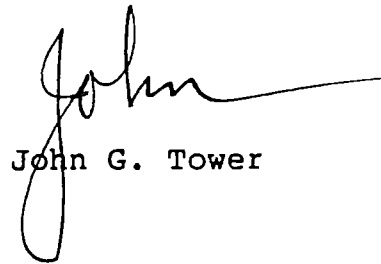

This is the statement that I will deliver on camera in the event that the Senate does not confirm me. After this statement is read, I do not intend to take questions.

It is time for the bitterness, rancor and anger to fade and for those elements of government who have been involved in the confirmation process to unite to be about the people's business. I will be recorded as the first cabinet nominee in the history of the Republic to be rejected in the first 90 days of a Presidency and perhaps be harshly judged. But I depart from this place at peace with myself knowing that I have given a full measure of devotion to my country. No public figure in my memory has been subjected to such a far-reaching and thorough investigation nor had his human foibles bared to such intensive and demeaning public scrutiny. And yet there is no finding that I have ever breached established legal and ethical standards nor been derelict in my duty.

I am deeply grateful to our great President for his continuing confidence in me and his unflagging support in the most difficult of circumstances. I am obliged to my old colleagues in the Senate who rallied to me with fervor, zeal, and eloquence in the face of staggering political odds. I shall always be in their debt. I am thankful to the thousands of Americans who have inundated me with messages of encouragement and support.

It is my intention to return to private life in my beloved Texas. But I shall speak out from time to time on national issues when my knowledge, experience and insights may contribute to public debate.

I hope that my successor will be expeditiously confirmed and I wish him Godspeed.

5:30 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

TOWER NOMINATION (Reuter) -- The Senate voted 53-47 to reject the nomination of John Tower, inflicting a sharp political defeat on President Bush. The vote came before packed public galleries.

PRESIDENT'S TRIP (New York/AP) -- President Bush served notice to cop-killing drug traffickers that "hunting season is over" and said he is determined to attack the nation's drug problem on both the supply and demand fronts. Kicking off what the White House has billed as "drug week," Bush flew to New York to pay tribute to DEA agents killed in the line of duty.

EASTERN (AP) -- Eastern's bankruptcy filing confused congressional efforts to push a balky President Bush into the middle of the strike against the enfeebled air carrier. The House Public Works Committee had been poised to approve a bill that would have required Bush to appoint an emergency board to recommend a solution to the rancorous walkout. The proposal could prove to be little more than symbolic because the Bush administration has threatened to veto it, and because it may not even make it out of the Senate. Rep. Oberstar (D-Minn), chairman of the Public Works aviation subcommittee, and other lawmakers said they believed that it was unconstitutional for a law to single out a single company in bankruptcy proceedings.

BUDGET (Reuter) -- Congressional budget analysts said President Bush's budget plan for the 1990 fiscal year would lead to a deficit of \$131 billion, far higher than the \$91 billion forecast by the White House. Most of the difference is due to whether the billions of dollars needed to bail out the savings and loan industry is included in the budget. The forecast by the respected CBO is expected to make Bush's task of selling his budget to the Democratic-controlled Congress more difficult.

S&Ls (UPI) -- The FDIC took over management of another 45 financially troubled savings and loan institutions under the joint regulatory oversight program announced by President Bush last month. The 45 thrifts will maintain normal operations and all depositors will continue to be protected up to a \$100,000 insurance limit.

SOVIETS/WORLD COURT (U.N./AP) -- The U.S. welcomed Soviet acceptance of World Court authority on human rights, but a government legal expert said the justices probably never will hear a case testing the Kremlin's commitment. U.N. and State Department legal officers said Gorbachev's acceptance of jurisdiction by the World Court will bring him international good will with little risk of embarrassment over Soviet human rights practices.

POLAND (Warsaw/AP) -- Government and opposition negotiators announced agreement on free elections to a newly created senate, in what could be the first democratic national elections in the communist bloc. In addition, the sides agreed to two-stage elections to the existing parliament, in which opposition candidates would be free to run for at least 35% of the seats. Politburo member Janusz Reykowski said anyone could run for the senate who is nominated by an existing political or social group, or who gathered 5,000 signatures. The two sides also agreed in principle to establish a president who would be elected by a majority of both chambers of parliament.

(1) I asked Loret Ruppe over the weekend if she would be interested in going to Norway. She said she was honored but wanted time to think about it. Since then she passed the word that she wants to speak with you privately before deciding. I suspect this is a gambit to corner you on the directorship of Y.E.S., which is best left unaddressed till Gregg Petersmeyer develops the program. Therefore, I recommend that you not see Loret and that instead you call her. (I am willing to make this call on your behalf if you desire.) In that call, you/I would tell her that nothing has been decided on Y.E.S., that the only question before the house is whether she wants to go to Norway. If she says yes, it's a deal. If not, you've made her a first-rate offer that she chose to reject and take her chances with Y.E.S.

Mosbacher foes may be too late

Most people would think Rob Mosbacher, son of the new secretary of commerce, is too nice a guy to be a politician. He's friendly, engaging, polite, and thoughtful. At 21, he still looks 20-something, the kind of wholesome, fresh-scrubbed young man little old ladies like to look at as their son.

But politician he is, and as the state elections 21 months away, Mosbacher is the most likely Republican nominee for lieutenant governor.

A few years ago, serious-minded candidates would not have aspired to the GOP nomination for lieutenant governor. It was a sure way to defeat to one's political résumé. Now, though, times are different, and with most GOP nominations worth having, many ambitious Republicans are jostling for positions on the 1990 ticket.

What makes Mosbacher's emergence noteworthy is his position as the likely Republican nominee means that other strong Republicans don't want to challenge him, and it includes understanding with various gubernatorial assistants that if they drop out of that to run for something else, the "nothing else" won't be lieutenant governor.

To secure his position, Mosbacher is already on the hustings. Though not an announced candidate, he is visiting political operations around the state, making known his interest in running and, incidentally, also making known his plan to wage a \$4 mil-

lion to \$5 million campaign. That plan is not lost on audiences who know he has the ability to put substance behind the theory. Aside from his personal wealth, he has access to major GOP contributors from his time as Republican finance chairman, and he has one of the state's premier fund-raisers, Herb Butrum, committed to raise the money.

Mosbacher has gathered a campaign team that creates political substance to match his financial substance. He has signed Charles Black as campaign strategist. Unknown to the average voter, Black's success with former clients Phil Gramm and George Bush gives his name weight with politicians.

In addition, Mosbacher has commitments from John Cozart, an experienced public relations expert, to serve as press secretary and from Dr. David Hill, former director of the Texas Poll, to be his pollster. His advertising campaign will probably be planned by Michael Murphy, one of the bright young stars of political advertising. Murphy has the talent to counter the kind of "wrestle-in-the-mud" campaign that Comptroller Bob Bullock, the likely Democratic nominee, has shown inclinations to favor.

Mosbacher's credibility is not built purely on political clout. His personal credentials are impressive as well.

A graduate of Georgetown University and SMU law school, he worked eight years for former U.S. Senate majority leader Howard Baker, rising from legislative aide to administrative assistant, the sen-

for staff position.

After leaving Washington, he returned home to Houston where he joined the family business and now heads Mosbacher Energy Co. He dedicates at least two days a week to his duties as chairman of the Texas Department of Human Services, the \$3.5 billion state agency that administers the welfare program. He is also chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Welfare Reform and was a member of President Reagan's Advisory Committee for Private Sector Initiatives. He founded the Houston Committee for Private Sector Initiatives.

Mosbacher's activities in welfare

reform and his efforts to involve the private sector in key problems like employment training, neighborhood revitalization, and child care give credibility to his call for Republicans to offer solutions to problems. The solutions he offers as chairman of the TDHS and chairman of the welfare reform task force will also give insight into his vision. That's politically significant because, on the stump, Mosbacher calls for Republicans to offer a vision for the future of Texas.

The filing deadline is still many months away, and today's reality can quickly become tomorrow's forgotten memory. Mosbacher's position as the "likely Republican nominee" could pass if vows of other aspiring politicians change. Some supporters of young George Bush for governor are encouraging Railroad Commissioner Ken Hance to drop out of the governor's race to run for lieutenant governor, while a key adviser to Robert Barrera Jr. is encouraging him to run for lieutenant governor rather than make another race for attorney general.

But if his position as the leading candidate does fade, some heavy weights had better move fast. Whatever others decide, Mosbacher is in the lieutenant governor's race to stay. If prospective opponents, encouraged by Mosbacher's disarming looks and style, think he's weak, they'll be surprised. He is tough and determined. And at the pace he is moving, some who could have beaten him if they had acted sooner will find the door closed and locked.

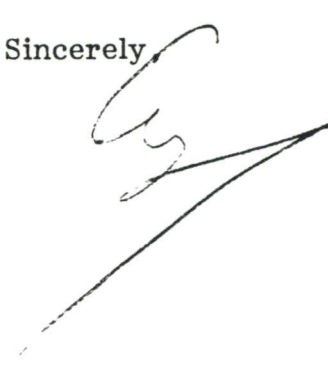

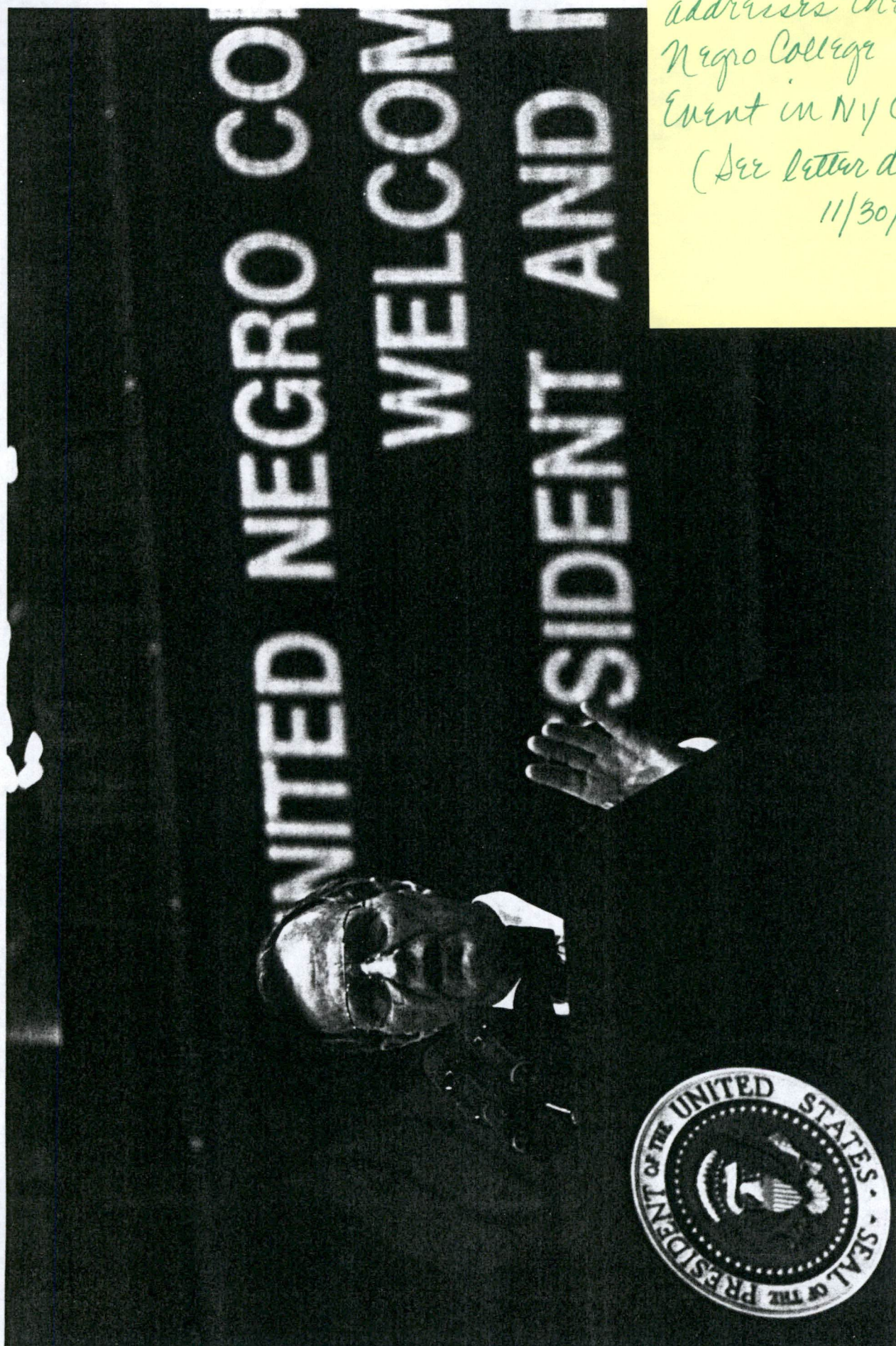
