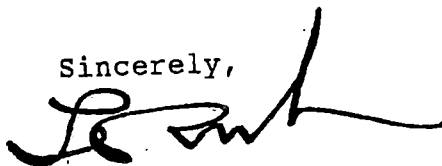

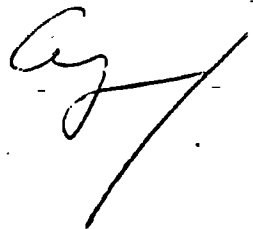

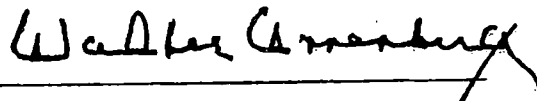
This unfortunate story that I am enclosing with a copy of a letter from Richard Nixon that he had sent to Chief of Staff Sununu would be upsetting to you too.

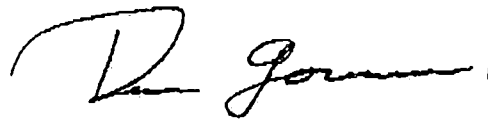

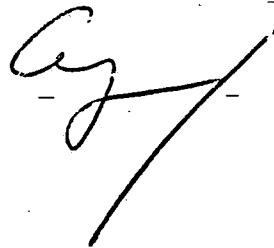

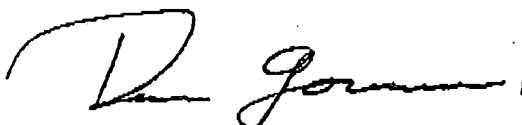
