IN HAMTRAMCK, BUSH OFFERS AID FOR POLAND

**He Says It's Intended To Encourage
New Moves Toward Freedom There**

HAMTRAMCK -- Citing a reawakening of democracy in Eastern Europe, President Bush announced a package of U.S. financial help for Poland's ailing economy Monday to reward the Soviet bloc nation for moving this month to adopt sweeping political changes.

"Democratic forces in Poland have asked for the moral, political and economic support of the West. And the West will respond," Bush said in Hamtramck, which boasts that more than half of its 25,000 residents are of Polish descent.

The actions announced by Bush would clear the way for Western banks, governments, and businesses to pump billions of dollars in new loans, investments, and trade incentives into Poland's distressed economy.

Bush Unveils Economic Aid Plan For Poland

HAMTRAMCK -- President Bush, declaring that "Eastern Europe is awakening to the yearning for democracy, independence and prosperity," unveiled a program Monday that is intended to provide Poland with a modest package of trade and economic benefits in response to the political and economic liberalization.

In Warsaw, Solidarity leader Lech Walesa praised Bush's announcement, describing the President as a "brilliant politician." Looking relaxed despite what he said was a case of pneumonia, he said, "Bush is a great man and he knows the Polish situation very well."

Walesa called the proposal for U.S. aid "quite big."

Neither the government nor Solidarity itself issued any comment, with spokesmen for both sides saying they preferred to withhold comment until they had read Bush's speech. (James Gerstenzang, Los Angeles Times, A1)

Bush, making his first visit to Michigan since becoming Chief Executive, also found time to wave to school kids whose classes were cancelled for the day and munch on stuffed cabbage, pierogi, and kielbasa with Cardinal Edmund Szoka and other state leaders at a local restaurant.

The crowd, many of whom held U.S. and red and white Polish flags, lined up early in the rain. About 4,000 showed up, police said, short of the 10,000 hoped for by promoters, who blamed the threatening skies for the lighter turnout.

Bush Rewards Polish Reform With A Credit, Trade Package

HAMTRAMCK -- President Bush, acting quickly to reward Poland's communist government for dramatic political changes, announced yesterday an eight-point loan and trade package aimed at reversing the country's economic decline....

The President noted that "for almost half a century the suppression of freedom in Eastern Europe, sustained by the military power of the Soviet Union, has kept nation from nation, neighbor from neighbor.

"...We dream of the day when Eastern European peoples will be free to choose their system of government, and to vote for the party of their choice in regular, free, contested elections," he said. "And we envision an Eastern Europe in which the Soviet Union has renounced military intervention as an instrument of its policy on any pretext."

Threats Don't Dim Welcome For President; Bush Promises Aid To Poland

HAMTRAMCK -- Roman Fiskiewicz, who emigrated from Poland 4 years ago, held his antsy young son, Matthew, and explained in broken english what President Bush's trip Monday meant to him.

"I want Poland to have a future for me and for my son," he said.

President Bush's visit brought out Polish natives like Fiskiewicz, as well as thousands of other sons and daughters of Poles.

Bush's call for economic support for Poland was applauded by the crowd of almost 4,000 which gathered outside City Hall in this largely Polish community.

U.S. Offers Poles Incentives; Bush Presses East-Bloc Liberalization

HAMTRAMCK -- President Bush, in his initial address stemming from a wide-ranging foreign policy review, offered new economic incentives to Poland today and challenged the Soviet Union to allow further liberalization in Eastern Europe.

Speaking to a small but enthusiastic crowd in front of City Hall in this Polish-American enclave, Bush declared, "My friends, liberty is an idea whose time has come in Eastern Europe, and make no mistake about it."

The President, who has taken a cautious view of reform efforts in the Soviet Union over the last year, attributed the "opening" in Eastern Europe in part to what he described as "the bold, new thinking in the Soviet Union."

On the same day that the outlawed Polish trade union Solidarity was legalized formally, Bush announced his conditional approval of steps that eventually could ease Poland's \$39 billion foreign debt and encourage economic reforms necessary for it to benefit from additional lending.

Poland Plan Meant To Reward Reforms, Spur Trade

HAMTRAMCK -- President Bush announced Monday a package of economic incentives designed to reward the Polish government's recent moves toward liberalization and held out hope of similar moves toward other Eastern European Communist nations.

...Bush hailed the April 5 agreement between the Polish government and the once-banned Solidarity labor union as one that, "if faithfully implemented, will be a watershed in the history of Eastern Europe."

"We can and must answer this call to freedom," the President said. He declared that "if Poland's experiment succeeds, other countries may follow," pledging that "help from the West will come in concert with liberalization."

And, he said, "We dream of the day when Eastern European countries will be free to choose their own peaceful course in the world, including closer ties with Western Europe." (Carl Leubsdorf, Knight-Ridder)

Bush Offers Aid To Poland In Exchange For Political, Economic Reform

HAMTRAMCK -- In a clear signal to other Soviet bloc countries, President Bush Monday announced a series of initiatives designed to support more political and economic reform in Poland.

In a speech delivered to a flag-waving gathering in this heavily Polish-American Detroit suburb, Bush's plan is also designed to spur democratic moves in Eastern Europe that would follow Poland's example....

"If Poland's experiment succeeds, other countries may follow," Bush said. "There can be no progress without significant political and economic liberalization. Help from the West will come in concert with liberalization." (John Mashek, Boston Globe)

Administration Officials Say Bush's Poland Package Could Help Break Down East-West Divisions In Europe

Administration officials said Monday a political and economic aid package to Poland, announced by President Bush in Michigan, could help break down East-West divisions in Europe.

A senior official, briefing reporters at the State Department on the condition of not being identified, emphasized that the series of measures, while they dealt specifically with economic and trade issues, were meant as a political instrument.

The official said the package "constitutes a potential landmark in this country's approach to ending the division of Europe." ...

The official said that Polish economic reforms, encouraged by the U.S. and other Western governments, "could lead to a series of small steps, if we are wise and lucky" that could revolutionize the relationship between East and West. (Jim Anderson, UPI)

MAN ACCUSED OF THREATENING PRESIDENT BUSH

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich. -- A man accused of threatening President Bush's life was arrested Monday outside a National Guard base just before the President's motorcade raced by, the Secret Service said.

Richard Gregory, 37, was apprehended by base police and Secret Service agents at the main gate of Selfridge Air National Guard Base, said James Huse, special-agent-in-charge of the Detroit Secret Service.

No bomb was found, but authorities blew up Gregory's briefcase after they saw what they believed was explosive residue, Huse said. (UPI)

HOUSE COMMITTEE CHARGES WRIGHT WITH 69 ETHICS-RULES VIOLATIONS

Improper Gifts, 'Scheme' To Evade Income Limit On Book Sales Cited

The House ethics committee unanimously charged yesterday that Speaker Wright had committed dozens of violations of House rules stemming from his financial dealings with a Fort Worth businessman and the bulk sales of his book, "Reflections of a Public Man."

The 12-member committee, in an extensive report that stunned many of Wright's strongest supporters, said it had found reason to believe that the speaker had broken House rules in 69 instances on five separate counts of alleged wrongdoing....

In a prepared statement, committee chairman Dixon described bulk sales of the book as "an overall scheme to evade" House limits on outside income and said that Wright improperly accepted gifts worth \$145,000 from [Fort Worth developer George] Mallick in the form of his wife's salary, free and reduced-rate housing, and use of a car.

The House ethics committee, in a scathing report citing 69 violations of House rules, accused Speaker Wright on Monday of accepting nearly \$145,000 in "gifts" and scheming to avoid limits on outside income....

The speaker's Washington attorney, William Oldaker, called the committee's formal action "a lot of noise, a lot of clamoring, but very little substance."

"From what I see here," said Oldaker, "I do not believe there were any intentional, or technical, violations."

Wright Stands Confident In His Innocence

Speaker Wright...says he is confident he can prove his innocence and wants the [ethics committee charges] resolved as soon as possible....

"I want the earliest possible opportunity to get this resolved decisively and definitively and get it behind us," he later told reporters.

Democratic allies of Speaker Wright stepped up their defense of [him] yesterday in the wake of the House ethics committee report outlining his possible violations of House rules. But a number of them appeared privately shaken by what the committee had found.

"I just read it; it's like a ton of bricks fell on him," one Democrat who has defended Wright said of the report.... "It's difficult to defend against the volumes of allegations. Where do you start?" ...

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Report Details Oil Well Investment; Arrangement Yielded Substantial Income For Speaker's Blind Trust

The 279-page report that led to the ethics charges against Speaker Wright contains previously unreported information about Wright's finances, including an oil well investment that contributed substantial income to Wright's blind trust on the day the ethics investigation of the speaker started.

The report also discloses that the sales of Wright's book, "Reflections of a Public Man," exceeded by 2,000 the 19,000 copies that were printed. Those who did not receive the book paid for it anyway, contributing to the House ethics committee's conclusion that the book sales were a way to evade House rules on income.

SENATE BEGINS DEBATE ON S&L BAILOUT PLAN Republicans Blame House For High Costs

The Senate opened debate yesterday on President Bush's slightly altered plan for bailing out S&L depositors and Republicans blamed House Democrats for the bulk of the costs.

[Sen.] Garn said the bailout costs -- estimated at a minimum of \$157 billion over the next 10 years -- would be only half as much if in 1986, the Democrat-controlled House had gone along with a Senate-approved measure to pump \$15 billion into the S&L insurance funds to close insolvent thrifts there.

ALASKAN OFFICIALS ASSAIL EXXON CLEANUP PLAN

VALDEZ -- State officials Monday lashed out at Exxon's long-awaited cleanup plan on the grounds that it fails to consider ridding toxic wastes and skimming contaminants from water....

"Exxon seems to have a hard time getting it together," said Dennis Kelso, the state's top environmental officer. "What has happened to date shows a lack of organization, lack of planning and a lack of delivery."

Kelso said he was concerned that Exxon...would not be able to meet its own timetable.

Coast Guard Adm. Yost...said time was crucial. "The oil is weathering rapidly," he said. "It's forming into tar balls and covering areas that are getting hard to reach. It's our intention to measure whether Exxon stays on target." (Jeff Berliner, UPI)

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SULLIVAN TO CALL FOR WELFARE REFORM REGULATIONS

BUSH MEETS WITH BRITISH FOREIGN SECRETARY

President Bush met Monday with British Foreign Secretary Geoffrey Howe and expressed his desire that the NATO summit meeting in Brussels next month will project a broad vision of the future of Europe and the Atlantic Alliance, a White House spokesman said.

Press Secretary Fitzwater said that Howe, who met with Bush for 30 minutes in the Oval Office, gave the President a report on Soviet leader Gorbachev's recent stop in London.

"The President emphasized the success of the Alliance over the last 40 years and his desire that the upcoming NATO summit project a broad future of Europe and the Alliance's role in it," said Fitzwater. (UPI)

British Foreign Minister Confers With Bush On NATO

British Foreign Secretary Geoffrey Howe, who discussed the future of NATO with President Bush, rejected suggestions Monday that the Alliance make deeper cuts in conventional arms spending....

"We will get bids (from defense firms) and I would suggest that by the end of this year or early next year we would begin to see what those look like and be in a position to make a decision" the senior Bush administration official said.

But the official, who asked not to be identified, told reporters any deployment of the controversial short-range weapon in the mid-1990s would be up to NATO and said Congress might not even provide money for it without allied approval.

SHAMIR REJECTS PULLOUT OF TROOPS IN TERRITORIES

JERUSALEM -- Israeli Prime Minister Shamir said Monday he would not withdraw troops to pave way for elections in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, where three more Palestinians died amid mounting violence....

"Their deployment is necessary to maintain order. Order is also necessary to hold elections," he said....

Shamir, who said he opposed the participation of 140,000 East Jerusalem Arabs, where many Palestinian leaders live, also dismissed the idea of international supervision of the polls.

U.S. IS PRESSING SYRIA TO END BEIRUT SHELLING

The Bush administration has decided to step up pressure on Syria to stop shelling Christian areas of East Beirut.

"Obviously, we are against all violence, proportional or not. But we felt that what the Syrians were doing had to be publicly cited if we were going to induce them to accept a cease-fire."

MITCHELL SETS STAFF PROBE ON IRAN-CONTRA PAPERS

Senate Majority Leader Mitchell said yesterday he has ordered a staff investigation to determine whether the Reagan White House deliberately withheld from the congressional Iran-contra investigating committees documents it subsequently made available in the trial of Oliver North.

Mitchell told reporters that if the investigation process proves the White House did not "comply with the promise to provide all appropriate documents," he would treat it as "a matter of the utmost gravity," throwing into question Congress' ability to rely on commitments from President Bush.

Mitchell...told a group of reporters that the North trial...has raised important questions about Bush's role in the affair.... [He] said Bush has a duty to respond once the case is decided.

POLAND ANNOUNCEMENT

ABC's Peter Jennings: President Bush went before an audience of Polish Americans in Hamtramck, Michigan today to announce a major new package of economic benefits for Poland. Call them incentives. It's meant to reward the Polish government for reforms already made and to encourage more.

ABC's Brit Hume: The President came to this noted Polish-American community on this long-awaited day to associate himself with the cause of freedom in Poland. But with the U.S. treasury in deficit, the plan Mr. Bush announced to advance that cause is long on moral support and short on money, though money is what Poland needs most. The Bush plan would include certain U.S. tariff exemptions on Polish products, such as hams, U.S. backing for rescheduling Poland's massive foreign debt, U.S.-backed loans for private investment in Poland and encouraging U.S. lenders to swap debt for equity in Polish businesses. Administration officials refused to put a dollar estimate on the package, and it would be conditioned on further progress toward political and economic freedom. These sorts of incentives for change are likely to be offered other Warsaw Pact countries as part of an effort to free them from Soviet dominance and dependence.

(President Bush: "We share an unwavering conviction that one day all the peoples of Europe will live in freedom, and make no mistake about that.")

That, of course, remains a dream, but a challenge as well to Soviet leader Gorbachev to permit not just the economic independence in places like Poland, which he wants, but a degree of political independence which he may not want.

Jennings: The President's package will be welcomed in Poland, where political change is already a factor and where economic need is always a reality.

ABC's Jerry King reports that Solidarity leader Lech Walesa called President Bush "a friend who really understands Poland." Riding the train to Warsaw, Walesa said he'd heard few details. But what he had heard made him happy. "It's a first step," he said. An aide termed the President's remarks "crucial." The President's speech was covered in less than a minute on the main Polish television news. No official reaction yet. Privately, some Poles thought he should have been more specific, the aid package more immediate.

(Polish TV commentator: "What we heard is a kind of a political support. And what we need here in Poland, right now, is a substantial economic assistance.")

Already there have been some joint business ventures involving U.S. companies and Poland, but the economy here is staggering under a foreign debt of nearly \$40 billion. A Polish political commentator, like Walesa, now feels like Poland finally has a friend in Washington.

King continues:

(Polish political commentator: "We are willing to pay, but we need some help and some understanding, and I think that Bush shows that he is willing to understand some of the challenges of Poland.")

Today in a Warsaw courtroom, officially the Solidarity union was re-registered as a legal independent trade union. And as a measure of the change, it's widely expected the man who outlawed the union seven years ago, the Communist Party boss, will meet tomorrow with Walesa, the man he once detained without trial. (ABC-7)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: President Bush went to bat for Poland today, offering a plan to help that country deal with its current economic crisis. Among other things, the President said he'll ask Congress to lower the tariff on some Polish imports. He'll also ask for approval of U.S.-guaranteed loans to stimulate the Polish economy. The President went to a heavily Polish-American town in Michigan to announce his incentives. He said, "This country must respond to the changes now taking place in Poland."

(President Bush: "Democratic forces in Poland have asked for the moral, political, and economic support of the West. And we can and must answer this call to freedom.")

Just before the President spoke, there was dramatic evidence of the changes that are taking place in Poland these days. A court in Warsaw approved Solidarity's application for a legal status....

CBS's Dan Rather: Solidarity won its struggle for survival today, and Poland won an immediate promise of a lot of money. A judge in Warsaw officially re-certified the independent trade union to the cheers of Solidarity backers.... President Bush responded today with long-awaited economic concessions to the government of Poland, and he won cheers from Polish-Americans for that.

Wyatt Andrews:

(President Bush: "We can and must answer this call to freedom.")

President Bush today chose the Polish-American community of Hamtramck, Michigan to announce a new U.S. policy to Poland: a package of economic incentives to reward Poland for moves toward democracy.

(President Bush: "The Poles are now taking steps that deserve our active support.")

For years, U.S. policy has punished the Polish consumer. The new Bush plan would reverse that, asking Congress to grant Poland preferred trade status, allowing many Polish imports into the United States duty-free. The plan encourages new private investment in Poland and promises U.S. help in rescheduling Poland's foreign debt. The entire package is based on the condition that Poland keep its promises to reform.

(President Bush: "We're not going to offer aid without requiring sound economic practices in return.")

Rewarding Poland for its political reform is not just a policy aimed at helping Poland economically. It is also a political message aimed at the Soviet Union. This is one area where the White House believes it can take the global initiative away from Mikhail Gorbachev. It's as if Mr. Bush is warning Gorbachev the U.S. will use its financial clout to pursue the goal of a free Europe.

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Andrews continues:

(President Bush: "And we envision an Eastern Europe in which the Soviet Union has renounced military intervention as an instrument of its policy on any pretext. We share an unwavering conviction that one day all the peoples of Europe will live in freedom.")

(Zbigniew Brzezinski: "For the Soviet Union, this is a test as to whether the Soviet Union is prepared to accept democracy and the reunification of Europe. If it is not, then a great deal of what Gorbachev is talking about is false.")

Despite the political show in Michigan, there are complaints today's package is not enough. But the White House thinks the U.S. was burned in the '70s when it gave Poland cash grants and now wants to force Poland to earn the money. (CBS-2)

NORTH TRIAL/MITCHELL

Brokaw: Sen. Mitchell said today that after watching the Oliver North trial, he personally believes that President Reagan was much more involved than previous investigations indicated. Mitchell also said he thinks that President Bush will have to explain his role as the result of documents introduced at the trial. Mitchell has asked congressional investigators to determine why those documents apparently didn't get to his committee [during the Iran-Contra hearings]. (NBC-2)

WRIGHT/ETHICS

Jennings: We begin tonight with the first speaker of the House in the history of the U.S. Congress to be formally charged with violating the ethics of Congress. Over time, political ethics have had many definitions. Still, when the House Ethics Committee today formally charged the Speaker with 69 violations of the ethics act, this one written in 1978, Jim Wright had to know he was one step deeper in trouble. So what exactly are the charges? What does it mean to the Speaker's future, and what will be the effect on the rest of Congress?

ABC's Sheilah Kast reports that the committee's report at this stage is similar to an indictment. There is reason to believe that Speaker Wright violated House rules 69 times. Nearly one-third of the alleged violations stem from what the committee saw as a deliberate scheme to evade House limits on outside income. The committee concluded that Betty Wright's \$18,000-a-year salary from a Mallick-Wright investment company for four years was really a gift, as were the free condo and company Cadillac she used. The six Democrats and six Republicans voted unanimously to release the report. Speaking to a labor group, Wright challenged the committee to hear his personal defense within a week.

ABC's Allan Frank reports that the committee is also looking into a natural gas deal. In January 1988, Mallightco reached an agreement to buy a 4% interest in a gas well known as the North Sabine Prospect. They put down \$9,000 and agreed to pay an estimated \$90,000 to complete the well. In early April the well struck gas. But by early May, just a month later, it had gone dry.

Frank continues: Nevertheless, on May 10, Mallightco traded its share in the well to a petroleum company in exchange for a cash loan of \$350,000. There seemed to be no provision to recover the loan if the well did not produce. What is more puzzling to the committee is what happened next. In a complicated transaction in early June 1988, Mallightco bought out Wright's interest in the company by paying his trust \$350,000. Jim Wright's lawyers say the blind trust had no knowledge of the gas deal. (ABC-Lead)

Brokaw: House Speaker Wright can't blame party politics for his big troubles tonight. He now faces a trial by his House peers after Republicans and Democrats alike on the House Ethics Committee charged him today with a long list of violations, most of them designed to get Wright more money.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports that the committee also investigated and rejected four charges: that Wright used campaign funds to publish his book; that he pressured S&L regulators to go easy on Texas thrifts; that his staff worked on his book on government time; that he lobbied for a business partner with whom he had natural gas investments.

NBC's Bob Kur reports that the Wright case, which involves his wife, does not suggest congressional wives cannot work -- only that they must be especially careful in a company town where the potential for conflict of interest runs high. (NBC-Lead)

Rather: The Democratic Speaker of the House of Representatives stands accused tonight by a panel of his peers. By unanimous vote of the ethics committee, Texan Jim Wright was accused of dozens of violations of House rules. Wright's lawyer called the allegations "double-speak." But there is no doubt now that the man who is second in line to the presidency is facing a battle for political survival.

CBS's Phil Jones reports that the committee dropped 47 findings brought by special counsel Richard Phelan, including charges that Wright used undue influence to lobby government agencies on behalf of friends. (CBS-Lead)

OIL SPILL/EXXON

Jennings reports that no sooner had Exxon laid out the details of its latest plan for cleaning up the deal than Adm. Yost criticized it as being overly optimistic. One of his concerns was that Exxon will not be able to finish the cleanup before winter sets in, which comes early in Alaska.

ABC's Mike von Fremd reports that in its plan Exxon promises to hire 4,000 workers to scrub 300 miles of oiled shoreline. Exxon proposes scrapping the current procedure of wiping rocks one at a time, in favor of the more effective water blasting technique. To keep the workers and equipment on site, Exxon would bring in 11 floating hotels.

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von Fremd continues: Under Exxon's timetable, all workers would be in place by June 11, and beach cleanup would be finished by Sept. 15, before cold weather sets in. The oil company's plan allows for only 18 days of bad weather, and Adm. Yost says Exxon needs to be more realistic.

(Adm. Yost: "I'm going to have to talk to them about that, because without the sustainability, the plan is going to fall apart.")

The Exxon plan deals only with beach cleanup in Prince William Sound. (ABC-2)

EASTERN AIRLINES

Brokaw: Texas Air Corporation said today that Eastern Airlines, strike-bound and bankrupt, is no longer for sale, except in pieces. Officials said they will sell off large chunks, then run it as a smaller airline. (NBC-8)

EASTERN PLANE/COCAINE

Jennings: As if Eastern Airlines didn't have enough problems, the U.S. Customs Service has impounded an Eastern jet. Seventy-five pounds of cocaine were found on board after the plane arrived in Miami on Saturday on a flight from Paraguay. (ABC-4)

Brokaw reports that Customs fined the airline more than \$1 million. (NBC-9, CBS-6)

That was Bennett's style in his earlier incarnation as secretary of education in Ronald Reagan's administration... 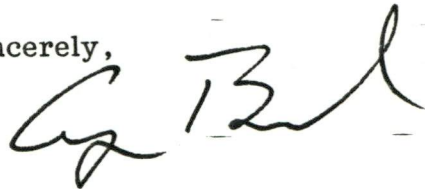

Co-Chairmen include Lane Kirkland, John C. Whitehead and Liv Ullmann.

I am writing to you personally, and on behalf of the IRC Board of Directors, to ask if you would serve as Honorary Chairman of this event honoring Prince Sadrudin. We anticipate an attendance of several hundred distinguished persons from the business, diplomatic and international communities.

We expect a substantial number of Afghan refugees to be returning to their devastated homeland by April. I know you have visited the Afghan refugee camps and are personally committed to their cause. The IRC has been the leading American voluntary agency helping Afghan refugees in Pakistan, and we will be there and in Afghanistan to assist them in their return.

You honored us in 1983 by being the speaker at the 50th Anniversary observance of the International Rescue Committee. You spoke eloquently about the "human toll" of the war being fought in Afghanistan, of the refugees driven into exile by Soviet forces as well as "the suffering and displacement within that tragic country."

I hope you will not think me presumptuous if I also quote the concluding words you addressed to the IRC on that occasion, which provided strength and inspiration to us all:

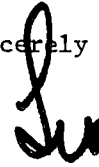

Prince Sadruddin Aga Khan, the uncle of the current Aga Khan, the spiritual leader of millions of Moslems of the Ismaili sect, largely in India, Iran and Kenya, has emerged as a favorite among United States officials to become the next Director General of the United Nations Scientific, Educational and Cultural Organization, or Unesco.

American support is important, since the United States, along with Britain, withdrew its support of Unesco because of dissatisfaction with the leadership of the present Director General, Amadou-Mahtar M'Bow from Senegal. If Prince Sadruddin were to get the Unesco position, some Washington officials say the United States would quickly rejoin the organization and resume financial support of it.

Prince Sadruddin's supporters include Vice President Bush and Senator Claiborne Pell, the Rhode Island Democrat who is chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee. Another likely supporter is Senator Edward M. Kennedy, Democrat of Massachusetts, who was a classmate of Prince Sadruddin at Harvard.

Mr. Bush's friendship with Prince Sadruddin is said to be so close that he stays at the Prince's home, the Chateau de Belle Rive, when he visits Geneva. Last week Mr. Bush and his wife, Barbara, were flown by helicopter to the Virginia horse country, where they spent the day with Prince Sadruddin and his wife, Princess Catherine, at the Prince's farm in Middleburg.

Prince Sadruddin served as United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees from 1965 to 1977 and once campaigned unsuccessfully for the United Nations' top spot, Secretary General. A Senate aide said he was expected to receive the backing of the State Department and to join the sweepstakes to succeed Mr. M'Bow with formidable support that would include not only the backing of the United States but perhaps that of Britain, France, West Germany and Japan as well.

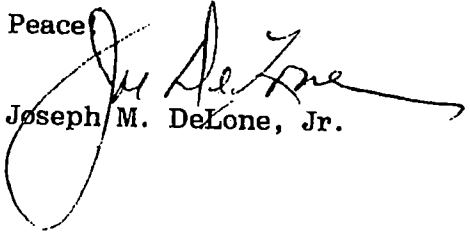

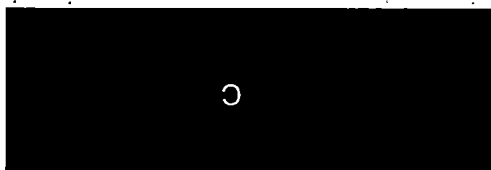
