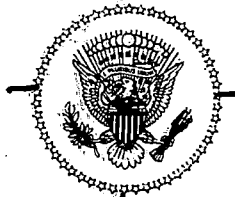

BUSH PUSHES VOLUNTEERISM FOR GRADUATES

WYNCOTE, Pa. -- President Bush told high school graduates here last night to help "by word and by deed" people seeking freedom in the Soviet Union, Poland and the young man in China who confronted a column of tanks unarmed.

"We do not have to stand in front of tanks in America, but we do have to summon the same courage to confront the evil that exists in the world," Bush said during commencement exercises at Cheltenham High School in Montgomery County, near Philadelphia....

"Today I ask you to take a risk for a cause larger than ourselves," Bush said, using his first address to graduating high school students to pitch for a variety of public service, including support for those seeking "rights of assembly, religion, press, free speech."

The Bush administration plans to propose Wednesday at talks with the Soviet Union that mutual round-the-clock monitoring of certain ballistic missile factories and direct inspections of missile warheads begin prior to any new superpower agreement to cut strategic nuclear arsenals, a senior official said Monday....

The administration official characterized the initiatives as "confidence-building measures" to be implemented before a new arms control treaty is completed so that it can eventually win broad public and congressional support....

The official challenged critics who have recently suggested the initiatives would needlessly delay the treaty's completion. He suggested that the trial inspectors instead would save time by allowing a fine-tuning of the text to reflect proven inspection procedures.

Bush struck a similar theme in a statement released Monday asserting that verifying treaty compliance "may be the most complex" issue of the negotiations. (R. Jeffrey Smith, Washington Post, A1)

PENTAGON SHIFTS POLICY ON ARMS DEVELOPMENT COSTS Defense Dept. Will Lift Burden From Contractors In Quest For Quality, Atwood Says

The new team at the Pentagon, in a major shift from Reagan-era military procurement policy, has decided that the Defense Department will pay the full cost of bringing weapons to production rather than continue to require contractors to help finance the expensive development phase, Deputy Defense Secretary Donald Atwood said Monday.

The defense industry is certain to hail the change, which could mean billions of dollars in savings to defense contractors in the coming decade.

...But a number of lawmakers are expected to object to scrapping the current cost-sharing arrangements, which often require contractors to pay up to 50 percent of the development costs that precede production of a new weapon.

Atwood...said in an interview that the present cost-sharing arrangement sounds appealing but has proved to be penny-wise and pound-foolish. (George Wilson, Washington Post, A14)

GENSCHER TO BRIEF U.S. ON GORBACHEV'S ACCLAIMED TRIP TO BONN

BONN -- When Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher goes to Washington Tuesday, he will report on Soviet leader Gorbachev's rapturously-received Bonn visit and its likely impact on developing East-West relations....

Analysts said the atmosphere of Genscher's one-day stopover in Washington would be eased by U.S. satisfaction that Gorbachev's trip came off without surprises and that the West German government -- in contrast with the people -- did not go overboard greeting him.

"The Gorbymania noted by the U.S. media had no shock effect on official Washington," the daily Die Welt...said in a commentary by its Washington correspondent. (Mark Heinrich, Reuter)

Prime Minister Thatcher, whose "Europe-bashing" campaign tactics are drawing public criticism from Tory ranks, called the results "disappointing" but indicated she would wait until next month to undertake what is now seen as an inevitable shake-up of her government and her political operation.

The conservative leader, Constantine Mitsotakis of the New Democracy Party, is seeking support from the Communist alliance to form an interim government with a mandate limited to prosecution of financial irregularities that occurred under Papandreou's rule and to organization of new elections within a few months....

The leftist coalition leader, Harilaos Florakis of the Communist Party of Greece, said his group is seriously considering the proposal but has not yet decided how to respond.

BEIJING -- Amid growing signs of normalization in this beleaguered capital, China's political leadership appeared to be nearing resolution of the worst crisis in 40 years of Communist rule.

Three members of the ruling Politburo's inner circle -- Li Peng, Qiao Shi and Yao Yilin -- were prominently shown together on state-run television news Monday night....

"The rebellion has been basically quelled so far and the general situation is heading for stability," said Li...in the boldest expression of control since the massacre.

Foreign analysts viewed Monday's developments as a sign of growing confidence by the politically hard-line faction headed by supreme leader Deng Xiaoping, and as evidence that his inner circle has reached consensus on the fate of more moderate party leaders sympathetic to the student-led demonstrations, including General Secretary Zhao Ziyang.

NETWORK NEWS SUMMARY

(Monday Evening, June 19)

CONTRACTOR INDICTMENTS

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin this evening with a story of greed and about fraud and potential disaster involving what are believed to be millions of substandard parts sold to the Army and Air Force. In Tampa today a federal grand jury has indicted three former executives of a company called Aerodyne Investment Castings, Inc. They are charged with selling the military turbine engine blades made out of scrap metal. The blades are used in more than 22,000 jet aircraft, helicopters and tanks. They are critical parts, and their failure could spell disaster.

ABC's Jim Slade says that if one of the turbine blades Aerodyne made for helicopter or fighter engines broke, it could destroy the machine and kill the crew. Government investigators say Aerodyne increased its profits by mixing scrap metal back into what were supposed to be 100% pure metals to stretch the supply. Further, ABC News has obtained documents that show Aerodyne employees were directed by senior management to falsify test results and that other devices were used to evade quality control. Former employees say that one of the things that made it easy was the presence of at least one government inspector -- Warren Fisher -- who simply looked the other way. What's more, when Fisher left the government, investigators say he went to work in a front company set up by the indicted Aerodyne executives. The company laundered excess profits made by watering the metal down with scrap. The three executives that investigators say were responsible for Aerodyne's actions -- Russell Baker and his sons Roger and Russell, Jr. -- denied the charges.

(Donald Mancuso, Defense Department: "It's a matter of placing greed above national interest and safety of individuals that serve our country. So I view it as the most serious form of crime against the Department of Defense, probably right up there with espionage.")

Rep. Dingell is investigating the Aerodyne affair.

(Rep. Dingell: "There appears to be significant peril with regard to the helicopters and with regard to the parts. There also appears to be danger to personnel, which is not being adequately addressed by the Department of Defense.")

Over a seven-year period, Aerodyne manufactured millions of parts to be used for more than 22,000 helicopters, jets and tanks currently in use by the military. In a statement, the Air Force said that they had not had any problems with the turbine parts, but critics are not satisfied.

(Rep. Dingell: "I describe the military's response to this problem as seriously inadequate, callous, and probably seriously indifferent.") According to investigators there have been no systematic efforts by the Defense Department to test the parts or to determine whether they have caused any accidents.

CUSTOMS AUCTIONS

NBC's Tom Brokaw: Tonight we begin with what could be a major government scandal. It centers on this question: How can the government lose money when it sells off planes, boats, cars and assorted other expensive property confiscated from drug smugglers and drug dealers? Brian Ross reports federal prosecutors are looking into why the government loses and its partner in the sales wins big.

NBC's Brian Ross reports that every few weeks hundreds of seized drug planes, speedboats and yachts, fancy cars and a lot of other items not related to drugs are auctioned. This is supposed to be a big bonanza for the federal Treasury, but somehow, for the last three years, with all the money coming in at these auctions, the U.S. Customs Service has managed to lose millions of dollars selling off seized property the Customs Service gets for nothing. Now a federal grand jury in Texas is looking into what's happening with the Customs Service auctions in what authorities say may become a big scandal in the war on drugs. Government affidavits filed in federal court show that the criminal investigation focuses on a division of the Northrop corporation, which under a contract with Customs runs the auctions and the seized property program. Authorities say they are looking at allegations of a sophisticated nationwide scheme by Northrop to rip off profits from the Customs auctions by bill padding and fraud. A small town banker in Texas, George Talbert, discovered that a car bought with an auto loan from Talbert's bank was seized by Customs in a drug case and then sold off at auction by Northrop. But Northrop charged \$1,400 to handle the sale and another \$700 to tow the car 90 miles to the auction, leaving nowhere near enough to pay off the bank loan and nothing for the government. Talbert blew the whistle to the U.S. Attorney. The case has led authorities to seize records from a Northrop office in Oklahoma of every transaction involving Customs auctions going back three years. The top Northrop official handling the Customs contract, Roy Hooks, is under investigation for allegedly lying to federal agents and trying to hide some of the Northrop computer records when agents raided the office. In Washington there are questions about the role of the Customs Service itself in the Northrop investigation. The former chief financial officer for Customs, Linda Gibbs, has testified in Congress that she was removed from her job when she refused to go along with what she says was a cover-up of the auctions losses. Customs Commissioner vonRaab says there was no cover-up, and he says that Customs loses money on its auctions because Customs warehouses are full of a lot more than just fancy boats and cars.

(vonRaab: "When you lump all of our forfeitures together, including those made, let's say of fruit that doesn't pass FDA rules, or blue jeans that violate a quota or are mismarked, then we don't make a profit.")

Committees of the House and the Senate are now investigating who's telling the truth about allegations of a cover-up at Customs, and some at Congress say there's no excuse for Customs losing money on its auctions.

(Rep. Schulze: "Either the auctions are rigged or else they're being very poorly run.")

Ross continues: Customs officials have confirmed to NBC News at least two cases in which Northrop insiders apparently tried to rig auctions. Despite that and all the investigations, Northrop continues to run the Customs auctions, losing millions for the government and making millions for itself. (NBC-Lead)

HUD

Brokaw: In another government scandal receiving a lot of attention these days, President Bush said today that he is confident that Secretary Kemp will clean up the conditions which led to charges of gross mismanagement and influence peddling at HUD. Referring to the allegations of multi-million dollar fraud in HUD during the Reagan Administration, a White House spokesman said the President and Secretary Kemp talked Saturday about the need for a clean-up in that department. (NBC-2)

START TALKS

Jennings: Overseas in Geneva today the START talks resumed after a seven-month recess. The President said he wanted time for his Administration to review American arms reduction policies. The review hasn't changed all that much.

ABC's Bob Zelnick reports that the biggest problem blocking conclusion of the deal still is the Star Wars missile defense system. The U.S. wants to test Star Wars components and deploy the system when it's ready. That would mean an end to the ABM treaty limiting missile defenses. The Soviets want to keep the ABM treaty and say they won't make cuts in offensive missiles without it.

(Soviet negotiator Yuri Nazarkin: "This is probably going to be issue number one at the negotiations.")

Today the Bush Administration proposed a new wrinkle -- a so-called verification and stability plan. It calls for some on-site inspection before a treaty is concluded. Inspectors could, for example, count the number of warheads on missiles, building confidence in their ability to detect cheating once the treaty is completed. But finishing work on that treaty will likely take years, leaving the verification experts with a great body of information and expertise, but no treaty to enforce. (ABC-2)

Brokaw: After a seven-month break, there was a new start today for START. The new American negotiator is Richard Burt. He's the former ambassador to West Germany. His Soviet counterpart now is Yuri Nazarkin, an experienced arms negotiator from Moscow. The United States is placing a new emphasis on verification. It wants to monitor Soviet and American missile sites even before the two sides reach an agreement which they hope will cut long-range nuclear missiles by 50% on both sides. The current round of talks is expected to last for six or seven weeks. (NBC-6)

CBS's Dan Rather: The U.S. and the Soviet Union today opened a new round of talks on strategic arms. They're trying to work out the last and most difficult problems blocking a treaty to reduce long-range nuclear missiles. Each side brought in a new chief negotiator, but as Doug Tunnell reports, their positions were mostly unchanged.

CBS's Doug Tunnell reports that at the American mission in Geneva today the Bush Administration made its first foray into the most complex and most difficult arms control quandry of them all, long-range missiles. The first formal session on strategic arms since talks were halted seven months ago ended after only 80 minutes.

(U.S. Ambassador Burt: "I was able in the discussions to describe President Bush's overall approach to arms control, emphasizing the President's commitment to reducing the risk of nuclear war.")

After today's meeting, Mikhail Gorbachev's chief negotiator sounded optimistic.

(Yuri Nazarkin: "I'm satisfied. It was a good start.")

But on the big issues like Star Wars, mobile missiles and air- and sea-launched cruise missiles, there is not even a hint of movement, at least not yet. One key word used to describe the Bush approach to these talks is "continuity" -- no major changes from the Reagan Administration. But what that also means is no new solutions to old problems that blocked an accord on strategic arms when the talks were suspended seven months ago.

CBS's Wyatt Andrews: President Bush may be the first American leader in decades to signal that reducing nuclear missiles is not his top arms control priority. Mr. Bush sent his nuclear negotiators to Geneva with no new bold proposals and no urgent deadlines for a deal -- a sharp contrast to his conventional arms initiative where he wants both big cuts and quick action.

(President Bush on May 31: "And we should aim to reach an agreement within six months to a year.")

After years in which nuclear issues dominated arms control, the President for the first time has put troops on the table right along with silos and missile launchers.

(Sen. Nunn: "And the fact that we're putting more emphasis on conventional now emphasizes that we have neglected that for a long time.")

And while the President would move quickly on conventional arms reductions, critics say on long-range missiles the President appears to be slowing things down. In the strategy for the Geneva talks announced today, Mr. Bush is asking the Russians to agree to test in advance how long-range missile cuts would be verified -- in effect, a demand that both sides try out their anti-cheating techniques before writing them into the final treaty. Advance visits to each other's ICBM missile sites is one example. Critics accuse the President of a delaying tactic.

(Spurgeon Keeny, Jr., Arms Control Association: "Bush's new initiative will stall the progress in START and only delay any favorable outcome in the treaty.")

This policy to reduce troops quickly but nuclear arms slowly is once again partly due to the President's distrust of the Soviets. A senior Administration official says Mr. Bush views nuclear weapons as the crowned jewels of America's defense and wants to test the Soviets before he cuts the missiles.

(CBS-6)

TOXIC CHEMICALS

Jennings: The government today released a report on dangerous chemicals. It has been a long time coming. In 1986, as a result of the disaster at the Union Carbide plant at Bhopal in India, Congress passed a right-to-know law requiring companies in this country to notify the government every time a dangerous chemical is either moved or spilled or leaked into the environment. Today the first public results of that legislation.

ABC's Barry Serafin says that it's the first time the government has had a nationwide picture of chemical pollution, and it's not encouraging: in 1987, 18 billion pounds of toxic chemicals released directly into the air, land and water. The EPA data has been computerized so that libraries and individuals with personal computers can plug in to obtain information on chemical pollution in their communities and neighborhoods. But that will still leave questions.

(Charles Elkins, EPA: "The difficult part for all of us, both professionals, experts, and for the general public is to figure out exactly what that means for the person who lives in that neighborhood. Is the person at risk?")

Environmentalists say where cancer-causing chemicals are involved the answer is clear.

(David Doniger, National Resources Defense Council: "There is no level of a carcinogen which is safe to breathe.")

To focus on carcinogens, the NRDC has used EPA data to draw up a list of the worst offenders. Environmentalists hail the right-to-know law that makes that kind of information available, and recent proposals by President Bush for cleaning up the air. But they want those proposals toughened up, especially when it comes to chemicals that cause cancer. (ABC-3, CBS-10)

MEDICARE

Rather says that the nation's doctors are arming for a battle royale with Congress about federal spending for Medicare. The dispute over Medicare dominated today's session of the American Medical Association convention.

CBS's Susan Spencer reports that doctors at the convention fumed as they watched replays of congressional speeches last week on ET, nickname of a sweeping cost-cutting plan they say will endanger the health of 30 million Americans on Medicare. ET, Expenditure Target, would set a target each year for overall Medicare spending. Exceed the target one year and the government would cut reimbursements to doctors the next.

(Rep. Stark: "The American Medical Association cares nothing except to not limit the income of individual doctors.")

Not so says an indignant AMA, which in a letter to Congress calls the plan cynical and dangerous, and says seniors and the disabled will suffer, because doctors will be forced to ration services to meet targets. Plan supporters deny it would lead to any rationing of care. Medicare is currently galloping along, the cost of its programs growing 15% a year. The Administration last week embraced this proposal to limit it.

Spencer continues:

(Secretary Sullivan: "It has been projected that by the year 2005 physician payments under Part B would be the largest entitlement program in our federal budget.") (CBS-4)

SUPREME COURT

Jennings reports that the justices said today that the private railroad corporation Conrail does not have to negotiate with its unions before ordering workers to undergo drug testing. It is a fairly narrow ruling that affects only the railroad and certain airline employees. (ABC-4, NBC-5)

NORTH

Jennings reports that Iran-Contra prosecutors pleaded today that Oliver North be sent to prison when he's sentenced on Friday. In a memorandum to Judge Gesell, the prosecutors charged that North lied at his trial and shows a total lack of remorse. He could get 10 years. The prosecutor's office tells ABC's Tim O'Brien they would recommend a lighter sentence if North agrees to help in the case against John Poindexter. (ABC-5, CBS-5)

GREECE

Jennings reports that an enormously controversial election in Greece has not been conclusive. Many observers expected the Greek national election to be a rejection of the scandal-plagued government of Prime Minister Papandreou. He lost. But the man who won may turn out to be the loser.

ABC's Mike Lee reports that he is the man with the most votes among two dozen rival candidates -- a solidly pro-Western leader who favors keeping American bases in Greece. But right-wing leader Mitsotakis is a couple of percentage points short of the overall majority needed to form a government. If a new government cannot be formed, Papandreou will remain in office despite losing the election. Today Papandreou offered his resignation, which was routinely rejected because there is no other government. (ABC-9, NBC-7)

CHINA/TRADE

Jennings: In China the propaganda blitz continues. Li Peng claims that the country is returning to normal, but he warned that arrests would continue and protest leaders would be shown no mercy. On state radio today Li claimed that the counter-revolutionary rebellion is basically over -- his words. (ABC-10, NBC-8)

Rather reports that China expelled reporter Joe Kahn of the Dallas Morning News today for violating martial law. The Chinese government said he "fabricated rumors that many people were killed by soldiers in Tiananmen Square." While Chinese authorities are trying to harass and intimidate Western reporters, they are taking the opposite line with business people.

CBS's John Sheahan says that ironically, the same Chinese propaganda department that issues daily anti-American attacks also shows Americans signing business deals, reassuring the Chinese public that U.S. business has not been driven away. Japanese business is back in China, and in such numbers that the Japanese foreign ministry admonished them to be more discreet about it. A U.S. trade official predicts that half the American businessmen who fled will be back by the end of this month, nearly all of them a month after that, regardless of their feelings about the brutal crackdown on the students.

Rather: Officials from the United States, China, Japan and South Korea are meeting this week in Seattle to talk about the nuts and bolts of trade in the booming Pacific Rim. As David Dow reports, the events in China shook up today's proceedings.

CBS's David Dow reports that the meetings have typically gone unnoticed, but today there were a few demonstrators, and inside a walk-out by a Seattle port commissioner protesting the involvement of Chinese officials. (CBS-8)

CARNEGIE EDUCATION REPORT

Rather: The chief author of a major new education report says America's middle grade schools are the last chance to reach our young people. The report says that all too often that last, best chance is being missed, frequently with tragic results.

CBS's Bruce Morton reports that 92% of recent high school graduates had started drinking, 56% had started while in the sixth through ninth grades. The proportion of young people becoming sexually active before age 16 is up dramatically. Minority kids especially are likely to drop out in those early adolescent years; 40% of Hispanic dropout is in or before ninth grade. The suicide rate for 10- to 14-year-olds more than doubled during the 1980s. The Carnegie Council suggests some answers, all of them things that have worked in one community or another: smaller schools; emphasis on basic skills, and emphasis on health care and health education; more community involvement; more control for teachers, less for bureaucrats. (CBS-9, ABC-8)

SOVIET UNREST

Rather says that violence was reported in the southern republic of Kazakhstan. The TASS news agency says armed youths went on a rampage and that some people were killed. No word on what led to the violence, but relations have been tense between native Kuzakhs and ethnic Russians who work in the area. (CBS-7)

COAL STRIKE

Brokaw reports that the wildcat strike by miners spread today to 10 states, as far south as Alabama, as far west as Missouri. Twenty-seven thousand mine workers -- one-third of those in the United Mine Workers Union -- are on strike now. (NBC-10)

EDITORIALS/COLUMNISTS

MINIMUM WAGE

Beyond Minimum Wage -- "For a president who had earned a reputation for lethargy in his first months in office, President Bush acted with stunning swiftness and assertiveness this week when he vetoed a bill that would have raised the minimum wage to \$4.55 an hour over three years.... Bush was not simply being a curmudgeon in rejecting the first raise in the salary floor in more than a decade.... What is usually forgotten is that a substantial portion of minimum-wage workers are in fact members of middle-income or even upper-income families -- typically, college students who get summer jobs at the minimum wage. A far more lasting, humane and effective way to give the working poor genuine relief from their predicament is to expand the tax credit for such families. Best of all, such a compromise would accomplish the goal without shutting workers out of the job market or fueling inflation. Far from merely quibbling over nickels and dimes, Bush's veto of the \$4.55 minimum wage offers a rare opportunity to achieve a worthwhile public policy goal."

Mr. Bush's 30 Cent Veto -- "...Despite [President Bush's] insistence that his quarrel with the legislation is over more than a difference of 30 cents an hour, his reasons for the veto are less than convincing. If he would accept a minimum wage of \$4.25 an hour by January 1992, it's hard to see how the congressional version of \$4.55 an hour by October 1991 would wreak the havoc the president forecast.... Even when his misguided notion of a subminimum training wage for new employees was accepted by Congress in an effort to finally increase the minimum wage, the president refused to budge from his original stand on the issue. The most callous part of Mr. Bush's attitude is what Sen. Mitchell pointed out: The veto for a raise for America's poorest workers comes at the same time the president wants a tax break for the richest, in the form of a lower tax rate on capital gains."

The Good Guys Are The Bad Guys -- "President Bush vetoed a \$1.20 hike in the minimum wage on Tuesday. That makes him the bad guy. House and Senate Democrats are fighting to override Bush's veto. That makes them the good guys. Right? Wrong. Democratic leaders say that a minimum wage hike is good for the poor, good for women, good for minorities. But they know better. The standard-issue clichés about the minimum wage are all phony. Is America turning into a nation of hamburger-flippers? No way.... In short, a minimum wage hike is bad. Bad for everybody. Sure, raising the minimum wage is politically popular. But it's economically crazy. Do it and you'll increase poverty, in both the short and the long run. The 'good guys' are the bad guys this time around. Don't listen to them. Don't threaten the jobs of the people who need jobs most."

A Veto That Can Help The Poor -- "President Bush's veto Tuesday of the minimum wage bill did more than stop an increase to \$4.55 an hour. He impelled Congress toward a stunning public policy triumph. Mr. Bush welcomes Congress to join in a grand compromise: Expand tax credits for poor families in exchange for a small increase in minimum wages. Exactly right.... Higher minimum wages sound humane but in practice are an obtuse, ineffective way to help poor workers.... The truly practical way to help poor workers is for the Treasury to supplement their wages.... Congress's minimum wage bill was wrong because it pursued the wrong remedy for the problem of low pay. Mr. Bush's alternative minimum-wage package was wrong because it provided too little relief and threatened the jobs of some older workers. From these two bad bills now might come a triumphant compromise. By expanding the tax credit, Congress can avoid raising minimum wages so much. Mr. Bush would not have to insist on a sub-minimum wage. And the poor people who most need help would get it. Congress can now insure a rare outcome: Everyone wins."

Minimum Pay Hike Is Right Thing To Do -- "...Raising the minimum wage hasn't caused unemployment in the 50 years since it became federal law. And there's no reason to expect it would this time. And although many wanted more, the proposed minimum wage was only 30 cents an hour -- three thin dimes -- more than Bush's. It was the president's turn to compromise. He should have signed the bill into law. But he chose to veto it. An increase in the minimum wage is long overdue. It was approved by solid majorities in the House and Senate. And it had overwhelming public support. It's too bad the president would not compromise. He should have. That's the way our government works...."

Minimum Pay Hike Is Wrong Policy Move -- "...I have to assume that Democrats have turned the issue into a media event because they know the general public misunderstands the issue. Hoping to portray Republicans as coldhearted, they are exploiting uninformed pity and risking real injury to those who need help most.... Similarly, the president has compromised with public ignorance. Knowing that any minimum-wage rise will freeze the least employable out of the job market, he says he'll sign a rise of 90 cents instead of the Democrats' \$1.20. Does that make him 30 cents more ethical?... A whole class of captive poor really need help, but all I see is partisan posturing. It's time that politicians put away these infantile campaign power games."

Minimum Wage: Who Benefits? -- "...Our basic point is that the news media are guilty of inadequate reporting of the issue and that the effect of such reporting, whether deliberate or not, is to sway the public against the \$4.25 minimum wage favored by President Bush and in favor of the House-Senate compromise raising the level from its current \$3.35 to \$4.25 an hour by 1991.... Congress should be taking the practical, albeit less politically glamorous, course: cut spending, eliminate the deficit and thereby cut interest rates. Create jobs by helping U.S. industry to compete internationally. Instead, even with the evidence before it -- notably, in China and the Soviet Union -- that central economic controls create more problems than they solve, the Democrat-controlled Congress clings to the belief that government can successfully micro-manage the economy. Minimum wage may be good politics, and even that is not certain, but it's lousy economics."

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING WITH BIPARTISAN
LEADERSHIP ON STRATEGIC MODERNIZATION AND START

INTRODUCTION

- THIS WEEK MARKS BOTH THE RESUMPTION OF THE NEGOTIATIONS IN GENEVA WITH THE SOVIETS AND THE BEGINNING OF DEBATE ON NEXT YEAR'S DEFENSE BILLS. IT IS PARTICULARLY APPROPRIATE THAT WE TALK ABOUT THOSE TWO SUBJECTS TODAY AND HOW THEY RELATE TO EACH OTHER.
- LET ME BEGIN WITH SOME INTRODUCTORY REMARKS AND THEN COVER SOME PARTICULAR POINTS IN MORE DETAIL.
- I WANT TO MAKE CERTAIN THAT YOU UNDERSTAND OUR PLANS AND THE UNDERLYING RATIONALE FOR SPECIFIC STRATEGIC PROGRAMS. THEY FORM A COHERENT WHOLE: TO ENSURE CONTINUED EFFECTIVE AND EFFICIENT DETERRENCE, TO PROVIDE THE LEVERAGE TO MOVE START NEGOTIATIONS AHEAD AND TO KEEP THE PRESSURE ON THE SOVIETS TO CONTINUE THE CHANGES THEY SEEM TO BE MAKING.

- IN ADDITION TO THE MILITARY JUSTIFICATION IS THE POLITICAL IMPORTANCE.
- ABOVE ALL, OUR PROPOSED STRATEGIC PROGRAMS WARRANT SUPPORT BECAUSE THEY ARE NECESSARY TO PRESERVE A CAPABLE, SURVIVABLE AND EFFECTIVE DETERRENT. TOGETHER THEY CONSTITUTE A COHERENT, INTEGRATED STRATEGIC FORCE.
- I AM OPTIMISTIC ABOUT THE CHANGES WE ARE BEGINNING TO SEE IN THE SOVIET UNION. SIGNIFICANT OPPORTUNITIES MAY BE OPENING IN OUR RELATIONSHIP. THE SOVIETS MAY FINALLY BE WILLING TO MAKE SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE CHARACTER AND SIZE OF THEIR MILITARY FORCES.
- THE CHANGES WE SEE ARE IN PART THE RESULT OF OUR COMMITMENT TO A MODERN, CAPABLE DETERRENT. WEAKENING OUR COMMITMENT TO STRATEGIC MODERNIZATION NOW COULD UNDERMINE THE POSITIVE TRENDS IN SOVIET FORCES THAT ARE EMERGING.

- OUR DETERMINATION TO "DO THE NECESSARY" WITH OUR STRATEGIC DETERRENT FORCES HAS ALSO CONTRIBUTED TO THE PROGRESS THAT HAS BEEN MADE IN GENEVA. FAILURE TO FOLLOW THROUGH ON OUR ANNOUNCED MODERNIZATION PLANS COULD REMOVE SOME OF THE INCENTIVES FOR THE SOVIETS TO BE FLEXIBLE IN NEGOTIATIONS.
- DESPITE PRESS REPORTS TO THE CONTRARY, OUR GOAL IS TO BUILD UPON THE PROGRESS THAT HAS ALREADY BEEN MADE IN START. WE HAVE COMPLETED OUR REVIEW OF THE WORK IN START TO DATE. IT IS A JOB THAT NEEDED TO BE DONE AND WE HAVE TAKEN THE TIME TO DO IT RIGHT. I HAVE SENT RICK BURT BACK TO GENEVA WITH A FULL AGENDA. I AM CONFIDENT WE WILL MAKE CONSIDERABLE PROGRESS ON OUTSTANDING PROBLEMS.
- WE ALL NEED TO REMEMBER THAT THESE TWO THINGS
-- ARMS CONTROL AND FORCE MODERNIZATION --

- NEED TO WORK TOGETHER. SHORTCHANGE ONE AND YOU UNDERCUT THE OTHER.
- ALLOW ME TO ADD TWO CAUTIONARY NOTES.
 - FIRST, I HAVE TO REPEAT THAT GOOD ARMS CONTROL CANNOT BE LEGISLATED, IT CAN ONLY BE NEGOTIATED. I SEEK YOUR COUNSEL AND WELCOME YOUR ADVICE, BUT IN THE FINAL ANALYSIS, AS PRESIDENT I MUST BE RESPONSIBLE FOR OUR FOREIGN POLICY, INCLUDING ARMS CONTROL. THE MANY ARMS CONTROL AMENDMENTS THAT ARE CUSTOMARILY PROPOSED TO THE DEFENSE BILLS WILL ONLY UNDERCUT OUR NEGOTIATORS.
 - SECOND, THERE WILL BE PRESSURES TO PLAY ONE MODERNIZATION PROGRAM OFF AGAINST ANOTHER -- TO PAY FOR ONE WITH CUTS IN ANOTHER. BUT I HOPE THAT WE CAN WORK TOGETHER TO KEEP STRATEGIC MODERNIZATION THE BALANCED AND INTEGRATED PACKAGE IT IS NOW.

STRATEGIC FORCE MODERNIZATION

- THE SECURITY REVIEW THAT I DIRECTED HAS AGAIN VALIDATED THE IMPORTANCE OF A BALANCED TRIAD AS THE CORNERSTONE OF OUR DETERRENT STRATEGY. WE REQUIRE A CAPABLE, FLEXIBLE, EFFECTIVE DETERRENT, ABLE TO MEET THE RANGE OF SOVIET THREATS AND CHALLENGES.
- THE ONGOING MODERNIZATION OF THE STRATEGIC TRIAD MUST CONTINUE. THE TRIDENT SUBMARINE, THE D-5 MISSILE, B-2, ADVANCED CRUISE MISSILE, SRAM II, ALONG WITH THE REBASING OF MX IN RAIL-GARRISON AND THE DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT OF THE SMALL MOBILE ICBM ARE ESSENTIAL AND MUST CONTINUE ON SCHEDULE. SDI AND ASAT ARE LIKEWISE INTEGRAL PARTS OF OUR PROGRAM.
- TOGETHER, THESE PROGRAMS FORM A COHERENT STRATEGY. WE MUST BE VERY CAUTIOUS OF CHANGES IN ONE AREA WITHOUT ADJUSTMENTS IN ANOTHER.

- ROBBING "PETER TO PAY PAUL" CAN DESTROY THE COHERENCE OF THE WHOLE.
- { THE B-2 IS AT A CRITICAL POINT. BOTH OUR FUTURE DETERRENT AND OUR START POSITION DEPEND HEAVILY ON THIS NEW, ALMOST REVOLUTIONARY SYSTEM. WE HAVE TAKEN A FRESH LOOK AT THE SYSTEM AND ITS TECHNOLOGY -- DICK RECENTLY VISITED THE PLANT ALONG WITH THE CHIEFS -- AND ARE SATISFIED WITH THE BASIC PROGRAM. IT'S WORTH THE COST AND DESERVES YOUR SUPPORT.
 - WE HAVE ALSO TAKEN A HARD LOOK AT SDI. GIVEN THE BUDGET CRUNCH WE FACE, I HAD NO CHOICE BUT TO SCALE BACK ITS FUNDING A BIT. BUT I AM COMMITTED TO CONTINUE THE PROGRAM AND TO DEPLOY IT WHEN IT IS READY. I HAVE ALREADY MADE THE CUTS POSSIBLE IN THE SDI PROGRAM. IF THE CONGRESS CUTS EVEN MORE DEEPLY, OUR ABILITY TO INVESTIGATE THE MOST PROMISING OPTIONS WILL BE SERIOUSLY HAMPERED.

- I KNOW **ASAT** IS CONTROVERSIAL. BUT WE CANNOT SIMPLY CEDE TO THE SOVIETS A UNILATERAL CAPABILITY TO HOLD OUR SATELLITES AT RISK. CONSEQUENTLY, I BELIEVE IT IS PRUDENT TO INVEST IN THE RESEARCH FOR BOTH KINETIC AND LASER SYSTEMS.
- MOST OF MY REMARKS TODAY ARE ON THE **ICBM MODERNIZATION PROGRAM.** THIS IS AN ISSUE OF CONTROVERSY AND STRONG OPINIONS. THERE IS BROAD AGREEMENT THAT MOBILITY IS REQUIRED FOR OUR LAND-BASED MISSILES TO IMPROVE SURVIVABILITY AND TO MAINTAIN THE UNIQUE MILITARY CAPABILITIES OF THIS ELEMENT OF THE TRIAD. BUT ONE OF THE MAJOR POINTS AT ISSUE SEEMS TO BE "WHY TWO MISSILES?"
- THE REASONS FOR BOTH SYSTEMS REVOLVES AROUND CAPABILITIES, TIMING AND FISCAL REALITIES.
- MX IS A DIRECT AND IMMEDIATE COUNTER TO SOVIET HARD-TARGET CAPABILITIES. WE NEED TO GET THAT

- SYSTEM OUT OF ITS SILOS, WHERE IT IS BOTH VULNERABLE AND TEMPTING TO THE SOVIETS IN A DEEP CRISIS. THE RAIL-GARRISON MX WILL IMPROVE THE SURVIVABILITY OF THE ICBM LEG, QUICKLY AND AT MODEST COST, ALLOWING US TO PRESERVE THE CONSIDERABLE MILITARY CAPABILITIES OF THIS SYSTEM.
- SOME HAVE EXPRESSED CONCERNS OVER RAIL GARRISON SURVIVABILITY BECAUSE IT TAKES SEVERAL HOURS TO "GENERATE" THE FORCES ONTO THE RAILS. THAT IS CLEARLY THE CASE, BUT REMEMBER THAT THE SYSTEM CAN BE LAUNCHED FROM ANYWHERE, INCLUDING THE GARRISON, SO THAT THE CAPABILITY OF THIS MISSILE IS ALWAYS AVAILABLE. OF COURSE, WHEN DEPLOYED, IT IS HIGHLY SURVIVABLE.
- THE SMALL ICBM REPRESENTS THE FUTURE OF THE ICBM FORCE -- WHERE WE WANT TO BE IN THE YEARS AHEAD. IT OFFERS A VERY HIGH DEGREE OF

SURVIVABILITY EVEN WITH VIRTUALLY NO WARNING. SINGLE WARHEAD MOBILES, ON BOTH SIDES, WOULD ALSO EASE VERIFICATION CONCERNS WE HAVE WITH MOBILE SYSTEMS.

- BUT THE SMALL ICBM IS NOT READY TO DEPLOY NOW AND WILL, BY ITS VERY NATURE, BE MORE EXPENSIVE THAN MULTIPLE WARHEAD ICBMS -- REMEMBER THE ONLY REAL ADVANTAGE OF MIRVED MISSILES IS THAT THEY COST LESS TO BUY, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE.
- THE TWO-MISSILE APPROACH TO ICBM MODERNIZATION IS THE RIGHT APPROACH. WE NEED TO ENSURE THE CAPABILITY OF MX NOW. AND WE NEED TO KEEP MOVING TOWARD THE LONG-TERM SOLUTION OFFERED BY THE SMALL ICBM.

STRATEGIC ARMS NEGOTIATIONS

- OUR NEGOTIATORS ARE BACK IN GENEVA -- THE START AND DEFENSE AND SPACE TALKS RESUMED

YESTERDAY. MUCH HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED IN THE NEGOTIATIONS BY THE PREVIOUS ADMINISTRATION, BUT THERE IS MORE TO DO.

- OUR REVIEW OF THE NEGOTIATIONS IS NOW COMPLETE. WE WILL BE REAFFIRMING MUCH OF THE TREATY TEXT ALREADY AGREED BY PRESIDENT REAGAN WITH THE SOVIETS. IN ADDITION WE ARE READY, AND WILL BE ADDRESSING ALL THE ISSUES ON WHICH THE TWO SIDES HAVE NOT REACHED AGREEMENT. FINALLY, WE NATURALLY RESERVE, AND PROBABLY WILL EXERCISE, THE RIGHT TO MAKE CHANGES AND INTRODUCE NEW INITIATIVES THAT FURTHER ENHANCE STRATEGIC STABILITY.
- OF ALL THE OUTSTANDING START ISSUES, VERIFICATION MAY BE THE MOST COMPLEX. IT IS TOUGHER THAN IN INF. I DON'T WANT US TO FIND OURSELVES AT A POINT WHERE WE HAVE REACHED SUBSTANTIVE AGREEMENT WITH THE SOVIETS ON TREATY LIMITS, BUT NOT BE ABLE TO MOVE TO

CONCLUSION BECAUSE OF PROBLEMS WITH VERIFICATION.

- SO I WANT TO GET A HEAD START ON THE VERIFICATION PROBLEMS NOW.
- TOMORROW, AMBASSADOR RICK BURT WILL PROPOSE A LIST OF VERIFICATION AND STABILITY MEASURES, INCLUDING NEAR-TERM PORTAL MONITORING OF MOBILE MISSILE PRODUCTION FACILITIES, NOTIFICATIONS OF STRATEGIC EXERCISES AND MOBILE MISSILE MOVEMENTS, EARLY EXCHANGE OF DATA, A BAN ON TELEMETRY ENCRYPTION OF BALLISTIC MISSILE TESTS, RV INSPECTION, AND A BAN ON SHORT TIME OF FLIGHT SLBM TESTS.
- THESE IDEAS HAVE NOT JUST BEEN INVENTED. THEY HAVE ALL BEEN AROUND FOR A WHILE AND ARE LARGELY DRAWN FROM PROPOSALS THAT HAVE BEEN ADVANCED BY BOTH SIDES.
- WE WILL APPROACH OUR DISCUSSIONS WITH THE SOVIETS ON THESE IDEAS FLEXIBLY AND

ADAPTIVELY. WE WILL WORK WITH THEM ON DEMONSTRATIONS, EXPERIMENTS, AND FACILITY VISITS IN A WAY AGREEABLE TO BOTH TO ADVANCE RESOLUTION OF THIS IMPORTANT ISSUE AND GIVE ADDED MOMENTUM TO CONCLUDE A START AGREEMENT.

- I WANT TO ADD ONE MORE POINT ABOUT THE TIE IN BETWEEN OUR ARMS CONTROL NEGOTIATIONS AND STRATEGIC MODERNIZATION. THE SOVIETS ARE AT THIS MOMENT DEPLOYING TWO MOBILE MISSILES. WE ARE NOW BACK AT THE NEGOTIATING TABLE. PLEASE DON'T PULL THE RUG OUT FROM UNDER ME BY ATTACKING MY ICBM MOBILE PROGRAMS. IF I AM TO BE ABLE TO NEGOTIATE ANYTHING SUCCESSFULLY, I MUST HAVE THE LEVERAGE THE RAIL GARRISON AND SMALL MISSILE PROGRAMS WILL GIVE ME.

VERIFICATION

- LET ME SAY A FEW MORE WORDS ABOUT VERIFICATION IN GENERAL.
- WE SHOULD AND WILL INSIST ON SCRUPULOUS SOVIET COMPLIANCE WITH ARMS CONTROL AGREEMENTS. BUT WE ALSO NEED TO RECOGNIZE SOME HARD FACTS.
- FIRST, VERIFICATION IS VERY EXPENSIVE AND THE MONEY TO PAY FOR IT IS LIKELY TO COME DIRECTLY AT THE EXPENSE OF THE MILITARY CAPABILITIES WE ALSO NEED TO PROTECT OUR SECURITY. WE NEED TO BE SURE THAT, AT SOME POINT, THE COSTS DON'T BEGIN TO OUTWEIGH THE BENEFITS.
- SECOND, VERIFICATION IS BECOMING INCREASINGLY INTRUSIVE. WE NEED TO REMEMBER THAT THE SOVIETS WILL HAVE THE SAME INSPECTION RIGHTS THAT WE DO AND WILL SEIZE EVERY OPPORTUNITY TO COLLECT INTELLIGENCE ON OUR SENSITIVE CAPABILITIES AND FACILITIES. SO WE HAVE TO STRIKE THE RIGHT BALANCE, TRYING TO KEEP CLEAR

- IN OUR MINDS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THINGS WE MUST INSPECT FOR EFFECTIVE VERIFICATION, AND THINGS WE WOULD LIKE TO BE ABLE TO GET A LOOK AT.
- THIRD, PERFECT VERIFICATION IS AN UNACHIEVABLE IDEAL. WE NEED TO CANDIDLY ACKNOWLEDGE THAT, IN SOME AREAS, WE WILL NEVER BE ABLE TO ACHIEVE VERY HIGH CONFIDENCE IN OUR VERIFICATION ABILITY, NO MATTER HOW MUCH MONEY WE SPEND AND NO MATTER HOW INTRUSIVE OUR INSPECTIONS.
 - ALL THIS RELATES TO WHAT WE REALLY MEAN BY "EFFECTIVE VERIFICATION." IT DOES NOT MEAN OUR ABILITY TO DISCOVER EACH AND EVERY INSTANCE OF CHEATING. IT DOES MEAN THAT WE MUST HAVE HIGH CONFIDENCE IN OUR ABILITY TO DETECT CHEATING WHICH COULD BE OF STRATEGIC SIGNIFICANCE, AND TO DO SO IN TIME TO BE ABLE TO RESPOND.

SUMMARY

- TO WRAP UP, THE ICBM MODERNIZATION PROGRAM IS THE APPROACH WE NEED FOR MOVING TO OUR DESIRED LONG TERM FORCES STRUCTURE, WHILE ENHANCING ICBM SURVIVABILITY IN THE NEAR TERM, KEEPING OUR DETERRENT CAPABILITY ON LINE, AND DOING ALL THIS AT REASONABLE COSTS IN A CAREFULLY TIME-PHASED PROGRAM. THE STRATEGIC MODERNIZATION PROGRAM IS AN INTERNALLY CONSISTENT PLAN, AFFORDABLE, AND NEEDED.

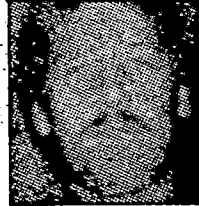

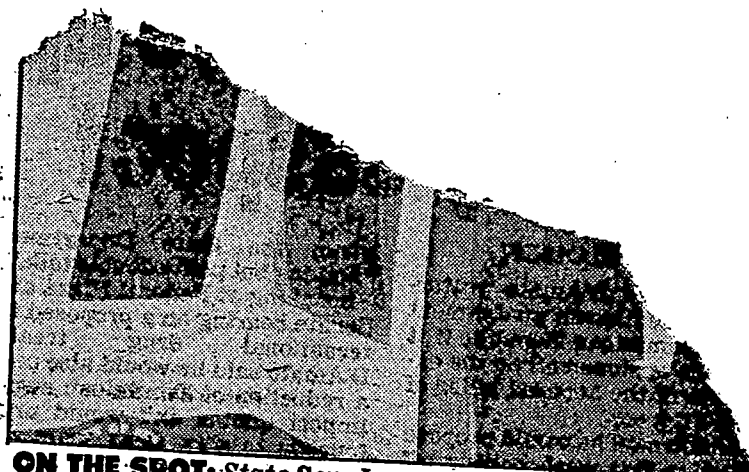

Gov. meets key death

Cancer-stricken state Sen. James Donovan was flown to Albany yesterday, where he said he's still wrestling with how he'll cast his crucial Senate vote on the death penalty.

"It's a moral dilemma," Donovan said after a luncheon with death-penalty arch-foe Gov. Cuomo at the governor's mansion, where the two men, both Catholics, discussed the issue.

He said Cuomo didn't try to pressure him — just as he said death-penalty sponsors, such as Sen. Dale Volker (R-Buffa), haven't.

"For me, it's come down to a matter of conscience," said the 65-year-old conservative Republican after arriving from his home near Utica in a state helicopter dispatched by Cuomo.

"I have to form a right conscience on the issue."

Dear Mr. President,

I had lunch yesterday with Greg Petersmeyer, who was enormously excited about the potential for next week's announcement of the new 'points of light' initiatives. I told him I wanted to write you a note about my feelings on it, which I've been meaning to tell you for months now.

I have always thought that the idea of citizen involvement and citizen responsibility as articulated in your acceptance speech -- 'a brilliant diversity spread like stars, like a thousand points of light in a broad and peaceful sky' -- was the thing that is really at the heart of your career. The idea of giving back no matter who we are or what our circumstances, the idea that we all owe each other as citizens. When I followed you around those two days last June, that's what I heard.

The way I thought of it last August is "Points of light" is the fist -- and the other elements of your domestic initiatives are the fingers. Volunteerism is at the center, and your other themes grow out of it: federal spending (we can make progress without spending more money), the deficit (we don't have to increase it to help those who need help), and taxes (we don't have to increase them to improve the lives of the poor.)

Moreover, outside Washington and New York -- in the real America -- 'points of light' caught on from day one. Because that's really what America is and yearns to be, a helping nation. Greg gets this and understands not only the appeal of the program but its potential to be your 'Ask not', your 'New Fronteir'.

So I say, humbly: Go for it. I think that when they remember your greatness this will be a big part of what they're remembering.
