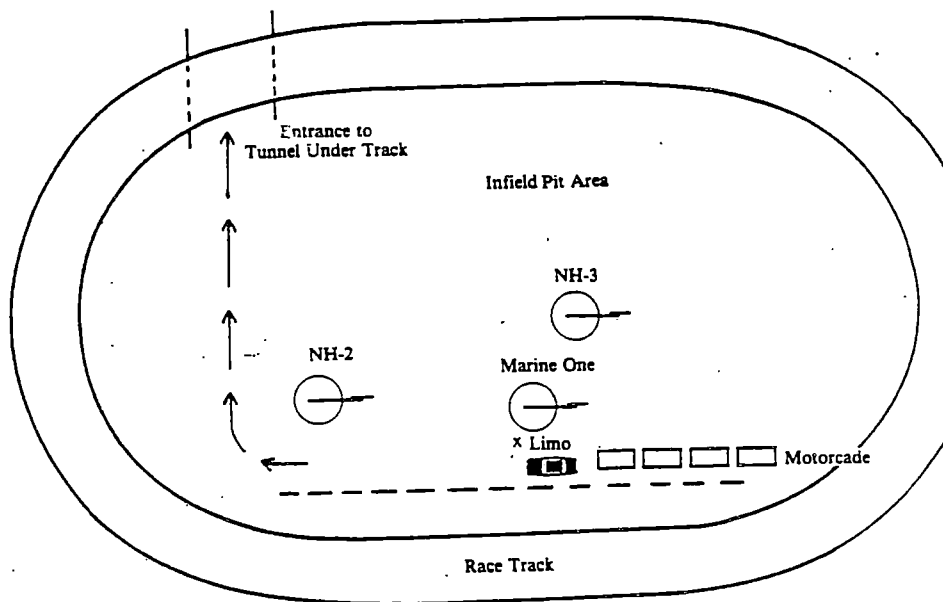

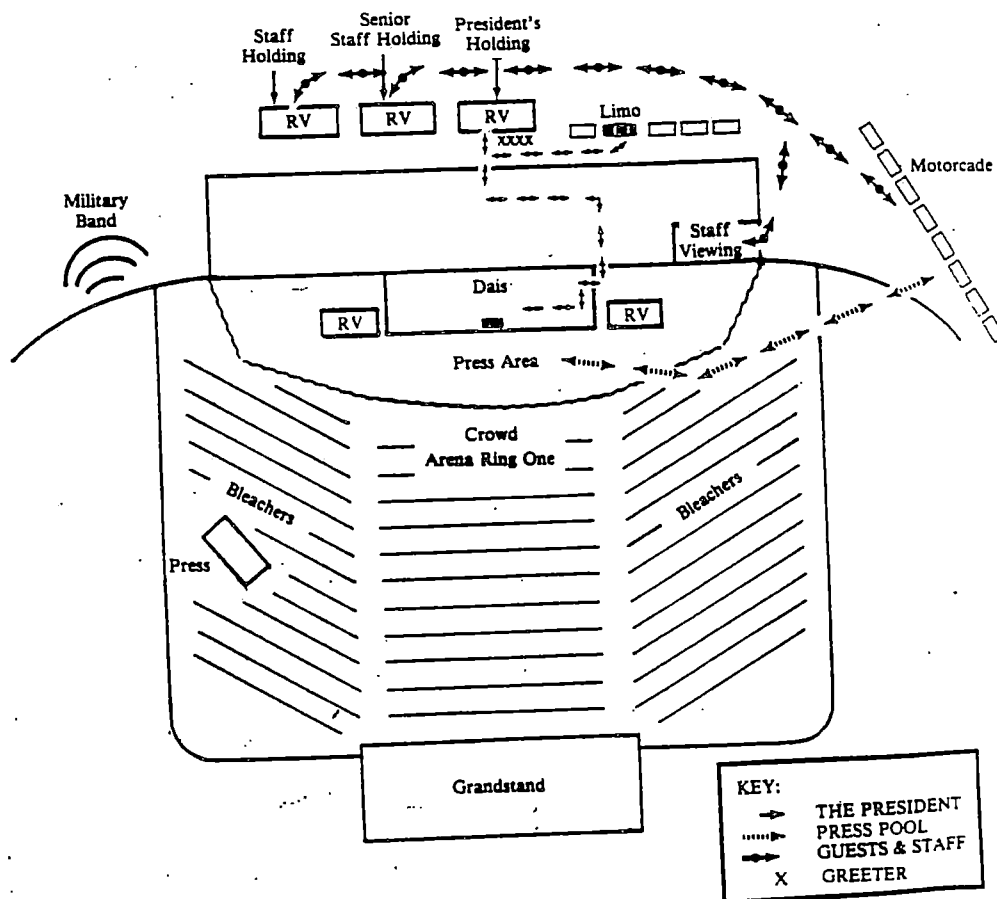
RICHMOND, VIRGINIA

Richmond Motor Speedway Landing Zone

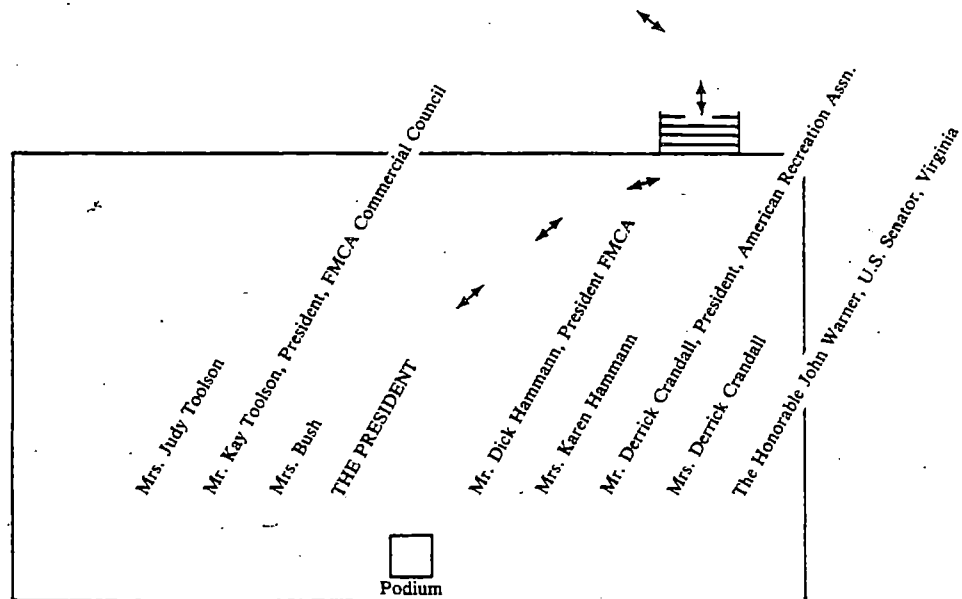

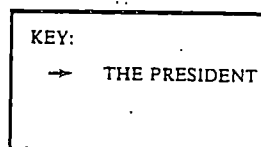

 Wednesday, June 21, 1989



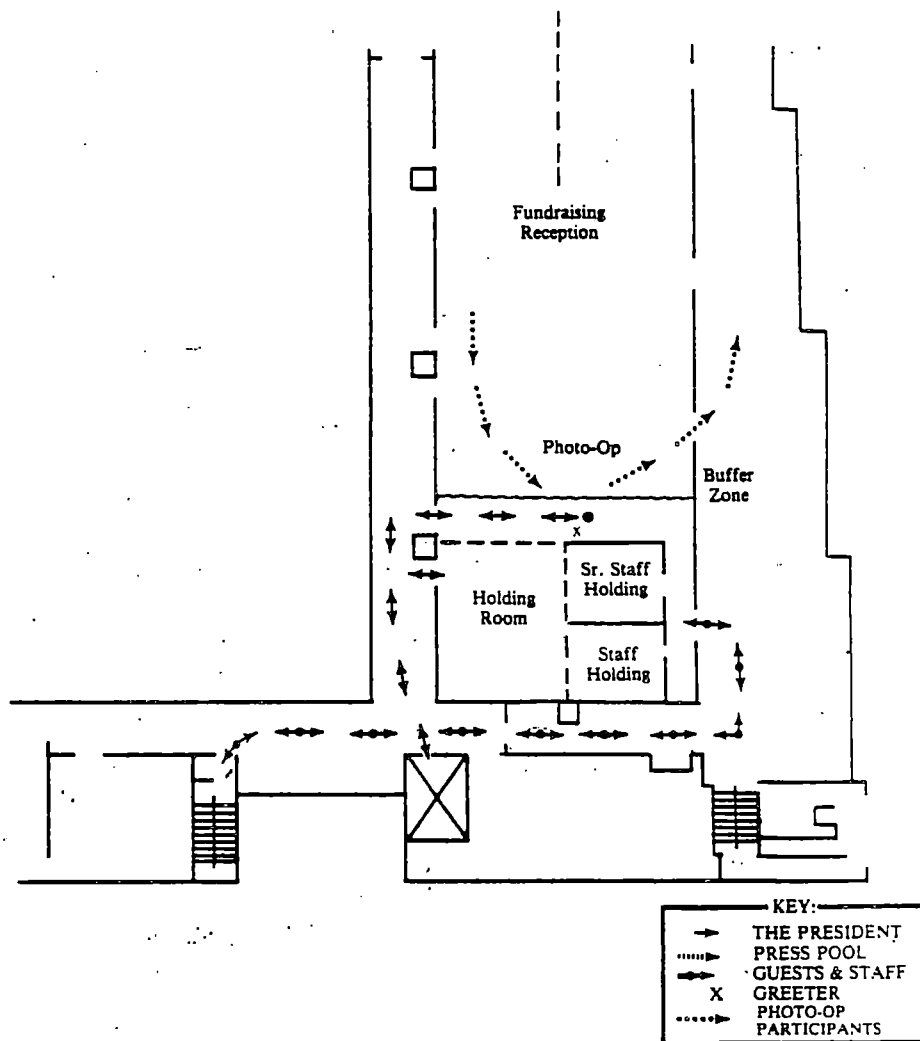
TAB C

 Wednesday, June 21, 1989



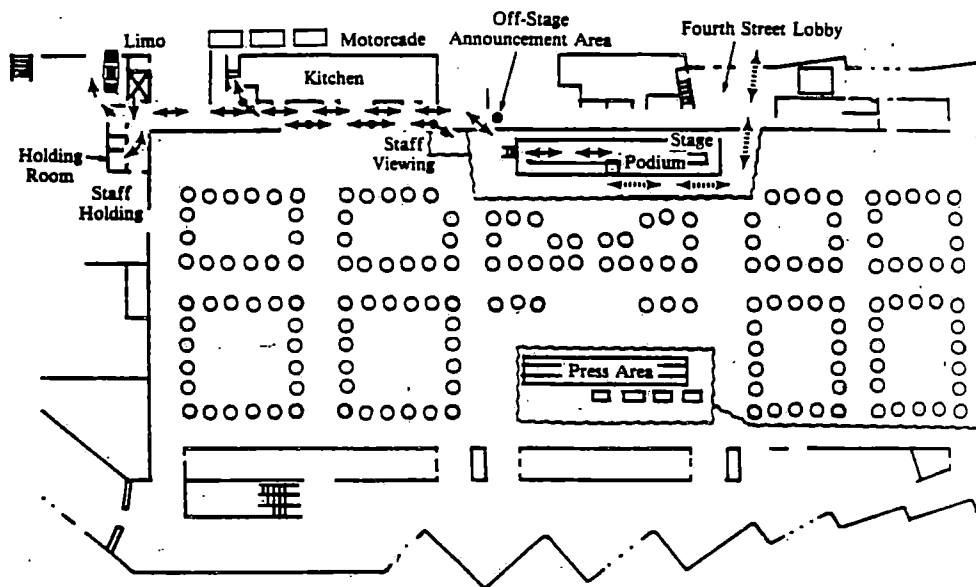

 Wednesday, June 21, 1989

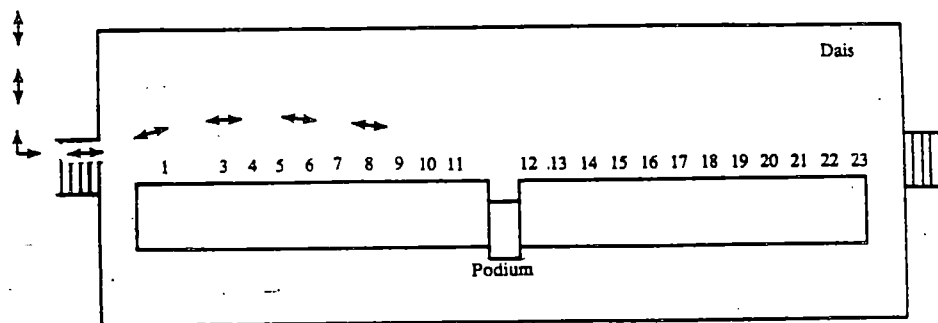

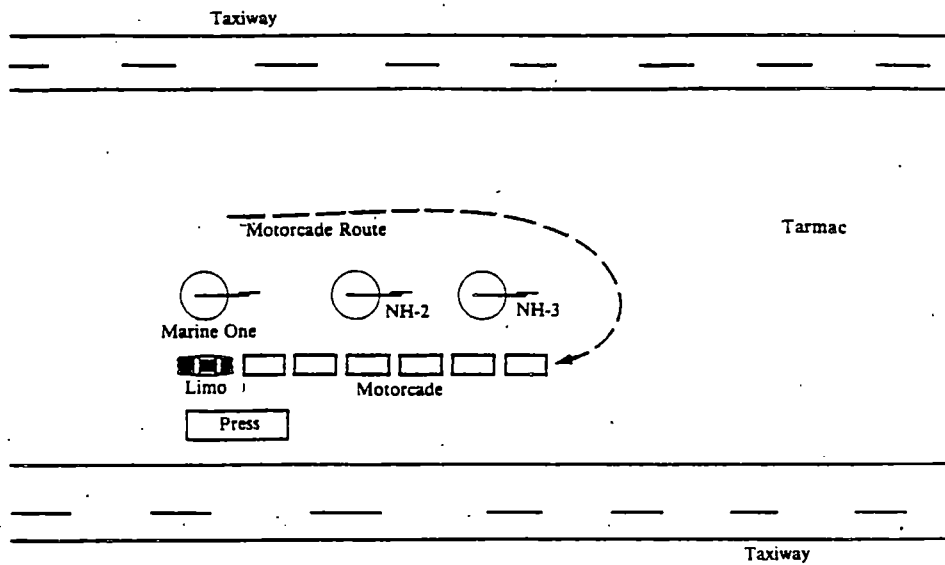

BUSH BARS HIGH-LEVEL CONTACTS WITH BEIJING U.S. Support For Bank Loans Also Suspended

President Bush, responding to congressional pressure for a stronger U.S. reaction to events in China, Tuesday ordered an end to all high-level official U.S. contacts with Beijing, and suspended indefinitely U.S. support for at least \$1.3 billion in international bank loans to China.

A White House statement said the measures, which include the first economic restrictions by Bush since the bloody crackdown in Tiananmen Square two weeks ago, were taken "in response to the wave of violence and reprisals by the Chinese authorities against those who have called for democracy." It said Bush urged other countries to join the U.S. expression of concern.

The decision came after the administration appealed to Chinese leaders early Tuesday to show clemency toward the 11 persons so far condemned to death in Beijing and Shanghai and to pardon the more than 1,300 individuals arrested up to now....

A Washington Post/ABC News poll showed that 54 percent of 1,500 persons surveyed June 15-19 believed Bush's actions in the crisis have been "just about right," while 92 percent approved of his suspension of military equipment sales to China....

Five senators raised with Secretary of State Baker their concern about the administration's reaction to the Chinese leaders' harsh crackdown. (David Ottaway & R. Jeffrey Smith, Washington Post, A1)

Bush Announces New Sanctions Against China

President Bush, responding to "violence and reprisals by the Chinese authorities," ordered new sanctions Tuesday, including a ban on high-level contacts and blocking loans from international aid agencies.

Bush's action was announced in a statement at the White House, where a formal denunciation of the death sentences meted out to protesters in China was made earlier in the day....

In addition to the ban on exchanges, the White House said the U.S. would also seek to postpone consideration of new loans to China by international financial institutions....

White House officials said the ban would not affect activities of U.S. Ambassador Lilley....

In prepared [to Congress earlier Tuesday], Secretary of State Baker criticized Soviet President Gorbachev's failure to address the Beijing [massacre]...saying, "To stand in the way of such necessary, historic change -- as we are seeing to our outrage and sorrow in China -- is to turn one's back on the future. And that is why General Secretary Gorbachev's temporizing comments on those tragic events are disappointing." (Jim Anderson, UPI)

Bush Risks Wider Rift With Tougher Attitude Toward China

President Bush, risking a wider rift in relations with China, has suspended high-level contacts between the two governments and called for the postponement of international development loans to China.

Facing growing criticism in Congress that he had been too soft in protesting a bloody crackdown on pro-democracy demonstrators in China, Bush Tuesday cut off the contacts and called for the loan postponement.

...Tuesday's actions seemed likely to invoke ire in Beijing, which complained earlier that the U.S. was meddling in its internal affairs.

...The White House said Tuesday that Bush was determined to retain "productive relations." But this seemed to be a fading hope for the moment.

Bush Takes New Actions Against China

The Bush administration Tuesday took new actions against China, including a limit on all contacts by high-level U.S. officials and a request to international financial institutions to postpone consideration of any loan requests by Beijing.

Secretary of State Baker disclosed that he had recommended those two steps to President Bush Tuesday, and the White House Tuesday night announced that they were being implemented....

During a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing at which Baker testified, Sen. Humphrey chose some of the harshest words any critic has used against the administration to date.

"I think our response to the slaughter in China has been pathetically weak," the Republican senator said.

Humphrey said he welcomed the diplomatic and economic steps Baker had outlined to the committee a few minutes earlier. But he added: "I think it's long overdue.... I think it's already shamefully late."

BEIJING -- China Wednesday ordered colleges to set up new political and education programs so students will learn to "love socialism and love the army" and accept official condemnation of recent prodemocracy protests.

New arrests were reported, raising the total nationwide to more than 1,600 since June 4....

The Foreign Ministry did not immediately respond to President Bush's order Tuesday that U.S. government officials suspend all high-level contacts with Chinese officials.

PANEL CLEARS WEAPONS BILL AS SUBMITTED
Cheney's \$69 Billion In Priorities Accepted

A House Armed Services subcommittee Tuesday narrowly approved Defense Secretary Cheney's \$69 billion weapons procurement budget intact, breaking with political custom by adding no pet projects and accepting cancellation of several favorite weapons.

The 10 to 9 vote was called "staggering" by Rep. Aspin...who allied himself with Cheney to keep the Bush administration's first military procurement plan safe from an early congressional rewrite. Aspin said the outcome showed that lawmakers are finally realizing that weapons must be cancelled to reduce the federal deficit.

Cheney...recommended killing several big-ticket items, notably the Bell-Boeing V-22 Osprey aircraft sought by the Marine Corps and the Grumman F-14D Tomcat fighter plane desired by the Navy.

BUSH TO BOOST FUNDS FOR MIDGETMAN
Nearly \$1 Billion Pledged Over 3 Years In Bid To Save 2-Missile Plan

President Bush agreed Tuesday to a nearly \$1 billion funding increase for the Midgetman missile and said he would abandon the U.S. call for a ban on such mobile missiles if Congress approves both the Midgetman and the mobile MX systems he proposed in April.

Bush announced the decision in a morning meeting with congressional leaders.... Administration officials said the congressional leaders told Bush that without the shifts, Congress was unlikely to approve both the deployment of the 10-warhead MX on rails and production of the single-warhead Midgetman....

Sen. Nunn, emerging from the White House following the meeting with Bush, said the moves were "very encouraging" and would help gain Senate approval of both the MX and the Midgetman...and said, "It's enough for me." He added that several of his colleagues agreed that the President still needs to make a statement that deals with the "inconsistency" of its stated position at Geneva opposing mobile missiles while seeking massive new spending on two such systems from Congress.

U.S. TO REVIVE 'START' POSITION IF MISSILE PLAN IS APPROVED

President Bush will drop a U.S. call for a ban on mobile missiles in strategic arms talks with the Soviet Union if Congress funds his controversial "two-missile" nuclear modernization program, the White House said Tuesday.

Bush met Republican and Democratic congressional leaders at the White House Tuesday to discuss the talks....

Later, Secretary of State Baker rejected a Democratic senator's suggestion that a U.S. plan to focus on the thorny issue of verifying compliance with START early in the negotiations could delay agreement on the treaty.

"There is no desire or inclination here to throw something up as a precondition, or require that verification and stability measures be agreed to before the other elements of a START treaty be agreed to," Baker said in response to skeptical questioning by Sen. Biden (Gene Gibbons, Reuter)

PENTAGON AGREES TO PAY COST OF DEVELOPING NEW WEAPONS

Expressing concern about the financial health of the defense industry, Defense Secretary Cheney said Tuesday the Pentagon will drop its requirement that contractors pay a large part of the cost of developing new weapon systems....

Cheney told reporters that during the development stage, "You're dealing with large unknowns. A lot of times you're dealing with new technologies. The notion that you ought to apply exactly the same kind of contract at that stage that you would at later stages of the process when you're actually producing a system that's already well developed and tested, doesn't make a lot of sense." ...

Cheney said this is only one of the changes in defense acquisition procedures he hopes to make to improve the business relationship between the Pentagon and its contractors while increasing the efficiency of the weapons procurement system. (Otto Kreisher, Copley)

CONGRESSIONAL EXPERT SAYS SDI CAN THRIVE ON SMALLER BUDGET

A new report by the congressional Budget Office shows the U.S. SDI can thrive at lower budget levels than sought by President Bush, an expert member of Congress said Tuesday.

Rep. Spratt, a South Carolina Democrat who chaired an Armed Services Committee task force on SDI in the last Congress, said the U.S. should temper its expectations and look at SDI missions with reduced goals....

Spratt said it appeared for the foreseeable future that SDI promised only enhanced deterrence, not a "leak-proof shield." "This does not mean we should give up on SDI. It does mean that we should temper our expectation and look at the alternatives," he said in a statement. (Reuter)

WHITE HOUSE CAUTIONS SOVIETS ON MAJOR ARMS SALE TO IRAN

The Bush administration has warned the Soviet Union it will be displeased and concerned if the Soviets make a large arms sale to Iran as a result of the Moscow visit of Iran's powerful parliament speaker and leading presidential candidate, Ali Akbar Hashemi Rafsanjani, according to U.S. officials....

"This will be an indication of whether [Moscow's] 'new thinking' toward regional conflicts applies to Iran," said one U.S. official.

Concern about a possible major arms deal has been heightened by a spate of reports in the Arab and European news media that Moscow is planning to sign a multibillion-dollar arms deal with Iran that could include tanks and aircraft. (David Ottaway, Washington Post, A19)

GORBACHEV, RAFSANJANI AGREE TO MORE SOVIET-IRANIAN COOPERATION

MOSCOW -- Soviet President Gorbachev and an influential Iranian leader have agreed in Kremlin talks to pursue better relations after a long period of strained ties.

[Parliamentary speaker Rafsanjani and Gorbachev], who met Tuesday, agreed that "never before had the two countries had such chances for expanding their cooperation," Tass...reported.

During Rafsanjani's visit this week, documents were to be signed extending Soviet-Iranian cooperation to the year 2000, Tass said, without giving details. (Susan Cornwell, Reuter)

CONSERVATIVES WARN BUSH ON TRADE STATUS FOR SOVIETS

A coalition [signed by 88 conservative leaders and Soviet dissidents] petitioned President Bush Tuesday to withhold "most favored nation" trade status for the Soviet Union unless it guarantees "democracy and independence" for its people, warning he will otherwise face a firestorm of conservative protest....

"Let the Bush administration and the Congress understand that they are going to see for a change something they haven't seen for a long time, and that is the full force of this (conservative movement impacting on the Congress of the United States in an effort to stop this outrageous action," Paul Weyrich, national chairman of Conservatives for America, said at a news conference....

Howard Phillips, Conservative Caucus chairman, said the issue had "greater potential than the Panama Canal treaty." (David Lawsky, Reuter)

ADMINISTRATION UNDER ATTACK FOR TOUGH NEW TRADE POLICY

A month after branding Brazil, India and Japan as unfair traders, the Bush administration is being attacked in international meetings by U.S. allies and Third World nations as a bully whose policies are threatening free trade....

Our problem is that we are going to be alone. Nobody will defend us," said a senior administration official....

U.S. Trade Representative Hills has sought to play down the likelihood of retaliation....

[However], U.S. trade specialists said Brazil and India have mobilized support from other Third World nations....

"If Brazil and India are successful of getting a broad spectrum of countries to beat this drum, it raises serious problems for the United States," an administration official said.

U.S. TO ACCEPT COMPROMISE ON CAMBODIA RULE

The Bush administration, its military aid plan for non-Communist rebels in Cambodia stalled on Capitol Hill, has decided that it would accept a compromise solution for a new government in that nation involving shared power between Prince Norodom Sihanouk and the present Vietnamese-backed regime, The Los Angeles Times has learned.

By agreeing to endorse the sort of settlement that it previously had scorned, the administration has given Sihanouk...important maneuvering room to negotiate a deal that would freeze out the Khmer Rouge....

Vietnam...has announced that it will withdraw its troops [from Cambodia] by Sept. 30, leaving the government, led by Hun Sen, to fend for itself....

But what Sihanouk will do with his new latitude is not yet clear....

The U.S. government has decided that a Sihanouk-Hun Sen coalition would be acceptable, provided it does not impede the total withdrawal of Vietnamese troops from Cambodia, prevents the Khmer Rouge from regaining control and ultimately results in self-determination for the Cambodian people, according to administration officials....

"If the administration now plans to work for a relationship with Hun Sen, this would not produce any objections on the Hill. The administration is taking the course of realism," said a Senate staffer.

ORTEGA TRIES NEW ROUTE TO U.S. TALKS, IS REJECTED

MANAGUA -- President Ortega has asked Cardinal Miguel Obando y Bravo to arrange talks with the U.S. government in an apparent effort to forestall alleged American interference in this country's efforts to meet the terms of a regional peace pact.

In Washington, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater rejected talks before Obando responded to Ortega's request, which was made on Monday.

...U.S. officials criticized the request for talks as an effort to distract attention from Nicaragua's internal problems. A State Department official in Washington said the Bush administration was ready to consider moving toward direct talks with the Nicaraguan government "if and when good will is shown." (Mary Speck, Washington Post, A16)

ANTI-SANDINISTAS WARY ON U.S. AID

MANAGUA -- Stung by word that the Bush administration is considering efforts to influence the elections here, Nicaraguan opposition leaders have spoken out against such aid, calling suggestions that it is on the way a potentially fatal blow to their electoral hopes.

"What more could Daniel Ortega want than to cry out to the world that the CIA is helping the opposition and that the democratic opposition is a kind of civilian contra that has sold itself to imperialism?" said the opposition newspaper La Prensa.

The government of President Ortega...has devoted much space in the official press to detailed coverage of payments reportedly received by opposition candidates and parties....

But opposition leaders have denied such allegations.... Those assertions have been supported by senior American diplomats....

"If anything is noticeable at this stage, it is not how much the United States is doing, but how little," said a diplomat based in Managua.

PANEL APPROVES GREGG AS ENVOY TO SOUTH KOREA

Democrats Split On Job For Iran-Contra Figure

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee Tuesday approved the controversial nomination of Donald Gregg as ambassador to South Korea, with three Democrats, including committee Chairman Pell, joining all nine of the panel's Republicans in voting for him.

The 12 to 7 vote was a clear victory for President Bush and another sign that Congress wants to put behind it any lingering controversy and unanswered questions about the Iran-contra affair....

Sen. Cranston said after Tuesday's vote that two of the Democrats who supported Gregg -- Pell and Sen. Sanford -- were concerned that a vote to reject Gregg would reflect a lack of confidence in Bush's own statements that he was also unaware of the secret contra resupply operation.

"Terry Sanford...just did not want to pursue a matter that could lead to the White House...that could implicate the President," Cranston told reporters. (Walter Pincus & Joe Pichirallo, Washington Post, A4)

MEXICAN ATTORNEY GENERAL CALLS FOR U.S.
TO CONTROL CHEMICALS USED TO PROCESS COCAINE

SAN DIEGO -- Mexico's attorney general Tuesday night urged the U.S. to pay greater attention to the export of chemicals that are used to process coca into cocaine. The DEA said it was on the verge of doing just that.

Attorney General Enrique Alvarez del Castillo also said that it was useless for the world's drug-producing and drug-consuming nations to blame each other for the international narcotics problem, since production and consumption were so closely linked.

His comments represented a sharp turnaround from the views of officials in previous Mexican administrations, who had blamed the drug problem almost entirely on the huge U.S. market for illicit narcotics.

INCONCLUSIVE GREEK ELECTION BODES ILL FOR U.S. BASES

ATHENS -- The inconclusive general election in which neither of the two leading parties gained an overall majority in parliament boded ill for the future of the U.S. military bases on Greek soil because the country appeared to be heading for a period of instability....

Conservative New Democracy Party leader Constantine Mitsotakis...said several times before the election that he would renew the agreement governing the four major U.S. military bases and 20 minor installations in Greece. On the day before the balloting, he said he would be willing to sign an eight-year agreement on the bases....

[But] Greek analysts and diplomats said the election outcome, [in which Mitsotakis failed to gain an overall majority of 151 seats in the...Greek parliament], means that the future of the bases...would remain uncertain for the next several months, at least.

The last five-year agreement on the bases expired in December and Washington was given until May 1990 to dismantle them.

COALITION BID REJECTED BY GREEK COMMUNISTS

ATHENS -- Greece settled in Tuesday for a period of political bargaining after Constantine Mitsotakis of the conservative New Democracy Party was named as the first leader to try to form a new government.

A Communist-led leftist coalition turned down Mitsotakis' proposal, made Monday, that the coalition cooperate with New Democracy in an immediate interim government that would be mandated only to organize new elections and prosecute financial irregularities that occurred under Socialist prime minister Papandreou.

The leftist group left room for some kind of coalition government, but did not indicate with whom it would be willing to join or under what conditions.... Greek political analysts...doubt that Mitsotakis will change the leftists' minds...in coming days.

SHAMIR SAYS ISRAEL MUST PREVENT OUTBREAK OF WAR AMONG JEWS

JERUSALEM -- Prime Minister Shamir, criticized and insulted by Jewish settlers for peace proposals to Palestinians, urged Israelis Wednesday not to wage war on each other.

Asked if he feared a war among Jews, Shamir told Israel Radio: "All must be done to prevent such a war from taking place, God forbid. It is the most dangerous thing that could happen." ...

Some of the settlers involved in the attacks [on Arabs Tuesday outside Tel Aviv] had attended the funeral of a murdered settler where Shamir was condemned as a traitor for his proposal to let Arabs under occupation elect negotiators to peace talks with Israel....

"Yesterday during this disgrace I wasn't worried about myself," Shamir said of his treatment at the funeral. "I was worried about the people of Israel."

BUSH EMERGES AS HIGHLY POPULAR PRESIDENT, POLL SHOWS

George Bush, emerging as a highly popular President, is viewed favorably by 73 percent of the U.S. public after five months in office, matching Ronald Reagan's best score, a new poll showed Tuesday.

The ABC/Washington Post survey showed Bush was viewed positively by every major U.S. demographic group, including 51 percent of blacks.

Bush has averaged a 72 percent positive rating since his inauguration January 20...the poll showed....

Based on the latest poll, "it is probably time to say the honeymoon period is over for Bush and that he has emerged as a broadly popular president," ABC News said in a commentary on the poll. (Reuter)

REPUBLICANS COUNTER DEMOCRATS' CHILD CARE BILL

Sen. Dole formally unveiled the GOP child care bill Tuesday, which couples an expansion of the tax credits for dependent care and provides \$400 million in block grants to states to develop their own programs.

The Republican proposal was put forth as an alternative to the legislation supported by Democrats that also provides additional tax credits and would establish a new \$1.75 billion federal program administered by the state to increase the quality and supply of child care services.

Sen. Mitchell said he and Dole were near agreement to vote on the competing plans Thursday and to finish action on the bill prior to the start of the July 4 recess next week. (Steve Gerstel, UPI)

HATCH ADMONISHES GOP COLLEAGUES ON CHILD CARE BILL

A leading Republican senator accused fellow GOP lawmakers Tuesday of "downright deliberate deceit" in attacks on a major child care package and said the Republican alternative paled in comparison.

"It's really irritating to see the disinformation and downright false information that has been spread around this body," said Sen. Hatch.

"I get a little tired of seeing partisanship and seeing people playing with this issue," said Hatch.... He crossed party lines to co-sponsor the bill [which was approved by the Senate Labor Committee]....

Hatch spoke as the Senate entered its fourth day of debate on the measures and prepared to consider an alternative package to be offered by Sen. Dole. (John King, AP)

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STRATEGISTS SEE CHILD CARE AS SIGNIFICANT ISSUE

Child care will be a significant issue in the 1990 congressional campaign and Republican chances could be damaged if child care and parental-leave legislation is vetoed by President Bush, GOP and Democratic political strategists said Tuesday.

Vince Breglio, a Republican consultant who was pollster for the Bush campaign in 1988...said: "I don't believe serious political candidates in 1990 can avoid discussing the issue of child care...[and] long-term health care." Celinda Lake, a Democratic consultant, argued that "work and family issues...have emerged as major policy issues in 1990." ...

Breglio said the most recent White House poll indicates about 5 to 6 percent more support for Bush's child care program, based on a tax credit, than for a program being considered in Congress that would involve direct government funding.

"So far, George Bush is doing pretty well with women," he said. "The numbers look very good. Now, if there is a whole series of vetos on legislation that is of particular importance to women, that could be a whole different ball game." (Dale Nelson, AP)

Democrats Are Failing To Highlight Family Issues, Consultant Says

Democrats are failing to capitalize on family issues such as child care at the polls because they are "afraid to take on the tax consequences" of programs that voters say they support, a party consultant says.

But a Republican consultant warned women's groups that even though child care has emerged as an important campaign issue in recent years, "there are a lot of folks who just don't care about the issue."

Celinda Lake, a Democratic expert on electing women candidates, and Vince Breglio, a former campaign strategist for Senate Republicans before becoming President Bush's chief pollster for the 1988 campaign, appeared on a panel at a meeting held by child care advocates Tuesday....

"We as Democrats have not drawn strong enough political lines on this issue," Lake said. (W. Dale Nelson, AP)

PANEL BACKS PLAN TO AID STATES IN FIGHTING FEDERAL POLLUTERS House Unit Turns Aside Administration Opposition

When he was campaigning last spring for the presidency, George Bush declared that the federal government should not consider itself "above reproach" when it came to pollution and promised a government that would "live within the laws it imposes on others."

Tuesday, members of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, saying they wanted to test Bush's promise, passed by a lopsided 38 to 5 votes -- and over administration opposition -- a bill that would give greater power to states and the EPA to stop federal agencies from dumping hazardous wastes.

Supporters included 12 Republicans, 10 more than supported a similar bill last year. Their numbers encouraged the sponsors of the measure, who said the new GOP backing may persuade the White House that further opposition is futile....

All five votes came from conservative Republicans, one of whom [Rep. Whittaker] warned that the bill still faces strong opposition on the floor.

U.S. AGREES TO DELAY BUILDING ARMS-GRADE PLUTONIUM PLANT

LOS ANGELES -- Energy Secretary Watkins, under heavy pressure from Congress and environmentalists, agreed today to order an environmental-impact study of a new plutonium-refining process in California and significantly delay construction of a weapon-grade plutonium production plant near Idaho Falls....

Energy Department spokeswoman Chris Sankey said Watkins ordered the environmental study..."to put public doubts about environmental safeguards to rest." ...

Rep. Stark...hailed the decision as "a great victory for all of the residents of the Livermore Valley..." ...

The Natural Resources Defense Council, an environmental group, notified the department in April that it would sue if an environmental impact study was not done. (Jay Mathews, Washington Post, A10)

FEDERAL WILDERNESS RULING PUTS INDUSTRY IN 'LIMBO'

In an action that federal officials said leaves thousands of commercial developers and miners in "limbo" over the development of public land, a federal appeals court ruled Tuesday that environmentalists must be given a chance in court to stop commercial expansion into wilderness areas.

The unanimous U.S. Court of Appeals decision reversed a 1988 ruling that the National Wildlife Federation had no standing to sue the Bureau of Land Management over commercial development of public land....

A spokesman for the Department of the Interior said...that private developers and agency officials may not know how to proceed. "This leaves a lot of people in limbo," said spokesman Bob Walker.

ENVIRONMENTALISTS HOPE FOR SCORCHING SUMMER

As summer makes its official debut Wednesday, environmentalists and their allies are praying for a sizzler. A little drought won't hurt, either.

A real cooker this summer will increase pressure on Congress and the Bush administration to deal aggressively with predictions that the planet is going to warm dramatically as greenhouse gases accumulate in the atmosphere.

"If this summer is especially bad, a crisis mentality will take over and Congress will want to pass legislation to show that they're on top of the situation," said Dan Becker, director of Sierra Club's global warming campaign. (William Booth, Washington Post, A1)

JUSTICE AIDE DEFENDS CRIME UNIT MERGERS

The head of the Justice Department's criminal division Tuesday defended a controversial plan to abolish the department's independent organized crime strike forces, asserting that merging the units into federal prosecutors' offices would enhance efforts to combat organized crime.

The proposal "is not to abandon, abolish, diminish or in any way have as a lower priority the organized crime program," Assistant Attorney General Edward Dennis told a House Judiciary subcommittee....

"For the last 20 years, the organized crime strike forces have waged a relentless war against crime," Rep. Schumer said. "After all these victories, I think it's fair to ask, 'What's broken that needs fixing?'"

THORNBURGH PLAN WOULD WRECK CRIME-FIGHTING TEAM,

Attorney General Thornburgh's plan to place the nation's elite corps of organized crime-fighting prosecutors under control of U.S. attorneys is coming under fire from former leaders of the unit.

"It's impractical, it just won't work," Philadelphia attorney Peter Vaira said Tuesday at a hearing of the House subcommittee on criminal justice....

Edward McDonald, former head of the strike force in Brooklyn, was sharply critical of what Thornburgh and his aides "call euphemistically the merger of the strike force. I like to call it the destruction or the abolition of the strike force."

The plan already has sent strike force attorneys in New York hunting for new jobs, he said, adding that the departure of highly experienced prosecutors is likely to grow worse. (Mike Robinson, AP)

FLORIDA SETS JAIL TERM FOR CARELESS GUN OWNERS

TALLAHASSEE -- Florida, which enacted a liberal and controversial gun law two years ago, Tuesday became the first state to approve strict legislation mandating jail terms for parents and others whose guns are used in shootings involving children....

Gov. Martinez has pledged to sign the legislation....

The measure...calls for a five-year jail sentence and \$5,000 fine for the owner of any loaded gun found by a child who kills or seriously injures someone with it. (Reuter, Washington Post, A10)

N.Y. MAYOR CALLS U.S. ANTI-DRUG POLICY A 'FRAUD'

CHARLESTON, S.C. -- New York Mayor Koch Tuesday told colleagues who run America's big cities that President Bush's highly publicized war on drugs is a "fraud" because Washington won't commit the money needed to make anti-drug efforts work.

In a speech to the U.S. Conference of Mayors 57th annual meeting, Koch also charged Bush is hiding in the White House rather than lending direct federal support to cities where drug abuse is most rampant....

"The mayors of this country are now the soldiers on the firing line. They are leading the shock troops. But they cannot do the job when the commander in chief is sitting in a bunker," Koch declared.

ATWATER COMES UNDER FIRE AT MAYORS' CONFERENCE

CHARLESTON, S.C. -- RNC Chairman Atwater came under intense attack at the U.S. Conference of Mayors meeting here Tuesday, with New York's mayor denouncing him as "amoral" and a "pathological" liar.

DNC Chairman Brown accused his Republican counterpart of having "taken politics to the lowest level of my lifetime."

"He may be the best hired gun in the world, but he carries with him all of the things that America hates, which is low-level, disgusting tactics...vile things," said Mayor Koch....

In Washington, RNC spokeswoman Leslie Goodman said, "We assume Ed Koch has said all these things because he's in a heated race for mayor."

FDIC CHIEF CONSIDERS SEEKING MORE POWER OVER S&L BAILOUT

L. William Seidman, who would become the new deposit insurance czar under legislation moving through Congress, is conferring with the Bush administration about an idea that would enhance his power over the S&L bailout.

Under the plan, Seidman, chairman of the FDIC, would have greater authority than originally envisioned by the administration within the Resolution Trust Corp., a new agency being created to oversee the closing or sale of insolvent thrift institutions....

According to an industry official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, Seidman wants the FDIC to report directly to the RTC oversight board rather than through a staff working for the board....

Seidman, in a telephone interview Tuesday, declined to say his agency is advocating the idea, but he described it as "worth exploring" and "feasible."

'INFLUENCE' PEDDLED FOR HUD CONTRACT

Paul Manafort, a prominent Republican political consultant and campaign adviser to Presidents Bush and Reagan, told a congressional committee Tuesday that he engaged in "influence-peddling" three years ago when he used his Washington contacts to obtain a potentially lucrative federal housing contract.

"The technical term for what we do -- and law firms, associations and professional groups do -- is lobby," said Manafort.... "For the purposes of today, I will stipulate that, in a narrow sense, some people may term it influence peddling."

The lobbying firm was paid \$326,000 for its work on behalf of the project in rural Upper Deerfield Township, N.J....

Manafort's role in obtaining the federal funds...was criticized Tuesday as benefiting a project that was ill-lanned, expensive and unneeded.

NORTH SENTENCING POSTPONED; JUDGE TO HOLD HEARING ON JUROR

A federal judge Tuesday postponed sentencing of Oliver North to examine allegations of misconduct by one of the jurors at North's trial....

U.S. District Court Judge Gesell said he will consider the charges submitted by North's lawyers at a special hearing June 28. He delayed sentencing of North, originally set for Friday, until July 5.

[North's lawyers] said the juror, Tara Leigh King, failed to disclose that four of her 14 brothers and sisters had "repeated involvement with the courts and law enforcement authorities" despite a query on the juror questionnaire that was designed to elicit such information.

CHINA

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with the perennial question in international relations: Just how much influence does the United States have on the affairs of another nation? From Washington today President Bush tried to extend protection to those in China who have been condemned to death for what the Chinese government calls anti-revolutionary activity. Will Beijing listen? Today the government of China condemned the United States for interfering in China's affairs. Official Chinese radio actually said that Americans were expected of plotting some of the counter-revolutionary chaos.

ABC's John McWethy: It was the first step that President Bush has taken in nearly two weeks: ordering the State Department to again call in China's ambassador to Washington. The message, according to Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater, was to deplore the death sentences handed down in Beijing and Shanghai, and urged clemency. On Capitol Hill, Secretary Baker unveiled other steps: First, postpone all high-level visits to China -- Secretary Mosbacher was scheduled to go in July; second, urge such institutions as the World Bank to delay making decisions on an estimated \$1.4 billion in new loans to China. Listening today in the hearing room was Fang Kha [phonetic], the son of dissident Fang Lizhi, who has sought safe haven in the U.S. Embassy in Beijing.

(Secretary Baker: "I think the Administration has very clearly expressed our outrage over the brutal and unacceptable use of force against peaceful demonstrators.")

Some senators, such as Sen. Humphrey, do not believe that is enough.

(Sen. Humphrey: "I think our response to the slaughter in China has been pathetically weak.")

But according to an ABC News/Washington Post poll, 54% of the American people think President Bush has been tough enough. Only 38% think the President has been too weak. And nearly half of those questioned doubt that the U.S. can have any impact on China. That matches what one White House aide conceded that the government of China is going to shoot those people no matter what the President does.

Jennings: Another example of how the system currently works in China; the government today invalidated all current passports and exit visas, which means that anyone who wants to leave the country will have to apply all over again. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: President Bush, who has been criticized for not taking a tougher line against the Chinese government, apparently now has decided to step up the Administration criticism with some sanctions. The White House and Secretary Baker sent strong warnings to Beijing today, and NBC's John Cochran reports a sizeable delegation from Congress took to the streets.

NBC's John Cochran: Congressmen who think the U.S. should be showing more outrage over the Beijing massacre marched to the Chinese Embassy to honor those killed and to urge stronger measures against China.

(Rep. Bilbray: "We're not going to allow this to go on. I, for one, am supporting stronger sanctions against the Chinese government.")

The White House, stung by charges that Bush's response has been weak, said the Chinese ambassador was summoned to the State Department last night -- not to give him a dressing down, but to deplore the death sentences handed down in Shanghai and Beijing and to appeal for clemency. But congressmen who met the Chinese ambassador today said he was unimpressed by appeals from Bush and from them.

(Rep. Scaggs: "The ambassador's reaction, I think, was by and large indifferent.")

Secretary Baker told a Senate committee of further steps against China, that the U.S. is suspending all high-level government visits to China, and that the U.S. will try to block all attempts by China to borrow money from agencies like the World Bank.

(Secretary Baker: "We will be attempting as well to do what we can to postpone consideration of loan applications and international financial institutions.")

Sen. Humphrey was underwhelmed.

(Sen. Humphrey: "I think our response to the slaughter in China has been pathetically weak. I think we looked awfully unprincipled. I think we looked like we cared more about commercial contacts, commercial relations, than we cared about human rights.")

Baker said President Bush cannot afford to go too far.

(Secretary Baker: "I think the President was mindful of the need to preserve what is -- to the extent that we can -- preserve what is a very, very important relationship.")

President Bush said last night no one should think he has forgotten the students who stood up to tanks.

(President Bush: "We don't have to stand in front of tanks in America, thank God, but we do have to summon the same courage to confront the evil that exists in the world.")

To the President, his policy in China seems prudent, cautious. To the critics he seems to be speaking loudly but carrying a small stick.

Brokaw: Chrysler corporation, which makes jeeps in a joint venture with China, announced today that it will now send American workers back into Beijing, saying it had been assured by local officials it is safe once again. There is still no word, however, from other major American investors in China, including General Electric, Xerox, IBM, Coke and Pepsi. At the same time, Japan and the World Bank today announced that they're reserving judgement on whether to resume a financial relationship with China.... (NBC-Lead)

CBS's Dan Rather: Under pressure from Congress to say more, do more, to take stronger action on China, President Bush today did make a direct appeal to Chinese leaders to let up in their crackdown on pro-democracy demonstrators. He also stepped up somewhat U.S. diplomatic -- not economic -- but diplomatic sanctions against Beijing.

CBS's Bill Plante: Stepping up its public pressure on China, the Bush Administration called on Beijing to suspend death sentences against student demonstrators and to pardon those arrested. Officials warned that the death penalty could only deepen the wounds of the past few weeks. On Capitol Hill, Secretary Baker signaled new sanctions against China.

(Secretary Baker: "The detention or arrest of these people for exercising their basic human rights, senator, is clearly contrary to internationally recognized standards.")

Baker told the senators he has recommended the U.S. suspend high-level diplomatic exchanges with China as it already has military visits. A planned trip to China next month by Secretary Mosbacher would be cancelled. The U.S. also will try to postpone consideration of Chinese loan applications by the IMF and other institutions, totalling almost \$1½ billion. Baker argued that the Administration is still carefully balancing its response.

(Secretary Baker: "I think the President was mindful of the need to preserve what is -- to the extent that we can -- preserve what is a very, very important relationship.")

But many members of Congress think the U.S. response has been weak and far too low-key.

(Sen. Humphrey: "We took these minimal approaches. I think we looked awfully unprincipled. I think we looked like we cared more about commercial contacts, commercial relations, than we cared about human rights.")

A dozen members of the House went to the Chinese Embassy to ask that the death sentences be reconsidered. After a meeting with the ambassador they were not encouraged.

(Rep. Gephardt: "I must say that the reaction we got was not one that we had hoped for.")

(Rep. Scaggs: "The ambassador's reaction, I think, was by and large indifferent to most of the sentiments that were held strongly and expressed strongly by this group.")

Late today the White House adopted Baker's suggestions, though Administration officials remain skeptical that these new sanctions will do very much to affect the behavior of the current Chinese leadership.

Rather: China's official press said more protesters were arrested today, and the Chinese supreme court told lower courts to swiftly and severely punish all "counter-revolutionaries" who have been charged. The order said nothing about giving them a fair trial. In China that is not required.

CBS's Bob Simon reports that you can tell the changing times outside the American Embassy. Three Chinese citizens applied for visas today, as compared to 350 yesterday. Outside the embassy local police were turning people away. (CBS-Lead)

GREGG

Brokaw: Donald Gregg's connection to Oliver North held up his nomination as ambassador to South Korea. He repeatedly denied to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that he was ever involved in North's secret operation to supply the Contras. Some Democrats said they didn't believe him, but today the committee approved his nomination on a vote of 12 to 7. (NBC-3)

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Rather: The Senate Foreign Relations Committee handed President Bush a victory. It recommended that former Bush aide, Donald Gregg, be confirmed as the new U.S. ambassador to South Korea. Gregg denies charges of any involvement in Oliver North's Contra resupply effort as National Security Adviser to then-Vice President Bush. (CBS-5)

HUD

Jennings: On Capitol Hill today, the story of how an unwanted housing project was developed anyway. The story was told before a House subcommittee investigating charges of influence peddling and corruption at HUD during the Reagan Administration.

ABC's Sheilah Kast reports that the mayor of Upper Deerfield, N.J. says his town never wanted this apartment complex refurbished and made eligible for federal rent subsidies. He said some residents who have lived there for decades will be thrown out -- people who make too much money to qualify for the rent subsidy but not enough to pay the new higher rents on their own. The mayor told congress today he was never consulted by HUD. The project was approved after lobbying by Paul Manafort, a top campaign strategist for President Bush. Manafort's consulting firm was paid \$326,000 -- \$1,000 for each unit. In April 1987, after Manafort's lobbying helped persuade HUD to make rent subsidies available, Manafort and some partners bought the apartments. Manafort said he was just working within the system, but --

(Manafort: "I will stipulate for the purpose of today that you could characterize this as influence peddling.")

Influence peddling is also being raised in connection with another famous Republican name and this housing project for the elderly in Minneapolis. It got HUD mortgage insurance only after aggressive lobbying by Robert Weinberger, nephew of former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger and an aide to Ronald Reagan when he was governor of California.

(Weinberger: "Some people call this influencing peddling. I think that's the direction that they're trying to go with the story, and in fact it's process peddling.")

There are now charges of influence peddling or outright fraud in a half dozen separate HUD programs. (ABC-3, NBC-4, CBS-6)

OIL SPILL PLAN

Jennings reports that the oil industry has revealed details of a plan for cleaning up the next big oil spill.

ABC's Stephen Aug reports that the industry plan would set up five regional centers manned 24 hours a day capable of responding within five hours to any spill up to the size of the Exxon Valdez incident. The response center already in Alaska would be improved separately. But the industry admits weather and sea conditions could foul up any plan. The plan also gives the Coast Guard sole authority to order the response centers into action. Environmental groups call it a step in the right direction, but want to push the oil companies further.

Aug continues: The industry says the quarter-billion dollar cost of the plan won't be noticeable at the gas pump. Clearly the oil industry feels it has to do something to win back public confidence. That could be difficult, because of its many assurances over the years that it was prepared to handle any oil spill in Alaska.

(ABC-7, NBC-6)

BOLIVIAN DRUG WAR

NBC's Lisa Myers reports that with only 40 agents and eight aging helicopters to cover an area the size of Texas, the U.S. war against cocaine from Bolivia is going slowly. Bolivians say only massive U.S. economic aid will win farmers away from growing coca. U.S. Ambassador Robert Gelbard says the U.S. has to decide how important this war really is.

(Gelbard: "Obviously I'd like to see some additional help, just in terms of general resources across the board.")

Administration and congressional sources say Gelbard also wants to get the U.S. military directly involved in finding the drug traffickers, to have special forces commandos accompany Bolivians on raids now led by DEA agents. But both Bolivian officials and the DEA oppose that. Despite the frustration, the Americans say the drug war in Bolivia is worth fighting. The Americans are getting four more helicopters, but they are the old hueys, not the new faster models they wanted. And the State Department has cut its portion of next year's budget for the drug war here from \$15 million to \$9 million. Those closest to the problem say that if going after cocaine at the source has the chance of working anywhere it is here in Bolivia: The people are not violent and government cooperation is improved. But the battle is not going to be won by 40 Americans with hand-me-down helicopters and with more will than support from their government.

(NBC-10)

POLL ON CONGRESS

Jennings: After the resignation of Speaker Wright, an ABC News/Washington Post poll shows that 60% of those we asked think Congress is doing a poor job. [37% approved of the job Congress is doing.] That is the lowest rating since we began asking that question four years ago.

(ABC-4)

NORTH

Jennings: The judge in the Iran-Contra cases delayed sentencing for Oliver North from this Friday until July 5. The judge says he will hear complaints from North's attorney that one member of the North jury gave false answers during the jury selection process.

(ABC-2, NBC-2, CBS-4)

IRAN/MOSCOW

Brokaw: On the diplomatic front, the Soviet Union today was trying to take the chill out of its relations with Iran, meeting with the new leadership. Iranian parliament Speaker Rafsanjani received a warm welcome on arrival in Moscow and then went into a meeting with President Gorbachev....

(NBC-9, CBS-3)

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SHIP RESCUE

Jennings reports that in the ice cold waters of the Arctic Circle, surrounded by heavy fog, a Soviet ocean liner was suddenly ripped open by an iceberg. A dramatic rescue effort was launched and tonight the passengers are safe and the ship is still afloat.

(ABC-6, NBC-8, CBS-2)

SWINDALL

Brokaw: Former Rep. Swindall was found guilty today of nine counts of perjury punishable by at least 10 months in prison. Swindall was charged with lying to a grand jury about a scheme to launder drug money. He says publicity about the case kept him from getting a fair trial. He will appeal the verdict, he says.

(NBC-5, CBS-7)

BUDGET

Bush Should Listen To Rosty On Taxes -- "...The administration's refusal to negotiate with Rostenkowski, head of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, only postpones the inevitable. The anemic budget agreement reached in April between the White House and Congress made it clear that major progress in cutting the deficit is impossible without raising taxes. Yet the White House and Congress are locked in a standoff, each afraid to be the first to admit that. Bush clings stubbornly to his campaign pledge of no new taxes, while lawmakers say they will not vote for any tax hike unless it is endorsed in advance by the President.... Nearly a dozen capital gains rate reduction bills have been introduced by Republicans and Democrats in Congress, but there's little chance for any to succeed unless Bush budges on his no-new-taxes pledge. There are reports that his lips are beginning to tremble, that the administration is secretly preparing the way for sizable tax hikes in 1991. If that's true, Bush is playing a silly and unnecessary game now...."

(Chicago Tribune 6/15)

Phony White House Forecasts Hide The Truth About The National Deficit -- "...If the economy continues to expand with unemployment already low and industry already pressing against capacity, prices will rise faster. This will require billions more in government spending on cost-of-living adjustments for Social Security recipients, federal workers and federal retirees. It also means a higher cost for everything the trillion-dollar federal budget buys. That's not all. Continued growth with the economy near full capacity spells higher interest rates.... This is why administrations are so easily seduced into playing a grossly dishonest game of rigging economic forecasts to avoid the mandatory, across-the-board cuts required by the Gramm-Rudman Balanced Budget Act. The administration is especially sensitive to the king-size cuts the law would require from military spending. Here is a violation of the law every bit as brazen as the Watergate break in or the violation of the Boland amendment in the Iran-Contra scandal.... The deficit will continue for still another year with no improvement. It will be the fourth consecutive year an administration predicts a sharp deficit reduction when in fact it will be either far less than predicted or actually rise...."

President's Tax Proposal Is Really Rich -- "The surest way to balance the federal deficit, stimulate investment and reinvigorate the U.S. economy is to cut my taxes.... President Bush has been making precisely this argument -- on behalf of cutting the capital gains tax -- since the Republican convention last year. Now Rep. Rostenkowski...appears to have become a believer in Bush's fanciful notion.... In short, cutting the capital gains tax is a gamble. But it is a no-lose gamble for stockbrokers, oilmen and speculators. Even if the tax cut doesn't reduce the deficit, they would still get to keep the tax cut. The rest of us would have to make up the difference.... The bottom line: A cut in the capital gains tax would encourage stock market bubbles, tax shelters, real estate speculation, asset 'churning' and merger mania. On the plus side, maybe we'd break even. It hardly seems worth the risk."

President Bush met today with Congressional opponents and proponents of extensions for Steel VRA's. Also in attendance were Secretaries Brady and Mosbacher, Budget Director Darman, and Trade Ambassador Hills as well as John Sununu.

At the start of the Cabinet Room meeting, Bush was asked if he would apply extra sanctions following the execution of a Chinese pro-democracy demonstrator. Bush declined to answer the question, saying: "You all know the ground rules." He was also asked ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ whether he was sorry about what had happened, Bush gave the impression that he hadn't heard the question and motioned toward some pictures on the wall facing him.

Seated on the President's right were Cong. Michel, Cong. Gibbons and Cong. Archer. To the left of the President were Sen. Packwood, Sen. Gramm, Sen. Wilson and Sen. Rockefeller.

Listed as Proponents of VRA Extension are Sens Hatch, Heinz, Rockefeller, and Congressmen Regula, Schulze and Murtha. Opponents were Sens. Packwood, Gramm, Wilson and Congressmen Michel, Archer, Gibbons, and Crane.

WASHINGTON (AP) - PRESIDENT BUSH TODAY SUGGESTED HE MIGHT BACK AWAY FROM SUPPORTING A BAN ON MOBILE NUCLEAR MISSILES IN ARMS TALKS IN GENEVA IF CONGRESS APPROVES HIS TWO-MISSILE PLAN FOR UPGRADING U.S. STRATEGIC FORCES, CONGRESSIONAL LEADERS SAID.

SENATE ARMED SERVICES CHAIRMAN SAM NUNN, D-GA., SAID BUSH SOUGHT TO BREATHE NEW LIFE INTO HIS ENDANGERED PROPOSAL TO PUSH AHEAD WITH THE DEVELOPMENT OF BOTH THE 10-WARHEAD MOBILE MX AND THE SINGLE-WARHEAD MIDGETMAN MISSILES AT A BIPARTISAN MEETING WITH HOUSE AND SENATE LEADERS.

HE PARTICULARLY EMPHASIZED THE IMPORTANCE OF FUNDING BOTH THE MX RAIL MOBILE MISSILE AS WELL AS THE MIDGETMAN MISSILE. HE MADE IT VERY CLEAR THIS IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF OUR OVERALL ARMS CONTROL AND FORCE MODERNIZATION POSTURE, NUNN TOLD REPORTERS AFTER THE WHITE HOUSE MEETING.

THE DEMOCRAT ALSO SAID HE STRONGLY SUPPORTED THE ADMINISTRATION'S PROPOSAL THAT EFFORTS TO REACH AGREEMENT ON VERIFICATION PROCEDURES BE NAILED DOWN BETWEEN U.S. AND SOVIET NEGOTIATORS AT THE OUTSET OF TALKS ON CONTROLLING LONG RANGE MISSILES.

THE CURRENT U.S. POSITION, STAKED OUT INITIALLY BY THE REAGAN ADMINISTRATION, IS IN FAVOR OF AN EVENTUAL BAN ON MOBILE MISSILES LIKE THE MX.

THIS IS THE POSITION THE UNITED STATES HAS TAKEN IN THE STRATEGIC ARMS REDUCTION TALKS IN GENEVA, WHICH RECONVENED ON MONDAY AFTER A SEVEN-MONTH HIATUS.

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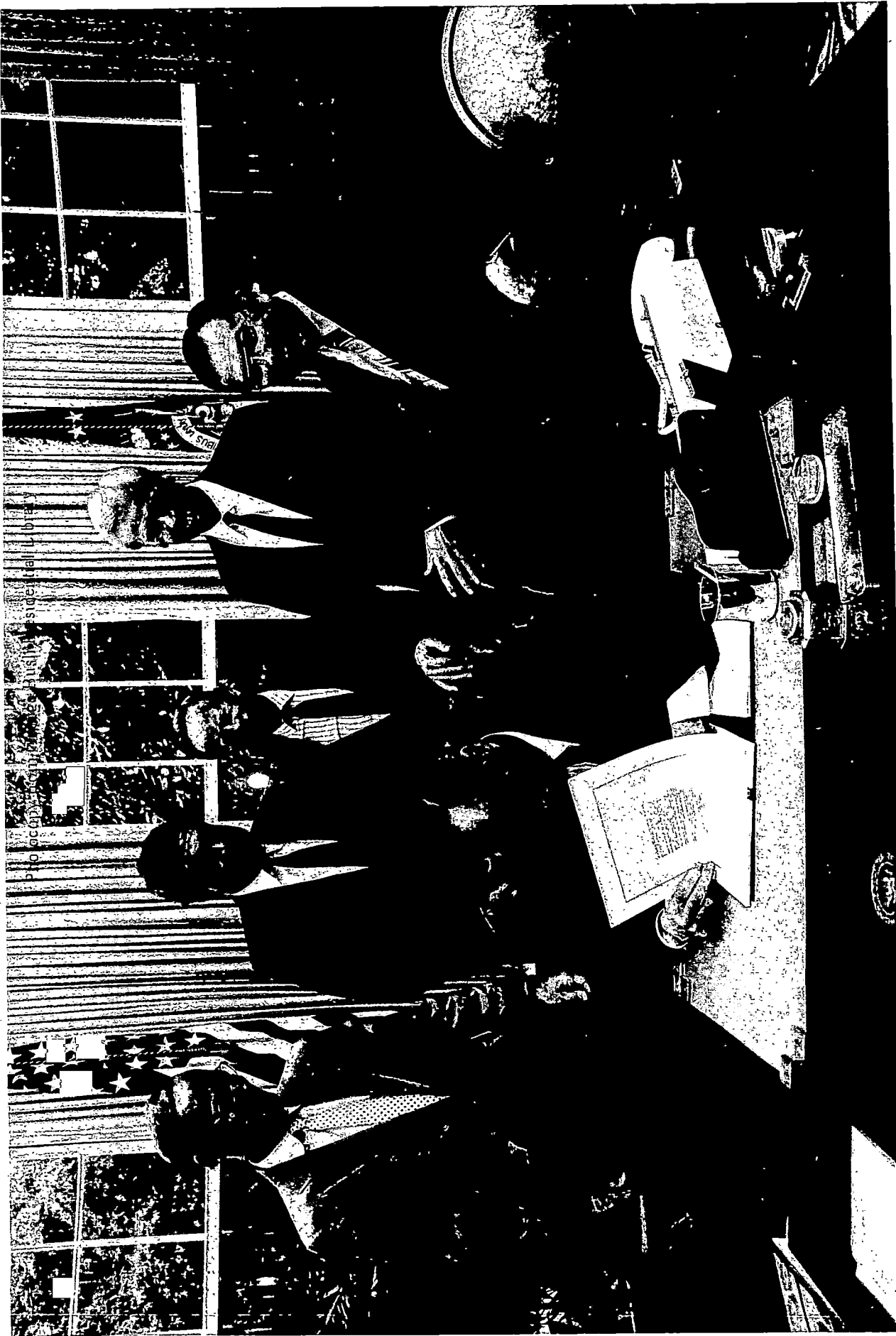
