COCAINE CARTEL DECLARES 'TOTAL WAR'
Colombian 'Extraditables' Accompany Threats With Explosives

BOGOTA -- The country's cocaine traffickers struck back Thursday, declaring "total war" against Colombian society and underlining its determination with bombings and arson.

President Barco's launching of a campaign of confiscations, arrests and extradition last Friday provoked the drug traffickers' communique, delivered before dawn to a radio network's office in Medellin, home of Colombia's biggest cocaine cartel.

About the same time, bombs exploded at the Medellin offices of Colombia's two major political parties, and heavily armed men invaded rural properties belonging to two prominent Medellin-area political figures to set them ablaze.

The explosion at the headquarters of a Liberal Party faction reportedly killed one person who was walking past at the moment of detonation.

An unexploded bomb was found at the Medellin office of Radio Cadena Nacional, and about 40 unexploded pounds of dynamite also accompanied the communique left at Radio Caracol's offices in Medellin. Those are Colombia's two largest radio networks.

'TOTAL WAR' IN COLOMBIA HEIGHTENS U.S. SECURITY CONCERNS

The declaration of war against the Colombian establishment by drug lords wanted in the U.S. has heightened U.S. concern over the safety of officials there, the State Department said Thursday.

Referring to bomb attacks on the offices of Colombia's Liberal and Conservative political parties in Medellin, State Department spokesman Boucher told reporters: "It dramatizes what we've long known and that is that these drug traffickers represent a very concrete threat to the institutions of the government of Colombia." ...

Clearly the government officials are at risk in these attacks," Boucher said. "Is the government going to fall or falter or disappear or be wiped out? I would not say anything of that type."

NO EVACUATIONS FOR NOW, U.S. SAYS

The State Department said Thursday it has no immediate plans to evacuate U.S. government personnel from Colombia in aftermath of bombings by drug traffickers, but acknowledged "a very concrete threat" exists against the Bogota government....

There are no plans to withdraw any U.S. personnel in Colombia, and, without such a plan the government would not even necessarily pay for travel of those U.S. dependents who want to leave, State Department spokesman Boucher said.

"The embassy is on heightened alert, but that embassy always is," said another State Department official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Meanwhile, Administration and military sources say the Joint Chiefs of Staff decided Thursday to draw up a "laundry list" of military hardware for President Bush to consider sending to Colombia in the event that nation requests such material.

No military personnel were included in the recommendations.

The Administration reacted with muted rhetoric to the attacks in the Colombian city of Medellin...but moved to give Colombia as much money as possible from \$5 million appropriated by Congress for that government's war on drugs.

NINE CHARGED IN LARGE SCALE COLOMBIAN HEROIN SCHEME

NEW YORK -- A leader of a major Colombian drug ring and eight others were indicted Thursday for their role in a narcotics network that sought to import heroin from Colombia and distribute it in the New York area.

The Manhattan U.S. attorney's office said Jose Gonzalo Rodriguez Gacha, a leader of the Medellin drug cartel which is responsible for selling vast quantities of the world's cocaine, was named in a 12-count indictment alleging heroin and money laundering offenses.

The office said that the cartel has been exporting heroin as well as cocaine.

"It represents a frightening development given the resources available to this group that they can diversify so readily. The significance of the case lies in our ability to stop it dead in its tracks," said Manhattan District Attorney Benito Romano.

COCAINE TROUBLES START IN BOLIVIA

Specialists Call For Development Efforts To Divert Coca Growers

LA PAZ -- The war against drug trafficking in Bolivia, which is the source of a third of the cocaine funneled to the U.S. through Colombia, will not be won unless consumer nations greatly increase funding for development programs that undercut the economic benefits of narcotics production, according to Latin American and U.S. specialists.

The same sources stress that serious efforts to reduce cocaine production must also include cutting demand in consuming nations and greater interdiction efforts. Otherwise, they say, Bolivia runs the risk of falling into the hands of the traffickers.

Bolivian and U.S. officials say drug traffickers have introduced sophisticated weapons and that many Colombians are acting as chemists or providing the traders' security here.

U.S. WEIGHS TIGHTER SANCTIONS AGAINST PANAMA

The Bush Administration is weighing the possibility of tightening existing sanctions against Panama now that efforts by the OAS to achieve a democratic transfer of power is at an apparent dead end, officials said Thursday.

The reevaluation of Administration policy toward Panama followed what officials regarded as a disappointing outcome of a three-month effort by OAS mediators to promote a restoration of democratic rule in Panama.

The officials declined to specify what economic measures against Panama are under consideration....

After OAS foreign ministers approved a blandly worded resolution early Thursday following all-night discussions, the U.S. and Panamanian delegations engaged in unusually heated verbal sparring, with each side blaming the other for the impasse.

Deputy Secretary of State Eagleburger compared Gen. Noriega to Adolph Hitler and derided Panama as an "outlaw regime" that deserves the censure of all OAS member states. Eagleburger's remarks prompted a walkout by Panamanian Foreign Minister Jorge Ritter.

In a vitriolic two-hour rebuttal, Panamanian delegate Romulo Escobar Betancourt blamed the U.S. for the lack of progress toward a political solution in Panama, citing both the U.S. economic sanctions and what he described as the unsettling impact of U.S. military maneuvers in Panama.

MAZOWIECKI IS ELECTED IN POLAND; FIRST NON-COMMUNIST IN 45 YEARS

WARSAW -- Solidarity adviser Tadeusz Mazowiecki won nearly unanimous election in parliament Thursday as Poland's new prime minister, becoming the first non-communist to head a government in the Warsaw Pact.

Mazowiecki appealed to Poles for their patience and goodwill while his new government begins grappling with the country's massive economic problem, and he pledged that "Poland will be different if that is what everyone wants."

The historic vote in the Sejm, or lower house of Poland's National Assembly, was 378 to 4, with 41 abstentions. About two-thirds of the communist deputies voted to approve Mazowiecki, and the outgoing communist ministers offered congratulatory handshakes as soon as the results were announced.

Mazowiecki then went to the Belvedere Palace to meet with President Jaruzelski....

After Thursday's election, 15 communist deputies representing the party's caucus submitted a proposal to drop from the constitution a clause designating the Communist Party as the "leading force" in society.

In Moscow, Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman Yuri Gromitskikh called Mazowiecki "our partner in the business affairs that link our countries."

BEIRUT -- French warships cruised carefully out of range of artillery fire from Lebanon Friday after Syrian and Iranian-backed Shiite Moslems threatened to shell them.

The ships, including the aircraft carrier Foch, stayed at least 190 miles from the Lebanese coast with the exception of a single reconnaissance frigate, Paris said....

Lebanon's pro-Syrian Moslems, distrusting French motives and suspecting Paris of siding with their Christian foes in the Lebanese carnage, threatened to open fire if the warships came within range.

REBEL LEADER ENDS CEASE-FIRE IN ANGOLA; PEACE PLAN DISPUTED

JOHANNESBURG -- Anti-communist guerrilla leader Jonas Savimbi Thursday ordered his army to resume the war in Angola, calling off a two-month-old cease-fire, in a move that may jeopardize the withdrawal of Cuban troops backing the Angolan government.

Savimbi, in a statement issued from his bush headquarters in Jamba, in southeastern Angola, and released in Lisbon, said Cuban-backed Angolan troops had launched a new offensive against his guerrillas of the UNITA. "The Angolan people, to their infinite sorrow, accept that the war has restarted," Savimbi declared.

Savimbi's announcement came on the eve of a visit to Zaire by South African acting President de Klerk as part of a regional effort to salvage the Angolan cease-fire.

Savimbi also said he "rejected in the most violent terms" the conclusion of a summit of eight African leaders in Harare, Zimbabwe, on Tuesday that Savimbi had agreed at a June 22 peace conference in Gbadolite, Zaire, to accept "temporary and voluntary retirement" during peace negotiations and that his guerrillas would be integrated into existing Angolan political structures. BUSH VOWS 'STRONG SUPPORT' OF POLAND

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush vowed to give "our strong support" to Poland Thursday as that country's parliament ratified selection of its first non-communist prime minister since World War II.

On a cool, brilliantly sunny day, Bush later greeted Danish Prime Minister Schlueter and his wife...to his seaside vacation home here for talks about the "fascinating changes taking place in Europe." During what he described as primarily a "private" overnight visit, Bush said they will "discuss a lot of issues," including changes in both Eastern and Western Europe, as well as the fight against drug lords who have escalated a new round of violence in Colombia.

Bush also made it clear that the Schlueters can expect to join in his "total vacation" here, including an outing on his 28-foot speedboat into the open ocean. Thursday night they plan to dine on lobster, swordfish and corn on the cob at the Bush estate that juts into the sea....

Bush said he will be talking with Schlueter about developments in Poland, where the selection of Tadeusz Mazowiecki...as prime minister was ratified by the parliament Thursday. The White House later issued a statement by Bush responding to the ratification, saying he wants to assure Mazowiecki "of our strong support as he seeks to lead his country toward economic recovery and democratic change."

Bush complimented the new prime minister, as well as President Jaruzelski and Solidarity leader Walesa, for the democratic reforms that led to partly-free elections this summer and a Solidarity-led government. "These developments hold promise not only for a peaceful democratic transition in Poland but also for a broader process of European reconciliation..." he said. (David Hoffman, Washington Post, A17)

Bush Lauds Formal Beginning Of Non-Communist Government In Poland

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush on Thursday praised the formal election of the first non-communist government leader Poland has had in 41 years, calling it a major step toward a "whole and free" Europe.

"I want the Polish people and their new government to know that they will have our continued support as they meet the serious economic and political challenges before them," Bush said in a statement.

Bush's remarks were released after the Sejm...Thursday overwhelmingly ratified President Jaruzelski's choice last Friday of Tadeusz Mazowiecki to be prime minister and head of a non-communist government.

Bush said he has sent assurances to Mazowiecki "of our strong support as he seeks to lead his country toward economic recovery and democratic change."

The President also lauded Jaruzelski "for his wisdom in endorsing a government reflecting the genuine will of the Polish people, and Solidarity, under the leadership of Lech Walesa, for its constructive role in helping bring about a new beginning in Poland."

Bush Welcomes Danish Prime Minister To Vacation Home

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush welcomed Danish Prime Minister Schlueter to his seaside home Thursday, heralding changes in Europe he "couldn't have predicted" seven months ago.

The overnight trip by Schlueter and his new wife...was more of a pleasure visit than for international consultations. But the vacationing Bush took the opportunity to salute his longtime friend, and relations between the U.S. and Denmark, as "first class, strong in every way."

The two leaders, who met more than a decade ago as ambassadors to the U.N., spent the afternoon boating and fishing -- but had to go into town to buy fish. Bush quipped "that's the only way I can get them." The two leaders then had dinner at the President's family compound.

Greeting Schlueter at the Bush estate earlier Thursday, the President lauded sign of democratic reform in Poland and said they would discuss sweeping changes throughout Europe.

"I think the prime minister would agree with me that there are fascinating changes taking place in Europe -- changes that he might not have even predicted,...and certainly changes so fast that I couldn't have predicted them just seven months ago when I became President of the United States," Bush said.

Bush Meets Danish Official, Praises Changes In Europe

KENNEBUNKPORT -- President Bush praised the election of a non-communist leader in Poland and heralded the "fascinating changes" in Europe as he welcomed Denmark's prime minister to his vacation home Thursday.

Bush also said his private visit with Poul Schlueter would include some talk of anti-drug efforts, on a day that Colombian drug lords declared war on their government to retaliate against President Barco's drug crackdown.

"Certainly that's one we'll discuss -- anti-narcotics efforts," the President told reporters as he welcomed Schlueter to his seaside home.

The overnight visit of Schlueter and his wife was billed primarily as a personal trip of an old friend Bush has known since they were both representatives at the U.N. in the 1970s. But Europe would be on the agenda too.

"There are fascinating changes taking place in Europe, changes that he might not have even predicted when he became prime minister, and certainly changes so fast that I couldn't have predicted them just seven months ago when I became President of the United States," the President said.

BUSH OK'S MAJOR PROVISIONS OF ANTI-DRUG PLAN

President Bush has OK'd a drug program that will use the threat of withholding federal funds to force states to take stricter measures against drug offenders.

States would be denied federal crime-fighting funds, for example, if they extended bond, probation or parole to prisoners who failed drug tests, Administration officials said Thursday.

The President approved proposals aimed at discouraging white-collar drug use through stiffer sentences and forfeiture of property.

Drug czar Bennett also has proposed that states be required to revoke the driver's licenses of drug offenders or face loss of federal highway funds. But an Administration official said he was unsure whether Bush had signed off on that particular proposal.

The President did approve a Bennett proposal for military-style boot camps for first-time drug offenders and up to an 85 percent increase in the 31,000 federal prison beds.

DARMAN ASKS STAFF TO STUDY WAYS TO BENEFIT PLANS

Budget Director Darman has asked his staff to examine ways of taxing benefits provided by Medicare and other federal programs, according to Administration sources.

The development provides clues about what sort of tax increase President Bush might eventually agree to -- if he ever does back off from his "no new taxes" pledge.

But the fact that Darman has requested a study of the controversial proposal by the OMB doesn't necessarily mean that the Administration will ever advance or accept it.

One source described the request as "just groping" and said it is part of an exercise Darman is undertaking as he begins exploratory work on cutting the fiscal 1991 deficit by \$30 billion to \$60 billion....

One possibility that the OMB is toying with would require that well-to-do Medicare beneficiaries pay higher deductibles and co-payments -- a change that would produce results similar to a tax on benefits but in a way that could be portrayed as a "spending cut."

STOCK PRICES HIT RECORD HIGH

Dow Rises 56, Surpassing Pre-Crash Mark

After teasing investors for two zig-zag weeks, stock prices leaped to all-time highs Thursday as the market completed its recovery from the historic crash of Oct. 19, 1987.

Propelled by a combination of favorable economic, business and market trends, the Dow Jones industrial average shot up 56.53 points to close at a record 2734.64.

The record surpassed the previous high of 2722.42, which was set two years ago Thursday. Two months later, the market crashed, with the Dow falling as low as 1738.34.

CAPITAL GAINS TAX MIGHT BE CUT, FOLEY CONCEDES
Speaker Says Fall Agenda Includes 'Catastrophic'
Illness Insurance And Aid To Poland

House Speaker Foley tacitly conceded defeat Thursday in his effort to block President Bush's drive to cut capital gains taxes.

"Any proposal for cutting taxes," he told reporters, "even one as ill-timed and inequitable as this one, has a prospect of succeeding.... A proposal to reduce taxes is extremely popular."

Foley indicated that he likes an alternative to the Bush-backed plan, suggested by House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Rostenkowski, a bit more than the Administration proposal but said he has not "signed off" on the details....

Foley expressed concern about the impact of the capital gains cut on the deficit but repeated his assertion that Democrats would not propose offsetting tax increases unless Bush relented on his no-tax-increase campaign pledge and took active leadership in such an effort.

COURT BARS DOE AWARD OF CONTRACT
TRW Fought Decision On Atomic Waste Pact

The U.S. Claims Court Thursday blocked the DOE from allowing Bechtel National Inc. to manage a controversial \$1 billion contract to establish the nation's first high-level nuclear waste repository.

In a written order, Judge Reginald Gibson forbade the Energy Department from awarding the contract to anyone except TRW Inc., which filed the lawsuit in December after losing a competition for the project that it claimed was stacked against the company.

If the Cleveland-based aerospace and industrial conglomerate is awarded the contract, it would result in the creation of about 1,000 jobs, including 400 in Fairfax.

OIL PRICES EXPECTED TO STAY LOW THROUGH REST OF CENTURY

Oil prices are likely to remain relatively low through the rest of this century, depressing oil and gas exploration in this country and leading to a doubling of U.S. oil imports, according to projections released Thursday by the natural gas industry's research branch.

Stable petroleum prices may also lead to increased use of oil at the expense of other fuels such as natural gas, the Gas Research Institute said. "Oil is the most readily available and universal fuel. You can get it anywhere with a phone call. As long as low or stable prices prevail, industrial users will respond accordingly," said Daniel Dreyfus, the institute's vice president for strategic planning and analysis.

The FDA gave some drug firms preferential treatment and failed to establish adequate quality-control guidelines in its review of generic drugs, according to an internal HHS Department memo released Thursday.

In an 11-page report, HHS Inspector General Richard Kusserow found that the lack of adequate internal controls at the agency "significantly impairs FDA's mission of assuring a fair generic drug review process," permits "employees involved in the process to violate the department's standards of conduct" and "could deprive the public of competitively priced drugs."

The report provides a summary of the principal criticisms of the FDA's Generic Drug Division that have been made by congressional and industry officials over the past few months, in the wake of revelations that FDA drug reviewers took bribes from industry executives. Its recommendations also formed the basis for the reforms enacted by FDA Commissioner Young and HHS Secretary Sullivan last Friday. The division was reorganized to provide for tighter supervision from senior agency officials.

"We've already begun acting on it," said FDA spokesman William Grigg. "We'll shortly be providing a report back to the inspector general to outline the steps that are under way" in response to the memo, which was prepared in May and June at the request of Young and House Energy and Commerce Committee Chairman Dingell.

NATIONAL EDUCATION STANDARDS BACKED

Poll Finds Support For Letting Parents Pick Schools, Raising Taxes

Americans strongly favor national achievement standards for public schools and national tests to determine whether students are reaching them, the annual Gallup Poll on education reported Thursday.

Despite a tradition of local control of public schools, the poll said 70 percent of those questioned favor "requiring...schools...to conform to national standards and goals" and 69 percent support a "standardized national curriculum."

At the same time, by 60 to 31 percent, the poll reported strong support for letting parents choose which public schools in their community that their children will attend. It also showed support for higher taxes for education.

Frank...said the employee had been a male prostitute convicted of sex offenses in Virginia.

He told Reuter in a telephone interview that he hired the man as a combination housekeeper, driver and personal assistant in the belief he would be able to reform him.

"I was trying to get him to stop being a prostitute," Frank said in a telephone interview from his home in Newton, Mass....

Frank, 49, said he threw the employee out when he became suspicious the apartment was being used for prostitution despite what he said were his orders against any illegal activities there, including drug abuse.

BUSH'S NEIGHBORS COOL TO SATIRIC COMIC BOOK

KENNEBUNKPORT -- Town elders in this cozy resort where the first family is on vacation have unofficially banned a comic book that portrays President Bush as a nerd and Barbara as a punk rocker.

The 34-page "collector's edition" of "On the Road With George and Barbara in Vacationland" has been barred from crossing the Kennebunkport River and joining dozens of tacky Bush souvenirs on gift shop shelves.

But the \$2.50, self-described "kinder, gentler" story of the Bushes -- Millie included -- dressing as regular tourists and visiting Maine incognito is the rage outside of Kennebunkport.

"We can't keep them on the shelves," said an employee of Bookland in nearby Wells....

While the comic book carries a disclaimer that "Any resemblance to actual persons, living or dead, is purely coincidental," Jack Fenner, owner of Kennebunkport Book Port, the only bookstore here, said, "We did not find it appropriate to sell."

Rose has been accused of betting on baseball games from 1985 to 1987, including those involving the Cincinnati Reds.... He continued to maintain Thursday that "I did not bet on baseball."

COLOMBIA/DRUGS

NBC's MARY ALICE WILLIAMS: A climate of terror and fear in Colombia tonight. The Colombian drug barons, thought to be fleeing their government's crackdown, have made their presence felt with startling ferocity, declaring total war.

NBC's BRIAN ROSS reports from Bogota that Colombia's drug bosses struck back today by bombing and burning buildings and homes in Medellin, a stronghold of the drug cartel. Among the first targets of the attacks were the party headquarters of the late Sen. Galan who was murdered last week. Police also found and disarmed 40-pound bombs at two of the country's biggest radio stations. And just outside Medellin, the estates of another Colombian senator and a leading industrialist were burned to the ground. The drug bosses sent a one-page communique to a radio station in which they declared total war against the government, the industrial elite, union leaders, judges and journalists. And, in a line that had a particularly chilling effect here, the drug bosses vowed to go after the families of "those who have not respected our families." NBC has learned that the drug bosses appear to have made it out of Colombia. According to American law enforcement officials, the drug bosses have gone to the city of Manaus, Brazil. And, American authorities say, a former Medellin city official, Diego Landona White, and his brother have helped the cartel bosses to invest millions of dollars in real estate in Brazil, a country that rarely extradites anyone. Today, police in Brazil said they may have found two getaway cars on the border between Colombia and Brazil. Brazilian authorities also said they are reinforcing police along the border and in Manaus. Wherever the drug bosses are hiding, American authorities say, they have now had time to reestablish command of the drug armies they have spent the last two years organizing. (NBC-Lead)

CBS's JUAN VASQUEZ reports from Bogota that the drug cartel bombed the headquarters of the nation's two principal political parties in Medellin. The government of Colombia said it would not buckle under the pressure or the threats.

(CARLOS LEMOS, MINISTER OF COMMUNICATIONS: "It is continuing, and is going to be continued until we win this battle against the drug cartels.")

The government announced it has captured another trafficker wanted in the U.S. Ana Rodriguez de Tamayo is under indictment in Arizona and Florida. The process of extraditing her to the U.S. has already begun. (CBS-4)

ABC's MARK POTTER reports from Bogota that Colombian judges are beginning to end their strike for more police protection. However, one judge resigned today after a death threat was made against his daughter. There is lingering fear in Colombia that the worst violence is still to come.

ABC's JOHN McWETHY reports from the State Department that the \$5 million U.S. program designed to protect Colombia's 4,500 judges is still months away from being able to help.

McWETHY continues: Eventually, \$2 million is to be spent for training Colombian judges on how to avoid attacks. It is the same kind of training the U.S. provides to its diplomats. Half a million dollars is to be spent on such equipment as armored cars and bullet-proof vests. Another \$2½ million is being held in reserve. In another account, the U.S. has begun spending \$10 million to help Colombia eradicate its coca harvest and to destroy cocaine laboratories. But whatever the U.S. is doing, it is dwarfed by the vast resources of the drug traffickers. ABC's CAROLE SIMPSON reports that Harvard University researchers say monkeys addicted to cocaine virtually lost their addiction after taking a pain-killing drug. (ABC-5, NBC-4, CBS-9)

CRACK ADDICTION

SIMPSON reports that the New York Times said that crack addiction, once thought to be virtually incurable, may not be. Doctors say the key is putting crack addicts into a whole new social structure after taking away the drug. (ABC-6)

POLAND

ABC's JIM HICKEY reports from Warsaw that Tadeusz Mazowiecki was elected prime minister of Poland today. "I want to be prime minister of all Poles," he declared, "regardless of politics." He said the past struggles between Communists and Solidarity must be replaced with partnership. "It will be difficult," he admitted, "but it needn't cause chaos." Mazowiecki received at least 91 Communist votes; one even called him an excellent helmsman for the ship of state. One of his first orders of business was a meeting with President Jaruzelski. "I wish you success," said the Communist president. The non-Communist prime minister responded: "Success is possible only with your cooperation." In Gdansk, an emotional and satisfied Solidarity leader Lech Walesa watched it all on television. The prime minister's most difficult job will be to convince pessimistic Poles that change is possible. (ABC-9, NBC-8, CBS-5)

ABC's MIKE LEE reports that the Solidarity-led government plans to reform the nation's television networks which heretofore were the government's propaganda machines. WILLIAMS DISCUSSES THE POLISH SITUATION WITH NBC's JOHN COCHRAN:

WILLIAMS: It seems as though the President today offered the new non-Communist government nothing more than the \$119 million aid package he offered to the Communist government when he visited Warsaw last month.

COCHRAN (in Kennebunkport): That's right. It was a pretty modest offer last month. It's a pretty modest offer now. But George Bush has decided against increasing his aid package even though some Polish-Americans and some politically conservative groups have criticized him, saying he should be doing everything in his power to make sure that the first non-Communist government in the Soviet bloc does not fail. But Bush feels constrained by his own budgetary problems. And, I'm told, he's also not absolutely sure that the new non-Communist government would be any smarter at spending foreign aid than the Communists were.

WILLIAMS: So what happens next?

COCHRAN: Well, late next month in Brussels the U.S. and other Western governments will meet and discuss more aid for Poland. I'm told that if at that time Bush is satisfied with this new government in Warsaw he may sweeten the pot a little bit with some more money.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

At the request of President Barco and in order to support the Government of Colombia in its battle against narcotics traffickers, I have today decided to authorize a \$65 million emergency anti-drug support package for the Colombian police and military. The package will include equipment for police and military personnel, with initial shipments to arrive as early as next week. In addition, it will include aircraft and helicopters to improve the mobility of Colombian forces engaged in the anti-drug effort. The package was developed over the last few days during which there was close consultation between President Barco and myself and among our key advisors.

No United States troops have been requested by the Colombian Government. We will provide only materiel support and training. The United States has complete confidence in the capability of the Colombian police and military to deal with this situation.

The support package will be made available under the provisions of the 1986 Foreign Assistance Act which enables the President to direct the Department of Defense to provide military equipment and services to a foreign country in the event of an emergency.

In addition to this emergency assistance and the funds being provided under the Justice Department's judicial protection program, I will authorize an expanded police and military assistance program for FY 90 which will provide an increased level of support for the Colombian Government's ongoing anti-drug efforts.

The recent wave of assassinations and threats by the drug cartel against all Colombians who cooperate in President Barco's anti-drug crackdown makes it clear that it is time for the United States and other countries of the world to stand with President Barco during his courageous challenge to these insidious forces that threaten the very fabric of Colombian society.

We intend to work closely with the Colombian Government to bring to justice those responsible for the scourge of drug trafficking and will continue in our efforts to assist the Colombian effort to provide protection for judges and other Colombian officials who are on the front line of the war against drugs. The Departments of State and Justice are working closely with their Colombian counterparts on extradition matters.

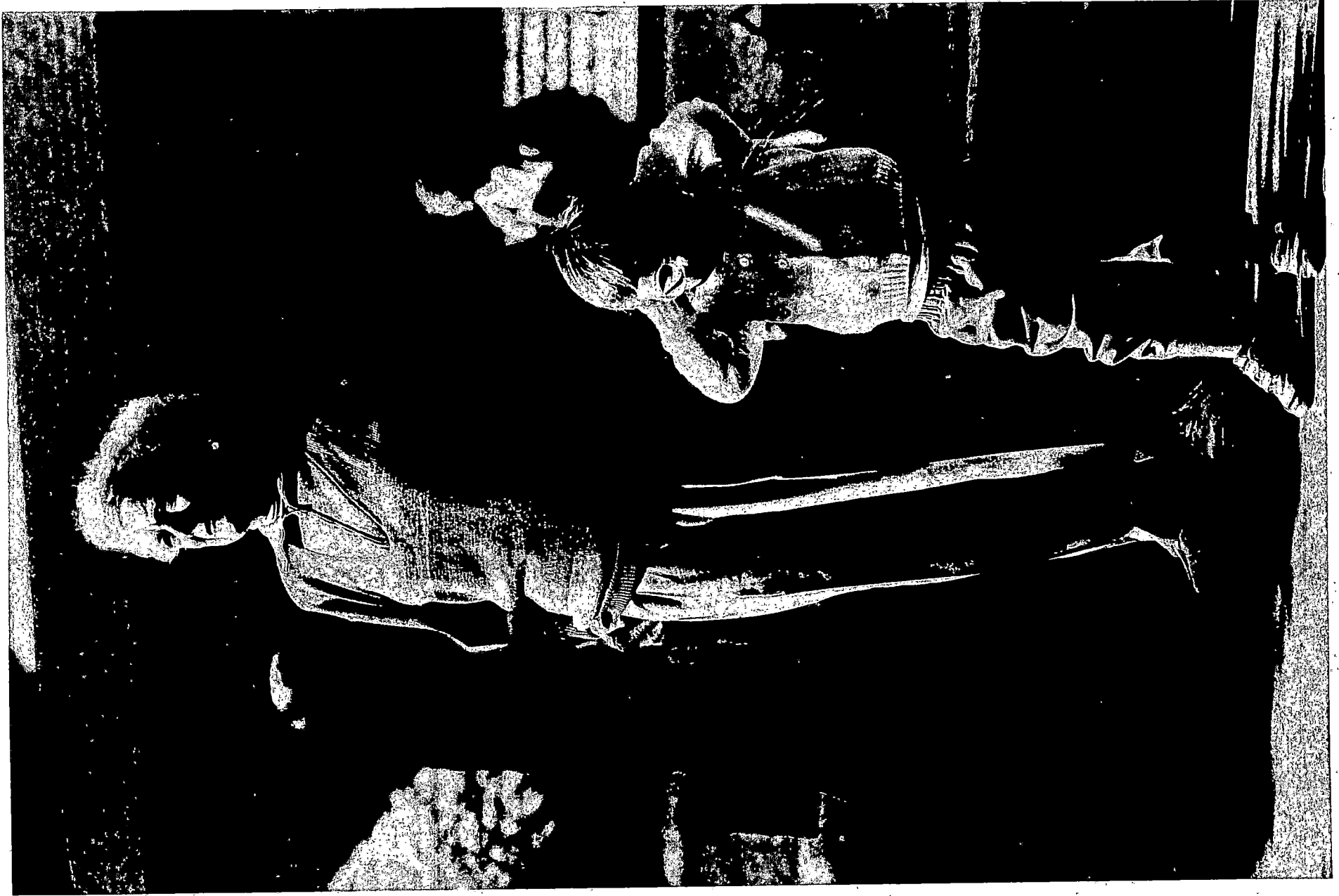
