Gifts, other than Foreign Gifts, ^{made available by} ~~to the White House~~ ^{as excess property} will be handled expeditiously in the following manner:

1. A White House official will prepare a listing of gift items covered with a Standard Form 120 or 126. The items will be listed and include an estimated acquisition cost, fair market value, or other reasonable estimate ^{(or set of} ~~of the value of~~ ^{each item} similar items).
2. The designated official will call the following General Services Administration official: Mr. Byron Strain, telephone number 472-2051. The mailing address is as follows:

Regional Office Building, Room 6654
7th & D Streets, SW
Washington, DC 20407
3. The gifts will be removed from the White House by the General Services Administration within 5 (five) days of the telephone call.
4. Immediately upon pickup GSA will "quick screen" the items for possible Federal use, as required by the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended, and if no Federal need exists the property will then be made available to eligible donees within 10 days of pickup. The White House may designate an eligible donee to assist in the donation.
5. GSA will advise the White House designated official as soon as the gift items have been donated to an eligible donee. Notification will include information about which eligible donees received property.

SUBJECT: Gifts to Tri-Sector

Pursuant to your request of July 6, 1989, Counsel's Office has reviewed the proposal for the President and Mrs. Bush to have certain items donated to Tri-Sector, Inc., a nonprofit service organization which works with various community groups in the Washington, D.C. area.

We see no legal objection to the President and Mrs. Bush donating to charity gifts which they have received.

You have also asked us to look into any possible legal problems with using the group, Tri-Sector. The memo you attached indicates that Jan Burmeister has already researched the group with favorable results. We have checked with the IRS and determined that Tri-Sector is indeed a qualifying 501(c)3 corporation. We also asked the Justice Department on July 10 to conduct a review of Tri-Sector, the results of which we would expect within a week. We will share with you any relevant information which results from such review.

As you suggested, we have also checked with John Hilboldt regarding this matter. John appears to have no problem with the proposal to use Tri-Sector.

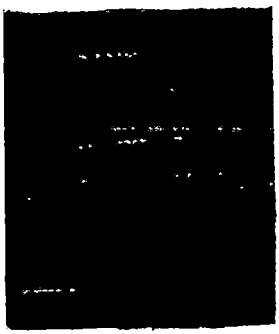

TRI-SECTOR is a non-profit community service organization located at 1323 Girard Street (drug war zone) that focuses on helping the poor, homeless and drug-affected community.

They assist a variety of inner city groups with resources and activity coordination, and serve as a conduit between corporate and individual benefactors and the needy. For example, they will receive a ton of excess produce from a grocery store chain and distribute it among a dozen facilities, using vehicles donated by a car dealership and volunteers channeled from church and civic organizations such as Urban Young Life and Sojourners.

Pickup and delivery would remain anonymous, and they would add to their distribution points any new outlet specified (such as Rev. Jerry Moore, Jr., of Nineteenth Street Baptist Church) or deliver a specific gift to a specific family or place if requested. Mark Harmon of TRI-SECTOR has met with Greg Petersmeyer to show how their program has worked effectively in urban Washington, D.C.

SUBJECT: Weekly Report

Last week I went to New York City to meet privately with eighteen CEO's to get their views on a variety of economic issues. I plan to do this periodically to get opinions from key business leaders who reside outside the Beltway.

The major topics of interest were:

1. The U.S.-Japan economic relationship;
2. Long-term competitiveness - cost of capital and saving rates;
3. The budget deficit and taxes; and
4. The currency markets.

On U.S.-Japanese economic relations, there was a strong view that progress can be made with the Japanese in opening up markets. The businessmen were very supportive of the structural initiative negotiations that you launched. Two specific points were made:

1. There is a substantial complementary effort underway in the private sector. But this business-to-business dialogue will be most successful if it is reinforced by the U.S. government.
2. It is extremely important that the U.S. government stress trade at every opportunity in meetings with Japanese leaders.

The cost of capital and the savings rate were both very much on the minds of this group. They felt the short term focus of U.S. businesses, and their resulting competitive problems, stems largely from the higher price that U.S. businesses must pay for capital than foreign competitors. The high cost of capital means investment projects must have a faster pay back, which naturally penalizes long term investment.

In addition, high U.S. capital gains taxes and the double taxation of dividends exacerbate the problem, as do the short term investment criteria of professional investors with pension fund money. While these are not new concerns, they felt we must address them as well if we are to stay competitive.

Some comment was directed to the budget deficit and, while a poll was not taken, there was sentiment for an oil import/gas tax or value added tax -- but only if the revenue was tied to deficit reduction and not new spending.

Several in the group felt that the rising dollar (versus the yen and deutschmark) is hurting American business and is undercutting recent progress on the trade deficit. Others pointed out that exchange rate volatility creates uncertainty and hurts U.S. business investment. Everyone agreed that to some extent the calm political atmosphere in the U.S. is attracting many investors. These investors are looking for a safe haven and, therefore, are willing to overlook technical factors which could argue for a lower dollar.

Overall the mood of the group was upbeat but concerned about international competitiveness. These executives are competing in a global arena and are looking to us for policies that will help U.S. business be successful in the global marketplace.

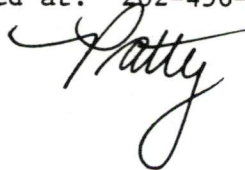
