Boston - Golf - Summit Announcement - Fishing

THE PRESIDENT HAS SEEN

And you thought four hours on a bus was bad.

From the top:

Bush arrived the Boston landing zone (playground on the Charles River near the Massachusetts Eye and Ear Infirmary) 12:37 p.m. The helicopter rotors whipped brown carpeting off the make-shift plywood ramp that extended over damp ground. As Marine Honor Guard crouched at attention the limousine was backed up to the helicopter.

Off Marine One stepped Mrs. Bush, in a black, gray and white print two-piece you've seen before, and the President in traditional dark suit. The motorcade was uneventful until Bush neared the hotel, where protestors du jour shouted "down with Bush" while some waived anti-Syria banners and others lofted pro-choice signs.

The Catholic Lawyers' Guild event was open but here are a couple of items you may have missed. Nancy Sununu kissed Governor Dukakis who was at the head table between Chief Justice Paul Liacos of the Massachusetts Supreme Court and Bishop Robert Banks, Vicar of the Archdiocese of Boston. Mrs. Bush did not kiss Governor Dukakis but shook his hand and they exchanged warm greetings (of undetermined sincerity).

While in Boston, Bush signed the "Dr. Morgan Bill." Marlin said the action was taken "out of compassion for her plight."

The motorcade and return helicopter flight was uneventful, with Marine One hugging the coast to avoid dark clouds inland.

Bush changed clothes quickly at Walker's Point and headed off without delay for a "sport opportunity" at the Cape Arundel Golf Club. He was wearing a consummate preppy ensemble of baggy green pants, turquoise Polo and a shapeless beige sweater (which later was to be covered, because of several heavy downpours by rain gear - red pants and a yellow Nike windbreaker with blue shoulders and a white chevron across the chest).

Teeing off at the first hole he refused questions on the Wyoming negotiations and Monica de Greiff, but when asked if her departure means the drug lords are winning, he said: "No."

Bush drove a cart with club pro Ken Raynor. Scowcroft followed alone in his own cart. As the pool waited on the porch at the club, heavy rain began, but it slackened off as Bush putted out at the ninth green (not too hot on the President's golf action).

Bush and aides exchanged comments regarding a phone call, which the President said was "incoming." As the threesome was playing the tenth hole, Zanca gathered poolers for a presidential statement and Q and A. A transcript will be provided by the White House, but here are the highlights:

Bush said he had talked to Baker but before proceeding stopped to wipe the rain off his brow then said: "I'm very pleased that we've reached agreement with the Soviets on several questions - only one of which I'm prepared to mention here now."

"I'm very pleased that we've reached agreement with the Soviets on several questions - only one of which I'm prepared to mention here now."

He said Shevardnadze and Baker would do a show in Wyoming "at which it will be announced we will be having a Summit - that I will be meeting with Mr. Gorbachev - in late Spring or early Summer. That agreement is set, and I'm very pleased."

Q: Where?

A: "Well, undoubtedly, it will be in the United States, I'm assuming it will be there."

Bush said he would leave arms control announcements to the Secretary and Foreign Minister.

Q: Accomplishments out of the Summit?

A: Well, a wide array of subjects. And we will be continuing to work on the arms control agenda. It's not my view that Summits must have arms control agreements, but we're going to be working towards them with full faith. Going forward in every way to achieve further arms reductions. That's been a goal of mine for a long time. I think it's a goal of Mr. Gorbachev. And so I would say that there's a chance for agreements of that nature. But there'll be plenty of other stuff to be discussed in addition to arms control."

(The transcript is now catching up with the pool report so I'll knock off the full quotes.)

The U.N speech on Monday is likely to be changed to reflect the Wyoming negotiations because, Bush said: "I think around the world people will be pleased."

There follows Bush's belief the Summit will be in Washington, his uncertainty of whether it will be before or after the Economic Summit which could be as late as the Fall (because "our allies seem to be very flexible").

More discussion of de Greiff.

At the end of the Q and A, Bush turned to McBride, saying: "Tim, get my junk out of the back of the car," meaning the presidential fishing gear. Then Bush went to the bank of the Kennebunk River by the club house and fished in pouring rain for about twenty minutes. He caught nothing.

GOLF COURSE POOL

Kennebunkport, Maine
September 22, 1989

The President hit the golf course sometime around six pm but your pool did not sight him until just before seven, as he approached the ninth green with Scowcroft, the club pro Ken Raynor and a fleet of nine other golf carts more or less behind him in formation.

Asked as he reached the green how his game was, Bush replied "Terrible." He then let it be known that Scowcroft had won most of the holes, followed by the pro, and then the First Hacker. At least, that's what he seemed to be saying.

A few moments later, Bush used his oversized putter to sink a fairly formidable four footer that he left after his approach shot led him to overshoot the hole on his first putt. Asked if he liked the ungainly club, he said, "Yeah, I like it."

The threesome then engaged in what could only be a strange local golf custom: each dropped a ball near the ninth green and pitched to the nearby tenth green and putted through. Though designed to be some kind of sudden death playoff, it proved inconclusive; Bush egged a first weak putt on ten with an oath to himself as he stroked -- "Hit the damn thing" -- but this only certified that he would come up short. The trio then putted out (in gimme fashion) on ten and then repeated the drill, pitching back to the ninth. By this time, darkness had nearly fallen and seeing, much less putting, was getting tricky.

Just when your pool had loaded into the vans and began to dream of dinner, it was informed the First Hacker had turned into the First Angler; he had taken rod in hand and was fishing for bass off a rock in the Kennebunk River near the clubhouse. We piled out of the car and ran to see him spin-casting for bass, using a typical bass lure for bait. Bush had no luck, despite help from Raynor. This was not surprising, inasmuch as darkness had fallen completely by now and neither your pool, the President or any fish could clearly see the lure as it rippled through the water. What's more, if the fish weren't biting, the mosquitoes were. And so, after a dozen-odd casts this way and that, the President retired, commenting to Scowcroft, who had waited nearby, "What a lovely evening."

Then it was an uneventful motorcade home, where Bush had said earlier that he would remain through the evening.

TOUR OF MORSE TREE FARM

Kennebunkport, Maine

September 22, 1989

News broke out at the tree farm, but it had little to do with capital gains or trees. After touring the tree farm, which looked like most any wooded area, the President was asked what he thought of the DEA's effort to lure a drug dealer to Lafayette Park in order to buy the crack that Bush later used in his drug speech. What follows are the highlights of his response. The White House is preparing a transcript.

"I think it was great because it sent a message to the United States that even across from the White House they sell drugs. It sends a powerful message," the President angrily responded.

Asked whether he thought it was proper for the DEA to lure the drug dealer to Lafayette Park, Bush responded, "Every time a guy gets caught selling drugs he pleads he has been lured there...the guy was arrested or grabbed for selling drugs in front of the White House."

Your poolers persisted, asking again whether it was proper to lure a drug dealer to Lafayette Park, and Bush responded, "That's what you do whenever you make a drug bust."

"The fact is the guy was arrested or busted in front of the White House. It doesn't matter how it got there."

The President seemed puzzled by the questioning saying, "I don't understand...are these advocates here for this drug guy?"

The President was asked whether he specifically requested crack purchased across from the White House. "I said I'd like to have something from that vicinity to show it can happen anywhere. Absolutely. And that's what they gave me."

Clearly irritated by the questions, the President continued, "What I get out of it is that the man was busted in front of the White House. I can't feel sorry for him. I'm sorry. You ought not to be peddling these insidious drugs that ruin the lives of our children. That's the bottom line."

The President then said he was not sure whether the person who sold the DEA agents the crack had been arrested. "There's a little ongoing action about that."

"I don't think any neighborhood is free from selling drugs. This proves the White House is not," Bush concluded.

The President then turned and spoke to the Morse family apologizing for discussing drugs instead of trees. He did not respond to shouted questions about the state of the capital gains deal being debated on Capitol Hill.

The best quote regarding trees came from Martin Morse when he told the President that Hurricane Hugo may have done significant damage to similar tree farms in the South. "One 12-hour storm can wipe out 30 years work."

Although Morse talked much about capital gains, all the President could be heard to say was "We're going to work on it," and "Some of my opponents are saying this is a tax break for the wealthy..." The President's voice trailed off as he began explaining to the Morse family that he did not believe that to be true.

Bush, who changed into olive green pants and a khaki shirt before going to the tree farm, went golfing after the tree farm in a threesome including Scowcroft and the Club Pro. Asked at the first tee about the Baker-Shevardnadze talks, he said he had called Baker from Air Force One. "He seems to be well-satisfied with them (how the talks were going)."

CAPE ARUNDEL GOLF CLUB POOL

The president went to the golf course this morning, not to knock a few balls around but to go fishing. He and golf pro Ken Raynor walked to a bank along the Kennebunk River, down from the clubhouse. There they stood casting away.

But the fish weren't biting, so they quickly moved to another river slope. "We're going down to where the fish are now," said Bush. But there was no luck there, so the pair moved to yet another spot, forcing poolers to trek through the woods and leap across a 4-foot gulley to keep up.

The only comments resembling news came when Bush was asked about the progress of US-Soviet talks in Wyoming: "Encouraging, yeah. Very."

Bush was clad in black rubber boots, a brown and tan fishing jacket, lightweight army-green slacks and a navy blue "USS Bluefish" cap. Bush was out there a little more than an hour and apparently caught no fish, at least none he displayed for the cameras.

Poolers originally were told Bush was going to jog, then were told he would golf instead. But he ended up fishing.

Asked about jogging, Bush replied: "I'm going to a little later. We don't leave 'till noon."

And golfing? "We'll do that too," Bush said.

THE PRESIDENT: General Scowcroft and I just talked to Secretary Baker and I'm very pleased that we've reached agreement with the Soviets on several questions, only one of which I am prepared to mention here now. But in a few minutes, Mr. Shevardnadze will be have a press conference, followed promptly by Secretary Baker's press conference, at which it will be announced -- and they will discuss the details -- that we will be having a summit, that I will be meeting with Mr. Gorbachev in late spring or early summer. The agreement is set and I'm very pleased. And I'll leave further comment on what's been accomplished in Wyoming to our Secretary of State.

Q Where is the summit going to be, Mr. President?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, undoubtedly, it will be in the United States.

Q Has that been fixed in those talks, or is --

THE PRESIDENT: I'm not sure that that will be part of the announcement; I didn't discuss it. But it is just assumed -- I'm assuming it will be there.

Q And did they nail down the accords on nuclear testing and chemical weapons?

THE PRESIDENT: No, but I'd prefer to leave that to the Secretary and Mr. Shevardnadze. But I'm very pleased overall. I think you'll see why when they make their announcements there.

Q What accomplishment do you expect out of the summit? What will be the purpose of it then?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, a wide array of subjects, and we will be continuing to work on the arms control agenda. It's not my view that summits must have arms control agreements. But we're going to be working towards -- with full faith, going forward in every way to achieve further arms reductions. That's been a goal of mine for a long time and I think it's a goal of Mr. Gorbachev's. And so I would say that there's a chance for agreements of that nature. But there will be plenty of other subjects to discuss in addition to arms control.

Q Why the late spring to early summer timetable? Could it not be sooner?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, you might make a case that it could be sooner, but this was the agreed timetable, and it's agreeable to us, and --

Q Did you want to give more time to the conventional weapons negotiations to go forward or --

THE PRESIDENT: Well, it gives us time to move forward on

MORE

a lot of fronts, is the way I see it. And it's not under the time gun, and yet, the summit being set, I think it will be useful on both sides to pushing both bureaucracies forward, both decision-making teams forward to achieve results. I think that was why the general agreement on time.

Anyway, it's good news, and I'm very pleased with what the Secretary has been able to accomplish out there. Maybe -- I don't know whether General Scowcroft would have more on all this later, but I know he's been in close touch with the Secretary, Bob Gates, out there, and will continue to be.

Q Will you now work this into your speech to the U.N. General Assembly?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, we may -- it's one of the things that you foresaw in your question a minute ago, but yes, we might touch on it. I think around the world, people will be pleased that there is this announcement, and there may be other things that will come out of the Wyoming meeting that we can talk about in New York.

Q Would you like to see this summit take place someplace other than Washington? You'd like to see it out in the country, wouldn't you?

THE PRESIDENT: No, I think probably Washington would be proper for this one, although I don't think they've discussed that or agreed on --

GENERAL SCOWCROFT: No, sir. It's just the ordinary run of things, it's your turn.

Q But, General, there is a commitment by the Soviets to have the summit in the U.S.?

GENERAL SCOWCROFT: Oh, I think so. It's assumed.

THE PRESIDENT: Yes. That was discussed, as a matter of fact, in the Oval Office and was almost a given. But I just have to hedge a little because I don't know whether that's in the announcement by the Foreign Secretary.

Q Do you think it would proceed or follow the economic summit?

THE PRESIDENT: Well, we haven't set a date. We're very open as to whether that economic summit should be in the spring of 1990 or into the fall of 1990. The last one, as you know, was -- the one just past -- in the summer. But I think our allies seem to be very flexible and I now must get in touch with them fairly soon to determine what their desires are. From the U.S. side, we can be very flexible on that.

Q And it might be as late as the fall?

THE PRESIDENT: I would think it could be. They've had several in the fall, I think. So there's no -- in other words, there is no set month or period, season in which to have these.

Q On the drug front, don't you think that Mrs. de Greiff's resignation in Colombia means that the drug lords are not -- that they seem to have the upper hand, they're not being beaten back at all?

THE PRESIDENT: Rita, I don't think so because of what I've been reading today coming out of Colombia and, obviously, from what she, herself, said. But that's their business; that's the internal affair of Colombia. But I see no reason that that single resignation will signal or lead to a lessening in resolve on the part of President Barco. So I don't worry about that.

MORE

Q But she might have been threatened out of office.

THE PRESIDENT: Well, I think that was the original fear, but I don't know the internals of that at all. But I think that the commitment of the Colombian government is such that this resignation by itself should not be interpreted as a signal that they're going to lighten up in some way.

Okay. Thank you all very much. Now for the river.

Q What?

THE PRESIDENT: A little fishing down there. Come on.
(Laughter.)

Q You're kidding.

Q This is a joke, right?

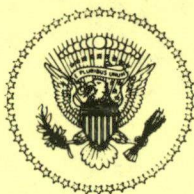

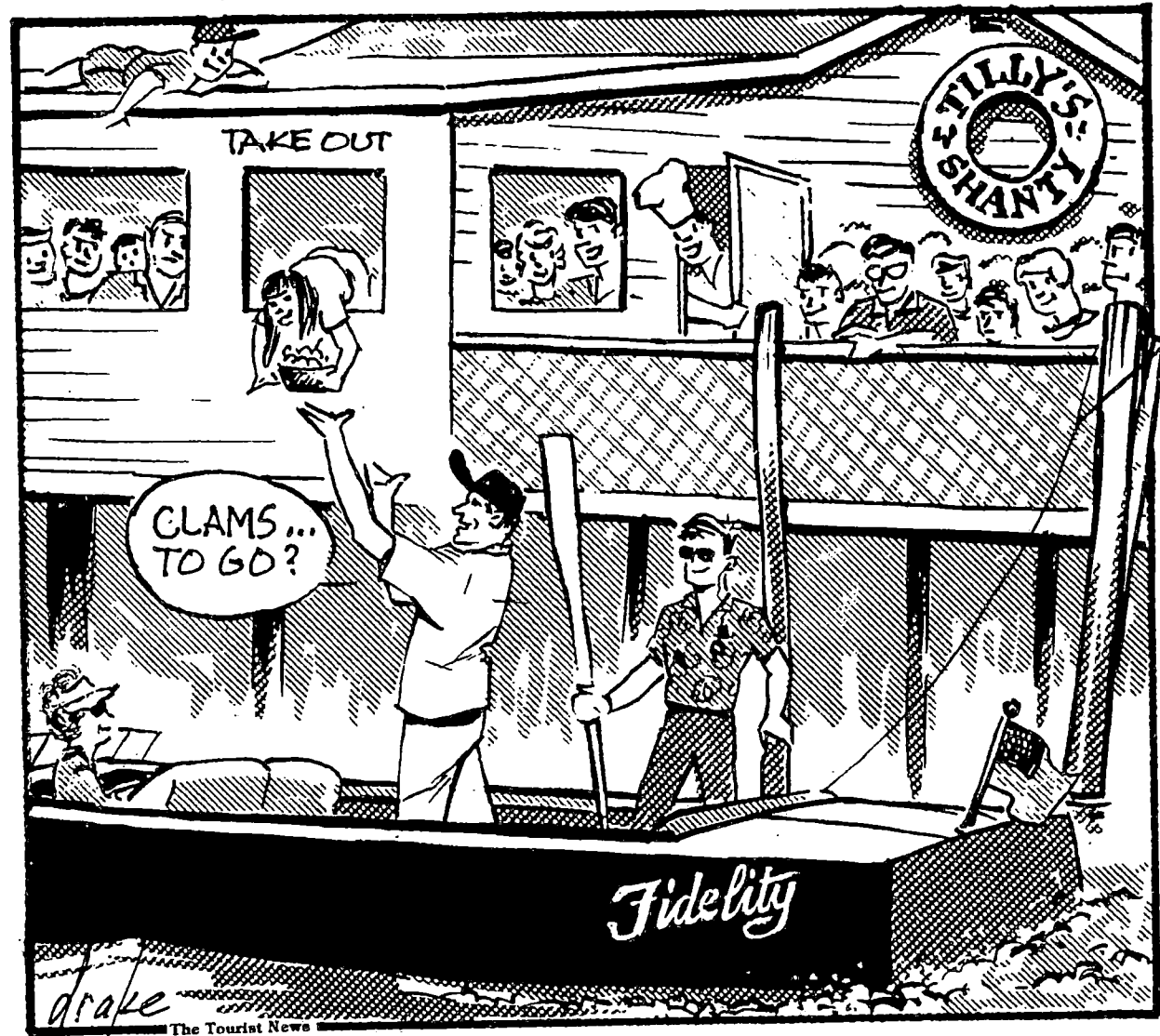

The Catholic Lawyers Guild of the Archdiocese of Boston was reestablished in July, 1987 after a quarter century lapse. On the First Friday of each month, its members attend a Mass and breakfast at St. Thomas More's Oratory on Franklin Street. On October 28 it will present for judges, lawyers and others in the judicial system a Day of Recollection at St. John's Seminary directed by The Most Reverend Lawrence J. Riley, S.T.D., LL.D., Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese.

The Red Mass

The Red Mass is the popular name for the Mass of the Holy Spirit offered to invoke God's blessings on the judges, attorneys, and others working to provide justice throughout the judicial system. Its name is derived from the color of the vestments customarily worn by the celebrants. The custom began in the thirteenth century in Europe. In London, it was offered at Westminster Abbey at the opening of Michaelmas term. In Rome, it was traditionally celebrated to open the judicial year of the Sacred Roman Rota.
