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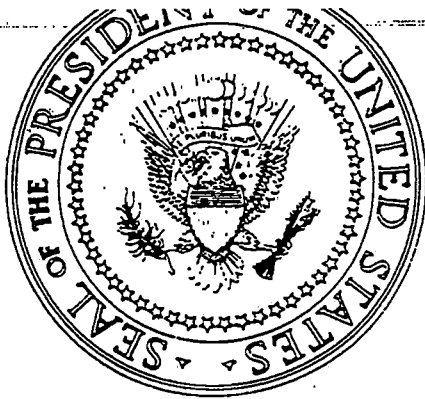

SOVIET CALLS FOR END OF CHEMICAL ARMS Shevardnadze Accepts Bush Plan, Widens It

U.N. -- The Soviet Union Tuesday accepted President Bush's challenge to cut back sharply on chemical weapons and called on the U.S. to go even further by eliminating all poison gas from U.S. and Soviet arsenals.

Foreign Minister Shevardnadze, addressing the U.N. General Assembly 24 hours after Bush had spoken at the same podium, called on the U.S. to halt production of chemical weapons immediately and, in tandem with Moscow, to "radically reduce or completely destroy" its existing poison gas stocks....

Shevardnadze, in an address that concentrated on proposals to reduce or destroy modern arms and the means for testing and producing them, repeatedly praised Bush for arms initiatives but offered even more ambitious disarmament bids in various fields.

The Soviet minister, who last week arranged for a late spring or early summer meeting of Bush and President Gorbachev, said there are "realistic prospects" for passing "the last turn" on the road to a strategic arms reduction treaty by the time of the summit.

Deputy Foreign Minister Viktor Karpov, Moscow's senior civilian specialist on arms, said Shevardnadze intended to project compromises during the mid-year summit to eliminate the last major obstacles to the landmark START treaty, which could slash U.S. and Soviet strategic nuclear arsenals by 50 percent. Once agreement is reached at the top, Karpov said, the Geneva negotiators could prepare the historic accord for signing without delay.

Shevardnadze said agreement on a time period for Bush's first summit meeting with Gorbachev "shows that we have moved quite far ahead in solving a number of major bilateral and international problems."

SOVIETS BACKS ARMS BAN Bush Lauds 'Common Ground' On Chemical Weapons

President Bush -- Declaring Tuesday the finding of "some good common ground" with the Soviets -- praised Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze's endorsement of a plan to cut stockpiles of chemical weapons. Bush said the endorsement will help arms-reduction talks move forward....

"I am very pleased with the way things are going," said Bush. "The reaction from the Soviets...has been positive, so now the goal is to get moving and try to work out these agreements."

James Blackwell of the Center for Strategic and International Studies said Bush's signals that he's "willing to cut deals" will set a faster pace for other negotiations to reduce nuclear arms.

U.S. TO TRY TO SHUT OFF SOVIET SUPPLY OF STRATEGIC EQUIPMENT

Commerce Secretary Mosbacher said Tuesday that the U.S. would try to persuade its allies to shut off Soviet sources for key manufacturing equipment used to make missile casings.

The so-called prepeg machines, used to make composite materials for products ranging from missile casings to fishing rods, are now widely available to communist nations.

Mosbacher said the Commerce, Defense and State departments agreed to maintain export controls on the machines but at the same time would urge other Western nations to impose their own export controls.

He said in a statement: "I think we have a reasonable likelihood of success."

EXTRA STAR WARS FUNDS REJECTED

The Senate, working on a \$288.2 billion defense bill, refused Tuesday to add money for "Star Wars" in a sign that the anti-missile program has passed its heyday as a symbol of superpower conflict.

On a 66 to 34 vote, the Senate rejected an \$8.5 billion package, including an extra \$298 million for "Star Wars." The unsuccessful package was offered as an alternative to an amendment -- without added "Star Wars" money -- by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

The Senate also refused, 71 to 29, to kill the controversial B-2 Stealth bomber. It rejected an amendment to end the program after the 13 planes already under construction, at a cost of \$23 billion, are finished.

SENATE REJECTS WITHDRAWAL OF 3,000 TROOPS FROM KOREA

The Senate rejected an amendment Tuesday night to withdraw 3,000 U.S. troops from South Korea next year, but a leading opponent of that proposal predicted Korea would agree to U.S. troop reductions by 1992.

The amendment by Sen. Bumpers to reduce the 43,800 U.S. troops in South Korea by 3,000 by next Aug. 30 was rejected 65 to 34.

It was replaced with a non-bonding "sense of the Senate" amendment urging President Bush to report by next April on the prospects for future reduction of U.S. troops in South Korea.

BUSH SEEKS BANKS' AID ON DEBT

President Bush summoned leading bankers to the White House Tuesday in an unprecedented effort to rally support for his Administration's plan to ease the burden of debt faced by many Third World nations.

Responding to increasing antagonism among the banks, Bush urged about 65 top bank executives and foreign financial leaders to support the strategy of Treasury Secretary Brady, which is aimed at reducing the hundreds of billions of dollars in debt that impoverished Third World countries owe the banks.

"I want you to know how strongly I support the new debt strategy, and how important it is for us to work together to ensure that the strategy is successful," one participant quoted Bush as saying.

Bush's comments marked an unusually high-level effort to prod the banks, many of which have been hostile to Brady's request that they both forgive some existing loans to developing countries and continue to provide new ones. No U.S. president has ever become involved in the Third World debt issue in such a direct way, bankers said.

MEXICAN PRESIDENT TO SEEK MAJOR TRADE AGREEMENT WITH BUSH ADMINISTRATION

MEXICO CITY -- President Salinas de Gortari, on the eve of his first official visit to Washington, said he is seeking a major trade agreement with the Bush Administration that would recast economic relations between the U.S. and Mexico.

Salinas said in an interview with the Boston Globe Monday that he will push for an accord that would permit Mexican textiles, steel, automobiles, and other products to enter U.S. markets on a scale that would deter Mexican workers from immigrating illegally to the U.S. in search of better jobs.

Although he stopped short of calling for unrestricted trade between the two countries, Salinas said that increased access to U.S. markets was an essential part of his government's bold shift in policy that is opening the Mexican economy for the first time in decades to large foreign and private capital.

"It is very important, I would say fundamental to the consolidation of the program of economic reform in Mexico," Salinas said of a trade agreement. (Philip Bennett, Boston Globe)

BRADY WARNS AGAINST EXCESSIVE EXPECTATIONS FOR DEBT REDUCTION

Treasury Secretary Brady warned developing countries Tuesday against "excessive expectations" that can delay debt reduction negotiations with banks and increase the risk of talks breaking down.

Addressing the opening session of the annual meeting of the World Bank and the IMF, Brady also said "debt reduction cannot be seen as a cure-all for the economic problems of debtor countries." ...

Brady contended that "debt reduction is meaningful only if it supports the economic reforms that are the key to long-term sustained growth," he said.

Economic reform, including increased investment, return of flight capital, privatization of government enterprises and reduction of barriers to foreign investment, is the objective of the debt strategy, he said.

Brady warned countries seeking debt reduction from private banks against being unrealistic.

"Excessive expectations can only promote delays, increase the risk of breakdown in negotiations and ultimately raise the economic costs to the banks and debtor countries," he said. "In this case, time is money."

JAPAN ANNOUNCES \$300 MILLION HUMAN RESOURCE FUND

Japan announced Tuesday it would give the World Bank \$300 million over the next three years to train people in poor countries to help their nations develop.

"Japan is now prepared to contribute a total of about \$300 million...for a special fund in the bank," Japanese Finance Minister Hashimoto told the annual meeting of the IMF and the World Bank.

Japanese officials said the idea of the fund sprang from Hashimoto's experience in a post-war Japan that grew into an economic power, boosted by capable people.

Many Japanese educated abroad contributed greatly to the development, an official said, adding: "It was the people that made Japan's economic development possible." (Reuter)

\$660 MILLION PLAN OF AIDE TO HUNGARY AND POLAND URGED

BRUSSELS -- The EC's executive commission Tuesday proposed a \$600 million economic aid program for Hungary and Poland next year, more than double the total already pledged by the industrial democracies this year.

The response from the 24 major non-communist economic powers gathered here to decide how to encourage evolution in Easter Europe was overwhelmingly positive. And many officials made it clear that the amount, which would come from all 24 countries, could even be greatly exceeded.

"The 24 met today at a decisive moment in the process of democratization and economic reforms in Poland and Hungary," a communique issued at the end of the meeting concluded, "but it remains fragile."

WHITE HOUSE PLANS TO AID POLAND THROUGH IMF

The Bush Administration is working on a new "package of support" for Poland that relies strongly on the IMF to channel money to the new government in Warsaw as part of a major multilateral effort, White House officials said.

In agreeing with plans by the IMF to expand its role in Eastern Europe, the Administration has apparently committed itself to more ambitious aid to Poland than the direct assistance previously proposed by the White House. The new idea for aid through multilateral institutions was discussed Tuesday by the National Security Council, officials said.

Administration officials say there could be a substantial difference between direct aid from Washington to Warsaw -- which some Democrats have criticized as paltry -- and international aid provided by the IMF. But they could not say exactly how much the fund might actually offer.

U.S. ASKS JAPAN, WEST GERMANY TO AID NICARAGUA OPPOSITION

U.N. -- The U.S. has asked Japan and West Germany to help fund the democratic opposition in Nicaragua in its election campaign against the Sandinista government, U.S. officials said Tuesday.

Secretary of State Baker made the request during separate meetings with Japanese Foreign Minister Nakayama and West German Foreign Minister Genscher, said the officials, who asked not to be identified.

They described the response as "relatively positive" but said no commitments have been made....

One official said Baker was not just seeking money but was also asking other democracies to send observers to the elections, set for February, and to have groups visit Nicaragua in advance of the polls to monitor the campaign.

ORTEGA SAYS ELECTIONS WILL END CONFRONTATION WITH U.S.

MANAGUA -- President Ortega said Tuesday that President Bush is his main political adversary and challenged him to a debate, but predicted that Nicaragua's elections next February would produce a "new understanding" with the U.S.

In his first news conference since the Sandinista Front chose him Sunday to run for re-election, Ortega said the elections would swing international opinion in favor of his government and open up blocked sources of financing needed to rebuild his country's shattered economy. He also sought to discredit opposition candidates by labeling them as U.S. puppets.

"There is no real opposition here.... The opposition is the United States of America," Ortega said. "My adversary is North American imperialism, my adversary ultimately is named George Bush."

Asked whether he would be willing to debate Violeta Chamorro, the candidate of the National Opposition Union coalition, Ortega replied, "I am ready to debate the maximum leader of the opposition, who is named George Bush."

SPEED CONTRA RESETTLEMENT, GUATEMALAN URGES THE U.S.

U.N. -- The President of Guatemala appealed to the U.S. Tuesday to use the aid it is giving the Nicaraguan rebels in Honduras to speed up their return and resettlement in Nicaragua.

In an interview, the Guatemalan leader, Vinicio Cerezo, said he spoke for all the Central American presidents when he warned that if the U.S. fails to encourage their rapid return to Nicaragua, the Contras may remain indefinitely in Honduras and become "a destabilizing element" in Central America.

"If we do not get them to go home soon they will become a very dangerous problem for the rest of Central America," he said.

In an address to the U.N. General Assembly, Cerezo recalled that the five Central American presidents are committed to speeding the return of the Contras under the terms of the agreement they reached in Tela, Honduras, last month.

DRUG BARONS BRING NEW DIMENSION TO VIOLENCE IN GUATEMALA

MEXICO CITY -- Colombian drug traffickers seeking new supply lines have moved into Guatemala, adding to instability as the country goes through a new round of factional violence, Western diplomats say.

The diplomats estimate that up to 200 Colombians linked to the Medellin and Cali cartels are now operating in Guatemala, and that some 1,100 pounds of cocaine passes through the country a week, mainly to the U.S. market.

The increased drug activity comes as Guatemala faces a new round of kidnapping, bombings and assassinations, raising fears of a return to the violence at the beginning of the decade, when thousands were slaughtered by death squads under military rule.

Killings Seen As Rebel Protest To U.S. Bases

MANILA -- Gunmen thought to be communist rebels killed two American civilians working at a U.S. military base Tuesday and protesters called for the closure of U.S. military facilities as Vice President Quayle arrived here to seek talks on keeping the bases open.

Retired Air Force officers Donald Buchner, 44, and William Thompson, 45, both working for Ford Aerospace under contract to the Defense Department, were ambushed by the gunmen as they drove from their base about 50 miles north of here near Clark Air Base, according to police and U.S. sources. The victims' hometowns were not immediately available.

"The evidence available at this time suggests that they were victims of an...assassination squad" of the Communist New People's Army, Quayle said Wednesday morning. He condemned the killers as "vicious terrorists who wish to drown freedom in the blood of innocent men and women."

The NPA strongly opposes the U.S. military presence in the Philippines. Like protests by several hundred Filipinos at Manila's airport, where Quayle arrived, the killings appeared aimed at underlying leftists' opposition to the U.S. military presence here. At the airport, students burned U.S. flags and shouted such slogans as "Quayle Go Home -- Bases Out."

VIETNAM COMPLETES CAMBODIA PULLOUT

General Calls Withdrawal A Success

MOC BAI, Vietnam -- The final column of Vietnamese combat troops in Cambodia crossed over the border Tuesday into Vietnam, ending a decade-long military adventure in a foreign land and bringing hopes here that for the first time in almost 50 years, Vietnamese soldiers will not be dying in war.

While this troop pullout has been described as Vietnam's "complete and final withdrawal" from the country it invaded in December 1978, Gen. Nguyen Van Thai, a senior military spokesman, said in an interview at this desolate border checkpoint that the last few Vietnamese soldiers may not actually make it out of Cambodia for another day or two because some trucks had broken down and some passages had become congested.

Thai called the withdrawal a success, in part because the troops were able to begin this evacuation from Cambodia -- along four land routes as well as by sea -- without any last-minute guerrilla attacks on them. "I am very happy that the crossing has been completed peacefully," he said.

**PARTY CHIEF MEETS PRESS IN BEIJING
5 Politburo Members Join Show Of Unity**

BEIJING -- China's new Communist Party chief Jiang Zemin, in his first press conference since the army crushed a student-led democracy movement more than three months ago, stressed Tuesday that China will adhere to a policy of economic reform and opening to the outside world.

But Jiang and five other leading Politburo officials appearing at the news conference offered few specifics as to how reform is to be carried out. They made no concessions to criticisms from Western nations of the crackdown on the democracy movement.

"We do not believe there was any tragedy on Tiananmen Square," said Jiang, when asked whether the crushing of the movement there could have been avoided. "What actually happened was a counterrevolutionary rebellion...aimed at overthrowing the socialist system," Jiang said.

The Chinese leadership's main aim in convening the press conference appeared to be twofold: to put on a display of top-level unity and to convey the image that everything has returned to normal in China, despite continuing arrests of dissidents and what amounts to state of military alert in Beijing against possible acts of sabotage.

MANEUVERING MARKS EVE OF 'EDUCATION SUMMIT' **Arrangements Divide Governors, Bush Aides**

Despite continued backstage squabbling over access and arrangements, President Bush and the nation's governors prepared to head Wednesday to an "education summit" in Charlottesville that is supposed to give new impetus to school improvements.

On the eve of the summit, Democrats and Republicans on Capitol Hill jockeyed for the lead in proposing legislation to boost the supply and quality of teachers and enhance their role in running the schools....

Bush, who proclaimed during the 1988 campaign an ambition to be known as the "education president," will deliver a concluding address Thursday afternoon and share a news conference with four governors who have taken the lead on school issues.

He remarked Tuesday that he hopes the summit will "come up with some suggestions that will dramatically change things." In addition to setting national goals that "the President can push from here" and the governors can advocate from state capitols, he said, the session should decide "what we're doing wrong...(because) on a per capita basis, we spend far more than Germany or...Japan, and yet we're not achieving the way they are." ...

Governors...were grumbling about limits they said had been ordered by Roger Porter, the White House domestic policy coordinator and chief summit planner. In a memo sent to other governors Monday, Gov. Clinton said the White House was insistent on barring staff members from sessions between governors and Cabinet officers and permitting only Administration officials to prepare a summary of the discussions. He also complained that the White House "refused to budge on making any of the working sessions public."

No Quick Fixes Expected From Education Summit

President Bush heads for his education summit Wednesday with an open mind and a closed wallet.

Bush, who wants to be the "education president," will host two days of talks at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville with all 50 state governors -- the third time in this century that a president has convened state executives to confront a national crisis.

"I'm going down there to listen and to work with the governors, not try to impose an agenda from here," Bush said Tuesday after business leaders told him other countries get more mileage from education dollars.

"We've got to see what is is that we're doing wrong, how can we be more accountable," Bush said.

"We're willing to establish the President as the leader in education, but the responsibility for education resides with state and local government," said New Mexico Gov. Carruthers.

"I have to be the final arbiter, I think, on the overall budget and that is unacceptable to me," Bush said when asked if he would agree to relax restrictions on IRAs in exchange for a capital gains cut....

Rep. Rostenkowski accused Bush of wasting his chance to set national policies and to cut the deficit. "The President has squandered the first year of his presidency on symbolic victories," the Illinois Democrat said.

POLL: U.S. DIVIDED ON CAPITAL GAINS

As the House prepares for a key tax vote Thursday, a USA Today poll says the public is as divided as Congress on cutting taxes on capital gains.

But more taxpayers would prefer tax breaks on IRAs. The poll of 513 adults found:

- * 45 percent agree with President Bush that lower taxes on capital gains...would stimulate the economy.

- * 40 percent agree with Democratic leaders that such a tax cut benefits only the rich.

- * 58 percent say it's a good idea to extend tax breaks on IRAs....

Asked to choose between the proposals, taxpayers prefer IRA tax breaks over those for capital gains by nearly a 3-to-1 margin. But 55 percent -- including 69 percent with household incomes under \$30,000 -- haven't thought enough about it to decide.

And more than 1 in 3 say neither President Bush nor the Democratic majority in Congress can be trusted to create a fair tax system; 32 percent trust Bush more; 25 percent trust the Democrats more.

HOUSE PANEL BACKS BUSH ON CLEAN AIR PROPOSAL Growing Support For Compromise Seen

A House subcommittee Tuesday preserved a key component of President Bush's clean air bill, beating back an effort to strengthen the Administration's proposed controls on the principal source of urban smog -- motor vehicles.

But support appeared to be growing for a compromise measure that would tighten the proposal somewhat, extending to the nation standards planned for California by the mid-1990s.

"Many members are looking for middle ground," said Rep. Waxman. His attempt to strengthen the Administration bill lost on a voice vote....

Calling for a reconciliation between the car and clean air, Bush proposed requiring autos to achieve reductions of 39 percent in hydrocarbons and 30 percent in nitrogen oxides by 1995.

But critics argued at Tuesday's markup session that [Bush's] proposal does not go far enough to offset the impact of a doubling in vehicle miles traveled that is projected by the year 2010. They argued that without larger cutbacks, cities will be forced to curb small industrial emissions of the pollutants. (Michael Weisskopf, Washington Post, A3)

SENATE APPROVES TWO APPROPRIATIONS BILLS

House Democratic leaders, unable to resolve a bitter jurisdictional dispute over child-care legislation, decided Tuesday to allow two powerful committee leaders both to have their way, at least for the moment.

Congressional sources said the leadership will accommodate both the Education and Labor Committee on a key financing issue, effectively passing the dispute to an eventual House-Senate conference for settlement. The compromise is expected to add \$200 million to the cost of the bill....

By allowing both committees to retain jurisdiction on the child-care bill, the leadership assured both sides they would be represented when the bill goes to conference with the Senate.

CHEMICAL WEAPONS

NBC's Tom Brokaw: Chemical weapons -- poison gas. They're cheap, deadly and they're easy to hide and they're a growing threat around the world, especially in the renegade countries such as Libya, Iraq and Iran. President Bush wants the United States and the Soviet Union to begin a worldwide drive to get rid of all chemical weapons by cutting their supplies. Today the Soviet Foreign Minister, Shevardnadze, at the United Nations said Moscow has a better idea.

NBC's John Cochran: Not to be outdone by President Bush, the Soviet Foreign Minister, acting on orders from Mikhail Gorbachev, tried to regain the initiative on chemical weapons, saying Moscow would not only accept Bush's offer, but would go him one better.

(Shevardnadze, through interpreter: "The Soviet Union is ready, together with the United States, to go further: radically reduce or completely destroy Soviet and U.S. chemical weapons.")

President Bush's plan would eliminate 98% of Soviet and American chemical weapons over eight years. The remaining 2% would be destroyed only when all countries capable of chemical warfare agreed to a total ban. The Soviet plan would commit Washington and Moscow to destroying all chemical weapons before other countries join the ban. Despite their differences, Secretary Baker, after a private meeting with Shevardnadze, chose to emphasize the positive and to remind reporters that the Soviets were reacting to Bush, not the other way around.

(Secretary Baker: "It seems to me that it was very responsive to the President's initiative.")

Getting a treaty with the Soviets would require overcoming the problems of verification. At present, the U.S. must rely on satellites and other spying measures to detect poison gas plants such as the Libyan complex that NBC's Fred Francis revealed this year. Libya is one of the reasons President Bush does not like Moscow's proposal today to destroy all Soviet and American chemical weapons. Bush wants to keep some weapons as a bargaining chip to pressure Libya's Colonel Khaddafi to agree to on-site inspection. Still, Bush was upbeat about Moscow's offer.

(President: "You never get everything you want, but I'm very pleased with the way things are going.")

Although the Soviets engaged in a little one-upsmanship today, there is private optimism here that the superpowers can agree on a chemical weapons treaty for Bush and Gorbachev to sign at next year's summit.

Brokaw interviews Sen. Sam Nunn:

Brokaw: Yesterday you had nice words to say about President Bush's offer on chemical weapons. Should he go the extra step that the Soviets are outlining today?

Nunn: The Soviet Foreign Minister basically said, we'll see your bet and raise it. The real question is whether the Foreign Minister intended to convey that the 80% cut from U.S. levels, proposed by President Bush, will be agreed to and then go further. If that's the case, this is good news. But if they're insisting that we do away with all the weapons bilaterally on both sides before we have a multinational agreement, then I think it'll cause us real problems in terms of negotiation.

Brokaw: He also wants the United States not to produce any new generation of chemical weapons. Do you think that's a good idea?

Nunn: That's also a difficult problem. It may be that we have some negotiating room on how much we produce, but an awful lot of our chemical inventory is unsafe. And the binary chemical program is designed to have two separate chemicals that, unless they are mixed, don't have any kind of detrimental effect, so it's a safety measure in replacing inventory as well as a weapons development program. So it'll be very difficult to agree to no new production, but there may be some room, with the good faith on both sides, to come to an in-between position. Maybe we can go a little farther and maybe the Soviets can drop back some. (NBC-Lead)

ABC's John McWethy reports that Foreign Minister Shevardnadze told the U.N. that the Soviet Union supported President Bush's proposal on chemical weapons as far as it went.

(Shevardnadze, through interpreter: "The Soviet Union is ready, together with the United States, to go further.")

Shevardnadze urged the U.S. to stop chemical weapons production right now, not to wait for an agreement. The Soviets, he said, had already stopped. Yesterday, President Bush said the U.S. and Soviet Union should destroy 80% of their chemical weapons immediately, then get rid of everything else only after all other countries capable of producing chemical weapons had signed a treaty banning poison gas. The Soviets today upped the ante.

(Viktor Karpov, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister: "If we agree with the United States to destroy all our chemical weapons stocks, we are ready to do that even without waiting for all the countries to destroy theirs.")

Despite the new Kremlin position, Secretary Baker indicated the Soviets were on the right track.

(Baker: "It seems to me that it was a response to the President's initiative with respect to chemical weapons.")

White House Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the superpowers are now on the same wavelength. Once again the U.S. and Soviet Union are competing with each other, but this week again illustrates how vastly that competition has changed. They are now competing to see who can look like they are the most eager to disarm. (ABC-5)

CBS's Dan Rather reports the Soviet Union today matched President Bush's offer to reduce chemical weapons and said it would go even further. A spokesman for President Bush called that a very constructive response. (CBS-11)

The Democrats have an alternative: higher income taxes for the wealthy along with restored deductions for Individual Retirement Accounts. But several conservative Southern Democrats are siding with the President and so are timber-state liberals, because Mr. Bush's plan would benefit that industry. The President was on the phone today lobbying House members for the vote later this week. Mr. Bush is so determined to win this, he says he'll keep up the fight even if it triggers across-the-board budget cuts in domestic and defense programs.

EDUCATION

These include: thinking about thinking, which encourages children to think about their own thinking and apply that knowledge to the classroom; mentoring and apprenticeships, which provide personal attention to show kids that someone cares if they stay in school; smaller schools, which allow every student to participate in the learning process; choice and accountability, which encourage schools to compete for and with each other for students and thus fosters innovative programming; and business partnerships with schools, which help teachers and principals streamline stifling school bureaucracy so they can concentrate on delivering education. A new Gallup poll shows that, for the first time in U.S. history, a strong majority of Americans (70%) want local schools to meet national education standards and want all students to take national tests.

HUGO AFTERMATH

Jennings: We begin in South Carolina again tonight where only now, five days after Hurricane Hugo came ashore, are they getting a full measure of the hardship which Hugo wrought. Today Gov. Carroll Campbell said that a quarter of a million people are unemployed because the places where they worked were destroyed by the storm. Now the Governor wants the federal government to hire those people, to pay them for putting their community back together. Such an arrangement would be unprecedented, but then so is the damage that Hugo has caused in South Carolina.

ABC's Chris Bury reports now that most counties on the South Carolina coast have been declared federal disaster areas, some government money will be available, but it could be a long time coming. Trucks from the Federal Emergency Management Agency arrived just today, but application centers have yet to open. Federal disaster aid includes: reimbursement for up to 18 months of temporary housing, grants up to \$10,000 to individuals and families, and low-interest loans ranging from 4% to 9% for uninsured losses. To help rebuild the state, the Governor proposed putting jobless people on the public payroll. He likened it to the plan that gave U.S. aid to Europe after World War Two. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Ann Rubenstein reports from Charleston that relief efforts have been hampered by logistical problems. Questions have been raised as to how prepared the Federal Emergency Management Agency is to handle an even larger disaster in the future. (NBC-4)

Rather reports that the Defense Department dispatched about 435 Army engineers to help clear roads and build bridges in South Carolina.

CBS's Erin Hayes reports from Awendaw, South Carolina, that relief efforts there are being neglected in favor of urban areas. (CBS-4)

PIERCE/HUD INVESTIGATION

NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports that Samuel Pierce showed up under order of a subpoena, but said he could not testify because he had not had enough time to prepare. He demanded that all cameras and microphones be turned off before he entered the courtroom, invoking an obscure House rule. (ABC-2, NBC-3)

Rather: Former President Ronald Reagan's name came up today in the investigation of mismanagement and political corruption during the 1980s at the Department of Housing and Urban Development. This came as Samuel Pierce, HUD Secretary for all eight years of the Reagan-Bush Administration, invoked his Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination and refused to tell what he knows.

CBS's Terence Smith reports that an internal HUD memorandum reveals that the White House redirected HUD funds to New Jersey, from another state where the funds were earmarked, in order to help an unsuccessful Republican senatorial campaign.

Rather asks how serious this revelation is involving President Reagan:

Smith: It's obviously not going to improve his image in the history books because it makes clear, for the first time, that the politics that influence decisions at HUD originated, some of it anyway, at the White House and that the President himself was a willing participant.

Set National Education Goals -- "There's a growing consensus that national goals and standards must be adopted for all American schools. Questions of curriculum and quality can no longer be left to local jurisdictions.... A little tinkering and hoping for the best will not suffice.... For too long the federal government has concerned itself only with peripheral issues in education, leaving curriculum and required achievement standards to others.... The federal government must become involved in curriculum and performance. It must back its program with dollars."

We hope he uses it for more than photo opportunities."

Education's Grass Roots -- "The imposition of statewide standards means little if the ability to meet those standards varies from community to community.... By inviting the governors to the summit, Bush recognizes that he feels the best hope for reform lies in action by the states. What he must do at the summit is develop a battle plan to unlock the pent-up creativity of America's statehouses and local education officials."

Education Too Important To Be Left Up To Districts -- "The president should ask the states to withdraw the 'exclusive franchise' of the local school district. The governors should let other public organizations (including other local districts) start public schools within the same boundaries and allow kids to decide whose public schools best fit their needs.... The dynamics created by competition and choice will open the way to the restructuring that educators agree is needed and in particular to the expanded professional roles that teachers unions say they want."

Privatize The Public Schools -- "The first change that needs to be made is to take public schools away from the NEA and the government and convert them into privately run, parent-controlled institutions.... Students have not received value equivalent to the huge sums paid by their parents in taxes. START AGREEMENT/PRESIDENT (Terence Hunt, AP) -- President Bush said Wednesday there is "a good likelihood" that the U.S. and Soviet Union will be ready to sign a treaty cutting strategic nuclear arsenals by the time of a superpower summit in late spring or early summer. Bush said the scheduling of the summit with Soviet leader Gorbachev "will serve as a catalyst for moving forward" on a treaty but that "it's not a given." "It's not absolutely certain that that's going to happen but I would have to agree (there is) a good likelihood that might happen," Bush said in an interview with a small group of reporters in the Oval Office. He also restated U.S. opposition to a ban on nuclear testing, saying it was important that the U.S. have the capability to test the weapons in its arsenal.

(Reuter) -- President Bush said Wednesday he shared Foreign Minister Shevardnadze's view that a strategic arms reduction treaty might be ready for signing at next year's U.S.-Soviet summit. "I think the setting of a summit perhaps will serve as a catalyst for our moving forward," he said during a freewheeling Q&A session with a small group of reporters.... He also said he would "absolutely not" agree to join the Soviet Union in bilaterally eliminating chemical weapons stocks, as Shevardnadze proposed at the U.N. Tuesday. "We need a certain sense of deterrent and we need some leverage to get other countries to ban them," he said.

SECURITY/PRESIDENT (AP) -- President Bush said Wednesday that he won't be "deterred by rumors" that Colombian drug lords have threatened to kidnap one of his five children if the U.S. and Colombian governments don't grant them amnesty. "I can't do my job if I get deterred by rumors," Bush told reporters in the Oval Office. However, the President confirmed that Secret Service protection had been increased for his children. "But that, to the degree security has been stepped up in accordance with the law, on the Bush kids, it is not because of a specific, hard piece of intelligence -- hard threat -- and I'm confident of that," Bush said.

JACKSON-VANIK/PRESIDENT/MITCHELL (AP) -- Sen. Mitchell accused President Bush Wednesday of being "overly timid" and urged him to suspend trade restrictions with the Soviet Union as a reward for permitting freer emigration. Mitchell called for the temporary waiver of the Jackson-Vanik amendment.... The Democratic leader noted that more than 100,000 people have been permitted to leave the Soviet Union since the beginning of the year and that as many as 50,000 more have received permission to depart. "This indisputable rise in Soviet emigration is a step that deserves an American response," Mitchell told the Senate. "The response quite clearly should be the conditional lifting of impediments to trade imposed by the Jackson-Vanik amendment." ... "It is disappointing that the President has failed to recognize that the goals of Jackson-Vanik have been met," Mitchell said.

SDI/MITCHELL (AP) -- Sen. Mitchell said Wednesday the Senate's refusal to put an additional \$300 million into Star Wars reflects a growing sentiment toward reining in the missile-defense shield. "I think there is a growing recognition...that we have to reduce our expectations and level of resources committed to it," Mitchell told reporters. He said the Senate vote "was a strong indication of concern in that regard." ...Mitchell said the vote [to turn aside a Republican-backed attempt to restore funds to Star Wars Tuesday] amounted to a major blow to the program.

SOVIET THREAT/CHENEY (UPI) -- Defense Secretary Cheney warned Wednesday that while the Soviet Union may be seen as a "kinder, gentler" military power, it is "the only nation capable of threatening the very survival of the United States." Cheney made the remarks in releasing the Pentagon's eight annual edition of "Soviet Military Power." ... "There's no effort here to inflate the threat, there's no effort to make it seem more serious than it really is," Cheney said at a news conference. "By the same token, there's no effort to shade the truth and imply that somehow the Soviets don't really retain significant military capability."

SOVIET DEFENSE MINISTER/U.S. (Reuter) -- In another sign of warming relations between the superpowers, Defense Secretary Cheney said Wednesday that Soviet Defense Minister Dmitri Yazov will visit the U.S. next week. Pentagon officials said Yazov would visit Washington and probably other areas of the country from Oct. 1-6. Cheney told reporters at a press conference that "promoting military-to-military exchanges are a very useful thing."

COLOMBIAN GOVERNMENT/LEFTISTS (Bogota/AP) -- The government and Colombia's leftist guerrilla group have signed a peace accord, but there will be no peace for the nation's cocaine cartels, President Barco said.... He announced the treaty late Tuesday night in a surprise nationwide television and radio address, and said it calls for pardons for members of the May 10 guerrilla movement and for them to give up their weapons. The rebels also would be allowed to form a political party under the agreement, reached after six months of negotiations, Barco said. There was no immediate comment from M-19, one of six rebel groups in Colombia.

WESTERN AID/POLAND (Reuter) -- Polish Finance Minister Leszek Balcerowicz said Wednesday his government is seeking \$500 million from Western governments to cover essential imports, including food and pharmaceuticals, during the last three months of 1989. He told a press conference here that the money would be in addition to a \$1 billion loan Poland is seeking from the West to back its anti-inflation program.

ARAFAT VISA/PLO (Tunis/Reuter) -- The PLO is even more determined to seek a U.S. visa for Yasser Arafat after a demand by more than 100 U.S. senators and congressmen to bar him from the U.S., a Palestinian leader said Wednesday.... "We consider this a hostile position, a position which is not at all impartial, a position which shows the complete bias towards Israel," Salah Khalaf, Arafat's deputy in the mainstream Fatah movement, told Reuters in an interview. "In fact it makes us more determined to make a visa application and the United States will have to bear the consequences in front of the Arab world and our friends in the world."

PLO VISAS/STATE DEPARTMENT (AP) -- The State Department has approved visa applications for two PLO officials to attend the U.N. General Assembly session in New York, a U.S. official said Wednesday. The officials said the visas were approved for Abd Rabbuh and Suliman Najib, both PLO officials based in Tunis Tuesday night, said officials, speaking on condition they not be identified. It was not clear whether PLO visa applications were received only from those two officials.

CAPITAL GAINS/HOUSE (AP) -- a majority of House members lean toward cutting the tax on capital gains, both supporters and opponents agreed Wednesday. "I think we have on my side a slight margin at the present time," said Rep. Jenkins, chief sponsor of the capital-gains cut. "I think it's a very close vote." Rep. Sander Levin, who is fighting the reduction, told reporters after a closed Democratic caucus on the issue he still does not see enough votes to block the cut. But, he said, "I think we can catch up." Republicans held their own strategy session, where the Democratic plan of substituting liberalized IRAs for a lower capital-gains tax was portrayed as an excuse to raise taxes.... "It's exactly the kind of tax increase...(Democrats) proposed in 1984," said Rep. Gingrich. "I think we'll find the extra five or six votes necessary to win."

WAR ON DRUGS/SENATE (UPI) -- The Senate was urged Wednesday to approve a \$9.4 billion program "as the strongest first step" in the war on drugs which Sen. Byrd called a greater threat to the nation's future than any battle overseas. Byrd urged the Senate to adopt the compromise package worked out by Senate Republicans and Democrats with White House approval.... "I think this proposal represents the strongest first step we can make to win the war against drugs," Byrd said. "This is the first step and we need to do more as we go along."

HANDICAPPED PROTESTS/ADMINISTRATION (Atlanta/AP) -- Handicapped people who occupied a federal building for two days in a bid to get wheelchair lifts installed on public buses ended the protest after winning a pledge of support from the Bush administration.... Federal officials promised to urge Transportation Secretary Skinner to meet with the group, [the American Disabled for Accessible Public Transportation]. "This agreement by no means resolves the problem of access. It just brings us a step closer," said Mark Johnson, one of the protest leaders who met with Steven Diaz, chief counsel for the Urban Mass Transportation Administration.

HUD HEARINGS (AP) -- A former top assistant to onetime HUD Secretary Pierce, [Lance Wilson], refused Wednesday to testify before a congressional panel about the scandals at HUD, citing his Fifth Amendment rights.... Wilson read a brief statement saying "statements made by the subcommittee members...convinced me the subcommittee had already prejudged me" and identified him as "a prime candidate for a criminal investigation." ...Rep. Lantos said the panel has not prejudged Pierce's potential criminal culpability but had reached a judgment about his tenure as secretary of HUD for eight years. "He was a miserable secretary of HUD," Lantos said. "The record of HUD is clear."

Bush Family Target Of Kidnap Scheme

Sources: Cartels want high-level hostage

By Richard Esposito

The Colombian drug cartels have threatened to kidnap one of President George Bush's five children or another high-profile American to help gain amnesty from the United States and Colombian governments, Washington intelligence sources said yesterday.

The kidnaping scheme is the latest threat lodged by the cocaine barons against U.S. politicians, prosecutors and federal agents since early 1988.

Although increased Secret Service protection of the Bush family members had been reported previously, details of the kidnap threat had not been known.

Initially, in fact, the Bush children, who live in Maine, Texas, Florida and

Washington, had resisted the extra protection, but in recent days all family members have agreed to the Secret Service help.

The sources said the kidnaping threat — also aimed at top U.S. government officials involved in the anti-drug campaign — surfaced about two weeks of Bush's Sept. 5 anti-drug address, which occurred almost simultaneously with a crackdown on the drug cartels by Colombian authorities.

The sources, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, said they believe the cartel members want to influence Colombia's 1990 elections by backing candidates more receptive to their demands for amnesty for past crimes and to prevent

their own extradition to the United States.

A terrorist kidnaping, these sources said, would further enhance the cartels' bargaining power with a new Colombian government.

The sources noted that the cartels — operating out of the city of Medellin and the region of Cali in Colombia — have failed to carry out previous threats made when U.S. government pressure on their business escalated.

But last week, newspapers reported that Bush's family had been assigned Secret Service protection they previously had declined. Syndicated columnist Jack

Anderson disclosed Sept. 14 and Sept. 24 that Colombian "hit teams" were at large in the United States to carry out death threats against Bush.

Secret Service officials declined yesterday to comment on specific threats. But they said there usually is a flurry of such activity when the U.S. government cracks down on terrorists.

But sources said that the president's daughter, Dorothy LeBlond, a Portland, Maine, businesswoman, appeared the most vulnerable. They declined to elaborate. Bush and his wife, Barbara, have four children: George W. Bush, part owner of the Texas Rangers baseball team; John, former state secretary of commerce in Florida; Neil, a Denver oil executive, and Marvin, a Washington stockbroker.

In Texas last week, the president's son George W. Bush said he was not worried by the reported threats. "You can't worry about things like this," Bush told the Dallas Times Herald.

The same day, the president told a reporter in Helena, Mont., that he was similarly unimpressed. Any attempt to make good on the threats "would bring down the total wrath of the American people and the American government," Bush said.

"Our problem is not money, our problem is using the money that is there effectively," said White House Chief of Staff Sununu, as the governors gathered for the two-day conference. "We've got to do it smart, we've got to do it right," Sununu said on NBC's "Today" show. "If all people do is focus on the price tag and say 'if we make it expensive it will be better,' we will never improve the classroom."

EDUCATION SUMMIT/DEMOCRATS (Scripps Howard) -- A confidential memo to Democratic governors advises them not to fall into the "tax-and-spend box" when they meet with President Bush at an education summit this week. In the memo, moderate Arkansas Gov. Clinton asked the 27 other Democratic governors coming to Charlottesville to focus on setting national performance goals with Bush on Wednesday and Thursday.... Clinton's memo summarizes the summit's politics bluntly: "The President 'wins' on the issue just by calling the education summit and we should give him credit for elevating education to such importance. However, we must see to it that Democrats and governors who have worked on education reform for years also 'win' and most importantly that real improvement in education occurs."

PRESIDENT'S FAMILY/COLOMBIAN THREATS (Headline News) -- Security has been tightened around President Bush in response to threats from Colombian drug traffickers. According to a report in New York Newsday, drug lords have threatened to kidnap one of Mr. Bush's five children unless U.S. and Colombian governments grant them amnesty from prosecution.

U.S. DRUG AGENTS/BOLIVIA (La Paz/Reuter) -- Bolivia's main labor federation on Tuesday demanded the expulsion of U.S. anti-narcotics agents and an end to government plans to eradicate planting of coca. The Central Obrera Boliviana (COB) said it was against the illegal drug trade, but...[called] the eradication program "an attack on the interests of the Bolivian people" in a resolution passed at a COB convention.
