1. The First Lady will arrive via motorcade from Hagerstown Airport on Friday, 3 November 1989 at approximately 1515. (Lead/limo/follow)
2. The President will arrive via helo on Friday, 3 November 1989 at approximately 1900.

BUSH CHALLENGES HILL TO SHRINK DEFICIT President Abandons Capital-Gains Tax Cut

President Bush and congressional Republicans Thursday abandoned their quest for a capital gains tax cut this year, but the retreat was accompanied by a White House demand for a stringent deficit-reduction package that far exceeds anything that Congress has so far been willing to enact.

In a statement issued after senior Administration aides conferred with Republican leaders on Capitol Hill, Bush called on Congress to enact legislation achieving \$14 billion in "real deficit reduction -- without new taxes, without spending measures that increase the deficit in the future and without scoring gimmicks." He threatened to veto deficit-reduction legislation that does not meet these tests, leaving in place the \$16.1 billion in automatic, across-the-board budget cuts that were imposed Oct. 16 because Congress and the Administration had not agreed on a budget-cutting package.

In effect, Bush challenged Congress to meet his terms on the deficit-reduction legislation or live with the consequences of "sequestration." ... He said the Administration was "prepared to manage the government under sequester...for as long as it takes to reach agreement on a fiscally responsible bill." ...

Democratic leaders said Thursday night they would offer a counterproposal to Republicans Friday that would include a deficit bill that meets the goals of the budget agreement forged with the White House earlier this year. The Democrats said they would call Bush's bluff by including some of the same "gimmicks" that the Administration agreed to during their budget summit, such as removing the Postal Service from budget calculations. Bush Drops Efforts To Force Vote On Capital Gains Tax Cut

President Bush, suspending the bitterest battle of his presidency, Thursday dropped efforts to force a key Senate vote on a capital gains tax cut, prompting a Republican leader to declare it all but dead for the year.

Bush's action came hours after congressional Republicans warned Chief of Staff Sununu that the Democratic-controlled Congress cannot be dealt with like the overwhelmingly Republican New Hampshire legislature that Sununu used to work with as governor.

Following weeks of legislative maneuvering and bickering on one of the most contentious issues of the 1988 presidential campaign, Republicans for the past week have sought to attach the capital gains measure to a bill that increases the national debt. But after Treasury officials warned that could hold up Social Security checks and other obligations, possibly creating a government default, Bush decided to end the effort....

"I deeply regret the tone of partisanship that has entered the economic policy debate," Bush said in a statement. "I would very much have preferred a fair and balanced debate -- and vote -- on the merits. But the congressional process has bogged down. Now, the stalemate must be broken."

Bush Concedes On Capital Gains, But Pushes For Deficit Cuts

President Bush and congressional Republicans Thursday gave up their best chance of winning a lower capital gains tax rate this year but said they would continue to fight for it.

But as Bush conceded defeat on his campaign pledge to cut investors' taxes, he threatened to continue \$16 billion in across-the-board spending cuts he ordered last month unless Congress cuts the federal budget deficit by \$14 billion....

Congressional Democratic leaders said they had not accepted Bush's demand and would make a counter proposal tomorrow. They said they would meet, but would not go beyond, the spending cuts they agreed to in negotiations with the White House last spring.

Bush Buries Capital Gains Push For '89

President Bush has abandoned his yearlong crusade for a capital gains tax cut, but vows to renew the battle in 1990.

The concession Thursday removed a major roadblock in stalled budget talks between the White House and Congress.

"Lightning could strike," says Rep. Michel. "But I can't conceive what it would be."

"A welcome development," says Sen. Mitchell.

But Bush said Congress must pass a deficit-reduction bill without new spending or he would allow current across-the-board budget cuts to stand -- an idea Democrats oppose.

Bush, Republicans Fly White Flag On Gains Tax To Expedite Debt Bill

President Bush and congressional Republicans all but conceded defeat on their prized capital gains tax cut Thursday by dropping efforts to attach it to must-pass debt-limit legislation.

"No capital gains amendment will be offered" to the debt-limit bill, Sen. Dole told colleagues in an afternoon session.

Dole said he would limit amendments on the debt-limit bill to two: one repealing a catastrophic health insurance surtax and another repealing a 1986 provision designed to ensure that employee benefit plans don't discriminate against low-wage workers.

Limiting the amendments will help ensure passage of the debt bill in time to prevent default next week by the Treasury, he said.

CONGRESS BECAME IMPATIENT WITH BUSH'S EMPHASIS ON TAX CUT

The demise Thursday of President Bush's quest for a capital gains tax cut this year was the result of congressional impatience with his claim that it should be the nation's top domestic priority as well as White House overreaching for a victory, according to Administration and congressional officials.

Although Bush insisted four weeks ago that the tax cut was "vital" and "one of our major goals," he was unable to persuade even Republican congressional leaders that it was worth another bruising battle, these sources said. One Senate Republican said that privately, while supporting Bush, none of his GOP colleagues believed capital gains was the most important legislative goal of the session.

Rep. Michel said, "We can't let the government topple on that (capital gains) issue, at least the government's ability to pay its bills...."

"You don't make it a to-die-fore unless it is winnable or a major, major importance. This wasn't," said a high-ranking Administration strategist. "It wasn't to the Republicans on the Hill and should not have been for the White House. You try it for this year. You try it for next. You support it. But why such a big deal?" ...

The fight over the tax cut appears to have all but destroyed the hopes of Bush and Budget Director Darman for a bipartisan compromise this autumn on reducing the budget deficit. However, some White House officials, who refused to be identified further, said the issues could well be raised again in a few months. "Yes, we wanted capital gains, but we will get it next year," said one official. "Mitchell can't keep his finger in the dike forever." (David Hoffman & Ann Devroy, Washington Post, A16)

FOLEY, MICHEL ASK BUSH TO BACK RAISE House Leaders Sought Meeting

At an unpublicized meeting Wednesday, Speaker Foley and Rep. Michel asked President Bush to publicly support a pay raise this year for all three branches of government.

According to informed sources, the House leaders told the President that without his specific support for the entire package -- including a congressional pay increase -- the issue is dead. The two House leaders reportedly favor a phased pay increase that could total about 35 percent for members of Congress, judges and senior officials of the executive branch.

The Foley-Michel-Bush summit opens a major new effort to confront the politically sensitive issue. When congressional leaders unsuccessfully tried last year to allow a 51 percent increase to go into effect without a vote, a political firestorm ensued, encouraged by the country's radio talk-show hosts.

Failure to reach agreement on a raise has left thousands of federal employees with nearly frozen salaries for years, prompting many to leave government.

According to a senior White House official and several congressional sources, the Wednesday meeting with Bush -- which was preceded by conversations between White House Chief of Staff Sununu and congressional leaders -- did not produce an immediate presidential endorsement.

DINGELL ACID-RAIN PLAN SPREADS CLEANUP COSTS
Large Facilities As Well As Dirtiest Power Plants Would Pay

The House Democratic sponsor of President Bush's clean-air bill Thursday unveiled a plan for acid rain controls that appears to contradict the cardinal principle of the Administration measure, which is that the polluter pays.

The plan by Rep. Dingell comes three weeks after he led a move to gut another key provision of the Bush package that would have required alternative auto fuels to reduce smog.

On acid rain, the Administration bill would require power plants by the year 2000 to halve their emissions of sulfur dioxide, which combines with water in the air to form acid that comes down in rain, poisoning lakes and damaging forests in the Northeast.

The nation's dirtiest plants -- 107 facilities in the Midwest and Southeast -- would be responsible for all the reductions in the first five years and for the costs of cleanup.

Dingell's plan, however, would spread out the cleanup costs -- estimated to run \$7000 million a year in the first five years -- by assessing fees from other large utilities, industrial boilers and processors based on their emissions of sulfur dioxide. The fees would be used to pay part of the costs of anti-pollution devices installed by the dirty facilities.

ANTI-DRUG AD CAMPAIGN DIRECTED AT BLACKS
Survey Shows Cocaine Use Dramatically
Higher Among Minority Teenagers

A coalition of major advertising and media corporations said Thursday that it will begin a \$90 million anti-drug campaign targeting black Americans amid new survey data showing minority teenagers are "significantly" more likely to be heavy users of cocaine and crack than their white counterparts.

Among the television advertisements scheduled to air this month is a dramatic and emotionally charged commercial showing black Africans being shackled and shipped to slavery in America.

The message, which was prepared by a group of black-owned advertising companies, mentions the long struggle of black Americans for freedom and concludes: "Don't dishonor them by becoming a slave to heroin, cocaine and crack.... Drug abuse is the new slavery."

James Burke, chairman of the Media Partnership for a Drug-Free America, showed that and other anti-drug commercials Thursday while unveiling a broader \$365 million anti-drug campaign at a White House news conference. President Bush, who attended briefly, described the effort as "absolutely crucial" because "the federal government will never solve this (drug) problem by itself."

JUSTICE DEPT. URGES WORKERS TO ADOPT

Thornburgh Proposal 'Outrageous,' Federal Union Leader Says

If you are a dedicated employee at the Department of Justice, there is just one more thing you can do for your department: adopt a child.

"The President intends for the federal work force to provide leadership in adoptions," Attorney General Thornburgh told department employees in a memorandum last month. "I ask you to consider adoption and the wonderful gift you can give to a child who has no one."

The two-page memo, captioned "Department Support of Adoptions," reads more like the Republican Party platform than the usual dry legal missives issued by the Attorney General.

"The foundation of our Nation is the American Family, protector of our most valuable yet vulnerable resource -- our children." ...

Bill Myers, an assistant to Thornburgh, said a number of other departments and agencies, including the OPM and the departments of HUD, Veterans Affairs, Labor, Education, Treasury and HHS, were expected to take steps to implement the President's directive.

Adoptive groups applauded Thornburgh's move.... But the union that represents some 20,000 of the department's more than 70,000 employees did not see the memorandum in quite the same light. "This is simply outrageous," said John Sturdivant, president of the American Federation of Government Employees.

COLEMAN TALKS TRANSPORTATION IN RESTON

Republican Marshall Coleman has challenged Democratic gubernatorial rival Douglas Wilder to meet him Thursday at the State Capitol to answer questions about a tape recording that allegedly shows Wilder is secretly working to gut the state's right-to-work law. Coleman visited traffic-weary Northern Virginia at the height of morning rush hour Thursday with Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner and met with harried commuters in Reston.

Coleman repeated his call for a regional transportation authority to solve the region's transportation crisis, saying the status quo isn't working. But Skinner indicated money from the federal highway trust fund would not be released any time soon, a chief complaint of Democrats.

The former GOP attorney general campaigned for votes of Northern Virginia women. The GOP fears, and polls show, that many of the upscale, Republican women of the region will defect to Wilder because of Coleman's strict abortion views.

In addition, Coleman, who trails in public opinion polls, talked defense spending to attract Hampton Roads votes.

Coleman received a boost from Labor Secretary Elizabeth Dole as the two toured the Crystal City Play and Learn Center and plugged the Republican's ideas on child care. Coleman said he supports tax credits for low-income families and incentives for employers to provide day care. He also said he would work to establish day care centers for children of state employees. "We are not doing a good job in Virginia of providing child care," he said.

Coleman said he would emphasize his vision for Virginia in the days before the election, but also would continue to compare his record to the lieutenant governor's. "What I am telling the people of Virginia is I want to be governor because I believe we can build roads faster, hold the line on taxes, fight crime better, do something about drugs under a Coleman administration," he said.

In Norfolk, Coleman was endorsed by former Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, who served during the Reagan administration, a period of increased military spending. He urged voters to elect Coleman "in the interest of strong defense." Coleman pointed to the link between Defense and the Hampton Roads economy and noted a newspaper interview in which Wilder advocated reduced military spending. "Who is going to stand up for the working and producing people of Hampton Roads?" Coleman asked. "We'd like to get more (shipbuilding), not less."

He also challenged Wilder to meet him Thursday at the State Capitol to play a tape recording provided by the National Right to Work Committee. The committee contends the tape proves the Democrat is willing to defeat Virginia's right to work law. Wilder had no immediate response.

Wilder, speaking in Richmond, said a trio of new television ads by the former attorney general amounted to "the same old commercials ... distorting my record, distorting my views." He also denied allegations by the National Right to Work Committee that he told United Mine Workers during a private meeting with the union July 31 in Castlewood that he would support an amendment that would require non-union workers to support unions with dues. "Virginia's right to work will be preserved," said Wilder. "And I'm committed to it."

BUSH GIVES HUNGARIAN ASSURANCES ON SUMMIT

President Bush assured a leading Hungarian political figure Thursday that he will make no deals to the disadvantage of Eastern European nations when he meets Soviet President Gorbachev in the Mediterranean Dec. 2-3.

Imre Pozsgay, the presidential candidate of the former Hungarian Communist Party, renamed and reorganized as the Hungarian Socialist Party, said Bush volunteered the assurance during a 30-minute White House meeting. Pozsgay, who said he hopes the summit will contribute to the stability of Eastern Europe, added he accepts Bush's pledge and believes Gorbachev has a similar intention.

Bush and other White House officials said the sentiments of Hungarian and Polish leaders during the President's trip to Eastern Europe in July played a key role in the decision to seek an early informal meeting with Gorbachev. White House statements have suggested that Eastern Europe is likely to be a major topic of discussion at a shipboard summit....

Bush "restated his commitment to the success of Hungary's democratic reforms" in the meeting with Pozsgay, the White House said, adding that the U.S. supports the process of change but does not support any particular party or candidate.

Pozsgay told a news conference that he hopes for "prosperous and blossoming relations" with the U.S. to replace the tenuous ties of recent decades while Hungary was a communist nation closely allied with the Soviet Union.

HUNGARIAN OFFICIAL LAUDS SUMMIT

All of Central Europe could benefit from the December summit between president Bush and Soviet President Gorbachev, Hungary's minister of state said Thursday after a meeting with Bush at the White House.

"If there will be cooperation within the two superpowers, and this leads to further detente, and it will strengthen perestroika in the Soviet Union, then all Central European nations can only profit from this," said Imre Pozsgay, the leading contender in Hungary's presidential election.

Pozsgay said Bush "assured us that the whole region and the European cooperation and global cooperation could benefit from (the minisummit) and naturally it will be also beneficial and advantageous for Hungary."

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SOME FEAR BUSH COULD LEGITIMIZE
SOVIET REPRESSION WITH MEETING

The Bush Administration may legitimize a coming crackdown in the Soviet bloc by holding an informal summit with Mikhail Gorbachev, some foreign policy and national security experts fear.

Others say the danger in the Dec. 2 summit is that unwarranted foreign policy concessions could be made.

Frank Gaffney, director of the conservative Center for Security Policy, said the summit would be a U.S. signal to Gorbachev that he could take repressive measures against dissidents or strikers without any reaction from the West.

"Gorbachev is saying that events in the USSR and Eastern Europe are making Soviet repression inevitable," Gaffney said. "Evidently the Administration is disposed to view repressive actions necessary -- and by definition, acceptable -- evils on the road to reform."

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NICARAGUA MOUNTS OFFENSIVE
Sandinistas, Contras Report Fighting

MANAGUA -- Apparently fulfilling President Ortega's pledge to "hit the Contras hard," the Sandinista government said its troops Thursday mounted an offensive against rebel units in a mountainous area of northern Nicaragua.

According to the official government newspaper Barricada, an army company, backed by militias, attacked a group of about 30 rebels in the area of Nueva Segovia province, not far from the Honduran border. A Defense Ministry spokesman told reporters that offensive operations were taking place in nine of the country's 16 provinces.

The reports could not be independently confirmed, and neither details of the fighting nor the number of casualties were available.

It remained unclear Thursday whether the level of fighting around the country actually had increased since Ortega's formal decision Wednesday to suspend the government's 19-month-old cease-fire with the Contras.

CONTRA INFILTRATION CONFIRMED
Purpose Is Said To Be To Encourage Voting

The State Department said Thursday that some 2,000 Contra guerrillas have infiltrated Nicaragua from neighboring Honduras recently, thereby confirming one of the chief reasons cited by Nicaraguan President Ortega for canceling his government's 19-month cease-fire with the Contras.

However, department spokesman Boucher said the U.S.-backed Contras have not mounted any concerted hostilities that would justify the Marxist-led Sandinista government's new military offensive.

Since early October, when campaigning began for the elections to be held Feb. 25, about 2,000 Contras have reentered Nicaragua along its northern border with Honduras, joining with 3,500 other guerrillas already in that area, Boucher said. He added that Contra leaders have told the U.S. that the new guerrillas had been sent in "to encourage their supporters to register for the election and the vote."

FBI: INDICTMENT SHOWS HIGH-LEVEL MAFIA, COLOMBIA DRUG LINK

MIAMIA -- The indictment of 12 people in the U.S. and Colombia offers the first clear indication of cooperation between the Sicilian Mafia and Colombia's Medellin cartel, federal officials said.

John Galatalo, 44, the alleged middleman between the two smuggling groups, was among the dozen indicted in Miami, New York, Detroit and Colombia, according to federal officials.

"This is the first real hard evidence of this nexus and close relationship between Colombian cocaine trafficking and Sicilian Mafia members," Timothy McNally, assistant special agent in charge of the FBI in Miami, said Thursday.

THREE REPORTED KILLED IN BOMBINGS, JUDGES STRIKE

BOGOTA -- Two bombs exploded in the capital, killing three people, including a child, and injuring five, a national radio chain reported early Friday.

The new violence erupted late Thursday, the same day judges and court workers began a series of nationwide strikes demanding more protection. The strikes were a response to the murders a day earlier of a judge and a congressman, apparently by drug traffickers.

A car bomb exploded in the western part of the capital, killing three members of the same family who were walking nearby, the radio network Caracol said, quoting witnesses. The three dead were a woman, her small child and her nephew, it said.

BUSH VISITS DUARTE

President Bush visited El Salvador's Jose Napoleon Duarte Thursday at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, where Bush announced a private scholarship in name of the cancer-stricken former president.

"President Duarte is father of democracy in El Salvador," Bush told reporters following a 20-minute meeting with the ailing leader. "He is an inspiration to us all."

\$305 BILLION DEFENSE BILL APPROVED

The "Star Wars" missile defense program suffered its first actual cut Thursday in a compromise \$305 billion 1990 defense authorization bill that also provides a "soft landing" to Grumman's F-14D Tomcat fighter.

In addition, the bill developed by a House-Senate conference committee cuts back on the B-2 stealth bomber program and requires that it pass a number of technical hurdles. The Pentagon also must give Congress a report on the plane's cost, now pegged at \$530 million a copy for 132 planes.

It gives Grumman a brief reprieve by buying a final installment of 18 Tomcat fighters, and allows research work to continue on the V-22 tilt-rotor Osprey being developed by Bell Helicopter and Boeing's helicopter unit in Ridley Park, Delaware County.

"This decision will save hundreds of jobs for Philadelphians," Rep. Foglietta said....

Defense Secretary Cheney, traveling to the South Pacific, said in a statement issued at the Pentagon that the deal "sounds fairly good.... The conference agreement also recognizes that we cannot afford lower-priority defense programs. I would have preferred a higher level of funding for SDI."

Congressional negotiators announced Thursday that they had agreed on a \$305 billion military programs bill that for the first time forces cuts in spending on the Pentagon's "Star Wars" program.

AIR FORCE ADMITS STEALTH BOMBER CAN BE DETECTED

The Air Force has acknowledged its Stealth bomber can be detected -- three weeks after USA Today reported Australian scientists had developed computer software and radar that can pinpoint and track the plane....

Reports of the Stealth-detecting radar -- coupled with Air Force acknowledgement of Stealth vulnerability -- have put the \$70 billion bomber program in even more jeopardy.

"The issue of whether Stealth works...is increasingly becoming a major question," said Ralph DeGennaro, a spokesman for U.S. Rep. Bennett....

The Australian "Jindalee" system is an over-the-horizon radar that bounced long-wave beams of the ionosphere to locate aircraft through wind movement -- a long-known Stealth vulnerability.

U.S., AUSTRALIAN MINISTERS OPEN ANNUAL TALKS

SYDNEY -- U.S. officials said at the start of annual ministerial talks with Australia Friday that Washington strongly opposed a nuclear-free zone favored by nations in the South Pacific.

The officials, travelling with Secretary of State Baker and Defense Secretary Cheney, said such zones in the vast region would hinder movement of American warships, which do not reveal whether they have nuclear arms on board.

But they said the proposal by the 14-member South Pacific Forum of nations would not be a point of contention as Baker and Cheney held two days of economic and military talks with Prime Minister Hawke and Defense Minister Kim Beazley.

"We will just indicate that this is not something we will support," a U.S. official, who asked not to be identified, told reporters. He noted that Australia had given only limited support to the nuclear-free concept.

U.S. DECLINES TO RENEW MILITARY TIES WITH NEW ZEALAND

SYDNEY -- The U.S. refused Friday an Australian request to renew high-level military and political contacts with New Zealand, severed in a rift over warships carrying nuclear weapons, Australian officials said.

The refusal by Secretary of State Baker came at the opening of two days of annual U.S.-Australian ministerial talks on bilateral relations and issues in the South Pacific.

"They (the Americans) argued that this was a considered policy that they had to bear in mind, not only with New Zealand, but with the rest of the world," an Australian official, who asked not to be identified, told reporters....

The Australian official said Prime Minister Hawke and Defense Minister Kim Beazley suggested to Baker and Defense Secretary Cheney that it might be time to make American officials more accessible to New Zealand.

"The Secretary of State took a different view. That's his privilege...but it was certainly not a snub," said the official.

ISRAEL STUDIES REVISIONS TO BAKER'S PLAN

JERUSALEM -- Secretary of State Baker has revised his plan for Israeli-Palestinian talks in an effort to meet the objections of Israel's ruling Likud party, but the changes are unlikely to satisfy Prime Minister Shamir, official sources said here Thursday.

Officials said Baker telephoned Foreign Minister Arens Wednesday night to discuss revisions in his five-point "framework" for arranging the proposed talks, which would be convened as a way of advancing Israel's own plan for elections in the occupied territories.... Baker also requested that Israel formulate a response to his plan in the coming week, officials said.

Foreign Ministry sources described the changes as a step forward, but a source close to Shamir said Thursday evening that it was unlikely he would be satisfied with them.

"There will have to be more clarifications," the source said. "All of these discussions have muddled the waters and we need to make it clearer."

ISRAEL WARMS A BIT TO U.S. PLAN ON TALKS

JERUSALEM -- The Israeli government indicated possible readiness Thursday to accept the American plan for Israeli-Palestinian discussions in Cairo after Secretary of State Baker offered essentially minor modifications.

Ehud Olmert, a government minister and a confidant of Prime Minister Shamir, said, "There is no doubt that Baker's new amendments improve the situation immeasurably and make it easier for us." Egypt and far-right-wing Israelis may reject it, he added after a discussion with Shamir, "but our calculations have to be what's best for Israel."

Olmert's and other public endorsements fell short of unequivocal acceptance of the Baker plan. That cannot come until a Cabinet vote. But the four most senior government ministers are scheduled to meet Friday and if they agree, Cabinet approval seems assured.

ISRAEL PLANS TO DRAW 100,000 SOVIET JEWS Resettlement Cost Put At \$2 Billion

JERUSALEM -- The Israeli government and the Jewish Agency have agreed on a \$2 billion campaign to bring 100,000 Soviet emigrants to Israel in the next three years and they are hoping that the U.S. will finance a significant part of the program, officials said here Thursday.

After a meeting in Jerusalem, the Jewish Agency's board of governors agreed to endorse a plan under which the agency will seek to raise \$500 million in a campaign to finance the absorption of Soviet Jews in Israel. Another \$1.5 billion will be put up by the Israeli government, and the two partners will cooperate in a new program to try to persuade the more than 2 million Jews still living in the Soviet Union to come here.

The campaign was launched following the U.S. decision to limit acceptance of Soviet immigrants beginning next year, at a time when Soviet Jews are seeking to leave the country in record numbers.

ABC's Peter Jennings: Everybody seems to agree today that, once again, there is fighting in Nicaragua. In fact, 24 hours after the Nicaraguan President, Daniel Ortega, said that he would no longer honor a cease-fire because the anti-government Contras were ignoring it, there was fighting reported by both sides in nine Nicaraguan provinces. In Washington today, the Bush Administration acknowledges that armed Contras have been streaming across the border from their bases in next-door Honduras. The question is: Were they going home to fight or to vote?

ABC's John McWethy reports that the State Department said the Contras in the north have been infiltrating back into Nicaragua, swelling their ranks by 60% in the last few months to 5,500 fighters. Spokesman Richard Boucher said the rebels claim they are returning to help with the election.

(Boucher: "To encourage their support is to register for the election and to vote.")

Boucher insisted the Contras, who are armed, were not returning to fight.

(Boucher: "It's not a military operation. It's -- it's -- fighters in small units going back into the Nicaraguan mountains.")

U.S. government sources say the Contras are becoming more and more difficult for the U.S. to control and that there have been numerous reports of small units attacking Sandinista positions -- just the kind of thing President Ortega is accusing the Contras of doing. Contra leaders feel they have been abandoned by the U.S. and fear they will soon be kicked out of their bases in Honduras. U.S. officials admit that Contra concerns are valid. But the political focus of the Bush Administration today was on Ortega and a need to stop the fighting so a fair election is possible.

(President: "It is hypocritical for the Sandinistas to assert that they want the resistance to return voluntarily while setting its vast armed forces to attack them.")

Though the President emphasizes that the U.S. is keeping all its options open, officials say re-arming the Contras is one option not being seriously considered.

ABC's Peter Collins reports from Nicaragua that the Sandinistas hope to pressure the Contras to disband or destroy them altogether. Nicaraguan villagers say they have enjoyed peace during the cease-fire. In an opinion piece in the New York Times today, Ortega said he lifted the cease-fire because the Contras have been re-infiltrating into Nicaragua and killing civilians. But civilian opposition leaders here have a different view of Ortega's motives.

(Alfredo Cesar, United National Opposition: "I think Ortega is basically testing the waters with the international community right now, and if the international community accepts what he just decided, then he'll know that he can get away with suspending, cancelling, or stealing the election.")

Collins continues: The Sandinistas say if the U.S. Congress does not approve money to disband the Contras, the elections may have to be cancelled and the U.S. would be to blame. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: In Central America, the Contra war is on once again and President Bush blames Nicaragua's President Daniel Ortega. He calls Ortega's decision to end the cease-fire an assault on the electoral process in Nicaragua, and he said he'll keep his options open. Next week, Sandinista and Contra representatives are expected at the United Nations for new negotiations.

NBC's Ed Rabel reports from Nicaragua that today's funerals were for what the government says are more victims of Contra attacks. Since the Tela Agreement, the Contras have killed 34 people in 27 attacks; they have wounded another 34 and kidnapped 12, all according to "Witness for Peace," a liberal, human rights fact-finding group. A high U.N. official was booed on October 12 when he urged Honduran-based Contras to disband. The United States did not push them, Washington says, because the Sandinistas are stalling on promoting democracy. Today, the U.S. conceded that more Contras have entered Nicaragua, but for political, not military, reasons.

(Richard Boucher, State Department spokesman: "They have increased their presence by perhaps 2,000 additional men to encourage their supporters to register for the election and to vote.")

Charging the U.S. with foot-dragging, the Sandinistas have launched full-scale military operations against the Contras inside Nicaragua. The attacks will stop, Managua says, only if the Contras agree to disband. (NBC-2)

CBS's Dan Rather: The government of Nicaragua said today it has resumed military operations against the U.S.-backed Contra rebels but gave no details of any of the new fighting. Yesterday, President Daniel Ortega broke off his cease-fire, claiming Contra attacks were endangering the elections set for February. Today, Ortega said that he's willing to negotiate a new cease-fire and, he said, the elections will go ahead barring any invasion by the United States, which Ortega says he doesn't expect. In Washington, President Bush said that he's keeping his options open. (CBS-5)

BUDGET

Rather: President Bush appears to be giving up and giving in tonight on his top priority idea of getting a tax cut in the capital gains tax this year. Congressional Democrats and Republicans say Mr. Bush has all but conceded defeat by agreeing not to attach his capital gains proposal to important budget legislation. Mr. Bush denies that this amounts to a give on capital gains. All of this is part of the larger battle between President Bush and congressional Democrats over economic policy; a battle that has created budget gridlock and triggered billions of dollars in spending cuts.

CBS's Lesley Stahl: The President has given up his attempt to pass capital gains tax cuts on must-pass legislation, specifically on next week's bill to raise the debt ceiling and on that big budget reconciliation bill. Now they're saying the President's doing this to break the budget stalemate, but they are not conceding that this is the absolute death now for capital gains this year.

Stahl continues: They say that if a bill comes along that they can attach it to, they'll try. That doesn't seem too likely. They're saying if it doesn't work they will come back again next year and try for capital gains again, so they're not saying it's totally dead.

Rather asks CBS's Bob Schieffer, who is on Capitol Hill: Are the Democrats declaring victory over this capital gains tax cut idea?

Schieffer: Nobody's said too much yet; they're all in a meeting. I think this kind of hit like a bolt out of the blue -- nobody really expected it to happen. But clearly, this was a victory for the Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell. Capital gains has been a part of almost everything up here this year; suddenly today, the White House finally said we're not going to push it on must-pass legislation, and so for all practical purposes I think it's dead for the rest of the year.

Rather: Let's set aside, for the moment at least, the question of why President Bush insisted for so long on a capital gains tax cut and deal with -- there's a tremendous budget mess which the executive and legislative branches bear a lot of responsibility. What are they going to do -- what is anybody going to do -- or are they going to continue to basically do nothing.

Stahl: ...What the President is saying tonight is that if Congress won't pass a clean budget bill without any add-ons, and the White House doesn't think they can, then he is prepared to live with these across-the-board budget cuts -- the so-called Gramm-Rudman sequestration. They say they've looked at the Pentagon -- that the cuts aren't that bad for the Pentagon. They say they will take some cuts: some FBI agents will be furloughed, some education and environmental cuts, about 5% -- they say they can live with that. They've calculated that the President, accepting these cuts, will look bold; he'll look as though he's taking firm action.

Schieffer: Up here, of course, they take a very different view of that. Democrats were arguing all day today that if the President does allow these across-the-board cuts to stand, it could backfire on him.

(Rep. Panetta: "The very programs that the President has identified as important for this country, at this point of history, are the very programs that would be severely impacted by these cuts.")

The cuts will be draconian. By next November the Pentagon would have to discharge at least 160,000 people and retire 20 ships. Reductions in domestic programs would be equally severe. The Department of Education's budget would be cut \$1 billion, FBI and the Drug Enforcement Agency \$110 million, other drug-fighting and treatment programs \$570 million, environmental programs \$371 million, and the space agency \$589 million. Tonight, people here still can't really believe that the President would allow that kind of cutting to stand. But the Democrats are meeting tonight to plot their next move now that the President has given up on capital gains. (CBS-Lead)

Jennings reports that because Congress has failed to pass a budget bill, the Gramm-Rudman automatic budget-cutting bill has already gone into effect. And for the first time, President Bush has said he is content to live with the automatic cuts, which are deep and across the board.

ABC's Brit Hume: It means that these automatic spending cuts, some \$16 billion worth of them, which nobody thought would be either permanent or real, will be both permanent and real. It could mean, for example, the Federal Aviation Administration not being able to fly as many flight to try to interdict drug runners, it could mean farmers not getting the same amount of money in price supports that they were accustomed to, it could mean a reduction in air traffic control personnel, people being furloughed. On the other hand, it will also mean that there'll be far more real deficit reduction this year than anybody a couple of weeks ago thought.

Jennings asks Hume: And the President and the Congress have arrived at this point because -- ?

Hume: They were negotiations over the past three days to try to reach a compromise budget bill that would include the things the Congress wanted and something the President wanted: the capital gains tax reduction. Congress refused to buy it, negotiations basically collapsed, and the President said that he would live with these spending cuts, barring some major change of heart on the Hill.

Jennings: Pick up again on that point of cutting the deficit down even more sharply than they'd imagined.

Hume: The largest deficit reduction contemplated by any of the bills coming from the Hill was about nine, ten billion dollars. This means it'll be \$16 billion dollars, and because of the way the budget process works, next year the amount of reduction in the deficit will be even more dramatic because of these cuts.

Jennings: And the great shadow over a lot of this is capital gains tax, right?

Hume: That's been the hitch in the negotiations. The Administration foregoes the opportunities to get this passed in this budget bill, but insists it will try again on one of the other bills that will be coming down here from Congress if it can get it done. (ABC-2)

Brokaw reports that President Bush today surrendered in a key battle: He gave up efforts to win a reduction in taxes on capital gains. This was a major issue for this President.

NBC's Jim Miklaszewski: President Bush went to the mat with Congress on a capital gains tax cut but today threw in the towel, at least for now. With defeat all but certain, the President agreed not to attach the capital gains tax break to critical funding bills in Congress: the debt ceiling bill, which deals with how much the government can borrow, and the federal government budget bill. A delay in passing those bills could have ground the federal government to a halt. And earlier today, Democrats were lining up to lay the blame on Bush.

(Sen. Mitchell: "I hope and pray that the President will evaluate the consequences of entangling the debt limit extension into this capital gains controversy.")

Even the Republican leadership wrote off capital gains as a lost cause.

Miklaszewski continues: House Minority Leader Bob Michel warned we can't let the government topple on that issue. In return, the President is demanding that Congress pass a budget bill that produces real reductions in the deficit or face sequestration, which would mean automatic, across-the-board cuts in the budget. That left some democrats hopping mad.

(Rep. Gray: "And if they want to cut these vital programs for the American public simply because they want to give the wealthiest families in America another tax break, then that decision will be up to them. And those of us in the Democratic leadership are opposed to such a trade-off.")

This has been the most contentious fight yet between President Bush and Congress, and it's not over yet. While Democrats claim they've killed capital gains for the year, White House officials say they'll continue to fight for it, but acknowledge that any bipartisanship between the White House and Congress may now be dead.

Brokaw asks Miklaszewski: What are the chances that all of those automatic budget cuts now will go into effect?

Miklaszewski: Officials say that they don't think Congress has the muster to pass a bill that will pass that Gramm-Rudman test and that sequester will eventually go into effect. (NBC-3)

EAST GERMAN REFORM

Brokaw: East Germany: For years it was the model Soviet bloc country but it's now under even greater strain tonight. East Germany's new leader, Egon Krenz, was in Poland today saying that he could learn from the changes instituted there by Solidarity, no less. In East Germany, a number of top Communist Party officials were fired or resigned today from key positions, and when a ban on travel was lifted, thousands of East Germans poured into Czechoslovakia headed West.

NBC's Arthur Kent reports from Prague that the refugees believe things will never change in East Germany. (NBC-Lead)

Jennings reports that East Germany's Egon Krenz has promised to announce a new law next Monday which will permit free travel from East Germany to the West.

ABC's Jerry King reports from Prague that almost 2,000 East German refugees have packed into the West German Embassy here in less than two days. Another tent city is in the making as people don't want to wait for East German reform. This time, however, East German officials have actually cooperated with the exodus; Western sources say they collect the identity papers of each refugee and supply an exit visa that complies with Czechoslovakian law. (CBS-3, ABC-8)

SOVIET REFORM/KGB

NBC's Tom Pettit reports from Moscow that the KGB is trying to change its hardline image in a series of public relations moves. Three weeks ago, the head of the KGB actually held a news conference. Tonight, four KGB executives went on live national television to answer phoned-in questions. (ABC-9, NBC-12)

SOVIET UNION/COAL STRIKE

Rather reports that thousands of miners in the Ukraine and in the frozen fields above the Arctic Circle have been going on strike in defiance of the new law against work stoppages. They claim the government hasn't carried out the agreements that ended their strikes last summer. The action adds to the growing threat of a coal shortage this winter. (CBS-4)

IRAN

NBC's Rick Davis reports from the former U.S. Embassy in Tehran on Iran's ten-year-old Islamic Revolution. President Rafsanjani is searching for help, but not from the United States. (Rafsanjani, through interpreter: "We have problems with the United States; we have serious difficulties with them.") Rafsanjani must move carefully for fear of alienating still-powerful fundamentalist factions. Iran's support for the fundamentalist group Hezbollah poses another problem: Hezbollah factions hold the foreign hostages in Lebanon. Iranian radicals oppose any effort by Rafsanjani to free them. (Rafsanjani: "And we don't see any reason to get ourselves involved in this matter.") (NBC-11)

ANTI-DRUG WAR/COLOMBIAN JUDGES' STRIKE

Rather reports that all 42 of Colombia's federal judges are out on strike today. They say they won't come back until they receive better protection. This follows the assassination overnight of a federal judge in Medellin and the killing of a Colombian congressman in Bogota. (CBS-6)

ANTI-DRUG WAR/ARREST

Jennings reports that Mexican police have arrested a major drug smuggler. They believe him to be the owner of the 21 tons of cocaine which drug agents seized in Los Angeles in September. (ABC-10)

NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE

ABC's Stephen Aug reports the New York Stock Exchange today imposed tough new rules on programmed trading. Member brokerage firms are being asked to refrain from programmed trading for their own accounts. Whatever programmed trading remains will be delayed starting whenever there is a drop of as little as 30 points. (John Phelan, Chairman, New York Stock Exchange: "If we don't curb, in some way or another, this excess volatility in the market, we're going to ruin the function of markets in this country, which is a capital-raising mechanism.") The decision reflects pressure not just from Congress, but from business firms that have threatened to take future sales of stock away from New York to give their business to Tokyo. (ABC-3)

FORD/JAGUAR BUYOUT

Brokaw reports that Ford has bought the British-based Jaguar Motor Company for \$2.5 billion cash. (ABC-4, NBC-10)

HUD/PIERCE

Rather: An official request today asking the Justice Department to appoint an independent special prosecutor to investigate former Housing and Urban Development Secretary Pierce. Pierce and other top former HUD officials have invoked their Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination, refusing to tell investigators what they know about possible mismanagement, corruption, and crime at HUD during the Reagan-Bush Administration.

CBS's Terrence Smith reports that House Democrats today formally called for the appointment of a special prosecutor. After Pierce invoked the Fifth Amendment for a second time last week, the Democrats on the House Judiciary Committee wrote to the Attorney General, asserting that the former secretary may be implicated in a conspiracy to defraud the United States in the distribution of HUD funds. The letter also asserts possible perjury by Mr. Pierce in testimony last spring. The Attorney General issued a statement accusing the Democrats of partisan politics but said the Justice Department will follow the letter of the law.

(Attorney General Thornburgh: "We're obliged to utilize the provisions of the independent counsel statute.")
Pierce's attorney dismissed the idea that there is any evidence against Pierce. (CBS-2)

AFTERSHOCK/QUAKES/CALIFORNIA

Jennings reports that there was another strong aftershock tonight measuring 4.4 on the Richter scale. No damage was reported. The California legislature met in special session today to add another quarter percent to the state sales tax; the new money will be used to help pay the recovery costs from last month's earthquake.

(CBS-7, ABC-7)

USS IOWA INVESTIGATION

NBC's Fred Francis reports that the Navy's conclusion that Gunner's Mate Clayton Hartwig most probably triggered the explosion is under fire by a congressional committee. The claim that the Navy found foreign elements in the gun barrel was not substantiated by the FBI. Rep. Nicholas Mavroules criticizes the Navy for switching theories on what happened.

(Rep. Mavroules: "What bothers me the very most is that they've come out and they've changed their position, or at least their opinion, on three different occasions.")

But the Navy argues it changed its theories as the evidence came in. It has told Congress that it is even more convinced now that Hartwig killed himself and 46 Iowa shipmates. (NBC-7)

PAN AM 103

Brokaw reports a presidential commission said today it will investigate Pan Am claims that U.S. authorities knew that Flight 103 was a terrorism target before it was destroyed by a bomb. (NBC-8)

AIDS

Brokaw reports that an official at the World Health Organization said that by the year 2000 the number of AIDS cases could multiply ten-fold to almost six million. He warned that government efforts to fight the epidemic are threatened by a dangerous complacency. (NBC-6)

ENVIRONMENT/NEWSPAPER RECYCLING

ABC's Ned Potter reports that newspaper recycling has been a victim of its own success. There is now a tremendous glut of used newspapers. Only eight mills in the nation recycle old papers into new ones. Environmentalists claim that newspaper publishers are the ones who can demand recycled newsprint; so far, the groups complain, they've been very slow about it. (ABC-11)

VIRGINIA GUBERNATORIAL RACE

CBS's Bruce Morton reports that race has not been an issue in the Virginia campaign; it seems as if abortion may overcome race as a motivation for voting. Douglas Wilder's success, so far, may already be considered a victory for the fight against racial discrimination. (CBS-8)
