SOVIETS TO TURN UP HEAT ON LITHUANIA

MOSCOW -- The Kremlin announced Monday night it will step up its pressure campaign against Lithuania and accused the Lithuanian government of blocking a solution to the month-long secessionist crisis, while huge crowds gathered in the southern republic of Georgia to demand the restoration of Georgian independence.

About 100,000 Georgians, holding candles and waving independent Georgian flags, held an all-night vigil in Tbilisi to mourn the killings of 20 people by Soviet troops in an anti-government demonstration a year ago.

The statement on Lithuania, which was issued after a meeting of the presidential council chaired by Soviet leader Gorbachev, did not specify precisely what action Moscow plans to take to restore its authority in the rebel republic. But its tone was uncompromising and suggested the beginning of a new stage in the war of wills between Moscow and Vilnius.

"The present Lithuanian leadership is blocking any exit from the crisis with its anti-constitutional actions and the escalation of illegal measures. It is aggravating the situation in the republic for which it bears full responsibility," the statement said, as reported by Tass.

The statement said the counsel...had concluded that "additional economic, political and other measures should be taken to protect the U.S.S.R. constitution and the interests of citizens living in the republic and the Soviet Union as a whole." (Michael Dobbs, Washington Post, A1)

Gorbachev Indicates Pressing Lithuania For Total Surrender

MOSCOW -- Soviet President Gorbachev has indicated he will press rebel Lithuania for total surrender as calls to follow its push for independence echo along the Western rim of his multi-national state.

A meeting of Gorbachev's Presidential Council Monday rejected Lithuania's calls for compromise and warned darkly of further measures if the Baltic republic does not withdraw its March 11 declaration of independence. The president of Latvia, meanwhile, predicted his parliament would make a similar declaration when it convenes next month.

...The council did not spell out what it wanted, although details were expected to emerge later Tuesday when Gorbachev meets visiting British Foreign Secretary Hurd....

"Maybe the West will see now that Gorbachev does not fit the image that he likes to put across," Lithuanian President Landsbergis told a news conference. (Peter Conradi, Reuter)

SOVIET OFFICIAL SAYS LITHUANIA HAS RIGHT TO SECEDE

ANCHORAGE, Alaska -- The Soviet Union would allow Lithuania to become independent if the rebellious republic followed the nation's laws for seceding from the union, the chief spokesman for the Soviet Foreign Ministry said Monday.

Gennady Gerasimov told the Anchorage Chamber of Commerce that Lithuania's declaration of independence was in Moscow's eyes "against the constitution, the laws of the country. The position is, you can go if you want to go, but you must follow the usual rules of divorce," he said.

The rules included holding a referendum in which two-thirds of the voters would have to favor independence and then waiting up to five years to break from the Soviet Union, he said. (Yereth Rosen, Reuter)

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SHEVARDNADZE PREDICTS BREAKTHROUGH AT SUMMIT

MOSCOW -- Foreign Minister Shevardnadze predicted a "genuine breakthrough" in U.S.-Soviet relations at the Washington summit with the signing of a dozen agreements, including trade and economic accords.

Shevardnadze also reiterated in an interview Monday with Novosti news agency that a united Germany cannot be in NATO but that a compromise solution "is quite possible."

Shevardnadze pledged that in the remaining weeks before the May 30-June 3 summit, both sides would do their utmost to settle differences on air- and sea-launched cruise missiles so a treaty to reduce strategic weapons can be completed. He said his next meeting with Secretary Baker...would be dedicated to overcoming the final hurdles for START.

Shevardnadze also looked beyond a pact on strategic arms, saying, "I hope that during the summit meeting it will be possible to coordinate a draft of a joint statement of intent...to lay down the guidelines for further progress in the further reduction of armed forces and armaments."

NUCLEAR ARMS PACT LESS 'DOABLE'

The White House backpedaled Monday on expectations that President Bush and President Gorbachev will seal a nuclear arms treaty at next month's summit, after reports that negotiations had deadlocked.

"If the emphasis is on the word 'doable,' which is the new word, I think that there is certainly a great question whether or not it is doable that we would have a treaty," said White House Press Secretary Fitzwater.

..."I think we've long since passed the point where you can only meet if you have a treaty to sign," he said.

MOSCOW'S MISSILE TRANSFER MIGHT HAVE VIOLATED TREATY

Recent U.S.-Soviet talks failed to resolve the thorny problem of Moscow's transfer of SS-23 missiles in a possible treaty violation, Bush Administration officials said Monday.

"That very serious issue has not been resolved," said Susanne Dalch, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency.

She said ACDA is conducting a compliance assessment "related to the SS-23 missiles which are located in Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and East Germany."

SOVIETS SAY POLITICAL PRISONS EMPTY

Soviet officials assured Washington in pre-summit talks that there are no more "prisoners of conscience" in Soviet prisons or exile, Assistant Secretary of State for Human Rights Richard Schifter said.

Schifter, who took part in last week's discussions, said in an interview Monday that U.S. officials have no reason to doubt the Soviet claims, but are still investigating some 25 cases. Some of the cases, Schifter said, involve violations of Soviet criminal law by people who also may have been political dissidents.

During the Washington talks, the Soviets produced a list of about 40 cases of alleged prisoners of conscience in the U.S., mainly political activists -- such as Black Panthers or Puerto Rican nationalists -- who also were convicted of criminal acts.

SOVIET SPOKESMAN IA UDS CHANGES

ANCHORAGE, Alaska -- With world attention focused on Moscow and Washington, Siberians and Alaskans have been pursuing a thaw all their own to open up the U.S.-Soviet Bering Strait border, the chief spokesman for the Soviet government said Monday.

"While all the world was looking the other way and diplomats traveled from Washington to Moscow and back, we quietly opened the back door here," said Gennadi Gerasimov....

Change has been so rapid, and with it pressure for more trade and travel across the Bering Strait, that Gerasimov said a Soviet consulate soon may be needed in Alaska. (Jeff Berliner, UPI)

SOVIETS PLANNING BIG PRICE RISES

MOSCOW -- The Soviet government, risking serious social unrest, is planning to let its low, state-controlled retail prices double and even triple in the coming 18 months as part of a program of radical economic reforms, well-informed economists said Monday.

The plans call for only half of the price increases to be covered through a system that ties incomes to inflation, according to an outline of the government's reform package; any additional pay will apparently depend on greater worker productivity.

Anticipating widespread worker protests as a result of new policies that the government acknowledges will seem "very harsh," President Gorbachev is expected to outlaw strikes for the next two years, the sources said, and then to use his broad executive powers to take other stern measures to ensure law and order.

The reforms will also include, as expected, the extensive privatization of the Soviet Union's state-owned industries, the economists were told at a high-level briefing here Monday. (Michael Parks, Los Angeles Times, A1)

KREMLIN HESITATES AS DEADLINE FALLS FOR ECONOMIC PLAN

MOSCOW -- On the day he was to submit a package of "radical" economic proposals to President Gorbachev, the Deputy Prime Minister in charge of the program was still talking Monday of "drafts" and "possible alternatives," not a clear plan of attack against what he acknowledged is a severe crisis.

But the minister, Leonid Abalkin...gave some hint at a news conference of what the package would not include. He said there were no plans to replace the ruble with a new currency or to make it freely convertible with Western currencies anytime soon.

SOVIETS' FORMER SATELLITES OK FREE ENTERPRISE

BONN -- The Soviet Union and its former satellites in East Europe agreed here Monday, in a significant signal of shifting economic principles, to embrace the principles of free enterprise, private property and a market economy.

Moscow and the old East bloc countries endorsed a series of liberal economic principles at the 35-nation European economic conference as a way of encouraging foreign investment and their own private sectors....

The head of the U.S. delegation, businessman Alan Holmer, said he is "very happy" with the draft declaration expected to be signed before the conference ends Wednesday. (William Tuohy, Los Angeles Times, A16)

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BANK CREATED FOR EAST BLOC DEVELOPMENT
U.S., U.S.S.R. Among 42 Founding Nations

Creation of a \$12-billion European Development Bank to speed the nations of Eastern and Central Europe toward private-market economies was announced in Paris Monday by the 42 founding governments, including the U.S. and Soviet Union.

West European nations and the European Community will have majority control, although the U.S.'s 10 percent share will make it the largest single member....

A key condition, hammered out after long negotiation, is that at least 60 percent of the bank's loans in any country will go for private-sector activities, or for state-owned enterprises that are being privatized.... At the insistence of the U.S., the Soviet Union will be limited for the first three years to borrowing up to the value of its 6 percent share.

EAST GERMAN PARTIES AGREE ON COALITION
Christian Democrats To Lead; Social Democrats Get 7 Posts

EAST BERLIN -- After more than three weeks of negotiation, East Germany's political parties agreed Monday on the makeup of the government that will dissolve the country.

Prime Minister Lothar de Maiziere announced that his right-of-center Christian Democrats will lead a five-party coalition that gives the government a two-thirds majority of the legislature, which will enable it to make the numerous constitutional changes necessary to pave the way to German unification.

He said his Christian Democrats...will fill 11 ministerial posts in the new government. Seven cabinet posts, including the foreign and finance ministries, will go to the left-of-center Social Democrats, the largest opposition group.... The Liberals will get three seats, the right-wing German Social Union two, and Democratic Awakening one, de Maiziere said.

CONSERVATIVE TO FORM NEW GOVERNMENT IN GREECE

ATHENS -- Constantine Mitsotakis of the conservative New Democracy Party secured the parliamentary majority that he needed to form a new government Monday, winning endorsement from a small centrist party and apparently breaking a long standoff in Greek politics.

Mitsotakis renewed his pledge to pick a cabinet by Wednesday that he said will begin a difficult struggle to untangle Greece's economic confusion and restore stable rule....

The backing from Constantine Stephanopoulos's Democratic Renewal Party, which earned one seat in Sunday's national elections, boosted Mitsotakis from his own 150 seats to a narrow 151-seat majority in the 300-member Greek parliament....

Greek analysts cautioned it remained a fragile base for the austerity measures prescribed by Greek economists to overcome a \$2.5 billion-dollar budget deficit and calm 16 percent inflation.

ABU NIDAL HOSTAGES HANDED TO FRENCH EMBASSY IN BEIRUT

BEIRUT -- Three European hostages kidnapped at sea in 1987 by Palestinian extremists were freed and handed over to the French Embassy in Moslem West Beirut Tuesday.

Reuter correspondent Samia Nakhoul said from the scene that Frenchwoman Jacqueline Valente, her Belgian boyfriend and their baby daughter were inside the embassy building.

Their captors, the Fatah Revolutionary Council, led by Abu Nidal, inexplicably denied in a telephone call that the three had been freed. It said it would call a news conference to clarify the situation.

EXPELLED U.S. DIPLOMAT LEAVES IRAQ

BAGHDAD -- A U.S. diplomat, expelled by Iraq in retaliation for Washington's expulsion of an Iraqi diplomat based at the U.N., left Baghdad late Monday night on his way home, an Asian diplomat said Tuesday.

The Asian diplomat, who asked not to be named, told Reuters the American diplomat was Zachary White, a secondary secretary at the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad. The Embassy declined to comment.

In New York, U.N. sources identified the Iraqi diplomat expelled last week as first secretary at Iraq's U.N. mission Hamid al-Amiry. (Reuter)

IRAQ EXPELLING U.S. DIPLOMAT IN RETALIATION

BAGHDAD -- Iraq Monday ordered a U.S. diplomat to leave in retaliation for U.S. expulsion of an Iraqi envoy accused of involvement in a murder plot.

In Washington, State Department spokeswoman Tutwiler called the expulsion of the American, who was not named, "totally inappropriate." She declined to say whether the U.S. might respond by expelling another Iraqi diplomat.

BUSH TAKES STEPS TO GET IRAQ TO BACK OFF THREATENING MOVES

The Bush Administration has decided to ratchet up a quiet diplomatic effort to warn Iraq not to push the U.S. too far.

After a series of steps by Iraq that the U.S. considers threatening, the Commerce Department canceled an important aerospace trade mission Monday that was to have been held in Baghdad in May.

Even more telling, the White House is not actively opposing a move by members of Congress to prepare legislation ordering economic sanctions against Iraq....

The Bush Administration has been unwilling to break again with Iraq, hoping to work out a way of calming the volatile Middle East and perhaps even mellowing Iraq....

[But] The State Department, which has refused to stop U.S. trade with Iraq, used its harshest language yet against Iraq, condemning Hussein's April 2 remarks against Israel as "inflammatory, irresponsible and outrageous."

The State Department Monday denied a U.S. congressman's statement that Vietnam had suggested the U.S. military return to Cam Rahn Bay once the Soviet Union withdraws from the base.

Rep. Ridge...said the proposal was raised privately at a conference in Bali, Indonesia, attended by several U.S. congressmen and ranking Vietnamese officials....

G-7 INACTION ON YEN SERVES AS WARNING TO JAPAN

Japan was served a blunt private warning by its major financial and economic partners at Saturday's Group of Seven meeting in Paris: Stabilize your own currency and stock markets by raising interest rates.

"We told them that without action on your side, intervention alone" to prop up the yen "won't work," said one key official....

In a communique, the G-7 officials, while promising to continue close coordination of economic policies among their countries, including intervention to stabilize the weak yen, rejected Japanese petitions for stronger action. (News analysis, Hobart Rowen, Washington Post, D1)

JAPAN TO CONSIDER OFFICIAL 'HUMANITARIAN' LOANS TO CHINA

TOKYO -- Finance Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto said Tuesday Japan should soon consider resuming official humanitarian loans to China, suspended because of the government's pro-democracy crackdown.

"It is undesirable to have China isolated from the international community," he told a news conference, noting that the World Bank had resumed lending to China for basic human needs....

Japan...has promised a loan of \$5.6 billion in the 1990-95 period.

Hashimoto said that while Japan would respect the agreement made by the seven major Western nations at last July's Paris summit to suspend official loans, it also had to consider its position as an Asian nation. (Reuter)

FIVE PEOPLE EXECUTED IN CHINA

BEIJING -- Five people were executed in China Monday for killing and robbing taxi drivers, a Shanghai newspaper, the Xinmin Wanbao, reported. (Reuter)

CHINA SENDS TROOPS TO QUELL DISTURBANCES IN WESTERN CITY

BEIJING -- China has flown troops into a remote frontier area to help control anti-Chinese disturbances, Western diplomats said Monday.

One diplomat, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said an official from the Xinjiang Autonomous Region informed him that reports of violence erupting in recent days around China's westernmost city, Kashgar, were credible.... Foreign travelers in Urumqi, capital of the Xinjiang region, said Sunday that China had closed off Kashgar to foreigners following the reports of ethnic disturbances....

Officials in the region recently acknowledged that political liberalization in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union are having an impact in Xinjiang. (Daniel Southerland, Washington Post, A20)

CONTRAS' TRIP HOME TO COST U.S. MILLIONS

The U.S. government, which spent more than \$1 billion to arm, clothe and feed Nicaraguan resistance fighters, agreed Monday to a joint U.N.-OAS team to begin disarming the contras and send them home.

"This is just a stopgap measure. This isn't going to deal with the whole problem, but hopefully it will get us through until we get the other bill passed," said White House spokesman Fitzwater, referring to an Administration request for \$32 million left behind when the Senate recessed for Easter....

Monday's announcement that the interim money would be provided followed a somewhat desperate-sounding letter to the Agency for International Development from OAS Assistant Secretary Robert Sayre asking for money, while other OAS officials gave interviews saying the lack of money stood in the way of the International Commission for Support and Verification [CIAV] effort.

One U.S. official, who asked not to be identified, said the U.N. and OAS were slow to plan, despite a \$250,000 grant, and were trying to shift blame to the State Department. (Frank Murray, Washington Times, A1)

CONTRAS SAY STAGE SET FOR TRUCE

Thousands More Reported To Seek Move To U.S.

TEGUCIGALPA -- After three days of negotiations with representatives of Violeta Chamorro, rebel leaders said here Monday that they were ready to sign a bilateral cease-fire with the Sandinista government and order their forces to move into five security zones inside Nicaragua as the first concrete steps in their eventual demobilization. They offered no timetable.

A spokesman for the rebels said the speed of the demobilization would depend on how quickly the U.N. peace-keeping troops can be deployed in Nicaragua.

At the press conference where the results of the weekend agreements were explained, rebel delegation member Aristides Sanchez said the contras were planning to ask the U.S. to accept any who want to move there rather than return to Nicaragua. Sanchez estimated that about 20,000 fighters and family members would not go back to Nicaragua now that the decade-long war against the Sandinistas is over.

"We are going to talk with United States officials because there are many [contras] who want to demobilize in the United States. We'll see if they have the will to support the peace process by giving them refuge." The U.S. Embassy had no comment. (Wilson Ring, Washington Post, A 16)

CHAMORRO OFFICIALS SEEK MEETING BETWEEN CONTRAS, SANDINISTAS

MANAGUA -- Nicaraguan contra rebels could meet this week in Managua with Sandinista government and army officials to negotiate a final cease-fire in their eight-year war, envoys from President-elect Chamorro said Monday.

Chamorro envoys Leopoldo Navarro and Roberto Ferrey told Reuters upon returning from three days of talks with contra leaders in Tegucigalpa that they would seek a contra-Sandinista meeting this week to negotiate details of a cease-fire.

"We are going to push for a meeting between the contras and the current government and army to see if an accord can be reached," Navarro said.

ADMINISTRATION SIGNALING HARDER LINE ON EL SALVADOR, REBELS

The Bush Administration is signaling it intends to take a harder line toward El Salvador's government and the leftist guerrillas who have waged a decade-long civil war, officials say.

The new policy is coming about through discussions with Congress.

...A first round of contacts came last week between Secretary Baker and congressional leaders of both parties. Baker aides said the visits on Capitol Hill were intended to indicate a willingness to rethink the U.S. policy of undiluted support for the Salvadoran government....

"My sense is there will be some restriction on aid to the government of El Salvador, conditioned on an effective investigation and prosecution of the Jesuit murders," said a senior congressional Republican, speaking on condition of anonymity.

At least two serious complications threaten the discussions. Congressional sources said shipments of weapons to the FMLN rebels from Nicaragua have tripled in the past month..., apparently an effort to build stockpiles before a new government takes over...the sources said. And there are indications that the Salvadoran government may be unable to successfully prosecute Col. Guillermo Alfredo Benavides, the highest-ranking officer indicated in the Jesuit slayings, because of insufficient evidence and a weak judicial system. (Jim Drinkard, AP)

U.S. EFFORTS TO TOPPLE CASTRO COUNTERPRODUCTIVE, AUTHOR SAYS

BOGOTA -- U.S. efforts to topple Cuban leader Castro, such as beaming television into the island, will only strengthen his resistance, Colombian author Gabriel Garcia Marquez said in an interview published Monday.

"It's a mistake to think that Fidel will fall through suffocation. That gives him no alternative but to resist," he was quoted as saying in an interview published in the Miami Herald and El Tiempo of Bogota....

He said it was also an error to think there would be a popular uprising if Castro did not reform. "As long as Fidel can manage the economy, he can stay in power indefinitely."

Garcia Marquez said the solution to the Cuban issue lay in negotiations with the U.S. (Reuter)

COLOMBIAN LEADER: FOCUS ON DRUG USE

LONDON -- President Barco Monday called for new emphasis on finding and treating the causes of drug abuse, not just cracking down on traffickers to slow a world epidemic.

"Strategies geared only to [stamping out] drug production and trafficking are inevitably doomed to failure," Barco said at a three-day conference that drew 500 delegates from 112 countries.

HHS Secretary Sullivan said an international commitment to ending the drug plague will send "a message to users that they bear responsibility in perpetuating the drug problem." ...

"The war against drugs has only just started," said Barco.

COLOMBIAN DEFENSE IMPORTS TRIPLE IN 1989, REPORT SAYS

BOGOTA -- Defense imports by the Colombian government, fighting drug traffickers and leftist guerrillas, almost tripled in 1989, a newspaper report said Monday.

A report in El Espectador said the Defense Ministry was Colombia's biggest importer last year, replacing state-run oil and agricultural concerns as the biggest spenders....

Defense imports leaped 292 percent from \$74.6 million in 1988 to \$218.5 million in 1989, the report said, quoting figures from the Foreign Trade Institute. (Reuter)

FALSE CLAIMS ON STEALTH ADMITTED

The Air Force Monday acknowledged that its \$110 million F-117A Stealth fighter did not perform in Panama as ballyhooed by military officials.

The admission came after a spokesman for Secretary Cheney said the Air Force provided the secretary with erroneous information about the plane's performance.

The disclosure also followed a protest from Rep. Murtha, a powerful House member on defense matters. Murtha...has conveyed his "extreme displeasure" about the incident to senior Air Force officials and plans an investigation, a congressional source said.

BUSH OFF TO CANADA FOR TALKS WITH MULRONEY, BASEBALL GAME

President Bush, mixing business with his love of sports, makes a 10-hour trip to Canada Tuesday to meet Prime Minister Mulroney and watch one of the first games of the new baseball season....

"There are a lot of questions arising out of developments in Europe for which neither Canada or the United States has full answers," Canadian Ambassador Derek Burney said Monday. "What we want to do...is compare notes on what we are doing."

Burney, speaking with reporters in Washington, said the pollution of Canadian lakes and streams by U.S. smokestack emissions that fall to the earth as acid rain would also be a topic of discussion.

Bush, Mulroney Touch Base, Play Ball

President Bush and Prime Minister Mulroney, in a unique diplomatic double play, will toss out the first pitch Tuesday in the Toronto Blue Jays' baseball game with the Texas Rangers.

Before the game, Bush and Mulroney, who will spend their entire seven-hour visit at Toronto's SkyDome, will talk over plans for the East-West summit, German reunification and Eastern Europe....

Cross-border issues should dominate Tuesday, said Canadian Ambassador to Washington Derek Burney. "The prime minister obviously will want to discuss the progress on the adoption of clean air legislation [and] free trade."

SUPPORT FOR CANADA'S CONSERVATIVES SINKS TO RECORD LOW

OTTAWA -- The popularity of Canada's Conservative government, beset by a constitutional crisis and a revolt against a proposed tax, has tumbled to a new record low, an opinion poll suggested Monday.

The Angus Reid-Southam News survey indicated support for Prime Minister Mulroney's government has fallen to 15 percent among decided voters against 53 percent for the Liberals and 23 percent for the New Democratic Party. Twenty-nine percent were undecided.

"There is a sense that the government is adrift," pollster Angus Reid said in an interview. "The goods and services tax is more responsible than anything for the declining support in the past year." ...

Canadians, Reid added, also feel Mulroney has failed in his promise to help unify a nation where tensions between English and French communities have heightened of late because of the constitutional deadlock....

Mulroney, who is known to watch opinion polls closely, is now even more unpopular than Prime Minister Thatcher. (Gary Regenstreif, Reuter)

UNREST IN 19 PRISONS ROCKS BRITAIN Riots Draw Attention To Squalid Conditions At Crowded Facilities

LONDON -- Britain has been shaken by its worst outbreak of prison unrest in modern history, with inmates in 19 prisons staging riots and protests that have drawn attention to overcrowded and squalid condition in many of the country's penal institutions.

The trouble began nine days ago at Strangeways..., where prisoners attacked their guards, took over most of the prison and then meted out punishment and physical abuse to several dozen alleged or convicted sex offenders housed in a special wing....

The siege...led to "copycat" riots over the weekend at a dozen other institutions....

Prison officials...are under growing pressure to...send in police or special troops, a move that many fear would result in large-scale bloodshed.

"This is much closer to Attica than anything we've ever seen in this country," said Prof. Terence Morris, a prisons expert at the London School of Economics.

FOUR STATE LEGISLATORS SWITCH FROM DEMOCRATIC TO REPUBLICAN PARTY

PASCAGOULA, Miss. -- Four Democratic state legislators announced Monday that they were switching to the Republican Party, earning them praise from President Bush.

State Reps. Frank Ely, Alvin Endt, Danny Guice and Curtis Holston Jr. told reporters they had considered the change for about a year.

"I'm not leaving the Democrats -- they left me long ago," Endt said.

...The four were accompanied at news conferences in Pascagoula and Jackson by Ron Farris of the state GOP. Farris read a letter from Bush, who lauded the lawmakers for their "tremendous courage" in switching allegiances. (AP)

Four Legislators In Mississippi Jump To GOP

JACKSON, Miss. -- Sunday there were 22 Republicans in the 174-member Mississippi legislature. Monday there were 26.

The shift took place the way it often does in the South these days -- not in a voting booth, but at a news conference. Four state house Democrats simply announced that they had switched jerseys. "I've been a Democrat all my life but it seems like every time I turned around, I was voting for a Republican," explained state Rep. Daniel Guice, whose district is along the conservative Gulf Coast.

In the 15 months since President Bush was inaugurated, two members of Congress and more than 200 state and local elected officials nationwide have switched their party affiliation from Democratic to Republican....

All but two of the switchers live in the South.... Slowly, the local [Democratic] hegemony [there] is eroding. A decade ago, just 15 percent of southern state legislators were Republican. Today, 25 percent are....

The switcher program has made its biggest dent here in Mississippi, where more than 60 elected Democratic officials have jumped ship in the last year.

KENNEDY CHIDES 'TIMID' DEMOCRATS

Sen. Kennedy, his party's leading voice of liberalism for the last two decades, chided fellow Democrats Monday for being "muted," "timid" and "befuddled" in the face of new political opportunities created by the end of the Cold War.

In a speech on the state of the party, Kennedy also sought to rally Democrats behind his proposal to spend a "peace dividend" of \$170 billion saved by scaling down defense programs over the next five years on early childhood programs, science and math education, anti-drug programs, national health insurance and capital investments in airports, bridges, railroads and telecommunications systems.

"With a few notable exceptions, there has been a kind of unnatural quiet coming from our party, a sense of yielding ground to the President, of kowtowing to his veto threats, of confining our own Democratic efforts to merely marginal improvements in Republican proposals, or almost conceding a second term to President Bush -- or hoping against hope that he stumbles somewhere along the way," Kennedy said in a speech at Georgetown University.

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Ted Kennedy Criticizes Bush, Calls For Return To Solid Domestic Policies

Appealing to his party not to repudiate traditional liberal values, Sen. Kennedy Monday called on Democrats to stake out bolder positions on domestic issues and fight for a peace dividend to improve health care, education and housing across the country....

In a speech sprinkled with criticism of both parties, the senator admonished Democrats for being timid, accusing them of "kowtowing" to the President's veto threats and almost conceding him a second term, while confining their ideas to "merely marginal improvements in Republican proposals."

Kennedy...called for an end to the \$3 billion plan to upgrade the Lance missile and proposed the creation of a National Needs Trust Fund, with money saved from cuts in the defense budget....

He painted the picture of a Bush Administration unwilling to recognize the need to cut defense spending. He said there is "a stubborn, convoluted, almost irrational denial of the existence of a peace dividend" by the political right and some powerful figures in the Administration.

Further, he said, the nation has seen "the spectacle" of Secretary Cheney assailing CIA Director Webster for providing a realistic instead of alarmist assessment of a Soviet threat.

"We see an Administration with a military budget that pretends 1989 never happened, a budget that pretends the Berlin Wall never opened, a budget cooked up in the right wing's own Cold War kitchen," Kennedy said.

Kennedy: Massive Defense Cuts To Pay For Domestic Programs

Sen. Kennedy called for the Democratic Party to regain its soul by backing a five-year, 27 percent cut in defense spending with the money to pay for a wide range of performance-tested domestic programs.

Kennedy...conceded Monday that having lost five of the past six national elections, Democrats are adrift and in danger of losing all power unless the party reinvigorates itself and rediscovers its liberal principles.

In a speech at Georgetown University, Kennedy argued that a possible "peace dividend" from lessening Cold War tensions could give Democrats a unique opportunity to re-establish themselves by pushing for new domestic programs without having to ask for many new taxes....

"We are, both by history and belief, the carriers of principles and ideas best described as progressive, liberal, activist, concerned and ambitious for our country. If as Democrats we continue to drift -- if we run from our values and our enduring beliefs, we can be certain that the voters will not follow us," Kennedy said, arguing that the party's central problem "is the temptation to retreat from the very reason we are Democrats, the very ground of our party's being."

BUSH TRAVELS REAGAN'S COURSE IN NAMING JUDGES

Faced with the opportunity to name dozens of federal judges, President Bush is quietly but steadily continuing to fill the nation's courts with judges expected to construe laws more narrowly, side more frequently with the police and defer to Congress, according to a wide range of monitoring groups and Bush Administration officials.

Although the White House has eliminated the elaborate screening apparatus that the Reagan Administration used to insure that judicial candidates were sympathetic to such conservative jurisprudence, Bush is nonetheless looking for the same kind of judges, aides say.

"It's structured a little differently, but the result is very much the same," said C. Boyden Gray, the White House counsel. The aim, Gray said, "is to shift the courts in a more conservative direction."

BRADY DEFENDS GRAMM-RUDMAN

Secretary Brady criticized Monday a Democratic proposal to toss out the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings budget-balancing law, asserting that spending cuts are the only way to trim the U.S. deficit.

"It's very important that Gramm-Rudman stays in place, and [President Bush] is very determined that it does," Brady, fresh from a Group of Seven monetary policy meeting in Paris, told New York business leaders.

Brady also called for broader presidential powers in the budget process, such as the line-item budget veto. He also demanded congressional discipline in spending....

Brady rejected a recent suggestion by Rep. Rostenkowski that the Gramm-Rudman law be repealed because it has lost its effectiveness. He also dismissed the Democrat's call for higher taxes for people in upper income tax brackets and on tobacco, alcohol, gasoline and pollutants.

"We don't want to get into a debate...on which is the most virtuous tax, which is the handsomest tax," Brady said. "What we have to pay attention to in this country is the spending side." (Brendan Murphy, UPI)

RYAN SWORN IN AS THRIFT REGULATOR

Timothy Ryan, sworn in to direct the federal government's regulation of the troubled S&L industry, pledged to fight fraud and corruption in a business wracked by expensive failures and scandals.

"We will not tolerate the fraudulent practices and decisions in the industry that in the past have led to so many failures and put such a financial burden on the American taxpayer," Ryan said Monday.

Seventeen senators have written Secretary Sullivan protesting a new federal regulation that state officials say could deny Medicaid to tens of thousands of disabled, low-income people.

They say it would allow the Social Security Administration, in effect, to block disabled people from applying to the states for Medicaid or cancel benefits the states had previously ruled they were entitled to.

Call Dr. Louis Sullivan "another C. Everett Koop" and he throws back his head and roars with laughter.

But given the health and human services secretary's crusades against smoking, unhealthy diets, drug abuse and excessive drinking, his concerns about drug-addicted and AIDS-infected babies, and his championing of minority health issues and the importance of preventive medicine, Dr. Sullivan admits it's probably fair to compare him to the outspoken former surgeon general.

But what Sullivan said next revealed the confidence he is feeling after 14 months as a member of President Bush's Cabinet: "The difference is that I have responsibility for more than the Public Health Service. It's like comparing the president with a senator. The president has broader responsibilities."

EARLY RELEASE OF TELESCOPE DATA SET
NASA To Provide Raw Images Promptly; Countdown Continuing

CAPE CANAVERAL -- NASA officials said Monday they will release raw "engineering" images from the Pioneering Hubble Space Telescope a few days after it is launched rather than keeping with the original plan of waiting two weeks or more for electronically processed "pretties."

The decision, apparently made under pressure from news organizations, came as the countdown continued smoothly toward Tuesday morning's scheduled launch of the instrument.

The launch, aboard the space shuttle Discovery, could take place any time within a 2½ hour "window" that opens at 8:47 a.m. Eastern time.

U.S. DECIDES NOT TO MOVE ENDANGERED LIGHTHOUSE

The National Park Service has decided against moving the historic Cape Hatteras Lighthouse from its threatened location on North Carolina's Outer Banks, a decision that some beach erosion experts say may soon allow the candy-striped structure to topple into the sea.

George Berklacy, a Park Service spokesman, said Monday the agency has not sought any of the \$8.7 million needed to move the 208-foot lighthouse from its site, about 100 feet from the Atlantic Ocean, because officials doubt the danger is immediate. "We're going to wait it out," he said.

"The longer they wait, the more dangerous the situation becomes," said David Bush, a Duke University researcher and a member of the Save the Lighthouse Committee.

A CUTBACK IN CLASSIFIED INFORMATION?
Secrecy Decisions Dropped 35% In '89

Government decisions to classify information as "Top Secret," "Secret" or "confidential" dropped by more 35 percent last year, according to the Information Security Oversight Office.

In its annual report to the White House, ISOO said there were 6,796,501 classification actions in fiscal 1989, a decrease of more than 3.6 million from the year before. But it added that the unprecedented drop was "primarily the result of more accurate counting, rather than an actual tremendous decrease in classification activity."

ISOO Director Steven Garfinkel said much of the improvement came from steps taken by the Navy to correct serious deficiencies in sampling and reporting methods that had made past figures "vastly inflated."

HUBBLE TELESCOPE

NBC's Tom Brokaw: Tomorrow morning NASA hopes to launch a satellite that will give us a picture of the heavens that Galileo could not have imagined when he introduced the original telescope almost 400 years ago in 1609. This one is called the Hubble Space Telescope and it is expected to be an epic event in space exploration. The shuttle Discovery is on the launch pad at Kennedy Space Center in Florida tonight, and the telescope, which is the size of a bus, is in the cargo bay ready for liftoff tomorrow morning at 8:47 Eastern time if the weather holds.

NBC's Robert Bazell reports that the space telescope will allow us to see far beyond us, to the limits of the universe. For the first time scientists will be able to observe planets, stars and galaxies from above the atmosphere which limits the view from Earth.

SOVIET ECONOMY/U.S. COMPANIES

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with soft drinks and hard liquor, Pepsi and vodka, and ships at sea, \$3 billion worth all put together into the largest consumer trade deal ever between the U.S. and the Soviet Union. The Soviets are having to become increasingly creative as they try to keep their economy from wrack and ruin.

ABC's Rick Inderfurth reports from Moscow that under the new agreement Pepsi will more than double its bottling and distribution network in the Soviet Union, meaning more jobs for Soviet workers. It's an example of the opportunities for American business here, but also of the hurdles of dealing with the Soviet economy. Pepsi will continue to take its profits out of the country in vodka. The agreement gives Pepsi the exclusive right to distribute Russian vodka in the U.S. for another 10 years, and to sweeten the deal the Soviets have agreed to build at least 10 commercial ships for Pepsi which the company can sell or lease. This is one bit of good news for a Soviet economy which, according to one of Mikhail Gorbachev's top advisers today, is in desperate need of help. During the first quarter of this year industrial production was down 1.2 percent, partly because of ethnic unrest. Inflation is estimated to be running as high as 17 percent, and the Soviets had their first trade deficit in 14 years, caused largely by a drop in the production of oil for export and increased imports of Western goods. The Soviets want more deals like the one with Pepsi, but President Gorbachev and his advisers say the economy can only be saved by internal reforms -- by a much faster transition to a free-market system.

ABC's Stephen Aug reports that DuPont has been selling agricultural chemicals to the USSR for more than 15 years. But now for the first time it's not getting paid on schedule. And it's not just DuPont that's not getting paid on schedule. Neither are other Western firms that sell grain, textiles, computer equipment. The main reason for the payment problem appears to be the changes in the Soviet economy. Two years ago all foreign trade was controlled by a single ministry. But today that's no longer true. There's no central authority to coordinate the trade and make sure enough hard currencies like the dollar are available to pay for what they buy. All of this is making life difficult, especially for smaller American companies that can't afford to wait very long for payment. And if enough U.S. companies refuse to sell to the Soviet Union, that could put efforts to rebuild the Soviet economy into a stall.

LITHUANIA

Brokaw: Mikhail Gorbachev continues to tighten the screws on Lithuania tonight. The new Soviet presidential council called for more economic and political sanctions against the rebellious republic, and at the same time Soviet legislators were putting pressure on Gorbachev demanding that Moscow dissolve Lithuania's parliament and impose direct rule. And as the vices tighten in Vilnius and in Moscow, Washington is feeling increasingly uncomfortable as well. The Bush Administration is worried that the Soviet internal pressures could make an arms control agreement more difficult this spring.

NBC's John Cochran: President Bush is finding that Gorbachev's problems in calming down his party's hardliners have also created problems for Bush.

[TV COVERAGE of a Cabinet meeting.]

Today the President told his Cabinet that talks with the Soviet foreign minister last week made some progress on arms control but not as much as hoped. Officials tell NBC News that Secretary Baker suspects the Soviets are in disarray and are having trouble deciding what they want out of arms agreements. On nuclear weapons U.S. officials were disappointed that the Soviets got tougher on cruise missiles. Disagreement too on some conventional, or non-nuclear weapons, especially on which combat aircraft should be included in the cutbacks.

(Baker: "And the proposal that was made to us on aircraft we find unattractive; let me put it that way.")

U.S. intelligence analysts say the Soviet military seems to be reasserting itself and is having second thoughts about the value of arms control. As one Warsaw Pact ally after another rejects communism, the Soviets are re-thinking whether Moscow can afford to give up so much hardware, especially long-range weapons. The Soviet hard-line on arms control also reflects the pressure Gorbachev faces from party conservatives in the Supreme Soviet, which would have to approve an arms treaty. Those are the same conservatives who today demanded that Gorbachev outlaw the Lithuanian independence movement. In Washington the Lithuanian diplomat said his people realize Gorbachev is under great pressure.

Cochran continues: White House spokesman Fitzwater, also sensitive to Gorbachev's problems, had a "no comment" when asked how the U.S. feels about hard-line demands to dissolve the Lithuanian parliament. But despite all the hand-wringing about Gorbachev's problems, U.S. officials say reports of his probable demise are greatly exaggerated. They suspect that although Gorbachev may have to do some backing and filling he'll find a way to survive.

SOVIET GEORGIA

Jennings reports that in Soviet Georgia today 200,000 people marched through the streets of the capital, Tbilisi. It was a year ago today that 20 Georgians were killed by Soviet troops during a pro-democracy demonstration.

ABC's Jim Laurie reports that the killings a year ago have obviously awakened Georgian consciousness. They've also awakened political activity as never seen here before. At a mass rally today all of Georgia's new political parties were on hand. They are now united in a strategy of civil disobedience. Last month Georgians succeeded in cancelling Soviet parliamentary elections. They are now turning their attention to the military. They marched today on army headquarters, decrying the army's shameful acts. As one activist put it, unless Gorbachev grants us independence, force again may be the only way to keep us from being free.

FERRY FIRES

Jennings: There have been two more fires on European ferries. On a French ferry in the English channel there was a fire in the engine room. One person was hurt. On a Danish-owned ferry traveling between Wales and Ireland a fire left one person dead and nine others hurt. Officials suspect arson. And arson has emerged as the prime concern in that fire Saturday onboard the North Sea ferry Scandinavian Star. Officials in Sweden now say that as many as 200 people may have died.

HUNGARY

Rather reports that official returns from yesterday's runoff elections show the conservative party in the lead and ready to form a coalition government with two smaller pro-Western parties.

In the biggest deal this year, General Electric invested \$150 million to buy controlling interests in this Hungarian lightbulb maker. Even the U.S. Ambassador, Mark Palmer, is quitting his job to go into business. All together 250 joint ventures are starting up.

NEPAL

Brokaw reports that thousands of Nepalese partied in the streets of their capital Katmandu celebrating King Birendra's decision to permit political parties after 29 years of dictatorial rule. (NBC-5, CBS-4)

LEGAL SERVICES CORP.

Rather: With little fanfare or publicity, President Bush recently appointed a new board to oversee the embattled Legal Services Corporation. That program is supposed to provide poor people with legal help and help guarantee equal justice for all in our country. The new board comes in after a decade of ideological feuding inside and outside the agency and attempts to kill the program outright during the Reagan/Bush years.

CBS's Bob McNamara reports that legal aid for the poor is on hold. Today local offices are surviving on 40 percent less in real dollars than 10 years ago -- a total budget not much more than the cost of a single B-1 bomber. And yet daily applications for help mount as fast as the phone calls. The lawyers of last resort have seen the budget cuts take a toll.

(Bob Cohen, Orange County, CA, Legal Aid: "For us in Orange Country it's meant we've gone from a program of 17 attorneys to a program of 11 attorneys.")

With ongoing case files piling in corners and papering hallways, legal aid offices are legal emergency rooms -- barely enough time now for quick advice to the mother of a child abducted by a boyfriend. Today, regional legal aid director meetings are gatherings of the battle weary, full of talk of witch hunts and politically motivated audits directed from Washington; about new laws against defending illegal aliens and farm workers. While legal aid lawyers are known for low pay and high dedication, conservatives suspect poverty lawyers are trying to build a power base. But insiders say what irks conservatives most is that government money might be funding a liberal agenda. In a climate where anti-poverty has at times met anti-poor, perhaps those needing help should feel fortunate the phones are answered at all. (CBS-11)

COSMETICS

Jennings: In Washington today a new congressional report says the government needs more authority to monitor safety in the cosmetics industry, which includes everything from makeup to bubble bath. Right now the industry has a voluntary safety self-regulation program. Today's report says "not enough." (ABC-4)

EXXON

Jennings reports that Exxon and its shipping company are pleading not guilty to criminal charges ranging from violating clean water laws to spilling oil into a waterway in Alaska. (ABC-6)

GREYHOUND

Jennings: Greyhound has filed a \$30 million lawsuit against the union which represents its striking drivers. The bus line claims that the union is behind the shooting attacks on its buses. The union says the suit is an act of desperation. (ABC-5, NBC-7, CBS-10)

MAPPLETHORPE ART

Jennings reports that a contemporary art center made copies of all the photographs in the Robert Mapplethorpe exhibition and turned them over to a local prosecutor. Yesterday a judge said if the copies were made the originals could stay on exhibit while the courts decide if seven of them are obscene. (ABC-7)

(Myers: "And when they saw his story played out on the national screen I think people had to ask themselves the question about their own attitudes, why was it that they felt the way they did? When here was a clear example of how illogical that hate happened to be.") The gay community believes Ryan White helped other AIDS victims, but there is a long way to go. Dr. Myers says it's now easier for politicians to exhibit their compassion for a victim.

(Myers: "You're seeing today a number of politicians who five years ago wouldn't have touched the subject, and I think that it is now a subject that can be freely discussed in political circles.")

He credits Ryan for that and says the next step is the funding to treat and eradicate the disease that killed him. (NBC-6, CBS-13)

LINCOLN AND JEFFERSON MEMORIALS

Jennings reports that two new studies have determined that the Lincoln and Jefferson memorials in Washington are in need of repairs.

ABC's Jim Wooten reports that in the caverns below the Lincoln memorial moisture-formed stalactites and stalagmites weaken the concrete slabs on which visitors walk, and the same is true beneath the Jefferson. The Park Service is asking for about \$12 million to see that they stand straight and true for generations yet to come.

ABORTION

Dr. Sullivan Delivers -- "...Fortunately, HHS Secretary Sullivan and Assistant Secretary for Health James Mason are subtle enough to distinguish between discovering a corpse on a road and creating one in a laboratory. As Mason told [a] subcommittee, 'The secretary and I are persuaded that one must accept the likelihood that permitting the human fetal tissue research at issue will increase the incidence of abortion across the country.'... When President Bush was elected, some conservatives doubted his commitment to the cause of the unborn. When HHS Secretary-designate Sullivan made a number of contradictory and confusing statements about abortion, these doubts were reinforced. But since that time Bush has made an unbroken series of correct policy decisions on pro-life issues. The position of Sullivan and Mason on the complex issue of fetal-tissue transplantation, perhaps more than any of the others, shows a firm understanding of the fundamental questions in the conflict over abortion. It should erase any doubts about where the Administration stands." (Washington Times, 4/9)

A Reprieve From Idaho's Scary Abortion Law -- "It is a measure of how extreme the Idaho anti-abortion law was that Gov. Andrus, longtime abortion opponent, vetoed it. And the scary thing is that the legislation had been designed by national anti-abortion groups as their best calculation of what the U.S. Supreme Court is likely to accept. If the calculation is correct, that's all the more reason to keep warding off such laws at every turn.... The Idaho law also would have given prospective fathers the right to seek a court injunction against the woman if they suspected she would seek a forbidden abortion, which amounts to a boyfriend's veto or a boon to wife abusers. It was just such realistic concerns that apparently led Andrus to balk. Forced by the legislation to confront the real-world implications of his own past anti-abortion rhetoric, he sensibly shied. Andrus called the legislation punitive and without compassion. Yes, but that, of course, is precisely the idea. Such legislation is a way for the people who wouldn't think of having an abortion, which is their right, to get even with the ones who would." (Atlanta Constitution, 4/4)

Too Hot A Potato Even For Idaho -- "...Gov. Andrus honorably and rightly vetoed what would have been the nation's most restrictive limits on access to abortion.... Matching the bill's utter lack of compassion was its undisguised opportunism. It had been drafted specifically to appeal to Supreme Court Justice O'Connor, believed to be the court's swing vote on abortion, who has indicated that she could support harsh abortion restrictions so long as a woman choosing abortion wasn't held criminally liable. The Idaho measure catered to that concern by putting the legal burden on doctors who perform abortions. Cynical? You bet. Andrus has given this mean-spirited bill the fate it deserved." (Los Angeles Times, 4/4)

Andrus Tells The Nation To Butt Out -- "...The people of Idaho are particularly sensitive to being 'used' by outsiders. Most of the state is owned by the federal government, and in some ways the Bureau of Land Management, the U.S. Forest Service, the Interior Department, the Department of Energy and assorted other federal agencies have more power over Idaho than its elected governor.... The goal of the National Right to Life Committee isn't to provide Minnesotans an abortion policy that fits them. It's a national effort to provide Supreme Court Justice O'Connor with a rationale that will allow her to vote with four other justices and overturn Roe v. Wade. Minnesota, like Idaho, has been used as a pawn. Minnesotans, like Idahoans, ought to feel uncomfortable in that role, and should do as Andrus did: Invite others to butt out and leave this issue for Minnesotans to resolve in ways that best suit this state, its people and its traditions." (Minneapolis Star Tribune, 4/3)

Idaho Chooses Freedom -- "Idaho's abortion bill was pernicious legislation that got exactly what it deserved from Gov. Andrus: thumbs down. The governor's decision was a reasonable call that contrasted sharply with the National Right to Life Committee's overzealous goal in crafting the bill: to outlaw abortion nationwide by forcing the U.S. Supreme Court to review Roe v. Wade. The ploy backfired when most legal experts, including some abortion opponents, declared the law's chance of being held constitutional were slim to none.... It has been nine months since the Supreme Court's Webster decision, which said state legislatures could pass limitations on abortion. Of the many bills introduced since then -- more than 150, including several in Florida's special legislative session last October -- no law has been passed which poses a direct threat to Roe v. Wade.... We think that reflects the view of the majority of Americans, who believe in freedom of choice based on conscience." (Palm Beach Post, 4/3)

Idaho's Laws And Rapists' Rights -- "Idaho's legislature passed an anti-abortion bill that would have given rapists more reproductive rights than their victims. That's just one of the reasons Gov. Andrus, a professed opponent of abortion, was justified, even compelled by conscience, in vetoing the bill.... Gov. Andrus aptly found that the bill would further harm the victim and would do so 'punitively and without compassion.' Impassioned but compassionless, the right-to-lifers in state after state are encountering such decent moderates and repelling them with their extremism. They are loud, and some of them are boisterous to the point of violence, but unless they can be more tolerant and fair they won't be listened to, much less obeyed. Americans are no fans of abortion but they are jealous of their liberty, which is nowhere more deeply threatened than when the state forces a person to incubate." (New York Times, 4/2)

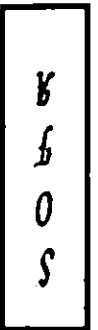

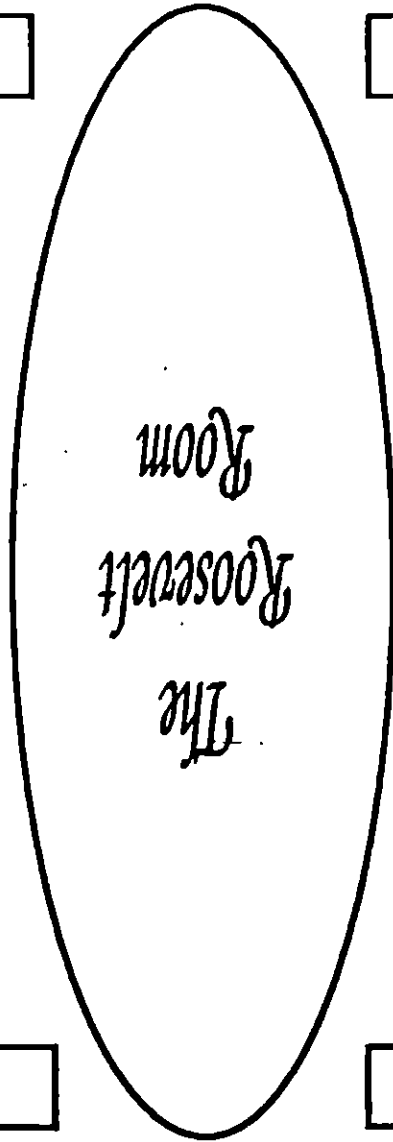

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: Did you discuss the Meech Lake Accord, and what is the U.S. position?

A: It is obviously not appropriate for me to comment on Canada's constitutional arrangements. What I can say is that I am confident of Canada's ability to remain strong, prosperous and united.

Q: Did you agree on a date for negotiating a bilateral acid rain agreement?

A: No, setting a date would be premature until U.S. Congressional action is somewhat further along, since we first need to know precisely what the acid rain provisions of the bill are going to be. However, I am very pleased with the way our Clean Air legislation has been progressing, and I hope we will be able to set a date for negotiations soon.

Q: Is it true you are going to negotiate a Free Trade Agreement with Mexico, and won't that damage Canada because of our FTA with the U.S.?

A: We have not made any definite decisions about an FTA with Mexico, but if we were to enter into negotiations, we would of course take full account of our obligations under the U.S.-Canada FTA.

Q: Are there any differences between you and Prime Minister Mulroney on Lithuania?

A: We see the issue very much from the same perspective.

ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FOR TORONTO

- Q: Why is the U.S. Navy refusing to buy rubber boats from Canada's Zodiac Company, when we have a Free Trade Agreement with the U.S.?
- A: The FTA does not override domestic defense procurement legislation. There are legal issues as to what the U.S. Navy may and may not do, and the State Department is working with the Canadian Embassy in Washington to try to sort these through.
- Q: American fishermen are still violating Canadian waters, and Canadian fishermen are also being disadvantaged by your regulations on the size of lobsters Canada can export to the U.S. How does this square with the FTA and with U.S.-Canadian friendship?
- A: Our legal experts are currently working together toward a bilateral fisheries enforcement accord. In addition, we just held an important U.S.-Canada fisheries conference in Portland, Maine in March to deal with issues of this type. We are also making full use of the FTA's dispute-settlement mechanisms. So I am confident that we will be able to work out problems like these, as friends.
- Q: If the U.S. is sympathetic to Lithuanian independence, then what is your policy with regard to those who advocate the independence of Quebec?
- A: There is no connection; we never recognized Lithuania's incorporation into the Soviet Union, whereas Quebec has always been part of Canada.
- Q: Why is the U.S. subsidizing American wheat and barley to the detriment of Canadian grain exports?
- A: We set up the Export Enhancement Program (EEP) only reluctantly, and as a response to extensive European subsidies of their grain exports; but in retaliating against subsidized EC exports we make every effort to avoid damage to Canadian grain exports.

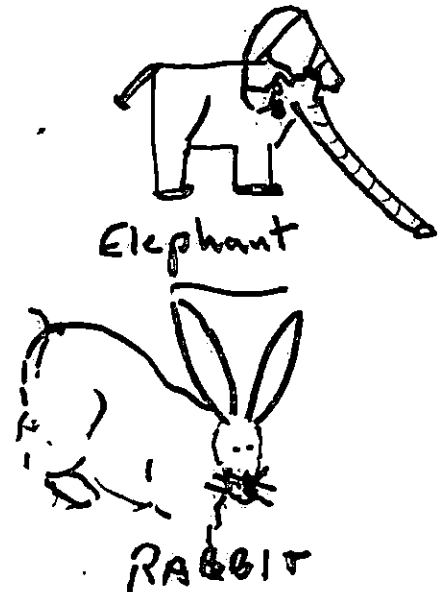

ARRIVAL IN TORONTO AND PHOTO OP WITH MULRONEY

April 10, 1990

Bush stepped off Air Force One in a light, but steady, rain with a contingent of scarlet-clad Royal Canadian Mounted Police serving as an honor guard. The President was greeted warmly at the foot of the steps by Canadian Prime Minister Mulroney, who was wearing a raincoat. The only moment of levity came when Secretary of State James A. Baker III came down the steps with an inverted umbrella. Your poolers don't know whether this was a malfunctioning umbrella or another Presidential prank (like the exploding golf ball for Scowcroft). At any rate, Baker was clearly cracked up by the incident. The motorcade took about 25 minutes to get to the Skydome.

The Bilateral meeting was held in a wood-panelled reception area of the dome on the third floor. The two leaders were chatting side-by-side during the photo op. When a reporter asked Bush, "Mr. President why are we REALLY here?" Bush answered by reminding reporters of his no-answer rule at photo ops. Bush was reminded by reporters that he was on Canadian soil, where photo op rules might be different and Mulroney was asked for a comment. But he demured saying there would be a 5:00 p.m. news conference.

Rice University Campus Map

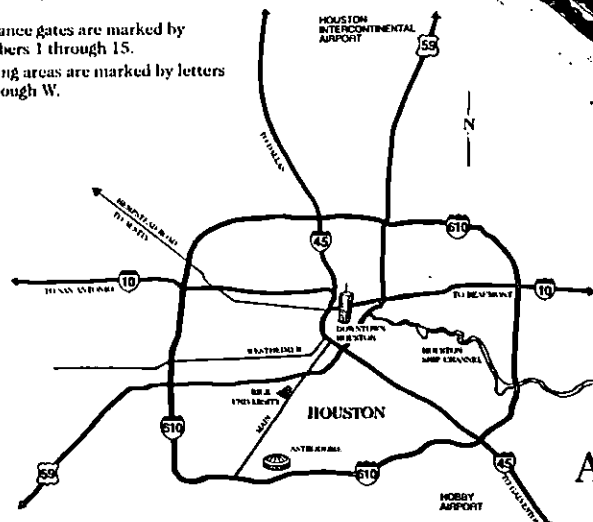
