U.S. WON'T REJOIN UNESCO, DERIDING AGENCY AS INEPT

The Bush Administration has decided that the U.S. should not rejoin the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, Administration officials said Monday.

In a report to be issued on Tuesday, the State Department asserts that the organization wastes money, is poorly managed and has not taken a firm stand in the defense of freedom of the press.

The report concludes that there has been little progress in solving the problems that led the U.S. to withdraw from [it].

"Bluntly stated, Unesco needs the United States as a member far more than the United States needs Unesco," says the report, issued by Secretary Baker. (Robert Pear, New York Times, A1)

SWIFT ACTION URGED ON AID TO NICARAGUA

President Bush Monday called on the Senate to take "immediate" action on his \$300 million aid package for Nicaragua, but senior officials say they have little hope of approval before the April 25 inauguration of President-elect Chamorro.

The White House Monday called in several conservative groups to hear Bush make his pitch that speedy government aid "is crucial" to help improve Nicaragua's ruinous economic condition....

"With democracy at stake, there is simply no time for delay," Bush said, noting that the country's economy is in deep trouble....

A senior official said the Administration...saw its prospects diminish this week because of the death of Sen. Matsunaga....

Another senior Administration official, [speaking on condition of anonymity], said, "It would be a very unfortunate message for the Congress to send to Mrs. Chamorro not to have this on the President's desk by her inauguration. That would be a real failure of the Congress to support Mrs. Chamorro in this democracy, and we hope that they will move quickly."

Bush Sends A Message To Hill: Hurry Up On Aid To Nicaragua

One week before President-elect Chamorro takes office, President Bush appealed to Congress Monday for \$300 million in economic aid for Managua, including \$47 million to help repatriate the anti-Marxist rebels.

In a loud, clear message to the lawmakers..., Bush told U.S. businessmen eyeing American-Nicaraguan joint ventures: "I'm disappointed that Congress failed to take the final steps to make the funds available before the Easter recess.... With democracy at stake, there is simply no time for delay." ...

A senior Administration official, referring to congressional Democrats' attempts to siphon off some of the \$800 million aid package for Eastern Europe, said, "To cut this package and reduce it supposedly to help some other part of the world would be a historic mistake."

'Time Is Wasting' On Central American Aid, Bush Administration Says

The Bush Administration is turning up the heat on Congress to enact an \$800 million aid package for Central America, calling further delay an affront to allies in the region.

Administration officials say that stalling the aid package beyond the April 25 inauguration of U.S.-backed President-elect Chamorro would be a foreign policy embarrassment. It also would be a burden on the government of Honduras...the officials say....

Addressing a White House audience on Latin American issues Monday, Bush said Congress...was wrong to not provide the funds before the break.

"I have pledged to Mrs. Chamorro that the United States government would respond in Nicaragua's hour of need," the President said. "I believe the United States of America has a great deal at stake in the success of Violeta Chamorro, but more so in democracy itself in Nicaragua," he added. (Tom Raum, AP)

CONTRA REBELS BEGIN DISARMING IN HONDURAS

SIRSITARA, Honduras -- On a sun-drenched parade ground Monday, 260 anti-Sandinista rebels from Nicaragua's Caribbean coast surrendered their weapons to U.N. troops, the first time any contras have been disarmed as part of the Central American peace process. After collecting the weapons, a platoon of armed Venezuelan army paratroopers under U.N. command cut them up with blowtorches....

A larger demobilization is expected Wednesday at the main contra base camps in Yamales, Honduras....

But...thousands of contras continue to operate in small units inside Nicaragua, skirmishing with Sandinista patrols.... Their presence has contributed to rising tension in Nicaragua....

However, a spokesman for President-elect Chamorro hailed Monday's disarming ceremony as a significant step toward peace. "As a symbolic first step, it's very important," said the spokesman, Luis Sanchez. (Wilson Ring, Washington Post, A1)

SLOW DISARMAMENT COULD DELAY INAUGURATION, ORTEGA WARNS

MANAGUA -- President Ortega left open the possibility Monday that the April 25 inauguration of President-elect Chamorro could be postponed if U.S.-backed resistance fighters are not disarmed by that date.

Ortega was asked at a news conference if the transfer of power...would take place April 25 if the rebels remained armed.

"We are analyzing this situation in order to find an adequate response to this so critical, so difficult and so grave situation in Nicaragua," he said.

In New York, a U.N. spokeswoman said voluntary demobilization of Nicaraguan rebels in Honduran base camps began Monday, but a U.N. memorandum indicated that talks about disbanding contras inside Nicaragua had run into difficulties.

MEXICAN DOCTOR'S ARREST TRIGGERS 'KIDNAP' CHARGES

The recent arrest of a Mexican doctor charged with helping murder federal drug agent Enrique Camarena has triggered new charges in Mexico that U.S. officials are violating that country's laws and paying bounties to those who "kidnap" its citizens....

[The doctor], Humberto Alvarez Machain, and four others in U.S. custody are scheduled to be tried May 1....

DEA officials said Monday that Alvarez Machain was apprehended by Mexican law enforcement officers in Guadalajara earlier this month and then flown to El Paso where he was arrested by the DEA on April 3.

However, Robert Steinberg, Alvarez Machain's lawyer, said the client claims he was arrested by people carrying badges of the Mexican Judicial Federal Police and that they told him he was charged with performing an illegal abortion....

Spokesmen for the Mexican Embassy in Washington and for the Federal Judicial Police both denied that any Mexican federal police officers were involved in the doctor's arrest.

A Mexican legislator, Alfredo Arenas Rodriguez, last week vowed to raise the issue of U.S. "interventionism" over the case.

U.S. PLANS NEW ANTI-DRUG BASES IN PERU

The U.S. plans to build new anti-drug bases in Peru similar to the one where U.S. drug agents recently engaged guerrillas in a fierce 85-minute firefight, officials said Monday....

Spokesmen for the State Department and DEA stressed Monday that no U.S. agents were wounded or killed in the April 7 attack on Santa Lucia Base and that the firefight does not signal the advent of further attacks....

A State Department official said Monday the U.S. is "now planning" several camps similar to Santa Lucia, but outside the Upper Huallaga Valley, to help Peru step up attempts to destroy coca crops and chemicals used to process cocaine. The new camps undoubtedly will bring U.S. agents into similar conflicts with drug traffickers or guerrilla units as the one at Santa Lucia, U.S. officials said.

TRAFFICKERS SAID TO REJECT VIOLENT TACTICS OF LEADER

BOGOTA -- A communique signed in the name of Colombia's most notorious drug barons said that Medellin cocaine cartel leader Pablo Escobar acted alone in ordering a recent wave of violence and that many opposed the move.

The document, if authentic, suggested a possible new split among the world's leading cocaine traffickers. But authorities here said the communique needed further study before they were certain it was authentic....

Police said they had received intelligence reports over the last week of serious rifts within the cartel over the return to terrorist tactics.... "We, the Extraditables, do not agree with the terrorist acts ordered indiscriminately and personally by Pablo Escobar," said the communique released Sunday night.

Escobar Leadership Of Medellin Cartel Thrown Into Question

BOGOTA -- The Medellin drug cartel rejects its longtime leader, Pablo Escobar, because of his indiscriminate terrorism, according to a statement claiming to be from cartel members.

The newspaper El Tiempo on Monday doubted the statement's authenticity. It said the format and lettering were different from previous documents sent by the traffickers to local media.

Defense Minister Oscar Botero said Monday he did not know if the statement was authentic, but that a split in the cartel does exist over tactics in a battle against the government.

"There are many drug traffickers," Botero said in a TV interview broadcast by the Cinevision news program, adding that some members of the Medellin cartel were opposed to terrorist violence.

CUBA READY TO DEFEND SOCIALISM TO THE DEATH, OFFICIAL SAYS

HAVANA -- A senior Cuban official told thousands of cheering Havana residents Monday that Cuba rejected "a thousand times" the political changes in Eastern Europe and would defend its one-party socialist system to the death.

"Will our capital be like Budapest, Warsaw or Prague?" Jorge Lezcano, First Secretary in Havana of the ruling Cuban Communist Party, asked a large rally in the Cuban capital.

"No," the crowd roared back.

"Certainly not, a thousand times no," Lezcano added. (Reuter)

LITHUANIA OFFERS SEVERAL CHANGES
Rights, Citizenship Compromises Signalled

MOSCOW -- The Lithuanian leadership, facing the threat of an economic blockade, signalled Monday that it is ready to compromise on several crucial issues in its five-week confrontation with the Kremlin over the republic's bid for independence.

Lithuanian Prime Minister Kazimiera Prunskiene said that in response to President Gorbachev's ultimatum last week, the legislature was prepared to consider new laws protecting the rights of all people on Lithuanian soil and allowing individuals to remain Soviet citizens even in an independent republic.

She said the republic would also permit its young men to serve in the Red Army if they chose and would search for a "compromise" on the division of property between the national Communist Party and the Lithuanian Communist Party....

Although Prunskiene said a blockade imposed from Moscow would "constitute a cold, and very harsh, war against the people of Lithuania," she also noted that the Kremlin's latest threat was "a step forward in a way" because it did not demand that Lithuania repeal its declaration of independence.... She also said the republic's legislature needed more details on Moscow's threat...before it could respond adequately.

MOSCOW CAUTIONED AGAINST EMBARGO

Talks On Economic Issues Could Be Put At Risk, White House Says

Five sets of upcoming U.S.-Soviet talks on economic issues ranging from trade to civil aviation could be put at risk if the Soviet Union follows through on its threat to impose an economic embargo on raw materials entering Lithuania, senior Administration officials said Monday.

U.S. and Soviet negotiators are scheduled to resume talks on the economic issues during the next three weeks, but all of the sessions could be postponed or cancelled if situation in Lithuania worsens, officials said....

Meanwhile, the Administration's policy was endorsed Monday by Sen. Mitchell.... Mitchell said Monday he believes a compromise solution to the Soviet-Lithuanian conflict is still possible and he urged the Administration to proceed cautiously in the dispute.

Administration officials, reflecting President Bush's caution on the subject, said Monday that no steps have yet been taken to postpone any of the U.S.-Soviet talks and that the President has not discussed the issue with his top advisers.

Senate Leader Mitchell Backs Bush's Cautious Approach On Lithuania

The Bush Administration's cautious response to the turbulence in Lithuania won an important ally from the opposition party Monday as Senate Democratic leader Mitchell, just back from a trip to Moscow, said he supported the President.

At a luncheon with reporters, Mitchell said of Bush's stance that "some ambiguity is useful" while the U.S. waits to see whether President Gorbachev carries out a threat to impose economic sanctions on the Lithuanians unless they renounce their declaration of independence.

"You can't predict precisely in advance or calibrate your position based on what someone might or might not do. The President is right," Mitchell said. (John Mashek, Boston Globe)

PENTAGON PLANNER POINTS TO UNCERTAINTY

Undersecretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz suggested Monday that a Soviet military crackdown on Lithuania would not destroy U.S.-Soviet relations, but would strengthen Secretary Cheney's demands to use caution when trimming U.S. defense capabilities.

"I think even if the worst happens in Lithuania, the pressure on the Soviets to get out of Germany is still going to be very strong," said Wolfowitz at a luncheon meeting with editors and reporters at The Washington Times....

"I wouldn't say that all bets would be off [in a Soviet attack on Lithuania] but I think already the kind of turmoil in Lithuania has given some people second thoughts about the absolute confidence with which they want to assume everything positive is going to happen."

SOVIETS RAISE OBSTACLES TO NEW ARMS PACTS

The Soviet Union in recent weeks has been backing away from or qualifying a number of important arms control deals, including the agreement for a ceiling of 195,000 U.S. and Soviet troops in Central Europe, U.S. officials say.

Officials and non-government experts blame the problem on a new assertiveness by the Soviet military.... The Red Army has pushed Moscow to reopen old issues that were considered settled and raised new ones to bedevil the negotiators.

Unless President Gorbachev "cracks the whip," as one official put it last week, the new Soviet positions could prevent him and President Bush from agreeing in principle on the START nuclear arms reduction treaty at their May 30 summit. They could also prolong negotiations on the CFE talks beyond this year.

SMUGGLING SAID KEY FACTOR IN THIRD WORLD NUCLEAR WEAPON PLANS

Clandestine trade has played a central role in advancing the nuclear weapons capabilities of Pakistan, India, Argentina, Brazil and Iraq, according to a report released Tuesday.

The report, by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace..., blamed the trade on advanced nuclear supplier countries, particularly West Germany, as well as on emerging suppliers such as China.

"The role of West German citizens and West German firms has been particularly troubling, and there is good reason to believe that the laxity of West German export control authorities has contributed seriously to the problem," the study said. (Reuter)

U.S. CONSULTED JEWISH GROUPS ON SOVIET EMIGRE QUOTA

The Bush Administration obtained advance support of American Jewish leaders before imposing new rules that had the effect of diverting most Soviet Jewish emigres from the U.S. to Israel, according to informed sources.

Administration sources and Jewish leaders both said that the consultations defused what could have turned into a firestorm of controversy.

However, the refugee plan...may also have the unintended consequence of swelling the population of Jewish settlements in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip....

An official of a Jewish organization who followed the consultations closely said Administration officials "knew going into this that it was a very sensitive issue. They also knew that if they didn't handle it very well, it could come back to hurt them."

ANTI-SEMITES SAID TO BE AMONG SOVIETS ON U.S.-FUNDED TOUR

The USIA is financing a month-long tour of the U.S. by a group of Soviet editors and writers associated with extreme Russian nationalist publications, some of whom have been accused of antisemitism.

Several leaders of American Jewish groups have criticized the USIA for bringing the group to this country. "Inviting these kinds of people from the Soviet Union with known anti-Semitic views is unacceptable and harmful," said Mark Talisman, director of the Council of Jewish Federations. "Sponsorship by the federal government is ludicrous and appears to smack of approval."

USIA spokesman Frank Johnson said, "I'm not in a position to confirm...whether they have anti-semitic views or not. These people are Russian nationalists. That is why they were invited.... Is the situation such that everybody has to agree with us before they can be invited?" (Judith Havemann, Washington Post, A1)

U.S. Sponsoring Visit By Anti-Semites, AJC Says

The government is sponsoring a month-long U.S. tour by a group of Russian writers that includes known anti-Semites, a major Jewish group charged Monday night.

"This visit is not in the interests of the West generally," said David Harris, president of the American Jewish Committee.

A Russian Jewish emigre whose studies of anti-Semitic writers were used by the committee, Semyon Reznick, said some writers in the group "exuded the myth of a Jewish-Zionist conspiracy, an old Russian hatred" in their work.

Frank Johnson, a spokesman for the USIA, sponsor of the tour, said, "I don't know that they are anti-Semitic; I don't know that they are not, either.... We feel very strongly that pluralism in this country is worth talking about and observing." (AP)

RANKING OF NATO BURDEN-SHARING REVEALED

Turkey, Greece, Britain and France were given high marks by the Pentagon Monday for their contributions to NATO's defense, while Canada, Denmark and Luxembourg were cited for doing "relatively less" than others.

The findings were contained in a publication on burden-sharing of costs that Secretary Cheney sent to Congress....

The report said some allies "appear to be doing at least their fair share or substantially more, others appear to be doing substantially less than their fair share, while a third group of nations shows performance that can be best described as mixed."

...The group of "non-U.S. NATO allies doing relatively less" included Luxembourg, Denmark and Canada, and the report said their performance "looks substantially below-par based on the defense-gross domestic product share and most of the key indicators examined."

LONDON TIMES SAYS BUSH TO END U.S. COOLNESS TO LABOR PARTY

LONDON -- President Bush is confident of good relations between the U.S. and Britain if the opposition Labor Party comes to power, The Times newspaper said Tuesday.

The Times said this was a signal from Bush that the days of deliberate White House hostility to Labor could be over.

Bush told The Times in an interview that in the event of a future Labor government, "If we do have a special relationship, it will continue, I'm sure."

Asked about President Reagan's cold, brief reception of Labor Party leader Kinnock in the past, Bush said that when "the opposition leaders come here, we will see them. That's the way it should be." (Reuter)

DELEGATES BOP BUSH ON GLOBAL WARMING.

Delegates from 17 nations gathered for a White House conference on global warming amid criticism from some participants and environmentalists that the Bush Administration isn't dealing with the problem....

The Sierra Club...called the White House conference an attempt by the Administration to shift the focus of the issue away from the need for pollution controls to a debate over economic considerations.

"It's really a smokescreen for the Administration's inaction on global warming," said Daniel Becker of the Sierra Club. "We know enough now to begin acting to curb global warming today."

Europeans Miffed Over White House Climate Conference

The White House conference on global climate change began on a discordant note Monday as European delegates accused the Bush Administration of trying to stifle discussion of possible international action to reduce "greenhouse" emissions....

Dutch delegates, [at a Monday afternoon news conference], expressed irritation with the Administration's "one-way traffic conference."

The Dutch charged the White House had tailored the agenda to fit the Administration's position that more scientific research is needed before the international community can agree on economically costly steps to reduce industrial carbon dioxide emissions.

"We were quite surprised with the agenda," said Pier Vellinga, director of The Netherlands' national climate program. "We now see the United States is organizing this conference to stress the difficulties in economics of reducing carbon dioxide emissions and stating not enough research is done."

Vellinga said his country and others wrote letters to the White House asking to change the agenda to include public discussion of possible international action to freeze or reduce carbon dioxide emissions from the burning of oil, coal and other fossil fuels. "We have had no reply," he said. "We do now see that it's kind of a one-way traffic conference."

BUSH ALLOWS S. AFRICAN STEEL DESPITE SANCTIONS

The Bush Administration is allowing South African iron and steel into the U.S. despite a 1986 economic sanction designed to force an end to apartheid, the State Department said Monday.

Most of the controversial imports are ferroalloys, strategic commodities never intended by Congress to be banned under the law, said Department spokeswoman Tutwiler....

"The Administration will continue to enforce fully all provisions of the Comprehensive Anti-Apartheid Act," Tutwiler said. "This is an old issue that has been thoroughly reviewed by the Treasury Department."

Another U.S. official, requesting anonymity, said some prefabricated items, such as toasters and some ferroalloys had been imported.

DALLAS -- U.S. Trade Representative Hills said Monday the issue of farm subsidies will determine the outcome of latest round of GATT trade talks, scheduled to end in December.

"It is a break-or-make issue," Hills told reporters after her address to a luncheon meeting of the North Texas Commission, a regional economic development group.

Hills...warned that participating nations are still far apart on the farm subsidies issue....

"Eliminating the protectionist policies that exist worldwide in agriculture will put \$11 billion in the pockets of American farmers -- that's an extra \$3,400 for each and every one of them," Hills said in her speech. "This round of the GATT is a bold and ambitious undertaking. It may be the last, best chance this century to create the trading rules we need for the next century," she continued. YEUTTER: GET MOVING ON FARM TRADE REFORM

The U.S. proposal to phase out agricultural quotas and trade barriers over a 10-year period should help get the world moving toward freer farm trade, Secretary Yeutter said Monday.

In remarks prepared for delivery to an Indianapolis seminar, Yeutter said agricultural trade barriers and subsidies cost developed nations \$135 billion a year and deprive farmers around the world of billions of dollars in trade.... Yeutter's call for trade reform followed a round of European criticism of U.S. proposals at the Uruguay Round of world trade talks....

Yeutter said the U.S. proposal to convert trade barriers into tariffs and to reduce tariff levels over 10 years "just makes good sense." ... "We need to get off dead center in the agricultural trade arena and this is the way to start," he said. (UPI)

BANKS WARY OF LOANS TO E. EUROPE
Little Prospect Seen For Major New Aid

A leading commercial bankers organization Monday warned the former Soviet satellite countries in Europe not to expect much help from bankers as the nations attempt to move toward a free-market environment.

Horst Schulmann, managing director of the Institute for International Finance, told a press conference that because the creditworthiness of the countries is "limited," there is little prospect that commercial banks will be able to make substantial new loans to the region -- and those that are made will be "customer driven," not made to governments. The economic machinery of seven states in Eastern and Central Europe "is so run down that it is near collapse," according to a report released Monday by the institute.... The seven states are Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, Poland, Romania and Yugoslavia.

OPPOSITION LEADER IN NEPAL TO FORM NEW GOVERNMENT

KATMANDU -- King Birendra Monday asked the once-banned Nepali Congress Party to form an interim government to rule until the first free elections in nearly three decades are held in this Himalayan kingdom, an opposition leader said.

A leader of the party, Ganesh Man Singh, met with Birendra and said later that the king had indicated he would give up his wide powers. Singh also said that parliamentary elections would be held within a year.

Birendra approved Krishna Prasad Bhattarai as the new prime minister pending the vote, Singh said. Bhattarai is acting president of the Nepali Congress Party.

FEDS' 89-TON COKE HAUL CAN'T 86 DRUG WOES

Although federal agents seized a record 89 tons of cocaine last year, Bush Administration officials concede they have not made a dent in the supplies available on the street.

Drug enforcement experts say the impact of the cocaine busts has been blunted by huge stockpiles of coke and admit they do not have a firm idea of how big those stores are.

"There's an enormous amount out there, much larger than we ever believed," said one drug authority.

An Administration source said that without clearer intelligence reports on what's in the pipeline and hidden in warehouses, it will be difficult to evaluate in the short run how well President Bush's anti-drug strategies are working....

"Until we have a better intelligence picture, we're almost guessing," said the Administration source. He said Bush's Office of National Drug Control Policy has put a priority on improving intelligence gathering. (Bryna Brennan, New York Daily News, 11)

THORNBURGH BLASTS DRUG DECRIMINALIZATION DEBATE

RICHMOND, Va. -- Attorney General Thornburgh, speaking late Monday to Virginia law enforcement officials trying to develop a new strategy against illicit drugs, dismissed public debate over decriminalization.

Thornburgh, who travels to Mexico on Wednesday for a meeting of law enforcement leaders from the OAS, criticized those who consider drug abuse a "victimless crime."

"Increasingly," he said, "these days we are hearing naive talk about drug abuse as a 'victimless crime.' We hear pundits, professors, and even judges learnedly proposing to legalize drugs. What does this talk constitute but just the opposite of street smart. Call it, I say, street ignorance."

Those who favor legalization show "we still have a job to do to make people realize the true risks that are associated with drugs," said Thornburgh, speaking to a statewide drug summit.

REPORT: CONGRESSMAN GOT FREE OFFICE FROM LOBBYIST IN HUD SCANDAL

SAN JOSE, Calif. -- Rep. Lantos, who led Congress' investigation of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, got free office space from lobbyists representing a key figure in the HUD affair, according to a published report.

The rent-free space -- provided by the public relations firm Hill & Knowlton Inc. -- has been used since late 1988 by a private foundation headed by Lantos, the San Jose Mercury News reported Sunday.

An examination of that foundation and a similarly named, taxpayer-supported organization founded by Lantos reveals that he disregarded guidelines to prevent conflicts of interest and other abuses, according to the Mercury News. (AP)

STATES PAY BIGGER SHARE FOR HIGHWAYS, BRIDGES

State and local governments are bearing an increasing share of the burden of rebuilding the nation's highways and bridges, and states have raised their gas taxes 122 times since 1980, according to a survey released today.

Although the survey was simply intended to provide statistical information, it raises questions about the feasibility of the Bush Administration's recent call for states and local governments to play an even greater role in highway construction and maintenance.

The Road Information Program (TRIP), a non-profit Washington-based transportation research institute, said its survey found that state and local governments bore 77.6% of the cost of highway improvements in 1988, compared to 74% in 1980....

The survey also found that states have already boosted their gas taxes by an average 84% -- from 8.6 cents a gallon in 1980 to 15.8 cents a gallon by Jan. 1, 1990.

EXXON SAYS MINIMAL CLEANUP EFFORT NEEDED THIS SUMMER

Otto Harrison, the Exxon Valdez oil spill cleanup general manager, said more work was needed on fewer than 50 miles of beach and perhaps only 24 miles.

Neither state nor federal officials endorsed Harrison's remarks and, in fact, said there was insufficient evidence to support the Exxon conclusions.

QUAKE LEAVES FRUSTRATION IN BAY AREA

ON HARMONY LANE, The Santa Cruz Mountains, Calif. -- ...On the eve of the six-month anniversary of what probably was the nation's costliest natural disaster, the San Francisco Bay Area seems resigned to a long period of rebuilding and readjustment, with the air still full of bitterness about inadequacy of federal aid and conflicting opinions about which damaged buildings and highways should be restored....

Oakland Mayor Wilson decried what he said was FEMA's "arrogance and a lack of compassion." Alameda County Supervisor Don Perata pronounced FEMA guilty of "flagrant abuse of the public." ...

HIGH COURT TO REVIEW PENSION-CLAIMS CASE

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with the waiting game the world is watching. Mikhail Gorbachev's 48-hour deadline to Lithuania has come and gone, and the Lithuanians have not abandoned the three key steps they've taken towards independence. Their own ID cards, their refusal to register for the Soviet draft, and the position that all property in Lithuania belongs to Lithuanians. Yet so far Moscow has done nothing to cut off gas and oil and other vital supplies to the Lithuanian republic. Today the Lithuanian government met to debate what it should do next.

ABC's Jim Laurie: After the meeting the Lithuanian government responded by sending Mikhail Gorbachev a telegram. It appealed to him to hold immediate talks on the key issues which prompted the threatened trade sanctions, President Landsbergis suggesting Lithuania was prepared for concessions.

(President Landsbergis: "We can go to compromises on very much questions, excluding only the question of independence.") In his cable on Friday Gorbachev did not specifically call for the repeal of the independence declaration. He did demand retraction of Lithuania's new identification cards, compliance with the military draft and obedience to Soviet property laws. In a further note of conciliation tonight, Lithuania's prime minister on national television promised Lithuania would not retaliate by cutting off shipments of manufactured goods to the rest of the Soviet Union. Meanwhile, at Moscow's main depot for truck traffic, cargo was moving out as usual, carrying machinery, oil and other vital supplies to Lithuania. Despite the deadline which expired last night there is no sign yet that an embargo is about to begin. Faced with sanctions, Lithuania is in fact helpless. Factories could only operate two weeks without vital supplies, so compromise on anything but independence itself seems the only way to avoid a damaging embargo.

Jennings: The State Department interpreted today's news from Lithuania as good news. But what will the Bush Administration do if Gorbachev decides to go ahead with his sanctions?

ABC's John McWethy: In public the State Department refused to talk about a possible U.S. response.

(State Department spokeswoman Tutwiler: "We are not going to discuss or hypothesize with you what we may or may not do, actions we may or may not take, and options we may or may not pursue.") Still, Administration officials say the U.S. does have a list of options all aimed at inflicting economic pain on the Soviet Union should that be necessary.

McWethy continues:

[TV COVERAGE of Presidents Bush and Gorbachev talking together.]
At the top of the list is the trade agreement that President Bush proposed four months ago at the Malta summit as a major step toward improving relations. The agreement would give Moscow low tariffs in trading with the U.S. Officials say a slowdown or cancellation of these talks is possible. Also in jeopardy are expanded landing rights for Soviet and American airlines, a broader agreement on shipping and use of ports, plus technical agreements on investment and taxes. U.S. officials say there are no plans to stop grain sales to the Soviets or to suspend arms control talks because in these areas the U.S. has as much to lose as do the Soviets. So if the Kremlin moves against Lithuania American strategy will be to deny Gorbachev what he badly needs -- closer ties to the world's largest economy. American officials concede this alone may not deter Gorbachev, but they hope it will be a factor as he weighs his options. (ABC-Lead, CBS-4)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: In the old days Moscow would have sent in the troops and the tanks by now. But the standoff between the Soviet Union and the breakaway republic of Lithuania remains just that tonight. President Gorbachev said that crucial economic supplies would be cut off if certain laws passed recently were not rescinded by last night. For its part Lithuania did not blink. But it did ask for a meeting.

NBC's Bob Abernethy reports that as long lines formed at filling stations Lithuania's people began preparing for cutbacks in gasoline, oil, and natural gas, for which they're totally dependent of the Soviet Union. They probably have enough electricity unless Moscow stops coal shipments, but printer's ink and newsprint are down to less than a week's supply. Agriculture could suffer if there were not enough fuel and spare parts for farm machinery or chemicals for fertilizer, and if Lithuania's factories had to shut down for lack of raw materials or energy there could be enough unemployment to weaken the independence movement.

Brokaw discusses the situation in Lithuania with Sen. Mitchell:

Brokaw: What's your judgement? Are the Lithuanians giving Gorbachev too little room to maneuver?

Mitchell: I think the important thing is for the dialogue to begin. Although there are obviously deep differences between them I think this can be resolved in a peaceful manner. And I hope that he will see their offer of a meeting as a first step in that process.

Brokaw: But we have been saying that on this side for some time now. If it comes to an economic boycott, would you recommend that the U.S. provide economic aid to Lithuania?

Mitchell: I think it's unwise to speculate in advance certainly before we've had a chance to meet and talk with the President about it, which we'll do tomorrow, on what may happen and what may not happen.

Mitchell continues: It is significant, of course, that the deadline has passed more than 24 hours ago and yet no action has yet been taken. Therefore I think it's premature to speculate as to when it might happen and what we might then do. I think our efforts ought to be concentrated toward resolving the situation in a peaceful manner.

Brokaw: I'm not sure that everyone understands that Gorbachev is not asking Lithuania for that country to give up its independence. He's really asking for that country to rescind a couple of laws. One has to do with conscription of people into the Soviet military forces. Is that an unreasonable request on his part in your judgement?

Mitchell: It's more than that. He's asked them to rescind their declaration of independence, and from their standpoint and ours they do not recognize the incorporation of Lithuania into the Soviet Union. American policy for 50 years has been not to recognize that incorporation. So from their standpoint it is a significant step. There may be middle ground suggested by Lithuanians and Soviets themselves in a separate meeting a couple of weeks ago in which they talked about the possibility of a temporary suspension of the declaration. If they do that while they're in negotiations it seems to me it offers a way out for both sides. (NBC-Lead)

PUBLIC LAND

CBS's Dan Rather: The U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments today in what could become a landmark case over public land and the environment. It is the latest confrontation involving industrial development, commercial business, government regulators and environmental groups. President Bush is siding against the environmentalists in today's case. This comes as politicians from the President on down, corporations and groups of many different stripes, all gearing up for Earth Day 1990 and trying to portray themselves as friendly to the environment.

CBS's Rita Braver reports that it's a battle over leaving the land as it is or mining it for its riches. It began in the Reagan Administration with Interior Secretary James Watt.

(Watt in 1982: "We expect to generate several billions of dollars in the years ahead as we allow the private sector to take these lands and put them to more constructive use.")

Between 1981 and 1985 the Interior Department opened for development 180 million acres of federal land in 12 western states. The National Wildlife Federation sued, claiming that damage caused by commercial use, primarily mining, would interfere with the rights of members to enjoy the public lands.

[TV COVERAGE of President Bush planting a palm tree in Bermuda.] But staying the Reagan course the Administration of self-proclaimed environmental President George Bush argues the environmentalists have no right to stop the development.

(Steven Goldstein, Interior Department: "The issue here is whether one special interest group determines the management of our public lands or whether that decision is made by a secretary of the Interior who is appointed by an elected president.")

Braver continues: And an Administration lawyer today told the Supreme Court that environmentalists should not be allowed to stop development unless they can prove that they use the specific lands being mined. Justice Byron White seemed skeptical of that argument, suggesting that even building roads to get to the mine sites could have broad environmental impact.

(Jay Hair, National Wildlife Federation: "Clearly that's going to diminish the value of that to the American people and to the local environment.")

The environmentalists blocked development through 1988, but now some mining has begun. And the Supreme Court's decision in this case could determine whether anyone has the right to challenge many governmental decisions to develop public land. (CBS-Lead)

EARTH DAY/POLL

Rather reports that according to the latest CBS News/New York Times poll out this evening this Earth Day anniversary is an occasion for concern, not just for celebrating. Three out of the four people we polled say the air and water have become more polluted in the generation since Earth Day 1970. More than four out of 10 say pollution is a serious problem in their own neighborhoods and getting worse. One out of five knows someone whose health has been affected.

CBS's Richard Threlkeld says the fact that the earth is a manifestly dirtier place now than it was back in the 1970s is evidence that a lot of the lessons about cleaning up the environment have gone unlearned. There have been some changes for the better since that first Earth Day in 1970. There's an EPA now, and clean air, clean water and toxic waste laws -- and most important a big change in the way people, ordinary people, have begun to think and act about the environment. You can find little examples of that all over the country. One example, a growing number of farmers have virtually stopped using chemicals in pesticides. It all goes to show that cleaning up America is a possible dream, but we're obviously a long way from fulfilling it. Today Americans are consuming more energy, generating more solid waste and cutting down more trees than 20 years ago. Yet we're spending no more of our federal tax dollars on the environment now than then. (CBS-3)

RECYCLING

NBC's Don Oliver reports that because of a massive city recycling effort in Seattle, garbage into landfills has been cut by 25 percent, and officials are optimistic that the cost of collecting recyclable garbage will continue to be less than the price they can sell it for. (NBC-7)

MANDELA

Brokaw reports that ANC leader Nelson Mandela was promoting continued sanctions against the South African government during an international concert in his honor today in London.

NBC's Peter Kent reports:

(Mandela to the crowd in Wimbly Stadium: "Do not listen to anyone who says that you must give up the struggle against apartheid.") Mandela said economic sanctions against South Africa should continue until promised changes actually take place and all political prisoners are free.

(Mandela: "There are some in the world who wish to support the South African government by giving it rewards and carrots.") Which is why Mandela turned down an invitation to meet Prime Minister Thatcher this week. He considers her decision to lift sanctions against South Africa absolutely disastrous. Mandela says he'd rather have Thatcher as an ally than an enemy, but that he'll meet her some other time.

(Mandela: "Together we must learn to continue our united effort for the abolition of the apartheid system.")

A message Mandela plans to carry to Presidents Bush and Gorbachev as soon as visits can be arranged. (NBC-2, ABC-7, CBS-5)

NICARAGUA

Brokaw: In Nicaragua today President Ortega appeared to leave open the possibility that the inauguration of President-elect Chamorro, scheduled for nine days from now, it could be postponed, he said, if the Contras are not disarmed. Ortega accused the Contras of delaying the disarmament, adding "We are very close to peace and very close to war." (NBC-3)

S&Ls

NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports that in Texas the chairman of Vernon [phonetic] S&L has been sentenced to 30 years in prison for bank fraud. Vernon's failure could cost taxpayers \$1.3 billion. The Attorney General calls Vernon --

(Attorney General Thornburgh: "-- the most egregious example of the systematic looting of a savings and loan through a whole variety of daisy-chain transactions.")

Insider deals, inflated real estate values, and bogus loans -- a pattern of fraud the government found in 60 percent of the 400 S&Ls seized so far. At a House Banking Committee hearing in Texas, the FBI director called it a national crisis as pervasive as drug abuse. The chairman of the agency running the S&L bailout blames Congress and the Administration for permitting high-risk investments without proper oversight.

(William Seidman, Chairman RTC: "When they opened up the S&Ls to all these wild activities they could go into, they didn't provide the supervision to see that they operated in a safe and sound manner. And some of the bad people got ahold of the S&Ls and took advantage of the fact that the cop was off the beat.")

Even when S&L executives are convicted the government is having a hard time recovering any assets, and fraud is very hard to prove. (NBC-5)

FILING DEADLINE

Brokaw reports that the IRS was working overtime today processing tens of millions of tax returns. An estimated six million taxpayers were expected to forget about meeting tonight's deadline, filling out a form that will give them an extra four months or so to complete their returns. (NBC-4)

Rather reports that the latest estimate is that the average American will work 125 days, until May 5, to pay for those things your 1990 taxes will help pay for. (CBS-9)

ART

Jennings reports that in a Cincinnati courtroom today lawyers for a local art museum and its director pleaded not guilty to obscenity charges. It is the latest development in a running battle with the censors over the display of photographs by the late Robert Mapplethorpe.

ABC's Charles Thomas reports that a poll released last week showed 60 percent of Cincinnatians supported the museum's right to show the Mapplethorpe exhibit. (ABC-3, CBS-6)

IBUPROFEN

Jennings: The FDA said today there is no cause for alarm about taking the pain reliever Ibuprofen so long as patients read the warning label carefully. Ibuprofen is the key ingredient in such things as Advil, Motrin, Nuprin. The study published over the weekend reported that its use could produce kidney failure in some patients with otherwise mild kidney problems. The drug's manufacturer said today it has a good safety record.

(ABC-5, NBC-8)

COP CORPS

Brokaw reports that a proposal before the Senate would add more police to the streets by creating a cop corps of young people who would get money for college in exchange for police work.

NBC's Bob Kur reports that the idea is to recruit more cops, as many as 25,000 a year, to work in their own neighborhoods and receive college scholarships in return. Students who agree to begin police training during summers while in college and spend four years as officers after graduation would get \$10,000-a-year scholarships paid by the federal government. The eventual cost -- about a billion dollars a year. Localities would pay their salaries which would stay at entry level for the four-year tour with no pension benefits -- presumably a bargain for many cities which now have more violent crimes than cops. Though most major police organizations support the concept, some believe the money would be better spent to further educate cops already on the beat or to pay them more, which could help recruiting. Los Angeles Police Chief Daryl Gates doubts a police corps recruit would be effective anyway.

(Gates: "He's an elitist, an individual who probably doesn't want to be a police officer -- wants to be a doctor or a lawyer or a computer specialist and is only coming into the police service because he's getting his education paid for by the United States government.") (NBC-9)

POLICE WEAPON

Jennings reports that in Los Angeles over the weekend police used nunchucks -- those devices that look like two nightsticks tied together -- at a demonstration against abortion. An earlier use of nunchucks in San Diego has prompted a \$5 million lawsuit against police.

ABC's Brian Rooney reports that when a police officer gets a grip with his nunchucks, you go where he goes. It creates leverage officers just can't get with their hands. It hurts a lot, which is partly why it's so effective. Only police departments can buy them. More than 50 of them have. The nunchucks are supposed to cause pain without permanent damage. Nunchucks are now being tested by the Los Angeles police as an alternative to the painful holds police have been using. (ABC-6)

GARBO

Brokaw reports that Greta Garbo died in New York last night at the age of 84. (NBC-11, ABC-11, CBS-10)

SUMMIT/ARMS CONTROL

Baltic Chill On Arms Talks -- "Any lingering hope that Presidents Bush and Gorbachev would sign a new arms control treaty at their June summit has been dispelled by those chill winds blowing in from the Baltic. While both leaders have tried not to let the Lithuanian standoff harm superpower relations, neither one seems to be in a position to make further visible concessions on nuclear weaponry at this particular moment. Their task at the upcoming Washington meeting is to try to set the stage for a signing before year's end. But uncertainty intrudes.... Even modest steps toward arms control are better than no steps at all. If international conditions permit a START treat later this year, it will force 50 percent cutbacks in heavy Soviet ballistic missiles and the nuclear throw-weight they carry. U.S. intercontinental rocketry also would be constrained. So START is a start -- provided it leads one day to abandonment of nuclear-warfighting fantasies. It would be a tragedy if Soviet pressure on the Baltic states scuttles not only nuclear arms cutbacks but reductions in conventional forces massed in central Europe." (Baltimore Sun, 4/13)

Why Risk Start Now, Needlessly? -- "...Banning multi-warhead missiles makes eminently good sense. If both sides had only single-warhead missiles that could each destroy no more than one opposing missile, there would be little to gain from shooting first. But the ban President Bush proposes put the burden almost entirely on the Soviets. They have mobile land-based missiles, which Bush would ban in Start 1. The U.S. does not. And if Start 2 extended the ban to missiles with multiple warheads in silos, as Bush also proposes, the impact on the Soviets would be even greater. That's because the Bush proposal makes no mention of multi-warhead missiles based at sea, where the U.S. enjoys a substantial lead.... It's forever tempting for the parties to try to correct possible shortcomings or gain marginal advantages late in a negotiation. But to do that now puts Start 1 in needless jeopardy. Bush and Gorbachev had the right idea months ago: to lock in this agreement and begin reducing forces."

(New York Times, 4/12)

U.S. Opens Door A Crack On Realistic Strategic-Arms Cuts -- "...If we could eliminate all land-based MIRVs by accepting some limits on submarine-launched missiles, it would be a safer world -- and, not that it matters, there'd still be roles for Navy and Air Force. President Bush ought to bang heads and get this rolling. As Paul Nitze says, it makes the START I niggling look like kid stuff. MIRVs are ideal first-strike weapons.... Getting rid of them will be costly. In a less than perfect world, we'll need to replace them with single-warhead mobile Midgetmen and build smaller subs so our reduced D-5 force can be dispersed. With all the other defense cuts now possible, that's an affordable bargain."

(Jim Fain, Atlanta Journal and Constitution, 4/11)

The Summit's Set -- Scheduling Bush-Gorbachev Meeting A Hopeful Sign -- "The scheduling...of a Washington summit meeting between President Bush and Soviet President Gorbachev indicates U.S. optimism that the Lithuanian secession crisis can be resolved peacefully. The Bush Administration is banking on the Soviet leader's desire for a continued warming in East-West relations. There is, in fact, much at stake for both superpowers in keeping summitry alive and well.... If the Kremlin uses force to keep the republics in the Soviet fold, we can postpone or cancel the summit.... Barring a disruption of plans, the upcoming Bush-Gorbachev summit will be their second.... Even without a START pact, there is still other business to transact. Whether it is or not could well depend on how much restraint Gorbachev exercises in dealing with the Baltic crisis." (Houston Post, 4/7)

A Summit In Springtime -- "...For Gorbachev, the road to the U.S. runs through Lithuania. The use of Soviet force there over the next seven weeks could scotch the summit and set back U.S.-Soviet relations for some time to come.... Even with Soviet tanks rolling through Vilnius, the Bush Administration was correct in pressing ahead with the summit. The U.S. has as great an interest in the agenda items as the Soviets. The Administration has made itself clear on the matter of Lithuanian independence.... As Secretary Baker said...after meeting with Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze, 'This is a very, very important matter.' It should be, and the Bush Administration has now given Gorbachev and the Soviets even more reason for realizing this. And acting accordingly in Lithuania. between HR 3 and the companion Senate bill (S 5), which passed last year.

- The Senate passed legislation (HR 7) to reauthorize vocational education programs for five years. The bill now goes to conference with the House, which approved its version of the measure last May.

- The House and Senate Agriculture committees have begun marking up a multiyear measure to renew the nation's farm programs. The bill, which comes up for renewal every four or five years, is a top priority this year.

- Three House committees — Education, Energy and Public Works — have approved legislation (HR 2273) to extend

anti-discrimination protections to the disabled.

Only the House Judiciary Committee remains to be heard from before the bill, known as the Americans with Disabilities Act, can go to the House floor. The Senate passed a similar bill (S 933) last year.

- The House Energy Committee gave approval to two bills (HR 3656, HR 3657) that would give the Securities and Exchange Commission more authority to regulate the securities markets and to restrict program trading and other practices that could exacerbate volatile market conditions.

Voting Participation

Both chambers have maintained

record or near-record voting participation scores.

In 57 Senate roll-call votes, the average participation was 97.3 percent, only slightly below the 97.8 percent record set last year.

Average House participation in the first 63 roll-call votes was 95.2 percent, higher than the record of 94 percent set in 1985 and tied last year.

The high scores in the Senate are due, in some measure, to Majority Leader George J. Mitchell's scheduling ability. The Maine Democrat has gone out of his way to avoid votes at inconvenient times. No roll-call votes have been held on a Monday or a Friday this year. In fact, the Senate has been in session on just six Mondays and three Fridays. ■

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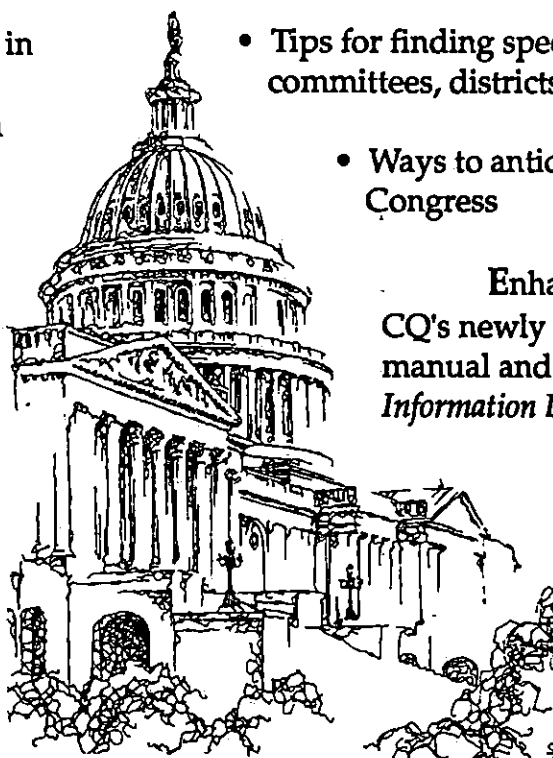

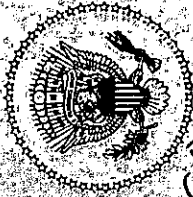

AFGHANISTAN (Islamabad/UPI) -- The pro-Soviet Afghan government has dispatched a massive convoy carrying weapons and food to its troops fighting rebels in southern Afghanistan, Western diplomatic sources said. They said the convoy of about 150 tanks and 1,000 trucks left the western air base of Shindand during the weekend for Kandahar, 270 miles southwest of Kabul and one of Afghan's largest cities. Fierce fighting has been reported in Kandahar Province in the past few weeks between troops and guerrillas.

In another development, the sources said Afghan authorities have detained the chairman of the Afghan Academy of Sciences, the chairman of Kabul University and the police chiefs of the eastern cities of Jalalabad and Khost in connection with last month's coup attempt. The sources, quoting diplomatic sources, said the authorities have also begun detaining friends and relatives of the leaders of the revolt.

NICARAGUA (Managua/Reuter) -- A delegation of Contra rebels arrived in Managua for talks with President-elect Chamorro and called for the demilitarization of Nicaragua. "We want the demilitarization of the country, that is the mandate of the popular vote," Oscar Sovalbarro told reporters at Managua's Augusto Cesar Sandino airport.

CUBA/RADIO JAMMING (Havana/Reuter) -- Cuba began jamming Radio Marti. An official statement said the radio was "an instrument of psychological war and disinformation" aimed at overthrowing communist rule in Cuba. The statement said Cuba's electronic defense systems began a five-hour period of tests early today to jam Radio Marti, initially in the Havana area.

UNESCO (Reuter) -- The U.S. will stay out of UNESCO because of the same poor management and political bias that prompted Washington to leave the organization in 1984, the State Department said. "It is obvious that the time is not yet ripe to reopen the question of renewing United States membership in UNESCO," the department said in a report to Congress on U.S. involvement with UNESCO.

DRUG PROBE/BANKS (AP) -- The Justice Department sought records of 754 U.S. bank accounts that it says once contained \$400 million in illegal drug profits amassed by Colombian drug lords. The department asked federal judges in Atlanta, New York and Miami to direct 173 banks in 23 states to produce records of the accounts. Prosecutors also sought to freeze 684 accounts, which they said were linked to Eduardo Martinez Romero, who was extradited last September from Colombia to face charges of laundering money for he Medellin cartel. Attorney General Thornburgh said in a statement that the action was the fourth phase in the Justice Department's longrunning Operation Polar Cap investigation of Colombian cocaine trafficking in this country.

REV. ABERNATHY DIES (Atlanta/UPI) -- The Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, who fought for civil rights alongside his friend Martin Luther King Jr. during the 1960s, died in a hospital at the age of 64. Abernathy entered the hospital March 23 for what doctors called a "low sodium condition." He had been treated for strokes in the past, family members said.

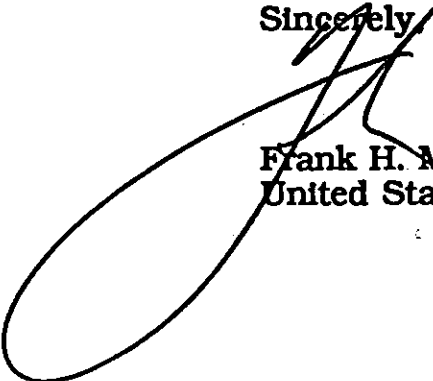

Dear Mr. President:

I appreciate the opportunity to meet with you today, to discuss my Delegation's trip to the Middle East. We visited five countries -- Syria, Egypt, Jordan, Iraq and Israel. In each country, we met with the head of government and other leaders, and -- without exception -- had wide-ranging, candid and useful exchanges.

We intend to raise a number of matters with you today, but in this letter I wanted to pinpoint three personal impressions I feel are among the most interesting from our trip.

As you know, we adjusted our itinerary on short notice to add a stop in Iraq. Our meeting with President Hussein -- which lasted nearly three hours -- covered all of the urgent matters in U.S.-Iraqi relations. We pulled no punches in outlining our concerns, and presented him a letter outlining them -- so there could be no misunderstanding (copy of letter enclosed). Hussein was equally frank in stating his views.

Hussein was somewhat responsive to the issues we raised. But in the short time we spent with him, he continued to put great emphasis on Iraq's military strength and ability to deal with issues through military options. He persisted in being loud and clear in his sharp criticism of the State of Israel.

Among the things Hussein said, one in particular struck me as potentially important.

No matter how wrong he may be, Hussein appears to be driven in part by a genuine conviction that there is a U.S.-British-Israeli conspiracy to discredit Iraq and undermine his leadership. When we passed on to him your reaffirmation, from the phone conversation we had with you while we were in Amman, that our Government was not engaged in any such cabal, though, his response was immediate: "That [i.e., your word] is sufficient for me."

It struck me that his declaration might offer an opening to explore privately with Hussein some stand-down in current tensions. I should note that we have purposely avoided any discussion in public of this point from our discussion with Hussein, to preserve the option for you to make a totally private response to him.

In sum, I don't think any of us are inclined to "buy" much of what Hussein said, but I was struck by his willingness to engage in "no holds barred" exchanges. I hope you will agree with my assessment that we ought to pursue a continuation of such exchanges.

A second matter I want to bring to your particular attention is my assessment that the political stalemate in Israel over the formation of a new government is damaging the peace process and, potentially, Israel's regional and international standing.

We met with Shamir, Arens, Peres and Rabin -- and found none of them confident about how or when the current stalemate will be resolved. Peres, in particular, was impressive in his determination and eloquence, but even he offered no real optimism that there will be a stable, effective government in Israel any time soon.

All of us, I think, believe that, as President Mubarak said to us, there is a "window of opportunity" to make progress in the peace process. If that "window" closes before the involved parties take advantage of it, it would be a tragedy. And if the burden of responsibility for that failure falls on Israel, it will significantly damage its international standing and -- perhaps even more important -- undermine its credibility with Mubarak, moderate Arabs and Palestinians, and others who would like to see the peace process move forward. That, in turn, could seriously undermine the prospects for renewing the peace process later, when Israel finally has a government in place.

Obviously, our ability to do anything about this is limited. But it does underscore the importance of all of us speaking with one voice in urging the Israelis to "get their act together," and in the meantime avoiding any actions which complicate the problems that Israel's leaders face.

Finally, I want to note one particular point from a meeting with ten West Bank and Gaza Palestinian leaders,

arranged for us by our Consulate General in Jerusalem. I was struck by the openness of these prominent Palestinians in acknowledging Palestinian responsibility for past terrorism, and their admission that utilizing such tactics had been wrong and, on top of that, counter-productive even from the Palestinian standpoint.

They stuck to their existing line -- that the PLO must ultimately speak for Palestinians in negotiations, either directly or by selecting the delegates to any peace talks, rather than allowing their selection through elections. They asserted, though, that the Palestinian political leadership, including Arafat, has made what they termed a "quantum leap" in the strategy, and that they are genuinely committed to trying to reach a negotiated settlement with Israel, through the mechanism of the Baker Plan. They also cautioned, though, that there is a large segment of the Palestinian public -- which one of them estimated at 30% -- which continues to advocate confrontation, violence and terrorism. Unless their negotiating approach bears fruit in the near future, they concluded, the extremists would grow stronger, and the prospects for a peaceful settlement deteriorate.

As with Hussein, the words of these Palestinians cannot be taken on good faith alone. But they appeared genuine, both in the description of their strategy and the internal machinations of the Palestinian movement. Particularly in the latter regard, what they said seems to make sense -- if "moderates" cannot show results through negotiations, "extremists" will be strengthened.

All that underscores again how important it is that we test all parties through aggressive pursuit of the Baker plan, and other opportunities for advancing the peace process bilaterally and multilaterally.

One other matter concerning Arafat deserves mention and requires follow-up. Prime Minister Shamir gave us a news report of a speech that Arafat reportedly recently gave to his followers, ordering them to "open fire on the new Jewish immigrants, whether they are Russians or Falashas....I present to you my orders to use violence against the immigrants, and whoever fails I will put him in prison." Our Ambassador in Israel, Ambassador Brown, subsequently showed us a cable raising question about the authenticity or reliability of the report of such a speech, but clearly this

matter needs to be further explored, as part of our continuing examination of Arafat's true feelings and intentions.

Mr. President, I hope these observations -- and those we will pass along in our meeting today -- will be of help to you as you grapple with the critical and complex problems of American security interests in the Middle East.

Dear Mr. President:

We appreciate your willingness to receive us during your holy month of Ramadan, particularly on such short notice.

We come to Baghdad, as a bipartisan delegation of the United States Senate, because of our belief that Iraq plays a key role in the Middle East. We would also like to see improved bilateral relations between our nations.

It is clear to us that we can never resolve the serious differences between our nations if we ignore them, or fail to take advantage of opportunities to communicate with each other clearly and candidly. For that reason, we believe it is important that you hear our very deep concerns about certain policies and activities of your Government, which stand as a major barrier to improved relations.

Your nation has just emerged from a long and costly war, which has generated concerns about your own security. But we cannot stress too firmly our conviction that your efforts to develop a nuclear, chemical and biological capability seriously jeopardize -- rather than enhance -- your security, potentially threaten other nations of the region, and provoke dangerous tensions throughout the Middle East. Your recent statements threatening to use chemical weapons against Israel have created anxiety among nations throughout the world. In your own interest and in the interest of peace in the Middle East, we urge you to reconsider pursuit of these dangerous programs and provocative assertions.

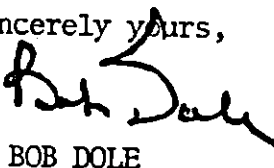
We must also express our profound distress at the alleged activities which led to the expulsion of an official of your diplomatic mission in the United States on charges that he was involved in a conspiracy to murder. We repeat: if our two nations are to have better relations, such activities as those alleged to have occurred must never happen again.

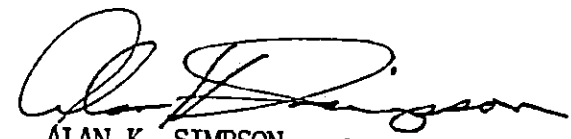
Finally, we urge you to become actively and constructively engaged in the peace process now underway involving Egypt, Israel, representatives of the Palestinian people, and the United States.

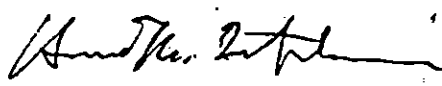

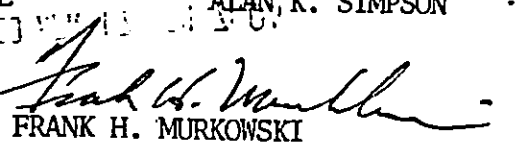

The Times said this was a signal from Bush that the days of deliberate White House hostility to Labor could be over.

Bush told The Times in an interview that in the event of a future Labor government, "If we do have a special relationship, it will continue, I'm sure."

Asked about President Reagan's cold, brief reception of Labor Party leader Kinnock in the past, Bush said that when "the opposition leaders come here, we will see them. That's the way it should be." (Reuter)

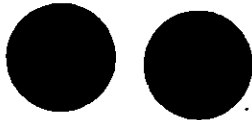

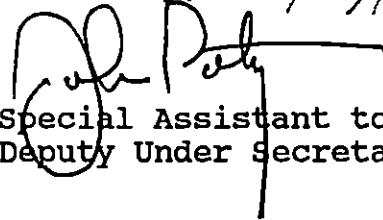

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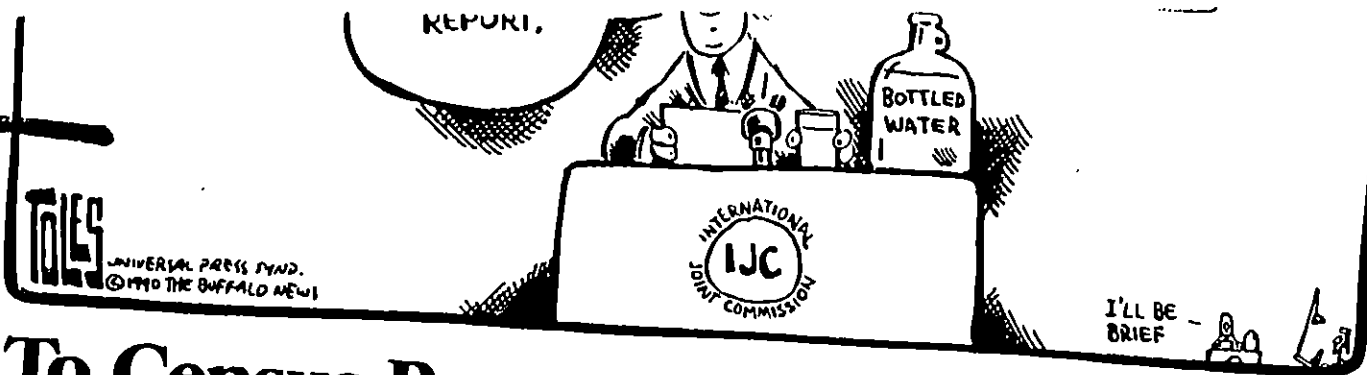
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To Census Bureau, she doesn't count

Any time some worthy government project starts off with a couple of dozen people threatening to sue if it moves, you have to feel sorry for those running the show. Thus it was with our census.

Even before it started, the mayor and chief executives and corporation counselors of several big U.S. cities said they were going to sue the Census Bureau because it was going to find enough people within their borders. No sense waiting for the count.

The Census Bureau has a problem. It can't blame the post office for snafus, because men would get angry and stop delivering the forms altogether. It can't blame the people for not sending their forms in, or the people will get angry and not send the forms in at all.

The Census Bureau just has to jolly the folks along, flattering them about what good citizens they are, how important the census is, reminding them of all the federal loot it will bring to their hometowns, and how they can be absolutely honest with the Census Bureau, which would never in a million years share any of its information with the Immigration Bureau or the Internal Revenue Bureau or the FBI. Trust me.

For a multitude of reasons, about 40 percent of the people haven't sent the forms back. The Census Bureau says it will need an additional \$50 million or \$150 million to hire more people to track folks down. Two days later, she got a form. It was the wrong form. It said someone would come visit her to take her census. A week later she got a phone call. "Have you gotten your form?"

"No."

Intolerant of a first lady's traditional choice

If she hadn't been married to this guy who happens to be president, we never would have heard of her. — Susana Cardenas, Wellesley senior.

Washington — One hundred-fifty seniors at Wellesley College, who in about a month will have learned just about everything there is to know, signed a petition to protest Barbara Bush as their commencement speaker. The White House defended the first lady with as much hyperbole as chivalry: "If they withdraw the invitation, they will miss the opportunity to meet one of the most extraordinarily independent and influential women of our time," said the president's press secretary.

Agreed, said Nannerl Keohane, president of Wellesley, one of the original Seven Sisters (which still admits not even one brother). Girls will be girls: "Every year, we have students who don't like the choice of speaker, and every year somebody signs a petition."

Columnist Ellen Goodman describes the controversy as a senior identity crisis, "more anxiety than disrespect." The young women are only asking themselves whether their ambitions risk being curtailed and compromised, too.

SOME COMPROMISE. Of course, everybody's right, in a way, since the first lady is extraordinarily influen-

tial, and protesting graduation speakers is a campus fashion. Even high-achievement seniors are nervous over their future and the protest is the last they'll make under the protection of Daddy's money.

But there's something more dispiriting at work here, and that's "arrogance" and "intolerance" on the campuses of the elite toward ideas that don't fit into a narrow agenda of programmed radicalism.

The radical-camp politics of feminism denigrate the choice of motherhood as a worthy endeavor, and these young women who have not yet accomplished anything off campus are as intolerant of the traditional choices of women as they are of the history they're trying to challenge — the history of educated women in a time of few choices of any kind.

Some, probably a lot, of these protesters got to Wellesley in the first place because a woman stayed home to devote herself to rearing a daughter to go to Wellesley.

FORGET FOR a moment that Barbara Bush is first lady. She speaks eloquently about the joys and trials of rearing a large family with a man she admires and respects. She jokes that she's a role model for the "fat, white-haired, wrinkled ladies," but everyone feels the quiet pride she takes in "being there" for her children and grandchildren.

She's earthy and authentic, and she's a different kind of woman from the last three Wellesley commencement speakers — Susan Estrich, manager of the disastrous Dukakis campaign; Gloria Steinem, career feminist; and Elizabeth Dole, the secretary of labor. Doesn't it take all kinds?

The controversy over Barbara Bush also revives a much older con-

cern over the ambiguous role of first lady. How we judge the president's wife tells us as much about ourselves as about the woman who becomes first lady. Betty Ford, Rosalynn Carter and Nancy Reagan were all criticized for being outspoken on issues they were not elected to influence.

BARBARA BUSH suggests the return to the traditional Bess Truman image — standing quietly beside the president, keeping her own counsel, running the house without trying to run the country.

Although the noisy apprentice feminists at Wellesley do not claim her as one of their own, and radical feminists are not comfortable with her, Barbara Bush actually personifies the kind of woman now being held up as a model by professors of "women's studies."

"I want to celebrate the little things in women's lives ... the small nurturing things that women do," says Lynda Bundtzen, professor of English and the chairman of the women's studies program at Williams College. Barbara Bush, who reared a large family, moving 29 times in 44 years, always following her husband's lead, could probably tell the professor a thing or two about the value of some of the small nurturing things that women do.

A defense of Mrs. Bush

WASHINGTON - Barbara Bush's record of influence and independent achievement was vigorously defended yesterday by the White House against charges by a group of Wellesley College students that her only qualification to be this year's commencement speaker was the political success of her husband.

"It seems to me that a truly edu-

cated person would be able to recognize achievement whether in a classroom or in or out of a marriage," said the White House spokesman, Marlin Fitzwater. "If they withdraw the invitation, they will miss the opportunity to meet one of the most extraordinarily independent and influential women of our time. It would be extraordinarily shortsighted."

The president of Wellesley, Nanerl Keohane, said the college had

no intention of withdrawing the June commencement invitation, which Bush has accepted, saying the protesting students did not ask that the invitation be withdrawn.

"Every year, we have students who don't like the choice of speaker, and every year somebody signs a petition," Keohane said. "This is not unprecedented. They weren't proposing we disinvite Mrs. Bush. They were not proposing to picket her. They were saying in future we should invite those people who have made achievements on their own, not through a spouse."

Anna Perez, Bush's spokeswoman, had no comment on the scheduled Wellesley speech, except to say Bush was "looking forward to it."

Wellesley senior Susana Cardenas, spokeswoman for 150 seniors who signed a petition last month protesting the selection of Bush, said she was disappointed by the college's response.

"Unfortunately, nothing is being done," said Cardenas, a native of Lima, Peru. "Basically, they're say-

ing they're glad we're not being quiet, but that they won't do anything about our complaints."

There are about 600 students in this year's senior class.

In a statement presented to Keohane three weeks ago, the dissenting students said they were "outraged by this choice," saying they believe Bush does not represent the type of woman Wellesley seeks to educate.

"Wellesley teaches that we will be rewarded on the basis of our own merit, not on that of a spouse," the petition read. "To honor Barbara Bush as a commencement speaker is to honor a woman who has gained recognition thorough the achievements of her husband, which contradicts what we have been taught over the last four years at Wellesley."

Bush dropped out of Smith College after two years to marry George Bush. She never has held a paying job or sought a professional career, although she has been involved in scores of charities and fund-raising activities for nonprofit organizations.

"Regardless of her political affiliation, we feel that she does not suc-

nized that withdrawing the invitation would be "discourteous," and asked the school to include in the commencement program an additional speaker "who would more aptly reflect the self-affirming qualities of a Wellesley graduate."

Keohane, who met with the dissenting students, said the program already includes a student speaker "who can speak to whatever values she thinks are important."

Keohane, citing Bush's "great strength as a volunteer," rejected the petitioners' complaint that Bush has done little in her own right.

"I reminded the students we don't educate women just to go out to have paid careers," Keohane said.

Bush was the second choice to speak at Wellesley in voting last year among members of the class of 1990. The first choice, Alice Walker, declined the invitation to address the class for personal reasons.

Keohane said Walker, author of the novel "The Color Purple," and Bush were "very close" in the number of votes they received.

Students were asked to choose 10 from a list of 76 men and women, including novelist Toni Morrison, actresses Whoopi Goldberg and Glenn Close, newscaster Connie Chung, astronaut Sally Ride, associate Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, Democratic Rep. Pat Schroeder of Colorado, and United Nations Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar.

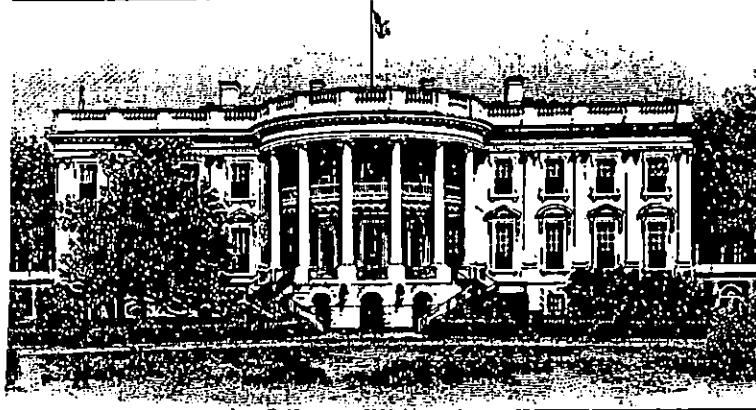
Cardenas said dissenters objected to the selection process, saying only about two-thirds of the class was polled. She recommended a greater effort to involve all class members, a shorter list from which to decide, and a second vote if the first choice is unavailable as speaker.

Environmental President Not Recycling, Sierra S White House Makes the 'Slimy Se

President Bush isn't doing a very good job of taking out the trash.

At least, that's the view of the local Sierra Club, which yesterday put the White House, Bush's not so humble home, on its "Slimy Seven" list of federal agencies it said are making no effort to comply with the District's recycling law.

Does that mean George and Barbara Bush have to separate their newspapers and office paper waste like the rest of us?

Yes, said Dick O'Connor, chairman of the Sierra Club's Rock Creek Group.

"This environmental president should take the first steps to comply with the law—and he can take those steps right in his own house," O'Connor said.

At a news conference timed to coincide with the upcoming Earth Day, the Sierra Club chided—and threatened to sue—the White House and six other federal offices for failure to comply with the D.C. law, which took effect Oct. 1.

said, refused to answer his group's freedom-of-information request. Defense Department officials told the Sierra Club the District's recycling law does not apply to them. It does, according to legal authorities, but only at federal facilities in the District.

Stephen Hart, Bush's deputy press secretary, said the White House has to destroy much of its office waste—by burning or shredding it.

He said the executive branch is still discussing how best to dispose of office paper and does have "some recycling strategies under consideration."

O'Connor said his group, as required by law, is giving the agencies a 60-day warning and then intends to file suit in federal court if the recycling recalcitrants are still not complying with the law.

The District government, O'Connor said, is getting the same 60-day warning before the club files suit against it in D.C. Superior Court.

Group members and Charlie Wilburn, representing the United Haulers Association, said they were upset about the city's failure to recycle the yard waste and newspapers it began collecting from residents Oct. 1 and its postponement of a recycling program for cans and bottles, once set to start April 1.

The District should be recycling the newspapers and yard waste even if it has to pay recycling vendors, they said.

The group said the city has no excuse for postponing the collection of cans and bottles because a recycling market does exist for these items.

Wilburn complained that small haulers such as himself are being charged a \$5-a-ton fee—out of the \$25.25 a ton it cost to dump at the city's Lorton landfill—to help support the recycling program.

But the haulers, he said, have yet to see the drop-off and buyback cen-

LITHUANIA (Moscow/Reuter) -- The Soviet Union has launched economic sanctions against Lithuania by reducing supplies of natural gas, the speaker of parliament said. He told the assembly Soviet authorities had announced in a telegram they were "sharply reducing" gas supplies -- the Kremlin's first clear move to implement economic sanctions.

Speaker Aleksandras Abisalas read parliament a telegram from the acting director of the Soviet Western gas region which was addressed to the general director of Lithuanian Gas. The telegram said: "Implementing the orders of the government of the USSR and those of the state gas concern...supplies of natural gas to the Lithuanian SSR will be sharply reduced from April 17 of the current year."

The parliament discussed a draft telegram to Moscow, saying the Lithuanian government saw no reason to "justify a worsening of economic relations, all the more so that this would not affect Lithuania alone."

LITHUANIA/WHITE HOUSE (UPI) -- President Bush warned the Soviet Union that the U.S. is considering "appropriate responses" if the threats of an economic embargo against Lithuania are implemented. Bush made the remarks during a picture-taking session at the start of a working visit with Honduran President Callejas in the Oval Office. Reading from notes, Bush told reporters, "Obviously we're watching the situation very, very closely and we're waiting to see if the Soviets' announcements are implemented."

CLIMATE/PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS (AP) -- President Bush told an international conference on global warming that more study is needed into the causes of climate changes, saying "What we need are facts." Critics criticized the president's go-slow approach.

The president, receiving only polite applause at the beginning and end of his address, told delegates to the conference: "Environmental policies that ignore the economic factor, the human factor, are destined to failure." Bush repeatedly emphasized the link between environmental consequences and economic costs. "All of us must be certain we preserve our environmental well-being and our economic welfare," Bush said. He called these "two sides of the same coin."

CONSUMER PRICES (Reuter) -- A rise in the cost of housing and clothing in March helped push the CPI up 0.5%, matching its February gain, the Labor Department said. The core rate of inflation, considered by many economists a more reliable price indicator since it excludes the volatile food and energy figures, climbed 0.7%. This unexpectedly sharp climb in retail inflation further arms the Fed in its determination to stick to its tight monetary policy, economists said.

HOUSING STARTS (AP) -- Housing starts fell 9.3% in March, their second consecutive monthly drop and the steepest in more than a year, as the pace returned to late 1989 levels after spurring during unusually warm weather in January and February, the Commerce Department said.

TRADE/JAPAN (Tokyo/AP) -- Japan need not abandon its farmers for the sake of opening up world trade, but it should end protection for specific crops, a U.S. official said. Proposals made by Washington at trade talks on agricultural products would permit nations to help their farmers, Undersecretary of Agriculture Richard Crowder told reporters.

PHILIPPINES (Manila/Reuters) -- U.S. ambassador to the Philippines Nicholas Platt said it would be unwise to dismantle American bases in the Philippines because of political change in Eastern Europe. "While we welcome the changes and are glad to see the end of the cold war, we think it's premature to dismantle the entire structure that brought about and protected world peace," Platt said in a speech to Manila businessmen.

Philippine Foreign Secretary Raul Manglapus told reporters today that failure by the U.S. Congress to restore \$96 million it had cut from an annual aid pledge of \$481 million "would weigh very heavily" on Manila's decision on whether to extend the bases agreement.

LEBANON (Beirut/UPI) -- Violence caused by power struggles among rival Christian and Moslem forces engulfed both sectors of Beirut, killing 10 and wounding 30, police said. Using anti-armor rockets and automatic arms, hundreds of pro-Syrian Shiite Amal gunmen and Hezbollah militants fought for more than seven hours, paralyzing most businesses and shutting schools in Syrian-policed west Beirut, police said.

ARAFAT (Amman/Reuters) -- PLO chairman Arafat said some American officials were backing Israeli hardliners and shared blame for Israel's political deadlock. "What happened in Israel was made up by some circles in the American administration who want Yitzhak Shamir and not Shimon Peres," Arafat told reporters.

SUPREME COURT/RELIGION/DRUGS (UPI) -- The Supreme Court ruled the religious use of drugs is not protected by the First Amendment's guarantee of freedom of religion. The court's 6-3 ruling came in a case from Oregon involving two American Indian drug abuse counselors fired for use of peyote, who then sought unemployment benefits. The court, in a ruling by Justice Scalia, rejected the former counselors' argument, but it said the Constitution does not bar states from granting such protections if they wish.

BARNEY FRANK (Newton, Mass./UPI) -- Rep. Frank announced he will run for re-election even though the House ethics committee has yet to rule on its investigation into his hiring a male prostitute. "After consultation with friends and supporters, I have concluded that I will run for re-election," Frank said in a statement.

AFGHANISTAN (Islamabad/UPI) -- The pro-Soviet Afghan government has dispatched a massive convoy carrying weapons and food to its troops fighting rebels in southern Afghanistan, Western diplomatic sources said. They said the convoy of about 150 tanks and 1,000 trucks left the western air base of Shindand during the weekend for Kandahar, 270 miles southwest of Kabul and one of Afghan's largest cities. Fierce fighting has been reported in Kandahar Province in the past few weeks between troops and guerrillas.

In another development, the sources said Afghan authorities have detained the chairman of the Afghan Academy of Sciences, the chairman of Kabul University and the police chiefs of the eastern cities of Jalalabad and Khost in connection with last month's coup attempt. The sources, quoting diplomatic sources, said the authorities have also begun detaining friends and relatives of the leaders of the revolt.

NICARAGUA (Managua/Reuter) -- A delegation of Contra rebels arrived in Managua for talks with President-elect Chamorro and called for the demilitarization of Nicaragua. "We want the demilitarization of the country, that is the mandate of the popular vote," Oscar Sovalbarro told reporters at Managua's Augusto Cesar Sandino airport.

CUBA/RADIO JAMMING (Havana/Reuter) -- Cuba began jamming Radio Marti. An official statement said the radio was "an instrument of psychological war and disinformation" aimed at overthrowing communist rule in Cuba. The statement said Cuba's electronic defense systems began a five-hour period of tests early today to jam Radio Marti, initially in the Havana area.

UNESCO (Reuter) -- The U.S. will stay out of UNESCO because of the same poor management and political bias that prompted Washington to leave the organization in 1984, the State Department said. "It is obvious that the time is not yet ripe to reopen the question of renewing United States membership in UNESCO," the department said in a report to Congress on U.S. involvement with UNESCO.

DRUG PROBE/BANKS (AP) -- The Justice Department sought records of 754 U.S. bank accounts that it says once contained \$400 million in illegal drug profits amassed by Colombian drug lords. The department asked federal judges in Atlanta, New York and Miami to direct 173 banks in 23 states to produce records of the accounts. Prosecutors also sought to freeze 684 accounts, which they said were linked to Eduardo Martinez Romero, who was extradited last September from Colombia to face charges of laundering money for the Medellin cartel. Attorney General Thornburgh said in a statement that the action was the fourth phase in the Justice Department's longrunning Operation Polar Cap investigation of Colombian cocaine trafficking in this country.

REV. ABERNATHY DIES (Atlanta/UPI) -- The Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, who fought for civil rights alongside his friend Martin Luther King Jr. during the 1960s, died in a hospital at the age of 64. Abernathy entered the hospital March 23 for what doctors called a "low sodium condition." He had been treated for strokes in the past, family members said.

THE PRESIDENT: Let me say that I understand Marlin has waived my speaking -- prohibitions on saying anything at photo opportunities. But inasmuch as a lot of questions have been asked of our Press Office regarding Lithuania I asked dispensation from our esteemed guest from Honduras, with whom I'm looking forward to visiting. And I told him if it's agreeable we would just make a brief statement about Lithuania. He acquiesced in that and was very pleasant about it.

But first, welcome, sir. We're just delighted you're here.

Let me just say on Lithuania -- and this is all I'll say on it right now. Obviously, we are watching the situation very, very closely. And we are waiting to see if the Soviet announcements are implemented. Clearly, those announcements are contrary to the approach that we have urged and that others have urged upon the Soviet Union. We are considering appropriate responses if these threats are implemented.

And I'm going to leave it right there. But we -- I would simply repeat that what we need is dialogue, discussion, and a peaceful resolution of this great difficulty there.

THE PRESIDENT: Mr. President and members of the Honduran delegation, let me again thank you for coming to the White House, all of you. We're very pleased and honored that you're here. And it's been a great and personal pleasure to meet President Callejas in his first official visit to Washington. We met before, but this was his first official visit since taking over as President.

The President is a long-time friend of the United States, dating back to his university days at Mississippi State University. And Vice President Quayle carried our warmest regards in January when he attended the President's historic inauguration -- the first peaceful transfer of power to an opposition party in nearly 60 years. And, indeed, an inspiring example of the democratic promise that today is spreading throughout the Americas.

I remember with great fondness the natural beauty of Honduras and the history of the Honduran people when I visited Tegucigalpa some years ago for the inauguration of your distinguished predecessor.

President Callejas and I shared very friendly and useful talks today on several subjects. We both expressed our appreciation for the stable and constructive relations shared by our two nations. The U.S. applauds Honduras' productive role in achieving a multilateral agreement on the peaceful demobilization and repatriation of the Nicaraguan resistance in conditions of safety for all concerned.

We support this process and will work to ensure humanitarian assistance to those in need in both Nicaragua and Honduras as they return to their homes, their families and their jobs, and play a vital role in helping Nicaragua establish lasting democratic institutions.

The President and I explored our mutual goals for Central America and also for our own bilateral relationship. We agreed on the importance of continuing our close cooperation in the struggle against the scourge of cocaine in our hemisphere. The U.S. remains firmly committed to helping economic development in Honduras. And we fully support President Callejas' bold economic reforms, and we are

Thank you for coming. We wish you Godspeed and success in your continuing talks here over the next two days. Thank you, sir.

PRESIDENT CALLEJAS: Thank you, Mr. President. Ten years ago I came to the White House in company of a military president of Honduras. It was the beginning of a very complicated decade for Central America. Now, we perceive new opportunities. We have concluded in the region by the 25th of April, the election of democratic presidents. And we hope that this next decade will be, in its priority, oriented to economic development and welfare.

Today, with President Bush, we have had a very cordial and fruitful meeting. We had the opportunity to discuss frankly and extensively bilateral and regional issues. I thank President Bush for the support of his administration, for the efforts the Honduran people are doing in order to advance a program of economic reform. It is important that we quite well understand that there's no possibility to have democracy without economic development. And on that means the President assured us of the continued support of the United States for Honduras to recuperate its economic difficulties.

I was very encouraged by the appreciation President Bush has demonstrated for the measures that we have taken. We also discussed the regional situation. We have entered a new era in Central America. We have built upon democracy in the past decade and now we must build an economic recovery. We have high hopes and expectations on the new prospectus of the region. With the assumption of power of Mrs. Chamorro in Nicaragua, a new page has been turned in Central America. And we all will support the efforts that the region demands and needs. This success can only be achieved by continued support of friendly countries like the United States. And in that regard, I hope that the United States will continue to be close to the region in its new era.

I thank you, Mr. President, for your support and for your commitment to continue to give Honduras a helping hand in its effort to create a better place to live for its people. Thank you very much, Mr. President.

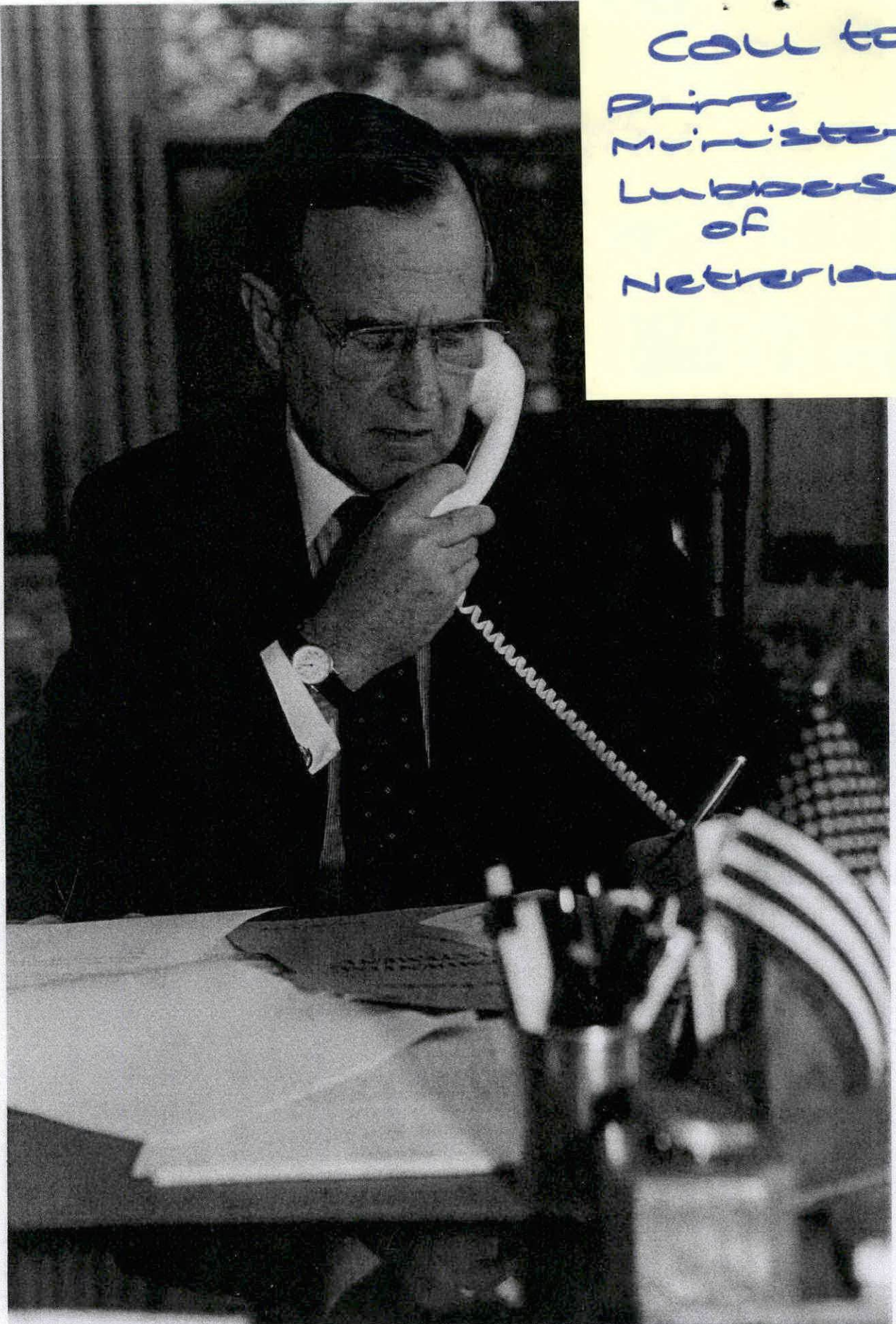


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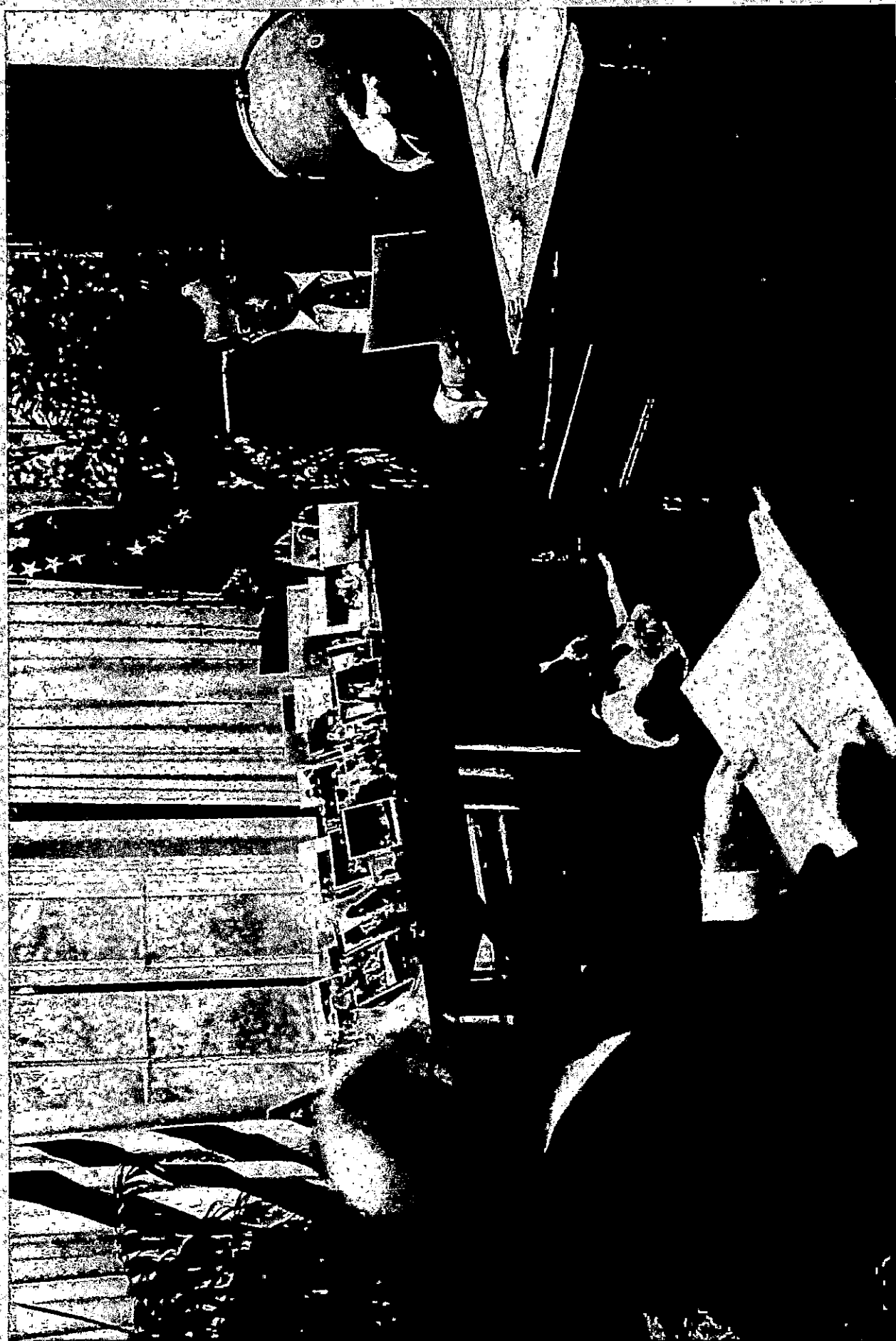
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
