**BUSH, MITTERRAND AGREE TO HOLD A NATO SUMMIT
Changes In Europe To Be Discussed**

KEY LARGO -- President Bush and President Mitterrand agreed here Thursday to hold a summit of leaders of NATO members to discuss the rapidly changing face of Europe.

Mitterrand...said at a joint news conference after their talks that he had suggested the meeting of leaders of the 16-member alliance. U.S. officials later indicated that Bush raised no objection....

Mitterrand also outlined for Bush a joint proposal with Chancellor Kohl that was announced earlier Thursday in Paris...calling for the formation of a new European security structure inside the European Community....

At the news conference, Bush brushed aside questions about whether such an extension of the role of the EC would threaten the predominance of NATO and of U.S. interests on the European security front.

FRANCE, W. GERMANY URGE EUROPEAN UNITY

PARIS -- The leaders of France and West Germany, in a quest for a new European security structure, urged Thursday that the 12-nation European Community forge a political union with common foreign and security policies by 1993.

The initiative, announced simultaneously by President Mitterrand and Chancellor Kohl as Mitterrand left Paris for talks with President Bush, was proposed as a bold European response to the new situation created by imminent German unification and disintegration of the Warsaw Pact....

If carried out, it would create a strong European pole in NATO, balancing off U.S. leadership....

"This is the first time we have seen that, a call to define and put into action a foreign and security policy [for Europe]," a NATO-country diplomat said. (Edward Cody, WASHINGTON POST, A19)

MITTERRAND PUTS U.S. FEARS ON NATO COMMITMENT TO REST

KEY LARGO -- President Mitterrand returned to Paris Friday confident that he dispelled American concern about his country's commitment to NATO.

He appears to have convinced President Bush at talks here Thursday that U.S. interests are not threatened by French plans for Europe to take a more assertive role in its own security.

Bush even hailed Mitterrand's "enlightened long-term vision" about the future shape of the U.S.-led Western alliance and its relations with Europe's own institutions.

"I think that President Mitterrand and I are very close together on the concept of NATO in the future," Bush said at a joint news conference.

The assurance was in striking contrast to the build-up to the informal talks. Unidentified American officials had warned through the French media that the two allies seemed to be drifting apart on their blueprints for the new NATO. (Nicholas Kotch, Reuter)

LITHUANIA MIGHT OFFER COMPROMISE IN MOSCOW TALKS -- BBC

LONDON -- Lithuania might offer to suspend its declaration of independence during informal talks with the Soviet government Friday, the BBC reported.

BBC television's Newsnight program Thursday quoted Lithuanian sources as saying the offer would be made in return for a definite timetable for independence of up to two years.

Interviewed on the same program, a member of the Soviet Communist Party's Central Committee said Moscow would be willing to negotiate a shorter transition time than the five years it has previously set for allowing secession.

"I am sure that can be negotiated. No doubt about that," said Alex Bebedev, the committee's deputy head of ideology. (Reuter)

SOVIETS BLAME VILNIUS FOR ENERGY CLAMPDOWN
Gorbachev Warns Estonians, Latvians

MOSCOW -- The Kremlin formally announced Thursday that it had cut supplies of oil and gas to Lithuania, accusing the rebel Baltic republic of ignoring an ultimatum by Soviet leader Gorbachev to reverse its moves toward independence.

The Soviet president summoned the leaders of Estonia and Latvia...to Moscow to warn them that they could face similar sanctions if they went ahead with unilateral measures to reassert their prewar independence. He demanded that Estonia abrogate a new law suspending the operation of Soviet legislation on Estonian territory.

The partial economic blockade of Lithuania began late Wednesday night.... Thursday the Kremlin tightened the noose by reducing supplies of natural gas more than 80 percent, leaving only enough for domestic use.

The Lithuanian authorities immediately imposed a series of draconian energy-saving measures.... In a statement after the oil embargo went into force, President Landsbergis accused the Soviet Union of resorting to "economic coercion and economic warfare" against a neighboring country. But he also described the decision as a recognition by the Kremlin of Lithuanian independence.

In Key Largo, President Bush said, "I am greatly concerned by this escalation in terms of using energy to push Lithuanians into line."

Gorbachev Unleashes Wrath On Baltic States

MOSCOW -- President Gorbachev slashed fuel supplies to rebel Lithuania Thursday, demanded that Estonia revoke its own independence declaration and warned Latvia not to follow the example of its Baltic neighbors.

But Lithuanian President Landsbergis said his breakaway republic would hold out indefinitely. "Lithuania can hold out for 100 years without gas and oil," Landsbergis told a French TV interviewer. "It can survive."

Bush Says U.S. Not Ready To Use Sanctions Over Lithuania

KEY LARGO -- President Bush said Thursday that while he was concerned about the escalation of tensions between the Soviet Union and Lithuania, he was not ready to carry through on his previous warning of imposing sanctions against the Soviet Union.

After a day-long meeting here with President Mitterrand... Bush told reporters he had begun consultations with all allied leaders to discuss responses to the Soviet activities in Lithuania.

Bush said the U.S. had yet to be able to confirm the assertion by Lithuanian leaders on Wednesday that the Soviets shut off oil supplies to the republic's only oil refinery. However, after those Wednesday reports, Bush said Secretary Baker telephoned the Soviet foreign minister, Eduard Shevardnadze, to express U.S. dismay with the reported action.

"I am greatly concerned by this escalation in terms of using energy to push the Lithuanians into line," Bush said. "But I am not concerned that there is any miscommunication or a gap of misunderstanding between the Soviets and the U.S. on this particular point."

Bush's remarks at an outdoor news conference here suggested that while his patience is wearing thin with the Soviet steps in Lithuania, he is still unwilling to order any precipitous response out of concern that it could jeopardize the thaw in relations between the U.S. and the Soviet Union.

Bush Says Lithuania Response Affects Many Countries

KEY LARGO -- President Bush says his reluctance to punish Moscow for its economic intimidation campaign against Lithuania is partly due to concern that such action would jeopardize progress on other issues.

"My reluctance stems from trying to keep open a dialogue and discussion that affects many, many countries," Bush said Thursday at a seaside news conference with President Mitterrand.

"I'm talking about solidifying the democracies in Eastern Europe. I'm talking about a lot of matters where U.S.-Soviet relations affect a lot of other countries," Bush said in an apparent signal that the U.S. has higher policy priorities than Lithuanian independence.

But Bush also said there were limits Moscow should not cross in its dealings with Lithuania. (Michael Gelb, Reuter)

'There Are Limits' To U.S. Patience On Lithuania, Bush Says

KEY LARGO -- President Bush is cautioning the Kremlin anew on hardball tactics against Lithuania and defending his refusal to meet terrorists' demand that a U.S. envoy be sent to Syria to secure freedom for a hostage....

The hostage situation and the Lithuanian crisis overshadowed other topics that Bush discussed Thursday in Key Largo with President Mitterrand, who paid a nine-hour visit to the U.S. At a marathon outdoor news conference, Bush said "there are limits" to U.S. patience with Soviet tactics against the rebellious Baltic state of Lithuania, and "I am convinced that Mr. Gorbachev knows that."

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President Warns Gorbachev His Patience Could Wear Thin

KEY LARGO -- President Bush said Thursday he sent word to Mikhail Gorbachev that "there are limits" to his patience over Soviet pressure on Lithuania.

"I am greatly concerned by this escalation in terms of using energy to push the Lithuanians into line," Bush said in a seaside joint news conference with President Mitterrand....

Still refusing to reveal what options he might employ, the President said he had outlined them to Mitterrand. "We have not been able to confirm, oddly, the exact extent of any Soviet crackdown," Bush said in rebuffing a question on how and when the two countries might act. Criticism Of Gorbachev Grows As Lithuania Sanctions Bite

MOSCOW -- President Gorbachev's economic sanctions against rebel Lithuania have begun to have an effect, bringing increased international criticism and threatening to sour U.S.-Soviet relations....

President Bush said he and President Mitterrand were deeply disturbed and the U.S. was considering retaliatory measures. Secretary Baker said promising trade links could be damaged.

Soviet foreign ministry spokesman Vadim Perfiljev complained Thursday of a mounting propaganda campaign in the U.S. and called for a more balanced approach.

"As to all manner of sermons and concealed threats from the United States, they are inadmissible interference in our domestic affairs, which can only complicate the situation and hamper Soviet-American dialogue," he told a news briefing.

SOVIET SPOKESMAN SPEAKS ON LITHUANIA IN BALTIMORE

BALTIMORE -- Soviet spokesman Gennady Gerasimov repeated calls Thursday for Lithuania to reverse its declaration of independence from the Soviet Union and negotiate terms of the split to reduce international tensions.

Gerasimov, who met with reporters before an address at Loyola College, focused on the crisis in the Baltic state. During his speech, he was heckled by some members of the audience....

Speaking to reporters, Gerasimov repeated Soviet contentions that Lithuania's declaration of independence violates international law.... The spokesman said the U.S. and other allies have not acknowledged the split because it is illegal under international law.

"This situation creates tension in international relations," said Gerasimov, adding that it has complicated relations between the Soviet Union and U.S. (Kevin Hall, UPI)

U.S. CAUGHT OFF BASE BY GORBACHEV TACTICS

The White House and the State Department appear to have badly misjudged the lengths to which President Gorbachev would go to keep Lithuania within the fold of the Soviet Union....

By cutting off the majority of oil and gas supplies to Lithuania, brushing aside Washington's warnings, the Soviet leader has made it clear that he values Soviet unity ahead of recent vast improvements in superpower relations.

"I don't think he is paying any attention to us right now," said Marshall Goldman of Harvard University's Russian Research Center. Goldman said he is reluctant to criticize the Administration "because I don't know what I would have done differently." (Warren Strobel, WASHINGTON TIMES, A7)

AMERICAN HOSTAGE RELEASE BY SATURDAY OR SUNDAY -- PAPER

NEW YORK -- Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk al-Shara has expressed confidence that pro-Iranian kidnappers will release an American hostage by Saturday or Sunday, the NEW YORK TIMES reported Friday.

"We have been exerting a great deal of effort with the Iranians to secure the release of the American hostages by Saturday or Sunday," the newspaper quoted the foreign minister as saying.

The paper reported from Damascus that the Syrian official made his prediction after meeting the U.S. ambassador to Syria, Edward Djerejian. It said Djerejian declined to comment on the meeting. (Reuter)

RELEASE OF HOSTAGE IN BEIRUT DELAYED
U.S. Refusal To Dispatch Envoy Cited

DAMASCUS -- Lebanese kidnappers said Thursday night in Beirut that they have postponed freeing an American hostage because of the refusal by the U.S. to dispatch a senior State Department official here to make final arrangements for the release.

Thursday night's announcement, delivered to Western and Arab news organizations in Beirut, appeared to surprise senior Syrian government officials here who had seemed convinced that the release would take place Friday.

Foreign Minister Farouk Charaa, who conferred for more than an hour with U.S. Ambassador Djerijian Thursday night, said after the announcement: "We hope this American hostage will be released either on Saturday or Sunday." ...

"Kelly's failure to respond has so far frustrated the release, which made us postpone this operation until the picture is cleared," the kidnappers said.

BUSH SPURNS CAPTORS' 'DEMANDS'

President Bush said Thursday he decided not to send Assistant Secretary of State Kelly to Damascus as requested by a pro-Iranian group holding American hostages because "the United States does not knuckle under to demands" by such groups.

"The U.S. position is clear -- we do not meet demands," Bush said at a joint news conference with President Mitterrand....

Although Administration officials earlier in the day had suggested that a message from the pro-Iranian group might lead to the release of an American hostage held in Lebanon, Bush took a more pessimistic tone after the group announced it would postpone the release because Kelly had not been sent.

"We've been disappointed before, hopes raised only to have them dashed by excessive speculation," Bush said. He said the U.S. is "not talking to the hostage holders."

"So let me just take this opportunity to repeat what I said when I first became President," Bush said. "Goodwill begets goodwill. And I link that to release of American hostages. We can't have normal relations [with Iran] when hostages are held." Referring to both Iran and Libya, Bush said "a verifiable renunciation of terror is terribly important...if we are to have better relations here." (David Hoffman, WASHINGTON POST, A1)

Bush: U.S. Won't 'Knuckle Under'

A defiant President Bush Thursday defended the Administration's decision not to send senior diplomat John Kelly to Damascus, apparently leading to a radical Moslem group's postponement of the promised release of an American hostage.

"The U.S. is not going to knuckle under to demands," Bush said at a joint news conference in Key Largo with President Mitterrand.

"We have a perfectly capable, accredited diplomat on the scene," he said of U.S. Ambassador to Syria Ed Djerjian....

A senior U.S. official said late Thursday that there has been no reconsideration of the decision not to send Kelly. The official said Islamic Jihad's postponement of the hostage release only reinforces the Administration's view that by dispatching Kelly it would be breaking its pledge not to barter for the captives' release. While the group's demands appear to be a small price, "once you get on that slope, where does it stop?" said the official, insisting on anonymity.

U.S. DISMISSES REPORT LINKING HUSSEIN TO ATTACK ON USS STARK

The U.S. dismissed as groundless Thursday a report that President Hussein ordered the 1987 missile attack by an Iraqi pilot that killed 37 U.S. sailors on the USS Stark.

"We've seen this report and it is without foundation," State Department spokeswoman Tutwiler said at the daily news briefing.

Syndicated columnists Jack Anderson and Dale Van Atta...reported Thursday the strike was not an accident but ordered by Hussein....

The CIA, citing its official policy of not commenting on such reports, referred reporters to the State Department statement.

HOUSE PANEL REBUFFS BUSH, CONDEMNS IRAQ

A House panel, brushing aside Bush Administration objections, approved a measure Thursday condemning Iraq for human rights abuses, including torture and executions.

"I think there is no question that Iraq's human rights record is abysmal," said Rep. Bereuter, a co-sponsor of the non-binding resolution. The resolution cites, among other violations, Iraq's use of chemical weapons against its Kurdish minority in 1988 and persistent repression of all political opposition.

Rep. Yatron...said the State Department told Congress that officials opposed the measure because it referred to Iraq's "consistent pattern of gross violations" of human rights.

The Senate voted Thursday night to restore trade relations with Nicaragua and give many of its exports duty-free status under the Caribbean Basin Initiative.

On a voice vote without dissent, the Senate approved an amendment [offered by Sen. Dodd] lifting the trade sanctions imposed in 1985....

The Senate, also without dissent, approved an amendment urging President Bush to consider calling for extending the duty-free status now enjoyed by the Caribbean and Central American countries to Peru, Colombia and Bolivia.

WOMAN READY TO BE TAPPED AS AMBASSADOR TO NICARAGUA

President Bush is expected to name a female career diplomat as U.S. ambassador to Nicaragua as that country prepares for a new era under President-elect Chamorro, according to informed sources.

The sources said Thursday it is virtually certain the appointment will go to Melissa Wells, currently ambassador to Mozambique. They said the Administration believed a female ambassador could relate better than a man to Chamorro.... They also said the Administration is eager to have more women in key posts.

CONTRAS, SANDINISTAS AGREE TO CEASE-FIRE, DISARMAMENT
Rebels Agree To Disband By June 10

MANAGUA -- The Sandinista government, the U.S.-backed contra rebels and representatives of president-elect Chamorro Thursday reached agreement on an armistice and terms to disarm the rebels that should end nine years of civil war that cost more than 30,000 lives.

The accord set a cease-fire that began at noon, and rebel leaders promised to start turning in their weapons on April 25... The contras also agreed to disband as a fighting force by June 10.

Cease-Fire In Nicaragua But Ortega Says War Not Yet Over

MANAGUA -- Outgoing President Ortega said the threat of war was not over in Nicaragua despite a cease-fire designed to end eight years of fighting between U.S.-backed contra rebels and Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.... Ortega said while the agreements were a major step toward ending the fighting, he remained distrustful of the contras.

"Today we can say we are much closer to peace and moving away from war," Ortega told reporters after meeting U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Aronson. "But war has not yet disappeared and peace is not yet a reality in Nicaragua. War will have disappeared when all the contras are disarmed." (Richard Jacobsen, Reuter)

SECRETARY GENERAL ASKS FOR URGENT ACTION ON DISARMING CONTRAS

U.N. -- U.N. Secretary General Perez asked the Security Council Thursday for urgent approval for U.N. forces to oversee the demobilization of the contras in Nicaragua.

"I need not stress the urgency of this matter, for the members of the council will have noted that the cease-fire has already come into effect," the secretary general said....

"Monitoring the cease-fire and the separation of forces will constitute a further addition to ONUCA's [the U.N. peacekeeping force] mandate and will thus require the approval of the Security Council" the secretary general said. (Reuter)

U.S. CRITICAL OF SHAMIR

The State Department was sharply and openly critical Thursday of Prime Minister Shamir for his reported expansion of Israeli settlements in occupied territory....

Spokeswoman Tutwiler said, "We would oppose such activity."

Without mentioning his name, she continued with the criticism of Shamir....

"It would be disappointing that a leadership that was not prepared to go forward on peace would be prepared to take steps on settlements, which in our view would make it more difficult to develop a meaningful peace process," Tutwiler said.

Ruth Yaron, a spokeswoman for the Israeli Embassy, denied that Shamir was carrying out new settlements policy. "He is a caretaker prime minister," she said, "and is carrying out the policies of the last government, dealing with old settlements which had already been planned for several years." (UPI)

FOUR HOUSE REPUBLICANS CASTIGATE DOLE

Comments On Israeli Matters Draw Fire; Senator Stands Ground

Four House Republican leaders Thursday sharply criticized Sen. Dole for controversial recent comments in which Dole suggested a cut in aid to Israel, accused American Jewish leaders of "selfishness" on the aid issue and spurned a Senate resolution that endorsed Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

But Dole stood his ground in a Senate speech defending his repudiation of [the] nonbinding Senate resolution...and in a testy written response he later sent to the House Republicans.

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U.S. TRIMS ASIA FORCE, WILL WAIT ON MISSILE

The Pentagon responded Thursday to growing congressional pressure for cutting spending by reducing troops in Asia and postponing a missile system in Europe.

Troop strength in Asia will be reduced in the next three years by about 15,000 or 11 percent fewer....

"We see some welcome changes in Soviet policy in the region," Undersecretary of Defense Wolfowitz, who announced the decision, told the Senate Armed Services Committee. "Not as dramatic, perhaps, as events in Eastern Europe, but welcome nonetheless."

NUNN URGES BIGGER CUTS IN MILITARY

Sen. Nunn Thursday called on the Bush Administration to increase reductions in defense spending over the next five years by cutting 100,000 more troops in Europe, withdrawing all battlefield nuclear arms there and scaling back the Navy by two to four aircraft carrier battle groups while putting more ships into the reserves.

Nunn...did not say precisely how much he would cut from Bush's request, but indicated it would be less than the \$11.5 billion that House Democratic leaders have targeted in the budget bill markup.

Nunn: Cut Troops To 75,000, Carriers To 10

Sen. Nunn said Thursday the Pentagon should plan on cutting European troop levels about making do with as few as 10 aircraft carriers.

The influential chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, in a major address laying out his ideas about how U.S. forces should be reorganized in view of the reduced threat, also proposed a greater reliance on reserve forces and suggested informal military cooperation with France....

"Despite the Administration's view that 195,000 U.S. troops in central Europe is a 'floor' below which the United States cannot reduce, that is not the right assumption," said Nunn. "I think we must begin planning for a significantly lower level in the years ahead."

U.S. MAY NOT IMPOSE SANCTIONS AGAINST JAPAN

PUERTO VALLARTA, Mexico -- The U.S. may not impose trade sanctions against Japan this year if the two nations can resolve differences over fair trade practices, U.S. Trade Representative Hills told Japanese officials Thursday.

Hills met privately with Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Nakayama during meetings of the Uruguay Round of trade liberalization talks in Puerto Vallarta.

Foreign ministry spokesman Makoto Yamanaka said the two officials discussed bilateral economic relations as well as other multilateral issues related to the talks on the GATT....

"She understood the concerns of the Japanese side," Yamanaka said. "She hoped that exercise of the Super 301 would not be needed...she did not elaborate."

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LAWMAKERS CRITICIZE TRADE PACT WITH JAPAN

In their first meeting with lawmakers since reaching a broad trade agreement with Japan two weeks ago, Administration negotiators faced sharp questioning Thursday over whether the accord goes far enough to cut the persistent U.S. trade deficit with Tokyo. Representatives from both parties also expressed doubts that Japan will keep its end of the bargain.

"Unfortunately, the Japanese have given us ample reason to be skeptical about their promises in this area," said Rep. Toby Roth.

Rep. Gejdenson added: "Other agreements with very specific goals haven't worked. This [agreement] is kind of soft and fuzzy and may not work." He pressed the Administration to insist on a formal procedure to monitor Japan's performance.

OFFICIAL SAYS TRADE DEFICIT COULD WORSEN

A top Administration official said Thursday that the U.S. trade deficit could worsen this year and warned that Japan's closed markets pose "important risks for the world economy."

Treasury Undersecretary David Mulford said that there is more at stake than reducing America's huge trade imbalance. He said growing protectionist threats could imperil world prosperity.

"If we are going to preserve the global trading system, we are going to have to insist that Japan and others who share the benefits do their part," Mulford said. "Clearly, Japan has not done its part."

WESTERN NATIONS URGE CURBS ON MONEY LAUNDERING IN DRUGS FIGHT

PARIS -- The cloak of banking secrecy should be lifted as part of worldwide efforts to curb the laundering of an estimated \$85 billion a year in drug money, a report by 15 Western nations said Thursday.

But a senior police official warned bankers at a gathering here Wednesday against being too optimistic that such action would have a big effect in tackling the sale of heroin, cocaine and marijuana.

The report was commissioned by a summit of the seven leading industrial democracies in Paris last year and will be followed up at this year's summit in Houston in July. (Alan Wheatley, Reuter)

ENVOY SAYS WASHINGTON HAS GAINED SUPPORT AT UNITED NATIONS

U.N. -- U.S. foreign policy is gaining support at the U.N. and there is less emphasis on linking foreign aid to how a recipient country votes, the American ambassador says.

Some Arab envoys, however, expect the Bush Administration and Congress to put pressure on recipients of American aid to rescind a General Assembly resolution adopted in 1975 that equates Zionism with racism.

Ambassador Pickering...told reporters recently the idea of linking U.S. foreign aid to supportive U.N. votes "never rose to massive proportions, and the fact is that there is less focus now on scorecarding in aid than there was before."

BUSH STRUGGLES FOR 'BALANCE' BETWEEN 2 SHARP EDGES

In his 1988 Presidential campaign, George Bush pledged to stop offshore oil drilling in "environmentally sensitive" areas, but having once been in the offshore oil business himself, Bush also said he would permit drilling in other places to meet the nation's energy needs.

Today, Bush is discovering the difficulty of reconciling these divergent goals and fulfilling his promise to be the "environmental president." ...

The offshore oil dilemma also reflects what many activists, industry and Administration officials say is the mixed success of Bush's determination to pursue "balance" between sharply competing interests on environmental issues....

"This one is really difficult for him," a senior policy-maker said. "This has been a split-the-difference presidency, and on some issues you can't split the difference."

GLENN: PENTAGON NEEDS RADIOACTIVE WASTE POLICY

The Pentagon doesn't know how much low-level radioactive waste it has generated and needs a uniform system for disposing of the deadly material, Sen. Glenn said Thursday.

Glenn released the findings of a GAO study of the problem and said he may propose legislation to deal with it after hearing what Secretary Cheney has to say about his concerns....

"None of the three services has a complete grip of what type and how much...waste it has generated nor where exactly such waste is buried or stored," Glenn said. He also said that storing the wastes on the base where they are generated increases the chances of an accidental spill.

LEVIN: GREAT LAKES SPILLS

THREE TIMES HIGHER THAN PREVIOUSLY REPORTED

Oil and chemical spills in the Great Lakes are three times more frequent than previously reported, Sen. Levin said Thursday.

Levin released revised figures from the Coast Guard, which he said make an even stronger case for his proposal to establish a Great Lakes oil and chemical spill response center.

At Levin's request, the Coast Guard conducted a comprehensive review of spills and found 5,000 oil and toxic chemical spills in U.S. waters of the Great Lakes between January 1980 and September 1989. Earlier, using a more simplified process, the Coast Guard had identified only 1,800 Great Lakes spills during that period, he said.

PANEL BACKS \$1.2 TRILLION BUDGET PLAN

The House Budget Committee Thursday approved a \$1.2 trillion fiscal spending plan, drawing the battle lines for a floor fight over military spending that threatens to undo a shaky Democratic consensus on budget priorities.

The committee voted 21 to 14 along straight party lines to pass the budget after liberal Democrats forced their leaders to lower the new Pentagon spending authority to \$283 billion from \$285.9 billion in the plan the Rep. Panetta presented....

"It [the lower military spending figure] gives a lot of us conservatives real heartburn," said Democratic Rep. Huckaby. "There isn't a consensus among us whether we can support it."

PUBLIC HEALTH EXPERT ATTACKS U.S. TOBACCO EXPORTS

CHICAGO -- The U.S. is spreading death and disease by promoting tobacco exports, a public health expert said Thursday.

Tobacco is now being heavily advertised in undeveloped countries, often with billboards depicting a glamorous globe-trotting individual and similar images, said William Foege, a former head of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control who is now executive director of the Carter Center in Atlanta....

"What we have done with Japan and Taiwan is to say to them 'unless you accept our tobacco there will be trade sanctions against you.' In Japan they accepted our tobacco and our tobacco companies then advertised heavily, causing local tobacco companies to advertise in order to stay in the market," he said.

MEMBERS OF CONGRESS ASK BUSH TO REVIEW PROPOSED NORTON TAKEOVER

A bipartisan group of about 100 members of Congress signed a letter Thursday asking President Bush to intervene in the proposed hostile takeover of Norton Co. by Britain's BTR PLC, citing national security interests....

On Wednesday, Mass. Gov. Dukakis signed anti-takeover legislation requiring companies to elect their boards of directors to staggered terms, only one-third at a time. This would prevent BTR from gaining a majority on the Norton Board until two annual meetings are held.

The entire Massachusetts congressional delegation held a news conference to release their letter to Bush -- signed by scores of other members of Congress including Sen. Helms -- asking for an investigation of the proposed takeover.

ANTI-SMUT GROUP CUTS INTO NEA'S HILL SUPPORT

Congressional support for the National Endowment for the Arts appears to be slipping as the result of a Christian anti-smut group's efforts to blanket Congress with angry constituents' letters and copies of what it claims are "filthy" pictures from an NEA-funded exhibit.

But critics of the American Family Association and its director, Rev. Don Wildmon, say it is misrepresenting the NEA, the art exhibit in question and the voting records of some members of Congress just to raise money for the association.

"I think NEA reauthorization is in serious jeopardy," Rep. Saxton said Thursday. He has received 300 to 400 anti-NEA letters and postcards in recent weeks as a result of Wildmon's campaign, he said....

"I met with NEA officials yesterday and told them that unless they re-establish public credibility, they won't have my vote for reauthorization," he said Thursday.

In our latest NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll [last weekend of 1,000 registered voters], an exceptional 75 percent approve of the job that the President is doing. Only 15 percent disapprove. (NBC-3)

HOSTAGES

BROKAW: Here we go again. Now the pro-Iranian group holding three American hostages said it will not release one tomorrow after all. The Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine said the release depended on the arrival of U.S. Assistant Secretary of State John Kelly in Syria. Kelly isn't going to Syria, and tonight the kidnappers issued a communique saying the release was on hold. The communique included a photo of hostage Robert Polhill.

NBC'S JOHN DANCY says that it's just been a roller-coaster day here at the State Department. The State Department deliberately played down hopes but made preparations nevertheless only to be disappointed again. In West Germany a U.S. military hospital is ready to treat the hostage once he's freed. An American medical team flew in from the U.S. late this afternoon. A military med-evac plane is standing by to fly to Damascus. And U.S. Ambassador to Syria Edward Djerjian cut short a visit to Europe to fly back to Damascus. But then this afternoon hopes were put on hold with word that the kidnappers had delayed the release indefinitely. Their reasons: The State Department had refused to dispatch Assistant Secretary of State John Kelly to Damascus to arrange final details of the swap. The State Department chose to interpret the request that Kelly come to Damascus as a demand, a senior official saying to send Kelly would look like the U.S. was negotiating with terrorists.

(STATE DEPARTMENT SPOKESWOMAN TUTWILER: "We've gone through this before, I'll refer you back to the record. The United States does not deal.")

President Bush was philosophical:

(PRESIDENT BUSH in Key Largo: "We've been disappointed before, hopes raised, only to have them dashed by excessive speculation.") But for hostage Jesse Turner's mother, the delay was a bitter disappointment. Hostage Terry Anderson's sister, Peggy Say, had sharp words for President Bush's failure to dispatch Kelly to Damascus.

(SAY: "The first time these people stand up and say send us John Kelly he says no. I mean this is designed for frustration on my part. I don't understand it.")

If there is a way out of the impasse the Syrians seem to be the key. The State Department says the U.S. ambassador in Damascus is in constant contact with the Syrians, and they are using their influence with the terrorists to try to get the release back on track again.

NBC'S RICK DAVIS reports that U.S. Ambassador to Syria Djerijian is thought to have gotten the word of the delay at a meeting with Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa. But he had little to say as he left the meeting.

(AMBASSADOR DJERIJIAN: "I'm not in the position now to discuss the substance of our talks with Foreign Minister Sharaa. We're staying in close touch with the Syrian government on the issue. That's all I can say now.")

(FOREIGN MINISTER AL-SHARAA: "We have been exerting a lot of efforts with the Iranians to secure the release of the hostages in Lebanon. And we hope that this American hostage will be released either on Saturday or Sunday.")

Sources said Sharaa went to Iran for talks with President Rafsanjani, who favors the release of hostages, and with extremists in opposition. He stressed it's time to close the hostage file - a message from Syrian President Assad. If the hostage release fails totally it will be a major embarrassment for the Syrians. President Assad and his 40,000 troops will seem impotent in Lebanon. But Foreign Minister Sharaa is still hopeful for a hostage release Saturday or Sunday.

BROKAW: There are believed to be 18 Western hostages in Beirut. That includes, of course, eight Americans. The last American to be released was David Jacobson in the fall of 1986. (NBC-Lead)

CBS'S DAN RATHER: Freedom is on hold tonight for one American hostage. Which one we do not know. A pro-Iranian group in Beirut said it has postponed its promised release because President Bush refused to send a key U.S. diplomat to Syria to coordinate vital details. The President said his Administration is not talking directly to the kidnappers. However, high-level talks were going on tonight in Damascus.

CBS'S BOB SIMON reports that in Damascus official Syrian radio was already providing the moral of the story. "The release is proceeding thanks to Syria's good offices," it said. If Tehran wants hostages released to open trade routes with the West, Syrian President Assad wants to prove that all roads pass through Damascus. Washington remains trapped between wanting to get the hostages out and not wanting to negotiate or appear to negotiate along the way. That's why Kelly didn't come to Damascus. That's why the release of one of the hostages has been at best delayed.

CBS'S LESLEY STAHL: President Bush made it clear he doesn't regret refusing the kidnappers' demand that he send diplomat John Kelly to Damascus.

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "We have a perfectly capable, accredited diplomat on the scene in Syria to work toward the release if it comes to that. The second answer is the United States does not knuckle under to demands.")

That the hostage takers would announce a release and then toy with the President of the United States by delay or by reneging is nothing new.

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "We've been disappointed before, hopes raised, only to have them dashed by excessive speculation. I would add that we are not talking to the hostage holders. I would further add we are grateful to Syria for trying to play a constructive role in what is going on.")

STAHL continues: The Syrian government sent word yesterday to the U.S. that the message announcing the imminent hostage release was authentic. The Administration was hopeful enough that it dispatched a medical reception team to West Germany. Now U.S. officials and family members, like hostage Jesse Turner's mother, must deal with their disappointment.

(ESTELLE RONNEBURG: "They like to do little things like that, you know, to get us upset. And hopefully they won't postpone it again.")

But other hostage families are angry that President Bush refused to send Kelly to Syria.

(PEGGY SAY, Terry Anderson's sister: "God knows for five years I've heard from the White House, 'We will go anywhere and we will talk to anybody.' And I am totally puzzled by the attitude of reluctance to move forward and get on with this. If they want John Kelly, then send them John Kelly.")

Kelly didn't go, White House officials say, because President Bush didn't want any questions to be raised about negotiating with terrorists.

(BRIAN JENKINS, terrorism expert: "Politically this is a very, very dangerous area. This is a minefield for the President politically, so he has to move very, very carefully.")

Why do the kidnappers want John Kelly? No one knows for sure, but one thing is worth remembering: He was ambassador to Lebanon when the Iran-Contra scandal broke. He handled secret messages about the hostage deal from John Poindexter. (CBS-Lead)

ABC'S PETER JENNINGS: President Bush today defended his Administration's decision not to send Undersecretary of State for Middle East Affairs John Kelly to Damascus, as the group holding three American hostages had demanded before they would release one of them. Bush said the U.S. does not knuckle under to the demands from terrorist groups -- his words. The group, the Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine, said it would delay the hostage release because Kelly had not been sent to Damascus. Still, Syrian and American sources in Damascus say there is little doubt that an American hostage will be released.

ABC'S BARRIE DUNSMORE reports that the U.S. ambassador went to the Syrian Foreign Ministry here in Damascus tonight. The Syrians had said earlier that the release of an American hostage was imminent. This appeared to be a meeting to make the final arrangements for that release. As he left, Ambassador Djerjian gave nothing away. (DJERJIAN: "We're staying in close touch with the Syrian government on the issue... That's all I can say now.") While the ambassador would say nothing publicly it was widely believed here that an American hostage would be turned over to him by the Syrians here in Damascus tomorrow or the next day. It was the Syrian government which alerted the U.S. that a hostage would be released even before the kidnappers announced it, which is why this was not seen as just another possible false alarm. (ABC-2)

LITHUANIA

JENNINGS: We begin tonight with the energy squeeze on Lithuania. Yesterday Gorbachev turned off the oil, today the natural gas. Not all of it, mind you. The Soviets say there will still be a little piped in; not enough to keep the factories running. They're expected to shut down in a matter of days. For Lithuanians, then, the reality is long lines for rationed gasoline and the prospect of unemployment.

ABC'S JIM LAURIE: There was little sense of crisis on the streets of Vilnius today, though to save fuel public transportation is already being curtailed. Moscow's actions are seen here as the start of a full-scale blockade more severe than expected. The cutoff of crude oil here will force the region's only refinery to shut down within five days. Eighty-five percent of all natural gas supplies here also have been cut, and while people still cook their meals by gas tonight the pinch will be felt soon in electric power plants and industry, too. Government officials announced today a severe rationing scheme with stiff penalties for hoarding. At gas stations, two-hour waits. By day's end a ration was imposed of two gallons a week. Local energy officials here say that even with rationing Lithuania can hold out only about three weeks with current oil reserves. Nevertheless people here seem ready for hardship and so far, at least, morale is high. "We've got our bicycles ready," said one young couple. "I'm prepared to suffer for independence," said this man. Lithuanian defiance was most evident here today in a rally near parliament house. They were mostly older people who had survived Stalin's mass deportation of Lithuanians to Siberia in the late 1940s. Their Siberian prison songs and signs summed up their feelings. "Gorbachev has finally shown his true colors." "We survived Stalin's Siberia. We can now survive Gorbachev's blockade."

JENNINGS: As Gorbachev tightens the screws it isn't only Lithuania that feels the pressure. With each development President Bush has sought a way to express support for the Lithuanians without upsetting the U.S. relationship with Gorbachev. And the subject came up again today as Bush met French President Mitterrand in Florida.

ABC'S BRIT HUME: It was another harmonious consultation with a sometimes reluctant ally Bush has taken pains to court. It might have been an almost happy occasion except for the inconvenient developments in Lithuania. The President acknowledged for the first time that the Soviets had moved beyond threats to action.

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "I am greatly concerned by this escalation in terms of using energy to push the Lithuanians into line.") He was asked if there are limits to his patience in terms of responding to the Soviet action.

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "Yes, there are limits, and having said that I am convinced that Mr. Gorbachev knows that there are limits.") But he said he could not confirm the extent of any fuel cutoff to Lithuania, and he could not say when any U.S. action might come. By way of explanation he gave his most candid statement to date on why he has been hesitant to respond.

HUME continues:

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "My reluctance stems from trying to keep open a dialogue and discussion that affects many, many countries. I'm talking about arms control, solidifying the democracies in Europe, a lot of matters where U.S.-Soviet relations affect a lot of other countries.")

Privately many U.S. officials think the Lithuanians have acted recklessly in provoking Moscow into a confrontation Lithuania cannot possibly win, but which the U.S. cannot possibly ignore.

(ABC-Lead)

NBC'S BOB ABERNETHY reports that in Moscow an official government spokesman warned there may be more pressure to come.

(VADIM PERFILIEV, Soviet spokesman: "I must tell you that of course we might have some other restrictions, too.")

Also, an attack on unofficial American advice.

(PERFILIEV: "As for various sermons coming from the United States, those constitute an unacceptable interference in our internal affairs.")

President Gorbachev met today in the Kremlin with representatives of Latvia and Estonia and was reported to have offered them some kind of special status in a new loose confederation of Soviet republics if they would give up their moves toward independence.

BROKAW: Lithuania's Prime Minister was in Norway today trying to get a special deal on oil. The Oslo government said the state-run Norwegian oil company would help Lithuania meet its energy needs. However, it would do so only at market prices and for hard currency. Those are conditions that Lithuania will have trouble meeting.

PRESIDENT BUSH met today in Florida with French President Mitterrand and said that both leaders were "deeply disturbed by the Soviet sanctions against Lithuania."

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "I am convinced that Mr. Gorbachev knows that there are limits in terms of this matter. I am encouraged every time I hear them say 'no use of force,' but I am greatly concerned by this escalation in terms of using energy to push the Lithuanians into line.")

(NBC-2)

RATHER: President Bush spoke at a joint news conference after meeting French President Mitterrand in Florida. He said this afternoon that he was deeply disturbed by new Soviet moves against Lithuania and "considering appropriate measures in response." This came as Mikhail Gorbachev struck at the vitals of Lithuania today. The Soviet Union shut off more than 80 percent of the tiny republic's natural gas on top of yesterday's cutoff of crude oil.

CBS'S MARTHA TEICHNER reports:

(ALGIMANTAS CEKULIS, aide to President Landsbergis: "We are not that naive to think that the United States or any other country of the West...would bail us out.")

But tonight President Landsbergis was pleading for help.

(LANDSBERGIS: "No democratic country can stay indifferent in the case of such economic aggression.")

TEICHNER continues: A Soviet Foreign ministry spokesman told foreign journalists today that if the Lithuanians want the gas turned back on they have to turn back the clock to before their March 11 declaration of independence. "The Soviet Union doesn't care how they do it," he said. "A moratorium, a freeze, they can call it whatever they like, just as long as that's what they do." (CBS-2)

LANCE MISSILE

BROKAW: There was an important new development today in arms reduction, another result of the winding down of the Cold War. Administration officials said development of 88 new Lance missile launchers will be postponed indefinitely. They were to be deployed in West Germany, aimed at what was East Germany.

And Senator Nunn praised the decision.... Today he gave the third in a series of speeches on how to cut the defense budget. Nunn called for reducing American forces in Europe by two-thirds to fewer than 100,000 in five years. (NBC-10, CBS-3)

TROOP CUTS

JENNINGS: The Pentagon announced plans today to withdraw as many as 15,000 American troops from Asia over the next three years. That's about 11 percent of the 135,000 troops who are now stationed there. (ABC-10)

IRAQ/HOUSE

BROKAW: A House Foreign Affairs subcommittee passed a resolution today denouncing Iraq for torture, use of poison gas and other human rights abuses. The BUSH ADMINISTRATION, however, opposed that resolution, apparently because it could encourage congressional sanctions against Iraq. And that, in turn, could antagonize its president, Saddam Hussein, who has all of those weapons. (NBC-12)

NICARAGUA

BROKAW: After nine years of civil war and 30,000 dead, a cease-fire went into effect today between Nicaragua's Sandinistas and the U.S.-backed Contras. This agreement removed the last obstacle to an orderly transfer of power next Wednesday to the democratically elected government of Violeta Chamorro.

NBC'S ED RABEL reports that under the plan the Contras must begin laying down their arms next week and be totally disbanded by June 10. Peace finally seemed at hand. But a measure of how volatile Nicaragua remains came within hours of the signing of the peace accords: pro-Sandinista youths demonstrating against the arrival here of a top U.S. official for talks with Sandinista President Ortega. Assistant Secretary of State Aronson had come here to meet with incoming government leaders and to make peace with the Sandinistas.

(ARONSON: "We're going to try to encourage them to keep their promises, and if they do the United States is prepared to deal with them as we would any other democratic opposition party.")

RABEL continues: Maybe these Sandinistas had not gotten the word. They beat and kicked Aronson's van as he left the airport. No injuries were reported. Aronson is expected to meet with Ortega late today. Presumably he will remind Ortega that the Sandinistas had promised to turn over the government peacefully, putting the powerful Sandinista army under civilian control. Ortega, for his part, is expected to tell Aronson that the Sandinistas will give up their revolutionary ways to become the so-called loyal opposition. (NBC-8, ABC-9, CBS-9)

DRUG ENFORCEMENT POLICY/MEXICO

RATHER: New tensions between the U.S. and Mexico over drug enforcement policy today. Mexico's President Salinas said today, "We don't allow anybody to violate Mexican law." He spoke amid charges that U.S. federal agents recently kidnapped a suspect in Mexico who is wanted in connection with the murder of U.S. drug enforcement agent Enrique Camarena in 1985. (CBS-8)

SOUTH AFRICA

BROKAW: South Africa's President de Klerk pledged major changes today in some of that country's toughest apartheid laws, but not repeal of those laws. At the same time de Klerk promised that all whites will have veto power over any constitutional changes. De Klerk's speech to parliament came as police killed four black demonstrators in a township. (NBC-9)

ENVIRONMENT POLL

BROKAW: As we move toward Earth Day this Sunday the country has seen a dramatic change in attitudes about the environment. Our NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll found that more than ever before American voters are willing to change their behavior and also to pay higher prices if that will protect the environment.

We found that:

- 93% favor requiring separation of garbage for recycling.
- 84% think there should be a ban on plastic fast-food containers.
- 74% favor banning disposable diapers.
- 48% are willing to pay 20 cents a gallon more for cleaner-burning gasoline.
- 33% favor closing factories that cause pollution if that would cost jobs.

Overall our poll of 1,000 registered voters last weekend found that two-thirds believe the environment has gotten worse in the past two decades. (NBC-13)

TOXIC REPORT

RATHER: The U.S. EPA is out today with its annual report on toxic pollution by U.S. industry. The nation's factories released 4.6 billion pounds of toxic chemicals into the air, land and water in 1988. This is said to be a nine percent improvement over the year before. (CBS-10)

EASTERN AIRLINES

JENNINGS reports that there's a new boss at the bankrupt Eastern Airlines, the result of a judicial takeover. A federal bankruptcy judge in New York has taken Eastern away from Frank Lorenzo and put one of his former employees in charge.

ABC'S BOB JAMIESON reports that in taking control of Eastern away from Lorenzo the bankruptcy judge said the Texas Air chief was guilty of parental neglect. The judge zeroed in on Eastern's losses of more than a billion dollars since filing for bankruptcy last year. (ABC-4, NBC-5, CBS-5)

PHILLIPS PETROLEUM

JENNINGS: The government today proposed a \$5.6 million fine against the Phillips Petroleum Company for 575 safety violations. The government says violations led to a series of explosions in Pasadena, Texas, last year in which 23 workers were killed. Phillips says it will appeal. (ABC-5)

BROKAW reports that Labor Secretary Dole said safer procedures could have prevented the disaster. (NBC-6)

DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE

JENNINGS: The government says today that 50 percent of the goals set a decade ago for reducing drug and alcohol abuse have been met. The Centers for Disease Control report that goals set in 1980 for cutting down drunk-driving deaths, alcohol consumption and cirrhosis of the liver have been met. Other goals, including reducing the use of drugs and alcohol among teenagers and young adults have not been met, mostly because there is a greater use of cocaine. (ABC-8, CBS-7)

ASSAULT RIFLES

JENNINGS: There's another big argument shaping up about gun control. When is an assault rifle not an assault rifle? When President Bush temporarily banned the import of assault weapons last year the gun-makers at Colt voluntarily stopped selling their AR-15 semi-automatic rifle to civilians. A new version of the AR-15 is back in the gun shops and it is causing anxiety.

ABC'S RON CLAIBORNE reports that both supporters and opponents of gun control say the new AR-15 semi-automatic has little more than a new name. The company says the modified model is not an assault weapon because it does not have a bayonet mount. It comes with a clip for just five bullets. But clips for up to 90 bullets are readily available and cheap. (ABC-7)

CENSUS

BROKAW: The director of the federal census said today that the head count may now cost an extra \$100 million or more because of the poor public response. So far only 63 percent of the forms have been returned compared with 75 percent at this time during the 1980 census. On the other hand, critics say that many people never got those forms in the first place. (NBC-7) -more-

SENATE RESOLUTIONS

NBC'S JOHN CHANCELLOR comments: Will the U.S. Senate please keep quiet for awhile? Will it please stop passing useless resolutions that gum up the foreign relations of the U.S.? These expressions of senatorial sentiment [like declaring Jerusalem the capital of Israel] make some senators feel good but they're really monkey wrenches tossed into the machinery of foreign affairs. Foreign leaders attach much more importance to these Sense of the Senate resolutions than do most senators. Too bad. Sen. Dole said today that these things don't represent the sense of the Senate but the nonsense of the Senate. He's right. It's time for the U.S. Senate to cool it. (NBC-11)

PETE ROSE

NBC'S JIM POLK reports that Pete Rose has signed a deal to plead guilty to cheating on his taxes, concealing cash he made on the side as a baseball star. There is well over a quarter of a million dollars that Rose never reported on his taxes. He is charged with filing false tax returns for 1985 and '87. Rose will have to pay stiff back taxes and could face a prison cell. Rose could face up to three years in prison on each count. (NBC-4, ABC-3, CBS-6)

News From the Hill

SENATE FLOOR: Debate begins on Caribbean Basin trade bill.

The Senate yesterday began consideration of a bill (HR 1594) to renew and extend trade laws that give special treatment to Caribbean Basin nations.

The bill would give permanent duty-free status for many Caribbean exports to the United States. The special treatment was first authorized in the 1983 Caribbean Basin Initiative and is due to expire in 1995.

The measure also would authorize fiscal 1991 funding for the Customs Service, the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative and the International Trade Commission.

Members approved, 90-3, an amendment by William V. Roth Jr., R-Del., to appoint an administrator to handle non-controversial suspensions of export duties.

Consideration of HR 1594 will continue today. The House is not in session.

HOUSE FLOOR: New Mexico river protection bill OK'd.

The House yesterday approved a bill (HR 644) to include segments of the Jemez and Pecos rivers in New Mexico as part of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System, to be managed by the U.S. Forest Service.

Passed 391-1, the measure would designate 11 miles of the East Fork of the Jemez and 20.5 miles of the Pecos — both popular trout streams — as wild and scenic rivers.

BUDGET RESOLUTION gets House Budget Committee approval.

The House Budget Committee yesterday approved, strictly along party lines, a congressional spending blueprint for fiscal years 1991 to 1995.

The budget resolution, drafted by the Democratic majority, won approval, 21-14.

Committee Chairman Leon E. Panetta, D-Calif., hailed the proposal as reflecting "the reality that we live in a far

different world from the one which we have known for most of our lifetimes."

For fiscal 1991, which begins Oct. 1, 1990, the budget resolution calls for the expenditure of \$1.24 trillion, just slightly more than that proposed by President Bush. However, defense spending would be only \$295.5 billion in fiscal 1991, \$8 billion less than the administration's recommendation. The plan would reduce defense spending a total of 25 percent by 1995. (For details, see chart on page 2)

The Budget Committee's proposal — which will be considered on the House floor next week — provides for \$13.9 billion in new revenue, the same as proposed by the Bush administration.

As approved by the Budget panel, the plan calls for a deficit of \$63.5 billion in 1991, just barely under the limit set by the Gramm-Rudman budget deficit reduction law to avoid automatic spending cuts. Under the proposal, a balanced budget would be achieved by fiscal 1993.

The spending resolution also would provide \$6.2 billion for new social and environmental spending in fiscal 1991, with plans for increases in future years.

The proposed budget would call for a reduction of \$1.7 billion in the Medicare program. The administration had requested a reduction of \$5.2 billion.

The Budget Committee plan also reflects the Congressional Budget Office's estimate that the savings and loan bailout will require the Resolution Trust Corporation to borrow about \$28 billion more than the Bush budget had planned for fiscal 1991. That huge addition forced the panel to make bookkeeping alterations elsewhere in the budget to make the two plans comparable.

FARM BILL'S grain quality, research titles approved by panel.

The Senate Agriculture Committee breezed through more of its work on the 1990 farm bill yesterday, handily approving provisions to improve the quality of

American grain and to streamline and expand agricultural research programs.

The farm bill's grain quality title, based on S 1977, introduced earlier this year by Tom Daschle, D-S.D., would establish a grain quality coordinator position in the Agriculture Department (USDA) and create a system by which the head of the Federal Grain Inspection Service could determine future grain standards.

It would standardize commercial grain inspection and allow the inspection service to prohibit the mixing of defective grain with that of higher quality. The grain quality provision would require the inspection service administrator to set cleanliness standards — under established rulemaking procedures — for certain U.S. grain if such a step would boost exports and farm income.

The research title, approved by voice vote, calls for an increase in the low-input sustainable agriculture program — research into alternative farming methods that reduce reliance on pesticides, herbicides and fertilizer — from \$4.5 million to \$40 million and seeks an extra \$10 million to train USDA Extension Service agents in such farming methods.

It includes a global warming section that calls on the USDA to study the effects of climate change on food crops and forests and for \$400 million for competitive agricultural research grants.

And, the measure would make the USDA the primary agency responsible for agricultural groundwater issues.

The committee plans to consider the forestry title today.

FOOD PROMOTION programs gain House panel's backing.

The House Agriculture Committee yesterday approved by voice vote legislation (HR 3664) that would create farmer-funded programs to promote sales of pecans, mushrooms, potatoes and limes. Changes to the existing cotton promotion program were also approved.

For each commodity, the bill would establish a promotion board composed of farmers and industry representatives. The board would collect assessments on

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farmers of the commodity and have responsibility for spending the money.

Similar programs are already in place for 10 other commodities, including beef, dairy and pork. Generally, the money is used to fund national television advertising campaigns.

SUPPORT RATES for cotton, rice, sugar approved by committee.

Government support rates for cotton, rice and sugar producers would be tied to the inflation rate, under a plan (HR 4328) approved yesterday by the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Cotton, Rice and Sugar.

Under the subcommittee plan, support prices would increase by 2 percentage points less than increases in the consumer price index.

The subcommittee also began work on Chairman Jerry Huckaby's proposal for overhauling the federal sugar program. The Louisiana Democrat's plan would set a minimum level of sugar imports at 1.25 million tons a year, limit domestic sugar output during times of projected overproduction, and assess farmers to pay for a controversial program subsidizing cane sugar refiners.

The minimum import level is designed to create a more even sugar market from year-to-year.

The subcommittee adopted an amendment that would bar countries who import sugar from Cuba from also exporting to the United States. The amendment affects Canada and Mexico, among others.

The subcommittee's work will be combined with that of other Agriculture subcommittees to create an omnibus farm bill. The subcommittee will continue its deliberations next week.

IRAQ CONDEMNED on human rights; administration objects.

A House subcommittee yesterday approved a resolution condemning Iraq for "consistent and gross violations of human rights," despite objections to the resolution from the Bush administration. The measure was one of three non-binding resolutions approved unanimously by the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Human Rights and sent on to the full committee.

The administration earlier had told subcommittee Chairman Gus Yatron, D-Pa., that it supported the resolution, H Con Res 298. After objections by the State Department's Near East Division, however, the administration changed its position and withheld support for the measure.

The administration objected to language in the resolution which cites Iraq's "consistent pattern of gross violations" of human rights. "I think there is no question that Iraq's human rights record is abysmal," observed Doug Bereuter, Neb.,

the ranking Republican on the subcommittee.

The panel also approved a resolution (H Res 365) condemning Cuba for jailing human rights activists and a measure (H J Res 457) calling on the United Nations to repeal its resolution that equates Zionism with racism.

NUNN URGES additional U.S. troop cuts in Europe.

The chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee yesterday called for the removal of twice as many U.S. troops from Europe as has been recommended by President Bush.

In a Senate floor speech, Sam Nunn, D-Ga., also called for a reduction in the Navy's carrier battle groups.

Because the Warsaw Pact, as a military alliance, has collapsed, Nunn said the Bush administration should begin planning for a residual force in Europe of between 75,000 and 100,000 U.S. troops by 1995.

The United States currently has 305,000 troops in Europe. In U.S.-Soviet negotiations on a conventional arms reduction treaty, Bush has proposed keeping 195,000 American troops in Central Europe and 30,000 elsewhere on the continent. Bush has said he would be unwilling to go below a total of 195,000 troops for Europe.

On a related topic, Under Secretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz told Nunn's committee that the administration plans to withdraw up to 15,000 U.S. troops

from Asia within three years. He said the United States also hopes to turn the lead defense role in South Korea over to Korean forces by the end of the century.

Wolfowitz said the administration plans to cut 7,000 U.S. troops from the 44,400 in South Korea over the next three years, remove 5,000 to 6,000 of the 50,000 U.S. troops in Japan and cut 2,000 from the 14,800 troop level in the Philippines.

LAGGING CENSUS returns will cost taxpayers, director says.

The lagging rate at which Americans are returning census questionnaires will raise the price tag of the 1990 census, but it will not jeopardize the accuracy of the count, Census Director Barbara E. Bryant said yesterday.

Bryant told the House Post Office Subcommittee on Census and Population that only 63 percent of the households that were mailed forms have sent them back. The Census Bureau had anticipated a 70 percent return rate, and the shortfall means that thousands of additional enumerators will have to be hired to track down the information door-to-door. Asked if the extra personnel could cost the government as much as \$100 million, Bryant said, "It could be more than that."

Although most members of the subcommittee did not criticize Bryant directly, they cited a variety of instances in which census forms never reached their intended recipients. In some cases, whole

zip codes were missed.

Tom Ridge, R-Pa., vented his frustration at citizens who had received the forms but failed to return them. "What people don't quite understand . . . is that it'd be a lot easier and a lot cheaper to take 15 minutes to fill out the form."

But Bryant brushed aside speculation that the integrity of the census might be in danger. "The census is not over. . . . The only thing that has changed is that our workload of personal-visit follow-ups will be larger than originally planned."

CRIME STATISTICS compilation is a major problem, panel told.

A General Accounting Office (GAO) official told a House Judiciary subcommittee yesterday that there is a need for better compilation of crime statistics to determine policies aimed at reducing crime.

Lowell Dodge, director of GAO's Administration of Justice Issues Office, said at a Criminal Justice Subcommittee hearing that an investigation by his office found that problems exist with the quality, completeness and consistency of state crime statistics.

Dodge said the Justice Department cannot efficiently collect crime data because many states have inadequate automation services in their criminal record repositories.

Subcommittee Chairman Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y., said the subcommittee's staff has also found that detailed statistical data on crime rates, convictions, sentences and recidivisms "are simply not available."

TRADE OUTLOOK could become worse, Treasury official says.

A top Treasury Department official yesterday told a Senate Banking subcommittee that any further improvement in the United States' trade outlook would be modest, and the situation could possibly worsen.

Treasury Under Secretary David Mulford said at a hearing of the International Finance and Monetary Policy Subcommittee that Japan's closed markets pose "important risks for the world economy."

And, he said, the decline in the Japanese yen in recent months has threatened to worsen the \$49 billion trade deficit between Japan and the United States. A weaker yen would make Japanese products less expensive in this country while making American goods more costly in Japan.

Mulford's comments are in line with the view of many private economists. If the trade deficit were to worsen, it would pose a threat to the optimistic economic assumptions the Bush administration has forecast in recent months.

A widening of the trade deficit would worsen the slump in manufacturing as companies found it harder to sell their products overseas, analysts agree. Further weakness in manufacturing could seriously depress overall economic growth, Mulford said.

APACHE HELICOPTER found to be unreliable by GAO.

Defense experts from the General Accounting Office (GAO) told a House Energy subcommittee yesterday that the Army's top-of-the-line Apache helicopter has such severe maintenance problems that no more should be purchased.

Instead, some of the money should be used to fix and maintain those already delivered, said Richard Davis, GAO's director of Army Issues. Congress appropriated almost \$1.5 billion for 132 Apaches last year, but the Defense Department has not yet signed purchase contracts, Davis said.

Subcommittee members said the Apache performed poorly during Army exercises and during the U.S. invasion of Panama last year. Four of the six Apaches used in Panama were grounded after one day in combat, even though the Army handpicked the particular helicopters used in the invasion, said subcommittee Chairman John D. Dingell, D-Mich.

According to the GAO investigation, only 49 percent of the Apache fleet was "fully mission capable" during 1989 — far short of the goal of 70 percent.

Secretary of the Army Michael P. W. Stone acknowledged problems in the Apache program, but he told the subcommittee that the Army is working hard to improve the helicopter's durability. Stone said many of the problems have already been fixed.

MATH, SCIENCE bill's funding not enough, educators say.

Legislation aimed at improving math and science achievement lacks sufficient funding to pay for its lofty goals, scientists and teachers complained to the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee yesterday.

"The money is minuscule compared to the problem," said Charles Hollister, marine geologist and vice president of an oceanographic center in Woods Hole, Mass. "None of us really can get too excited about cranking up our enthusiasm for something that's so small."

The bill (S 2114), the Excellence in Mathematics, Science and Engineering Education Act, recently was introduced by committee Chairman Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., with the goal of making the United States number one in math and science by 2000.

It calls for roughly \$125 million, to

be provided in increments of a few million dollars, for a variety of programs designed to tackle math and science academic difficulties as well as to provide incentives to minorities and women.

It can cost \$30,000 annually for one graduate student's stipend and another \$250,000 to \$500,000 in research costs for one doctoral student, Hollister said.

Shirley Malcom of the American Association for the Advancement of Science agreed with him: "The size of the authorization is not on a scale with the size of the problem."

Correction: Yesterday's issue of the *Monitor* incorrectly reported that HR 1236, a vertical price-fixing bill passed by the House, would pave the way for consumers to more easily bring antitrust suits. The legislation aims to make it easier for retailers, rather than consumers, to bring such suits against those who engage in vertical price-fixing. Vertical price-fixing is a practice in which a manufacturer and a retailer agree on minimum prices for products and lock other retailers out of the market. ■

REPUBLICAN MAJORITY '90

The Republican Party of Florida has a unique opportunity in the 1990 election cycle, the goals for Florida's GOP include re-electing Governor Martinez, capturing the four seats necessary to control the Florida Senate, winning the single seat needed for a majority on Florida's cabinet, solidifying our position in the state house and maintaining our commanding lead in Florida's congressional delegation.

The above goals fit into a much bigger picture when viewed in the context of the political ramifications of redistricting, the process of re-drawing legislative and congressional districts following the completion of the census in 1990.

By controlling the Governor's mansion and the state senate, Republicans will enjoy a fair and equitable redistricting process, and thereby prevent unfair positioning by the democratic party through a process known as "gerrymandering." The result, an important strategic advantage for the Republican Party of Florida for the next ten years. But the entire balance of power is contingent on a successful campaign cycle in 1990.

Our model for success in 1990 is based on the fundamental basics of a good campaign, candidate, organization and message. Voter identification and get out the vote activities will serve as the anchor and when combined with opposition research, opinion polling and clear media themes, will provide a winning avenue for the final ingredient, good Republican candidates. However, without the necessary funding, the political goals for Republican Majority '90 cannot be accomplished on November 6th.
