BUSH WROTE TO SHAMIR IN EFFORT TO JUMP-START MIDEAST PEACE PROCESS

President Bush has tried to jump-start the Mideast peace process with a lengthy private letter to Prime Minister Shamir, he revealed Monday in an exclusive interview on foreign policy issues with Knight-Ridder.

The letter included "several suggestions" that Bush said he hoped would clear the way for peace talks in the Middle East.

In the interview, the President declined to endorse majority rule in predominantly black South Africa and spoke with great optimism about prospects for settling differences with the Soviet Union over the democracy movement in Eastern Europe.

Bush would not say what his specific suggestions to Shamir were but added that the new right-wing government of Israel..."presents some real problems" for the U.S. -- including sharp differences toward Israeli settlements in occupied territories. The President said he emphasized in the letter that peace talks between Israel and Palestinians..."should go forward."

Shamir, meanwhile, said in Jerusalem that the letter "asks me for replies and explanations about our path in the framework of the peace process," and promised a reply "to the best of our ability."

Bush also said that despite an implied threat by Secretary Baker last week that the U.S. might abandon efforts to get peace talks started, "we aren't going to pick up our marbles and go home." Bush cautioned, however, that unless Israel and the Palestinians wanted to move forward "there may be a hiatus" in U.S. peace efforts.

On the question of majority rule, Bush said, "I want to have that matter sorted out through negotiation in our country.... I think we're going to be a little careful there.... I clearly would favor the elimination of apartheid and I'd like to see full participation by all in the political process."

A Bush Letter Prods Shamir On Peace Talks

President Bush, following up on a stern public message from Secretary Baker last week, has written a "lengthy" letter to Prime Minister Shamir questioning the willingness of his new conservative government to revive the Middle East peace process.

White House spokesman Fitzwater said the letter was sent in the last few days and was both a congratulatory letter on the formulation of the government and a lengthier discussion of U.S.-Israeli relations.

Administration officials said Bush reiterated U.S. commitment to a plan that Shamir espoused and the Administration adopted last year for the election of Palestinian representatives in the occupied territories.... Officials said Bush's letter posed questions to Shamir about his government's positions on various aspects of the peace talks and expressed U.S. interest in continuing to work for progress.

SHAMIR INVITES SYRIA'S ASSAD TO MEET FOR PEACE TALKS

JERUSALEM -- Prime Minister Shamir Monday invited Syrian President Assad to open peace talks with Israel and criticized the U.S. for delaying a decision on whether to continue contacts with the PLO.

Appearing before high school students in the town of Petah Tikva, Shamir expanded on one of the principal stances of his new right-wing government by calling on Assad "to come, to talk, to conduct negotiations and maybe to get to peace." ...

Shamir expressed impatience at the slowness of the Bush Administration to decide on whether to break relations with the PLO as a result of the attempted attack by guerrillas of the PLO-affiliated Palestinian Liberation Front on Israeli beaches May 31. "Week after week passes, and they are still discussing, there in the diplomatic offices in the United States, if the PLO is a terrorist organization," Shamir said. "And they can't decide."

The Bush Administration, Shamir added, "has to prove the credibility of the United States, to prove to the whole world that those who engage in terror cannot be party to negotiations."

JERUSALEM -- Prime Minister Shamir has invited Syrian President Assad to Israel in a gesture apparently aimed at convincing the U.S. his new right-wing government wants peace.

"I hope that Syrian President Assad seriously wants peace with Israel -- we invite him to come, talk, negotiate and maybe we can achieve peace," Shamir told high school students...Monday.

Israeli analysts said he expected a negative response from Assad, one of the Jewish state's worst enemies.

**MANDELA SAYS MAJORITY RULE WILL PROVIDE
EQUAL RIGHTS, STRONG CENTRAL RULE**

OTTAWA -- Nelson Mandela, on a visit to secure continued support for the anti-apartheid movement, said Monday majority rule in South Africa would lead to a strong central government with an independent judiciary enforcing a bill of rights for citizens of all races.

He also said an end to apartheid would mean a new period of growth for the South African economy. He said nationalization of industries...was only one option under majority rule. It was by no means a certainty, he said....

"We wish to see every adult South African enjoying the right to vote and having the possibility of being elected to all organs of government without discrimination on grounds of race, color or sex," Mandela said. "In addition to a democratic constitution, there should be an entrenched...bill of rights...fostered by an independent judiciary." ...

At a news conference later, Mandela said a new majority government would be "extremely careful" with the economy, giving growth the overriding priority as the best method to ensure a better standard of living for the black majority.

**CANADA TELLS MANDELA: SANCTIONS STAY
ANC Leader Given A Hero's Welcome**

TORONTO -- Nelson Mandela, receiving a tumultuous hero's welcome in a country that has championed economic sanctions against South Africa for nearly three decades, Monday asked Canada to "walk the last mile" with his ANC in the struggle against apartheid and was assured by Canadian leaders they would not relax international pressure on the white government in Pretoria.

While acknowledging that President de Klerk is "honestly committed" to a peaceful transformation to democratic rule, Mandela said that South African police and white extremist groups...continue to kill and maim blacks to protect white minority rule. "The fact of the matter is, the apartheid system is still in place," he told a joint session of Parliament in Ottawa.

Mandela In Canada Gets Promise Of Continued Sanctions

TORONTO -- Black nationalist leader Nelson Mandela, half-way through a six-week international tour to persuade Western nations not to lift sanctions against South Africa, will leave Canada with promises of cash aid and continued support....

Prime Minister Mulroney told Mandela at a dinner in Toronto Monday: "When clear and irreversible change has occurred; when the system of apartheid is on the way to oblivion it will be appropriate to ease some of the pressure of sanctions. But that time has not yet come.

"To relax sanctions now would run the risk of aborting the negotiations process before it has properly begun." ...

Mulroney...promised \$4.25 million to be spent in South Africa to repatriate and resettle South African exiles and to reintegrate political prisoners into their communities. He did not elaborate.

FUGITIVE RIGHT-WING COUNCILOR DECLARES WAR ON DE KLERK

JOHANNESBURG -- An extreme rightist South African councilor, on the run from police after stealing arms from a military arsenal, declared war Tuesday on the reformist government of President de Klerk.

In a videotape delivered to a Johannesburg newspaper, Piet "Skit" Rudolph said the highest priority for loyal Afrikaaners was the overthrow of de Klerk, who wants to scrap apartheid.

"There is no time to plan a counter-revolution. It is now open war," said Rudolph, flanked on the videotape by masked men toting machine guns.

POSSIBLE POISON GAS FACILITIES IN LIBYA MONITORED BY U.S.

U.S. intelligence agencies are monitoring one or more facilities in Libya on the suspicion that the regime of Col. Gadhafi may seek to produce poison gas after staging a hoax fire in March at an alleged chemical weapons complex at Rabta, 60 miles southwest of Tripoli, Administration officials said Monday.

White House press secretary Fitzwater reiterated the Bush Administration's concern over Libya's suspected chemical weapons program, saying, "We are prepared to believe the worst."

He declined to specify the location of the facilities that have become the focus of U.S. attention, but another Administration official added, "there are a couple of places indicated as possible sites and they are being watched, but nothing has panned out so far." ...

Administration officials said that a report in The Washington Times Monday asserting that Gadhafi is building a new underground chemical complex several hundred miles south of Tripoli was not correct and had not been confirmed by the CIA, as the newspaper said.

"Our basic position is that we think Gadhafi is not finished with chemical weapons," one Administration official said, adding, "Do we think there is a new facility now? No."

U.S. Claims Khadafy Is Building Underground Chemical Weapons Plant

U.S. officials believe that Libyan leader Col. Khadafy is building an underground chemical weapons plant in the desert, an Administration official said Monday. And a White House spokesman said the fire last March at another Libyan plant was a hoax.

The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, confirmed reports that members of the Bush Administration think Libya is building a second facility, and that possible responses are under review.

"This is a two-step process," the official said. "There is confirming it, and then there is having a public posture. I think it's safe to say that as we look very carefully at the evidence that is available from various sources, we are formulating a public posture." ...

Speaking at a White House news conference, Presidential spokesman Fitzwater...said that the Administration had become convinced that a fire at the Rabta plant in March was faked....

"The weight of the evidence regarding the fire as a hoax really shifted last month," the [anonymous] Administration source said. While declining to elaborate on what evidence was available, the source said the government thought the Rabta plant was still capable of producing chemical weapons.

White House Fears The Worst On Libyan Arms

The White House agreed Monday that Libya may be building a second chemical arms plant and accused Tripoli of staging a "hoax" fire at its first chemical facility to defuse Western outrage over Libyans trafficking in poison gas.

"We're prepared to believe the worst," spokesman Fitzwater said when asked about a story in The Washington Times Monday that described Libyan efforts to build a second chemical weapons plant several hundred miles south of Tripoli. The Administration is evaluating reports about the second plant but "we just don't have any conclusions to give," Fitzwater said....

The White House and the State Department, meanwhile, accused Col. Gadhafi's government of faking a fire at Rabta in March.

FUNDING ANGOLAN REBELS BLASTED BY BLACK CAUCUS

The Bush Administration has asked Congress to add \$10 million or \$15 million to a secret arms program for rebels fighting the Soviet-backed government of Angola, a congressional source said Monday.

Some of the money would be used to buy Hawk anti-aircraft missiles, bolstering an arsenal of shoulder-fired Stinger rockets the rebels have used to attack government planes, said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The request for the extra money prompted an angry letter from the Congressional Black Caucus to Sen. Boren.... Rep. Dellums...said rebel land mines have given Angola the largest population of amputees in the world, according to Red Cross figures. He called U.S. aid to the rebels "morally indefensible."

'FRIENDLY FIRE' KILLED 2 U.S. TROOPS

The Defense Department said Monday that two of the 23 Americans killed during the invasion of Panama died from "friendly fire" coming from U.S. forces, and 19 of the 324 wounded were hit by rounds fired from U.S. positions.

In a statement issued in response to an article in Newsweek magazine, the Pentagon said two U.S. servicemen hit by their own troops during the night operation died at Rio Hato, where the Army's 82nd Airborne Division staged a parachute assault to seize a key base held by the PDF.

"In the case of one additional serviceman killed in action," the statement said, "it has not been determined if his death was a direct result of friendly fire." This case is still under investigation, the Pentagon said.

SANDINISTAS TO ELECT NEW LEADERS IN 1991

MANAGUA -- The opposition Sandinista Front announced Monday it would hold a national congress next year to elect new leaders in a secret vote that could conceivably replace former President Ortega as leader of the party....

UNO members have predicted that Ortega will be removed from the party leadership as a result of bitterness among members over the 55-percent to 41-percent election loss. (UPI)

BAKER OFFERS CENTRAL AMERICA HELP IN FINDING AID ELSEWHERE

ANTIGUA, Guatemala -- Secretary Baker assured Central American presidents Monday that Washington would press Japan and Western Europe to increase their assistance to the region at a time of declining U.S. aid to most Central American countries.

The approach is patterned on the Group of 24 industrialized nations that was formed last year to rebuild Hungary and Poland....

Although the presidents expressed some doubts about the structure of the new aid mechanism and conditions that might be attached to new assistance, the general response to Baker's proposal was positive.

"The United States is taking the lead in getting the world to give aid to Central America," said President Rafael Calderon. "We all celebrate that." (Lee Hockstader, Washington Post, A12)

U.S. Proposal Gets Mixed Reception In Central America

ANTIGUA -- Secretary Baker met with Central American presidents Monday and proposed a development plan to help "consolidate democracy" that got a favorable but uneasy reaction....

"We showed Secretary Baker we were pleased with this proposal presented by the United States and specified our will that it be the Central American countries that form part of the administration to oversee the results," said Salvadoran President Cristiani, acting as spokesman for the six heads of state....

The Foreign Ministry officials said Prime Minister Kaifu committed the funds to Salinas during their meeting Monday at Kaifu's official residence. The always unsteady U.S.-Japanese relationship could be headed for an even rockier future if Tokyo fails to provide detailed plans to implement a bilateral agreement worked out last April, U.S. Trade Rep. Hills said.

In remarks prepared for delivery to the Japan Society in New York Monday night, Hills said Japan must realize that the interim bilateral report addressing structural problems in the two economies needs to be followed up with specifics in the final report, due in July....

Between now and the completion of the final SII report general commitments must be augmented by detailed plans, amounts of monies to be spent and schedules for action to be taken must be specified," she told the Japan Society.

GENSCHER, SHEVARDNADEZ DISCUSS GERMAN UNIFICATION

MUNSTER, West Germany -- The Soviet and West German foreign ministers, meeting amid increasing calls for German unification by year's end, apparently failed to reach agreement on Germany's military future.

In a joint statement Monday after meeting for more than six hours in the historic city of Munster, Foreign Ministers Genscher and Shevardnadze said they "got closer and made progress on important issues." Speaking at a news conference after the talks...they said they had agreed to meet again later.

Disagreement on several key issues was obvious. Shevardnadze said the question of troop strength of a united Germany's defense force should be determined at the six-nation German unity negotiations, known as two-plus-four. Genscher, however, said the issue should be included in East West disarmament talks held in Vienna.

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U.S. RELAXES LICENSING OF HIGH-TECH EXPORTS

In another sign of the winding down of the Cold War, the Bush Administration Monday wiped away licensing requirements on the sale of \$30 billion worth of computers, telecommunications equipment and other high-technology products to allies in Western Europe, Japan and Australia.

The action, which takes effect in two weeks, expands on the decision 10 days ago by the U.S. and its allies to relax -- but not eliminate -- barriers to the sale of high-technology products to the Soviet Union and some of its former East European satellites.

U.S. To Lower Export Barriers For NATO Partners On Some Items

Export licensing requirements will be eliminated on about \$30 billion worth of goods the U.S. sells annually to its NATO partners, the Commerce Department announced Monday.

The department's ruling, which becomes effective July 2, "relieves an embarrassing situation," said Peter Taylor, an expert on international trade with Export Control News, an industry newsletter. "The East bloc was winding up with more liberal export policies than our own allies."

Easing Of Technology Export Controls May Boost Arms Smuggling In Mideast

The recent relaxation of Western controls on technology exports to the Soviet Union may make it easier for countries in the Middle East to obtain goods crucial to the production and use of nuclear weapons, according to critics of the move.

...The change in export rules, according to a spokeswoman for the Commerce Department's Bureau of Export Administration, would allow shipment of various previously restricted items to "certain reliable Eastern European countries like Poland, Hungary and Czechoslovakia." ...

But critics of the move charge that the relaxation could accelerate the nuclear arms race in the Middle east. "This means that Iraq can order U.S. bomb triggers through front companies in Eastern Europe without breaking any laws," asserted Gary Milhollin, head of the Wisconsin Project on Nuclear Arms Control, a Washington research firm.

MOSCOW -- The Soviet Communist Party's leading conservative, Yegor Ligachev, called Monday for a referendum on whether the country should follow a socialist or capitalist path.

In an interview with the party daily Pravda, Politburo member Ligachev obliquely questioned the wisdom of President Gorbachev's ambition to abandon the command-administrative model and build a market economy.

Ligachev said he was firmly against the establishment of private property and was concerned that the country might be headed for a "restoration" of capitalism.

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**RUSSIA THREATENS TO CUT PAYMENTS,

...The new Russian prime minister, Ivan Silayev, said his republic transfers about 100 billion rubles (about \$180 billion) to the national treasury, but gets back only 30 billion rubles (about \$50 billion). Russia also sends more goods and food items to the rest of the country than it receives back in internal Soviet trade, Silayev said.

In an inaugural speech to the Russian parliament, he promised that the republican government will take steps later this year to stop these lopsided arrangements in order to "ensure Russia's real economic independence as a sovereign state in the fold of the Soviet Union."

OPPONENTS OF FLAG AMENDMENT SEEKING QUICK KILL ON HOUSE FLOOR

Buoyed by an unexpectedly quiet response at the grass roots and by an unofficial vote tally that shows they can prevail, opponents of a constitutional amendment to prohibit desecration of the flag are pushing for a quick attempt to kill the proposal on the House floor, possible as early as Thursday.

"The phone isn't ringing, the mail isn't coming in," said Rep. Durbin, who was undecided on the flag amendment last week but said Monday that he is leaning against it. "...The more political this becomes, the more skeptical people become."

"We're hearing very little from constituents," said Rep. Glickman, who will vote against the amendment.

"There is nothing driving this issue, other than Washington politicians," acknowledged Richard Viguerie, a direct-mail fundraiser for conservative groups....

"This is an issue whose time has come and gone," said one high-level Republican operative who asked not to be identified. The strategist indicated that if the amendment fails in Congress, the White House would not seek to turn it into a national campaign issue against Democrats this fall, but predicted that it would be raised in isolated Senate and House races....

However, a White House official expressed doubt Monday that the Democrats have the hard votes needed to kill the amendment, adding that the Administration has a targeted list of wavering lawmakers it plans to lobby this week.

AP Survey: Flag Amendment Too Close To Call

An Associated Press survey of Congress shows that the vote on President Bush's anti-flag burning amendment is too close to call - with undecided moderate Democrats in control of its fate.

Neither side in the politically charged battle could yet claim victory, according to the survey.... "I don't know what the vote outcome will be. I expect it will be close," Sen. Mitchell said Monday.

In the Senate, where 67 votes are needed to pass the amendment, 58 lawmakers surveyed favored it or were leaning in that direction, while 24 were against or leaning against. Of the 18 who did not take a position, 15 were Democrats.

Supporters and those leaning in favor outnumbered opponents 253 to 115 in the House, where 289 votes are required for passage. Of the 65 who were undecided or had no known position, 54 were Democrats.

Fulbright Calls Flag Amendment 'Great Tragedy'

Former Sen. J. William Fulbright expressed disappointment with his successors in government, saying it is a "great tragedy" that politicians have shifted their attention from world events to debate a constitutional amendment to ban flag burning....

"I feel more optimistic about the international situation than anytime I was in the Senate," he said, adding that he believed even the Chinese would "come around" and join the world move toward democracy.

But Fulbright was clearly troubled by the response of American politicians, faulting President Bush for refusing to cut defense spending or raise taxes, criticizing the invasion of Panama and the funding of the contra rebels in Nicaragua, and accusing Democrats in Congress of timidity.

Asked to comment on the flag amendment, he said, "I think it's a great tragedy that in this time of very promising issues that we should be diverted by such an...utterly emotional and unimportant issue.... I think it ought to be left alone."

FORCED CUTS COULD EXCEED \$80 BILLION, DARMAN SAYS

On the eve of critical negotiations with Congress, the Bush Administration's budget director said Monday that the alternative to agreement on a deficit-reduction plan is at least \$80 billion in forced spending cuts, which would lay waste to most domestic programs.

Richard Darman told a group of reporters that possible revenue-raising measures will be discussed for the first time by Administration and congressional representatives when they resume their meetings Tuesday. He predicted that by Thursday, proposals for \$45 billion to \$60 billion in deficit reductions "will come from all parties -- including the Administration."

As the bipartisan budget summit prepared to move from detailed briefings to direct negotiations, with only the principals present, Darman said, "We feel a lot better about the group and the process than we did a few weeks ago." But he cautioned that the "chemistry" and mutual trust that have been built up in the past four weeks of briefings are untested. No one, he said, is under any illusions "about how hard this is."

OFFICIALS: POSSIBLE ENERGY CRISIS MAY BE WORSE THAN IN 1970S

BISMARCK -- An energy crisis might be coming that would be far worse than the Arab oil embargo of the early 1970s, federal and state officials said Monday.

"The focus is how to make sure this country is energy secure and is able to meet the rising demand that we're facing," Robert Gentile of the U.S. Energy Department told officials at the 29-state Interstate Oil Compact Commission meeting in Bismarck....

The Energy Department has been in the process of writing a comprehensive energy policy that will address energy needs and environmental concerns, said Gentile, assistant secretary for fossil energy....

"Hopefully, it will reopen a dialogue around this country about energy, put energy back on the nation's scope as a national concern and a national priority," Gentile said. (UPI)

U.S. MINERALS SERVICE PRESSED TO TAKE SWIFT ACTION ON MISCONDUCT

The chairman of the House Interior Committee is pressing Secretary Lujan to take "prompt and appropriate action" on allegations of financial and sexual misconduct by Interior Department workers in Dallas.

Rep. Udall termed the allegations against some employees of the Minerals Management Service's Dallas office serious, warning that failure to investigate and act on them "could result in irreparable damage."

Although allegations are not proof of wrongdoing, Udall told Lujan, "there nonetheless appears to be a pattern of conduct that warrants your attention in order to preserve the public faith and confidence in the integrity of the Royalty Management Program." ...

STUDY: NIH SLOW TO INCLUDE FEMALES IN DISEASE RESEARCH

The National Institutes of Health has made little progress in carrying out a four-year-old policy to include more women in government-funded studies of diseases and their treatments, according to a study by the GAO described at a congressional hearing Monday.

Although an NIH memorandum acknowledged last year that underrepresentation of women in such research has caused "significant gaps" in medical knowledge, the agency has been slow and inconsistent in its efforts to get researchers to include more women in studies, said Mark Nadel, the GAO's associate director for national and public health issues....

William Raub, acting director of the NIH, said in an interview the "vast majority" of NIH studies include adequate numbers of woman and are in compliance with the policy.... "I don't believe the NIH system is grossly out of focus," he said. "We do need to do some fine tuning." (Susan Okie, Washington Post, A10)

COCAINE SHORTAGE? EVIDENCE SKIMPY

A major price increase for cocaine in New York and Los Angeles, seen by some as evidence supplies are dwindling, is not matched in other major cities, including Washington, experts said.

A DEA internal review of 19 major cities due to be released this week shows that in most areas the price of cocaine is holding firm and supplies are abundant.

In the District, "the price may have gone down a little," said Mario Perez, DEA spokesman for the Washington field office. "From our observation, both cocaine and crack are plentiful."

3,800 VIOLATORS FOUND IN CHILD-LABOR SWEEP

Vowing to keep up such enforcement efforts, the U.S. Department of Labor Monday said it found nearly 3,800 children working illegally earlier this month in a nationwide, one-day sweep for child-labor violators.

Illegal child labor was found in 37 percent of the places visited, with the firms involved facing fines of more than a million dollars.

Most of the children found working illegally were 14- and 15-year-olds employed in excess of hours permitted by law, labor officials said. But 490 children, some younger than 14, were found working in jobs that posed safety hazards.

The Census Bureau roundly criticized this spring because of the sluggish mail response to the 1990 census, now reports that nearly 95 percent of "residential units" have responded to the decennial head count....

Officials call the new figures encouraging. BUT some express concern that the door-to-door count would end weeks past the original deadline of June 6. The lag, they say, shortens the period available for follow-up surveys to check the count, increasing chances for error and inaccuracy.

PENSION PROTECTION BROADENED
Court Decision Called 'Victory' For Retirees

The Supreme Court Monday broadened the powers of federal regulators to protect the pensions of millions of American workers by affirming the government's authority to order corporations to reinstate terminated retirement plans.

The 8 to 1 decision in a case involving the LTV Corp. averted a potential financial crisis for the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp., which insures \$1 trillion in private pension benefits for 40 million workers much the way the FDIC insures bank deposits. The ruling will make it harder, if not impossible, for corporations to use bankruptcy laws to "dump" their underfunded pension liabilities on the agency so they can have more cash for their creditors.

"This removes a major cloud that's been hanging over the agency for two and a half years," said James Lockhart, PBGC executive director. "The nation's retirees won a big victory today."

BETTER TESTS NEEDED TO DETECT FLAW
THAT CAUSED IOWA DC-10 CRASH, NTSB SAYS

The National Transportation Safety Board said Monday that a crack in an engine part that led to the crash-landing of a United Airlines DC-10 jumbo jet in Iowa last year probably could not have been detected by metallurgical tests now used on operational engines, and urgently recommended that new tests be developed for engines still in service.

The board said the defect in the engine part could have been detected at the time of manufacture -- and the crash possibly prevented -- if another test performed during assembly had been used properly.

NEA HELPS FUND GAY FILM FESTIVAL

SAN FRANCISCO -- The San Francisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival opened this week with a showing of homoerotic movies -- thanks in part to a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts....

Frameline, the non-profit group that runs the 10-day festival but generates most of its income from the rental of homosexual and lesbian videos, received \$9,000 from the NEA, the third such grant in three years....

"The most important thing about it is that a federal agency has recognized a gay/lesbian organization," says festival Director Michael Lumpkin. "...It gives us a certain legitimacy."

Lumpkin said he signed the obscenity pledge now required of NEA grant recipients, even though he was "sure" some of the films would be considered homoerotic, or homosexually arousing.

FLORIDA KILLINGS

NBC's Tom Brokaw: A man loaded for war walked into a credit agency in Jacksonville, FL, today, and in just two minutes he killed eight people, wounded six, and then killed himself.

(NBC-Lead, CBS-Lead)

ABC's Peter Collins reports that the gunman walked into the General Motors credit office just after it opened for business. His car had been repossessed last January. He was carrying a 30-calibre semi-automatic rifle and a pistol. The man opened fire without warning. At the rear door he put a pistol to his head and shot himself dead. About 25 years ago 43-year-old James Pugh [phonetic] was charged with assault with intent to murder, and in 1971 he was arrested for murder but served only five years of probation on the lesser charge of manslaughter. Police are trying to find out how a man with a history of violence like James Pugh was able to acquire weapons and when he got them. Florida has about the weakest gun laws in the U.S. In Jacksonville, no background checks and no waiting period are required. Ironically, the state has passed a law requiring a background check, but it will not go into effect until October. So this incident is certain to add fuel to the nationwide debate over gun laws, especially as they apply to automatic weapons.

FAMILY LEAVE

Brokaw: Guaranteed family leave. Congress passed it and a lot of people in this country support it. But today the White House said that President Bush will veto it, probably this week, a family leave bill that would guarantee workers unpaid leave to care for sick relatives or newborn or adopted children. Supporters of the bill say that President Bush is going back on a campaign promise.

NBC's John Cochran: Joan Curry spends all her time now looking after her mother, who suffers from Alzheimer's disease. Last year Joan's employer, a university, fired her, officially because of budget cuts. Unofficially she was told she had missed work too often because of her mother. The bill Congress passed would affect companies with at least 50 workers. It would guarantee 12 weeks unpaid leave each year in cases of doctor-certified serious family illnesses.

(Joan Curry: "I am sorry to see that President Bush is contemplating on vetoing the bill, especially at a time now where the older population is increasing.")

The family care bill also provides unpaid leave to take care of new children, a problem that candidate George Bush addressed in the '88 campaign.

Cochran continues:

(Vice President Bush, Sept. 1988: "We also need to assure that women don't have to worry about getting their jobs back after having a child or caring for a child during a serious illness.") But today White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said, "I'm not aware of what he said during the campaign. But we are opposed to federally mandated benefits." Bush's upcoming veto surprises some who heard Barbara Bush tell Wellesley graduates that work isn't everything.

(First Lady: "You will regret time not spent with a husband, a child, a friend or a parent.")

President Bush wants to leave it to workers and employers to negotiate leave policy. At AT&T the company provides one year's unpaid leave. Karen Bracy [phonetic] just returned from maternity leave.

(Karen Bracy: "I didn't have to worry about, okay, if I do take the year off, you know, will I have a job.")

President Bush has done some things that business executives don't like, such as compromising with Democrats on minimum wage and clean-air bills. But Bush aides say it would be too much for a Republican president to force companies to grant family leave. Not all Republicans agree.

(Rep. Roukema: "It's a bedrock family issue, and it's one that Republicans should get behind.")

President Bush suggested workers look for jobs with guarantees of time off for family emergencies. But some laid off workers like Joan Curry say that in the real world it's not that easy.

DRUNK DRIVING/SUPREME COURT

ABC's Peter Jennings: For the second time in a week the Supreme Court has made it easier for police to take a more aggressive stand against drunk driving. Last week the court said it was all right for the police to set up sobriety checkpoints. Today the court ruled that police may also videotape drivers so there is a visual record of how drunk they are. Twenty-three thousand lives are lost every year as the result of drunk driving. This is a powerful new tool for the police.

ABC's Tim O'Brien reports that Justice Brennan, writing for the court, said videotapes were similar to other physical evidence like fingerprints and blood samples, which are not governed by the guarantee against self-incrimination. Brennan went out of his way to emphasize that while police may tape answers to routine questions, they could not interrogate suspects or ask other questions designed to trip them up. All the justices agreed that other tests -- following the roving pencil or walking the straight line -- are not like testimony and may be taped without violating any right against self-incrimination.

PANAMA INVASION

Jennings: The Pentagon said today that some of the 23 Americans who died when U.S. troops invaded Panama last December were killed by fire from their own forces. At least two and possibly three American soldiers were killed and at least 19 wounded by fire from other American troops during the pre-dawn invasion.

LIBYA

Jennings: There are several reports today that Libya may be building a second chemical weapons facility several hundred miles south of Tripoli. The White House says it is not surprised. Libya is accused of having one chemical weapons plant already in operation. (ABC-9)

ROMANIA

Jennings: From the United States and Europe today, another outburst of condemnation for the Romanian government because of its violent crackdown on anti-government demonstrators last week. The State Department called for the release of those who were jailed, and foreign ministers from the EC put off indefinitely any new trade agreement with Romania. In Bucharest there were more demonstrations.

ABC's John Donovan reports that the protesters stood their ground in Bucharest's University Square today, their numbers and self-confidence growing, even while Romania's parliament was voting to throw them out. It was one of the parliaments first acts on its first day in session, more than two-thirds demanding that the streets be cleared by "the forces of public law and order." That apparently does not include the thousands of coal miners who took charge of the city by violent means last week. Today the American ambassador to Romania returned from Washington with a statement criticizing Iliescu's actions.

(Ambassador Alan Green: "Frankly I'm shocked by what I've seen and heard. It is clear that the democratic process in Romania has come to a stop.")

As for the police and the army, they have remained distant from this latest protest, watching all but doing little. The government has decided it wants to talk, inviting this group of students to meet with a senior official this evening. Student leaders, in their own statements, have begun advising against public demonstrations in the current climate.

Jennings: With political upheaval at home a number of Romanians are choosing not to go home. Over the weekend 35 Romanian soccer fans at the World Cup in Rome asked for political asylum, and thousands of others have left Romania in search of a better life. (ABC-7, NBC-10)

BULGARIA

Jennings reports that a runoff election in Bulgaria has ended with victory for the communists, who in at least a gesture of reform have renamed themselves the Socialist Party. Unofficial results of the second round of voting give the socialists a clear majority in the Bulgarian parliament. (ABC-8)

POLLUTION

Jennings: In California today the federal government has sued eight companies for allegedly dumping toxic waste into the waters off southern California. It is a major environmental lawsuit. The government wants the companies to clean up the mess, which the lawsuit says they have made, and restore the shoreline to its natural status.

ABC's Brian Rooney reports that today's lawsuit represents a major policy shift by the Bush Administration not only to stop pollution but to force polluters to go back and clean up what they dumped as long as 40 years ago. Among the companies named in the suit are Westinghouse and the Stouffer [phonetic] Chemical Corporation. Some environmentalists are surprised the government is taking such tough action.

(Robert Sulnick, American Oceans Campaign: "Yeah. It's the first hopeful sign that I've seen in over 12 years.")

Accidents like the Exxon oil spill in Alaska provoked the federal government to adopt a new strategy using old laws. They hope to force the companies to repair environmental damage. The defendant companies have not responded to the lawsuit. But with millions of dollars and a big precedent at stake, they're expected to put up a big fight. (ABC-2)

DEFENSE WASTE

CBS's David Martin reports that there are 14,000 potentially hazardous waste sites at military bases in the U.S.

(Rep. Ray: "I would rank the environmental problem from military bases as the number two concern, right behind maybe an all-out emergency to deal with a military offensive of some kind.")

The Defense Department is the federal government's number one source of hazardous waste. Of the 117 federal facilities on the EPA's list of most dangerous hazardous waste sites, 87 belong to the Pentagon. The notion that because it performs such a vital mission the Defense Department was somehow exempt from obeying environmental laws ended last year. That's when three senior officials here at the Army's Aberdeen Proving Ground were convicted of illegally storing and disposing of toxic wastes. This Navy fire fighting school used to turn out clouds of black smoke from oil fires. Today it's fires are clean-burning, and the fire extinguishing foam is a harmless mixture of soap suds. The Air Force, which used toxic chemicals to strip paint off of aircraft, now uses a blasting technique that prevents pollution. But the biggest problem is cleaning up decades of accumulated waste. The Pentagon estimates it will cost \$10 to \$15 billion and take 15 to 20 years. But the truth is no one really knows. The Pentagon has only begun to invest the time and money needed to repair the damage that's been done. And beyond the cleanup there's the even larger task of convincing the military that protecting the environment is as important as defending the nation. (CBS-8)

BANKS

CBS's Dan Rather: Even as the Supreme Court shored up government protection of private pension plans, worries multiplied tonight about this nation's banks. Shaky loan policies in the go-go '80s have left increasing numbers of U.S. banks collapsing or facing an uncertain tomorrow. And as failures climb, authorities may again turn to the taxpayer for help.

CBS's Ray Brady reports that banks are in trouble, their numbers shrinking like a spendthrift checking account, more than 200 a year going belly up, the greatest number since the great Depression, leaving depositors angry, bewildered. Banks are being declared insolvent across the nation, and you can blame it all on what are called problem loans -- unpaid loans.

(Rep. Schumer: "I think some of the same problems that pushed the S&L industry off the cliff are affecting the banking industry.") Though experts stress most of the banking system is safe and sound, more than 1,000 banks are on the government's watch list, in trouble. Most depositors' funds are insured by the U.S. government, the FDIC. But that may be part of the problem. Some banks made loans fast and furious, knowing that Uncle Sam would make up any losses. As more and more banks keep failing, the bill to the government keeps mounting, a bill that may eventually have to be paid by the American taxpayer.

PENSIONS/SUPREME COURT

Jennings: There was a ruling by the Supreme Court today that directly affects 30 million Americans who are covered by private pension plans. The court decided that businesses do not have an automatic right to cry financial hardship and walk out on their pension plans. It said the government has a right to keep the plans going.

MANDELA

Brokaw reports that word from Washington tonight is that President Bush will assure Nelson Mandela next week that U.S. sanctions against South Africa will be kept in place at least until all political prisoners in that country are set free. Today Mandela addressed the Canadian Parliament and received several standing ovations. On a 13-nation trip to celebrate his own release after 27 years in prison, Mandela said the pressure against apartheid must be kept up until South Africa has a new constitution that ends it.

OZONE

Rather: Two days before a major conference on the world's vanishing protective ozone layer, U.S. environmentalists called for a consumer boycott of products that contain one of the main culprit [chemicals of ozone depletion]. The list includes more than 140 items.

MEDICAL TESTING/WOMEN

Jennings reports that in Washington today the GAO maintained that one reason doctors often don't know what effect a given treatment will have on a woman is because the research on that disease was done only on men. The government report finds that sexual bias is so common even male laboratory rats are the preferred animal for study. (ABC-11)

ABORTION

Brokaw reports that New York's Cardinal John O'Connor is now trying to cool a controversy over whether Roman Catholic politicians who fail to fight against abortion should be kicked out of the church. O'Connor says he was misinterpreted. Some people, however, are even questioning that. (NBC-5)

CHINA

U.S. Leverage With China -- "...Mr. Bush says his [trade] policy is designed to keep China open, to avoid further isolating it. But Beijing is busy isolating itself -- not the other way around. If anything, events in China since MFN was granted make the Administration's policy look silly.... What seems a tragedy today [with the Tiananmen Square massacre] needn't end as one. Sen. Mitchell says he will try to overturn Mr. Bush's MFN waiver in the 30 days Congress has to approve it. Better than that, Congress should make the MFN conditional on human rights progress. This new 'China card' offers leverage. It will put Beijing clearly on notice that come next June there's music to be faced."

Chemical Weapons -- China's U.S. Ties Jeopardized By Negotiations With Gadhafi -- "China's negotiations to sell Libya ingredients for chemical weapons could hardly be more poorly timed.... For China to help Libyan leader Gadhafi enhance his supply of such weapons would be a gross affront to President Bush and the American people. It would come at a time when many Americans still support Beijing's preferential trade status, despite the Tiananmen Square massacre.... Much of that American public support for U.S. trade policy on China will vanish, however, if Beijing adds to Mideast volatility by helping Gadhafi produce chemical weapons. There are few leaders most Americans would less rather see with a poison-gas arsenal."

Bush's Shame, Not Ours -- "Since the American people have had ample opportunity to take the measure of the proclaimed presidential 'measured response' to last year's bloody slaughter of unarmed Chinese civilians in Beijing's Tiananmen Square, at least the thoughtful and morally sensitive among us must agree with Sen. Mitchell: 'The Chinese people must be told' that President Bush's silence concerning the morality of his recent action in extending -- with no human rights conditions attached -- most-favored-nation trading status to Beijing 'does not represent the view of all Americans.'... Today in Congress

Floor Action: The Senate will continue debate on a bill (S 566) that would restructure federal housing programs.

The House will take up the fiscal 1990 spending bill (HR 5019) for energy and water projects — the first of 13 appropriations bills.

Members will also consider a bill (S 280) that would add portions of the Niobrara River in Nebraska and a segment of the Missouri River to the Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

Trade Conference: Negotiators will meet again on legislation (HR 1594) that would renew and extend trade laws that give special treatment to Caribbean Basin nations.

The legislation would grant permanent duty-free status to many Caribbean exports to the United States. The special treatment was first authorized in the 1983 Caribbean Basin Initiative and is due to expire in 1995.

The bill also includes provisions on other unrelated trade matters, such as limits on exports of unprocessed logs.

A number of issues remain unresolved, including a dispute over an ethanol provision, which determines how much and which ethanol products (ethyl alcohol and mixtures thereof) will be allowed to enter the United States duty-free. Members from Midwestern states, which are competing sources of ethanol feedstock grains, have opposed totally duty-free treatment.

Meanwhile, a bipartisan staff proposal that would settle House-Senate differences on leather products, sugar, anti-dumping rules and unprocessed timber exports has yet to be endorsed by conferees and could unravel at today's meeting.

Transportation Funding: A \$29.7 billion transportation spending measure that would boost funding for improvements in the nation's air travel and highway systems will be marked up by the

House Appropriations Transportation Subcommittee.

The bill would raise spending 13 percent over last year's \$26.9 billion appropriation.

Less than one-half of the funds — \$13.1 billion — would be appropriated from general Treasury funds. Another \$16.6 billion would come from various trust funds, with most of the money going for highway projects.

The subcommittee is expected to repeat what has become an annual ritual of rejecting the administration's proposed cuts in Amtrak and mass transit subsidies.

Arts Funding: The House Education and Labor Committee will take up a measure (HR 4825) to reauthorize the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and the National Endowment for the Humanities, but the panel is expected to report a straight reauthorization, saving controversial amendments for the House floor. Some in Congress want to add language that would set an obscenity standard for grants awarded by NEA.

Some lawmakers are angry that last year some museums receiving NEA grants displayed homoerotic and, what some considered to be, obscene art work.

The committee will consider a bill proposed by the administration that contains no obscenity standards and would reauthorize the agency for five years. The measure would provide \$175 million for the arts and \$165 million for the humanities in fiscal 1991.

To avoid the controversy expected to be sparked by the obscenity language, the Education and Labor Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education canceled a June 13 markup and discharged the bill to the full committee. Subcommittee Chairman Pat Williams, D-Mont., said a bipartisan majority of panel members want to send a bill free of amendments to the floor,

HOUSE FLOOR: Health measures, Zionism resolution pass.

Legislation to authorize health services aimed at preventing tuberculosis and cancer of the cervix and breast were among several bills approved by voice vote yesterday in the House.

The tuberculosis prevention bill (HR 4273) would reauthorize a grants program to thwart the disease, which health officials say is on the rise again. A new program to provide grants for breast and cervical cancer screenings for low-income women would be established by HR 4790.

Members approved a resolution (S J Res 246) to repeal the 15-year-old United Nations General Assembly Resolution 3379 that equated Zionism with racism, and a bill (HR 1013) to renew and expand discretionary programs to educate disabled Americans.

The House also passed a measure (HR 4736) to reduce the number of reports that the Department of Defense must submit to Congress.

SENATE FLOOR: Consideration of massive housing bill begins.

The Senate yesterday began consideration of a three-year \$57.7 billion comprehensive housing bill (S 566) that would add more flexibility to existing programs. The legislation is the first housing reauthorization Congress has considered since 1987.

Under the legislation, \$17.7 billion would be authorized for housing programs in fiscal 1991, \$19.3 billion in 1992 and \$20.7 billion in 1993.

One provision would establish a new \$3 billion-a-year Housing Opportunity Partnerships program to provide rental apartments for low-income families.

Alan Cranston, D-Calif., said the administration has concerns with the bill but negotiations will continue between congressional and White House staffers. ■

where action is expected in mid-July.

Farm Bill: The Senate Agriculture Committee plans to take up the dairy provisions of its draft 1990 farm bill today. A proposal by Chairman Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., to freeze commodity price supports at current levels is expected to be the starting point for the committee's consideration of the dairy section.

Leahy offered the plan last week to cover all subsidized commodities. But, in a reflection of regional differences on the panel, Republicans endorsed it and some Democrats rejected it. The plan would also establish a new loan structure for farmers growing subsidized crops.

Yesterday, members were still trying to work out an agreement on the commodities sections of the bill, which will renew and modify federal agriculture and nutrition programs for five years.

Flag Burning: All eyes will be on the House Judiciary Committee today as it marks up a proposed constitutional amendment (H J Res 350) that would allow Congress and the states to ban flag burning.

Election-year pressures are driving this measure down a fast track, with the subcommittee acting on June 13, just two days after the Supreme Court ruled that a flag-protection law violated First Amendment rights to free speech.

There is little doubt the measure will get out of committee today, if only because the House leadership has pledged to bring it to the floor for a vote. But aides say the panel may vote to send the resolution on without recommendation or with a recommendation to reject the measure. The resolution could come to the floor as early as Thursday.

The Senate is expected to move quickly on its flag-protection resolution (S J Res 332) as well, perhaps as early as this week. Backers of the measure in both houses say they are close to gaining the two-thirds majority needed for approval. If they are successful, they will have to convince 38 state legislatures to endorse the proposed amendment before it can become law.

Insurance Pricing: The House Judiciary Committee is expected to approve a bill (HR 1663) that would restrict the sharing of price information among insurance companies.

An exemption from federal antitrust law allows insurers to pool loss information, trade data on claims filed, and engage in other cooperative activities. But soaring premiums have prompted charges from consumer groups that insurers are using their antitrust shelter to fix prices and cut supply.

HR 1663 would allow companies to continue sharing historical data on the volume of claims but would bar them from trading other information that could be used to fix premiums.

Insurance associations have vowed to throw their considerable weight against the bill. One industry lobbyist conceded that Judiciary Chairman Jack Brooks, D-Texas, probably has the votes to push the bill through committee but doubted the House leadership would bring the bill to the floor.

The bill has not advanced beyond the hearings stage in the Senate, and a Senate Judiciary aide said no markup had been scheduled.

Energy Markup: The House Energy and Commerce Committee will take up a varied slate of bills at a markup today, including a measure to reauthorize the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC).

The CPSC reauthorization (HR 4952) would increase funding for the

commission and also revamp its operating rules to make it easier to assemble a quorum. Ideological conflict and unfilled vacancies made the CPSC largely ineffectual during the Reagan years.

The bill is not popular with some panel Republicans, who say it would involve Congress in regulatory decisions better left to the commission. The bill directs the CPSC to take action on specific products, such as reclining chairs, amusement park rides, children's toys, three-wheel all-terrain vehicles and garage doors.

Also on the agenda is a bill (HR 2965) that would require the government to relinquish some of the electromagnetic spectrum frequencies it occupies for use by the private sector. The bill is aimed at easing the potential impact of the broadcast of high-definition television signals, which use more of the spectrum than current TV broadcasting. Bill supporters say it would force the federal government to use its portion of the airwaves more efficiently, while opening up the broadcast spectrum for more commercial use. ■

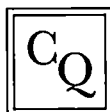

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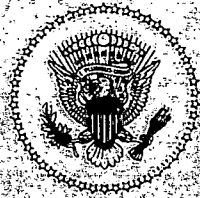

A DEA internal review of 19 major cities due to be released this week shows that in most areas the price of cocaine is holding firm and supplies are abundant.

In the District, "the price may have gone down a little," said Mario Perez, DEA spokesman for the Washington field office. "From our observation, both cocaine and crack are plentiful."

Vowing to keep up such enforcement efforts, the U.S. Department of Labor Monday said it found nearly 3,800 children working illegally earlier this month in a nationwide, one-day sweep for child-labor violators.

Illegal child labor was found in 37 percent of the places visited, with the firms involved facing fines of more than a million dollars.

Most of the children found working illegally were 14- and 15-year-olds employed in excess of hours permitted by law, labor officials said. But 490 children, some younger than 14, were found working in jobs that posed safety hazards.

Publicly, they won't concede anything -- even that Bush has softened his position. They say he's merely done what was necessary to open a dialogue with Congress on the budget.

Rostenkowski brought a grim message of deficit reduction, imminent tax increases and legislative deadlock to this week's annual summer meeting of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, who had been hoping for a slice of the peace dividend.

"The peace dividend, and quite a bit more, has already been invested in our savings and loans," Rostenkowski said.... "We need to slash spending and raise taxes merely to get to ground zero."

Sen. Kerrey was considerably more upbeat in a luncheon speech, declaring urban needs in education, health care, housing and transportation can be met if federal and local governments work together.

PURPOSE: To encourage Senator McCain to support your veto of the Hatch Act.

BACKGROUND: The Senate is scheduled to vote on your Hatch Act veto at 11:30 a.m. on Thursday. Senator McCain has in the past been opposed to altering the Hatch Act, and we believe he is sympathetic to our arguments on the merits. However, on May 10 of this year, he voted for the legislation. His apparent turnaround may be due to politics: Arizona has a relatively large percentage of federal employee unions who have worked him hard. With his re-election coming up in 1992 and his concern over the Lincoln Savings and Loan matter, he seems particularly sensitive to the potential political downside to supporting the veto.

When we have contacted him regarding this vote and the Amtrak override (where he supported you), he has raised two personnel matters. Chase Untermeyer is aware of Senator McCain's concerns and has been working on them, even as recently as today.

KEY POINTS:

- o Thank you for your help on the Amtrak override last week. Once again, we really need your support on a very close vote.
- o From my years in the federal government, I feel very strongly that these proposed changes to the Hatch Act pose a real threat to the merit-based civil service system that has worked so well for 50 years. I am convinced, as I said in my veto statement, that it would result in a subtle coercion as employees will naturally seek to please their supervisors.

- o Please take a careful look at who really supports this liberalization of existing political restrictions: there is no statistical information supporting the claim that federal employees want the Hatch Act protections lifted and, in fact, polls over the years indicate just the opposite.
- o Politically, I hope I don't have to tell you that this bill is bad news. The federal employee unions just don't support Republicans. Look at the numbers: I understand that as much as 90 percent of PAC contributions from these union PACs go to Democrats. This could hurt us across the board in the many close Senate races just as we are gaining momentum.

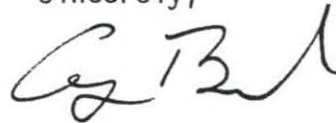

MR. FITZWATER: The President just finished the meeting with the GOP senators. We'll go through that in a second. He's having a taping session this morning for senatorial candidates. Having lunch with Attorney General Thornburgh.

Q What's that about?

MR. FITZWATER: Just talk about the civil rights bill and other matters that pertain to the Justice Department.

Q Hold his hand?

MR. FITZWATER: Pardon?

Q Hold his hand? Isn't he pretty troubled?

Q Is his job on the line, Marlin?

MR. FITZWATER: Get serious.

Q We are serious.

Q Is that a "no"?

Q That's a serious question. Is there any question about tenure?

MR. FITZWATER: He's an outstanding Attorney General. It's nonsense.

Q Who said so?

Q You didn't answer the question.

Q Does he have other plans?

MR. FITZWATER: No. Get serious.

Q We are serious. He's beleaguered.

Q Marlin, not every attorney general takes lie detector tests because people don't believe what he says. I mean this is a serious question.

MR. FITZWATER: All right, I'll give it a serious answer. Attorney General is doing an outstanding job. The President wanted to have lunch with him and talk about a number of issues including the status of the civil rights bill, the S&L prosecutions and other matters.

Q Marlin, just on that point, is he talking about the

changes Mr. Thornburgh is making in the Justice Department of reorganization, personnel changes and such?

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q Marlin, on the S&L, is the President satisfied with the pace that the Justice Department's been pursuing prosecutions in the S&L scandal?

MR. FITZWATER: We would always like prosecutions to go faster, but this is a process that is not quick. It mean chasing paper through a lot of organizations. We have some 1,000 cases, more than a 1,000 cases in the works. The Attorney General is gearing up task forces all over the country, committing more resources to the effort all the time. So we do expect results, but it's not going to be a quick and easy process.

We're not talking here about guys who robbed dime stores, we're talking about guys who have taken savings from families through elaborate schemes and mismanagement and finagling of savings and loans. And we are going to find them, we're going to put them in jail, but it's not going to be a quick process.

Q On that, Marlin, is the administration considering expanding the FBI for that purpose?

MR. FITZWATER: We have expanded resources in all the departments. The FBI has put a lot of people onto it. I don't have numbers. I refer you to the FBI, but I know they've committed a lot of resources to it.

Q But is there a new S&L specific package in the works?

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q Marlin, about 40 percent of these cases, the S&L cases are in Texas the President's home state. And last Sunday Kevin Phillips wrote an article in which he said that we're paying in the 1990s for what happened in the '80s. Do you know if the President read that article?

MR. FITZWATER: I don't know if he read the article, but I know we need to go after all these people involved in the savings and loans scandal wherever it is.

Q Does he think that his son is not involved at all?

MR. FITZWATER: He's not.

Q This is fairly tough talk about going after these people. Is the President supporting getting them to cover more of the costs, seizing more of their own property and to defray the enormous cost to the American taxpayer of this bailout?

MR. FITZWATER: The Resolution Trust Company is charged with taking over those thrifts, dispensing with the property, getting back all the funds that they can to help pay for the depositors' losses. A big part of the problem here is that in the dead of night, a few years ago, the Democrats pushed through raising the limit to \$100,000 per person. So there's a lot costs to recover here. And that is our purpose and we're going to do it. But there are enormous depositors accounts that need to be safeguarded, and that is the legal responsibility. The Resolution Trust Company is working as rapidly as they can to do that.

Q Is that a political charge you just made?

Q Marlin, usually you make the point that the President deliberately does not want to involve himself in criminal

prosecutions planned or underway by the Justice Department.

MR. FITZWATER: That's true.

Q And this seems to be an exception. Why?

MR. FITZWATER: No. I'm talking here about the overall prosecution of the problem, not the specific cases. I don't know about any cases.

Q Marlin, did they discuss whether the adjustments made in the job discrimination law of the Civil Rights Act of 1990 make it any less necessary to veto?

Q Can we stay on this subject for one minute?

MR. FITZWATER: Okay, yes, let's stay on this subject.

Q This is this subject; this is the Thornburgh lunch.

MR. FITZWATER: No, let's stay on this subject.

Q Are you saying that the Democrats are the cause of the S&L debacle?

MR. FITZWATER: I'm saying the Democrats have a big role in it. Take a look at Jim Wright and Tony Coelho and Mr. Kerrey and some of his Nebraska accounts and Don Riegle and DeConcini; take a look at all of them. If they want to make this a political issue, we'll be glad to do it.

Q Is the kickoff of that?

Q Marlin, I checked the Federal Home Loan Bank Board office a while back. And they tell me that every constituency in the Congress had people calling them -- Democratic and Republican calling them to ask them to go easy on federal regulations. They didn't say it was one party or another; they said everybody did it. And it seems that a lot of this was people were -- congressmen were pushed to do this by civic leaders and Chambers of Commerce leaders in their own hometowns saying, go easy on them or our people will be hurt. And also, I'd like to ask you if any Republican has ever come forward since that \$100,000 was passed and asked that it be changed?

MR. FITZWATER: Well, we're taking a look at all of that now. I'm sure there will be all kinds of reexaminations of the problem. It's a very sorry mess and one that a lot of people have suffered for and one that needs to be cleaned up.

Q Did the President say all that?

Q Marlin, you mentioned the Democrats -- you said they pushed for this \$100,000 -- does this administration think \$100,000 is excessive?

MR. FITZWATER: In retrospect, we think it helped lead to a lot of the problems here and it caused people to have more confidence than they should have. The bank regulation was not as strong as it should have been. We could go on and on. That's why these cases are under investigation. But I don't think you here any serious analysis of this problem that doesn't point to Freddie St. Germain and the changes that were made in the banking laws back at that point.

Q How about Garn? It's the Garn-St. Germain Act.

Q Marlin, it was a well-established Republican, Bill Seidman who came -- the first one to come forward and say that the costs of this bailout is atrociously low, we're going to have to really face this. And whether you believe these varying stories, it

was Sununu and Secretary Brady who seemed to be upset that Seidman was not a team player, and he's not going to be with us long.

MR. FITZWATER: You're just talking about analysis of the cost which is irrelevant to the problem. I mean, the costs keep rising, they keep going up; there's no question about that. But that's irrelevant to the problem of how we got into this mess in the first place. We're talking about a decade of negligence and mismanagement that has to be corrected.

Q Marlin, you're kind of suggesting that that decade of mismanagement was chiefly Democratic. Would you care to balance it off and tell us where the Republicans' faults lies?

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q Was it mismanagement of the deregulated industry that is the problem, or was it deregulation itself was wrong?

MR. FITZWATER: The trusts that have gone under.

Q How was it that increasing the insurance limit to \$100,000 increases the incidence of questionable loans on the part of the bank managers? How did that encourage them to make --

MR. FITZWATER: I don't think I'm qualified to give you that kind of analysis, but I'll be glad to put you together with people who can.

Q Marlin, was there any responsibility from the previous administration cutting back on the number of regulators who oversaw the management practices --

MR. FITZWATER: There's enough -- a lot of responsibility for every place. But I see some disturbing signs of Democrats wanting to make this political through Republicans. And I just want to put them on notice that this plays both ways and we're ready to play.

Q You have never been so vehement and never tackled this subject before. Did this come out of the leadership meeting? And have you made it -- is it now going to be a big campaign issue?

MR. FITZWATER: No. I think Senator Kerry and others are clearly trying to make it a campaign issue. And if they want to do it, so be it. There are a lot of battles that can be fought on this turf, and we're ready.

Q Kerrey -- which Kerrey?

Q Nebraska?

MR. FITZWATER: Kerrey of Nebraska, yes.

Q You say -- when you say we're ready to play, does that mean that the President himself will be heard on this issue, or is he going to leave it to spokesmen and others?

MR. FITZWATER: We'll just have to wait and see.

Want to move on to the other issues?

Q What about Frank's question about the lunch?

MR. FITZWATER: Yes, we'll get to the lunch here in a minute.

Q I've got one more question on this. You've taken the offensive here, but are there specific steps that the Justice Department is about to take to increase the prosecutorial offensive?

MR. FITZWATER: They've been taking a number of steps over the last several months. I'm sure the Justice Department can detail those for you -- increasing cases, task forces, work loads, prosecutors, all up and down the line.

Q Marlin, isn't there a problem here in trying to settle this through the Justice Department or at least trying to prosecute a lot of these people in that there's no law against making bad loans? I mean losing money is not a crime in a lot of places.

MR. FITZWATER: It's a very difficult case to make. That's right. It involves investigating these loans and their management practices and seeing whether laws were broken. In some cases, it was just bad management and bad judgment. In some cases, there was cases of fraud. Now we have grand juries hearing a lot of different cases. But there still -- there are a lot of prosecutions that can be made. With over a thousand cases working, you know there are going to be some.

Q Marlin, just following up Helen's question on the timing of this attack of yours, I saw B. Jay here. Are you sure there wasn't a meeting here that -- before the briefing -- and with Mary Matalin and others, maybe in a phone call with Atwater that it's time to unleash Marlin into the S&L scandal? (Laughter.)

Q Tell us all, Marlin.

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q Hey, hey, no meeting --

MR. FITZWATER: No meeting.

Q No separate meetings outside?

MR. FITZWATER: No, none.

Q Did you say that the administration is reviewing the possibility of the \$100,000 insurance limit on deposits?

MR. FITZWATER: No. I haven't heard that. I'm just saying I'm sure that there will be all kinds of review of the S&L industry coming out of this. But I don't have any special review on that limit, no.

Q In other words, there's no initiative contemplated to reduce that?

MR. FITZWATER: Not aware of any at the moment.

Q You're satisfied with keeping the \$100,000?

MR. FITZWATER: Not aware of any change at the moment.

Q Obviously, this lashing attack is meant to show that Bush is doing a great job in trying to clean up the mess. Is it also directed perhaps at the Reagan administration and the bad regulation that went on during that period that was behind a lot of this?

Q Say yes.

MR. FITZWATER: I direct it at the problem. The problem is a difficult one and needs to be cleaned up.

Q Marlin, aren't you saying that the problem only lies at its source and not in its continued process?

MR. FITZWATER: What's that mean?

Q Well, you're saying that the problem lies solely at the feet of the Democrats because -- if its inception came there, not at the Republicans who continue the administration -- continued it through their administration. Isn't that sort of like saying I'll eat your cake, but I'm not responsible for it?

Q What's he been whispering about, Marlin?

MR. FITZWATER: I'm not sure what he's whispering about, Sarah. The problem is with us. You all know how it's being dealt with. Congress is taking a look at it. We're looking at it legally.

Q Did this subject come up this morning at all at the congressional meeting?

MR. FITZWATER: Just briefly. Just briefly.

Q How briefly? In what respect?

Q How did it come up, Marlin? Can you just fill us in?

MR. FITZWATER: The Attorney General just said that he was pursuing a number of cases and mentioned the number 1000 cases. That's about it.

Q And that set you off?

Q Marlin, there's a proposal by a House Republican congressman to appoint a special prosecutor to examine the S&L mess. A number of Republican members have signed on that bill, including Newt Gingrich. Does the White House oppose it or --

MR. FITZWATER: I think our feeling is the Justice Department is the appropriate place for these investigations to go forward.

Civil rights?

Q I want to change the subject when this is done.

MR. FITZWATER: Okay.

Q I'm just a little confused. You seem to be blaming this on the Democrats. But I thought --

Q Seem?

Q -- most of the deregulation occurred during the Reagan administration. And I seem to recall then-Vice President Bush chaired a commission on deregulation in the financial industry.

MR. FITZWATER: I invite you to go back and look at the history of this problem. I think the names will be clear as to where they came from.

Q Yes, but I wonder if you can point out to us where the President challenged the \$100,000 limit as chairman of that, and where he challenged the deregulation. The Republicans championed that.

MR. FITZWATER: I'm just saying these things happened, and I invite you to go back and look at the record. It speaks for itself.

Q Is anyone besides Kerrey trying to make this a campaign issue, as far as you can tell?

MR. FITZWATER: We see it in any number of places, yes.

Q Where else do we see it, Marlin?

MR. FITZWATER: He's the only one I want to specify, because he chose to go on television and make a big floor speech a couple of nights ago.

Q Would you like to elaborate on your reference to his dealings with Nebraska Bank?

MR. FITZWATER: No. I'll let you look into that yourself.

Q Is the President in favor of stepped-up prosecutions of S&L fraud, which is one thing that Thornburgh seems to be interested in?

MR. FITZWATER: You bet.

Q Did you say that the administration is not asking Congress for any more money above the \$50 million for more investigations and prosecutorial strength?

MR. FITZWATER: What do you mean? What are you talking about?

Q Is the administration going to ask for more money beyond what Congress has already authorized for the purpose of prosecuting and investigating the S&L --

MR. FITZWATER: We asked for \$50,000 and we asked for a supplemental, which was rejected. I don't remember how much that was. And we're considering now the -- of course, the part of the budget compromise is the whole billions that are necessary to pay of depositors. So it's all part of that plan.

Okay, let's go to Frank and civil rights.

Q Can I finish one more, Marlin?

MR. FITZWATER: One last question.

Q When you start to really grapple with the budget and make decisions on that, is the administration and specifically the President ready to point to the S&L -- the mishandling of the whole S&L thing as one reason -- whatever decisions he has to make on the budget -- whatever that has in regard to revenue or whatever -- a large part of that is the S&L problem and how it was mishandled?

MR. FITZWATER: The S&L payoff for the contributors is a part of the problem now, yes. And it will be -- I mean, there's no question about that.

Q Is that going to justify the tax hike?

MR. FITZWATER: We just said it's a part of the budget compromise they've got to consider.

Q The Thornburgh-Bush agenda. Does it include the changes made in the job discrimination law -- the Civil Rights Act of 1990 and whether or not it's no longer a veto --

MR. FITZWATER: The meeting this morning, including the participation of Attorney General Thornburgh, focused on a number of issues.

To get to the civil rights bill and the thrust of your question, let me just introduce it by saying the President began by noting some progress in the situation in Lithuania, saying that he had expressed the sentiment of the Congress on that matter. Then they talked about campaign reform and the status of that bill. They

talked about the Hatch Act, where they're expecting a veto override vote in the House, and then will move on to the Senate. The President expressed his support for -- his gratitude for Senate support and indicated he hoped that they sustained his veto.

Q What reading did he get on that?

MR. FITZWATER: They said it would be close, but they were hopeful they would be able to do it.

On the civil rights bill, the President raised many of the issues that he raised in his Rose Garden speech before civil rights groups on what he would like to see in a civil rights bill. He said that he does not want to veto the bill, that he wants a civil rights bill he can sign; that members of the administration have been having discussions with leaders on the Hill, trying to work out language that is acceptable.

The President said that if the bill does compel quotas that he will consider the veto, but that he is hopeful that it can be resolved. His message to those who say that the bill does not constitute a quota bill is, let's work out the language to make sure that's the case.

Q So it's not there yet?

MR. FITZWATER: Not there yet. The Attorney General had some discussion of the bill and its various provisions. He spoke certainly about the provision that changes the burden of proof or shifts the burden of proof from the employee to the employer, indicating that that's unknown in the American system of jurisprudence, that a person must prove he's done nothing; and that we have great concerns about that provision as well.

He talked about the various case laws that are behind the civil rights bill and the problems that they're having in getting the language changed.

But the consensus of everybody was that they want something they can be for. They want a civil rights bill that can be signed. And there was some indication from Senator Hatch and others involved that, while this is a very complex bill and the language is very detailed, that they will be able to work out compromise language that would satisfy our concerns.

They also talked about -- I guess those are the main things.

Q Marlin, was there any concern expressed by Hatch or others that the Democrats were going to be pushing this bill at a time when Nelson Mandela was in the country?

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q The subject didn't come up?

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q About a month ago the new chairman of the Civil Rights Commission appointed by the President --

MR. FITZWATER: Well I think somebody -- I'm sorry, John -- that somebody mentioned that the bill might come up during that period. But there's no concern about it.

Q -- said that there were no quotas, said the bill did not mandate quotas, said that --

MR. FITZWATER: Who said that?

Q Arthur Fletcher.

Q The man the President has nominated, appointed chairman of the Civil Rights Commission. And said that the President's aides were mistaken and seemed to think that he had made some headway in convincing the President of that. Have we shifted back the other way now? Is the sense that there are quotas and the Civil Rights Commission Chief is wrong?

MR. FITZWATER: Never been any doubt in our mind that this has constituted quotas in several areas of the bill. That the remedies provision has been unfair and inequitable and that that has been a very significant problem. We've had a veto threat on this bill for weeks on the basis of its amounting to a quota bill.

Q I can't believe what I'm hearing.

MR. FITZWATER: What's wrong, Ann. Why can't you believe what you're hearing?

Q Well, because the day that Arthur Fletcher was here you described the differences as very minimal and said there were no -- no longer a veto threat. That we don't make such threats this early in the legislative process, and that the President --

MR. FITZWATER: I said then that the differences were minimal, that there was veto threat on it, but that we hoped to resolve them.

Q All right. Let's go to today.

MR. FITZWATER: That's still the case. Minimal compared to the whole bill. This is a bill about this thick. But they're serious enough that we're being urged to veto the bill if we can't resolve these.

Q But is there a presidential veto threat or not? I'm confused. You said he would consider it and then the time you came out when Ann mentioned you said the Thornburgh veto threat was off. And now you're saying you're being urged to veto it and the veto threat's out. I mean, I'm just confused by your use of words. Will the President veto the bill in its present form?

MR. FITZWATER: Well, the problem is I don't want to say that because the bill is changing and because we're in the midst of discussions. But I think you clearly get the picture that we're willing to veto this bill if it contains -- if it is a quota bill. That's the bottom line.

Q You talk about the compromise language or the compromise that you're trying to work out. Senator Hatch said he has seen no language and no proposal from the White House on a compromise. Senator Kennedy says he's seen no language and no proposal from the White House on the compromise. Civil rights leaders say this is essentially a stall. Where's the language? What is the language and why is it secret from the two main people involved in negotiating this?

MR. FITZWATER: Well, I'm not sure what they're referring to. Certainly, Senator Kennedy has been in on all of the discussions with Governor Sununu and Boyden Gray and the Attorney General and others. Senator Hatch, I don't believe has been directly involved, so I'm not sure what he's seen. But they are both clearly aware of our concerns and what the discussions are about.

Q They've seen no compromise proposals.

MR. FITZWATER: Maybe they're not -- maybe they're talking about specific language or something, but that's got to flow out of the debate.

Q But, Marlin, the question is do you want them to just change --

MR. FITZWATER: I'm not willing to give out to any specific words if that's what you're asking for, words on paper.

Q Yes, but do they exist?

Q They have to see them.

MR. FITZWATER: They exist in terms of our discussions, yes. We know exactly what the problems are and how they can be fixed. There are lawyers all over town.

Q Well, if you won't tell Kennedy what they are and you won't tell Hatch what they are, what are they being used for?

MR. FITZWATER: Kennedy's aware of the problem here. We're discussing it and trying to work it out.

Q As I understand it -- and I don't -- (laughter) -- but if a business departs from the portion of a racial balance in an area in it's hiring that it presumed to be guilty. And this is the shifting burden thing, too, but it's out of that kind of language that they're concerned that the businessman will set quotas. And is the President going to veto it because somebody might decide to set a quota to protect himself from some intangible thing that he can't catch?

MR. FITZWATER: If the law enforces that, that makes it a veto bill. That's our point. If the law has the effect of forcing people to adopt quotas then it's a quota bill. That's our whole point.

Q Is the President going to have a news conference in Huntsville tomorrow?

MR. FITZWATER: Nothing very formal. He'll have a rope line press conference probably during the visit to the Marshall Space Flight Center.

Q Has he got prepared remarks of any kind? Does he have something he wants to --

MR. FITZWATER: He'll have some remarks about the space program, yes.

Q Not a formal sit-down press conference?

MR. FITZWATER: Not a formal one, no.

Q Do you set up a mike stand kind of thing?

Q When he arrives?

MR. FITZWATER: Yes, probably just a toast lectern and a mult. Take some questions.

Q Any announcements he wants to make?

MR. FITZWATER: No, no announcement or anything. It's nothing special. It's just the President felt it was about time to come down to the briefing room and talk to the press again and we said well why don't we do it in Huntsville.

Q Why did you say that?

Q Why?

MR. FITZWATER: Well, to make it interesting day. Give you all good stories to write --

Q Fill up the press plane.

MR. FITZWATER: -- fill up the press plane, things like that. (Laughter.)

Q What time?

Q Marlin, did you talk -- did anybody talk about the budget at the meeting this morning?

MR. FITZWATER: No, budget wasn't discussed.

Q And I have another question for you, which is that the Democrats have been saying for weeks that the President has to prepare public opinion for the possibility that revenue has to be raised, and they're also saying that they're going to sit there with their arms folded and wait for the President to go first. What's he going to do?

MR. FITZWATER: I don't think they will. I think they are operating in good faith and I think they'll discuss various options and proposals and it will flow back and forth, and when they get a final agreement then we'll all go to the country and talk about the problem and explain what the compromise is.

Q You're sure he's -- so your just -- you're not prepared to say here today the President has something to present tomorrow to go first? That's not the --

MR. FITZWATER: They've all agreed that's not the way they're going to do it. It's not going to be this is our side, our presentation or your presentation and you knock down this and we'll knock down that. That's not the way they're going to proceed. They're going to talk about various ideas and proposals will come on the table, but there's not going to be a yours, ours, and theirs.

Q Somebody has got to go first, though.

MR. FITZWATER: They'll work that out.

Q Marlin, does Mary McGrory have an exclusive interview with the President? She just went in.

MR. FITZWATER: No.

Q Senators Cohen, Gramm, some other budget specialists entered the White House as the 10:00 a.m., meeting was breaking up. Is there an internal budget meeting going on?

MR. FITZWATER: No, there is some 28 members who are running for office in this election who are coming in to have videotapes made, and they were among that group.

Q Could I ask a question on the family leave? Is that veto going to come any day or is it still --

MR. FITZWATER: We haven't received the bill yet, but it will -- after we receive the bill.

Q And a follow-up on that. In that tape of September '88 when the President talked about it during the campaign, I didn't hear him suggest or imply that if it was mandated, he would be opposed to it. Who did he think was going to favor these leaves -- that the companies were going to do it themselves, that business was going to police itself?

MR. FITZWATER: Exactly.

Q Who would do it if the government didn't do it?

MR. FITZWATER: Exactly. Most companies -- or many companies do. And he was urging voluntary participation.

Q He was urging -- the word voluntary was not in there, Marlin.

MR. FITZWATER: Neither was mandatory. It was silent on that point. All he said was he thought women should not be forced out of their jobs because of having children. He believed it then; he believes that now.

Q But if it's a problem now --

MR. FITZWATER: He repeats those same words today. He just doesn't believe it should be federally mandated. But he does believe companies should provide those benefits.

Q That's why he raised it in that speech that if there was -- that was being done in a lot of companies around the country. And yet there's been no redress of that since.

MR. FITZWATER: He believes that companies should provide those benefits. He just doesn't believe they should be federally mandated.

Q You, at this podium some months ago, basically made the point that you all thought that the cure in this parental leave was worse than the harm. You said that it would -- you were afraid, the administration was afraid it would drive people out of work if you mandated these benefits.

MR. FITZWATER: That's one of the big problems, is job losses, yes.

Q On what do you base that conclusion?

MR. FITZWATER: On two extensive conclusions. One is that there are studies that tend to show that mandated federal benefits force employers to make decisions not to hire. And secondly, the experience that we've seen in Western Europe and in Eastern Europe certainly, is that the more rigidities you build into the employment system, the more difficult it is to hire people and create new jobs. When we saw the rapid expansion of employment in the United States in the late '80s, you did not see that in places like Great Britain, Italy and France. And their conclusion -- one of the major conclusions was that they had so many rigidities in their employment benefits system. And we don't want that to happen here. We think it very definitely is a jobs question.

Q OCS -- still in the cards this week?

MR. FITZWATER: Any day.

Q How about today?

MR. FITZWATER: Not today.

Q The former Japanese Foreign Minister Abe is coming to meet with President Bush on Thursday. He said last week that U.S.-Japanese relations are in danger of breaking down due to the growing acrimony as you approach the final report on SII. Is the President concerned about these kinds of comments?

MR. FITZWATER: We don't believe that's the case. We have good relations with Japan. The President and the Prime Minister have good relations. Our two countries are both large economic powers. I don't think there's any danger of that breaking down.

We're working towards the final report. We want to keep the pressure on. A lot of participants are commenting one way or another, but there's no danger in U.S.-Japan relations falling apart.

Q Would you say that you would hope to have that final report ready for Kaifu and Bush to sign when they meet prior to the Houston summit?

MR. FITZWATER: No, it will be ready whenever it's supposed to be ready.

Q Hatch said something about -- in connection with the letter to Shamir -- that there was a lot going on behind the scenes. Do you know what he was referring to? Did something come up at the --

MR. FITZWATER: I don't know. As Knight-Ridder reported, the President did send a letter to Mr. Shamir congratulating him on the formation of his government. He talked about Israel's security and well-being remaining an important concern to the United States. And well, I guess you've all reported all this, you don't need to hear it again.

Q No, I'd like to hear it.

MR. FITZWATER: He said he looked forward to working with Mr. Shamir on enhancing the freedom of Soviet Jews. He reiterated his view that Israel's settlement activity constitutes a significant obstacle to peace. He reiterated his strong support for the Israeli government's May 14, 1989 initiative as the most realistic way forward in the peace process. And as Prime Minister Shamir said yesterday, that President Bush also asked him for his views on the peace process and how they would like to proceed.

Q What are the suggestions about?

MR. FITZWATER: What suggestions?

Q President Bush made suggestions to Prime Minister Shamir. He said that in the interview. Could you give any details about what those were?

MR. FITZWATER: No detail really, just to the effect of continuing the peace process, of pursuing the various proposals that Secretary Baker had been working on in the recent months before the fall of the last government.

Q Marlin, Hatch outside said that the President had indicated they were, quote, "some substantive reasons to hope for success in the Middle East peace process." To what is he alluding?

MR. FITZWATER: I don't know. You have to ask him. If I were asked that question, I guess I would point to, one, that we now have a government, so at least we have an entity to work with. The President's letter is one of committing the United States to the peace process, and we are hopeful that we can engage the Shamir government in pursuing that. But what he had in mind, I have no idea.

Q What time is this press conference tomorrow?

MR. FITZWATER: There's no specific time. It will be just during the tour of the Marshall Space Flight Center, which is generally late morning, I think; early afternoon.

Q To tie up a loose end on the civil rights -- John's question about the timing with Mandela -- would you consider it dysfunctional that the Democrats brought it up, or would you consider it political?

MR. FITZWATER: No, they can bring it up at anytime.

Q Could you give us a list of the prebriefs for the two summits, NATO and Houston? The briefings next week.

MR. FITZWATER: We'll try to publish something for you.

Q When? Today?

MR. FITZWATER: We'll try to do it this afternoon, yes.

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you all very much for that warm introduction, and that special honor. And thanks -- I think it's the Marines I see down there in the glow. (Laughter.) I thank them especially for providing the music tonight. And David Humphreys and Galey Coleman here, and Sheldon. I understand we have some distinguished senators or congressmen. Every time you announce them, somebody says, "Oh, they're not here, they're off voting someplace." (Laughter.) But Senator Burns and Roth, Ron Marlenee, Congressman Hiler. And, of course, my friend Derrick Crandall and Stu Northrop. And Dick Nunis over here, and Jeff Napier.

Look, it's a great pleasure for me to be with you tonight. And I will be relatively brief, speaking before the broccoli. I've got to get out of here and get back home. (Laughter and applause.) But really, what an honor to accept this Sheldon Coleman Great Outdoors Award. He was a great friend -- I bet to everybody in this room and to many others across the country -- a great friend of nature.

And his influence is still with us today in so many ways, in partnerships for the outdoors that he encouraged throughout his entire life. And like the lanterns that bear his name, glowing beside the tents and RVs across this country, those partnerships do shine bright with promise for the environment -- the precious environment we share.

I am deeply honored that you consider me worthy of this award. And I imagine there was some controversy. (Laughter.) Some might say that the award should have gone to a more accomplished outdoors person. It probably should have gone to the only person I know who can fish and read at the same time, Barbara Bush. (Laughter and applause.)

Look, there's some fishermen out here. Please understand my frustration. (Laughter.) We're looking for these damn bluefish and -- (laughter) -- Barbara's reading away, studying, reading -- "Oh, I've got a fish." And I'm out there working, and studying, and changing bait, and nothing happens. (Laughter.)

But I don't worry when somebody reaches into the tackle box and pulls out a lure like a Meps Spinner, or a Johnson Silver Spoon, because I've got the Silver Fox. (Laughter and applause.)

And like every pursuit in the great outdoors, fishing is a great equalizer, whether you're out there with a friend or a head of state or one of the grandkids. You get out there and you just simply love it -- just like the other 60 million American men, women and children who fish from boats, and beaches, and bridges, and riverbanks all across this great country.

I remember fishing off the Saco River in Maine, there was a guy with a belly that made one of these sumo wrestlers, or whatever

they are, look skinny, you know. (Laughter.) And he's standing out there, fishing with his grandson, and I come by in our Cigarette with our couple -- trolling, I admit, nice and slow. And the guy yells out, "Only in America." (Laughter.) And, you know, he was absolutely right. (Laughter.) Here we were. It was just very special and all of us have our own tales to tell. (Laughter.)

But all of you understand how time spent in nature, in camping or hiking or fishing -- frees up the mind, restores the soul, and makes memories. Tranquil, peaceful, wonderful memories that stay with you the rest of your life.

Among the greatest joys that Barbara and I have ever known have been exploring the outdoors with our kids and our grandkids. You saw George P. here with us. Look at the majesty, then, of the Grand Tetons through the eyes of a 13-year-old grandson, teach a grandkid a few mysteries of the ocean and you're powerfully reminded that our kids will truly inherit the Earth.

You don't even have to leave home. Every summer on vacation, up at our house there at Kennebunkport, we put up a tent -- I don't want to prejudice any other vendors here, or manufacturers. (Laughter.) But I call Sheldon Coleman and say, "Hey listen, I need a tent." This was several years ago. And I get a tremendous kick out of -- that same tent goes up every year, and I get a tremendous kick -- you don't have to leave home -- hearing the nighttime giggles of the grandchildren out there. It's wonderful -- you see them reading by a lantern and telling stories, hear them whispering to each other before they drop off to sleep with the sea pounding away in the background.

These are special moments -- moments in the outdoors; and they are all very, very special. So preserving nature for future generations demands special effort. And I've been very happy to support the public-private partnerships like this Wallop-Breaux -- was Dingell-Johnson -- but the Wallop-Breaux Trust Fund to protect our wetlands and preserve and enhance the boating and fishing. And by encouraging private partnerships like Ducks Unlimited, and groups like the American Recreation Coalition, and the Recreation Roundtable, to engage this nation in a new spirit of renewal. I want to try my very hardest to do my part to help build that spirit.

In this year's budget, we included funds to help save the Everglades and to implement the historic North American Waterfowl Management Plan, to stop the tragedy of thousands of birds dying at the Stillwater Wildlife Refuge. But the cornerstone of our program was something called "America the Beautiful," to expand our parks, our forests, and wildlife refuges; to promote recreation; and yes -- one of the ones that I'm most interested in, to plant a billion trees a year in America.

Tonight I want to ask for your help. I've seen too many budgets frittered away on other priorities. We all agree that trees are good for our water, and good for air, good for our communities. So take this message with you, please, to the legislative branch: Don't leave our tree planting initiative out on a limb.

Groups like this one are helping us build a new ethic of stewardship in America. And you know, I do believe that we have reason to be hopeful. This year, in a tradition that dates back to President Taft, I was presented with the first salmon caught in the 1990 season in the Penobscot River in Maine.

It was a tradition that died back in the 1950s because the river had deteriorated so much. But this year, a state fisheries spokesman said they had the biggest opening day that he could recall. Right here in Washington, D.C., the once-polluted Potomac River is now a site for first-class bass fishing tournaments.

I was fishing in Pintlala, Alabama with Ricky Clune, a kid from Montgomery, Texas; one of the great bass fishermen in this

country. And Rick, I'll never forget his winning a bass tournament. If you haven't been to one of these weigh-ins, you ought to go. Four or five thousand people in a stadium when these guys come trolling in with these -- trailoring their fishing boats in and bringing out the bass. And I'll never forget Rick Clune when he won Bass Masters Championship saying that he learned to fish when he was in his underwear following his dad in the creeks of Oklahoma. And he said, isn't it great to live in a country with no limits. And I like that. And I think he's right.

He was telling me in Pintlala this winter, he said, "You don't have to come all the way down here to Alabama to fish," he said, "the Potomac River is back. You can go right across from the Pentagon and get good five-, six-, seven-pound bass out there." And he was right. I think it's an exciting thing that you all are doing for this country, helping us bring back these fantastic resources that regrettably we took for granted maybe 10 or 20 years ago.

So I'm honored that you'd grant me the Great Outdoors Award, in the memory of Sheldon Coleman. He was a great inspiration to me. I knew him personally. I loved that remarkable spirit that you all remember. And I salute his memory. I'm also here to tip my hat to all of the individuals in America, like yourselves, who are raising awareness, raising money, and sometimes raising hell to preserve -- (laughter) -- our natural heritage for future generations.

Sometimes that does mean conflicts. But I believe that the efforts we put into finding constructive partnerships will take us much farther than debate and contention. We need to spend less time arguing and more time working on solutions.

All of you here tonight have the creativity, the will, and the love -- the love of the outdoors, to create new private partnerships to protect this nation's natural beauty. So let me encourage each of you, help us build momentum for a new spirit of American stewardship. As your President, I will not ever miss any opportunity at all to go fishing, to go hiking, to go camping -- (laughter and applause) -- to go out in my boat. I want to do my part. (Applause.)

And so, I'll go to work early in the morning and sometimes go home late at night. But I'll be damned if I'm going to let anybody keep me from the great outdoors. Thank you all very, very much. (Applause.) I'm honored to be with you. Thank you so much. (Applause.)
