BUSH GREETES LEADERS WITH CHALLENGE TO WORK TOGETHER

HOUSTON -- With flags flying in the hot sun, President Bush welcomed seven Economic Summit partners to Houston Monday with full military honors and urged them to help him "set the stage for the new millennium." ...

In brief remarks after a 21-gun salute, the trooping of the colors and the playing of the national anthems, Bush said his adopted hometown was "a very appropriate place" for the meeting, the first "of the post-postwar era."

Such meetings, he said, have become a "framework for frank and constructive dialogue, a dialogue for progress that I believe will be advanced greatly in these next three days."

"A new world of freedom lays before us," Bush said. "So, let us begin in good faith to set the stage for the new millennium."

AMERICANS EXPRESS WORRY ON JAPAN,
AS FEELINGS IN TOKYO SEEM TO SOFTEN

The American public's concern over the economic might of the Japan appears to have risen sharply, heightening sentiment for limits on foreign investments, as Americans worry more about Japanese economic power than about Soviet military power.

The surge in anxiety is occurring even as Japanese attitudes toward the U.S., while tinged with resentment, appear to be softening somewhat on trade issues.

The findings are a result of a matched pair of public opinion polls conducted in the U.S. by the NEW YORK TIMES and CBS News and in Japan by the Tokyo Broadcasting System....

Sixty-four percent of Americans, up from 45 percent in 1987, now say that investment by the Japanese in the U.S. poses a threat to American economic independence. Sixty-one percent favor restrictions on foreign investments in American real estate, up from 53 percent in a May 1988 CBS News poll.

WESTERN NATIONS TO GO THEIR OWN WAY ON SOVIET AID

HOUSTON -- Leaders of the world's seven richest nations failed to find a common approach to shore up the sickly Soviet economy, but moved Monday toward a summit compromise allowing each country to go its own way on financial assistance to Moscow....

At a dinner hosted by President Bush at a Houston mansion, the leaders focused on Soviet aid and China. Their foreign ministers, dining at a restaurant, grappled with the same issues. A U.S. official said the problems "have not been put to bed," but said that some recent liberalization in Beijing will be welcomed.

A Japanese foreign ministry official said Prime Minister Kaifu told the other leaders he will resume \$5.2 billion in loans to China that were interrupted last year.

French presidential spokesman Hubert Vedrine said "there are still differences of opinion" on how to deal with the Soviet aid question in a political communique to be issued Tuesday.

A tentative draft, awaiting final approval by the leaders, made no direct reference to the Soviets' plight but prescribed "economic assistance as appropriate" to countries moving toward democracy.

Summit Weighs Study Of Soviet Aid Needs

HOUSTON -- Responding to appeals from President Gorbachev for swift economic aid, leaders of the major Western democracies at the opening of the 16th annual economic summit Monday moved toward agreement on a comprehensive study of the Soviet economy as a precondition of any multination assistance effort.

Movement toward a response to Gorbachev's appeals came as President Bush welcomed the leaders of the summit nations, saying that "a new world of freedom lays before us." At an opening ceremony in near 100-degree heat at Rice University, Bush challenged the leaders "to work toward decisions...that will bring new stability and prosperity to the world."

But the opening session was marked by strains on several complex issues, with the U.S. surprising the other participating nations with its aggressiveness on agricultural trade but on the defensive over international efforts to combat global warming.

Immediately after the opening ceremony, the participants went to work at a closed session that focused on the Soviet Union and on their trade differences. Their talks on how to respond to Gorbachev were to continue at a private dinner.

U.S. OPENS WITH AGGRESSIVE STANCE ON AGRICULTURE

Bush On Defensive Over Global Warming Efforts,
A Source Of Criticism From Europeans

HOUSTON -- The 16th annual economic summit opened here Monday with the U.S. taking a surprisingly aggressive position on agriculture trade but on the defensive over international efforts to combat global warming.

The public expressions of warmth and goodwill that characterized the summit's opening ceremony masked the underlying tensions on trade and environment, two issues on which the Bush Administration has been at odds with most of the other industrialized nations.

The U.S. attack on trade appeared in part designed to deflect attention from the environmental issue in which the Administration is increasingly isolated from the other nations here. Chancellor Kohl, in a letter to the other leaders, called for significant action to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases that cause global warming. But White House press secretary Fitzwater said Monday night he believed the differences could be bridged by the time the summit ends Wednesday.

Bush raised the stakes on the trade issue here by forcefully telling the Europeans that they must negotiate away their farm subsidies, despite political disruptions that might cause in France and West Germany. The first signal of how seriously Bush means to press the issue came Sunday afternoon at a private meeting with Jacques Delors, president of the EC. Europeans at the session said Monday they were shocked by the intensity of the President. "We in Europe underestimated Bush," said an EC official here.

G-7 Leaders Work To Cool Differences On Trade, Aid To USSR

HOUSTON -- The leaders of the seven richest nations perspired literally and figuratively as they began sorting out compromises on hot differences in 95-degree heat Monday....

At a working dinner Monday night, the leaders virtually decided to let each nation develop its own policy on aid to the Soviets, with the U.S. eschewing cash in favor of technical expertise and other forms of indirect aid....

The heads of state and government have deep differences in four broad areas -- agriculture, Soviet aid, sanctions against China and global warming -- but on Monday they began forging compromises to enable them to leave Wednesday without a major rift.

It was clear at once that Bush's positions on almost all issues are unpopular, but aides worked to try to avoid merely "papering over" the differences....

Bush would not go along with a cap on carbon dioxide emissions, as some European, especially Chancellor Kohl, think is necessary to curb global warming. Bush said more data is needed before mandatory restrictions, but he said the U.S. will adopt a stronger overall Clean Air Act by the end of the year.

However, Bush's Chief of Staff, John Sununu, surprised reporters by stating that 96 percent of carbon dioxide comes from nature and only 4 percent from manmade sources. That's an echo of former President Reagan's erroneous statement that "killer" trees pollute the environment. (Ann McFeatters, Scripps Howard)

Summit Quiet On Environment

HOUSTON Environmental groups, seeing their issues on the economic summit's back burner, are lobbying heavily to keep them from being pushed off the stove.

A draft of the U.S. environmental position demonstrates the cautious approach favored by the Bush Administration.

"There seems to be some propensity to deal with the issue without putting all the data on the table," said White House chief of staff Sununu, top architect of the go-slow policy.

Environmentalists -- holding an "Envirosummit" here -- renewed a battle with Sununu over the causes and severity of global warming. They charged the U.S. is out of step on its approach to the environmental protection, and "isolating itself further" in the eyes of the world. (Richard Benedetto, USA TODAY, 4A)

Bush Sets Summit Sights On 'Stability And Prosperity'

HOUSTON -- President Bush convened the first post-Cold War summit of America's closest economic allies Monday, seeking to tackle trade disputes and forge closer ties with the Soviet Union to move the world toward "a new stability and prosperity." ...

Posing afterward for a group picture, Bush told reporters the first formal summit session had yielded "very good discussion" on the trade issue, despite traditional European resistance to eliminating agricultural subsidies. White House Chief of Staff Sununu said Bush hoped to secure a commitment that the U.S. course "is the right direction to go." Given European sensitivities, however, he said Bush might have to settle for "sufficient give and take." (Norman Sandler, UPI)

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Bush Presses Hard For Agricultural Trade Reform

HOUSTON -- President Bush opened the 16th economic summit Monday with a hard push for the elimination of farm subsidies, a key stumbling block to the successful conclusion of international talks on tearing down trade barriers.... Although the contentious issue was tackled early in the session, the leaders did not reach a consensus and are expected to review the matter further Tuesday, said White House press secretary Fitzwater.... Chief of Staff Sununu acknowledged that major strides toward resolving the matter may not be reached during the three-day summit....

In briefings with reporters, U.S. officials and their counterparts from France and Germany hinted a recent proposal by the chairman of the GATT agricultural working group could provide a framework for resolution of the issue. (Bob Webster, UPI)

Bush Finds Himself In Minority On Soviet Aid, Farm Subsidies

HOUSTON -- Leaders of the seven largest industrial democracies opened their first post-Cold War economic summit Monday in search of face-saving compromises to bridge deep divisions over aiding the Soviet Union, ending agricultural export subsidies and combating global warming. As the group began three days of deliberations here that will focus on the economic impact of communism's collapse in Europe, President Bush found himself in the minority on each major issue....

"It's nice to be able to have your cake and eat it, too, if you can, but that's really not the way the world works," said Secretary Yeutter, who appeared at a briefing for reporters with U.S. Trade Rep. Hills. Solving the dispute on agriculture subsidies is "ten times as important to the economy of the world as what happens in our relationship with the Soviet Union," Yeutter insisted. But Guy Legras, the EC's director general for agriculture, said that elimination of export subsidies "means we would be out of business." He argued that "free trade in agriculture is impossible because it's different."

European Nations Accuse U.S. Of Trying To Stampede Them On Trade

HOUSTON -- The U.S. and its industrial allies appeared Monday to be headed for a sharp clash over reform of world trade, with U.S. officials predicting economic disaster if no progress is made and European officials accusing the U.S. of trying to stampede them. Even before the opening session of their annual economic summit, the two sides took diametrically opposite stands on the politically sensitive issue of how each country helps its farmers to the detriment of those elsewhere.

U.S. officials pictured cutbacks in such help as central to protecting against a breakdown of the \$3 trillion-a-year global trading system. EC officials scoffed at that position and said the help is essential to maintain stable farm markets. "What's at stake is the economic renaissance of the 21st century," Carla Hills, U.S. Trade Rep., declared at an afternoon press briefing. "I think that is slightly overstated," Guy LeGras, the European Community's director general for agriculture, shot back at a separate briefing. (Peter Gosselin & John Mashek, BOSTON GLOBE)

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Trade Experts Weigh Dangers Of Breakdown Over Farm Subsidies

HOUSTON -- As a dispute between the U.S. and the EC over farm subsidies threatens to escalate, trade experts wonder whether fears of a breakdown in the world trading system are so far-fetched.

"I think it's a potential risk, I don't think it's theoretical," Fred Bergsten, director of the Washington-based Institute for International Economics, said Monday....

U.S. officials say if the Community refuses to do away with the subsidies, talks on rewriting trade rules established under the GATT could break down irretrievably. Some experts say such a development could spell the end of GATT.... That would most likely lead to higher prices for consumers, higher unemployment and a general climate of uncertainty among businessmen on what trading rules apply with which nation.

"The cataclysmic scenario is we could forget everything we learned in the last 35 years," Bill Brock, former U.S. Trade Rep. and Labor Secretary, said. (Andrew Hurst, Reuter)

SUMMIT PARTNERS TRY TO FIND CONSENSUS ON AID TO SOVIETS

HOUSTON -- President Bush and his economic summit partners moved Monday toward a consensus for the West to provide a blend of financial and technical assistance to the Soviet Union.

They also are considering sending teams of experts to Moscow to determine the kinds of Western aid most needed to encourage and support reform efforts.

The emerging compromise is broad enough to bridge the differences among the Western powers, enabling West Germany and France to go ahead with financial support for the Soviets without criticism from their allies....

In Moscow, Soviet officials said Monday that they would welcome Western aid, but some made a point of rejecting the linking of any conditions to such assistance.

Summit Warned Gorbachev In Danger And It Must Help Him

HOUSTON -- President Mitterrand dramatically warned Monday that Mikhail Gorbachev was in danger without swift Western aid but the world's biggest industrial democracies could agree for now only to study Moscow's needs....

"There is consensus that one should start with technical cooperation to identify the problems," said Canada's Foreign Minister, Joe Clark....

But Mitterrand said the Soviet president's fate could lie in the balance if the West did not provide quick financial aid.

"We mustn't pile up conditions. If we don't decide on immediate aid, there's a risk that there'll be neither a medium term (for Gorbachev) nor reforms," a French spokesman quoted Mitterrand as saying.

The spokesman added that in principle all accepted the idea that the West help Gorbachev, but the question was how.

Soviet Leaders Make It Plain: We Need Lots Of Western Aid, Now

MOSCOW -- As leaders of the major capitalist countries settle down to discuss whether to give aid to the Soviet Union, Soviet leaders say they need lots of Western aid, and they need it fast.

Speaking to reporters at the Communist Party congress, Foreign Minister Shevardnadze and other top officials stressed Monday that economic assistance is in the interest both of the West and of Moscow.

"The supply of credit will undoubtedly help perestroika, and the democratization and humanization of our society," Shevardnadze said during a break in the congress proceedings. "It's not a question of the rich giving crumbs to the poor," Deputy Prime Minister Abalkin said a few minutes later. Credit would be used "to stabilize the social-political situation in the country," Abalkin said, and "to win popular confidence for the program of President Gorbachev and the government."

White House Chief of Staff Sununu said Monday that an initial assessment of Soviet needs could be carried out by a number of Western financial organizations, including the World Bank and the IMF. But Gorbachev's personal adviser on economic affairs, Nikolai Petrakov, told the BOSTON GLOBE that time was of the essence. "If it's going to come in two years' time, we may as well forget it," Petrakov said.

Western Aid Issue Sharply Debated By Soviet Leaders

MOSCOW -- Senior Soviet officials appealed Monday for Western economic help in moving the moribund Soviet economy toward a free market, but the issue has divided the Soviet Union almost as badly as it has split potential donor countries.

While the seven leading Western industrial powers met in Houston to debate whether to throw a financial lifesaver to President Gorbachev, liberals and conservatives in the Communist Party differed sharply over what kind of aid to seek, and with what kind of conditions....

Some liberals, such as the chairman of the Leningrad City Council, Anatoly Sobchak, warned that large amounts of aid poured into the present system would be wasted. They called instead for Western investment in the form of small, private joint business ventures.

..."No money should be given into the hands of the bureaucrats, and no money should be invested into any kind of middleman organization. There should be concrete projects that quickly pay for themselves," Sobchak said.

Some conservatives, on the other hand, caution that Western aid would be the wedge of capitalist ideology and would eventually turn the Soviet Union into a colony supplying cheap resources and labor.

HOUSTON -- They are there, quietly working in their assigned workplace, elbow-to-elbow with a row of fresh-faced young people from Rice University who are eagerly overseeing copies of THE RICE THRESHER.

They are six veteran Soviet journalists....

"I think that what will happen is that each country will use the summit to determine their own agenda," said Alexander Shalnev, a correspondent with IZVESTIA. "Each country will go its own way."

He did caution that some Soviet journalists have developed a view of President Bush as someone who is apt to make an "unpredictable" move -- perhaps a move toward some immediate aid. During his tenure, forecasting Bush's policy moves has proved difficult for some members of the Soviet media, Shalnev said.

"Under Reagan there were so many leaks of information that you could predict ahead of time what was going to happen," he said.

SUMMIT HOST COMMITTEE USING DEFAULTED S&L PROPERTY

U.S., EUROPEAN TEXTILE PRODUCERS AGREE ON COMMON STRATEGY

NEW YORK -- Three groups representing U.S. and European manufacturers of cloth and clothing have agreed to push for a global quota system exempting developed countries. Such a system would replace the current set of rules governing the \$200-billion-a-year world trade in textiles and apparel.

The proposed system, announced Friday in a joint statement by the American Textile Manufacturers Institute, the American Apparel Manufacturers Association and Europe's largest textile and apparel companies, is a little-disguised attempt to halt the proliferation of Asian products in U.S. and European markets. It takes aim particularly at Hong Kong, South Korea, Taiwan and China.

Police sources, who insisted on anonymity, said at least three people were killed and more than 100 injured in the unrest.

Chamorro addressed the nation on state radio and television as thousands of Sandinistas backing a week-long wave of strikes returned to the streets and, defying government orders, erected more barricades. There was some question, however, of whether the Sandinista-dominated army would support Chamorro.

MANAGUA -- President Chamorro ordered the army Monday to take back the streets of the Nicaraguan capital from striking pro-Sandinista union workers but strike leaders said their protest would continue.

Chamorro said in a message read over government radio that she had ordered the army to move immediately, along with police, to clear barricades from Managua's streets and take back occupied government buildings.

"I call on all sectors of Nicaragua society to defend our sovereign liberties and to end this situation that seeks to take the country to total ruin," Chamorro said....

On Monday the situation appeared to move beyond a protest against Chamorro's market-oriented economic reforms and move toward a street referendum on the new government. "Both sides appear to be moving further and further into a hard line," one Managua-based Western diplomat said.

MANAGUA -- Dozens of student supporters of a Sandinista strike seized a government broadcasting center on Monday and prevented President Chamorro from addressing the nation.

Instead, Nicaraguans heard manifestos for two hours urging people to join the week-old walkouts organized by the leftist Sandinista opposition....

The students seized Radio Nicaragua and the state television studios shortly before 5 p.m.... After about two hours, a student announced over Radio Nicaragua that police told them to leave and they were doing so peacefully....

Daniel Ortega...urged Chamorro's government to negotiate, saying in a radio interview: "This conflict cannot be solved by force. Any attempt in that direction is an invitation to chaos."

Four Dead In Managua Strike Violence

MANAGUA -- A week-old general strike backed by the opposition Sandinista Front against the new government of President Chamorro turned violent Monday, transforming the streets of this capital into scenes of chaos.

Workers, students and teenagers loyal to the Sandinistas exchanged volleys of rocks with Chamorro's supporters and gunfire punctuated the clashes. The police, many of whom remain loyal to the Sandinistas, at first appeared unwilling or unable to control the Sandinista mobs manning scores of barricades. Late Monday afternoon, however, police began clearing the streets, in some cases with bulldozers.

At about the same time, the government announced that the Sandinistas had seized control of one of the two state-owned television stations as well as Radio Nicaragua.

Hospitals confirmed four deaths 54 people injured.

SOVIETS VOTE TO EXPAND POLITBURO
Move Will Dilute Hard-liners' Hold

MOSCOW -- The Soviet Communist Party congress, in a tactical victory for President Gorbachev, voted Monday to expand the composition of the decision-making Politburo to include representatives of all 15 republics.

The change in the Communist Party rules adopted Monday will alter the nature of the leadership body that has been regarded as the seat of ultimate power in the Soviet Union over the past seven decades....

Gorbachev, having failed in his primary goal of using the congress to renovate the Communist Party from top to bottom, now appears to be attempting to limit the damage by preventing the conservatives from gaining too strong a grip on the new leadership bodies. The decision to give the first secretaries of all republican party organizations ex-officio seats on the Politburo will in effect dilute what otherwise would have been a hard-line majority.

The congress also Monday adopted a toughly worded statement on military policy, declaring that the Soviet Union is still under threat from the West and needs to strengthen its armed forces.

GORBACHEV SAYS HARDLINERS CANNOT TURN CLOCK BACK

MOSCOW -- President Gorbachev said Tuesday that hardline communists had no hope of using the current party congress to turn the clock back and foil his perestroika reform policy.

"If some delegates arrived here -- and that was obvious at different meetings and during some speeches -- in the hope of turning the party back to the past conditions of command and orders, they are deeply mistaken," he told the congress.

"The political line on perestroika, with small exceptions, is being supported by this congress." ...

"There is only one indisputable conclusion," he said. "The party will remain the vanguard of society only if it realizes its new role and in the shortest possible period completes its reform on the road of democratization." (Susan Cornwell, Reuter)

RUSSIAN CHIEF YELTSIN PROPOSES COOPERATION TREATY WITH LITHUANIA

MOSCOW -- Ignoring the central Soviet government, Russian President Boris Yeltsin proposed Monday a bilateral cooperation treaty with the restive republic of Lithuania.

In a letter to the Lithuanian government, Yeltsin and his prime minister, Ivan Silayev, said the giant Russian republic would like to conclude a treaty on trade and commercial arrangements by next year. (Jeff Sallot, TORONTO GLOBE AND MAIL)

PLO STAGED MAY BOMBING, ISRAEL SAYS

Blast Shattered Jerusalem Market 2 Days Before Speedboat Raid

JERUSALEM -- Israel has given U.S. officials intelligence evidence indicating that a pipe-bomb attack that killed one person and injured none at a Jerusalem vegetable market May 28 was the work of a PLO military unit, official sources here said Monday.

Israeli sources said the information showed that the attack was carried out by Palestinians affiliated with Force 17, an elite squad organized by PLO chairman Arafat's centrist Fatah Movement, and suggests that the mainstream PLO was involved in an attack on Israeli civilians prior to the abortive speedboat assault on the Israeli coast by a PLO splinter group two days later....

According to Israeli intelligence data -- which sources said has been closely guarded to protect informants -- the bombing was carried out by Palestinians living in the Israeli-occupied territories on instructions received from abroad. According to the Israeli account, the instructions were probably delivered through a Force 17 operative in Amman, Jordan....

U.S. officials were informed of the Israeli information before President Bush announced his decision to suspend dialogue with the PLO June 20, sources here said. The sources said Israel was told that U.S. officials had discussed the bombing with the PLO and suggested that the incident may have played a role in Bush's decision.

U.S. officials refused to comment on the Israeli account.

ALBANIA ALLOWS REFUGEES TO LEAVE

BUDAPEST -- A group of 51 Albanians who sought asylum left Tirana by plane for Czechoslovakia Monday night, and diplomats said they were hopeful the departure indicated a solution is near in the refugee crisis, in which an estimated 6,000 would-be emigrants have crowded into foreign embassies in the Albanian capital.

The plane arrived in Prague early Tuesday morning and Czechoslovak Foreign Minister Jiri Dienstbier welcomed the Albanians, Reuter reported.

Forty more were reported preparing to leave for Hungary Tuesday, and Monday night West German, French and Italian embassy officials in Tirana were helping 4,500 refugees jammed into their embassy compounds fill out passport applications.

AGENCY BLASTS NEIL BUSH'S ACTIONS WHILE ON THRIFT BOARD

As a director of a now-defunct Colorado savings and loan, President Bush's son Neil was engaged in not only a conflict of interest, but "one of the worst kinds of conflict of interest," according to a federal document released Monday.

In withholding information from his fellow board members when they were considering extending a line of credit to one of Neil Bush's business partners, Bush led Silverado Banking, Savings and Loan of Denver "to the point of committing a violation of one of the most important of the (federal) regulations aimed at eliminating insider abuse," the document said.

"Bush's conduct here was one of the worst kinds of conflict of interest.... It is precisely this kind of conduct that leads to gross abuses and harm when not strictly controlled. It is precisely this kind of conduct that entails the possibility of abnormal risk, or loss, or other damage," said the document, released by the federal OTS....

"...The fact that no violation occurred was not because Bush did anything to prevent it," OTS said. In fact, "Bush did everything in his power to bring about a regulatory violation."

BUSH'S SON DEFENDS S&L ROLE

Misconduct Denied; Loan Acknowledged As A 'Sweet Deal'

DENVER -- An angry, embattled Neil Bush Monday defended his conduct as a director of a failed Denver savings and loan as well as his acceptance of what he conceded was "an incredibly sweet deal" in the form of a \$100,000 loan from a Denver investor that he did not have to repay.

President Bush's 35-year-old son, who faces a disciplinary hearing this fall before federal thrift regulators, decided this weekend to launch a one-man public relations campaign in connection with his role as a director of the defunct Silverado Savings and Loan, whose collapse is expected to cost taxpayers about \$1 billion. He issued a combative eight-page response to the charges against him and began inviting reporters to his spartan office here to hear his version of the events that have made him a figure in the S&L bailout, largest financial scandal in U.S. history.

Chewing gum and digging through stacks of papers on the office floor, Bush acknowledged in an interview Monday that he got "an incredibly sweet deal" in 1984 when Denver investor Kenneth Good lent him \$100,000 and then forgave the debt. Bush also revealed that he has decided to report that six-year-old payment as income on his 1990 tax return.

But that loan, Bush insisted, was "totally unrelated" to his work as a director of Silverado.

Other charges against him, Bush complained, stem from political "opportunism" and "press sensationalism."

CONGRESS INVESTIGATING DEAL TO BUY FAILED THRIFTS

Less than an hour after a top banking official had overridden staff objections, the U.S. agency overseeing the savings and loan bailout approved the sale of 15 failed thrifts to an Arizona businessman, previously indicted for fraud, who put up only \$1,000 to secure the \$70 million deal.

Wayne Frena, a financial analyst with the Federal Home Loan Bank Board of Dallas, told members of a Senate judiciary subcommittee Monday that the head of his office, George Barclay, ordered Frena and other staff members to issue a recommendation on behalf of the businessman, James Fail of Phoenix. This allowed the Bank Board's main office in Washington to approve the deal 15 minutes later.

...Charges of political favoritism, of ties to President Bush and of sweetheart deals filled the hearing room as the subcommittee opened its investigation of Fail's purchase of the 15 failed savings and loan institutions, now operating under the name of Bluebonnet Savings in Dallas....

After two financial analysts who worked on the deal testified, Metzenbaum stated, "The U.S. taxpayer, compliments of the dealmakers...send Mr. Fail a check for what amounts to \$23 million every month."

SENATOR QUESTIONS S&L SALE

The chairman of a Senate Judiciary subcommittee said Monday that he wants to subpoena a former aide to President Bush who allegedly helped an Arizona insurance executive secure a \$1.8 billion subsidy from savings and loan regulators.

The insurance executive, James Fail of Phoenix, borrowed \$70 million while putting up \$1,000 of his own in December 1988 to acquire 15 thrifts that now operate as the Dallas-based Bluebonnet Savings Bank.

The reconstituted thrift was the nation's most profitable large S&L last year, Sen. Metzenbaum said.

Robert Roe, a former official of the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. who helped negotiate the Bluebonnet deal, told Metzenbaum's subcommittee on antitrust, monopolies and business rights that Robert Thompson, once congressional liaison to Bush when he was vice president, had represented Fail in the matter.

However, Fail, Thompson and M. Danny Wall, the former chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which oversaw the FSLIC, all declined to testify before the panel.

Metzenbaum...said he would push the panel to subpoena the three, and others, within the week.

MEDICARE CUTS OPPOSED AS DEFICIT CURB

By 88 percent to 8 percent, Americans 18 or older oppose substantial cuts in Medicare to reduce the federal deficit, according to a new Gallup survey released Monday.

The survey, sponsored in June by the Federation of American Health Systems, which represents for-profit hospitals, also found that 70 percent of the respondents believed raising taxes on high-income people; on alcohol, tobacco and gasoline; and on businesses that create pollution would be "excellent" or "good" ways of reducing the deficit.

Half of those surveyed thought cutting defense would be an excellent or good way to cut the deficit, but 43 percent disagreed.

In addition to opposing Medicare cuts, 65 percent of those surveyed believed the proportion of GNP spent on all U.S. health care should be increased over the 11 percent level now in effect. On average, the favored proportion was 19.9 percent.

Reps. Hunter and Campbell have some advice for federal budget negotiators wrestling with new tax proposals: Get the foreigners first.

ENVIRONMENTALISTS ATTACK PLAN TO REOPEN PLUTONIUM FACILITY

The Department of Energy's plan to reopen a plutonium production plant as part of a nuclear cleanup program "is like saying we need crack houses to fight drug addiction," an environmental group said Tuesday.

The Institute for Energy and Environmental Research said in a study commissioned by the Hanford Education Action League of Spokane, Wash., that the plant on the department's Hanford Reservation in Eastern Washington is unsafe.

The study also said that closing the 35-year-old plant could save \$300 million to \$400 million over the next 10 years.

Mary Kayne Heinze, a DOE public affairs officer, said there would be no comment until officials had a chance to look at the report.

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FEDS: CHEMICAL-WEAPONS ACCORD COULD BE JEOPARDIZED
IF ARSENAL CLEANUP HALTED

DENVER -- A critical U.S.-Soviet treaty on chemical weapons could be jeopardized if a judge grants the state's request to halt cleanup of nerve gas vapors at the Rocky Mountain Arsenal, federal officials warned Monday.

State officials are seeking a court order from U.S. District Judge Jim Carrigan to halt nerve gas decontamination at the arsenal near Denver unless workers are better protected....

But Army Col. Daniel Voss, commander of the arsenal, testified Monday that interruption of the decontamination work could jeopardize U.S. access to similar chemical weapons plants in the Soviet Union and undermine negotiations for verification of chemical weapons disposal.

The hearing on the state's request continues Tuesday.

HOOKS ALLEGES U.S. HARASSMENT OF BLACK OFFICIALS

CLAIMS ABOUT COST OF BARRY PROBE CALLED BAFFLING

Federal prosecutors say they are baffled at the repeated statement by many in the black community that the federal government's prosecution of Mayor Barry has cost \$42 million. It's not true, they say. They find themselves saying that a lot.

Most recently they have said it in court. A motion filed by prosecutors in the Barry case May 31 noted that the cost of running the U.S. attorney's office in Washington now runs about \$26 million a year, a figure that makes Barry's claims about the cost of the probe "wildly exaggerated."

"Any claim that this office spent around twice its annual budget in conducting its investigation of defendant's activities over a 13-month period, while at the same time prosecuting over 22,000 other cases annually, is absurd on its face," the motion said. Law enforcement officials estimate that the cost of pursuing 10 complex investigations involving Barry or his subordinates from 1982 to the present, including the Jan. 18 sting at the Vista Hotel, is between \$2 million and \$3 million.

COMMODITIES TRADERS CONVICTED ON ONLY FRACTION OF COUNTS

CHICAGO -- In a stunning blow to the government, a federal jury Monday returned a mixed bag of verdicts against three members of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, acquitting one trader of two counts while convicting two other defendants of a fraction of the charges against them.

After 11 days of deliberations, jurors convicted Robert Mosky, a Merc currency futures broker, of seven counts of violating the Commodity Exchange Act by cheating customers. Jurors convicted trader Danny Scheck of one count of violating the act, and acquitted David Zatz, also a trader, of two counts of commodity law violations....

Later, in the lobby of the Dirksen Federal Building, Assistant U.S. Attorneys James Fleissner and Mark Pollack declined to characterize the mixed verdicts. Fleissner noted that the jury "saw fit to convict two of the defendants" and said the government planned to retry them on the deadlocked counts.

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NASA REPORTS PROGRESS IN PINPOINTING SHUTTLE FUEL LEAK

Space agency officials confirmed Monday the existence of a significant and persistent fuel leak in the umbilical line that connects at least two of the nation's space shuttles to their silo-shaped fuel tanks.

...Weekend tests at a Rockwell International laboratory convinced engineers that the fuel leak aboard the two shuttles is serious and persistent. It occurs when supercold liquid hydrogen fuel is pumped through the pipes, flanges and seals that form the umbilical connecting the winged orbiter and its fuel tank....

"We really don't know what the problem is yet," said Robert Crippen, astronaut director of the space shuttle program.

The United States Postal Service announced plans Monday to contract out more than 12,000 new jobs in order to save between \$10 and \$12 an hour per worker.

ECONOMIC SUMMIT

ABC'S TED KOPPEL: In the sweltering heat and humidity of Houston President Bush is hosting his first economic summit and finding significant disagreements between himself and the leaders of America's six main industrial allies. The disagreements are about agricultural subsidies, global warming and what kind of help to give Mikhail Gorbachev.

ABC'S BRIT HUME:

[TV COVERAGE of the leaders walking together.]

These economic summits were originally conceived as an annual chance for heart-to-heart talks among leaders under no pressure for grand agreements. But they have now evolved into ceremonial extravaganzas involving enormous expense and massive news coverage. As a result there must be at least a pretense of major progress. (PRESIDENT BUSH: "Together we're called upon as allies and as friends to work toward decisions here in Houston that will bring a new stability and prosperity to the world.")

There are no profound divisions separating President Bush and his guests here. But there are some disagreements on which they will want to show progress. Their meetings today, for example, focused on agriculture. France's Mitterrand and others in Europe don't want to ditch the huge farm export subsidies that make it hard for U.S. and other farmers worldwide to sell products abroad. The dispute has stalled the current round of international trade talks in Uruguay, and the President would like a summit commitment to push those talks forward. In addition, Germany's Kohl is intent on pumping money into the comatose Soviet economy, partly to sweeten for Moscow the bitter pill of German unification. Mrs. Thatcher and President Bush think it's a bad idea, won't do it themselves, but won't stand in the way. All the leaders are under pressure to do more to protect the environment. And the U.S. environmental lobby is almost an eighth delegation here.... They pass as journalists to get into press briefings, then use the opportunity to brief reporters themselves. They also hold their own news conferences where they plug the issue of global warming. The Bush Administration gets low marks on that subject since it won't go along with Kohl and the West Germans's idea of international limits on emissions of so-called greenhouse gases. The most difficult of these issues is agriculture. Farmers in every country, including the U.S., have come to depend to some extent on government subsidies and trade protection. Getting rid of them might mean freer trade worldwide, but that's a long-run benefit -- not necessarily appealing to leaders who must face re-election in the short run.

KOPPEL: As if to underscore what a sensitive issue ending farm subsidies is, some Texas farmers with two longhorn steer in tow demonstrated at the summit today. The heads of state, however, are well aware that the farmers are just one part of an enormously complex puzzle.

ABC'S STEPHEN AUG: This field of grain in Europe may not seem to have much to do with this factory making pipeline valves in Texas. But they are both caught up in a complicated web of trade restrictions that world leaders are trying to untangle. The Houston factory has to compete with cheaper counterfeit valves made in Third World nations, and many of those developing countries say they will not honor foreign patents until industrial nations, mainly the Europeans and Japan, stop protecting their own farmers and import more agricultural products from the Third World. The argument over agricultural trade barriers has stalled worldwide trade negotiations that have been going on for four years.

(U.S. TRADE REP. CARLA HILLS: "If we are unable to break the impasse between the European Community and the exporting nations, we might have 40 nations walk from these talks.")

The Europeans argue that they need to subsidize their 10 million farmers just to keep them in business.

(NICO WEGTER, European Community: "It can never be accepted as a message to be given to the European farmers that finally no support whatsoever could be expected anymore.")

The Bush Administration wants to phase out agricultural subsidies over 10 years to get the trade talks going again. That could persuade developing nations to allow more foreign investment and trade in services like accounting, insurance and banking, where American firms excel. At stake is more than \$1 trillion worth of trade.

(FRED BERGSTEN, Institute for International Economics: "If the global trade talks were to fail, then the world trading system could begin to disintegrate. That would mean a loss of jobs in this country and elsewhere as markets around the world begin to shrink.")

Participants in the trade talks have set a deadline of next December for reaching an agreement. Some analysts say a push from the leaders here at the summit could be the last hope for reaching an agreement on time.

KOPPEL: The Western leaders are divided over the issue of economic aid to the Soviet Union. In Moscow, where the Soviet party congress is still underway, there is no unanimity either.

ABC'S JIM LAURIE reports that in the halls outside the party congress there was talk of Western economic aid, but a difference of opinion. Conservative politicians tend to approve. "Help from a friend when we're in need is a good thing," says Russian hardliner Ivan Poleshkov [phonetic]. Others disagree. In fact, economists here believe even billions of dollars would do little good. It could buy hard-pressed consumers more goods, but most of it would be wasted by inefficient centralized bureaucracies. Economists like Alexei Easimov [phonetic] suggest the West wait until there is real movement toward a market economy. Aid now might actually set back Gorbachev's plan for reform.

(EASIMOV: "The massive aid, unconditioned assistance, will play directly into the hands of conservatives, because that will help centralized economy structure to survive longer.")

So if not money now, what does Gorbachev want? Apparently just about what President Bush has proposed -- experts to teach the Soviets how to build a free-market economy and a promise of financial aid when it begins to work.

(ABC-Lead)

NBC'S TOM BROKAW: One year ago, anyone who predicted that the leaders of the world's seven richest industrialized countries would consider giving buckets of money to Moscow would have been put down as a lunatic. But today at the opening of this year's economic summit meeting in Houston they were debating just that.

NBC'S JOHN COCHRAN:

[TV COVERAGE of the leaders walking together.]

For the second time in less than a week, President Bush is going for a big win at an allied summit. Last week in London the Western allies bought Bush's ideas for reassuring Moscow that NATO has no hostile intentions. But this week the industrial powers are divided on how to help the Soviets. President Bush says American advice, yes -- but no American money until Moscow cleans up its act at home and abroad.

(GOV. SUNUNU: "Certainly the assistance sent by the Soviets to Cuba and the spending within the Soviet Union itself on its own defense structure obviously is felt by the United States that these funds can be better used domestically by the Soviets to reform their own economy.")

The summit leaders are equally divided on whether they should send money to Moscow. In the no-money camp, the Americans, the British, and the Japanese, who first want the Soviets to return Japanese islands taken at the end of World War II. In the money-now camp, the Italians, the French, and the West Germans, who are trying to buy Moscow's approval of a united Germany in NATO. In the middle, Canada's Prime Minister Mulroney, who is offering a compromise: send a team of Western and Japanese experts to determine what kind of help the Soviets need, and then decide. President Bush likes that idea because it allows time for some dust to settle after the current Soviet power struggle.

(SUNUNU: "If you look at the debate taking place in the party congress there still is not unanimity in the Soviet Union that the kind of economic reforms that Mr. Gorbachev has been talking about implementing -- there is not unanimity and support and endorsement of those policies.")

Instead of trying to get unanimity in Houston, President Bush wants the leaders to agree that each country should make its own decision about aid for the Soviets. And for now President Bush will limit American help to providing experts, not cash.

BROKAW talks with COCHRAN:

BROKAW: Are their political as well as financial reasons for George Bush being so dug in on all of this?

COCHRAN: Oh, you bet. He's got to worry about conservative opinion in his own party, and when he picked up his morning newspaper here in Houston he saw a national poll showing that by a two-to-one edge Americans are against giving cash to Moscow. They are willing to provide the sort technical help the President talks about. They even think Gorbachev ought to be invited to these economic summits. But when it comes to their tax dollars at work, they don't want them at work in Moscow. (NBC-3)

CBS'S DAN RATHER: An economic meeting involving world leaders got underway this afternoon in Houston. On hand were the leaders of the U.S., France, West Germany, Britain, Italy, Japan and Canada. Since there wasn't a lot of news, everyone seemed to be talking about the weather. As it always is this time of year in Houston, it was hot. The leaders were also talking about what divides President Bush from some of the others and what he's trying to do about it.

CBS'S LESLEY STAHL: President Bush, the host of the Houston summit, is trying to paper over one of the big differences among the leaders, aid for the Soviet Union. He's going to propose a vague statement of guidelines allowing each country to go its own way and agreeing to send a joint technical team to study Soviet needs. But the West Germans are pushing for much more definitive language in the joint communique committing the West to helping Gorbachev. The harmony reached at the NATO summit last week seems to be melting away in the 96-degree temperatures here in Houston where, so far anyway, heat is as much the story as anything. The White House built a specially equipped platform for today's formal arrival ceremony on the campus of Rice University just to help the leaders survive the thickness and the steam of Houston's outdoors. Air conditioning units placed under the platform blasted cool air up through vents. Thatcher of Britain, warned of the possibility of upward gusts, came equipped, reportedly, with weights sown into the hem of her skirt.

(PRIME MINISTER MULRONEY: "The Canadians have been in the heat too long.")

After sampling Houston's midday sun, Mulroney of Canada asked that a canopy be built over the arrival platform. He said he made the request for the well-being of 73-year-old Mitterrand of France. President Bush cut down his opening remarks from five minutes to 78 seconds.

(PRESIDENT BUSH: "These economic summits have become a framework for frank and constructive dialogue.")

The first session on the subject of Soviet aid got going this afternoon.

(PRESIDENT BUSH to Chancellor Kohl indoors: "It's cooler in here. Come in, come in, Helmut.")

President Bush has an uncanny way of matching summits with severe weather conditions. With Gorbachev it was Malta in the hurricane season. With Thatcher he picked Bermuda in the gale-force storm season. What's odd about this summit is that George Bush lived here for 13 years. He can't have forgotten what Houston was like in July.

CBS'S RAY BRADY: Sweltering diplomats were joined here today by hot-under-the-collar American farmers, angry American farmers, charging that policies being pushed at the summit by President Bush could drive them right off the farm.

(FARMER: "And what we're here to tell you today is it's not right, and it will destroy the American family farmer.")

(FARMER: "Prices will just go to the bottom, and when they do it'll put us all out of business.")

While there are differences at this summit over aid to Russia, the environment and other issues, the farm question is the most contentious among the nations and farmers here.

BRADY continues: The U.S. spends around \$8.4 billion a year, and Europe \$34 billion in subsidies to farmers to keep farm income stable so they'll continue to provide food. Tariffs and quotas keep many foods from moving freely around the world. Do away with all that. Let farmers compete, the Administration is saying. Taxpayers and consumers would save money and U.S. farmers could break into more foreign markets.

(U.S. TRADE REP. HILLS: "To bring down protections, vis-a-vis Europe, would put \$11 billion into the pockets of American farmers, which does work out to \$3,400 for each farmer and farm worker in America.

(FARMER: "And I love my country. But we don't believe that the U.S. position will put that money in those pockets.")

And in Minnesota, Siebert Peterson [phonetic] asks what about competition from low-cost soybean producers such as Brazil? That would mean his son Aaron could not become the fourth generation to work this farm.

(PETERSON: "They have no workman's compensation, they have no unemployment insurance, they have no real estate taxes, their wages are \$3 a day. I can't compete with that.")

U.S. farmers argue also the Bush proposal could bring in a flood of foreign foods tainted with dangerous pesticides....

(HILLS: "If it's tainted, keep it out. If it's good food, let it come in and compete.")

The European nations at this summit are fighting hard against the President's proposal, saying the bigger, more efficient U.S. farms would wipe out their smaller farms. But Administration officials here are saying that if all this isn't resolved soon then the Cold War just ended could be followed by a red-hot trade war. (CBS-4)

SOVIET ECONOMY

NBC'S BOB ABERNETHY reports that clumsy planning, massive inefficiency, too few incentives, bad roads, old trucks and inadequate warehousing mean up to a third of all the food the Soviet Union produces never gets to market. Most Soviet leaders have at last acknowledged their need for Western aid. They talk at length about moving toward what President Gorbachev calls a regulated market economy, but they can't agree on how to do so.

(ED HEWETT, Brookings Institution: "I have absolutely no interest now in writing a check for this government, because I think they'd just waste the money like they wasted all the other money they've spent the last five years.")

Many experts think what the Soviet people need most is training in the skills and attitudes of the free market. Seventy-two years of dictatorship have left the Soviets wary of taking responsibility and making decisions. (NBC-5)

HOSTAGES

RATHER: Iran hinted again today that one or more Western hostages in Lebanon may be freed soon. Today's hint came from Iran's state radio. Saturday the official Islamic Republic News Agency also suggested a release might be imminent. Middle East sources indicate that Brian Keenan of Ireland may be the hostage first in line to get out now, followed by Anglican Church envoy Terry Waite. (CBS-8)

SOVIET PARTY CONGRESS

KOPPEL: Mikhail Gorbachev won an important victory at the Communist Party congress today when it voted to revise the makeup of the party's ruling Politburo. The new Politburo will include members from all 15 Soviet republics, more in tune with Gorbachev's reform than the Russians, who have dominated the body in the past. (ABC-2, NBC-4, CBS-5)

ALBANIA

KOPPEL reports that in Tirana 51 Albanian refugees have been allowed to leave the Czechoslovak Embassy and fly out of the country. They are the first of nearly 6,000 Albanians who started moving into the embassies a week ago, more than half of them in the West German Embassy alone. There was also word that two Albanians trying to cross the border to Greece were shot and killed by Albanian border guards. (ABC-3, CBS-6)

ABORTION

BROKAW: The issue is abortion, and the fight is in Louisiana, but it could affect the whole country if it gets to the U.S. Supreme Court. Here's why. The Louisiana legislature has passed a second very tough anti-abortion law, but this one does allow abortions for victims of rape or incest. It could set the standard for other states if the Louisiana governor signs it -- if.

NBC'S KENLEY JONES reports that Gov. Roemer says the Supreme Court should set some national standards for abortion policy. He says leaving it to 50 state legislatures is a disaster.

(NBC-Lead, ABC-4, CBS-3)

NASA PILOTS

RATHER: Another setback for the U.S. space program tonight, an embarrassing first for NASA. Two veteran space shuttle crew commanders have been grounded for breaking flight safety rules. This comes as the entire U.S. shuttle fleet itself is grounded over safety concerns and amid new questions about the competence of the space agency and its contractors. (CBS-Lead)

KOPPEL: Another embarrassment for NASA. Two veteran shuttle astronauts, Robert "Hoot" Gibson and David Walker, have been grounded for violating flight safety rules. Gibson ignored regulations and took part in an air race in Texas over the weekend. He was involved in a collision in which another pilot was killed. No word on what grounded Walker. (ABC-6, NBC-7)

NICARAGUA

RATHER: In Nicaragua, supporters of President Chamorro and pro-Sandinista workers fought each other today in the streets of Managua. The clash grew out of a week-long strike called by the Sandinistas to protest what they say are massive government firings. At least one person was killed and several others were wounded in Nicaragua. (CBS-7)

S&L

ABC'S JIM WOOTEN reports that Sen. Metzenbaum was very angry. The people he really wanted at today's hearing didn't show up. Among the no-shows was James Fail, an Arizona insurance executive guaranteed a federal subsidy of a billion dollars to help his takeover of several insolvent Texas S&Ls in 1988. According to the senator, Fail invested a mere \$1,000 of his own money and \$60 million in loans from insurance companies he controlled in order to create Bluebonnet Savings and Loan from 15 failed thrift institutions. Moreover, Metzenbaum suggested Robert Thompson, a lobbyist and former assistant to then-Vice President Bush and President Reagan, greased the wheels in Washington for the deal with M. Danny Wall, former chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank board. And in return, Thompson was loaned nearly half a million dollars by Bluebonnet and one of Fail's insurance companies, including \$350,000 to purchase a Capitol Hill townhouse. Metzenbaum now plans to subpoena Fail, Thompson, Wall and others invited today who didn't make an appearance.

(ABC-7, NBC-2, CBS-2)

URANIUM POISONING/NAVAHO INDIANS

ABC'S KEN KASHIWAHARA reports that in the 1950s and '60s, 15,000 Navaho and white men worked in uranium mines producing fuel for nuclear weapons and plants. The federal government was the sole purchaser of the uranium. Documents show the government knew about the radiation danger and had the power to regulate mine safety but chose not to. The mines had no ventilation. The miners no protection. Workers didn't know they were in danger. More than 400 of those uranium miners have died of lung cancer -- five times the normal death rate. Today families of the miners blame the U.S. government for not warning them. It is an issue now in the hands of Congress, which is considering a bill that would offer the nation's apology and compensate uranium miners or their families up to \$100,000. Congress may be the best and last hope for the miners. Nearly a quarter century after they stopped mining uranium for bombs, many Navahos continue to contract lung cancer. Others worry that they may be next. So while the Cold War with communist countries may be ending, it continues to claim American victims.

Today in Congress

Senate Floor: The Senate will begin consideration of a bill (S 2104) aimed at reversing six U.S. Supreme Court decisions that make it more difficult to win job discrimination lawsuits.

A key element of S 2104 would reverse the court's 1989 *Wards Cove* decision that shifted the burden of proof in racial or sexual job discrimination cases from employers to employees.

The legislation also would provide victims of religious or sexual discrimination access to the same legal remedies available to those who have suffered racial discrimination on the job.

President Bush recently met with civil rights leaders and assured them he supports civil rights legislation. However, the president has said he wants some provisions of S 2104 toned down to give employers more latitude in their hiring practices.

The bill was scheduled for action two weeks ago but was postponed to allow negotiations. Republican senators are expected to introduce several amendments that would make the changes the administration favors.

House Floor: The House plans to consider about a dozen bills today under suspension of the rules, including a measure (HR 4111) to create a research center devoted to domestic production of strategic and critical minerals. Also scheduled for action are two bills aimed at improving educational and vocational services for veterans (HR 4087 and HR 4089) and a bill (HR 4053) to allow the re-mining of some abandoned coal fields.

Budget Negotiations: White House and congressional leaders have scheduled more than four hours of negotiations today on a plan to reduce the potential \$160 billion budget deficit in fiscal 1991.

The budget negotiators resume their talks with a sense of urgency as only 41

days of legislative action are scheduled for the remainder of the 101st Congress.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney has cut short a trip to southern Europe to return and participate in the negotiations.

The announcement by President Bush two weeks ago that new taxes could be part of a budget-deficit reduction package has given the negotiators more latitude in drafting proposals.

Democrats, however, will be pressured to protect middle- and lower-income wage earners by advocating that any new taxes be targeted more toward the rich.

And despite the president's new stance, congressional Republicans are very reluctant to impose higher income tax rates.

Defense Budget: Members of the Senate Armed Services Committee will begin a weeklong effort to craft a fiscal 1991 defense authorization bill (S 2171). The subcommittees will first mark up their portions of the legislation; they are scheduled to finish by Wednesday afternoon. The full committee will then begin work, most likely finishing late Friday afternoon. All meetings are closed.

President Bush has requested \$307 billion in defense spending for fiscal 1991; the House-passed budget resolution calls for \$283 billion and Armed Services Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., is seeking about \$290 billion.

Nunn has said that the committee will draw up two budget proposals — one in the \$286 billion range proposed by the Senate Budget Committee, the other closer to his \$290 billion proposal, in order to show members how difficult it will be to cut the Pentagon's allocation to \$286 billion.

Some of the issues the committee will face this week include:

THRIFT investigation may subpoena ex-thrift regulator Wall.

A Senate panel is planning to subpoena former chief thrift regulator M. Danny Wall and others within a week to get the facts on how a group of failing savings and loans was sold to an Arizona insurance executive who put up only \$1,000 of his own money.

Wall and James M. Fail, the insurance executive, were invited but declined to testify yesterday at a hearing before the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Antitrust, Monopolies and Business Rights.

Chairman Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, said that their refusal to testify prompts the subpoenas. "They owe the public an explanation," he said.

To quicken the sale of insolvent thrifts in 1988, Wall, chairman of the now-defunct Federal Home Loan Bank Board, began offering tax breaks and other financial incentives to buyers of S&Ls. Many of those deals were made in the waning hours of 1988, when tax breaks were set to expire.

In exchange for his purchase of 15 failing Texas thrifts, Fail was given \$1.85 billion in federal subsidies and guarantees. He raised the \$70 million in capital needed to make the deal through loans. Fail used only \$1,000 of his own money in the transaction. Bluebonnet Savings, which the 15 S&Ls were renamed, was one of the most profitable thrifts in the nation in 1989.

Metzenbaum is charging that Fail should never have been allowed to purchase the thrifts because of a 1976 indictment for securities fraud. His failure to come up with \$10 million of the \$70 million capital requirement on time, Metzenbaum added, should also allow the government to terminate further subsidy payments. As part of the thrift purchase agreement, Fail received \$276 million in subsidies from the federal government in 1989.

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Looking Ahead: Busy Four Weeks Expected

With just four weeks of work until its next scheduled recess, Congress faces a hectic July schedule as it returns today from an 11-day Fourth of July break.

What is accomplished — or left undone — between now and August 3 may well determine whether Congress will have to return for a post-election lame-duck session this fall.

Tops on Congress' list of things to do this month is negotiating a budget deal with the Bush administration that will put a substantial dent in the projected fiscal 1991 budget deficit.

Other important measures on the agenda include an increase in the debt limit to enable the government to continue to borrow money to pay its bills, the 13 fiscal 1991 spending bills, an overhaul of the Clean Air Act, a major child-care initiative, farm legislation, an anticrime bill, a renewal of government housing assistance programs, campaign finance reform and an oil spill liability measure.

Most of those items bear a "must-pass" tag that mandates action before the 101st Congress adjourns later this year.

The sheer volume of the work to be done will require members of Congress to put in longer workweeks: Yesterday may have been the last free Monday that House members will see for a while and this Friday's scheduled House session will be the first of the year.

House Majority Leader Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., told his colleagues before the Fourth of July recess that, given the large volume of legislation awaiting action before Congress' August break, they are likely to have votes on Mondays and Fridays throughout this month. That would be a switch from the usual Tuesday-through-Thursday routine.

And Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, in a July 2 letter to colleagues warned that the scheduled August recess might have to be delayed a week if senators do not pass the debt limit increase and the Defense Department authorization bill, which is being taken up in committee this week. In the same letter, Mitchell told senators to plan on working five-day weeks with roll-call votes possible every day.

Gephardt and House Minority Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., offered a preview of the items on the House's legislative menu — a full fare that members are not likely to digest before their monthlong recess in August.

"I have my doubts that we can get all of these things done in this month," Gephardt said on the floor. "I think in listing these bills, members can get a sense of how much business there is to finish. This is the last clump of time before the September-October period when we have to finish up before the election."

Here's a rundown on important measures that may well be before both chambers in the next four weeks:

1991 Budget: The fiscal 1991 budget resolution (H Con Res 310) has been stalled while Congress awaits the outcome of the ongoing deficit-reduction talks between the administration and Hill leaders.

Most observers believe those talks are entering a critical phase in which progress must soon become apparent to avert mandatory, across-the-board spending cuts this fall.

The Gramm-Rudman antideficit law requires the fiscal 1991 deficit to be no greater than \$64 billion. With recent deficit estimates coming in at about \$100 billion above that figure, budget negotiators are in agreement that cuts of that magnitude are not feasible. That means that any budget agreement would have to be accompanied by legislation to change the Gramm-Rudman target.

Further complicating matters is the knowledge that the current ceiling on the amount of money that the government can owe will be reached within the next month.

Treasury officials have informed Congress that legislation to increase the debt limit must be cleared before the August

recess begins.

Such legislation — with its powerful urgency — historically attracts controversial riders as it moves through Congress. In fact, the Senate has already agreed to consider a proposal to take the Social Security surplus out of the budget-deficit calculations when it takes up a debt-limit bill.

In past years, the House has not had to act separately on a debt-limit increase bill. Such a bill has been passed automatically on the same day that the House clears the conference report on the budget resolution.

But this year, with final House action on the budget resolution far from certain this month, the House may find it necessary to pass a separate debt-limit bill.

Appropriations: Congress is way behind schedule in its consideration of the 13 fiscal 1991 appropriations bills. The House, which traditionally gets the first crack at spending bills, was supposed to have finished work on all of them by June 30, but had completed only four by that time.

The spending bill for transportation programs is expected on the House floor later this week, and the House hopes to complete action on the other eight measures before the August break.

The 13 subcommittees of the Senate Appropriations Committee will begin marking up their spending bills during the next four weeks. Mitchell has said that he would like the Senate to consider a few of the bills before the monthlong August recess.

But as has been the case in past years, those spending bills may not reach the floor until September.

Conference Reports: Both houses are to consider other conference reports on a variety of legislation, including clean air (S 1630), civil rights for the disabled (S 933), child-care programs (S 5), oil-spill liability (HR 1465), and vocational education programs (HR 7).

Negotiators on the Americans with Disabilities Act, which extends civil rights protections to disabled Americans, completed their conference report on June 25 and the Senate is expected to approve it this week.

The conference dropped a House-passed provision that would have allowed employers to transfer those suffering from AIDS from food-handling jobs.

Child-care conferees, trying to forge agreement on expanding federally subsidized day-care programs, started meeting June 7 and have no meeting scheduled for this week.

The House-Senate conference on vocational education programs has not yet completed its work either.

Oil-spill conferees are set to meet this week to debate a House provision requiring oil tankers to have double steel hulls. House and Senate conferees on the clean air bill were just appointed on June 28.

Farm Bill: Legislation (HR 3950, Senate bill unnumbered) to renew and modify federal agriculture and nutrition programs for five years awaits action on both floors. The House and Senate Agriculture committees have both completed work on their versions of the bill, with Senate floor action possible as early as July 12.

Defense Reauthorization: The reduced threat by the Soviet Union and the emerging democracies in Eastern Europe have made the defense budget the single most inviting target for cutbacks in fiscal 1991. President Bush has recommended a \$307 billion budget, but the final number will probably be closer to \$295 billion once the measure (S 2171) emerges from the Senate Armed Services Committee.

The House version (HR 4739) is still in committee, where it has seen no action. A markup has yet to be scheduled in House Armed Services, which is waiting for the outcome of the White

House-congressional budget summit, a committee aide said.

The House-passed version of the budget resolution (H Con Res 310) calls for \$283 billion in defense spending in fiscal 1991, a significant reduction from the president's original proposal.

Campaign Finance: Lawmakers in both the House and Senate have failed to reach agreement on campaign finance reform packages (S 137, House bill to be introduced) governing election races for their respective chambers.

For more than a month, Senate Republicans and Democrats have tried to work out a compromise to S 137, legislation to reform campaign finance law.

The negotiations broke off and now the two sides are set to offer competing plans.

The Democratic proposal would establish voluntary campaign spending limits for Senate elections. It would also set spending ceilings according to a formula based on the voting-age population of each state.

Candidates who agreed to the voluntary limits would be granted a series of benefits, including reduced rates for mailings and broadcast advertising.

Candidates who chose not to comply with the spending curbs would have to disclose that in their campaign ads.

The Democratic plan also would restrict the use of "soft money," which critics contend allows contributors to skirt donation limits by funneling money to candidates through state parties.

The most striking feature of the Republican plan would eliminate political action committees (PACs). The Democratic proposal, however, would prohibit PAC contributions to individual candidates but would allow PACs to contribute up to \$15,000 a year to party committees.

The GOP plan would place curbs on how much a candidate could spend on radio and television advertising but would not limit the total that national parties could spend on political organizational efforts.

In the House, Democratic leaders have said they hope to bring a campaign reform measure to the floor this month. Republicans and Democrats have yet to reach accord on most major campaign finance issues, and even House Democrats have yet to agree on an official party package.

A bill to be introduced by Al Swift, D-Wash., chairman of the House Administration Subcommittee on Elections, will serve as the vehicle for the House package.

Some liberals pushing for strong reforms consider Swift's bill inadequate and, if the rules allow, may attempt to add amendments calling for stricter regulations.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., has promised Republicans an up-or-down vote on their proposal (HR 3425).

While Republicans seek to reduce PAC contributions, House Democrats want to look at curbing all large-scale donations, including those from wealthy individuals, an aide said. Campaign spending limits are expected to be included in the House's final product.

In addition to the above-mentioned items that are on the agenda of both the Senate and House, a number of other important bills are also scheduled for House or Senate floor action this month.

House Floor Action

Housing: Members will take up a \$28 billion affordable housing and community development bill (HR 1180), possibly as early as this week. The Senate has already approved its own version of housing legislation (S 566).

Balanced Budget: A proposed constitutional balanced budget amendment (H J Res 268), forced onto the House floor when 218 members signed a discharge petition to wrest it from the Judiciary Committee, has been tentatively scheduled for floor consideration on July 17.

Anticrime Bill: An omnibus anticrime bill, which incorporates several different crime bills, is expected to come before the House. The Senate has already approved its own bill (S 1970).

Civil Rights: Major civil rights legislation (HR 4000) could also see floor action this summer. It is currently pending in the House Judiciary Committee. It would reverse several recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions that civil rights advocates say weaken existing law protecting women and minorities from job discrimination.

Family Leave: President Bush's veto of the family and medical leave bill (HR 770) will come up for an override vote in the House. Bush is 12-for-12 to date in winning his veto battles. The override vote is expected to be close in the House.

Ethics: Potential votes on two ethics cases pending in the House Committee on Standards of Official Conduct await House members. The cases involve Barney Frank, D-Mass., and Donald E. "Buz" Lukens, R-Ohio, who has lost a bid for reelection. The ethics panel generally drops investigations of members who have left office.

Senate Floor Action

Savings and Loan: Senators are expected to take up a bill (S 2786) to order more law enforcement efforts to curb fraud and embezzlement in the beleaguered savings and loan industry.

Two proposed amendments to toughen penalties for those convicted of fraud of savings and loan institutions were removed from the major anticrime bill the Senate is expected to pass on Wednesday to allow consideration of the free-standing S 2786.

CFTC: Majority Leader Mitchell also will try to get an agreement for consideration of S 1729, a five-year reauthorization measure for the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC) that would give the commission more power to monitor the future exchanges.

The bill has provoked disagreement over whether the CFTC should be given those additional powers as opposed to the Securities and Exchange Commission.

As approved by the Agriculture Committee, S 1729 would provide the CFTC with additional funds and staff to increase surveillance of the markets and place new restrictions on broker transactions. It also would include stiff penalties for trader abuse and fraud.

The legislation, which has already passed the House (HR 2869) also would provide for allegedly cheated customers to seek civil damages from traders and provide strict rules designed to prevent conflict of interest among those on the exchanges.

Under the bill, the CFTC would have the power to suspend, after a hearing, any trader with outstanding indictments or violations from trading on exchange floors.

Social Security: Consideration of legislation to remove the Social Security Trust Fund from the federal budget may be considered by the Senate during the next month. A group of senators led by Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., contend that the trust fund is used to cover up the true size of the budget deficit. Moynihan, however, has found little support to roll back the payroll deductions that go into the trust fund.

Ethics: The Senate Ethics Committee also is expected to release its report on the investigation of Sen. Dave Durenberger, R-Minn., who is accused of violating Senate rules on outside income and of improperly receiving reimbursement for condominium expenses.

The committee conducted trial-like hearings on the charges last month. The committee's special counsel, Robert Bennett, has called for denouncement — but not expulsion — of the Minnesota senator. That punishment would be more severe than a simple reprimand. ■

● **B2 'Stealth' Bomber:** Bush originally asked for 132 planes and Defense Secretary Dick Cheney later cut that to 75 planes with an estimated total cost of \$61.1 billion. But congressional support for the program is questionable — especially at a cost of \$815 million per plane.

● **MX and Midgetman Missiles:** Bush requested continued development of both systems, \$2.8 billion for the MX and \$202 million for the smaller Midgetman missile. But the MX has always received mixed reviews from Congress and many lawmakers question the need to develop new systems at this time.

● **SDI:** The annual battle over funding for the Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI) will likely culminate in the program receiving substantially less than Bush's request of \$4.7 billion.

● **Personnel Issues:** Members also will explore ways to encourage people to leave the armed services early by offering early retirement and early-leave incentives. The manpower portion of the defense budget accounts for about \$79 billion annually and any serious cuts in the budget will have to include manpower

reductions.

Appropriations: A funding bill that would raise federal spending for highway and airport improvement will be marked up by the House Appropriations Committee.

As approved by the Transportation Subcommittee, the unnumbered bill would appropriate \$13.1 billion from the Treasury for the coming fiscal year. The bill also would allow \$17.7 billion to be spent from various trust funds, mostly for highway projects.

The bill would cap funding from the Highway Trust Fund at \$14.5 billion, \$2.3 billion more than this year.

The Federal Aviation Administration would get a funding boost of \$1.1 billion, to \$8.2 billion, and funding for Airport Improvement Grants would rise to \$1.8 billion, an almost \$400 million hike.

Members hope to get the bill to the floor this week. Unlike last year's bill, when legislation to ban smoking on domestic airline flights was tacked on, the bill contains no controversial proposals.

The Agriculture Subcommittee will also mark up its bill. The subcommittee's

allocation is \$51.2 billion in budget authority, up from \$43.6 billion appropriated for fiscal 1990.

Balanced Budget: A proposed constitutional amendment (H J Res 268) to require a balanced federal budget will be discussed at a hearing before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Economic and Commercial Law.

The measure would mandate that federal outlays not exceed total receipts in any fiscal year unless Congress approved a specific excess expenditure by a three-fifths vote. To become part of the Constitution, the proposal would have to be endorsed by two-thirds of both houses of Congress and by 38 state legislatures.

In the eyes of many lawmakers, the hearing comes as too little too late. Frustrated by the Judiciary Committee's failure to move the measure, Larry E. Craig, R-Idaho, recently collected from his colleagues the 218 signatures required to discharge the bill from committee and bring it to the floor. The House is slated to vote on H J Res 268 on July 17.

The Senate Judiciary Committee approved a similar measure (S J Res 183) June 14.

Guests chute the works for crowd at rodeo

It probably wasn't the first time bull made an appearance at an economic summit, but it had to be the most entertaining.

In a made-to-order rodeo and hoedown Sunday for world leaders, the bulls bucked professional cowboys, a lasso was compared to world peace and participants were urged to "say howdy to your neighbor."

President Bush, who asked for the show at the Astroarena, brought along four economic summit participants — Prime Ministers Toshiki Kaifu of Japan, Brian Mulroney of Canada and Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain and European Community President Jacques Delors — and a few thousand reporters.

Flags from the summit nations — those with representatives present at the rodeo as well as Italy, France and West Germany — decorated the arena.

It was a strange night. The first

big crowd reaction came when the pool of photographers was brought out to take pictures of arriving leaders. In keeping with the setting, they were herded out of a rodeo chute.

The summit leaders got big applause as they took their seats behind bulletproof glass.

A Stetson set atop Mulroney's head, and Kaifu made a big hit when he waved his cowboy hat to the crowd. Thatcher's husband, Denis, wore a western-style coat and checkered cowboy shirt. Bush and his wife, Barbara, got the biggest

applause.

The show opened with the national anthem as rider Susie Mills of San Diego, Calif., carried the American flag atop a horse that rose on an elevator to the top of a giant red, white and blue cowboy boot.

Then, while the crowd sang, "Oh say does that star spangled banner yet wave," the elevator malfunctioned and Mills, horse, and the flag slowly sank back inside the boot to giggles from some in the audience. The song ended with only the flag's tip visible.

Stretching to draw a parallel with the summit, announcer Bill Bailey compared a lasso to a circle of world peace and harmony.

He also poked fun at a frowning gaggle of Secret Service agents — who stood solemnly with their walkie-talkie ear pieces in place — and told them it was a rodeo rule to smile.

They did, and the crowd applauded.

To make sure the international press got the right idea, Bailey and

fellow announcer Bob Tallman remarked several times that rodeo animals are treated humanely and are rarely injured in rodeos.

Although most rodeos last upward of two hours, the international visitors got a sampling of typical rodeo events in an abbreviated, 45-minute exhibition televised live locally and worldwide by the U.S. Information Agency and taped for later airing by the Voice of America.

Minutes after the rodeo ended, the stage lit up with the Grand Ole Opry, the Nashville-based country music

The concert was only the second time the Opry has performed outside Nashville in almost 40 years.

Performers included the legendary Bill Monroe and The Bluegrass

Boys, Loretta Lynn, Charley Pride and, of course, Minnie Pearl. An early "How-deee!" from Pearl drew great applause.

Though some of the crowd started out skeptical about the night's entertainment, many seemed to warm to the show as it wore on.

"I think it's interesting to see, it's real genuine," said Giuseppe Carnessa, an Italian journalist.

Zbigniew Bochniarz of the Polish Ecology Club called the rodeo "a very interesting piece of Texas and Southern culture."

"It's a good introduction to Houston," he said.

Gerald Jonas of the Agence France-Press news service said he'd seen rodeos on TV before, but this exceeded expectations.

"I didn't expect that much action; it was really exciting, and I'd love to come see a regular rodeo," he said.

U.S., British entourages start day with church service

St. Martin's Episcopal Church, where George Bush worshiped before he became president, welcomed him home Sunday with a quiet, early-morning Holy Eucharist service.

It was church as usual except for security checks at the door and Secret Service men in the sanctuary.

Joining the president and his wife, Barbara, for the service were British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher; her husband, Denis; U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III; U.S. Treas-

ury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady; and about 15 assorted friends and relatives.

When the entourage slipped in through the church's side door at 8 a.m., many in the packed, 700-seat sanctuary had been seated almost an hour.

But only a few heads turned toward the heads of state. St. Martin's parishioners, with typical Episcopal aplomb, afforded the president and prime minister the right to worship in peace.

St. Martin's rector didn't formally recognize the visitors until well into the 45-minute service. Instead, the

Rev. Claude E. Payne joined pastors across the city Sunday in praying for peace and the success of the economic summit. He stressed the role a strong faith plays in enabling world leaders to make judicious decisions.

It was a normal early-morning Episcopal liturgy. There was no music as there would be at St. Martin's two services later. The dignitaries sped away immediately after the service in limousines escorted by police and decorated with the American and British flags. While they were in church, however, they acted just like everyone else.

"I thought maybe they'd do some-

thing special for them," Sydney Billingsley said after the service. She was pleased when the Bushes walked to the altar, kneeling to receive the consecrated bread and the wine served from a silver chalice passed by a priest as a common cup.

"It touched my heart," said Billingsley, who dressed in red, white and blue.

Equally pleased by Bush's visit was St. Martin's former rector, the retired Rev. J. Thomas Bagby, who founded St. Martin's Church.

"I was standing in line" behind the other priests, Bagby said. "Didn't know if I'd see him. And George, I

mean the president, came over and tapped my shoulder and said, 'Hi, Tom.' He's like that. You know he was a member here for 30 years. He was on the vestry. Barbara taught Sunday School."

Even for the Thatchers, worshipping at the southwest Houston parish was a homecoming of sorts. The Episcopal Church is part of the Anglican Communion and a sister church to the original Anglican body, the Church of England.

The presidential party passed up an invitation to attend a service at Second Baptist Church of Houston.

The celebration included a 750-

member choir, orchestra and an ensemble of patriotic music, prayer and song.

The service was actually the church's annual July 4 service that was postponed to coincide with the economic summit.

The Rev. Ed Young, the pastor of the church, said an invitation had been sent to Bush and that the White House had responded by saying only that the president's schedule was incomplete.

Grand Ole Opry pays visit to Bush, Astroarena

The Grand Ole Opry came to Houston Sunday, at the invitation of President Bush, on the eve of the economic summit in Houston. Opry members Bill Monroe, Loretta Lynn, Minnie Pearl and the Gatlin Brothers, plus special guest Charley Pride, entertained an invitation-only audience of 5,000 at the Astroarena.

The president and Mrs. Bush

were in attendance, along with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain, Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu of Japan, Prime Minister Brian Mulroney of Canada and Jacques Delors, president of the European Community.

At the end of the performance, the president — an avowed country music fan — joined the Opry members on stage for a sing-along on *I'll Fly Away*. Bush hugged Lynn and kissed Pearl. He thanked all the performers for "helping us

get the summit off to a wonderful start... I think we're all working for the same thing — for world peace and harmony."

Monroe's Bluegrass Boys opened the 45-minute show with the Yellow Rose Cloggers. The bluegrass great sang *Blue Moon of Kentucky*. Monroe returned later to introduce 86-year-old Roy Acuff, patriarch of the Grand Ole Opry, who pitched in on a wobbly-voiced version of *Wabash Cannonball*.

Lynn sang *Coal Miner's Daughter* and *Secret Love*. Pearl, who was wearing her familiar flower hat with the price tag hanging from it, did her stand-up comedy routine.

Pride sang *Kiss An Angel Good Morning* and the Cajun fiddle tune *Louisiana Man*.

Sunday's performance was only the second time in nearly 40 years that the Opry has appeared outside of Nashville, Tenn.

Protocol chief keeps 'thriving on chaos'

WASHINGTON — The title of a book on Joseph V. Reed's shelf summed up what he has gone through in preparation for the economic summit: *Thriving on Chaos*.

As U.S. chief of protocol, Reed was given the task of making sure the code of ceremonial forms and courtesies is played out precisely.

At the Houston events, "You are talking about protocol with a capital 'P,'" Reed said. "These people have all been around the track."

With any big international gathering, "You have to set, and live within, that mysterious world called protocol. . . . Just as though you were going to have a graduation ceremony or you were going to have a wedding. . . . you have a certain set of procedures and steps you live with."

"In this particular instance, you put it on a mega scale. You are going to have some 2,000 participants and some 3,000 members of the press who are going to be covering every single moving part with a microscope."

The staff devoted to protocol duties before and during the summit had to apply the protocol test to every detail: hotels, food, flowers, music, who sits where, who arrives when and in what order.

If there are food allergies among the dignitaries, Reed has to know that. The flag arrangers must be sure no flag is backward or upside down or out of order.

Reed opened a white loose-leaf notebook on his desk. Dividers marked the 17 major events of the summit. Each event was listed in a time line, down to every few minutes.

"Take a look at the arrival ceremony, for instance. One-oh-three (p.m.), 1:11, 1:17, 1:24, 1:31, 1:38," said Reed, ticking off the times.

"This is a perfect example of how the blueprint according to the rules of protocol will be put in force," he said. "The fanfare, the foreign national anthems — starting with France, and there is none for the European Community — then there will be ours, and a 21-gun salute, for all the leaders."

"All these things have to be very carefully worked out — are there enough chairs, is the simultaneous translation in place, are the interpreters ready if need be?"

Some traditional elements acquired critics.

"Somebody asked me the other day, 'Why are we having a review of the troops?'" Reed said. "The answer is. . . to show a nation's pride in

its ability to defend itself, its ability to maintain a regional order and peace."

"A 21-gun salute will be going off, and again, people say, 'Why should we have guns?' Well, this is a centuries-old tradition of protocol."

There are occasional details that the average host must worry about that protocol makes unnecessary. For example, seating a left-hander next to a right-hander. For one thing, the formal banquet table is not likely to be so crowded that there would be any elbow-bumping. And for another, Reed said, the seating is determined by the order of precedence in office.

"Fortunately, it is simple because it goes according to date of ascension to office. So you have (French President Francois) Mitterrand as the granddaddy. As the senior head of state. You would immediately challenge me and ask, what about Mrs. Thatcher (British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher)? She is not a head of state." The queen is that.

"Here you will have George Bush the first to arrive, as the host, and the last to leave," Reed said.

In Houston, by the time the first note is struck in the summit conference welcoming ceremony, there will have been myriad rehearsals and protocol planning sessions.

"The first thing you do is you offer the country with the ranking order of precedence an opportunity to come visit, and sit down and discuss the requirements of that country, which happens to be the Republic of France," Reed said.

"In this particular case, you start with the fact that they are going to use a Concorde and arrive at Ellington Air Force Base. From there you will have hotels, cars, meeting rooms, holding rooms, flags, national anthems, food requirements, sitting requirements, standing requirements, moving requirements, health.

"The famous Reed Checklist: it has 4,424 items," Reed said.

They were such tiny details as the angle at which state flags would be held when the nations are announced: "The flags will be dipped at an agreed-upon procedural moment, 40 degrees," Reed said.

"Protocol is a deadly serious business," Reed said. "Therefore, it has enormous weight as we move into the Houston summit. Nothing, nothing can be left to chance."

Just before packing for Houston, Reed fretted about possibly missing a detail. He rubbed a sunburned spot at his receding hairline.

"Sunscreen," he said. "Do you think I should tell the heads of state to bring some sunscreen?"

The spouses

The "first spouses" of the industrialized world won't take a back seat in Houston this week.

Tonight, in their most intimate affair here, the spouses will be hosted for dinner at the Memorial-area home of Betty and J. Hugh Liedtke, chairman of Pennzoil Co., a former business partner of Bush.

Beginning tomorrow Barbara Bush has planned several field trips to keep the spouses busy between personal plans that will take them from recreation to shopping to sight-seeing.

Tuesday morning the spouses will board a plane for San Antonio, where they will tour the 18th century missions of San Jose and the Alamo — the most visited site in Texas — and the city's recently renovated Majestic Theater.

That evening the spouses will dine with the heads of state at Houston's Museum of Fine Arts.

On Wednesday, the last day of the summit, the spouses will visit the Texas Medical Center. Details have been withheld for security reasons, but it is known that the spouses have been given their choices of several different tours.

Only Hannelore Kohl, wife of West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, and Marie Delors, wife of European Commission President Jacques Delors, did not accompany their husbands to Texas.

Italy: The most unaffiliated with her spouse's work is Livia Danese Andreotti, who has maintained a private life during 45 years of marriage to Italian Prime Minister Giulio Andreotti.



Mrs. Andreotti, a Rome native, met her husband as she completed her degrees in philosophy and liberal arts. Although once desiring a teaching career, she has never taught.

She is reported to be about 67 years old.

Her four children, two sons and two daughters, are grown.

Japan: Sachiyo Kaifu has charted a different course for her role in a nation where most women still stay at home in service to their husbands' business or political interests.



A graduate of Kinjo Gakuin University, she met her husband, now Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu, while working for the Japanese equivalent of a congressman. They married in 1957 and lived a relatively modest lifestyle in an apartment rather than a large private house, which is more typical for Japanese politicians.

Mrs. Kaifu, 57, has two grown children, a son and a daughter.



Canada: Mila Pivnicki Mulroney has not gone unnoticed or without criticism as the wife of conservative Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney.

She, at 37, is 14 years younger than her husband, whom she met in 1972 when she was a worker for a Progressive Conservative Party parliamentary candidate. She was born in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia, and moved with her family to Montreal in 1958.

She has been criticized for becoming the first prime minister's wife to have an office and personal staff on Parliament Hill — at considerable cost to taxpayers. Like Barbara Bush, however, she has been quoted as saying her most important job is that of wife and mother.

The Mulroneys have four children, one girl and three boys, all younger than 17. The Canadian press agrees with her self-description as a traditional, old-fashioned mother.

France: One of the more politically active spouses, Danielle Gouze Mitterrand might be more politically left than her husband and not reluctant to show it, President Francois Mitterrand admits.



The 66-year-old activist for human rights has traveled extensively, most recently to Africa to promote AIDS awareness and overseas disaster relief. She has conducted much of her human rights work with the organization France-Libertes, which she founded in 1986.

Yet she has not sacrificed her domestic reputation as an elegant and fashionable first lady and is particularly fond of designer Yves-Saint Laurent.

She and her husband met while working for the Resistance during World War II. They married in 1944 and have two sons.

Britain: The only male "first spouse," Denis Thatcher will attend only the summit's opening ceremonies and the Liedtke dinner before embarking on a private schedule that will include visits to companies with British connections.



Observers speculate Thatcher, 75, is further to the political right than his wife, Margaret, but remains silent about his views, avoiding any appearance of challenging his wife.

The Thatchers met at a Conservative Party social event in 1949 and married two years later.

After serving in the British army in World War II, he inherited his family's chemical and paint company. He served on the boards of Castrol and Burmah Oil Co. He retired in 1975 but remains a consulting director to two Burmah subsidiaries.

This is his second marriage. His first ended in divorce. The Thatchers have grown twins, a boy and a girl, and one grandson.

Texans put on dawg for dignitaries

Visitors snap up barbecue, bolos

If Saturday's museum parties were Texas swank, Sunday's bash was Texas swing.

Beer, barbecue and braggadocio abounded Sunday afternoon in the Astrodome as Houston welcomed more than 3,000 journalists from around the world and the international leaders who brought them here.

The rodeo and Grand Ole Opry were preceded by every Texas theme, stereotype, dance step and lasso trick, magnified: mariachis, cloggers, Alabama-Coushatta Indian dancers, the clink of spurs against the concrete floor and the excited voice of the armadillo-race announcer.

Tomoo Hirakawa, an official in Japan's New Orleans consulate, walked away with the grand championship in armadillo racing. Contestants were allowed only to point their charges toward the finish line, then encourage them without touching them.

"It's my first time in Texas," Hirakawa said, "and my first armadillo race. It's been fun so far."

Bill Rush, police chief of Hedwig Village, came dressed as an old-time sheriff complete with leather vest, jeans, rifle and a tin cup hanging from his belt by a rawhide string.

"Everybody thinks we still dress this way in Texas," he said. "We didn't want to let them down."

"It's fantastic," said Googiang Wei, a Washington, D.C.-based reporter for Xinhua, the New China News Agency. "It's all very interesting to me. I could never see anything like this anywhere else in the United States."

More than 250 businesses and individuals donated food, drinks, equipment and services to stage the event. The inside of Astrodome was bedecked with a parade of facades resembling livery stables, stores and saloons.

A sign reading "Howdy partner" greeted party goers as they walked

through the door.

There was an Alamo bar, square dancing, the Cotton-eyed Joe, horseshoes, cow dung and plenty of beer.

The Texans — volunteers and people who lucked into tickets — went all out for the media, donning boots, tight jeans, giant belt buckles, straw hats and even Texas-shaped earrings.

Mary Jane Harmond, a Katy

homemaker who grew up in Sweeny, said the hootin' and hollerin' brought back pleasant memories.

"The stock show comes around once a year. This is a stock show and better. At least it smells better," she said, smiling.

One woman, eating barbecue with her daughter and mother, wondered out loud about perhaps, um, Texas overkill.

"I'm surprised they didn't have the dignitaries ride in on horseback," she said.

Foreign reporters seemed to enjoy the megadose of Texana.

German journalist Jurgen Koar of

the Stuttgart Zeitung said Texas reminded him of Bavaria, a region in his native Germany.

People there lead a 20th-century lifestyle but are ready to don traditional clothing and dance to regional music for special occasions.

"Bavarians are very proud of their state," he said. "They can be considered as independent-minded as Texans — they'd rather go their own way than join others."

Vendors who set up shop on the periphery of the hall reported brisk sales to the foreign visitors.

At the Opryland booth, David Businda said white gimme caps with a

logo for the Grand Ole Opry economic summit performance sold best.

"They're all having a hard time with the money though," he said, referring to currency differences.

Next door, at Tender Loving Crafts, Shirley Daughtery said items reflecting Americana, such as a wooden Uncle Sam statue and pillow with the phrase "God Bless America," were selling best.

Cory McBride, a co-owner of Zapotec Art Imports, a store that specializes in American Indian jewelry and gifts, had the crowd pegged:

"The Orientals always look it over first, then they come back and buy," she said. "The Europeans see it and buy it. They've got cash. The Americans have credit cards, but they usually wait a bit and then buy."

Bracelets and bolo ties were big sellers for McBride's store.

Nearby, at the Ralph Fisher and Co. booth, Oscar the Buzzard watched from atop a bleached cow skull as visitors paid \$10 each to pose for pictures atop Redbone, the Longhorn Steer.

"They get a pretty big kick out of this," said Bob Roy, a company

animal handler.

The summit's top guests ate from plates designed by Austin ceramics artist Teri Vance Hubbeling.

Houston leather crafter Rocky Carroll worked since before Christmas designing special ostrich-skin boots for the foreign dignitaries. Each pair is ornately covered with the flags of the nations represented at the summit, adorned with extensive gold inlay, and personalized with the dignitary's initials.

Stately mansion, stellar guests

Miss Ima's Bayou Bend hosts world leaders

When President Bush sits down to dinner tonight with the other heads of state here for the economic summit, it will be the only time a U.S. president has dined at Bayou Bend.

The stately River Oaks mansion that was once home to the late philanthropist Ima Hogg has been "virtually never used" for private entertaining since it opened as a museum in 1966, according to Bayou Bend Director David B. Warren.

But during the nearly 40 years "Miss Ima" — as she was affectionately known — called Bayou Bend home, her guest lists included such famous names as composer Igor Stravinsky, conductor Leonard Bernstein, former Polish President Ignace Paderewski, former first lady Lady Bird Johnson and collector Henry Francis du Pont, who was often her friendly rival in the acquisition of the American antiques that filled her home and his Winterthur.

Designed by famed Houston architect John F. Staub in a style he called "Latin Colonial," Bayou Bend was built in 1927 as a residence for Miss Ima and her brothers, Mike and Will Hogg. Their father, James Hogg, was the first native-born Texan to be governor of Texas. The family fortune was made in oil and real estate.

Although Miss Ima collected American antique furniture and objects with the idea of someday creating a museum, it was not part of her original plan to transform the house and its 14 acres along a bend in

Buffalo Bayou into today's 28-room museum.

She began collecting in 1920 with a simple Colonial armchair, and by the time Bayou Bend opened as the American decorative arts wing of the Houston's Museum of Fine Arts, the collection spanned the 17th to the 19th centuries. During the conversion from residence to museum, the furnishings were regrouped into settings representative of different periods, such as the Queen Anne bedroom and sitting room (1720-1760) and the imposing Philadelphia Hall, featuring Chippendale-style furniture made in Philadelphia between 1760 and 1790.

When the world leaders' limousines turn onto Lazy Lane tonight, they will be on the most exclusive street in Houston, according to Diane Lokey, the top residential broker with the John Daugherty real estate firm. And Lokey should know, because she's sold all but one of the Lazy Lane mansions that have been on the market in the last 15 years. She currently has the Dogwood Gardens estate next to Bayou Bend listed for \$11.5 million.

Summit guests will arrive at Bayou Bend via the Lazy Lane entrance that winds through the gardens to the south entrance, where they will be greeted by Bush.

During drinks in the elegant 18th-century style drawing room, they can view one of Miss Ima's best acquisitions, the mahogany Townsend and Goddard Newport block-and-shell desk and bookcase, circa 1760-1785. Miss Ima bought the desk in 1954. Last year a similar Newport desk, one of 10 known today, sold at a

Christie's auction house in New York for a record \$12.1 million.

Before dinner, the world leaders will gather on the terraced north lawn for the official group portrait with the columned Bayou Bend facade for a backdrop. In anticipation of the summit spotlight, all visible mold has been scrubbed from the pink stucco exterior, and grass killed by the Christmas freeze and recent heat has been resod, according to Kenneth Soh of the MFA public relations office.

Federal-style furniture (1790-1815) and a hand-painted wall-covering of white dogwood on a background of gold leaf give a romantic look to the dining room. When the heads of state sit down to eat, however, they will dine with silver, crystal and china provided for the occasion by Bayou Bend trustees, not pieces from the museum collection, Soh said.

Sixteen top aides to the government leaders will be served in the blue-walled Massachusetts Room amid Chippendale-style furniture (1760-1790), and 24 "essential" staff members will dine buffet-style in the adjoining Winedale Cottage.

When asked why Bayou Bend was selected as location of the summit "working dinner," Warren said he felt it would provide the perfect, intimate atmosphere while still being part of the public domain. "Surrounded by this wonderful collection of American art, objects and furniture, the president will be able to convey a grand sense of this country's heritage to our visitors," he said.

Texan takes 'em by the horns

HOUSTON—Britain's Margaret Thatcher looked tickled by the moon-walking palomino, while Toshiki Kaifu of Japan waved his cowboy hat, as if to freshen the manure-scented air of the Astroarena.

But no one seemed as happy Sunday as George Bush, the adopted son of Texas, as he herded his guests through a night of barbecue and cowboy Americana.

Always eager to exercise his personal brand of diplomacy, Bush was in high gear in anticipation of Monday's opening of the summit of the world's richest nations.

No Texas cliché went unstated as leaders of three of the world's capitalist nations received hand-tooled, ostrich-skin cowboy boots and silver belt buckles.

Bush provided his guests with hours of craziness: cowboys riding broncs and cowgirls performing barrel races in skin-tight outfits "and million-dollar smiles."

Leaders of the world's democracies also smiled as a man in gold-painted gladiator costume rode astride two horses and bow-legged cowboys tried to stay on bucking

horse for a full eight seconds.

Like a photo opportunity surrendering to Southwestern mania, the entertainment started with the playing of the national anthem as a young woman, a horse and a flag on a turntable rose out of a red, white and blue cowboy boot. Unfortunately in the middle of the anthem the woman, the horse and the flag began sinking out of view.

But nary a giggle emerged from Thatcher, who tiptoed in her 3-inch high heels to avoid sinking into the mulch on the floor. She and Kaifu, along with the Bushes, Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney and Jacques Delors, president of the European Commission of the European Community, watched the spectacle from seats behind bulletproof glass.

The evening ended with Bush hugging Minnie Pearl, Charley Pride and the Gatlin Brothers.

Bush and the summit organizing committee designed the traditionally overdone ceremonies, which included 3.5 tons of barbecued beef brisket.

For Houston, the economic summit is an orgy of self-promotion, most of it geared to some 3,000 visiting journalists.

Though their spouses are scheduled to visit local hospitals, NASA's Johnson Space Center and San Antonio, the heads of state will see little of this city where the local cancer society warned Sunday that ultra-violet rays were so strong that people should stay indoors.

It wasn't hard to persuade them, as the temperature was 96, the humidity hovered around 95 percent and the air-conditioning was set on stun.

That didn't stop the protesters, who came from a rainbow of interests. The Ku Klux Klan paraded and was confronted by AIDS activists and a local group of Texas revolutionaries who burned a flag for attention.

Hispanics and Vietnamese rallied, and others tried to draw attention to their anti-abortion or pro-marijuana beliefs.

Sometimes the choice of hospitality seemed odd, as Bush shepherded Japan's Prime Minister Kaifu to a performance of the musical "Carousel."

The reason: Houston's art patrons had complained to the White House that there was too much barbecue and bull and too little culture.

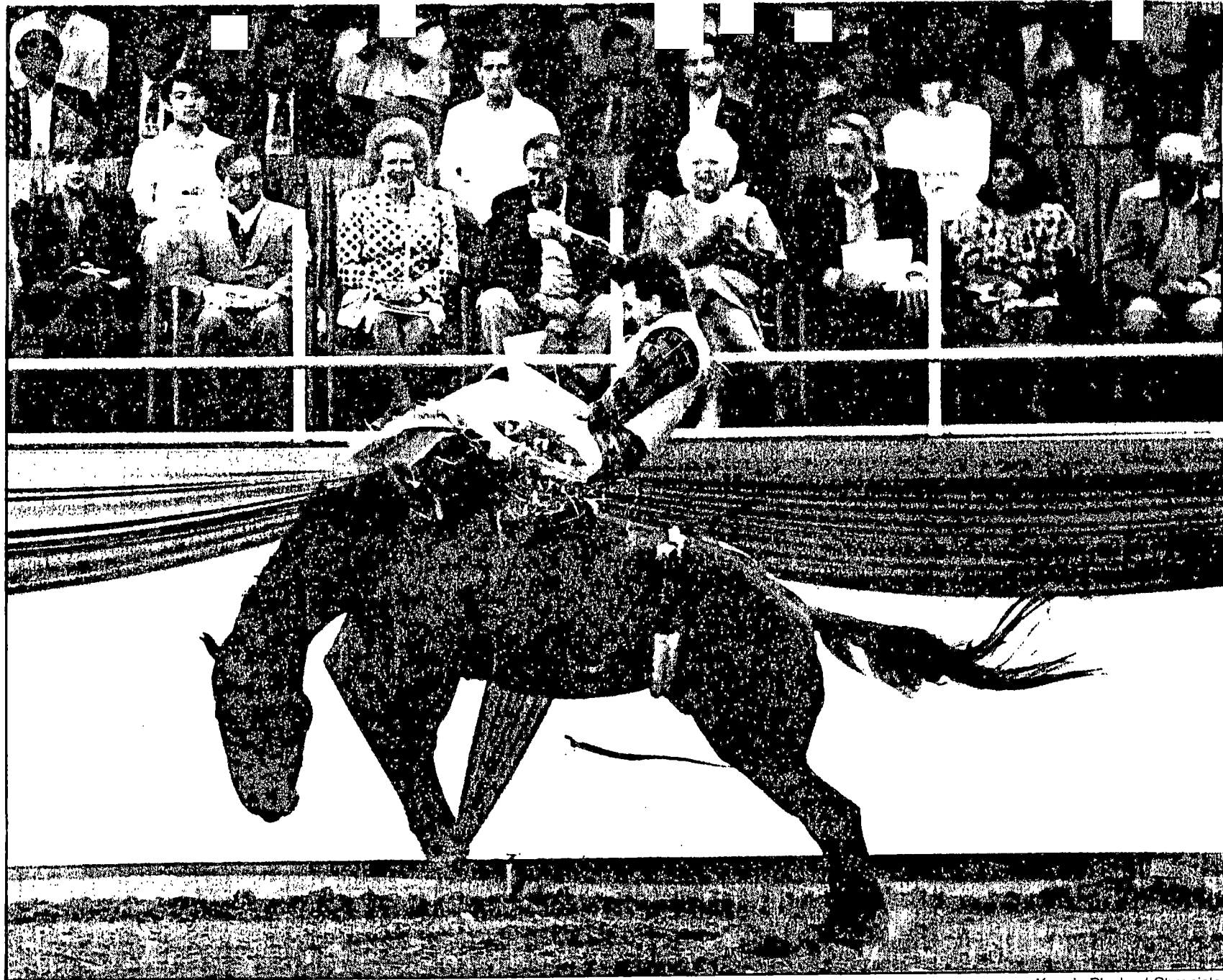

Sightseeing, Socializing On Summit Spouses Schedule

HOUSTON (AP) — As the summit leaders focus on global issues, their spouses have a full schedule of sightseeing and socializing, starting with a private dinner at friends of President Bush's Monday night.

The seven leaders of the industrialized world planned a working dinner Monday at Bayou Bend, a mansion-turned-museum, while they spouses were guests of Betty and Hugh Liedtkes.

The Liedtkes, close friends of both Bush and his wife, Barbara, invited the spouses to their home for dinner in the upscale Memorial neighborhood. Liedtke is a wealthy oil man who knew Bush when the president was in the oil business in Texas before entering politics.

On Tuesday, the spouses planned to fly to San Antonio to tour the Alamo, the Mission San Jose and the renovated Majestic Theatre. San Antonio also was in the running to host the economic summit, but the city lost out to Houston, Bush's adopted hometown. .

The Alamo is the site of the historic 1836 battle between the Mexican army and a group of men led by Col. William Travis who were fighting for Texas' independence from Mexico.

Mexican Gen. Santa Anna's troops greatly outnumbered the Alamo forces, although historical records do not provide an exact number. The Mexican soldiers laid siege on the Alamo for 14 days before attacking.

All of Travis' men - 189 - were killed, and the tragic fight gave birth to the battle cry, "Remember the Alamo!" for other Texans fighting for freedom.

After visiting San Antonio, the spouses were to return to Houston. They also planned to tour the Texas Medical Center on Wednesday, the final day of the summit.

Besides Mrs. Bush, the spouses include France's Danielle Mitterrand, Canada's Mila Mulroney, Italy's Livia Andreotti, Japan's Sachiyo Kaifu and England's Denis Thatcher, the only male spouse.

Hannelore Kohl, wife of West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, and Marie Delors, wife of European Commission President Jacques Delors did not accompany their husbands to Texas.

The wives of several other local leaders also planned to attend Monday night's dinner at the Liedtke home. The menu included quail, gazpacho soup, shrimp creole remoulade, poached snapper and asparagus. Dessert was called strawberries summit.

After dinner, the group was to be entertained by a string trio and a singing duo. The trio's members are all teen-agers.

Bush and Liedtke met years ago in West Texas while both were in the oil business, and they helped form Zapata Petroleum. Eventually, the company's investors spilt, although Liedtke and Bush remained friends.

Liedtke is the former chief of Houston-based Pennzoil Co., the oil company that won an \$10.3 billion judgment in 1985 from Texaco Inc. over Texaco's takeover of Getty Oil Co. Pennzoil later settled for \$3 billion.

Liedtke is still chairman of Pennzoil's board.

Bush to Kohl: 'Hail the Champions of Football'

HOUSTON (AP) — President Bush figured there was more on Chancellor Helmut Kohl's mind than trade and economics when he arrived for the start of the summit.

"Hail the champions of football," the president said as he greeted the West German leader, who missed a rodeo and other pre-summit festivities so he could watch the German team beat Argentina, 1-0, in the World Cup soccer final.

"World champions! It's a big win for Germany." Bush said.

"There must be great excitement at home."

Later, Bush told Kohl he was a soccer player in college. Bush played for Yale University in 1945.

"I loved the game, and the American people are loving it more and more," said Bush. The United States hosts the next World Cup in 1994.

"I think President Bush is going to inaugurate that great event in four years," said Kohl.

"Either as an unemployed person or as president," Bush said.

"We're getting warmed up here," President Bush told Prime Minister Brian Mulroney as the Canadian arrived for the economic summit of the world's seven richest nations.

Those may have been the truest words spoken on a day when the heat and humidity soared.

The staff members, reporters and camera operators who recorded Bush's greeting of each foreign leader wilted in the hazy sun for close to two hours as the motorcades one by one pulled up to Rice University's manicured entrance.

Sweatbands were soaked through, jackets were shed and those who had the foresight to wear shorts were eyed enviously.

Even the impeccable, cool-as-a-cucumber U.S. chief of protocol, Joseph V. Reed, was seen to wipe his brow and mutter, "Whew."

Bush and his wife Barbara retreated inside after each arrival, walking out on the red carpet to curbside just seconds before each leader pulled up.

Mrs. Bush, at one point eyeing the sweat-sodden clutch of reporters and photographers, noted that they were "melting."

The president, noting the sun for the moment was behind hazy clouds, jocularly called out, "We've ordered the sun to stay in for you."

By the time French President Francois Mitterrand brought up the rear, the sun was back out and even Bush seemed to have had enough of the heat.

"Here we go out of the sun," he said motioning the Frenchman inside.

At another photo op earlier, British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher was overheard offering praise of Sunday night's rodeo entertainment.

"Barbara, last night was fabulous."

Her husband Denis chimed in to President Bush:

"Wasn't it good?," and Bush must have expressed some doubt in reply. Denis Thatcher continued:

"No, no, no, everybody thought it was."

Bush: "Did they really?"

Denis Thatcher: "Oh, yes. My word. I promise you."

S&L Crisis Puts President's Son on the Hot Seat

DENVER—The massive savings and loan scandal, the biggest financial disaster in American history, is rapidly acquiring a new symbol: Neil Bush, the 34-year-old son of the President of the United States.

Two major investigations are under way in Denver, involving Neil Bush's role as a director of the failed Silverado Banking, Savings & Loan Assn., one involving allegations of serious violations of conflict-of-interest rules.

President Bush has expressed confidence in his son's integrity, but he has vowed not to interfere. Federal S&L regulators announced Thursday that, in a departure from previous practice, the hearing on Neil Bush's case—now scheduled for Sept. 25—will be open to the public, part of an effort by regulators to persuade the public that they are cracking down on cases where violations are suspected.

Is the President's son merely a naive young man suckered by S&L sharpies who has been caught up in attempts by Democrats and Republicans to blame each other for a debacle that shows signs of becoming a major campaign issue? Or is he a willing participant in the greedy destruction of an S&L whose rescue could cost taxpayers as much as \$1 billion?

The answers to these questions will help determine whether the S&L scandal lands directly at the door of the White House, as Democrats are hoping, or whether President Bush can escape most of the direct blame for the handling of the situation.

The President already has suffered some political setbacks as a result of the S&L crisis. He was forced to abandon his no-new-taxes pledge partly because the Treasury badly underestimated the cost of the S&L bailout. Now he is in danger of seeing his son become the most-visible example of what went wrong when sometimes-

greedy developers took out huge loans that they could never repay.

"The system is going to work, whether it's the President's son or somebody else," the President declared at his June 29 press conference, "and to suggest that it doesn't undermines the basic integrity of the American process."

Nevertheless, a longtime associate of the chief executive said that the President is deeply worried about the implications of the Silverado case for his son. And an initial investigation suggests that there is at least some reason for the President to be apprehensive.

Congressional records show that less than a month before the 1988 presidential election, state officials had concluded that Silverado was insolvent and had made plans to order it shut down. Instead, they delayed the closing after a mysterious phone call from federal S&L regulators in Washington.

The Treasury Department's inspector general is investigating the incident. Officials here say that no one in the federal regulators' regional office in Topeka, Kan., remembers receiving the call, and no one in Washington remembers suggesting that Silverado be kept open.

In separate action, federal officials have charged Neil Bush with violating conflict-of-interest rules because, while serving on the Silverado board, he failed to disclose his business ties with Kenneth M. Good and Bill Walters, two developers who were big borrowers at Silverado. The two men eventually defaulted on \$106 million in loans from Silverado.

Records show that Neil Bush approved major loans to Walters and also personally arranged for a \$900,000 line of credit from the S&L for a drilling venture in Argentina in partnership with Good. What disturbed federal regulators most, however, was Neil Bush's conspicuous silence in 1986 when Silverado released \$11.5 million in collateral pledged by Good, who by then was admittedly virtually broke. Instead, Silverado accepted \$3 million in cash from Good, figuring it was all the S&L could get. Good had borrowed more than \$30 million from the institution, but his developments were not selling.

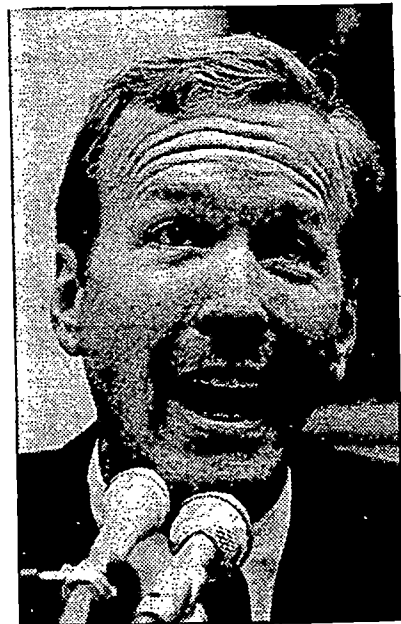
Federal regulators say that Neil Bush did not tell his fellow directors that at the very time he was appealing for fiscal relief at Silverado, Good was also planning to pump \$3 million into Bush's oil-drilling firm, JNB Exploration.

Nor did Neil Bush disclose that Good had extended him a \$100,000 "loan" in 1984, the year before Bush joined Silverado's board. Good invested the \$100,000 for Bush in a speculative commodities scheme, and it was to be repaid only if the investment paid off. But the investment yielded no gains, and Good later canceled the loan.

In attempting to explain to the House Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs Committee why he had not included the \$100,000 on a conflict-of-interest form required of S&L directors, Neil Bush conceded that the transaction "sounds a little fishy." Investigators stumbled onto the case after Good listed the \$100,000 as a note payable on a federal disclosure form.

According to the Office of Thrift Supervision, federal regulators have referred five such instances of suspicious actions involving Silverado to the Justice Department since 1986. But department officials decline to confirm that the cases are under investigation, and they will not say whether any of them involves Neil Bush. "I just don't have anything to say about that," said Thomas O'Rourke, an assistant U.S. attorney in Denver.

Moreover, there is a stark contrast between the sworn testimony provided by the President's son and other documents that Congress has obtained involving Michael Wise, former chairman of Silvera-

do. In a letter to Silverado's preferred shareholders and its board of directors, Wise said that Neil Bush had promised to abstain on any votes involving his business partners. But the President's son asserts that he never heard of any such letter, made no promise, and is being persecuted.

A federal administrative law judge will decide later this year whether to recommend the issuance of a cease-and-desist order against the President's son, barring him from further violations of the conflict-of-interest rules. The judge's recommendation then goes to T. Timothy Ryan Jr., director of the Office of Thrift Supervision, which regulates federally chartered S&Ls.

The timetable for the Neil Bush case, issued on Thursday by Administrative Law Judge Daniel J. Davidson, virtually guarantees that the sensitive matter will not be resolved until after the November election. In fact, Nov. 6—Election Day—is the date that the regulators and Neil Bush must submit their final briefs in the case. The initial public hearing is in September—six weeks before voters go to the polls.

The full truth about the depth of Neil Bush's involvement in the Silverado case may never be known, but the political stakes are likely to be enormous, as the public becomes increasingly angry over the costs of closing defunct

S&Ls—a price tag now calculated at \$90 billion to \$120 billion.

Rep. Frank Annunzio (D-Ill.), a member of the House Banking Committee, raises another question: "Is it possible to conduct a fair investigation of the President's family?" he asked.

At the center of all the debate is a seemingly unlikely villain. The President's third-born is a man who overcame a severe reading disability to gain a master's degree in business and followed his father's footsteps into the speculative oil business. Before going into business on his own, Neil Bush worked as a "land man" for Amoco Corp., researching the ownership of tracts where Amoco wanted to search for oil and then negotiating deals to permit the company to drill.

Neil Bush's siblings have described him as the most optimistic and generous member of the family—and more of a risk-taker than the others. Last year, rating his success in the drilling business as about 0-in-31, Neil Bush said: "I'm still optimistic. I guess because of

the adversity I faced early in life, I don't think there's anything that can't be done."

Actually, JNB Exploration (the first two initials are those of Bush's general partners who brought oil-hunting expertise to the partnership) did bring in at least a couple of wells, but plunging oil prices made the wells commercially unprofitable. Undaunted, Bush in May, 1989, launched another oil-hunting enterprise, Apex Energy Co.

Although Good and Walters were major investors in JNB, Bush was unaware of their dealings with Silverado when he joined the S&L's board, according to James E. Nesland, Neil Bush's lawyer, who also served as associate counsel in the 1979 investigation of then President Jimmy Carter's peanut warehouse business. Wise, Silverado's chief executive officer, lived in the same Denver Country Club neighborhood as Bush and recruited him for the board, Nesland said. Bush served from August, 1985, until August, 1988. One of the most potentially damaging pieces of evidence is a July 15, 1985, letter in which Wise told Silverado's directors and preferred shareholders that the President's son would be joining the board.

"For his part, Neil has agreed to abstain from any board consideration regarding Silverado's relations with Mr. Walters or Mr. Good, and Neil has further agreed he will not participate in any board actions relating to Silverado's preferred stock or preferred stockholders," the letter said. An accompanying memo stated that a copy had been sent to Bush.

But, testifying voluntarily before the House Banking Committee, Bush flatly denied making such a promise. "There was no agreement" and "there never was an agreement," he said—"So, I don't recall seeing a letter like that."

Annunzio, who was questioning Bush at the time, began to query the witness. "You are saying that Mr. Wise lied to the board and you never agreed . . . ?" he began.

"I am saying I didn't see the letter, sir," Neil Bush snapped.

Nesland says that the inquiry is being fueled by partisan politics. Neil Bush is "a very honest person, to the point of being squeaky-clean," he asserts. Noting that no former board member or preferred shareholder remembers receiving the letter—and that Wise testified he has no recollection of it—Nes-

land said: "It looks to me that he [Wise] never sent it and left it sitting in a file . . ."

Nesland also contends that each of the conflict-of-interest allegations that has been directed at Neil Bush falls apart when it is examined closely. "As a matter of law, the conflict-of-interest allegation is wrong," Nesland said. "Critics can sit around and philosophize, but that's what the law is."

Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez (D-Tex.), chairman of the Banking Committee, cited the behavior of Silverado's board as illustrating a failure of the "fail-safe mechanisms" that directors are supposed to provide. "Some of the board of directors were more interested in their own financial dealings than in the health of the institution they had sworn to protect," he said. "Other directors seemed to accept whatever scheme management put before them—good, bad or indifferent."

Part of the Silverado failure reflected the collapse of the Denver real estate boom. Fueled by

energy prices and optimism, the boom sparked grandiose dreams on the part of developers and the thrift executives who lent them money.

Silverado "was no different than many other failed thrifts," Brian McCormally, district counsel for the Office of Thrift Supervision's Topeka region, told the Banking Committee. "Stripped to its essentials, Silverado's problem was that it primarily relied upon high-cost borrowings and lent money to people who couldn't repay their loans—period." Rep. Jim Leach (R-Iowa), Neil Bush's chief defender on the committee, voiced a harsher view of what was going on at Silverado.

"I know Neil Bush as a thoughtful young man who I think frankly was lured into becoming an outside director in a financial institution, which at the time was composed of inside directors who appeared to be good community citizens when, in fact, perhaps they were up to their ears in some scheming conflicts."

Bush's Son Defends S&L Role

Misconduct Denied; Loan Acknowledged As a 'Sweet Deal'

DENVER, July 9—An angry, embattled Neil Bush today defended his conduct as a director of a failed Denver savings and loan as well as his acceptance of what he conceded was "an incredibly sweet deal" in the form of a \$100,000 loan from a Denver investor that he did not have to repay.

President Bush's 35-year-old son, who faces a disciplinary hearing this fall before federal thrift regulators, decided this weekend to launch a one-man public relations campaign in connection with his role as a director of the defunct Silverado Savings and Loan, whose collapse is expected to cost taxpayers about \$1 billion. He issued a combative eight-page response to the charges against him and began inviting reporters to his spartan office here to hear his version of the events that have made him a figure in the S&L bailout, the largest financial scandal in U.S. history.

Chewing gum and digging through stacks of papers on the office floor, Bush acknowledged in an interview today that he got "an incredibly sweet deal" in 1984 when Denver investor Kenneth Good lent him \$100,000 and then forgave the debt. Bush also revealed that he has decided to report that six-year-old payment as income on his 1990 tax

But that loan, Bush insisted, was "totally unrelated" to his work as a director of Silverado.

Other charges against him, Bush complained, stem from political "opportunism" and "press sensationalism."

In January, the federal Office of Thrift Supervision proposed a decree banning Neil Bush from the banking business because of his actions as a director of the bankrupt thrift. He refused to accede, despite pressure from White House aides urging him to put a quick end to the embarrassing case. He is now battling a reduced charge brought by the same agency.

Describing himself as "stubborn," Bush said today that "it would have been much easier to sign it [the decree], move on in terms of just the quality of my life." Since then, he said, "This negative publicity has just, you know, taken over, dominated my life for six months." In addition, Bush noted, his position in the S&L investigation may help Democrats turn the scandal to their political advantage.

Still, Bush said he decided to fight "because I know I haven't done anything wrong." The regulators have scheduled a public hearing for September, alleging that Bush violated conflict-of-interest rules by voting to approve Silverado loans to individuals with whom he had a business relationship.

After keeping his own counsel for months, he has now decided to take his case to the public. "I've been kind of like a little caged-in animal in an unsanitary zoo," the presi-

dent's son said. "Now my cage is open and I'm telling people ... what my side of the story is. And I feel good about it."

"I know I'm a better person for it," the slender, sandy-haired Bush went on. "I am stronger ... I'm eating better, drinking fruit juice. I feel like I'm warming for a fight."

The eight-page document that Bush issued argues that the current disciplinary proceeding against him "is unprecedented." In the document, he noted that thrift regulators have not previously pursued such charges against a person who is no longer involved in banking. Bush quit the Silverado board in the summer of 1988.

Bush's response also challenges the regulators' contention that he violated regulations by voting to approve Silverado loans to Bill Walters, a Denver developer who had invested in Bush's oil company. Bush said there was no conflict of interest in his votes because other bank officials knew of his ties to Walters.

"I'm sure there was a disclosure made ... that was looked at by legal counsel," Bush said today. However, he did not mention his business connection with Walters on required conflict-of-interest forms, records show.

Bush's long response also discusses dealings between Silverado and Good, the investor who had forgiven a \$100,000 loan to Bush a year before he joined the bank board. "Bush abstained from voting on this matter and all transactions relating to Ken Good," according to the written response.

Bank records show that Bush did not vote when Silverado's board approved loans to Good. But thrift regulators charge that Bush personally proposed to his fellow board members that they grant Good a \$900,000 line of credit, which they did.

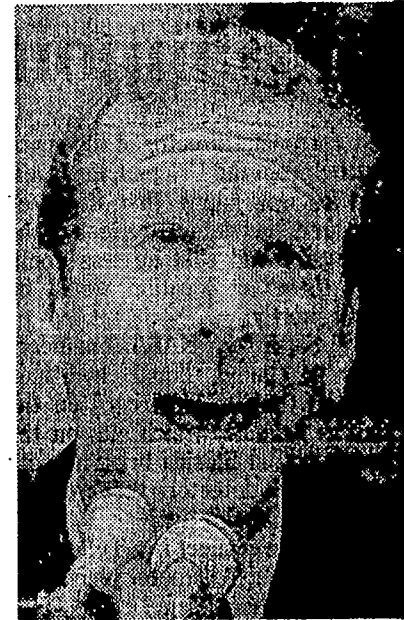
In another instance, regulators charge, Bush failed to tell the other directors that Good agreed to invest up to \$3 million in Bush's oil company—even while Good told Silverado that he lacked the money to pay back his loans from the thrift.

Bush today offered further explanation of the \$100,000 payment he received from Good in 1984. Under the arrangement, Bush was not expected to repay the loan unless the invested money returned a profit. Bush said that Good offered such loans to several Denver business people to pay for commodity speculation. The investment "went bad," Bush said, so Good forgave the loans to all investors.

Another local businessman received a \$350,000 payment from Good under the same circumstances, Bush noted. "But, of course, that won't be of any kind of interest," he added caustically, "because his name doesn't relate to somebody famous."

Since the \$100,000 loan was never repaid, it is considered taxable income to Bush. Bush said today he has not reported the 1984 payment on his tax returns to date, but will do so on his 1990 return.

"I took it in as income in 1990 ... because it was just forgiven," he said. Over the intervening six years, he said, the money "was basically forgotten ... it's been dormant."

Like his father, the younger Bush seemed during the interview to be particularly sensitive about barbs in the Doonesbury comic strip.

Rustling through his papers, Bush pulled out Sunday's Doonesbury, which states that he got the \$100,000 loan while serving as a bank director.

"That is absolute crap," Bush retorted. "That's a lie I got the—there was a loan two or three years earlier ... before I was on the board."

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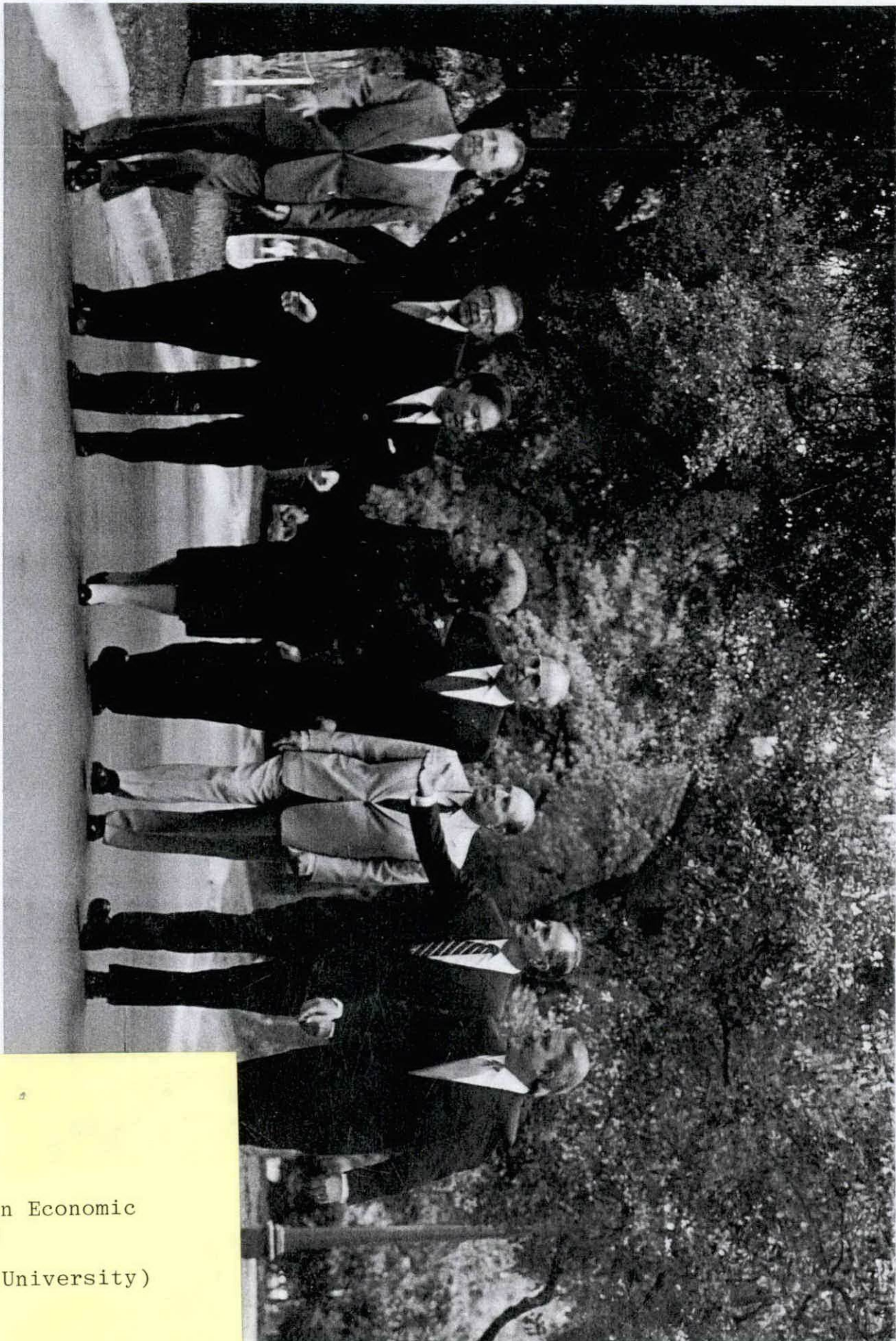
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
