About 200 tanks of the invasion force clanked through the capital Thursday evening, some of them drawn up along the seafront with their guns trained toward the Gulf....

Early Friday morning quiet had fallen on the capital and the Iraqi invaders who stormed across the border before daybreak appeared to have eliminated the last pockets of resistance from the heavily outnumbered and out-gunned Kuwaitis.

Lloyds Intelligence reported that Iraqi troops...were moving south of the capital towards oil fields at Mina al-Ahmadi.

### **Kuwaiti Ambassador Insists Government Not Overthrown**

**CAIRO** -- Kuwait's ambassador to the U.S. insisted his government has not been overthrown even though its leadership has fled following Iraq's military invasion and apparent intention to install a provisional government.

"The people of Kuwait are fighting this penetration," said Kuwait's ambassador to the U.S., Sheikh Saud Nasir Al Sabah, in an interview Thursday night on ABC's "Nightline."

"No, the government has not been overthrown," said Al Sabah. "The nation still exists. It is under occupation and it is resisting this brutal occupation."

Al Sabah said the emir of Kuwait, Sheikh Jaber Al Ahmad Al Sabah, and the prime minister were in a "haven place" -- Saudi Arabia -- and were talking with other Arab leaders about how to respond to the invasion.

**SIX AMERICAN OIL WORKERS MISSING**

A U.S. oil company in Kuwait reported that six of its American workers disappeared Thursday after Iraq invaded the Persian Gulf nation, a State Department official said.

"We've gone to the government of Iraq, through our embassy in Baghdad, looking for information on these people," the official said. "We haven't gotten an answer yet."

The official said there had been reports that six Americans were seen with Iraqi forces. "We can't confirm that. The only thing we can confirm is that six Americans are missing," he said.

The official declined to identify the name of the American oil company, but said it is in northern Kuwait, near the Iraqi border.

...President Bush, speaking in Aspen, said he was unaware of any missing Americans. But he said if any are rounded up by Iraqi forces "it would affect the United States in a very dramatic way."

**IRAQI INVASION FORCE SEIZES CONTROL OF KUWAIT;  
U.S. BANS TRADE, JOINS ALLIES IN FREEZING ASSETS  
Ruler Flees Country; Casualties Reported**

**KUWAIT** -- A massive Iraqi invasion force stormed through this small Persian Gulf emirate Thursday, driving out the government and taking control of the capital after meeting surprisingly stiff initial resistance from outnumbered Kuwaiti troops.

The Iraqi troops, who crossed the border at 2 a.m., quickly secured control of several key government ministries and spread their tanks and armored vehicles throughout the city. But they had to wage tough battles at several points during the day....

Iraqi soldiers rounded up and moved "a few" American oil field workers from their work places near the border of Kuwait and their whereabouts are unknown, an unidentified State Department official in Washington told the AP. (Caryle Murphy, Washington Post, A1)

**BUSH LEAVES OPEN MILITARY OPTIONS**

President Bush joined other world leaders in condemning Iraq's invasion of Kuwait as an act of "naked aggression" Thursday as the U.S. imposed a near-total economic embargo on Iraq and launched a massive diplomatic effort to force withdrawal of Iraqi troops from Kuwait.

The Kuwaiti ambassador here, Saud Nasir Sabah, applauded the move by the U.S. and its allies to freeze tens of billions of dollars of Kuwaiti assets to keep them out of Iraqi hands, but he strongly appealed for U.S. military intervention "in order to survive."

Bush left open the possibility of a military response, pledging to "take whatever steps are necessary to defend our long-standing vital interests" in the Persian Gulf. But key Bush advisers played down that possibility and military experts said it would be difficult, if not impossible, to do more than put on a limited display of military muscle in the gulf without a major mobilization of forces.

Instead, one senior official said, the U.S. and its allies would attempt "to put the economic screws" to Iraq....

Economic experts predicted some adverse economic fallout from the turmoil in the gulf, including a likely increase in energy costs in the U.S., but said that gasoline shortages and steep price increases were unlikely. However, a number of economists warned that a sustained rise in oil prices would worsen inflation and threaten to push the nation's already sluggish economy into a recession....

The U.N. Security Council, convening at the request of Kuwait and the U.S., condemned the invasion and called on Iraq to withdraw. The NATO allies, convening in emergency session in Brussels, joined the call for unconditional Iraqi withdrawal and considered a U.S. request to join in banning all trade with Iraq, including oil, and freeze that nation's assets.

**U.S. Military Options -- Few And Far Between**

President Bush had few military options available to him to counter the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, with the only substantive U.S. force in the region being the aircraft carrier USS Independence....

Bush said early Thursday he was not contemplating the use of U.S. military force. But later, after discussions with his national security adviser, Bush said, "We're not ruling any option in, but we're not ruling any options out." ...

A Pentagon official said Bush was first going to try to "freeze" President Hussein out through economic measures. The USS Independence will remain in waters outside the Persian Gulf, officials said. The Pentagon has never sent a carrier into the gulf because that would make it "too big a target" in a small space, Pentagon spokesman Marine Lt. Col. Stuart Wagner said.

"We're moving stuff, and we're positioning a carrier and other battle groups in and near the Persian Gulf to send a message: Saddam, beware," said a military officer involved in the operation. "But we will not move troops around unless the Saudi northern provinces are threatened."

Retired Adm. William Crowe agreed: "The United States can't do anything militarily unless the Saudis cooperate."

Bush's Military Options In Mideast Conflict Difficult Ones

Problems abound if President Bush decides on a major military intervention in the Iraq-Kuwait conflict, with the U.S. carrier Independence far away and U.S. troops scattered outside the Persian Gulf region, analysts say.

Bush says no options -- military or otherwise -- have been ruled in or out. But if the 3,000 Americans in Kuwait came into harm's way, the President said it would affect the U.S. "in a very dramatic way."

"If they are threatened or harmed...I have certain responsibilities," Bush said after conferring with Prime Minister Thatcher in Aspen....

Military sources said the U.S. carrier Independence was "several days" from reaching a staging area outside gulf waters. But it will serve as a potent symbol of U.S. military strength.... "Our forces are very far away. It would take weeks for them to get there," one high-ranking military officer said.

Deploying Major U.S. Force In Mideast Would Take Weeks

U.S. military authorities Thursday ordered some additional naval forces to the Persian Gulf region, but said if President Bush ordered a major show of force or military confrontation with Iraqi forces in Kuwait, the U.S. military would need more than 45 days to fully mobilize and deploy to the Middle East....

Military officials estimated Thursday that a U.S. counter-invasion would require a commitment of up to 300,000 troops....

"U.S. military operations would cease every place in the world if we had to support any sizable operation in Kuwait," said a Pentagon official....

Although no large operations appeared imminent, Bush said Thursday he would not rule out the possibility of military intervention if Iraq does not withdraw its forces.

**U.S. Military Options Are Few At This Time, Experts Say**

President Bush has few immediate military options to counter Iraqi strongman Saddam Hussein's conquest of Kuwait, but in the long term the U.S. and other Western industrial nations could temper Saddam's expansionism, military and regional experts said Thursday. By Friday the U.S. will have 15 ships in the Persian Gulf area, eight of them there already as part of a Middle East task force.... But the ships are vulnerable to attack by Iraqi aircraft and have no landing forces or aircraft with sufficient range to carry out missions into Iraq's interior, making their stationing only a gesture, military experts said.... "Nevertheless," argued W. Seth Carus, an expert on Iraq who teaches at the Naval War College, "Hussein has vulnerabilities." He said the Iraqi air defense is not sophisticated and that U.S. and European land-based bombers could attack its interior. He and others said a military-enforced oil blockade could also be a major deterrent, through it would hold severe economic repercussions for the West. On Capitol Hill, Sen. Nunn told reporters he does not believe the U.S. has a military option at the moment, "nor do we have a treaty obligation." ... "And I do not think the time is now for us to talk about military force. We would not want to get into a ground war in that area. I believe that our primary recourse should be very intensive diplomatic activity."

**Baker: U.S. Considering Various Responses To Iraqi Invasion**

ULAN BATOR -- Secretary Baker Friday called Iraq's invasion of Kuwait an "outlaw action," saying the U.S. was considering a range of responses and refusing to rule out military action.

Baker spoke at a news conference shortly before cutting short a visit to Mongolia and leaving for Moscow for a meeting with Foreign Minister Shevardnadze. They intend to issue a landmark joint statement with the Soviets on Thursday's invasion. Baker said his joint statement with Shevardnadze would be "unique and quite significant." Baker said Iraq was believed to have 50,000 to 100,000 troops in Kuwait and was consolidating its grip on the country. "There are indications that the occupying power is setting up a puppet government," Baker said. He said there were no reports of American casualties and "the integrity of foreign embassies seems to have been preserved so far" in the occupied nation.

**CIA, Defense Saw Different Aims In Buildup**

Iran dispatched fuel, trucks and cargo planes to troops massed on the Kuwaiti border two days before the invasion, a tip-off to some in the Pentagon that President Hussein had decided to mount an attack, Bush Administration sources said Thursday. The Pentagon, however, continued to stick to a "general agreement" that Iraq was only staging a massive show of force to intimidate Kuwait and probably would not invade, these sources said, adding that the attack surprised most Defense Department officials. But the CIA was advising President Bush that an attack was "likely," the agency said Thursday. "There were no surprises," said CIA spokesman Mark Mansfield.

In the U.S., President Bush said there were limits to international patience and expressed concern about U.S. citizens caught up in the invasion. He said he had been in contact with Arab leaders, including Presidents Mubarak and Hussein, who had urged restraint to allow Arab diplomacy to work.

**Arab Voices Are Muted As World Reacts**

PARIS -- The Iraqi invasion of neighboring Arab Kuwait evoked swift condemnation Thursday throughout most of the world but little official criticism in other Arab nations.

Most Arab capitals ignored Kuwait's appeal for support in the wake of Iraq's massive attack and instead urged foreign powers to avoid involvement so as to provide time for an Arab diplomatic settlement of the crisis.

The muted response across the Arab world stood in sharp contrast to the strong denunciations of Iraq's military action in the West....

Elsewhere, China said, "no one should resort to force of arms in resolving their disputes." Japan, which imports 99 percent of its oil from the Middle East, "deeply regrets" the invasion and "requests the immediate retreat of the Iraqi forces," chief government spokesman Misoji Sakamoto said.

An emergency meeting in Cairo of the 22-member Arab League adjourned without making any proclamation, ostensibly to await the arrival of an Iraqi delegation. Abdel Rahman Awadi, Kuwait's cabinet affairs minister, told reporters after the session that he had asked the Arab League to condemn the invasion and dispatch a joint task force to protect his country.

**Israel Calls For Sanctions Against Iraq**

JERUSALEM -- The Israeli government urged Western nations Thursday to apply strong economic and diplomatic sanctions against Iraq, and warned that Israel would not tolerate any movement of Iraqi troops into neighboring Jordan.

Defense Minister Arens told Israel radio that concerted Western sanctions could stop Saddam Hussein "dead in his tracks," making military action unnecessary. At the same time, Arens and other Israeli leaders compared the invasion to Nazi Germany's aggression in the 1930s. "Iraq will be looking around for other targets, not just Israel," Arens said....

Israeli officials said the movement of Iraqi troops into Kuwait did not in itself threaten the Jewish state and would not provoke any military response by Israel.

Cuba Calls On Iraq To Withdraw, Warns Of U.S. Action

HAVANA -- Cuba Thursday called on Iraq to withdraw its invading troops from Kuwait and said the invasion could be used as an "excuse" by the U.S. and its allies to intervene directly in the conflict. President Castro also sent a letter to Yugoslav President Jovic, whose country currently chairs the Nonaligned Movement, urging the group to find a peaceful solution to the dispute and offering Cuba's help in any initiative.

"Cuba considers that the use of force to solve international conflicts is unacceptable," the Foreign Ministry said in a statement released in Havana. (Reuter)

In Washington, Partisan Potshots, Concern

Iraq's invasion set off some partisan bickering on Capitol Hill Thursday -- but lawmakers were unanimous in their outrage and worry. Democrats criticized the President for not ordering sanctions against Iraq earlier. Republicans said Democrats should think twice before slashing defense.

"If the Administration had acted earlier, (Saddam) may have gotten the message that his lawlessness would not be tolerated," said Sen. Pell.... "Obviously, Saddam Hussein thinks we are a paper tiger," said Sen. Dornan. He urged the Administration to "speak softly and carry a big B-2." (Richard Wolf, USA Today, 4A)

OIL PRICES CLIMB IN ASIA ON IRAQI TROOP REPORT

SINGAPORE -- [A CBS News report from London] that Iraq had started moving troops in Kuwait towards the border with Saudi Arabia sent oil prices climbing again Friday.

Britain's internationally traded Brent Blend crude oil for October delivery traded at \$23 per barrel, up 50 cents from its level in early Far East trade....

Price Rise Could Harm Economy

If crude oil prices, which shot up Thursday in the wake of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, remain high in coming months, inflation will worsen in the U.S. and the nation's already sluggish economy could drop into a recession, a number of economists and oil industry analysts said Thursday.

But where crude oil prices may settle is anybody's guess at the moment, with estimates ranging Thursday from \$20 a barrel...to as much as \$45. Each \$1-per-barrel increase in crude prices, if passed directly through to the pump, would raise gasoline prices by about 2.4 cents a gallon. (John Berry, Washington Post, A25)

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**Delicate Balancing Act Undone In A Lightning Strike**

Without any attractive military options at the outset of the crisis, the Bush Administration Thursday rejected Kuwaiti pleas for intervention by force, and instead responded to the invasion by seeking to isolate Iraq internationally.... A State Department official said that in economic and monetary terms, "We want to bring the world down on their heads."

Although U.S. intelligence reports had carefully tracked the Iraqi forces amassing on Kuwait's border and said that an attack was possible, senior officials said they were nonetheless taken aback by the swiftness of the invasion. "Nobody was sure he was going to pull the trigger," said a high-ranking Administration official.

BUSH URGES CUTTING U.S. FORCES BY 1995

ASPEN -- President Bush proposed Thursday that the U.S. reduce its military forces by 25 percent or 500,000 troops by 1995, but he cited Iraq's invasion of Kuwait as evidence of continuing dangers facing the world....

"The brutal aggression launched last night against Kuwait illustrates my central thesis," Bush said in a speech to the Aspen Institute. In advocating the large reduction in manpower, Bush made it clear that he was not proposing an across-the-board slash. The key word, he said, was "restructuring" rather than reducing....

On SDI, he said, "I am convinced that a defensive, and I emphasize defensive, strategic deterrent makes more sense in the 1990s than ever before."

**B-2 BOMBER SURVIVES VOTE IN SENATE BY SMALL MARGIN**

The Senate Thursday approved continued production of the B-2 "stealth" bomber by the smallest margin in the history of the controversial aircraft as it narrowly rejected moves by critics to kill the program or stall it for a year.

Senate approval for construction of two more of the costly, radar-evading strategic bombers improved chances for the bomber's survival in conference with the House, which is expected to vote next month to build no more than the 15 planes that have been authorized by Congress.

But the loss of 11 votes since the Senate voted on the issue last year indicated the future of the \$62 billion, 75-plane program is shaky at best.... Approved 97 to 2 were a series of conditions proposed by the Senate Armed Services Committee that would bar release of funds for the two new bombers until performance tests are successfully completed.

The official, a narcotics expert, said he believed cocaine shipments to Europe from Latin America would reach 200 metric tons this year, up from 100 metric tons in 1989.

"There's a good possibility they could have doubled," the official, who requested anonymity, told reporters. He did not specify where the cocaine originated. (Reuter)

**U.S. WILLING TO AID MONGOLIA'S MOVE TO FREE MARKET ECONOMY**

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### **CIVIL RIGHTS BILL NEARING HOUSE VOTE AS LAWMAKERS CAP DAMAGES**

A major civil rights bill is moving toward a House vote, with sponsors saying it was strengthened by adding a limit on damages that courts can award female victims of job discrimination.

"The southern Democrats voted with us on this cap and most of them will now be with us, so I think we'll have a whopping good vote," Rep. Hawkins said after the ceiling was adopted Thursday night. A final vote was scheduled for Friday.

The cap, approved 289 to 134, would limit punitive damages for women who are victims of intentional job discrimination to \$150,000 or the amount of compensatory damages, whichever is larger.

### **HOUSE BATTLES OVER SUBSTITUTE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL**

Republican leaders accused their Democratic counterparts of using strong-arm tactics to change votes.... "This is standard politics for the (Democratic) machine," said Rep. Gingrich.

Thornburgh also declined comment on a report in the Los Angeles Times that the FBI has launched a major investigation into the use of political influence in thrift sales under the government's Southwest Plan of 1988. "Obviously I can't discuss any matters under investigation," Thornburgh told the committee.

**U.S. OFFICIAL SEES SMALL AMOUNT RECOVERED FROM THRIFT FRAUDS**

Millions of dollars in losses at savings and loan institutions due to fraud by directors and officers may never be recovered, Attorney General Thornburgh said Thursday.

In testimony to the Senate Banking Committee, Thornburgh said some \$57 million in restitutions have been ordered from 231 people who have been convicted of fraud at financial institutions since 1988, but only a small percentage of that will be recovered.

"The prospects of getting restitution from people who are in jail is not always promising," Thornburgh said. "I would be misleading you were I to indicate that that figure has produced any kind of significant recovery. If you get five to 10 percent ultimately of these losses recovered through civil or criminal proceedings, you're going to be lucky."

White House Press Secretary Fitzwater called Rep. Stark's remarks a "bigoted assault on the integrity and ability of Secretary Sullivan." Fitzwater also asked that DNC Chairman Brown distance his party from the "ill-tempered and shameful" attack."

...Stark's hostility toward Dr. Sullivan apparently stems from Sullivan's opposition to a national health insurance plan.

### IRAQ

ABC's Peter Jennings reports: In the Middle East last night, when the Iraqi army swept virtually unchallenged into tiny Kuwait next door, war in the Persian Gulf once again became a matter of the highest priority for the U.S. This is not simply a case of one Arab country invading another. This is about oil and the price of gasoline; about the balance of power in the Middle East, which has shifted. It raises the urgent question of what the U.S. can do to defend its allies in the region and what the world can do if anything to restrain the Iraqi leader, Saddam Hussein.

Troops and tank divisions poured across the virtually undefended border at about two in the morning local time. They made a straight run for the capital, Kuwait City, only 80 miles away. "Citizens, your country is being subjected to a barbaric invasion. It is time to defend it. Honor is being violated. Blood is being shed," came from a loudspeaker. The Kuwaiti army has never been in action before. The Iraqis have a bloody reputation. It wasn't long before Iraq had control of all the government's installations and Dazman Palace [phonetic]. Reportedly the Kuwaiti leader managed to escape to Saudi Arabia. There was sporadic fighting in various parts of the capital. Many foreigners live in Kuwait, including 3,000 Americans. There is no indication they are in serious trouble, but all foreigners were advised to stay off the streets. Roads were cut, the airport, now closed, was bombed; gas stations were closed so that Kuwaitis could not flee the country in their cars.

In Washington the Kuwaiti ambassador pleaded for American support.

(Saud Nasir al Sabad: "The situation inside Kuwait is serious. They have occupied all the important facilities in Kuwait, including the ministries. They are commanding the whole country with their fingers.")

At the U.N. the Iraqi ambassador claimed, though no one believed him, that there'd been a coup in Kuwait before the invasion -- that Iraq had been invited in by the new provisional government.

There's a late report that six oil workers, Americans, have been picked up by the Iraqi army, but there is no indication of their condition yet.

ABC's Barrie Dunsmore reports that hoping to play peacemaker, Saudi Arabia had arranged a meeting of Iraqi and Kuwaiti negotiators in Saudi Arabia on Tuesday. But the talks went nowhere, and the two sides went home with Iraq charging that Kuwait had failed to take its demands seriously. Those territorial and financial demands were very serious. The Iraqis have long sought control of two Kuwaiti islands which would give them unimpeded access to the Persian Gulf. Iraq wanted a change in the border so that the southern tip of the Rumela [phonetic] oil fields would no longer be in Kuwait. It demanded more than \$2 billion for oil, which it said Kuwait had stolen from those fields.

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Dunsmore continues: It wanted \$14 billion in compensation for oil revenues, which it claims were lost because Kuwait exceeded its OPEC production quotas, thereby forcing down the world price of oil. And finally, Iraq demanded that Kuwait write off the \$12 billion in loans made to Iraq to support its war with Iran. That eight-year war is believed to have left Iraq with as much as \$80 billion in debt. Some say that today's Iraqi invasion amounts to an attempt to eliminate that debt by looting Kuwait.

Jennings reports that the U.N. Security Council met through the night on the Iraqi invasion, then voted overwhelmingly to condemn it and call for Iraqi troops to be withdrawn. The Soviet Union voted with the U.S. in favor of having the Iraqis pull back. The Soviets also agreed today to stop all arms shipments to Iraq.

President Bush has put some economic pressure on the Iraqis. He's issued a freeze on all U.S. assets of both Iraq and Kuwait. And he's ordered an embargo against all Iraqi products, meaning oil. Mr. Bush flew to Aspen, Colorado, this morning where he has been meeting with British Prime Minister Thatcher.

ABC's Brit Hume:

[TV COVERAGE of President Bush with advisers in the Cabinet Room.] Before leaving the White House this morning the President held an emergency session with senior advisers, where he read a statement denouncing the Iraqi invasion.

(President Bush: "We call for the immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all Iraqi forces. There is no place for this sort of naked aggression in today's world.")

Mr. Bush said he would do whatever necessary to protect U.S. interests. But he suggested strongly that did not include U.S. military involvement.

(President Bush: "We're not discussing intervention. I would not discuss any military options even if we'd agreed upon them.")

But before he departed for Colorado the President ordered an across-the-board halt to all U.S. trade, including oil purchases, with Iraq. He also froze Iraqi assets in the U.S. as punishment, and he did the same for Kuwaiti assets for the opposite reason, to protect them. He also sent Secretary Baker to Moscow, where it was expected there would be an unprecedented joint U.S.-Soviet statement condemning the invasion tomorrow.

[TV COVERAGE of President Bush walking to Marine One with Vice President Quayle and Gov. Sununu.]

Several hours later, after meeting with Mrs. Thatcher, the two leaders came out and declared their support for further action by the U.N.

(Prime Minister Thatcher: "None of us can do it separately. We need a collective and effective will of the nations belonging to the United Nations.")

And the President also said he had talked to Egypt's Mubarak and Jordan's King Hussein. And he spoke approvingly of the efforts of Arab leaders to organize a joint response.

(President Bush: "There are collective efforts beginning to be undertaken by these worthy countries, and let's hope that they result in a satisfactory resolution of this international crisis.") This President always preferred to work with other nations. But when asked about reports of U.S. oil workers being rounded up by Iraqi forces, Mr. Bush suggested that might prompt a different response.

Hume continues:

(President Bush: "It would affect the United States in a very dramatic way, because I view a fundamental responsibility of my presidency as protecting American citizens.")

An outbreak of war in one of the oil-rich states of the Persian Gulf is a Western leader's nightmare. But in one sense this crisis may actually help Mr. Bush. He's trying to save his defense budget from a massive hemorrhage in Congress by arguing that the world is still a dangerous place. Who can argue with that tonight?

Jennings: Here's a little bit what the gulf region looks like from a military perspective: The U.S. Navy has eight ships in the Persian Gulf. The Pentagon today ordered the aircraft carrier Independence and six support ships to move closer from their present station in the Indian Ocean. Does any other country in the region have the muscle to restrain Iraq? The answer is clearly no. Iraq has a million men under arms, more than 5,000 tanks, more than 500 aircraft. By comparison, as one example, Saudi Arabia has fewer than 66,000 men in its armed forces, most of whom have never been in combat.

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Jennings talks with former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff William Crowe:

Jennings: A couple of years ago you told us that the Persian Gulf was vital to U.S. national security. You said also the U.S. should be prepared to take some risks there. If the U.S. wants to, can it now rein in Hussein of Iraq militarily before he goes any farther?

Crowe: I believe that we can, of course, control the gulf -- at least the waters of the gulf -- with our strength, but when you say rein in Mr. Hussein if he goes further; first of all I think you have to assume that he might. We've already made an assumption once that he broke. We cannot assume that he will necessarily stop at Kuwait. But if we were to rein him in -- if it became necessary -- with U.S. military force, it would require a substantial effort.

Jennings: You hear the President today saying that he doesn't want the military budget cut any further. But you're saying, I think, that we can't do it even with the present capacity.

Crowe: Certainly not rein in the ground forces of Iraq. It would require considerable lift, it would require, of course, cooperation of the Arab countries and some access to ground bases, facilities and airfields within the gulf, and then it would require an intensive buildup. This would require time, effort, and be protracted.

Jennings: In one phrase, Gen. Crowe, dangerous situation at the moment?

Crowe: Absolutely.

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Jennings: As far as the economic impact of all this is concerned, no country is made more nervous by chaos in the Persian Gulf than Japan. The Japanese import 99 percent of all their oil, 10 percent of it from Iraq and Kuwait.

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Jennings continues: While there is no sign at all that Iraq wants to keep oil away from the world market -- after all, Iraq needs the money desperately -- Western Europe is also nervous, and the price of oil jumped up today on the international market. At the moment the U.S. does not rely very much on Iraqi oil. In fact the President, as you hear there, has ordered an economic embargo against Iraq. But it's not so simple in the long run. As Iraq increasingly dominates the gulf, as the admiral said, the U.S. is increasing its dependence on oil from there.

ABC's Bob Jamieson reports that oil prices shot up by more than 20 percent when news of Iraq's invasion first hit world oil markets. But by the end of the day fears subsided in U.S. trading, and oil prices closed less than 10 percent higher. Traders say the invasion poses few short-term consequences for the U.S. Iraq and Kuwait oil together amounts to just five percent of American consumption.

(Joe Link, editor, Platt's Oilgram: "Oil is still flowing, and additionally our crude oil inventories in the United States currently are at their record-high levels.")

That three-month supply should prevent long lines at the gas pumps and cushion the price impact for consumers in the next few weeks. But the long-term outlook is less certain. Iraq now controls almost as much oil as Saudi Arabia, has enormous influence over other OPEC nations, and wants to raise prices. And this comes at a time America is increasingly dependent on foreign oil. After the long gas lines of the 1970s, oil imports fell from 47 percent of U.S. consumption to less than a third in 1985. But with lower oil prices, imports have soared again to 50 percent of U.S. consumption.

(Sen. Boren: "So we have slipped back into all of our old habits, and now we put ourselves in the position of having a very grave national interest of this country threatened by what is not only a short-term but a long-term instability in the region.")

And Boren warned that unless Americans rediscover conservation, national security could be at the mercy of someone like Saddam Hussein.

Jennings: News from the Middle East sent oil company stocks much higher today. Texaco, for example, was today's most active stock, up \$2 1/2. Other stocks tumbled on Wall Street, and the Dow Jones Industrials lost more than 34 points overall to close at 2864. The trading was heavy.

ABC's Jim Hickey reports from Cairo: Despite the demands by Kuwait for unified action against Iraq, Arab neighbors are moving slowly and cautiously tonight. The Arab League Council adjourned its emergency session here in Cairo for 24 hours without issuing any public statement. In the closed session Iraq repeated the claim that it had launched the invasion at the request of Kuwaiti revolutionaries. Also today Jordan's King Hussein flew to Egypt where he met privately with President Mubarak in another effort to defuse the crisis. Mubarak in recent weeks has tried to act as a mediator in the dispute between Iraq and Kuwait, and he is said by sources to be personally upset by today's developments. That's because Mubarak was promised by Iraq that it would not use force. That was obviously a lie, and a slap in the face to Egypt as well.

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Jennings talks with Hickey:

Jennings: Even if the Arabs united and wanted to do something, which is most unlikely, in a phrase they couldn't do anything, could they, at least not militarily?

Hickey: That's precisely the proper phrase. It's unlikely they could do anything at all. The failure of the Arab League today to roundly condemn the invasion should give Kuwait a clue. As you have mentioned, Iraq is very powerful in the region, and people like King Hussein of Jordan would be very nervous about getting on the wrong side of a war-tested Iraq. Even Saudi Arabia's response today was guarded, saying it was simply watching the situation with caution. Not the unified response Kuwait is looking for.

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ABC's Dean Reynolds reports that the Israeli government has concluded for now that there is no need to intervene in this Arab-v.-Arab conflict.

(Moshe Arens, Israeli Defense Minister: "Kuwait is over 700 miles from Israel and as far as Israel's concerned this does not represent a change in the Jewish strategic situation.")

Israel is more worried that Iraq would make a move into Jordan. That would threaten Israel along its eastern front, and, the Israelis made clear, be a cause for intervention. Today the Israelis are simply satisfied to let Iraq go ahead and prove what Israel itself has been trying for months to make to the rest of the world; that is that Saddam Hussein is a dangerous man and something should be done about him.

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Jennings talks with Reynolds:

Jennings: The Israelis have always thought they benefited tremendously when Arabs were fighting other Arabs. Does this also, do you think, take the pressure off their problems internationally with the Palestinians?

Reynolds: I don't think there's any question at all about that. The Palestinian-Israeli conflict will now be receding into the shadows while everyone has a very good look at the kind of Arab leader that the Israelis have pointed out to the rest of the world they are supposed to be trying to do business with. This is showing off the worst kind of Arab leader to the rest of the world, and it only makes the point about Israel and the very dangerous neighborhood that it lives in.

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Jennings talks with Judith Kipper of the Brookings Institution and Anthony Cordesman, professor of national security at Georgetown:

Jennings: Judith Kipper, what do you think Saddam Hussein is going to do next? Is he going to stop at Kuwait?

Kipper: I think first and foremost he's going to try to get ahold of the Kuwaiti assets -- financial assets, that is -- and secondly to consolidate the considerable gains of the last several months. I don't see any military action in the immediate future.

Jennings: Has he become a wider threat now to the region, or does it stay fairly contained?

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Kipper: I think he is a very great threat to the region. Iraq is a real superpower in that area.

Jennings: Does the U.S. now have renewed interest in supporting Iran to counterbalance Iraq?

Kipper: The Iranian threat to American interests ended today when Iraq did exactly what we've been fearing the Iranians would do, and I think we have to reconsider that relationship, and somebody's going to have to re-arm Iran in the long term.

Jennings: Tony Cordesman, what's the worse-case scenario as far as you're concerned?

Cordesman: The worse-case scenario is we do nothing -- we do not back Israel, we do not back the Saudis, we let Saddam Hussein dominate. Today he faces a hopelessly weak Iran, a weak Saudi Arabia, a declining Syria. He is extending a great deal of influence over Jordan. He has become a threat to our oil supplies. He is expanding his threat to Israel. No one in the region is safe unless we can react.

Jennings: If we can't get at him militarily at the moment, can he be reined in economically?

Cordesman: I think the key is to shut off his arms supplies, to shut off his sources of loans and renewal of those loans, to strengthen the friendly states in the region, and to put pressure on him to contain him. If we don't contain him, I think his ambitions may prove endless.

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Jennings reports that Iraq warned foreign governments to stay out of the conflict, saying it would turn Kuwait into a graveyard if they got involved. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw reports: It is a prescription for war, this Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, the tiny country that is a primary source of oil for much of the Western world. But tonight the U.S., the Soviet Union, Israel and other powers are concentrating on diplomatic and economic solutions to this surprising and dangerous development. The invasion by 100,000 Iraqi troops backed by air cover and tanks was brutally efficient. Iraq wants control of Kuwait's territory, its oil, and the money that comes with it. Iraq insists that it was invited in by a rebel Kuwaiti government. But no one believes that.

From the moment of the invasion last night, the White House and the Pentagon have been on full alert trying to decide the U.S.'s options and there aren't many.

The President was up all night long and then he was off to Aspen for a previously scheduled meeting with Prime Minister Thatcher.

NBC's John Cochran: That's right. The President came to Colorado to warn against making massive cuts in defense spending. He has long planned to say that because of troubled spots like the gulf region the world is still a dangerous place. When he first scheduled this trip he had no idea how right he was.

Cochran continues:

[TV COVERAGE of President Bush with advisers in the Cabinet Room.] This morning at the White House the President seemed to rule out military action against Iraq.

(President Bush: "I'm not contemplating such action, and I again would not discuss it if I were.")

But by the time Bush arrived in Colorado for a long-scheduled meeting with Britain's Prime Minister Thatcher, the President changed his strategy, hoping to create doubts in the mind of Iraq's Saddam Hussein.

(President Bush: "And we're not ruling any options in, but we're not ruling any options out.")

The British leader implied that the U.N. should consider military action if Iraq ignores the security council's call to withdraw from Kuwait.

(Prime Minister Thatcher: "None of us can do it separately. We need a collective and effective will of the nations belonging to the United Nations.")

The Soviets joined in the condemnation of their old friends in Baghdad. After talks in Siberia with Secretary Baker, Foreign Minister Shevardnadze agreed to halt arms sales to Iraq. And in an unusual move, Baker and Shevardnadze agreed to continue talks in Moscow tomorrow on the gulf crisis. In Washington, the Iraqi ambassador tried to justify the invasion, saying his country was simply trying to restore order in Kuwait. But no one else in Washington bought that.

(Sen. Dodd: "I would not rule out military action. I wouldn't be in favor of it unilaterally, but you're dealing with a madman.")

The House unanimously backed President Bush's freeze on both Iraqi and Kuwaiti assets in the U.S. And the House added further economic sanctions. And faced with a possible cutoff of gulf oil, the Senate gave Bush extra authority to use emergency oil reserves. The President, meanwhile, warned that if Iraq harms American oil workers in Kuwait then all bets are off on U.S. military intervention.

Brokaw: There are reports out of the State Department that a few American oil field workers were rounded up by the invading Iraqis and then they were taken somewhere that we don't know. Even if the U.S. wanted to rescue them, what are the military options tonight?

NBC's Fred Francis reports there are no realistic military options to push the Iraqis from Kuwait, more seriously to keep the Iraqis from invading other gulf states. Kuwait's small army was the victim of exactly what would face American forces if they were rushed into the fray: overwhelming numbers of battle-tested Iraqi troops well-armed and well-supplied. Kuwait nonetheless has asked for U.S. military muscle.

(Saud Nasir al Sabad, Kuwaiti ambassador to the U.S.: "Let me say that we would like to have military assistance in order to survive. I think U.S. intervention at this stage is both paramount and important.")

But Pentagon officials say there will be no military rescue of Kuwait. The hard facts are that it would take more than 100,000 U.S. soldiers and two months of staging to re-take the captured oil kingdom.

Francis continues: And although the aircraft carrier Independence was moved close to the Persian Gulf today, it and 13 other Navy ships would be better suited for an oil blockade of Iraq, which was discussed, but would be a disaster for Western economies. Curiously, Iran's leaders have said little about the invasion. One analyst said Iran must be enjoying the U.S. dilemma, since the U.S. sided so strongly with Iraq during the Persian Gulf war. The President might be forced to war with Iraq if, if Saddam Hussein moves on the Saudi Oil fields a few hundred miles away -- precisely what some say Iraq plans to do to dominate the Arab world.

(Shlomo Gazit, Middle East analyst: "And to do it by manipulating military forces and by taking over the most important natural resource, which is oil.")

The U.S. has an old agreement to help defend Saudi Arabia and tens of millions of dollars of war supplies are stored in the desert kingdom. Hussein knows all that and U.S. officials said today Hussein will not move on Saudi Arabia and trigger a U.S. military response. But those same officials as late as yesterday afternoon were saying that Kuwait wouldn't be attacked. That was a failure of U.S. intelligence and diplomatic analysis, and it could happen again.

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Brokaw talks with Richard Murphy, former assistant secretary of State for the Middle East, currently a senior fellow of the Council on Foreign Relations:

Brokaw: The Iraqi ambassador says that they could be in there for only a few days. Do you have any reason to believe that?

Murphy: No, I have no reason to believe that they have any decision made at all about how long they'll stay. They shouldn't be in there and they have, as far as I can tell, invented this talk of a revolutionary government.

Brokaw: Are the Iraqi objectives all related to oil and the money that comes with it?

Murphy: Oil, money and territory. They have long sought territory which is for them strategic -- some islands off the northern coast of Kuwait, which is up against the Iraqis' only access to the gulf.

Brokaw: You heard the Fred Francis report about the limitations on our military options now. Do you agree with that or should we be putting up more of a show of force in the Persian Gulf area?

Murphy: I agree there are limitations, but I don't think there's any point in speculating about what can be done. The President was dead right not to get into any details, because we should keep the parties out there guessing as to what we can do. And as we found in '87-'88, we have quite a variety of measures that can be taken.

Brokaw: We have a lot of Americans, of course, on the ground in Kuwait. What are the dangers that we'll have still more hostages now in that part of the world?

Murphy: I don't think Iraq's looking for that. I think if you remember a week ago when he called in our ambassador that was just after we had a small technical exercise involving the UAE. He made it plain, apparently, that there was no quarrel between the United States and Iraq. He's not looking to expand it in that way, but he's unpredictable. He's not a madman, but he is unpredictable.

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Brokaw says that the other big power in the Arab world in the Middle East is Iraq's archenemy Syria, and today Syria called the invasion by Iraq of Kuwait a dangerous development and pushed for an Arab summit to deal with it this weekend.

NBC's Martin Fletcher reports that Kuwait appealed for help from its Arab brothers and got only silence. The other gulf states are keeping quiet, hoping Iraq will be satisfied with devouring Kuwait. But analysts believe Iraq will go no further. Israel has long been warning to take Saddam Hussein's threats seriously. Now Israel's been proved right, it's hard for Israeli leaders to avoid saying I told you so.

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Brokaw talks with Benjamin Netanyahu, Israeli deputy foreign minister:

Brokaw: You can say that the Israelis have been going around saying we told you that this could happen, but what about the Israeli options now? What can you do and what are your obligations and responsibilities?

Netanyahu: I think it's important for us that we assess exactly what we're up against, because that will determine our response. This is a man who threatened to clobber the Kurds in Iraq, he did it. He threatened to invade Iran, he did it. He threatened to invade Kuwait, he did that. Now he's threatening to burn half of Israel. Well Israel, as you know, is not Kuwait, but we take him seriously. And the important thing is not what we will do. We will know and we do know how to defend ourselves. The important thing is for the international community to wake up, to realize there is a growing menace here. It's a menace to peace in the Middle East, it's a menace to the world. And the international community has to take a very hard look and begin to take hard action; economic action, political action, very tough action against Iraq.

Brokaw: And what about the military option?

Netanyahu: These are things that always will be discussed, and not on television. And this is something that we're not changing our policies as a result of what has happened. We know what we have to do to defend ourselves. But I think that the international community for too long has not acted, has not sent any messages to Iraq at all.

Brokaw: But as long as Saddam Hussein is in control of Iraq, can that part of the world be considered at all safe?

Netanyahu: Well I don't think it's a safe neighborhood here in the first place. I think for too long people have believed that the source of all the conflict in the Middle East is the Palestinian problem, something that we want to solve, as you know. But I think that the real source of the problem is these uninhibited appetites, the league of dictators and men of blood. Arafat is in league with Saddam and a few others are as well. If these brothers in blood, with their credo and terror and violence, their belief that through violence and war they can achieve their aims, this is the real source of the danger in the Middle East. And it's time that we recognize it, and it's time that we took action against them.

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NBC's Mike Jensen reports that news of the Iraqi invasion hit the Japanese stock market like a howitzer shell. The Japanese are very dependent on Middle East oil, and the prospect of a cutoff sent shudders through their markets. Same thing in London. Crude oil prices shot up 10 percent.

The U.S. has an oil stock pile stored in salt domes, enough to cover 81 days of lost imports. Also, less than 10 percent of U.S. imports come from Iraq and Kuwait, and there's a glut of oil. (Henson Moore, deputy secretary of Energy: "We do not see any reason for a permanent long-term price increase by virtue of that oil from Iraq and from Kuwait not coming to the United States.") Still, if the unrest spread to the entire Persian Gulf, that would be another matter. And even without shortages there could be big problems: higher oil prices sending a ripple of inflation through the economy. The Fed would have to push interest rates higher, and that would run the risk of sending an already fragile economy into a recession.

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Brokaw talks with Jensen:

Brokaw: You're at the New York Mercantile Exchange, where the price of oil now is negotiated. What are the long-term prospects that the price of oil will go up sharply as a result of all of this?

Jensen: Nobody around here or anybody else I've talked to thinks that there's going to be a huge increase in the price of oil. Nobody thinks there's going to be a big stock market collapse. What most people worry about is that even a modest increase in the price of oil would have a sufficient inflationary effect that it could hurt the economy, perhaps even send it into a recession. Things are a lot worse today than they were yesterday at this time.

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Brokaw talks with NBC's Andrea Mitchell and John Cochran:

Brokaw: Andrea, is this having any impact on that congressional debate about cutting back on the defense budget?

Mitchell: It sure has. Already tonight the B-2 survived a key test in the Senate. Bob Dole said this was not the time to start cutting military spending. So it looks like it is having an impact. People here are very hawkish. Even liberals are talking about military intervention. And there is some grumbling privately that the President should have imposed sanctions sooner against Iraq.

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Cochran: They did approve the B-2, but basically speaking isn't Congress likely to approve weapons which can be used in regional crises like this instead of those expensive missiles which would be aimed only at the Soviet Union?

Mitchell: That's been the conventional wisdom, but it seems that at least tonight the B-2 survived, and it was very much on the endangered list.

Brokaw: What about the chances that the Congress will be pushing the President harder for military action than he might like publicly?

Mitchell: I think that is the case. They immediately want some more help for the Saudis, to build up the Saudis, and possibly some more help for the Israelis as well. But they want to build up the military action in the region. (NBC-Lead)

CBS's Dan Rather reports: Iraq invaded and took over its tiny neighbor Kuwait today. That set off worldwide protest and drew sanctions from the U.S., Great Britain, and the Soviet Union. The government of dictator Saddam Hussein claimed it went in at the invitation of revolutionaries who had overthrown the Kuwaiti government. No Western authority accepted that story. The U.N. Security Council voted to condemn Iraq. The Soviet Union, Iraq's main arms supplier, cut off its weapons sales. President Bush cut off all imports to the U.S. from Iraq and froze Iraqi and Kuwaiti assets in America. Kuwait pleaded for U.S. military intervention. Mr. Bush at first said he wasn't considering it, later said he is "not ruling any options out." The State Department tonight said several American oil workers in Kuwait were "moved" by advancing Iraqi troops and their whereabouts are not presently known.

(Michael Trew, invasion eyewitness: "From our viewpoint we heard the shellfire, we heard rockets. The initial impression was one of shock. People did not expect it to happen, and they still believe that America will come and rescue them within the next few days.")

CBS's Anthony Mason reports that casualty figures are sketchy but estimated in the hundreds. Roused from their beds in the early hours of the morning, members of the U.N. Security Council heard Iraq's explanation for the invasion, then unanimously condemned it. Iraqi diplomats insisted they'd only come to the aid of Kuwaiti revolutionaries.

(Mohamed al Mashat, Iraqi ambassador to the U.S.: "The Iraqi forces will be withdrawn as soon as the situation is settled down. We hope that this will be a matter of few days or few weeks at the latest.")

Kuwait, meanwhile, was desperately calling for help.

(Saud Nasir al Sabad, Kuwaiti ambassador to the U.S.: "We have appealed to all our friends around the world, including the United States, to come to our aid and assistance.")

Only last week Hussein promised Egyptian President Mubarak that he would not use force in Kuwait. When Mubarak tried to fly to Baghdad today he was reportedly told not to come.

Mason continues:

(al Sabad: "They have been telling us that the man in Baghdad, Saddam Hussein, has changed his ways and is no longer a thug and a bully, and that you could depend on him to guarantee some kind of order. I think they are clearly, the Egyptians and the Jordanians, are very embarrassed.")

Arab foreign ministers meeting in Cairo have called an emergency summit for this weekend. But so far no Arab government has formally condemned the invasion. However much some Arab leaders may dislike Hussein and his army, they've learned to fear them even more.

CBS's David Martin: The CIA had warned the President that the Iraqi buildup along the Kuwaiti border was not a bluff and that an invasion was "likely." But what had happened, it appeared to catch both the Administration and the intended target, Kuwait, flat-footed.

(al Sabad: "Yes, we knew about their concentration. Yes, we knew about their intentions. But we have been assured by prominent heads of states all along that Iraqis have given their word that they will not use military force.")

To hear the Iraqi ambassador to Washington tell it, there was no invasion -- just a little neighborly assistance to Kuwaitis rebelling against their leaders.

(al Mashat: "Their interim free government has asked the Iraqi government to extend assistance for maintenance of law and order with the view of sparing the people of Kuwait any harm.")

That claim was immediately denounced by the State Department.

(Spokesman Richard Boucher: "That kind of statement and the announcements by a so-called provisional government are just patent fraud.")

But Kuwait wanted much more than just words from the U.S.

(al Sabad: "We would like to have military assistance in order to survive. I think the U.S. intervention at this stage is both paramount and important.")

President Bush appeared to rule that out. The U.S. did send the aircraft carrier Independence steaming toward the Persian Gulf, but it was far too little and much too late to stop Iraq.

(Sen. Boren: "It was the largest force ever used in the history of the Arabian peninsula. Airlifted troops were brought in, as you probably know, into Kuwait City as well as an attack across the border, and the invasion force was something like 120,000.")

The Pentagon is now working on plans for aiding Saudi Arabia, next door to Kuwait. A small number of aerial tankers already has been moved into position for refueling aircraft en route to the Persian Gulf. The U.S. is prepared to send F-16 jet fighters as well as AWACS radar planes if the Saudis ask for them. A squadron of aircraft could be in the Persian Gulf ready to operate in just 48 hours. But it would take the U.S. at least a month to put in a ground force that was capable of holding its own against the Iraqis.

Rather: Only hours after President Bush appeared to rule out any immediate direct U.S. military retaliation against Iraq, Mr. Bush seemed to reverse himself, or at least adjust what he said. He stated that he was keeping all his options open.

**Rather** continues: The apparent change came after the markets in London and Tokyo dropped and after Mr. Bush left Washington and flew to Aspen, Colorado, for a scheduled speech and meeting there with Britain's Prime Minister Thatcher.

**CBS's Lesley Stahl:**

[TV COVERAGE of President Bush getting off Marine One in Colorado.] President Bush has decided on a cautious policy. He's moving characteristically slowly trying to organize worldwide sanctions and, if possible, universal condemnation of what he calls Iraq's "illegal naked aggression." After meeting with Prime Minister Thatcher in Colorado he toughened up his morning statement that he wasn't contemplating military action.

(**President Bush:** "We're not ruling any options in, but we're not ruling any options out.")

Thirty-eight hundred Americans are said to be in Kuwait. President Bush warned Iraq's Saddam Hussein not to harm them.

(**President Bush:** "It would affect the United States in a very dramatic way, and if they're threatened or harmed or put into harm's way, I have certain responsibilities.")

Before he left for Colorado this morning the President convened his national security team at the White House, where he first ruled out immediate U.S. military action.

(**President Bush** in the Cabinet Room: "We're not discussing intervention. I would not discuss any military options even if we'd agreed upon them.")

After contacting several leaders in the Middle East, Mr. Bush took some noose-tightening actions designed to isolate Iraq diplomatically and economically. He issued executive orders that freeze all Iraqi assets in the U.S. He also froze Kuwaiti assets to protect them from Iraq. The orders block all imports from Iraq, including oil. That amounts to 500,000 barrels a day, or eight percent of all U.S. oil imports so far this year.

(**President Bush** in the Cabinet Room: "There is no place for this sort of naked aggression in today's world, and I have taken a number of steps to indicate the deep concern that I feel.")

Ambassadors from several Arab states were called to the State Department late today. The President said they are working on a joint solution.

(**President Bush** in Aspen: "They asked for restraint. They asked for a short period of time in which to have this Arab solution evolve.")

One official here said that a country simply can't function if it can't move money around, if it can't trade. The Bush Administration is trying to build such a wall around Iraq, a wall that includes U.S. allies, the Arab states, and the Soviet Union.

**Rather:** In Washington there were calls today for U.S. military retaliation in the Middle East to, among other things, bolster sagging American credibility in the area. These calls included a specific proposal today from one of the most respected members of the U.S. Senate when it comes to military affairs, Sen. Nunn.

**CBS's Bob Schieffer:** The influential chairman of the Armed Services Committee told me tonight that the U.S. should be prepared to use military force, principally air power, to protect the Saudi Arabian oil fields. But he said we must also insist that Saudi Arabia join with the neighbor regional powers such as Egypt and Jordan to provide the first line of defense. -more-

**Schieffer continues:**

(**Sen. Nunn:** "They ought to be on the front line. It's their region. It's their security, and I believe they ought to make that plain. If we are requested, and I think it's likely we will be, I think we ought to make it plain we will help them. What I don't think we ought to do is the United States to become the front line power in the short term.")

Defense Secretary Cheney came to the Capitol to brief key congressmen, but that did not stop angry House members from blaming the invasion on Administration failure to get tough with Iraq early on.

(**Rep. Lantos:** "I think the invasion of Kuwait is in large measure the result of a policy of appeasement that this State Department has conducted vis-a-vis the bloodthirsty dictator of Iraq.")

(**Rep. Lawrence Smith:** "We are about to be hoisted on our own petard. Where are the stingers that we sold, that we gave to Kuwait that some of us fought bitterly against? They are now in the hands of the Iraqis.")

The mood was even angrier on the House floor, where members voted unanimously to cut off all trade and aid to Iraq. In the Senate, liberals and conservatives alike denounced Iraq, suggesting U.S. intervention could be necessary.

(**Sen. D'Amato:** "Indeed he is the new Hitler.")

(**Sen. Dodd:** "I'm not convinced that this nut is going to respond to sanctions.")

And that pretty well summed up feelings here. Unlike many foreign policy debates of past years, this time there's no argument over whether U.S. national security interests have been threatened. The consensus is, has been, the question, what to do about it.

**CBS's Richard Roth** says the Arab oil embargo in the '70s fueled double-digit inflation. Administration officials say there are no similar concerns yet.

(**Michael Boskin**, Council of Economic Advisers: "Our economy today is much better able to absorb modest price increases than it was in the past.")

Industry experts are predicting Iraq's push into Kuwait may push up gasoline prices a few cents a gallon a few weeks from now. Consumers today were already cynical. In Texas this afternoon consumers were reporting price hikes at the pump from 5 to 13 cents a gallon.

**CBS's Bob Simon** reports from Tel Aviv that Israel's CIA recently sent a sample of Saddam Hussein's handwriting to a graphologist, who concluded, according to an Israeli newspaper, that the man is given to hasty and violent decisions, endangering those around him, and should be hospitalized. But judging from his behavior, Israeli military analysts have concluded that he is as crazy as a fox.

(**Ze'ev Schiff**, military analyst: "Saddam Hussein is not Qadafi. He might be brutal, but I think he's quite -- very careful, calculating his steps carefully.")

The estimate here is that Saddam will have to digest what he's swallowed before he moves further. The assumption is that ultimately the only power that can stop him is the U.S. The question is, if the Americans don't stand up for Kuwait, will they stand up for Saudi Arabia or Jordan or Israel?

Rather talks with Simon:

Rather: Is United States power, prestige and credibility on the line tonight in the Middle East?

Simon: Absolutely. The Russians are no longer really considered a superpower here. It's the Americans. If the Americans can control this they will have gained enormous prestige. What's already clear here, and the most troubling thing, is that the end of the Cold War has not brought peace to this region. On the contrary, the Middle East is more dangerous than ever before.

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Rather talks with Fred Halliday, professor of international relations at the London School of Economics:

Rather: What does Saddam Hussein have to lose, if anything?

Halliday: This was a gamble for leadership of the Arab world. If he's pushed out of Kuwait without getting the money he wants, without putting into power a puppet government, then he will have lost that gamble. He will have lost the attempt to be leader of the Arab world, and somebody in Iraq might well try and get rid of him. So he might lose power as well.

Rather: But his hand tonight is looking very strong, isn't it?

Halliday: He's looking strong unless the international community, and that's really the U.N. Security Council, can put pressure on him either economically or militarily. They could do it. Whether they have the will remains to be seen in the next few days.

Rather: What are the options? They seem to be few to none.

Halliday: The economic option is not just to seize his and Kuwait's assets, but to strangle Iraq by cutting off its oil exports, which could be done by a U.S. Naval blockade of Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait turning off its pipelines. But it's also possible to carry out selective military strikes against targets in Iraq if Iraqis don't get out of Kuwait in short order in a day or two.

Rather: Are we facing a very largely changed situation in the Middle East, or is it too early to say that?

Halliday: Saddam has been pushing the Middle East around for some time. After all, he invaded Iran 10 years ago. But if he gets away with this, yes, you will have a new dominant power in the Arab world, and a very dangerous one with, as people have said, 20 percent of the world's oil.

Rather: More powerful and dangerous than Mohamar Qadafi?

Halliday: Much more powerful, but Qadafi doesn't have an army that can fight. Saddam has a million men who can fight. He has hundreds of tanks that can fight. Moreover, Qadafi isn't going to invade another Arab state. Saddam's invaded one, he could well invade others.

(CBS-Lead)

ABC's Linda Pattillo reports that the Texas seafood industry faces multi-million-dollar losses. Hardest hit will be the area's shrimpers. (ABC-2)

**DELTA FORCE COMMANDO**

Brokaw: In Rhode Island tonight a so-called Rambo-style rape suspect is back behind bars after a brazen escape on Monday. Police took no chances as they captured former Delta Force commando Marshall Brown at gunpoint early this morning. Army colleagues say the 37-year-old had been trained as a stone-cold professional Army killer. Brown has been charged with raping several women in Rhode Island and North Carolina. (NBC-2)

## News From the Hill

### SENATE FLOOR: DOD measure debated; energy, water bill passed.

The Senate yesterday rejected two attempts to kill or drastically scale back the B-2 stealth bomber program as it worked on the \$289 billion Department of Defense (DOD) authorization measure for military programs and personnel for fiscal 1991 (S 2884).

The Armed Services Committee-approved bill would authorize \$4.6 billion for the B-2 in fiscal 1991.

Senators, however, voted, 97-2, to set aside the funds while the B-2 bomber undergoes further testing. The amendment was offered by Sam Nunn, D-Ga., and John W. Warner, R-Va., the ranking members of the Armed Services Committee.

An amendment by Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., to immediately terminate the B-2 program was defeated, 43-56.

Another amendment by William S. Cohen, R-Maine, to limit production of the B-2 bomber to the number already authorized also was turned back, 45-53.

• The Senate yesterday approved, 76-23, an energy and water spending bill (HR 5019) that includes nearly \$3 billion for a new program to clean up nuclear contamination from weapons plants.

The \$20.8 billion spending measure — the first of the 13 regular appropriations bills to pass the Senate — also contains about \$2 billion for new water projects. The spending bill contains \$2.5 billion more than the 1990 appropriation.

The bill also contains \$318 million in 1991 for the superconducting super collider project in Texas.

• The Senate yesterday also approved, 99-0, the conference report on HR 1465, an oil spill liability bill designed to prevent spills and ensure that shippers and oil companies pay for damages.

**Late Wednesday.** In late-night action on Wednesday, the Senate passed:

• On a 59-40 vote, a bill (S 137) to institute a voluntary system of campaign spending limits.

The bill would place limits on congressional candidates' spending, provide them with subsidies to buy television advertising and outlaw special-interest political action committees. Senators also would be barred from receiving honoraria.

• HR 2372, which would allow victims of radiation exposure to be compensated from a \$100 million trust fund. Victims of fallout from nuclear devices detonated in Nevada in the 1950s were prohibited from suing the government, but would be eligible for compensation from the fund.

• S 1731, which would authorize expenditures for wetlands restoration projects, including grants to states. The bill is especially aimed at wetlands in Louisiana eroded by the Mississippi River.

• S 2740, which would authorize \$1.8 billion for 22 navigation and flood control projects by the Army Corps of Engineers.

### HOUSE FLOOR: Airport safety bill passes; civil rights taken up.

The House yesterday passed, 405-15, legislation (HR 5170) to authorize increased spending for airport and airway safety and capacity and to authorize a new fee on air travelers to help pay for improvements at airports.

Members defeated, 171-252, an amendment by Douglas H. Bosco, D-Calif., to strike the provision that would allow airports to impose the passenger fees.

The bill would authorize \$8.4 billion in fiscal 1991 and \$9.3 billion in fiscal 1992 for the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to operate the nation's airway system. That amount includes \$1.8 billion in 1991 and \$1.9 billion in 1992 for the Airport Improvement Fund, which finances development of airport capacity and safety improvements and noise abatement.

The bill contains \$2.5 billion in fiscal 1991 and \$3 billion in fiscal 1992 for FAA upgrading of the air traffic control system and other airport equipment.

## Today

The House is expected to pass a short-term debt limit extension (HR 5350) today that would provide the government with enough borrowing authority to pay its bills through the August congressional recess. The Senate will probably pass that measure as its last item of business before leaving town.

Senators will continue debate on the fiscal 1991 defense authorization bill (S 2884).

As members rush toward adjournment, other bills may be brought up on short notice.

In other action, clean air conferees will meet once more before breaking for a month. At today's session negotiators hope to reach agreement on the section of the bill (S 1630) that would phase out chemicals that destroy the protective ozone layer.

The House and Senate versions of the measure call for an end to the use of chlorofluorocarbons, but they differ on timetables for phasing out specific chemicals.

And this morning, the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health will meet to discuss a bill (HR 5041) to sharply limit tobacco advertising and strengthen health warnings on cigarette packaging.

The measure faces opposition from several panel members and as of yesterday both sides remained far apart.

As introduced, the measure would restrict tobacco advertising to black and white text only, with no pictures of people with cigarettes.

The bill would also require that the Surgeon General's warning against smoking be enlarged and printed on cigarette packages in red. Stronger warnings, such as "Cigarettes Kill," would be mandated.

The legislation is aimed at preventing tobacco ads from making smoking look glamorous. Critics of the bill, including the advertising industry, say it restricts free speech.

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the House began debate and was expected to work late into the night on a major bill (HR 4000) to restore and strengthen federal laws against racial and gender discrimination in the workplace.

The bill aims to ease the way for workers to bring discrimination cases to court and returns the burden of proof in such lawsuits from the employees to the employers.

Republicans, who claim the bill would force employers to implement hiring quotas, planned to offer a substitute amendment that would limit damages in some cases of intentional discrimination and make other changes to alter those provisions of the underlying bill that are designed to protect employees.

**Late Wednesday.** In late Wednesday floor action, the House passed, 327-91, the 1990 farm bill (HR 3950), a \$53 billion measure to authorize government agriculture and nutrition programs for five years.

The Senate passed its version (S 2830), which calls for about the same level of spending, in a 70-21 tally last week.

The White House has threatened a veto if costs in the bill are not decreased.

Members approved an amendment to limit the amount of total government farm subsidies to \$200,000 per producer and an amendment to prohibit the export of pesticides that have been banned by the Environmental Protection Agency and that have not been deemed safe by the Food and Drug Administration.

#### **IRAQ SANCTIONS voted by House in show of support for Bush.**

The House yesterday gave an overwhelming endorsement to President Bush's stern response to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

Members approved, 416-0, emergency legislation (HR 5431) to impose economic sanctions on Iraq.

The bill would codify actions President Bush has already taken by executive order in the aftermath of Iraq's invasion. The bill calls for freezing Iraqi assets in the United States and prohibiting trade and travel between the United States and Iraq.

The measure incorporates export sanctions contained in a bill (HR 4585) approved by the House Foreign Affairs Committee on Wednesday.

In related action, the Senate yesterday took steps to ensure a continued supply of oil should Iraq's invasion of Kuwait disrupt world oil supplies.

The Senate gave voice-vote approval to a one-month reauthorization (S 2952) of the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, the nation's crude oil stockpile. Current authority for the reserve expires Aug. 15.

The bill would extend the president's authority to fill and draw down the reserve, if necessary.

"The events in the Middle East today underscore once again the fragility of

the economies of the Western world and the marginal supply of energy that fuels it," said James A. McClure, R-Idaho.

The reserve oil is stored in salt caverns along the Louisiana and Texas coasts.

The extension would give lawmakers more time to work out differences over a long-term reauthorization of the oil reserve. The Senate has passed a three-year measure (S 2088) that would increase the maximum size of the reserve from 750 million barrels to 1 billion barrels.

The House dropped provisions expanding the reserve because of administration opposition to the cost, an estimated \$12 billion, but included in its four-year measure (HR 3193) a proposal to store gasoline, heating oil and other refined products. The president has threatened to veto that bill as well.

#### **IRAQ INVASION might force energy tax, Panetta says.**

Budget negotiators might have to rethink imposing an energy tax as a result of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, House Budget Committee Chairman Leon E. Panetta, D-Calif., said in an interview with Reuters yesterday.

"Oil prices could raise concerns about energy taxes," he said, explaining that economic projections may have to be adjusted because real U.S. growth and income could drop while fuel costs rise.

But House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., would not go that far. "I think it is too early to make such an assumption," he said of Panetta's view that the budget talks could be affected by the Iraqi situation.

White House and congressional budget negotiators have put aside their work as Congress moves closer to an August recess, but they are expected to announce today a September schedule of negotiating deadlines. Some have mentioned Sept. 10 as a potential goal for finishing the talks.

#### **U.S. CONTRACTS, other measures OK'd by House panel.**

The House Government Operations Committee yesterday approved a bill (HR 4131) requiring foreign contractors to give U.S. government auditors access to their facilities and records as a condition for obtaining government contracts.

The government may have been overcharged by roughly \$500 million because of differences in the standards for awarding contracts to U.S. and foreign firms, the Defense Department's inspector general told a Government Operations subcommittee last year.

In other action, the panel approved:

- HR 4279, which would allow the states to bill the federal government for costs they incur because of late reimbursement for state money used to finance federal programs.

- S 535, which calls for inflation adjustments for civil monetary penalties. The vote was 33-4.

- HR 4179, which would establish a program to help minority-owned businesses get government contracts by allowing them to pool their resources and secure corporate bonding for the projects.

- H J Res 226, which would establish a national policy that federal records and publications should be printed on acid-free, permanent paper.

#### **HAZARDOUS WASTE shipment bill gains in House subcommittee.**

After averting a proposal to set up a costly computerized system to track hazardous waste shipments, a House Public Works subcommittee yesterday approved legislation (HR 3520) to revamp the nation's hazardous materials transportation laws for the first time in 15 years.

Doug Applegate, D-Ohio, did not offer his shipment tracking proposal (HR 2584) as an amendment to the hazardous materials bill, but opted for an agreement to direct the National Academy of Sciences to study the issue and report back to Congress in 19 months.

The Surface Transportation Subcommittee then approved the bill (HR 3520) by voice vote.

The House Energy Committee approved its version, which also includes no new tracking system, on March 13. An Energy Committee staffer said differences between the two bills would probably be resolved before the legislation goes to the full Public Works Committee.

One major sticking point involves priorities for training and enforcement. The Energy and Commerce bill favors hiring new inspectors, while the Public Works bill targets federal aid to states for emergency-response training.

#### **LEGAL SERVICES: Panel votes to lift ban on abortion cases.**

The House Judiciary Subcommittee on Administrative Law yesterday unexpectedly voted to repeal the current ban on the use of federal legal aid funds for abortion cases as it marked up a bill (HR 5271) to reauthorize the Legal Services Corporation (LSC).

"Abortion would be treated for purposes of Legal Services like any other issue that might be brought by a client," said subcommittee Chairman Barney Frank, D-Mass.

Frank had originally included in the bill the current appropriations rider to bar use of LSC funds for "any litigation with respect to abortion." But in yesterday's session, he moved to amend his bill to drop the ban and also to repeal a more narrowly written prohibition from the 1974 LSC act.

Harley O. Staggers Jr., D-W. Va., argued the amendment "will make Legal

Services more controversial." But Frank, armed with proxies from three subcommittee Democrats, declared the amendment adopted on a voice vote.

The subcommittee also defeated, 3-6, an omnibus amendment offered by Staggers to impose a variety of restrictions on local legal aid programs. But working through the issues one by one, the panel adopted some additional restrictions, including a compromise fashioned by Frank to bar legal aid programs from work on congressional redistricting cases.

The markup resumes this morning, with a key amendment restricting legal aid lawyers' handling of farm labor cases still to be considered.

#### **SCENIC RIVER designation approved by Interior subcommittee.**

The House Interior panel's Subcommittee on National Parks and Public Lands yesterday approved legislation (HR 4687) that would add eight miles of the Lower Merced River in California to the nation's Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

The measure calls for a study to determine whether the North Fork of the Merced River should also be included.

The subcommittee approved a second measure (HR 4227) that would authorize a study of portions of the Sudbury, Assabet and Concord rivers in Massachusetts for possible designation as Wild and Scenic.

#### **THRIFT FRAUD focus of Banking panel's questions.**

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh yesterday declined to comment on a report that the government was examining whether thrift regulators displayed "political favoritism" when selling insolvent savings and loans in 1988.

Appearing before the Senate Banking Committee to discuss the administration's effort to crack down on thrift fraud, Thornburgh said it would be inappropriate to comment on a story in *The Los Angeles Times* that the department was looking at 1988 thrift transactions to determine if politics were involved in the purchase of failing S&Ls.

One of the transactions reportedly under scrutiny is Bluebonnet Savings, which was purchased by Arizona insurance executive James M. Fail with \$1,000 of his own money and \$70 million in borrowed funds.

Fail bought the thrift in December 1988 as the now-defunct Federal Home Loan Bank Board completed a flurry of deals in the last days of the year to take advantage of expiring tax breaks.

Sen. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, has charged that Robert Thompson, a former aide to then-Vice President Bush, helped Fail gain special access to regulators when he wanted to purchase the 15 Texas-based thrifts that ulti-

mately became Bluebonnet Savings. According to the *Times* story, another bidder for the thrifts said he was told by regulators that he lost out to Fail because Thompson was a friend of the Reagan administration.

#### **EL SALVADOR aid would be cut under senators' proposal.**

Two Democratic senators yesterday introduced legislation (S 2954) to cut military aid to El Salvador.

The proposal by Christopher J. Dodd of Connecticut and Patrick J. Leahy of Vermont would withhold half of the \$85 million in military aid to El Salvador contained in the fiscal 1991 foreign aid spending bill (HR 5114). It also would cut military aid previously allocated but not yet sent to El Salvador.

The measure also specifies that if the Salvadoran government of President Alfredo Cristiani failed to participate in peace negotiations, all of the military aid would be rescinded.

However, if the guerrilla groups fighting the Salvadoran government refused to take part in talks or launched an offensive that threatened the government, all of the aid could be restored.

The legislation is expected on the floor in late September or early October, aides to the two senators said.

The House June 27 approved a 50 percent cut in aid to El Salvador as part of its fiscal 1991 foreign aid appropriations bill (HR 5114).

#### **STARK CALLS HHS Secretary Sullivan 'disgrace to his race.'**

A key House Democrat yesterday said Health and Human Services Secretary Louis W. Sullivan, the only black in the Cabinet, was "a disgrace to his profession and to his race."

Sullivan angrily demanded an apology from Pete Stark, D-Calif., but the chairman of the Ways and Means Subcommittee on Health refused to offer one.

Stark said Dr. Sullivan, in supporting Bush administration health policies, has been insensitive to the needs of the poor and minorities on issues including national health insurance, abortion and the dangers of smoking.

Stark's remarks came at a press conference at which he discussed his proposal to force tobacco companies to pay more of the tab for smoking-related health costs.

Sullivan issued a statement demanding an apology from Stark "for his intemperate remarks and personal attack," adding, "I wish he had the guts to say that to my face . . . 'I don't live on Pete Stark's plantation.'"

Stark refused to apologize or to back down. "No, he doesn't live on my plantation," he said of Sullivan. "He lives on John Sununu's" [the White House chief of staff].

#### **FLAKE INDICTED on conspiracy, tax-evasion charges.**

Rep. Floyd H. Flake, D-N.Y., was indicted in New York yesterday on charges of conspiracy, fraud and tax evasion for allegedly embezzling funds from a federally subsidized senior citizens' housing project run by his church.

The 17-count indictment against the two-term 6th District representative and his wife, Margaret, was announced by U.S. Attorney Andrew Maloney and concluded an 18-month investigation.

Flake is the pastor of the 156-year-old Allen African Methodist Episcopal Church in Queens. The church built and operates the 300-unit senior citizens' facility.

The charges allege that Flake stole about \$75,000 in transportation funds from the Allen Senior Citizens Apartments from 1983 to 1987 and diverted another \$66,000 in church funds to his own use from 1983 to 1988.

In a statement, Flake said he had cooperated fully with the government's investigation and expected to be acquitted. ■

**Correction:** In a story yesterday on the House Armed Services markup of HR 4739, the fiscal 1991 defense authorization bill, the *Monitor* incorrectly reported that the Bush administration had requested troop levels cuts of 90,000 individuals. The actual administration request for manpower cuts was about 38,000.

#### **Not As Scheduled**

- The Senate Judiciary Committee yesterday was unable to mark up a bill (S 2313) to provide extra federal assistance to communities hit hard by drug crimes. The committee took too much time debating a committee resolution concerning discriminatory practices at private clubs and was unable to consider S 2313. The markup will be rescheduled.

- The House Interior Subcommittee on Insular and International Affairs yesterday did not mark up a draft bill that would give the people of Puerto Rico the right to self determination. Panel members said they were negotiating on the bill until late last night but had yet to reach agreement. The subcommittee hopes to take up the bill today at 1 pm.

The Senate Finance Committee on Wednesday approved a Puerto Rican self-determination bill (S 712) that would provide for a five-year transition period for social welfare programs if the Puerto Rican people chose either enhanced commonwealth or statehood in a 1991 plebiscite.

Points for call to Turkish PM Ozal

--I wanted to give you a call to confer on the evolving and I am afraid deteriorating situation in the gulf.

--As you know, we are calling for the immediate and unconditional withdrawal of Iraqi forces, but so far we have seen no progress. To the contrary, Saddam seems intent on keeping Kuwait.

--This would be intolerable for us all. Saddam would control oil prices and be in a position to impose his will on the entire Gulf and the Middle East. Both of our countries would suffer.

--We hope international sanctions that we are pushing for in the UN may help, but Saddam is ruthless is likely to be able to resist. We will also be looking at other options designed to convince Saddam to withdraw his forces, but it is possible he will resort to further uses of force.

--Turkey is in a key position here given the pipeline, which provides a major source of revenue to Iraq. We need to consult closely about under what conditions we would be prepared to shut this down. If we go down this route, and we are getting close to the point where we may agree it is necessary, I want you to know that the United States will stand by its ally Turkey against Iraq or anyone else.

--A generation ago our two countries stood side by side in another challenge to the peace, ✓ in Korea. This is no less dangerous or historic.

--I would appreciate having the benefit of your views given your experience in dealing with Iraq.

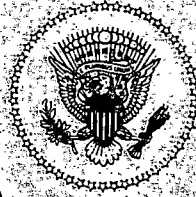

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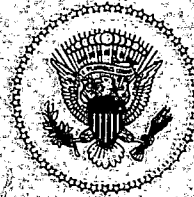

Unfortunately, bad news. The unemployment rate rose from 5.2 percent in June to 5.5 percent in July. Nonfarm payroll employment fell by 219,000 jobs, although 160,000 of these were temporary Census workers ending employment. Average hourly earning rose 0.6 percent. We have been anticipating a rise in unemployment, given five straight quarters of under 2 percent growth. Also, 5.5 percent is still relatively good historically and by comparison, say, to Western Europe. However, the unemployment rate has been below 5.5 percent since August 1988. The rise in the rates, the job loss and other recent economic data will generate, understandably, fears of a mild recession.

Chairman Greenspan still worries about any sign of inflation. Today's average hourly earnings figures provoked more concern than the fall in employment. To my argument he should be lowering interest rates, he says the (Iraq-Kuwait) oil price increase makes that very difficult. I reminded him a one-time price increase will affect the inflation rate only temporarily.

AM-GULF-SHEVARDNADZE URGENT

IRAQ ASSURES MOSCOW IT WILL PULL OUT OF IRAQ SOON

MOSCOW, Reuter - Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze said Friday that Moscow had been assured Iraq was going to pull its troops out of Kuwait soon.

"We've had contacts at various levels and been assured that very soon the Iraqis will pull out their troops," he told reporters.

Shevardnadze spoke to journalists before issuing a joint statement with Secretary of State James Baker calling on the world community to halt arms shipments to Iraq, which invaded Kuwait early Thursday.

Shevardnadze said it had been difficult for Moscow to condemn Baghdad, "inasmuch as we have had good and longstanding relations with Iraq which have evolved for decades."

Despite these good relations we were forced to take such steps by the events in Kuwait, in line with new (Soviet) political thinking and normal relations between civilized states," he said.

1. The President will arrive via helo on Friday, 3 August 1990 at approximately 1530.
2. The Vice President and seven others will arrive approximately 0800, on Saturday, 4 August 1990 and depart approximately 1200.
3. There will be no observers for any of the arrivals.

**EVENTS/OPERATIONS/SET-UP**

1. Class "A" inspections will commence at 1000, Friday, 3 August 1990 and continue throughout the visit.
2. There will be no crew parking in the E6, Wye Oak, and Hickory parking lots. Speed limit must be strictly enforced. POV travel will be strictly limited to/from Redwood parking lot.
3. Uniform for arrival/departure of Marine ONE will be Summer White (Officers and CPO's) and Service Dress Jumper (E6 and below). During the remainder of the visit, the uniform will be as specified in the NSF Notice 1020 of 10 April 1990.
4. On Saturday morning at approximately 0800, the President, Vice President and seven others will have a meeting in Laurel.
5. Following the meeting, various invited tennis guests will arrive and play tennis. Following tennis, guests are invited to a picnic on the Aspen patio. Guests will depart approximately 1600 on Saturday.

8. Golf carts will be set at Aspen, Birch, and Dogwood. Bicycles will be staged at all cabins.
9. All guest facilities reserved; Aspen and Staff pools are open. Tennis courts will be open. Hickory Theater is closed.
10. Based on past experiences, any activity is possible. Probable activities include: golf carts, skeet, bowling, jogging, fishing, horseshoes, walks, swimming, use of the sauna and visits to Wye Oak.
11. There will be a 0730 Catholic Mass in Hickory Library on Sunday and an interdenominational Chapel service at 0900. Crew members and dependents are

invited under guidance previously provided. Bus transportation from housing will depart at 0700 and 0830 and immediately after the service/mass. Mrs. Dee Berry will be our pianist for both services. Duty Yeoman will be the Chaplain's escort and assistant. One individual from the Navy Duty Section and one Marine will usher. The Bush family and guests will sit front right. Dress is working uniform or appropriate civilian attire.

**IRAQI INVASION (UPI)** -- Iraqi invading troops have approached the border with Saudi Arabia, U.S. and other sources said Friday amid reports of continued resistance by pockets of loyalist troops in Kuwait city.... An administration official said the Iraqis were consolidating their positions and approaching Saudi Arabia. "They're moving closer to the border with Saudi Arabia but their troops strength is no where near what it was when it invaded Kuwait," the official said. British and U.S. oil sources also reported the Iraqi invasion force had advanced toward the Saudi border. A Western diplomat said, "The Saudis have not even put their forces on full alert, or moved troops to prevent any Iraqi incursion because they do not want to provoke Saddam or give him an excuse," he said.... The Iraqi moves were reported to be causing deep concern in Riyadh.... A split emerged in the Arab world over the Iraqi attack. Algeria, Morocco and Lebanon condemned the invasion but Iraq has been openly supported by Libya, Jordan and Yemen, and privately backed by Sudan and the Palestine Liberation Organization.

(Nicosia/Reuters) -- Iraq lashed out Friday at critics of its military invasion of Kuwait, with the official media vowing it would not be cowed by "imperialist threats." "We will make the Gulf a graveyard for those who think of committing aggression, starting with those cowardly American navies," Baghdad Radio said in response to a U.S. naval buildup.... The government daily *Al-Jumhuriyah*, in another clear warning to the U.S., told Baghdad's citizens: "Iraq's experienced swords will lie in wait for any evil attempt designed to harm the sovereignty of Kuwait through futile attempts to turn back the wheel of history."

(AP) -- ...A missile landed on Saudi territory near the convergence of the Saudi, Iraqi and Kuwaiti borders, diplomats in Saudi Arabia said. No injuries or damage was reported.

**IRAQI INVASION/U.S. RESPONSE (Brussels/Reuters)** -- The U.S. told its NATO allies Friday that it might use military force in the Persian Gulf if Iraq attacked other countries in the area, alliance sources said. The announcement... was the clearest indication yet that Washington might move from economic sanctions against Iraq to military action. "The Americans said they were making contingency plans in case Iraq attacked anyone else," said one source, who asked not to be identified. These include a military option and seem mostly aimed at protecting Saudi Arabia. But they gave no indication they are planning any military action for now."

(Nicosia/Reuters) -- The U.S. is pressing Saudi Arabia and Turkey to shut pipelines that carry nearly 90 percent of Iraqi oil exports, Persian Gulf officials and oil sources said. But both Riyadh and Ankara appear wary of the idea that would set them on a collision course with Saddam Hussein.... Gulf Arab officials and analysts agreed that an oil embargo and other economic sanctions were Saddam's Achilles' heel. But they doubted Saudi Arabia would join such a high-risk plan.... One Middle East expert, informed of Saudi Arabian thinking, said: "The Saudis are scared stiff of any miscalculation that might trigger the wrath of the unpredictable Saddam."

(Reuter) -- The Pentagon said Friday that a U.S. aircraft carrier, battleship and four escort ships would leave for the Mediterranean Sea next Tuesday on a "long-scheduled deployment" to the region. Stressing the deployment was not connected with the Persian Gulf crisis, Army Col. Miguel Monteverde said "No. This is a regular, long-scheduled deployment to the Mediterranean Sea." In addition to the departures of the carrier Saratoga and battleship Wisconsin Tuesday, the Pentagon said the other ships in the Amphibious Ready Group, carrying about 2,000 Marines, will depart the Norfolk area Monday, also on a routine deployment to the Mediterranean.

**IRAQI INVASION/U.N. SECURITY COUNCIL (U.N./UPI)** -- The Security Council should move rapidly to impose sanctions on Iraq, if Baghdad ignores the U.N. call to withdraw its troops from Kuwait immediately, the U.S. envoy said. Ambassador Pickering said he was looking for "all-encompassing" sanctions. "We are interested in putting teeth in the present resolution," he told reporters as he entered the Security Council chambers to brief the body's 15 members on the U.S. policy toward Iraq. "If the Iraqis are not responsive to the move of the Security Council, we want to move rapidly with sanctions," he said. "We are interested in all encompassing sanctions, military, financial, anything you can think of, we would like to do it."

**IRAQI INVASION/EC (AP)** -- ...Italy...suspended arms shipments [to Iraq] and called a meeting of EC foreign ministry officials in Rome on Saturday to discuss the invasion.... "We will let Europe's weight be felt," said Italian Foreign Minister De Michelis.

**GERMAN UNIFICATION (Bonn/UPI)** -- Chancellor Kohl agreed Friday with Prime Minister de Maiziere's proposal on unification in early fall and all-German elections on Oct. 14.... Kohl backed the suggestion Friday a few hours after de Maiziere made the call for swift unification. "I welcome the proposal which would create clarity about the accession (of East Germany) and the election date," Kohl said. "The proposal reflects the wishes in the GDR but also in the Federal Republic of Germany," he said in a statement.

**CAMBODIA (Phnom Penh/Reuter)** -- The Cambodian National Assembly...praised the U.S. for the first time for Washington's about-face in its Indochina policy, the state news agency SPK said. Assembly chairman Chea Sim, who is also one of the top Communist Party leaders, was quoted as praising the "constructive atmosphere" created by the U.S.

**AIRPORT TAX (UPI)** -- The House voted to hit airline passengers with an airport user fee that could add up to \$12 to the cost of a round-trip ticket, rejecting arguments it amounts to an unfair and regressive \$1 billion tax.... The House...passed the bill 405-15 and sent it to the Senate.

**IRAQI INVASION** (Cairo/UPI) -- Fighting reportedly flared in Kuwait City Friday between pockets of loyalist troops and Iraqi invasion forces, which sources said were moving toward Kuwait's border with Saudi Arabia. The fighting came amid reports that as many as eight American oil workers had been taken by Iraqi troops. U.S. and Soviet officials were preparing Friday to issue an unprecedented joint condemnation of the attack by President Hussein.... Various Lebanese radio stations...said there was intense fighting around the city's Shuwair district and the defense ministry in the Ahmadi area. Telephone links with the city were severed overnight. CNN reported Iraqi troops used artillery strikes in Kuwait City early Friday and explosions near military barracks on the city's outskirts were reported. Initial casualty reports from Kuwaiti diplomats say there were about 500 fatalities.... "(Saddam's) right up against Saudi Arabia," said Sen. Bentsen. "There is no question in my mind...that is his next target. And if he takes over that, and then the (United Arab) Emirates, with the kind of power that he has, he is going to have the entire world's economy in his grasp."

(Kuwait/Reuter) -- World leaders weighed their options in responding to the Persian Gulf Crisis on Friday as small groups of defiant Kuwaitis struggled against the iron grip of Iraqi invaders in Kuwait City. South of the beleaguered city, a desert radio issued a plea to the watching world for help. "How long will the world remain a spectator while peace is being slaughtered on the land of Kuwait," asked the station calling itself "This is Kuwait." Explosions echoed across the capital between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. (local), believed to be coming from army barracks at Shuwaikh on the city outskirts. Automatic gunfire was also reported along the city seafront where Iraqi guns pointed menacingly towards the Gulf.

**IRAQI INVASION/MISSING AMERICANS** (Headline News, 9:09 a.m.) -- At the top of the President's list this morning: some answers to some questions which he hasn't received yet. Where the Iraqi troops took those American oil field workers who were picked up apparently Thursday?... The only U.S. response that we know about is that the U.S. Embassy in Iraq went to the Iraqi Foreign Ministry and demanded to know where those people were taken and why they were taken.... Mr. Bush got a briefing about an hour ago on the situation in Kuwait.... He plans to make more phone calls to Middle Eastern leaders during the day; the purpose of those calls (being) to get Middle Eastern government to condemn Iraq...and to help other countries force Iraqi troops back within their own borders. There's a continuing concern about Americans living in Kuwait. There are reports this morning of gunfire outside the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait. Embassy employees are having trouble using the phone to communicate with the outside world. Some officials say the Iraqi troops in Kuwait are attempting to intimidate the U.S. Embassy personnel by doing all this firing outside the Embassy.

(Reuter) -- At least eight Americans who work for a U.S. oil company in Kuwait were missing Friday, whisked away by Iraqi troops who invaded the tiny oil-rich nation, the State Department said. "It's eight (Americans) and possibly more," said State Department spokesman Adam Shub. "They were taken away in cars and buses sometime yesterday," said Shub. "One of the oil companies reported that eight of its workers were missing," he said.... CNN television said at least six American oil workers were missing, but added they appeared to be safe. "A spokesman for the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait says the workers do not appear to be in any danger. They were apparently taken to help keep oilfields and refineries running," CNN said.... One of the missing Americans was reported to be Charles Amos, a Texan. His son told CNN that an eyewitness to Amos's disappearance said, "At that time they hadn't been abused, or any real force used." He did not know what happened to his father after he was taken away.

**IRAQI INVASION/INTELLIGENCE COMMITTEE (AP)** -- Iraq has far more troops in and near Kuwait than are necessary to occupy the country, which has U.S. officials worried about President Hussein's intentions toward Saudi Arabia. "It's very dangerous for everybody," said Rep. Livingston, a member of the House Intelligence Committee. Members of Congress who attended classified briefings late Thursday said they believed the U.S. is seeking not only to enlist support among allies for a global trade embargo, but also is asking which allies would be prepared to commit military forces to defend Saudi Arabia should Saddam decide to invade.... The Senate approved 97-0 a resolution praising President Bush's move [of sanctions] and calling for a global boycott of Iraqi oil.... "I think it would be a direct threat to the security of the country" if Saudi Arabia were invaded, said Sen. Boren. "There's great nervousness in the whole region."... "[Saddam] is as inscrutable as the sphinx, but far more dangerous," said Rep. Solarz. "We have to prepare for worst-case eventualities. The use of force should be a last resort, but it may be a necessary resort." Sen. Murkowski...who has met Saddam, said: "There is no doubt in my mind that he will go for the brass ring."

**IRAQI INVASION/KING HUSSEIN (Amman/Reuter)** -- Jordan's King Hussein left for Baghdad Friday for talks with President Hussein on the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, an official said.

**IRAQI INVASION/WORLD REACTION (London/AP)** -- More nations Friday joined the chorus of condemnations of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, and Japan considered joining the U.S. and other countries in imposing sanctions on the Baghdad government. The invasion brought rival nations together in calls for Iraq to immediately withdraw its forces from the oil-rich Persian Gulf sheikhdom. Japan, West Germany, Italy, Belgium and Luxembourg announced they would freeze Kuwaiti assets to protect them from Iraq. Officials in the Netherlands said they were likely to impose an asset freeze as well.... The insurance company Lloyd's of London introduced war risk premiums for shipping in the Gulf for the first time since the Iran-Iraq war in 1988.... Friday South Korea, Malaysia, Thailand, Indonesia and China urged a peaceful solution to the conflict. Singapore issued an especially strongly worded condemnation of the invasion, saying it was "a threat to the security of small states everywhere."

"Lead poisoning. It's a terrible thing," said the president.

"Flaking the paint, licking her toes," Mr. Bush said. "The paint falls — you know. They're redoing the White House and she's licking her feet and she's ingested lead."

The English springer spaniel is a favorite of White House visitors and often sprawls out on the carpet in the Oval Office. Millie made headlines when she had puppies a year ago.

## Millie Sick With Lead Poisoning

ASPEN, Colo., Aug. 2—President Bush was in this mountain resort today to discuss the problems confronting Western civilization, but his heart seemed to be in Kennebunkport with his ailing pooch, Millie.

The renowned English springer spaniel has lead poisoning from eating paint chipping off the White House, now being renovated.

In a speech at the Aspen Institute, Bush said he had left the First Lady at their Maine home with their grandchildren and "a sick dog."

Later, out for a walk on the Catto Ranch near here before a private dinner with British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, Bush was asked what was wrong with Millie.

"Lead poisoning. It's a terrible thing," said Bush.

"Flaking the paint, licking her toes," Bush said. "The paint falls—you know, they're redoing the White House and she's licking her feet and she's ingested lead."

Lead poisoning can cause vomiting and anemia and affect the nervous system, kidneys and reproductive organs. Effects sometimes are reversible and cases can be treated with chemicals that bind to the lead, allowing it to be flushed from the body.

## 5:15 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

**IRAQI INVASION/WITHDRAWAL** (Baghdad/Reuter) -- Iraq said Friday it planned to start withdrawing its troops from Kuwait Sunday as long as no threats emerged to Kuwaiti and Iraqi security. "A plan has been laid down to start withdrawing Iraqi troops from Kuwait according to a timetable as of Sunday, unless something appears which could threaten the security of Kuwait and Iraq," a spokesman for the Revolution Command Council said. He ruled out any return of the ruling al-Sabah family. "No return to the extinct regime after the sun of dignity and honor has shone," he said.

(Moscow/Reuter) -- Foreign Minister Shevardnadze said Friday that Moscow had been assured Iraq was going to pull its troops out of Kuwait soon. "We've had contacts at various levels and been assured that very soon the Iraqis will pull out their troops," he told reporters. Shevardnadze spoke to journalists before issuing a joint statement with Secretary Baker calling on the world community to halt arms shipments to Iraq.... Shevardnadze said it had been difficult for Moscow to condemn Baghdad "inasmuch as we have had good and longstanding relations with Iraq which have evolved for decades. Despite these good relations we were forced to take such steps by the events in Kuwait, in line with new (Soviet) political thinking and normal relations between civilized states," he said.

(Moscow/AP) -- The Soviet Union and the U.S. Friday demanded that all countries cut off arms supplies to Iraq because of its invasion of Kuwait, and Foreign Minister Shevardnadze said Iraq would soon withdraw from Kuwait. Shevardnadze and Secretary Baker read a joint statement demanding the arms cutoff to reporters after a hastily scheduled, one-hour meeting at a Moscow airport. The U.S.-Soviet statement, a rare case of superpower cooperation in pursuit of peace, noted that the Soviet Union had cut off arms supplies to Iraq on Thursday and the U.S. had frozen Iraqi assets. The two superpowers also demanded in the statement that Iraq withdraw all of its troops from Kuwait.

**PRESIDENT/SAUDI AID** (Reuter) -- President Bush said Friday Iraq's occupation of Kuwait was a matter of grave concern and that expansion by Iraqi troops into Saudi Arabia or other Gulf oil states would be unacceptable. "I'm not discussing options but I would simply say the status quo is unacceptable and further expansion would be even more unacceptable," Bush told reporters on the White House lawn before departing to his weekend retreat at Camp David. Bush seemed to draw a line against any threat to Saudi Arabia. He said that in a long telephone conversation with Saudi Arabia's King Fahd, he stressed solid U.S. support. "The integrity of Saudi Arabia, its freedom, are very, very important to the United States.... If they asked for specific help...I would be inclined to help in any way we possibly can. It's that serious." Asked about what options the U.S. was considering, Bush did not rule out using the military, saying, "All options are open, economic and otherwise." Bush said he had talked with Turkish Prime Minister Ozal on ways to clamp down on Iraq and that both "have the same sense of urgency and concern."

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**ARAB SUMMIT** (Jeddah/Reuter) -- Iraqi President Hussein will meet the Kuwaiti Emir and other Arab leaders in Saudi Arabia to discuss the invasion of Kuwait, a Saudi Arabian official said Friday. He told Reuters Egyptian President Mubarak, Saudi King Fahd and Jordan's Hussein would also attend the meeting, expected to be held Sunday in the Saudi Red Sea port of Jeddah. The Saudi source, who declined to be identified but is close to Saudi policy making, was speaking after King Fahd met a top Iraqi envoy who is in Saudi Arabia to discuss the Gulf crisis.

**IRAQI INVASION/SAUDI ARABIA** (Reuter) -- The State Department said Friday that Iraqi forces are believed to be within five to 10 miles from the Saudi border and said this was cause for "significant concern." "We note that Kuwait is a small country and we believe the Iraqis are probably within five to 10 miles of the Saudi border," State Department spokesman Boucher told Reuters.

**ARAB LEAGUE REACTION** (Cairo/Reuter) -- The Arab League condemned Iraq Friday for its invasion of Kuwait but seven of the 21 members abstained from the denunciation, "The Arab League...decided to condemn the Iraqi aggression against the state of Kuwait and reject any situation resulting from it," said a statement.... But Iraq, Jordan, Libya, Yemen, Sudan, Djibouti and the PLO refused to endorse the resolution, adopted after the League rule requiring unanimity was waived.

**EGYPTIAN REACTION** (Cairo/UPI) -- Egypt called on Iraq Friday to withdraw its troops from Kuwait immediately and stop all attempts to alter Kuwait's political system by force..... The statement by the Foreign Ministry did not specify what action Cairo may consider if Iraq did not heed its warning, but appeared timed to coincide with the opening in Cairo of a meeting of foreign ministers from the Arab League.

**GORBACHEV/COMMUNIST PARTY** (Atlanta/Reuter) -- Foreign Minister Shevardnadze told a CNN interviewer he expects President Gorbachev to step down as head of the Soviet Communist Party, CNN said Friday. The Atlanta-based network said Shevardnadze told its correspondent he could not predict when Gorbachev would relinquish his party post, but that "there is no doubt in my mind at all that he will one day do this."

**CIVIL RIGHTS** (AP) -- The House approved a landmark civil rights bill Friday, brushing off a last-minute veto threat by President Bush.... "Stand up for what you know is right, stand up for America's values," Rep. Gephardt urged as the House approved the bill, 272-154. The measure goes to a House-Senate conference committee, where prospects for compromise appear good.... Approval came minutes after release of a letter from Bush, threatening a veto and offering to sign an alternate version that he called a "sound, practical compromise." He said that without changes the bill "will have the effect of forcing businesses to adopt quotas in hiring and promotion."... The alternate was rejected, however, as the House pressed ahead with the measure that would effectively overturn five Supreme Court decisions last year and that tops the civil rights community's congressional list.

# One Hundred First Congress of the United States of America

## AT THE SECOND SESSION

*Begun and held at the City of Washington on Tuesday, the twenty-third day of January,  
one thousand nine hundred and ninety*

### Joint Resolution

To designate September 13, 1990, as "National D.A.R.E. Day".

- Whereas D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) is a comprehensive program under which children from kindergarten through the 12th grade are taught how to resist the pressures of experimenting with drugs and alcohol;
- Whereas the D.A.R.E. program provides parents with the information and techniques necessary to reinforce and further develop the decisions of their children to lead drug free-lives;
- Whereas the D.A.R.E. program targets children at ages when they are most vulnerable to extreme peer pressure to try drugs and alcohol and teaches them how effectively to resist pressure to engage in negative behavior;
- Whereas the D.A.R.E. program is now conducted in local schools in more than 2,000 communities in 49 States and in Department of Defense Overseas Dependent Schools worldwide;
- Whereas more than 4,500,000 school children will be reached through the D.A.R.E. core curriculum in 1990;
- Whereas, school children are sometimes more streetwise about substance abuse than are classroom teachers, the D.A.R.E. program is taught by veteran police officers having direct experience with cases involving criminal drug offenses and with people whose lives have been ruined by substance abuse;
- Whereas each police officer who teaches the D.A.R.E. program completes an 80-hour training course that includes instruction in teaching techniques, relationships between officers and schools, self-esteem development, child development, and communication skills;
- Whereas the D.A.R.E. curriculum, developed by the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles Unified School District, helps school children understand self-image, recognize and manage stress without using drugs or alcohol, analyze and resist media presentations about drugs and alcohol, evaluate risk-taking behavior, resist gang pressure, apply decision-making skills, and evaluate the consequences of the choices facing them;
- Whereas independent research shows that the D.A.R.E. program has exceeded its goal of helping students combat peer pressure to use drugs and alcohol by contributing to improved study habits and grades, by reducing vandalism and gang activity, and by instilling greater respect for police officers; and
- Whereas the D.A.R.E. program has achieved outstanding success teaching positive and effective approaches to one of the most difficult problems facing young people today, namely drug and alcohol abuse: Now, therefore, be it
