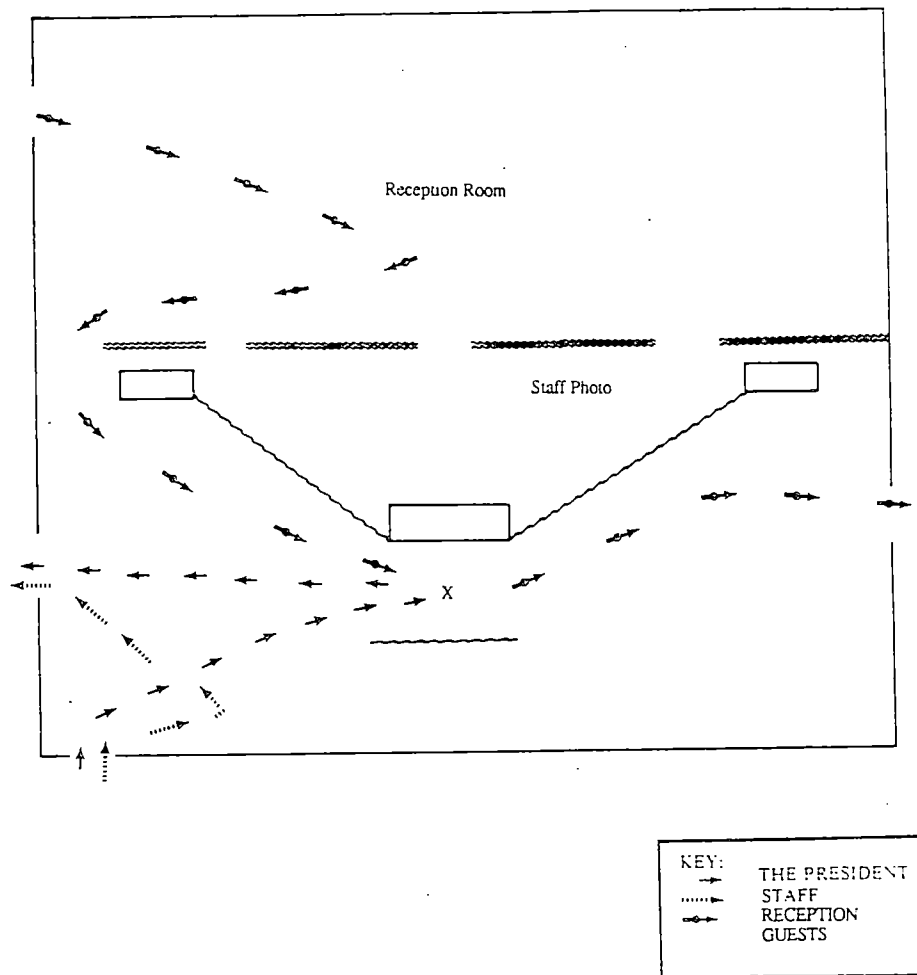

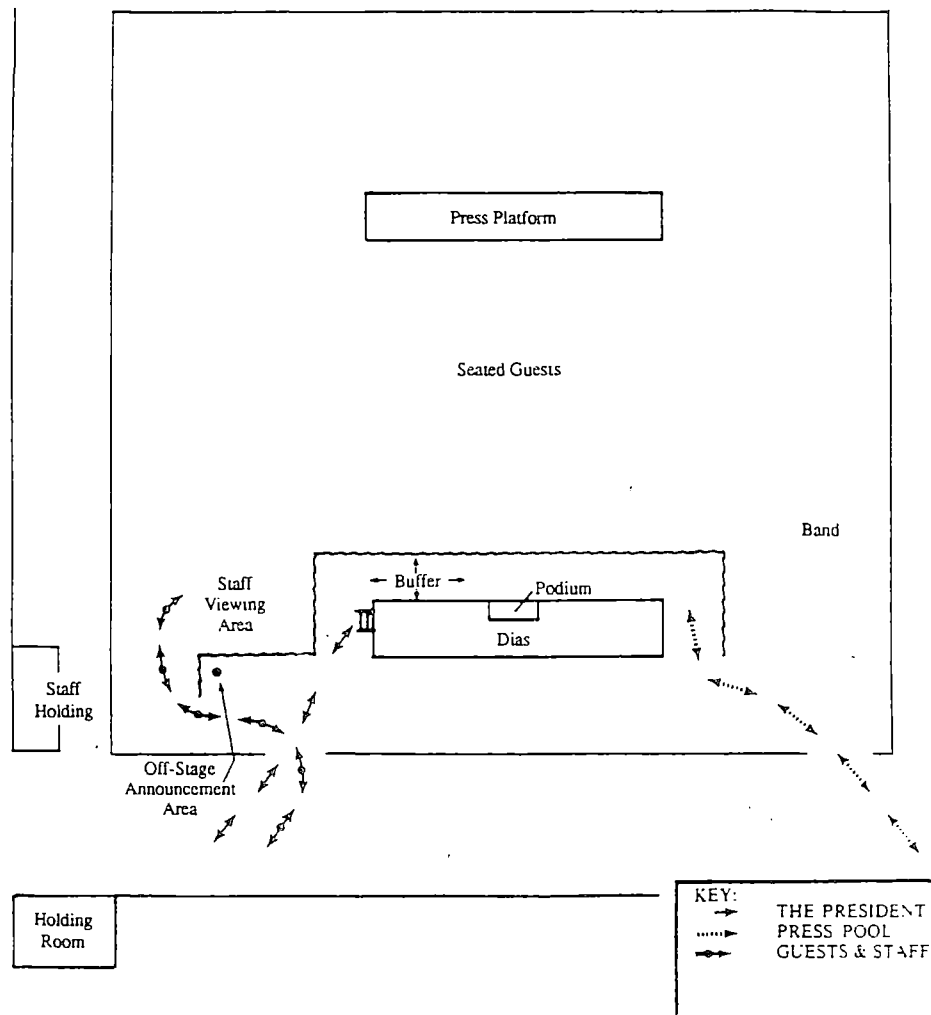

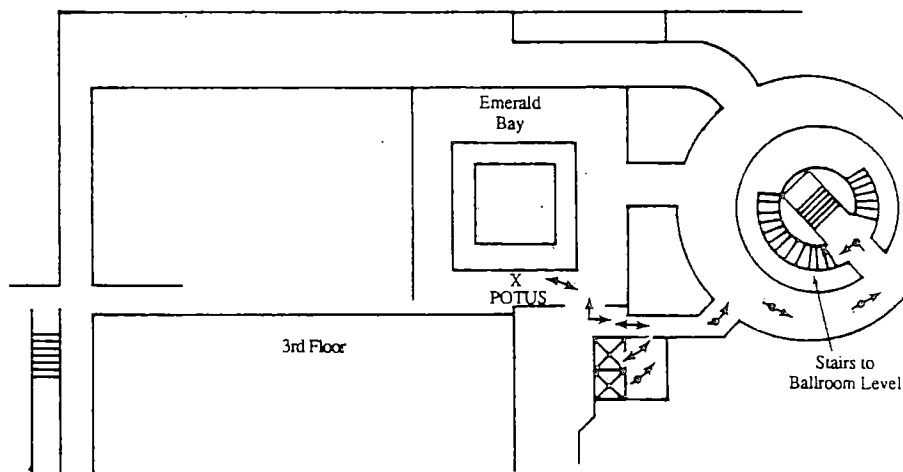

HOUSE FLOOR: Free mail for U.S. troops in desert approved.

The House yesterday cleared for the president a bill (S 3033) to allow free mailing privileges for U.S. troops stationed in the Persian Gulf, approving the legislation 368-0. The Senate approved the measure on Friday.

Members then approved, 227-142, a motion by Tom Ridge, R-Pa., to alter a similar House bill (HR 5611) to stipulate that the U.S. Postal Service would be reimbursed for the free military mailings from legislative funds used to pay for franked congressional mail that lawmakers send — at taxpayer cost — to their constituents.

HR 5611 was passed by voice vote and will be sent to the Senate, where action is not considered likely.

The House also approved numerous bills by voice vote under suspension of the rules, including:

- A bill (HR 5610) to allow the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation to bolster its bank insurance funds by increasing deposit insurance premiums.

- Legislation (HR 4660) to place a memorial to the Indians who fought against Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer at the Battle of Little Big Horn at the Custer Battlefield National Monument in Montana.

- A bill (HR 4962) calling for the minting of commemorative coins to support the training of American athletes in preparation for the 1992 Olympic games.

SENATE FLOOR: Work begins on age discrimination bill.

The Senate conducted a leisurely day of work — devoted largely to quorum calls — on legislation (S 1511) that would overturn a 1989 Supreme Court ruling that now allows employers to discriminate against older workers in employee benefit plans.

Senators approved a number of relatively minor amendments to the bill, which has been on the Senate calendar

for months. The measure was approved Feb. 28 by the Senate Labor Committee.

The bill would make it clear that the 1967 Age Discrimination in Employment Act covers benefits for older workers, unless such discrimination is justified by "significant cost considerations."

SOUTER QUIZZED on death penalty, abortion, judicial activism.

Supreme Court nominee David H. Souter yesterday continued to dodge questions about his views on abortion and several other specific topics as the Senate Judiciary Committee held its third day of hearings on the nomination.

Souter did tell members that he does not believe the death penalty violates the Constitution's ban on "cruel and unusual punishment."

And the New Hampshire jurist explained his ruling in a New Hampshire Supreme Court case in which he was the lone defender of police use of sobriety checkpoints for motorists.

But members weren't always successful in prying loose a definitive answer.

- Souter declined to address directly a question posed by Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, about whether a woman's decision to get an abortion was an example of an individual right that should be protected by the high court.

"Those considerations, to me, point exactly to the kind of inquiry the court must make," Souter said. The nominee did agree with Metzenbaum that the Supreme Court had an obligation to defend individual rights, such as flag burning, when those rights were opposed by a majority of Americans.

"There's no question about it. If that were not the case, there would be no point in having the Bill of Rights," Souter said.

- Arlen Specter, R-Pa., and Charles E. Grassley, R-Iowa, were unable to elicit

Senate Floor: The Senate will continue debate on legislation (S 1511) to bar employers from providing lower disability pay and fewer other benefits to older workers unless justified by special cost considerations.

Senators are expected to return to consideration of the fiscal 1991 spending bill (HR 5311) for the District of Columbia. A vote is likely on an amendment by Daniel R. Coats, R-Ind., that would allow states to bar dumping of other states' garbage by private waste-disposal companies.

Members will also vote on a number of minor treaties, including seven routine tax treaties.

House Floor: The House will take up legislation (HR 4328) that would limit increases in textile imports to 1 percent annually. The administration argues that the measure would pre-empt international trade negotiations and prove costly to consumers.

Members will also begin consideration of a far-reaching crime prevention bill (HR 5269). The measure would allow broader use of the death penalty while speeding the appeals process for death row inmates.

The bill has also drawn a veto threat because of provisions that would impose stricter standards for convicting capital case defendants and keeping them on death row. President Bush says the bill is tougher on law enforcement than on crime.

Coastal Barriers: After failing to get a quorum last week, the House Banking Committee plans to mark up legislation (HR 2840) to expand a program designed to protect hundreds of miles of coastline along the East Coast.

The measure would more than double the acreage of the Coastal Barriers Resource System, bringing the total to

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from Souter his views on judicial activism — just how aggressive the judiciary should be in righting what the judges consider to be wrongs in society or whether the judiciary should step into areas which no branch of government has yet addressed.

The hearings will continue today.

BUDGET NEGOTIATORS aim for deadline, but problems remain.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said yesterday he expected White House and congressional budget negotiators to reach agreement on how to cut the federal deficit by early today.

Democrats and Republicans, however, were still divided over whether to cut the tax on capital gains and what other taxes to raise. Foley said that questions also remained on military spending and restraints on entitlement programs.

The negotiators hope to cut the fiscal 1991 deficit by \$50 billion.

President Bush, who has said that some taxes must be raised to help reduce the deficit, reiterated his position yesterday that a reduction in the capital gains tax must be part of any compromise. Democrats want to offset the capital gains cuts by increasing the personal income taxes of the wealthy.

Negotiators, who have been ensconced at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington, D.C., for more than a week now, have already missed a number of self-imposed deadlines. They also realize that only two weeks remain before the start of the new fiscal year on Oct. 1. Across-the-board spending cuts of more than \$100 billion will go into effect Oct. 15 if an agreement is not reached.

WHEAT ACREAGE limitations set by House Agriculture panel.

The House Agriculture Subcommit-

tee on Wheat voted yesterday to spell out wheat acreage reduction guidelines to help farmers decide how much winter wheat to plant.

Under the bill, wheat farmers who participate in federal programs would be required to take 10 percent of their acreage out of production. Growers who took another 5 percent out of production would receive additional subsidies.

Final planting guidelines will be included in the five-year farm bill (S 2830) Congress is working on now, but those guidelines would be too late for winter-wheat farmers, who have already begun to plant their crops, lawmakers said.

For several weeks, lawmakers have been urging the Agriculture Department to set guidelines, much as they did in 1985 when the last farm bill was crafted. The administration has resisted, however, arguing that it did not want to be forced to choose between different levels offered by the House and Senate versions of the farm bill.

But sponsors of the measure say that without acreage reduction guidelines, farmers are left guessing what portion of their land to take out of production to qualify for federal programs. If they plant too much, they would be forced to plow over crops to comply with acreage reduction levels.

MEXICO TRADE: Administration to seek bargaining authority.

Administration officials said yesterday that President Bush would formally submit to Congress within the next few days a request for authority to negotiate an agreement dismantling barriers to the free flow of goods and investment between the United States and Mexico.

The announcement came in testimony before the Joint Economic Committee.

The administration's formal request would start a procedure in which Congress had 60 legislative days, a period expected to last until late spring, to review the proposal. If Congress gave its assent, which is considered likely, then the administration could begin negotiations with Mexico.

Deputy U.S. Trade Representative Julius Katz told members of the Joint Economic Committee that if negotiations begin in late spring, he hoped to have an agreement wrapped up by the end of 1991.

Administration officials have said that the Persian Gulf crisis has focused attention on America's trade relationship with Mexico, which has the eighth-largest reserve of oil in the world.

The United States would like to work with Mexico in accelerating oil production in that country, which currently stands at about 2.5 million barrels of crude daily.

Head Start's For Turtle Kids Too

The Head Start program, aimed at giving poor preschoolers a leg up on learning skills, is seen as one of the success stories of the \$1.2 trillion federal budget. It must be doing something right; President Bush proposed to raise its budget by 36 percent.

But there's another head start program. For sea turtles.

That's right. Sea turtles.

No, they're not taught their ABC's, but it's a serious program, aimed at boosting sea turtle populations. And while the lives of sea turtles may not merit as much money as the \$1.4 billion Head Start program, along the coast of the Gulf of Mexico, turtles' lives are serious business.

Environmentalists there complain that the gulf turtle population is being depleted because mature turtles are drowning after being caught in shrimpers' nets.

The Commerce Department last year issued a regulation that all shrimpers attach so-called Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs), which release the trapped turtles, to their nets.

But shrimpers complain that the devices cost them up to 40 percent of their shrimp catch.

The House Merchant Marine Subcommittee on Fisheries and Wildlife Conservation held a hearing yesterday on two bills that would help increase endangered turtle populations.

One measure, sponsored by Gene Taylor, D-Miss., takes advantage of an experimental program, already under way, in which wild turtle eggs are dug up, hatched, and raised in a federal laboratory. The small turtles are then released about nine months later, when they have a "head start" on their predators.

Taylor's bill (HR 3842) would expand the head start program to include all threatened sea turtle populations in the gulf.

His district is home to a sizable shrimping fleet, and he says shrimpers are being unfairly singled out for the decline in turtle populations.

Another measure (HR 2975), sponsored by W. J. "Billy" Tauzin, D-La., before the subcommittee would authorize the Interior Department to make grants for projects to increase endangered turtle populations.

Shrimpers back the two bills because the legislation could help rebuild gulf turtle populations and eventually ease the use of TEDs.

But environmentalists point out that a major problem with the hatching program is that those turtles hatched in laboratories don't seem to be reproducing. It seems that because they are raised in captivity, the turtles have lost the necessary nesting instincts.

And some environmentalists question whether it makes much sense to nurture turtles, only to send them off to die in shrimp nets.

1.2 million protected areas.

While the bill would not ban development, it would prohibit developers of the coastal areas from receiving federal benefits, such as flood insurance and housing loans.

The Merchant Marine Committee has already approved the bill.

NIH Reauthorization: A potentially rancorous markup awaits the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health, when members mark up draft legislation to reauthorize the National Institutes of Health (NIH).

Members will square off over proposed NIH funding of fetal tissue research. Under the current NIH authorization, the agency is banned from funding fetal tissue research. Members who object to abortion say that using fetal tissue is immoral.

But other members say that successful use of fetal tissue to treat Parkinson's disease and juvenile diabetes, as well as other promising uses, shows that fetal tissue research is an important component

of advancing medicine.

Subcommittee Chairman Henry A. Waxman, D-Calif., strongly supports overturning the research ban. "The administration has abandoned scientific inquiry in favor of right-wing dogma," he said.

But Assistant Secretary for Health James O. Mason maintains that to overturn the ban on fetal tissue research would "conflict with the administration policy to ensure the protection of all human life."

Foreign Investment: Legislation to improve the government's collection of data on foreign investment in the United States will be marked up by the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Commerce.

Lawmakers and the administration agree that more information on foreign investment is needed but disagree over who should get the information or how it should be used.

Under one bill before the panel, the added information would serve as a means for curbing foreign takeovers. HR 5225 would broaden the U.S. govern-

ment's power to block foreign acquisition of U.S. assets by barring takeovers that weaken the "industrial and technological base" of the United States.

The U.S. government would have to investigate whenever a foreign firm acquired a U.S. business that included technologies essential to national security. The administration opposes the bill, saying it may discourage foreign investment.

The other measure (HR 4520) would allow the Commerce Department's Census Bureau to share information on foreign investment with several federal agencies, including the interagency committee that is responsible for advising the president on whether to bar foreign takeovers for national security reasons.

Spotted Owl: Draft legislation to protect the northern spotted owl will be considered by the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Forests.

The measure would establish a temporary old-growth forest reserve that would be off-limits to logging while a scientific panel studied how much forest area was needed to protect the threatened owl.

Election Day in Three States

Voters in three states will decide their party's nominees for Senate, House and gubernatorial seats today in primary and runoff elections in Massachusetts, Oklahoma and Washington.

Following is a sketch of what can be expected in today's polling.

Massachusetts: Lt. Gov. Evelyn F. Murphy's surprise withdrawal last week from the Massachusetts Democratic gubernatorial primary was expected to enhance former state Attorney General Francis X. Bellotti's lead over Boston University President John Silber. Murphy, who has trailed both men in recent polls and whose name will remain on the ballot, endorsed Bellotti.

In the GOP gubernatorial race, polls showed former U.S. Attorney William F. Weld catching up to state House Minority Leader Steven D. Pierce. In recent days, the gap between the two has closed to smaller than the polls' margin of error.

While the race to succeed Democratic Gov. Michael S. Dukakis has dominated state politics this year, some Bay State congressional campaigns have stirred interest as well.

Two Republicans — Concord developer and lawyer Jim Rappaport and Hingham businessman Dan Daly — are spending big money in the GOP primary to decide who will face incumbent Democratic Sen. John Kerry in November. Kerry will be a big favorite over the GOP nominee.

Freshman Rep. Richard E. Neal, a 2nd District Democrat, was likely saved from a possible primary defeat when his opponent, Theodore E. Dimauro, issued a statement this month saying that federal bank regulators were about to close the Bank of New England. The bank was not closed, its stock plummeted for a day following Dimauro's statement, and the would-be congressman may be prosecuted for spreading a false rumor about the health of a bank.

Two Republicans — Donald T. Coleman and John F.

MacGovern — are vying to challenge 5th District Democratic incumbent Chester G. Atkins in November. Atkins, a member of the House Appropriations Committee, is considered safe.

Oklahoma: Rep. Wes Watkins, 51, a Democrat representing the 3rd District, and 1986 gubernatorial nominee and businessman David Walters, 38, face each other in a runoff for their party's gubernatorial nomination. Watkins captured 32.2 percent of the vote and Walters 31.7 percent in the Aug. 28 primary.

In the GOP gubernatorial race, restaurateur Vince Orza, 40, and former U.S. Attorney Bill Price, 41, vie in their party's runoff. Orza won 40.1 percent of the vote to Price's 27.1 percent in the primary.

Washington: Five of the state's eight House incumbents face primary opposition, with at least two considered vulnerable to eventual general election challengers.

Third District freshman Democrat Jolene Unsoeld is battling to hold onto her seat in an area where the weakening timber industry — threatened by congressional efforts to save the threatened northern spotted owl — has dumped on her pro-environment record. She faces Ned Norris in the Democratic primary.

Former Republican state Rep. Bob Williams, running for Unsoeld's seat in the GOP primary, poses a serious challenge to the freshman in November. He faces Gary L. Snell in the primary.

First District Republican Rep. John Miller is expected to beat his primary opponent, Kerman Kermoade, but faces a vigorous challenge in November from Democratic King County Council member Cynthia Sullivan. Miller is expected to overcome Sullivan's attempt to unseat him. Sullivan faces Benny Teal in the primary.

Committee Meetings Today

The bill also sets minimum annual timber sales for three years to help local communities ease into the logging cut-backs.

Policymakers are being pressured by environmentalists, who worry about the extinction of the owl, and Northwest loggers, who say the legislation will cost thousands of jobs.

Environmentalists oppose the draft measure because it includes a provision that would restrict environmental groups and others from filing lawsuits against the government over logging plans.

A House Interior subcommittee approved a bill (HR 5295) Sept. 13 that would establish an old-growth forest reserve but would not prohibit lawsuits.

Meanwhile, about 200 Northwest loggers rallied on Capitol Hill yesterday to urge Congress not to restrict timber harvesting. "We didn't come to Washington to ask Congress for a handout. We came to ask for the opportunity to continue working," said one rally member.

Judiciary Markup: The House Judiciary Committee will mark up legislation (HR 3898) aimed at creating a more efficient system for the resolution of federal civil court cases.

The bill would require federal district courts to devise a system for speeding action on civil cases and reducing expenses.

Carlos J. Moorhead, R-Calif., is expected to offer an amendment to enable U.S. attorneys to seek Justice Department approval of any settlement agreement. To speed resolution of cases, the bill language prohibits such oversight.

The committee will also mark up a bill (HR 5316) that would expand the number of federal circuit and district judges. The measure would add eight new appeals court judges and 39 new district court judges.

Indian Health: The Senate Indian Affairs Committee will mark up a bill (S 2645) aimed at providing medical care to the growing segment of the Indian population that lives in urban areas.

Despite comprising 50 percent of the Indian population, urban Indians receive less than 1 percent of the Indian Health Service (IHS) budget. The bill would require the IHS to boost its urban Indian health efforts, focusing on preventive medicine, immunization, mental health services, and prevention and treatment of child sexual abuse.

One of the provisions of the bill would require the IHS to refurbish its urban Indian health centers.

According to committee Chairman Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, urban Indians have as many health problems as their reservation counterparts, but finding care is much more difficult, in many cases. ■

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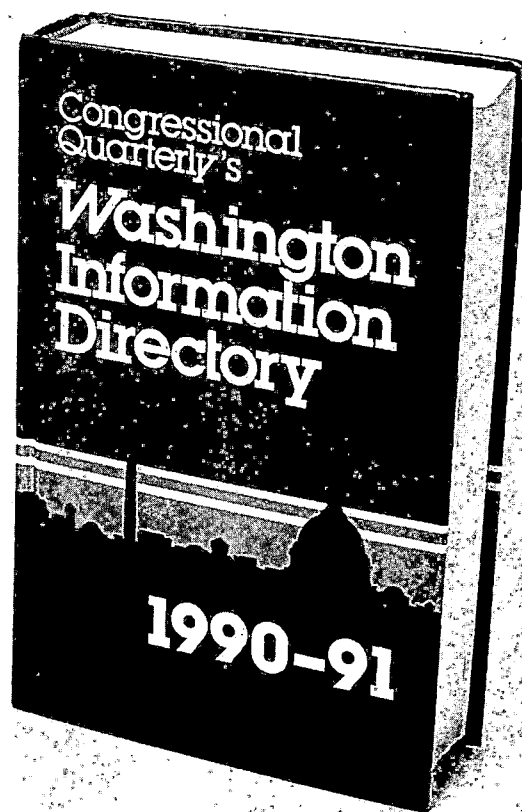

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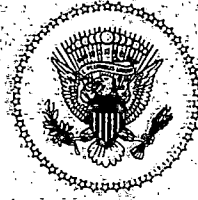

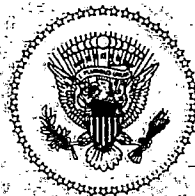

Dugan also discussed the sharing of intelligence and weapons technology with Israel, statements that could upset Arab members of the alliance against Iraq, and he violated Pentagon protocol by suggesting the Air Force would be the service that shoulders the primary burden.

(Secretary Cheney: "The statements in the article to the effect that the Army and the Marines would provide for diversionary activities while basically the Air Force carried the ball was inappropriate.")

Dugan later released a statement saying his comments were his personal views and they should not be construed as reflecting U.S. war plans. Privately, Pentagon officials disputed some of what Dugan said in the interview.

Rather: Asked about the much-decorated general's firing Monday, President Bush said only that he strongly supports it. Mr. Bush also told reporters that he is confident that Iran can be counted on to continue helping against Iraq.

CBS's Lesley Stahl: "Amid reports that Iran has made a secret, embargo-busting deal to buy oil from Iraq and to send food in exchange, President Bush said Monday there isn't any evidence that Iran is cheating.

(President: "We have had indirect assurances from Iran that they want to see these sanctions complied with.")

Mr. Bush played down Ayatollah Khomeini's call last week for a holy war against the U.S. deployment. A high priority right now: improving relations with Iran, keeping it in the anti-Iraq coalition. As for the President's debut on Iraqi TV Sunday, he said if two people there heard what he called the truth, it was worth the effort, and he ridiculed the orchestrated demonstrations.

(President: "Well it kept them hustling round, jumping up and down, screaming about the United States, and if that helped them vent their frustrations, fine. they must have been a little concerned about it because the demonstrators were already heading to the demonstration point before they knew what I said.")

The President snapped at a reporter who suggested he had misread Iraq's intentions before the invasion.

(President: "I don't think this is caused by miscalculation in United States policy. I think it's caused by miscalculation by Saddam Hussein.")

But some critics are charging that the administration may have actually encouraged the invasion. On July 31, a State Department official testified publicly that the U.S. was under no obligation to come to Kuwait's aid if it were attacked. Iraqi tanks rolled two days later. The President said he regrets his policy of improving relations with Iraq, that in hindsight it didn't make much sense. But he said he's not sure a different policy would have changed Saddam's intention to take over Kuwait.

- Andrews: some significant progress; still significant differences in all areas (not just capital gains); venue shifting to Capitol (leaders meeting with S/B/D today).

III. ENTITLEMENTS

IV. ENERGY TAXES

- These are likely to prove manageable, but with some "regressivity offset" (increase in the standard deduction).

- "Nunn adjusted for Desert Shield" seems acceptable for three years -- but Democrats insist on treating Desert Shield adjustment as a supplemental.

VI. PROCESS REFORM

- This is being debated in arcane terms. An enforceable deal with a revised and satisfactory G-R-H system seems achievable if other pieces fall into place.

Three quick items regarding your trip to Colorado and California:

1. In your Colorado and California speeches, (particularly in your remarks in Los Angeles), you make a non-partisan appeal to get-out-and-vote. In your Los Angeles remarks, you cite the fact that even the members of the Armed Forces serving in the Persian Gulf will be exercising their right to vote through absentee ballots. In fact, we have worked with DOD to be sure that absentee voter programs are not only available, but made a priority, to those folks serving in the Gulf region. DOD has been very cooperative and aggressive in this effort.
2. Bruce Benson, Colorado State Party Chairman, will be aboard Air Force One from Washington to Denver. Bruce was GBFP Finance Chairman in 1988 and proved to be very industrious and a hard worker. Be advised, however, that Benson is waging the most aggressive campaign so far to be Lee Atwater's replacement at the RNC. He's had several conversations with RNC leaders around the country and even called me two weeks ago to discuss the need for "someone" to replace Lee sooner rather than later. I'm sure he won't mention this to you, but I wanted you to be aware of it.
3. You may see Sam Bamieh at the major donor event in San Francisco. He's a Team 100 member and a major donor to the State Party as well as the Wilson campaign. He was an active fundraiser in the 1988 campaign. FYI, Sam has personally covered a very large part of Lee Atwater's medical bills and done so without fanfare - in a very matter-of-fact manner just because he likes Lee. This has made an enormous difference in the lives of Sally and the kids. Bush came back briefly while we were rolling toward our runway at Andrews. He talked mostly about the budget negotiations. He said he "just had a long talk with Brady, Darman and Sununu" on the budget negotiations. He said he "can't really predict what's going to happen." Asked whether his advisers were optimistic, he said "they expressed some optimism...I think everybody, they tell me, agrees that they've come quite a way but it's not done by a long shot."

Asked whether the talks were stuck on just "a few sticking points," Bush replied "I gather it is." He added, "Just let them hammer it out." Asked whether his insistence on cutting the capital gains tax is not a stumbling block, Bush replied "As far as I'm concerned, it's not stumbling. It's something that I've long expressed my support for and will again." Asked whether there was any "budge" in his support for a capital-gains cut, he said he would "leave it to the negotiators to discuss the positions." He added, "We went over it with great depth this morning, and my position is well known and I will reiterate it today."

Asked his reaction to Atlanta's selection as site of the 1996 summer Olympics, Bush said he wasn't surprised but "I was very pleased with the choice of Atlanta." He said he had sent a "little tape" (presumably to the site selection committee) on Atlanta's behalf. (more tk)

ADJENDUM TO POOL REPORT NO. 1

Before landing in Denver, Bush signed into law Bill S. 3033 which allows members of the US Armed Forces serving in the Persian Gulf to send mail to the United States without cost. The bill, which was sponsored by Sen. Pryor of Arkansas and seven others, amends the current law which authorizes US troops serving overseas to receive the free mail privileges if they are either 1) engaged in combat against an enemy of the US; or 2) engaged in military operations with a hostile foreign force.

The bill Bush signed amends that law to allow military personnel who are "engaged in temporary military operations under arduous circumstances" to be also eligible for the free mail privileges.

The law covers the sending of letters and recorded tapes.

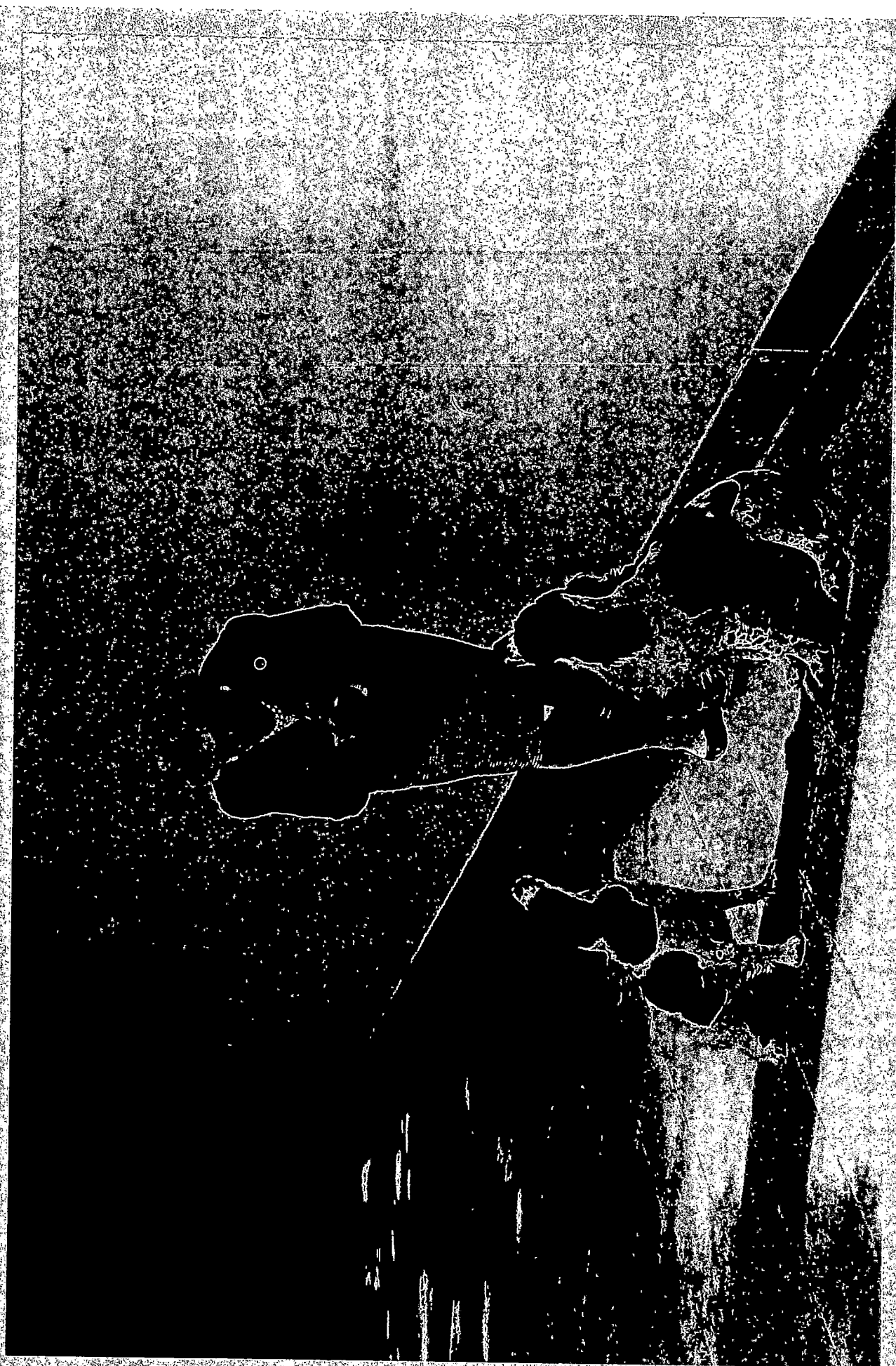

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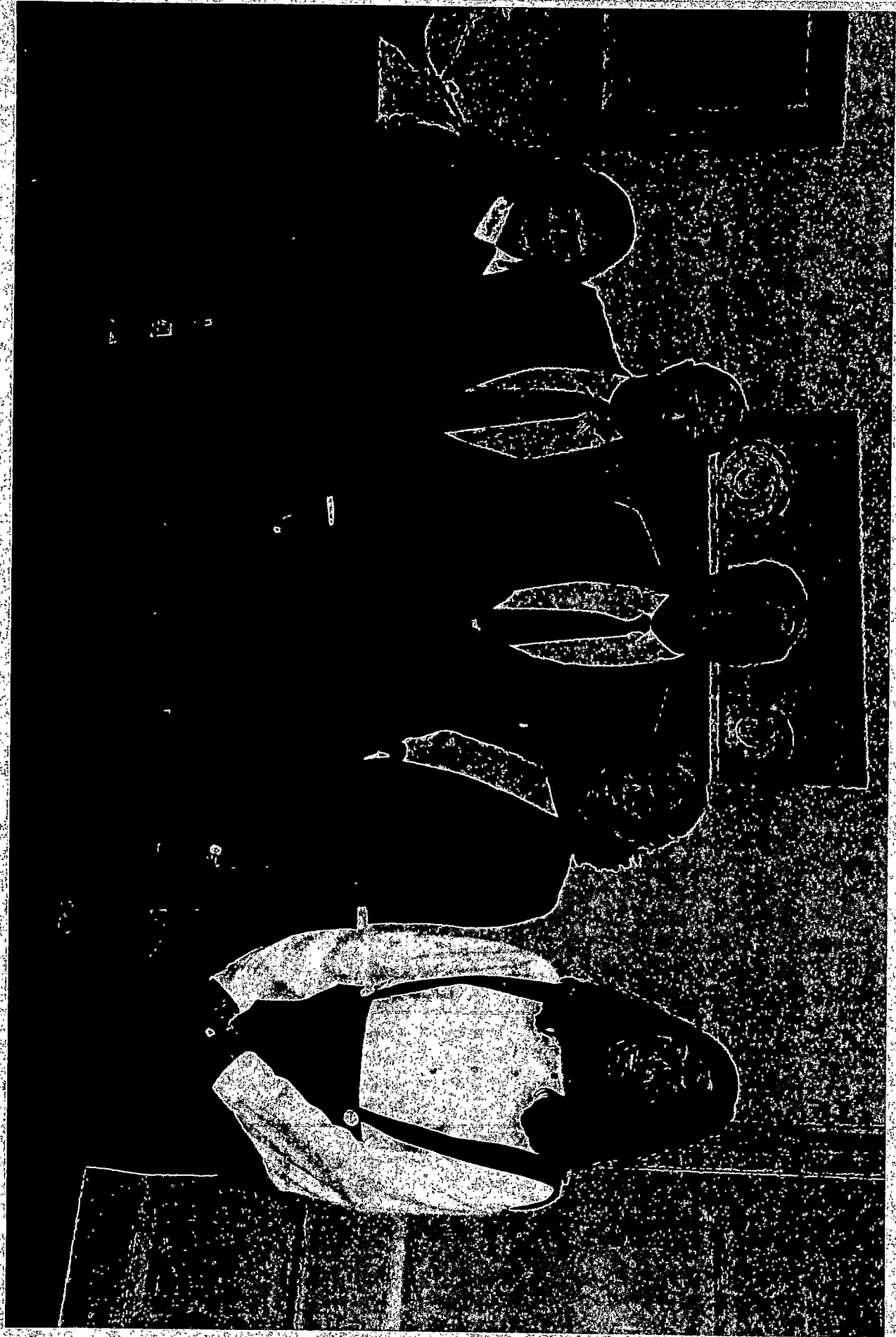

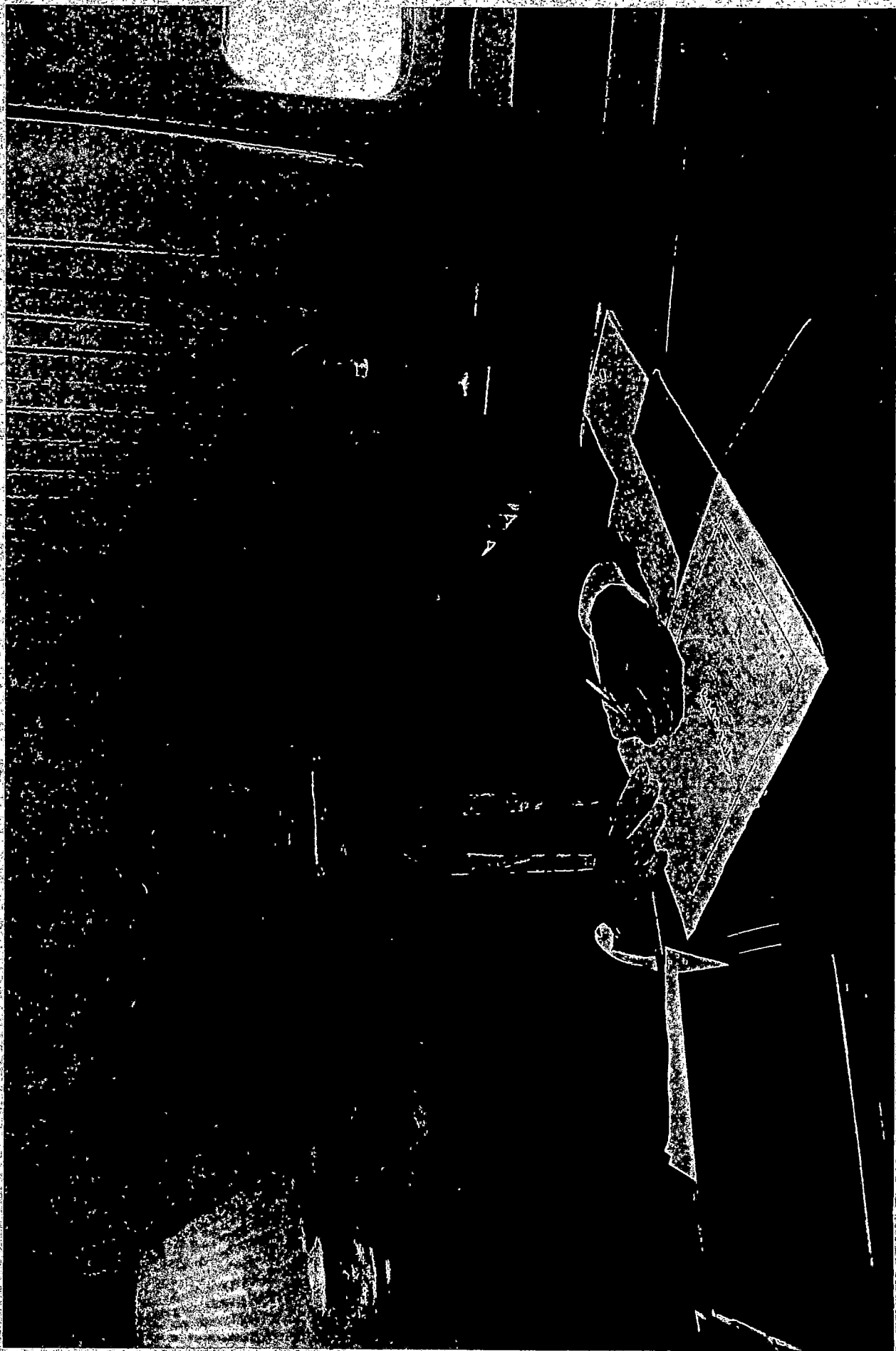
