HOUSE DEMOCRATS JOIN REVOLT ON BUDGET DEAL Vote Counts Show Both Parties Falling Short

The prospects for passage of a major deficit-reduction package seriously deteriorated Wednesday as the congressional revolt over the budget agreement spread to House Democrats who are upset over the pact's tax and Medicare provisions.

Wednesday night, worried House Democratic leaders were considering postponement of the first test vote on the agreement, which is scheduled Thursday. Vote counts in the House showed each party falling short of a majority of its members ready to support a budget resolution that would set out the broad spending totals agreed to by White House and congressional negotiators on Sunday, according to leadership aides in both parties....

Upon hearing the latest vote counts, the White House intensified its last-minute lobbying blitz last night. "This is breaking against us," said an Administration official.

Bush and numerous top Administration officials spent hours Wednesday trying to persuade House Republicans to support the budget plan....

Lawmakers reported that telephone calls to their offices were still running heavily against many provisions, especially savings from Medicare and higher taxes on gasoline, beer and wine. "The President told them to call," said one northeastern Democratic lawmaker. "They called all right -- I got 100 calls today. Only five or six were for it." (John Yang, Washington Post, A1)

Bush Pulls Out The Stops As Budget Pact Faces First Real Test

President Bush pulled out all the stops to win passage of a belt-tightening budget package that was due to be put to the test for the first time in Congress Thursday.

Putting his political prestige on the line, Bush canceled a five-day trip to stay in Washington and lobby for Republican votes in the House and Senate.

"It is our last, best chance to try to get this federal deficit under control," Bush told reporters. "A major benefit is short-run, a staving off of economic catastrophe."

Prospects for passage of the bipartisan budget pact appeared to be deteriorating as a revolt among House Republicans spread to House Democrats upset over the pact's cuts in health care for the elderly....

Both Secretary Brady and Fed chief Greenspan sought to sugarcoat the bitter medicine contained in the package by predicting lower interest rates once it's passed.

"It's simple: If Congress passes the budget agreement, interest rates will go down," Brady said. "If they don't pass it, interest rates will go up." (Rich Miller, Reuter)

House Democrats Seek To Undermine Budget Agreement, But Supporters Still Confident

Power House Democrats began maneuvering Wednesday to undercut the bipartisan deficit reduction package, although top Bush Administration officials and Democratic congressional leaders said they expected the measure to survive a key vote on Thursday.

Despite a nationally televised appeal on the package's behalf by President Bush in tandem with Sen. Mitchell on Tuesday night, key Democrats on the House Ways and Means Committee voiced major reservations. Rep. Rostenkowski vowed to press for potentially fatal modifications....

Meeting with reporters from different parts of the country, Bush Wednesday acknowledged the dilemma. The President described his Tuesday night speech as an attempt to "give cover" to Republicans and Democrats in Congress, permitting them to tell constituents "the President encouraged you to do it. Blame me, because I know it's best for our country, but I don't expect it's politically popular."...

While Rostenkowski targeted a package of tax breaks contained in the agreement for small-scale, venture capital companies and a provision to save \$60 billion from the Medicare program and threatened to insist on changes in both areas when his committee is asked to implement the tax-change provisions....

Meanwhile, Reps. Obey and Dorgan proposed an alternative that would impose deeper cuts on military spending and higher taxes on the wealthy then called for by the summit agreement.

Now, It's House Democrats Rebelling Against Budget Package

Liberal House Democrats rebelled Wednesday against the \$500 billion deficit-reduction package as President Bush and congressional leaders pushed hard for the plan on the eve of its first vote.

Leading House Democrats and Republicans expressed confidence that both sides would round up a majority of votes by Thursday, when the full House plans to vote on an outline of the package of tax boosts and spending cuts.

"That is my intuition, that when the vote comes there will be a majority of both parties," said Speaker Foley.

But Bush, Foley and Rep. Michel worked furiously behind the scenes, meeting privately with rank-and-file members and dispatching top lieutenants to do the same. Democratic leadership aides, speaking privately, offered conflicting assessments of how worried they might be about the prospects.

Democrats and Republicans figured on Wednesday night they were each 40 votes short of what they need and that a considerable number of lawmakers remained uncommitted.

House Dem. Leader Gephardt Scolded For Criticizing Budget Deal

Rep. Gephardt should not be criticizing a budget deal that he played a key role in developing, Sen. Bond said Wednesday.

Bond administered that unusual rap on a fellow Missourian's political knuckles during a speech on the Senate floor, as Bond brandished a St. Louis Post-Dispatch article quoting Gephardt as calling the budget tax package "horribly unfair."

Said Bond: "When the President is asking Americans in a bipartisan effort to sacrifice for their future, his partner in those negotiations is saying, 'I think it's wrong.'"

"I think we have to pull together -- on both sides of the aisle, on both sides of this Capitol -- to take the difficult medicine and to adopt the tough measures that we must."...

Budget Director Darman...said Wednesday that Gephardt appeared to be "living up to his obligation" to seek votes for the compromise from House Democrats.

At a lunch with reporters, Darman praised Gephardt for doing "an excellent job" in the five-month budget negotiations between congressional and White House figures. He said Gephardt had "argued skillfully to make the tax system even more progressive."

Senate Majority Chief Will Fight Home Oil Tax

Sen. Mitchell, who reportedly was forced by Sen. Bentsen to help insert a 2-cent-per-gallon tax on heating oil into the budget deal, said Wednesday that he would lead a fight to repeal the tax - and that he would begin the effort in the Finance Committee, which Bentsen heads.

Budget Director Darman said Wednesday that Bentsen's demand that home heating oil be taxed was made just 20 minutes before the deal was unveiled by President Bush on Sunday. Darman said that Bentsen and Mitchell called him and said the tax had to be put into the package.

Although Mitchell strongly opposes the tax, several members of Congress said Bentsen told Mitchell he would oppose the deal unless the tax was included. Thus, the legislators said, Mitchell was forced to call Darman and say the tax should be included....

Although President Bush and congressional leaders have agreed that they would oppose any major revision of the budget deal, Mitchell said minor changes would be allowed. He said the removal of the heating oil tax could be considered "generally consistent" with the deal.

Bush Continues Lobbying GOP On Budget Deal As Fed Head Boosts Proposal

President Bush, desperately trying to persuade Republicans to support his budget package in crucial House and Senate votes scheduled for Thursday, urged reluctant GOP members Wednesday to back him and "blame the President" if voters object to the deal.

Meanwhile, in a boost for the President, Alan Greenspan told Congress that approval of the package probably would lead to lower interest rates, but that a defeat would be "a grave mistake" and send a bad signal to nervous world markets....

"The worst feature of the agreement is that it pounds middle-income taxpayers, but it hardly lays a glove on the super-rich," said Rep. Obey....

Budget Director Darman said Wednesday that Republicans were far short of having enough votes. But he, too, said that when the vote was held, "I do not believe it will fail." Asked about the opposition of liberal Democrats and conservative Republicans, Darman said, "there is a very broad middle" that will support the deal. Republican leaders said they had enough support in the Senate, but were far short of votes in the House.

'BLAME ME' -- BUSH CLEARS DESK FOR BUDGET BATTLE

President Bush canceled a two-day political trip and a holiday weekend to fight back Wednesday when conservative Republican objections to the bipartisan budget agreement grew into a bipartisan revolt.

"Blame me. Because I know what's best for the country," he said in response to the growing wave of congressional rebellion against the five-year, \$500 billion deficit reduction plan.

"I tried to give cover to members of Congress -- Democrat and Republican," Mr. Bush said at a news conference, trying to cushion the imminent vote on the plan.

The President promised he would not retaliate against those who vote against the deal crafted by congressional and White House negotiators....

"Nobody is without pain here," Mr. Bush said, although 77 percent of its cost would be delayed until after the 1992 election....

Congressional sources said late Wednesday it is possible the vote on the budget resolution could be delayed until Friday, giving the Bush Administration more time to corral its renegade members....

Privately, Bush Administration officials expect narrow passage and predict a game of musical chairs in which many members will hold off until passage is assured and then cast a "free vote" against the plan for campaign purposes.

LOCAL ANGLES SHARP AS BUSH HEARS LOCAL EDITORS ON BUDGET DEAL

Farm subsidies have been cut by half since 1985, and now you want to cut agriculture \$13 billion more, the editor from rural Illinois sternly told President Bush: "How can that be fair?"

Our region is already in a recession, said the editor from Connecticut, asking Bush to explain how more taxes on home heating oil and gasoline, along with defense cuts, won't make his region the hardest hit.

"You say that this package is balanced and fair," the editor from Florida lectured the President, "yet half the entitlement cuts come from Medicare. How can you say that is fair to the elderly?"

For Bush, Wednesday was a rocky tour through America's regional and local interests, from the farm belt, where gasoline taxes and agricultural subsidies loom large, to the New England states, where a hike in home heating oil taxes is serious trouble, to Florida, Arizona and other states that draw retirees worried about higher Medicare costs.

According to White House officials, what Bush heard in his public question-and-answer session with editors from around the country he also heard in private from the more than 40 members of Congress he spoke with Wednesday. "Almost every single session is: 'Mr. President, I support you on the overall package, but I got problems in my district with this one provision,'" was how one official described the gist of many of the in-person sessions and telephone conversations Bush has had since Sunday, when he began trying to sell mostly Republican members of Congress on the five-year, \$500 billion deficit-reduction package of budget cuts and tax increases....

"I tried to give cover to members of Congress," Bush told the editors, "and say you don't have to support every 't' and dotting every 'i' but say the President encouraged you to do it. Blame me. Because I know it's best for our country, but I don't expect it's politically popular."

FED CHAIRMAN ENDORSES BUDGET AGREEMENT

Fed Chairman Greenspan lent his considerable endorsement to the bipartisan budget agreement Wednesday, saying it would produce "a credible, enforceable reduction in the budget deficit" and lower interest rates.

Failure to pass it, he warned a House Government Operations subcommittee, "would produce an adverse reaction in financial markets that could undercut the economy already significantly weakened by the shock of the Middle East crisis and problems in our financial system."

Later, Secretary Brady issued a statement agreeing with Greenspan's interpretations, declaring, "It's simple: If Congress passes the budget agreement, interest rates will go down. If they don't pass it, interest rates will go up."...

"Failure to enact the agreement would, in my estimation, be a grave mistake," Greenspan declared.... If this agreement is voted down, prospects for coming to grips with the corrosive effects of budget deficits on our economy would be dim indeed."

GINGRICH A THORN IN ROSE GARDEN

Rep. Gingrich was expounding on his theories of deficit reduction Wednesday when the subject turned to that evening's House Republican dinner with President Bush.

"You going to eat anything?" a reporter asked. Gingrich just smiled. For the second time in two years, the Georgia firebrand is taking on a Washington giant. Last year, his ethics inquiry led to the resignation of former Speaker Wright.

Now Gingrich is opposing Bush on a key vote of his presidency, a \$500 billion deficit-cutting package.

And he's doing it with his usual brash style. Judging from the reaction, it wouldn't be surprising if he decided to use a food-taster. "If an elected leader isn't able to support his President, then he's obliged to remain silent...or resign his leadership post," says Rep. Chandler.

"I'd call it extremely reckless," says Rep. Wilson. "His relations with the White House are essentially over."

Gingrich claims otherwise.... His opposition, he concedes, "clearly bothers the President." But the defiance voiced by dozens of conservative Republicans "strongly helps the party. This is an extremely unpopular package in the country," he insists. "I have a responsibility to speak out," he says. "My intention is not to embarrass the President." Wednesday, he kept speaking out. After Budget Director Darman characterized him as "a historian who has recently tried to learn about economics," Gingrich shot back: "Mr. Darman is one of the most brilliant men in the Administration. I didn't say he was one of the wisest." (Richard Wolf, USA Today)

TWIN CRISES THAT TEST THE PRESIDENCY

Facing twin crises that will test and define his presidency, George Bush shrugged off the political pressures of the threat of war in the Persian Gulf and a deficit-induced economic recession.

"Look, nobody said it would be easy," Bush said at a news conference Wednesday. Asked whether his presidency is "on the line," he noted that "every once in a while the going gets a little tough," but, "I don't feel embattled at all."

Fielding questions from reporters for out-of-town news organizations, Bush spoke with gratitude of the broad support for his policy in the gulf and with passion of the need for a \$500 billion deficit-reduction plan before Congress.

His comments also revealed a certain "I told you so" attitude toward critics and skeptics who have questioned the decisions left in the wake of his passage from honeymoon to hot seat in the 20 months he has been in office.

"I try not to sound egotistical, but we've been right on German unification," he said as Germans rejoiced in the end of their postwar division. "And yet, I remember many people saying, 'It's impossible, the Soviets aren't going to permit a unified Germany to be in NATO, it isn't going to happen, you can't have a unified Germany before you have two peace treaties with Poland.'"

In fact, Bush did not respond with emotional fervor last year at the early events that in a matter of weeks snowballed into the unification juggernaut. On Wednesday, however, the re-emergence of a single, strong Germany was trumpeted as a dramatic vindication of his repeated talk over the last year of a "Europe whole and free." For a politician previously accused of lacking vision, it smacked of special significance. -more- (Norman Sandler, UPI)

BUDGET VOTE GIVES AREA LAWMAKERS 'NO WAY OUT'

Just mention the federal budget to Rep. Parris and he starts feeling like a wishbone. His heart pulls him in one direction, but his constituents and his President pull him in another.

Today something snaps.

Parris, who described himself late Thursday as "resolutely undecided" on the budget, typifies the Washington area's members of Congress, who confront the compromise deficit reduction plan that comes before the House Thursday with undiluted dread.

Virtually all the area's lawmakers say they detest everything about the proposal -- its tax increases, its cuts in government services and its timing, coming only weeks before House elections.

But Washington is a company town, and area legislators live just outside the factory gates. The prospect of massive federal layoffs if no budget is adopted presents a political threat that is especially poison out here....

In interviews over the last two days, Washington area lawmakers said they were split over the spending plan. Three of four senators from Virginia and Maryland said they would support it, albeit reluctantly; Sen. Mikulski said she was uncertain,...and Reps. Slaughter and Dyson said they would oppose the plan.

But all agreed on one thing: This budget vote leaves them no way to win, and no place to hide.

TAX-BREAK PLAN FOR SMALL FIRMS FACES RESISTANCE

Congress' two top tax-writers said they hoped to scrap the budget accord's tax breaks for small businesses and find alternatives.

At the same time, however, Budget Director Darman said the budget package gave the tax-writing panels only limited latitude to change its provisions, including the controversial tax incentives.

The disagreement could lead to problems when the committees begin drafting tax legislation next week. Several prominent lawmakers are seeking modifications in the details of the budget agreement. But changes in the small-business tax breaks and other important provisions, such as those covering Medicare, pose a threat to the overall budget package, which its negotiators have pledged to keep intact.

"What the summit (pact) has done is to muck up the code again," said Rep. Rostenkowski. The small-business provisions, he added, "could certainly lead to a tax-shelter boom."

**DEFICIT-CUT PACKAGE ASSAILED FOR BREAKS
PROPOSED ON OIL-AND-GAS INDUSTRY TAXES**

The deficit-reduction package will hit American pocketbooks, but not everyone's. The plan is filled with tax breaks for special interests, including President Bush's friends in the oil-and-gas business.

The five-year plan to reduce the federal deficit by \$500 billion includes \$28 billion in tax cuts -- \$4 billion of which would go to the President's home state of Texas and other oil states in the form of largely unspecified energy tax breaks. As with many of these special preferences, critics are asking why the oil-and-gas industry is being so favored.

"What do you need energy incentives for?" said Sen. Metzenbaum. "Look at the price. It's \$40 a barrel. That's incentive enough."

Sen. Conrad agreed. "I don't see how you can justify that, now that the price of oil has doubled," he said. "Texas did well in this package. Surprise, surprise."

While there is support for the plan, even some top budget negotiators are chagrined at the largesse.

"There's no need for (the tax breaks), and they don't work anyway in an industry that already is one of the most favored in the nation," Sen. Packwood said, citing a recent major government study. "God, have we poured money into petroleum over the years. It's as if there's no other resources on Earth."

GROUPS PLAN TO FIGHT CUTS IN MEDICARE

A coalition of groups representing the elderly and disabled is gearing up to battle provisions in the deficit-reduction plan that would cut \$60 billion from Medicare over five years.

Their aim, spokesman said, is not to kill the whole budget agreement, but to soften cuts in Medicare benefits and to protect the poor and near-poor among Medicare's 33 million beneficiaries from the financial impact.

John Rother, legislative director of the American Association of Retired Persons, which claims 32 million members, said, "We have always recognized that seniors, like everyone else, must make a contribution. What we're insisting on is that those who cannot afford to sacrifice further be protected."

ORDERS FOR MANUFACTURED GOODS RISE 1.8%; HIGHER OIL PRICES CITED

Orders to U.S. factories for manufactured goods jumped 1.8 percent in August due mainly to rising costs of petroleum products following the Persian Gulf crisis, the government reported Wednesday.

The Commerce Department said orders for both durable and non-durable goods totaled a seasonally adjusted \$244.6 billion following a 1.5 percent gain in July.

"Most of the increase is attributed to the petroleum refining industry, which had substantial price increases during the month," the report said. Petroleum and coal orders were up \$3 billion. "Excluding petroleum, orders increased 0.6 percent," it said.

HOUSE VOTES TO INCREASE YEARLY IMMIGRATION LEVEL

The House voted Wednesday to greatly expand the number of immigrants allowed into the country each year, giving increased priority to highly skilled workers and natives of some European countries who have been virtually shut out since current immigration laws were established 25 years ago.

"Today's House action will preserve our heritage of attracting the best and the brightest from all over the world, who come to America to build a better life," said Rep. Morrison, who sponsored the bill.

The legislation, approved 231 to 192, would increase by nearly a quarter of a million the number of immigrants allowed to enter the country annually, setting an upper limit of 775,000. The Senate passed its own version of immigration reform last year that would set a lower cap at 630,000 and place less emphasis on expanding the diversity of the immigrant pool.

SENATE VOTES DEEP SPACE PROGRAM CUTS

The Senate approved deep cuts Wednesday in President Bush's funding request for a manned space station and refused to give any money for his plans for manned missions to the Moon and Mars.

By a vote of 90-8, the Senate passed a \$78.6 billion 1991 appropriations bill that included funding for several government bodies, including NASA, the departments of HUD, Veterans Affairs and the EPA....

The Senate approved \$13.4 billion for NASA, a \$1.2 billion increase over this year's funding level, but made dramatic cuts in key future projects. The total of \$5.6 billion appropriated for NASA research and development projects fell nearly \$1.5 billion below the Administration's request.

CONGRESS PASSES BILL TO PROTECT OLDER WORKERS

The House gave final congressional approval Wednesday to legislation aimed at reversing the effects of a Supreme Court decision that allowed employers to limit job benefits for older workers.

The House voted 406 to 17 to approve the same version of legislation passed by the Senate on Sept. 24.

The Supreme Court held in a 1989 ruling that employee benefits were not afforded protection under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967.

U.S., SOVIETS REACH TENTATIVE ARMS PACT Conventional Forces In Europe Would Be Slashed

NEW YORK -- Secretary Baker and Foreign Minister Shevardnadze announced Wednesday night they have agreed in principle on major provisions of a treaty to limit non-nuclear forces in Europe, requiring the destruction or withdrawal of thousands of aircraft, armored vehicles and artillery by nations on both sides of the line that once divided East and West.

The announcement, after more than five hours of negotiations here at the Soviet Mission to the U.N., sets limits on weapons deployed in Europe, but does not cover the number of troops, a topic the negotiators left for subsequent talks.

The treaty must be approved by both NATO and the Warsaw Pact, and Baker and Shevardnadze said they would consult with their allies before releasing details of the compromises reached here.

But they left little doubt that they are confident the way has been cleared for signing the accord at the Nov. 19 Paris summit of the 34-nation Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe. The signatories would be the heads of state of 23 nations, including the U.S. and the Soviet Union.

SOLDIERS REVOLT ON SOUTHERN ISLAND IN WHAT APPEARS NEW COUP ATTEMPT

MANILA -- Soldiers mutinied before dawn Thursday across the northern coast of the country's southernmost and second-largest island in what appeared a new attempt to overthrow President Aquino.

The mutineers on Mindanao, led by the former chief of Mrs. Aquino's guard force, seized the city of Butuan and also appeared to be in control of Cagayan de Oro, a major port of about 200,000 people.

The armed forces went on nationwide alert and Mrs. Aquino gathered with her cabinet, senior military officers and congressmen at the presidential palace....

Military Chief of Staff Gen. Renato de Villa said the mutiny appeared a secessionist move and vowed to do "whatever is necessary to prevent any dismemberment of this republic."

Officials said about 200 rebels launched the revolt about 1 a.m., seizing the 402nd Brigade army base in Butuan, about 500 miles south of Manila.

IRAQ INSISTS KUWAIT PART OF MOTHERLAND AS SADDAM MEETS TROOPS

NICOSIA -- Iraq, in a pre-emptive strike at diplomatic efforts to force it out of Kuwait, insisted the emirate was part of the "mother homeland" as President Saddam paid his first known visit to the occupied country.

Saddam met military commanders and some of the soldiers who swept into Kuwait Aug. 2, and they assured him of their readiness to die for Iraq, the Iraqi news agency INA reported.

INA said Saddam Wednesday toured Kuwait City, which it said "appeared flourishing after its return to mother homeland." The agency did not say whether he later returned to Baghdad.

BUSH ADMINISTRATION STYMIED ON PAKISTAN ARMS

The Bush Administration, unable to assure Congress that Pakistan is not seeking nuclear weapons, is looking for ways to get around a legal bar against continuing aid to Pakistan, a congressional aide said Wednesday.

The Administration has to certify to Congress that Pakistan is not developing nuclear weapons in order to continue the aid. The certification was due Monday, but has not been given.

State Department deputy spokesman Boucher acknowledged that the Administration had been consulting with Congress on the Pakistan aid program, but declined to go into details.

He said talks had also been held with the Islamabad government "about restraint in their nuclear program and about the importance of regional nonproliferation" of nuclear weapons. (Reuter)

GULF STATES DEVELOPING JOINT DEFENSE, U.S. OFFICIALS SAY

The sale of \$7.3 billion in new weaponry to Saudi Arabia is just one step in creating a Persian Gulf "coalition defense" against the long-term threat posed by Iraq, say two senior Bush Administration officials.

That sale will be followed by more sales next year to the Saudis, perhaps to their neighbors Bahrain and the UAE, and new military help for Israel, Undersecretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz and Undersecretary of State Reginald Bartholomew told Congress Wednesday.

In doing so, the U.S. hopes "to build a Saudi and a gulf force capability that will, in effect, drive up significantly the costs to anybody looking to take a whack at them," Bartholomew said.

"We do not want to leave the road to Bahrain open, as it was on the second of August," he told a hearing of two House Foreign Affairs subcommittees....

The two officials said the weapons would help the Saudis present a more credible deterrent to aggression from Iraq or elsewhere, and would permit them if attacked to resist long enough to allow reinforcements from friendly countries to arrive.

LEASE SOUGHT FOR ARMS TO SAUDIS

Pro-Israel members of Congress Wednesday urged the Bush Administration to retain control of advanced arms being transferred to Saudi Arabia by leasing rather than selling them to the kingdom.

The congressmen expressed concern about the proposed arms transfer during a meeting of the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on Europe and the Middle East....

Several representatives, including California Democrats Lantos and Levine, said they doubted all the arms were needed to defend Saudi Arabia. They said they feared the weapons could fall into the hands of anti-American forces and could deprive Israel of its military advantage in the Middle East....

"Leasing would provide us with all the benefits we are seeking...while retaining marginal proprietary interests for the United States," Mr. Lantos said.

SUPERPOWERS ADMIT ROLE IN RISE OF IRAQ

SAN FRANCISCO -- The top military leaders of the world's two superpowers admitted Wednesday that they had contributed to the Persian Gulf crisis by selling weapons to Iraq in the past.

"Iraq has been able to be an aggressor because we have given it the wherewithal to be an aggressor," said Gen. Powell.

Powell's remarks came at the end of a dinner honoring Gen. Mikhail Moiseyev, the head of the Soviet armed forces.

Powell and Moiseyev said they agreed that arms sales to the Third World, like those to Iraqi strongman Saddam Hussein's regime, must be stopped.... Despite what he described as an "acute international crisis," Moiseyev said he believed a political solution could be found to the 2-month-old confrontation.

**IRAQI FORCES TORTURE, KILL KUWAITIS,
AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL STUDY SAYS**

LONDON -- Iraq's security forces have tortured and executed dozens of Kuwaitis, including boys as young as 15, in an attempt to crush resistance after Saddam Hussein's army occupied Kuwait two months ago, according to a report issued Wednesday by Amnesty International.

Among those executed were five members of a Kuwaiti medical team shot after they failed to save the lives of several critically wounded Iraqi soldiers, and a Kuwaiti hanged for allegedly harboring a U.S. citizen from the authorities, Amnesty officials said.

The London-based human rights organization summarized accounts obtained from about 50 people who have fled Kuwait in the past few weeks.

MITTERRAND, SOVIET ENVOY GO TO GULF

AMMAN -- A special envoy of President Gorbachev arrived here Wednesday on his way to Baghdad and said the Kremlin leadership saw possibilities for a peaceful settlement of the Persian Gulf crisis.

Yevgeny Primakov, a member of Gorbachev's Presidential Council, will be the first senior Soviet emissary to visit Baghdad since Iraq invaded Kuwait two months ago. In New York, Foreign Minister Shevardnadze said that his mission is primarily to arrange the evacuation of Soviet citizens but that he also hoped to meet with President Saddam. OIL PRICES REBOUND, GAIN \$3.37

NEW YORK -- Propelled by a last-minute buying spree, the price of oil rebounded sharply Wednesday, making up most of its losses of earlier in the week.

Oil traders and analysts said market optimism about peace in the Middle East was replaced by a new round of nervousness and uncertainty.

The price of a benchmark barrel of high-quality crude oil on the New York Mercantile Exchange shot up \$3.37 a barrel, to \$37.32, after falling a total of \$5.56 the two previous sessions. Prices of gasoline and heating oil also went up sharply on the commodities exchange. (Mark Potts, Washington Post, E2)

U.S., SOVIETS EMBRACE U.N.

NEW YORK -- Amid the Persian Gulf crisis in which the U.N. has played a major role, the U.S. and Soviet Union issued an unusual pledge Wednesday night to promote greater use of the world body in resolving international conflicts and other global problems.

The four-page communique, signed by Secretary Baker and Foreign Minister Shevardnadze, also says the superpowers, the U.N.'s biggest contributors, will strive to pay their dues even as they work for U.N. reforms....

The document applauds "the renunciation of sterile and rigid positions dictated by ideology rather than by practicality," and says "the U.N. is fast becoming a real center for agreed common actions." (Warren Strobel, Washington Times, A9)

**VOA BEGINS BROADCASTING MESSAGES
FROM RELATIVES TO HOSTAGES IN IRAQ**

The VOA Wednesday began broadcasting taped messages to Americans held hostage in Kuwait and Iraq from their families at home, the State Department said.

Department deputy spokesman Boucher said the message would be broadcast daily between 7 and 10 a.m. local time in a new segment called "Messages From Home."

The program is similar to a BBC broadcast.

"...It's actually a sad commentary on the Iraqi government, that American families can only communicate with their loved ones through radio messages," Boucher said.

ISRAEL: SETTLEMENTS POLICY UNCHANGED
Agreement On U.S. Loan Said To Bring No New Commitments

JERUSALEM -- New assurances by Israel to the U.S. on Jewish settlement of the occupied territories -- described by Washington as unprecedented -- will lead to no change in the government's subsidies to the settlements or in its work to expand them, officials here said Wednesday.

In particular, they said, Israel will continue with plans to build more than 2,000 units of new housing in Arab East Jerusalem and to settle immigrants in it....

In Jerusalem Wednesday, however, officials insisted that the Israeli commitments represented no change in the policies of Shamir's government, which is committed to maintaining Israel's control over the territories.

TRADE BREAK FOR SOVIETS MAY BE SPEEDED BY U.S.

The Administration is considering whether to make federal guarantees of commercial bank loans immediately available for Soviet purchases of American goods, even before the enactment of Soviet emigration law that President Bush has set as a condition for tariff concessions.

A senior Administration official, who asked not to be identified, said such action was being sought by the business and farm communities and their supporters in the Cabinet, who argue that the U.S. would benefit from increased exports.

Otherwise, these people say, the U.S. would be at a competitive disadvantage against Japan and Western European nations that do provide such guarantees.

Some State Department officials, who have been sounding out members of Congress on the idea in recent days, cite an additional motive" the incentive it might offer the Soviet Parliament to pass long-delayed emigration legislation.

BUDGET

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin Wednesday night with the budget deal that almost nobody likes and which a day ahead of a scheduled vote in Congress is far from guaranteed. The budget agreement which was put together by the White House and the congressional leadership faces its first critical test in the Congress Thursday. Tuesday night, Mr. Bush said markets will tumble and recession will follow if Congress doesn't go along. Wednesday, he'd again been trying to get reluctant Republicans to go along with him.

ABC's Jim Wooten reports the Vice President was dispatched to Capitol Hill not to lobby Democrats, but rather to sell the budget package to reluctant Republicans. There was, he said, good news and bad news.

(Vice President): "I think the Senate looks reasonably good but we're probably not there yet. The people are still analyzing the package. The House of Representatives is another question." Quite another question since Rep. Gingrich is the number one nemesis of the budget package, a genuine threat to its passage.

(Gingrich): "Is this something I can go home in good conscience and say: This is the best we could do for the next five years, and I can defend it? My personal belief is no.")

That kind of offense seemed to overshadow this kind of defense from Sen. Dole:

(Sen. Dole): "It seems to me that it's not a choice of this budget package or something else. At this moment it's this budget package, period.")

Dole and Sen. Mitchell say the Senate's in the bag, and yet Democrats Hollings, Metzenbaum, Kohl and Bumpers all attacked it Wednesday. On the House side, Speaker Foley said he believes he has the votes. And yet on the House floor there were other Democratic voices.

(Rep. Kaptur, (D.-Ohio)): "I hope every senior citizen in America gets on the phone today. That's 202-456-1414. You call the President of the United States and let him know what you think about him raising your Medicare premiums over \$300 a year over the next five years.")

There's no telling which way this thing is going. Privately, both sides say they have neither the votes to kill it nor to pass it. Since Democrats control the agenda, it would come as no surprise if Thursday's scheduled vote is delayed at least until Friday.

Jennings reports the Congressional Joint Tax Committee said that families on the upper end of the income scale earning \$200,000 or more would see their tax bills increase by just 1.7 percent. But those earning \$30,000 to \$50,000 would see their taxes rise by 2.9 percent. Families at the bottom, \$10,000 or less, would find their tax bill rising by 7.6 percent -- quadruple that of those at the top.

ABC's Sheilah Kast reports this budget deal was full of special interest bonuses. There is a tax break for the oil industry; with three congressmen from Texas along with President Bush, sources say there was little argument about including \$4 billion in new incentives for oil and gas drilling. The deal would also single out ethanol, extending the 60-cent a gallon subsidy that was due to expire in two years. Most of the nation's ethanol is made by Arthur Daniels Midland, whose chairman, Duane Andreus [phonetic], is a friend of Sen. Dole. The tax on luxury items originally was designed to include private aircraft, but Dole insisted they be dropped. The Beech and Cessna aircraft companies are headquartered in his state. As for yachts, only those which cost more than \$100,000 would be taxed. Critics point out that some of the negotiators come from coastal states like Maine, Washington and Texas.

(Rep. Shuster, (R.-Pa.): "There are special breaks in this agreement for those who were lucky enough to serve on the summit.")

(Rep. Thomas, (R.-Ca.): "While congressional leaders were 'crafting plans to save America,' they couldn't resist wetting their fingers to pick up crumbs off the tablecloth.")

These are small items compared to the total package, but they give members already upset about taxes and spending cuts another reason to vote against this package. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Jane Pauley reports President Bush stepped up his sales pitch for approval of the budget, but he ran into increasing opposition from his own party.

NBC's John Cochran: After a day of arm-twisting fellow Republicans, President Bush tried to clear his head on the tennis court, saying, "I'm glad to get off that damned telephone."

(TV coverage: President on tennis court.)

It wasn't just the phone; Bush also appealed face-to-face to Republicans to support the budget package. Tuesday night, Bush appealed to the nation.

(TV coverage: President in Cabinet Room with congressmen.)

But Wednesday he said what he really did was volunteer to take the heat for Congress.

(President: "And that's why last night I tried to give cover to members of Congress -- Democrat and Republican -- and say, you don't have to support every -- crossing every 'T' and dotting every 'I'. But say the President encouraged you to do it; blame me, because I know what's best for our country.")

But the number two Republican in the House thinks he knows best. Newt Gingrich, a Georgia rebel, is leading the GOP insurrection against the President and higher taxes. Bush responded by snubbing Gingrich at a White House ceremony. Gingrich, unfazed, said Bush failed to win over the nation Tuesday night.

(Rep. Gingrich: "We had 775 phone calls by about an hour ago, and it was 83 percent against the package.")

Republican Sen. Dole said Gingrich should be leading the fight for the budget agreement, not against it.

(Sen. Dole: "Leadership -- you pay a penalty for leadership. [If] you don't want to pay the penalty, maybe you ought to find some other line of work.")

Cochran continues: The good news for President Bush came from Federal Reserve Chairman Greenspan, who endorsed the budget package, and Ronald Reagan --that old tax-hater -- gave luke-warm backing, saying the budget agreement seems worthy of support. The White House expects close votes, close enough for the President to cancel a campaign trip so he can stay here for last-minute lobbying.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports from Capitol Hill that 300 people called Rep. Berman's congressional office in Los Angeles: all but three said he should vote against it. The same reaction from people calling Sen. Metzenbaum at the Capitol. Their chief complaint is on Medicare cuts. It didn't take long for the senator to respond.

(Sen. Metzenbaum: "Who's gonna really pay the price? The senior citizens, those least able to pay.")

After meeting with Democrats, the Speaker said he thought he would have the votes.

(Rep. Foley: "I would hope so and believe so. I tell you, my instinct is that that's what'll happen.")

But leaders drafting the budget law are surrounded by defectors and turf battles. Powerful chairmen like Rep. Rostenkowski don't like being told how to change the tax law; they're used to writing it themselves.

(Rep. Rostenkowski: "All I see in this growth package is the fact that we're making available for the wealthy again an opportunity to shelter income.")

Some liberals want more cuts from defense, less from Medicare patients. Democratic leaders scrambled, offering to take less from patients and more from doctors. Nothing offered will satisfy Sen. Hollings.

(Sen. Hollings: "I can tell you, totally it's a disaster. It's wrong, wrong, wrong in every respect.")

Leaders are promising that if people vote yes this week they can change things they don't like in the budget before it becomes final. That tactic may work eventually, but Wednesday night the leaders don't have the votes, and they may need another day to try to get enough support.

NBC's John Chancellor comments that the President's address Tuesday night shows how difficult it is to govern this country; the President and Sen. Mitchell were forced to ask the public to tell the Congress how to vote. The problem of enacting that agreement lies in fear of losing one's congressional seat. That fear is magnified by today's TV attack ads. Supporting the budget hands a loaded gun to one's opponents in next month's election. These attack ads have created the virus of fear that's killing the political system in this country and making the country almost impossible to govern. That's why the Republican President and Democratic Majority Leader had to beg for your support Tuesday night. They're not sure they can control their troops in this Congress so they asked you to help. It looked like bipartisanship, but it really was desperation.

CBS's Wyatt Andrews: Twenty-four hours before the most important vote of his presidency so far, George Bush Wednesday worried aloud he might lose.

(**President:** "It is tough, and the reason is 'cause there's a lot of people that have long been advocating specific things that they're not going to get out of this package")

Even after the President's national TV speech, White House counts show the budget deal winning in the Senate but wounded in the House. Mr. Bush even cancelled a political trip to New England to devote more time to wooing potential converts. His new tactic today: Vote for the budget package, then go home and blame me.

(**President:** "Blame the President. Say I rallied to support the President. He was elected and I don't like this but I'm going to support him. And so I'm asking them, look, please accept the view that this is serious business. We've got to get this deficit down.")

Though he found time for tennis this afternoon, Mr. Bush spent most of his day warning wavering Republicans that failure to pass this package of new taxes and Medicare cuts could bring Armageddon -- economic collapse.

(TV coverage: President playing tennis.)

He found an unusual cheerleader in Federal Reserve Chairman Greenspan, who hinted at lower interest rates if the deal passes but predicted trouble if it goes down in flames.

(**Greenspan:** "I am fearful that failure to enact the agreement would produce an adverse reaction in financial markets that could undercut the economy.")

The President's so-called arm-twisting campaign is not based on threats or favors, it's based on fear. The White House believes it will win this vote Thursday if only because most congressmen in a crunch fear recession and chaos more than they dislike this deal.

CBS's Bob Schieffer reports it's come down to a battle of the President and his new best friends, the congressional Democratic leaders, versus the President's new worst enemies, conservative Republicans and the business community. The newest of the President's new friends, Rep. Foley, said he and the President definitely picked up support for the budget agreement Wednesday.

(**Rep. Foley:** "Well, we haven't completed any counts so I'll just tell you that's my intuition. We don't have any count yet so -- it'll probably be taking place within the next day.")

But at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, core of the President's business-community support in the '88 campaign, they came out against the agreement.

(**Richard Lesher,** U.S. Chamber of Commerce: "Many of the economic and political assumptions embodied in this agreement border on fantasy.")

And the number two House Republican, who normally rounds up votes for the President, is now holding daily press conferences to oppose it.

(**Rep. Gingrich:** "I sat in that room. I know how many other options there were. And in my personal judgement, we can do better than this.")

That makes Gingrich the unfamiliar ally of Virginia's Democratic governor, who's attacking the national Democratic Party for supporting the plan.

Schieffer continues:

(Gov. Wilder: "A package, in my judgement, which unfairly discriminates against middle-Americans and forgotten Americans.") To round out the confusion, 11 liberal House Democrats who said the agreement cuts too deeply into social programs unveiled an alternative plan. And late Wednesday, even one of the authors of the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings law which triggered all of this said he didn't like the budget agreement either.

(Sen. Hollings: "It's a disaster. It's wrong for government, for Republicans, for Democrats, for everybody. This is the worst thing I've seen yet.")

Despite such bombasts, the President's people and Democratic congressional leaders still believe it is possible to get enough votes to pass the bill when it comes to the House floor for a vote Thursday. But they'll tell you in the same breath, they don't have the votes yet. (CBS-6)

U.S.-SOVIET ARMS AGREEMENT

Jennings reports the U.S. and Soviet Union have reached another major agreement which clearly reflects the new world order. In New York Wednesday, Secretary Baker and Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze have signed off on a deal to radically reduce conventional weapons in Europe.

ABC's John McWethy reports the very heart of Soviet military might in Eastern Europe is now going to be reduced dramatically. More than 40,000 Soviet tanks are either going to be withdrawn or destroyed, more than 7,000 Soviet aircraft, more than 20,000 Soviet artillery pieces. The cuts to American and NATO forces are going to far less significant. It's going to be around 10 percent in most of the categories or less. The East-West balance is much more equal. The political reality, of course, is running ahead of what the negotiators have been able to accomplish. The politics of Eastern Europe have been driving Soviet forces out regardless of any treaties. It was very clear Shevardnadze wanted the deal, in fact Eastern European sources said he would not allow Soviet military men at the table during these three or four days of intense negotiations. (ABC-2)

NBC's John Dancy notes that the agreement clears the way for a 34-nation summit conference to take place in Paris in mid-November. It is the largest conventional arms control agreement ever reached in the history of mankind. (NBC-3)

CBS's Bill Plante says the agreement was important because it means that Presidents Bush and Gorbachev will be able to sign an arms control treaty next month in Paris which will drastically reduce tanks, planes and artillery in Europe.

(Shevardnadze: "But so far as U.S.-Soviet discussions, we have been able to reach mutual understanding on all the major issues, and of course the Soviet Union made all the main concessions [laughter].")

There are still a number of loose ends like the number of helicopters on both sides. (CBS-3)

IRAQ

ABC's Mark Litke reports from Baghdad that Saddam Hussein appeared on television in the area which he considers to be his 19th province, formerly Kuwait. It was classic Saddam Hussein: pictures of him as a man of the people and brother in arms. He walked among his troops, playing to the cameras for a television audience back home. He jumped into a foxhole and gave a trooper a little advice on how to position his machine gun. He chatted with a group digging foxholes and urged them to keep their spirits up. Bush is challenging us, he said, what can we do? We're not afraid of anything, they replied, we'll challenge Bush back and defend our homeland. The Iraqis consider what was Kuwait City to be part of their homeland. But they appear to be defending a ghost town. Streets and shops were empty; no people were visible anywhere.

Jennings reports Yevgeny Primakov, one of Gorbachev's closest aides and an expert on the Middle East, flew to Jordan Wednesday to see King Hussein. He'll be in Baghdad Thursday. Moscow calls his trip a special mission but gave no details. Japanese Prime Minister Kaifu was in Egypt as part of a seven day tour of the region to explain Japanese policy there. And French President Mitterrand flew to Abu Dhabi Wednesday to meet with the President of the UAE and to visit French troops in the region. In Saudi Arabia Wednesday, a U.S. Army observation helicopter crashed while on a training mission; no one was hurt. It is the sixth accident involving American helicopters in the Gulf.

ABC's John Lawrence reports from Saudi Arabia U.S. helicopters in the Gulf are being blasted by desert sand, which gets inside helicopter compression chambers causing loss of power. Some have been grounded because of the sand. Ground crews are trying to cope with the problems by flushing out the engines after every flight and spending more time maintaining the aircraft. Of all the helicopters being flown here, the much-criticized Apache seems to be coping best with the sand. Officers say the Apache is ready about 80 percent of the time, better than the Army's standard of 70 percent. Mechanics say Apache's have a special particle separator which keeps sand out of the engine. Senior officers say they will have enough helicopters to fly and fight, but one veteran pilot says nobody knows how long the engines are going to last.

Jennings reports the head of the U.N. Disaster Relief Organization said his group is in dire need of supplies to help refugees from Iraq and Kuwait. Of all the nations that promised to send money to the refugees, only Japan has come through with cash. (ABC-4)

Pauley reports an Iraqi spokesman compared German unification to their own position; he said Arabs also aspire to unity.

NBC's Gary Matsumoto reports on Saddam's visit to Kuwait in which he personally stakes his claim before the world at what he calls Province 19. PLO Chairman Arafat explains why he thinks the Primakov visit might be genuine reason for hope.

Matsumoto continues:

(Arafat: "President Bush's speech two days ago [was] in the same line so for this I am optimistic.")

What has Arafat beaming is any possible linkage, however tentative, between an Iraqi withdrawal and a resolution to the Palestinian problem. (NBC-2)

CBS's Betsy Aaron reports from Baghdad on Saddam's propaganda. Iraqi TV showed off Iraqi babies at Saddam Hussein Hospital who are allegedly suffering from the embargo.

(Iraqi doctor, holding crying baby: "He's three months old. He should be about six kilos now, but he's four kilos only. So he's starting to lose weight because of blockade of medication and milk.")

But shipments of drugs and milk are not embargoed. All Iraq has to do is to prove a need and ask for the supplies, and the International Red Cross will distribute them. Iraq has not asked for such aid. One doctor couldn't think of one baby who has died from the embargo. The whole world is against us, says Iraq's minister of information.

(Latif Jassim, Iraqi Information Minister: "At any moment we expect that America will attack Iraq.")

CBS' Bob Simon reports on the bedouins of the Saudi desert. Their grazing lands are being used by American troops for training. (CBS-5)

GERMANY

Brokaw: Good evening from the Brandenburg Gate, once again. The first day in the new life of this nation, which still is haunted by its past. Peace was a prevailing theme Wednesday as German leaders received messages of congratulations from Presidents Bush, Gorbachev and others.....

The joining of the two German armies represents what many said should never happen again: a single German state with a powerful military. But German leaders insist the old ways will not return again. An estimated 15,000 German leftists marched against unification Wednesday and the protest got out of hand for a time. Most Germans, however, took to the streets in a more subdued fashion. In Washington, President Bush joined leaders around the world in congratulating the new German state.

(President: "No wall is ever strong enough to strangle the human spirit, that no wall can ever crush a nation's soul.")

He signed a proclamation designating this German-American Day. The new government moved swiftly Wednesday to establish a new order. Soviet President Gorbachev is expected to come here next month to sign a new cooperation treaty. And the last man to run the East German spy network against the West was arrested. How long will the hunt for former East German Stasi agents go on?

(Volker Ruehe, Helmut Kohl's aide: "We want peace in this society and we welcome people who change their minds and become Democrats. But on the other hand, we can't just sweep the dust of the past underneath the carpet.")

Wednesday night, it appears that Markus Wolf, the former mastermind behind Stasi, may be arrested. One of his brilliant successes was Guenther Guillaume, who posed as a refugee, crossed into West Germany in the '50s and penetrated the highest levels of the government.

-more-

Brokaw continues: He became then-Chancellor Brandt's personal advisor. Guillaume today is not happy about the unification and is uneasy about dealing with West Germans.
(Gaillaume: "I would be willing to talk to them about things that need to be cleared up. But I know how difficult that could be.... It's not easy to hold out your hand to your enemy.")
There is speculation Wednesday night that Markus Wolf may have fled to the Soviet Union. (NBC-Lead)

NBC's Mike Boettcher reports on the differences dividing Germans east and west. Even though the physical barrier is gone, a mental barrier still divides Germany. (NBC-10)

ABC's John Donovan reports from Berlin on the dichotomy between east and west Germans. The people from the east realize that they are still the poor Germans, years behind westerners in wealth and in prospects. This gives many easterners a feeling of inferiority. Contacts between east and west Germans have produces as much friction as friendship. (ABC-8)

Chung reports about 200 people were arrested as police battled with anarchists, left-wing radicals and neo-Nazi skinheads.

CBS's Tom Fenton reports from Berlin that 30,000 anarchists and assorted leftists marched in disapproval of the unification. Some were looking for trouble; they found it when police tried to bar their way. The anarchists threw rocks at police, who stood their ground and finally charged and beat demonstrators. Police brought in tear gas and water cannons to clear the streets of the remaining troublemakers. There were a number of injuries and at least 150 arrests. (CBS-2)

PHILIPPINES

Jennings reports soldiers took over the army brigade headquarters in Butuan City on the island of Mindanao. The Philippine Army chief of staff says the mutineers appear to have cut off all communications to the island, which is 500 miles southeast of Manila. (ABC-3)

Chung reports the Philippine Army was put on nation-wide alert Wednesday night after the mutiny. The army chief of staff said there is no indication that another coup attempt against President Aquino is under way. (CBS-4)

ENERGY

Jennings reports scientists at Princeton University say they have developed a nuclear fission reactor capable of producing as much energy as it uses. A practical application may be decades away, however. (ABC-5)

FREEDOM OF SPEECH/OBSCENITY

Chung: An unprecedented obscenity case in the United States Wednesday. A Florida record store owner was found guilty on obscenity charges for selling an album by the rap music group 2 Live Crew.... It was the latest turn in a nation-wide controversy over what is art, what is smut, and who gets to decide. -more-

NBC's Richard Roth reports this was the first obscenity conviction ever in America for selling recorded music. In June, a federal judge in Florida banned the album there, calling its sexually explicit lyrics obscene.

(Charles Freeman, convicted record dealer: "This doesn't reflect my community as a black man in Broward County. It's unfair. The jury was all white; there were no blacks on the jury pool at all, only one, and they don't know where EC records is, they don't know nothin' about the goddam ghetto.")

The prosecution said there are common sense exceptions to the First Amendment. The defense claims the album is Constitutionally protected and not offensive at all in the communities where it's been a big seller. Experts say the ruling points to the problem in other cases where courts are colliding with local standards of taste.

(James Goodale, First Amendment attorney: "Once the obscenity laws play out, we will have pockets all around the country that are differing with one another. It's a crazy law that the United States Supreme Court has put down.")

The founder of the conservative American Family Association called the verdict a sign of a shift in attitudes in America about what he called trash. The ACLU worries the verdict will encourage what it calls self-appointed protectors of public morality.

CHOLESTEROL

NBC's Robert Bazell reports a 17 year study on cholesterol, costing \$52 million, Wednesday said cholesterol contributes to heart disease.

(Dr. Henry Buchwald, University of Minnesota: "I hope that it will put the so-called national debate on cholesterol...behind. The study says the lower the cholesterol, the better off you are.") Other doctors, however, claim the study is simply an indicator and cannot give a clear-cut answer that diet plays that big a role.

(NBC-6)

CHILDREN'S HEALTH CARE

CBS's Charles Osgood reports hospital emergency rooms not set up for children are not necessarily able to care for them; many die of preventable deaths. A Chicago study found all the kids who went to an emergency room with special emphasis on kids survived. Thirty-two percent of those who went first to a community hospital either died or suffered permanent damage. Special training centers are being set up now in both rural and urban areas to improve our emergency health care system for kids.

(CBS-7)

FLORIDA/ENCEPHALITIS

ABC's Mike von Fremd reports the worst outbreak of encephalitis in 13 years has hit Florida, already causing one death. The only way people can get the disease is from the bite of a mosquito. Despite widespread spraying, officials say an epidemic is possible.

(ABC-6)

CASIRAGHI/MONACO

Jennings reports the husband of Princess Caroline of Monaco died in a speedboat accident Wednesday when his boat flipped over.

BUDGET

Budgetary Baloney -- "...What President Bush and congressional leaders are touting...is not a plan to cut the deficit any time soon, but to keep it from growing even larger. That said, it would be dangerous for Congress to reject the deal particularly since nearly all the flak is coming from politicians and interest groups that want to weaken it further. Better to approve it now and try harder next year. How did the summiteers come up with something so weak after five months of bargaining? It's simple. They didn't cut military spending enough, they scarcely touched domestic spending, and they didn't raise taxes very much either.... The only thing worse than approving it would be to weaken it."

The Shotgun Marriage Worked -- "...Of all the participants in the negotiations, President Bush deserves the most credit for traveling the greatest distance toward compromise. His read-my-lips nonsense on taxes is now history. His obsession with cutting the capital gains taxes to benefit the richest one percent of taxpayers was based on a dubious economic assumption.... White House and congressional negotiators no doubt will boast of the \$170 billion in budget cuts over five years that they agreed upon. They could have done better. 1:15 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

BUDGET (AP) -- Congress' first showdown loomed today on the deficit-cutting plan as President Bush and congressional leaders kept up an all-out lobbying blitz that left vote-counters optimistic but nervous.... The White House and Bush's top allies said they did not yet have the votes to pass it in the House. Bush wooed 60 Republicans over coffee and doughnuts at the White House this morning. Rep. Michel emerged to say Bush had convinced several of the Republicans to vote for the pact. But Michel acknowledged, "We're not there yet."

(Reuter) -- Speaker Foley and President Bush agreed to hold an emergency meeting at the White House Thursday in an attempt to save the budget plan from a growing rebellion in Congress. In an apparent reference to demands for changes in the plan, Foley told reporters: "I'm going to tell him that the committees of the Congress will exercise some flexibility in carrying out the plan." Foley said after a closed meeting with fellow Democrats that he might have to delay the vote until Friday.

(UPI) -- House leaders said they had no plans to postpone the scheduled afternoon vote on the plan, even if there were not enough Republican votes to help pass it. "At this point, neither side has a majority," said Rep. Gejdenson as he emerged from a House Democratic whip meeting. But an optimistic Speaker Foley predicted that Democrats "will have the votes at the time the vote is taken." "We're going to win," added Rep. Gephardt.

(UPI) -- Rep. Schuette told the "Fox Morning News" the deficit reduction proposal amounts to a stab in the heart to the auto worker. "Respectfully, I'm voting no on this agreement," said Schuette. "And George Bush understands my focus in terms of Michigan and the responsibilities I have for job creation in my state. And he wants me in the United States Senate."

(Boston/UPI) -- Gov. Dukakis urged Congress to reject the deficit reduction package, saying it imposed an unacceptable burden on the elderly and average taxpayers.... "The package which has been agreed upon...fundamentally continues the policies of the past 10 years. They continue to excuse the rich in this country from paying their fair share, outrageously," Dukakis said Wednesday.

OIL/JUSTICE (AP) -- The Justice Department said today it had subpoenaed records of major oil companies, refiners and marketers as part of its investigation of gasoline price hikes since Iraq invaded Kuwait.

GULF/CARRIER (Dubai/Reuter) -- The U.S. aircraft carrier Independence appeared to be heading out of the Persian Gulf today, three days after entering it in a show of force against Iraq. News photographers flying over the Gulf saw the carrier heading toward the Strait of Hormuz.

GULF/SAUDI (London/Reuter) -- Former Saudi oil minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani said there was more than a 50-50 chance of war in the Gulf and reiterated his view that fighting could send oil prices to \$60 per barrel.

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10:30 A.M. NEWS UPDATE

PHILIPPINES/COUP (Manila/UPI) -- Mutinous soldiers, led by renegade army Col. Alexander Noble, seized two southern cities without firing a shot and proclaimed an independent federal state in Mindanao, the first stage of an attempt to overthrow President Aquino. Aquino said she would crush the rebels "in due time."

(Manila/Reuter) -- A Philippine government panel linked opposition leader Juan Ponce Enrile to a series of army coup attempts, but he immediately denied involvement.

WARSAW PACT (Berlin/Reuter) -- One of the Soviet Union's top soldiers said he believed the Warsaw Pact would probably disband as a military organization next year. Marshal Sergei Akhromeyev, an adviser to President Gorbachev, told the Communist Party daily Neues Deutschland that NATO should also relinquish its military role and concentrate being on being a political body.

IRAQ/KAIFU (Amman/Reuter) -- Prime Minister Kaifu told a senior Iraqi official Thursday that Iraq's conquest of Kuwait and holding of hostages were unacceptable, a Japanese Foreign Ministry official said.... In the meeting, Iraqi Deputy Premier Ramadan restated Iraq's position on the crisis but said French proposals could be a starting point for a peaceful solution, said the official.

IRAQ/EGYPT (Cairo/Reuter) -- President Mubarak accused Saddam Hussein Thursday of sending teams to launch bomb attacks in Egypt. "He is pushing forces to throw bombs and attack bases," he said in a televised speech.... "We caught them. We'll arrest the rest."

GULF/GOBACHEV (Moscow/Reuter) -- President Gorbachev said Thursday he thought there would not be war in the Persian Gulf and indicated Moscow still had no intention of sending troops there.... "I think there are more than enough troops there," Gorbachev said. "The U.S.S.R. will fulfill its role to the end."

GULF/MOISEYEV (San Francisco/Reuter) -- The head of the Soviet General Staff says his country favors a political solution to the Gulf crisis rather than a test of military might between Iraq and the rest of the world. Gen. Moiseyev said Moscow supported the economic and trade sanctions, including the air blockade.

GULF/PRIMAKOV (Baghdad/Reuter) -- A special envoy from President Gorbachev, Yevgeny Primakov, arrived in Baghdad Thursday, stressing the need for a political solution to the Gulf crisis.

AMNESTY/IRAQ (London/Reuter) -- Iraq rejected a report by Amnesty International alleging its forces had executed and tortured scores of people in Kuwait since Aug. 2.

GULF/VIETNAM (Hanoi/Reuter) -- Vietnam said today it would wait for permission from the U.N. Security Council before sending a ship with rice for its 17,000 workers stranded without food in Iraq.

REPATRIATION/VIETNAM (Hanoi/Reuter) -- Hanoi denied that it had decided to accept the forced repatriation of the thousands of Vietnamese boat people held in Hong Kong camps.

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5:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

BUDGET/FOLEY (UPI) -- Speaker Foley said President Bush will let Congress make unspecified changes in the budget agreement in hopes of winning enough votes for congressional approval. Foley made the comment after a private White House lunch with Bush. Asked if during the luncheon he sought from Bush flexibility to make more changes than the President would give, Foley said, "No, certainly not." "The speaker's statement to the (Democratic) Caucus that he would talk to the President Thursday about flexibility has assuaged some members' concerns," said Rep. Eckart.

(Reuter) -- ...Speaker Foley appeared to soften his stance on how much leeway the House Ways and Means Committee would have to change the plan. "I'm not going to start to decide how those committees will legislate," he said. "That's their concern and their responsibility and their right... Many of the policies outlined (in the agreement) were for illustrative purposes."

BUDGET/CONGRESS (AP) -- ...House Republicans were said to be nearly 20 votes shy of providing a majority of their 176 members.... Senate support for the measure seemed likely. "We're going to have a majority when we get there," said Sen. Mitchell. "Foley has been pleading and pleading and pleading," said one Democratic aide.

CFE/PRESIDENT (Tom Raum, AP) -- President Bush hailed a tentative East-West agreement to reduce conventional forces in Europe, saying it would "redraw the military map" to match dramatic political changes. He said the agreement would pave the way for the signing of the treaty next month in Paris. Bush said the Soviet Union and U.S. had "agreed in principle on all the remaining issues" on the CFE Treaty "and on essential details as well."

CFE/BAKER (Reuter) -- The Warsaw Pact will have to destroy 19,000 tanks and the NATO alliance will destroy 4,000 tanks under the terms of a CFE agreement, Secretary Baker said. "There will be significantly greater destruction obligations on the Soviet Union," Baker told a news conference.

GULF/IRAQ (Amman/Reuter) -- Iraq said it preferred war to surrender and that any talks on the Persian Gulf crisis should be linked to an Israeli withdrawal from occupied Arab land. Iraqi Deputy Prime Minister Taha Yassin Ramadan told a news conference in Amman Iraq would not fire the first shot but would fight back if attacked.

GULF/U.N. (U.N./UPI) -- Speeches in the U.N. General Assembly and corridor conversations show that sentiment here is strongly against American use of unprovoked military force against Iraq.

GULF/NON-ALIGNED (U.N./Reuter) -- The foreign minister of Yugoslavia proposed that he undertake an initiative, as chairman of the non-aligned movement, to resolve the Persian Gulf crisis on the basis of U.N. Security Council resolutions.

EMBARGO/NAVY (AP) -- A U.S. Navy guided missile frigate prevented a Sudanese freighter from entering the Gulf of Aqaba today after a boarding party found that its cargo manifest did not account for all of its cargo, the Pentagon announced. Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said no shots were fired.

EMBARGO/FAHD (Jeddah/Reuter) -- Saudi Arabia's King Fahd believes the strategy of squeezing Iraq out of Kuwait by economic and political means must be followed to its conclusion but doubts it will succeed, French spokesman Hubert Vedrine said. "It must be carried through to the finish, but unfortunately Saddam Hussein doesn't seem to be listening," Vedrine quoted Fahd as saying.

GULF/AIRLINES (Reuter) -- The Gulf crisis is increasing the threat of an attack against airlines like the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103, Sen. Lautenberg warned.

PHILIPPINES/TRINIDAD (U.N./Reuter) -- Trinidad and Tobago Prime Minister A.N.R. Robinson said the U.S. had information that could have prevented last July's coup attempt by Moslem extremists if his government had been alerted to it.

DRUGS/SULLIVAN (AP) -- Secretary Sullivan told drug dealers to beware of an "angry and active community" as he announced grants of \$42 million to 95 coalitions of community groups. "Those who deal in drugs and death will lose this war. Those who deal in community spirit will win," he told a White House news conference.

DEATH PENALTY/HOUSE (UPI) -- The House voted to expand the list of federal crimes that can carry the death penalty and to limit appeals by state prisoners who face execution. Final passage was expected late Thursday or Friday.

ABORTION/HOUSE (AP) -- The House Judiciary subcommittee on civil and constitutional rights approved a bill Thursday that would put into federal law a woman's right to an abortion as ruled in Roe v. Wade. "The language of the bill is drawn directly from Roe," said Rep. Don Edwards, subcommittee chairman.

ABORTION/TEENS (New York/UPI) -- Teenagers around the country say abortion is murder but should remain legal to keep it safe, researchers reported. They tended to use pro-life language but took pro-choice positions, said the researchers in describing a series of 11 teen discussion groups held recently in seven cities.

DUKE RACE (Baton Rouge/AP) -- The Republican Senate candidate, Ben Bagert, is dropping out of the race, leaving David Duke as the only major candidate to challenge the incumbent, RNC spokesman Charles Black said. Black urged his supporters to vote for Sen. Johnston.... Asked if national party leaders had urged Bagert to drop out, he replied: "Not exactly."

SENATE FLOOR: Souter confirmed to Supreme Court.

Following an afternoon of mostly supportive floor statements, senators yesterday voted overwhelmingly to confirm New Hampshire judge David H. Souter as an associate justice on the U.S. Supreme Court. The vote was 90-9.

The confirmation vote came 2½ months after Souter was nominated by President Bush. The 51-year old Souter could be sworn in as soon as Friday.

Republican Orrin G. Hatch of Utah said Congress should "want judges that look, act, and talk" like Judge Souter. But an opponent, Brock Adams, D-Wash., said the confirmation was premature in light of Souter's professional experience. "Let him show his mettle in the First Circuit" [Court of Appeals] before allowing Souter a seat on the nation's highest court, Adams said.

• In other action yesterday, senators debated, but took no action on, legislation (3037) designed to combat money laundering.

• Members also overwhelmingly passed, 96-3, a resolution (S Con Res 147) endorsing President Bush's handling of the Persian Gulf crisis and approved the conference report on S 1824, which would reauthorize discretionary programs of the 1975 Education of the Handicapped Act.

HOUSE FLOOR: Immigration changes debated, headway made.

The House debated legislation (HR 4300) yesterday to change immigration laws to admit aliens on the basis of family ties and their ability to fill specified U.S. labor shortages.

Members adopted by voice vote an amendment to allow those granted political asylum from Poland, Nicaragua, Hungary and Panama to apply for permanent residency status without having to prove that they would still be defined as refugees under U.S. law.

Lawmakers defeated amendments

that would limit total legal immigration to 630,000 people a year; require employers to provide education and training for U.S. workers or students in order to import certain foreign employees; and delete provisions of the bill that would suspend for three years the detention and deportation of illegal immigrants from El Salvador, Lebanon, Liberia and Kuwait.

Members adopted, by voice vote, an amendment to stop the Immigration and Naturalization Service from detaining for more than 24 hours illegal alien parents with children younger than 2. It aims to prevent nursing mothers who are not potential threats to society from being separated from their children for long periods.

• The House yesterday also passed, by voice vote, a bill (HR 1608) requiring the government to prepare a 10-year plan assessing the dietary and nutritional status of the U.S. population, to establish dietary guidelines and to boost nutrition education efforts nationwide.

The House passed a number of measures late Monday, including:

• HR 5725, which is a short-term extension of the Defense Production Act, which enables the president to require companies to make Defense Department supply and equipment orders their top priority.

• HR 5732, which would improve security at airports.

• H J Res 418, which calls on the Bush administration to seek immediate negotiations for a new international agreement on protecting Antarctica's environment.

BUSH LOBBIES for budget plan, approval predicted.

President Bush personally lobbied dozens of wavering House Republicans, then took his message to the American people last night in an effort to win approval of a five-year, \$500 billion deficit-reduction package.

Some of the loudest critics of the

House Floor: The House plans to complete action on an immigration revision bill (HR 4300).

Members may take up a crime bill (HR 5269) under a rule that would permit an amendment by Henry J. Hyde, R-Ill., aimed at limiting appeals by death row inmates. Proponents of the amendment contend that the bill, which is designed to speed executions by streamlining the appeals process, would actually make it impossible for states to carry out the death penalty by granting prisoners more grounds for appeal.

The issue is one of the primary sticking points holding up action on the bill and led to last week's defeat of the original rule, which barred Hyde's amendment.

Members will vote on a bill (S 1511) to prohibit employers from discriminating against older workers in providing disability and other benefits.

Senate Floor: The Senate may consider a treaty (Treaty Doc. 101-20) that would grant sovereignty to a united Germany. Under the treaty, the United States, France, Great Britain and the Soviet Union would renounce all rights over Germany.

Senators may also consider a bill (S 1379) that would renew and modify the 1950 Defense Production Act, which enables the president to require companies to produce strategically important products during a national emergency.

Budget Resolution: House and Senate conferees will meet this afternoon to develop a budget resolution that will conform with the budget agreement reached last Sunday by White House and congressional negotiators.

Conferees will make adjustments to H Con Res 310 — the original congressional spending blueprint that passed the House on May 1 and the Senate on June 14.

The revised measure is expected on the House and Senate floors Thursday.

Under the terms of Sunday's agreement, the budget resolution must clear by the end of the week. If it does not, a short-term, all encompassing spending bill will not be extended.

Interior Markup: A hotly contested measure that pits environmentalists against timber interests will be marked up by the House Interior panel.

The bill (HR 5295) is aimed at preserving the endangered northern spotted owl and would ban logging on 6.3 million acres of old-growth forests on federal lands. The measure also would reduce timber sales from federal lands. Timber industry supporters say that such measures are drastic and would threaten thousands of jobs in the Pacific Northwest.

The bill faces a troubled future. It has strong opposition in both the Interior and Agriculture committees and, even if reported out, approval by the full House is far from certain. It's likely that the "jobs vs. owls" issue will be settled in the Interior appropriations bill, which is awaiting House floor action.

Also on the agenda is legislation (HR 5579) that would do away with a 60-day congressional review period for right-of-way applications to cross federal lands with pipelines 2 feet in diameter or larger. The measure would hasten the review process, which bill supporters say can become time-consuming because the 60-day review period does not include days when either chamber has adjourned.

Saudi Arms Sale: Two subcommittees of the House Foreign Affairs Committee will grill representatives of the Bush administration on the proposed sale of military equipment to Saudi Arabia. President Bush announced Sept. 27 a plan to sell a \$7 billion package of military hardware to that country.

The Arms Control and Europe and the Middle East subcommittees will hold a joint hearing to examine the proposed sale.

The sale will go through unless Congress moves to block it within 30 days.

But arms sales to Arab nations always raise concerns about Israel, and some members of Congress have criticized the inclusion of certain weapons that could be used against Israel in the future.

For example, Saudi Arabia is slated to buy 150 M-1 tanks, for \$1.3 billion. But the latest version of the M-1 has not yet gone into production and will not be ready for delivery to Saudi Arabia for three years. The administration has billed the sale as a needed response to Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, but some lawmakers question the need for immediate action on such items. ■

budget agreement are House Republicans. And so yesterday the president met with about 60 Republican members in three separate White House meetings.

Some of the Republicans emerged from the gathering saying the president had persuaded them to support the agreement, which includes large cuts in Medicare and other entitlements and a host of new taxes — including higher levies on gasoline, cigarettes and liquor.

E. Thomas Coleman of Missouri and Don Sundquist of Tennessee were among those Republicans who said they would support the budget plan after they met with the president.

Back on Capitol Hill, Vin Weber, R-Minn., a staunch opponent of the agreement, acknowledged that presidential pleas for loyalty usually were successful.

Backers of the plan were generally cautiously optimistic about prospects for congressional approval, as well.

Opponents of the deficit-reduction plan apparently are not waging a behind-the-scenes lobbying blitz to stop the plan. According to congressional sources, a preliminary whip count shows that 57 House Republicans are strongly opposed. A couple of dozen more were said to be leaning toward opposition, according to the count.

Because Democratic leaders on Capitol Hill have said that the plan must be supported by a majority of Republicans in each chamber, Bush will have to muster at least 89 GOP votes in the House.

HOUSING CONFEREES plow through hundreds of provisions.

House and Senate conferees on the housing bill (S 566) yesterday reached agreement on about 160 mostly minor differences in the two chambers' versions of the bill.

One of the provisions agreed upon yesterday would authorize \$150 million to provide housing and financing for homeless people with AIDS.

Still to be decided is whether provisions will be included to make it harder for landlords to raise rents on tenants after federally subsidized mortgages are paid off.

Conferees also appeared to be moving toward adopting the Senate's framework of a Housing Opportunity Partnerships program — which would authorize \$2 billion for grants to state and local governments to buy, build and rehabilitate housing for low- and middle-income families — and to fold into that program a proposal sponsored by Democratic Rep. Charles E. Schumer of New York to provide \$300 million for construction of new homes for low-income families.

Conferees will meet again on Thursday and perhaps Friday to act on 87 ad-

ditional items in disagreement.

GERMANY TREATY gets nod from Foreign Relations panel.

A treaty to return full sovereignty to a united Germany moved easily through the Senate Foreign Relations Committee yesterday, with members approving a resolution of ratification 17-0.

Members also unanimously approved a draft Senate resolution that would clarify the intent of Congress regarding other post-World War II borders.

East and West Germany officially united this morning at 12:01 a.m.

During yesterday's session, Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn. — who was born in Berlin in 1930 and who lost many members of his family in the Holocaust — said he had "mixed emotions about seeing them get back together. Hopefully, it's for the good." But, he cautioned, "their history as a unified country leaves something to be desired."

Article One in the treaty of final settlement with Germany (Treaty Doc. 101-20) recognizes the post-war border between Poland and Germany as the official border and calls on the two countries to negotiate a treaty to this effect.

But Jesse Helms, N.C., ranking Republican on the panel, expressed concern that the article could be viewed as an acceptance by the United States of the Soviet takeover of the Baltic republics during World War II. The USSR continues to include Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia.

The second resolution approved by the committee states that while the post-war border for Germany and Poland is acceptable to the United States, the United States does not accept the Soviet occupation of the Baltic republics.

Floor action on the treaty is expected today.

AMBASSADORIAL NOMINATIONS put on hold by Senate panel.

The nomination of Fred Vreeland to be the U.S. ambassador to Burma (now called the Union of Myamar) suffered a setback yesterday when the Senate Foreign Relations Committee dropped him at the last minute from a long list of nominees to be voted on yesterday.

The action came at the request of Sen. Alfonse M. D'Amato, R-N.Y., who sent a letter to the panel's ranking Republican, Jesse Helms, N.C., asking for a second hearing on the nomination before the committee vote.

Controversy over Vreeland centers on reports that tie him to the CIA.

In related action, a Foreign Relations hearing yesterday afternoon on the nomination of Philip Hughes to be U.S. ambassador to Barbados was not completed and committee sources say that the Senate will not confirm him this session.

Before the hearing was suspended,

Hughes, who served in the Reagan administration, reportedly told committee members that he kept a diary of his activities that were related to the Iran-contra affair but that the White House was now in possession of the diary.

FOREIGN AID spending bill supports Bush's Gulf actions.

The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Foreign Operations yesterday acted to support administration policy in the Middle East as it marked up the fiscal 1991 foreign aid appropriations bill (HR 5114).

The subcommittee, chaired by Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., approved an administration proposal to forgive Egypt's \$6.7 billion military debt. The State Department had sought the action, partly in recognition of Cairo's support for Operation Desert Shield. The House previously voted to grant temporary waiver of payments to Egypt — but not to forgive the debt.

But by approving a conditional 50 percent cut in military assistance for El Salvador, and \$15 million in funding for a controversial United Nations family planning agency, the subcommittee acted in opposition to administration policy. Robert Kasten, Wis., the subcommittee's ranking Republican, said either action — if contained in the bill's final version — would draw a presidential veto.

The full Appropriations panel will consider the measure on Thursday.

FOREIGN INVESTMENT data bill gains in House Energy panel.

The House Energy Committee yesterday approved four bills, including one (HR 4520) that would permit wider dissemination within the government of information about foreign investment in the United States.

HR 4520, approved by voice vote, is a significantly watered-down version of legislation (HR 5) backed by John Bryant, D-Texas, that would require public disclosure of foreign investment in U.S. companies. That bill has twice passed the House but stalled in the Senate.

HR 4520 merely would give the Bureau of Economic Analysis access to foreign investment information gathered by the Census Bureau and the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The panel yesterday rejected, 6-15, an amendment by Bryant that would have given the General Accounting Office access to all government data on foreign investments.

The House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on International Economic Policy will mark up the bill today.

The Energy panel also approved:

- HR 5707, which would clarify that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) has no jurisdiction over local natural gas distributors who provide fuel

for motor vehicles. Under current law, FERC would have jurisdiction if the vehicles drove across state lines.

A companion bill (S 3085) has been approved by the Senate Energy panel.

- HR 3429, which would make interstate simulcasts and off-track betting on greyhound races subject to the same regulations governing horse racing. The measure was approved, 26-17.

- HR 5756, which would assert that political candidates should be able to buy broadcast advertising time at the station's lowest charge for the 30 days before a primary election and the 45 days before the general election.

The legislation was prompted by a recent Federal Election Commission survey that showed more than half of the broadcast stations surveyed were charging political candidates too much.

ADDED FUNDS for veterans dropped by House panel.

Recognizing budgetary reality — that support cannot be found to increase funding for some programs in the midst of a massive deficit-reduction effort — the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Hospitals and Health Care yesterday dropped six relatively minor provisions from health-care legislation (5740) before approving the measure by voice vote.

The bill authorizes a number of small health-care programs.

Subcommittee Chairman G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery, D-Miss., anticipating impending budget cuts, offered an amendment to strike the provisions — all small-ticket items — because they would add dollars to the veterans' budget. The amendment was approved by voice vote.

Included in the provisions that were deleted was a measure that would have increased from \$500 to \$1,000 the amount that could be spent during a year for dental services without a second opinion.

Jim Jontz, D-Ind., had planned to offer a number of amendments authorizing funding for treatment of post traumatic stress disorder, which he said afflicts 479,000 Vietnam veterans. Jontz did not offer the amendments because they lacked the support of the subcommittee leadership. Jontz did offer a budget neutral amendment that would create an advisory panel on the disorder. The amendment was approved by voice vote.

U.S. PAYMENTS, D.C. supreme court bills OK'd by District panel.

The House District of Columbia Committee yesterday approved bills to ensure continued substantial federal payments to the District government and to establish a local, seven-member supreme court.

The panel approved, 9-3, a bill (HR 5760) to establish a new formula for determining annual federal payments to the District, delaying until the next Con-

gress action on a provision to give the local government the autonomy to run its own budgetary affairs.

Under the legislation, which aims to give the city a predictable method for determining its financial support from the United States, the federal government would be authorized to pay the district an amount equal to 19.5 percent of local revenues.

The panel adopted, 9-3, an amendment by Thomas J. Bliley Jr., R-Va., that would reduce to five days the congressional review period for local legislation passed by the D.C. city council. Currently, Congress has 30 days to review changes in the D.C. civil code and 60 days to look over new criminal laws.

Bliley's amendment would allow a 30-day review of either type of law if a member of Congress introduced a bill to disapprove of a D.C. council law.

The federal payment to the district has dropped from 20 percent of District revenues in 1985 to 14 percent in 1990.

- In other business, the committee approved, 11-1, compromise legislation (HR 4257) to create a seven-judge D.C. supreme court. The bill would elevate the current nine-member appeals court to supreme court status (allowing it to shrink to seven members through attrition) and require the president to appoint nine new judges to the appellate court. It also calls for four extra superior court judges.

SENATE ENERGY considers options to ensure adequate oil supply.

The Senate Energy Committee, in a packed hearing yesterday, heard a number of suggestions for reducing the United States' dependence on foreign oil. Practically every proposal involved government intervention.

Some of the options included:

- Government participation in the petroleum market — both buying and selling — to stabilize prices.

- Government setting of the price of imported oil.

- Government-mandated higher fuel economy standards for motor vehicles.

- A higher tax on gasoline to force consumers to use less.

- Increased research on and public awareness of alternative fuels.

- Penalties for commodity speculators who artificially inflate prices.

Democrat Jeff Bingaman, N.M., said that for the good of the economy a policy must be formulated to stabilize prices. "How can you make investments when the price of oil is going up and down like a yo-yo?" he asked.

James A. McClure, R-Idaho, said Congress should have acted years ago to develop a sound energy policy. "Familiar faces, familiar voices," he said in reference to those testifying for new energy options. ■

1. Several of the Security Council resolutions (662, 665) express "determination to restore the authority of the legitimate government of Kuwait." This language is always found in the preambular section.

2. Resolution 661 (the initial sanctions resolution) "decides" in its operative section on sanctions for two purposes: to secure Iraqi compliance with UNSC resolution 660 (which makes no mention of the legitimate government) and "to restore the authority of the legitimate government of Kuwait."

3. Also, the Aug. 10 Arab League resolution "insists" in its operative portion on "the return to Kuwait of the legitimate government which was present before the invasion."

**TEXT OF UN SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION 660
CONDEMNING THE IRAQI INVASION OF KUWAIT**

The Security Council adopted by a vote of 14-0-0 with one member, Yemen, not participating, a resolution (SC RES 660) condemning the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

The text of SC RES 660 is as follows:

The Security Council, alarmed by the invasion of Kuwait on 2 August 1990 by the military forces of Iraq, determining that there exists a breach of international peace and security as regards the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, acting under Articles 39 and 40 of the Charter of the United Nations:

1. Condemns the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait;
2. Demands that Iraq withdraw immediately and unconditionally all its forces to the positions in which they were located on 1 August 1990;
3. Calls upon Iraq and Kuwait to begin immediately intensive negotiations for the resolution of their differences and supports all efforts in this regard, and especially those of the Arab League;
4. Decides to meet again as necessary to consider further steps to ensure compliance with this resolution.

Deeply concerned that that resolution has not been implemented and that the invasion by Iraq of Kuwait continues with further loss of human life and material destruction,

Determined to bring the invasion and occupation of Kuwait by Iraq to an end and to restore the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of Kuwait,

Noting that the legitimate Government of Kuwait has expressed its readiness to comply with resolution 660 (1990),

Mindful of its responsibilities under the Charter of the United Nations for the maintenance of international peace and security,

Affirming the inherent right of individual or collective self-defence, in response to the armed attack by Iraq against Kuwait, in accordance with Article 51 of the Charter,

Acting under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations,

1. **Determines** that Iraq so far has failed to comply with paragraph 2 of resolution 660 (1990) and has usurped the authority of the legitimate Government of Kuwait;

2. **Decides**, as a consequence, to take the following measures to secure compliance of Iraq with paragraph 2 of resolution 660 (1990) and to restore the authority of the legitimate Government of Kuwait;

3. **Decides** that all States shall prevent:

S/RES/661 (1990)

(a) The import into their territories of all commodities and products originating in Iraq or Kuwait exported therefrom after the date of the present resolution;

(b) Any activities by their nationals or in their territories which would promote or are calculated to promote the export or trans-shipment of any commodities or products from Iraq or Kuwait; and any dealings by their nationals or their flag vessels or in their territories in any commodities or products originating in Iraq or Kuwait and exported therefrom after the date of the present resolution, including in particular any transfer of funds to Iraq or Kuwait for the purposes of such activities or dealings;

(c) The sale or supply by their nationals or from their territories or using their flag vessels of any commodities or products, including weapons or any other military equipment, whether or not originating in their territories but not including supplies intended strictly for medical purposes, and, in humanitarian circumstances, foodstuffs, to any person or body in Iraq or Kuwait or to any person or body for the purposes of any business carried on in or operated from Iraq or Kuwait; and any activities by their nationals or in their territories which promote or are calculated to promote such sale or supply of such commodities or products;

4. Decides that all States shall not make available to the Government of Iraq or to any commercial, industrial or public utility undertaking in Iraq or Kuwait, any funds or any other financial or economic resources and shall prevent their nationals and any persons within their territories from removing from their territories or otherwise making available to that Government or to any such undertaking any such funds or resources and from remitting any other funds to persons or bodies within Iraq or Kuwait, except payments exclusively for strictly medical or humanitarian purposes and, in humanitarian circumstances, foodstuffs;

5. Calls upon all States, including States non-members of the United Nations, to act strictly in accordance with the provisions of the present resolution notwithstanding any contract entered into or licence granted before the date of the present resolution;

6. Decides to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, a Committee of the Security Council consisting of all the members of the Council, to undertake the following tasks and to report on its work to the Council with its observations and recommendations:

(a) To examine the reports on the progress of the implementation of the present resolution which will be submitted by the Secretary-General;

(b) To seek from all States further information regarding the action taken by them concerning the effective implementation of the provisions laid down in the present resolution;

7. Calls upon all States to co-operate fully with the Committee in the fulfilment of its task, including supplying such information as may be sought by the Committee in pursuance of the present resolution;

Report on Iraq-Kuwait Developments

Iraq released nine French hostages and indicated it would let all remaining Frenchmen (estimated to number approximately 100) go if senior GOF official stops in Baghdad, according to CNN.

President Mitterand is currently in Gulf, visiting Saudi Arabia and U.A.E.

Prime Minister Thatcher intends to seek U.N. consensus to use frozen Iraqi assets to compensate Kuwait for damages associated with invasion and occupation, according to NY Times. Reportedly, she raised the issue with President Bush last Sunday.

Separately, Senate approves amendment to the Military Construction Appropriation Bill which would authorize President to seize and sell Iraqi assets. The proceeds would be used to settle claims against the country.

Also according to NY Times, Congressman Solarz indicates he will no longer agree to waivers of U.S. legislation forbidding aid to Pakistan if the country has, or is, developing nuclear weapons.

Separately, Pakistan's Finance Minister returns from Bank/Fund meetings and reportedly tells local press the institutions have agreed to provide the country dols 1 billion in supplemental aid. Embassy learns no commitments have yet been made.

Jordan told that oil tapline from Saudi Arabia will be reopened, if supplies permit, pending settlement of dols 40 million payment.

Saudi Arabia publicly confirms, for the first time that production is up to 6.3 million barrels per day, compared to OPEC quota of 4.3 million.

Separately, the country apparently intends to seek international financing for ambitious petroleum expansion plans. Saudis reportedly prefer to have U.S. banks lead; American bankers visiting kingdom appear cautious.

Bulgarian construction workers' bank accounts frozen in Iraq. Their food supplies are apparently quite limited and Bulgaria intends to request U.N. permission to truck in food to two construction sites.

[Text] In his United Nations General Assembly speech the United States' President, George Bush, spoke of a rosy world, free of conflicts. He also spoke of a democratic, oppression-free world, stressing his country's example of prosperity and racial tolerance. President Bush spoke as though the world was so tranquil, justice was deep-rooted, not a single human was persecuted. There was not an instance of a nation suffering from hard (luck times) and, above all, as though there were no flash points in the world which would any time throw this Bush-created fabulous world into turmoil.

Initially the United States is not an as flawless society as he claimed. There is in fact a glaring example in the United States of every state of injustice, persecution, degrading poverty, racism, political prejudice, and lust for domination. Millions of Americans are living under the poverty line. Under an American democracy these homeless can sit before the White House begging, airing grave doubts, and demanding solutions to their plight. But, under this same democracy there is no guarantee that their desperate cries would find an ear to listen. The world is not so tranquil as Mr. Bush tried to impress. It is still rife with active conflicts and dormant disputes that make any talk of a problem-free world a far cry.

Until recently East-West rivalry was at the root of almost every conflict. In Vietnam, Kampuchea, Latin America, and the Middle East there remained instances of the United States and the Soviet Union jockeying for more spheres of influence with one of them doing one thing and the other reacting. Now that the Soviet Union has abandoned its superpower role the cold war, as Mr. Bush claimed, is a thing of the past and U.S.-Soviet rivalry has turned into a new international system. However, it is still preposterous to suggest that it was a Kubla Khan type world until 2 August when the Gulf crisis started. Under East-West (?rapprochement) there remained a most glaring example of Israeli occupation and the Palestinian people denied by the occupier of the basic human rights of which Bush has claimed to be a stalwart defender.

It is a state of disgrace in American political behaviour to apply double standards vis-a-vis various international issues. Israel has received a worldwide condemnation for the occupation of lands, expulsion of the Palestinian people, and acts of oppression unseen elsewhere in the world. The United Nations, which Mr. Bush spoke so favorably of, has issued so many resolutions demanding Israeli withdrawal from occupied Arab territories, (?and to use of) excessive force, adherence to the Geneva conventions on the treatment of civilians under occupation, and help to deportation of

Palestinians. None of these resolutions has been implemented and Israel has not been deterred simply because the United States' administration willfully blocked United Nations bids with its God send veto.

President Bush should have remembered he is still a long way from this ideal world as long as he allows acts of injustice to pass with impunity simply because they are linked to American interests. With such a blinkered view there is bound to be a new state of confrontation. But this time between small nations on the one hand and an America trying to have things tailored to its own (?measure) on the other. After all it does not fit a U.S. President to say one thing and do another.

Introductory Remarks by the President
before Secretary Baker's CFE briefing

Oct 4, 1990

Yesterday, in the Rose Garden, we celebrated the dawn of a new era for Germany and welcomed the prospect of a Europe whole and free. But, despite these dramatic political events, Europe is still the site of the greatest concentration of armed strength in the world. As Europe is transformed politically, we must also redraw the military map of the continent and lift some of the shadows and fears we and our Allies have lived with for nearly half a century. Today Secretary Baker will describe our latest efforts to insure that the political transformation of Europe is matched in the military field in our negotiations to reduce and limit Conventional Armed Forces in Europe, the CFE talks.

Some of you here will remember when, in May of 1989, at the NATO Summit, I proposed a series of initiatives to quicken the pace in CFE. I pledged then to devote our full effort to the speedy conclusion of a CFE agreement, a treaty that would decisively improve the balance of military power on the continent and back our hopes for lasting stability.

We have followed through on that commitment.

There is still more work to do. I want to remind you that CFE is not an accord between the United States and the Soviet Union, it will be a treaty among twenty-two states -- East and West. All must be satisfied with the treaty's provisions. We have consulted repeatedly with our Allies about our efforts, both before New York and during the talks there. We believe our Allies are pleased with the progress being made.

Pending further consultation with our NATO partners, we have agreed in principle with the Soviet Union on resolution of all the major remaining issues in CFE, and on many of the essential details as well. Along with our Allies, we will continue to push to complete this treaty next month so that the way is clear for convening a CSCE Summit in Paris.

In conclusion, let me just say how pleased I am with the progress we have achieved. I would like now to turn to Secretary Baker.

On its merits this package has a lot going for it. It has strong pro-growth incentives and it has legitimate, enforceable spending cuts. I'm convinced its effect on the economy will be positive. Not only is it a good package, but when compared to the alternative of sequester, I think it's imperative that it be passed.

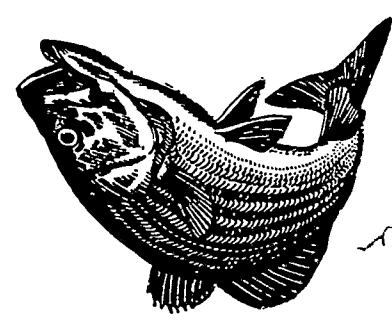

K.O. Mbadiwe is dead

DEATH of Dr. Kingsley Ozunumba Mbadiwe, a renowned politician in the first and second republics was yesterday confirmed by members of his family. He died at the age of 73 years.

In a statement jointly issued by his son, Barrister Greg Mbadiwe and the Vice Chairman of Mbadiwe family Barrister P. C. Mbadiwe said that "the sad event took place at the Saint Nicholas Hospital, Lagos, on Wednesday August 29."

"Dr. Mbadiwe (the Agaragba Chiriuzo of Arondizuogu) died at 6.35 a.m. after a brief illness. He passed away peacefully in his sleep", the statement explained.

The late head of the Mbadiwe and Odum families is survived by his wife, Madam Cecilia Mbadiwe, four sons, a daughter and other brothers and sisters.

According to yesterday's statement funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Dr. Mbadiwe who was born on March 15, 1917 at Arondizuogu, Imo State, had his primary and secondary education at Saint Mary's Catholic School, Port Harcourt, Government School Aba; Hope Weddel Training Institute, Calabar; 1933; Aggrey Memorial College, Arochukuwu, 1934; Baptist Academy, Lagos and Igbobi College, Lagos in 1935.

In 1939, he proceeded to Lincoln University where he won the first prize in Oratory contest, and later for Columbia Business College in 1940 where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Banking and Finance. In 1945, he proceeded to New York University where he obtained a Master Degree in Arts.

Back in Nigeria he founded the *Daily Telegraph*, Lagos and Greater Tomorrow Transport Company having been a

representative of Zik's West African Pilot for Port Harcourt, Aba and Onitsha in 1937 and was also chairman and managing director, African Insurance Company Limited since 1950.

He was elected first Orlu member, defunct Eastern Nigeria House of Assembly 1951, elected member, Federal Parliament and later appointed Federal Minister of Land and Natural Resources 1952-54 and Minister of Communications and Aviation in 1954.

The deceased in 1957 was a member of the Federal Government Delegation to the Nigerian Constitutional Conference, London, appointed Adviser to the Prime Minister, Sir Abubakar Tafawa Balewa on African Affairs in 1961.

He founded African Academy of Arts and Research, member Constituent Assembly 1977-78, appointed Presidential Adviser on National Assembly Affairs to President Shehu Shagari 1979-83, Ambassador Extra-Ordinary and Plenipotentiary, October-December 1983.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

The Briefing Room

THE PRESIDENT: Yesterday in the Rose Garden, we celebrated the dawn of a new era for Germany and welcome the prospect of a Europe whole and free. But despite these dramatic political events, Europe is still the site of the greatest concentration of armed strength in the world. As Europe is transformed politically, we must also redraw the military map of the continent and lift some of the shadows and fears that we and our allies have lived with for nearly half a century.

Today, Secretary Baker will describe our latest efforts to ensure that the political transformation of Europe is matched in the military field in our negotiations to reduce and limit conventional armed forces in Europe -- the so-called CFE talks.

Some of you here will remember when, in May of 1989 at the NATO summit, I proposed a series of initiatives to quicken the pace in CFE. I pledged then to devote our full effort to the speedy conclusion of a CFE agreement, a treaty that would decisively improve the balance of military power on the continent and back our hopes for lasting stability.

We followed through on that commitment, and there is still -- let's face it -- more work to do. I want to remind you that CFE is not an accord between the United States and the Soviet Union, it'll be a treaty among 22 states, East and West. All must be satisfied with the treaty's provisions.

We've consulted repeatedly with our allies about our efforts, both before New York and then during the many talks up there. We believe our allies are pleased with the progress being made. Pending further consultation with our NATO partners, we have agreed in principle with the Soviet Union on resolution of all the major remaining issues in CFE and on many of the essential details as well.

Along with our allies, we will continue to push to complete this treaty next month so that the way is clear for convening a CSCE summit in Paris.

In conclusion, I want to thank the Secretary of State and the people that have been working with him during these negotiations -- and let me just say how pleased I am with the progress that we have achieved here -- and I would like to now turn to Secretary Baker who has a statement, and then he'll be glad to take your questions.
