THE THIRD NATIONAL DRUG CONTROL STRATEGY (STRATEGY III): ISSUES FOR DOMESTIC POLICY COUNCIL CONSIDERATION -- REVISED

Background:

The Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 (P.L. 100-690) requires that a National Drug Control Strategy be transmitted to Congress not later than February 1 each year. Accordingly, the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) has drafted for Domestic Policy Council consideration the third National Drug Control Strategy (Strategy III).

The President announced the first National Drug Control Strategy (Strategy I) on September 5, 1989. The second National Drug Control Strategy (Strategy II) was transmitted to Congress on January 25, 1990. Strategy III will be transmitted to Congress concurrently with the President's Fiscal Year 1992 Budget. (This schedule conforms to statutory requirements.)

Strategy III stays the course charted in Strategies I and II. It further refines the blueprint laid out in Strategy II with respect to the activities and responsibilities of Federal departments and agencies; specific initiatives to begin in this fiscal year; and the funding and legislation necessary to carry out the Administration's policy.

In summary, the approach laid out in the two previous Strategies seems to be the right one and seems to be working; none of the major policy directions in Strategies I and II is reversed in Strategy III.

The structure of Strategy III maintains that of Strategies I and II. Following the Introduction, seven chapters examine the "fronts" on which the drug war must continue to be waged: Criminal Justice; Drug Treatment; Education, Community Action, and the Workplace; International Initiatives; Border Interdiction and Security; Research; and Intelligence.

Several Appendices are included with the Strategy: High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (Appendix A); Resource Requirements (Appendix B); Management (Appendix C); and Recommended State Legislation (Appendix D).

Progress In the War on Drugs:

We are now turning the corner in the war on drugs. Cocaine, for example, is harder to find, more expensive, and less pure

today than it was one year ago. Drug use is down. The Federal government has provided unprecedented funding through State block grants for drug treatment, prevention, and State and local law enforcement.

Asset forfeiture collections have also been enhanced -- in FY90, collections increased 28 percent to \$460 million. An agreement between the Drug Enforcement Administration and Customs cross-designating an additional 1,000 Customs agents in the effort to investigate drug and money-laundering cases has been implemented. The U.S. signed the Document of Cartagena establishing drug control cooperation with Peru, Bolivia, and Colombia.

ONDCP released three "white papers" in 1990: 1) a paper on leading drug indicators, showing significant declines in drug use from 1988 to 1989; 2) a paper explaining how effective drug treatment works; and 3) a paper on State drug control policy and activity, including recommendations for State drug-free workplace statutes.

Working Group Consideration:

The DPC Working Group on Anti-Drug Policy reviewed early drafts of Strategy III. During Working Group consideration, numerous issues were addressed and resolved between ONDCP and the agencies. Budget levels in Strategy III (Appendix B) will be addressed in the FY92 Budget review process. The International chapter was discussed in the NSC process, and a declassified version of the International chapter is included in Strategy III.

Highlights of Strategy III:

Strategy III includes some follow-up on three major policy issues addressed in previous Strategies:

1. Tying Federal highway funds to State drivers' license revocation laws. Strategy I urged States to adopt laws revoking the drivers' licenses of convicted drug offenders. The President decided that the Administration would not propose to sanction Federal highway funds going to States that had not enacted such laws.

The FY91 Transportation appropriations bill included a provision that requires 5 percent of a State's Federal highway funds to be withheld if the State has not enacted a revocation law within two years. After four years, 10 percent of Federal highway funds will be withheld. States must revoke a driver's license for 6 months after a drug conviction. (This pertains to any drug conviction -- the offense does not have to be related to

driving.) The only exception for a State is to certify that it officially considered revocation laws and rejected them.

Strategy III does not further address this controversial issue.

2. High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas. The law authorizes the designation of certain localities in the United States as high intensity drug trafficking areas. Strategy II designated New York City, Miami, Houston, Los Angeles, and the Southwest Border as high intensity drug trafficking areas.

In FY90, the five areas received \$25 million for use by Federal law enforcement agencies. The Administration requested \$50 million for FY91, but Congress appropriated \$82 million -- earmarking the additional \$32 million for direct State and local law enforcement funding assistance. Funding for designated high intensity drug trafficking areas was intended to be seed money to aid stepped up local efforts by an enhanced Federal presence.

Strategy III (Appendix A, p. 188) maintains the designation of the five areas as high intensity drug trafficking areas. ONDCP is required to report to Congress by March 1, 1991, on the effectiveness of and need for such designations.

The appropriate FY92 funding level for high intensity drug trafficking areas as well as the proper funding mechanism (i.e., whether to provide funding through ONDCP or through normal budget channels at the Departments of Treasury and Justice) are questions expected to be addressed in the FY92 budget review process.

3. National Drug Intelligence Center. A proposal for the National Drug Intelligence Center (NDIC) was highlighted as an Administration priority in previous Strategies. Congress rejected the Administration's proposal and instead included \$10 million in the FY91 Defense appropriations bill for a National Drug Intelligence Center to be located in Pennsylvania and operated by the Department of Defense. This was done by Rep. John Murtha (D-Pennsylvania). It is not clear that the Department of Defense has legal authority to operate such a Center. No work has begun in setting up the NDIC; the Department of Defense and ONDCP are still studying the statutory language and the conference report. Some members of Congress seem to disapprove of the \$10 million NDIC appropriation and may alter the law in the next Congress.

Moreover, in the Commerce, State, Justice appropriation bill for FY91, Congress directed that no funds be spent by the Justice Department for any activity called a National Drug Intelligence Center, yet the involvement of Justice is essential.

As the Administration seeks to resolve with Congress the question of creating a National Drug Intelligence Center, Strategy III (p. 178) calls for continued improvements in our capability to produce strategic intelligence on drug trafficking organizations. The Attorney General will create and chair a Law Enforcement Drug Intelligence Committee (LEDIC) to coordinate the development of drug intelligence collection. As one of its initial tasks, the LEDIC will explore alternate means to accomplish NDIC's primary missions, such as enhancements to or expansions of existing drug intelligence entities.

Major Policy Issues Requiring DPC Consideration:

The Working Group on Anti-Drug Policy has identified the following issues for DPC consideration. (Budgetary implications related to the following issues will be decided in the FY92 budget review process and are not addressed here.)

1. Treatment capacity. The major emphasis in Strategy III is the commitment to treatment. HHS now estimates 6 million Americans need and could benefit from drug treatment. This constitutes an increase of 2 million persons over earlier Administration estimates, due to efforts to count certain populations (e.g., prisoners, the homeless) not previously included in the total.

In any given year, about half of this group -- or 3 million people -- will be induced into treatment. Because the number of Americans using drugs continues to decline, the 3 million persons who could be induced into treatment is expected to drop to 2.5 million in the next few years. The current treatment system (public and private) can absorb up to 1.7 million people.

HHS data also show that while the number of treatment slots in certain urban areas is inadequate, treatment capacity in other geographical areas goes unused. Thus, despite the perception of a national shortage of treatment capacity in all regions, only 80 percent of the slots are used. This geographical mismatch between the supply of and demand for treatment slots is but one example of how the way treatment is currently funded fails to reach everyone in need. The lack of State treatment action plans, well-trained staff, and new sites for program expansions has also frustrated plans for growth in treatment.

Strategy III (p. 65) proposes to expand or redirect treatment capacity so that by 1994 treatment is available to all those who need treatment and could benefit from it (i.e., 2.5 million people). Strategy III proposes to increase the size of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Services (ADMS) block grant to achieve this goal. Depending on budgetary decisions made in the FY92 budget review process, this may not be possible.

However, a variety of other funding alternatives are possible, such as (among others): 1) altering the allocation formula to direct treatment funds to States with greater need or to greater areas of need within States; and 2) targeting discretionary grants to areas with particular treatment needs.

It must be emphasized that any approach chosen (such as those mentioned above) will entail costs -- both political and fiscal. For instance, altering the allocation formula to direct treatment funds to States with greater need involves shifting funds from rural, primarily western States to more urban States. Targeting may involve recreating categorical programs that at the Reagan Administration's request were combined to form the block grant in 1981.

To better analyze and rationalize the implications of a decision to expand treatment, the Director of OMB has agreed to convene the affected agencies (HHS, ONDCP, OMB, OPD) to explore options.

Question: Should Strategy III have as one of its primary objectives the expansion of treatment availability to all those who need treatment and could benefit from it -- by 1994 (provided offsets, if necessary, can be found to support the proposal)?

Pros:

- o A plan to make treatment available within three years to all those who could benefit visibly demonstrates the Administration's commitment to treatment.
- o Some Democrats have attempted to criticize the Administration in previous Strategies for emphasizing law enforcement at the expense of treatment.

Cons:

- o The goal of making treatment available to all those who could benefit by 1994 may be unachievable for both programmatic and budgetary reasons. Five years instead of three may be more reasonable.
- o A Federal commitment to make treatment available to all who could benefit is largely meaningless because States will have to bear the larger responsibility in funding treatment expansion.
- o The funding alternatives mentioned above, such as changing the allocation formula for the block grant, might have political disadvantages. Intense Congressional opposition, especially in the Senate, can be expected to any proposal that would reduce block grant funds going to rural States or

that would direct new funds to populous States.

2. Numerical objectives. The law requires two-year and ten-year numerical goals in each Strategy. Strategy I first laid out a set of nine quantified goals that were subsequently revised in Strategy II. Most of the goals are based on National Household Survey data from the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and are directly related to drug use. Various data indicate some success in the drug war (cocaine prices and purity, cocaine-related deaths, etc.) and many of the two-year goals specified in previous Strategies have already been met.

Strategy III (p. 4) again revises the two-year and ten-year numerical objectives, making them more ambitious in light of recent progress in the war on drugs. For example, Strategy III sets a goal of a 20 percent reduction (from the 1988 level) for current overall drug use by 1993 and a 60 percent reduction by 2001. Some of the goals are even more ambitious: Strategy III aims at a 60 percent reduction (from the 1988 level) in the number of adolescents reporting past month cocaine use by 1993 and a 75 percent reduction by 2001.

Question: Does the DPC approve the more ambitious numerical two- and ten-year objectives included in Strategy III?

Pros:

- o More ambitious goals highlight that progress in the war on drugs is being made.
- o Unless we revise some of the goals, we will establish goals that are below what we have already achieved.
- o Holding ourselves to more stringent goals is consistent with the accountability theme that pervades other Administration policies, such as the National Education Goals.
- o The Administration risks looking insincere if it maintains that progress is being made, but insists on a relatively less stringent set of goals for itself.

Cons:

- o Reductions in drug use indicators as measured by the Household Survey might be reflecting the hardening of social attitudes; respondents could be simply less likely to admit drug use than they were in past surveys.
- o After initial precipitous reductions in reported drug use, subsequent marginal reductions become much more difficult to achieve.

3. National standards for drug testing labs: Drug testing in the workplace is becoming more and more a common practice. In fact, a growing number of employers have begun to institute testing for broader categories of employees. Public support for drug testing programs depends in large part on high standards of accuracy of the tests. False-positive results from any single poor quality lab can endanger the credibility of drug testing programs generally.

Strategy III (p. 106) calls for the development of national drug testing legislation for lab certification only, thus separating the narrower question of lab certification from the broad range of employer needs and employee rights. Strategy III otherwise maintains current policy of encouraging States to adopt their own drug-free workplace policies.

Question: Should Strategy III call for development of national drug testing legislation for lab certification that would preempt State legislation?

Pros:

- o Preemption of State law for certification of drug testing laboratories would not be as significant a departure from general Administration policy as would overall national drug testing legislation.
- o National legislation will promote consistently high-quality drug testing programs, thus minimizing the credibility damage resulting from a few isolated labs producing poor results.
- o There are problems with varying degrees of quality among laboratories. National legislation would remove the problem of conflicting quality standards for companies operating in more than one State.
- o Business groups would likely support legislation providing consistency across State lines.
- o HHS currently certifies some medical laboratories for certain purposes. The approach would be consistent with 1988 legislation regarding clinical laboratories.

Cons:

- o National drug testing legislation would preempt State legislation and private testing practices, thus running counter to the principle of Federalism and opening the door

to preemption in other areas. Administration policy has generally been not to preempt State laws.

- o States are better suited to judge what particular adjustments must be made to address the needs of their populations.
- o "Federalizing" drug testing legislation could make the Federal government liable to a new round of costly litigation.
- o ONDCP has already released a "white paper" recommending model State legislation for building a drug-free workforce.
- o Administration-sponsored legislation preempting States in the relatively narrow area of lab certification will give Congress an opportunity to expand the scope of the legislation and more broadly preempt State laws.

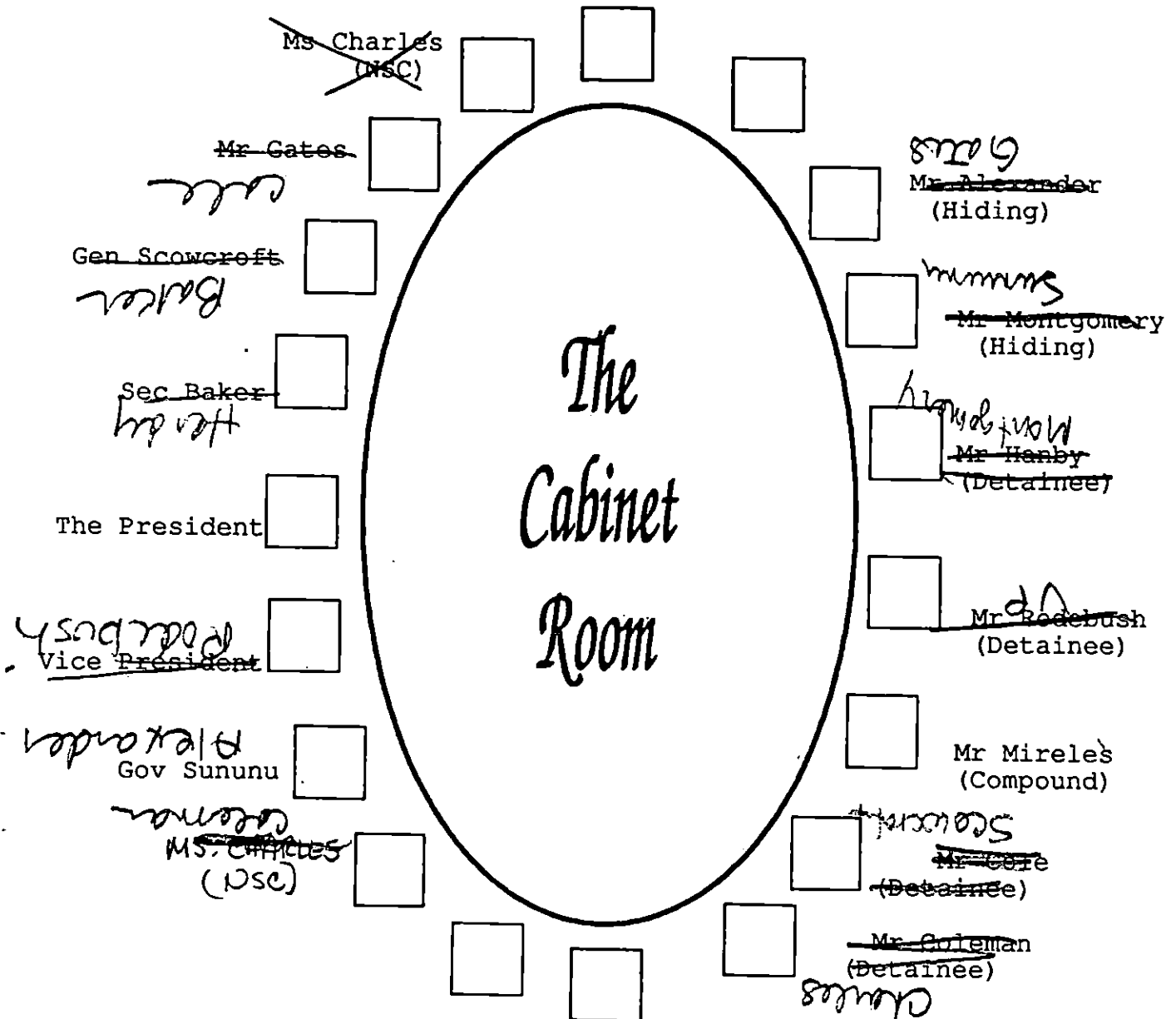

Dear Mr. President:

I am honored by your willingness to nominate me to become Chairman of the Republican National Committee. As you know, prior to that announcement I had determined that -- after nine years of Executive Branch service -- I should return to private life so as to satisfy important personal and family obligations.

I have now determined, with the deepest reluctance, that I cannot serve as both Chairman of the Republican National Committee and fulfill these personal and other professional responsibilities. Among these is a longstanding contractual commitment to Simon and Schuster to write two books. They have recently advised, understandably, that they cannot extend my commitment to them for yet another two years.

In addition, I am now advised by legal counsel that Federal ethics law could be interpreted to limit substantially my involvement in private sector activities while serving as Chairman of the Republican National Committee during the first year following my departure from the Executive Branch. I would not want this to create an appearance of impropriety. As you know, I share your commitment to the highest ethical standards in public service and I would not want to do anything to jeopardize our shared commitment to those standards.

While I would be happy to be of assistance to you in years to come and most particularly in your re-election campaign, I am compelled at this time to withdraw my name from consideration for Chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Finally, Mr. President, let me say that I am also advised that nothing in Federal ethics law prevents me from continuing to speak out on behalf of you and the policies of your Administration. I intend to do so vigorously.

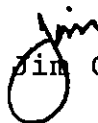

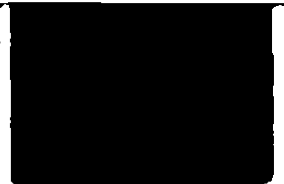

Restaurateurs indicted on tax charges

ALFRED — A Kennebunk restaurant and two of its owners were indicted Thursday on charges of failing to pay state sales taxes and failing to file state income tax reports between 1985 and 1990.

The 95-count indictment returned by a York County grand jury Thursday names B & B Coastal Enterprises, operator of Bartley's Dockside Restaurant in Kennebunk, and

two of the owners, James C. Bartley and his son, Brian R. Bartley.

No arraignment date has been set.

The most serious charges are that the Bartleys took, for their own use, more than \$30,000 in sales taxes between May 1, 1985, and Oct. 31 of this year. Each of the five counts against each Bartley carries a maximum 10-year prison term and a fine up to about \$25,000, said Charles Silsby, chief investigator for the Bureau of Taxation.

Failure to report monthly sales taxes and failure to file income tax reports are misdemeanors, each carrying a maximum of 364 days in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

Brian Bartley referred all questions to the firm's accountant, Bruce Gardner of Jonesport. Gardner was unavailable for comment Thursday.

Silsby said the investigation took "a couple of years."

He said, "This type of case is common, but we are a small staff

and are limited as to what we can do. But we hope to do more in the future."

He said the current amnesty program promoted by the state to collect delinquent taxes "probably wouldn't apply in this case, because it has been under criminal investigation."

Silsby said "substantially more" than \$30,000 is involved, including interest and penalties, but the bureau's estimate wasn't available immediately.

Is Prince disappointed at the box-office failure of his movie *Graffiti Bridge*? Not so you'd notice. "People are saying, 'Oh, this was Prince's big gamble.' What gamble? I made a \$7 million movie with somebody else's money." The only way.

Writer Jane Wagner, updating her and Lily Tomlin's *The Search for Signs of Intelligent Life in the Universe*, predicted in Ms. Magazine: "In the future... due to diversion of funds from breast-cancer research to male medical problems, there will be a cure for male-pattern baldness. Male-pattern violence, however, will remain a major health threat... There will be so many going into crime as a way of life, criminals will be forced to network and job share. This will be a system called 'flex crime.'"

J. W. Goodwin, who has given Auburn University \$8 million over the years, said his alma mater would get no more from him because of its refusal to grant tenure to Catholic theologian Charles Curran. The school refuses to say why it denied tenure to Curran, who's been censured by the Vatican for his views on abortion and homosexuality and now occupies an Auburn chair funded by Goodwin for \$600,000. Curran, noting that the school had cited "nonacademic" reasons for its refusal, said that in doing so "they have admitted it's a violation of academic freedom."

The Rev. Jim Lavender's Richmond, Va., church members have made a 30-minute video linking Santa Claus and Jesus Christ. "Many people just don't realize the connection between Santa and the birth of Christ," said Mr. Lavender, pastor of the Discovery United Methodist Church. "We want to bridge that gap between religious and secular philosophies and let people know that, indeed, two historical legends are intertwined."

The president's remarks to the Points of Light Foundation were piped in and a packet of information on his new initiatives is available in the Press Office. Attorney General Dick Thornburgh, Assistant Atty Gen Stuart Gerson and Gregg Petersmeyer warmed up the crowd prior to Bush's arrival. Room 450 was packed with about 200 state legislators and officials of non-profit organizations. Thornburgh used an a story to explain the reason for the legal reforms contained in Bush's initiatives. He said a Little LEague baseball player was once shifted from shortstop to the outfield by a volunteer coach and was then injured. The parents sued the coach, saying their son was a "born shortstop" and should have never been shifted to the outfield. They held the coach legally liable for their son's injured eye. President and Mrs. Bush and Vice President and Mrs. ^{Quayle} ~~Quayle~~ listened to school children tell what Hanukkah means to them and sing several songs before the president had a chance to improve on his poor showing from last ~~year~~ year during a ^{to} spinning game of dreidle. He didn't, but more on that later.

Several rabbis began the celebration with brief messages and Bush was presented with a ~~silver menorah~~ 19th ~~century~~ century silver menorah that was saved from the flames of the Warsaw ghetto. Their remarks were piped in as were the president's.

Rabbi ~~Shalom~~ Efraim Stein called on the "supreme king of kings" to sustain President Bush and Vice President Quayle and their families and to deliver them from "all distress and misfortune." He also asked that ~~we~~ ^{we} ~~aspire~~ ^{aspire} them and their counsellors and aides to "deal kindly with us and ~~deal~~ with all Israel."

Rabbi Chaskel Besserman noted that the holiday emphasizes the courage to fight and overcome evil and wickedness. He said that on the international front Mr. Bush ~~and~~ had shown "our nation and the whole world that the true leader lives up to his credo."

He said that the president's actions in the Persian Gulf "fills us ~~with~~ with pride and hope" and he noted that last year at this time Bush undertook the "liberation of Panama" and that his efforts were blessed with "great success." 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12:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

BENNETT (CNN) -- Former Drug Policy Director William Bennett has apparently changed his mind. Sources say Bennett has decided not to take over as Republican national chairman after all.

...Just a few moments ago, Bennett cited a number of items leading him to decline the job. One complication concerns a book contract. He says he can't write a book and head the RNC at the same time. He also talked about ethics, saying laws limit his private work in the first year after serving the Executive Branch.

No word on who might be tapped to be the next RNC chairman.

KUWAIT/U.S. EMBASSY (Baghdad/Reuter) -- Five U.S. diplomats left Kuwait along with 34 other Westerners, many of whom had been hiding since Iraq's invasion. Embassy officials said the plane was due to leave for Frankfurt later today after picking up between 75 and 100 Americans and other Westerners in Baghdad.

GULF/JORDAN (Amman/Reuter) -- Prime Minister Badran has accused the U.S. and some Arab countries of plotting to sabotage attempts to find an Arab solution to the Gulf crisis. "There is a foreign plot to disrupt an Arab-Arab dialogue on the crisis and some of our Arab brothers are responding to that," the national news agency Petra quoted Badran as telling a lower house of parliament meeting. "The United States does not want a peaceful solution and insists the dialogue should be limited to an Iraqi-American dialogue which means military action," he said.

GULF/BAKER (Reuter) -- Secretary Baker said Iraq had still not offered acceptable dates for high-level talks and did not seem to be taking the U.S. peace bid seriously. "We have given the Iraqis 15 separate dates, asked them to choose any one of 15 days. They continue to insist on just one day," Baker told reporters after a breakfast meeting with Prime Minister Shamir. Analysts said Iraq wanted to signal to Bush that it would be no pushover in the talks, should they take place. The best U.S. response would be to take an equally tough stance.

GULF/OPEC (Vienna/AP) -- OPEC ministers endorsed maintaining high crude production to ease any oil shortages caused by the Gulf crisis, and pledged to sharply reduce their output once it is resolved. Nigerian Oil Minister Jibril Aminu said the accord "should firm (prices) up and send a signal (that people) need to relax in a time of worry."

SOMALIA (Nairobi, Kenya/Reuter) -- The U.S. has ordered an evacuation of Americans from Somalia because of escalating civil war and ethnic killings in the capital, Mogadishu. A spokesman for the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi told Reuters the State Department had issued a statement in Washington telling all dependents and non-essential employees to leave. It also warned against travel to Somalia and urged private U.S. citizens already in the country to evacuate as soon as possible.

PEGGY SAY (Cadiz, Ky./AP) -- Peggy Say says she's going to Lebanon next month and won't come back without her brother. Say said a State Department ban on travel to Lebanon does not apply to families of hostages, but officials still do not want her to go. "I simply have no choice," she said. "The administration has given me no choice."

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3:30 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

WAR POWERS (AP) -- A federal judge refused to order President Bush to seek permission from Congress before any attack on Iraqi forces in the Gulf but reaffirmed the power of lawmakers to declare war. Judge Greene denied a request by 54 Democratic congressmen for an injunction to force the President to seek a declaration of war before launching an attack. But the judge said that in principle, the President must seek such authorization from Congress. He said the issue was not ripe for a decision because Bush "has not shown a commitment to a definitive course of action."

IRAQ/U.S. (Baghdad/Reuter) -- The U.S. and Iraq clashed angrily over the dates of proposed talks, but both stopped short of calling off the peace effort. Secretary Baker said Iraq had still not offered acceptable dates for the talks and did not seem to be taking the U.S. peace bid seriously. In Baghdad, the Iraqi foreign ministry denounced Washington for rejecting its proposed date of Jan. 12 and accused it of suggesting the talks only as a cover for war.

(AP) -- Saddam Hussein said his nation wants peace but it will gladly wage war rather than permit foreign domination of Arab oil or land, the official Iraqi News Agency reported. "We want peace, endeavor to achieve it, and work to reach a point where no one of us brandishes his sword against the other. But if the enemies want to push affairs to a military duel, then by God's help we would win and would walk over their corpses and tread on their heads," INA quoted Saddam as saying.

GULF/EC (Rome/Reuter) -- President Bush told the EC it was vital that the international coalition against Iraq remain united despite attempts by Baghdad to split it. In a letter to the Italian government on the eve of an EC summit here, Bush said countries opposing Iraq had to expect siren calls from Baghdad before the Jan. 15 U.N. deadline for Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait or risk the use of force against it.

GULF/BRITAIN (London/Reuter) -- Prime Minister Major said Iraq must withdraw totally and unconditionally from Kuwait or face military action after Jan. 15. "A partial withdrawal simply will not do," Major told parliament. If Saddam Hussein did not withdraw voluntarily, he would be compelled to by force, Major said.

HOSTAGE FLIGHTS (Baghdad/Reuter) -- Five U.S. diplomats from Kuwait and 91 other Westerners and Japanese left Baghdad for Frankfurt on a chartered Iraqi aircraft, airport sources and U.S. officials said. Embassy officials said only one American who wanted to leave Iraq or Kuwait had still to fly out. He had been forced to return to Basra to obtain documents from his former employ as part of exit formalities and was expected to leave in the next day or two.

BENNETT RESIGNATION (Reuter) -- "...It is appropriate that Bill Bennett's tenure at the Republican National Committee lasted about as long as most of President Bush's campaign promises," DNC Chairman Brown said. He added Bennett's departure speaks volumes about the "new paralysis" in Republican ranks.

SOVIETS/U.S. CREDIT (Moscow/UPI) -- A top Soviet official welcomed the U.S. decision to waive restrictions on credit guarantees and said the move would help the Soviet Union cope with its current economic crisis and improve overall trade restrictions. Deputy Premier Lev Voronin, who is coordinating the international relief effort, told a news conference, "We have a very good opinion of this action. It will also promote our trade cooperation, and we hope that additional help...will be provided to us."

SAVIMBI MEETING (UPI) -- Jonas Savimbi met with President Bush and predicted a cease-fire to end the civil war in Angola is "real close." Savimbi spoke to reporters after the Oval Office meeting, during which he said he thanked President Bush "for all the support the United States has been giving us."

EDUCATION SECRETARY (Reuter) -- White House aides were searching for a new education secretary, who resigned from the Cabinet at the insistence of Chief of Staff Sununu, officials said. Speculation focused on former Rep. Saiki and Lynne Cheney. If the job were to fall to Cheney, she and Defense Secretary Richard Cheney would become the first husband-wife team in a presidential cabinet.

FREE TRADE/CANADA (Toronto/UPI) -- A majority [53%] of Canadians are no longer in favor of the 2-year-old free-trade agreement between Canada and the U.S., according to a Gallup poll, while 31% said they supported it.

Bush was seated on one side of the Cabinet table and seven former hostages on the other. Also seated were Baker, Sununu and Gates.

Bush was asked by Wyatt Andrews if he should "give something in return" for the hostages' freedom. Bush responded emphatically: "Hell no. Not one thing. You don't reward a kidnapper. You don't reward somebody that has done something that he shouldn't have done in the first place." ~~"I don't reward anybody."~~ The president began a sentence by saying, "That's fundamental international . . .," then cut himself and added, "I'm not going to take any more questions because I want to get into this briefing. But the answer to your question, if you have any doubt, no." To that, the room erupted in laughter with Sununu and Gates sharing a chuckle.

Asked whether he could "defuse the tension," Bush responded, "What tension?" ~~Andrews~~ Told that the question referred to the "tension in the situation," Bush responded: "One way or another we will."

As the pool was shown in, Bush was telling the group, "What this man put the world through, I just can't express it and I think you all expressed it coming home with the clarity that has brought this home to the American people. I am very anxious to hear from each of you, how you read it and what you think happened there. . . ." As we left, Bush was telling one former hostage: "Let your hair down. If we're screwing something up, I want you to tell me."
