Dear Mr. Gephardt:

As a new session of the Congress opens, I want you to know Saudi Arabia's deep and continuing appreciation for all that the United States and especially its armed forces in that part of the world are doing to help meet Saddam Hussein's naked aggression against Kuwait and bring about greater stability and peace in the globally important Gulf area.

I also want to re-emphasize Saudi Arabia's firm commitment to meet its own responsibilities in this overall crisis - and in manpower, military, economic and all other terms. Since the start of the build-up of Arab and other friendly forces to overcome Saddam Hussein's expansionist designs, Saudi Arabia has undertaken an open-ended offer of fuel, food, water, host-country facilities, local transportation and other services for American forces in-country or in the surrounding waters, all at no cost to the United States. In addition, the Kingdom has committed itself to help financially to meet a number of military and economic consequences of the crisis as to key other friendly countries and to strengthen substantially Saudi Arabia's own defense capabilities.

I particularly want to note that Saudi Arabia has not received a net financial windfall in the most recent fiscal year from the higher oil prices caused by speculative international market forces since early August and the increased production undertaken by the Kingdom to help moderate those price surges.

At the start of the 1990 fiscal year, Saudi oil revenues were anticipated to come to around \$23 billion for the year. With increased oil prices since August 2nd, those are now estimated to come to \$36 billion for the year - roughly a \$13 billion increase. That is quite close to the conclusion of the independent Financial Times of London in its special supplement on Saudi Arabia on

December 12th: "Additional oil revenues due to higher prices and sharply increased production are expected to amount to 14 billion dollars this year, much of which is committed to payments for the U.S. military presence and in compensation to states such as Egypt, Syria and Turkey."

Additional Saudi costs as a consequence of the crisis will more than take that expected additional revenue, as the following summary indicates:

For U.S. support through 1990 - Estimated here at \$3 billion (and well higher by others) through December 31 and now rising fast. The outlay will be higher in the coming quarter because of the additional troops and stepped-up troop activities.

For assistance to Egypt, Turkey, Morocco, Syria and a number of other countries because of the crisis - \$3.65 billion. (Plus forgiving Egyptian debts of over \$4 billion and making multi-billion dollar other commitments relevant to the Gulf crisis.)

In-country additional Saudi costs for the Kingdom's own military - \$1.7 billion and rising.

For additional arms purchase from the U.S., approved by President Bush and the Congress in October - \$7.6 billion.

The above four outlays alone come to \$16 billion. Still further costs include:

(a) The investment necessary to raise oil production from approximately 5.5 million barrels a day to current production output of over eight million barrels a day. The cost of accomplishing that has come to over \$4 billion. The output increase was a major factor in bringing the international spot-market price of oil down from nearly \$40 a barrel at one point since the beginning of the Gulf crisis to \$24 to \$27 a barrel more recently. The Kingdom has announced it will be investing additional billions in the years ahead (estimated by the Financial Times at over \$15 billion) to increase Saudi Arabia's standby production capacity to help meet expected global oil demand in this decade and moderate price pressures which will come with that.

(b) Additional arms purchases from other than the U.S. since August 2nd because of the crisis come to roughly \$5 billion. The Kingdom will be making additional defense purchases in the period ahead to provide more fully for its own security; and this has to be taken into account whether these purchases are made in the United States, Europe or elsewhere, although it is hoped that will be in America.

Windfall claims have unfortunately gone wrong in substantially overstating Saudi revenues, with that further dramatized by being put on an annual basis rather than kept for the period August 2 to the end of the year or through the first quarter of the coming year.

Windfall claims have also wrongly included the \$23 billion which the Kingdom already expected without the crisis or higher prices and production. Further reasons a claimed windfall is seriously overstated include the following:

a. Before calculating revenues, production totals have to be reduced by the free oil being provided by the Kingdom during the crisis to not only American and other friendly armed forces in the area but also subsidized oil being provided to countries from Morocco to Turkey. Similarly, production which goes for local consumption in Saudi Arabia and to stocks must also be taken out before calculating revenues related to international prices. Just the military supplies being provided free by Saudi Arabia have recently been running over two million barrels a day and will certainly go higher.

b. Oil production operating costs and investment expenditures also have to be deducted before arriving at the net oil revenues for the Kingdom.

c. Windfall figures usually seem to have been figured on the basis of the market at or around its price high in recent months as well as the high point of recent production, not how market pricing and production have actually moved. The result is a serious distortion of the real situation. (For month by month prices, see Appendix A attached.)

d. U.S. and North Sea spot oil prices oversimplified as cited day-to-day in the U.S. media seem generally to have been relied on in claims of a windfall, rather than recognizing Saudi revenues result from real prices for at least four different crudes sold in at least four different sectors of the globe, all with different prices. The Kingdom's heavier blend earns less than Western benchmarks. Using U.S. and North Sea pricing also ignores the fact Saudi and other Gulf prices have to absorb long-distance transportation costs, higher insurance and other matters applicable to sources of oil distant from American, European and Far East markets and in a higher-risk area. Further, the recent weakness of the U.S. dollar relative to other key currencies must be considered since oil is generally paid for in dollars. Modes of payment are also a factor, with credit time which usually varies from 30 to 60 days and FOB or CIF terms. Finally, much of the Kingdom's oil is sold under longer-term contracts priced below speculative upward pricing pressures in recent months.

After taking into account both higher revenues and higher expenditures resulting from the crisis, a clear Saudi budget deficit results. Even after the collapse of world oil prices in the last decade, the Kingdom had an annual deficit generally somewhat less. So the trend, as well as the actual net budget outcome, is quite opposite from the mirage of a grand windfall.

It is also relevant that higher oil prices since early August are expected by practically all international energy experts to decline after the crisis. But expenditures resulting from the crisis and its aftermath are anticipated to be significant and long lasting. A realistic perspective would reasonably seem bound to take that into account in the interest of the international community as well as Saudi Arabia and the Gulf area.

As a bottom line to all this, King Fahd has made clear again and again, including within the last few days, that Saudi Arabia will meet its full share of the costs and other consequences of the Gulf crisis. The Kingdom's financial forthcomingness has been demonstrated not only in the present situation but for a number of years. Thus, over the last decade and a half Saudi Arabia has devoted around 7% of its gross national income (and at times 10%) to foreign aid. That compares with less than one-fourth of one percent by the developed nations for similar purposes.

I have gone on at greater length here than time demands on both of us might commend. But there is need to emphasize that the Kingdom is fully aware of what is at stake in the current crisis for the Gulf area and the Middle East more broadly as well as the international community and vital interests of both America and Saudi Arabia. That is why the Kingdom is firmly committed and steady on course. That course is full implementation of the resolutions since August 2nd by the United Nations Security Council, Arab League Summit and Islamic Conference Organization - without preconditions or equivocations which would in effect reward aggression. I believe you will agree with me that there should surely be no footdragging or feint-heartedness by any of us in facing up to the present crisis.

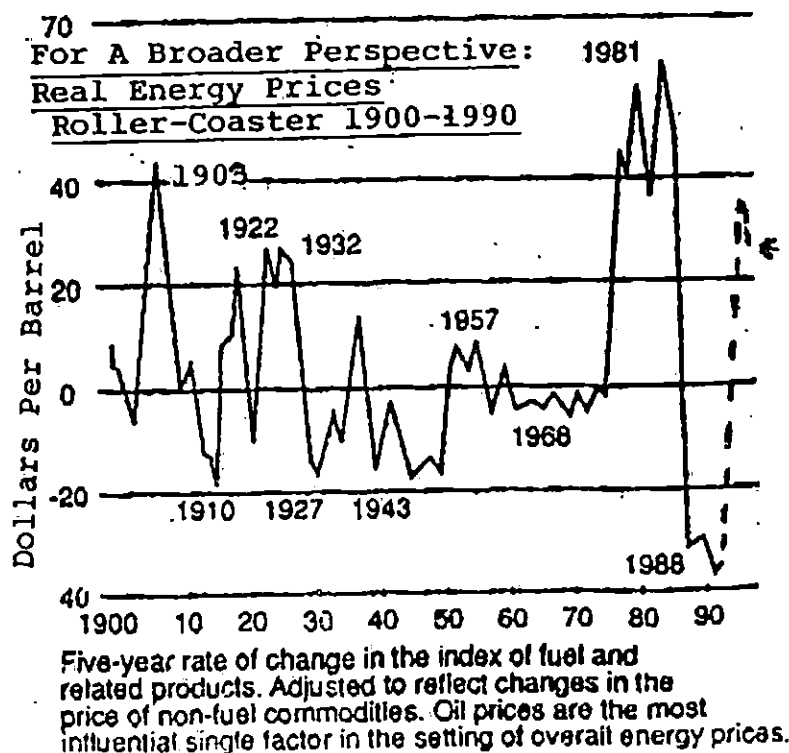
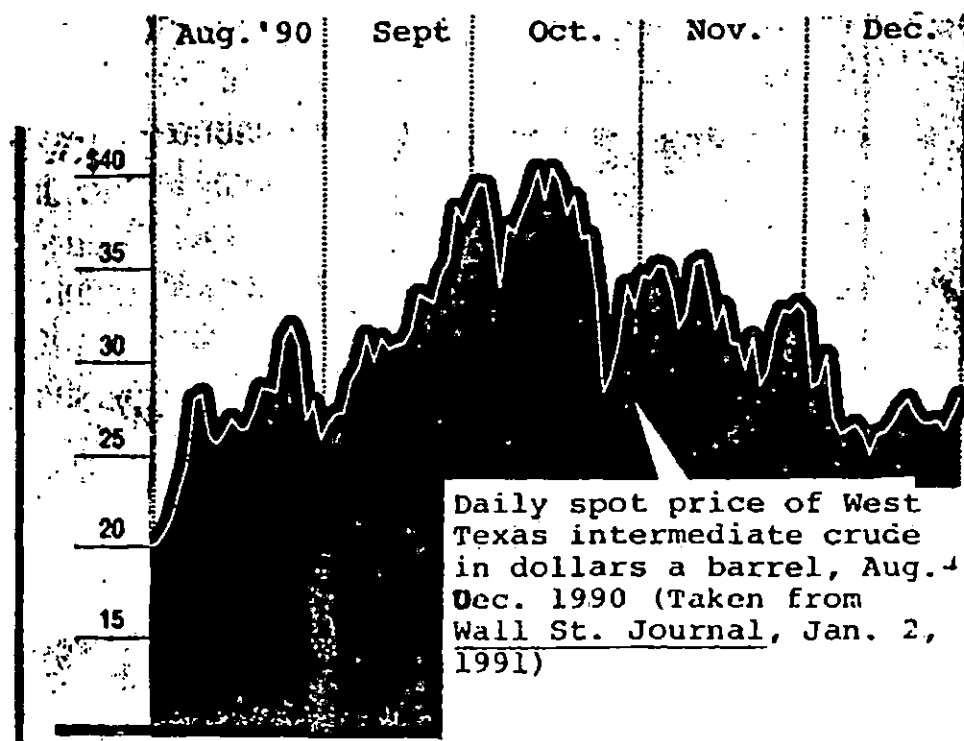

Dear Mr. Speaker:

As you know I have long felt that it would greatly enhance the chances for peace if the Congress went on record supporting the position taken by the U.N. Security Council in twelve separate resolutions. I have told you and the other leaders of Congress several times that the best way to guarantee Saddam's compliance with the U.N. Resolutions is for Congress to send a strong message of support for all the Resolutions, most specifically for Resolution 678.

Jim Baker will be meeting with Iraq's Foreign Minister on January 9th. It would have been most constructive if Secretary Baker could have presented the Iraq Government at that time a Resolution passed by both Houses of Congress strongly supporting the U.N. Resolutions and the foreign policy objectives that I have spelled out and that the other coalition partners strongly advocate and support.

Inasmuch as Congressional debate will not begin in earnest until January 10th, I would now request that the first order of business before both the House and Senate be a Resolution that supports all 12 of the relevant U.N. Resolutions. And further that the Congress specifically state that the President after January 14th should be empowered to "use all necessary means to uphold and implement the 12 U.N. Resolutions and to restore international peace and security in the area" (language of Resolution 678).

Regardless of the outcome of the Baker mission such action by the Congress would send the clearest possible message to Saddam Hussein that he must comply without concession and without delay in getting totally out of Kuwait.

I welcome a Resolution from the Congress that will send Saddam Hussein a strong message of support for this policy that has so much support around the world.

I am determined to do whatever is necessary to support the Coalition arrayed against Iraq's leader and to support all the relevant Resolutions passed by the U.N. Security Council. The last best chance for peace is for Congress to support me at this critical time.
