DeKLERK CALLS FOR END TO APARTHEID

CAPE TOWN -- President de Klerk Friday proposed the repeal of all major apartheid laws and promised to halt racial discrimination.

But thousands of people marched in nationwide protests to demand the immediate end of apartheid.

"Should parliament adopt the government's proposal, the South African statute books will be devoid, within months, of the remnants of racially discriminatory legislation," de Klerk said in his address to the opening session of parliament.

However, he rejected calls for a multi-racial interim government. He said the white-led government will remain in power until a new constitution is negotiated with the ANC and other opposition groups.

De Klerk said the government will propose scrapping the last three pillars of apartheid. He said it will call for ending outright the Group Areas Act and the land acts, while modifying the Population Registration Act in advance of its abolition..

ALLIED BOMBERS STRIKE SHIFTING IRAQI TROOPS

Allied bombers Thursday attacked thousands of Iraqi troops moving through southern Kuwait. U.S. officials said they were uncertain whether the Iraqi forces were massing for a major ground attack or attempting to reorganize after an unsuccessful offensive into Saudi Arabia earlier this week.

One intelligence official described the Iraqi forces as remnants of two or three divisions of mechanized reserves who had been moved close to the Saudi border to reinforce a four-pronged attack that was repulsed earlier this week. The intense bombing Thursday appeared to disrupt the Iraqi troop movements, causing some units to retreat northward away from the border, another official added.

Marine Harrier jump jets joined a swarm of other attack planes in blasting what one pilot said were an estimated 800 to 1,000 tanks, armored personnel carriers and trucks caught in the open during an apparent effort to resupply Iraqi troops in Kuwait.

"It's almost like you flipped on the light late at night and the cockroaches start scurrying, and we're killing them," Harrier squadron commander Lt. Col. Dick "Snake" White said....

Pentagon officials said Thursday night that an Air Force AC-130 gunship was apparently shot down over Kuwait during an attack sortie. The plane...was carrying at least 14 people.

Allies Bomb New Iraqi Column -- Bases Used in Spain -- To increase the number of B-52 bombing raids against Iraqi ground forces, the U.S. has been secretly basing some of its bombers in Spain and has obtained permission to use a British airfield as well, Western official said Thursday.

The use of the base in Spain, which was disclosed by administration officials, has been considered politically delicate because the Spanish government...has been trying in recent years to reduce the presence of American forces. SAUDI TOWN RECLAIMED; TRAPPED MARINES FREED

WITH U.S. MARINES ON THE OUTSKIRTS OF KHAFJI -- A fierce battle for this deserted coastal town ended Thursday when forces from Saudi Arabia and Qatar, backed by American artillery and air strikes, evicted Iraqi troops and tanks and freed two trapped U.S. Marine reconnaissance teams....

The [12] men were extracted from the town around noon Thursday, during the fight to reclaim Khafji....

Despite the apparent hit-and-run nature of the attacks this week, allied leaders were alert to the possibility that Iraq may be preparing a large-scale offensive, possibly to involve several divisions of armored troops. Lt. Gen. Boomer said in an interview that U.S. forces were observing "a lot of movement" among the Iraqis "in the last few days. We're watching very carefully to see if we can discern what he [Saddam] might try to do."

"They lost 90 percent of their forces," Saudi Gen. Khalid Bin Sultan said, adding that 200 Iraqi troops were killed or wounded in fighting that began Tuesday night. "It is tragic that so many good people should be driven to their death by their leaders."...

Iraqi artillery rockets hit outside Khafji during the night and the crack of rifle fire indicated that snipers were active.

U.S. SAYS IT WILL NOT BE PUSHED INTO GROUND WAR

President Bush and his commanders say they will not be drawn into a premature land battle in the Gulf war by Iraqi strikes against Saudi Arabia which the U.S. military rates as costly failures....

"We don't want to be drawn in. I don't think he can draw us in," Gen. Kelly, speaking for the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told a Pentagon briefing Thursday.

"The bombing campaign is going very well.... It would seem to me that we wouldn't want to engage in a ground war right now. I think that really is upsetting our principal adversary," he said.

He said Iraqi attacks along the Kuwait-Saudi border in the previous 48 hours may have been aimed more at boosting morale than conquest....

Bush told Jewish leaders at the White House he was "not anxious at this point" to enter into a ground war, said Shoshana Cardin, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations, who attended the meeting.

"I think he feels there is more to be done (in the air war) before beginning a major ground attack," she told reporters....

She quoted Bush as saying, "There will be no intermittent cease-fire" in the war. (Michael Conlin, AP)

Bush Said To Be Not Anxious For Ground War -- ...Cardin quoted the President as saying "'The war is on target. The schedule is being met. They're (allied forces) achieving their objectives.'"

She also reported that Bush said that "there will be no intermittent cease-fire," adding that the President plans to "stay the course."

Cardin said that the leaders had a very productive and reassuring meeting.

"We told the President we commend the strength of his determination to remove evil from the world," she added. "This is a moral war, a just war. There is an evil individual inflicting danger and harm and we believe the course he is taking is the correct course."

Cardin said the Jewish leaders have learned that the U.S. alliance with Israel "is a credible one." (Helen Thomas, UPI)

U.S. In No Hurry To Invade -- The Bush administration said Thursday that it is not ready to send U.S. forces into Iraq or Kuwait.

"We're in no hurry to engage in a ground campaign," Vice President Quayle said at a London news conference with Prime Minister Major. LONDON -- Vice President Quayle said Friday he expected Saddam Hussein to use chemical weapons at some point during the Gulf war.

Asked by a BBC radio interviewer whether he believed Saddam would unleash chemical weapons, Quayle replied, "Eventually he probably will. He has used them in the past. He has said that he will."

"He has the (chemical) capability on artillery and short-range weapons so our anticipation (is that) at some time, at his choosing, he will unfortunately use chemical weapons." (Reuter)

Effort Would Address Arab-Israeli Dispute**

The Bush administration is crafting a broad postwar peace plan for the Middle East that would address the Arab-Israeli conflict, regional security, arms control and the economic disparities underlying the area's turmoil, according to administration officials.

A planning document examining options for a postwar peace effort has been sent to Secretary Baker. However, a State Department official said Baker has not yet made any decisions on the options developed by senior department officials....

"This is not a how-to document, but a big picture, a broad brush," said a senior administration official familiar with the planning. "It would be practical and politically smart" to sketch out the overall thrust of the administration's vision before the hostilities have ended, the official added. "We can't just say when the shooting stops, someone else should pick up the ball."

START NEGOTIATIONS SAID TO YIELD PROGRESS

The U.S. and Soviet Union made progress this week toward completing the START treaty, but remained at loggerheads on Soviet compliance with the recently signed CFE treaty, administration officials said Thursday.

The Soviets offered a "package deal" to settle most the outstanding issues in the way of the START treaty, according to Soviet officials, but the U.S. has not yet formally responded. A U.S. official speaking on the condition of anonymity said the Soviet positions did not lay the basis for an easy compromise.

On several issues, the U.S. officials said, Soviet negotiators reconfirmed agreements that had been tentatively reached last December when Secretary Baker met then-Foreign Minister Shevardnadze in Houston. The moves this week followed a temporary suspension of some parts of the deal by the Soviet Foreign Ministry, apparently under pressure from the General Staff of the Soviet Armed Forces.

After Shevardnadze's December resignation, which may have been prompted partly by his disputes with the Soviet military, "they walked back [on] some of what we had agreed to at Houston," a senior U.S. official said. In the past few days, "they walked back partially on the walkback," the official said.

As much as \$20 billion of the savings is targeted to come from Medicare, about \$3 billion of it in the year that begins Oct. 1....

Budget experts familiar with Bush's near-\$1.5 trillion budget proposal said the administration hopes to take advantage of last year's deficit-reduction agreement to eliminate or transfer to the states more than \$30 billion in domestic federal spending.

Up to \$17 billion would be freed from curtailed or eliminated programs and would be targeted for administration initiatives in children's health, education, science, research and repair of the nation's deteriorating highway system.

"That is a significant amount of the domestic dollars that are available," said Stanley Collender, a fiscal policy expert at the national accounting firm Price Waterhouse.

Sen. Gramm predicted a new tenor to the budget debate, saying: "The President's budget proposal is far from the usual. It represents a new blueprint for the American government."...

What really counts are the mandatory spending caps that will apply to both military and domestic discretionary spending programs....

"Most of the attention will be focused on how to allocate what is there," Collender said. "The decisions made will be ones that affect people directly." (Robert Dodge, Dallas Morning News)

BUSH PROPOSES 11% INCREASE IN DRUG WAR SPENDING

President Bush Thursday proposed an 11 percent increase in spending on the war against drugs and declared the administration has achieved the goals set in September 1989 when the first national drug control strategy was unveiled.

Announcing an updated strategy and new budget proposals for fiscal year 1992, Bush said the request to add nearly \$1.2 billion to the current budget of \$10.5 billion "persuasively demonstrates that our administration is committed to defending the menace of drugs."...

Officials at the Office of National Drug Control Policy were informed only Wednesday that the President, who has come under criticism for neglecting domestic issues, might want to announce the drug strategy Thursday.

Bush seemed to allude to that impetus in his remarks. "I expect some to wonder whether I am totally preoccupied with events halfway around the world," Bush said. "And I really wanted to take this opportunity to come over here to you who have done so much in this fight to let you know you're not alone."

Bush Ups Ante In Drug War -- President Bush, under pressure to hold the line on the federal budget, Thursday proposed an 11 percent spending increase in the war on drugs that will greatly expand drug treatment.

While federal reports have indicated that drug use and drug-related crimes are down, Bush said the new efforts must march ahead to reap victory by the year 2001.

Calling the reports "welcome news," the President said: "You might ask, can we lessen our commitment to stopping the scourge of drugs? Can we afford to look elsewhere, lose interest? Can we declare victory? And, of course, the answer is an emphatic 'no.'..."

Acting drug czar John Walters later told reporters that the budget request for 1992 will add \$156 million, or 10 percent, to the treatment program....

The new drug strategy includes spending for international anti-drug programs, construction of jails and increases for law enforcement.

Bush Proposes More Anti-Drug Spending -- ...Independent drug experts and congressional critics asserted that while spending for treatment would rise by \$260 million in the President's plan, the proportion of the total budget designated for health-related problems would decline, to 30.3 percent from 31.2 in the current fiscal year.

"Despite its rhetoric to the contrary, the administration continues to short-change treatment and prevention programs that reduce the demand for drugs," said Sen. Kennedy.

Mathea Falco, an assistant secretary of state for international narcotic matters in the Carter administration...said Bush's drug strategy was "more of the same."

Falco said in a telephone interview from New York: "Its dominant focus is on keeping supplies from coming into the country and keeping them off the streets. It still does not recognize that reducing demand must be the first priority. We know that sealing the border is impossible, but the strategy continues to try to do it."

David Tell, deputy chief of staff of the administration's Office of National Drug Control Policy, said the increased funds sought by Bush would be used "across the board in all major functional areas." But the largest increase would go to domestic law enforcement...which would receive 14 percent more than in the current fiscal year. (Joseph Treaster, New York Times, A12)

1991 DEFENSE BUDGET TO CONTINUE MILITARY CUTBACKS DESPITE GULF WAR

The Bush administration is readying a fiscal 1992 defense budget that would continue the cutback in military spending begun last year, despite the stepped-up war in the Gulf and recent setbacks in the Soviet Union's move toward democratic reforms.

The new spending plan, to be disclosed on Monday, is expected to propose cutting military outlays by a sharp 3.3% after inflation, reducing further the number of military personnel and canceling two key nuclear missile programs.

"We are anticipating peace," a senior Pentagon official said Thursday. In fact, he added, "We're banking on it."

SOCIAL SECURITY TAX MORE LIKELY TO BE CUT

President Bush wants to cut the capital gains tax rate, but a growing alliance of liberals and conservatives now believes a Social Security payroll tax cut has a much better chance of being enacted.

Not only is the proposal winning new bipartisan support in Congress, but it is getting strong backing from a number of politically disparate groups, including the AFL-CIO, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the Committee to Preserve Social Security.

Supporters say cutting the payroll tax has much stronger grass-roots political appeal than the Bush proposal to cut taxes on the profit from the sale of assets.

The White House, which actively opposed the payroll tax cut last year, is holding back to see if a groundswell develops, according to congressional sources, though presidential aides cite new polling data against the proposal.

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SENATE REFUSES TO SUSPEND BUDGET AGREEMENT

Senate Democrats and Republicans...joined forces to keep the agreement intact despite the recession.

LIMITED SDI PROGRAM MIGHT COST \$9 BILLION

The revamped SDI program announced Tuesday envisions Patriot-like interceptors deployed with U.S. ground forces or aboard ships in crisis spots to turn away short-range missile attacks.

A senior Pentagon official, offering fresh details of the scaled-back...plan, estimated the cost of this project Thursday at \$9 billion. A separate project to defend primarily against long-range missiles would cost another \$32 billion.

Defense Department planning documents predict that an improved version of the Patriot could be deployed by 1993, with more advanced weapons a few years later.

**REILLY INVOKING CLEAN AIR LAW
TO CLEAR VISTA AT GRAND CANYON**

In the first use of federal law to protect scenic vistas within a national park, EPA Administrator Reilly has decided to order an Arizona power plant to stop polluting the air over the Grand Canyon.

The decision, which is expected to be announced today and is subject to agency review, is aimed at thinning persistent haze that on some winter days makes the canyon's vivid colors and spectacular rock formations all but invisible to a tourist standing on its rim....

Reilly had difficulty convincing some administration officials that merely improving views of the canyon was worth the costs -- estimated at up to \$2.3 billion -- of installing anti-pollution controls on the Navajo Generating Station 80 miles to the northeast.

He backed off the agency's original proposal to remove 90 percent of the sulfurous emissions from the coal-fired plant, accepting 70 percent as a compromise. The concession drew sharp criticism from environmentalists and National Park Service officers.

**FDIC, BANKS WEIGH BORROWING PROPOSALS
Funds Would Be Used To Pay For Failures**

FDIC officials and banking industry leaders said Thursday they are considering proposals to borrow the money needed to pay for bank failures as a way to avoid directly asking taxpayers to bail out the bank insurance fund....

Thursday, for the first time, FDIC Chairman Seidman acknowledged that the fund could run out of money this year if the current recession drags on longer than expected and causes more banks to fail.

However, "There is no crisis here," Seidman emphasized. "At this point I don't see any likelihood that we will have to go to the taxpayer."

Bleak Forecasts For The FDIC Are Challenged -- L. William Seidman, the nation's top banking regulator, Thursday flatly contradicted forecasts that the bank insurance fund he manages would be insolvent within the next two years.

On the defensive against a growing chorus of criticism on Capitol Hill and mounting concern among administration officials, Seidman disputed suggestions that a taxpayer bailout would be required to keep the fund that protects bank deposits afloat.

The bank insurance fund would be "weak but solvent" under the "most widely held view on expected economic conditions," Seidman said at a news conference this morning. "There is no crisis here. What we have is sufficient to handle what we foresee now."

But Seidman...did hedge his prediction, noting that if the recession lasted longer than a year, a prospect he called unlikely, then the bank insurance fund might be insolvent by the end of the year.

**UNEMPLOYMENT TO KEEP RISING
EVEN IF RECESSION MILD, ANALYSTS SAY**

The nation's unemployment rate, surging at its fastest pace since 1982, will jump higher in coming months even if the worst of the recession is over, many analysts predict.

More layoffs and hiring freezes -- already one million Americans have joined the ranks of the unemployed since last June -- are likely because unemployment is one of the last areas to be touched by a recession, economists said.

"In the early phases of recession, they're slow to lay people off, and when the economy is recovering, they're slow to hire them back because they're unsure of what's happening," said Elliott Platt, an economist with Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette Securities Corp....

"It takes a while to convince businesses that it's time to start hiring again," said David Wyss of DRI-McGraw Hill.

The 1980s were a "terrible decade for children," with clear deterioration from 1980 to 1988 in their social and economic condition...according to a national study released Friday....

Nationally, there were substantial increases in the percentages of children in poverty, juveniles who are incarcerated, out-of-wedlock births and teen violent deaths. There was also an increase, though smaller, in the percentage of babies born at low birth weights, which lead to physical and mental impairments and sometimes death.

The only improvements were in child death rates, infant mortality rates and the percentage graduating from high school.

GULF WAR

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin again tonight with the first land battle fought in the Persian Gulf war, a psychological lift as far as Saddam Hussein is concerned, who calls it a thunderous storm in the Arab desert -- but a military defeat, as far as we know; what the U.S. Commander-in-Chief says was like a mosquito on the back of an elephant. Behind the rhetoric of the day, real concern about trying to stop 50-60,000 Iraqi men and hundreds of tanks apparently now moving down along the frontier. There are early reports of a real battle actually shaping up. We also learned today that a fairly large U.S. plane with more than a dozen people aboard is missing behind Iraqi lines. Two soldiers, a man and a woman, are missing along the front lines. As for that Iraqi offensive northwest of Khafji over the last couple of years, 11 -- not 12 -- Marines were killed. And two soldiers who were missing at Khafji have been rescued.

ABC's Bill Redeker reports on the battle for Khafji. Marines, who provided some backup support for Arab coalition forces, said they were frustrated the Iraqis were able to hold the city for more than 36 hours. The Iraqis were eventually chased back into Kuwait. The coalition forces are claiming victory and say they are holding 160 Iraqi prisoners of war. Still, an American officer in the area says the recapture of Khafji was extremely confusing as U.S., Saudi and Qatari forces tried to coordinate operations.

ABC's Jim Hickey reports on the air battle. By all accounts, there was a massive air assault on Iraqi forces to keep them coming into Khafji. There could have been too many planes, all jockeying for targets in seemingly uncoordinated bombing runs. Because of the crowded skies and competition for targets, some pilots said they began to run low on fuel and had to return to base without dropping their bombs.

ABC's Bob Zelnick reports from the Pentagon that U.S. officials say Iraqi troops fought poorly at Khafji. But officials here also say privately the Saudi forces displayed little initiative and required help from Marine units.

Jennings reports the Pentagon gave no comment on the statement by Baghdad Radio today that Iraq is holding female prisoners. Jennings examines the role of women in the combat zone historically and in the Gulf war.

Jennings reports a federal judge has ruled the Pentagon may require troops in the Gulf to take unapproved drugs to protect against possible germ warfare.

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Jennings reports the Iraqis fired another Scud at Israel today. This time it landed on the occupied West Bank, which ironically means the Palestinians were the most in danger. Nobody was hurt. There is a debate in Tel Aviv about whether it is the people's patriotic duty to stay in town. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: American military officials seem to be more confident than ever tonight that, overall, Operation Desert Storm is going very well. But another Iraqi ground attack may be coming soon. The Iraqis could be preparing for another run at the Saudi border near Khafji, which they gained and then lost to Arab and American forces today.

NBC's Brad Willis reports from Khafji on the battle.

NBC's Arthur Kent reports from Saudi Arabia that both U.S. and allied commanders say they would welcome more incursions by Saddam Hussein's tanks. Allied commanders say that aside from the Khafji incident, their forces responded well and are prepared for more probing by Saddam's troops.

NBC's Fred Francis reports the analysis at the Pentagon that if there is another incursion by Iraq, it is a desperation move in Baghdad. One senior official told NBC News, "These helpless attacks are an early indication that Saddam may be trying for one major land battle before calling it quits."

NBC's Ed Rabel reports on a surprise international conference in Iran on ways to end the fighting. Allowing Iraqi jet fighters to land here is interpreted by some military analysts as Iran lending a helping hand to Iraq. The new moderate Iranian leaders may see the moment as an opportune time to so influence events that after the war ends, Iran will emerge as the superpower in the region, according to top Mideast analysts. President Rafsanjani is expected to meet with reporters on Monday to answer questions about this peace conference and also about the Iraqi jets. (NBC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Aspell reports Iraqi television shows pictures of an Iraqi hospital in Basra. An Iraqi doctor says the hospital was damaged last Saturday. He says artillery shells and missiles hit nearby and patients were killed in their beds. Other videotapes made available today show extensive damage to another Iraqi town. There is nothing to suggest a military target in the pictures, but there is no independent confirmation of civilian casualties. Iraq's Revolutionary Command Council has claimed that towns all over the country have been damaged in allied air raids. There is no way for us to verify Iraqi claims that civilian areas are being deliberately targeted by allied planes. It is clear, however, that civilian areas are being damaged.

NBC's George Lewis reports from Dhahran on how Saudi Arabia reacted to the beginning of combat. The sudden influx of GIs, with the inevitable culture clashes, has taxed local hospitality at times. But the Saudis still profess a strong gratitude for the U.S. military presence.

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NBC's Andrea Mitchell reports on the role of women in Desert Storm and the controversy surrounding the prohibition on combat roles.

(Rep. Schroeder: "The bottom line is the only thing they're protecting women from are career promotions.")

(Rep. Montgomery: "...Some women just don't have that strength.") But military women say women have acted in combat.

NBC's John Cochran: The White House and the State Department were still busy today with damage control in the aftermath of the flap with the Soviets over that joint statement on Mideast policy. Leaders of Jewish-American groups came to the White House today looking for reassurance that President Bush is not mixing his war goals with the Arab-Israeli conflict. On Tuesday, Secretary Baker and Foreign Minister Bessmertnykh issued a joint statement on the Gulf war. One sentence in particular set off alarms in Washington and Jerusalem: "In the aftermath of the crisis in the Persian Gulf, mutual U.S.-Soviet efforts to promote Arab-Israeli peace will be greatly facilitated." Prime Minister Shamir quickly complained he was not consulted about the statement. But Jewish leaders who met with President Bush were satisfied.

(Shoshana Cardin: "There is no change in policy. There will not be any imposition. Israel will not be dictated to.")

Everyone at the White House privately admits that the joint statement with the Soviets was very badly written, but they insist it was just a Jim Baker goof, not a nasty hint to Jerusalem.

Brokaw reports Marine officers have been visiting the homes of the fallen today.

NBC's Mike Jensen reports American companies are lining up to get a piece of the job repairing Kuwait. American companies will get most of the contracts. (NBC-3)

NBC's Roger O'Neill reports on people being called back to duty who are torn about going. A lieutenant colonel, retired after 25 years' service, is a doctor who believes his rural Kansas hospital will close if he is not there. There are at least 50 small towns across the country who are asking the military to let their doctors come home. The army has approved six hardship exemptions so far. (Sen. Dole: "If you lose your hospital in a small town like St. John, you might as well start rolling up Main Street.") (NBC-8)

CBS's Dan Rather: The U.S. military says allied forces have recaptured Khafji; that's after two days of fierce fighting against a stubborn Iraqi invading force. Tonight, new clashes are reported with a much bigger Iraqi force west along the Kuwaiti border. A large column of Iraqi armor said to have been moving toward the Kuwaiti border is being pounded by B-52s. Earlier, Iraq said it has captured male and female American soldiers. U.S. officials said they are looking for two missing soldiers, a man and a woman, whose military vehicle was found empty near the Kuwaiti border. Behind enemy lines, another U.S. plane shot down. It's believed to be a large electronic warfare craft with about 20 Americans aboard. In the battle for Khafji, the Pentagon says allied forces wound up destroying 42 Iraqi tanks and 35 other vehicles and took 161 Iraqi prisoners.

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CBS's Scott Pelley reports on the battle for Khafji. The loss of Khafji and several failed attempts to retake it embarrassed the coalition. Today, U.S. commanders insisted only Arab ground troops were involved. But U.S. Marine ground troops were in the fight. At least 161 Iraqis were taken prisoner; the POWs say they were forced to fight against their will.

Rather: President Bush had his spokesman say today that the U.S. strategy on the ground in Saudi Arabia is exactly right. This came as Iraqi ground forces were said to be massing and on the move again in southern Kuwait and U.S. forces were in the sky again pounding Iraqi positions.

CBS's David Martin reports on how the war is going. The Pentagon says it is determined not to fight the kind of [ground] war Saddam wants to fight.

Rather: President Bush was quoted again today as saying it is not yet time to launch a ground war to force Saddam Hussein out of Kuwait.

CBS's Bob Schieffer says the time is drawing closer when the President will have to make what members of Congress are already calling his toughest decision since the war began: whether to shift the attack to the ground.

(Rep. Aspin: "The clear, predominant view of congressmen when you talk to them is let's just take the bombing campaign as long as we can.")

CBS's Bruce Morton reports the American dead have started coming home.

CBS's John Blackstone reports that thousands of people who believed their years of active military service were well behind them reported for duty today. They are members of what is called the Individual Ready Reserve. They are discovering what may have seemed like fine print when they enlisted is in fact a binding contract that is putting them back in uniform. The Army is making no apologies. Some are resisting.

Rather reports a British journalist who was detained by Iraqi troops wrote that he was beaten, stripped and deprived of food and even a toilet. Bruce Cheeseman said he was arrested during the first night of bombing in Baghdad by Iraqi troops who accused him of being an American pilot.

CBS's Doug Tunnell reports from Jordan that many foreigners are fleeing from Iraq to Jordan. Authorities say four Jordanians have died in allied air strikes while en route to the border. But there have been others. Many are missing and no one is keeping count. Eyewitnesses say allied jets now target almost anything that moves.

CBS's Peter Van Sant reports that night after night, affluent draft-age Kuwaitis go to discos, casinos and night clubs in Egypt. Aware that this constant partying is an affront to almost everyone, cameras and reporters are not allowed into the Kuwaiti night spots. When the 30,000 Kuwaitis living in Cairo were asked to pray for their country's liberation, just a handful turned out at local mosques. Embarrassed Kuwaiti leaders admit they have a disco problem. (CBS-Lead)

SDI

ABC's Dennis Troute reports on the results of SDI tests released today. The Pentagon says the results are proof that star wars technology can work. Star wars advocates are seizing on the success of their own tests and that of the Patriot to argue that anti-missile technology is both promising and necessary. They hope to get Congress to restore funding for the star wars program, but many analysts say the Scuds and even the Patriots are relatively primitive and cannot really show what star wars might or might not do.

(John Pike, scientist: "I don't think that the success of the Patriots against Scuds says anything about the ability of star wars to intercept nuclear missiles.")

Pentagon officials say there will be no better time to ask Congress to invest in one more unproven technology. And they point out that before the Gulf war, the Patriot was unproven too. (ABC-2)

Brokaw interviews scientists Daniel Graham, an SDI proponent, and John Pike, an opponent. Graham says the impetus toward defending against ballistic missiles given by Ronald Reagan was the reason the Patriot program really got started. Pike says the Patriot is entirely appropriate but the longer-range nuclear missiles aimed at the U.S. are going to be coming much faster and the warheads are going to be smaller. Also, even missing one of them would destroy a city. (NBC-5)

PAN AM/IRAQI NATIONALS

Jennings reports a civil rights group in New York City has taken Pan Am to court to try to stop them from keeping Iraqi nationals off Pan Am flights simply because they are Iraqis. The National Emergency Civil Liberties Committee says the Pan Am policy revives memories of the U.S. World War II internment of all Japanese-Americans. (ABC-5)

GULF WAR/ROUTE 83

Jennings introduces a series of occasional reports from points along Route 83, which divides the U.S. north/south nearly down the middle, on how people are affected by the war.

ABC's Tom Foreman begins in Minot, North Dakota, near the sites of many nuclear missiles. A lot of people around Minot will tell you this town supports the war. A few will tell you it raises all their old fears. But many believe this war, with its patriotism, will bring back an American spirit they think was lost long ago. (ABC-7)

ECONOMY

ABC's Stephen Aug reports Fed Chairman Greenspan says that if the war lasts past April, consumers could become so uncertain about the future that they would cut back even further on buying. Greenspan said that more than at any time in the recent past, the economy now is subject to changes in psychology. Greenspan says the recession is being made worse by lack of credit. He wants bank examiners not to be so critical, so bankers will agree to lend more. Members of the House Banking Committee agreed that businesspeople are suffering, even those who have good relations with their bankers. Greenspan faces opposition from other bank regulators who worry this could lead to more bank failures. (ABC-4)

NBC's Irving R. Levine reports on the warnings by William Seidman that the bank insurance fund is headed toward empty. The outlook is that the fund will run out if the recession runs through this year. At a closed meeting today, bankers heard a government plan for banks to pay higher insurance premiums to replenish the fund. But that could worsen the problem; the contention is that when you make a healthy bank pay more into the fund, the risk you run is that some of those healthy banks will be forced into insolvency. Officials say the cost of rescuing the FDIC won't fall on taxpayers unless the number of bank failures turns out to be higher than anyone now expects. (NBC-6)

DRUG STRATEGY

Brokaw: President Bush called for an 11% increase in spending to fight drugs. That would raise the total drug spending to almost \$12 billion.

NBC's Lisa Myers: To prove he isn't preoccupied with the Gulf war, the President briefly turned his attention today to a war here at home, the drug war. He said the big budget increase should secure victory.

(President Bush: "And I believe it persuasively demonstrates that our Administration is committed to defeating the menace of drugs and that that commitment is unswerving.")

The commitment to law enforcement also remains unswerving. It gets almost half the new budget. Bush says he's not changing strategy, because this strategy is working. According to the new report, the Administration's goal was to reduce overall drug use and casual cocaine use by 10% each. They're down 11% and 29%. The Administration also claims to have reduced the number of heavy cocaine users. But most experts challenged that, which is one reason the President today was emphasizing drug treatment.

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Myers continues: However, a recent report estimates it will cost 20 times that much in additional spending to treat all those who need it. SENATE FLOOR: Agent Orange measure cleared for president.

Senators yesterday cleared, 99-0, a bill (HR 556) that would compensate veterans with certain diseases linked to their exposure to Agent Orange, a defoliant used during the Vietnam War and blamed by many veterans for various health complications.

The House passed the bill Tuesday, and President Bush is expected to sign the bill into law shortly.

"Today we are finally beginning to resolve a problem that has plagued Vietnam veterans and their families for over 20 years," said Tom Daschle, D-S.D., the chief supporter of the legislation in the Senate.

The Senate also gave voice vote approval to a bill (S 296) that would provide special immigration status for aliens who have served in the United States armed forces or who have enlisted to serve for at least 12 years.

HOUSE FLOOR: VA pay bill for doctors, dentists, gains approval.

Legislation (HR 598) designed to help the Veterans Affairs Department (VA) recruit and retain physicians and dentists easily passed the House yesterday.

By a 399-0 vote, lawmakers passed the measure, which would authorize the VA to pay physicians and dentists at a special pay rate. HR 598 would also authorize collective bargaining for health-care personnel.

BENEFITS FOR Persian Gulf troops unanimously approved.

The Senate Armed Services Committee yesterday unanimously approved a package of bills designed to increase benefits for military personnel serving in the Persian Gulf.

The action came one day after the House had approved a package of bills that would provide strengthened job protection and economic benefits for troops

in the gulf and their families.

Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said that the legislation is needed to "ensure that our military personnel are fully supported."

The committee approved five measures that may be rolled into an omnibus bill for floor consideration. One measure (S 237) introduced by Nunn would increase imminent danger pay for troops in the Persian Gulf from \$110 to \$150 per month.

The panel also approved a bill (S 232) that would double — from \$50,000 to \$100,000 — the amount of life insurance provided for members of the military. The measure would guarantee that survivors of those killed in Operation Desert Shield or Operation Desert Storm would receive double the insurance they were due at the time of their death.

Other measures approved by the panel would:

- Give members leaving the military the same 26 weeks of unemployment benefits available to civilians who lose their jobs (S 160).

- Allow retired military personnel recalled to active duty to serve at the highest grade they held while on active duty (S 204).

- Authorize troops serving in the Persian Gulf to invest their pay in a Treasury savings program with an interest rate of up to 10 percent (S 221). The committee added a provision that would remove the \$10,000 cap on savings for military personnel who are missing or are prisoners of war.

LABOR NOMINEE says she'll help move parental leave bill.

Former Rep. Lynn Martin, R-Ill., President Bush's nominee to serve as Labor secretary, told members of the Senate Labor Committee yesterday that she hoped to act as a "fulcrum" in the ongoing debate over parental leave legislation.

Today

Floor Action: The Senate will vote on a resolution (S J Res 44) that would allow Congress to disregard tough new federal spending caps and pay-as-you-go rules in the face of a recession. Under last year's anti-deficit law, the Senate is required to take up the measure; but, congressional leaders oppose its adoption. The Senate Budget panel sent the resolution on to the floor with a recommendation that it be defeated.

The House is in pro forma session.

Older Americans: The Senate Labor Subcommittee on Aging will look into the effectiveness of current programs to aid the elderly and ways to improve the delivery of services. The hearing is the first in a series by the subcommittee, as it prepares to reauthorize the 1965 Older Americans Act.

The act provides funding for state and local nutrition and legal services programs for older Americans.

Today's hearing will focus on how well the programs under the law protect the rights of the elderly, with special attention on the legal services and nursing home programs.

Congress last reauthorized the act in 1987. In 1990, lawmakers appropriated \$1.3 billion for the programs under the act.

One issue that lawmakers will confront in crafting a bill this year is how to better serve the poor and minority elderly. Some say that the poor elderly are not receiving the aid they need. And minority participation in these programs has been declining steadily.

Another issue is whether to require those who can afford it to pay for some of the services they receive. Under current law, there is no "means testing," nor are any elderly required to pay for benefits. Instead, those who are able to pay for services are encouraged to give a voluntary contribution.

As a member of the House last year, Martin voted in favor of legislation mandating unpaid leave for workers caring for newborns or seriously ill family members, a bill that Bush vetoed. She said she thought it was significant that Bush nominated her for the Labor post even though they disagreed on the Family and Medical Leave Act.

Democratic leaders in both chambers have vowed to pass a parental leave

measure again early this year.

"He doesn't want 'yes' women and 'yes' men," she said at yesterday's Labor Committee confirmation hearing. "I assure you, I intend to give him my best advice."

In the 101st Congress, Martin also differed with Bush over civil rights legislation designed to shore up guarantees against employment discrimination and on an increase in the federal minimum wage. Bush vetoed both bills, although he latter reached a compromise with Con-

gress on the minimum wage boost.

Bush had insisted that the civil rights measure, which would have made it easier to prove job discrimination, could prompt employers to adopt hiring and promotion quotas to avoid lawsuits.

Martin told the Senate committee that she did not believe quotas help people meet the American dream, adding: "I couldn't serve the president if I did not share his policies of opportunity."

Bush Speech Wins GOP Raves; Democrats' Views Mixed

After President Bush completed his State of the Union speech Tuesday night, lawmakers on Capitol Hill were left pondering his wartime address and its proper place in history.

Only two weeks into the Persian Gulf War, lawmakers were looking for Bush to deliver an address defining the conflict and providing a vision of a post-war America. Some members thought they heard such a speech; some didn't.

Members from both parties seemed impressed by Bush's resolute stance against Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein, but many Democrats had misgivings about what they viewed as the president's failure to adequately advance a domestic agenda.

Republicans were effusive in their praise.

Sen. Connie Mack, R-Fla., told reporters after the speech, "I think it will go down as an historic speech."

GOP Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, called the address a "powerful message" that appropriately focused on the war. "My momma watched tonight to hear the president talk about the Persian Gulf," he added.

But many Democratic legislators complained that Bush's domestic proposals were just rhetoric, with little substance to back them up.

Rep. William H. Gray III, D-Pa., said the speech characterized the essence of the Bush presidency. "It was good on foreign policy, weak on domestic policy," he said. "It looks like we are going to shoot real bullets at Saddam Hussein and shoot blanks on the home front," Gray said.

Domestic Agenda. With the nation at war, it seemed reasonable to many members that the president devoted less of his speech to the domestic outlook.

As Rep. Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y., put it: "No one would have expected Franklin Roosevelt to have laid down a large domestic agenda in his congressional address in 1942."

Still, a large domestic agenda awaits members, including the thrifing bailout, banking restructuring, antirecession measures, an eroding transportation infrastructure and campaign financing.

Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, said that as critical as the situation is in the gulf, "the other business of the nation won't wait. . . . We have a crisis abroad, but we also have a crisis at home." Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., said, "The domestic part of the speech was unreal in many respects. The president knows all the heads of state, but he does not know the heads of our school systems."

More details of the administration's domestic programs will be made available to members on Monday when the president's budget comes out. And comprehensive proposals on the banking system, energy and transportation are expected on Capitol Hill in the next two weeks. But that didn't mean early debate was off limits.

"We're both going to be beating down the same budget path. It will be new programs versus old and worn-out pro-

grams," said New Mexico Republican Sen. Pete V. Domenici.

Star Wars. One of the surprises of the speech that prompted quick reaction was Bush's call to pursue a re-focused strategic defense initiative program to protect the United States and its allies "from limited ballistic missile strikes — whatever their source."

Bush will seek \$4.5 billion for the "star wars" program in Monday's budget, White House officials said yesterday. But Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, said the star wars concept is still an academic notion and should be treated as nothing more.

Rep. Charles E. Bennett, D-Fla., a long-time member of the Armed Services Committee, said that perhaps in place of a massive space-based defense system Congress could "explore upgrading the Patriot further to give it the ability to protect wider areas and interdict more capable tactical missiles."

Capital Gains. While it was not a surprise that Bush would once again call for a capital gains tax cut, his announcement that Federal Reserve Board Chairman Alan Greenspan would head a study group on capital gains was seen as an attempt to avoid another partisan brouhaha over whether a capital gains cut is nothing more than a gift to the wealthy or is a worthwhile revenue raiser.

Domenici said appointment of a "blue ribbon panel to study capital gains will allow for the rhetoric to be taken away from Congress. There is no one here who knows the answer. Let the true economists look at it."

Rally Point. The annual prime-time, televised State of the Union address is an opportunity for the president to rally Congress and the nation behind him. Bush used Tuesday evening's speech to attempt just that. While focused specifically on the troops in the Persian Gulf, he made it clear that a large "defining hour" was at hand and that nothing less than a "new world order" was at stake in the battle against Iraq.

Said Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole, Kan., "Now that Saddam Hussein has surely heard the state of our union and the state of our unity, maybe he'll finally understand what a nation of principle is all about."

In particular, legislators reacted to Bush's declaration: "There is no one more devoted, more committed to the hard work of freedom, than every soldier and sailor, every Marine, airman and Coast Guardsman — every man and woman now serving in the Persian Gulf."

Members rose for an ovation that lasted more than two minutes. Sen. John W. Warner, R-Va., called it the "longest standing ovation I've seen in my 12 years in the Senate."

Not as impressed with the call to rally the troops was Delaware's Joseph R. Biden Jr., D, who said the speech "should have been the place for the president to prepare the country for the real sacrifices of a ground war."

RECORD DEFICIT in fiscal 1991, Reischauer warns.

The U.S. government is going to rack up a record deficit of at least \$298 billion this year, the head of the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) told the House Budget Committee yesterday.

The deficit will be even higher, CBO Director Robert D. Reischauer warned, when the costs of the Persian Gulf War are included. He said that while the war was "sure to add to" the deficit, the additional amount was uncertain because U.S. allies have pledged to help defray the war's expenses.

Yesterday's deficit projection was substantially more than the \$253 billion deficit the CBO forecast in December. Reischauer attributed the increase to the recession and the ongoing bailout of savings and loans. The deficit will also be the highest federal deficit on record, eclipsing the \$221.2 billion deficit in fiscal 1986.

But the CBO projections were somewhat more optimistic than estimates made Sunday by White House budget director Richard G. Darman.

Darman projected the deficit would be \$318 billion for fiscal 1991 and \$281 billion in fiscal 1992.

Reischauer predicted yesterday that the deficit for fiscal 1992 would be about as large as the fiscal 1991 shortfall — as long as Congress and the president stick to spending limits set under last year's budget deal.

Panel Chairman Leon E. Panetta, D-Calif., seemed clearly frustrated that after five years of struggle, the deficit was as bad, or worse, than ever.

"I never see the light at the end of the tunnel," Panetta said. "Everybody predicts it... but we never get there. We never get there. There's something fundamentally wrong."

Reischauer did tell lawmakers that the recession was likely to be a short one, with renewed growth possible as early as the second quarter of this year.

He also urged lawmakers to resist the temptation to tinker with last year's deficit-reduction agreement. Assuming that the economy can come out of the recession and remain strong, Reischauer said, the deficit could shrink to about \$57 billion by 1995.

KEATING FIVE private deliberations begin in Senate panel.

The Senate Ethics Committee met

all day yesterday as it began deliberations on the case of five senators accused of improperly intervening with federal regulators on behalf of savings and loan operator Charles H. Keating Jr.

After two months of public hearings, the five senators — Republican John McCain, Ariz., and Democrats Dennis DeConcini, Ariz., John Glenn, Ohio, Donald W. Riegle Jr., Mich., and Alan Cranston, Calif. — must now wait on the decision of the Ethics panel.

The committee is considering each senator's case separately. Panel members are expected to spend the coming weeks reviewing the evidence before reaching a conclusion.

The panel's counsel, Robert S. Bennett, has recommended that the panel drop the cases against McCain and Glenn.

The panel will continue to meet until members reach an agreement, but the panel will no longer announce its schedule until it is ready to make recommendations to the Senate.

PUERTO RICO's future status remains up in the air.

Prospects for a quick resolution to the debate over Puerto Rico's political future were dampened yesterday as three competing political groups from the island testified before the Senate Energy Committee.

Committee Chairman J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., who has sponsored a bill (S 244) to enable Puerto Ricans to choose independence, statehood, or remaining a commonwealth, has been eager to get the ball rolling on his legislation.

But time constraints may work against the legislation. The three political groups said yesterday that Congress must agree on an approach by mid-February for the referendum process to be workable.

The ideal time for Puerto Rico to

hold a referendum would be this fall, before the island's election year, they said.

This did not sit well with some on the panel. "I am not certain this timetable is realistic," said panel member Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo.

Fellow panel member Don Nickles, R-Okla., added that he had additional reservations to moving ahead with the measure, saying it was unclear if the other states wanted statehood for Puerto Rico.

JUDICIARY PANEL chooses subcommittee chairmen.

The House Judiciary Committee underwent several changes yesterday as it organized for the 102nd Congress.

The panel decided to reduce its subcommittees from seven to six. The Crime and Criminal Justice panels were consolidated under the chairmanship of Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y.

Schumer, who chaired the former Criminal Justice Subcommittee last year, was given the added responsibilities of the Crime Subcommittee when its former chairman, William J. Hughes, D-N.J., decided to chair the Intellectual Property and Judicial Administration Subcommittee. The chairmanship of that subcommittee opened up when Robert W. Kastenmeier, D-Wis., lost a re-election bid last November.

The reshuffling also marked the return of Romano L. Mazzoli, D-Ky., to the top spot at the International Law, Immigration and Refugees Subcommittee.

In 1989, the Judiciary Committee voted to strip Mazzoli of his subcommittee chairmanship. Panel Democrats contended that Mazzoli had poorly managed the panel, something the Kentuckian later conceded was true.

The subcommittee chairmanship became available when Bruce A. Morrison, D-Conn., left Congress for an unsuccessful gubernatorial bid.

In August of 1991, my husband and I took our son back to college at the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. As we moved our son into the dorm, we met Barbara and Tim Eberly. They are the wife and son of Colonel David W. Eberly. David is an F15-E fighter pilot who is now listed as missing in action.

Barbara, Tim and my family have developed a very warm friendship through letters and phone calls. My family has been a support unit while David is in the middle east. I made arrangements for David's unit to receive "care packages" through Operation Southern Comfort.

I found Tim's paper very moving. I believe the last paragraph in David's letter is the essence of a true soldier serving his country.

As we move into the second week of this Gulf War, I pray for you, our country, the men and women serving their country, and that David is safe and alive.

Dad is a Colonel in the United States Air Force. He's a pilot, a damn good pilot. He flies the F-15e out of Seymour Johnson Air Force Base in Goldsboro, North Carolina. Several times he has come marginally close to being TOP GUN of the Fourth Tactical Fighter Wing. He's not a big man. He stands about five feet nine inches and only weighs 148 pounds. Don't be deceived. Small he may be, but he's the largest man at heart when it comes to his country and family. He's got short brown hair and stands astute in his flight suit bearing his country's colors. One is reminded of John Wayne and an old western with relation to the all-American. Sundance is his call sign, for he is the one who dances with the sun in the sky above. He is the one who creates the sound of freedom overhead that we have all come to rely on.

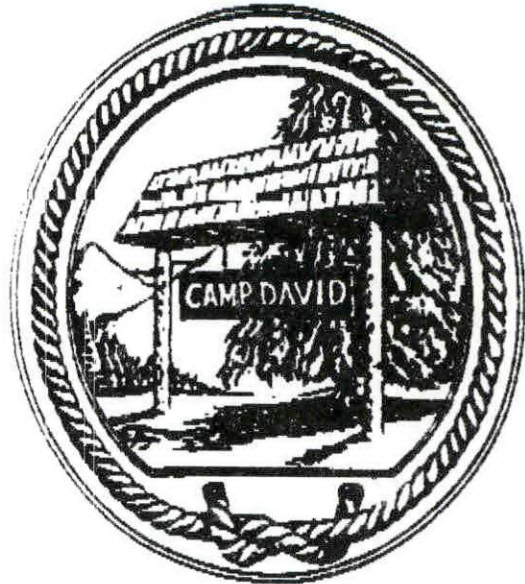

U.S. in no hurry to invade

The Bush administration said yesterday that it is not ready to send U.S. forces into Kuwait or Iraq.

"We're in no hurry to engage in a ground campaign," Vice President Dan Quayle said at a London news conference with British Prime Minister John Major. "Perhaps Saddam Hussein would like to commence the ground war because he's been so unsuccessful in getting any of his air assets deployed."

At the White House, President Bush told Jewish leaders that he "is not anxious at this point to enter into a ground war," said Shoshana Cardin, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations.

"I think he feels there is more to be done [in the air war]" before beginning a major ground attack, she said after the hour-long afternoon meeting with the president at the White House. Iraq's military "has been diminished rapidly and he [Mr. Bush] trusts there will be more aerial war before there is a ground war."

"When we're ready to move, we'll move," added White House Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater. "If Iraq chooses to make intrusions as they did in the last day or two, we'll deal with those when they happen."

The comments came one day after U.S. Marines and Saudi troops turned back repeated Iraqi attempts to invade and hold ground in Saudi Arabia. Iraqi troops on Wednesday temporarily held the Saudi resort

city of Khafji. Eleven Marines died in the battle, which stretched into yesterday.

U.S. commanders have said the air war will continue for another two weeks unless Iraq launches a ground offensive, which Baghdad has labeled the "mother of battles."

The White House on Wednesday said it did not view the battles around Khafji as the start of the ground war. Units of the Marine 1st Division engaged about 4,000 Iraqis.

Late yesterday, military officials in Saudi Arabia said up to 1,000 Iraqi military vehicles were moving to-

ward the Saudi border, giving rise to speculation that Iraq was triggering the ground war.

Mr. Bush started the day at a prayer breakfast, asking Americans to join in a national day of prayer and peace on Sunday.

"I encourage all people of faith to say a special prayer on that day — a prayer for peace, a prayer for the safety of our troops, a prayer for their families, a prayer for the innocents caught up in this war, and a prayer that God will continue to bless the United States of America," he said at the yearly event.

In another Gulf-related event, he signed legislation that gives U.S. service men and women in the Gulf a special tax break and an extension on filing their income-tax returns.

The Jewish leaders who met with Mr. Bush also met with State Department officials. They had just returned from a visit to Israel. Their meetings followed release of a U.S.-Soviet statement offering to end the attack on Iraq if Iraq makes an "unequivocal commitment" to leave Kuwait.

The administration spent much of Wednesday telling reporters that it was not changing its demand for total Iraqi withdrawal from Kuwait.

Some Jewish leaders at the White House said they had received assurances that the U.S.-Soviet statement Tuesday on the Gulf — an initiative that promised post-war efforts to "promote Arab-Israeli peace and regional stability" — did not constitute a shift in U.S. policy.

- o The National Drug Control Strategy recognizes the key roles of Federal, State, and local governments, the private sector, and communities and individuals across the Nation.
- o The Strategy calls for applying pressure across all fronts of the drug war simultaneously, recognizing that prevention is the only answer in the long run, but that in the short run increased interdiction, international, and law enforcement efforts are necessary, as well as treatment for those currently using drugs.
- o It declares that as a Nation we must:
 - Establish meaningful and effective programs to prevent people from using drugs in the first place.
 - Provide effective treatment for those who need it and can benefit from it.
 - Hold users accountable for their actions and thereby deter others from using drugs.
 - Prosecute dealers and traffickers.
 - Punish those convicted of drug crimes.
 - Disrupt the flow of drugs, drug money, and related chemicals.
 - Engage other nations in efforts to reduce the growth, production, and distribution of drugs.
 - Support basic and applied research in behavior, medicine, and technology.
 - Improve our intelligence capabilities in order to attack drug trafficking organizations better.

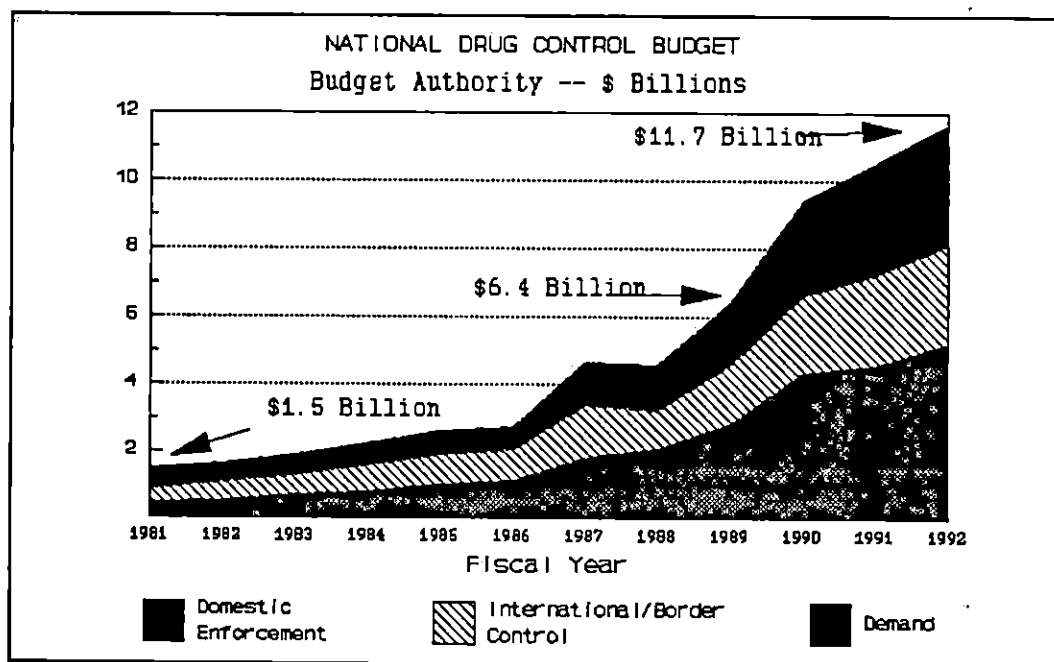

To reduce the cultivation, production, transportation, and distribution of drugs we must bring to bear the broad range of the criminal justice system -- law enforcement, judicial, prosecutorial, penal, and intelligence resources.

The focus of the Strategy is on continuing Federal efforts to disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking organizations. It calls upon States and localities to continue to increase the likelihood that those involved with drugs -- whether as dealers, purchasers, or users -- will be held accountable by the criminal justice system.

The Strategy calls on governments at all levels to provide the resources the criminal justice system requires, effectively manage the resources already dedicated to this purpose, and devise creative ways of enforcing the law.

LAW ENFORCEMENT PRIORITIES

- o Expand resources for Federal money laundering investigations.
- o Continue the high priority given domestic marijuana eradication programs.
- o Expand and improve precursor chemical programs.
- o Mobilize law enforcement (especially DEA) and regulatory communities to halt the diversion of licit drugs for illicit purposes.
- o Provide assistance to State and local law enforcement.

- o Expand joint task force efforts (OCDETF and DEA).
- o Encourage States to enhance their asset forfeiture laws so majority of proceeds go to local law enforcement.

COURTS, PROSECUTIONS, AND PUNISHMENT PRIORITIES

- o Institute drug testing at every stage of the criminal justice process from the time of arrest through parole. Seek legislation that would condition receipt of Federal criminal justice funds upon States' adopting at least some drug testing programs in their criminal justice systems.
- o Expand the capacity in the U.S. Courts by filling 85 newly authorized judgeships and vacant judgeships and provide sufficient resources to support the judgeships.
- o Augment U.S. prosecutorial efforts.
- o Continue to pursue legislation that would authorize imposition of the death penalty for certain categories of drug offenders.
- o Expand the Substance Abuse Treatment Program of the U.S. Probation Office to increase treatment availability as well as maintain adequate supervision of probationers receiving drug treatment.
- o Urge the States to devote significant portions of their law enforcement funds to expand their ability to prosecute drug criminals.

CORRECTIONS SYSTEM PRIORITIES

- o Encourage States to develop and use intermediate punishments and innovative approaches to punishment, such as electronic monitoring and house arrest.
- o Increase Federal prison bed spaces.
- o Increase the availability and quality of Federal prison drug treatment services.
- o Provide Federal technical assistance to help States reduce construction and operating costs of jails and prisons.
- o Streamline the process for deporting criminal aliens so they are deported early in their terms of incarceration.

Continue the policies outlined in the 1989 and 1990 Strategies and increase the availability and quality of drug treatment services.

EXPAND TREATMENT SYSTEM CAPACITY

- o Increase Federal support for treatment capacity by \$100 million -- triple the increase Congress provided this year (200,000 more people would receive treatment).
- o Seek legislation prohibiting States that receive funding from the Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Services (ADMS) block grant program from reducing their own drug-related funding below the average amount of such expenditures for the preceding two years.
- o Explore use of "treatment voucher" experiments, allowing addicts to be treated at private facilities.
- o Continue the Treatment Campus initiative -- centers that would offer a variety of treatment approaches, enhanced treatment capacity, improved treatment quality, and the opportunity to evaluate and compare the efficiency of different treatment methods.
- o Explore the feasibility of using Job Corps sites to provide trainees who have drug problems both job training and drug treatment simultaneously.
- o Undertake further efforts to promote private insurance coverage of drug treatment:

- Encourage the insurance industry to cover drug treatment other than the currently covered, costly 28-day inpatient programs.
- Work with the States to develop sound standards for admission, care, and program performance.
- o Explore ways to improve Medicaid's coverage of drug treatment through two HHS studies to:
 - Examine the cost effectiveness of the Institutions for Mental Diseases (IMD) exclusion. NOTE: The primary limitation on using Medicaid for drug treatment is that it cannot pay for residential treatment in facilities with over 16 beds for recipients aged 22-64.
 - Allow a few States to waive the IMD exclusion on a demonstration basis in order to provide residential drug treatment services to pregnant women.
- o Work with the States to overcome community resistance to new treatment facility sites. Continue to prosecute landlords who refuse to rent to group homes for recovering drug addicts and municipalities that use zoning laws and building codes to block such homes.
- o Support in-service training of treatment professionals in the latest techniques and methods, and similar training of central intake and referral staff.

IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF TREATMENT

- o Encourage Congressional enactment of legislation conditioning the receipt of Federal treatment funds on a State's development and implementation of a coordinated, statewide treatment plan.
- o Develop and test promising treatment strategies.
- o Evaluate current treatment methods to see what works.
- o Continue research on the effects of drugs on infants and pregnant women.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

- o Develop a comprehensive approach to drug treatment in the criminal justice system; identify drug users; refer them to treatment; supervise treatment, aftercare, and monitoring.

- o Improve the ability of the criminal justice system to direct pregnant drug-using women into treatment.
- o Encourage States to use funds from the Department of Justice Block Grant to support the identification and referral to treatment of drug using offenders.
- o Encourage States to develop comprehensive drug testing plans within their criminal justice systems. State drug treatment plans would be required to describe how States will expand drug treatment for individuals in the criminal justice system.

Ultimate success in the war on drugs will come from sound prevention efforts in the community, workplace, and schools. The Federal role is to assist States, localities, and the private sector in these efforts.

- o Increase the number of Community Partnership Program grants to communities to plan comprehensive prevention programs.
- o Support the development of a small number of model community user accountability programs, and expand technical assistance to others.
- o Conduct research and evaluation of what works in drug prevention.
- o Increase Federal coordination and funding to assist HUD in ensuring drug-free public housing.
- o Monitor the implementation of the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act requirement that all schools adopt and implement comprehensive drug prevention programs. In FY 1992 the Emergency Grant Program (ED) will provide additional funding for grants to communities particularly hard-hit by drugs.
- o Expand efforts to develop models for approaches that provide havens for children of addicts.
- o Support demonstration projects to develop and evaluate effective techniques for teaching drug-impaired children.
- o Support efforts to assist companies -- especially small and medium-sized businesses -- to achieve drug-free workplaces.

- o Continue to track agencies' implementation of Executive Order 12564, which requires drug-free workplace programs. ONDCP will continue its general oversight of this effort.
- o Establish a working group to review national drug testing legislation pending in the Congress and make recommendations.

The international trade in drugs is a threat to our national security. The Strategy focuses our efforts on disrupting and dismantling overseas trafficking enterprises and networks to complement our domestic supply reduction programs and give our demand reduction efforts a better chance of success. The Strategy also calls for extending diplomatic initiatives to increase hemispheric trade, improve mechanisms for money laundering and precursor chemical control, and launch joint demand reduction efforts overseas.

ANDEAN INITIATIVE

In Fiscal Year 1991 the United States provided approximately \$370 million in resources and equipment to the Andean countries, and proposes almost \$500 million for Fiscal Year 1992. Economic assistance will be conditioned on drug control performance and adherence to sound economic policies and respect for human rights.

HEROIN

In the United States, heroin is available at low cost and high purity. However, there is a substantial decline in heroin emergency room mentions (and a smaller drop in coroner reports) over the last year.

- o Cooperate with other countries, to engage their resources to dismantle their own cultivation, refining and ancillary industries, and reduce demand for drugs.

- o Solicit diplomatic assistance to influence producers to which we have limited access (e.g., Laos).
- o Increase efforts at home and abroad against drug organizations to interdict shipments destined for the United States and to strengthen host country law enforcement abilities.

POTENTIAL SOURCE AND TRANSIT COUNTRIES

As counterdrug efforts take effect in the Andean Strategy countries, we may see relocation of growing and processing operations, and development of new smuggling routes.

- o Continue to target resources in a cost effective manner with special attention to Panama and Guatemala.
- o Work to develop these countries' ability to provide and benefit from expanded intelligence capabilities.
- o Continue DOD detection and surveillance efforts, while assisting potential transit countries in developing their own intelligence capabilities and their ability to act on shared intelligence.
- o Encourage drug producer and transit countries to strengthen their laws, legal institutions, and programs to apprehend and bring drug traffickers and drug money launderers to justice.
- o Increase law enforcement and other programs with Mexico as the transit country of principal concern.

The goal of interdiction is to deter drug smuggling by intercepting, disrupting, and destroying the products, communications, transportation, and proceeds of the illegal drug business. To achieve this goal the Strategy will:

- o Improve coordination and cooperation among Federal law enforcement officials and streamline the lines of command for interdiction operations to increase pressure against traffickers in the air, on land, and at sea.
- o Transfer Customs aerostats to DOD in Fiscal Year 1991.
- o Propose additional sanctions for pilots who violate flight planning, entry notification, or border clearance rules, and additional legislation making it a criminal offense to refuse orders of Federal authorities to land an aircraft or bring-to a vessel.
- o Enhance Customs land interdiction activities, including increased Southwest Border inspections.
- o Augment Immigration and Naturalization Service efforts at and between ports of entry by increasing personnel, equipment, and inspection facilities.
- o Improve the automated data processing programs of Customs, INS, and the Coast Guard.
- o Apply innovative technologies from Federal laboratories and private industry to various interdiction problems including detection of concealed drugs, controlling movements across our borders, and enhancing data collection and information processing.

- o Continue vigorous enforcement of laws and pursue international cooperation to halt illegal diversion of precursor chemicals.
- o Improve intelligence on financial activities of drug traffickers, investigating suspected money launderers, achieving effective regulation at the Federal and State levels, and promoting international cooperation.
- o Continue to restrict the movement of weapons and explosives from the United States and deny their use to drug traffickers.
- o Provide additional resources to disrupt drug trafficking on our Southwest Border.

The Strategy establishes an ambitious Federal commitment to long-term research in the fields of drug treatment, education and prevention, criminal justice, and drug use. Even more pointed efforts will be made to develop better information for national policy decisionmaking, better technology in support of drug law enforcement initiatives, and better medical techniques to treat the effects of drug use.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

- o Establish a Counternarcotics Technology Assessment Center within the ONDCP in accordance with legislation.
- o Encourage transfer of technology to drug enforcement agencies or activities, and increased participation of private sector, industry, and academic facilities in the technology acquisition process.
- o Upgrade Federal Law enforcement agency abilities to store, retrieve, and manipulate information to understand drug trafficking networks better and to attack them more effectively.

DATA COLLECTION AND EVALUATION

- o Get better data for policymakers by improving and expanding the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, the High School Senior Survey, the Drug Abuse Warning Network (DAWN), and the Drug Use Forecasting Program (DUF).
- o Establish quick response and target surveys to provide up-to-date and responsive information for policy use.

- o Improve drug treatment data to guide the allocation of treatment resources.
- o Undertake scientifically designed and controlled evaluations of new and promising treatment methods, and determine "what works" in prevention.
- o Collect information on Federal drug-related law enforcement activities parallel to that which State and local law enforcement agencies now report.

BIOMEDICAL AND BEHAVIORAL RESEARCH

- o Enhance NIDA's strategic planning process to address the research needs identified in previous Strategies.
- o Further identify the neural mechanisms by which cocaine operates, and develop medications that can block cocaine euphoria and relieve cocaine cravings.
- o Find effective means of persuading drug users, especially intravenous drug users, to enter treatment.
- o Support research to define quality treatment and desirable outcomes for clients, identify determinants of quality treatment, and develop accountability standards for treatment delivery.

INTELLIGENCE

The Strategy calls for improved, better coordinated, and more focused strategic and tactical drug intelligence support programs and efforts.

- o Create a "forum" to coordinate the development and prioritization of overall drug intelligence requirements (both domestic and foreign).
- o Establish a Law Enforcement Drug Intelligence Council to coordinate development of drug intelligence collection and analysis requirements. The Administration will also seek ways to accomplish National Drug Intelligence Center missions.
- o Emphasize the importance of the El Paso Intelligence Center (EPIC) as the central interagency tactical drug intelligence analysis center.
- o Emphasize continued support to intelligence programs and efforts included in the Andean and other international strategies.

INFORMATION MANAGEMENT

- o Emphasize the need to improve the automation of drug information, particularly law enforcement, and expanded sharing of information through improved ADP/communications links and access.
- o Continue efforts to expand and improve communications among the various supply reduction agencies.

HIGH INTENSITY DRUG TRAFFICKING AREAS

Five areas were designated as High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTAs): New York City, Miami, Houston, Los Angeles, and the Southwest Border. The initial \$25 million appropriated to ONDCP in FY 1990 for HIDTAs was used exclusively by Federal law enforcement agencies for anti-drug programs in the designated areas.

- o The President's FY 1992 budget requests \$50 million to support the ongoing program.
- o In addition to the direct appropriation for HIDTA activities described above, the President's 1992 Budget requests a total of \$1.5 billion for other drug related programs in the HIDTA areas, up from \$1.3 billion provided by Congress in 1991.

DRUG POLICY MANAGEMENT AGENDA

The Administration has continually worked to improve the management of the Federal government's drug programs. ONDCP has designed and implemented a government-wide strategic planning process to monitor and coordinate anti-drug initiatives, and each Federal agency with drug control responsibilities now has a plan, approved by ONDCP, to advance the goals and objectives of the Strategy.

To enhance coordination, ONDCP has established three committees comprising senior Federal policy-level officials in areas such as interdiction, treatment, and criminal justice.

- o ONDCP Supply Reduction Working Group -- coordinates and oversees implementation by Federal drug agencies of supply-related policies, objectives, and priorities. It oversees efforts of subcommittees in the areas of Public Lands Drug Control, Border Interdiction, Southwest Border High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA), and Metropolitan HIDTA.
- o ONDCP Demand Reduction Working Group -- coordinates and oversees implementation by Federal drug agencies of demand reduction policies, objectives, and outreach activities. It oversees efforts of subcommittees in the areas of Treatment, Education and Prevention, Workplace, and International Demand Reduction.
- o Drug-related Financial Crimes Policy Group -- coordinates national policies to curtail the flow of illegal drug-related currency and assets into, within, and out of the United States, including policies and programs concerning seizures of currency and assets.

Three committees operate under the oversight of a Research and Development Committee, chaired by the ONDCP Director, which provides policy guidance for the research and development efforts of the Federal drug control agencies.

- o Data Committee -- guides improvements in the relevance, timeliness, and usefulness of drug-related data collection, research studies, and evaluations.
- o Medical Research Committee -- coordinates policy and general objectives on medical research conducted in the Federal drug agencies, and promotes the dissemination of findings from that research.

- o Science and Technology Committee -- chaired by the new Chief Scientist, will act as an advisory board to the CTAC, which will oversee working groups on Automated Data Processing, Communications Interoperability, Contraband Detection, Taggants, Technology Coordination, and Sensors and Surveillances.

National Drug Control Strategy Executive Summary

In accordance with the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988, the President presented the third National Drug Control Strategy to the Congress on January 31, 1991.

The fundamental principle of the National Strategy remains firm: to reduce drug use through a mix of supply and demand policies and programs. Like its predecessors, this Strategy recognizes the key roles of Federal, State, and local governments, the private sector, and communities and individuals across the Nation. The Strategy calls for applying pressure across all fronts of the drug war simultaneously, recognizing that prevention is the only answer in the long run, but that in the short run increased interdiction, international, and law enforcement efforts are necessary, as well as treatment for those currently using drugs.

It declares that as a Nation we must:

- Establish meaningful and effective programs to prevent people from using drugs in the first place.
- Provide effective treatment for those who need it and can benefit from it.
- Hold users accountable for their actions and thereby deter others from using drugs.
- Target and dismantle drug trafficking organizations.
- Prosecute drug dealers and traffickers.
- Punish those convicted of drug crimes.
- Disrupt the flow of drugs, related chemicals, and drug money.
- Engage other nations in efforts to reduce the growth, production, and distribution of drugs.

Executive Summary

- Support basic and applied research in behavior, medicine, and technology.
- Improve our intelligence capabilities in order to attack drug trafficking organizations better.

The National Drug Control Strategy established nine detailed goals and objectives. These goals were first set in the 1989 Strategy as targets for 1991. As the following chart shows, these objectives have been met.

For Fiscal Year 1992, the Administration is seeking \$11.7 billion in drug-related funding — a \$5.3 billion (82 percent) increase since the beginning of the Administration and a \$1.1 billion (11 percent) increase over Fiscal Year 1991. Additional detail on the National Drug Control Budget is available in the National Drug Control Strategy Budget Summary.

The 1991 Strategy follows the same format as previous Strategies. Seven sections (The Criminal Justice System; Drug Treatment; Education, Community Action and the Workplace; International Initiatives; Border Interdiction and Security; A Research Agenda; and Intelligence and Information Management) present a thorough discussion of issues, policies, and programs related to our national drug control activities. Broad reviews of Federal drug program management issues, budget proposals, High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas, and recommended model State legislation are included as appendices.

Highlights From the February 1991 National Drug Control Strategy

The Criminal Justice System

Expanded Joint Task Forces

- \$402 million in total funding for Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Forces (OCDETFs) and \$55 million for Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) State and local task forces (increases of 20 percent and 25 percent compared to FY 1991 respectively).
- Over 400 new Federal agents and attorneys added to the OCDETF program.

Continued High Priority to Domestic Marijuana Eradication Programs

- Nearly \$90 million for Federal agency efforts to eliminate marijuana on Federal lands.
- \$15 million in DEA funding, training, and investigative support to local government efforts.

Executive Summary

Additional DEA and FBI Agents

- 134 more DEA agents and 44 more FBI agents than this year, exclusive of those added through OCDETFs.

Expanded Federal Prison Capacity

- Funding for over 2,500 drug-related new beds in the Federal prison system in Fiscal Year 1992.
- 50,000 total beds (drug and nondrug) under design, construction, or in the planning stage in the Federal prison system through 1996.

Expanded Resources for Federal Money Laundering Investigations

- An increase of 102 positions (85 special agent positions) and \$8.8 million for the Internal Revenue Service's OCDETF program and an additional \$1.6 million to expand the intelligence information systems of the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network.

Proposed Legislation

- *Drug Testing* - condition receipt of Federal criminal justice funds upon States adopting drug testing programs in their criminal justice systems.
- *Deporting Aliens* - streamline exclusion of deportation procedures by eliminating some administrative avenues by appeal while fully maintaining the judicial appeals process.
- *Death Penalty* - make the death penalty available in cases involving three additional categories of drug offenders: major drug kingpins; drug kingpins who attempt to kill in order to obstruct justice; and Federal drug felons whose offense results in death.

Expanded Treatment System Capacity

- \$100 million increase in Federal support for treatment capacity, enabling 200,000 more people to receive treatment.
- Explore use of "treatment voucher" experiments, which allow addicts to be treated at private facilities.

- Treatment Campuses to offer a variety of treatment approaches, enhanced treatment capacity, improved treatment quality, and the opportunity to evaluate and compare the efficiency of different treatment methods.
- Approximately \$119 million for treatment programs directed at priority populations such as adolescents, pregnant/postpartum women and their children, and drug users risking or suffering from HIV/AIDS.
- \$21 million increase in funding for treating Federal arrestees, prisoners, probationers, and those on post-incarceration supervised release (a 36 percent increase over 1991).

Improved Quality of Treatment

- Development and testing of promising treatment strategies.
- Evaluation of current treatment methods to see what works.
- Continued research on the effects of drugs on infants and pregnant women.
- Assistance to States in setting and meeting standards of treatment quality and improving treatment for the priority populations noted above.

Proposed Legislation

- *Maintenance of Effort* - ensure that States receiving funds from the Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Services (ADMS) block grant program do not reduce their own drug-related funding below the average amount of such expenditures for the preceding two years.
- *State Treatment and Prevention Plan* - condition the receipt of Federal treatment funds on a State's development and implementation of a coordinated, statewide treatment and prevention plan.

Education, Community Action, and the Workplace

Community Drug Prevention

- \$114 million in Community Partnership Grants to assist communities in developing comprehensive prevention strategies to address drug and alcohol problems — a 14 percent increase over 1991.

Executive Summary

- \$165 million for HUD's Public Housing Drug Elimination Grant program — a 10 percent increase over 1991.

Protection for Children

- Expanded efforts to develop approaches that provide havens for children of addicts.
- Training for criminal justice officials and social workers, child care workers, and foster parents who deal with addicts and their children.

Drug-Free Schools

- Nearly \$500 million to improve drug education in classrooms.

Drug-Free Workplace

- Continued cooperation with the private sector to develop drug-free workplace programs, including information dissemination and research to help employees and employers understand better the impact of drug use in the workplace.
- Continued efforts to achieve a fully implemented drug program — including a drug testing plan — in every Federal agency.

Proposed Legislation

- *Lab Accreditation* - seek high-quality drug testing programs by ensuring that there are high standards of confidentiality and accuracy.

International Initiatives

Expanded International Efforts

- \$125 million increase in military, law enforcement, and economic assistance to Colombia, Peru, and Bolivia.
- Continued diplomatic initiatives to increase hemispheric trade, improve regional and global mechanisms for money laundering and precursor chemical control, and launch joint demand reduction efforts overseas.

Increased Assistance to Mexico

- Continued support of Mexican efforts against drug production and trafficking, particularly along the U.S. Southwest Border.

Potential Source and Transit Countries

- Assistance to potential transit countries in developing their own intelligence capabilities and their ability to act on shared intelligence.
- Encouragement to drug producer and transit countries to strengthen their laws, legal institutions, and programs to apprehend and bring drug traffickers and drug money launderers to justice.

Strengthened Financial Crimes Enforcement

- Continued priority targeting of money laundering and other drug-related financial crimes through the Department of the Treasury's Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN) and the multi-agency Drug-Related Financial Crimes Policy Group.
- Improved intelligence on financial activities of drug traffickers, investigation of suspected money launderers, achieving effective regulation at the Federal and State levels, and promoting international cooperation.

Border Interdiction and Security

Enhanced Interdiction Activities

- Improved automated data processing programs at Customs, INS, and the Coast Guard.
- Application of innovative technologies from Federal laboratories and private industry to various interdiction problems including detection of concealed drugs, control of movements across our borders, and enhanced data collection and information processing.
- Additional sanctions for pilots who violate flight planning, entry notification, or border clearance rules, and additional legislation making it a criminal offense to refuse orders of Federal authorities to land an aircraft or bring-to a vessel.

Executive Summary

- Continued vigorous enforcement of laws and pursuit of international cooperation to halt illegal diversion of precursor chemicals, weapons, and explosives to drug traffickers.
- Strengthened law enforcement activities along our Southwest Border.

A Research Agenda

Science and Technology

- Creation of a Counternarcotics Technology Assessment Center within the ONDCP to establish drug-related research and development priorities and to plan for the acquisition and use of advanced drug law enforcement technologies by Federal agencies.
- Upgraded ability of Federal law enforcement agencies to store, retrieve, and manipulate information to understand drug trafficking networks better and to attack them more effectively.

Improved Data Collection and Evaluation

- Improved information systems that measure our national objectives; expanded treatment system data; and intensified treatment and prevention evaluation.
- Quick response and target surveys to provide up-to-date and responsive information for policy use.

Biomedical and Behavioral Research

- Enhance NIDA's strategic planning process to address the research needs identified in previous Strategies.
- Further identify the neural mechanisms by which cocaine operates, and develop medications that can block cocaine euphoria and relieve cocaine cravings.
- Find effective means of persuading drug users, especially intravenous drug users, to enter treatment.
- Support research to define quality treatment and desirable outcomes for clients, identify determinants of quality treatment, and develop accountability standards for treatment delivery.

Intelligence and Information Management

Law Enforcement Drug Intelligence Council

- Establishment of a Law Enforcement Drug Intelligence Council to coordinate development of drug intelligence collection and analysis requirements. The Administration will also seek ways to accomplish National Drug Intelligence Center missions.

High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas

Five Areas Designated as HIDTAs

- Continued support to the five areas designated as High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTAs) in the 1990 Strategy: New York City, Miami, Houston, Los Angeles, and the Southwest Border.
- \$50 million will support the ongoing Federal program in Fiscal Year 1992.
- In addition to the appropriation for HIDTA activities described above, \$1.5 billion for other drug-related programs in the HIDTA areas in Fiscal Year 1992, up from \$1.3 billion in 1991.

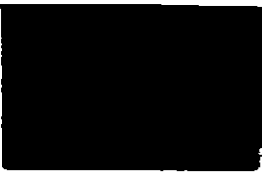

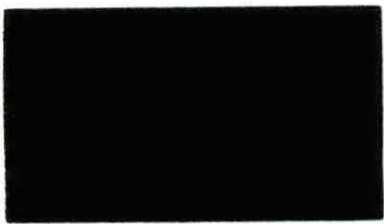

Dear Delegates:

It is with great pleasure that I welcome you to the United States as we gather to begin negotiations on a landmark international convention on climate change. This agreement will serve as a framework for future cooperative efforts to address the problem of climate change.

We look forward to working with you in the task of addressing this vitally important set of problems. I assure you that we are prepared to work openly, diligently, and respectfully toward achieving the goal of completing a climate change convention in time for its signature at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development to be convened in June 1992.

The UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) has defined our common agenda: accelerating scientific and economic research to help reduce remaining uncertainties; taking action now that responds to our present state of knowledge; and negotiating a multilateral framework for comprehensive response strategies.

Through our U.S. Global Change Research Program, we are working aggressively with other nations to improve our understanding of the global ecosystem and the relationship of our economic activities to the natural environment. We look forward to continuing this partnership.

In addition, a number of nations are implementing policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. I am pleased to provide a copy of the U.S. action plan for climate change -- America's Climate Change Strategy. This comprehensive strategy for action is built upon a series of actions which will have broad-ranging benefits -- from curbing air pollution, to conserving energy, to restoring forest lands -- and which will help curb net greenhouse gas emissions.

In total, the actions which are currently included in America's Climate Change Strategy are projected to result in U.S. greenhouse gas emissions in the year 2000 being equal to or below the 1987 level. I hope that the results of our efforts here will be structured in such a way as to encourage such national strategies -- and to avoid any incentives to delay taking those actions which clearly have merit.

The United States takes the challenge of global stewardship very seriously and believes that these negotiations offer the opportunity to structure an important vehicle for cooperation toward that end. The outcome of our talks will be profoundly important -- and working together, I am sure that we will succeed.

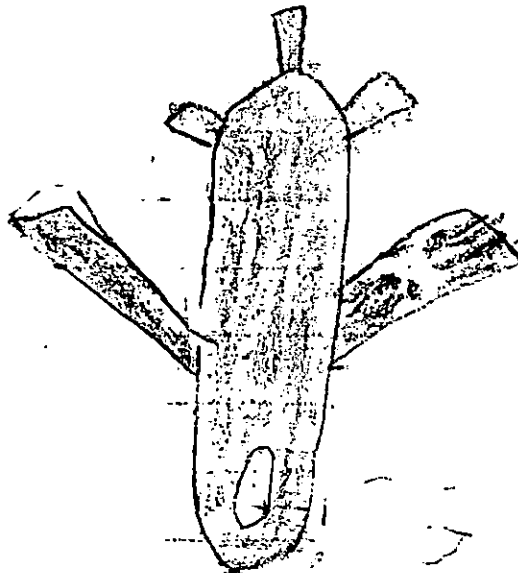

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you for that great welcome. Jill -- Jill McCaffrey, it is my great pleasure to be here and to meet with you. Barbara and I met the Commanding General -- met Jill's husband, General Barry McCaffrey, and many of his troops -- many of your loved ones -- and we shared a meal with them on Thanksgiving Day. And it was special, and we Bushes will never forget it. And the food wasn't bad, either. (Laughter.) But I'll tell you, the morale was great.

I want to salute General Burba, thank him for his leadership in this most important command of his. I want to salute and pay my respects to these two Senators from this state in which this installation is located -- Senator Nunn, Chairman of our Armed Services Committee; Senator Wyche Fowler -- and of course, your own Congressman from this district who's been so supportive of everything all of you are involved in, Congressman Thomas. To the new Governor of this great state, Governor Miller, who is with us today, my respects. And Colonel Lucas, thank you, sir, for your prayers.

And Colonel Frank Miller, if you can sing like your wife does, why, you guys ought to go on the road. (Laughter.) But I think I've mentioned everybody but Beetle Bailey here. (Laughter.)

But nevertheless, it is indeed a real pleasure to meet with you. I've heard a lot from Colonel Miller and others about Hinesville, and I heard a lot out in the Saudi desert, you can believe me, about all of you, the Fort Stewart family. I came down here to thank you on behalf of a grateful nation for your steadfast service and sacrifice. Because when proud men and women of Fort Stewart and Hunter Field put it all on the line, every one of you is right there with them.

In times of trial, we fall back on faith and on family -- what a wise man once called the "little platoons" to which we all belong; the little platoons that provide the 24th Infantry Division with its fighting spirit and its staying power.

Right now, it's night in Saudi Arabia. The soldiers from Fort Stewart are on duty -- one more day in more than five long months away from home. Our thoughts are with them, day and night. America's finest: Standing against an aggressor who must be stopped -- standing up for the best -- all that is best in us. (Applause.) Because those men and women know and you know, we all know that when the forces of aggression take up arms, America cannot look the other way.

It began with Kuwait, but that wouldn't have been the end. What we've witnessed these last few weeks removed any last shred of doubt about the adversary that we face. The terror bombing, without military value -- the terror bombing of innocent civilians with those Scud missiles. The brutal treatment -- that brutal, inhumane treatment of our POWs. The endless appetite for evil that would lead a man to make war on the world's environment. All of us know what we're up against. All of us know why we're there.

We are there because we are Americans -- part of something that's larger than ourselves. Our cause is right. Our cause is just. And because it is just, that world's cause will prevail. (Applause.)

And when we win -- and we will -- (applause) -- we will have taught a dangerous Dictator -- and any tyrant tempted to follow in his footsteps -- that the U.S. has a new credibility and that what we say goes; and that there is no place for lawless aggression in the Persian Gulf and in this new world order that we seek to create. And we mean it, and he will understand that when the day is done. (Applause.)

I know that all of you, especially all of you, are anxious to know if and when a ground operation might begin. Let me tell you now, it will only begin if necessary -- and when we decide that the time is right. We will conduct this conflict on our terms, on our timetable, not on Saddam Hussein's timetable. (Applause.)

Let me assure you that Desert Storm is right on course. Our training, our investment, our planning are all paying off. American and allied forces are systematically destroying Iraq's capacity to wage war.

Every member of the 24th Infantry Division is part of a fighting tradition stretching back some 50 years. Back in November, when I met with the men and women of the 24th, I told them about the last Thanksgiving that I had spent so far away from home. It was on a ship off the Philippine coast back in 1944. The 24th was there, fighting to take Red Beach on Leyte Island in the campaign that earned the 24th the nickname it so proudly bears today: The "Victory" Division. (Applause.)

And back then, those -- close to 50 years ago -- Franklin Delano Roosevelt sent a cable out to General MacArthur and the 24th Division -- a message that -- very short -- I'd like to read it to you today. FDR wrote them: "You have the nation's gratitude, and the nation's prayers for success, as you and your men fight your way back."

And now, many years later, once more, the 24th is in the front lines, far from home. Once more, the nation's prayers -- and the nation's pride -- are with the 24th and all the brave men and women of Desert Storm. (Applause.)

I don't know whether it was Jill, but somebody told me about the send-off back in August, when the 24th was among the first to deploy to Saudi Arabia -- the way the people of Hinesville and the other towns near here lined not just the streets around Fort Stewart, but lined the interstate all the way up I-95 to Hunter Field and Savannah. What a sight that must have been to the proud soldiers of Fort Stewart.

And let me say to all the children here with parents that are serving over there in the Gulf, keep in mind that no matter how much you depend on your parents, your country depends on them, too. And you've read at school about the great generals and some of the presidents -- all about American history and American heroes. Well, you see, that's just part of the great story about our country, because your moms and dads are the heroes, too -- doing the hard work of freedom, right now, half a world away.

I know it's been tough. It may get tougher. We've got three of the Walker kids here somewhere: Michael, Simon and their little brother Martin. Their mom and dad are both now serving in Saudi Arabia -- and they've been living with their babysitter, Ida Sanders. Eddie and Brandon Bowman are here -- their dad went over in August, and their mom in November. Eddie and Brandon are staying with a friend of their family -- Reggie Bray -- whose wife was called up in the reserves. I know at times like this the Fort Stewart family draws together, just gets tighter -- everyone pulls together,

the way a family always does.

And so to all you kids, let me say, be proud -- and stay strong. Don't be afraid to ask family friends or your teachers at school to help you when things get tough. And know that we're doing everything we can to make sure your parents have the best possible support to get the job done and get every man and woman of the fighting 24th back home, safe and sound just as soon as possible. That is my goal as your Commander-in-Chief. (Applause.)

With those brave young men and women in mind, let this nation come together this Sunday -- day after tomorrow -- on a day that will be our National Day of Prayer. We are, you see, one nation under God. And we will pray for the safety of every American and allied serviceman and servicewoman, for every innocent caught up in this terrible conflict, and for our POWs, and for our MIAs. And may all of our troops be safe and sound until the families of Fort Stewart are united once again.

Thank you once again for this warm welcome and for all your support. And let me tell you what I told some of the wives that are supporting in this support group. When I got on Air Force One this morning, I heard one of the television commentators say, well, the President is going to three different places to help with the morale. And, you see, it's been just the other way around. I've got good morale. But I'll tell you, I'm going on home to see Barbara with my morale sky-high because of the fantastic spirit -- (applause) -- because of the fantastic spirit of the families that are giving their all-out support to the finest fighting men and women that the world has ever seen.

God bless you all, and God bless the United States.
Thank you very, very much. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you very much for that warm welcome. And it's a wonderful honor to be introduced by Mr. Hearney, whose husband is doing such an outstanding job for the country. Let me salute the Secretary of the Navy Larry Garrett. Of course, General Al Gray, upon whom I depend so much as a member of the Joint Chiefs. (Applause.) And General Mundy and General Richwine and Colonel McDoyle and, of course, Governor Martin, the Governor of this great state -- and old friend, Jim Martin. And Mrs. Krulak and Mrs. Sutton. Families and friends, and members of the crew. The proud. The Marines. (Applause.)

There's a song which speaks of "Carolina in the Morning." Well, I am very pleased to be here this morning to salute all of you who form the magnificent Carolina MCRG.

Admiral Bull Halsey -- if you'll forgive me, a Navy man -- (laughter) -- once called you "not merely the elite Corps of this country, but the elite Corps of this world." And I agree. (Applause.) Let me tell you, it's a real privilege -- and I mean that -- to be at a home base of the United States Marine Corps. (Applause.)

For 218 years, the Corps has helped write the story of America. And today -- in wartime, as in peacetime -- you write that story still. It is the story of Semper Paratus. Always Faithful -- to the liberty which set men free.

My Squadron helped cover the landings at Guam and Saipan, and I was way up there and those Marines were way down there. And I saw the courage then, firsthand. Think of the Marines storming the beaches at Iwo. Or taking the shell-torn ridges at Chosin, Guadalcanal. Patrolling the skies from Okinawa to Korea, and now in Saudi Arabia.

As I said Tuesday night in my State of the Union speech, to be an American means writing new chapters in this story. It means enlisting in the cause of liberty and undertaking the hard work of freedom -- a cause which, today in the Persian Gulf, your colleagues -- friends -- above all, families -- have bravely and willingly borne as Marines have always done.

It comes as little surprise that the first ground engagement in the Gulf war involved Marines. It comes as no surprise that the Marines fought with great distinction and fought very bravely. (Applause.) Their professionalism and sacrifice will end the nightmare -- I'm absolutely confident of that -- will end the nightmare of Iraq's brutal occupation, and ensure that Kuwait is once again free. (Applause.)

What's this t-shirt up here? (Applause.)

No, but their courage and commitment will help punish aggression and protect our new world order from the tyranny of ruthless dictators with no concern for human life.

We're now more than two weeks into Operation Desert Storm. My report to you today is that we are on course, we are on schedule, and things go well. (Applause.) Day by day, night by night, Iraq's capacity to wage war is being systematically destroyed by U.S. and coalition military forces. And our investment, our training, and our planning are paying off. And, yes, achieving our goals will require time and sacrifice, but we will prevail -- make no mistake about that. (Applause.) And when we do -- and when we do, we will have taught a dangerous tyrant and those few who would follow in his footsteps that there is no place for lawless aggression in this critical region and in the new world order that we seek to create.

Every day, I think of our brave servicemen and women like the 2nd Marine Airwing -- 11 squadrons and two battalions deployed in the Gulf; the 2nd Marine Division -- (applause) -- and the 2nd Force Service Support Group. (Applause.) Ninety percent of their members are deployed in the Gulf. And they, too, believe in a cause larger than themselves. And most of all, we think of all those who have given the last full measure of devotion, and I will always keep a place in my heart for the memories and especially for the families of these American heroes. (Applause.)

I'm told that not far from here yellow ribbons stretch as far as the eye can see. (Applause.) And they show what a former President, a former general, Dwight Eisenhower meant when he said, "Morale is the greatest single factor in successful wars." The communities of Jacksonville and Havelock care. And so like communities all across America, they've joined hands to support military troops and their families. And I think of your schools -- touching troops with their letters and their love. And the "Key Wives Program" -- linking families, and hearts. (Applause.) And if there's anyone around this country who wonders what we're fighting for, they need look no farther than right here in this room. (Applause.)

Unfortunately, there are no medals of valor for military families. If there were, there would be as much decoration on your chests as there is pride within them. Two weeks ago, a monument was dedicated a mile from here. It has five service seals and this inscription: "Operation Desert Storm: This beacon burning bright is a constant reminder of Havelock's home fires burning in support of our military men and women and their families." (Applause.) To all of you -- spouses, children, parents, loved ones, Marines -- you're doing more than just keeping the home fires burning. Your dedication and bravery is lighting the heart -- believe me, it is lighting the heart of every American. You're hastening the day when your men and women will come home. And let me repeat this to the families: we will stay in the Gulf for as long as necessary, but not one day longer than it takes us to complete this mission. (Applause.)

Today, in the Gulf, Marines are enduring much to keep America strong and great. Let me leave you with words that were written more than a century ago. Back then, the Marines had just landed on another distant shore, and a reporter wrote, "The Marines have landed and the situation is well in hand." Nothing has changed -- and nothing will. (Applause.)

You know I heard on the radio, the President is going to North Carolina to lift the morale of the people. Let me assure you, it's the other way around after seeing this group. (Applause.)

So thank you -- thank you for your support. God bless you and this great country. And most of all, God bless the finest soldiers, sailors, airmen, Coast Guardsmen and Marines any nation has ever had. (Applause.) Thank you very much. (Applause.)

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you so very much. Cynthia, thank you for that introduction. This is the warmest picnic on a cold day I've ever attended, I'll tell you. (Applause.) And really, it's great to be here at Seymour Johnson, home of the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing -- the "Rocketeers" and the "Chiefs" -- (applause) -- as well as these great refueling units, the 68th and the 916th. (Applause.) And let me just pay my respects and say what an unbelievable job Colonel "Jumbo" Wray is doing here on this base. We're very proud of him. (Applause.) While your Wing Commander, Colonel Hornburg, is deployed with Desert Storm, Jumbo is filling in, doing just great.

And I'm also glad to see a man that flew over with me from our last stop -- that's Governor Martin out here, the Governor of this state. Congressman Martin Lancaster, from this district, and I am very proud he is with us here today. And, of course, the Mayor, Mayor Plunk is with us, too. And I wanted to specifically thank the Military Affairs Committee of the Wayne County Chamber of Commerce for hosting this fantastic picnic. I don't believe I've had so much fun in a long, long time. (Applause.)

And, of course, I do want to salute two others -- our very able Secretary of the Air Force, that you just met, Don Rice back there; as well as the Air Force Chief of Staff, General Tony McPeak -- both of them doing a fantastic job for our country. (Applause.)

This is a three-stop day for me. We just came here from the Marine Air Station at Cherry Point, and from here we head to Fort Stewart. But I want to tell you how very pleased I am to be able to spend some time meeting and talking to at least some of you -- especially the kids -- because I know in my heart how tough these days can be. There's a lot of waiting, a lot of uncertainty. The not knowing. But each of you do know this: The men and women from Seymour Johnson are doing a fantastic job for this country, and we are very, very grateful. (Applause.)

You've got the tactical fighters and the refuelers and the medical personnel -- (applause) -- the civil engineers and the security police. I just want you to know how grateful the nation is to this entire team -- and to you -- and to share with you here today just a few thoughts. I cast fear and horror into the heart of one guy I was having lunch with because I told him this was going to take 45 minutes -- it won't, believe me.

But let me just share some thoughts with you. I probably don't need to tell you that the brave servicemen and women of this base are part of the most motivated, the best educated, the best equipped armed forces in the history of this great country of ours -- bar none. (Applause.) Because they are, and you are, doing the hard work of freedom, the cause of freedom will prevail. I'm absolutely certain of that. (Applause.)

You know, we're now more than two weeks into Desert

Storm. And I'm happy to say and -- put it this way -- we are on course and we are on schedule. And as each day passes, Iraq's war machine, thanks to many of your loved ones, is being systematically destroyed by our allied military forces. Our investment, our training, and our planning are paying off. And, yes, sacrifices still lay ahead, but we will succeed. And when we do, we will have taught Saddam Hussein -- and all others like him -- that there is no place for lawless aggression in the region or in this new world order that we envision. (Applause.)

While I'm here, I would be remiss if I didn't salute what the U.S. and coalition airmen have accomplished. Air superiority is an established fact now. The Iraqi Air Force is no longer a factor. (Applause.) And I know that this base, as much as any base in the country -- this base is very proud of the way that we have used air superiority to go after Saddam's missiles of terror. (Applause.)

And, yes, our mission in the Gulf is demanding and it's difficult, but I can tell you that our troops will not be asked to accomplish their mission with one hand tied behind their back. We are not going to do that in this war. (Applause.) And let me say something else -- your husbands and wives, and your moms and dads will not be in that Gulf one day longer than is absolutely necessary. I want them home, and I want them all home. (Applause.)

And finally -- and I don't think I have to tell this particular group this point -- but I want each of you and all our troops -- this really is for the troops -- I want you to know that the American people stand with you. And I hope you had a chance to watch at least part of that -- the part of the State of the Union message that I want to mention to you because if you did, you would have seen a very moving scene: The entire Congress -- and Congressman Lancaster was there; he will tell you this is true -- the entire Congress, the Cabinet, the Supreme Court, the Joint Chiefs, the diplomatic corps, rose to their feet in a prolonged, heartfelt tribute to the troops. It was a moving thing. And if only you could have felt it as I did standing up there in front of the Congress -- felt the thunder of the applause and sensed the emotion that filled that chamber. And the cheering for our Armed Forces -- and it was strong, it was for them -- was followed by two more standing ovations for you, the courageous families of our servicemen and women. And it was for you and for our troops. And that's exactly the way it should have been.

And I hope that that Saddam Hussein, in his bunker somewhere in Baghdad, saw every single minute of it. And if he had -- (applause) -- and if he did, maybe he now understands that we are a nation united in support of our troops. (Applause.)

I know it's been tough on a lot of you -- maybe all you -- here at Seymour Johnson. And I know also what it is that you have offered this great nation of ours. I understand what it is that I have asked of you, what General McPeak has asked of you. Members of this fighting unit have voluntarily set aside their freedom to wage this battle. But while today some may be prisoners of war, and others may have made the ultimate sacrifice, a lifetime of democracy and faith in God keeps their spirit free. No foreign dictator can imprison the love of liberty that beats in the hearts of every American.

And before I finish, I'd like to say something to all of the kids here today. I want you to know that your parents, your loved ones, our troops in the Gulf, are enduring the hardships of war today so that you may know the blessings of peace tomorrow.

And seeing such strong, wonderful families here today, and knowing the support that you have received from this community is good for the soul and proves the strength of America's spirit. And I thank each and every one of you -- I thank each and every one of you. And when I climbed on Air Force One of this morning out there, I told them this over at Cherry Point, I heard on the television, President Bush is visiting the bases to help lift the moral. And it's been

exactly 180 degrees the other way around. My moral has been pretty darn good, frankly, but seeing those people over there and now all of you, my moral has never been more sky-high. (Applause.)

Thank you for this fantastic support for the troops. (Applause.) Because you see -- you see, I do draw strength and courage from your forbearance for the job that the Colonel and all the others are doing around here. And I ask God's blessing upon you all -- every one of you -- and upon every soldier and sailor, Marine, airman and Coast Guardsman -- every man and woman now serving in the Persian Gulf. What a wonderful country we have. And nothing could prove that more than the patriotism and the courage and the devotion of your loved ones, our beloved troops, halfway around the world.

May God bless the United States of America and each and every one of you. (Applause.) Thank you very, very much.

Immediately after the speech, the President shook hands, handed out cards, kissed military wives and received words of encouragement from the assemblage. At one point, the President took an auto-focus camera from a woman in the crowd and attempted to take a picture of himself and her standing together. The effort was to no avail, so the President handed the camera to a nearby Secret Service agent, who snapped the shot. He was handed a t-shirt with a camel on it and the slogan, "Iraqi mobile SCUD launcher."

Before leaving the base, the President toured the aircraft, at one point climbing inside a C-130 transport plane and surveying the cockpit of an ~~AV-8B Harrier~~ ^{F/A-18} fighter jet. Asked by a reporter "What do you think of Saddam massing in the South," the President replied, "He's making a big mistake."

For military buffs, the President saw two tanks, an AAV (Assault Amphibious Vehicle) and an LAV (light armored vehicle), an F/A-18 fighter jet, and four helicopters--a UH-1N "Huey", an AH-1W "Cobra", a CH-53D "Sea Stallion", a CH46E "Sea Knight."

Marlin, when asked about recent events in South Africa, said, "We welcome the move by President De Klerk of South Africa. We'll wait for the parliament to act and then we'll see. It certainly appears to take a big step in the right direction towards meeting the conditions" (for lifting the sanctions.)

Lots of color. Little news. Brent Scowcroft, asked by your pool why he thought the Iraqis had crossed the border and engaged U.S. troops, speculated that it could be they just wanted to show that they could do it or show that they were a presence. He said, "We hit 'em pretty hard...we'll continue on schedule."

Now the color. Several hundred airmen's families were gathered in huge crowds around a picnic table which was set aside for the President. He went through a food line where he got pork barbecue, cole slaw, hush puppies, potato salad, and a Pepsi, plopped down at the table and proceeded to eat while several hundred people, who had eaten earlier, watched him. This went on for at least 15 minutes as Bush chatted with people at his table, all of whom were children or spouses of servicemen serving in the Gulf. The group included a six-year-old, Michael Langlais, grandson of a Staff Sergeant plus two other teenagers and three wives.

After the picnic, the President gave the remarks you heard. He then plunged into the crowd for an extensive ropeline foray in which he signed dozens of pictures being held forward by spouses and girlfriends and family members of their loved ones, presumably all of whom are in the Gulf. One woman held out a thin, blue bracelet (Airman First Class Robert R. Mickle, Jr.) that appeared to be one of those name bracelets of Desert Shield servicepeople and the President put it on his right wrist and moved down the line. Babies were lifted. Toddlers were lifted. Bush did extensive hugging, kissing, autographing, and posing for pictures. The crowd seemed to be almost all women and young children or babies. Many of them were clutching photographs of servicemen they wanted Bush to autograph. One woman, Denise Coyle, was sobbing and holding a picture of her husband she said had volunteered in August. The President hugged her and kissed the top of her head. He then headed to meet with POW families outside the site of the pool.

There are two POWs from this base, but we don't know how many family members were there nor whether other POW families were brought in.

FORT STEWART, GEORGIA

FEBRUARY 1, 1991

The President was asked by a reporter as he worked the crowd if a ground war is inevitable. The President replied, "I'm not making any prediction."

The scene at Fort Stewart was similar to the two earlier events in that the President spent 15-20 minutes working the crowd along the barricade. Again, it was mostly women and children, with soldiers in camouflage mostly in back of the Presidential podium.

Linda Hernandez, whose husband is serving in Saudi Arabia, was one of many women standing along the front lines who watched the President with long faces and sad eyes glistening with tears. "It was wonderful," she said after the President's speech, which was exactly what we needed. Later, Mrs. Hernandez was among those with whom the President shook hands. She said, "God bless you, Mr. President." He took her face in his hands and then hugged her, while she was sobbing openly at this point and wiping away her tears with her handkerchief.

In another barricade line episode, Mr. Bush encountered Kathy Richards, who was filming the President with a camcorder, but became very nervous as he approached. "Don't be nervous," Mr. Bush consoled her. "Focus this, you'll be fine." As the President moved farther down the line, Mrs. Richards, who was filming the event for her husband, another soldier in Saudi Arabia, exploded with relief from the tension of the event. "He'll never believe it, he'll never believe it," she screamed, referring to her husband. She and her camera fell back into the crowd as her knees seemed to give way underneath her.

One other bit of color: There were two large pea-green-colored tanks, known as Bradley fighting vehicles, that were featured near the Presidential podium.

MARINE CORPS AIR STATION CHERRY POINT, NORTH CAROLINA

Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point is home to the 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (2d MAW). This particular wing is the parent organization to four fixed wing air groups, two rotary wing air groups, a Marine Air Control Group and a Marine Wing Support Group, located at a variety of bases on the East Coast of the United States. Many of the units from Cherry Point have been deployed during Desert Shield. The Marine Corps Air Station is in close proximity to Camp LeJeune, which is the home of the 2nd Marine Division.

The President will give remarks to families from Cherry Point, Camp LeJeune and base personnel in a hangar within the complex.

GOLDSBORO, SEYMOUR JOHNSON AIR FORCE BASE, NORTH CAROLINA

Seymour Johnson Air Force Base is located in the city of Goldsboro, North Carolina. It is a Tactical Air Command

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base and has the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing as its primary unit, flying the F-15E "Strike Eagle" dual role fighter aircraft. The base is named for Navy Lt. Seymour A. Johnson, a Goldsboro native, killed in an aircraft crash in Maryland in March, 1941.

The base has a population of 4,500 military members and 950 civilians. The Commander of the Wing is Colonel Hal M. Hornburg, who is deployed to Saudi Arabia. The Wing Vice Commander, Colonel James C. Wray, is currently the senior commander at the base.

The 4th Tactical Fighter Wing has deployed two squadrons of F-15Es (approximately 48 aircraft) to Saudi Arabia, the 336th Squadron in August and the 335th Squadron in December.

The President will participate in an outdoor picnic with family members of deployed personnel, base personnel, and others.

No remarks on the plane or under the wing upon arrival. Motorcade uneventful. While the President visited with spouses at the Family Assistance Center, your pool spoke with Marlin, who offered a readout from the Seymour Johnson event with POW/MIA families.

Marlin characterized the meeting as a "pretty good session. I think the President was very impressed with their courage." The President met with the wives of two POWs and two MIAs and a number of children. "They were all very supportive and said their husbands believed very strongly in what they were doing," Fitzwater said. He added that the President "just wanted to pass on the words of the President that we were doing everything we could to find their husbands."

With regard to the Gulf, he said Brent Scowcroft had called General Powell and had a "long conversation." No further details.

9:30 A.M. NEWS UPDATE

IRAQI TANKS/SAUDI TERRITORY (Dhahran/Reuter) -- Iraqi tanks broke into Saudi territory Thursday night and at least three were destroyed in a battle with U.S. Marines, according to a pool report from the front. The battle took place opposite the Kuwaiti border settlement of Umm Hujul, about 50 miles west of Khafji, the report said. The Marines called in allied air strikes and artillery to beat back the Iraqi advance. They took four Iraqi prisoners and there were no U.S. casualties, the report said. The U.S. counter-attack was continuing, said the report, filed from the front at 1 a.m. EST Friday.

(N. Saudi Arabia/AP) -- ...At the Pentagon, a military source said coalition air forces were attacking "a significant enemy force that is attempting to mass itself north of the (Kuwait-Saudi) border." The source, speaking on condition of anonymity, provided no figures for the size of the Iraqi force. He said allied troops were firing at "armored vehicles from a significant enemy force." "They have kind of done what we were hoping they would eventually do," he said. "A significant force has come out from under its bunkers to prepare to come south to test allied defenses.... We can disrupt this formation enormously."

IRAQI CHEM WARFARE/VICE PRESIDENT (London/Reuter) -- Vice President Quayle said he expected Saddam Hussein to unleash chemical warfare at some point during the Gulf War and refused to rule out the use of nuclear weapons in response. But Quayle, in an interview before meeting Defense Minister King, indicated the U.S.-led multinational forces were more likely to reply with conventional weapons in the event of a chemical attack.

FOOD AND MEDICINES TO IRAQ/IRAN (Athens/UPI) -- Iran said that it is sending food and medicines to Iraq under the supervision of the International Red Cross, the official IRNA reported.

AIR WAR (Riyadh/AP) -- Saddam Hussein has been crushed in the air war, and he ordered ground troops into Saudi Arabia in a desperate move to show he can still strike out, says the U.S. Air Force commander in the gulf. Lt. Gen. Chuck Horner said in an interview that allied air power has so devastated the Iraqi military that it would probably take a decade for Iraq to rebuild its fighting machine if the war ended tomorrow. Saddam has only hurt what is left of his military by ordering this week's border attacks, Horner said. "The attack at Khafji -- that's stupid!" he said. "That's the stupidest thing he could do!" Horner said he thinks Saddam views the cross-border raids as an assault styled after the 1968 Tet offensive that undermined U.S. domestic support for the Vietnam War.

GULF WAR/SOVIET GENERAL (Moscow/UPI) -- A Soviet general cautioned that victory for the U.S.-led allies in the Gulf War will "not come easy," and bristled at the suggestion that U.S. weapons were superior to Soviet arms used by the Iraqis in the desert conflict. Sergei Bogdanov, chief of the Operations Center of the Soviet General Staff, told the Defense Ministry Red Star newspaper it was still premature to predict Iraq's final defeat. Bogdanov charged that the Americans were using Iraq as a testing ground for its latest weapons.

GULF WAR/PHILIPPINES (Manila/AP) -- The foreign secretary called the U.S. the "constable of the world" for its role in the Gulf, and U.S. Ambassador Platt denounced the remark as "inaccurate and offensive."

BLACKS IN U.S. MILITARY/CHINA (Beijing/Reuter) -- China told its 1.1 billion people that the Gulf War had exposed official U.S. discrimination against blacks, making them shoulder an unfairly heavy burden of the fighting. This shows the "overly heavy burden of blacks and the discrimination by the government toward minority groups," the commentary said. "Operation Desert Storm has blown the cover off" (racial discrimination in the U.S.), it said.

SOVIET SOLDIERS/RUSSIAN REPUBLIC (Moscow/AP) -- A small contingent of Soviet soldiers has begun patrolling Moscow despite protests by the Russian legislature, which says the patrols are unconstitutional. In a Federation Council meeting at the Kremlin, President Gorbachev faced a roomful of republic presidents angry over the deployment of Soviet troops in their streets, as well as military attacks on civilians in the Baltics.

UNEMPLOYMENT (Reuter) -- The U.S. unemployment rate worsened for the third month in a row to reach 6.2 percent in January, its highest level since June 1987, the Labor Department said.

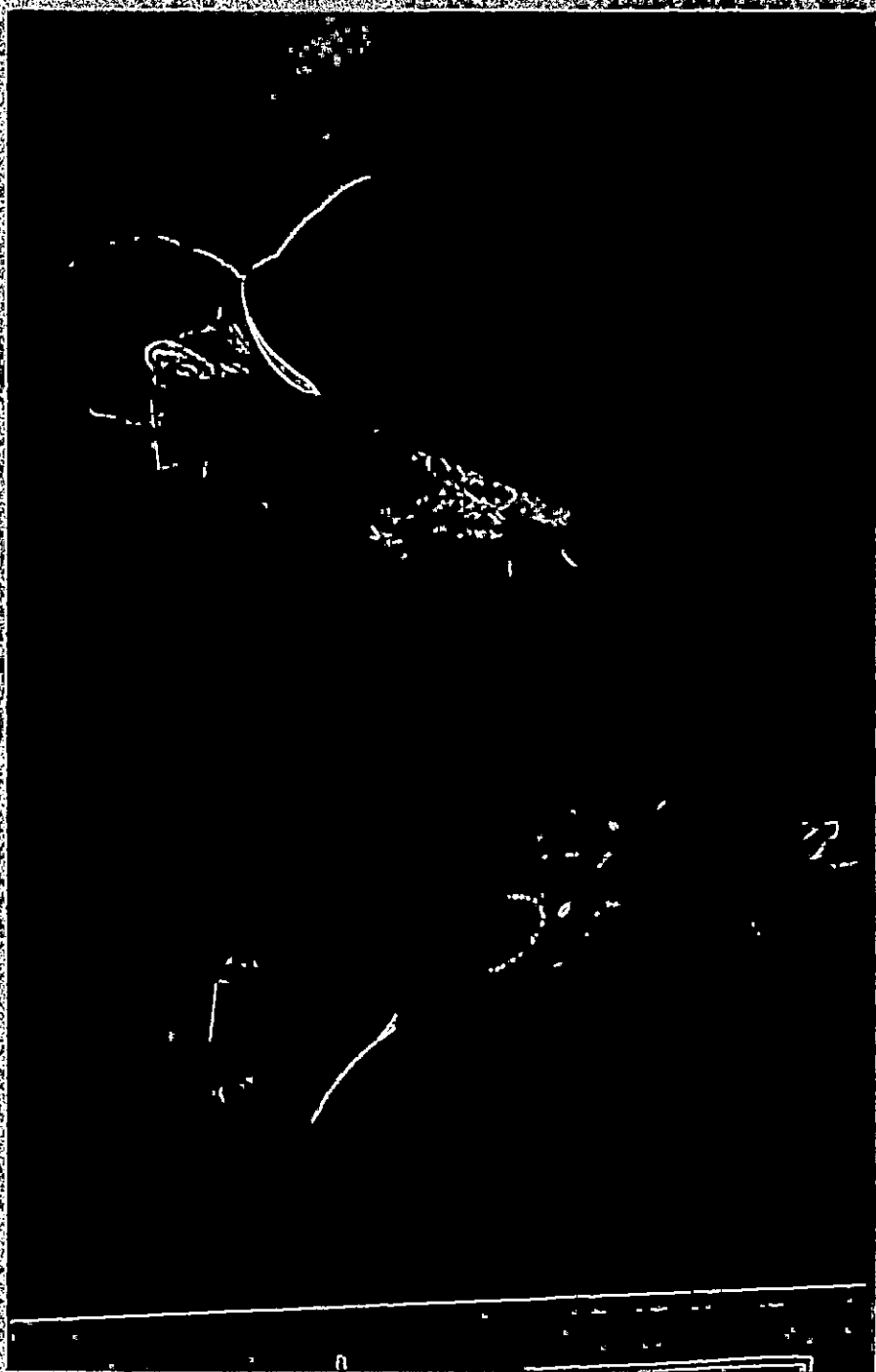
