NEUTRALITY IN IRAQ REAFFIRMED BY U.S. Kurds Seek Talks On New Government

Bush administration officials Tuesday strongly reaffirmed U.S. neutrality in the battles raging in Iraq and said American military force would not be used to protect civilian and armed rebel groups seeking to topple the government of Saddam Hussein.

All major spokesmen for the administration acknowledged Tuesday that widespread civilian deaths and atrocities were occurring in the conflict, but they said there would be no change in President Bush's decision to avoid getting involved directly in toppling Saddam. "We don't intend to involve ourselves in the internal conflict in Iraq," White House press secretary Fitzwater said....

Kurdish rebel spokesmen...reported their forces in Kirkuk had come under heavy artillery bombardment and air raids Tuesday in what they said was a prelude to a ground assault by government troops to try to recapture the key oil-producing center.

Another rebel group, the Shiite Muslim Dawa Party based in Tehran, claimed that four Iraqi air force pilots had defected to Iran in a helicopter "loaded with internationally banned chemical weapons," Reuters reported.

U.S., Fearing Iraqi Breakup, Is Said To Rule Out Action To Aid Anti-Hussein Rebels

President Bush has decided to let Saddam Hussein put down rebellions in his country without American intervention rather than risk the splintering of Iraq, according to official statements and private briefings Tuesday.

The White House said publicly that it will stay out of Iraq's internal strife, despite reports of atrocities by Saddam's forces, and a senior official said the American military has no plans to act on a warning to Iraq not to use combat helicopters against the insurgents. The U.S. acknowledged that Iraq has defied that warning.

The assertion that the administration has decided not to make any new moves to protect Iraqi rebel forces at this time reflects a conclusion that the insurgents cannot control all of Iraq and would only succeed in fracturing the country, officials said.

Bush also believes that an overt American move to support the rebels would be opposed by Washington's Arab allies, stir up domestic political opposition and spoil hopes for progress on other regional issues, a senior official said.

SADDAM MASSES TROOPS AS U.S. HANDS-OFF POLICY DISMAYS REBELS

DAMASCUS -- Iraqi rebels have expressed dismay at the U.S.'s hands-off approach to their civil-war struggle and say Saddam is massing troops for new offensives against them.

A Washington statement stunned rebels who had asked for American help in their campaign to oust Saddam....

Emigre spokesmen accused the U.S. of "taking sides" with Saddam by allowing him to use helicopters against rebels nearly 70 days since going to war to force him from Kuwait.

They predicted that Baghdad's next campaign will try to oust Kurdish rebels holding most of northern Iraq....

Opposition leaders said Kurdish guerrillas were advancing on Mosul, Saddam's last stronghold in the region....

"We believe the Fitzwater statement will encourage Saddam to increase his use of helicopters, which are attacking civilians with napalm and phosphorous bombs," said Abu Maisam al-Sagheir of the Supreme Council of the Islamic Revolution in Iraq.

Kamal Fouad, whose Patriotic Union for Kurdistan accused Iraq of using helicopters and warplanes to bomb Kirkuk Monday and Tuesday, said, "This policy is wrong. It is not in the interest of the U.S. We hope they will reconsider it."

Both Sagheir and Fouad said the U.S. wanted to weaken both the opposition and Saddam by allowing both to fight on.

WHITE HOUSE WEIGHS JORDAN ROLE IN TALKS**Baker, Scowcroft Meet With Hussein Aide**

Secretary Baker, in another round of talks aimed at restarting the Middle East peace process, has begun examining how to involve Jordan and reconcile it with the U.S. and Arab members of the allied coalition, administration officials and diplomats said Tuesday....

Officials said there is a realization in the administration that Jordan could play a crucial role in a future dialogue between Israelis and Palestinians.

Baker and national security adviser Scowcroft met this week with Adnan Abu Odeh, an adviser to Hussein. Odeh told Baker that Jordan is eager to be a participant in the nascent peace process. "They want to get back in our good graces," said an administration official....

Administration officials cautioned that any rapprochement would be gradual and said, for instance, that Jordan's Crown Prince Hassan had been discouraged from visiting Washington now in hopes of a meeting with Bush. (David Hoffman, Washington Post, A26)

DRAFT TRUCE AT HAND, SAY U.S. ENVOYS
Nonaligned Members Could Delay Vote

U.N. -- The five permanent members of the Security Council appear to have agreed on the wording of a draft resolution for a permanent cease-fire with Iraq, diplomats said Tuesday.

However, while the U.S. had hoped to have the draft approved later this week, some diplomats now say adoption by the 15-member council could stretch into next week because of opposition by nonaligned nations to certain key provisions.

Among the contested elements is a proposed U.N. role in defining and guaranteeing the Kuwait-Iraq border. "It has never happened before that the Security Council is asked to guarantee borders," said a diplomat from a nonaligned country....

The diplomat said there were other "negative precedents," which were likely to be opposed by other nonaligned members of the council. Among them was a provision for continued economic sanctions, and the creation of a U.N. commission to oversee elimination of Iraqi weapons of mass destruction.

U.N. Plan Would Force Iraq To Purge Arsenal

The five permanent members of the Security Council agreed Tuesday on general terms for a formal Gulf cease-fire that would require the elimination of Iraq's chemical, biological and nuclear weapons programs.

The lengthy draft resolution would also attach Iraq's oil income to pay reparations for its occupation of Kuwait and keep most economic sanctions and an arms embargo in place until the council debates otherwise.

It would also establish a small peacekeeping force to guarantee the Iraq-Kuwait border....

After dealing with the cease-fire issue, council members met in the evening to consider a statement by the body's current president, Austria, denouncing Israel's plans to deport four Palestinians accused of inciting violence against Jews.

A U.S. official said that two members, Cuba and Yemen, were demanding a council resolution on the issue, which carries more weight.

NEW IRAQI GOVERNMENT SWORN IN, KEY MINISTERS ABSENT

NICOSIA -- Iraq's new government has taken the constitutional oath before Saddam Hussein, but two key cabinet ministers were absent, the Iraqi News Agency reported Wednesday.

It said the defense and interior ministers, key players in the fight against the uprising aimed at toppling Saddam in Shiite Moslem southern Iraq and the Kurdish north, did not attend the ceremony "being on duty outside of Baghdad."

It did not elaborate.

KURDISH COMMANDER INVITES SADDAM FOES TO MEETING IN IRAQ

IRBIL, Iraq -- The overall military commander of Kurdish insurgents said Tuesday that he has invited Iraqi opposition leaders to come here to discuss establishing a provisional government to replace that of Saddam Hussein.

Massoud Barzani, speaking to the first Western reporters to visit rebel-held territory here, said international recognition from major powers was the most important precondition for deciding if a provisional government would be set up on Kurdish territory taken over from the Baghdad regime....

Asked if the U.S....had changed its mind since Turkey recently broke a six-decade taboo and met with a high-level Iraqi Kurdish insurgent delegation, he replied, "We don't feel any change in the field."

IRAQ IN DANGER OF BECOMING A LARGER LEBANON, ANALYSTS FEAR

...Like Lebanon, Iraq is losing control of its borders. Neighboring powers are vying for influence within the country. And a foreign army is resident on its soil. Also like Lebanon, Middle East analysts said, Iraqi problems may vex U.S. policy-makers for years.

"What we wanted was a strong Iraq without Saddam Hussein," said Michael Hudson, a professor of international relations at Georgetown University. "What we got was a weak Iraq with Saddam Hussein."...

Just what the U.S. is aiming for with Iraq is far from clear.

Boston University's Herman Eilts, who as a diplomat served in Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Egypt, characterized the U.S. as "flailing about" and attributed some of this to division within the U.N. Security Council about what the final cease-fire provisions with Iraq would contain....

"My impression," Eilts said, "is that there was little planning before the war began, and the war ended so quickly, with rapid development of events inside Iraq. There seems to be a disconnect between the inside group planners at the White House and the experts in the State Department and elsewhere. As a result, there's indecision."

WHITE HOUSE SAYS GULF WAR MAY COST UP TO \$70 BILLION

The cost of Operation Desert Storm will approach \$70 billion and U.S. taxpayers will have to pay \$13 billion more than estimated unless Congress removes a spending cap on foreign contributions, according to senior Bush administration officials.

Latest estimates indicate the final tally will surge \$20 billion -- to a total of \$60 billion to \$70 billion -- once the cost of repairs and weapons replacement are added to the price of fighting the Gulf war with Iraq, the officials said.

The revised costs include more than \$10 billion to repair damaged Navy ships and resupply depleted stockpiles of bombs, Patriot missiles, artillery and other weapons.

The new estimates provided to the Washington Times counter charges from Congress that the White House would make a profit on the money it is seeking from its allies.

GERMANY TO COMPLETE CONTRIBUTION TOWARD GULF WAR COSTS THURSDAY

German Finance Minister Theo Waigel, seeking to reassure U.S. officials that his government will fulfill its pledge to help pay for the Gulf war, told President Bush Tuesday that Germany will complete its promised 1991 payment of \$5.5 billion on Thursday....

Bush, who appeared briefly with Waigel, praised the German contribution and challenged estimates released Monday by the CBO that the cost of the war will be about \$40 billion, far less than the \$54.5 billion pledged by U.S. allies. "I'm afraid it's not going to be any cheaper...than original estimates," he said....

Waigel's visit here had initially evoked some hostility because of suggestions that he was coming, as one congressional source put it, "to look at the books to ensure that Bonn wasn't being cheated." However, at a meeting with reporters Tuesday, Waigel made clear that while he wanted to discuss with Secretary Brady the methods of accounting for war costs, the information would be used to help "pull the rug out from under the unnecessary domestic debate stirred by the opposition in Germany."

SCHWARZKOPF REVEALS: BUSH NIXED HIS PLAN TO ANNIHILATE IRAQIS

Allied Gulf commander Norman Schwarzkopf says he wanted to annihilate Iraq's armies as Hannibal once crushed the Romans, but President Bush pulled him up short.

In a television interview with David Frost scheduled for broadcast Wednesday evening, the general also said Baghdad's cease-fire negotiators "suckered me" into letting Iraq keep flying the helicopters it is now using against Shiite and Kurdish rebels.

Discussing Bush's decision to stop the ground war after four days...Schwarzkopf recalled..."Frankly, my recommendation (to Bush) had been, you know, continue the march..."

"I mean, we had them in a rout and we could have continued to reap great destruction on them. We could have completely closed the door and made it a battle of annihilation."

"And the President made the decision that we should stop at a given time, at a given place that did leave some escape routes open for them to get back out and I think it was a very humane decision and a very courageous decision on his part." (Reuter)

**SYRIA IS SAID TO PLAN TO DOUBLE ITS FORCE
AGAINST IRAQ IN GULF**

DAMASCUS -- Syria is planning to double its 20,000 member military contingent in the Gulf as part of efforts by Arab nations opposing Iraq to strengthen security in the region, a senior Syrian official said Tuesday.

The official, who spoke on condition that he not be identified, said that the exact number of troops and the precise area where they will be sent had not yet been decided.

JERUSALEM -- A Jewish settler was killed in an ambush by Palestinian gunmen who shot him while he was driving alone on a road through the occupied West Bank, the Israeli army said Wednesday. (UPI)

**'SHOOT TO KILL' ATTACKERS, ISRAELI ORDERS POLICE
Directive Aimed At Halting Arab Stabbings**

JERUSALEM -- Israeli Police Minister Roni Milo said Tuesday that security officers should "shoot to kill" Arab assailants of Israeli citizens.

Meanwhile, Israeli leaders rejected U.S. criticism of deportation orders against four alleged Palestinian uprising activists, insisting that the move was necessary to combat growing Arab terrorism. Defense Minister Arens said the U.S. condemnation "should not come as a surprise to us, but we regret it."

Foreign Minister Levy said Washington condemned deportation as an obstacle to peace but did not draw similar conclusions about the Arab stabbing attacks that took six Jewish lives in the past month. (Washington Post, A28)

BUDGET RISE CITED IN OCCUPIED LANDS

JERUSALEM -- The Israeli peace group Peace Now published a study Tuesday asserting that the government budgeted more than \$500 million during the current fiscal year on settlements in the occupied territories and related expenses.

That is more than twice the amount of such spending the government estimated it had made in a report given to the U.S. early this year.

Peace Now put the study together based on information supplied by well-placed "official sources within the government," said Eran Chayat, who compiled the research. He would not be more specific. (Joel Brinkley, New York Times, A6)

**OPPOSITION CONFRONTS GORBACHEV
Pro-Yeltsin Rally Set Despite Kremlin Ban**

MOSCOW -- The confrontation between President Gorbachev and the pro-democracy opposition heightened dramatically Tuesday as Moscow radicals supporting Russian leader Boris Yeltsin promised to defy a Kremlin ban on demonstrations, and coal miners refused to obey a government order to suspend their month-long strike.

Gorbachev, for his part, took even stronger measures to prevent the demonstrations, ordering the country's Interior Ministry to assume control of law enforcement in the capital -- a move that effectively strips the pro-Yeltsin city hall of control over Moscow's police.

Leaders of the Democratic Russia movement said they would ignore Gorbachev's decree...and would hold a pro-Yeltsin rally on Thursday....

Gorbachev, in a 90-minute TV interview Tuesday night, assailed the opposition forces, saying they had "no concrete program" and were "merely trying to stir up society" by taking advantage of the nation's current economic crisis.

Gorbachev also denied that he had moved to the political right and rejected the idea that the country required a period of authoritarian rule to bridge the historical gap between the old totalitarian state and a genuine democracy. "There is no going back, absolutely," he said, adding that "democracy is doomed if power is inefficient." (David Remnick, Washington Post, A1)

BUSH TO PRESS KAIFU ON TRADE DISPUTES

Just as President Bush seeks to use his war success to negotiate a broader Middle East peace, his new international prestige could help him pressure Japan to settle nagging economic disputes.

When he meets in California next week with Prime Minister Kaifu, Bush will push to ease a variety of irritants with Tokyo, according to administration officials familiar with trade issues....

Firmness in dealing with Tokyo could help the President combat Democratic criticism over administration trade policies and the high U.S.-Japanese trade deficit....

"I think President Bush's increased global prestige offers a marvelous opportunity to re-examine fundamental differences in the economic and trade relationship between the United States and Japan," said Jerry Jasinowski, president of the National Association of Manufacturers....

"It will probably be the same old stuff about them having to open their markets," said Clyde Prestowitz, the Commerce Department's point man on Japanese trade disputes during President Reagan's first term and now president of the Economic Strategy Institute.

He said Kaifu's visit is principally "because he's chagrined because the Japanese are seen by us as not performing very well in the Gulf" and not to give the U.S. trade concessions.

Despite the widespread chagrin over the rice ban, Japanese automakers showed little inclination Tuesday to offer concessions on Lee Iacocca's call for a reduced ceiling on auto exports....

Tadashi Yamamoto, president of the Japan Center for International Exchange warned that Japanese are starting to bridle at the harshness of the American criticism. "We should differentiate," he said, between issues such as Japan's ban on rice imports -- which, he admitted, is hard for many Japanese to justify -- and other issues where the attacks on Tokyo are less well-founded.

SKINNER SAYS WORST IS OVER FOR AIRLINES, NOT FOR AUTOMAKERS

Secretary Skinner said Tuesday he believes the worst is over for the struggling U.S. airline industry but that more tough times may lie ahead for American automakers.

Speaking with reporters, Skinner was generally optimistic about the future of the airline industry, although he predicted some "difficult transition times" ahead and said TWA, Pan Am and others still might fail....

"I do not believe that the competitive environment we have today will be significantly affected if a couple of carriers go out of business," Skinner said. "The fact that a couple of airlines go out of business doesn't necessarily mean we'll have less competition. We may even have stronger competition."...

He said the domestic auto industry is having its worst period since the recession of 1981-82 but said there would be no new limits on Japanese auto makers....

Skinner said the administration opposes a bill sponsored by Rep. Bryan to increase fuel efficiency standards.

If the bill becomes law, Skinner said "it could literally destroy the auto industry" as well as compromise safety by requiring cars to be made of lighter material to help the automakers meet tougher fuel efficiency standards.

NEW DRIVE TO AID CHILDREN OFTEN CUTS ADULT PROGRAMS

From statehouses to corporate boardrooms to Congress, a movement is building for greater spending on programs targeted for poor young children -- but often at the expense of reduced welfare assistance for their parents and other poor adults.

The shift in domestic spending priorities is being dubbed "a new line in the sandbox." It reflects the squeeze on state and federal budgets, the unpopularity of traditional income-assistance programs, and the growing belief that "preventive" spending on the health and education of young children is the only way to keep another generation from being crippled by poverty....

"I don't think we'll ever go back to the '60s, when we thought that government could intervene and break the cycle of poverty in a single generation," Cheryl Hayes, executive director of the National Commission on Children, said. "But everybody knows that we can't go on like this, letting out kids grow up the way they're growing up now." (Paul Taylor & David Broder, Washington Post, A1)

HERITAGE SAYS BUSH CAN NOW REDEEM SELF

Congress and the administration sprang a gigantic tax-and-spending hoax on Americans last year but President Bush now has the chance of a lifetime to square things with the public, Heritage Foundation analysts said Tuesday.

They said the federal budget agreement that Bush and Congress reached last year is riddled with deception, using the savings and loan bailout to hide a dramatic increase in spending.

"Every new tax dollar raised has generated \$1.83 in new domestic spending," said budget expert Scott Hodge. He said federal spending now devours more than 25 percent of the total economy, the highest level since 1946....

Noting that Bush is enjoying record approval, Heritage Vice President Kate O'Beirne said he "has an unprecedented opportunity to advance his agenda if we urge him to do so."

She said the President should announce that he wants to "liberate our inner cities, much as he liberated Kuwait City." Urban liberation is "a goal that has eluded liberals for 25 years" but will work now with a strategy that focuses on jobs, schools and neighborhoods, she said.

None of the proposals, which include parental choice in schools, ownership by the poor of public housing and enterprise zones, would add to the taxpayers' burden, Heritage experts argue.

Sources say a task force headed by HHS Undersecretary Constance Horner is working on proposals to do just that by making insurance companies change rules so that small firms will find it cheaper and easier to buy policies.

CIA OFFICIALS 'COOKED BOOKS,' EX-ANALYST SAYS

The CIA's analysis branch is plagued with mismanagement, says a former agency analyst in a rare inside look inside the secret intelligence agency.

In his letter of resignation, John Gentry, a 12-year agency veteran, accused the CIA's Directorate of Intelligence of "cooking the books" to please superiors.

Gentry also noted that 27 of 30 intelligence assessments requested by the White House for the 1989 Malta summit with President Gorbachev were not delivered in time. The briefing papers, he said, "failed to reach the President because SOVA [Soviet Analysis] division and group chiefs sat on the papers until after he left the country."

The CIA's inspector general is currently investigating the incident.

The Directorate of Intelligence's analytical review process is "destructive of creativity and timeliness," while "politically motivated analysis is injected" by superiors, Gentry said in his Nov. 16 letter, which has been widely circulated inside the CIA and on Capitol Hill.

NETWORKS TO 'EXPERIMENT' WITH POOL CAMERAS ON BUSH

Television networks are planning to reduce camera coverage of President Bush and "experiment" with coverage that will show TV audiences the same picture on every station.

In addition to saving the four networks lots of money, pooling coverage to two cameras -- from the 10 to 15 that are routine now -- will reduce sharply the crowding at photo opportunities and news conferences in the Oval Office, Cabinet Room and press Briefing Room....

IRAQI UNREST/ADMINISTRATION

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with the campaign to overthrow Saddam Hussein, and whether the Bush Administration will get more deeply involved. Iraqi opposition leaders admit today that the pro-Hussein elements of the Iraqi army have gained the upper hand in the south down near Kuwait.

(TV Coverage: Footage of buildings and troops.)

These pictures from the southern city of al-Ramada show burned-out buildings and government troops patrolling the streets, showing off, among other things, recaptured anti-aircraft guns. In the north, on the other hand, where Iraqi Kurds traditionally live, Kurdish leaders claim to control more than 90% of the region.

ABC's Charles Glass reports from Iraq with the rebel Kurds. The Kurdish forces in northern Iraq are relying increasingly on weapons captured from the Iraqi army. And Iraqi soldiers have now joined the rebellion. Kurdish commanders claim to have captured more than 60,000 Iraqi army prisoners. Kurdish commanders, whose forces now control most of northern Iraq, say they're concentrating their attacks on two fronts, moving toward Baghdad. But Kurdish leader Masoud Bovsani says the Kurds alone cannot attack Baghdad for fear of turning the war against Saddam into a battle between ethnic Kurds and the Arab majority. The Kurdish morale is surprisingly high. In nearly every city we've gone to we've seen people cheering and applauding whenever they've heard that another town has been liberated by the Kurds in northern Iraq. They applaud me as though I, as an American, were somehow responsible for the liberation of northern Iraq, and they pat me on the back and say to send their best wishes to President Bush. The Kurdish leaders say openly that the one thing they would like is for the Americans to reassert control of the skies over Iraq. They believe that on the ground, they have no problem. There is every bit of evidence on the ground to support that view. **(ABC-Lead)**

ABC's Brit Hume: All over town today, questions about Iraq's use of attack helicopters against rebel forces. And about why the U.S. isn't trying to stop it.

(State Dept. spokeswoman Tutwiler: "Our policy concerning helicopters has not changed over the last 24 hours, and I would refer you to the transcript from the Pentagon, where that is articulated almost every day.")

At the Pentagon today, though, the effort seemed not so much to articulate the policy but to blur it.

(Pete Williams: "We have not said what we're going to do about that, and I can't say today either.")

The problem for the Administration is that the President himself has suggested the U.S. will insist Iraq ground its helicopters.

(President Bush, March 13: "I must confess to some concern about the use of Iraqi helicopters in violation about what our understanding was, and that's one that has got to be resolved before we're going to have any permanence to any cease-fire.")

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Hume continues: Officials say that in his first meeting with Iraqi generals, Gen. Schwarzkopf reached an informal understanding that Iraq would not use its helicopters. Schwarzkopf's purpose was to safeguard coalition forces. Now, though, the helicopters are very much in use, but against groups like the Kurds trying to topple Saddam. They pose no apparent threat to allied troops. So at the White House today, spokesman Fitzwater said yes, using the helicopters does violate the understanding with Iraq, but that they would only be attacked if they appeared to endanger coalition forces. If that seems to contradict the President's own words, it does. The policy has changed. The Administration doesn't want to go after the helicopters that are fighting the rebels because it doesn't want to get involved in Iraq's internal power struggle. What it wants instead is to sign a permanent cease-fire and bring U.S. forces home. (ABC-2)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: We don't intend to involve ourselves in the internal conflict in Iraq: That's the word from the White House. And that means no shooting down of Iraqi helicopters firing on Iraqi rebels. But President Bush can't be happy with the prospects -- Saddam Hussein is winning everywhere but in the north. And he is preparing to concentrate his forces there next.

NBC's Fred Francis reports from the Pentagon that senior officials say it is only a matter of time before Saddam, left alone, puts down all the challenges to his rule.

(TV Coverage: Kurdish leader greeted by chanting crowds.) But today's triumphant return to Iraq of an exiled Kurdish leader seemed to belie that U.S. assessment. Jalal Talabani, the leader of tens of thousands of Kurdish rebels, looked every bit the conqueror in this village near the Turkish border. His Kurdish faction, with others, control much of northern Iraq, including the oil center of Kirkuk. But Saddam's tanks and more helicopter assaults are being organized. Heavily armored Republican Guard forces are preparing for a counterattack on Kirkuk.

(Pete Williams: "The Iraqi military appears to have withdrawn from the city for now, although there are indications that Iraqi military forces are now regrouping outside the city of Kirkuk.") Because U.S. forces did not interfere with Saddam's ruthless crackdown of Shi'ite rebels in the south, he was able to stage the buildup of heavy forces to confront the Kurds in the north. In the south, say refugees, thousands have died.

(Spokeswoman Tutwiler: "We cannot confirm recent reports of massacres by government forces, but there is no doubt that heavy civilian casualties have resulted from the fighting between government and dissident forces.")

Saddam's reconrol of the south comes despite Iran's cross-border raids and aid to Shi'ite rebels. Many of the Iranian attacks are against Iranian mujahideen rebels based in Iraq. Sources say Iran has taken a beating, losing hundreds of revolutionary guards in two weeks of fighting. But the incursions continue.

Meanwhile, the Bush Administration, it seems, has made the sour choice that Saddam is better than the unknown. (NBC-Lead)

Rather: In an apparent reversal of policy, President Bush today gave Saddam Hussein what amounts to a green light to use helicopter gunships against Iraqi rebels. Military sources say the choppers may turn the tide in the civil war Saddam's way.

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CBS's David Martin: If the rebels are counting on U.S. help, they will be bitterly disappointed. The Administration today backed off its warning to Iraq not to use helicopters against the rebels. White House spokesman Fitzwater told reporters the U.S. does not consider Iraq's use of helicopters a violation of the cease-fire - a far cry from what President Bush said just two weeks ago.

(President Bush, March 13: "I must confess to some concern about the use of Iraqi helicopters in violation of what our understanding was, and that's one that has got to be resolved before we're going to have any permanence to any cease-fire.")

Despite that warning, Iraq continues to fire 90-100 helicopter missions a day. But Pentagon officials say they have no orders to shoot them down unless they threaten the allied forces. U.S. jets will still shoot down Iraqi warplanes, which because of their speed can threaten allied forces with little or no warning.

(Pete Williams: "We're not going to get involved in the battle between the insurgents and the Iraqi military.")

Kurdish rebels still hold the upper hand in the north, and some analysts think Saddam may decide he has more pressing problems than fighting over territory which has little economic importance. The Bush Administration wants to get rid of Saddam without doing any of the dirty work of becoming involved in Iraq's civil war. But knowing what it wants and how to get it are two different things, which is why the Administration still seems to be groping for a postwar policy toward Iraq. (CBS-6)

IRAQ/U.N.

CBS's Bill Plante reports the members of the U.N. Security Council have agreed on the shape of a cease-fire agreement for Iraq, a big step toward getting American and allied troops home from the Gulf. The resolution calls for Iraq to destroy its ballistic missiles as well as its chemical and biological weapons under U.N. supervision, and dismantle its nuclear weapons program while the International Atomic Energy Agency watches. The arms embargo on conventional weapons would remain. A percentage of Iraq's oil revenue would go into a fund, overseen by the U.N., to repay individuals and nations who suffered war damage. The draft agreement would also take the unprecedented step of having U.N. military observers guaranteeing Iraq's border with Kuwait. Some members of the Council have objected since this could serve as a precedent in other border disputes. Once the cease-fire has formally taken effect, the U.N. observer force would take over policing operations, and allied troops could go home. Iraq has denounced the plan as barbaric, to no one's surprise, and Baghdad's friends Yemen and Cuba are expected to vote against it. U.S. officials think it will pass without much trouble, perhaps even by the end of the week. (CBS-7)

GULF/ALLIED DEBT

Rather: (TV Coverage: President Bush and German finance minister in Oval Office.) President Bush tried today to squelch the notion that the U.S. government might collect more money from its allies than it actually spent on the Gulf war. Meeting with the finance minister of Germany, Bush said the war is not going to be any cheaper than the original estimate. Bush didn't say which estimate he meant, but the German envoy said his country would pay the final installment of its \$6.5 billion pledge this week. (CBS-8)

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KUWAITI OIL FIRES

NBC's Deborah Roberts reports on the effort to stop the Kuwaiti oil well fires. Texas firefighters are still only assessing the job ahead, as not enough water or equipment has arrived to put out the fires. One says they hope to accomplish the job in 18 months. Meanwhile, scores of sabotaged wells which are no longer burning are gushing out rivers of oil across the desert. Today, one well was controlled for the first time. It was capped with a new valve and could be producing oil again within a week. Only 540 wells to go -- most more difficult and dangerous. (NBC-2)

Brokaw reports that scientists worry that with the end of the rainy season shortly, the smoke will spread as far as India and Pakistan.

NBC's Robert Bazell reports on the health hazard for U.S. troops from the well fires. Troops complain about the effects of the fumes. Sherri Moyers' husband Jeffrey is a Marine reserve captain. (Sherri Moyers: "As family members, we're getting phone calls from husbands and sons saying they're getting sick, they're getting headaches, they're nauseous. One son called, he said he was getting pains in his chest.")

Health experts say burning oil spews out many toxic substances which could increase the long-term cancer risk for some of the troops. But there are more immediate health risks, especially for young people with hidden health problems. The Pentagon spokesman was asked about the problem today.

(Pete Williams: "The EPA has taken some samples of the air, places where soldiers are located, and has concluded that there's no imminent danger to the troops by being there.")

But many of the family members of the troops do not agree.

(Moyers: "I called the Pentagon, and I spoke to a major who told me that she agreed with me. She said she thought it was worse than Agent Orange, and she wished me good luck. And I told her that they hadn't heard the end of it and that we weren't going to stop as family members until something's done.")

The Pentagon is considering sending cloth or paper face masks to the troops. (NBC-3)

HUNGER

Rather: One out of eight American children under the age of 12 is going hungry tonight. That is the finding of a new two-year study.

CBS's John Blackstone reports on the findings. The new estimate shows 5.5 million children under the age of 12 don't get enough to eat, and six million more are at risk of going hungry.

(Robert Fersh, Food and Research Action Center: "A hungry child cannot learn. A hungry child incurs higher medical and educational costs, and ultimately is a less productive member of society.")

(Rep. Downey: "I think it's fair to say that hungry children in this land of plenty is the ultimate obscenity.")

The WIC program, which gives food assistance to pregnant women, infants and children, once helped children until they reached age four or five, but now helps feed only the youngest. California's Gov. Wilson today called for more emergency aid. But the national study shows America's hungry children need dependable programs to keep them healthy. (CBS-Lead, ABC-3)

SUPREME COURT/CONFESSIONS

Rather reports the Supreme Court made a major shift, limiting the long-held rights of citizens accused of crimes. The justices ruled that a forced confession by police no longer means a conviction has to be thrown out.

CBS's Rita Braver reports on the ruling. A sharply divided court, in an opinion by Chief Justice Rehnquist, said convictions can stand if the trial also includes the use of other convincing evidence. Conservatives welcomed the new ruling.

(Paul Kamenar, Washington Legal Foundation: "We think that society should not be punished for mere technicalities that are committed during the trial proceedings.")

The balance in the five-four case was tilted by Justice Souter. The opposition, led by Justice White, said the use of coerced confessions violates the Constitution's basic protection against self-incrimination. Defense attorneys warned the decision will lead to police misconduct.

(Jeffrey Weiner, National Association of Criminal Defense Attorneys: "Because they don't have to be as careful, they can use trickery and deception and force and threats and you name it to get that statement.")

Today's ruling seems to signal increased willingness by the court to restrict the rights of the accused. (ABC-7, CBS-2)

JOB DISCRIMINATION

Rather reports the Supreme Court put new limits on laws against job discrimination. The justices ruled that job-bias protection laws do not apply to U.S. citizens employed by American businesses overseas. (CBS-3)

LAPD/POLICE BRUTALITY

Brokaw reports four Los Angeles Police officers were arraigned today on charges related to that videotaped beating of a black motorist. The officers pleaded not guilty to assault with a deadly weapon and unnecessarily beating a suspect. (NBC-5)

CBS's Jerry Bowen reports the trial date may be set later this week, but the question of getting a fair trial has defense attorneys fuming and critical of President Bush's comment that viewing the infamous home video made him sick.

(John Barnett, Officer Brisuno's attorney: "This is the United States, it's not the Baltic states. And it's very distressing when people in responsible positions find defendants guilty without trial.")

And the man who recorded the video, George Holliday, was honored by Los Angeles County today for getting involved.

(Holliday: "Changes have to be made, but I'm a bit saddened by all the bad publicity the police department's getting, because they're not a bad institution, they're a good institution.")

More indictments may be forthcoming this week. But an FBI probe for possible patterns of police misconduct has been stalled. Among the problems: some officers are refusing to be interviewed by FBI agents without guarantees their words won't come back to haunt them in a future criminal investigation. (CBS-4, ABC-5)

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RIGGS MURDER

Jennings reports on the aftermath of the Anthony Riggs murder. Riggs' wife and brother were charged with the murder of the former Gulf soldier. Riggs and his wife had reportedly been having both marital and money problems. (ABC-6, NBC-4, CBS-10)

MIDWAY BANKRUPTCY

Jennings reports that Chicago-based Midway Airlines has filed for bankruptcy. Midway says it will keep flying while trying to reorganize itself. (ABC-8)

SOVIET ARMY

Jennings reports President Gorbachev has put the Soviet Interior Ministry in charge of enforcing law and order in Moscow, a job normally reserved for the Moscow city government, which has become increasingly anti-Gorbachev.

ABC's Jim Laurie reports on the Soviet army and Gorbachev. Generals are still angry about the loss of Eastern Europe, and younger officers are angry about conditions at home. Nearly 200,000 officers and their families are without adequate housing. And they are all angry about the way they are treated in the outlying republics, where they face civilian resentment. Many are striking back, staging their own demonstrations, which are given extensive coverage on state-controlled television. President Gorbachev seems more anxious than ever to please the army and use it in the name of law and order. But the brutality of the army's actions against unarmed civilians in the Baltics has raised fears that the frustrated and fractured force might spin out of control. Chief of Staff Moiseyev said nuclear weapons have been moved to the Russian heartland and are under careful control. The Soviet media recently reported that soldiers at a missile base threatened to desert their posts if food shortages were not corrected. It's clear that the military is exerting greater influence in Soviet life, forming new power centers in parliament. Some Russians express concern about the possibility of military coups. (ABC-9)

NBC's Bob Abernethy reports Boris Yeltsin's supporters on the Moscow City Council voted to defy yesterday's government ban on rallies for three weeks. Meanwhile, a spokesman for 300,000 striking coal miners says they'll continue their strike in spite of an order by the Soviet parliament today to stop it. Tonight, President Gorbachev went on television to appeal again for national unity and to try to justify his increasingly hard line. (Gorbachev: "The government must be firm and strong to keep the democratic process going.") (NBC-8, CBS-9)

GULF/GROUND WAR ANALYSIS

ABC's Bill Redeker reports on the lessons of the ground war. Field commanders learned realistic training was as important as high-tech weaponry. But allied success was sealed by Iraqi failures in every critical aspect of the war. There has been an enormous impact in the reputation of Soviet-designed equipment. (ABC-11)

EDITORIALS/COLUMNISTS

ARMS SALES

Bush Should Be Ending Arms Proliferation, Not Looking For New Ways To Finance It -- "...The Bush Administration -- in a decision that makes lousy trade policy, budget policy and foreign policy -- wants the Export-Import Bank to guarantee up to \$1 billion in bank loans so that defense contractors can sell weapons to countries that otherwise couldn't afford them.... The rationale for the change is that other nations, particularly France, Britain and Germany, heavily subsidize their military contractors' sales to Third World nations with cut-rate financing and other sweeteners.... Washington should seek to eliminate the subsidies through negotiations, not engage in a game of tit-for-tat.... The time is ripe for curbing the worldwide proliferation of weaponry, yet the Administration seems intent on helping it along." (Newsday, 3/25)

No Windfall For Arms Merchants -- "The New World Order is beginning to look a lot like the old arms race.... A renewed round of weapons stockpiling is needed, Secretary Cheney told Congress, to enable Washington's allies in the Middle East to deal with threats to their security. Cheney did not identify the sources or the nature of these threats.... The day before Cheney testified, the State Department announced President Bush would soon ask Congress to approve financing \$1 billion in arms sales to unspecified foreign countries.... One would hope that the Administration would have used the end of the Cold War and the defeat of Iraq as an opportunity to bring new thinking to bear on Mideast rivalries. Instead, the White House has fallen back on familiar policies, even though some of those have done nothing in the past to make the Mideast more stable and secure." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 3/23)

Arms Bazaar: Congress Should Reject Bush Proposal -- "...President Bush's 90-plus approval rating...has apparently stricken him with amnesia. For all the months that Iraq was occupying Kuwait, he repeatedly condemned Saddam for squandering his nation's oil riches to amass all kinds of weapons.... And he repeatedly emphasized the need to curb the flow of all types of weapons to Third World countries and areas of instability, especially the Middle East. In the few weeks since the war's end, Bush must have decided that it matters more that U.S. defense contractors have an equal shot at arming the Saddams of the world.... Despite Administration claims that the [Ex-Im Bank proposal] is not contradictory to its aim to effect arms control in the Mideast, it is.... Congress should reject the proposal. We did not go to war to defeat Saddam only to create others." (Dallas Morning News, 3/21)

Put A Tight Rein On The Arms Explosion -- "...The President says he wants to reduce the flow of weapons to the Gulf. But the announcement of a \$1 billion program to guarantee arms loans to foreigners casts doubt on the commitment.... There are better ways to [bolster U.S. weapons manufacturers] than through arms sales to potential foes. The U.S....can provide arms makers with loans or subsidies. Meanwhile, officials should work toward reducing competition from foreign manufacturers by pressuring their governments to limit their exports." (New York Daily News, 3/26)

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The Flow Of Arms -- "Strong postwar words about the need to reduce the flow of arms into the Mideast have so far been just that.... The U.S. should be leading discussions of ways to regulate the arms market instead of backing off every time a regional ally pleads or a U.S. armsmaker bemoans Pentagon budget cuts. The President's commitment to press for limits on the sale of missile technology is a good start."
(Christian Science Monitor, 3/21)

It's Arm Business As Usual For America -- "The U.S. is blowing a historic chance in the Middle East by refusing to halt or at least seriously curtail arms sales to the region.... The President defends his proposed sale of American arms to the Mideast with the explanation that it is meant to enhance the region's 'balance' and 'stability.'... 'Stability' and 'balance' means 'our clients safely on top.' To other countries, of course, 'stability' and 'balance' means putting their clients safely on top. And so another arms war is begun.... It is a cycle that only the U.S. can break. Right now, we have the political and military prestige needed to set an example that other nations, perhaps even the USSR, would feel compelled to follow."
(Atlanta Constitution, 3/20)

Slowing The Mideast Arms Race -- "...While Secretary Baker was on the road, his arms-control efforts were being undermined back in Washington.... At best, the Ex-Im Bank's ill-timed arms-export request is a case of Washington's right hand not knowing what its left hand is doing. At worst, it is a case of foreign-policy hypocrisy.... A certain level of U.S. weapons transfers to allies in the Gulf is indeed desirable.... The unseemly request, however, has undermined the sensible White House argument for restraint in weapons transfers. The Administration should sidetrack the promotion for high-tech weaponry, giving the U.N. time to organize a strict Mideast arms-control regime as the basis of a new regional security structure."
(Cleveland Plain Dealer, 3/21)

The Need To Rationalize Arms Trade -- "President Bush is dangerously close to getting caught in the quicksand of Middle East arms sales. One day he's deploring the tragedy of another arms race in the Persian Gulf. The next, he's pushing the sale of a multibillion-dollar weapons package to the region and trying to find some way for Washington to subsidize still more arms sales.... President Bush should end the ambivalence and lay out a clear, rational approach to arms sales. Its primary goal should be to slow the proliferation of nuclear, biological and chemical and missile technology. Meantime, the State Department and Pentagon should have the flexibility to arm dependable friends, but only when this will increase regional security and stability. The two goals aren't incompatible, but it's going too far to ask U.S. taxpayers to bear the risk of arms sales through guaranteed loans or other direct supports."
(Chicago Tribune, 3/22)

Regional Arms And The Man -- "...Why let others cash in on all the fear? American arms are the hot merchandise right now and they fetch top dollar. The U.S. economy is in a recession and arms sales help prop up the bottom line.... But surely some sense of *deja vu* is inescapable. Until just recently Iraq was receiving a steady flow of Western arms and technical assistance.... That stab at a balance of power through arms sales literally blew up in our faces."
(Los Angeles Times, 2/24)

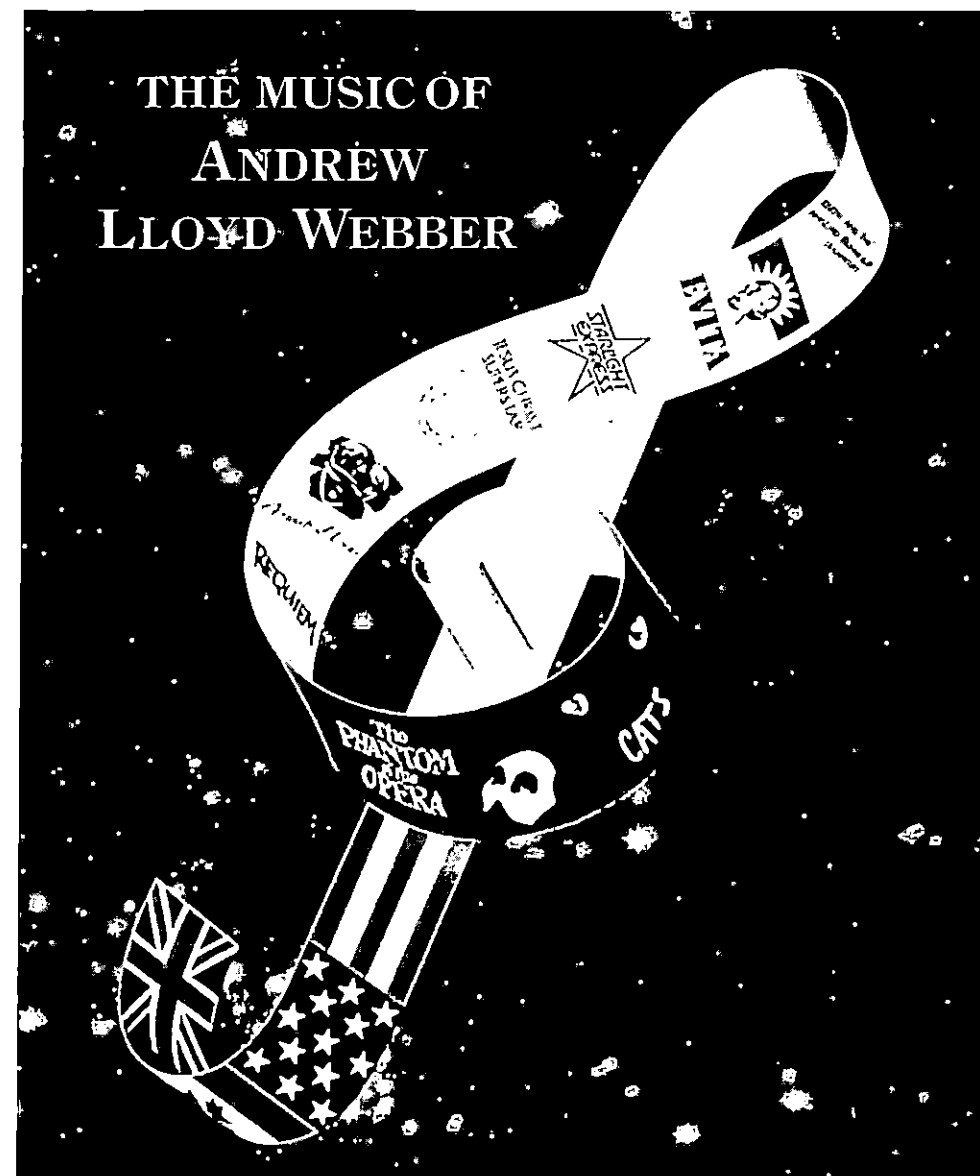

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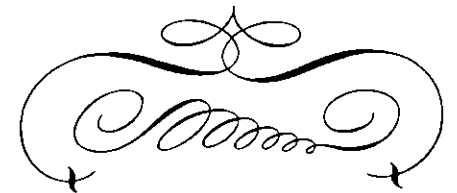

STAGEBILL TRAVELLER

Quick tips for American theatergoers in London

* The stalls are the orchestra seats, the dress (sometimes royal) circle is the mezzanine, and the upper circle is the balcony. Many British theaters have separate outside entrances to the different sections.

* Remember, 7:30 is the standard curtain time; this city tends to close down early. If you know where you're going it is possible to get a good meal after the theater, but if you're at all uncertain, many restaurants in the West End area offer a special pre-theater menu.

* Beware of ticket touts (scalpers). Before you part with your cash, go into the theater's lobby and check where the proffered seat is on the floor-plan chart. Better still, ask at the box office about the seat on

offer. The tout should wait for you to do this. Don't buy unless you are so desperate to see the show you don't mind sitting behind a pillar or staring into the wings at a weird angle.

* A bewildering diversity of accents—from Cockney to Geordie, from Scots to Welsh—carry in-built character clues for the native audience. They're a Morse code of social, political, and educational shorthand. Sometimes they can be difficult to follow, so don't worry about getting every word. Go with the flow and you should soon be out of the woods. One small consolation: some of the more exotic accents are almost as foreign to many Englishmen as they are to you.

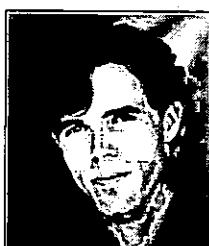

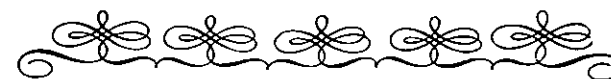

In early 1991, in addition to producing **THE PHANTOM OF THE OPERA** for Toronto, The Corporation will mount a second Canadian production of the musical that will embark on an eighteen-month national tour to Vancouver, Montreal, Ottawa and Calgary. Mr. Drabinsky's live theatre career began in 1977 when he co-produced Tom Stoppard's award-winning drama **TRAVESTIES** at Toronto's St. Lawrence Centre. Mr. Lloyd Webber's awards include four Tony Awards, four Drama Desk Awards, three Grammys, including the award for Best Classical Contemporary Composition for **REQUIEM** in 1986, and three 'Larrys.' He was honored in 1988 with an award for Creative Achievement by B'nai Brith in New York. Also in 1988 he was awarded Fellowship of the Royal College of Music. In January 1988, he was the first recipient of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers' Triple Play Award. With the opening of **ASPECTS OF LOVE** in New York, Mr. Lloyd Webber will have three musicals playing on Broadway and four in London.

✓ The following is a statement made by Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney concerning the President's decision to terminate military operations in the Gulf War:

"The decision the President made to stop military action was correct and courageous, and it was based on the recommendations of his senior military advisors. The decision was coordinated with and concurred in by the commander in the field, General Schwarzkopf.

"Our advice to the President was based on the fact that we had achieved our military objectives. The question was whether to continue operations with the attendant killing and destruction beyond what was required to achieve our objectives.

"General Schwarzkopf and General Powell were consulted and made the recommendation to me and to the President that we had achieved our military objectives and agreed that it was time to end the campaign. The President and I spoke personally with General Schwarzkopf that evening to congratulate him on the outstanding success of the campaign. He raised no objection to terminating hostilities."

SUBJECT: Post-Gulf International Economic Issues *CBS*

The successful conclusion of the war has raised a host of unanswered questions on the international economic front.

- o What countries will be the engines of world growth? This is particularly important for the U.S. at this time, since exports are providing roughly 50 percent of our growth.
 - ✓ -- Although Germany and Japan led world economic growth last year, both economies are slowing. There are signs of disarray in German policy-making, and the Japanese stock and real estate markets continue to have elements of vulnerability.
 - ✓ -- While there are some signs of leveling interest rates outside the United States, rates nonetheless remain very high. A concerted effort to make sure central bankers do not start a round of rate increases may be required.
 - The successful outcome of the war and improved confidence in the American economy have contributed to renewed strength in the dollar. Concerns about the Soviet Union and problems in Germany have fed DM weakness (and therefore dollar strength). While the underlying bullishness of the U.S. economy is welcome, we will need to manage this situation carefully in order to avoid competitiveness problems that could re-emerge if the dollar becomes too strong.
- o What will the global capital shortage mean to regions of key interest to the United States?
 - Eastern Europe and Latin America both need capital flows to support investment and growth. Although broad-based economic reforms in both areas may attract needed capital (particularly in Latin America where flight capital is being brought home), both regions will need substantial funds to support the growth necessary to sustain domestic reform.

- ✓ -- The Soviet Union is also in dire need of foreign capital, but cannot expect significant flows until there is greater political and economic order. However, the Soviet Union has particular leverage on Germany and other Western European countries and perhaps the Eastern Bloc, and could be quite successful in squeezing needed funds from those quarters.
 - ✓ -- The Middle East is in need of both immediate funds for reconstruction and longer-run support for development and reform. The front-line states, in particular Egypt and Turkey, continue to require exceptional assistance.
 - ✓ -- The traditional capital surplus countries, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, are not likely to be able to address these needs in the near-term. Kuwait faces huge reconstruction costs and Saudi Arabia is acting as though they are short of funds as they cope with the costs of the war in the context of a weak oil market. Their circumstances also raise questions about their ability to fulfill promptly their remaining Desert Storm obligations. The Saudis have raised again the possibility of paying us in oil.
- o What is the future of the oil market?
- The outcome of the war has left open major questions concerning the price and volatility of the oil markets. The effectiveness of OPEC in fostering stability in these markets is in serious doubt, raising the possibility of greater volatility in the future, particularly in the event of further supply disruptions.

As we move to extend U.S. leadership in the post-Gulf world to the economic arena, it is important that we develop a clearer and more comprehensive understanding of how to address these questions with our colleagues in the coalition.

In an effort to explore the issues outlined with financial leaders in both G-7 countries and the Gulf, I plan to travel in early April to Europe and the Middle East. The trip would be keyed off of the inaugural meeting in London of the new European Development Bank, where the United States is the largest shareholder. The tentative dates I have in mind are April 7 through April 16.

I would welcome any reaction you have to these plans.

5:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

SCHWARZKOPF/PRESIDENT (AP) -- President Bush said there was no difference "between any of us" on the conduct of the war despite an interview in which Gen. Schwarzkopf said he recommended against ending the fighting so soon. Bush, who said he hadn't spoken to Schwarzkopf about the interview, told reporters, "All I know is there was total agreement in terms of when this war should end." Bush rejected the idea that Schwarzkopf had recommended continuing the fighting, but refused to criticize the general. "I have such high regard for Gen. Schwarzkopf," he said.

SADDAM/PRESIDENT (Bethesda/Reuter) -- President Bush said the turmoil now gripping Iraq made it unlikely that President Saddam would be able to remain in control of his country. "It seems unlikely he can survive," Bush told reporters, following a medical examination at Bethesda Naval Medical Center. "I don't know how long it will take," Bush said. But he said pressure was mounting against Saddam because of widespread unrest in the country. "With this much turmoil it seems to me unlikely that he will survive. People are fed up with him. They see him for the brutal dictator that he is," Bush said.

(Rita Beamish, AP) -- President Bush said it is unlikely that Saddam can remain in power because Iraqi people "are fed up with him." Bush reiterated a desire to restore normal relations with Iraq, and repeated earlier statements that Saddam must go before that can happen. "There's enough dissent and disorder that it appears the Iraqi citizens are trying to do something about this," the President told reporters. "We'll wait and see how it plays out but I think we'd have to put him down as fairly doubtful at this point."

RESTRICTIONS ON IRAQ/STATE DEPT. (UPI) -- The Bush Administration, confident that the U.N. will soon adopt tough military and economic restrictions against Iraq, said it would implement the new plan regardless of the beleaguered nation's response to it. "These resolutions, if adopted, should be implemented whether Iraq accepts them or not," State Department spokeswoman Tutwiler said at a regular news briefing. Tutwiler would not disclose whether military means would be used to impose the restrictions.

DIALOGUE WITH PALESTINIANS/U.S. (AP) -- The Bush Administration has taken its renewed dialogue with Palestinian Arabs a step further by hosting a meeting here on prospects for Arab negotiations with the Israeli government. It was not clear whether the lone Palestinian who met Tuesday with Dennis Ross, head of the policy planning staff of the State Department, had the approval of the PLO. State Department spokeswoman Tutwiler declined to identify the Palestinian who met with Ross.

ECOLOGICAL WARFARE/IRAQ/U.N. (U.N./AP) -- Iraq would be liable for the environmental damage caused by war tactics such as torching oil wells and dumping oil into the gulf, under a measure forged by leading Security Council members. The 20-page [cease-fire draft in which the environmental clause is included] is the most complicated of the resolutions considered since Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

U.S. CEASE-FIRE DRAFT/SOVIETS (U.N./Reuter) -- The Soviet Union responded positively to a U.S.-initiated resolution for a cease-fire in the war, but made technical changes that might delay Security Council discussions on the measure. "Yes, we have instructions from Moscow," said Soviet Ambassador Vorontsov, adding that "of course, of course" the response was positive.

ISRAELI WAR RESTRAINT/ARMY CHIEF (Tel Aviv/UPI) -- Israel's army chief of staff said that his nation did more for U.S. interests by not retaliating for 39 Iraqi missile strikes during the war than it got in return with the Patriot defense system and a neutralized Iraq. Lt. Gen. Dan Shomron, in a 1 1/2-hour meeting with foreign journalists, also said Israel "lives with...and learns from" the 3-year-old Palestinian uprising but would make no concessions to the continuing violence. Shomron, who steps down from his post March 31, said he was comfortable with his nation's policy of restraint during the war and said he hoped the world would recognize Israel's contribution to the allied cause.

SOVIET DEMONSTRATIONS/STATE DEPT. (AP) -- The Bush Administration publicly reminded the Soviet Union of its commitment to allow public demonstrations, one day before a massive rally planned at the Kremlin. As a signer of the 1975 Helsinki accords, Moscow "has reaffirmed the right of peaceful assembly and demonstrations," State Department spokeswoman Tutwiler said. But Tutwiler also said that restrictions on the right of peaceful assembly "are sometimes necessary for public safety and other legitimate grounds."

BRITISH TROOPS IN GULF/KING (London/UPI) -- Defense Secretary King said that more than half of the British troops in the gulf would be withdrawn by the end of the week, but additional personnel would be deployed in the area. "We do not intend to retain a permanent ground force capability in the area," King said. "While their equipment is in the gulf and we review progress toward a formal cease-fire, we shall deploy some 1,500 personnel to take advantage of the training opportunities. My expectation is that the battle group will not remain beyond June."

BANK DEPOSITS/GONZALEZ (UPI) -- Rep. Gonzalez said the Bush Administration needs "to level with the people up front" on whether a taxpayer-funded bailout is needed for the cash-strapped fund that insures bank deposits. Gonzalez called a news conference to complain about what he called contradictory and rapidly changing figures the Administration has released about how much the FDIC wants to borrow to shore up the Bank Insurance Fund. "The people are beginning to smell a new taxpayer bailout," Gonzalez said. "If this is the case, it would be prudent of the Administration to level with the people up front" about the costs.

1992 BID/GOV. WILDER (AP) -- Gov. Wilder authorized supporters to raise money for a possible campaign for the 1992 Democratic presidential nomination. Wilder associates filed organizational papers for the "Wilder for President Exploratory Committee" with the Federal Election Commission.

PRESIDENT'S PHYSICAL (Helen Thomas, UPI) -- A smiling President Bush emerged from a six-hour physical examination at Bethesda Naval Hospital and pronounced himself "in perfect health." Bush said the team of naval doctors and his own White House physician, Dr. Lee, "found no problems" and that there was no further deterioration in the glaucoma in his left eye.

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11:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

BOMB BLASTS/TURKEY (Istanbul/AP) -- Bomb blasts shattered windows of a Shell Oil Company building near Istanbul and at the U.S. Consulate and Citibank office in the Aegean port city of Izmir, reports said. No injuries were reported in either explosion Tuesday night. No one immediately claimed responsibility.

SOVIET DEMONSTRATIONS (Moscow/Reuter) -- Leaders of the Soviet Union's largest republic declared illegal a Kremlin ban on demonstrations in Moscow, ratcheting up tension in the capital on the eve of a mass protest planned by radicals. The independent Interfax news agency quoted the presidium of the Russian Federation's parliament as saying the three-week ban violated the Soviet constitution.... Soviet security forces armed with water cannon, nightsticks and tear gas vowed to crush a banned anti-government rally outside the Kremlin. Moscow city officials said hundreds of thousands of demonstrators were expected to march Thursday to the Manezh Square, at the gates of the Kremlin, in defiance of a ban on all protests in the capital.

WAR CONTRIBUTIONS/GERMANY (Bonn/UPI) -- Finance Minister Waigel said that Germany will pay the full amount it pledged toward Desert Storm but stressed that the U.S. Administration promised not to seek more money. "We have Washington's commitment that they do not want to make money out of the war, but just cover the costs," Waigel told a news conference on his return from the U.S.

KURDISH REBELS/CAPTURED WARPLANES (Zakho, Iraq/AP) -- Kurdish rebels, who control a wide swath of northern Iraq, claimed they captured two government warplanes in overrunning an air base near the northern oil center of Kirkuk. They also said that hundreds of Iraqi officers and thousands more government soldiers have deserted and joined their struggle. Rebel leader Jalal Talabani said the captured planes were a MiG-21 fighter and a Sukhoi bomber.

ECONOMY/BRADY (UPI) -- Secretary Brady, underlining President Bush's message that the time has come to refocus attention on the sputtering domestic economy, said he sees the "first tangible signs of a turnaround." Brady, speaking to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said a rebound in February housing starts and a jump in existing home sales, combined with a report issued in New York this week that showed consumer confidence on the upswing, may mean an end to the recession by mid-year. But he noted that mixed indicators may lie ahead as the economy struggles forward, and said the most important development on which to base economic optimism is the Bush Administration's budget agreement with Congress.

GNP (AP) -- The U.S. economy fell at an annual rate of 1.6 percent in the final three months of last year, a less severe downturn than previously believed, the Commerce Department said. The department's revised estimate of the GNP served to bolster the Bush Administration's view that the current recession will be shorter and more shallow than the average downturn. The department's estimate that the economy shrank at a 1.6 percent rate in the October-December quarter represented an upward revision from two earlier GNP reports.

SCHWARZKOPF INTERVIEW/CHENEY (AP) -- Secretary Cheney said that Gen. Schwarzkopf raised "no objection" to ending the war against Iraq, contradicting comments from the allied commander. Cheney's statement, issued at the Pentagon, came as Schwarzkopf was quoted as saying that he'd recommended pursuing the fleeing Iraqi forces. His statement appeared to be aimed at quieting suggestions that there had been disagreement among top Administration and military leaders about the progress of the war. In his written statement, Cheney called the presidential decision to stop military action Feb. 27 "correct and courageous, and it was based on the recommendations of his senior military advisers."

CEASE-FIRE/BRITISH COMMANDER (London/Reuter) -- Iraq is breaking the terms of the war cease-fire by using its helicopters to suppress anti-government uprisings, the commander of Britain's gulf forces said. Lt. Gen. Sir Peter de la Billiere said Iraq's commanders had agreed at a conference after the end of hostilities last month not to use their helicopters for military purposes. "I was at the Safwan conference and the Iraqis asked, quite reasonably, that they should be allowed to use helicopters for administrative purposes...and also for hospital and casualty evacuation purposes," he said. "That is what was basically agreed. That was the understanding in which it was agreed. But of course they've now gone beyond that in using them to suppress the present unrest."

IRAQI CABINET/SADDAM (Nicosia/Reuter) -- President Saddam told his cabinet it had up to six months to prove itself. "You are facing a difficult period.... In my estimation, four months, or at the most six months, are sufficient for a minister to show if he can do the job," Saddam said. Baghdad Radio broadcast a recording of Saddam's speech to the cabinet when it took the constitutional oath at a special ceremony Tuesday. "We...are determined to support you as much as we can to help you perform your duties," Saddam said.

KURDISH GUERRILLAS/IRAQI AIRCRAFT (Athens/UPI) -- Kurdish guerrillas, consolidating their hold on territories captured in northern Iraq, attacked an Iraqi air force base near Kirkuk and destroyed three jet fighters and four helicopters on the ground, a rebel statement said.

S. KOREAN ELECTIONS (Seoul/Reuter) -- President Roh's ruling party has swept county and municipal elections, dealing a blow to the opposition that has sought to broaden its political power base before general and presidential elections due next year.

OLYMPICS/S. AFRICA (Johannesburg/Reuter) -- The International Olympic Committee gave South Africa six months to unify its rival sports bodies before the republic can be readmitted to the Olympic movement.

Asked if Saddam will be able to hold on:

"... ^TThere is enough dissent and disorder that it appears Iraqi citizens are trying to do ~~something~~ about this. So we will ~~xxx~~ wait and see how it plays out, but I think you would have to put him down as fairly doubtful."

Later, he said, "... Put it this way, with this much turmoil it seems to me unlikely he can survive. People are fed up with him, they see him for the brutal dictator that he is ... this turmoil is not simply just historic unrest, it is historic unrest plus great dissatisfaction with Saddam Hussein ..."

He also said he did not know how long it might take.

He said the U.S. went in under UN. resolutions and now is ^Vtrying to finalize the ceasefire. "That will take ~~care~~ of the U.S. role" He also said U.S. would be interested in seeing to it the U.N. requirements are complied with.

Asked if there ^{could} ~~would~~ be a permanent ceasefire even if the helicopters are used for combat, he said, "There will be a ceasefire. That was not a requirement of the U.N. It is not in the resolution."

"... I have not ruled out anything ... just saying what is in the ceasefire."

Asked ~~about~~ ^{could} about Schwarzkopf's comment about wanting to continue the war, Bush referred us to Cheney's statement. However, he also said: ^(was?) "I do not think there is ^{any} difference between any of us -- me, Cheney, Powell, Schwarzkopf ... there was total agreement in terms of when this war should end."

He repeated the word total and added "not even questionable."

Asked if any Iraqi rebel groups had asked for help, he said, he did not know of any such requests.

Now the health ~~report~~ ^{comments}:

Bush said he was later than expected because of the "eyeballs", a lobster lunch and a lack of desire to go back to work.

Prompted by Bush, Dr. Burton Lee, the president's physician said ^{the president} his eyes are "the same if not better" than last year.

The ^{apparently} president also bragged on Mrs. Bush's exam, which was yesterday. He said she got a clean bill of health and that while she still has "the Graves problem" it was "much better than would have been expected."

He said he had no cholesterol ^a problem and Dr. Lee said "the consultants" would be reporting back in in the next two weeks (apparently a reference to final scrutiny of various tests.)

A separate medical statement should be available.

After the president had answered the Iraq questions, he asked if there were any more ~~about~~ ^{physical} "physcial questions" and he then threatened to ~~release~~ ^{release} pictures which he described as "some ~~beautiful~~ beautifiles." --Kathy Lewis
