WE'VE SET A TARGET FOR OUR STUDENTS TO BE FIRST IN THE WORLD IN MATH AND SCIENCE BY THE YEAR 2000. WE WANT TO INCREASE THE GRADUATION RATE TO 90%. WE WILL ASK OUR STUDENTS TO DEMONSTRATE COMPETENCE IN FIVE CORE SUBJECTS AS THEY PROGRESS FROM 4TH GRADE TO GRADUATION. //

MANY TIMES, THE LAST GOAL WE MENTION IS SAFE, DISCIPLINED, AND DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS. IT MAY BE LAST, BUT IT IS BY NO MEANS LEAST IMPORTANT.

WE CAN'T HOPE TO GIVE ANY STUDENT A SOUND EDUCATION -- A DECENT SHOT AT A FUTURE -- IF DRUG USERS AND DRUG DEALERS ROAM THE HALLS OF OUR SCHOOLS. //

FOR THIS REASON, DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS ARE A TOP PRIORITY OF OUR AMERICAN 2000 STRATEGY AND OUR NATIONAL DRUG CONTROL STRATEGY. WE HAVE MADE SOME PROGRESS IN DECREASING ILLEGAL DRUG USE AMONG AMERICA'S STUDENTS -- AND EACH OF THE SCHOOLS GATHERED HERE TODAY HELPS ENSURE THIS PROGRESS WILL CONTINUE. //

THE 56 SCHOOLS WE HONOR HERE REPRESENT 28 STATES AND THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA. THESE INCLUDE PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS, / LARGE AND SMALL, / RURAL AND URBAN, / ELEMENTARY, JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGHS. //

BUT FOR ALL YOUR DIFFERENCES, YOU'VE GOT ONE THING IN COMMON: YOU'RE WINNING THE BATTLE. IN A SOCIETY WHERE OUR CHILDREN OFTEN GET MIXED MESSAGES ON DRUG USE, YOU SEND A CLEAR SIGNAL: YOU DRAW THE LINE AGAINST DRUGS. //

TAKE WASHINGTON MIDDLE SCHOOL IN ALBUQUERQUE, NEW MEXICO. FOR SOME KIDS, WALKING TO WASHINGTON MIDDLE SCHOOL EVERY MORNING MEANS RUNNING AN URBAN GAUNTLET -- THREADING THEIR WAY THROUGH TREACHEROUS GANG TURF. BUT WHEN THEY GET TO SCHOOL, THEY ENTER ANOTHER WORLD. WASHINGTON MIDDLE SCHOOL IS OFF-LIMITS TO GANGS. IT HOSTS MORE THAN A DOZEN STUDENT SUPPORT GROUPS -- PLACES WHERE KIDS CAN TURN TO ESCAPE THE PEER PRESSURE THAT OFTEN PUSHES THEM INTO A DEADLY EXPERIMENT WITH DRUGS.

THEN, THERE'S WASHINGTON'S PARENT CENTER -- A PROGRAM THAT TEACHES EVERYTHING FROM ENGLISH TO HOW TO BE A BETTER PARENT. I'VE HEARD ABOUT BANNERS ON THE WALL THERE THAT SAYS IT ALL: "IT'S EASIER TO BUILD A CHILD THAN REPAIR AN ADULT." //

WHEN A SCHOOL SUCCEEDS -- AS ALL OF YOURS ARE SUCCEEDING --IT'S A TEAM VICTORY: FOR THE TEACHERS AND ADMINISTRATORS, FOR THE STUDENTS -- BUT ALSO FOR THE PARENTS, AND THE WIDER COMMUNITY OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM. //

WHEN I UNVEILED OUR AMERICA 2000 STRATEGY BACK IN APRIL, I SAID: "ACROSS THIS NATION, WE MUST CULTIVATE COMMUNITIES WHERE CHILDREN CAN LEARN: COMMUNITIES WHERE THE SCHOOL IS MORE THAN A REFUGE -- MORE THAN A SOLITARY ISLAND OF CALM AMID CHAOS."

I CHALLENGED EVERY CITY AND TOWN ACROSS THE COUNTRY TO BECOME AN AMERICA 2000 COMMUNITY, BY DOING FOUR THINGS: ADOPT THE NATIONAL EDUCATION GOALS, / DEVISE A COMMUNITY-WIDE PLAN FOR REACHING THEM, / ESTABLISH A "REPORT CARD" TO MEASURE PROGRESS, / AND FOURTH AND FINALLY, TO CREATE AND SUPPORT WHAT I CALL A NEW AMERICAN SCHOOL.

IF THERE'S ONE WORD THAT DEFINES WHAT IT TAKES TO BE AN AMERICA 2000 COMMUNITY -- THAT ONE WORD IS COMMITMENT.

KENEDY HIGH SCHOOL IN KENEDY, TEXAS UNDERSTANDS THAT KIND OF COMMUNITY COMMITMENT. FOUR YEARS AGO, A KENEDY STUDENT DIED FROM DRUG ABUSE. THE SCHOOL VOWED TO TURN THAT TRAGEDY INTO HOPE -- AND A SMALL TEXAS TOWN DECLARED ITS OWN WAR ON DRUGS. /

STUDENT LEADERS AT KENEDY HIGH SCHOOL FORMED WHAT THEY CALL A SWAT TEAM -- STUDENTS WITH A TARGET -- TO SPREAD THE ANTI-DRUG MESSAGE. EVEN MORE IMPORTANT, THE COMMUNITY OUTSIDE THE SCHOOL CLOSED RANKS TO DENY DRUG USERS A SAFE HAVEN. / IT'S WORKING. KENEDY'S SUCCESS COMES FROM COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT: A COMMITMENT ON THE PART OF EVERY ADULT -- EVERY SHOP KEEPER, EVERY COMMUNITY LEADER, EVERY PARENT -- NEVER TO LOOK THE OTHER WAY WHEN KIDS USE DRUGS.

WASHINGTON AND KENEDY AND ALL THE OTHER SCHOOLS HERE TODAY PROVE THAT WHEN IT COMES TO STOPPING DRUGS, WE CAN FIGHT BACK. / BY CREATING A DRUG-FREE ENVIRONMENT WHERE STUDENTS CAN LEARN -- YOU SET AN EXAMPLE OTHER SCHOOLS CAN FOLLOW.

ONCE AGAIN, IT'S BEEN MY PLEASURE TO WELCOME YOU TO THE WHITE HOUSE. CONGRATULATIONS TO ALL OF YOU FOR YOUR FINE WORK -- AND MAY GOD BLESS THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR
BIPARTISAN CONGRESSIONAL MEETING

- IN MY MESSAGE TO THE CONGRESS ARGUING THE CASE FOR MFN FOR CHINA, I TOLD YOU I WANT TO WORK WITH YOU.
- TODAY, I WOULD LIKE TO BEGIN WITH A FEW POINTS AND THEN GET YOUR VIEWS.
- FIRST, I FIRMLY BELIEVE MFN IS THE STRONGEST TOOL WE HAVE TO BRING ABOUT LONG-TERM POSITIVE CHANGE IN CHINA. TEN YEARS OF TRADE AND OPENNESS SET IN MOTION THE FORCES WE SAW IN THOSE PROTESTS AT TIANANMEN.
- WE SHOULD NOT PUT THIS TREMENDOUS ADVANTAGE AT RISK. WE SHOULD NOT GIVE THE HARDLINERS IN CHINA AN OPPORTUNITY -- BY OUR PLACING CONDITIONS ON MFN -- SO THAT THEY CAN RESIST,

SO THAT THEY CAN DEFEAT THEIR REFORMIST
RIVALS.

SECOND, OUR CHINA POLICY IS A PACKAGE
APPROACH. WHEN THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES TO
COOPERATE WITH CHINA -- IN THE UN, KOREA,
CAMBODIA -- WE WILL DO SO.

EARLIER TODAY, MARTIN ANNOUNCED A MAJOR NEW
CHINESE STEP IN THE AREA OF COOPERATION. THE
CHINESE YESTERDAY INFORMED ME THAT THEY WILL
JOIN THE TALKS IN PARIS ON MY MIDDLE EAST ARMS
CONTROL INITIATIVE.

THIS IS A VERY POSITIVE DEVELOPMENT; IT GOES
TO THE HEART OF OUR CONCERNS ABOUT
PROLIFERATION IN THE REGION.

AND I THINK IT ALSO RESPONDS TO MY EFFORTS ON
BEHALF OF MEN FOR CHINA. YOU GET MORE FLIES
WITH HONEY THAN WITH VINEGAR.

- NONETHELESS, WHERE THERE ARE PROBLEMS WITH CHINA, I WILL NOT KOWTOW, I WILL TAKE ACTION. I HAVE ALREADY DONE SO ON HUMAN RIGHTS, TRADE, AND PROLIFERATION.
- YOU KNOW WE STILL HAVE SANCTIONS ON OPIC, TDP, INTERNATIONAL LENDING THAT IS NOT FOR BASIC HUMAN NEEDS, ALL MILITARY SALES AND HIGH-LEVEL EXCHANGES.
- WE HAVE DESIGNATED CHINA A PRIORITY COUNTRY UNDER SPECIAL 301 FOR COPYRIGHT PIRATING; WE HAVE LIFTED CHINESE TEXTILE VISAS IN RETALIATION FOR ILLEGAL THIRD-COUNTRY TRANSFERS; WE WILL SOON BEGIN MARKET ACCESS TALKS.
- THE CHINESE HAVE RESPONDED WITH A BUYING MISSION, AND THEY SAY MORE WILL FOLLOW.
- LAST WEEK, WE ACTED TO PRESS CHINA TO CONFORM TO INTERNATIONAL STANDARDS ON MISSILE

TRANSFERS. THERE WILL BE NO NEW SATELLITE LICENSES OR HIGH-SPEED COMPUTER TRANSFERS TO CHINA UNTIL IT MEETS THOSE STANDARDS. THERE WILL BE NO TRANSFERS OF MISSILE TECHNOLOGY OR EQUIPMENT TO CHINESE COMPANIES ENGAGED IN PROLIFERATION.

- I AM NOT SITTING ON MY HANDS. I AM PREPARED TO DO MORE WHEN CIRCUMSTANCES REQUIRE.
- THIRD, WE NEED TO STEP BACK FROM THE EMOTIONS OF THE MOMENT AND CALCULATE OUR LONG-TERM NATIONAL INTERESTS.
- WE ARE THE ONLY TRADING NATION IN THE WORLD THAT WOULD CONTEMPLATE REMOVING OR CONDITIONING MFN. IF WE PULL BACK, WE ISOLATE OURSELVES, NOT CHINA.

- WE MAY NOT LIKE IT, BUT CHINA IS A NECESSARY PART OF THE SOLUTION TO SOME IMPORTANT PROBLEMS. IT HAS A VETO IN THE UN SECURITY COUNCIL.
- THE SYSTEM THAT RULES CHINA TODAY WILL NOT CHANGE DRAMATICALLY OVERNIGHT. BUT THAT SYSTEM CANNOT INSULATE ITSELF FROM INEVITABLE CHANGE.
- I BELIEVE THE BEST COURSE IS TO USE ECONOMIC INVOLVEMENT -- AND ALL THE HUMAN INTERCHANGES THAT GO WITH IT -- TO ENCOURAGE LONG-TERM EVOLUTION IN CHINA. I THINK TODAY'S ANNOUNCEMENT ON MIDDLE EAST ARMS CONTROL HELPS PROVE THE POINT.
- NOW I WOULD LIKE TO HEAR YOUR VIEWS.
- THERE IS A PROCESS IN PLACE TO DEAL WITH CHINA AND MFN. I AM ASKING YOU TODAY TO LOOK CAREFULLY AT THE BIG PICTURE.

-- PLEASE DON'T RUSH TO A CONCLUSION. GIVE US A
CHANCE TO ADDRESS YOUR CONCERNS BEFORE YOU
DECIDE.

BUSH BARES EMOTIONS IN RECENT SPEECHES His Gulf Speech Brings Tears

George Bush, the reserved Episcopalian, showed an emotional side to the Southern Baptist Convention on Thursday.

"Like a lot of people, I've worried a little bit about shedding tears in public," the President, his voice cracking, said in a departure from his prepared text.

Then, as he told how tears poured down his and Barbara's cheeks when he prayed before the beginning of the air war in the Gulf, Bush's eyes filled with tears again.

The President...showed signs of fatigue during the speech, resting his elbow on the podium and stumbling over his lines in the concluding moments. Bush confessed to reporters afterward that he felt a little embarrassed by his display of emotion before the delegates. "I do that in church," he said. "Maybe in public it's a kind of a first, or maybe a third."

But, he said, "I feel very strongly about those kids who gave their lives for this country. So if I show some emotion, that's just the way I am." (Tom Baxter, Atlanta Journal-Constitution, A1)

Emotions Run High In Speech; Bush Defends Fetuses, Voluntary School Prayer

President Bush won Southern Baptists' political support Thursday with a litany of conservative positions, but he won their hearts with teary-eyed testimony as he closed their annual meeting in Atlanta.

Bush reaffirmed his stand against federally funded abortions, called for a constitutional amendment permitting voluntary prayer in public schools, and said he would like to expand a day-care voucher program to include schools.

Those statements drew lengthy applause from 25,000 Southern Baptists who passed resolutions this week calling for tax breaks for parents with children in private schools and reaffirming their strong anti-abortion stand.

The Baptists also cheered long and loud for an emotional prayer testimonial from the usually reserved President....

The highlight of his visit, the closing address to the Baptist convention, attracted two sets of protesters. About 200 Ethiopians demonstrated against U.S.-brokered peace talks that left a rebel group in control.... Also present were about 50 members of the gay-rights group ACT-UP, protesting what they called the nation's "failed" AIDS policy and an immigration policy that bars foreigners with the AIDS virus.

Bush Tearfully Recounts For Baptists His Prayer During Gulf War

ATLANTA -- President Bush, his voice choked with emotion and tears trickling down his cheeks, told an audience of Southern Baptists here that his reliance on prayer had relieved him of his Episcopalian worry about "how it looked to others" to pray in public.

Before a hushed audience of more than 15,000 members of the Southern Baptist Convention, Bush departed from his prepared text a few minutes into his speech to describe how he and Barbara had prayed with their minister at Camp David while waiting for the U.S. warplanes to begin bombing on Jan. 16. "Prayer has always been important and personal for me, you know us Episcopalians," he said.

As he waited the start of a war in which he would send "other people's sons to war," Bush recalled, "and I had the tears start down the cheek and our minister smiled back and I...I no longer worried how it looked to others" who were watching.

Describing the session, Bush's voice grew husky and choked as he paused to wipe the tears from his cheeks, and said, "There we go..." What mattered about prayer, he said, "was how it seemed to God," not how it seemed to others....

To wild cheers, Bush repeated his opposition to federal funding of abortion except when the life of the mother is in danger and his call for a constitutional amendment to allow prayer in schools. He also endorsed the government's move to allow federal aid to day-care centers in religious settings, and noted he had visited one here in Atlanta on the way into the convention.

Bush Hits It Off With Southern Baptists, Praises 'Faith And Family'

ATLANTA -- An emotional President Bush could hardly have found a more receptive gathering Thursday than the Southern Baptist Convention to describe a conservative social agenda he said was designed to "preserve faith and family."

The meeting of 23,000 Southern Baptists provided a cheering, flag-waving backdrop as the president announced new regulations making church-run child day-care centers eligible for a new, federally-funded voucher program for low-income parents. The Southern Baptists added more applause as Bush renewed his call for a similar voucher system for the nation's schools, for a constitutional amendment legalizing school prayer and for passage of his crime bill. Bush Courts Religious Conservatives -- Analysts

ATLANTA -- President Bush's speech Thursday to the Southern Baptist Convention on "faith, prayer and family" was the latest example of White House courtship of religious conservatives who are a key part of his constituency.

Since the beginning of the Gulf War, Bush has spoken out with increasing frequency on his personal faith and "confessed" that he hadn't done enough to bear religious witness in the past....

One side effect, analysts say, has been to reassure religious conservatives....

"He's always had a certain sensitivity to criticism from the religious right. He goes hot and cold on that, depending on his needs," Republican political analyst Kevin Phillips told Reuters. "He's closer right now to the religious right than any other politician they might be looking at. My sense is his ties with them now are better than usual. George Bush is pretty much the best these people can hope for."...

But the influential Chicago-based evangelical journal Christianity Today said in an editorial last September that Bush risked ignoring losing the votes of many "born-again Christians" if he ignored their moral issues. Bush, the journal complained, "apparently learned our language to ensure our vote," adding, "we can no longer afford to be naive."

Evangelical leaders remain incensed over federal funding through the NEA to controversial projects they deem "obscene" or "sacrilegious." Many were also outraged over an official invitation sent to gay activists for a White House function and a grant by the Atlanta-based U.S. Centers for Disease Control for a conference promoting "safe sex" for homosexuals to prevent AIDS.

S. KOREAN TO DIRECT U.S. TROOPS American General, In Interview, Details Seoul's Wider Role

SEOUL -- The U.S. military in South Korea, shifting from a leading role to a supporting one in defense of the most dangerous remaining stretch of the Iron Curtain, will turn over command of combined ground forces to a Korean general in the next six months, the commander of U.S. forces said Thursday.

Gen. Robert Riscassi, who will remain as the top U.S. and allied commander in overall charge, said in an interview that "we've satisfied ourselves" the time is right to name a Korean four-star general to head ground elements of U.S. and South Korean forces. Riscassi described the planned turnover, along with U.S. force reductions here and other pending moves, as an effort to realign the roles of the U.S. and South Korea without diminishing the U.S. commitment to the area's defense.

SHAMIR REPORTEDLY REJECTS BUSH PLEA

JERUSALEM -- Prime Minister Shamir has rejected an appeal by President Bush to accept compromise terms for a Middle East peace conference, but is suggesting possible alternative formulas in an effort to avoid blame for a breakdown of the peace process, sources here and in Washington said Thursday....

In Washington, Israeli sources said Shamir's letter rejecting Bush's plea was delivered to the White House Thursday evening. They said it expresses hope the peace process will continue, but complains about the direction things have been going.

BARZANI SAYS KURDS CLOSE TO AUTONOMY IN IRAQ

BAGHDAD -- Kurdish rebel leader Massoud Barzani, appearing in public for the first time in almost two weeks, said Thursday night that he was close to agreement with the Baghdad government on Kurdish autonomy.

"We are near to reaching an agreement.... We expect to do so by June 15 or 16, maybe even the 20th," he told reporters....

U.S. Army Col. Dick Naab said Thursday that forces in northern Iraq would overstep their role by fulfilling Kurdish requests for an allied-run demilitarized zone in northern Iraq and pressure Saddam on autonomy. "That's not our mission. We're really getting ready to go home," said Naab. (John Pomfret, AP)

MAJOR TELLS JAPAN FINANCIAL AID NOT ON AGENDA WITH GORBACHEV

TOKYO -- Britain has told Tokyo that financial aid to the Soviet Union would not be on the agenda at the G-7 summit, Japan's finance minister said Friday.

Prime Minister Kaifu received a letter from John Major Thursday night proposing Gorbachev be invited to London to attend a meeting separate from the economic summit, Finance Minister Hashimoto said. "The message in the letter was that financial aid to the Soviet Union will not be discussed in London, and the Soviets will not be a party to the summit," he said. (Reuter)

GORBACHEV ADVISER DENIES SOVIETS SEEK HUGE AID PACKAGE

MOSCOW -- President Gorbachev's top economic adviser denied in an interview published Thursday that the Soviet leader would ask for billions from the West if he is invited to next month's economic summit. Gorbachev does not intend "to go to London with an outstretched hand and mention any figures of financial or other aid," Yevgeny Primakov said in an interview with Izvestia that was carried by Tass. "The Soviet Union is joining the international division of labor, and the thing in question is radicalizing the country's movement to market relations with definite support of the West.... I am sure that on the part of the Soviet Union figures will not be mentioned even during the London summit." (AP)

SOVIET REPUBLICS GUESSING ABOUT U.S.

As the Bush Administration plans a summit with President Gorbachev and discusses possible financial aid for Moscow, Gueorgui Khostaria is left wondering if he's been forgotten.

Khostaria, minister of foreign affairs for the Soviet republic of Georgia, is in the middle of a little-noticed two-week tour to the U.S.... While the reception is polite and the sympathies earnest, nobody seems quite sure what to do with him or, more importantly, what to tell him.

"Different people in the Administration here have different attitudes toward the (central government in Moscow) and toward the republics," he said in an interview Thursday. But in general, he said, the Bush Administration position is that before asking the U.S. to take sides, "we should clear up things between us and the central authority back home." The problem was evident after a meeting Thursday with Rep. Gingrich.... A spokesman for Gingrich said he strongly supports pending legislation to require that any U.S. financial aid be given to the republics rather than the central government, but he still does not have a firm answer for the secessionist movements in the USSR. U.S. SENDS MEDICAL SUPPLIES TO SOVIETS

The U.S. will airlift \$1.8 million in urgently needed medical supplies Friday to the Soviet Ural region as part of a continuing international disaster relief initiative, the State Department said. (UPI)

U.S. EASES CAMPAIGN FOR WORLD BANK SHIFT

The U.S. is using its powerful influence at the World Bank to pressure the agency to channel a large part of its loans directly to the private sector rather than governments in keeping with the Bush Administration's free-market principles.

The U.S. drive, bitterly opposed by other countries in the bank's policy-making councils, would radically redirect the activities of the institution....

Originally, the Administration had sought to alter the bank's charter to require that 50 percent of its loans go directly to private companies. This numerical demand was dropped Thursday, sources said, at meetings involving World Bank President Conable. Instead, Conable agreed that more of the bank's loans would be made with the intention of "supporting" the private sector.

BUSH, ADVISERS SET U.S. POSITION ON STRATEGIC ARMS

President Bush Thursday discussed a new U.S. negotiating position on strategic arms with top advisers before today's scheduled meeting between Secretary Baker and Foreign Minister Bessmertnykh in Geneva, senior U.S. officials said.

The two officials are to attempt to resolve the issues blocking completion of the START Treaty....

Bush told reporters he would be holding a "rather important" session of the NSC Thursday afternoon to review the arms talks. But after the meeting, one official cautioned not to expect "any breakthroughs" in today's meeting in Geneva, suggesting that Bush had not authorized compromises on all the remaining points of conflict....

"There are some things (about the disagreements on START) that are highly technical, but are very, very important," Bush told reporters en route to Washington from Atlanta Thursday before the NSC meeting. "We have to hammer out some remaining differences, but a lot of the work has been done."

Bush, Advisers Clear Up U.S. Position On START Pact

The Bush Administration has resolved internal conflicts holding up START and will seek to complete the agreement in time to hold a superpower summit in Moscow late this month or in early July, U.S. officials said Thursday....

"It's a two-way street here," President Bush said of the arms talks. But he added: "Both sides are dealing very good faith at this point, both sides want to have a summit and both sides obviously want to have a strategic arms agreement."

"That has not always been the case necessarily," the President added in what appeared to be a rare public admission of a longstanding split within his Administration, as well as between the U.S. and the Soviet Union, on the last outstanding obstacle to START....

"A compromise involving a limited amount of downloading" was reached following a Wednesday morning meeting between Bush, Brent Scowcroft, Secretaries Baker and Cheney, and Gen. Powell, an official said.... The precise nature of the compromise was unclear.

Soviet Arms Data Called Too Low

A new U.S. intelligence estimate of the number of Soviet tanks, armored vehicles and artillery in Europe has found that information supplied by Moscow in February for the conventional arms treaty excludes thousands of weapons.

According to Bush Administration officials familiar with the intelligence estimate, new Soviet data...failed to include more than 16,000 treaty-limited weapons.... The discrepancy further compounds Administration efforts to resolve problems with the CFE treaty.

NATO In New Push For Almost-Forgotten 'Open Skies' Treaty

COPENHAGEN -- NATO is making a fresh effort to wrap up a radical but almost-forgotten treaty to allow former Cold War enemies to make surveillance flights over each other's territory.

Talks on an "Open Skies" treaty, involving the 22 nations of NATO and the Warsaw Pact, broke down last year because of disputes with Moscow. But NATO has offered compromise proposals that it hopes will get the talks started again, NATO officials said....

...Problems with CFE look close to resolution now, and NATO foreign ministers...say they hoped to see early agreement on "Open Skies" as a result.

PAKISTAN SEEKS TALKS ON NUCLEAR WEAPONS

LAHORE -- Prime Minister Sharif proposed Thursday that the U.S., the Soviet Union and China mediate negotiations between Pakistan and India aimed at controlling the spread of nuclear weapons on the volatile subcontinent.

The proposal contained no concessions on Pakistan's eight-year-old clandestine program to build a nuclear bomb, which has been a growing point of contention between Washington and Islamabad. Sharif said the timing of the plan was intended in part to signal the fledgling civilian government's desire for improved relations with the U.S.

PROBE OF ZIA'S FATAL CRASH 'INCONCLUSIVE,' U.S. REPORTS

LAHORE -- After a two-year investigation by the FBI into the mysterious 1988 plane crash that killed Pakistani military leader Gen. Zia, the U.S. ambassador to Pakistan and other senior officials, the U.S. Justice Department has determined that the evidence is "inconclusive" as to whether the crash was caused by an accident or sabotage.... **NATO PLEDGES INCREASED COOPERATION
WITH COUNTRIES OF EASTERN EUROPE**

COPENHAGEN -- NATO pledged Thursday to greatly increase its cooperation with the former Communist nations of Eastern Europe, promising implicitly to use its political clout to protect these emerging democracies from any attempt to bring them back under the domination of the Soviet Union.

In a statement on partnership with Central and Eastern Europe, NATO foreign ministers carefully avoided any mention of lingering fears in the East that failure of President Gorbachev's reform policies might shift power to those who want to reassert Moscow's hegemony over its neighbors. In fact, NATO ministers specifically cited the Soviet Union as one of the countries to which the West seeks to "extend the hand of friendship."

HOUSE DEMOCRATS MOVE TO DELAY SALVADORAN MILITARY AID

House Democrats decided Thursday to defer action on military aid to El Salvador until the end of the summer in an effort to pressure the Salvadoran government and its guerrilla opponents to conclude a successful peace agreement....

In a letter to President Bush, nine Democrats prominent in the Salvadoran aid debate said that although peace talks had not yet produced a settlement, there has been so much progress in current negotiations that "we have determined that we will continue to refrain from legislative action on El Salvador until after Labor Day." At that time, they said, the House will consider a Salvadoran aid authorization to be included in a final foreign aid bill. (Guy Gugliotta, Washington Post, A15)

TENS OF THOUSANDS OF CUBANS APPLY TO TRAVEL VISAS TO U.S.

HAVANA -- The consular section at the U.S. diplomatic mission here is being swamped with applications for travel to the U.S., and officials say that by year's end they may process as many as 100,000 applicants....

"More people are applying but more people are getting turned down," one U.S. diplomat said. "The criterion for deciding is going to become a nightmare." (Mimi Whitefield, Knight-Ridder)

**ARMY DISPUTES ISRAELI ACCOUNTING
OF PATRIOT FAILURES AGAINST SCUDS**

An Army official says Israel overestimated the number of Scud missile warheads that got through U.S. Patriot defenses deployed in Israel during the Gulf War.

In an internal Army memo, written in mid-April by A.Q. Oldacre, deputy manager of the U.S. Army Missile Command Office in charge of the Patriot system, and obtained by the AP on Thursday, the official wrote that physical destruction in Israel from the impact of Scuds would have been much greater than it actually was if the Israelis' estimate of warhead landings were correct.

PRESIDENT'S TRIP

NBC's Tom Brokaw: President Bush was away from Washington for most of the day, addressing the nation's largest Protestant denomination meeting in Atlanta. He made a surprise personal revelation that deeply impressed his audience.

NBC's John Cochran: President Bush, whose critics once called him a wimp, told the Southern Baptist Convention that during the Gulf War, he found there was nothing unmanly about crying.

(President Bush: "I've worried a little bit about shedding tears in public -- the emotion of it. But as Barbara and I prayed at Camp David before the air war began, we were thinking about those young men and women overseas, and I had a tear start down the cheek. And our minister smiled back and I no longer worried about how it looked to others." Applause.)

Southern Baptists also applauded Bush's support for a Constitutional amendment permitting school prayer. Bush is an Episcopalian, and today he let himself be drawn into the controversy over the ordination of a lesbian. President Bush expressed opposition to a lesbian priest.

(President Bush: "Perhaps I'm a little old-fashioned, but I'm not quite ready for that.")

Partly because of Bush's heritage as a conservative, New England WASP, for years he was regarded as keeping his emotions and his most personal views under wraps. Not anymore. (NBC-9)

PRESIDENT'S TRIP/SOVIET RELATIONS

CBS's Dan Rather: President Bush underscored again today he wants to do all he can to help Soviet President Gorbachev.

Susan Spencer: Secretary Baker will meet tomorrow with his Soviet counterpart in Geneva and, it's hoped here, will begin to wrap up the nine-year negotiations on a treaty to limit long-range nuclear weapons. That would pave the way for the superpower summit.

(President Bush: "It's a two-way street here and both sides are dealing in very good faith at this point and both sides want to have a summit.")

The pow-wow is expected in early July, shortly before the annual economic summit. Moscow once called this the capitalist exploiters club. No more. Now it talks of needing up to \$50 billion a year from these capitalists, and Gorbachev has been pestering for weeks for an invitation to plead his case. Today, it seemed, he would finally get it.

(Secretary Baker: "They want to explain how they see their reform program, what they see as the status of it and ways in which they think the West might be able to help.")

Spencer continues:

Mr. Bush is expected soon to approve the Soviets' request for a billion and a half dollars in credit to buy grain. But today, his concerns were less global and far more political. At the Southern Baptist Conference, he was literally preaching to the choir, talking of his opposition to abortion, his support of school prayer and his concerns during Desert Storm.

(President Bush: "As Barbara and I prayed at Camp David before the air war began, we were thinking about those young men and women overseas, and I had a tear start down the cheek. And our minister smiled back and I no longer worried about how it looked to others." Applause.)

On Saturday, Mr. Bush will be joined by some of the families of soldiers who died in Desert Storm for a memorial service to remember their sacrifice. He said today he hopes it doesn't get too emotional. (CBS-3)

PRESIDENT'S HEALTH

Rather: At the White House, President Bush is reported to be jogging again for the first time since his heartbeat and thyroid problems surfaced last month. His spokesman said President Bush has also gained back some of the weight he lost. (CBS-9)

EDUCATION

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with education in the country -- the sorry state, in this case. There has been another report from the government today on the competence of American students. This time, the subject is mathematics. The President's commission on education said some time ago that by the end of the century, American students should be the best in the world. Here is the situation today: When high school seniors in 37 states were asked to add up the cost of a hamburger, a cup of soup and a soda on the lunch menu, 25 percent of them got it wrong.

ABC's Bill Blakemore: American students and schools have failed the most comprehensive survey ever made of their math abilities.

(Secretary Alexander: "This is an alarm bell that ought to ring all night throughout this country.")

Only one in seven eighth-graders can understand simple algebra and geometry. In fact, fewer than two-thirds of eighth-graders could figure out the average age of the people in their families. And only one in 20 high school seniors can handle the algebra, probability and statistical reasoning necessary for college-level work and many of today's jobs. The study says it's not surprising. Many schools are simply not teaching them how.

(John Dosey, NAEP exam co-author: "If one is not exposed to material, there's no way they can learn it.")

The survey also found many schools teaching math in ways that have nothing to do with real life.

(Francie Alexander, National Assessment Association: "We have a curriculum that was designed almost a hundred years ago that some characterize as shopkeepers' arithmetic. Now people in stores don't even do that kind of arithmetic anymore; the cash register does.")

Blakemore continues:

Most schools still use outmoded techniques: heavy reliance on a single textbook with repetitious drill, or on worksheets, and on way too many tests, all of which can kill the fun of creative math thinking. The study also suggests results would have been much better if more teachers had studied a wider variety of math and math-teaching technique, and if students gave up some television time to study time. Those who performed worst often spend six hours a day in front of the TV. Secretary Alexander said this survey should shake all Americans on the common belief that while everyone else's schools are bad, theirs is probably OK.

(**Secretary Alexander:** "If our aim is to be first in the world in math by the year 2000, we had better fire up our engines, because we have an enormous challenge ahead of us.") (ABC-Lead)

CBS's Richard Threlkeld reports America's math teachers could have told the White House its dreams of educating America's school kids might be just a little bit lofty.

(**President Bush:** "One of our most ambitious goals is for American students to be first in the world in science and math achievement by the year 2000.")

Students in private schools and schools in the suburbs did better than students in public schools and schools in the inner city. But nowhere did they do very well.

(**Secretary Alexander:** "This is a country that likes to be the best it can be, and we won't have good jobs and we won't be happy in our lives if don't know enough and can't do enough.")

If the diagnosis was unsettling, the prescriptions for cure are pretty familiar: more computers and calculators in the classroom, more math classes, more help from parents and more homework. The kids seem willing; the survey showed half of them actually like math. They're going to give a test like this every year from now on, and maybe next year the students will do better, although it seems a little unfair to spank America's school children for what they don't know about math when the politicians in Washington haven't even figured out how to balance a budget. (CBS-2)

NBC's Robert Hager reports only 46 percent of high school seniors could demonstrate eighth-grade math proficiency.

(**Richard Boyd, test supervisor:** "The results we are presenting today do not portray a very happy picture.") (NBC-2)

MIDDLE EAST

Rather reports Israeli radio says Prime Minister Shamir sent a negative reply to a letter from President Bush, who had proposed a conference with the United Nations taking part. (ABC-10, CBS-6)

SOVIET AID

ABC's Barrie Dunsmore reports Secretary Baker's presentation today in Copenhagen was the first time an American official has publicly spelled out what the U.S. thinks the conditions should be for Western aid to save the Soviet economy. Behind the scenes, U.S. officials said Baker's conditions were meant to be flexible and that he recognized that Soviet reforms would take a long time. Along the way, the U.S. is willing to be helpful, but not with massive amounts of American money. (ABC-11)

HIGH SCHOOLS

ABC's Charles Thomas reports on a Rockford, Ill., high school that gives its graduates a certificate of employability, guaranteeing the holder can read, write and do basic math, and that the student had a good attitude and attendance record. If an employer determines a guaranteed graduate lacks those skills and qualities, the school promises to reteach the teenagers. Education warranties are supposed to address complaints by private industry that many schools do not prepare graduates for the work force. (ABC-2)

HEALTH CARE

Brokaw: Now that they appear to be losing the political battle on job discrimination, Democrats hope to bounce back with a new national health care plan. But today, Republicans jumped all over their proposal, which is designed to provide health insurance for the many who don't have it and to solve the cost of medical care, now running \$670 billion a year and going up.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell: It is a time bomb for 37 million Americans who have no coverage at all and millions more who are right on the edge.

(Sen. Rockefeller: "Right now, everybody is one pink slip or one car crash away from economic ruin for their families, and they know it.")

(Sen. Kennedy: "Real people are hurting. There are 10 million children in our society who have no coverage who are hurting; their parents are hurting.")

Republicans call the Democratic approach big government and big waste.

(Sen. Dole: "The proposed mandate on employers is, in effect, a heavy tax on jobs.")

(Sen. Mitchell: "It's the same argument they've made for 60 years against any legislation that is intended to provide opportunity and equality in our system.")

Small businesses have declared war on the Democrats' plan.

(John Polk, Cleveland Council of Smaller Enterprises: "I am sort of required by my members to say we will fight you on the beaches, we will fight you in the skies. We will never surrender.")

(John Motley III, National Federation of Independent Business: "Small employers are going to be forced to fire people in order to provide health insurance for the employees who are left.")

But many big companies say they're being killed by sky-rocketing costs of health coverage and want Congress to step in.

(Walter Williams, Bethlehem Steel: "We need help now, so I urge Congress to direct its attention to comprehensive health care legislation.")

The President's budget director believes the White House should develop its own plan because health costs are overwhelming the budget. But so far, he has been overruled by the President's political operatives, who think anything they propose will look like small potatoes compared to the Democrats' plan and hurt Bush in the 1992 campaign.

NBC's Fred Briggs reports many Americans think the U.S. should adopt a comprehensive national system like the one used in Canada.

Brokaw reports the American Medical Association agrees something must be done, but it is opposed to parts of the Democratic plan that set fees and put caps on health care rates.

(James Todd, AMA executive vice president: "We have to take into account Canada is a much more homogenous country than the U.S. It's population is only 26 million, which is smaller than the population of California. And they also don't have a lot of the confounding things we have, such as the huge amount of violence, the drug issues, all of which add to the cost of our health care.") (NBC-Lead)

Brokaw reports Prime Minister Major has invited Gorbachev to meet with leaders of the major industrial nations in London after the economic summit. (NBC-11)

UNEMPLOYMENT

Rather: The Bush Administration acknowledged today another 439,000 Americans have joined the line for unemployment benefits. Organizations of American working people, including unions, are warning the line will get a lot longer if President Bush negotiates a free-trade deal with Mexico.

CBS's Bruce Morton reports on Americans who are losing their jobs since their companies can't compete because of competition from Mexico and other countries. Many companies are moving to Mexico because wages are cheaper. Those left without jobs say the trend will continue unless they stand up against it. (CBS-12)

INTEREST RATES

NBC's Mike Jensen reports there is evidence the recession may be ending, helped by falling interest rates. But while the lower rates may be great for borrowers, they are bad for investors. Interest rates have dropped by as much as four points in two years. That saves American families \$4 billion a year in interest payments, but it costs them \$34 billion in interest income.

(Walter Williams, economist: "The conventional wisdom is when interest rates come down, the economy goes up, it does better. Not so. Today, 79 percent of the households in this country have some form of interest income, and 20 million people live on it; they depend on it. As interest income has dropped with lower interest rates, you have a group of people that have been drawn into the recession that would not have been drawn in otherwise.")

Economists like Williams say declining interest rates are not the key to an improvement in the nation's economy. (NBC-3)

RECESSION

Jennings reports of another indicator the recession is forcing more people onto the welfare rolls: More than 12 1/2 million Americans, mostly children and their mothers, are now enrolled in Aid to Families with Dependent Children. That's an all-time high. A quarter-million families have been added since October. (ABC-6)

VICE PRESIDENT'S TRIP

Rather: Vice President Quayle was in Czechoslovakia today. He promised the Czech president the U.S. will step up trade with the former communist states of Eastern Europe. (CBS-10)

FOOD LABELS

Jennings reports the Kraft Food Company announced today it is going to stop using labels that refer to the percentage of fat in its products. That comes on the same day the FDA announced it will be tougher on misleading food labels which make claims about fat. (ABC-4)

TEENAGE DRINKING

Rather reports there is a report from the surgeon general about alcohol use. It says more than half the students in grades 7-12 drink; that's 10 1/2 million. The surgeon general says half a million admit to a once-a-week binge. The reason children are drinking: 40 percent say they do it when they're upset; 25 percent say they drink to get high. (NBC-12, ABC-15, CBS-Lead)

PARADE

CBS's David Martin reports on preparations for Washington's Desert Storm victory parade. Some people think the event amounts to gloating. They will be out protesting Saturday. (CBS-4)

AIRLINES

CBS's Mark Phillips reports the General Accounting Office today announced several airlines may not make the 1994 deadline for repairing their older planes. The GAO blames bad planning and the general downturn in the aviation industry. It says some of the more financially strapped airlines have been putting off the repairs because of the cost and the FFA has been lax in enforcing the program. (CBS-5)

GUN CONTROL

ABC's Ken Kashiwahara reports an Oakland, Calif., widow of a man who was shot and killed with an assault rifle has won a \$400,000 settlement from the store where the gun was sold. The widow charged that the gun store allowed the gunman to buy the gun although he could not produce the identification required by law. A companion produced ID and filled out the required forms. Gun-control advocates hope the settlement will have a very sobering effect on gun dealers around the country. Both gun dealers and gun-control advocates agree the threat of future lawsuits will cause gun stores to scrutinize customers more carefully. (ABC-3)

FOOD STAMPS/WELFARE

ABC's John Martin reports on a program in Baltimore that allows 5,000 people to use pieces of plastic called independence cards to collect nearly \$2 million a month in food stamps and welfare payments. Instead of mailing them welfare checks or issuing food stamps, the government puts the money in special accounts. The funds can be obtained or transferred electronically through supermarkets. The recipients can also withdraw their welfare payments from automated bank teller machines. Store managers say the system saves time and money. State officials say it could save more than a million dollars a year in administrative costs. But critics say the card may make welfare too easy and attractive and increase the risk of fraud. Officials say the system has worked so well, they plan to test it statewide in Maryland this fall. Ultimately, they'd like to extend it to Social Security checks and medical insurance claims. (ABC-7)

DOCTOR REFERRALS

ABC's Timothy Johnson reports when doctors refer patients to their own joint venture facilities instead of to hospitals, hospital funds are drained. Hospitals must try to rectify the problem by increasing the cost of services or increasing tax revenues from citizens. Some doctors are making the problem worse by referring paying patients to their own facility while sending poor patients to the hospital. When doctors who own facilities drive up costs, everyone pays indirectly through higher taxes and higher insurance premiums. Legislators at the state and federal level have tried to make these joint ventures illegal. A bill in Congress was watered down to include only laboratories. But if health care costs soar and poor patients are subject to inferior care, it's a safe bet Congress will look at the issue again. (ABC-14)

SUMMIT/START/BAKER (Copenhagen/AP) -- Saying prospects for a June summit are dimming, Secretary Baker is making a last-ditch effort with Foreign Minister Bessmertnykh to conclude a new missile-reduction treaty that has eluded negotiators for nearly a decade. Pesky technical issues stood in the way, but Baker said he and Bessmertnykh would grapple with them rather than "kicking them over to a follow-on negotiation." Last week, White House officials were spreading the word a summit might be held in late June. But Baker all but scotched that possibility, saying, "That is going to be a difficult time-frame to try and meet."

G-7/GORBACHEV (London/Reuter) -- Britain expects to issue an invitation early next week for President Gorbachev to meet leaders of the G-7 in London in July, British officials said. Prime Minister Major was awaiting final replies from fellow leaders of the G-7 to his proposal for them to meet Gorbachev, they said.

SOVIET AID/PRIMAKOV (Moscow/AP) -- A top aide to Mikhail Gorbachev says the Soviet president would not go to next month's economic summit to beg for money if he is allowed to attend. Yevgeny Primakov told the government newspaper Izvestia in an interview that reports the Soviets were seeking anywhere from \$30 billion to \$100 billion in foreign aid from the West were unfounded. Primakov said he believes President Bush is leaning toward inviting Gorbachev to the G-7 meeting itself [as opposed to meeting after the G-7 summit, as reportedly suggested by Prime Minister Major]. "That is because [Bush] believes that Gorbachev is not going with an outstretched hand to ask for specific figures of financial and other aid," Primakov said.

NATO MEETING (Copenhagen/AP) -- The NATO allies said they will bolster the West European role within the alliance, but they ruled out a European defense system separate from the U.S. The statement closed out a two-day meeting on reshaping NATO. The foreign ministers threw cold water on a French initiative for a European go-it-alone approach outside NATO. They issued two statements stressing America's traditional role as guarantor of Western Europe's security since the end of World War II. Secretary Baker told reporters the issue of Europeans forsaking NATO had been laid to rest. "Questions (of an independent European course) that might have been posed or raised in the past are behind us," Baker said.

FOREIGN CORRESPONDENTS/CHINA (Beijing/Reuter) -- Chinese authorities banned a lunch meeting of the Foreign Correspondents Club of Beijing Friday with American China scholar Orville Schell as guest speaker, accusing journalists of trying to subvert the communist state.

UNEMPLOYMENT (Reuter) -- The unemployment rate climbed to 6.9% in May from 6.6% in April despite an unexpected increase in the number of jobs, the Labor Department said. Wall Street analysts were forecasting a 6.8% jobless rate.

HOUSE FLOOR: Space station supporters win floor battle.

The House held a referendum yesterday on the space station *Freedom*, and the space station won.

By a 240-173 vote, supporters of the program were successful in restoring \$1.9 billion in fiscal 1992 funding for the project. The Appropriations Committee had voted to terminate the program in May, saying the government couldn't afford it.

The long and contentious debate was played out as members worked into the night on a fiscal 1992 spending bill (HR 2519) for the Departments of Veterans Affairs and Housing and Urban Development and numerous independent agencies, including NASA.

Spending on the space station would be offset by holding total NASA funding to the fiscal 1991 level and cutting more than \$200 million in the bill from a public housing subsidy program.

About \$5.6 billion has already been invested in the space station project, which is expected to cost more than \$30 billion.

During the debate, members traded barbs about whether continued support for the space station was the best way to support science research. "Do we have the courage and the vision to move ahead with the manned exploration of space?" asked Robert S. Walker, R-Pa.

But Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, responded, "I reject efforts to restore funding for the space station on the backs of the least fortunate. That will happen if we cut public housing funds."

Johnson's Assignments. Sam Johnson, R-Texas, elected to the House on May 18, has been given his committee assignments. He will be serving on the Banking and Small Business committees.

SENATE FLOOR: Highway bill consideration delayed.

The Senate got bogged down over whether to begin formal debate on a \$105

billion multi-year authorization bill (S 965) to renew federal surface transportation programs.

Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., acting on behalf of John W. Warner, R-Va., blocked an attempt to take up the bill.

Warner opposes the funding formula in the bill that determines how Highway Trust Fund monies are allocated to states. The trust fund is financed primarily by a tax on motor fuels.

Warner argued that the bill "does not provide a fair distribution" of taxpayer money and that it should be revised.

Currently, 19 so-called donor states put more money into the highway trust fund than they get back.

On Tuesday, senators will vote on a motion to end the filibuster.

OIL-DRILLING ban extended in Interior spending bill.

Two House Appropriations subcommittees met yesterday to mark up fiscal 1992 spending bills and a third one will meet today.

Interior. The House Appropriations Interior Subcommittee yesterday approved a \$13.2 billion draft fiscal 1992 spending bill yesterday that would extend for one year the moratorium on oil and gas drilling off most U.S. shores.

The measure amounts to a 12.9 percent increase over last year's \$11.7 billion spending bill.

The panel approved the bill by voice vote after closing the meeting to the public. Les AuCoin, D-Ore., who proposed that the markup be closed, said that an open meeting would have broken down over the issue of the northern spotted owl.

The threatened owl is found in old-growth forests of the Pacific Northwest, which environmentalists would like to protect. But those who represent logging interests in the region hope to keep some of the forests open for logging jobs.

Roughly half the funds in the bill go

to programs in the Interior Department, which oversees the National Park Service and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Another \$178 million each would be appropriated for the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Humanities, up from the fiscal 1991 level of \$175 million and \$171 million, respectively.

Labor, HHS. Members of the House Appropriations Labor, Health and Human Services (HHS), and Education Subcommittee approved a \$201.9 billion fiscal 1992 spending bill. The panel reportedly did not include any funding for family planning programs under Title X of the Public Health Service Act of 1970.

Agriculture. The Agriculture Subcommittee will mark up its fiscal 1992 spending bill today.

The bulk of the \$50.4 billion bill covers mandatory programs, such as food stamps and farm program payments, leaving appropriators with only about \$12.5 billion in discretionary funds.

One issue the panel will need to decide is how much to fund farm programs that aim to reduce the use of agricultural chemicals.

Another program that could prove controversial is federally subsidized crop insurance. Although the administration and subcommittee Chairman Jamie L. Whitten, D-Miss., want to scrap the program, some members of the panel may fight to retain funding.

Last year, Congress appropriated \$52.2 billion for agriculture programs.

ABORTION COUNSELING bill gets backing of Senate panel.

A bill (S 323) that would overturn a Supreme Court ruling upholding an administration policy banning abortions and abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics was approved, 12-5, by the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee yesterday.

"The gag rule is an unfair restriction on the rights of women served by federally funded family planning clinics," said committee Chairman Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass.

Ranking Republican Orrin G. Hatch,

Utah, led the opposition to the bill. "I cannot support legislation that removes the wall separating federal family planning programs from abortion services," Hatch said.

Two Republicans — James M. Jeffords of Vermont and Nancy Landon Kassebaum of Kansas — joined all 10 panel Democrats in approving the bill.

Under S 323, federally funded family planning clinics would be required to offer pregnant women who receive health care under Title X of the Public Health Service Act of 1970 information on all options — including abortion — regarding their pregnancies.

The Supreme Court ruled last month that Title X can be read to bar not only abortions but also abortion counseling.

Kennedy said he was not sure yet if bill supporters could put together the two-thirds majority needed to override a threatened veto of the bill. But he did say, "I would think we would."

VETERANS BILLS sail through panel; judges' raise cut.

The Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee yesterday refused to approve a \$7,000 pay raise for judges who review veterans' claims for benefits.

The action came as the committee approved, on an 11-0 vote, three veterans bills, including:

- HR 153, which would authorize the U.S. Court of Veterans' Appeals to call an annual judicial conference of judges of the court. The conference would make recommendations for improvements to the court, which hears appeals from veterans who have been denied benefits.

As passed by the House last February, the measure would also authorize a \$7,000 raise for the six associate judges on the court, putting their salary at the same level as that of judges on federal appeals courts.

But the Senate panel, by an 8-4 vote, decided to delete the pay raise.

- S 868, which would ensure employment and education benefits for Persian Gulf War veterans.

- S 869, which would provide easier access to treatment for veterans who suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder.

MASS TRANSIT reauthorization approved by Senate panel.

The Senate Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee yesterday gave voice vote approval to a bill (S 1194) that would authorize \$21 billion for mass transit programs through fiscal 1996.

About \$3.8 billion would be authorized in fiscal 1992 for mass transit programs, such as subway and bus systems. The measure will be folded into an overall \$105 billion surface transportation reauthorization (S 965), which is before the Senate.

The bill aims to give states flexibility in deciding whether to use federal funds for highways or mass transit systems.

By voice vote, members approved an amendment by Florida senators Connie Mack, R, and Bob Graham, D, to change the formula for determining the amount of federal grants for state bus systems.

Mack and Graham argued that the grants determined using population figures should be updated more frequently than every 10 years, as is the current practice. After the Floridians argued for a two-year update, the panel agreed to recalculate the grants every four years.

EL SALVADOR aid cutoff to be deferred until September.

A group of key House Democrats has decided to wait until September to include in the foreign aid reauthorization (HR 2508) provisions that would withhold military assistance to El Salvador.

HR 2508 is scheduled for floor action next week.

In a June 5th letter to President Bush, the Democrats — including Rules Committee Chairman Joe Moakley, Mass., and Foreign Affairs Committee Chairman Dante B. Fascell, Fla. — said they would defer congressional action so that cease-fire talks between the El Salvadoran government and rebels would not be disrupted.

Democrats initially were willing to go along with an administration request to wait until May 30 before voting on the provisions; they are now willing to extend that until September.

"Out of a desire to give the talks every possible chance to succeed... we will continue to refrain from legislative action on El Salvador until after Labor Day," the members wrote Bush.

In fiscal 1991, \$85 million in military aid was slated for El Salvador, but Congress voted to withhold half of it. Since then, the administration and lawmakers have been at odds over whether to release the rest of the aid. In the letter by the Democrats, Bush was strongly urged not to release the money, saying it would take the pressure off the government to negotiate a cease-fire agreement.

Bush will meet with President Alfredo Cristiani of El Salvador next Wednesday at the White House to discuss peace efforts in the war-torn country, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said yesterday.

MIDEAST ARMS control strategy to include other nations.

Administration officials said yesterday they intend to meet soon with officials from major arms supplying nations in an attempt to curb the spread of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons in the Middle East.

Reginald Bartholomew, under secre-

tary of State for international security policy, told the Senate Foreign-Relations Committee that he will head a U.S. delegation that will negotiate with England, France, the Soviet Union and China on the possible curbs.

France has agreed to host the meetings, but no dates have been set, he said.

Bartholomew said the U.S. delegation will propose that:

- Middle East countries destroy their surface-to-surface missiles and implement a ban on the production and acquisition of nuclear weapons material.

- Major arms suppliers adopt a "general code of responsible arms transfers" to avoid military destabilization in the region.

- Suppliers notify one another in advance of certain arm sales and supply annual reports to each other on arms transfers in the region.

- Regional states become signatories to the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty and the 1972 Biological Weapons Convention.

Bartholomew said the Middle East "is a region wherein arms control is virtually unknown."

But the panel's ranking Republican, Jesse Helms, N.C., doubted that arms control could be applied successfully in the region because of the ongoing Arab-Israeli conflict.

"There is no common interest among the states in the Middle East. The Islamic countries are still at war," Helms said.

SECRECY OATH pursued again for Intelligence panel members.

Bud Shuster, R-Pa., has resumed his bid to require members of the House Intelligence Committee to take an oath of secrecy.

Shuster, a member of the Intelligence panel, yesterday asked the Rules Committee to allow him to offer an amendment requiring the oath when the House takes up a fiscal 1992 authorization bill for intelligence programs next week.

Intelligence Committee Chairman Dave McCurdy, Okla., has led the opposition among Democrats, who say that an oath is unnecessary and would only cast doubts on the reliability of the members and staff on the panel.

McCurdy argued that current House rules prohibit members from disclosing classified information. Staff are required to sign a non-disclosure agreement before working for the panel.

Shuster acknowledged that he was unaware of any unauthorized disclosure of information by committee members but said there was "substantial evidence of leaks in the past."

Based on comments made at the meeting of the Rules Committee, it was doubtful that the panel would waive rules making Shuster's amendment in order.

Committee Meetings Today

CREDIT ERRORS take months to fix, consumer group says.

Getting an erroneous credit report fixed at a credit bureau can take an average of six months because of needless delays and negligence by the bureaus, says a study released yesterday by a leading consumer rights research group.

The study, prepared by the U.S. Public Interest Research Group (PIRG), was released at a hearing of the House Banking Subcommittee on Consumer Affairs. The panel is considering proposals to amend the Fair Credit Reporting Act of 1971 to address complaints about inaccurate credit ratings.

"These consumers complained to the credit bureau for an average of 23 weeks, nearly six months, without solving their problems," said Ed Mierzewski, a consumer specialist with PIRG.

"Further, 63 percent of the consumers have contacted the credit bureau five times or more with no relief," he said.

Another survey of 161 credit reports, released a month ago by Consumers Union, found that 48 percent contained errors and 19 percent had serious mistakes that could cause denial of credit, insurance or employment.

"Workers are being denied employment or even blackballed because of information placed in their files," said subcommittee Chairman Esteban E. Torres, D-Calif. "And inaccurate consumer credit information is difficult, if not impossible, to remove from the record."

UNEMPLOYMENT insurance not helping all workers, group says.

The insurance system designed to provide benefits to unemployed workers is not living up to its promise, the chairman of a House Budget task force said yesterday.

Frank J. Guarini, D-N.J., head of the Urgent Fiscal Issues Task Force was examining how the recession has affected the financial condition of the unemployment insurance system, which is run by the states but overseen by the federal government.

Congress should ensure that all displaced workers receive benefits, Guarini said. "The insurance system designed to protect workers from fluctuations in the economy is not even covering half of the workers who lose their jobs," he said at a hearing of the task force.

Carolyn Golding, deputy assistant secretary of Labor, defended the administration's handling of the program, saying that it was doing everything it could to provide benefits to as many people as possible.

Outlays for unemployment benefit payments are expected to go up nearly 50 percent this fiscal year, from \$17 billion in fiscal 1990 to \$25 billion in fiscal 1991. ■

Senate Committees

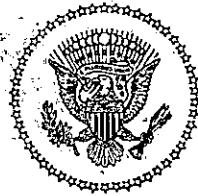

GORBACHEV ADVISER DENIES SOVIETS SEEK HUGE AID PACKAGE

MOSCOW -- President Gorbachev's top economic adviser denied in an interview published Thursday that the Soviet leader would ask for billions from the West if he is invited to next month's economic summit. Gorbachev does not intend "to go to London with an outstretched hand and mention any figures of financial or other aid," Yevgeny Primakov said in an interview with Izvestia that was carried by Tass. "The Soviet Union is joining the international division of labor, and the thing in question is radicalizing the country's movement to market relations with definite support of the West.... I am sure that on the part of the Soviet Union figures will not be mentioned even during the London summit." (AP)

SOVIET REPUBLICS GUESSING ABOUT U.S.

As the Bush Administration plans a summit with President Gorbachev and discusses possible financial aid for Moscow, Gueorgui Khostaria is left wondering if he's been forgotten.

Khostaria, minister of foreign affairs for the Soviet republic of Georgia, is in the middle of a little-noticed two-week tour to the U.S.... While the reception is polite and the sympathies earnest, nobody seems quite sure what to do with him or, more importantly, what to tell him.

"Different people in the Administration here have different attitudes toward the (central government in Moscow) and toward the republics," he said in an interview Thursday. But in general, he said, the Bush Administration position is that before asking the U.S. to take sides, "we should clear up things between us and the central authority back home." The problem was evident after a meeting Thursday with Rep. Gingrich.... A spokesman for Gingrich said he strongly supports pending legislation to require that any U.S. financial aid be given to the republics rather than the central government, but he still does not have a firm answer for the secessionist movements in the USSR. (Paul Basken, UPI)

U.S. SENDS MEDICAL SUPPLIES TO SOVIETS

The U.S. will airlift \$1.8 million in urgently needed medical supplies Friday to the Soviet Ural region as part of a continuing international disaster relief initiative, the State Department said. (UPI)

U.S. EASES CAMPAIGN FOR WORLD BANK SHIFT

The U.S. is using its powerful influence at the World Bank to pressure the agency to channel a large part of its loans directly to the private sector rather than governments in keeping with the Bush Administration's free-market principles.

The U.S. drive, bitterly opposed by other countries in the bank's policy-making councils, would radically redirect the activities of the institution....

Originally, the Administration had sought to alter the bank's charter to require that 50 percent of its loans go directly to private companies. This numerical demand was dropped Thursday, sources said, at meetings involving World Bank President Conable. Instead, Conable agreed that more of the bank's loans would be made with the intention of "supporting" the private sector.

HOUSE VOTES TO RESTORE SPACE STATION FUNDING

Three weeks after a spending subcommittee refused to fund NASA's \$40 billion space station Freedom, the House voted 240 to 173 Thursday to restore the full \$1.9 billion in funding for the coming fiscal year.

But in granting a reprieve to one of the space agency's premier manned flight projects, the House may only have delayed the day when Congress ultimately chooses between the expensive space station and a host of other politically popular spending programs.... The price...was a freeze on spending for other scientific and space programs run by NASA and a \$217 million cut in federal housing subsidies....

The White House mounted a major effort to rescue the space station, with President Bush telephoning key members of Congress. Thursday night, an aide to Vice President Quayle...said Quayle was "very pleased" with the vote because it indicates that the House shares Quayle's view that the nation wants a "forward-looking space program and, in particular, and aggressive manned space program."

CUOMO SAYS PARTY NEEDS PROGRAM, NOT 'NEW FACES'

ALBANY -- Gov. Cuomo says his party "doesn't need new faces" like his to challenge President Bush in 1992 but will fail to regain the White House unless it develops "a winning program for the whole of the Americans people. And that we don't have."

In an interview this week, the governor confirmed that he will begin making political speeches around the country later this year when the New York budget impasse ends. But he insisted he will be trying to shape the Democratic agenda for next year, not preparing for a 1992 candidacy....

"Anti-recession help will never come," he said, "because of the ridiculous status quo budget (agreement) that binds them all until after the 1992 election. This recession is causing the greatest fiscal problems (to states and cities) since the Great Depression, but they made a law that said you are not allowed to have a peace dividend.... That wasn't George Bush alone. That was George Bush and George Mitchell saying, 'This is the very best we can do.' Mitchell and Foley are terrific guys, but it's clear that we Democrats have not put together an agenda."

Cuomo also said Senate Democrats "made a terrible mistake walking away from the Moynihan Social Security tax cut."

Legislation to reverse the recent Supreme Court decision upholding the government's ban on abortion counseling at federally financed family planning clinics cleared its first hurdle in Congress Thursday as the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee approved the measure by a bipartisan vote of 12 to 5....

While lawmakers say the legislation probably will pass both houses, President Bush is expected to veto the bill and it is considered doubtful the two houses could muster the votes necessary to override a veto. ("Short Takes," Washington Post, A21)

Senate Committee Moves To End Ban On Abortion Counseling

...Sens. Kassebaum and Jeffords joined all 10 Democrats on the committee in voting for the legislation. A full Senate vote on the measure could come as early as next week.... However, aides to Senate leaders said they had not yet decided when to bring the legislation to the full chamber....

Sen. Kennedy said he believes the Senate bill, introduced by Sen. Chafee, will carry enough votes to overturn a veto. "There's an intensity about this issue and a concern about the implications of this issue and a reality about the issue that is much more evident than it was last year," Kennedy said.

Bush Courts Religious Conservatives -- Analysts

ATLANTA -- President Bush's speech Thursday to the Southern Baptist Convention on "faith, prayer and family" was the latest example of White House courtship of religious conservatives who are a key part of his constituency.

Since the beginning of the Gulf War, Bush has spoken out with increasing frequency on his personal faith and "confessed" that he hadn't done enough to bear religious witness in the past....

One side effect, analysts say, has been to reassure religious conservatives....

"He's always had a certain sensitivity to criticism from the religious right. He goes hot and cold on that, depending on his needs," Republican political analyst Kevin Phillips told Reuters. "He's closer right now to the religious right than any other politician they might be looking at. My sense is his ties with them now are better than usual. George Bush is pretty much the best these people can hope for."...

But the influential Chicago-based evangelical journal Christianity Today said in an editorial last September that Bush risked ignoring losing the votes of many "born-again Christians" if he ignored their moral issues. Bush, the journal complained, "apparently learned our language to ensure our vote," adding, "we can no longer afford to be naive."

Evangelical leaders remain incensed over federal funding through the NEA to controversial projects they deem "obscene" or "sacrilegious." Many were also outraged over an official invitation sent to gay activists for a White House function and a grant by the Atlanta-based U.S. Centers for Disease Control for a conference promoting "safe sex" for homosexuals to prevent AIDS.

SUBJECT: July 3 Medal Ceremony

By way of follow-up to our discussion on a potential Medal event honoring those who performed with distinction during the Gulf crisis, please be advised that I have discussed this with General Scowcroft on a confidential basis, and he concurs in presenting the Medal of Freedom to Generals Powell and Schwarzkopf and the Citizens Medal to core policy members of the Deputies Committee. He identified those members as:

Apparently, Deputy Secretaries (b)(6) were not core participants of the Deputies Committee, although they, along with others from Treasury, Justice, and other agencies participated in selected meetings.

Accordingly, your guidance is sought on whether you wish to proceed with presenting the Citizens Medal to all or some of the core policy group as listed above.

Also, unless you prefer otherwise, I would propose to discuss with Secretary Cheney and the Chief of Staff your desire to have a medal ceremony the morning of July 3 for Generals Powell and Schwarzkopf (with the request that it be kept strictly confidential until shortly before the event). It's my understanding that you would like to keep your intention to award the Medal of Freedom to (b)(6) (b)(6) a secret until the ceremony itself (as you did with Lane Kirkland's Citizens Medal).

One final question: would you wish to have a private luncheon with the Medal recipients and their families following the presentation ceremony? Your schedule is free, and you held such a luncheon after the Medal of Freedom ceremony in July 1989.

I hope this is consistent with our discussions. Thank you.
