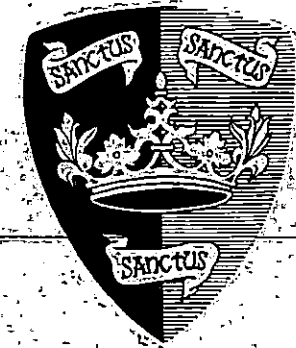

THE SCRIPTURES APPOINTED FOR TODAY focus on themes of God's Judgement and of Growth in the Lord.

In the reading from **EZEKIEL**, we hear the prophet's oracle of doom on Egypt. The glory and vaunted pride of Egypt will be brought low by Nebuchadnezzar. God is the judge of nations and the ruler of history; both people and nations should live accordingly. The parable of the tree is a warning to Israel against trusting in Egypt or any other nation for its protection.

PSALM 94:1-4, 11-14 reflects the meaning of Jesus' parable of the seed. Those who choose righteousness are like a great tree planted in the house of the Lord.

In the reading from **SECOND CORINTHIANS**, Paul speaks of his confident hope and his longing to experience the transformed body of heavenly existence. It will be like having a new house or set of clothes replace—or, better, be put on over—this tent of a body. In any case, we will not be left just as souls without form, but will have some manner of personal existence. God's Spirit is already our guarantee. This is our true destiny where we shall be at home with the Lord, and where we shall also be judged for our use of this earthly life.

In the reading from the **GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MARK**, Jesus tells the parables of the seed growing secretly and of the mustard seed in order to suggest what the Kingdom of God is like. God's activity is often unseen and mysterious, but it will produce its fruit and bring about the time for harvest. To human eyes the beginning of the Kingdom seems insignificant, but suddenly it will break forth. The great bush which the mustard seed becomes is a symbol for the Kingdom of God's protection. The evangelist closes the passage with his understanding that only faithful disciples can perceive the significance of Jesus' parables.

Commentary on the Scriptures is based on Introducing the Lessons of the Church Year, by Bishop Frederick Houk Borsch and Sunday's Scriptures, by the Rev. William Sydnor.

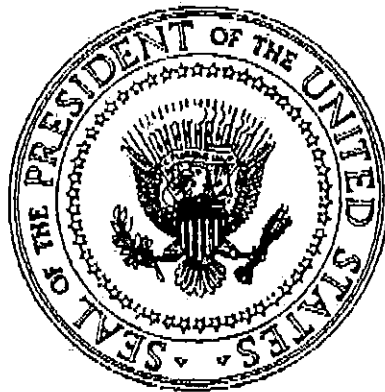

SUBJECT: Cabinet Report -- June 16 - 22

* * * THE WEEK AHEAD * * *

AGRICULTURE

June 18. Secretary Madigan will attend the State Dinner in honor of Brazilian President Fernando Collor. Secretary Brady will also attend.

June 19. Madigan and Ambassador Hills will co-chair the Agricultural Policy Advisory Committee meeting. Topic: agriculture negotiations in the Uruguay Round and the NAFTA. Later, Madigan will address the Food Research and Action Center's fundraising dinner, which will honor Senator Patrick Leahy and Congressmen Bill Emerson and Leon Panetta. Earlier in the day, Madigan will meet with Soviet Cabinet of Ministers Deputy Chairman F. P. Senko. Topic: negotiations with USDA regarding recently announced grain credit guarantees.

COMMERCE

June 20. Secretary Mosbacher will meet with U.S. Commission on Minority Business and Development Chairman and Maxima Corporation Chief Executive Officer Joshua Smith. Topic: the commission's interim report and the future of the commission.

June 21. Mosbacher will participate in the first meeting of the Competitiveness Policy Council. The Council was created by the Omnibus Trade Act of 1988 to advise Congress and the Administration on competitiveness issues in the United States. Later, Mosbacher will meet with European Community Vice President Martin Bangemann. Topic: standards, testing and certification issues. Ambassador Hills will also meet with Bangemann.

EDUCATION

June 17. Secretary Alexander will join the President and Governor Roy Romer in Grand Junction, Colorado to announce "Colorado 2000," a state program that will implement the President's America 2000 education strategy.

June 18. Alexander will meet with Secretary Lujan. Topic: the possibility of establishing a "New American School" on an Indian reservation. The America 2000 strategy envisions the creation of 535 New American Schools by 1996. Later, Alexander will address the Presidential Scholars' Distinguished Teacher Lunch, honoring teachers of the 1991 Presidential Scholars.

June 19. Alexander will address the third White House briefing for Presidential appointees confirmed by the Senate. Later he will meet with members of the House Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control. Topic: the 6th national education goal, that seeks to insure that all schools are drug-free by the year 2000. That afternoon, Alexander will join the President at the White House for the Presidential Scholars' Medallion ceremony.

June 20. Alexander will address a conference sponsored by Congressmen William Ford and John Dingell for educators in their congressional districts.

ENERGY

June 19. Secretary Watkins will meet with National Science Foundation (NSF) Director Walter Massey. Topic: issues of mutual interest to NSF and the department.

June 20. Watkins will address Ohio Republican Party members at the White House. Topic: the National Energy Strategy. Secretary Kemp will also address the group. Later, Watkins will meet with UCLA Laboratory of Nuclear Medicine Chief Michael Phelps and Senator Ted Stevens. Topic: an initiative by UCLA medical school to develop a biological imaging center.

June 21. Watkins will participate in a commencement ceremony at the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

June 16. Secretary Sullivan will deliver the Father's Day sermon at the Church of Atonement. Topic: the need for individual and community involvement in providing a safety net for our nation's youth. Later, he will travel to Columbus, Ohio to address the Public Health Service's national conference. Topics: the need to improve scientific literacy among Americans and the

department's biomedical research initiatives. Later, he will address an Ohio GOP fundraiser.

June 16-21. Two hundred HHS employees will travel to Florence, Italy to attend the International AIDS Conference. The conference is the most important annual scientific meeting on AIDS and its proceedings will likely attract media attention.

June 17. Sullivan will announce his intention to propose legislation that would reorganize the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration (ADAMHA). The proposed reorganization would move the research components of ADAMHA to the National Institutes of Health, allowing the agency to focus on service delivery and improvement. ADAMHA is responsible for administering the bulk of federal drug and alcohol treatment programs and this reorganization proposal is likely to attract media attention.

June 18. Sullivan will travel to Research Triangle Park, North Carolina to address the National Center for Environmental and Health Science. Topic: the hazardous effect of second-hand smoke on children. Later, he will travel to Chapel Hill, North Carolina to address students and faculty at the University of North Carolina Research Center. Topic: the Administration's commitment to continued research in the health sciences.

HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

June 18. Secretary Kemp will attend a meeting of the Federal Housing Finance Board. Topic: the financial management policy of the Federal Home Loan Bank system.

June 19. Kemp will address the Chowder and Marching Society. Topic: the Administration's anti-poverty initiatives. Later, Kemp will address the Wharton School Alumni Club on the same topic. Also during the day, Kemp will attend a closed meeting of the Resolution Trust Corporation.

June 20. Kemp will address the Philadelphia Jewish Business Leaders. Topic: the Administration's anti-poverty initiatives. Later, he will address a White House briefing for the "traditional values" coalition. Topic: the importance of traditional values in fighting poverty.

Under the ESA, the Service has one year to determine whether to list the species. The region of the bird's habitat that is subject to review includes Washington, Oregon and Northern California.

June 18. Lujan will accept a \$250,000 donation on behalf of the National Park Service from CONOCO, Inc. at a ceremony on Theodore Roosevelt Island. The donation is for construction of a National Park Ranger Museum at Norris Station in Yellowstone National Park. Later, Lujan will attend a Migratory Bird Commission meeting.

June 19. Lujan will address the American Recreation Coalition. Topic: announcement of the department's new outdoor recreation initiative, "Enjoy Outdoors America."

June 18. Release of the U.S. Housing Starts report from May (Commerce). Starts rose by 6.2 percent in April following a drop of 9.2 percent in March. Markets are expecting another increase in May.

June 19. Release of the U.S. Merchandise Trade report for April (Commerce). The deficit fell to \$4.0 billion in March from \$5.5 billion in February. The March figure was the lowest in nearly eight years. Markets are looking for a slight widening in the April deficit number.

June 21. Release of the Monthly Treasury Statement for May. Final settlements on individual tax liabilities and quarterly tax payments resulted in a \$30.1 billion dollar budget surplus in April. A large deficit is expected for May -- significantly wider than the \$42.5 billion of May 1990 and perhaps surpassing the previous record deficit for many months.

June 14. USDA's final Milk Inventory Management Report was delivered to Congress. Congressional hearings on the report have been tentatively scheduled next week in both the House and the Senate. Congress will likely consider legislation that would impose some form of dairy production quota. The USDA report evaluates several inventory management schemes without recommending any of the plans as superior to the others. However, USDA is likely to announce opposition to any quota systems.

June 13. The Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service (ERS) released its quarterly estimate of 1991 net cash farm income. Compared to \$58 billion in 1990, ERS now projects a range of \$52 to \$57 billion for 1991. The new 1991 estimate is down \$1 billion from the range of \$53 to \$58 billion that was published in March, 1991. The main reasons for the decline are lower prices than expected prices for feedgrains and higher interest expenses.

June 12. Secretary Madigan announced further administrative actions to relieve problems caused by excessive rains in various regions of the country. The most significant change will be for Iowa, Minnesota and other areas not yet officially designated as disaster areas and where rain has prevented planting of crops. The action will allow extension of the certification dates for prevented planting credit and allow farmers to withdraw from commodity programs without penalty if at least 30 percent of a crop is deemed to be lost or unplantable. This week's action is the fourth major administrative action taken to address weather-related agricultural distress this year.

June 9. The Commerce Department concluded its successful "Direct from the USA" trade fair held in Kuwait. Three hundred and eighty-eight U.S. companies were represented at the week-long fair, over 4,700 trade leads were recorded and over 60 agent/distributor agreements were signed at the show between exhibitors and Kuwaiti businessmen. Total sales by American businesses have reached \$38 million and are rising daily.

June 6. A pipeline in Knox County, Texas carrying West Texas crude oil was discovered to have spilled approximately 15,000 barrels into the Brazos River, at a point near Possum Kingdom Lake. Diamond-Shamrock Pipeline Company, the owner of the pipeline, has claimed full responsibility for the spill. Contractors at the scene placed containment booms in the river at a point where the river runs into the lake. EPA reports that the water current is causing the oil to disperse and it is not expected to reach the lake in threatening quantities. No fish kill has been reported. EPA, state health officials and representatives from Diamond-Shamrock are continuing to monitor cleanup efforts.

Construction will begin within a few weeks on the U.S. pavilion at Seville Expo '92. A contract worth almost \$7.6 million was awarded on May 29 to a Madrid construction firm for an 18,000-square foot, two-story building and two geodesic domes. Under the management of the U.S. Naval Facilities Engineering Command, work at the site is scheduled for completion by March 1992. The U.S. pavilion will showcase American technology, innovation, ingenuity and competitiveness. The American pavilion represents an unprecedented funding partnership between the federal government and the private sector. The six-month exposition will open on April 20 and close on Columbus Day, October 12, 1992.

* * * ON THE HORIZON * * *

June 24. The National Commission on Children will release its final report at a press conference. The report, which is expected to attract considerable media attention, addresses a wide range of children and health issues. The report includes

separate discussion by a minority group of commission members on some issues, and there is no consensus chapter on the issue of health care policy.

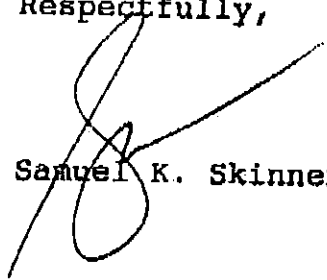
