POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING WITH
BIPARTISAN SENATORS' MEETING

- IN MY MESSAGE TO THE CONGRESS ARGUING THE CASE FOR MFN FOR CHINA, I TOLD YOU I WANT TO WORK WITH YOU.
- TODAY, I WOULD LIKE TO BEGIN WITH A FEW POINTS AND THEN GET YOUR VIEWS.
- FIRST, I REMAIN AS DEEPLY CONCERNED AS ANYONE WITH THE CONTINUING HUMAN RIGHTS ABUSES IN CHINA. I HAVE TOLD CHINA'S LEADERS IN NO UNCERTAIN TERMS. WE ALL SEEK PROGRESS THERE --
-- I FIRMLY BELIEVE MFN IS THE STRONGEST TOOL WE HAVE TO BRING ABOUT LONG-TERM POSITIVE CHANGE IN CHINA. TEN YEARS OF TRADE AND OPENNESS SET IN MOTION THE FORCES WE SAW IN THOSE PROTESTS AT TIANANMEN.
- TWO WEEKS AGO I MET IN CALIFORNIA WITH CHINESE STUDENTS WHO WERE AT TIANANMEN SQUARE AND WHO

CARD 2 OF 6

- ARE FOR MFN WITHOUT CONDITIONS. THEY SEE MFN AS KEY TO SUPPORT REFORMERS IN CHINA.
- WE SHOULD NOT PUT THIS TREMENDOUS ADVANTAGE AT RISK. WE SHOULD NOT GIVE THE HARDLINERS IN CHINA AN OPPORTUNITY -- BY PLACING CONDITIONS ON MFN -- TO USE CONDITIONALITY AS A NATIONALIST PRETEXT TO TURN AWAY FROM THE WEST AND TO ATTACK THE REFORMERS WHO WANT TO WORK WITH US.
- OUR CHINA POLICY IS A PACKAGE APPROACH. WHEN THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES TO COOPERATE WITH CHINA -- IN THE UN, KOREA, CAMBODIA -- WE WILL DO SO. WE SAW THE BENEFIT OF THAT IN CHINA'S COOPERATION WITH DESERT SHIELD AND DESERT STORM.
- SINCE I ANNOUNCED THIS YEAR'S DECISION ON MFN AT YALE, AND BECAUSE OF THAT DECISION, THE CHINESE HAVE RESPONDED POSITIVELY. THEY WILL JOIN THE TALKS IN PARIS ON MY MIDDLE EAST ARMS

CONTROL INITIATIVE. I AM CONFIDENT THERE WILL BE A POSITIVE RESULT THERE. THIS WILL HELP US TACKLE THE ISSUE OF MISSILE PROLIFERATION.

-- NONETHELESS, WHERE THERE ARE PROBLEMS IN CHINA I WILL NOT KOWTOW, I WILL TAKE ACTION. I HAVE ALREADY DONE SO ON HUMAN RIGHTS, TRADE, AND MISSILE PROLIFERATION.

-- YOU KNOW WE STILL HAVE SANCTIONS ON OPIC, TDP, INTERNATIONAL LENDING THAT IS NOT FOR BASIC HUMAN NEEDS, ALL MILITARY SALES AND HIGH-LEVEL EXCHANGES.

-- WE HAVE DESIGNATED CHINA A PRIORITY COUNTRY UNDER SPECIAL 301 FOR COPYRIGHT PIRATING; WE HAVE LIFTED CHINESE TEXTILE VISAS IN RETALIATION FOR ILLEGAL THIRD-COUNTRY TRANSFERS; WE WILL SOON BEGIN MARKET ACCESS TALKS.

-- THE CHINESE HAVE RESPONDED WITH A MISSION THAT CONTRACTED FOR OVER A BILLION DOLLARS IN U.S. EXPORTS, AND THEY SAY MORE WILL FOLLOW.

-- WE HAVE ACTED TO PRESS CHINA TO CONFORM TO INTERNATIONAL STANDARDS ON MISSILE TRANSFERS. THERE WILL BE NO NEW SATELLITE LICENSES OR HIGH-SPEED COMPUTER TRANSFERS TO CHINA UNTIL IT MEETS THOSE STANDARDS. THERE WILL BE NO TRANSFERS OF MISSILE TECHNOLOGY OR EQUIPMENT TO CHINESE COMPANIES ENGAGED IN PROLIFERATION.

-- I AM NOT SITTING ON MY HANDS. I AM PREPARED TO DO MORE WHEN CIRCUMSTANCES REQUIRE.

-- WE ALSO NEED TO STEP BACK FROM THE EMOTIONS OF THE MOMENT AND CALCULATE OUR LONG-TERM NATIONAL INTERESTS.

-- WE ARE THE ONLY TRADING NATION IN THE WORLD THAT WOULD CONTEMPLATE REMOVING OR CONDITIONING MFN. IF WE PULL BACK, WE ISOLATE

OURSELVES, NOT CHINA. WE HURT OUR BUSINESSES AND HELP OUR COMPETITORS.

-- WE MAY NOT LIKE IT, BUT CHINA IS A NECESSARY PART OF THE SOLUTION TO SOME IMPORTANT PROBLEMS. IT HAS A VETO IN THE UN SECURITY COUNCIL.

-- THE SYSTEM THAT RULES CHINA TODAY WILL NOT CHANGE DRAMATICALLY OVERNIGHT. THEY STILL HAVE A "MIDDLE KINGDOM" SYNDROME. BUT THAT SYSTEM CANNOT INSULATE ITSELF FROM INEVITABLE CHANGE.

-- BY GOING FOR MFN, I AM NOT PROTECTING CHINA'S ELDERLY LEADERSHIP, AS SOME WOULD HAVE YOU BELIEVE. RATHER, I AM TRYING TO SUSTAIN THE MOMENTUM FOR CHANGE.

-- I BELIEVE THE BEST COURSE IS TO USE ECONOMIC INVOLVEMENT --AND ALL THE HUMAN INTERCHANGES THAT GO WITH IT -- TO ENCOURAGE LONG-TERM EVOLUTION IN CHINA. I THINK CHINA'S

PARTICIPATION IN MIDDLE EAST ARMS CONTROL TALKS HELPS PROVE THE POINT.

-- LAST WEEK, I RECEIVED A LETTER FROM MAX BAUCUS AND FOURTEEN OF HIS COLLEAGUES ASKING ME TO TAKE CERTAIN ACTIONS WHILE PRESERVING MFN. WE ARE LOOKING CAREFULLY AT HIS LETTER TO SEE HOW WE MIGHT RESPOND. I THINK IT DESERVES SERIOUS CONSIDERATION.

-- NOW I WOULD LIKE TO HEAR YOUR VIEWS.

I. PURPOSE

To hear David Rockefeller's proposal for a Western Hemispheric Forum to promote a Hemispheric Free Trade area.

II. BACKGROUND

David Rockefeller has broached with me the idea of your participating next Spring in a Western Hemisphere Forum which could have as a theme, the creation of a Hemispheric Free Trade area by the year 2000. USTR has no problem with the theme. The Forum would be sponsored by the Council of the Americas and the America's Society. David is Chairman of both. He wants to discuss his idea with you briefly and seek your participation. David would also like to invite other Chiefs of State.

We have told him that his idea has appeal, but that we would need to consider how his meeting would fit with a somewhat similar one on Trade and Investment IDB President Enrique Iglesias is hoping to hold with your participation in September. We also told him we would want to consider carefully the participation of other governments.

We frankly think that two meetings on the Enterprise involving Heads of State within six months of each other is too much. We also think that the IDB meeting would be the better venue to have Chiefs of State involved. We would therefore like to have David concentrate on the private sector where he has so much influence. He will nevertheless make an appeal to involve Chiefs of State.

I recommend you encourage the conference to include saying that you would like to participate if your schedule permits, but suggest that he not involve other Chiefs of State. Suggested points to be made are at Tab A.

DAVID ROCKEFELLER

- Thank you so much for your very effective work in support of Fast Track. You made a real difference.
- I understand you have a proposal for a Hemispheric Conference in the Spring sponsored by the Council of the Americas and the America's Society to consider ways to bring about a hemisphere-wide Free Trade Agreement by the year 2000.
- I think the idea has merit, but we need to consider how such a conference would fit in with one being proposed for September by IDB President Enrique Iglesias. Please tell me about your idea.

**SUMMARY OF ADMINISTRATION'S REASONS
FOR OPPOSING H.R. 5 AND S. 55
THE "STRIKER REPLACEMENT" LEGISLATION**

The Administration opposes H.R. 5 and S. 55, the "Striker Replacement" legislation. If the Congress passed such a bill, the President's senior advisers would recommend that he veto it.

If enacted, H.R. 5 and S. 55 would upset the balance of economic power in private sector collective bargaining established over a fifty-year period. The union's potent right to strike is counterbalanced by the employer's equally lawful right to continue its operations with replacement employees.

No case has been made for such a fundamental change in our nation's labor policy. A 1991 General Accounting Office report, prepared at the request of the legislation's principal sponsors, found that in 1985, only 4 percent of striking employees were replaced by Mackay replacements. This decreased to just 3 percent in 1989.

The balance of economic power provides the strongest possible inducement for both groups to negotiate and compromise their differences. In 1980, there were 187 major work stoppages (strikes and lockouts involving 1,000 or more workers.) The number declined to under 100 in 1982, a record low of 40 was hit in 1988, and last year, there were only 44 major work stoppages.

By insulating employees from the traditional risks that have checked strikes, the law would promote labor unrest, cause disruption in the flow of commerce, expose our economy to anti-competitive collective bargaining agreements, and inflict injury on innocent non-striking workers, customers, suppliers and consumers. Small and struggling businesses, firms in tight labor markets requiring skilled workers, and those located in remote areas would be hit particularly hard.

If the right to permanently replace economic strikers were prohibited as S. 55 and H.R. 5 propose, there would be little incentive for unions to moderate the use of the strike weapon.

There are limits on the use of "permanent" replacements that protect employees from illegal employer bargaining tactics. Strikers can not be fired for exercising their right to strike because of an employer's illegal conduct such as a refusal to bargain in good faith. Moreover, in strikes over economic terms, strikers generally retain the right to reinstatement as vacancies occur, do not lose accrued seniority, and for one year can vote in union representation elections.

Recent amendments to the legislation purporting to remove non-union workers from coverage contain uncorrectable problems and create a double standard for union and non-union workers. The bill contains terms so vague that it would prohibit non-union employers from using permanent replacements to continue their operations in the face of recognitional picketing by union supporters.

Indeed, the bill would penalize workers who choose to take the risk of not striking. Under H.R. 5 and S. 55, those workers who chose not to strike could be displaced by returning strikers.

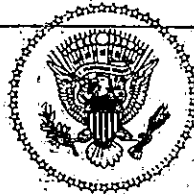

BACKGROUND: The Senate has been debating the Omnibus Crime Bill with a vote possible at 11:30 a.m. today on your habeas corpus proposal.

✓ So far, despite the rejection of your Crime package on a near straight party vote, we have been successful in amending the Biden Crime Bill to make it acceptable. However, the key vote on the bill is the habeas corpus vote. Without a strong habeas corpus component, your senior advisors will recommend a veto and we would have to start all over again.

We recommend these calls be made as soon as possible. These Senators have, for the most part, opposed us on crime. We need them to give us this vote to help salvage the bill.

KEY POINTS:

- I'm calling because I need your support and your vote for our habeas corpus proposal to the Crime Bill.
- This is the critical vote for our crime package. Without our habeas proposal, I will veto the entire package and we'll have to start all over.

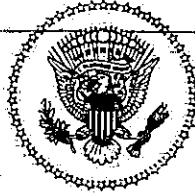

A Republican source, asked if Sununu's public apology for "mistakes" on Sunday meant that he was acknowledging that he mishandled his own travel, said, "I wouldn't say that. He believes that you (the media) are after him because he won't play by your rules. He believes Teeter, Teeley and Fuller are trying to get him so his power over the campaign is lessened. He thinks liberals overall are after him because he is conservative. He thinks the Jews and their friends are after him because he is Lebanese-American...."...

One source said Sununu had complained bitterly to Bush that "people in our own camp" are "fueling the flames" of the controversy by anonymously attacking him....

A source said Sununu "has agreed he needs to lower his profile and cut the travel" to avoid media scrutiny "for the time being." BAGHDAD -- U.N. investigators say they have identified several suspected nuclear sites in Iraq in addition to the two dozen the Baghdad government has disclosed....

In compliance with terms of the agreement ending the Gulf War, Iraq informed the IAEA that it had 24 nuclear facilities. But U.N. experts identified one additional site in May and have found "several more" since, said David Kay, deputy leader of an IAEA team working with the U.N. to investigate Iraqi weapons. Kay, interviewed Tuesday, would not divulge how many more nuclear sites were found or their suspected purpose.

CUBAN ENVOY REACTS TO U.S. CHARGES

Soviet support for Cuba remains constant, but the Soviet economic crisis has complicated Cuban efforts to buy food and other items obtained in the past, Havana's top diplomat in this country said Tuesday.

Jose Arbesu, head of the Cuban interests section here, also denied that his country has supplied sophisticated, surface-to-air missiles to leftist rebels in El Salvador. And he rejected charges that lax safety standards at a Cuban nuclear power complex being built with Soviet help could lead to an accident whose fallout might affect Florida.

Arbesu also denied that an increase in Cubans fleeing to Florida in makeshift boats means that President Castro's government is encouraging an exodus similar to the Mariel boatlift.

IRAQ/NUCLEAR

NBC's Jane Pauley reports many U.S. bombs missed Iraqi nuclear targets during the Gulf War because the allies didn't know they existed.

NBC's Fred Francis reports there is increasing evidence that Iraq is still trying to build an atomic bomb with materials and at locations that escaped the allied assault. U.S. intelligence sources say Iraq could have as many as 10 hiding places where nuclear-weapons research is underway or where equipment is stored. Pentagon sources say that U.S. bombers destroyed only a small percentage of Saddam's nuclear-research network. That is also the claim from a credible Iraqi defector.

(Gary Milhollin, University of Wisconsin: "The defector's story tells us that there's a big gap in U.S. intelligence gathering. This large enterprise went on without our finding out about it.") The defector said Iraq's secret success was possible because it borrowed declassified American technology from the Hiroshima bomb. In the '40s, the U.S. began enriching uranium for a bomb at a plant in Oak Ridge, Tennessee. It was a tedious process requiring much electricity from the dam's of the TVA. Large machines can separate weapons-grade uranium from raw material. The U.S. abandoned the process as too costly and slow, but it was good enough for Saddam. The defector asserts that calutrons [phonetic] were secretly built and in use near a dam under construction which could have generated enough electricity for a lot of weapons-grade uranium.

(Milhollin: "This process is not very efficient. It's very old and we declassified it because we didn't think anybody would use it. We were wrong.")

NBC News has learned that the Badisch [phonetic] Dam was financed in part with American money from the Atlanta branch of an Italian bank.

(Paul Van Wedel, Banca Nazionale del Lavoro: "We did a dam project in 1988 and we financed the Badisch Dam.")

And some of the equipment to enrich uranium may have come unwittingly from the firm Hipotronics of Brewster, New York.

(Steve Peschel, president, Hipotronics Inc.: "They told us it was going to be used for an induction heating generator, which involves a welding application for automotive parts.")

Intelligence sources say the Iraqis lied. They may have made 88 pounds of highly enriched uranium, more than enough for one bomb. A UN inspection team is searching for that uranium tonight, but NBC News has learned the Iraqis have denied the UN team access to one of the nuclear sites in violation of UN sanctions. (NBC-Lead)

ABC's Peter Jennings reports a UN inspection team was denied access to a key nuclear plant near Baghdad. When they went back, they saw cranes and other heavy equipment in the area, leading to speculation that whatever was in the plant may have been packed up and moved away. (ABC-4)

RECESSION

Jennings reports that according to the government, orders to factories for durable goods rose 3.8 percent last month. It was the second increase in a row and the largest in a year.

ABC's Stephen Aug reports orders rose for a broad range of goods: cars, aircraft, machinery for business, ships and tanks. There also was more activity in the residential real estate market. Sales of existing homes rose 6 percent, the fourth straight monthly gain. One reason is relatively low mortgage interest rates. But economists say that despite these signs, not every industry or region is going to recover from the recession at the same time.
(Jerry Jasinowski, businessman: "We're starting to see an end to the recession in manufacturing, so that areas like Chicago are really doing pretty well. On the other hand, in finance, we still have almost a depression, so that in cities like New York, it's a disaster.")

Consumers are also taking a wait-and-see attitude. The latest ABC News/Money Magazine consumer confidence survey shows most consumers do not think the economy is going to get any worse, so at least some of those new orders must be based on anticipation that consumers are going to be buying again soon.

Kuralt reports the AMA said today nothing should come between doctors and their patients, and that includes the government rule on abortion advice.

CBS's Edie Magnus reports a resolution passed today by the AMA stopped just short of openly calling on doctors to break the law on abortion counseling. Instead, it condemned any interference which would compromise a doctor's ability to discuss treatment with a patient, condemning in effect the recent Supreme Court ruling that bars doctors at federally funded clinics from providing information about abortion. The AMA says it will take the fight back to Washington. Doctors today refused to speculate on what they'll do if efforts to overturn the ruling fails. They would only say nobody wants to break the law.

CBS's Rita Braver reports pro-choice advocates have launched a last-minute lobbying blitz. The House bill's bipartisan supporters believe they will prevail.

(Rep. Porter: "I had three Republicans stop me in the five minutes on my way up here tell me that they had always been so-called right-to-life voters in the House of Representatives. Each one of them said: But this has gone beyond that; this is a matter where I'm not going to vote with them, I'm going to vote with you.") The anti-abortion side concedes the bill will probably pass its first hurdle. But the White House will definitely veto the bill, and the real battle will come over sustaining the veto.

(Rep. Smith: "It's not a matter of if we're going to fight this, it's a matter of when. And the most opportune time, in my view and in the view of many of my colleagues, is to do it after the President has vetoed this legislation.")

Though they expect to win a symbolic victory tomorrow, pro-choicers are already planning the next phase of their campaign.

YUGOSLAVIA

Jennings reports two of Yugoslavia's six republics, Croatia and Slovenia, voted today for unilateral independence. The national parliament, meeting tonight in emergency session, is calling for the army to prevent it. The State Department said today it will not recognize the independence of either republic. (ABC-5)

NBC's John Dancy reports the State Department is worried that the vote today will lead to civil war and to violence that will spread to other parts of Europe. One expert doubts the army will intervene.

(Susan Woodward, Brookings Institution: "The army cannot reunite Yugoslavia now that Slovenia and Croatia have declared their independence, because it has neither the power nor the authority to do so.")

Secretary Baker was in Yugoslavia last week, warning the country's leaders not to resort to violence. Only a week ago, Baker warned against the old animosities.

CBS's Martha Teichner reports the U.S. does not endorse this action.

Slovenia has hastily developed and trained an army to protect its independence. The question now is whether Yugoslavia's feeble national government will dare to send in troops of its own to try and pull the country back together. (CBS-7)

PHILIPPINES/BASES

ABC's Mark Litke reports the U.S. military bases that used to pump \$1 billion a year into the Philippine economy are now virtually unusable, and 80,000 Filipino base employees are out of work. Olongopo City, outside Subic Bay, and Angeles City, outside Clark Field, are both heavily damaged. (ABC-9)

Jennings reports the U.S. embassy in Manila said today the U.S. is not going to abandon the bases despite the damage.

ABC's Bob Zelnick reports that publicly, the Pentagon says damage to Clark and Subic Bay must be fully assessed before the future of the bases is decided.

But the disaster proves what both parties already knew: that no other single location can serve U.S. needs so well. (ABC-10)

AIR FORCE/HOMOSEXUAL

CBS's David Martin reports an Air Force officer who had publicly acknowledged his homosexuality was brought in by the Air Force for 3 1/2 hours of questioning. He was scheduled to be discharged Monday after four years of service, but that was held up for a day so investigators could conduct what can only be described as a gay hunt. The Air Force says it was a routine security precaution. But one member of Congress called that a stone-age mentality.

COMPUTER SABOTAGE

ABC's Gary Sheppard reports a computer programmer in San Diego has been charged with computer fraud for planting what authorities call a time-bomb program in a sensitive computer system linked to the Pentagon. The programmer worked in a space systems division of General Dynamics Corporation. According to the indictment, last March he created and hid inside the General Dynamics computer a program designed to erase key files relating to a number of U.S. military projects. (ABC-6)

HOSTAGES/LEBANON

Kuralt reports pro-Iranian kidnappers in Lebanon came out today with their first communications since the end of the Gulf War. They released a photograph of American hostage Allen Steen [phonetic] and repeated their earlier demand that Israel free 400 Arab prisoners. (CBS-8)

DRUGS/CALI CARTEL

CBS's Juan Vasquez reports federal and state authorities in New York have dealt a blow to what is now the largest cocaine exporting organization in Colombia. Six tons of cocaine and \$24 million in cash were seized as a Queens grand jury indicted 48 alleged members of the Cali cartel, said to be responsible for 70 percent of the cocaine in the U.S.

(Gov. Cuomo: "A sophisticated organization that [was] rigidly and brutally controlled from Colombia by a small group of wealthy and powerful individuals.")

(Thomas Cash, DEA: "Certainly, the traffickers of the Cali organizations are doing very, very well. They are what would be best described as a growth industry.")

(Gov. Martinez: "We don't care if they're violent or not violent. They've got a violent product that brings poison, so we're after them whether they're violent or not.")

But Colombian traffickers appear to be out of reach of American justice as long as they stay at home now that extradition has been all but outlawed. If the case of Pablo Escobar is any example, the worst they can expect, if they are caught, is to be sent to a jail of their choosing to bargain for a reduced sentence. (CBS-3)

Jennings reports that instead of trying to hide cocaine in pieces of hollowed-out plastic, many drug dealers are now melting down the cocaine and mixing it into the plastic itself, shaping it into anything from plugs to pipe fittings. Once it gets into the country, the plastic can be melted out again and the cocaine extracted. (ABC-7)

CUBA

NBC's Ed Rabol reports that as the Soviet Union cuts aid, Cuba is starving for oil and food. The Castro government is imposing deep austerity measures, and Castro said there will be more hard times ahead.

(Castro: "So we need to re-adapt ourselves, to re-adapt all of our efforts and all of our programs, and so we're trying to do it in the minimum of time possible. We're working hard, we're going through difficulties, and those difficulties can be even greater.") I asked who's to blame. He says, that I don't know. Privately, many blame the government and hope that Castro will step down. For now, he is firmly in power, in large part because there is no alternative. (NBC-2)

CAMBODIA

Jennings reports the Cambodian government has agreed to let the UN monitor a cease-fire with the three main anti-government groups. (ABC-11)

CHILDREN/COMMISSION

ABC's Rebecca Chase reports the National Commission on Children wants to change a welfare system that supports only those who do not work.

Chase continues:

(Marian Wright Edelman, commissioner: "We thought that the universality of the principle that all families and children should be guaranteed a minimum of economic decency was very important and that it took away the stigma of welfare to those at the bottom.") The reason the commission endorses the earned income tax credit is because it enables very poor families with children who are earning money to keep more of what they earn.

(Edelman: "You know, it's going to be an enormous boost to encourage work, to help people think that they can move up in this society.")

The commission says the child-support assurance recommendation is necessary because only one in four absent parents -- mostly fathers -- pays full child support.

(Allan Carlson, commissioner: "It would have a major effect in transferring responsibility for children back to the people who brought the child into the world.")

(Edelman: "What is important is the focus on the child and the focus on making sure that child and that family doesn't suffer because a parent is neglectful.") (ABC-12)

RANCHERS/CONGRESS

NBC's Roger O'Neil reports that if the Senate goes with a House bill passed tonight that raises grazing fees, many ranchers in the West who use public land will be run out of business. (NBC-5)

AIRLINE CRASH

NBC's Robert Hager reports that the collision of two Northwest airliners in Detroit last December was caused by the pilots, who got lost in heavy fog. But controllers and confusing runway signs also played some role.

News From the Hill

HOUSE FLOOR: Grazing fees increase approved by House.

The House yesterday passed, 345-76, a fiscal 1992 \$12.9 billion spending bill (HR 2686) for the Interior Department and related agencies, after approving an amendment that would increase grazing fees on public lands.

By a 232-192 vote, lawmakers approved an amendment, offered by Mike Synar, D-Okla., that would raise grazing fees from their current rate of \$1.97 per animal unit to at least \$8.70 by fiscal 1995.

An animal unit is calculated as the amount of forage needed to feed one mature cow, or five sheep, for a month.

Members also had their annual debate over the function of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). Members rejected, 66-361, an amendment by Philip M. Crane, R-Ill., to strike the \$178 million appropriation for the NEA.

Crane said the private sector contributed \$7.5 billion to the arts in 1990, which proved that a government-funded arts organization was not necessary. Supporters countered that the NEA plays a vital role in promoting the arts.

Whip Election. Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., announced yesterday that the Democratic Caucus will meet July 11 to elect a majority whip.

The race to succeed William H. Gray III, D-Pa., who is resigning from Congress, is expected to be between Steny H. Hoyer, D-Md., and David E. Bonior, D-Mich.

SENATE FLOOR: Crime bill amendments taken up.

Work on the comprehensive crime bill (S 1241) picked up yesterday as members voted on numerous amendments regarding police searches and use of the federal death penalty.

Members rejected, 43-54, an amendment by Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., that would have permitted evidence to be introduced in court that was retrieved during a search in which a police officer did not have

a warrant but believed that the search was justified and conducted in good faith.

Under current law, evidence retrieved in a warrantless search is usually not considered admissible in court.

Members, by voice vote, agreed to an amendment that would allow Indian tribes on reservations to decide whether or not a federal death penalty should be carried out for murders committed on reservation lands.

In a 30-68 vote, senators rejected an amendment by bill sponsor Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., that would have struck language from the bill allowing the death penalty to be used for leaders of drug supplying networks, or drug "kingpins," regardless of whether they were directly involved in a murder.

Members also rejected, 25-73, an amendment by Paul Simon, D-Ill., that would have replaced death penalty sentencing provisions in the bill with mandatory life imprisonment and a chance for parole.

TREASURY-POSTAL spending bill provides less for Postal Service.

The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Treasury, Postal Service and General Government yesterday approved, by voice vote, a \$19.3 billion fiscal 1992 spending measure (HR 2622) that includes about \$266 million less in mail subsidies for non-profit organizations than the House version.

Chairman Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., said the federal budget squeeze precluded the subcommittee from providing more than \$383 million for the Postal Service, which funds its own operations but receives an annual federal payment for "revenue foregone" — the amount the mail carrier loses each year because non-profit groups pay a lower rate for bulk mail.

The House bill includes the Postal

Senate Floor: Senators will resume work on an omnibus crime bill (S 1241).

The bill would restrict the sale of assault weapons, expand the federal death penalty and limit habeas corpus appeals by death row inmates.

Members may consider the bill's habeas corpus provisions, which seek to reduce the amount of time that can be used to exhaust appeals by death row inmates.

Supporters of the provisions argue that many death row inmates have been able to use habeas corpus laws to delay the carrying out of their death sentences for years.

Members may also debate provisions of the bill that would restrict the sale of assault weapons and require a seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases.

House Floor: Legislation (HR 2707) to fund the fiscal 1992 activities of the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and related agencies will be taken up by the House today.

Members will likely consider amendments that would revise abortion language in the \$204 billion spending bill. The measure would have the effect of lifting the Bush administration's ban on abortion counseling at family planning clinics that receive federal funds.

Overall, the measure includes about \$3.3 billion more than Bush requested, including about \$1.7 billion for education and \$1.6 billion for health programs.

D.C. Spending. After beginning work late yesterday, on a fiscal 1992 spending bill (HR 2699) for the District of Columbia, members are expected to complete work on the measure, which would provide almost \$700 million in federal funds for the District.

The bill would also approve the spending of \$3.9 billion in locally raised revenues by the District government.

China Trade Status: The House Ways and Means Committee will mark up legislation (HR 2212) that would continue normal trade relations with China for one more year but require Beijing to undertake human rights reforms and other changes.

During the next year, while China continues to receive most-favored-nation (MFN) trade status, the Chinese government would have to improve its record on human rights, religious expression and press freedom.

The bill also would require Beijing to disclose the fate of protesters unaccounted for since the 1989 crackdown on pro-democracy demonstrators in Tiananmen Square.

If China failed to make advancements in these areas, the bill would require the United States to end China's low-tariff treatment in 1992.

President Bush has announced his intention to renew MFN, which expires at the end of the month, and has said he would veto any legislation that would impose conditions.

Yesterday, Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, announced that he is scaling back his proposed conditions for normal trade relations with China in an effort to pass a bill with the two-thirds majority needed to overcome President Bush's promised veto.

An earlier Mitchell proposal would have ended the MFN status after six months unless China met a set of very stringent conditions.

Head Start: The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee markup of legislation (S.911) to expand health and education services for needy children comes on the heels of a high-profile report, released Monday, that recommended the expansion of Head Start to serve all eligible children.

The bill aims to provide Head Start coverage for all children in need, as sought by the bipartisan National Commission on Children.

Over three years, the measure would significantly expand the authorization level for the 26-year-old program — from \$1.9 billion currently to \$7.7 billion in fiscal 1994.

According to bill sponsor Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., Head Start is able to provide services for only about one-third of the children who are eligible.

The Head Start program was created in 1965 during President Lyndon B. Johnson's War on Poverty. Since then, the program has become a favorite of Democrats and Republicans.

The program is designed to give poor children some schooling before they enter

kindergarten so that they go into the classroom better prepared.

WIPP Facility: A bill that would permit the opening of a nuclear waste dump in New Mexico will be marked up by the House Interior Committee.

The bill (HR 2637) would pave the way for testing of the facility, called the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP), by transferring ownership from the Interior Department to the Energy Department, which is to operate the dump.

Numerous amendments may be offered, including several by Bill Richardson, D-N.M., that would impose additional restrictions on the Energy Department before the agency can begin testing the facility.

The storage facility, an underground cavern, is almost completed. It is designed to permanently store highly concentrated low-level waste from the nation's nuclear weapons plants. But it has been beset by structural problems that critics say make it unsafe to open.

One of Richardson's amendments would require the Energy Department to hold off testing until independent experts can certify that the facility is structurally sound.

John J. Rhodes III, R-Ariz., may offer an amendment to increase the amount of waste that can be placed in WIPP during the test phase.

Interior Chairman George Miller, D-Calif., is expected to oppose any substantial revision of the measure.

Fast Flux Reactor: Legislation aimed at salvaging a Department of Energy (DOE) nuclear research reactor tops the Senate Energy panel's markup agenda.

The bill would reverse a department decision to shut down the reactor, which is the agency's only research reactor. Called the Fast Flux Test Facility, the reactor had been doing most of its work for the Clinch River Breeder Reactor, which was never completed and was canceled in 1983.

But members from Washington State, where the reactor is located, say that it could serve a host of private sector functions, including research into medical isotopes, nuclear waste disposal technologies and space-based reactors.

The bill is designed to keep the project alive by encouraging private companies to invest in and use the reactor. The measure would allow DOE to charge users.

Veterans' COLA: The Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee will take up legislation (S 775) that would provide disabled veterans with the same annual automatic cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) that Social Security recipients get.

The COLA also goes to widows and

other survivors of those who died as a result of their service activity.

Congress failed to pass a COLA at the end of 1990, and the legislation seeks to prevent that from happening again. Earlier this year, Congress cleared a bill providing a 5.4 percent COLA for disabled veterans for fiscal 1991.

Bill sponsor Alan Cranston, D-Calif., estimates that under the bill, disabled veterans would get a 5.3 percent COLA in fiscal 1992.

The appropriations bill (HR 2519) that funds veterans' programs, which passed the House June 6, would provide a 5.2 percent cost-of-living increase for disabled veterans.

Unemployment Benefits: The chairman of the House Ways and Means Subcommittee on Human Resources, Thomas J. Downey, D-N.Y., will try to win approval of a proposal to extend the payment of federal unemployment benefits during a recession.

Current law provides for 13 weeks of federal benefits during a recession after the 26 weeks of state benefits are exhausted. The extra benefits would be available to people in areas of high unemployment.

Downey's bill (HR 1367) would provide an additional 26 weeks of federal unemployment benefits during a recession. But yesterday he was preparing a substitute, scaled-back version of the bill in an attempt to win more support.

Under the bill, the increased benefits would be paid for by raising the employer-paid taxes that finance the program. In the past, members have balked at the cost of expanding benefits and shown little support for a tax increase.

Fair Use: The House Judiciary Subcommittee on Intellectual Property and Judicial Administration will mark up legislation (HR 2372) that would allow certain uses of unpublished works without liability.

Under the fair use doctrine, copyrighted works may be used without permission or payment if the use is fair and in the public interest. For example, the legitimate use of part of a copyrighted work by a journalist for an article or by a scholar for a research paper is permitted.

Recent federal court decisions have restricted the use of this doctrine for works that are not published. HR 2372 would confirm that the fair use doctrine applies to unpublished as well as published works.

The measure also would establish a national registry to compile a list of films that are deemed to have artistic merit. The registry would work with film archives to preserve these films.

Subcommittee Chairman William J. Hughes, D-N.J., is expected to offer a substitute amendment that would simplify the fair use language. ■

Service's entire request of \$649 million, an increase of almost \$177 million over current spending.

The Bush administration requested \$183 million for fiscal 1992, contingent on the Postal Rate Commission revising the eligibility standards for the non-profit mailing subsidies.

DeConcini said that it was unlikely that the authorizing committees would change eligibility standards this year.

DeConcini held out hope that the Postal Rate Commission would make changes to the subsidy plan that would provide more money, but said, "I don't see how we can get up to \$649 million."

Overall, the subcommittee-approved version of HR 2622 includes about \$109 million less than the House bill, according to senators and staff. The subcommittee imposed an across-the-board cut of 5 percent on travel accounts for most departments.

About a third of the spending in the bill would go to the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS's \$6.68 billion appropriation is \$26 million less than the House version.

The full committee will consider the bill today.

PRICE-FIXING bill advances in House Judiciary Committee.

Legislation that would strengthen antitrust laws on vertical price-fixing won the voice vote approval yesterday of the House Judiciary Committee.

The bill (HR 1470) would make it easier for discount retailers to bring a lawsuit alleging that a manufacturer and a rival retailer conspired to set prices and cut off supplies to the discounter.

It would also clarify that vertical price-fixing is automatically illegal and would ease the standard for proving such cases.

The panel rejected, 12-22, an amendment by Hamilton Fish Jr., R-N.Y., that would have required plaintiffs who bring a price-fixing suit to show evidence of a conspiracy and a connection between that conspiracy and the subsequent price-fixing attempt.

Fish argued that the bill's language was too broad and that valid actions by the manufacturer and another retailer could be challenged.

Joint Ventures. The committee also approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 1604) that would provide some protection from antitrust laws to companies that enter into joint production ventures.

The measure would extend the provisions of the 1984 National Cooperative Research Act, which provides some protection for joint research and development ventures, to cover joint production

ventures. Under the law, companies found guilty of antitrust violations stemming from a joint venture would be liable only for actual damages instead of the triple damages normally called for in antitrust cases.

INTERSTATE banking provisions survive Banking markup.

The House Banking Committee yesterday rejected attempts to scale back provisions of a sweeping draft banking bill that would allow holding companies to open banks in any state.

By a 15-35 vote, the panel rejected an amendment by Bruce F. Vento, D-Minn., that would have granted states the right to choose whether to allow interstate banking. Another amendment that would have allowed states to bar interstate banking lost on a 23-26 vote.

Both amendments were opposed by the Bush administration and supported by the Independent Bankers Association and several state groups.

Members also defeated, by a 22-30 vote, an amendment offered by Joseph P. Kennedy II, D-Mass., that would have required banks to cash government checks and offer basic checking services.

By a 27-23 vote, members agreed to strike from the bill language that would have exempted banks with assets of less than \$50 million from reporting requirements on their lending to minorities.

PENSION PROTECTION extended under Education bill.

The House Education and Labor Committee yesterday gave speedy approval to a measure (HR 2031) that would extend federal protection for benefit plans sponsored by rural telephone cooperatives.

The committee amended the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 to provide the same protection to these plans as rural electric cooperatives' plans currently receive.

The committee's ranking Republican, Bill Goodling, Pa., said the effect of the legislation would be to exempt rural telephone cooperatives' health plans from state insurance regulations. And although he said he had no objection to the legislation, he warned that "this particular exemption may not be appropriate for hundreds of other multiemployer plans" that need the same protections.

Pat Williams, D-Mont., the bill's sponsor, said he had introduced the measure as a separate bill because similar provisions had been added to budget-reconciliation legislation but were dropped because they were unrelated to the budget.

The panel also approved HR 2720, a bill that would extend through fiscal 1992 the programs authorized under the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act and the Family Violence Prevention and

Services Act. The bill would also extend programs authorized under the Adoption Opportunities Act and provide a separate authorization of \$1 million for the U.S. Child Abuse Advisory Board.

MENTAL HEALTH grant bill OK'd by House subcommittee.

A new state block grant program for funding mental health facilities would be created by a bill (HR 2311) approved yesterday by the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health.

The three-year measure, approved by a 14-8 vote, would authorize \$270 million for mental health facility grants in fiscal 1992. Chairman Henry A. Waxman, D-Calif., has said that the current process of grouping the funds with money earmarked for substance abuse prevention has led to a random allocation to the states of mental health money.

States would be required to submit plans that detail their needs for mental health facilities. The secretary of Health and Human Services would dole out the grant money based on those needs.

By an 8-14 party-line vote, the panel rejected an amendment by William E. Dannemeyer, R-Calif., to restrict funding increases in fiscal 1993-94 to 2.4 percent.

Another Dannemeyer amendment, which coupled the spending restriction with language that would have required an advisory council on mental health to have a majority of members who were related to someone who was mentally ill, also failed by a 8-14 vote.

MILK SUPPORT legislation approved in House panel.

Legislation that would prop up the sagging prices of dairy milk was approved by voice vote yesterday in a House Agriculture subcommittee.

The measure would raise the government's price-support level for milk and place caps on government purchases of surplus milk.

Members of the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Livestock, Dairy and Poultry agreed, 10-9, to an amendment by Harold L. Volkmer, D-Mo., that would increase the price-support level in the bill from \$11.60 to \$12.60 per 100 pounds of milk. The current price support level is \$10.10.

Opponents of the amendment said it would only increase administration opposition to the measure.

The bill would also place a cap on government purchases of surplus milk at 5 billion pounds and would create an industry-controlled board with the authority to implement surplus control measures when milk surpluses exceed the cap. The milk is purchased by the Agriculture Department's Commodity Credit Corporation.

Members rejected, 6-7, an amend-

ment by Collin C. Peterson, D-Minn., that would have struck language in the bill exempting dairy farmers in Southern states from having to abide by surplus production caps.

DISASTER AID to territories approved by House Interior panel.

The House Interior Subcommittee on Insular and International Affairs yesterday approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 1688) to authorize disaster assistance to island territories under the auspices of the United States.

The measure would help the areas, such as the Virgin Islands and American Samoa, prepare for natural disasters. After the Interior Department reviews the territory's ability to cope with a disaster, funds would be allocated to construct health and safety facilities.

The bill would also authorize funds to help the territories improve their infrastructures. Based on an assessment of a territory's sewage, water and electrical needs, grants would be offered to help protect the basic utilities against storms and other disasters.

By voice vote, the panel removed Puerto Rico from the list of territories that could be given assistance. The Bush administration is opposed to including Puerto Rico, fearing it would add significant costs to the bill.

ELECTRIC VEHICLES to be studied under Science panel bill.

The House Science Committee's Environment Subcommittee approved legislation (HR 1538) yesterday, by voice vote, that would authorize funding for research on electric vehicles and, in particular, a study of the batteries needed for such cars.

Panel members pointed out that electric vehicles could help fight air pollution and oil dependency.

The measure, sponsored by committee Chairman George E. Brown Jr., D-Calif., establishes a 10-year demonstration program for electric vehicles that includes a plan to study the support and maintenance needs of the vehicles, including electricity delivery systems and battery replacement and disposal.

The panel approved two amendments by subcommittee Chairman James H. Scheuer, D-N.Y., that would reduce the research and development authorization by \$38.6 million and add \$50 million for the demonstration projects.

Ranking Republican Don Ritter, Pa., received voice vote approval for an amendment that would give the administration more flexibility in picking its demonstration projects. As originally written, Ritter said, only large car fleets in big cities would be eligible for the program. His amendment sought to open the program to mid-size cities that have

minivans and smaller mass transit fleets.

The measure generally drew bipartisan praise, but Ritter said some Republicans think it contains too much money for the demonstration program and they may seek to reduce the amount in full committee.

HOUSE CHILD-CARE workers granted health benefits by panel.

The House Administration Committee yesterday approved by voice vote a draft bill making the House health-care plan available to employees of the House child-care center.

Under the measure, the House child-care center, which is currently run as an independent, non-profit corporation, would be placed under the jurisdiction of the Clerk of the House for the purposes of extending health benefits to its employees.

Salaries of child-care workers at the center would continue to be paid out of the center's revenues. The estimated \$45,000 cost of extending health benefits to the workers would be paid out of the House administration budget.

The bill also authorizes the chairman of the House Administration Committee, in consultation with the ranking minority member, to appoint an advisory board for the center.

Republican members offered a substitute bill, defeated by voice vote, allowing the center's workers to qualify for House health benefits but requiring the center to foot the bill.

Arguing for the substitute, Bill Thomas, R-Calif., said that higher tuition costs, which could result if the center has to pay for its own health-care benefits, might help solve the admissions problem at the center. The center currently has 68 children enrolled but has 200 on a waiting list.

IMF NEEDS \$12 billion boost, administration official says.

A senior Treasury official told Congress yesterday that the International Monetary Fund (IMF) needs \$12 billion from the United States as part of a multinational funding, or quota, increase at the organization.

David Mulford, Treasury's under secretary for international affairs, told the Senate Banking Subcommittee on International Finance and Monetary Policy that the funding boost "is critical if the IMF is to help shape the world economy" in years ahead.

He said the increase was needed, in part, because the IMF expects to play a larger role in international finance as more nations change to a market economy and make other reforms.

The quota increase would raise the basic resources of the IMF by 50 percent from \$130 billion to \$195 billion. The U.S. quota would increase from \$26 billion to \$38 billion.

IMF member countries agreed to the quota increase in principle in May 1990, Mulford said. The last quota increase was in 1983.

Connie Mack, R-Fla., also said he was concerned that the Soviet Union might be able to use IMF funds to help Cuba build a nuclear reactor.

The IMF is considering granting the Soviet Union associate member status.

CHINA NOMINEE holds firm to administration's MFN policy.

The Bush administration's intention to extend most-favored-nation (MFN) trade status to China does not appear to hurt the confirmation chances for J. Stapleton Roy, the president's nominee to be ambassador to China.

In a confirmation hearing yesterday, members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee were openly critical of Roy's adherence to the administration's China policy but were clearly supportive of his nomination.

Roy said the administration is continuing efforts to pressure China to adopt broad political and human rights reforms. But he said Congress should not use MFN as a "blunt object" to try to force reforms.

Harris Wofford, D-Pa., praised Roy for his 35-year career in the Foreign Service but remained critical of his position on the MFN renewal request.

"It is still puzzling that the administration wants to extend MFN after the events of the last two years," Wofford said in reference to China's crackdown on student protesters and its continued repression of Tibet.

Jesse Helms, R-N.C., strongly urged Roy to work to stop the Chinese from exporting products that have been made in prison camps. He also urged that more be done to reduce China's increasing sale of arms to other countries.

The Foreign Relations panel expects to vote on the nomination on Thursday.

MEDICARE PAYMENT plan angers doctors.

Rep. Pete Stark, D-Calif., yesterday urged physicians and Medicare administrators to try to reach a compromise on a new Medicare physician payment plan due to go into effect Jan. 1, 1992.

Stark's comments came as the House Ways and Means Health Subcommittee, which he chairs, heard representatives of doctors' groups criticize the new payment plan, called the resource-based relative value scale (RB RVS).

The new payment plan would base fees on the amount of time, training and skill required to perform a specific procedure, rather than base them on usual and prevailing rates.

Stark, who expressed frustration over the long-standing controversy over

how to pay doctors under Medicare, asked competing factions to compromise. Dr. Alan Nelson, representing the American Medical Association, expressed "outrage" at the proposed 16 percent reduction of the conversion factor used to transform the value of physician services into dollar payment amounts. He said the cut will reduce overall payments to physicians.

But, according to Gail R. Wilensky administrator of the Health Care Financing Administration, which runs Medicare, the primary purpose of the plan would be to "redistribute Medicare fees to primary care services...and away from surgical and diagnostic procedures and high-priced areas."

The new payment plan will reduce Medicare payments to doctors by about \$3 billion in 1996, she said.

BUSH, BLACK CAUCUS discuss South Africa, civil rights bill.

President Bush and members of the Congressional Black Caucus met for about an hour yesterday and discussed a variety of topics, including sanctions against South Africa and a civil rights measure (HR 1) passed by the House.

Bush told the House members that he will be required, by law, to lift sanctions against South Africa once the last of five conditions — the release of all political prisoners — is met.

Bush also sought to explain his threatened veto of the civil rights bill. But he received a cool reception on both South Africa and civil rights issues.

Rep. John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., accused Bush of being "on the verge of making a historic mistake" on South Africa and of practicing political "racial divisiveness" on civil rights. "Removing sanctions [against South Africa] at this time would be dangerous and wrong," Conyers said in a statement issued on behalf of the caucus.

The 26-member organization has called on the administration to leave the 5-year-old sanctions in place until the Pretoria government gives blacks the right to vote. The caucus disputes the administration's claim that four of the five conditions of the 1986 sanctions law have now been met.

1. Cambodia: SNC Meeting Opens in Thailand. Prince Sihanouk has energized the Cambodian peace process by presenting a series of proposals, including an "unlimited cease-fire" linked to an arms cutoff, to the Supreme National Council (SNC). The SNC is considering how to monitor the cease-fire as well as a number of administrative issues -- including possibly making Phnom Penh its permanent home. The key substantive issue, persuading Phnom Penh to agree to elements of the Perm Five plan about which it has reservations, is still to be addressed. The Khmer Rouge appear to be willing to agree to all that Prince Sihanouk is proposing -- but making implementation contingent on Phnom Penh's acceptance of the Perm Five Framework Agreement. (C)

2. South Africa: Peace Conference. At a church-sponsored conference over the weekend, a wide variety of political organizations agreed to establish a committee to explore ways to end factional violence. Unlike the government-convened conference in May, which was boycotted by the ANC and others, all major groups except those from the right wing attended the meeting. The militant Pan-African Congress abandoned a longstanding policy of refusing to meet with government officials to attend the meeting. This was also the first meeting jointly attended by National Party ministers, the ANC and Inkatha. Although prospects for peace remain uncertain, the presence of such a broad range of players bodes well for future constitutional talks. (C)

3. Czechoslovakia: Agreement on Constitutional Arrangement. Federal leaders agreed on June 17 at Kromeriz to allow the parliaments of the Czech and Slovak republics to negotiate a treaty enshrining the Czechoslovak federation. The Kromeriz agreement marks a breakthrough in relations between the two nations of Czechoslovakia, and could provide an example for other multi-ethnic states in the region. Previous attempts to define the constitutional arrangement between Czechs and Slovaks foundered on the Slovaks' intransigence about their sovereignty. The leaders who met at Kromeriz must now sell the agreement to their constituents. Our Embassy warns that the approach of the June 1992 elections will complicate federation treaty negotiations and the writing of the Czech and Slovak constitutions. (C)

Fewer Steps Back

Recent media attention focused on questionable care at some VA medical centers, particularly at North Chicago, Ill. I want to update you on the steps we have taken to address the issues.

Hearing of problems there, I ordered an Inspector General review. The IG uncovered patterns of inadequate medical care that may have contributed, inter alia, to the deaths of at least eight veterans over the past two years. A panel of independent physicians confirmed the situation. I immediately directed changes in the hospital's leadership, elimination of certain kinds of surgery, and introduction of rigid quality control and accountability.

Before releasing the IG's report, we alerted the local congressman and sent copies to both Illinois senators and other appropriate members of Congress. I have insisted that VA's answers to the many congressional and media inquiries be forthcoming and honest, tempered only by privacy and due process. This way, we have contained the damage an evasive and secretive stance would have produced. We have also noticed grudging media acknowledgement of our positive efforts.

We have aggressively initiated a three-tiered system of early warning and corrective measures. This comprises a checklist of key quality of care indicators for semi-annual VAMC certifications, cyclical inspections of all medical facilities by the medical inspector, and independent assessments of our quality assurance programs by the IG.

One tool I installed in 1989 to encourage reporting of problem areas is a program called "Tell It to the Secretary." We use a post office box and I personally review and respond to information and complaints sent in on VA and VA-related activities. It has helped us find problems in many VA facilities, including North Chicago.

I do not wish to minimize the major administrative problem North Chicago has been or to suggest that there will not be other "North Chicagos." But by acting quickly to identify and correct the problems, we enhance our ability to continue providing the best care and service possible to our veterans.

Re: May Personal Income and Outlays

Several pieces of good news. First, initial state claims for unemployment insurance fell slightly for the week ended June 15.

Second, personal income rose 0.5 percent in May, 0.3 percent after adjusting for taxes and inflation. Personal spending rose 0.9 percent after accounting for inflation, after having fallen in April. This is a strong sign that the early stages of the recovery are falling into place.

Third, the Purchasing Managers' index--a private survey that is confidentially provided to me in advance of its release the first day of each month--will show a large gain in June when it is released on Monday. This will be the first time since the middle of last year that the index will show an expanding rather than declining industrial sector.

Coupled with yesterday's release of the final estimate of first quarter GNP which was within one-tenth of one percent of what we had forecast last December, these data indicate to me that things are going almost exactly as expected; my major concern is the strength and durability of the recovery and the need for a sustained growth of money and credit from the FED and the banking system to support the recovery.

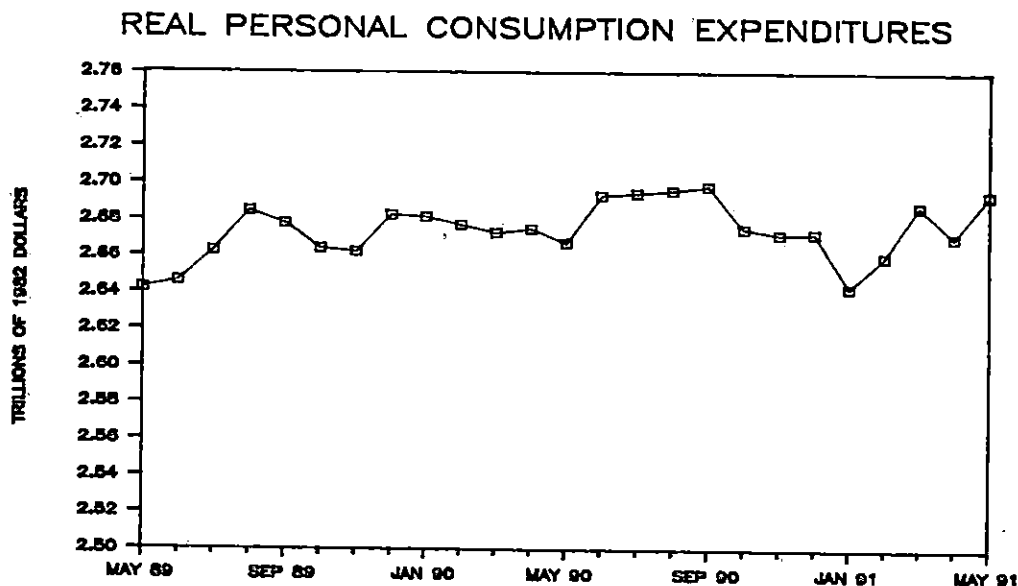

Department Release, Tomorrow, 10:00 a.m.

Personal income rose 0.5 percent in May, after rising 0.1 percent in April. The increase equaled that expected by private analysts. Wages and salaries increased 0.6 percent in May, compared with an increase of 0.2 percent in April.

Real personal disposable income--personal income adjusted for taxes and price changes--increased by 0.3 percent in May, and reached its highest level since December 1990.

Consumer spending rose 1.1 percent in May, exceeding the market expectation of 0.8 percent. Consumer spending adjusted for price changes rose 0.9 percent, reaching its highest level since September 1990. Real spending rose for almost all categories.

As shown below, real personal consumption expenditures have rebounded to the level reached in the middle of last year.

Family-Planning Clinics Face Dilemma Over Their Mission

PORTLAND, Me. — For Kimberly Edwards and the family-planning clinic she works for here, the choice offered by the United States Supreme Court was painful but clear: abandon abortion counseling or forgo \$600,000 in Federal funds.

Two weeks after the Court's ruling, Ms. Edwards's organization, Planned Parenthood of Northern New England, announced that it would give up the money, about 10 percent of its budget, rather than abide by the Federal regulations governing Title X family-planning funds.

Nancy Kelleher, the group's associate director for external affairs, said: "When we looked at our mission, the choice was clear. Planned Parenthood of Northern New England will not take the Federal hush money."

Nationwide, the same dilemma confronts 4,500 clinics that share \$150 million in Federal money under Title X

and serve four million low-income women at state public health departments, big-city hospital clinics and free-standing family-planning clinics in rural areas with few other medical resources.

It will be at least another month before the regulations actually take effect and clinics are forced to make a choice. For now, most are still trying to figure out exactly what the regulations will and will not allow — and hoping fervently that Congress will help them out by passing legislation to change the regulations or prevent their enforcement.

Dependent on the Funds

In Washington, Congressional foes of abortion have decided not to force a vote on a bill that would test their strength on the issue. The bill is a \$204 billion appropriation measure that contains the Title X funds and now includes a ban on enforcing the "gag rule" on abortion counseling. Supporters of the rule have decided they will wait until an expected Presidential veto of the bill in September or October, and hope to muster the 146 votes necessary to sustain it. There is no schedule for Senate action.

Some clinics say they are too reliant on Title X money to consider flouting the regulations, while others, like Planned Parenthood of Northern New England, say their principles will not

allow them to consider limiting the counseling they give, whatever the financial consequences.

Many say they are hoping they can find a way to rearrange their services and remain within the letter of the law, so that they can keep the money and yet make sure that their clients have access to abortion counseling, a risky proposition.

And many clinics are looking with new interest at the convoluted procedures now in use in five states where, because of a legal technicality, some clinics have already been operating under the restrictions for two years.

"It's a bunch of old men telling women how to think and act," said Ms. Edwards, who counsels teen-agers on contraceptives and reproductive health at the Portland, Me., clinic, speaking of the Supreme Court. "If I have a 16-year-old girl with an alcohol problem who's living on the streets and finds out she's pregnant, or the 12-year-old I saw last week who was sexually abused by her stepfather, and they ask me about abortion, how could I possibly say I can't answer their questions? It would be abandoning my responsibility to them."

Planned Parenthood's 900 clinics alone receive \$37 million a year, or about a quarter of all Title X funds. And several Planned Parenthood affiliates besides the one in Northern New England have already said they would rather give up the money than stop abortion counseling.

Clinics May Be Closing

The board of directors decided, unanimously, that we cannot accept funding that restricts our ability to inform our clients of their choices," said Sevrin Austin, executive director of Planned Parenthood of Wisconsin. "Five days after the decision, we did a fund-raising letter about it," which brought in \$70,000 in five days, but we're losing \$2.2 million, and that is going to mean some of our clinics will close and some patients will not be served."

Some other clinics, including Planned Parenthood affiliates and many state health departments and community clinics, have said they would do what it takes to keep the money.

"We've looked at our mission and we've decided we have to take the money, to insure that we can provide access to family planning for as many women as possible," said Peter Brown, executive director of Planned Parenthood of North Texas, which has four clinics that receive Title X funds and four that do not. "But we've also decided that we will find some way to insure that clients will still get all the information they need."

The Title X regulations enacted in 1988 say that family planning clinics

may not counsel or refer for abortion, and if a woman specifically asks, she must be told that abortion is not an appropriate method of family planning. The regulations also say that family planning clinics that receive Title X funds must be kept separate from clinics that do abortion counseling, and that such factors as separate accounting records, separate physical structures and separate personnel will be considered.

Maneuvering Room a Question

Because child-bearing decisions depend on so many factors, it is impossible to predict what effect, if any, the new regulations would have on the number of abortions performed each year. And no one knows how much maneuvering room will be allowed. For example, will the Federal enforcement officials allow nurses paid by Title X money to tell patients to look in the Yellow

Pages for listings of abortion providers? Can they send pregnant patients from a Title X family planning clinic across the street to a prenatal clinic that does not receive Title X money and does provide abortion counseling? What if that other clinic is in the next office and shares the same receptionist?

A spokeswoman for the Department of Health and Human Services said she could not answer these questions, but indicated that the department would soon issue more guidelines on exactly what will be allowed.

Most family planning clinics receiving Title X funds will have to resolve these questions by the fall when the department is scheduled to begin enforcing the 1988 regulations. The department was enjoined from enforcing the regulations in most places until the Supreme Court decided their constitutionality.

But the court orders only stopped enforcement in those clinics that were affiliated with Planned Parenthood, the National Family Planning and Reproductive Health Association, and the West Virginia Department of Health.

Dozens of clinics in Kentucky, Texas, South Dakota, Iowa and Nevada were not affiliated with any of those groups, and at those clinics, the regulations have already been in effect for two years. Several have devised what they term "creative ways" to comply with the regulations, but still give their clients access to abortion referrals, where requested.

For example, in the state public health clinic in Bowling Green, Ky., there is a notice posted next to every telephone.

"If a person calls and asks where they can get an abortion, tell the patient, 'I'm sorry, I can not give you that information. You should consult the Yellow Pages of the phone book or call a private doctor.' If the patient persists, you can offer to make her an appointment to see the nurse. If you do this you must say, 'I can make you an appointment to see a nurse for additional information. This information will not be associated with the family planning program.'"

But the nurses who handle Title X family planning clinics in the Barren River Health District, which includes Bowling Green, also run prenatal clinics. So it may be the very same person who first tells a client she can not provide an abortion referral in the family planning program, and then, in the prenatal program, proceeds to do so.

"If someone gets a positive pregnancy test and asks where she can go for an abortion, I tell them it is not an appropriate method of family planning," said Donna Woods, a nurse in Bowling Green. "Then I sign them out of the family planning clinic, make a note in the chart, and sign her into the prenatal program, and then I give her the sheet about no smoking or drinking, and the sheet listing her options, which include adoption and abortion referrals."

Ms. Woods said very few of her patients ever ask about abortions, but that even after two years she remains uncomfortable about the speech she has to make if they do.

The heart-rending thing is when the young lady is upset and undecided and crying and I wish I could talk about whatever she wanted to talk about," said Ms. Woods. "If somebody asks about abortion, how they'll feel after the abortion, will they be awake or asleep, I can't answer them, because I really don't know where the line is on what's allowed."

Doing What Is Necessary

Nancy Quarcelino, who coordinates the maternal-child health programs at the Barren River Health District, said that although she dislikes the regulations, her district's clinics, which provide family planning to 7,200 women a year, will do whatever they must to keep the \$223,000 of their \$800,000 budget that comes from Title X.

"We're not a real rich health department, and we couldn't afford to give up the money," she said. "We have never performed abortions, or called up and made appointments for women to get abortions, so our procedures now are not all that different. What bothers me is that the regulations show so little concern for the patients. They don't care who's paying you, they want to know what you can do to help them."

Clinics would evade the rules, if they knew what they were.

And when they're sitting there, upset, you're giving this bureaucratic speech they don't want to hear."

Some of the clinics in Texas that have been operating under the Title X regulations say they, too, have found ways to comply with the regulations and still provide abortion information.

For example, in San Antonio, at the Brady-Green Community Health Center, an out-patient clinic, the family planning nurse covered by Title X does pregnancy tests, but patients are told to get their results down the hall at the obstetrics intake unit, which is not covered by Title X, and can make abortion referrals.

"We're insulated by the network of different clinics there are here," said Jeffrey Hons, a family planning educator at Brady-Green. "But what's upsetting is that family planning clinics are the only people doing anything to reduce the need for abortion, and we're the ones getting picked on by the anti-

abortion people. And the real brunt of this falls on freestanding family planning clinics that don't have anywhere to refer people to."

While several free-standing rural Texas family planning clinics that are already bound by the regulations refused to discuss their practices, a few admitted on the condition that their names not be used, that they were referring patients to Yellow Pages listings of abortion providers, even though they think such referrals are probably prohibited by the law.

And both government officials and family planning organizations say they expect that Title X enforcement is likely to be far stricter at freestanding family planning clinics than at clinics that are based in hospitals, or those that offer general health services. It is also understood that family planning clinics that also offer abortions within a shared facility will be most strictly scrutinized of all.

I'm Big-Time Angry

Some family planning nurses say that the regulations will make it impossible for them to follow what they consider good medical practice.

"I'm big-time angry about the regulations and I'm personally prepared to quit rather than follow them," said Linda Byers, a nurse practitioner at Community Action, Inc., in San Mar-

cos, Tex., which is not yet bound by the regulations. "What bothers me most is these old white men telling young poor women that because they can't afford a private doctor, they can't have the information they need to make choices about their health care."

In Portland, Me., at Planned Parenthood's Tuesday night teen walk-in clinic, Rachael Doyle, an 18-year-old client who says she could not afford a private gynecologist on her part-time drugstore earnings, echoed similar objections.

"I don't think just because the government gives some money to a clinic, they should get to control what people can talk about," said Ms. Doyle, who has used the Planned Parenthood clinic for three years and plans to start nursing school in the fall. "The people here tell me pretty much everything I need to know."

The administrators at Planned Parenthood in Portland say that, no matter how difficult it is to keep going without the Title X money, they do not want to risk that credibility.

"If there's a way we can reconfigure our services, and still inform people of their options, sure, we'll look at it," said Skeek Frazer, of the Portland Planned Parenthood. "But a lot of our clients are young and we don't want to be in a position where we're not able to talk freely and are asking them to read our lips about crucial information."

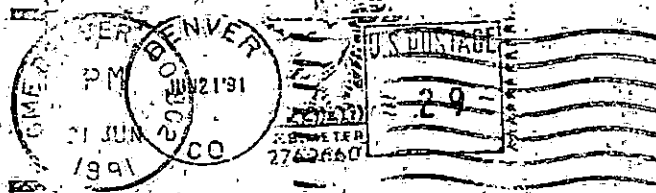

11:00 A.M. NEWS UPDATE

YUGOSLAVIA (Ljubljana, Yugoslavia/AP) -- The federal government ordered its police to take control of Slovenia's border crossings after the republic and neighboring Croatia declared independence. Both the federal army in Slovenia and the republic's rival territorial defense forces were put on high states of combat readiness, officials said.

MIDEAST PEACE/ARENS (Reuter) -- Israeli Defense Minister Arens said that Mideast peace prospects were improving even though some Arab rulers felt they needed peace with Israel "like a hole in the head." Arens also expressed confidence that the U.S. would not use Israel's impending request for \$10 billion in housing loan guarantees to settle Soviet Jews as a lever to prod Israel. Asked about the prospects for peace, Arens said in an interview on ABC's "Good Morning America," "I think the chances are improving, but I have to add right away they're improving very slowly. The Middle Eastern peace process is a slow process and it mainly has to do with a lack of incentives that Arab dictators have to make peace with Israel," he said.

SOVIETS/UNION TREATY/YELTSIN (Moscow/Reuter) -- Russian President Yeltsin said there were still major differences over President Gorbachev's proposed treaty for keeping the Soviet Union intact. Yeltsin told the Russian parliament five points were still outstanding, including division of powers, who signs the treaty, and the sensitive question of taxation. "Substantial work has been done, but the final accord on all articles of the treaty has not been reached," he said.

IRAQ/NUCLEAR PROGRAM (Vienna/UPI) -- The International Atomic Energy Agency confirmed that Iraqi military authorities twice denied or restricted access of IAEA investigators to inspect designated nuclear sites. In a communique released by its Vienna headquarters, the IAEA said the team finally -- after protests -- was granted full access this morning, but said "activities which had been observed from a distance during the first visit had ceased and objects that had been seen had been removed."

(Nicosia/Reuter) -- The official Iraqi news agency INA quoted Foreign Minister Ahmed Hussein as saying the only reason the IAEA team could not visit the site earlier was the Moslem holiday of Eid al-Adha.

GNP/ECONOMY (AP) -- The economy shrank at an annual rate of 2.8 percent in the first three months of the year while U.S. corporations suffered their worst profit squeeze since the spring of 1989, the government said.

S&L BAILOUT/BRADY (AP) -- Secretary Brady asked Congress to provide another \$80 billion for the S&L bailout and extend the life of the program by more than a year. Brady told the Senate Banking Committee that the RTC needs to double the \$80 billion it has already received to finish the job. "This would permit the RTC to complete its work as quickly as possible without costly delay," he said in prepared testimony. "Funding delays simply add to taxpayer costs because they slow the RTC's resolution activity."

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2:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

LITHUANIA (Moscow/AP) -- Soviet troops seized Lithuania's communications centers, taking over its independent TV and radio station and cutting telephone and telegraph lines to the republic, Lithuanian officials in Moscow said.

(Moscow/UPI) -- An unidentified Lithuanian official informed Soviet Interior Minister Pugo of the takeover, and Pugo said he had not ordered it, Interfax reported. Natalya Boganova, a spokeswoman at Lithuania's mission in Moscow, said "black beret" troops of the Interior Ministry's special forces unit known as OMON "took the intercity telephone station" in late afternoon, severing "all telephone ties with Lithuania.... The radio is also not broadcasting."

CRIME BILL (AP) -- The Senate approved President Bush's plan to severely limit legal maneuvers by death row inmates seeking to delay their executions. The White House proposal, passed 58-40, would block so-called habeas corpus petitions in federal court unless the judge found the state courts treated the defendant unfairly, and those petitions would have to be filed within six months. Sen. Biden argued the Bush plan would "rid us of abuse" but "at the very high price of endangering our constitutional rights." "Americans cannot understand why it takes so many years...why it takes so much of the energy of our legal system...to have the consequences of truth and justice executed," said Sen. Graham.

HEAD START (UPI) -- On the heels of a national commission report urging the nation to spend more on children, a Senate panel approved legislation that would entitle all low-income three-, four-, and five-year-olds to Head Start by 1997. Making Head Start an entitlement program comes at a cost -- \$33 billion over the next six years. The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee passed the bill on a voice vote, but Sen. Hatch noted the Bush administration would oppose another costly entitlement program despite the good intentions.

STRIKER REPLACEMENT BILL/MARTIN (AP) -- The Communications Workers of America scrapped an appearance by Secretary Martin because the Bush administration is opposed to a bill that outlaws permanent strikebreakers. About 3,000 members of the 650,000-member union, meeting in San Francisco, gave a rousing ovation when one suggested Tuesday that they all walk off the floor when Martin showed up for her speech today. That prompted union leaders to call her office Tuesday afternoon -- after she had already flown to San Francisco -- and "suggest it would not be in her best interest to come," said a union spokesman. "We felt it would put the secretary in something of an embarrassing position," he said. Martin, in response to the cancellation, issued a statement saying she regretted that "there are those who let single-issue politics stifle discussion and communications."

MIDEAST PEACE/SYRIA (Reuter) -- Syria, which has delayed responding to proposals from President Bush aimed at convening an Arab-Israeli peace conference, is seeking U.S. support for its demand that Israel withdraw from the Golan Heights, diplomats said. "Syria is afraid that Israel is not serious about negotiating over the Golan Heights and they want some assurances that they do not enter a negotiation which shoves this issue aside," said one source.

MIDEAST PEACE/EGYPT/U.N. (Cairo/Reuter) -- Egypt will insist that the U.N. play a major role in any Mideast peace conference, Foreign Minister Moussa said. "Egypt will not accept a marginal role for the United Nations because it is the author of Security Council resolutions 242 and 338 and the principle of inadmissibility of seizing land by force," Moussa told reporters.

KUWAIT/DEATH SENTENCES (London/Reuter) -- Kuwaiti Crown Prince al-Sabah told Prime Minister Major that all death sentences passed in recent trials in Kuwait were being commuted, British government officials said.

KUWAIT/MARTIAL LAW (Cairo/UPI) -- Kuwait lifted martial law by royal decree. The decision meant that prisoners charged with collaborating with Iraqi occupation troops would probably have their trials transferred to civilian rather than martial law courts. It was not immediately clear, however, whether the lifting of martial law meant that opposition parties would now be able to operate freely.

IRAQ/CHEMICAL WEAPONS (Zakho/Reuter) -- Iraq is still producing chemical weapons and moving them to new storage sites to hide them from international inspection, an anonymous Kurdish official said. The official named a new site near Mosul and said the Iraqi army was using it to stockpile freshly produced poison gases.

SOVIET AID (Moscow/UPI) -- Grigory Yavlinsky, author of the plan for massive infusions of Western capital to save perestroika, said that "considerable sums are involved." Radical economists rallied behind his formula as a unique opportunity. Yavlinsky's article in the Moscow News and a letter of support by leading economists such as Stanislav Shatalin and Oleg Bogomolov were part of a stepped-up campaign to defend the plan against conservative opposition. Yavlinsky said the aid will not be wasted because "the entire format of receiving the help is that it does not go to the government (and its ministries) but for specific objectives."

SOVIET TROOPS/GERMANY (Berlin/Reuter) -- The Soviet army said it was slowing down the withdrawal of more than 300,000 troops from reunited Germany's east because Bonn had built no housing for returning officers. In Bonn, the German government said it was stunned and dismayed by the Soviet move, contending Moscow was bound by a treaty to pull out the troops on time regardless of steps taken to provide housing for them.

ZACHARY TAYLOR (Louisville, Ky./AP) -- Tests show that President Taylor was not poisoned by arsenic 141 years ago, a medical examiner said.

CHINA/MFN (Reuter) -- A House committee voted to extend China's favorable trade status for another year but added strict conditions on human rights and other controversial issues to further extension. The legislation will be considered by the full House next month. Debate in a deeply divided Ways and Means Committee lasted several hours and critics of China managed to add several provisions designed to win enough votes in the full House to override a likely presidential veto. They included conditions relating to Chinese nuclear and missile exports, abortion, export goods made by forced labor, and China's opposition to Taiwan joining the main international trade organizations. In drafting a tougher bill, the committee overrode the objection of Reps. Rostenkowski and Gibbons, who argued that it was being overloaded with conditions. "There is a good chance that we will push them (the Chinese) too hard, they will just retreat within themselves," Gibbons said. Rep. Archer's bill, which would have allowed Bush more flexibility to continue MFN, was defeated 17-15 before the stronger measure was adopted without a recorded vote.

YUGOSLAVIA/PRESIDENT (Terence Hunt, AP) -- President Bush urged Yugoslavia's divided republics not to split their country apart, saying, "What we don't need is any more violence in the world." Bush was asked about the possible breakup of Yugoslavia during a picture-taking ceremony in the Cabinet Room with members of Congress. "Our position is very clear on that. I've spoken often about unity and tranquility, and people sitting down and talking about their differences," the President said.

LITHUANIA (Moscow/AP) -- Soviet soldiers withdrew peacefully from Lithuanian communications centers after about two hours. No injuries were reported.

ABORTION COUNSELING (AP) -- The House neared a vote to permit abortion counseling at taxpayer-financed clinics, a step toward reversing a Bush administration ban and the Supreme Court ruling that upheld it. The measure to lift the ban had "broad and deep support on both sides of the aisle and in most cases regardless of position on abortion because this is an even more fundamental question, one regarding honest relations between citizens and their government," said Rep. Porter. "I would urge the President to listen to the medical profession and to listen to people across this nation and sign the bill when it comes across his desk," said Porter. But Rep. Smith (R-N.J.) said, "This policy of the President is a good one and we will sustain a veto." Rep. Hyde said the amendment "is making doctors who should be helping parents plan their family recommend that they can also exterminate this child...and it's compelling the taxpayers to pay for it."

IRAQ/NUKES (UPI) -- The U.S. accused Iraq of undertaking a secret nuclear weapons program, then trying to hide it by removing evidence from a military site and holding up international inspection. "There is ample evidence from multiple sources that Iraq has been conducting a covert nuclear program that has included activities to produce nuclear weapons material," the State Department said.

ANTI-DRUG BUDGET (AP) -- An attempt by Republicans to restore \$114 million in drug treatment funds sought by the administration collapsed on a procedural point after some political rhetoric on the House floor. Rep. Shaw conceded that his amendment to add the money included funding for the administration's proposed drug treatment Capacity Expansion Program that Congress has not yet authorized. Before the measure died, however, Rep. Rangel blasted the White House's drug policy director for his comments criticizing Democrats for cuts in the administration's proposed drug war budget for '92. Rangel said he supports Shaw's effort to restore the funds deleted by the Appropriations Committee. But he said "the so-called drug czar has seen fit to politicize this by having a press conference on the Capitol steps." Rangel complained that Martinez hadn't called him or other Democratic members to ask for joint efforts to restore the funds. "The issue of drug abuse is too important to believe that we can do it as Democrats or Republicans," he said.

S&L BAILOUT (UPI) -- Amid heightened tension, Secretary Brady asked Congress for an additional \$180 billion to bail out the S&L industry and an extra year to do the job. Some senators, in turn, questioned the effectiveness of Brady and other senior officials assigned to oversee the industry cleanup, and suggested that the oversight board be reorganized. In a testy exchange, Sen. Kerry accused Treasury officials of underestimating the bailout costs before the 1988 presidential election to ensure victory for President Bush. Brady retorted, "I resent, Sen. Kerry, your insinuation."

MIDEAST PEACE/ARENS/SYRIA (AP) -- Israeli Defense Minister Arens virtually ruled out President Assad as a candidate for peace talks with Israel. "I think Assad is really not in a category of people interested in making peace with Israel," Arens said in a news conference. "He has pursued a consistently hostile policy." On the other hand, Arens said chances of Palestinian Arabs entering negotiations had improved. "We are closer to negotiations with them than with any of the other parties," he said. "If Israel were to signal surrounding Arab countries that they can attack Israel and lose territory and that all that is going to be returned to them, that is not an incentive for making peace, and it may be an incentive for making war," Arens said.

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
