I. PURPOSE

To brief you on macroeconomic issues, debt and trade for the London Economic Summit.

II. BACKGROUND

This is the first of three scheduled briefings for the London Economic Summit. On July 10 we have scheduled two separate sessions, one on Eastern Europe, the Soviet Union and other political issues; the other on the environment and key commune issues.

The Soviet Union is likely to dominate the London Economic Summit and may be the sole focus of media attention. However, we should guard against sweeping under the rug other serious economic issues, for example, the need for economic growth, for a successful trade round, and for continued attention to developing country debt. You may well have to remind your Summit colleagues that these are issues that merit the attention of Heads and should not be relegated to discussion among officials.

Macroeconomic Situation

Secretary Brady will summarize the current macroeconomic situation. We expect him to reiterate his theme that world growth remains low and that so far there are few signs of recovery, although in the U.S. some indicators are starting to point towards recovery. He continues to believe that the major industrial countries should pursue growth-oriented policies; the recent discount rate drop in Japan suggests Japan agrees. Publicly, however, the G-7 continue to stress price stability as a primary goal.

At the Summit, your colleagues will express little interest in this issue, believing that the world economy is doing relatively well. They are reluctant to stimulate their economies for fear of igniting inflation. Pressing them to stimulate growth will not prove useful, even if lowering interest rates is not mentioned, and could lead to charges

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that the large U.S. budget deficits help sustain high interest rates and deter growth.

Debt Forgiveness: Toronto/Trinidad Terms

In the past year, we have taken the lead in convincing the G-7 and other Western creditor governments to reduce the official debt of Poland and Egypt. Our strong lobbying has generated much resentment among the G-7 (particularly Japan), although we have stressed that these two cases are not a precedent.

Now, Prime Minister Major wants us to broaden debt relief beyond that agreed to at the 1988 Toronto Summit to include debt reduction for the poorest countries, primarily in Africa. He wrote you two weeks ago on this matter to promote his concept of "Trinidad Terms," a more generous form of debt relief than the Toronto standards.

Our ability to forgive LDC debt is limited by the credit reform aspects of the 1990 budget agreement, under which some official debt reduction has a budgetary impact, depending on the estimated payments from a particular country that were included in the budget submission to Congress.

State and Treasury believe strongly that we must respond positively to Major in the face of what surely will be strong European pressure to grant this broader debt relief, in light of the G-7 cooperation in our historic debt reduction efforts with Poland and Egypt. OMB cites the budgetary costs and warns State and Treasury that their foreign programs will have to bear the cost.

Trade

Our cautious expectation coming out of the Houston Summit that the Uruguay Round was on the way to success was dashed by the inability of the EC and Japanese to move on agriculture last December in Brussels. The elusive agreement on agriculture remains the glue which will hold together the entire package, including services, investment, and intellectual property.

While all your senior economic advisers believe the Round should remain your top trade priority, and must be actively pursued at senior political levels, views differ on our ability to achieve our current Round objectives. However, all agree there is little room for substantive compromise.

The London discussion of trade will not attain the intensity of that at Houston. Frankly, the other leaders have little interest in raising the issue, largely because they have not done much since Houston. You are in a much better position: we have lowered our initial demands on the extent of agricultural reform and Congress has extended fast track

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authority. You can be straightforward with your colleagues, reminding them you spent considerable domestic political capital to secure approval of fast track. However, it would be preferable to avoid committing to a deadline for conclusion of the Round. No deal is better than a bad deal. The worst outcome would be for our trade negotiators to bring home a package you could not get through Congress.

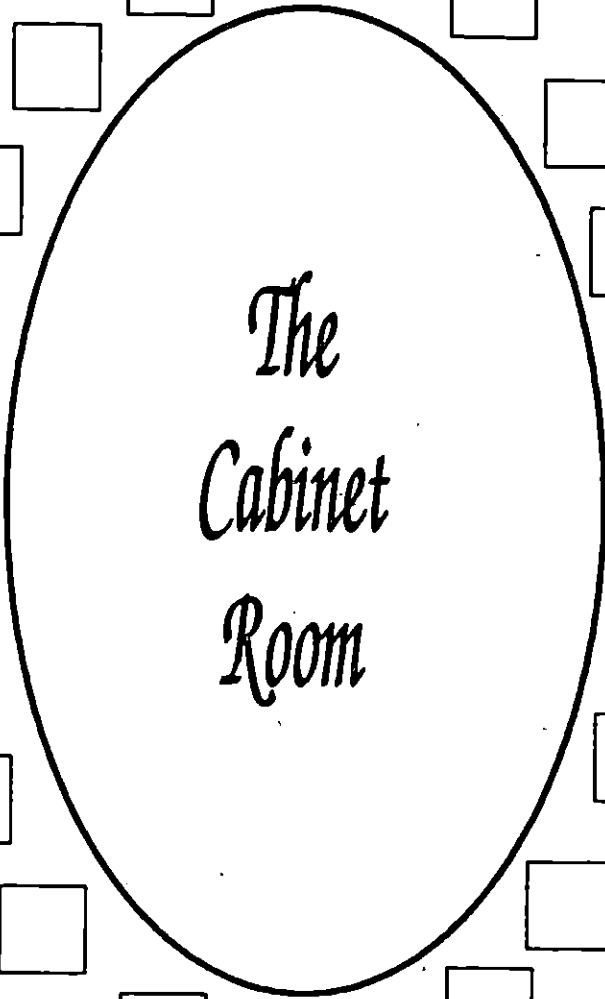

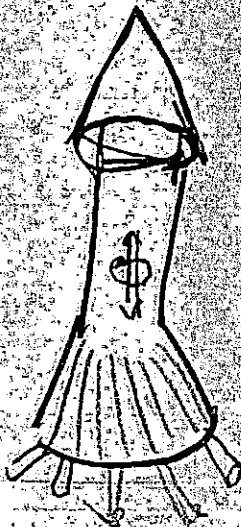

SOME ALSO SEEM RELUCTANT TO SPEND MONEY PROTECTING AMERICANS FROM ACCIDENTAL -- OR INTENTIONAL -- BALLISTIC MISSILE ATTACKS. WE HAVE ASKED CONGRESS TO SUPPORT THE G-PALS SYSTEM -- THAT'S GLOBAL PROTECTION AGAINST LIMITED STRIKES. ANYONE WHO THINKS WE WILL FACE THREATS NO MORE SEVERE THAN THE SCUD MISSILE ARE DELUDING THEMSELVES. IF WE WANT TO PROTECT OURSELVES AND DETER AGGRESSION, WE HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO DEVELOP DEFENSE TECHNOLOGIES, SUCH AS BRILLIANT PEBBLES, THAT LIE WITHIN OUR REACH. THIS INCLUDES G-PALS. //

AS WE PREPARE FOR THE FUTURE, WE ALSO MUST ASK WHAT KIND OF MILITARY FORCE STRUCTURE WE NEED. OUR GULF EXPERIENCE REINFORCED THE VALUABLE ROLE RESERVES CAN PLAY. IT ALSO SHOWED THAT WE DON'T NEED THE KIND OF RESERVE COMPONENT THE HOUSE INSISTS WE KEEP. THE HOUSE DEFENSE BILLS WOULD SPEND NEARLY 12 BILLION DOLLARS OVER THE NEXT FIVE YEARS ON UNNEEDED RESERVE POSITIONS AND OPERATIONS. THIS MONEY WOULD COME AT THE EXPENSE OF PROGRAMS THAT ALL OUR FORCES -- ACTIVE AND RESERVE -- WILL NEED.

WE LEARNED MANY THINGS IN THE GULF -- A NUMBER OF WHICH WERE ANTICIPATED IN THE DEFENSE SPEECH I GAVE LAST AUGUST 2ND -- IRONICALLY, THE DAY SADDAM INVADED KUWAIT.

WE LEARNED THAT NATIONS OF THE WORLD CAN AND WILL ACT COLLECTIVELY TO DEAL WITH AGGRESSION. THEY WILL TRY DIPLOMACY FIRST, AND USE MILITARY ACTION ONLY AS A LAST RESORT.

WE LEARNED THAT THE UNITED STATES ALONE CAN MOBILIZE THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY AND LEAD IT THROUGH SUCH EFFORTS. THAT LEADERSHIP WAS NOT JUST COINCIDENCE, OR NICE TO HAVE -- IT WAS A PREREQUISITE FOR OUR COLLECTIVE SUCCESS.

WE LEARNED THAT HIGH-TECH WEAPONS ARE NOT PRICEY "TOYS," AS CRITICS HAVE CLAIMED FOR YEARS. THEY MINIMIZE CIVILIAN CASUALTIES, MAXIMIZE DAMAGE TO MILITARY TARGETS, SHORTEN WARS AND SAVE LIVES -- AMERICAN LIVES, COALITION LIVES, AND EVEN ENEMY LIVES. WE MUST NEVER FORGET ANY LIFE UNNECESSARILY LOST IS A TRAGEDY -- ESPECIALLY IN TIMES OF WAR.

IT WOULD BE A SHAME IF, SO SOON AFTER THE WAR, WE DISREGARDED THESE LESSONS. // AND IT WOULD BE A TRAVESTY TO WASTE MONEY ON DEFENSES THAT WOULD NOT HAVE HELPED US IN THE GULF, AND WON'T HELP US MEET OUR FUTURE CHALLENGES. //

AS THE SENATE BEGINS ITS DELIBERATIONS, I URGE IT TO PASS A BUDGET THAT DEFENDS PEOPLE, NOT PORK; // THAT ENABLES US TO FIGHT THE NEXT WAR, NOT THE LAST ONE; // THAT PROMOTES NATIONAL SECURITY, PERIOD. LET ME TELL YOU NOW -- IF THE CONGRESS SENDS ME A DEFENSE BILL THAT IS INADEQUATE, THAT FAILS TO FUND NEEDED PROGRAMS AND WASTES MONEY AT THE EXPENSE OF DEFENSE MUSCLE, I WILL VETO IT.//

OUR ADMINISTRATION HAS TRIED TO RESTORE PROPORTION TO FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AND USE THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENCY TO MAKE DECISIONS THAT MIGHT SEEM TOO PAINFUL FOR REPRESENTATIVES OR SENATORS. I'VE SERVED IN CONGRESS AND I KNOW THE GENUINE PRESSURE ON THE MEMBERS OF CONGRESS TO ADVANCE THE INTERESTS OF THE HOME DISTRICT.

THIRTY YEARS AGO, IN HIS VALEDICTORY ADDRESS TO THE NATION, DWIGHT EISENHOWER EMPHASIZED SEVERAL THEMES THAT REMAIN IMPORTANT TODAY. "A VITAL ELEMENT IN KEEPING THE PEACE IS OUR MILITARY ESTABLISHMENT," HE SAID. "OUR ARMS MUST BE MIGHTY, READY FOR INSTANT ACTION, SO THAT NO POTENTIAL AGGRESSOR MAY BE TEMPTED TO RISK HIS OWN DESTRUCTION."

YET, IKE ALSO CAUTIONED THAT OUR EFFORTS MUST SERVE NATIONAL INTERESTS AND NATIONAL NEEDS -- NOT THE NARROW CONCERNS OF SPECIFIC INDUSTRIES OR INTEREST GROUPS.

A NEW WORLD ORDER DEMANDS A NEW SET OF DEFENSE PRIORITIES. TOGETHER, WE CAN PUT THOSE PRIORITIES INTO ACTION. // AS ATTENTION TURNS TOWARD THE SENATE, I ASK YOUR HELP IN CREATING A MILITARY STRONG ENOUGH TO PROTECT OUR INTERESTS BUT LEAN ENOUGH TO PRESERVE PUBLIC FAITH IN GOVERNMENT. //

THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONTINUED EFFORTS TO KEEP
AMERICA SAFE AND STRONG. THANK YOU FOR LETTING ME JOIN
YOU TODAY -- AND MAY GOD BLESS THE UNITED STATES OF
AMERICA.

MITCHELL: RACE WAS NOMINATION FACTOR Thomas Choice Inconsistent With Bush Quota Stand, Democrat Suggests

Sen. Mitchell charged Monday that President Bush's nomination of Thomas to succeed Marshall...shows that Bush is "against quotas for every position except the Supreme Court and for everyone except himself."...

"Mr. Thomas may well be qualified, and I may well vote for him," Mitchell said. "But I think it's manifest on its face that (race) was a criterion, a factor, in the nomination."...

Asked about Mitchell's charge, Sen. Dole said, "I think it's totally wrong."... "If the President sent up a black, liberal, activist nominee, you wouldn't hear Sen. Mitchell or other Democrats saying anything about quotas," he said....

Bush Monday used a Rose Garden ceremony on improving the nation's education system to plug the Thomas nomination. Thomas "offers what I think is a very stirring testament to what people can do when they refuse to take no for an answer, when through sheer determination they overcome obstacles that others have placed in their way," the President said.

...Dole called Thomas an "outstanding nominee," but said his limited judicial experience -- 15 months on the federal bench -- could make some senators uneasy.

"Certainly they're going to go after experience," Dole predicted, but said Thomas has a "lifetime of experience, so to speak."...

Mitchell also dismissed any suggestions, as proposed and then retracted by Governor Wilder, that Thomas's Catholic religion provided a proper line of questioning.

"Religion has nothing to do with it," Mitchell said. "I'm Catholic and I consider myself pro-choice. I don't think it's relevant."

Dole said Thomas should not answer specific questions on abortion during confirmation hearings.

"My advice would be to stay out of it," said Dole.

Mitchell refused to say if Thomas should be required to state his view on abortion prior to a confirmation vote....

Dole said skin color likely was "one of the factors" that went into the nomination.

In a brief Senate speech, Sen. Hatch...sharply criticized special interest groups that want to "impose litmus tests" on nominees to the federal court.

NAACP DEFERS DECISION ON THOMAS
Group's Board Seeks Meeting With Nominee Before Taking Position

HOUSTON -- The NAACP delayed a decision Monday on whether to endorse or oppose Judge Thomas's nomination to the Supreme Court, as delegates at the national convention here heard one high-ranking black official in the Bush Administration praise Thomas and another question his judgment.

Both Secretary Sullivan and Chairman of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights Arthur Fletcher, said they had not been dispatched by the White House to represent the view of black Republicans.

Fletcher, however, said in a speech that when he phoned White House officials from here and asked them to fax him some background information on Thomas, he was asked, "'Art, what can you do for him?'"... Fletcher said he was "deeply concerned" about Thomas's views on affirmative action and that the nominee needed to "explain himself."...

[Secretary Sullivan] told NAACP members that they had reached "an important point in our nation where diversity in the black community will invigorate us."...

While the NAACP was divided about the Thomas nomination, delegates to the League of United Latin American Citizens urged the Senate to reject it, as did U.S. civil rights commissioner Mary Frances Berry. She criticized Thomas's tenure as chairman of the EEOC and said his nomination "is insulting to those who marched, went to jail and died in the civil rights movement so that he and other Afro-Americans might become achievers in a different America."...

Sullivan said he has spoken with Thomas recently and that the nominee feels he is being unfairly judged by his critics. "I think his feeling is that his full record has not been looked at and not been appreciated and that people have rushed to judgment before they have examined his full record," said Sullivan....

Sullivan also said that in his discussion with Thomas, the nominee did not criticize the Brown v. Board of Education decision....

"In no way does he denigrate that achievement," said Sullivan. "He indicated that he felt that there were other legal arguments that could even strengthen" the decision....

He [Fletcher] was particularly concerned about Thomas's views on affirmative action and the Brown decision....

"Somewhere between now and that (confirmation) vote he's got to explain himself," Fletcher said.

NAACP Postpones Decision On Thomas Nomination

...Secretary Sullivan said he thinks Thomas is "committed to fairness, justice and to equal opportunity for all Americans, including our minority citizens.... I vouch for Judge Thomas....

"I [Sullivan] know what it's like to be black in the Republican party. I know what it's like struggling with the right-wing elements who will do their best to make sure you're not effective," he said.

Sullivan said black Republicans are automatically suspect for their views and "begin under a cloud of suspicion." He said he thinks the press has distorted Thomas's views and said he thinks the NAACP will give him a fair evaluation.

Thomas Refuses To Say If He'll Meet With NAACP

HOUSTON -- Officials of the NAACP said Monday they are "unfavorably impressed" with the record of Clarence Thomas and requested a meeting with him to clarify his position on vital civil rights issues....

"We are seeking to put together a comprehensive set of questions to determine where he stands on civil rights issues," [executive director of the NAACP] Hooks said. "He has a mixed record.... His paper trail leaves some ambiguity. Personally, I have made no decision at all about what my recommendation to the board will be....

Thomas...refused to say if he would meet with the NAACP.

"It's best that I refrain from responding to questions until the confirmation hearing," Thomas said, when asked if he would meet with the group....

"At the outset, we knew there was much in Judge Clarence Thomas's history, especially during his tenure as chairman of the EEOC, to give us pause," said a joint statement from Hooks and chairman of the NAACP board of directors Gibson.

"His record at the commission was not a good one in terms of his sensitivity toward affirmative action and racial and age discrimination. Without a shadow of a doubt, our assessment of Mr. Thomas and his philosophy was not favorable. The fact is, we are so unfavorably impressed with his known record that we are forced to take a further look."

PANEL SEEKS INCENTIVES TO CUT HOUSING RED TAPE

A Presidential commission unanimously agreed Monday the federal government should punish and reward cities to slash a web of policies and red tape that keep poor people out of safe housing.

"Zoning, building codes and fees, red tape, regulations, wetlands and environmental legislation, all these things have grown up topsy-turvy into a Franz Kafka-esque-like regulatory burden that is punishing to low-income people," Secretary Kemp said after delivering the report President Bush.

"If we want to have affordable housing for all, and that's certainly our objective and goal, we've got to confront this problem of regulation and excessive red tape, the bureaucracy at times interfering," Bush said....

"I think the Bush Administration has both the moral and the political obligation to take the lead in making housing both affordable as well as available to low- and moderate-income people and first-time home buyers, he [Kemp] said.

President Bush Monday announced the leaders of a private, tax-exempt corporation whose task is to set up model schools to inspire change in American education.

[Former New Jersey Governor Kean, who will be chairman of the New American Schools Development Corporation]..., said the teams will design schools that "communities can afford," possibly even lowering existing education costs by using new technology....

Officials with education groups are welcoming the involvement of big businesses in the research effort but are questioning whether that means the Bush Administration intends to abandon other federal research efforts.

Gordon Ambach, executive director of the Council of Chief State School Officers, said that "it is not sound" to expect education research to be assigned solely to the private sector any more than health research.

But John Chubb, a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, said, "If there was no independent source of funding it would basically be Congress saying, 'No.'"

Bruce Hunter, associate executive director of the American Association of School Administrators, said the corporation offers a new way for business and schools to cooperate, but he is skeptical it can raise the \$200 million, or can really find new ways to educate students.

PEACE AGREEMENT BREAKS DOWN AMID ACCUSATIONS AGAINST SLOVENIA

Less than 24 hours after reaching agreement with Slovenia for negotiations on the secession crisis, members of the federal presidency charged early Tuesday that Slovenia was violating the accord....

The federal presidency, minus its Slovenian and Croatian representatives, said Slovenia had failed to lift a blockade of some federal army units, was holding police prisoners, and had not deactivated its territorial defense units....

Despite the agreement, Slovenia on Monday had ordered its legislators to immediately vacate their seats in the federal parliament. It also boycotted the presidency meeting called Monday to confirm the Brioni agreement.

Croatia...also appeared to be disregarding the agreement when it sent a letter to the federal Parliament urging the body to "work so the dissociation process may unfold in a peaceful and democratic way."

SLOVENES BUY EC PLEDGES WITH ACCORD

LJUBLJANA -- Leaders of the breakaway republic of Slovenia said Monday that they chose to put their independence bid on hold in weekend peace talks as the price of involving the EC in their quest for international recognition.

In EC-brokered negotiations on the Adriatic island of Brioni, Slovenia dropped its insistence that it alone should control its borders and agreed to share custody of customs receipts with the Yugoslav government and allow the federal army to patrol its international frontier for a period of three months.

Slovenian leaders promised further to begin comprehensive discussions with the Yugoslav central government on the political future of the...six-republic federation. They also pledged to deactivate the republic's militia and lift all roadblocks used in their defense effort against the Yugoslav army....

Slovenian President Kucan...acknowledged that Slovenia had settled for an accord in the Brioni talks that was "not ideal." But he insisted that it was the best this Alpine republic...could hope for if it hopes to win a measure of West European protection from the Yugoslav army and if Slovenia is to have any chance of being recognized abroad as a sovereign state.

"Iraq...at last admits it has engaged in a nuclear weapons program," White House Press Secretary Fitzwater said in Washington. Both Fitzwater and State Department spokesman Tutwiler said the Iraqi disclosures underscore the need for continued comprehensive inspections, as well as spot checks, by U.N. and IAEA teams.

However, non-American sources here were more cautious. They said that while the activities that Iraq acknowledges engaging in could produce nuclear weapons, the letter from Iraqi Foreign Minister Ahmed Hussein did not admit to a weapons program but instead contended that Iraq's nuclear program is devoted to peaceful purposes.

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BUSH EXPECTED TO LIFT SOUTH AFRICA SANCTIONS

President Bush is expected to announce this week that he is lifting all U.S. economic sanctions against South Africa, Administration officials said Monday.

According to a senior official, Secretary Baker has completed an internal government review of the situation of political prisoners in South Africa....Baker has reported to Bush that the white-minority government in Pretoria is in the process of releasing all political prisoners, the official said.

The State Department concluded that recent moves taken by the South African government, including a process announced last week to handle remaining prisoners, meet the requirements of suspension of lifting of the economic sanctions by the President....

It was unclear Monday night whether Bush would announce the total lifting of sanctions or a suspension while the release of political prisoners continues. Administration officials said the President has the power to do either while certifying to Congress the legal conditions have been met.

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CHINA SIGNALS CHANGE IN HUMAN-RIGHTS APPROACH

BEIJING -- Chinese authorities appear to be moving toward a dialogue with other nations on human-rights issues after years of denouncing the West for criticizing Beijing's policies on political dissent.

As part of the apparent opening to Western concerns, a senior Justice Ministry official today gave a rare interview to two American journalists, providing new details about China's massive penal system and political prisoners, including the country's most famous dissident, Wei Jingsheng.

"There has been a change in the way they present human rights to foreign countries because they realize the tack they are using is not working," said one Western diplomat....

Some diplomats say the change in approach is cosmetic, time to influence the current debate in the U.S. Congress about renewal of China's MFN trade status.... Beijing's main motivation, they say, is to gather more information about human-rights problems in the West to wage a stronger counterattack.

But other analysts point to evidence that suggests the Chinese made the decision to change their approach long before their trade status became an emotionally charged issue this spring....

"Their reputation is so black in the U.S. on human rights, they know they're not going to fool anyone on either side by sending delegations that will let them finesse the human-rights question," said a western analyst. (Lena Sun, Washington Post, A12)

MULFORD: MOST-FAVORED STATUS WITH CHINA NOT LINKED TO TRADE

The Bush Administration will not make an extension of MFN status to China contingent upon an improvement in the nation's external trade and payments policies, Treasury Undersecretary David Mulford said Monday....

THOMAS NOMINATION

ABC's Carole Simpson: A possible sign of trouble ahead for the nomination of Clarence Thomas to the Supreme Court. Top officials of the nation's oldest and largest civil rights organization, the NAACP, say they are unfavorably impressed by Judge Thomas' record. But they want a face-to-face meeting before deciding whether to oppose his nomination.

ABC's Charles Thomas: The Administration's only black Cabinet member, Secretary Sullivan, tried to assure the NAACP delegates that Thomas is a friend of the civil rights movement.

(Sullivan: "He is committed to equal opportunity, to fairness and to justice for all. He is in contact with his roots.")

(TV coverage: President announcing nomination.)

But the fact that Thomas grew up black and poor in the segregated South has not convinced the NAACP leadership.

(Benjamin Hooks: "The question is, what did the suffering teach him? It don't teach some of us anything, and we want to find out whether it taught him anything.")

They wanted to find out in a face-to-face interview about Thomas' term during the Reagan Administration as chairman of the EOEP, and his opposition to affirmative action. Today, during a visit with influential senators on Capitol Hill, Thomas indicated he would not meet with the NAACP.

(Thomas: "I think it's best that I refrain from responding to questions until the hearing.")

Most convention delegates we spoke to said they would need more information about Thomas.

(Unidentified delegate: "If I had to make a decision now? No.")

(Unidentified delegate: "It doesn't matter if the person is black. What the principal thing here is what he is thinking.")

The NAACP says it will not make a decision on Thomas until mid-August, when its review of the nominee's record is complete.

(ABC-2)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: It will be at once a delicate and yet a bruising political battle: the nomination of Clarence Thomas as a member of the U.S. Supreme Court. President Bush today formally submitted the nomination of the black conservative to the Senate, and Thomas immediately followed up with a personal sales pitch.

NBC's Andrea Mitchell: The White House may have successfully divided the liberal coalition that defeated conservative Robert Bork's nomination to the Supreme Court four years ago. Like Bork, Thomas is controversial. But he grew up poor, black and Southern, a difficult target for Southern senators or black civil rights organizations. The White House strategy is to play up Thomas' personal story.

Mitchell continues:

(President Bush: "He outdistanced poverty and racism because he possessed the greatest treasures of all: the love of family, the faith of teachers -- remember what he said about teachers.")

Paying courtesy calls at the Capitol, Thomas tried to mend fences with more liberal blacks by retracting earlier criticism of Justice Marshall.

(Thomas: "I think very highly of someone who's done so much to make it possible for me to be where I am today.")

A divided NAACP could not agree on whether to endorse or oppose Thomas, so took no position.

(Hooks: "The only reason that there are some people who support him is because they get the feeling that being a brother, he couldn't be that wild.")

Hooks said he wanted to meet with Thomas. The judge made no promises.

(Thomas: "I think it's best that I refrain from responding to questions at this time.")

Reporter: "Sen. Dole, do you think he should meet with Benjamin Hooks?"

Dole: "I'll meet with Benjamin Hooks.")

Despite their smiles, Thomas' meeting with the Democratic leader was awkward. George Mitchell told him his nomination proved that the President did believe in quotas after all.

(Mitchell: "But it is now obvious that he's against quotas for everyone but himself and all positions but the Supreme Court.")

The major opposition to Thomas so far has come from women's groups.

(Patricia Ireland, NOW: "This nomination must not pass.")

Abortion rights organizations believe Thomas tipped his hand on the issue when he endorsed a speech condemning the Supreme Court's decision legalizing abortion.

(Ireland: "Clarence Thomas is an insult to the life and legacy of Thurgood Marshall and everything he stood and worked for.")

Although Thomas has written about abortion, he has told the White House he has no position on the issue. That could be because Republican senators have told him the best strategy on abortion is silence.

(NBC-Lead)

CBS's Dan Rather: There are indications tonight of a nasty confirmation fight ahead for President Bush's Supreme Court nominee. Clarence Thomas today began calling on senators, who have the final say on his appointment to the court. Some are already expressing doubts out loud.

NBC's Bob Schieffer: Thomas had hardly set foot in the Capitol for courtesy calls on key senators when it became clear this will be a bruising confirmation fight. Thomas himself said what nominees always say -- nothing.

(Thomas: "I think it's best that I refrain from responding to questions until the hearing.")

The Democrats' leader, George Mitchell, took the first swipe, and it was a hard one.

(Mitchell: "President Bush has made many speeches saying that he is against quotas, but it is now obvious that he's against quotas for everyone but himself and all positions but the Supreme Court.") But the Republican leader, Bob Dole, said Mitchell was dead wrong.

Schliefer continues:

(Dole: "I would say that if we sent up a black liberal activist nominee, you wouldn't hear Sen. Mitchell or any of the liberal Democrats saying anything about quotas.")

With that, the battle was joined, Republicans already saying Democrats will try to paint a false picture of Thomas.

(Sen. Hatch: "They're going to try to paint him as a person who really is against affirmative action, when in fact what he's against is reverse discrimination.")

And forget predictions that hardcore liberals will go easy because of Thomas' humble beginnings.

(Sen. Metzenbaum: "It won't be difficult for this white liberal to be against him if I think he's going to deny women their rights, if I think he's going to deny senior citizens their rights, and yes, deny minorities, blacks, their rights as well.")

Whatever Thomas himself intends to say on all of those subjects won't be known of course until after Labor Day, when the actual confirmation hearings begin. The only question he would answer today was, he was asked: How does it feel to be in the limelight? He said: Very uncomfortable.

Rather discusses the issue with Schliefer:

Rather: What's the problem on civil rights and age discrimination?

Schliefer: It is not so much any opinions he has written since he's been on the federal appeals court. It is the time he served on the EOEC. Many senior citizens said he was slow to act on age-discrimination suits. Many of the civil rights groups said that he acted as if he were against affirmative action. So there is where the questions on those issues will be raised.

Rather: Likely or unlikely that he will express his views about abortion?

Schliefer: He's certainly going to be asked about it. The outlook now is that he will not say, but Sen. Metzenbaum said today he is going to press on every front he can. I think you'll even see some Republicans pressing on the question of abortion. He has written very little about that, but because he has taken such conservative views on so many issues, I think a lot of liberals think that he would not favor abortion.

Rather: Isn't it or is it the betting that he will actually get confirmed?

Schliefer: I think at this point the betting is that he's going to be confirmed, but it's going to be very, very rough. And when Sen. Mitchell in the opening shot accuses the President of filling a quota by appointing Mr. Thomas, that shows you just how rough it's going to be. I'll tell you something else: This is not going to sit well with George Bush. I base that not on having talked to the President, obviously, but just knowing Mr. Bush and how he feels about things. He's not going to like this at all and I think it's really going to rev it up and make it an even tougher fight.

Rather: President Bush's spokesman is playing down any concern over the NAACP's lack of a quick endorsement today for Thomas. Leaders of the civil rights group say they need to know more about Thomas before deciding.

CBS's Scott Pelley: Today, the national convention of the NAACP is preoccupied with a crisis of conscience over the nomination.

(William Gibson, NAACP chairman: "The fact is we are so unfavorably impressed with his known record that we are forced to take a further look.")

Looking for something that will balance Judge Thomas' strident stand against affirmative action, anything that suggests he will not abandon the views of Justice Marshall.

(TV coverage: President announcing nomination.)

(Hooks: "We ought to have another African American appointed to this position. That African American must at least adhere to some of the principles for which Justice Marshall stood.")

And that was the assurance the Bush Administration sought to bring to the convention today.

(Sullivan: "He certainly shares the views of Justice Marshall and the rest of the black community in believing in equal opportunity and fairness for all.")

(Reporter: "Can a nominee who opposes affirmative action win the support of your organization?"

Gibson: "Very difficult.")

As the oldest and largest civil rights organization in the U.S., the NAACP could sway votes in the Thomas confirmation, especially among Southern Democrats. In 1990, when Thomas was nominated to the district court of appeals, the NAACP was neutral. Today, black leaders say they are withholding judgment despite phone calls from the White House seeking support.

(Arthur Fletcher, U.S. Commission on Civil Rights: "We all look alike, but we don't think alike.")

The NAACP is calling for a meeting with Judge Thomas. There has been a favorable response, but no meeting date has been set. Leaders of the rights organization say it will probably be the end of the month before they decide to endorse or oppose the nomination.

(CBS-2)

HOUSING

Brokaw: The President embraced a plan to make more affordable housing available to low- and middle-income families. A number of prominent conservatives looked at the problem, and their recommendations surprised many.

NBC's John Cochran: This housing report is a switch for a conservative Administration which usually advocates less federal control and more local control over local problems. But not this time. President Bush gave his blessing to the report, which blames local bureaucracies for creating barriers to inexpensive housing.

(TV coverage: President with Secretary Kemp.)

Called "Not In My Back Yard," the report says zoning and other local ordinances prevent many Americans from owning homes. The proposed cure: Deny federal funds to states and towns with unnecessary housing codes. The President agrees: Washington should crack down.

(President Bush: "We've got to confront this problem of regulation and excessive red tape, the bureaucracy in times interfering, and these are obstacles that make it difficult to construct housing for low-income families.")

Cochran continues:

A court ruled that in Brookhaven, New York, zoning ordinances illegally prevented low-income housing in some neighborhoods, but not on this property. That ruling satisfied no one and the case is now under appeal. The White House hopes to solve many such cases simply by withholding federal aid. Bad idea, says this housing expert.

(Prof. Dan Mandelker, George Washington University: "The uncooperative localities that are stopping affordable housing just won't take any federal funds. They don't need them. So it's just not going to work at all.")

But the Bush Administration believes money is so tight that local officials will think twice before giving up federal funds. If Congress agrees to new laws putting pressure on states and towns, the biggest beneficiaries may be minorities. Blacks in particular are disproportionately poor and in need of housing.

(Secretary Kemp: "I think a lot of people really do believe that this is chapter 2 in a new civil rights chapter in American history.")

President Bush may seem to be taking an unusually liberal stand. But wait. There's something in this for conservatives, too. It won't cost the federal government a dime. (ABC-4, NBC-2)

Brokaw discusses the issue with Secretary Kemp:

Brokaw: Don't you have to be very cautious in how you approach this? After all, it could only lead -- couldn't it -- to more racial polarization in this country when we already have much more than we need.

Kemp: I think John Cochran put it best when he said that, won't this help low-income people? And frankly, I don't think the American people who recognize -- as the Census Bureau pointed out last week -- that only 60 percent of the American people can now afford to own a median-priced home. I think the American people, whether they're low- or moderate- or upper-income, realize that the American dream is a vanishing American species. And we've got to do everything we can at all levels of government to work in cooperation to help make it a reality. If not so much today, at least for the young people and as an anti-poverty campaign in this country. (NBC-3)

CBS's Richard Roth reports on the study.

(Gov. Kean: "To me, the most shocking finding was that we have really between 20 and 30 percent of the cost of housing in many areas of the country is because of these regulatory barriers.") Experts point out labor, materials and financing remain the big factors pushing up housing prices. (CBS-6)

SOVIETS/ARMS TALKS

Simpson reports President Gorbachev has agreed to President Bush's request to speed up arms-control talks. He's sending his Foreign Minister and other negotiators to Washington Wednesday night. The White House said today it would like a summit at the end of July, but wants an arms-control agreement first. (CBS-3, ABC-8)

NBC's John Dancy reports the Bush Administration is playing an expectation game with the START treaty, putting the pressure on the Soviets to get it done in time for a summit. This new meeting is to turn up the temperature.

(President Bush: "So it's a good thing that they're coming and the time, there's plenty of time to get this done so we can have a meeting at the end of July. But whether these last difficulties can be ironed out, we just don't know.")

Former arms-control negotiator Jack Mendelson [phonetic] says Gorbachev needs the treaty.

(Mendelson: "Gorbachev really needs this as a sort of a key to unlocking more goodwill and economic support from the West. Therefore, we've got an opportunity to hold him up by the ankles and really shake the change out of his pocket.")

(TV coverage: President with Gorbachev.)

State Department officials say it is likely that Baker and the Soviet Foreign Minister will not quite finish the treaty this week. That honor may be left to Bush and Gorbachev when they meet next week in London.

(NBC-4)

GORBACHEV/G-7 SUMMIT

Rather reports when Gorbachev meets with Western leaders next week, he'll be going with the full support of Boris Yeltsin and leaders of nine other Soviet republics. They all met in Moscow today and endorsed Gorbachev's strategy of seeking money and other economic aid from the West.

(CBS-12)

IRAQ/NUCLEAR

Simpson reports Iraq admitted for the first time that it has been trying to make a large amount of enriched uranium. The information comes in a new 29-page list of Iraq's nuclear materials sent by Saddam Hussein to the UN. UN inspectors are back in Iraq, but no word on whether they are seeing everything.

(NBC-6, ABC-6)

CBS's Bill Plante reports Iraq claimed its nuclear research program is only for peaceful purposes. The U.S. says that's nonsense.

(Spokeswoman Tutwiler: "Saddam Hussein's government admits Iraq was engaged in a nuclear weapons program, contrary to previous repeated denials of the Iraqi government")

The Administration heaped scorn on the Iraqi letter, indicating it doesn't believe they've listed everything.

(Tutwiler: "Obviously, this regime does not have a lot of credibility with us and we will not be satisfied until we have had an opportunity to see everything that we want to see and that we believe is fair.")

Rather discusses the issue with Plante:

Rather: What does President Bush think Saddam is up to and is bombing a real option?

Plante: The Administration thinks that Saddam is just trying to get the UN off his back. An Administration source says that when the Iraqis delivered the list, they actually said with a straight face to the UN: Now that we've declared everything, you can stop looking. And yes, I think bombing remains a real option, not only to get the nuclear installations, but also, urged by some in this Administration, to get Saddam.

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YUGOSLAVIA

Simpson reports a cease-fire agreement has been signed and apparently holding in Slovenia. There will be negotiations over Slovenia's demand for independence. But in Croatia, the danger of ethnic violence continues. (NBC-5, ABC-9)

Rather reports Slovenia agreed to release all federal prisoners and suspend its independence drive. This tentative agreement let Slovenia keep control of its borders and negotiate terms for a peaceful break from Yugoslavia. (CBS-13)

SOUTH AFRICA

Simpson reports South Africa begins this week with what appears to be a new momentum for change. Over the weekend, the ANC committed itself to negotiations with the white government over sharing power. And the government released 19 of the most controversial black political prisoners. (ABC-10)

MARINES/GULF WAR

ABC's Bob Zelnick reports the Pentagon's report to Congress assessing the military's performance during the Gulf War criticizes the Marines. The Marines had no planes to provide intelligence on enemy movements because the F-4 Phantom has not been replaced. The Harrier jet was not equipped to operate well at night or in cloudy weather; worse yet, the Harrier was extremely vulnerable to heat-seeking missiles. There also were equipment shortages. Steps are being taken to remedy the situation. Many Marine officers acknowledge their problems in the Gulf could have been far more costly had the Iraqis proven tougher. (ABC-7)

NAVY/ACCIDENT

Rather reports the Navy had to shoot one of its own planes today over the Mediterranean. A carrier-based Hawkeye, an early-warning plane, caught fire while supporting allied relief efforts for the Kurds in northern Iraq. The crew bailed out 40 miles from Cyprus, but the plane kept going. An attack plane shot the aircraft down for what the Navy called safety reasons. (CBS-5)

ARMY/PANAMA

Rather reports the Army announced today an American serviceman stationed in Panama was killed over the weekend in a drive-by shooting. It happened at the end of what Panamanian officials had declared as "Friendship Week," celebrating ties between the U.S. and Panama. (CBS-8)

CITIES

Rather reports a study from the National League of Cities says American cities are stretched thinner than ever financially with declining federal help. In the past year, 80 percent of our cities had to raise taxes. For many cities, this year looks even worse. (CBS-7)

HEALTH FRAUD

Simpson: We begin tonight with the largest case of medical insurance fraud in U.S. history. In Los Angeles, law-enforcement authorities have unsealed 12 indictments and started arresting suspects. The charge is that they devised a scheme to bill insurance companies and the federal government for expensive medical tests that either weren't needed or were never done. The scam resulted in more than a billion dollars in phony claims.

ABC's John Martin reports the indictments charge customers were lured to clinics with promises of free medical exams. After the patients left, the clinics made up symptoms and diagnoses on the insurance forms to justify billing insurance companies for the unnecessary and expensive tests. A task force of state and federal investigators identified more than 900 of these phony clinics across the U.S., more than half allegedly run by two Russian immigrants, David and Michael Schmushkovich [phonetic]. The biggest victim of all may have been the American taxpayer. The clinics attracted many military dependents insured by the government. (ABC-Lead)

LUXURY TAX/AUTO SALES

NBC's Debra Roberts reports the luxury tax is causing hardships for dealers of high-priced cars. Rolls Royce has been hit so hard that it's offering to pay the tax on the basic model. (NBC-11)

AT&T/JAPAN

Brokaw reports AT&T announced today it is leasing its entire 35-story skyscraper in New York City to Sony. (NBC-12)

IMMIGRATION/HAITIANS

ABC's Mark Potter reports more than 160 Haitian refugees intercepted off the coast of Florida by the Coast Guard last weekend were detained for asylum hearings. Most are expected to be sent back. Meanwhile, two Cubans on the boat are likely to be granted asylum. Immigration officials say the difference in treatment is based on a 1966 U.S. law that grants Cuban refugees special status. Haitians complain the law is unfair and racist. (ABC-3)

Judge Thomas Brings Values That The Nation Can Live By -- "Instead of viewing Judge Thomas' conservative philosophy in wonderment, we should wonder why traditional civil rights leaders have abandoned it.... Today in Congress

House Floor: Legislation that would make available for commercial use up to 200 additional megahertz of government-held radio frequencies highlights the House agenda today.

Supporters of the bill (HR 531) contend that the radio frequencies are needed to clear the way for new technologies, such as high-definition television and microcell communications.

Two years after enactment of the bill, the Commerce Department would have to identify which bands should be withdrawn from federal use.

The measure does not include language, requested by the Bush administration, that would require that the frequencies be auctioned off.

The legislation leaves it to the Federal Communications Commission to come up with a plan to allocate the frequencies to commercial users.

Striped Bass. Also up for consideration is a bill (HR 2387) to promote the conservation of striped bass.

The measure would renew for three years programs established by the 1984 Atlantic Striped Bass Conservation Act, which allows the federal government to ban bass fishing off the coasts of states that do not follow federal conservation guidelines.

Drift Net Fishing. House members will also take up two measures (H Res 182, H Con Res 113) that call for a moratorium on all large-scale drift net fishing, which critics say causes the unnecessary death of marine life.

Senate Floor: The Senate will resume debate on a crime bill (S 1241) that would increase penalties for violent crimes, widen use of the federal death penalty and institute a five-day waiting period for the purchase of a handgun.

Numerous amendments to the bill remain to be acted on, including one to require establishment of sentencing guidelines for people convicted of child

pornography offenses and another to prohibit the export of assault weapons to major drug-producing countries.

Commerce, State Spending: The Senate Appropriations panel's Commerce, Justice, State and the Judiciary Subcommittee will mark up the spending bill (HR 2608) that provides funds for the Departments of Commerce, Justice and State as well as the federal courts.

As passed by the House on June 13, the \$22 billion bill includes \$9.3 billion for the Justice Department, \$2.7 billion for the Commerce Department and \$3.8 billion for the State Department.

One of the most contentious issues the panel is likely to address is funding for the National Endowment for Democracy, which funnels money to foreign political parties and other overseas institutions to foster democratic reforms. Some members have complained that it favors right-wing groups.

The House stripped the agency's proposed \$26 million funding from the bill after some Democratic members argued that the funding was not authorized and the agency lacked accountability.

Members of the Senate panel may also try to restore funding for the embattled Legal Services Corporation (LSC), which funds local groups that provide legal services for the poor. Although the president requested \$355 million for the agency, the House provided no funding on the grounds that it was not authorized under separate legislation.

The panel is likely once again to debate whether to modify or tear down the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. The House-passed bill provides the administration with \$130 million to spend on the embassy.

Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., the panel's chairman, may seek to eliminate all funding for the embassy or to allow release of the funds only if they are used to tear down the bug-riddled structure. ■

SENATE FLOOR: Crime bill debate flares up over police funds.

Back from a weeklong recess, members yesterday resumed debate on a contentious \$3.3 billion crime bill (S 1241) that aims to strengthen numerous federal and state anti-crime and anti-drug programs.

By a vote of 49-39, members voted to table, or kill, an amendment by Warren B. Rudman, R-N.H., that would have redirected \$2.2 billion in the bill to increase state and local police forces.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., the sponsor of the bill, argued that important programs would suffer by redirecting the funds. The Rudman amendment would have made substantial changes in the bill, eliminating, for example, millions of dollars in grants for anti-terrorism and anti-gang efforts.

July Agenda. As the Senate began what leaders hope will be a productive four-week period before the long August recess, Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, warned his colleagues to plan on working Mondays and Fridays.

Yesterday's vote on the Rudman amendment to the crime bill was the first roll call vote on a Monday this year. The Senate has held only four votes on Fridays.

Mitchell's agenda for July includes: appropriations bills; cable re-regulation legislation (S 12); a family and medical leave bill (S 5); a "motor voter" registration measure (S 250); a defense authorization bill (S 1066); and legislation (S 323) overturning an administration ban on abortion counseling at federally funded clinics.

LAWMAKERS SUE to save Philadelphia shipyard.

Senators from Pennsylvania and New Jersey filed suit in Philadelphia yesterday in an attempt to block the proposed shutdown of the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard.

The lawsuit, filed by the four senators, Pennsylvania Gov. Robert P. Casey, D, and unions representing the shipyard's 9,000 workers, alleges that the Navy and the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission violated federal law governing military base closings in their deliberations on the shipyard.

Specifically, the suit charges that critical memos by two senior Navy officers supporting retention of the shipyard were "deliberately withheld" by the Navy from congressmen, the commission and the General Accounting Office until after public hearings.

The suit also says the Navy instructed Adm. Peter Heckman, head of the Naval Sea Systems Command, not to testify at the commission's public hear-

In a December 1990 memo to the chief of naval operations, Heckman urged the Navy to reconsider its decision to close the shipyard, according to the suit.

"Admiral Heckman's testimony was vital to the base closure commission's deliberations on the shipyard," said Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa. "But the Navy deliberately prevented him from testifying, illegally prejudicing the shipyard's case."

CENSUS SHOULD be adjusted, House subcommittee chairman says.

The 1990 census is hopelessly flawed and should be adjusted, the chairman of the House subcommittee with jurisdiction over the census, Tom Sawyer, said yesterday.

"My belief is that adjustment would substantially improve the quality of the figures and therefore should be done," the Ohio Democrat said in a speech before the Center for National Policy. Saw-

yer chairs the House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee on Census and Population.

In a survey taken after the census, the U.S. Census Bureau found that the nation's population was undercounted by 5.3 million. Commerce Secretary Robert A. Mosbacher has until July 15 to decide whether to adjust the census to incorporate the results of the survey.

Sawyer's support for an adjustment puts him at odds with his Senate counterpart, Herb Kohl, D-Wis., who chairs the Governmental Affairs Subcommittee on Government Information and Regulation. Kohl came out against a census revision in June.

If Mosbacher decides against an adjustment, which is the general expectation, Sawyer said there was little Congress could do. But he added that Mosbacher should expect numerous court challenges if that is his decision.

WILDER SCHEDULES special election to replace Slaughter.

Virginia Gov. L. Douglas Wilder, D,

has scheduled a special election for Nov. 5 to fill the House seat of D. French Slaughter Jr., R-Va., who announced last week that he will resign later this year.

Slaughter, who has represented Virginia's 7th District for four terms, suffered a series of debilitating strokes in June, according to an aide.

His resignation will be effective on Nov. 5, the day of the regularly scheduled general election.

Until he resigns, Slaughter will keep his positions on the Judiciary, Small Business and Science panels.

Correction. In the July 8 issue of the *Monitor*, the story on appropriations bills (p. 3) incorrectly stated that four bills contain language that would liberalize current abortion policy. Only three contain such language — labor, health and human services, and education; District of Columbia; and foreign operations. The provisions are not in the defense appropriations bill (HR 2521), but rather in the defense authorization bill (HR 2100).

Senate Panel To Battle Over Defense Bill

Members of the Senate Armed Services Committee face a number of difficult decisions this week when the panel marks up its version (S 1066) of the fiscal 1992 defense authorization bill. Not only will the committee have to make the annual tough choices on which weapons systems to favor, but members must also decide how large a cut to make in defense personnel, a decrease necessitated by the reduction in total defense spending.

The Pentagon has called for a 9 percent reduction in National Guard and reserve forces in fiscal 1992. But the House, which passed its \$290.8 billion defense authorization bill (HR 2100) on May 22, endorsed only a 3 percent cut in Guard and reserve troops.

The battle over the B-2 stealth bomber continues this year. President Bush asked for \$3.2 billion in fiscal 1992 to buy four more of the bat-winged planes, but the House denied that request, voting to authorize funds only for research and development.

Armed Services Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., has gone all out to shore up weak support within his own committee for the project. Nunn called a series of hearings that focused on the successes of stealth weaponry in the Persian Gulf War. He also led panel members to Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland to see the controversial plane.

But nine members of the Armed Services panel have voted against the B-2 in the past, and Nunn will have his work cut out for him this week as he tries to protect the \$3.2 billion in the bill.

As for the Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI), the action has been somewhat similar to past years. Bush asked for \$4.6 billion for the anti-missile defense program for fiscal 1992, while the House voted to provide \$2.7 billion. House members also voted to completely kill funding for the portion of the program the White House likes most — the space-based interceptors called Brilliant Pebbles. Bush has said that if

funding for SDI is not restored, he will veto the defense bill.

The Senate is now trying to find some middle ground between the House and the president. Two senior Republicans on the Armed Services panel — John W. Warner of Virginia and William S. Cohen of Maine — have come up with a plan aimed at securing bipartisan support for SDI. Their version of the system would rely on ground-based weapons to intercept incoming missiles, leaving the future of Brilliant Pebbles unclear. But Bush appears wedded to the space-based program.

Senators also will have to decide whether to follow the lead of the House and allow women to fly combat missions. The House bill would lift the prohibition in current law against women serving as combat pilots in the Air Force, Navy and Marines. (Women are barred from combat roles in the Army, not by law, but by Army policy, and the bill would not address this.)

At a June 18 hearing before Armed Services' Subcommittee on Manpower and Personnel, the heads of the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines argued against lifting the ban. Some senators seemed supportive of eliminating the restriction, but many said the issue needed further study to determine whether there would be any unintended consequences, such as subjecting women to the draft.

A side issue that could entangle the bill is whether to permit abortions at military hospitals overseas. The House added a provision to HR 2100 that would allow members of the military and their dependents to get abortions at military hospitals abroad if they paid for the procedure. Bush, who opposes the provision, has threatened to veto the bill over the issue.

The Armed Services subcommittees are slated to finish work on their portions of the bill today. The full committee is scheduled to mark up the measure on Wednesday and Thursday. All the sessions are closed.

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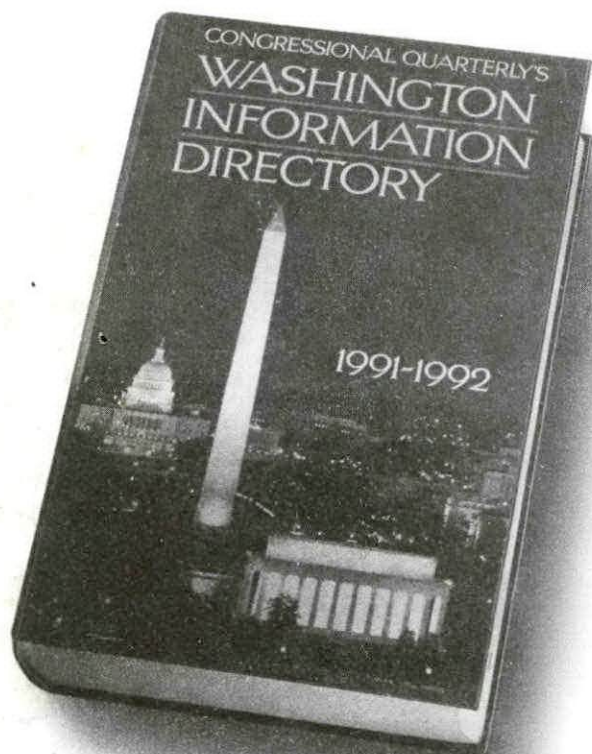
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
