I. PURPOSE

To brief you on Eastern Europe, the Soviet Union and the political issues likely to come up at the London Economic Summit.

II. BACKGROUND

Perhaps more so than at previous Economic Summits, the political issues for London cannot be separated neatly from the economic ones. While there will be an effort to reserve the political topics for the meals (as is customary), there is a very strong economic component to all the political issues, particularly Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union.

Eastern Europe

Eastern European leaders are concerned they will get short shrift at London as leaders focus on the Soviet Union. Eastern Europe has already made the commitment to democracy and free markets, and they deserve our continued support.

There are two ways we can provide continuing and enhanced assistance to Eastern Europe. Multilaterally, quick agreement on a substantial, market-opening Uruguay Round package will provide significantly expanded markets for Eastern Europe's agriculture, textile and manufactured exports. Kohl, Mitterrand and Delors could give a big boost to cementing democracy and free markets in Eastern Europe by loosening the protection they maintain for the EC's heavily subsidized farmers and sensitive industrial sectors.

Bilaterally, EC countries, Japan and we have done a lot for Eastern Europe, but we could do more. USTR has just completed an interagency review to determine what the U.S. can do to expand market access for Eastern European goods. On July 9, Secretary Brady convened the Economic Policy Council to discuss several additional steps on which there is not yet interagency agreement. He will be able to brief you on the results at today's session. The market opening measures you will take with you to London, as well as the

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steps to avoid undercutting Eastern European exports to the Soviet Union, should help persuade your G-7 counterparts to consider similar market access strategies.

The EC and the Soviet Union are Eastern Europe's natural markets, given geographical proximity. The EC is negotiating association agreements with Eastern Europe. We should urge the EC to be expansive in these agreements to include agriculture, textiles and steel.

SOVIET UNION

Secretaries Baker and Brady will present the status of our efforts to promote economic reform in the Soviet Union. In your letter to G-7 counterparts, you stressed that if Gorbachev is truly committed to credible economic and political reforms, the G-7 should help him in ways that make sense and draw on the Soviets' own vast physical and human resources. A key element of this response will be special associate status at the IMF and World Bank, which will assist Gorbachev in formulating a comprehensive economic reform program.

Our Summit partners generally agree that the IMF, World Bank and possibly other international institutions will need to be involved in helping to shape the Soviet reform program. But there is no consensus yet on the process, if any, by which the G-7 will stay in contact with, monitor the development of, and provide guidance to the institutions in their work with the Soviets. All Summit participants are wary of creating a new mechanism whether it be a new Group of 24 akin to the effort for Eastern Europe or one involving Summit countries only. But some process or mechanism seems inevitable since Gorbachev will not want to deal solely with the IMF, and your colleagues too will want to structure the follow-on dialogue with the USSR. Summit heads may ultimately wish to assign that responsibility to the Sherpas themselves for lack of a better alternative, but that could further institutionalize the Summit process and the USSR's link to it. Bob Zoellick will run through the options -- most of which the group, especially Secretary Brady, will find unpalatable.

Other Political Issues

As is customary at the Economic Summit, the British plan to issue several statements. There will be the Political Declaration which will cover the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, Yugoslavia, and the Gulf and Middle East. The declaration will also stress the importance of a revitalized UN with special note of the rights and duties of UN members to intervene in special situations (e.g., northern Iraq); make the traditional reference to the continuing terrorist threat; and include a special section on South Africa, urging foreign investment to help the country's recovery and stability. The latter is a British initiative which not all

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G-7 members have yet endorsed, but which we have supported in the preparatory meetings. There will be a separate declaration this year on proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and the technologies to produce them. The Germans and Canadians are pushing hard for a tough statement. The French are dragging their feet, primarily on the usual grounds that the G-7 is not an operational body, but will likely join the consensus in London. Finally, the Chairman's statement to be issued by Foreign Secretary Hurd will touch on regional issues not covered by the other documents (e.g, China, North Korea's nuclear capacity, Cuba, and Central America). Under Secretary Kimmitt, who has represented us in the preparatory discussions on political issues, will be able to discuss these issues in greater detail.

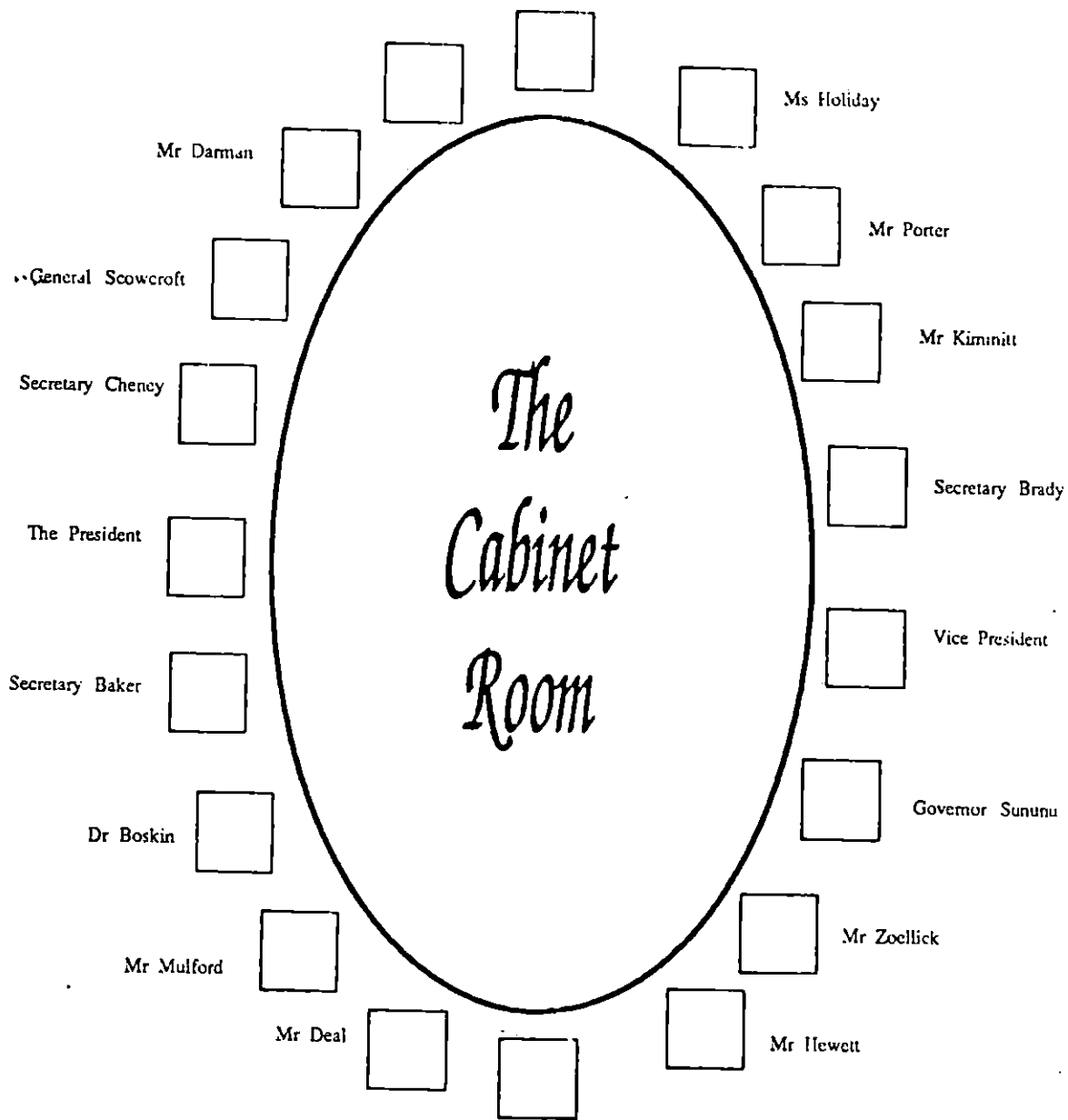

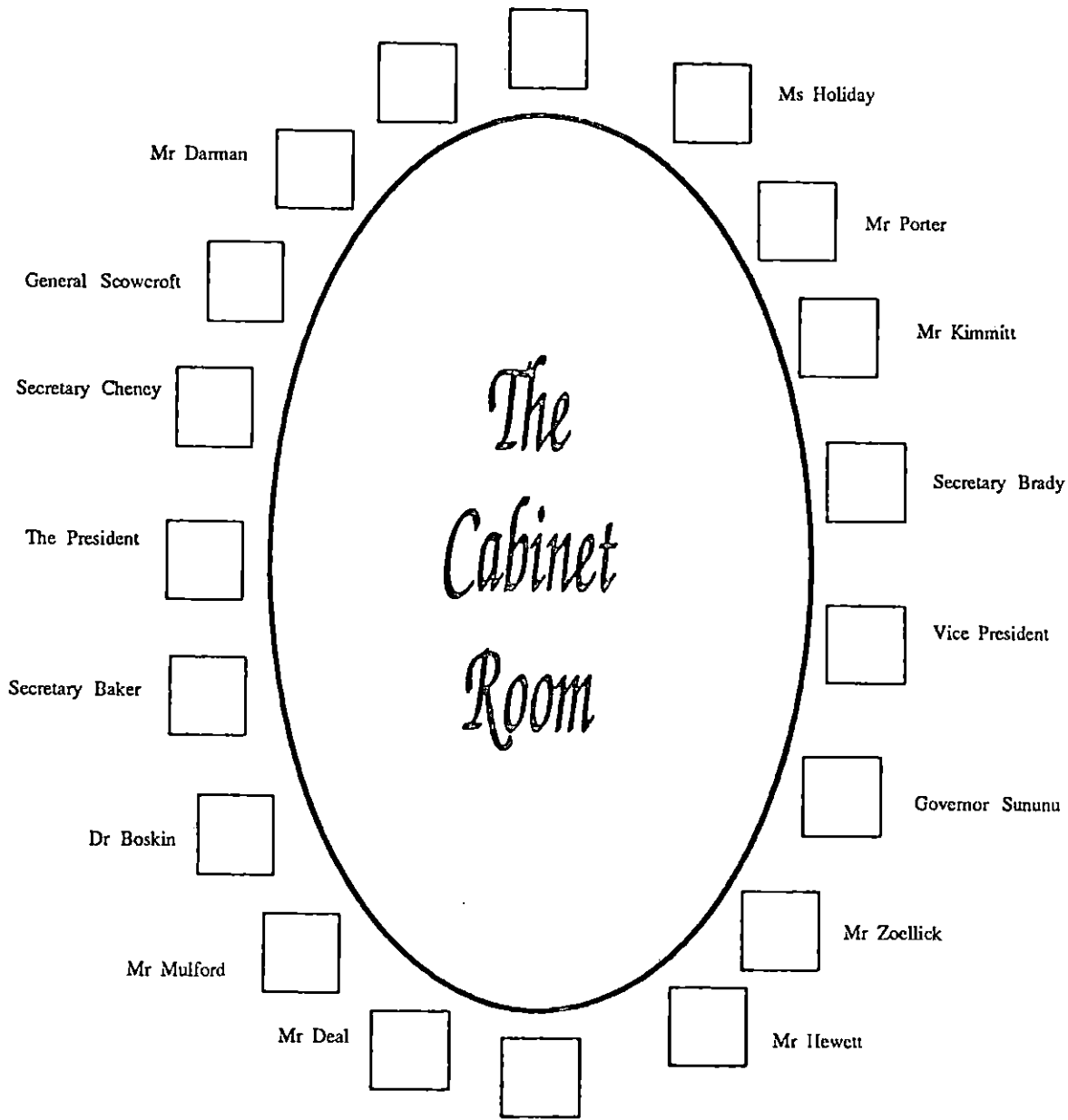

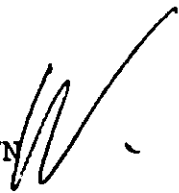

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POINTS TO BE MADE FOR
MEETING WITH CONGRESSIONAL MEMBERS

INTRODUCTION

- Next week I will be meeting in London with the leaders of the other key industrialized democracies. I will then visit Greece and Turkey before returning home.
- The Economic Summit was begun in 1975 because of a belief that the economic challenges confronting our countries could best be dealt with on a common basis. This will be the 17th such meeting.
- The Soviet issue is likely to dominate the meeting, and may well be the sole focus of media attention.
- However, there are other important economic issues which also merit serious discussion.
- Let me briefly outline the meeting as I see it. I would like to get any reaction or suggestions you may have.

ECONOMIC ISSUES

- We will review the overall macroeconomic situation facing our countries. World growth remains low, and there are few signs of global recovery.
- However, some indicators in the U.S. are beginning to point towards recovery. The recent discount rate cut in Japan is a helpful step in promoting growth.
- I expect there to be a discussion on developing countries and of what more can be done to stimulate market-oriented growth in these countries.

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By SS NARA, Date 11/25/24

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- Since Houston, the U.S. has taken the lead in securing international agreement to reduce the official debt of Poland and Egypt. There is substantial interest in providing more debt relief for the poorest countries, going beyond what was agreed to at the 1988 Toronto Summit.

URUGUAY ROUND

- Our cautious expectation coming out of the Houston Summit that the Uruguay Round was on the way to success was dashed by the inability of the EC and Japan to move on agriculture last December.
- I suspect other leaders would like to duck on the Round in London. But I intend to remind them of the commitment we all took in Houston to work personally for a substantial, successful outcome.
- Thanks to the strong support of Congress in extending fast track, I believe the U.S. is in a good position on this issue. The ball is in the EC and Japanese courts to unblock the negotiations.
- I would like to see an agreement by the end of the year or early next year in order to give Congress time to consider it fully before next November.
- However, we must have a substantial agreement which covers all the sectors. I know you will accept no less. And I intend to tell my colleagues this.

EASTERN EUROPE

- With all the interest surrounding the Soviet Union, we must not lessen our attention on Eastern Europe. These countries

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have already made the political and economic changes that the Soviet Union is only arguing over.

- The leaders of Poland, Hungary and Czechoslovakia are concerned lest we will shift our attention -- and thus our resources -- towards the Soviet Union.
- I have no intention of doing so. We must do our utmost to support democracy and the transition to markets in Eastern Europe.
- We have just completed an intensive review of what additional trade and investment assistance we can offer Eastern Europe. The Enterprise Funds are up and running. U.S. investment, particularly in Poland, is strong.
- I will urge my European colleagues to be more forthcoming on market access for Eastern European goods -- particularly in agriculture, textiles and steel.
- We must also see what can be done to revive Eastern Europe's natural trading links with the Soviet Union.

SOVIET UNION

- Let me conclude with the Soviet Union. I have written my Summit colleagues to lay out my thoughts on how we should handle this sensitive and difficult issue.
- If President Gorbachev is irrevocably committed to credible economic and democratic reforms, and can successfully implement them, we should help him in ways that make sense.
- I believe we should be guided by two principles:
 - Soviet commitment to genuine market reforms; and
 - Soviet self-help.

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- The Soviet Union is a wealthy country -- in resources and skilled people. It is these resources, and political will, that will determine the fate of reform.
- If we determine that Gorbachev is serious, a key element of our efforts should be Special Associate status in the IMF and World Bank.
- This multilateral financial and economic expertise can be supplemented by bilateral technical assistance efforts. We are prepared to help in areas such as food distribution, energy, defense sector transformation.
- We will need to be frank with President Gorbachev, frank to the point of telling him things he may not want to hear.
- Obviously the large resources the Soviet Union devotes to the military and to support Cuba and Afghanistan, its refusal to extend "new thinking" to the Asia-Pacific region and the continuing tension in the Baltics will all affect the reception President Gorbachev receives.

POLITICAL ISSUES

- We will also use next week's meeting to discuss key political issues around the world. Yugoslavia, the Gulf and Middle East, South Africa, China and Cambodia are among the topics I expect will be raised.
- This is a brief sketch. I would like to hear your views.

To thank the members of the Commission for their work and to endorse their findings as we send this report to the Hill.

II. BACKGROUND

The members of the Commission were appointed by you and confirmed by the Senate. After extensive public hearings and visits to the major sites, they have reported their findings on Dick Cheney's proposal to close 31 major and 12 minor domestic bases, and reduce or realign forces at 28 others. You have until July 15 to approve or reject their report.

Even though the Commission voted to preserve four large installations that Defense wanted to close, Cheney strongly recommends you approve the report (Tab D). Once you approve the document, Congress has 45 legislative days to pass a joint resolution of disapproval or the report can be implemented. This is a tough pill for many communities to swallow and members of Congress from affected districts will want to reopen the report. Your strong endorsement of both the report and the integrity of the process will help mute such efforts.

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING WITH
BASE CLOSURE AND REALIGNMENT COMMISSION

- In November of last year, I established the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission whose charter was to ensure a timely, independent, and fair process for closing and realigning United States military installations. My decision to do so was influenced both by the changing world order and by fiscal realities we cannot ignore.
- The Secretary of Defense submitted a recommended list of closures and realignments to the Commission in mid April, and you, in turn, have analyzed them in great detail. To the Commission's considerable credit, 28 separate hearings were conducted throughout the country, 47 military installations were visited, and literally hundreds of interviews and discussions took place.
- It has been an important undertaking that will affect thousands of people, and I acknowledge the scope of the task and thoroughness of your efforts.
- On the first of July, the Chairman, Jim Courter, forwarded to me the Commission's recommendations. After reading them, I want you to know that I am fully confident that no stone has been left unturned and that no potential impact has been unevaluated, overlooked or disregarded.
- Deciding to close installations that have served our Nation well and which, in some cases, have been the very lifeblood for the adjacent communities, is a painful process - but we have no choice.

The current situation, including
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- 1 ~~Real budgetary constraints that affect every facet of our Government -- not just defense spending,~~ a reduced threat to our national security, and the commensurate build-down of our Armed Forces mandate; that, ~~collectively,~~ we make our defense establishment even more efficient. At the same time, we must enhance our ability to fulfill our international responsibilities.

Biographies

He has served on the Senate Armed Services Committee staff and in the U.S. Navy. Today, Mr. Ball is president of the National Soft Drink Association in Washington, D.C.

Howard H. (Bo) Callaway

was a Member of Congress from Georgia prior to serving as Secretary of the Army. He was the manager of President Gerald Ford's 1976 campaign, and he is now chairman of GOPAC in Washington, D.C. He is also the chief executive officer and principal owner of the Crested Butte Mountain Resort. He served in the U.S. Army in Korea.

General Duane H. Cassidy, U.S. Air Force (Retired)

was commander-in-chief of the U.S. Transportation Command and of the Military Airlift Command. He served in the Air Force for more than 30 years. During this time, he served in Vietnam, commanded the Military Airlift Command's 21st Air Force, and was deputy chief of staff for manpower and personnel. Today, he is a vice president of Brown & Root U.S.A., Inc., an engineering and construction company located in Houston, Texas.

Robert D. Stuart, Jr., was U.S. ambassador to Norway from 1984 to 1989, after serving as president, chief executive officer, and then chairman of the board of The Quaker Oats Company. Ambassador Stuart is president of the Council of American Ambassadors, vice chairman of the Illinois Commission on the Future of Public Service, and president of North Star Investments. He served in the U.S. Army in Europe during World War II.

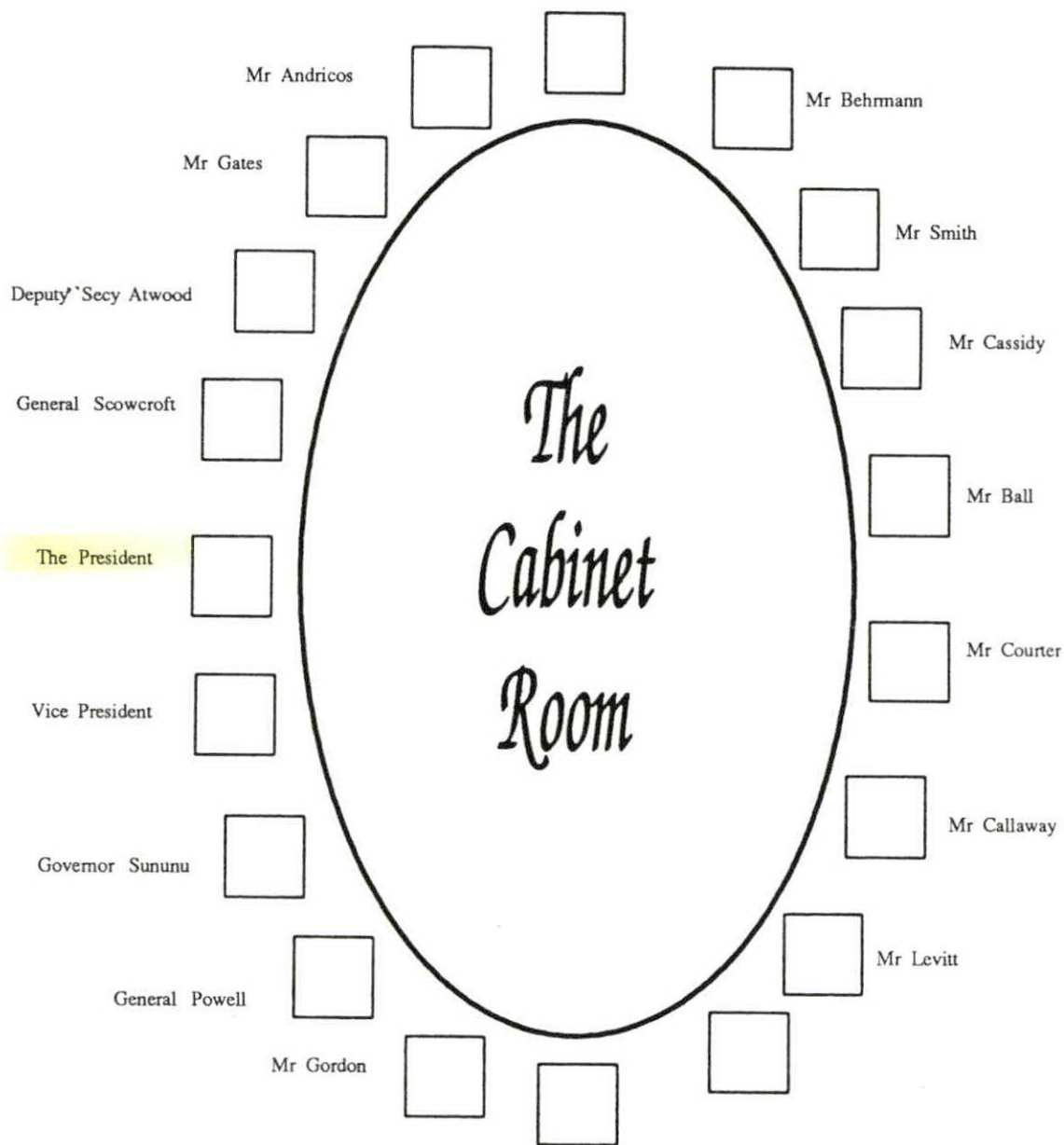

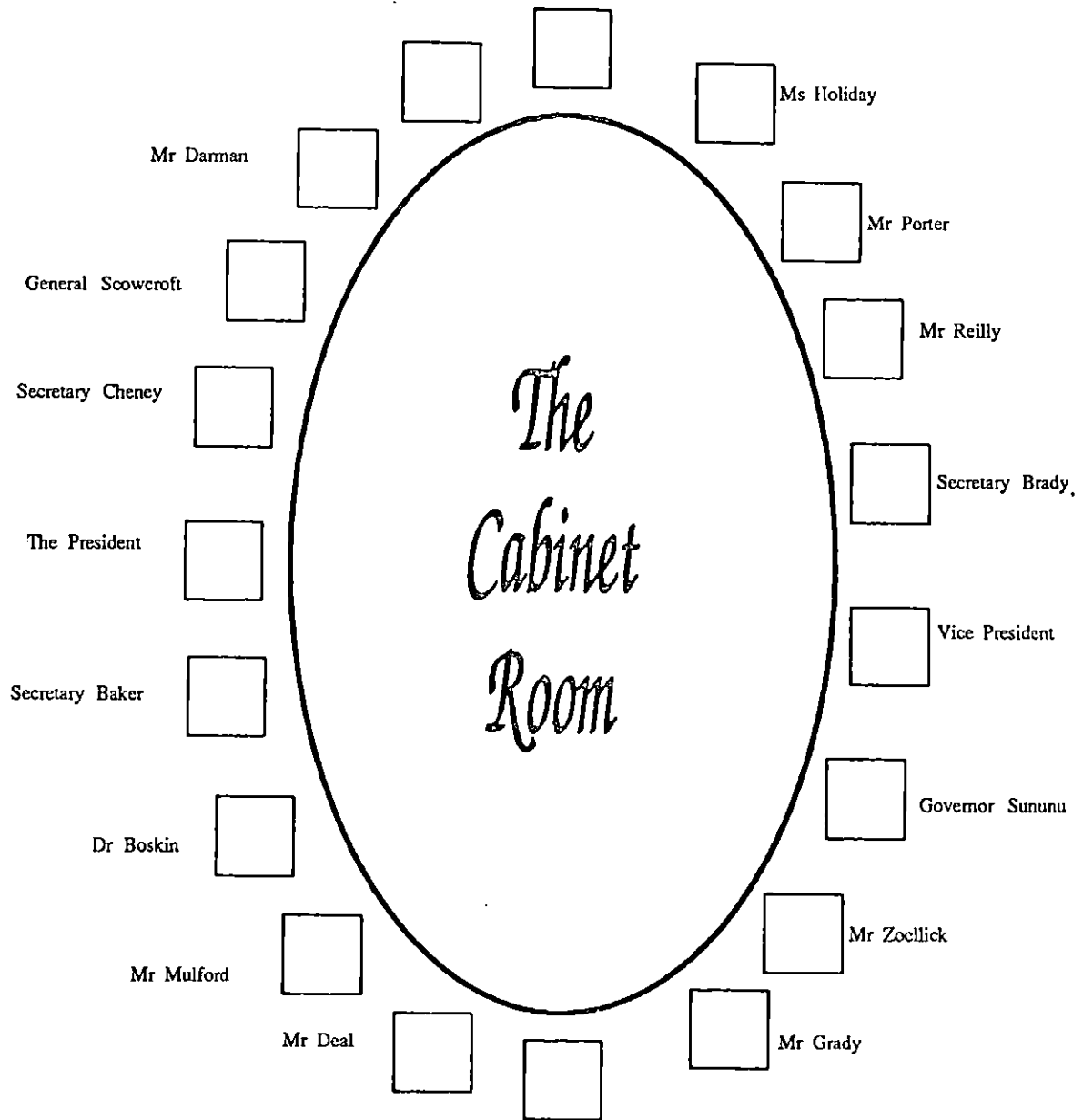

- Congratulations on your election as President of the ANC. I look forward to continued discussions and cooperation with you. And I would like to get your views on where things stand after the conference.
- The main reason I'm calling you today, however, is sanctions. As I have discussed with you before, our legislation -- the 1986 Comprehensive Anti-Apartheid Act -- is quite specific in mandating that I lift sanctions when certain, specific conditions are met. I have now determined that those five conditions have been met, and I will be signing an Executive Order to that effect.
- { In doing so, I want to assure you that I don't think that everything is now all right in South Africa; that it is somehow "a normal" country. I don't think that will be the case until there is a democratically elected government.
- The lifting of these sanctions does not signify any lessening of our desire to be helpful to you and others who are committed to the negotiating track to achieve that goal.
- Many measures against South Africa will remain in effect, including restrictions on IMF lending and the arms embargo.

- The CAAA was enacted to encourage negotiations. We believe it has done so. I was pleased to note that in your address to the recent ANC Congress you emphasize the importance of moving forward to negotiations.

SUBJECT: A Possible Last Minute Appeal from Mandela

The ANC's Foreign Affairs spokesman Thabo Mbeki has been in touch with us and indicated that Mandela may make a last ditch appeal to you to wait four or five more weeks before you lift the sanctions. By that time Mandela hopes that all the political prisoners -- by ANC standards -- will have been released. While this proposal at first glance may seem to have some merit, in fact it is a very bad idea.

First, it is not at all certain that all of the ANC defined prisoners will be out in four weeks. The original ANC/SAG deadline was April 30 on this issue. And the haggling over who should be released is likely to drag on into September which would leave us dangling.

Second, we would be fundamentally abandoning our position that our action on sanctions would be governed by the letter of the law, i.e. we would not move the goalposts one way or another. Indeed we would be acceding to the approach suggested all along by Senator Kennedy and others that Mandela should determine when and under what circumstances we lift sanctions.

Finally, all of this is too far down the track for us to throw on the brakes now. Media speculation is rife that we will lift sanctions today. We are in the midst of the mini-political brouhaha on the subject, e.g. the press conference in Toronto. There would be no graceful way to change direction now. And we need to get the issue behind us. (Even Jimmy Carter says it is time to lift the sanctions.)

→ If Mandela does make this pitch to you, I would suggest that you gracefully decline but assure him that you will telephone de Klerk and urge him to be forthcoming and generous on any remaining prisoner cases.

Mandela is also likely to urge that non-CAAA sanctions, e.g. the Gramm Amendment on IMF loans and the Evans Amendment on use of Exim, be phased out gradually, not all at once. We can agree with that notion.

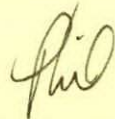

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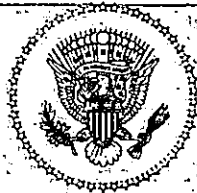

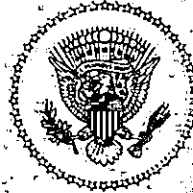

TELEPHONE CONVERSATION WITH
NELSON MANDELA

- Congratulations on your election as President of the ANC. I look forward to continued discussions and cooperation with you. And I would like to get your views on where things stand after the conference.
- The main reason I'm calling you today, however, is sanctions. As I have discussed with you before, our legislation -- the 1986 Comprehensive Anti-Apartheid Act -- is quite specific in mandating that I lift sanctions when certain, specific conditions are met. I have now determined that those five conditions have been met, and I will be signing an Executive Order to that effect.
- In doing so, I want to assure you that I don't think that everything is now all right in South Africa; that it is somehow a "normal" country. I don't think that will be the case until there is a democratically elected government.
- The lifting of these sanctions does not signify any lessening of our desire to be helpful to you and others who are committed to the negotiating track to achieve that goal.
- Many measures against South Africa will remain in effect, including restrictions on IMF lending and the arms embargo.

TELEPHONE CONVERSATION WITH
PRESIDENT F. W. DE KLERK

- I am delighted to tell you that I have certified that all five conditions in the 1986 Comprehensive Anti-Apartheid Act have been met, and I am terminating the enforcement of the CAAA sanctions against South Africa.
- Secretary Baker will soon inform Secretary Brady that the five CAAA conditions have been met. This will also terminate the provisions in the "Rangel Amendment" which resulted in double taxation for American companies operating in South Africa.
- These actions are in clear accord with our law and the proper response to the positive program you have followed over the last 18 months.
- We appreciate the need to find ways to help stimulate strong economic growth to provide jobs.
- I want personally to congratulate you on what you have done in South Africa. This is a moment of great satisfaction for all of us.
- We will remain steadfast in our commitment to do all we can to assist the process of peaceful change in South Africa.
- I hope that the remaining problems on the road to full negotiations can be cleared up quickly. I have asked both Mr. Mandela and Chief Buthelezi to do their share.

THOMAS 'MISLED CONGRESS AND PUBLIC' ON PROBES, REPORT SAYS

Under the chairmanship of...Thomas, the EEOC "misled Congress and the public" about lapses in the agency's investigation of age discrimination, says an unpublished Senate report from 1988.

The report, done for the senate Special Committee on Aging, was made an issue Tuesday by liberal organizations and advocacy groups for older Americans as they debated whether to oppose actively Thomas's nomination.

"The Thomas record documented by the Senate report raises new fundamental questions about his nomination," said executive director for the Alliance of Justice Nan Aron....

Thomas has maintained that the number and the seriousness of the lapses in pursuing complaints under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act were exaggerated.

THOMAS PRAISES TARGETS OF HIS BARBS

Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas, under fire from some civil rights leaders, Tuesday went out of his way to praise the movement and leaders such as retiring Justice Marshall for contributing to Thomas's rise out of poverty and segregation.

"I have been extremely fortunate," Thomas told reporters as he met with Sen. Thurmond....

"I've benefited greatly from the civil rights movement, from the justice whom I'm nominated to succeed (Marshall), from organizations such as the Urban League and the NAACP" as well as "mentors" such as Sen. Danforth, said Thomas....

NAACP executive director Hooks told NBC's "Today" show Tuesday that "his record, as it is known now, is very, very unfavorable."

Thomas has declined to comment on whether he would accept the NAACP invitation [for an interview], but senatorial supporters have indicated he is unlikely to do so. Asked whether the Administration had suggested that Thomas seek to mollify civil rights groups, White House spokesman Judy Smith said, "Judge Thomas is an independent man who expresses his own views."...

Responding to controversy over how extensively senators should question Thomas about his views on abortion and other issues, Sen. Biden said: "The judge (Thomas) can answer any questions he wants and senators can ask any questions they want. It's totally up to them." Later, Sen. Dole condemned what he called "litmus testers" who plan to quiz Thomas about specific cases....

Also Tuesday, former attorney general Griffin Bell...told reporters...that he supported Thomas. "I doubt very much he's against affirmative action, giving people a chance," Bell said.

**SOUTHERN DEMOCRATS EYE RACIAL
POLITICS IN HIGH COURT CONFIRMATION**

When it comes time for the Senate to vote on the nomination of Clarence Thomas..., a small but crucial number of Southern Democrats will have more on their minds than abortion, affirmative action and other legal issues.

They are mindful that support from black voters was critical to their election. And they are carefully watching civil rights groups agonize over how to deal with a black nominee whose views diverge sharply from the movement's mainstream.

"If civil rights groups go against Thomas, then certainly those senators in the South are going to have to take a real hard look and ask some tough questions of him," said Bill Max Paul, a veteran consultant for Southern Democrats....

IN BUSH APPROVAL RATINGS, THE GENDER GAP CLOSES

The gender gap that bedeviled Presidents Bush and Reagan in the past decade appears to have disappeared.

Public and private polls taken in the past several months show that virtually identical percentages of men and women believe that Bush is doing a good job....

The most recent Washington Post-ABC News Poll showed Bush's approval rating at 76 percent, with identical support for men and women....

The Post-ABC poll shows that men are more likely than women to feel strongly that Bush is doing a good job (46 to 38 percent). On Bush's handling of economic issues, his overall approval rating in the...poll is 46 percent, with 49 percent of men and 43 percent of women approving of his handling of these issues....

The Post-ABC poll and [Richard] Wirthlin's poll both show that about 57 percent of Americans say the country has gotten off on the wrong track. But while about three in five women agree with that view, only about half of the men do.

NRA BEGINS DRIVE TO STALL CRIME BILL
Senate Leaders Plan To Counter With Cloture Vote Today On Debate

The NRA Tuesday mounted a campaign to stall Senate action on omnibus anticrime legislation, charging that a provision calling for a five-day waiting period for handgun purchases amounts to "nothing less than an unmitigated attack on the rights of law-abiding gun owners."

Forced with threats of a filibuster by NRA supporters in the Senate..., Sens. Biden and Mitchell scheduled a cloture vote Wednesday in an attempt to end delaying tactics and force the bill to a final vote later this week....

The bill is "not a crime bill, it is a gun-control bill," said director of the NRA's Institute for Legislative Action Patrick Raffaniello, in his letter to senators.

SENATORS NEAR COMPROMISE ON 'INFORMATION HIGHWAY'

Two key senators are moving to end a turf fight that has threatened a bill authorizing new federal support for high-performance computers and a national network of "information highways" capable of transmitting billions of bits of data per second.

Aides to Sens. Johnston and Gore have reached a compromise under which the White House would select the federal agencies to lead the program, whose costs eventually could reach several billion dollars.... Neither senator has yet given final approval to a compromise, but sources said a deal appeared to be near. Further obstacles lie ahead, however.

S&L BUYERS BIG GIVERS TO CANDIDATES
Campaigns Got Millions Before '88 Deals: Study

Investors in the lucrative 1988 S&L rescues that were subsidized by the government contributed \$2.8 million to presidential and congressional candidates while the deals were being made, according to a study released Tuesday.

Beneficiaries of the government's largesse in the 1988 deals contributed \$69,000 to presidential candidate George Bush in 1987 and 1988, according to an analysis by the Center for Study of Responsive Law, a group affiliated with Ralph Nader. The thrift members gave members of the House Banking Committee a total of \$298,2000 and Senate Banking Committee members a total of \$229,199....

Joseph Belluck, one of the authors of the study, complained that the OTS refused to release documents that could show how some of the deals originated and whether any members of Congress sought to intervene on behalf of buyers. Belluck and other members of his group called on Congress to investigate the role campaign contributions played in the creation of the agreements.

BUSH STARTS DAILY THYROID MEDICATION**President's Health Deemed 'Excellent' After Checkup**

President Bush began taking daily doses of a synthetic thyroid hormone Tuesday as part of the continuing treatment for Graves' disease..., according to White House officials.

Bush will have to take the dedication for the rest of his life to replace the hormone that had been produced by his overactive thyroid gland, which has been gradually destroyed by a dose of radioactive iodine he took May 9....

After examining Bush, White House physician Burton Lee issued a statement saying that the President "remains in excellent physical health. He is conducting all of his business without any side effects from his medication and without any lingering problems from his recent Graves' disease. He is now jogging and carrying on all his normal physical activities." (Washington Post, A2)

TORONTO -- President Bush Tuesday strongly defended his decision to lift U.S. sanctions against South Africa, maintaining that to keep them in place until further strides are made in dismantling apartheid would be a "slap in the face" to the government in Pretoria, which he credited with making remarkable progress....

Bush Can Lift Sanctions, Hill Concedes

Congress appears unable to stop President Bush from lifting economic sanctions against South Africa and may be ready to assume a diminished role in charting U.S. policy in the post-apartheid era. Key pro-sanctions lawmakers said Tuesday they are powerless to block Bush....

"I think the train has probably left the station," said Rep. Dymally.... "We might be too late."...

Sen. Simon...said pro-sanctions lawmakers have been unable to come up with a strategy to challenge the White House....

President Bush plans to announce Wednesday a lifting of economic sanctions against South Africa in recognition of the white-minority government's step toward dismantling of apartheid, administration officials said....

Bush noted that the law makes clear that once the conditions are met, "there's no choice for the President. Sanctions will be lifted.... There's no dispute, not debate, nothing."...

Administration officials said Bush would not remove other sanctions imposed against South Africa in a separate law. These include bans on the sale of military equipment, strategic technology and nuclear material to South Africa....

Sen. Simon...said Bush should wait until the Pretoria government had begun "substantive negotiations" with the ANC.

NAACP Leaders Says Too Early To Lift Sanctions

HOUSTON -- ...NAACP Board Chairman William Gibson said the civil rights group was considering "immediate and long-term" actions it could take to prevent the lifting of sanctions, but declined to say what those actions might be.... Gibson also said the suggestion that sanctions be lifted now is evidence of President Bush's growing insensitivity to minorities.

"The President's sensitivity to all issues of race has almost become unglued, unstuck," Gibson said. "He's like a wildman, like a kid who has walked into a toy store and starts to tear things up and can't stop -- the civil rights bill, the nomination of a super conservative to the Supreme Court and lifting sanctions against South Africa."

"The only thing Bush is getting ready to do is have a lot of marches and demonstrations in his own country.... He's acting like a very stupid man at this point. It seems as though he's on a path to make certain black Americans know he doesn't like us. He's doing each and every thing that comes his way -- and sometimes he goes out of his way -- to make sure he's against the posture of African Americans in this nation and in foreign lands."

EX-CIA AIDE ADMITS IRAN-CONTRA ROLE

The former head of the CIA's Central American task force admitted in court Tuesday that he and other senior CIA officials were aware of the secret diversion of funds to the contra rebels in Nicaragua for months before the scandal broke in the fall of 1986. Alan Fiers...acknowledged the CIA's complicity in attempts to cover up the affair as he pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court here to two misdemeanor counts of unlawfully withholding information from Congress. His pleas came as part of an agreement to cooperate fully with independent counsel Lawrence Walsh....

"This is a real breakthrough, the first one we've gotten really," a source close to Walsh said of Fiers's action. Walsh himself called it "a significant advance" in the inquiry.

GORBACHEV REPORTED SET TO TAKE DETAILED PROPOSALS TO LONDON

MOSCOW -- President Gorbachev will present leaders of the major industrialized states next week with a detailed report describing specific proposals for investment and foreign assistance but he will not ask for a particular sum of money, aides and other sources said.

Gorbachev's speech and written report in London will also endorse a sweeping demilitarization of the Soviet economy and an end to the Bolshevik ban on private property, the sources said.

At a press conference today, Gorbachev said he would ask the West for help in supporting the rapid creation of a convertible ruble and for investment credits to help reduce the Soviet Union's runaway foreign debt....

Asked about the recent defections from the Communist Party...and the creation of a new Democratic Reform Movement..., Gorbachev said he hoped that a new Communist Party charter would help bring the party into line with the process of radical reform.

SATELLITE SPOTS IRAQ BURYING ATOMIC GEAR

Iraqi forces have been sighted burying nuclear-related equipment in an ongoing effort to hide materials slated for destruction from international authorities, according to U.S. officials. A spy satellite photographed the Iraqis at a secret military base near Baghdad last week burying equipment used to enrich uranium, according to Bush Administration officials with access to intelligence reports....

Administration spokesmen Tuesday accused Iraq of masking its nuclear program.

"We obviously think that this letter (to the IAEA falls short, that it has discrepancies, that there is more to be told here," State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said.

"What's new is Iraq's admitting what they previously had denied," Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said of the letter. "And that's why we think it's so important that there be full and complete visits by these inspection teams to look around and see for themselves." (Bill Gertz, Washington Times, A1)

U.S. MAY HAVE MISJUDGED IRAQ'S NUCLEAR CAPABILITY

The first indication that Iraq possessed secretly enriched nuclear material needed to build a crude atomic bomb was detected last December by U.S. intelligence experts, a month before the start of a bombing campaign that U.S. officials now say left Iraq's covert bomb-building equipment largely intact....

Officials who have seen Iraq's new written disclosure of its nuclear research programs and reviewed independent U.S. intelligence data have concluded that Iraq may have hidden enough highly enriched uranium to build a crude nuclear device at some future date. The prospects for recovering all of the weapons-grade uranium are widely seen as dim.

"You cannot rule that out," a government analyst said Tuesday when asked about the possibility that Saddam may eventually use the material to build a bomb. (Jeffrey Smith, Washington Post, A1)

U.N. TEAM INSPECTS IRAQI NUCLEAR SITES

BAGHDAD -- U.N. inspectors conducting an extensive survey of a newly disclosed Iraqi nuclear development program Tuesday viewed "essential elements" for manufacturing enriched uranium, a spokesman for the team said....

"Things are going well," said [an official of the IAEA] Demitri Perricos. "They are opening up. We are finding things according to the declaration."...

The Iraqi declaration...said that Iraq's program had made a little over one pound of slightly enriched uranium....

The IAEA official said that he did not know whether this was all of the uranium Iraq has enriched on its own....

Perricos said Tuesday that the Iraqis might have destroyed [some equipment] because "they didn't want to have any indication that they had been involved" in a clandestine nuclear-weapons development program.

In documents released at the U.N. Tuesday, Iraq said it destroyed the equipment and withheld information about its nuclear program for fear of allied attack.

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NATIONS DRAW MIDEAST ARMS GUIDELINES
5 On Security Council Would Bar A-Weapons

PARIS -- The five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council agreed Tuesday to seek exclusion of weapons of mass destruction from the Middle East, to develop "rules of restraint" on conventional arms sales and to achieve the sharing of information about weapons transfers to the region....

After two days of talks, the five agreed specifically to support a zone free of "weapons of mass destruction...in the Middle East" and advocated a missile freeze, the statement said. All nuclear activities there would be put under international safeguards....

Undersecretary of State for International Security Affairs Bartholomew...said, "We already put quite a bit of meat on the bones of what a restraint regime would look like," adding that it was too early to tell if the five could agree on ceilings or bans on the sales of certain weapons.

BUSH TO PUSH MIDDLE EAST ARMS CONTROL AT G-7 SUMMIT

President Bush is anxious to inject some momentum into his plan for Middle East arms control at next week's G-7 summit, but progress may be limited because of flaws in the proposal, analysts said....

"President Bush's long-awaited Middle East arms control initiative emerged as an unusually vague and contradictory concoction," said Spurgeon Keeny, president of the liberal Arms Control Association....

Diplomatic sources in London said Britain...was pressing for an arms control declaration calling for nuclear non-proliferation and restraint in sales of conventional arms to the Third World. "It is fairly certain there will be a declaration of some variety on arms control, probably a separate declaration issued at the same time as the political communique," one source said.

"The aim is to give a clear, strong political signal from the G-7 leaders of the importance of the subject," one said.

SOUTH AFRICA/SANCTIONS

ABC's Peter Jennings: The Bush Administration is now ready to reward South Africa for the reforms it has made to end its system of formal racial segregation. The White House is expected to announce tomorrow that it is lifting the economic sanctions that the Congress imposed on South Africa five years ago -- sanctions that Mr. Bush never supported in the first place.

ABC's Brit Hume: As the President left the White House this afternoon for a brief trip to Canada, he and his top aides were studying a wire service story, and Mr. Bush complained of false news reports he had already decided to lift the sanctions.

(TV coverage: President on South Lawn.)

Not so, he insisted. But everything else, he said, left no doubt what his decision will be.

(President Bush: "The law is very clear. When these five categories have been taken care of, there's no choice for the President -- sanctions will be lifted.")

Mr. Bush was talking about the five conditions Congress specified for ending the sanctions. For months, the Administration has said the only condition remaining is release of all political prisoners. Had that now been done, he was asked.

(President Bush: "Well, that's one of the things we're determining. They've made great progress there, great progress.") But the Administration counts as political prisoners only those jailed for their views, not those in prison for acts of violence. Thus, it does exercise some discretion over when the sanctions come off, and there is strong opposition to lifting them now.

(Benjamin Hooks: "I think it would be criminally irresponsible for sanctions to be lifted against South Africa. Sanctions have brought South Africa to the negotiation table and we need it until we get a little further down the road.")

But the President got a little help on the issue today from someone not normally considered one of his friends. Former President Carter said the sanctions should be lifted.

(Carter: "I think that what has been done in South Africa under President de Klerk lately has been a true and genuine and fast irreversible move toward the ultimate ending of apartheid.")

That's the President's view exactly, but it's not likely to win over civil rights organizations already mad at Mr. Bush for his opposition to their civil rights bill and for his nomination of a black conservative, Clarence Thomas, to the Supreme Court.

(ABC-3)

NBC's John Cochran: I'm told that tomorrow, when Bush's decision is announced, he will call Nelson Mandela to explain why he is lifting sanctions. The President never wanted to impose economic sanctions, and late today, he again showed his lack of enthusiasm for punishing South Africa.

Cochran continues:

(President Bush: "I don't think it helps employment over there, and most countries have lifted the sanctions already, so we'll have to wait and see.")

At the NAACP convention, Benjamin Hooks urged Bush to wait a long time.

(Hooks: "We'll be sending telegrams to President Bush today asking him: For God's sake, don't lift, at this point, sanctions against South Africa.")

(TV coverage: President on South Lawn.)

Bush is ready to drop sanctions because the State Department assured him South Africa has freed all political prisoners from cells like those in this former prison where Nelson Mandela was held for two decades. Amnesty International tells a different story.

(Jack Healey, Amnesty International: "This past year and up until now, there is torture in the jails of South Africa, there's still people picked up on the street.")

Nelson Mandela also says it is too early to reward South Africa. And some in Congress agree.

(Sen. Kennedy: "It does not make sense to jump the gun, to move the goal post just at the time when we are about to be successful in moving the political process forward in South Africa.")

Sanctions have been in effect since 1986, when Congress passed a tough law overriding strong objections from President Reagan and his Vice President.

(TV coverage: Vice President Bush with President Reagan.)

Many American companies severed ties with South Africa, which soon felt the pinch. Today, whites were elated to hear sanctions may soon end.

(Louis Pienaar, South African official: "It would make us doubly happy. It would be a red-letter day par excellence.")

Bush's decision may be controversial, but he will defend it by saying that the law actually forces him to lift sanctions now that South Africa has met the legal requirements. (NBC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw discusses the issue with Randall Robinson, executive director of TransAfrica:

Robinson: The President has an obligation to faithfully execute the laws of the United States. If he goes ahead with his plans tomorrow to lift sanctions, he will have flagrantly violated American law. I would agree that the political momentum is moving in the other direction, but our law requires that these conditions be met, and at least three of them have not been met. There are at least 850 political prisoners still in jails in South Africa. The law requires that all South Africans, irrespective of race, be allowed to participate in the political process. Some 40,000 South African blacks are barred from returning to South Africa. And the law also requires that the Group Areas Act and the Population Registration Act be repealed without substitution. Both acts have been substituted for. (NBC-2)

CBS's Susan Spencer: George Bush, of course, has never thought that the sanctions were a good idea, and he'll announce tomorrow that South Africa now has met the conditions necessary to lift them.

Spencer continues:

(President Bush: "The law is very clear. When these five categories have been taken care of, there's no choice for the President -- sanctions will be lifted.")

The five conditions: South Africa must free all political prisoners, abolish apartheid laws and the state of emergency, permit free political activity, and assure talks for a new government.

(Rep. Gray: "The real issue here is one, have we met the letter and the spirit of the law of the Anti-Apartheid Act of 1986? The answer is clearly no.")

The White House says it only can deal with the letter of the law, not the spirit. But opponents charge the Administration is being too literal, that while Nelson Mandela may be free, its narrow definition of political prisoner keeps scores of others in South African jails.

(Healey: "What are we rushing for? We haven't rushed to remove apartheid before by any form of American policy. Why rush now? Let's take our time.")

Others question whether race classification really has ended. And how can there be a claim of free political activity when thousands are still in exile?

(Anne Mares Griffin, TransAfrica: "Even if the conditions are met of the sanctions law, they do not have the right to vote. And these things, these very major issues, are somehow forgotten.") But Administration supporters say ending sanctions in fact will speed democracy.

(Sen. Lugar: "By lifting the sanctions, we offer some opportunities for economic growth so that democracy might also be enhanced by economic opportunity for blacks and whites and coloreds and all people of South Africa.")

Opponents can see there is little support on Capitol Hill for reimposing sanctions once they're lifted. Their strategy then will simply be to watch events unfold and see if without economic pressure South Africa reverts to its old self or continues on the path to reform.

THOMAS NOMINATION

CBS's Dan Rather: President Bush's Supreme Court nominee spent part of today praising some of the civil rights groups that have so far failed to endorse him. Clarence Thomas did so amid the latest indications that a bruising confirmation battle is shaping up.

CBS's Bob Schieffer:

(Unidentified: "Keep that chin up.")

Thomas: "I will."

He'll need to, because as Thomas visited the Capitol, key Republican senators told CBS News getting him confirmed will be harder than they thought now that civil rights groups are so openly dubious about him. That's why Thomas tried today to reassure those groups.

Schieffer continues:

(Thomas: "I benefitted greatly from civil rights movement; from the justice whom I'm nominated to succeed; organizations such as the Urban League, NAACP; mentors like Sen. Danforth; friends I've met since I've been in the executive branch, like yourself.")

That may be Thomas' only remark for a while, as he summed up the confirmation strategy.

(Thomas: "I'm under wraps.")

And rightly so, said Republicans.

(Sen. Dole: "Before his confirmation hearings even begin, these litmus testers would expect Judge Thomas to go beyond explanation of legal or judicial philosophy and answer specific questions about specific cases.")

Republicans say Thomas' conservatism shouldn't be an issue. And an influential Southern Democrat who endorsed Thomas today agreed.

(Griffin Bell: "Who ever heard such an argument that only a liberal black can be on the Supreme Court? What sort of a country do we have where people would take that position?")

In fact, civil rights groups have been challenging conservative nominees to the court for years. The difference this time: The nominee is black. No one is quite sure how that's going to play out politically, and that's one reason that a lot of senators right now are just as quiet as the nominee. (CBS-5)

IRAN-CONTRA/FIERS

Jennings reports Alan Fiers now admits he knew more than he told Congress about illegal arms shipments to the Contras. He has made a deal with the special prosecutor: He will tell all.

ABC's John Martin reports Fiers pleaded guilty to two counts of lying to the Senate and House Intelligence Committees. Fiers' admission raises questions whether his superiors also knew what was going on. In court today, Fiers said he discussed the operation with Clair George, then CIA deputy operations director. (Rep. Hamilton: "It implicates directly for the first time the Central Intelligence Agency in Iran-Contra.")

This may mean problems for Robert Gates, nominated to be the new CIA director.

L.A. POLICE/GATES

Jennings: We begin tonight with a scathing report on the Los Angeles Police Department and the recommendation from an independent commission that its chief, Darryl Gates, retire. The commission finds that the savage beating last March of motorist Rodney King, captured on a two-minute piece of home videotape, was not an isolated incident. Inside the L.A. Police Department, the commission says, there is a problem group of officers who ignore department guidelines, misuse force, and have been allowed to get away with it.

ABC's Judy Muller reports the commission says the problem is aggravated by racism in the department.

(Warren Christopher, commission chairman: "The commission's review of patrol car transmissions reveal many -- I'm sad to say, far too many -- disturbing racial remarks and ethnic slurs.")

Examples of those transmissions include "sounds like monkey-slapping time" and "everybody you kill in the line of duty becomes a slave in the afterlife." The commission stopped short of holding Gates personally responsible, but did call on him to step down as soon as a successor could be found.

Gates said on May 29 that he would resign if the commission found he had created a climate that condoned racism and brutality. Today, Gates said he would not run away from his job.

HOUSE FLOOR: Radio spectrum bill wins House approval.

The House passed legislation (HR 531) yesterday that would make government-held radio frequencies available for commercial use beginning in two years.

Approved by voice vote, the measure would authorize as much as 200 megahertz of frequencies currently reserved for federal use to be shifted to the private sector, which needs the additional spectrum for emerging technologies, such as high-definition television and cellular phones.

If enacted, the bill would require the Commerce Department over the next two years to compile a list of frequencies to be withdrawn from federal use. The president would then be required to withdraw the frequencies while the Federal Communications Commission came up with a plan to allocate the spectrum to commercial users.

Striped Bass. A bill (HR 2387) designed to protect the Atlantic striped bass also passed the House by voice vote. The measure would allow the government to continue to bar bass fishing in the coastal waters of states that ignore federal conservation guidelines.

Drift Net Fishing. Members agreed to two bills (H Res 182, H Con Res 113), by voice vote, that would require a moratorium on large-scale drift net fishing.

SENATE FLOOR: Crime bill delayed, cloture filed.

Senators yesterday had hoped to wrap up work on the crime bill (S 1241) but became deadlocked and instead moved to consideration of the fiscal 1992 energy and water spending bill (HR 2427).

Late Monday evening, members filed a cloture motion to cut off debate on the crime bill and to proceed to a vote on final passage. The vote to cut off debate is scheduled for today.

In action yesterday, members agreed, by voice vote, to an amendment

by Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., that would provide grants to states for establishment of prison literacy programs.

Senators first voted, 55-39, to modify the Bingaman amendment to make the literacy programs optional for states. The original amendment would have required all states to establish the programs.

Members agreed, by voice vote, to an amendment by Thad Cochran, R-Miss., that would authorize federal law enforcement officers to order aircraft and sea vessels suspected of illegal drug or money-laundering activities to land or stop for boarding and inspection.

Senators rejected, 43-55, an amendment by Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., that would have made it voluntary for states to follow provisions in the bill that would govern how certain disciplinary actions against police officers could be carried out.

MOSCOW EMBASSY to be torn down under spending bill.

The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Commerce, Justice, State and the Judiciary yesterday approved a \$21.2 billion fiscal 1992 spending bill (HR 2608) that would require the Bush administration to tear down the bug-ridden U.S. Embassy in Moscow.

Like the House version, the Senate measure would provide \$130 million for the embassy, but unlike the House it stipulates that the money must be spent on tearing down and rebuilding the embassy.

The panel also agreed to restore funding for three agencies for which the House provided no funds.

The National Endowment for Democracy would receive \$30 million. The House initially had \$26 million in its version, but removed it after members complained that the agency was not authorized and was unaccountable for its spending decisions.

Today

House Floor: The House is expected to vote to continue China's most-favored-nation (MFN) trade status, but to make the extension contingent on China changing its policies on human rights.

The bill (HR 2212) faces a veto by President Bush, who opposes new conditions being placed on the country. Current law requires that China show progress on free emigration to qualify.

China has had MFN status since 1979, which grants its exports low tariff rates.

The measure would require that the Chinese government improve its record on human rights, religious expression and press freedom. For example, Beijing would have to disclose the fate of protesters unaccounted for since the 1989 crackdown on pro-democracy demonstrators in Tiananmen Square.

If China failed to make advancements in these areas, the United States would be required to end China's low-tariff treatment in July 1992.

To keep their options open, lawmakers are also expected to approve a measure (H J Res 263) that would reject an extension of MFN status for China.

Ewing swearing-in. Thomas W. Ewing, R-Ill., will become the newest member of the House today when he is sworn in as the representative for the 15th District. Ewing replaces Edward Madigan, R, who resigned in March to become Agriculture secretary.

Senate Floor: The Senate plans to continue consideration of the crime bill (S 1241), which seeks to expand use of the federal death penalty, limit the appeals that could be filed by death row inmates and expand anti-drug programs.

Members plan to vote to limit debate on the bill, which would allow for a vote on final passage.

Transportation Spending: The House Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation will mark up the last of the 13 regular fiscal 1992 spending bills to be considered by the House.

Action on the draft measure, which would provide funding for the Department of Transportation and related agencies, has been delayed because Transportation panel Chairman William Lehman, D-Fla., suffered a stroke in March and has been recuperating.

Much of the importance lawmakers usually accord the bill has been overshadowed by congressional debate on a five-year highway and mass transit reauthorization bill (S 1204).

The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on the District of Columbia will also take up a spending bill (HR 2699) for the District that would provide a record \$700 million in federal funds.

The bill would bar the use of federal funds for abortion except to save a woman's life but challenges the president's position on abortion by placing no restrictions on the use of the District's locally raised revenue.

Government Securities: The Senate Banking Committee will mark up legislation (S 1247) reauthorizing the 1986 Government Securities Act, the federal law that regulates the \$3.3 trillion government securities market.

Government securities include a wide range of investments from Treasury bonds to the securities of federally chartered agencies such as the Federal National Mortgage Association.

The act expires on Oct. 1, 1991.

The Treasury Department has principal responsibility over the market, but critics say there are too few rules to protect buyers from unscrupulous brokers.

One of the most contentious issues is which agency — the Treasury Department or the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) — should write the rules governing the sale of government securities.

SEC officials say that there is no evidence of widespread abuse in sales practices. However, Treasury officials argue that the increased popularity of government securities has heightened the potential for abuse.

The legislation would expand some rules that currently govern sales of corporate and municipal securities to cover government securities as well.

NOAA Reauthorization. The House Ways and Means Committee is expected to strike a section of a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) reauthorization bill (HR 2130) that would broaden tax benefits for certain research vessels at a markup today.

The House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee added the provisions when it considered the bill in June, but members of the tax-writing panel are concerned that the bill will become a vehicle for tax legislation in the Senate.

Because the Constitution requires that all revenue-raising measures originate in the House, House-passed bills containing tax provisions often attract a host of unrelated tax amendments in the Senate.

The provisions included by the Merchant Marine panel would expand the

tax benefits available under the Capital Construction Fund (CCF) to cover research vessels built for NOAA. The CCF allows shipbuilders to defer taxes on money deposited in the fund that is used to build or renovate ships.

The Ways and Means panel is likely to vote to remove the amendment, both to protect its prerogatives in the House and to retain control over the timing of tax legislation in the Senate.

Veterans' COLA: The House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Compensation will mark up a non-controversial bill (HR 1046) to provide disabled veterans and their survivors with a 5.2 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) as of Dec. 1, 1991. No amendments are expected to be offered to the measure.

The 5.2 percent increase corresponds with the administration's request, and the same COLA has been included in the House-passed fiscal 1992 spending bill (HR 2519) for veterans' programs.

The Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee on June 26 also approved a measure (S 775) that would provide a COLA for disabled veterans. The Senate bill differs slightly from HR 1046 in that it bases the COLA on the Consumer Price Index (CPI), or rate of inflation.

Currently, the Congressional Budget Office projects that the CPI for 1991 will be 5.3 percent.

Natural Gas Pipelines: Legislation aimed at speeding up Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) approval of new natural gas pipelines will be marked up by the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Energy and Power.

Under current law, in order for a pipeline to be approved, an environmental study must be performed, either by FERC or a contractor hired by FERC. But the commission is facing a heavy caseload and may not have enough money next year to conduct environmental studies without lengthy delays.

The bill (HR 2809) would ease this expected backlog by allowing pipeline companies to hire contractors to do the studies, under FERC supervision.

Another measure (HR 1489) slated for markup is designed to lessen potential damage to the environment from natural gas and hazardous liquid pipelines by requiring the Transportation Department to consider potential harm to the environment when setting safety requirements for pipelines.

The bill would codify an existing department practice.

The bill would reauthorize both the Natural Gas Pipeline Safety Act of 1968 and the Hazardous Pipeline Safety Act of 1979. The bill also would require periodic inspections of pipelines in environmentally sensitive or populated areas. ■

(LSC) and Economic Development Administration (EDA) would receive \$350 million and \$226 million, respectively. Before the funds were removed, the House bill called for \$335 million for the LSC and \$246 million for the EDA.

The full committee is scheduled to mark up the bill tomorrow.

GRAZING FEE formula doesn't need change, Lujan says.

The federal fee formula applied to ranchers who graze cattle on public lands does not need to be changed, Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. told a Senate Appropriations panel yesterday.

During a hearing on the fiscal 1992 spending bill for the Interior Department in the Senate Appropriations Interior Subcommittee, Lujan said the administration believes that the current grazing fee — \$1.97 per animal unit per month — is adequate. An animal unit is calculated as the amount of forage needed to feed one cow, or five sheep, for a month.

Western senators such as Harry Reid, D-Nev., expressed concern over efforts to raise the fees, which they said would harm some Western ranchers.

The House on June 25 passed a fiscal 1992 interior spending bill (HR 2686) that would more than quadruple the fee.

Lujan also said he would support minor changes in the 1872 mining law, which governs how public lands are mined. The current \$2.50 per acre fee paid by miners who mine public lands might need to be revised, he said.

Lujan said he supported an administration budget proposal to require a \$100 per year holding fee on acres that are mined under the 1872 law.

SOVIET AID should follow economic reform, experts say.

Unless the Soviet Union moves more aggressively toward privatization and transition to a market economy, the United States should refrain from offering large amounts of economic aid to Moscow, Soviet experts told Congress yesterday.

Boston University Professor Walter Connor told the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Europe and the Middle East that lawmakers should not feel obliged to offer aid to the Soviet Union until it is clear that the former centrally managed economic system has been fully abandoned.

"The West is not responsible for the economic results of 74 years of Soviet history on the wrong economic track and should avoid any assumption, even implied, of such responsibility," Connor said.

Michael Mandelbaum, a scholar at Johns Hopkins University, suggested

that technical aid be given to assist the Soviet oil industry, both to provide the Soviets with more hard currency from oil exports and to increase the "global pool" of available oil.

Asked by subcommittee Chairman Lee H. Hamilton, D-Ind., if the administration should submit the U.S.-Soviet trade agreement for congressional approval, Mandelbaum said yes, adding that enactment of the trade agreement would help increase trade and promote exports between both countries.

POSTAL CHIEF defends bonuses, plans for diversification.

Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank was grilled yesterday by members of the Senate Governmental Affairs Subcommittee on Federal Services, Post Office and Civil Service about bonuses received by postal executives when the agency was losing money.

In fiscal years 1988-90, nearly all of the Postal Service's 1,200 executives received annual bonuses averaging about \$5,000. In all, \$20 million was spent on bonuses in those fiscal years.

Acting Chairman Jim Sasser, D-Tenn., said he found it hard to justify bonuses to executives who managed divisions that lost money. In those three fiscal years, the Postal Service lost about \$1.4 billion. "I couldn't sustain that rationale to my constituents," Sasser added.

Frank defended the bonuses, saying that managers were judged by their overall performance, not just whether they made money. If the sole criteria was profit, Frank told the panel, managers would sacrifice service to balance their budgets.

Frank also noted that many managers performed outstanding service to keep losses to a minimum. For example, the fiscal 1990 deficit was initially projected at \$1.6 billion. But the actual deficit ended up at about half that amount, which Frank called an outstanding performance.

FAMILY VIOLENCE programs need additional funds, panel hears.

Programs that help to prevent family violence were the subject of a hearing yesterday by the Senate Labor Subcommittee on Children, Families, Drugs and Alcoholism.

The panel is looking into the reauthorization of the Family Violence and Prevention Services Act, which authorizes grants to states to assist in preventing domestic violence and providing shelter to victims of abuse. The programs received \$10.7 million this fiscal year.

Subcommittee Chairman Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., said that violence against women is a widespread public health problem that is lacking a systematic response. "There is little awareness, strategy, or cooperation among government,

law enforcement and medicine," he said.

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., testified in support of the programs and discussed his legislation (S 803) that would provide funds to state coalitions that would work with family law judges and the courts to help address family violence.

Stressing the need for more funding, Reid, who sits on the Senate Appropriations Committee, said that an increase in funding would save money down the road in the welfare and justice systems because the programs seek to prevent violence.

The panel also heard from victims of domestic violence. Sherrie Williams of Hartford, Conn., spoke in support of shelters for battered women. "Any cuts in financial aid to the services they provide will result in serious injury and possibly even death to many women," she said.

IRS MODERNIZATION plans examined by House panel.

Officials from the General Accounting Office (GAO) expressed concern yesterday that the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has not sufficiently thought out its proposed program to modernize its tax-processing operations.

The IRS modernization program, which is expected to cost \$8 billion and to take nearly a decade to implement, would bring the agency's computer and telecommunications systems up to date.

To date, more than half a billion dollars have been budgeted through fiscal 1991 for modernization, and the IRS has requested \$427 million more for next year.

But Howard Rhile, director of GAO's General Government Information Systems, told the House Government Operations Commerce, Consumer and Monetary Affairs panel that this money is being spent "without a final plan."

GAO officials also said the IRS should consider making major changes in business operations, such as consolidating its 10 service centers.

Panel members and witnesses alike agreed, however, that modernization was necessary. "If we are to avoid eventual collapse in federal taxation, a big improvement has to be started right now," said subcommittee Chairman Doug Barnard Jr., D-Ga.

BUSH CONTINUES push for B-2 bomber, SDI spending.

President Bush yesterday called for continued production of the B-2 stealth bomber and more spending for the space-based, anti-missile Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI) as subcommittees of the Senate Armed Services Committee began work on the fiscal 1992 defense authorization bill (S 1066).

In a speech to the American Defense Preparedness Association, a defense industry group, Bush reiterated his threat to veto the final defense budget bill if he

finds it "inadequate."

The president criticized the House-passed version of the bill (HR 2100), which authorizes no funds for more B-2 bombers and severely cuts spending for SDI.

The Senate subcommittees are marking up the huge defense blueprint in closed sessions. According to a report by the *Reuters* news agency, the Manpower and Personnel Subcommittee dodged the issue of whether to remove the prohibition on women serving as combat pilots. Instead, the panel decided to hand the question to a presidential commission to decide. The House in May voted to allow women to serve in such a role.

SOUTH AFRICA sanctions removal draws Hill reaction.

Members of Congress reacted yesterday to news reports that President Bush plans to announce, perhaps as early as today, that he is lifting sanctions against South Africa.

The sanctions, imposed in 1986, bar the import of South African coal, steel and agricultural products and ended landing rights for the government-owned South African Airways until the country repealed apartheid laws, freed political prisoners and allowed other political parties to operate.

"No report or notification of Congress is required by the law. Sanctions would be terminated immediately upon issuance of the executive order," a State Department spokeswoman said yesterday.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the Bush administration was being too hasty in ending sanctions. "In its rush to lift sanctions, the administration risks undermining the progress being made in South Africa," he said.

But Sen. Richard G. Lugar, R-Ind., disagreed, saying South Africa was meeting all the conditions for dropping sanctions. "We have won our point. . . . To not take constructive action now is to risk a social backlash that could make South Africa difficult to govern."

THOMAS CALLS on senators, credits NAACP for advancement.

Supreme Court nominee Clarence Thomas yesterday continued to visit with key senators, meeting with Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., and Strom Thurmond, S.C., the ranking Republican on the panel.

Thomas, nominated to succeed retiring Justice Thurgood Marshall, told Thurmond that he was grateful to civil rights leaders. "I have benefited greatly from the civil rights movement, from the justice for whom I am nominated to succeed."

He specifically mentioned the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), which on Monday decided to delay a vote on endorsing Thomas so it could have more

time to study his record and perhaps meet with him.

Meanwhile, Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., responded to Democratic charges that the nomination amounted to filling a quota because Thomas, who is black, would succeed Marshall, currently the only black member of the court.

After meeting with Thomas on Monday, Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, said that he may well be qualified, but his nomination proved that President Bush was "against quotas for every position except the Supreme Court." Bush has opposed a Democratic-backed civil rights bill, contending it would lead to hiring quotas.

Dole rejected Mitchell's contention, saying that if Bush had "sent up liberal activists... you wouldn't hear Sen. Mitchell or Democrats saying anything about quotas."

ARMS CONTROL treaty sent to Senate for ratification.

President Bush sent to the Senate yesterday an arms control treaty that would lead to a dramatic reduction in U.S. and Soviet Union conventional weapons in Europe.

In a message to the Senate accompanying the so-called Conventional Forces in Europe treaty, Bush said the pact "marks the first time in history that European nations, together with the United States and Canada, have agreed to reduce and numerically limit their land-based conventional military equipment."

Bush added that the treaty, signed by 22 nations last November, would eliminate the Soviet advantage in conventional weapons in Europe that has existed since the end of World War II.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee is expected to hold a hearing on the treaty tomorrow, with Secretary of State James A. Brady III scheduled to testify.

SENATE PANEL to focus on consumer issues.

Senate Governmental Affairs Committee Chairman John Glenn, D-Ohio, yesterday announced creation of a new ad hoc Subcommittee on Consumer and Environmental Affairs.

Glenn tapped Connecticut Democrat Joseph I. Lieberman to chair the panel, which will conduct oversight hearings on issues affecting consumers.

Initial hearings in September are expected to focus on the Food and Drug Administration's efforts to protect consumers from faulty drugs, an aide to Lieberman said. Future hearings are also expected on gasoline pricing techniques and the value of vitamin supplements.

The panel is an oversight subcommittee and will not be authorized to draft legislation. ■
