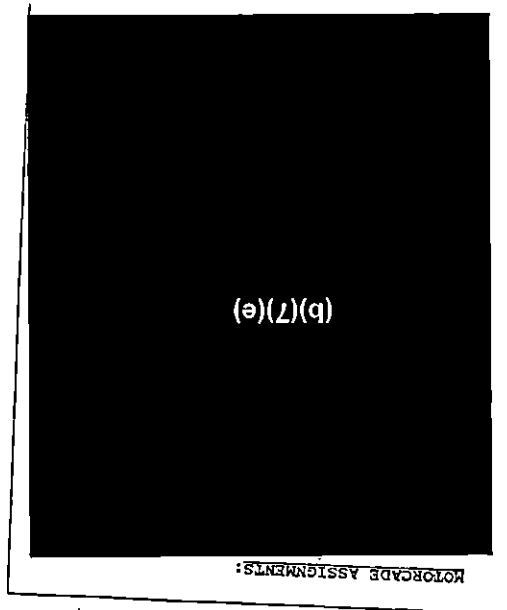

### **BUSH-GORBACHEV MARKS TURNING POINT IN U.S.-SOVIET RELATION**

When Presidents Bush and Gorbachev sign the START treaty in Moscow on Wednesday, they will formally end a quarter-century in which arms control dominated U.S.-Soviet relations.

At the same time, the 11th in a series of summits that began in Geneva in 1985 seems to confirm some basic changes as the U.S.-Soviet relationship shifts from confrontation to cooperation....

"There undoubtedly will be bilateral arms-control issues in the future," said Helmut Sonnenfeldt, a former State Department official now with the Brookings Institution. "But I really think the big issues have to do with the evolution of the Soviet Union and economics and politics in the society and how we and they interact and others and how they interact."

Kim Holmes, director of foreign policy and defense studies at the Heritage Foundation agreed.

"Arms control is becoming increasingly irrelevant as an issue in U.S.-Soviet relations," he said. "The transition moving from arms control to economic issues is not only going to be reflected in the summit; it's already happening."

### **START SUMMIT MARKS NEW ERA**

President Bush's arrival Monday night in Moscow for a summit to sign the historic START treaty marks a dramatic end to superpower clashes over arms control and the beginning of a cooperative relationship based on trade, according to senior Administration officials.

While the START treaty was the main reason for holding the summit, "The fundamental discussions will be on the evolving new relationship with the Soviet Union," said National Security Advisor Scowcroft.

"This is the first summit where the Soviet internal situation is going to be of paramount importance, not only for the Soviets, but for the American side as well," said Dimitri Simes of the Carnegie Endowment of International Peace.

Several senior U.S. officials said the START treaty will be the last arms-control pact the superpowers will agree to for years.

"There seems to be a desire to take a pause, to absorb, to begin implementation of both the START and CFE treaties," said Edward Warner of the Rand Corp.

The White House has brought in advisers from every branch of government and gone outside to the business and academic communities looking for different views on the Kremlin's problems....

"It's intentionally a broad range of experts so (Mr. Bush) doesn't get a narrow focus," said an Administration official....

"Bush is very open to information and ideas," said Oberlin College President Frederick Starr.

ARENS SAYS ISRAEL READY TO JOIN TALKS  
Official Acceptance Termed 'Formality'

Israeli Defense Minister Arens said Sunday that his country is prepared "in principle" to participate in a Middle East peace conference, and that an Israeli official statement of Israel's acceptance is "not more than a formality."...

After an Israeli cabinet meeting Sunday in Jerusalem, however, Immigration Minister Yitshak Peretz said that because of some outstanding problems, "I don't believe we can at this time give a definitive answer," Reuter reported....

"We have reached agreement with the U.S. over the Jordanian-Palestinian delegation and agreed that it should not include anybody from the PLO, nor a resident of Jerusalem," Arens said.

After Sunday's cabinet meeting, Religious Affairs Minister Avner Shaki told reporters, "We're prepared to go to a peace conference, to talk, but we have a few questions the Americans promised to answer, and we're checking with them... Israel has in principle said yes, but this yes is conditioned by the Palestinians not being from East Jerusalem and not being PLO, that's all."

In Cairo, a senior PLO official said that Palestinians would refuse to attend the peace conference unless the PLO receives a formal invitation to attend, Reuter reported.

ISRAEL WAITS FOR U.S. ASSURANCES ON PEACE TALKS

JERUSALEM -- Israel continued to resist pressure for a response to the U.S. peace initiative and officials said they were waiting for American assurances that Palestinians from East Jerusalem would not be invited to the peace table.

Defense Minister Arens, meanwhile Sunday, asserted that Israel would not negotiate with Syria over its claim to the strategically important Golan Heights and the Housing Ministry approved plans to build 380 new apartments in the region....

Israeli newspapers reported Washington has been pushing Palestinian leaders to accept the Israeli insistence that residents of East Jerusalem be excluded from the peace talks.

Quoting diplomatic sources, the Ha'Aretz daily newspaper said the U.S. was promising reluctant Palestinians, who also consider the city their capital, that the city's ultimate fate would be decided later, no matter who represents the delegation in the initial round of negotiations.

Syrian Foreign Minister Shara claimed Friday on "Nightline" that Washington has promised Syria it would force Israel to evacuate the territory at a peace conference. But the U.S. ambassador to Israel, William Brown, denied Sunday that such a promise was made.

## SOVIETS AIM AT MILITARY-INDUSTRIAL COMPLEX

MOSCOW -- Reformists close to President Gorbachev are hoping to use this week's summit meeting to make a case for Western cooperation in drastically reducing the role of the military in Soviet economy....

"The main priority now is to demilitarize our relations altogether," said Georgi Arbatov, director of the U.S.A.- Canada Institute in Moscow.

In a recent interview with Izvestia, one of the Soviet Union's top arms-control negotiators accused his military of obsession with secrecy. Viktor Karpov said it was impossible to draw up realistic plans for conversion without accurate knowledge about the number of people employed in the defense sector, the price of military hardware, and the technological potential of defense plants....

"Simply to cut the defense sector is to drive the country into an impasse it will never find its way out of," Prime Minister Valentin Pavlov told Izvestia. "You can't pay wages in tanks and planes. If you cut military expenditure you have to direct all this money first and foremost into the military industry itself, so that it can learn to produce passenger planes instead of fighters." ## BUSH WARNS IRAQ OVER ATOM SITES

## Despite Deadline, Some Allies Caution Against New Attacks

President Bush warned Iraq Sunday that it would make "an enormous mistake" if it fails to comply with UN demands for an accounting of its nuclear capabilities and said he is confident that U.S. allies would agree to use military force against Baghdad if it proves necessary to gain compliance.

Senior officials from the Soviet Union, Turkey and other countries, however, cautioned against air attacks on Iraq....

Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman Vitaly Churkin on CNN's "Newsmaker Sunday" cautioned against the use of force against Iraq, saying it would have "negative consequences...larger than may be the intended goal of those actions."

Turkish Prime Minister Mesut Yilmaz also ruled out the use of his country's air bases for an allied air strike against Iraq....

"There might be other ways to get at the problems without having a massive bombing campaign," Sen. Bradley said on "Meet The Press." "At the same time I wouldn't foreclose the possibility."

Appearing on the same program, Sen. Dole concurred, saying that he is planning to introduce legislation that "would, in effect, underscore the need to keep that option open and to affirm the President's right to proceed." (Gary Lee, Washington Post, A1)

**MIAMI** -- Governor Wilder, talking like a presidential candidate, is heavily criticizing fellow Democrats and President Bush....

**BROWN: BUSH HAS NO U.S. RECOVERY PLAN**

**NEW YORK** -- DNC chairman Ron Brown, in a fresh attack on the Bush Administration's domestic policies, said the President has formulated a recovery plan for several countries, but none for the U.S. "I think it's a tragedy. This Administration has an economic recovery plan for the Soviet Union...for Eastern Europe...for Kuwait and South and Central America. We need an economic recovery plan for New York. We need an economic recovery plan for America," Brown said.

"This Administration has no domestic agenda, and the fact is that the 1992 presidential election is gonna be decided on basic bread and butter/kitchen table economic issues," Brown said. "The middle class has suffered because George Bush has neglected them. I don't know what George Bush is running for secretary general of the UN or president of the world."

Brown also charged the President with trying to polarize Americans along racial lines to ensure his re-election, structuring a media campaign similar to the "Willie Horton platform," which he said reinforced white American fears of black criminals.

Asked if the Bush Administration was "playing race games" by its failure to correct the census undercount in cities, nominating Clarence Thomas, and opposition to affirmative action, Brown said, "It's a terrible charge to make.... But I would say the evidence is certainly mounting to be able to make that charge." (UPI)

### IRAQ/PEACE TALKS/SUMMIT

NBC's Tom Brokaw: Today the President was keeping his focus on the Middle East, sending another stern warning to Saddam Hussein. Iraq will be on the unofficial agenda when the President arrives tomorrow night for two days of talks with Soviet President Gorbachev and to sign a new arms-control agreement.

NBC's Jim Miklaszewski: Sneaking off for one last round of golf before he takes off tomorrow for the Moscow summit, President Bush was peppered with questions not about the Soviets, but Saddam.

(TV coverage: President Bush playing golf.)

Even as a new team of UN inspectors has arrived in Iraq, the President accused Saddam Hussein of concealing his nuclear weapons capability and appeared to threaten military action.

(President Bush: "Regrettably, there's a strong feeling that he is not coming totally clean, and therein he's making an enormous mistake.")

But Administration officials confirm that key Arab partners in the Gulf War coalition, like Egypt's Hosni Mubarak and Saudi Arabia's King Fahd, are reluctant to resume bombing. That goes for some Democrats in Congress, as well.

(Sen. Bradley: "Bombing could be excessive. There might be other ways that you could get at the problems without having a massive bombing campaign. So I would be cautious.")

It's the same kind of apprehension the President encountered before the war. But Bush sounded confident he'd get support for military strikes if it came time.

(President Bush: "My own view is that if lying and cheating continues, you'd see the countries of the world come together and say: We've got to do something about this.")

And he got some of that support today.

(Sen. Dole: "I don't think anybody wants to kill or injure any innocent people in Iraq, but we'd like to figure out some way for Saddam Hussein to go.")

He also got some encouraging news from Israel. Defense Minister Moshe Arens said today that Israel would agree to a peace conference with its Arab neighbors.

(Defense Minister Arens: "I think we're very close to a general agreement that will allow the initial meeting to take place and then break up into bilateral talks.")

Administration officials say, however, that Israel has not formally notified the President, and cautioned that even if the talks are held, it's just another step in the long Mideast peace process.

(TV coverage: President Bush arriving at White House.)

But the Arens statement today appears to clear the way for George Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev to issue formal invitations to a Mideast peace conference when they sit down together in Moscow and, as one White House official puts it, talk about the world's hot spots.

(NBC-Lead)

CBS's Randall Pinkston: Setting off on a final round of golf before the Moscow summit, President Bush issued a warning to Saddam Hussein: Stop stalling and reveal what's left of Iraq's nuclear weapons program.

(President Bush: "Regrettably, there's a strong feeling that he is not coming totally clean, and therein he's making an enormous mistake.")

Renewed bombing against Iraq remains what the President called a very viable option. But the U.S. may not be able to count on the same allies that backed use of force against Iraq during the Gulf War, like the Soviet Union.

(TV coverage: President Bush with Gorbachev at economic summit.)

(Vitaly Churkin, spokesman: "[Inaudible] I think cannot be met with equally unanimous approval by the international community as was the case during Iraqi aggression against Kuwait.")

Turkey is also cool to the proposal. While allied forces used Turkish air bases to fly strikes against Saddam during the war, the prime minister now says his government will not allow the bases to be used for renewed strikes. The President told reporters he's not pushing for immediate action.

(President Bush: "There are mixed degrees of enthusiasm or lack of enthusiasm about using force. But I think there is a unanimity that this lying and secreting of material must stop.")

And from key senators today, support for the President's firm line.

(Bradley: "I don't think that you should foreclose the use of force.")

(Dole: "He ought to understand this time that the threat is not an empty threat and that it could be exercised.")

President Bush leaves tomorrow morning for the superpower summit in Moscow. Iraq's nuclear weapons will be one of several important topics on the agenda, highlighted by the signing of a treaty to reduce long-range nuclear missiles. (CBS-Lead)

CBS's Allen Pizzey reports Saddam accused the West of caring more about dogs and cats than about the plight of 18 million Iraqis. The U.S., Saddam warned, is not in charge of Iraq. He told his audience to tell their children everyday that the West was the cause of their suffering. But in the streets, the usual rhetoric has done nothing to quell fears that the U.S. and its allies are winding up for another round of bombing. (CBS-2)

ABC's Forrest Sawyer reports Iraq today presented UN inspectors with new information about its nuclear program. Saddam issued his harshest attack yet on the sanctions, telling his people Western leaders hate them and want to starve them.

ABC's Jim Bittermann reports Iraqis are blaming the sanctions for everything. But there may be more to blame. For instance, sanctions have not stopped a steady flow of goods from Jordan. They ensure, among other things, that there's no shortage of liquor in Baghdad. UN officials said after a recent trip that they saw no signs the Iraqi military has used its equipment, medical supplies or manpower to help suffering civilians. (ABC-9)

## SUPERPOWER SUMMIT

**Sawyer:** Tomorrow morning at dawn, President Bush plans to leave for Moscow and prepare to sign the most complicated arms-control agreement in history, one that has been nine years in the making. U.S. and Soviet negotiators put the last touches on the 600-page document this weekend. The official signing will be the easy part of this summit. The hard issues are bread and butter.

**ABC's Ann Compton:** This afternoon President Bush was clearly anxious to begin the Moscow summit, which was delayed five months because the Gulf War intruded and the last major arms-control treaty with the Soviets was not ready for signing. It is now.

**(President Bush:** "This is the first post-Cold War summit, in a sense, and a lot has happened -- a lot of change still going on.") Those changes are economic and political ones within the Soviet Union, and they have become the focal point of the Moscow summit. President Bush intends to bring with him some support for Mikhail Gorbachev's reforms, including advice on getting food to market, expertise on getting Soviet oil out of the ground efficiently, and possibly most favored nation trading status for Soviet exports.

**(President Bush:** "There have been some technical hangups, but I'd like to see that matter resolved, and I think it can be very soon."

**Reporter:** "On the trip?"

**President Bush:** "Well, stay tuned. Let's save a little excitement for you on this trip.")

Politically, Mr. Bush will be the first American president to reach out to individual Soviet republics. He will call on Boris Yeltsin, president of the largest republic.

**(TV coverage:** President Bush with Yeltsin.)

He will visit Kiev, capital of the Ukraine. And he will applaud the proposed union treaty that would put more economic power in local hands, although there was a note of caution sounded today by former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger on "This Week With David Brinkley."

**(Henry Kissinger:** "Above all, I think the United States ought to stay out of it because we could get ourselves caught in a civil war and in a domestic conflict that we have absolutely no way of managing.")

President Bush is determined to bring Mikhail Gorbachev closer to Western politics and hopes the two presidents will co-sponsor any Middle East peace conference. So for both men, this summit is an important beginning.

(ABC-Lead)

**ABC's Jim Laurie** reports this is a summit with more goodwill than any in memory. But experts warn the arms treaty is not enough.

**(Boris Surikov,** retired Soviet general: "This arms treaty is only tiny step. We will still have 7,000 nuclear warheads pointed at us. We must take more steps together. We will not disarm on our own.")

**(Alexander Bevz,** Soviet economist: "I think that part of this debt should be put on a medium- and a long-term basis to normalize the situation. Otherwise we'll face very unpleasant consequences.") The planned meeting by President Bush with Yeltsin and Ukrainian leaders concerns some Gorbachev aides.

Laurie continues:

(Igor Malashenko, Soviet spokesman: "I do hope, of course, that some radical, nationalist leaders are not encouraged by the United States. I think it's nobody's interest to destabilize the situation in the Soviet Union.")

President Bush arrives here with Gorbachev still playing his domestic balancing act, vying for power with the republics and forcing essential changes in the Communist Party. The Bush visit, it's hoped, will help keep him on course. (ABC-2)

NBC's Jim Maceda reports Gorbachev has indicated traditional summitry is about to change.

(Vitaly Ignatenko: Soviet spokesman: "The forthcoming summit will open a new period, during which economic issues and regional cooperation will top the agenda.")

The Soviets hope a trade agreement, signed at last year's summit, but never ratified by Congress, will be announced here.

(TV coverage: President Bush at economic summit; President Bush and Gorbachev at 1990 summit.)

The START treaty should help Gorbachev cut the military budget without raising hardliners' fears of a loss of national security. And there is hope beyond START.

(Yuri Andreev, Soviet academic: "Maybe this economic cooperation will also help us for further steps in the cuts in the nuclear offensive weapons.")

For now Gorbachev may not get more than Bush's ear on economic cooperation, but by getting Bush's signature on START, prospects for future relations can only get brighter. (NBC-4)

CBS's Bill Plante reports there's a radically different view of this week's summit.

(Michael Mandelbaum, Council on Foreign Affairs: "This summit is the end of an era. I think that insofar as summits have been defined as the meeting points of two leaders who are bitter political rivals and have it within their power to destroy the world, this is the last summit.")

(TV coverage: President Bush with Gorbachev at economic summit.)

(Sergei Plekhanov, CBS consultant: "They certainly will be less dramatic, but they will remain a very important mechanism. We're talking about the two superpowers which are still overarmed, which are the two only nations which really have global role.")

There is likely to be less talk at this summit about such traditional concerns as human rights and arms control, and that could mean a diminished role for the U.S.

(Mandelbaum: "If present trends continue, the Soviet Union will want to talk more about economics and less about security. And if that is the case, the Soviets will be talking less to the United States and more to the Western community as a whole.") (CBS-4)

**MIDDLE EAST**

Sawyer reports President Assad has told the Washington Post Israel must be willing to give up the occupied territories for peace. Yasser Arafat today said the talks will mean little without his organization.

Sawyer continues:

(Yasser Arafat: "No talks with the PLO? OK. With whom are they going to make peace? This meeting is not a peace. This is a settlement, a temporary settlement.")

ABC's Dean Reynolds reports Arens said on "This Week With David Brinkley" that Israel's response is now just a formality.

(Arens: "Based on the agreements we reached during Secretary Baker's visit here, in the principle the answer is positive.") And that is in line with recent polls, showing almost 80 percent of Israelis want a peace conference.

(Arens: "We have to deal, we have to talk, we have to negotiate. Without trying, we don't have anything.")

(Shimon Peres: "In this, there is no [inaudible] to compromise. But it's obvious the two sides have to compromise.")

Peres said today east Jerusalem Palestinians should be allowed to negotiate. President Bush had hoped to be able to say at the Moscow summit this week that there will be a Mideast peace conference this October. But tonight Israeli television said the still-unresolved Palestinian issue makes it virtually impossible for Israel to meet that Moscow timetable. (ABC-4)

CBS's Mary Alice Williams reports that in Iran today, there was sharp criticism of the Arab states for their support of the U.S. peace proposals. Iran's ruling council is accusing the Arabs of selling out by giving in to Israeli demands that the PLO not be allowed to participate. (NBC-5)

NBC's Martin Fletcher reports Palestinian fundamentalists put out a leaflet instructing their supporters not to back the peace process. Fundamentalist power and influence is growing. Radical Palestinians promise the more talk there is of peace, the more violent they'll be on the West Bank and Gaza Strip. (NBC-6)

CBS's Barry Petersen reports Israel moved closer today toward acceptance of the U.S. plan, but didn't take the final step.

(Avner Shaki, religious affairs minister: "Israel has in principle said yes, but this yes is conditioned by the Palestinians not being from east Jerusalem and not being the PLO. That's all.")

(Yosi Ben Aharon, Shamir aide: "For us, introducing the PLO into the process could be not just a deal breaker. It could blow up the entire process.")

(Arafat: "Do you think that there will be any Palestinian is ready -- will be ready to go without the approval from the PLO?")

(Hanan Ashrawi, Palestinian leader: "I doubt that any Arab sites will embark on negotiations without the Palestinians, and I know for sure that no Palestinian will enter a negotiating process without east Jerusalem.")

Assad has told Newsweek: "Naturally, no peace can be established if one party continues to occupy another party's land." And the roadblocks to peace got a little higher, with signals from Israel that it will continue its aggressive building in areas the Arabs claim is theirs. The latest announcement: an additional 380 houses on the Golan Heights. (CBS-3)

**YUGOSLAVIA**

Williams reports some 45,000 demonstrators, most of them young people, turned out at Sarajevo, calling for an end to the ethnic violence. Meantime, sporadic clashes between Croatian forces and Serbian nationalists continued despite a tenuous cease-fire.

(NBC-7)

**TRANSPORTATION BILL**

NBC's Henry Champ reports on Congress' transportation bill. Almost every congressman has money set off for his district. But there isn't any embarrassment. Congressmen say they know better than the state governments and Washington what their districts need.

(Rep. Roe: "Congress itself is now saying they are fed up with the bureaucrats -- unelected -- who answer to nobody, who have all the answers to everything in America, but the American people can't get anything done.")

(Rep. Traficant: "I didn't go on the public-works committee for cerebral stimulation. My community needed help.")

(Secretary Skinner: "If in fact this bill contained all great projects that had gone through all of the analysis, we wouldn't be objecting to the projects.")

You can call it pork if you want. The congressmen intend to challenge the White House and special-interest groups and take even more in the future.

## ABC -- THIS WEEK WITH DAVID BRINKLEY

**Moderator:** David Brinkley. **Panel:** Sam Donaldson, Cokie Roberts.  
**Guests:** Defense Minister Arens, Henry Kissinger, Soviet Deputy Spokesman Igor Malashenko.

**On Soviet relations:** with Malashenko.

**Malashenko:** ...I would say that nobody in Moscow is disappointed about G-7 Summit at London, and it was very positively perceived back in the Soviet Union. And President Gorbachev delivered this message to the leaders of the nine republics, whom he met shortly after his arrival from London, and they accepted and approved this news, and nobody was also disappointed. So I would say it was a very positive development.

**Roberts:** Is there any discussion there about stopping [aid to Cuba]?

**Malashenko:** Well, actually, it's a very much debated domestic issue in the Soviet Union.... It is being cut already to Cuba. And Cubans themselves know this fact much better than anybody else.... But generally, it's perceived as a heavy burden for the Soviet economy...and many people would like to get rid of this burden basically. But they still feel some kind of a moral commitment, and it's very difficult to make this kind of a decision.

**Brinkley:** Do you think the Communist Party will go out of business, will eventually just disappear?

**Malashenko:** I do not think so after the last plenary session of the central committee, because there was a preliminary approval of a very radical party program, which doesn't have anything to do with old ideological cliches, with all this class struggle and things like that. So it's very liberal, and I would say it's almost surprisingly progressive, and there was very little opposition. So probably the Communist Party is still able to reform and we will see it very soon actually during the next party congress, this November, when this party will be discussed. And if it is adopted, I think it will be very different party. Probably the very name of it will be changed.

**On Soviet relations:** with Kissinger.

**Kissinger:** We ought to stay out of the internal political context because the players keep changing roles all the time and I think the internal conflict is primarily for the Soviet Union to settle.... What would be best for us would be a sort of a federal or confederal solution in which...they are strong enough to defend themselves, but not well enough united so that they can menace their neighbors.... But above all, I think the United States ought to stay out of it because we could get ourselves caught in a civil war and in a domestic conflict that we have absolutely no way of managing.

On the Middle East:

Kissinger: I think Israel will go to a peace conference and should go to a peace conference. I think it's wrong to put all the onus on Israel, because they're in a very difficult position.... I have always believed that Israel has to give up or should give up some of the territory that it has occupied.

Roberts: Do you trust Assad?

Kissinger: No, I don't...but it depends on what you mean by trust. I believe that if a balance of forces can be established, that Assad has been meticulous in keeping the agreements he has made in which the United States has been a party. When one says Assad is committed to reconciliation with Israel, I don't think that even translates into Arabic for him.... I have found him to be a reliable negotiating partner if one doesn't get too emotional and if one doesn't put it in abstract philosophical terms which have no meaning to him.

On Iraq's nuclear program:

Kissinger: Last year, I was in favor of very strong action. But I do not think we will have the same support, and I think it would be a very risky course to take. And we have to be careful that we don't look like the international bully.

On the Middle East: With Arens.

Arens: To tell you the truth, we don't really feel that we're being pushed.... I think that we're very close to a general agreement that will allow the initial meeting to take place and then break up into bilateral talks.... Based on the agreements that we've reached during Secretary Baker's visit here, in principle, the answer is positive.

Donaldson: Why yesterday did you announce another...300 families to be settled in the Golan Heights?

Arens: ...The right of the Jews to live in this area has been established for ages, has been given international recognition.... To the best of my knowledge, and with all due respect, the United States government has not held that the settlements in the area are illegal. They are not illegal....

Roberts: Do you feel completely confident that you have the United States government behind you, or do you have any fears that there might be some degree of abandonment of Israel?

Arens: We have a very close relationship with the United States.... However, once we enter direct negotiations, it will be a matter between us and the parties with whom we negotiate.

POLITICAL DISCUSSION

On the recession: Tom Wicker joins the panel.

Donaldson: My guess is that yes, we're going to recover from the recession.... But when? I think it's going to take a much longer time. I think it's maybe next year before we're really able to say we're getting out of it.

Wicker: It's political now to claim that it's over because there's been a relative -- a very small -- gain in the GNP. I think the key politically here is the question of unemployment, and I'm not sure that even a relatively steady recovery in the next year is going to do much about the numbers of people that are unemployed.

Roberts: It's also true that the Democrats have not been...ready to do anything about it. It's the first recession that I've seen where there's not been any kind of anti-recession bill going through the Congress, anything like that.... I think they're scared.

On the 1992 election:

Donaldson: ...A lot of people think [Rockefeller] wants to run, but some people tell me that his wife, Sharon, is against him running. She does not want the family exposed to that kind of publicity.

## NBC -- MEET THE PRESS

Moderator: Tim Russert. Panel: Elizabeth Drew, David Broder.  
Guests: Sen. Dole, Sen. Bradley.

### On the Middle East:

Dole: I think there's sufficient pressure now on Israel. I think it might be counterproductive to try to, in effect, force Shamir to the peace table. My view is that there's no real urgency....

### On Iraq's nuclear program:

Bradley: I don't think that you should ever foreclose the use of force.... [But] why would we be doing this? We have difficulty locating the various nuclear components now.... Bombing could be excessive. There might be other ways that you could get at the problems without having a massive bombing campaign. So I would be cautious.

### On the summit:

Bradley: I think it would be a big mistake for [Bush] to go to Kiev and simply be a prop for the old regime, for Gorbachev and the rest. I think it's very important that he meet with reformers when he is there, and very important that he uphold principles such as democracy and human rights.

Broder: Does the president have his priorities wrong?

Dole: ...There is a necessity right now to take some of these trips, to sit down to the Soviets, to sit down with the G-7, as he did last week. That's a responsibility the President has.

Bradley: One bit of message for the President, though, in Moscow: Please don't leave taxpayer dollars in Moscow.

### On domestic policy:

Bradley: ...What the problem is, in my opinion, is middle-income families out there under real financial pressure, and I don't see a lot that the President has done that'll give them any relief whatsoever, and I think that that's what people are talking about.

Dole: ...President Bush has told me directly as recently as the last week he wants to sign a civil rights bill. He's not ducking the civil rights responsibility.

Russert: Do you think the president wants a civil rights bill?

Bradley: I don't know. He hasn't indicated any real willingness to talk or compromise. He called off American business when they were seeking...to get an agreement.... I don't think he's a racist, that's for sure. I do think, however, he hasn't been above using race to get votes in a divisive way in a number of points in his career.

Russert: Why did it take the Democrats until the end of the recession to do something for the unemployed?

Bradley: ...I think that one answer is the budget; the other answer is the war. But, in fact, neither are acceptable. I think the main point is that we are now moving on extended benefits and we hope that the President will sign the bill....

Dole: I think we ought to give the President two options. One, that you pay for it, and one, you declare it an emergency. But in either event, you ought to reduce the cost. We could work out a bipartisan arrangement this week, and I have been talking with Dick Darman and the Secretary of labor, trying to convince them that we ought to address this problem. Then we might get it done before the week [is over]....

On MIAs in Vietnam:

Dole: ...What I'd like to see happen this week is for the President to have a presidential commission.... We might be able to weed out some of these people whom I think have got something pretty good going here.

On the BCCI scandal and Gates nomination:

Drew: Does this have any implications for the Gates nomination?

Dole: ...I don't believe we know.... Maybe this time we ought to have the facts before we start the allegations.

Bradley: ...I think that the whole issue around Iran-Contra [and Gates]...is a small part of the total picture. It relates also to candor and to judgment. Relates to impartiality, in assessments, of intelligence....

On the 1992 campaign:

Russert: If President Bush surprised all of us and announced he wasn't going to run, would you give it another shot?

Dole: ...I might.

**POLITICAL DISCUSSION**

Russert: David, a couple of months ago you declared the President as brain dead, the Democrats brain dead. How's the patient doing?

Broder: I think there's some wave of activity. Interestingly, Dick Gephardt...has sort of taken on the assignment of trying to orchestrate a message about domestic policy. But he realizes that he has only about two or three months to try to pull that together before all of the focus shifts to the Democratic presidential candidates, and there are likely to be different messages, not a single message.... I think Harkin and Rockefeller will be in probably by Labor Day, and perhaps one or two others.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** CBS's "Face The Nation" discussed violent crime and how it is depicted by the movie industry.

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## THE McLAUGHLIN GROUP

Moderator: John McLaughlin. Panel: Fred Barnes, Jack Germond, Eleanor Clift, Morton Kondracke.

### On the summit:

McLaughlin: Any surprises at next week's Moscow summit?

Clift: We've had our surprise, and that is how far that Gorbachev is willing to go in denouncing and renouncing communism.... The other surprise is scripted in, and that is the two superpowers may be able to announce a Middle Eastern peace conference, but it looks like Shamir is going to stall so that will not become a reality....

Barnes: ...The real story is that...reality has dawned on President Bush and he realizes he needs a two-track policy -- Gorbachev on one hand and the emerging leaders of the republics, of the democratic movement...and that is going to be the emphasis here....

Kondracke: ...The surprise will come for George Bush himself when he goes to the Ukraine and he finds out just how dissident and how independence-minded this republic is. He has this idea that the nine-plus-one treaty means that the Soviet Union, the center, is going to hold. What he's going to find out...is that those people want, practically speaking, to be out of the Soviet Union, too.... He's going to show that he has not got all his eggs in the Gorbachev basket....

### On the Middle East:

Clift: [Bush] needs [Gorbachev] to put his weight behind the peace process and to pry the Arab nations to give more, and what you're going to see is, Jim Baker and Mr. Bessmertnykh are going to be the new duo and they're going to probably travel together maybe to the Middle East to force this thing through.

Germond: Until Shamir is ready to move on that, what the U.S. and Soviet Union do jointly is not that important.

Kondracke: ...The formal invitation to the peace conference is not going to be delivered because they're not going to embarrass Shamir and they're not going to embarrass the Palestinians....

McLaughlin: Will [Bush and Gorbachev] form a united diplomatic front to force through a Middle East peace conference?

Barnes: They will, but Gorby doesn't matter. It's all George Bush's muscle.

Kondracke: They're not going to say: OK, it's going to be held on such and such a day and anybody who doesn't show up is a bad guy.

On the BCCI scandal and Gates nomination:

Kondracke: ...The problem is Clark Clifford and Robert Altman... who seem to have allowed BCCI to take over the bank without informing the Federal Reserve.... The CIA used this dirty bank in order to fund various activities. The question is, did Robert Gates know about it?...

Clift: ...At the very least, it's going to help bring down Gates' nomination....

On the 1992 campaign:

Barnes: ...The [Democrats'] attack strategy will not work at all because Bush is a foreign-policy President. People like the President to be that way. But what the Democrats do have is a strategy behind that, in which they are going to appeal to middle-class voters, and there is a vulnerability there that they can use....

Germond: ...Each one of these Democrats who isn't running for President...they have to demonstrate to their fellow Democrats that they're going to get right in his face and savage him...

Clift: The President's election-year strategy is to travel around the world.... It seems to me that the American people are not going to put up with a second term that looks like they're going to buy a trip for George Bush.

Kondracke: [Democrats] have to do more than tap into unease. They have to have an answer to the problems of the unease and I don't see it in the Democrats yet.

Germond: ...The Democrats already have more of a domestic program than the Administration. George Bush got elected on Willie Horton and trash last time....

**PREDICTIONS**

Clift: Republican delegates will modify the party's position on abortion by adding language that abortion is a matter of conscience.

Barnes: Speaker Foley will authorize an October Surprise investigation, but it will be low-key because Democratic leaders don't think it'll turn up anything conclusive.

Germond: Sen. Robb will be replaced by Sen. Bradley as head of the Democratic Senate Campaign Committee.

Kondracke: If George Bush vetoes the fetal-research bill and additional funds for breast cancer, he is going to suffer grievously in the next election.

## INSIDE WASHINGTON

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**Moderator:** Tina Gulland. **Panel:** Charles Krauthammer, Carl Rowan, Elizabeth Drew, Tom Oliphant.

### On Iraq's nuclear program:

**Gulland:** Do you think that it's a good decision to hold off on bombing, at least for now?

**Drew:** The Administration had a number of reasons for not going ahead at this time. Despite whatever the polls say, I think it is highly possible that it will go ahead at some time in the future, both to knock out the nuclear equipment and Saddam Hussein.

**Oliphant:** And that may be necessary because this is serious business. But it should be a last resort, not a first resort. This is not January the 15th and this is not the same Saddam.

**Krauthammer:** ...He is allowing inspection and he is telling us information piece by piece. As long as he does, we should hold off. But he's only telling us because he knows that if he stops telling us, we're going to send our bombers in, and we should if that occurs.... I think [easing sanctions] is a very bad idea. First of all, there's no way Saddam is going to feed his children; he's going to feed his army. And second of all, if he's allowed to sell oil...there'll be leakage around the edges and its going to end up breaking the embargo. I think the only answer is for us to give direct humanitarian aid of our own, under our control....

**Rowan:** ...You could have a situation where that oil is sold with the determination that the UN agency spends it, that they buy the food, they deliver the food, and Saddam does not become a hero.

### On the Middle East:

**Drew:** ...[Baker] got a lot further than conventional wisdom thought he would, so I'm prepared to put conventional wisdom in the back seat for a while.

**Oliphant:** ...I would predict now that I can see the dim outlines of an arrangement where Syria, to an extent, can come back on the Golan Heights and that there can be a peace treaty between Israel and Syria.

**Krauthammer:** ...[The Palestinians] are the big losers here. Assad obviously doesn't really care to be their champion.... They have no one sticking up for them and that's why, in this position of real weakness of the Palestinians, I think they will have to accept Israel's position on representation.... To make a decision on which your existence hinges and do it by Monday because it has to fit [Bush's] schedule is a little bit of a push, and I'm glad the Administration has pulled back on that.

On the Soviet Union:

Oliphant: ...A ball that Gorbachev hit all the way out of the ballpark, and that is to actually consummate the all-union treaty with nine of the republics' presidents, including at least some vague language involving a settlement of the tax issue. That is an amazing breakthrough that paves the way for businesses to invest in the Soviet Union.

On the BCCI scandal and Gates nomination:

Oliphant: Dragging its feet is being too kind to our Justice Department. This is Keystone Kops behavior on an international scandal of gargantuan proportions.... People who love conspiracies are going to love this story as it unfolds. It's going to go into all the corners of American political life....

Drew: We have to be a little careful because this town is awash in rumors.... But there's a truly alarming proportion of this as regards to the U.S.... If the CIA, as alleged, was doing business with this bank, the question arises: Why?... I do not think this is the only bank that would have cooperated....

Krauthammer: We have a tendency, I think, whenever a great event happens, to turn to our government and say: Why didn't you stop it or anticipate it?... The CIA is in the business of deception.... You would expect...it's going to use a bank with international connections...and which is very, very lightly regulated.... The allegation that the CIA...stopped any investigations because of its use of the bank is very serious, but I haven't seen any evidence yet that supports that.

Oliphant: ...The idea [the CIA] needs to use a bank controlled by criminals, run by criminals, with criminals its principal clients, is preposterous and unacceptable. We have information already that Mr. Gates...was at least aware of the dimensions of BCCI's wrongdoings as long as three years ago....
