ISRAEL READY TO SWAP ALL ARAB PRISONERS FOR HOSTAGES, SOLDIERS

LONDON -- Israel is ready to swap all Lebanese prisoners for the remaining 10 Western hostages and seven Israeli soldiers missing or held captive in Lebanon, an Israeli diplomat said Tuesday.

Uriel Savir, Israel's consul-general in New York, told BBC TV that there were grounds for cautious optimism that the hostage crisis might be moving toward a resolution....

Savir, asked what the next move should be, said that as a basis for negotiation Israel wanted information about the fate of seven Israeli servicemen held captive or missing in Lebanon.

"We insist on having that information. We have to know it as a basis for negotiation which Israel is ready to have in order to swap all of the Lebanese that are in our hands against all Western hostages and our own boys of course as well," he added.

Israeli Deputy Foreign Minister Netanyahu, interviewed on BBC radio, affirmed his country's willingness to swap all Lebanese prisoners for the seven missing Israelis.

We are not saying one-for one. We are saying we are prepared to consider the release of all the Lebanese prisoners detained in south Lebanon, some detained in Israeli jails, in exchange for our servicemen," he said.

"What we are interested in is a prisoner-to-prisoner exchange. But if in the course of such an exchange there can be an arrangement whereby Western hostages can be released as well we'd be delighted."

JERUSALEM -- ...Today's radio and newspaper reports suggest Israel is considering a change in tactics, whereby it would undertake in principle to release the detainees, in exchange for information on its missing soldiers.

ISRAELIS, CAPTORS NEAR DEAL

TEL AVIV -- ...Muslim fundamentalist sources in Beirut told Reuters that the broad outline of a deal to free the 11 Westerners for hundreds of Arabs held by Israel had been agreed upon last week.

The sources appeared to corroborate a report by two French newspapers saying the U.S., Britain and Shi'ite Muslim extremists held secret talks in Paris recently to arrange the release of the hostages.

During the talks, Le Monde and Le Parisien reported, it was agreed that the release of British hostage McCarthy and American hostage Tracy would precede that of Sheik Obeid.

Then, the remaining Western hostages would be released and the fate of seven Israelis missing in Lebanon resolved, the reports said. After that, Israel would free 400 Lebanese prisoners, they said.

U.S. OPTIMISTIC AS OFFER ON HOSTAGES IN LEBANON ASSESSED

KENNEBUNKPORT -- The U.S. is guardedly optimistic that a letter from the Islamic Jihad could help open the way for the release of Western hostages but diplomatic efforts are seeking to clarify the meaning of the message sent to the U.N....

The French newspaper Le Monde said the release of Sheik Obeid would be followed by the release 10 Western hostages in Lebanon and a detailed accounting of seven Israeli soldiers missing in Lebanon....

Britain also urged Israel Monday to release some Arab prisoners, saying this would maintain a momentum toward freedom for the remaining Western hostages.. (Laurence McQuillan, Reuter)

**U.N., ISRAEL SNAGGED ON HOSTAGES
Kidnappers Silent On Missing Soldiers**

JERUSALEM -- A meeting between two senior Israeli defense officials and U.N. Secretary General Perez de Cuellar in Geneva failed to produce a breakthrough in negotiations over hostages in the Middle East, and there is no sign so far that Israel's demand for information on its missing servicemen in Lebanon will be met, official sources said here Monday....

Defense Minister Arens said he saw "an opening for hope" in the Islamic Jihad letter because it indicated the kidnappers' willingness to make a deal and invited U.N. involvement, Reuter reported....

Sources said that Uri Lubrani and Johanan Bein, received no indication from Perez de Cuellar that the kidnappers were willing to meet Israel's demand that its servicemen be included in a hostage exchange. (Jackson Diehl, Washington Post, A13)

**THE FATE OF HOSTAGES DEPENDS ON
DEAL BETWEEN ISRAEL AND RADICAL MUSLIMS**

The fate of the 11 Western hostages remaining in Lebanon depends on whether the U.N. can convince Israel and radical Muslims to exchange other prized prisoners that each side has been unwilling or unable to surrender....

U.S. officials said one reason the kidnappers have not offered to include any Israelis as part of a comprehensive deal is that some of the Israeli prisoners or remains are believed to be in the hands of a separate group of Palestinians.

"Any Israelis held dead or alive are the most valuable possession of the hostage-holders," said a U.S. official Monday. "They may be saving them for the later stages of bargaining."

The official, who requested anonymity, also said the Administration believes the kidnappers' "bottom line" is freedom for the Shiite prisoners in southern Lebanon, not all Arab prisoners worldwide.

Meanwhile, Iran, seemed to complicate the negotiations Monday by saying it would use its influence to help achieve a hostage exchange only if it receives solid word on the fate of four Iranians missing in Lebanon since 1982. An Administration official said Monday that a U.S. investigation concluded that all four Iranians are dead and that the information was passed on to Iran. (Owen Ullman, Knight-Ridder)

U.N. CHIEF REVEALS LETTER ON HOSTAGES
Officials Note Ambiguities In Communique

U.N. Secretary General Perez de Cuellar Monday said he was "a little more hopeful" after revealing the contents of a letter from Islamic Jihad that says the Shiite Muslim group would free all its hostages "within 24 hours" if the U.N. chief wins the release of its "freedom fighters" detained around the world.

The kidnappers' lengthy letter was filled with polemical attacks on the West but vague on specifics about what the radical group wants Perez de Cuellar to do....

"Nobody quite knows what that means," President Bush told reporters in Kennebunkport.

The consensus of several nongovernmental experts interviewed after they studied the text was that "it is not an encouraging document," in the words of former assistant secretary of state Richard Murphy....

The German government said Monday it would not consider any deal involving its prisoners.

Asked if he thought that an end to the hostage crisis was near, Perez de Cuellar replied: "I would not say near, but nearer than before."...

According to Reuter, confidence that a hostage deal is at hand prompted Islamic Jihad to release McCarthy and Edward Tracy.

KIDNAPPERS OFFER TRADE FOR 'ALL DETAINEES'

A letter from Lebanese kidnappers made public in Geneva Monday offered to trade release of Western hostages for the freedom of "all detainees" worldwide -- a message that was vague but gave officials from Washington to Jerusalem cause for hope....

In London, the Times reported in Tuesday's editions that the fundamentalist Muslim group Hezbollah has offered to free two Israeli servicemen in exchange for Lebanese and Palestinians held in Israel.

The paper quoted officials of the pro-Iran group as saying it was holding two of seven missing Israeli servicemen and was prepared to negotiate for their release.

The London Times quoted the Hezbollah officials, whom it did not name, as saying that four of the servicemen were dead and that one was being held by the PLO.

THIRD PARTIES KEEP THE NEGOTIATIONS ALIVE

Despite President Bush's vacation calm, the White House is negotiating the fate of the remaining five U.S. hostages through third parties, former U.S. officials and a top Iranian diplomat said Monday....

"I would imagine there is much going on" through third parties, said former national security adviser Brzezinski.

The most overtly active U.S. intermediary is the Swiss Embassy in Tehran. "We have made contact through the Swiss with the U.S. government," acknowledged Iran's deputy U.N. ambassador M. Javad Sharif. Such discussions are "ongoing" and include more than the hostages' fate, he added.

AMERICA'S LATEST HOSTAGE STRATEGY: PATIENCE

American has tried military strikes, secret arms deals and covert commando squads. It has accused terrorists of being "misfits and looney tunes," issued threats and convened solemn blue-ribbon commissions.

But after more than a decade of fumbles and blunders in dealing with terrorist hostage-takers, it appears the U.S. has finally struck on the best policy: Shut down the rhetoric and be patient....

But even as diplomatic activity on behalf of the remaining hostages rises to a fever pitch, the Bush Administration seems to be taking a determinedly laid-back approach.

"I, we just don't know that much about it," President Bush said of the negotiations as he prepared to tee off for an early-morning round of golf....

Unfortunately, it is far from certain that a patient, low-key approach will be most effective in future hostage situations....

In these negotiations, "the U.S. has nothing to bargain with," says Bruce Hoffman, a terrorism expert at the Rand Corp. "So it makes sense to lower the rhetoric and stop the chest-thumping. That doesn't necessarily tell you what to do next time around."

LETTER HINTS BARRIERS TO RELEASE OF OTHERS
Not An Encouraging Document, Analysts Say

The letter from Islamic Jihad captors to U.N. Secretary General Perez de Cuellar appears to reflect a growing public relations consciousness on the part of the terrorist group but also suggests many complications in the way of a quick release of all Western hostages, Middle East experts said Monday....

To have such a document delivered in a highly publicized fashion by freed hostage John McCarthy to Perez de Cuellar, and then released to the world by the U.N. represents a "coup" for Islamic Jihad with much symbolic importance in the Middle East, according to Brian Jenkins, an expert on terrorism and senior managing director of Kroll Associates....

He said publication of the letter by the world body has brought "enormous status" to Islamic Jihad....

The letter is "background music...part of the political game...an attempt to say, we are not selling out," said Shireen Hunter, deputy director of the Middle East program of the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington....

Former assistant secretary of state Richard Murphy and other experts said a mainstream interpretation of the letter is that a general hostage release by Islamic Jihad and associated groups would require parallel release of thousands of Palestinian prisoners held by Israel as well as several Lebanese serving time for crimes in Germany and Switzerland.

**TRACY, AT U.S. HOSPITAL, SAID TO BE TRAUMATIZED
Ex-Hostage Well Fed, Commander Declares**

WIESBADEN -- Edward Tracy apparently is suffering from psychological trauma far beyond what other hostages exhibited upon release, U.S. military sources suggested Monday.

Col. Earl Ferguson said Tracy was well-fed in Lebanon and is physically in good condition.

But Ferguson refused to discuss details of Tracy's mental state, which was described by those Tracy met with Sunday in Syria as highly disturbed.

**PALESTINIANS: 1 MISSION, MANY LEADERS
Big Issue Is Who'll Go To Talks**

...The question of who speaks for the Palestinians has become central to getting Middle east peace talks going.

Monday the leader of a radical faction of the PLO accused the U.S. of caving in to Israeli pressure, and rejected any conditions on Palestinian representation at talks.

"The U.S. plan does not give anything for the Palestinians," said Nayef Hawatmeh of the Democratic Front of the Liberation of Palestine.

He called for a PLO-Arab summit to plan strategy for the October peace talks, and vowed to continue the intifada.

Harvard Middle East specialist Zachary Lockman said the Palestinians will dodge the issue of who sits at the peace table by choosing delegates whose PLO ties aren't obvious.

SYRIAN: ISRAELI SETTLEMENTS BLOCK PEACE CONFERENCE

DAMASCUS -- Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk Charaa said Sunday that Israel would have to cease building settlements in the occupied territories before the U.S.-proposed Middle East peace conference could convene.

"There has to be a cessation of settlements," Charaa said in an interview. By continuing with new settlements in the occupied West Bank, "it's as though the Israelis are producing evidence - sharp, concrete evidence -- that they are against peace and just paying lip service to peace," he said....

Charaa accused Israel of setting "preconditions" for its participation in the conference by demanding veto power over the Palestinians selected to attend. "I'm telling you that if Israel doesn't lift its reservations on the Palestinian delegation, especially having one from East Jerusalem, in this case the Palestinians won't go," he said.

**U.S. LENDS SPY PLANE TO U.N. TO VIEW IRAQ
Highflying U-2 To Search For Weapon Sites**

A special U.N. commission, seeking to bolster its ability to ferret out Iraqi weapons, has borrowed a high-altitude U.S. spy plane to conduct periodic flights over Iraqi territory, according to U.S. and diplomatic officials.

In a brief announcement Monday, the commission said only that it had asked for "a high-altitude, one-seater aircraft" and added that it would "commence its operations in the first half of August." However, other officials said the plane was a U-2 that Monday completed its first seven-hour mission over Iraq....

Sources here said that work has continued on the nuclear resolution and another measure that would authorize Iraq to sell oil exports worth \$1.6 billion to buy food for its war-ravaged population. The sources said the resolutions could be ready for Security Council votes later this week.

**BUSH'S PLAN TO SEND MILITARY TRAINERS

LIMA -- The Bush Administration's plan to send military trainers to Peru as part of a new bilateral antidrug agreement has caused a political firestorm here, embarrassing the government and producing renewed charges of human rights abuses by the security forces.

The \$35 million military aid agreement also raises new questions about the conflict, or coincidence, of U.S. antidrug policy and Peru's ongoing war against leftist guerrillas....

The new pact states that drug trafficking and guerrilla activities are "inextricably intertwined," and that as a result, counterinsurgency is a "justifiable component" of antidrug operations.

To critics, such language raises fears that U.S. troops could be drawn into a protracted guerrilla war in alliance with a corrupt and repressive security establishment, as occurred in El Salvador.

Peruvian human rights advocates argue that U.S. officials have deliberately overlooked the human rights record of Peru's armed forces in order to win their cooperation in the antidrug effort.

Francisco Soberon, director of the Peruvian Pro-Human Rights Association said, "With this document, the U.S. is wiping out its commitment to human rights." (Pamela Constable, Boston Globe)

PACT BETWEEN MOSCOW, REPUBLICS FALLS APART

A recent financial pact between Moscow and nine Soviet republics has collapsed, threatening to bankrupt the Kremlin and plunge the country into new chaos, Soviet officials warn....

Leading Soviet finance officials say the republics have systematically ignored the "nine-plus-one" agreement by withholding taxes from the Kremlin. (Martin Sieff, Washington Times, A7)

3 YUGOSLAV STATES SEEK NEW UNION

BELGRADE -- Three Yugoslav republics, including Serbia, called Monday for a new constitution, a move seen as a step toward forming a new federation dominated by the Serbs.

Serbian President Milosevic and allied leaders from Montenegro and Bosnia-Herzegovina issued a document saying the new Yugoslavia should be a multiparty state with a constitution allowing for a market economy and guaranteeing the equality of its republics and peoples....

The three urged Yugoslavia's other three republics to join the project, but Slovenia, Croatia and Macedonia boycotted Monday's meeting.

U.S. SEIZES MISSILES, NABS CROATS

The Customs Service has seized Stinger anti-aircraft missiles destined for Yugoslavia and arrested four Croats, including an alleged terrorist, in Miami, federal officials said Monday.

Customs Commissioner Carol Hallett described it as a "landmark case."

"We believe this is an organization based in both the U.S. and Canada, and it is one in which the effort was all out to gain as many goods and as many weapons as possible," Hallett said at a news conference.

VIETNAM VETERANS ON HILL HAVE DOUBTS ABOUT POWS

Six congressmen -- all Vietnam veterans -- have returned from a five-day trip to Southeast Asia doubtful that American servicemen are being held there. But they remain critical of the U.S. government's handling of the prisoner-of-war issue.

"I do not subscribe to the theory that there is a conspiracy to keep our servicemen over there, but I can see why that theory is so popular," Rep. Kolbe said in a telephone interview Monday. "Resolving the POW issues has not been the government's No. 1 priority."

Meanwhile, Sen. Kerry said Monday he has "hot leads" on the fates of missing American soldiers and is traveling to Indochina to investigate.

ARMS SALES FIGURES MISLEADING, U.S. SAYS

The State Department on Monday rejected as misleading a report that says the U.S. was the top arms supplier to Third World countries last year. State Department press officer Cynthia Whittlesey said it was based on misleading dollar-value comparisons: "In dollar terms, the largest share of U.S. military exports are not for weapons but for construction, spare parts and support." U.S. transfers are generally more expensive because they're high technology, she said, adding that other major exporters often subsidize their costs or engage in bartering, which hides the true costs of arms sales.

AMONG ABA MEMBERS, THE TALK IS OF THOMAS No Shortage Of Opinions At Lawyers Meeting

ATLANTA -- ...The ABA's judicial screening panel has been wrestling behind closed doors with the organization's official rating of nominee Clarence Thomas, but in hallways, in hastily arranged debates and over dinner, the appraisals are flowing.

There is little consensus -- except that almost all believe Thomas will be approved by the Senate -- but much debate....

Wallace Riley, former ABA president, said he "could not help but admire Thomas's record, what he's done and where he came from." Riley said Thomas would not only bring legal training and expertise to the high court, but "upbringing and background" that are important to the court's mix....

Former Atlanta mayor, Andrew Young said that just as the civil rights movement has turned back previous Supreme Court nominees, "maybe we need to turn back a Judge Thomas."

Young said the Southern Christian Leadership Conference would meet Tuesday to discuss the issues and probably would reserve judgement until confirmation hearings.

COURT NOMINEE REPORTS \$177,264 NET WORTH

Supreme Court Nominee Clarence Thomas, responding to a questionnaire from senators weighing his qualifications, on Monday reported a financial net worth of \$177,264....

The questionnaire asked about "judicial activism."

"The role of Congress is to enact laws after deliberation and debate," he responded. "It is the function of the judiciary to apply such laws in specific cases properly before it."

"In interpreting laws, a court's objective must always be to determine the legislative intent. And, in adjudicating a case before it, the court's overall objective should be to resolve only the controversy presented in that case."

Responding to other questions, Thomas said no one in the Bush Administration or the Senate had discussed any specific court case or legal issue with him as part of the nomination process. (AP)

Disclosure Forms: Thomas Would Be Poorest Member Of High Court

Clarence Thomas is not hurting for money, but he would join the Supreme Court as its poorest member if he is confirmed by the Senate, according to financial disclosure forms released....

The Judiciary Committee released 76 pages of disclosure forms and Thomas's responses to a questionnaire, revealing a number of new bits of information about Thomas....

He answered 'no' when asked if anyone involved in the selection process asked about "any specific case, legal issue or question in a manner that could reasonably be interpreted as seeking any express or implied assurances concerning (his) position on such case, issue or question."...

Thomas wrote the Judiciary Committee that he considers his government service "to be in the nature of 'pro bono' work."

"I consistently tried to use my positions in government to advance the public good," Thomas said. "I insisted that the EEOC reach out, as part of its mission, and help others."

VACATIONING, BUSH SEEMS MORE COMFORTABLY SMUG THAN A YEAR AGO

KENNEBUNKPORT -- As President Bush prepared for his monthlong vacation here, Chief of Staff Sununu beseeched him to interrupt it to attend a meeting of the National Governors' Association in Seattle. Despite the political benefits that the trip offered, every other White House aide rejected the idea, and Bush told Sununu: Forget it, this is a vacation.

The President's brushoff of Sununu's request demonstrates Bush's unapologetic allegiance to what he views as a well-earned month of boating, golfing and fishing. But to some it also reflects a White House smugness, a sense that Bush does not have to worry about how his leisurely hiatus from steamy Washington is viewed by voters.

"Sure, I'm worried," one senior Administration official said. "I'm always worried." Referring to a recent ABC-TV poll that said 67 percent of Americans believe the nation is on the wrong track, the official said, "the right-track, wrong-track polls are not a super position. It makes you concerned. Then there is the ever-growing theory of a 'double-dip recession.'"...

"The truth is that not much has changed" in the public's perception of Bush despite the dramatic events of the last year, the official said, speaking on condition of anonymity. "He was at 68 percent or 69 percent a year ago, and he is at 68 or 69 percent today. Now, Democrat or Republican, you don't get through an election with 69 percent of the vote. What will happen is that he will go down, and then the media will write that the President is slipping in the polls, and then something will happen and he will go down a little farther."

The official concluded, however, by saying that Bush will sweep to a wide, perhaps historic, margin of victory.

CUOMO'S LAMENT: I WON'T RUN, SO THEY WON'T LISTEN

ALBANY -- Gov. Cuomo said Monday that he's offering ideas to change the course of the nation but can't get people to listen because he won't run for president.

"Instead, what's happening now is they say, 'Well, if you're not going to say you're running for president, we won't even discuss the merits,' " of your ideas, Cuomo told Albany's WAMC radio.

Cuomo made the remark when asked about Democrats offering alternatives to the economic and domestic policies of the Bush administration.

While Cuomo gave no indication he was preparing to enter the presidential race, he said, "Sooner or later, you'll find this discussion picking up speed. You'll find the American people talking about changing course." (AP)

**AS THORNBURGH LEAVES FOR SENATE RACE,
ASHCROFT IS FAVORED AS REPLACEMENT**

As Attorney General Thornburgh prepares to leave office Thursday to run for the U.S. Senate from Pennsylvania, White House sources say Missouri's Governor Ashcroft is the favored candidate to head the Justice Department.

Ashcroft is reportedly the choice of Chief of Staff Sununu. Ashcroft also fits the mold favored by President Bush for his Cabinet: a current or former congressional figure or a governor with an established power base and an appreciation of practical politics. (John Mashek Boston Globe)

BUSH TO NAME CAREER FED OFFICER AS FDIC CHIEF

President Bush will nominate career Federal Reserve officer William Taylor to be the new chairman of the FDIC, an Administration source said Monday night.

A White House announcement that Taylor is the choice at FDIC could come as early as Tuesday, said the anonymous source. (AP)

HOSTAGE CRISIS

ABC's Sam Donaldson: There are plenty of signs tonight that backstage negotiations to end the Middle East hostage crisis are underway, but puzzlement as to the hostage takers' true intentions continues. A letter from the group holding Western hostages delivered to UN Secretary General Perez de Cuellar called for the release of Arab freedom fighters, but more than that, called for the release of all detainees throughout the world. Such a sweeping requirement, if meant literally, would seem impractical to meet. But Perez de Cuellar continued to express optimism as his aides worked behind the scenes. At President Bush's vacation retreat in Maine, the official position was that the letter contained some positive elements. But that came only after the President himself expressed puzzlement as to what it really meant.

ABC's Brit Hume: The President's reaction on the golf course early this morning to the contents of the letter to the UN secretary general was typical of his recent comments on the hostage issue. He's tried to seem concerned but not much involved in or even aware of what's going on.

(President Bush: "Well, we don't know too much about it. I talked to the situation room about 5 o'clock. There really isn't any detailed information. Back in the rumor game, broad-demand game. Release people all around the world. Nobody quite knows what that means.")

Well, he was asked, did he see in all this nonetheless the framework of a possible deal that might end the hostage era?

(President Bush: "It would seem framework for a deal for a long time in terms of people releasing all hostages, but we just don't know that much about it.")

That may be true. But it's also true that Mr. Bush does not want to say anything that would let the hostage takers think they're dealing even indirectly with the President of the United States, thereby making the hostages seem all the more valuable. Thus, the words "don't know" have been a Bush staple in recent days.

(President Bush, various dates: "I haven't heard an official word at all."... "We don't know anything official."... "I can't say, because we've been going up and down."... "Well, we don't know exactly why they were released.")

White House spokesman Fitzwater did say today the Administration thinks it positive that the letter to Perez de Cuellar did mention release of all detainees. If that means all hostages, he said, the Administration is for it. But does it mean that? Once again, the answer was: We don't know. (ABC-Lead)

ABC's Dean Reynolds reports Defense Minister Arens indicated the only positive point to come out of talks with Perez de Cuellar was a clear sign the UN is working hard for a fair solution.

Reynolds continues:

(Arens: "I am satisfied that the secretary general of the United Nations has decided to take this very important task upon himself.")

The Israelis are disappointed the letter did not mention seven missing servicemen. But they are encouraged the UN chief indicated he is working to include them in any deal.

(Perez de Cuellar: "Well, I wouldn't say that they are sticking point, but they are one of my very, very serious concerns.")

(Arens: "The terrorists that we are holding are one of the few important cards -- maybe the most important cards -- that the Western world has in order to bring about the release of the hostages.")

The Israeli government is concerned a unilateral gesture now would be interpreted by its enemies as a sign of weakness, and that the Israeli public would interpret it in exactly the same way.

(ABC-2)

Donaldson reports doctors in Wiesbaden say Edward Tracy is in good physical shape. John McCarthy said conditions for Terry Waite, Terry Anderson and Thomas Sutherland have improved greatly. He said they now have air-conditioning and a radio, and that Waite has a Bible.

(CBS-3, NBC-3, ABC-3)

NBC's Faith Daniels: Diplomacy is now center-stage in the hostage crisis. We now know what's in the letter sent out with British hostage John McCarthy. It spells out a list of demands, and it now appears the kidnappers in Lebanon are waiting to see if releasing McCarthy and American Edward Tracy within four days of each other leads to any response.

NBC's John Cochran: This week starts with a much different attitude here. Last week, you know, President Bush was trying hard to dampen expectations. Today, it's different. Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater was hardly euphoric, but he was upbeat, saying the letter from Islamic Jihad to the UN secretary general has "positive aspects." Meanwhile, Secretary General Perez de Cuellar was in Geneva, having had a long, hard look at the letter. That letter is packed with generalities, but everyone is focusing on a key sentence, which calls on Perez de Cuellar "to make a personal endeavor to secure the release of all detainees throughout the world. In such an eventuality, we would be perfectly willing to release the persons whom we are detaining within 24 hours." The UN chief was already on that job today, meeting with Israeli officials about the possible release of Arab prisoners.

(Perez de Cuellar: "I think the enthusiasm I have heard from the Israelis has been a positive one. But, of course, I have to see them again in order to know what is their clear-cut official position.")

Nothing was clear-cut to President Bush, who was bothered by the letter's wide-ranging demand for prisoner releases.

(President Bush: "Release people all around the world. Nobody quite knows what that means.")

It could mean, for example, a demand for the release of the Lebanese Hamadi [phonetic] brothers, now serving time in Germany for terrorism. But the German government says: no deals. And by the time Fitzwater met with reporters, the White House strategy was not to look for trouble, but to emphasize the positive.

Cochran continues:

Peggy Say, sister of hostage Terry Anderson, also got an upbeat briefing from State Department officials about the letter.

(Say: "It isn't stating any new demands. It simply, as I understand, is trusting Perez de Cuellar to see to it that all illegal detainees held in the Middle East are released.")

And if -- if -- that is all the terrorists are demanding, the ball is really in Israel's court. (NBC-Lead)

NBC's Martin Fletcher reports NBC News has been told if negotiations start, everything will be on the table. Israeli spokesmen first said they wouldn't consider releasing Palestinian prisoners, only the Lebanese. Now, they make it clear there are no preconditions to negotiations.

(Ariel Merari, Tel Aviv University: "The Middle East is a very dynamic place. It changes fast. Who knows what kind of regime will be in Lebanon or in Syria or in Iran a year from now. And hostage taking could easily resume.")

Tough talk is one thing, but history shows if Israel wants a deal, it will do whatever it takes. (CBS-5, NBC-2)

CBS's Dan Rather: The letter freed British hostage John McCarthy relayed to the UN secretary general yesterday was made public today. The message from McCarthy's terrorist captors suggests the remaining hostages in Lebanon be freed as part of a global release of prisoners. That letter came in for close scrutiny at the vacation White House in Maine.

CBS's Susan Spencer: The White House isn't quite sure what to make of it yet. It's a little bit vague. The letter itself blasts the United Nations, calling it the plaything of the superpowers. It then goes on to say that the UN may be the key to solving the crisis. The first reaction from the White House was fairly low key, the President being very, very downbeat when he spoke with reporters.

(President Bush: "There really isn't any detailed information. Back in the rumor game, broad-demand game.")

The letter's broadest demand: the release of all detainees around the world. Then, the kidnappers say, they will free the Western hostages within 24 hours.

(President Bush: "Release people all around the world. Nobody quite knows what that means. So it's -- you know, the fact that one is out is hopeful, but that's about -- really, nobody knows much.")

But everyone assumes it's a reference to Arab prisoners held by Israel, some of whom Mr. Bush has not-so-subtly hinted also can be considered hostages who should be freed. Israel says they stay right where they are until it gets an accounting of seven missing Israeli servicemen, not mentioned in the letter at all. But does the letter at least provide a new framework?

(President Bush: "It would seem framework for a deal for a long time in terms of people releasing all hostages.")

White House sources won't say if Mr. Bush has used his famous personal diplomacy to intervene with other world leaders. But for all the secrecy and placid pictures of a President on vacation, there's a sense that negotiations are getting down to brass tacks. (TV coverage: President Bush playing golf, fishing.)

Spencer continues:

(Perez de Cuellar: "They are a little more hopeful than before because we have two very concrete evidence that those who hold the hostages are interested in a solution.")

But former hostage Frank Reed agrees with the kidnappers that the secretary general holds the key.

(Reed: "What better place than the UN body, where we don't have to get involved in yellow-ribbon politics?")

But there's no escaping yellow-ribbon politics, as the Administration leans on other countries and the United Nations to do whatever they can to see to it that the hostages are freed. In the end, that probably will involve making a deal -- the very kind of deal the White House so righteously says it never would be involved in. (CBS-4)

IRAQ/SUPERGUN

Donaldson reports UN inspectors say Iraq has finally shown them its supergun. The inspectors said it wasn't operational. The U.S. has begun flying U-2 spy planes over Iraq to pick out sites for the UN team to inspect. (ABC-4)

ABORTION/WICHITA

NBC's Carl Stern reports Operation Rescue took the Justice Department's actions last week as an endorsement.

(Patrick Mahoney, Operation Rescue: "Clearly, it's a victory for the movement. The Justice Department has supported our position.") But today, the Justice Department sought to distance itself from the conduct of the protesters. It said it would not oppose punishment to those who violated the judge's orders, nor was it likely to file further briefs supporting Operation Rescue's efforts in Wichita. Deputy Solicitor General John Roberts said the protesters misunderstood if they thought the government approved of their actions.

(Roberts: "I would say: Look at the badge on the person who's arresting you; that's a United States Department of Justice badge. I don't see how they could assume that we're endorsing or condoning their activities, and we're not. It's a very technical, legal argument about which court has jurisdiction to hear this case.") Defiance of the judge's order in Wichita may jeopardize the government's contention that state courts can handle such matters under traditional trespassing laws. The intensity of the Wichita blockaders may convince the Supreme Court that federal intervention is needed. Justice Department lawyers today refused even to meet with lawyers for Operation Rescue, who were seeking further help. (NBC-4)

CBS's Scott Pelley reports Judge Patrick Kelly sentenced a few anti-abortion protesters, but dismissed many other cases. Operation Rescue accused Kelly of selectively enforcing his order. (Mahoney: "Judge Kelly is the one who is intensifying the situation. Judge Kelly is the one creating the problem.")

(ABC-13, CBS-6)

EPA/SOLID WASTE

ABC's Jeanne Meserve reports the EPA's Office of Solid Waste published a handbook that makes simple suggestions for reducing, reusing and recycling waste. But some powerful companies were not happy that the publication could change consumer habits, cutting their profits. The director of the Office of Solid Waste said she had no intention of pulling the publication, but she was overruled by Assistant Administrator Donald Clay, a decision defended by a public-health official working at EPA.

(Richard Cuimano: "I don't believe that we buckled to industry. What we did is we tried to take a look -- an objective look -- at whether we had good information in there, information that was going to be balanced as well as be accurate.")

The EPA is now working with industry to revise the handbook, but environmentalists and some agency staffers worry the result will be too bland to be worth printing. (ABC-9)

VMI/JUSTICE DEPARTMENT

Rather reports the Justice Department said today it will appeal a federal judge's ruling that VMI may continue to exclude women. (CBS-8)

MIAMI/ARMS SALES

CBS's Scott Tunnell reports Miami has emerged as the liveliest weapons shopping center in the country -- for both legal and illegal weapons -- with much of the weapons being sold to third-world customers. A half-dozen small contract airlines based at Miami International are in federal courts for alleged involvement in various illegal arms deals. Cash deposits in Miami's international banks tripled in the past 10 years, to more than \$100 billion. (CBS-7)

BANK MERGER

NBC's Mike Jensen reports Bank America and Security Pacific merged today, making it the nation's second largest bank. In a world where banking has become very international, Americans are struggling to become more competitive. Not one of the top 17 banks in the world is American; the six largest are Japanese. The recent mergers are simply the first wave in a huge shakeup: 125 sizable U.S. bank holding companies are expected to shrink to two dozen within five years. (CBS-Lead, ABC-5, NBC-5)

AIRLINE INDUSTRY

ABC's Bob Jamieson reports a judge approved Delta's bid to buy a huge chunk of Pan Am. The airline industry has lost more than \$5 billion in the past year. Some industry analysts say the problem is the 1978 deregulation of the airlines. Many predict only a handful of strong carriers will soon control the industry, proving deregulation a failure. (CBS-2, ABC-6)

10:45 A.M. NEWS UPDATE

HOSTAGES/OBEID (Beirut/UPI) -- Sheikh Obeid, the Hezbollah cleric imprisoned in Israel who is a key pawn in hostage negotiations, will be freed by Saturday, Iran's official news agency said. Quoting a "well-informed" Muslim source, the Islamic Republic News Agency said, "Sheikh Obeid will be released in a few days. He will rejoin his family in the village of Jibsheets on Saturday at the latest. Our source for this report is very much reliable," Musaab Naeemeh, editor-in-chief of IRNA in Beirut, told UPI. "This report is not speculation."

(Jerusalem/CNN) -- CNN's Linda Scherzer reports the Israeli defense ministry has completely denied [the above] report. Sheikh Obeid is considered the most valuable card in Israel's deck; he was kidnapped by Israeli commandos two years ago from his home in South Lebanon to be used as a bargaining chip specifically to gain the release of the seven missing Israelis, and it is highly unlikely that he will be released before those seven Israelis are released. The defense ministry completely knocked the report down, saying there is absolutely no chance that Obeid will be released.

HOSTAGES/ISRAELI SOLDIER (Damascus/Reuter) -- A Palestinian guerrilla group said it was willing to swap the body of an Israeli soldier for Arab prisoners held by the Jewish state. "We have the body of Sgt. Samir Assad of the Israeli army and we are willing to conduct negotiations through the [Red Cross] to exchange it with Arab prisoners held by the Israelis," said a spokesman for the Democratic Front for the Liberation of Palestine. The DFLP said Assad, one of seven Israelis missing in Lebanon, was captured alive but later killed in an Israeli air raid. The spokesman said the DFLP had nothing to do with the issue of Western hostages and the Israeli soldier, captured in 1984, had been held as a POW.

HOSTAGES/U.N. (Geneva/Reuter) -- Secretary General Perez de Cuellar said he thought there was a basis for an exchange of hostages and prisoners, adding that the various sides were not that far apart. He announced that he expected to meet Israeli envoy Uri Lubrani around midday Wednesday with a response on the fast-moving hostage saga. Asked if there was a basis for a swap, he told reporters: "I think so. We know more or less what each side wants, and now it is for me to bridge the gap." Asked how far apart the sides were, he said: "Not that far apart. It is not an ocean. I would say a river."

HOSTAGES/U.N./ISRAEL (Jerusalem/AP) -- Israel reacted positively to the emergence of the U.N. as a mediator in the effort to free Western captives. Israel radio said Prime Minister Shamir and other top officials would meet today and receive a recommendation that they authorize U.N. contacts on the government's behalf with kidnap groups in Lebanon. "Of course it is worth continuing contacts," said Yohanan Bein, a foreign ministry deputy director who traveled to Geneva over the weekend to discuss the hostage issue with Perez de Cuellar.

HOSTAGES/IRAN (Nicosia/AP) -- An Iranian newspaper that speaks for the government said in an editorial that the era of hostage-taking might not be over. The Tehran Times said Westerners were seized in Lebanon in reaction to the hundreds of Palestinians and Lebanese taken during Israel's military actions in Lebanon. Such actions were not condemned by the West so "the kidnapping of a few Westerners could only be the expected and a natural reaction," the English-language daily said in an editorial. The Times is the newspaper that last week predicted the release of an American and a Briton [Tracy & McCarthy].

TRACY (Wiesbaden/UPI) -- Freed hostage Edward Tracy has been deemed healthy after a battery of medical checkups, and he will leave Germany for the U.S. Wednesday, a U.S. military spokesman said.

NUCLEAR INCIDENT (Syracuse/Reuter) -- The second highest state of emergency was declared at the Nine Mile Point nuclear power plant in upstate New York, but there was no abnormal release of radiation and no evacuation of the surrounding area, officials said. "Things are stable at the moment and everything seems under control," a spokesman for the Nuclear Regulatory Commission in Washington said.

RETAIL SALES (AP) -- Retail sales rose 0.5% in July, the government said in a report showing that consumers continued pushing the economy forward -- although slowly -- as the third quarter began. And June's revised 0.1% gain was an improvement over the 0.2% decline in the department's initial estimate last month. It was the first three-month string of advances in a year. Analysts had expressed concern over the June report. Without increased personal consumption, they said, the economy faced a "double-dip" recession.

FDIC/TAYLOR (AP) -- President Bush's long anticipated nomination of career Fed officer William Taylor to be the new chairman of the FDIC could come as early as today, an administration source said.

SADDAM/KUWAITI EMIR (Cairo/UPI) -- The emir of Kuwait disclosed in an interview that Saddam Hussein asked for possession of one-third of his country three months before invading the oil-rich emirate last year. In an interview with Cairo's leading newspaper Al-Ahram, the emir also denied he turned down an Iraqi request for financial assistance before the Aug. 2, 1990, invasion.

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1:00 P.M. NEWS UPDATE

HOSTAGES (Nicosia/AP) -- Diplomatic efforts intensified to swiftly resolve the hostage crisis amid reports that Israel may free a Shiite Muslim cleric and Arab kidnappers are willing to turn over missing Israeli soldiers. A senior Israeli official said the Jewish state is willing to make concessions in exchange for information on its missing men. But the official, who spoke on conditions of anonymity, also said, "But first of all we want to hear about the fate of our prisoners." Tehran Radio accused Israel of blocking resolution of the hostage crisis by insisting on the return of seven soldiers missing in Lebanon. But the radio also suggested the crisis may be near a solution anyway because the captives have served their purpose -- raising awareness of what it called "Israel's brutal policies." The BBC, meanwhile, reported that Hezbollah sources have confirmed the group was willing to release two Israelis as part of a hostage-for-prisoners exchange.

HOSTAGES/ISRAELI SOLDIERS (Jerusalem/UPI) -- Under increased international pressure to free Arab prisoners as a "helpful gesture" to secure the release of Western hostages, Israel stood firm that it must first receive "signs of life" from its own captured servicemen. Israeli officials asserted that any release of Sheikh Obeid, or any other prisoners it holds, was dependent on their receiving news on Israeli soldiers. "If Israel is asked to pay the price for whatever deal will be done regarding the Western hostages, it must be very clear that Israel will be included in these negotiations, in this process, and that we must have very clear signs of life of our people," said Yochanan Bein, a top foreign ministry official.

HEZBOLLAH ATTACK (Rashaya, Lebanon/AP) -- Pro-Iranian Shiite Muslim guerrillas exploded two bombs inside the Israeli-controlled enclave in southern Lebanon, killing a Lebanese civilian and wounding one, security sources said.

ABA/VICE PRESIDENT (Atlanta/AP) -- Vice President Quayle called for sweeping changes in the nation's legal system, including dramatic limits on money awarded in personal injury lawsuits. Speaking to the ABA's national convention, Quayle called the legal system a stumbling block to U.S. businesses competing in the world market. "Our system of civil justice is, at times, a self-inflicted competitive disadvantage," he said.

FDIC (Kennebunkport/Reuter) -- President Bush nominated William Taylor as chairman of the FDIC, succeeding William Seidman.

VIETNAM/U.S. (Hanoi/Reuter) -- Vietnam's new prime minister urged the U.S. to forget the past, lift its trade embargo and normalize relations with its old enemy. Premier Vo Van Kiet, who helped lead the Viet Cong insurgency in the 1960s and 1970s against Saigon's U.S.-backed government, said Hanoi would help trace the fate of American soldiers missing from the war, even if reports of some being held alive were absurd.

*1 TSONGAS: TALKING "TOUGH LOVE" AND "ECONOMIC SPUTNIK"

He "brought his message of economic 'tough love'" to the ABA convention (Tom Baxter, ATLANTA CONSTITUTION). Like Wilder, who addressed the group 8/10, he "was nearly as critical of his own party as he was of President Bush": "The reason [Dems] lose is because nobody trusts us with the economy. Nor should they." He "warned of a coming 'economic Sputnik' that will make Americans aware of how vulnerable they are in the international economy." Tsongas "is a liberal on most social issues, but the only way to keep a liberal society going, he said, is to provide for an expanding economy": "The administration is telling people everything is fine. They know it isn't. But what you have to give them as a substitute is reality -- tough love." Although he "didn't receive the most prestigious speaking slot in the weeklong convention, [he] was well received by his audience, which appeared to respond to his message of economic pragmatism": "If you're thinking of 1992 and who are the swing votes, that audience in there is exactly what you're talking about." He also "predicted that by the end of [9/91] there will be five or six [Dem] candidates in the field. But he expressed frustration with a race in which he so far has been relegated to arguing with himself": "At some point, if you're a candidate with ideas, those ideas must bounce off something." He portrayed Bush as "a president who is pro-business and pro-capital gains but understands neither." For example, Tsongas said his capital gains plan "would give greater incentives to long-term investors and discourage speculators more than Mr. Bush's plan" (8/13). N.O. TIMES-PICAYUNE editorial: "Paul Tsongas could soon become a household name by default. ... At this juncture, a match between Mr. Tsongas, who seems to be campaigning more on principle than expectations of victory, [and Bush] would make David vs. Goliath seem like a match of near equals" (8/12).

*2 CUOMO: SUPER MARIO BOTHERS -- PLAYING GAMES WITH DEMS?

Germond & Witcover praise his "spellbinding indictment of the Bush administration for dumping national responsibilities on the states and cities," but, citing his declaration of no plans to make plans, grumble, "And so, after dancing the girl around the floor and showing her his fanciest footwork, the Fred Astaire of political oratory was showing her to her seat. She would have to find somebody else to take her home." But for "all his eloquence, Cuomo also sounded like an old Democrat whose answer to problems is more money." They conclude: "Cuomo could easily end all the dancing around by saying flatly that he will finish out his third term, which runs through 1994. If he is tired of the questions, he can thus shut them off once and for all. But he doesn't, and so the speculation continues -- along with the suspicion that that's what he really wants" (Balto. EVENING SUN, 8/12). BOSTON HERALD's Rachelle Cohen reacts to the same Hyannis speech: "Oh, the guy's still got it -- got it big time. All the warmth, the humor, the fire the [Dems] have been looking for in a presidential contender was still all there in their one true and enduring love, Mario Cuomo. And while [he] vamped and teased, he would not surrender -- not now. Sigh" (8/11). WASH. POST's Mary McGrory writes, "Just as the speech could have been lifted intact and put on the teleprompter at a campaign stop, the scratchy encounter with the press that followed could be repeated in

hundreds of briefing rooms from [NY to CA]. If Cuomo's rhetoric is incomparable, so is his tendency to bicker with people who cannot hold their own with him in semantic jiu-jitsu. ... The Mayors, who knew they were listening to the best campaign speech they were likely to hear in 1992, were awestruck, but exasperated. Why should he speak like that if he isn't going to act? Why torture them. ... Not since 1968, when another obvious candidate refused to move, have [Dems] been so frustrated. ... Bobby Kennedy showed anguish over his dilemma; Cuomo seems merely angry" (8/13). On his WAMC radio show in Albany, Cuomo said "he's offering ideas to change the course of the nation but can't get people to listen because he won't run for president" (W. TIMES, 8/13). In a column discussing Cuomo's Italian-American ethnicity, BOSTON GLOBE's Robert Turner writes, "It is time for Cuomo to move ahead, selling his message and, if he dares, himself. ... For nearly three years, Cuomo has been the [Dem] leader who has criticized President Bush's domestic policies most consistently and effectively by far." Gephardt "has been a distant second." In downplaying the importance of the "messenger," Cuomo "should know better, and surely does. Personas are the driving force of American politics. If issue positions determined the outcome, Walter Mondale would have won the presidency" (8/13).

TV TALK: Chris Matthews: "My hunch is that he will not run." Bob Beckel: "I thought he was going to run, then I didn't think he was going to run, then I did, now I don't care. ... The point about Mario is that everybody is sitting in the Democratic Party waiting for this guy to make up his mind, thinking he is going to be this great savior is ridiculous thing for the party to be doing. If Cuomo says he is not going to run, let it alone and lets move on" ("Good Morning America," ABC, 8/13). Ex-NYC Mayor Ed Koch on Cuomo: "He will have huge problems in conveying what he wants to do for the state of New York, is what the nation wants for itself" ("FOX Morning News," 8/13).

EARLY LINE: BOSTON HERALD's Wayne Woodlief "handicapped" six Dem hopefuls. On Cuomo: "Philosophical, sometimes earthy, and a media star, he's still rated the party's 800-pound gorilla, even if he remains reluctant to swing in the presidential jungles." Strengths: "Can raise a fat war chest fast and is the only one who can wait much longer to jump in." Weaknesses: "Had a bad year at home, slashing services and raising taxes. He gets blamed for a lot of New York-sized urban ills a lot of Americans want no part of. This time, with all of Bush's pluses and Cuomo's own problems, we think he means no." Odds: "30-70 against" (8/11).

*3 CLINTON: MR. DLC TO ADDRESS SCLC

The "head of what Jesse Jackson has dubbed the 'Southern White Boys Club' takes his possible presidential candidacy" to the SCLC conference in Birmingham 8/14 (Jeffrey Stinson, ARKANSAS GAZETTE). SCLC pres. Joseph Lowery said Clinton was invited because "I think he's one of the promising young politicians in this country. He's been a sensitive governor. He has aspirations to higher office." But his "commitment to civil rights has been questioned in recent months as he has chaired the [DLC]." Cited is the exclusion of Jackson from the 5/91 DLC convo, the DLC position against quotas, and Clinton's abolition of "race-norming" in AR employment tests. State Rep. Irma Hunter, who is black: "It's getting more and more difficult to tell the difference between" Clinton & Bush. Rep. Mike Espy (D-

MS), a black DLC member, on suspicions that the DLC is "moving away" from blacks: "If that were true, I would not be involved in the DLC. I know Bill Clinton never would be either" (8/11). L.A. TIMES' Shogan & Brownstein report DLC officials "are cooking up plans to get out the groups's controversial message," even if Clinton doesn't run. The "most dramatic idea": "sponsoring ballot initiatives around the country" on DLC-endorsed ideas (8/12). The Woodlief line: "Preaches centrist message that [Dems] must be strong on national defense, for workfare and 'individual responsibility.'" Strengths: "A solid record in [AR]; voted most effective governor [see HOTLINE 6/24]. Boyish good looks and earthy style that may win back some Southern and middle-class voters." Weaknesses: "Tendency to pick fights with powerful enemies, including Jackson and Cuomo. Rumors of past alleged romances could cause early Hart-attacks by media. Wife says she can handle it, but can an 11-year old daughter?" Odds: "60-40 he'll run" (BOSTON HERALD, 8/11).

ACHOO! WASH. TIMES' Donald Lambro writes Clinton "is worried that his allergies might affect his performance" as a candidate. "With his party's top presidential contenders dropping like flies, the [Gov.] has suddenly raised questions about the effect his serious allergic reactions to certain foods and outdoor seasonal conditions could have on his ability to handle a rigorous national campaign." Clinton: "It is on occasion very painful for me." Among other symptoms, "the allergies can result in a puffy, reddened nose and occasionally rob him of one of his most important assets: his voice." His "close" advisers say his decision to "will be based on whether he thinks Bush is beatable and not on his allergy problems." But some have questions on the severity of his allergies. DLC exec. dir. Al From: "At least once a year he loses his voice and there are times when he's bothered a lot by them." But From added, "I've never seen him incapacitated." AR Dem chair Betsey Wright: "His allergies are a very serious problem. From time to time they are incapacitating in that its really hard to give a major speech when you've lost your voice." Lambro concludes, "Raising" the problem of allergies "would be a new and novel excuse for not seeking" the nomination, "even in a party whose presidential contenders have offered a broad range of alibis" (8/13).

HOLLYWOOD: PINE BLUFF COMMERCIAL's Paul Greenberg on recent comments about Clinton made by TV producer Norman Lear. Lear called Clinton a man whose "heart and mind are kind of on his sleeve. He's smart and he's sweet, or maybe caring is a better word." Greenberg, "How's that again? No one has ever questioned Bill Clinton's intelligence, but sweet? Can this be the most elected" AR Gov. "since Orval Fabus, not to mention the shrewdest and most powerful? ... the me candidate who can say just the right things about abortion to both the" Natl Women's Caucus and "folks back home who oppose public funding for abortions? Mind and heart on his sleeve? Close to his vest would be more like it. Well, maybe Hollywood's Mr. Lear knows the governor better than we in [AR] do. Mr. Clinton has spent enough time out there of late" (WASH. TIMES, 8/13).

*4 GORE: "TENNESSEE HAMLET"

In a discussion of Dem solidarity on '92 message development, BOSTON GLOBE's Curtis Wilkie writes of Gore's "regional experience dealing with the politics of race." Gore: "I come from the South. We've seen this kind of politics for years. Whenever hard times threaten middle-income families ...

those who do not want any kind of economic initiative to change the situation start yelling race" (8/12). In deciding whether to run, he "has family concerns uppermost on his mind, aides on his staff insist." The "anxiety every candidate feels ... is intensified in Gore's case" due to the serious injury sustained by his son 2 years ago. Sources also say Gore "is weighing the political risk of emerging from the campaign a two-time loser." One '88 adviser: "If he runs, he has to win the nomination to avoid political damage. ... There is no way Gore can win by losing" (Shogan/Brownstein, L.A. TIMES, 8/12). The Woodlief line: "Tennessee Hamlet, down on the family farm this month to end, finally, the up-and-down suspense on his decision." Strengths: "Battle-tested and one of the last three in the [Dem] ring in '88, he'd be an instant frontrunner with a fair-sized war chest. Voted for Gulf War resolution, strong on environment." Liabilities: "Image still a bit stiff and preppy (remember those 'Prince Albert' cartoons in '88?). Concerns include arduous impact on young family (children ages 8-17) and political impact: If he loses big to Bush, there'll be no third chance for Gore in '96." Odds: "50-50 at best" (BOSTON HERALD, 8/11).

*5 WILDER: DON'T WORRY, HE'S GOT A SECURE PHONE

At his 8/11 strategy pow-wow (see HOTLINE 8/12), plans were made for him to travel to NH and "possibly another early primary state this month" to test the waters for '92, "according" to advisors. The trip "would be designed" to see if he "gets the same kind of encouraging response" that got when he went to IA in the spring (Norman Gomlak, Fairfax JOURNAL, 8/13). Advisers also told him that he "should talk up fiscal affairs and race -- two of his favorite themes -- if he runs" (Schapiro, RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH). VA Dem chair/Wilder adviser Paul Goldman "said a consensus emerged" at the session that "economic and racial issues are connected," and that the "decline in the nation's financial health has eroded relations between blacks and whites" (8/12). Also discussed was the "time commitment necessary for a presidential campaign. The [Dem] primary season will begin in mid-February, when the legislature will be debating Wilder's proposed state budget." Goldman: "With modern communications, a governor or president is always in communication. You take the job with you" (RICHMOND NEWS LEADER, 8/12). GREENVILLE NEWS' Dan Hoover cites three recent events that "may have made his bid ... more likely": Rockefeller's exit, reports that Jackson would take the CNN job, and Robb's courthouse call. He also reports Wilder may order a poll in Iowa (8/11). BOSTON HERALD's Wayne Woodlief: "Hot prospect after historic election in '89 ... and no-tax budget-balancing." Strengths: "Stark contrast to Jackson and other party liberals because of his more conservative message, including budget cuts instead of new spending." Liabilities: "Cooled off after headlines on nasty feud with" Robb "and lip-slip remark" on Thomas. "The Wilder camp is polling in [NH] before he decides. Don't expect encouraging findings." Odds: "45-55 against" (8/11).

CONSULTANT UPDATE: In addition to Joe Trippi and Goldman, also present were Joe Johnson, ex-E.D. of Jesse Jackson's Rainbow Coalition, and an "unidentified representative" of Dem media consultant Ray Strother. Goldman "said another meeting is planned for consultants who were unable to attend including" Dem media consultant/'89 Wilder adviser Frank Greer. Greer, who is "also advising" AR Gov. Bill Clinton, "said he could not attend" the meeting because "my mother-in-law is in town and that was my

priority" (Schapiro, TIMES-DISPATCH, 8/12).

*6 DEM ROUND-UP

HARKIN: BSOTON HERALD's Wayne Woodlief: "He's on a mission: To prove that Hubert Humphrey-style old-time liberalism hasn't been buried under four [GOP] presidential landslides in the past five cycles." Strengths: "An eye-snapping, fiery stump style, and an up-from-poverty life story." Weaknesses: "He's vague on how to pay for federal goodies, and after a few comfortable years in Congress, this coalminer's son has become a Bahamas property owner." Odds: "About 90-10" (8/11).

JACKSON: Bob Beckel: "Jesse Jackson will probably not run for president, he's probably going to take a TV talk show which is the right thing for him to do. ... Jackson could fill up a room and scare a lot of people out of it at the same time" ("Good Morning America," ABC, 8/13). The Woodlief line: "Except for Cuomo, the best known of all those mentioned." Strengths: "He makes a lot of people's emotions boil and stirs them to action." Weaknesses: "He makes a lot of other people's emotions boil and stirs them to action too. Reportedly given an ultimatum to say yes or no soon to a fat TV contract" from CNN (see HOTLINE 8/6), "Jackson seems likely to pick video stardom over a probable third strike and out in the presidential ball game." Odds: "20-80 against" (BOSTON HERALD, 8/11).

ROCKEFELLER: Wheeling NEWS-REGISTER's Mike Myer: "For thoughtful observers, [the question] becomes: In 1996, who will the Republicans run against Jay Rockefeller?" (8/11). Fairmont TIMES-WEST VIRGINIAN editorial header: "Jay surprises again; Don't rule out 1996" (8/11). Wheeling NEWS-REGISTER editorial: "We still have lots to look forward to, not the least of which is 1996" (8/8). Martinsburg MORNING JOURNAL headline, citing Rep. Harley Staggers' (D-WV) press secretary: "Jay May Be V.P. Candidate" (8/9). Chris Matthews: "If he spends the next four years studying not just the country's health and social needs but the economic means to address them, he will be a better candidate than he would have been in 1992" (W. TIMES, 8/13).

CARTER: C.S MONITOR's Godfrey Sperling continues his sponsorship of Carter in '92 asking, "who of the present crop of [Dem] candidates (and their ranks are thinning) would be able, right from the beginning, to grab the national attention that a Carter bid for the White House would claim." Carter's thoughts on being "rebuffed" by Dems? Bert Lance: "He's past that. He doesn't want to look back" (8/13). Ex-NH AG Tom Rath: "If you can exhume Zachary Taylor, you can exhume Jimmy Carter" ("Inc," CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 8/12).

HART: Gary Hart is presently working in international business "helping American companies break into overseas markets." He "says he has no interest in returning to politics." His advice to '92 hopefuls: "It takes a long time to prepare to govern America. It's important for people seeking the office to be prepared, not to learn on the job" (USA TODAY, 8/13).

GEPHARDT: Three "nationally obscure" Dem governors were singled out by Gephardt as potential contenders -- "in 1992 or beyond": Ray Mabus (D-MS), Roy Romer (D-CO) and Evan Bayh (D-IN). He included them in a list "along with the standard names": Jackson, Cuomo, Wilder, Clinton, Gore, Kerrey, Kerry and Bradley (Schlinkmann, ST. LOUIS POST-DISPATCH, 8/11).

WOMEN: MARIN INDEPENDENT JOURNAL's Linda Witt writes, "Run a women for president. It's the perfect year." Mentioned as leading Dem female political leaders: TX Gov. Ann Richards, Rep.

Joan Kelly Horn (D-MO), Rep. Pat Schroeder (D-CO), Sen. Barbara Mikulski (D-MD), NY Senate candidates Geraldine Ferraro and Elizabeth Holtzman, OR Gov. Barbara Roberts, ex-Commerce Sec. Juanita Kreps, ex-CBO dir. Alice Rivlin, Univ. of WI chancellor Donna Shalala, Spellman College pres. Johnetta Cole, ex-MO LG Harriet Woods, ex-MA LG Evelyn Murphy, TX RR commis. Lena Guerrero and Houston Mayor Kathy Whitmire (USA TODAY, 8/13).

MORNING CHATTER: ABC's "Good Morning America" hosted S.F. EXAMINER's Chris Matthews and Dem analyst Bob Beckel. Matthews: "The American people are very practical voters. They decided that they'd like a very strong president -- a president that will manage the economy that will keep taxes down ... for the big grown up job. They have gotten in the habit of voting for the Republicans, and the Republicans have a reputation for being good at it." Beckel: Dems "believe you can't run and lose a second time. Let's keep in mind that the last three Republican presidents [Bush, Reagan and Nixon] all ran and lost before they got to the White House so that's a bogus argument by the Democrats. ... What the [Dems] are going to have to realize now, is that they must re-introduce themselves to the middle class, when that happens, maybe, just maybe, the Democrats can elect someone to the presidency." Matthews: "When you deal with the Democrats you always get this sense that they're playing to the contributors at the table of the fundraisers" (8/13).

*7 BUSH/GOP ROUND-UP

STAYING THE COURSE? Chris Matthews asks: "What if George Bush, at 67 and still bothered by Graves' disease, decides not to run for re-election next year?" It's a "provocative question, not because a presidential retirement is likely, but because it remains undeniably plausible. The expert who keeps insisting on that plausibility is George Bush himself. ... Last weekend, the president pulled out his medical chart again. Huddling with his campaign aides at Camp David, Bush kept open the question of whether bad health would force an early retirement." If he doesn't run, "who then would seek to lead the country? Ask [DC] professionals from both parties and you'll get a powerful reply: practically everybody. All those loyal [GOPers] cheering from the dugout, all those [Dem] sluggers now slouching on the bench, would suddenly streak for the on-deck circle." Dem consultant Carter Eskew said the "chief reason the party's big hitters are hanging back ... is George Bush. With Bush out of the GOP lineup, most of those waiting for '96 and a chance to face Dan Quayle would storm onto the field." Dem consultant Bob Shrum "predicts that the first [Dems] to move" would be Harkin, Gore, Clinton, Jackson, and Wilder. Gephardt and Rockefeller "may have already closed the door." And whether Cuomo and Bentsen "would enter a Bush-less '92 contest remains beyond the ability of even this city's bold prognosticators to predict." On the GOP side, a Bush retirement "would spark a stampede from his own party's bench as well." The list "begins, but does not end" with Quayle. Also mentioned: Baker, Dole, Kemp, Gramm, Alexander, Bennett, Wilson, all "on the speculative rosters of experienced campaign consultants." Two other prospects: Cheney and Powell, "both of whom gained considerable prestige in the Persian Gulf war" (S.F. EXAMINER, 8/11). N.Y. TIMES' Russell Baker writes, "All America would laugh to see [the Dems] all rush back in after Mr. Bush dropped out. Knowing how deadly such laughter can be would probably keep them permanently sidelined, guaranteeing Mr. Bush's hand-picked successor a romp to the White House, sealing his

reputation for political genius and assuring him generous ink in the history books." Four reasons for Bush not running: "Second-term curse ... Wisdom of Joseph P. Kennedy ("Only a fool holds out for top dollar") ... Lethal domesticity ("Everything needs to be done and there is no money to do anything") ... Age and health." TIMES' Baker picks Sec./State Baker as Bush's "choice" to run should he retire (8/13).

SU-WHO-WHO? The CoS is "in trouble again." Sources tell NEWSWEEK that Bush, before the recent Camp David '92 pow-wow, gave Sununu "a list of about three dozen people to be invited. Sununu peremptorily deleted a handful of names from the list, including such longtime Bush political associates as Pete Teeley, David Bates, and Rich Bond." When Bush heard, he "did not confront Sununu directly, but saw to it that the rejects were invited. Friends say the incident has increased the distance between the two men." One "associate": "The president isn't telling anyone what he thinks, but he can't hide his emotions anymore" (8/19 issue).

*8 CONNECTICUT: JOHNSON ADVISED "TO THINK LONG AND HARD"

New Britain HERALD editorial notes Rep. Nancy Johnson (R-06) "says she is pondering a run" for Sen. Chris Dodd's (D) seat. "Johnson is advised to think long and hard about such a move, weighing the probability of gain against the real possibility of what would be lost. ... Johnson has been an outstanding Congresswoman. ... And while she has compiled a glittering record of victories ... Dodd is a more powerful and popular adversary than she has ever encountered and appears unable to do much wrong. It would take an extraordinary effort to beat him, and while it is possible, what she and the district stand to lose should give pause. ... Is it in the [GOP's] and Mrs. Johnson's best interest to lose what has been a sure House seat, her increasing seniority and growing recognition with her colleagues for a battle with Mr. Dodd that will be uphill at best?" (8/12).

*9 FLORIDA: GRAHAM AND CENTRUST REAX

"Even with the GOP still trying to recruit a candidate," Sen. Bob Graham (D) "is already fielding questions about his ties to fallen CentTrust Savings Bank chief David Paul." Graham: "I am certain that this issue will be raised again in other contexts in 1992. ... The reality of my dealings with David Paul were A, limited, and B, appropriate." FL GOP chair Van Poole: "He's got a lot of questions to answer about his coziness to David Paul. The public not only deserves, but will demand that these questions be answered." GOP strategist Mac Stipanovich "described a commercial featuring photographs of Paul's gold-plated bathroom fixtures and fancy yacht ... interspersed with photographs of Graham": "He not only didn't prevent it, but he's the guy's buddy." However, "consultants caution that Graham's CentTrust troubles alone are not enough to kick him out of office" because he "is perhaps the best-known politician in the state," he "did not receive campaign contributions from Paul" so "there is no spectre of a political payoff," he "welcomes scrutiny of his actions," and his "best-known potential challenger isn't convinced that the senator himself did anything wrong" -- ex-Rep. Bill Grant (R) "doubts Graham acted dishonorably": "I don't question his honor, but I certainly do question his politics. ... It's something I can assure you that people in the party including myself are taking a strong look at" (David Dahl, ST. PETERSBURG TIMES, 8/11).

*10 MARYLAND: THE SCOOP ON SNOOPS

The Annapolis Ethics Commission and a council cmte. "will look into" Mayor Alfred Hopkins' decision last month "permitting an Annapolis ambulance to take" Gov. Wm Donald Schaefer's (D) "long time companion," Hilde Mae Snoops, "to Baltimore on a non-emergency run," after she fell at the Gov.'s mansion. While the ambulance was returning, an Annapolis man "died of cardiac arrest" (Gary Gately, Balto. SUN). Although the responding ambulance was 3 miles farther from the scene than the one transporting Snoops would have been, Fire Capt. George Sherlock "said that the extra time was not a factor." Fire officials originally turned down Snoops' request for transport "because of a policy forbidding non-emergency transports outside the city." Hopkins claimed "he had not known that any fire officials denied the request." Ex-Sec to ex-Mayor Dennis Callahan Irma Sponsler

charged Hopkins with violating "a section of the city code forbidding an elected official to use 'the prestige of his office for his own private gain for another person" (8/13). Hopkins: "I deemed a call from a state police captain charged with the Governor's Mansion security to be an emergency" (W. POST, 8/13).

***11 MASSACHUSETTS: MASS-IVE SUPPORT FOR GOP**

A poll "taken last week for a Republican statewide office holder indicates 52 percent of residents surveyed had a strongly or somewhat favorable opinion of the GOP" while "only 31 percent" viewed the Dems "in favorable terms. ... Sources" said a poll by the state Dems "in June discovered similar sentiments." GOP consultant Charles Manning: "It's an amazing turnaround." Dem advisor Michael Goldman "attributed the results to a lack of leadership from any single" Dem "at the state or national level" and "suggested the numbers would change once citizens ... began to feel the effect of massive budget cuts implemented by" Gov. William Weld (R). Manning said "the change" is "more solid" (Armstrong, BOSTON HERALD, 8/12).

REMEMBER ME? A June DSCC fund-raising letter "contained a glaring omission" -- the name of Sen. Ted Kennedy (D). DSCC comm. dir. Jeff Eller on the omission: "There's no significance to that." The letter left Kennedy's name out of a listing of 3 cmte chairs "despite a reference in the letter to the Labor and Human Resources Committee chairmanship he holds" (HERALD, 8/12). Kennedy, who "has only raised \$50" in '91, "has prudently kept his still-formidable fund-raising machines idling while the Palm Beach rape case plays out." A Kennedy "advisor": "It would be pointless to try and raise money now. We're not in an election cycle." Kennedy also "returned \$13,000 in donations made to his campaign committee by executives of a failed Florida thrift." Kennedy spokesperson Paul Donovan: "It is our policy to refund contributions whenever such a question is raised" (HERALD, 8/12). U.S. NEWS' Charles Fenyvesi writes the decision to delay Willie Smith's rape trial is "bad for uncle Ted." Kennedy's "associates worry that a winter trial -- which will be televised live -- will receive even more attention than one that would have taken place this summer. They do not relish the journalistic feeding frenzy that will greet the senator's likely appearance on the witness stand" ("Washington Whispers," 8/19 issue).

***12 NEVADA: REID -- HOPING TO THWART CHALLENGE?**

Carson City NEVADA APPEAL editorial: "It seems the silly Senate season has started early with a nervous incumbent" -- Sen. Harry Reid (D) -- "doing all he can to intimidate potential challengers, while a group of elephants desperately searches for a herd-leader to stomp" on him. Reid recently sent out a news release "about having broken" all NV \$-raising records by "siphoning" \$2M from "special interests." It also touted Reid as the 1st Senate Dem to "support going to war against Saddam Hussein." State the paper, "We know bragging about building campaign coffers isn't intended for voters disgusted by election financing. ... Could it be intended for potential GOP challengers? Could it be a not-so-subtle message: 'I have lots of money ... Don't run against me?'" (8/9).

THAT'S "MRS. PRESIDENT" TO YOU: Speaking before the Northern NV Woman '91 Conference, Reid predicted "a woman will soon be elected president and the days of sexism are numbered" (L.V. SUN, 8/9). Reid: "The time is coming and I think soon, when a serious child will read about the inequities of the past

and will run into the Oval Office in the White House and look up at the president and ask, 'Why did they do it? Why, mom?'" Women's groups have praised Reid for his efforts on women's health, but some have criticized his conservative stance on abortion (DAILY SPARKS TRIBUNE, 8/9).

***13 NEW YORK: PREMATURE EXUBERATION?**

In a cover editorial on Sen. Al D'Amato's commercial that touts the decision by the Sen. Ethics Cmte (D'Amato: "Finally it's over. The Senate Ethics Committee concluded I did nothing wrong"), NEWSDAY says, "Truth in advertising is required here. It's not over. ... the committee didn't clear him," what it said, in some cases, was it "has no jurisdiction. ... Exoneration this isn't. ... Yet D'Amato whizzes around the state in what gleeful aides have dubbed a 'triumphal tour.' ... The public should not be hoodwinked: D'Amato's ethical problems didn't start with the current investigations. His entire career has been marked by them and by an unseemly pattern of denial. ... By his actions, he has already shamed himself and diminished the Empire State" (8/11). NEWSDAY's Sydney Schanberg writes, "Even though he's a national embarrassment, you've got to admit" D'Amato "has singlehandedly revived the art of satire. When Al gets up on stage and starts ticking off all the things he didn't know about with regard to the corruption that swirls constantly around him but somehow never comes to his attention, people's sides burst from laughing." D'Amato "entertained" the Ethics Cmte for four days of testimony, getting off "more I-don't-knows than Reagan's I-don't-recalls in his Iran-Contra testimony" (8/9). While GOP media man Roger Ailes "went so far as to declare" the Cmte's decision made D'Amato "unbeatable," other analysts say D'Amato will have "a long fight back." GOP consultant John Buckley: "He would have had a tough race even if the committee came out and blessed him as Mother Theresa." Dem consultant David Garth: "I think he should be grateful, subdued, instead of shouting from the rooftop, 'I'm perfect, I'm perfect.'" And POLITICAL REPORT's Stuart Rothenberg said the Cmte's "ruling did not change his assessment" of D'Amato as "highly vulnerable" (Kim Mills, AP, 8/12). D'Amato wrote a letter to the N.Y. TIMES criticizing a 7/25 editorial that criticized his amendments to the crime bill (8/12).

CHALLENGER NEWS: Ex-Rep. Geraldine Ferraro (D) was a guest speaker at the ABA convention in GA, where she was honored as an "outstanding" female lawyer (ATLANTA CONSTITUTION, 8/12).

***14 NORTH CAROLINA: FAIRCLOTH HITS THE WAVES**

"[N]ine months before GOP voters choose their nominee," Lauch Faircloth began airing the first TV spot of the '92 election (Christensen, Raleigh NEWS & OBSERVER). The 30-second spot shows Faircloth at work on his cattle farm and will air statewide. Faircloth, a "lifetime" Dem and unsuccessful '84 gov. contender, switched to the GOP 2/91: "Everybody else in this campaign has held elective office. I haven't. Consequently, I felt I needed to get out there and level the playing field a little bit." A Mason-Dixon poll, conducted last month, showed only 6% of the GOP voters preferred Faircloth (see HOTLINE 7/30). Although he is "an unknown quantity" to many NC GOPers, Faircloth is supported by Sen. Jesse Helms' (R) Congressional Club. Ex-Rep. Gene Johnston is the only other announced candidate for the GOP primary. Other GOPers "considering": ex-Rep. William Cobey; Charlotte Mayor Sue Myrick and ex-Superior court judge/ex-Gov.

candidate Beverly Lake Jr. In a recent \$-raising mailer, Faircloth said he "plans to attack" Sanford for his vote "against" use of force in the Gulf, his support for \$40B in foreign aid, "his support for 'Ted Kennedy's civil rights quota bill,' and his record as a big spender" (8/12).

TOUGH JOBS UPDATE: More reax to Sanford's chairing of the Sen. Ethics Cmte. and the October Surprise investigation (see HOTLINE 8/7): GOP consultant Eddie Mahe: "I can't imagine what possessed him to do it. It's pure dumb. ... It raises in one's mind whether he plans to seek re-election." But Sanford "said ... I don't think you avoid duty because you have an election coming." Ex-Rep./JFK assassination investigation chair Richardson Preyer, on Oct. Surprise: "If it turns out there is something substantive ... Terry could come out the way [ex-Sen. Sam Ervin] did with Watergate -- a national hero." This has "helped feed rumors" Sanford will retire. If so, '90 Sen. candidate Harvey Gantt (D) "has indicated that he would be interested in running" (Christensen, N&O, 8/13).

*15 OKLAHOMA: "WALTERS' VENTURE TO COST STATE FIRMS MILLIONS"

"Hundreds of Oklahoma businesses in a workers compensation group once run by Gov. David Walters [D] soon will be billed" more than \$2.3M "to cover deficits partially created by high administrative fees paid to Walters and key campaign contributors" (Ellis, SUNDAY OKLAHOMAN). 900 current and past members will be billed "to cover part of a massive deficit accumulated over three years." Walters was the original administrator of the workers comp. organization and a sister business association. Walters contributors in question include: Walters co-administrator and successor as administrator for the 2 groups Chris Sturm contributed \$4,200; Marketing president for the group Thomas Rumfelt contributed \$5K; the groups' claims processor president C.A. Towne contributed \$3K; the groups' auditor principal/Walters campaign treasurer Sam Cole contributed \$5K. The two sister self-insurance groups under fire "have drawn sharp rebukes from court officials for engaging in self-dealing, putting ut what officials said was misleading advertising and charging high overhead expenses." OK City fruit and vegetable distributor office manager Retta Casey: "I think it is pathetic. ... And I just found out recently that Mr. Walters was involved in it and that's even more pathetic. I just find it very odd considering all the other things that we're finding out ... he's got his little finger in the pie. ... I came back and told the owner. ... And she says, 'No. ... That's where all our stinking money is.'" Walters' company, David Walters Investments Inc., is being charged over \$2K "to pay it's share of the deficit for its time in the group." Court insurance dir. Jerry Whorton said although Walters' company may not have legal responsibility to pay the assessment because he sold the company's assets, Walters "might want to go ahead and pay ... since the political ramifications could be immense." Ex-court administrator Michael Clingman, a friend of Walters, is under sharp criticism "for not closing down the groups last summer when their financial problems became apparent. Critics say Clingman put businesses and their employees at risk to avoid political embarrassment to Walters during the campaign." Clingman, given a job as state insurance fund commis. after the campaign, has denied political motivation (8/11).

LEWIS SCRUTINIZES NICKLES RECORD: Ex-House Speaker/'90 Gov. loser Steve Lewis (D) said he will campaign against Sen. Don

Nickles (R) "even in the Democratic primary" (Craig Fuqua, STILLWATER NEWS PRESS). Lewis' "main message was that Nickles has not accomplished much since he was first elected to the Senate" in '80. He "said Nickles does not have any ideas ... votes against ideas others bring forward" and "belongs to the philosophy that government is the problem." State Sen. Darryl Roberts (D) is considering a run as well (8/9).

*16 TENNESSEE: GOP CHAIR SAYS GOV "FISHING" FOR GOODS ON LAMAR
TN GOP chair Tommy Hopper "accused" the administration of Gov. Ned Ray McWherter (D) "of going on 'a fishing expedition' to reel in charges of financial misconduct" surrounding US Ed. Sec. /ex-Univ. of TN pres./ex-Gov. Lamar Alexander (R). Hopper: "It is apparent to me that instead of offering the people ... some explanation for the budget crisis in the state, the blatant nepotism practiced by this administration and the apparent inability to manage the state, there is an effort under way to discredit anybody ... to take the attention off of Governor McWherter." McWherter spokesperson Ken Renner replied, "No one really pays much attention to Mr. Hopper. ... most people ... recognize there has been a number of incidents recently where [UT] has run into trouble. It is those concerns that have motivated a review of the university's activities." The "controversy ... erupted last week when the administration discovered a mountain inn that Alexander's wife owned a one-third interest in received nearly \$65,000 in business from UT during his tenure there." At his own expense, Alexander flew to Nashville 8/10 and spent 90 minutes with reporters (see HOTLINES 8/9, 8/12). There he said he was "puzzled" by the issue, adding it was "old news" (NASHVILLE BANNER, 8/12). Also, the BANNER (8/10) and NASHVILLE TENNESSEAN (8/12) report on a UT athletic dept. deal with the consulting firm of Tom Ingram, who earlier served then-Gov. Alexander as chief of staff. The unwritten agreement was in the form of retainer, not a direct contract; The Ingram Group was paid \$36,000 over 2 years by Host Communications, which did have a direct contract with the UT athletic dept. TN Finance Commis. David Manning "has called the hiring and billing arrangements between the fall of 1989 and July 1991 'highly irregular' and 'inappropriate' following a review of the practice" (TENNESSEAN, 8/13). Ingram, now with Knoxville-based Whittle Communications, said his firm "worked with them to provide public relations, counsel and other strategic services" (8/9). "If someone is suggesting we had a contract to work for Lamar, they're crazy" (8/12). TENNESSEAN editorial headline: "Alexander must open his financial records." The paper says, "The questions dogging Alexander are hurting UT, hurting the state, and hurting the Department of Education. And the only way for the hurting to stop is for Alexander to make full disclosure of every single one of his and his family's financial dealings. ... If there is nothing to hide, then hide nothing" (8/13).

*17 WISCONSIN: FEINGOLD AIDE DISPUTES MOODY'S WAR CHEST
"Despite a pledge between" state Sen. Russ Feingold (D) and Rep. Jim Moody (D-05) "that they would not indulge in personal campaign attacks during their campaigns" to unseat Sen. Bob Kasten (R), Moody aide Marcus Kunian "angrily denounced Feingold" 8/7 (John Hunter, Madison CAPITAL TIMES). Kunian "said there is a 'pattern of misrepresentation and a sleazy attempt at getting false negative charges against Moody into print.' ... Moody's camp is riled up over claims by Feingold aide Robert Decheine

that Moody has transferred \$185,000 from his bank account to his campaign treasury, boosting the cash total to \$571,964 in order to give the inflated impression that he is getting a lot of support" (8/8). Decheine: "They were plugging along and by the middle of June they realized they weren't anywhere near where they had to be ... so they did everything they could to look like they were way ahead of us. The word that keeps popping into my mind is panic." Kunian refuted the charges, saying the purpose of the personal loan is "sending a signal ... in terms of his commitment to the race." MILWAUKEE JOURNAL's Craig Gilbert notes, "While the Feingold camp claims Moody's fund-raising is lagging, Feingold's modest \$112,000 war chest indicates he still has to prove his own ability to raise money." Kasten, who had \$1.3M in the bank at mid-year, is expected to raise and spend \$5M or more. Likely contender businessman Joe Checota (D) didn't file a report and has not yet formed a campaign cmte (8/8).

*18 PENNSYLVANIA SENATE: WILL KS KO THORNBURGH?

AG Dick Thornburgh (R), "conceding that he made his 'share of mistakes' ... vigorously defended his three years" at the DoJ in an interview with the PITTSBURGH POST-GAZETTE, "saying that he tried to make the office 'more professional and less political." He listed his chief accomplishments: "sharply increasing the [DoJ's] budget, hiring additional prosecutors, more aggressively investigating white-collar crime, and more vigorously enforcing the nation's anti-trust laws." On the 1989 leak that House Maj. Whip Wm Gray (D-02) was being investigated: "I went ballistic and made a bigger deal out of it than I probably should have." He also "insisted" he has "a strong commitment to civil rights" and that Judge Patrick Kelly in KS "acted erroneously" and that they "have a right in court -- not on national TV -- to take issue with that Judge" (Jack Torry, 8/13). Thornburgh's "mixed record" as AG will be "a major focus" of Sen. Harris Wofford's (D) campaign. Wofford manager Paul Begala termed the Wichita case "an example of how he has moved to the extreme right wing." Wofford "has tried to stake out a middle ground on abortion, supporting a [PA] law that requires a 24-hour waiting period, notification of spouses and other restrictions now being considered in the courts. ... The raging controversy over abortion is expected to follow" Thornburgh from the DoJ "to the campaign trail." NOW's Patricia Ireland: "If Dick Thornburgh thinks this is going to help him in his race ... he has badly miscalculated" (Rowley, AP, 8/10).

EDITORIALS: PHILA. DAILY NEWS: "True to form, he plays to the mob. ... It is a frightening example of just how much our rights depend on the character and principles of those who are supposed to enforce the law. And just how little character and principle Dick Thornburgh would bring to the Senate" (8/12).

PITTSBURGH POST-GAZETTE: "The [DoJ] undermined the respect for the federal courts that any [AG] should attempt to foster, especially at a time of civil unrest ... On this one, we submit, [Thornburgh] lost his balance" (8/12). BOSTON GLOBE: "[His] bias in the Wichita case ... should be held in contempt" (8/12).

MIAMI HERALD: "Thornburgh's resignation ... is as welcome as it is overdue" (8/12). WASH. POST: "The [DoJ's] splashy and unnecessary intervention in his final days on the side of antiabortion demonstrators and against a federal judge in Wichita marked an unhappy end to his tenure. We ... persist in thinking [he] had much more to offer in government than he gave" (8/13).

PUTTING THEIR TWO CENTS IN: Neither Thornburgh nor Wofford "should look for immediate financial assistance" from state parties, because mid-year FEC reports show state party "coffers for the Senate race are nearly empty." Although most estimates suggest each candidate will need \$4-\$5M to run their campaigns, the GOP reported \$31,738 on hand, while the Dems reported \$438.92. At the end of June, Wofford had raised \$325,830. Thornburgh hasn't started \$-raising (Harrisburg PATRIOT-NEWS, 8/11).

POT SHOTS: PA's League of Women Voters will sponsor two debates. They already invited Wofford and will invite Thornburgh as soon as his candidacy is official. Wofford urged Thornburgh to accept (PATRIOT-NEWS, 8/11).

FILLING THORNY SHOES: MIAMI HERALD headline: "Wanted:

Attorney General: But not a 'Thornburgh' (8/12). The JOURNAL OF COMMERCE reports Thornburgh's resignation has "rekindled speculation that" Sec/Trans. Sam Skinner "will be tapped" for the post. But Skinner, who is "rumored to be in line for" the WH CoS job should John Sununu step down, "is said to want to remain at DOT through the end of President Bush's first term." US Trade Rep. Carla Hills "insisted ... she's happy where she is," as "leaving her trade post now could set back international trade negotiations" at the GATT (8/12).

*19 LOUISIANA GOVERNOR: POLL SHOWS EDWARDS WITH SLIGHT LEAD

A poll, conducted 7/30-8/2 by Marketing Research Institute, surveyed 800 registered voters; margin of error +/- 3.5% (MRI release, 8/12). Tested: Gov. Buddy Roemer (R), ex-Gov. Edwin Edwards (D), state Rep. David Duke (R), Public Service Commis. Kathleen Blanco (D), banking commis. Fred Dent (D), Rep. Clyde Holloway (R-08) and Franklin Mayor Sam Jones (D).

ANTI-DUKE COALITION GEARS UP: While many opponents of state Rep. David Duke (R) "felt it was best to simply to ignore him" when he was elected to the Legislature, the Louisiana Coalition Against Racism and Nazism "argued that morally they could not remain silent." The coalition, led by Lance Hill, was first formed to oppose Duke's bid for the U.S. Senate. In '90 they raised nearly \$500K, "more than any other" PAC in the state, "and were credited with providing information to the media that indicated Duke still held Jews and blacks in contempt." Plans to gear up for the Gov. race "renewed debate over whether its attacks hurt or help him." GOP chair Wm. Nungesser: "In an effort to stop him, you might give him the publicity he hasn't been able to get this year. You don't give your opponents free publicity." Duke "said he benefits from the media coverage the coalition generates": "They will focus more attention on my candidacy and will make clear the delineation between my conservatism and the NAACP membership of Gov. Roemer and Edwin Edwards." Hill "said that while he does not want to give Duke undue publicity, if the group doesn't speak out the public will only hear Duke's view of an issue." Hill "said that simply portraying Duke as a Nazi and Klansman is no longer effective

because voters have already made up their minds whether this matters. The new strategy will attempt to take recent statements Duke has made or policies he favors and try to show that they are consistent with the more openly racist or anti-Semitic policies he used to advocate" (Tyler Bridges, N.O. TIMES PICAYUNE, 8/12).

***20 KENTUCKY GOVERNOR: FRIENDS OF HOPKINS**

Dan Quayle, "a national workhorse for the [GOP], performed four basic tasks for" Rep. Larry Hopkins (R-06): He raised about \$100K at a \$-raising breakfast where he said Hopkins' election "would be a step toward Bush carrying the state next year"; "He pressed the flesh" at an unannounced restaurant stop; "He bashed national Democrats and otherwise sent a message of party unity in the heart of the heavily Republican" 5th CD "where GOP solidarity is essential to Hopkins"; "And he offered independent-minded Democrats a reason to forsake their party in the Nov. 5 election, suggesting that a Hopkins could get Kentucky more help from the Bush Administration than could" LG Brerton Jones (D): "Larry Hopkins can get ahold of me or President George Bush any time that he wants. Kentucky will only be a phone call away." Rep. Hal Rogers (R-05) at the breakfast \$-raiser: "Our party's come together. I can feel the rumblings in my district. I can feel the surge beginning" (Al Cross, Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL, 8/13). Nancy Sununu, wife of WH CoS John Sununu was "the first of several Washington figures who will make appearances for" Hopkins She "was the featured attraction [8/9] at a fund-raiser for the entire [GOP] ticket" -- a "\$100-per-person reception." Min. Whip Newt Gingrich (R-GA) "will speak at a fund-raiser ... later this month." Bush "is expected" in Oct. and other cabinet visitors will be Labor Sec. Lynn Martin, Veteran's Affairs Sec. Edward Derwinski, Ag. Sec. Edward Madigan, Interior Sec. Manuel Lujan and HUD Sec. Jack Kemp (Cross, C-J, 8/10).

INCONSISTENCY ON THE OTHER SIDE: Jones "may be changing his plan to have business people oversee state economic-development programs." In a 8/5 debate, Jones said "he wants representatives of business groups to nominate two or three candidates ... for appointment by the governor" but his "economic-development platform" released "in late March" said "a board of business representatives would hire the secretary, not make nominations to the governor." Gov. appointment of the sec. "should please" Gov. Wallace Wilkinson (D) "who said soon after the primary that he would endorse Jones only he was assured that Jones wouldn't weaken gubernatorial power." Jones spokesperson Diana Taylor said "Jones' possible revision was unrelated to Wilkinson." Hopkins: "You just can't go around appointing committees to make the tough decisions for you. Some of them you have to make on your own." Jones in response to Hopkins: "What I am proposing is obviously something that ... you're misunderstanding" (Cross, C-J, 8/6).

ABORTION IN THE COURTROOM: NBC's Carl Stern: "Today the Justice Department sought to distance itself from the conduct of the protesters." DoJ's John Roberts: "It's a very technical legal argument about which court has jurisdiction to hear this case." Stern: DoJ lawyers "refused even to meet with lawyers for Operation Rescue who were seeking further help." CBS' Dan Rather: "The focus of the long-running anti-abortion protest ... shifted today from the abortion clinics to the courtroom." CBS' Scott Pelley on the trial of 12 Operation Rescuers arrested 8/9: "12 defendants ... arrived in federal court this morning for what many believed would be a showdown between Operation Rescue and Judge Patrick Kelly. ... This morning the courtroom was stunned when prominent Operation Rescue figure Joseph Foreman was released ... Kelly called the incident a sad ordeal but ruled that the marshals had stopped the priests before they could block the clinic." Operation Rescue spokesman Rev. Pat Mahoney: "Judge Kelly is the one who is intensifying this situation. Judge Kelly is the one who is the problem" (8/12).

MERGER WAVE GOOD OR BAD?: CBS' Ray Brady on the merger of Bank of America and Security Pacific, now the nation's second largest bank: "Many analysts predict that the merger wave means that today's 12,000 banks could end up as 50 to 60 mega-banks down the road. Don't worry consumers, say the banks, there may be fewer branches around-- they'll be closed to save money and service will be better and your money will be safer. But some experts see danger signs." Nat'l Mortgage News' Stan Strachan: "Banks will gain such a substantial share of market that they will be able to simply to set prices. ... simply because they'll own certain market areas" (8/12).

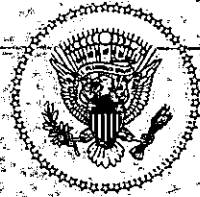

Ten Billion Dollar U.S. Loan Guarantees for Israel: Your Marching Orders

For years, we've outdone ourselves tossing out hoops for Congress to jump through. We're proud to say that we've surpassed even our own expectations with the \$10 billion loan guarantee -- the ultimate hoop -- and the most exorbitantly risky and outrageous proposition yet. Finally, our dream can become a reality. Here's how! First, we get some of our friends to believe, or at least pretend, that these are *really* loans which Israel will *really* repay. Then, we convince them that this is purely "humanitarian aid" with no relation whatsoever to the 40,000 new settlement units Israel announced last month. Finally, we hoodwink our friends into believing that Israel will still come to the peace talks in October after Congress gives it the \$10 billion in September. This might seem a bit much to expect -- but then what are "friends" for?

Here are some of our winning arguments. You should study them.

Trust us, the money is for the immigrants:

- * Israel had originally budgeted \$10 billion of its own funds over the next five years for such essential activities as building new settlements, maintaining thousands of defense forces in the West Bank and Gaza, and buying bulk supplies of rubber bullets. When Israel found out the Soviet immigrants were coming, it had to revise its spending plans and reallocate most of those funds to finance the massive resettlement. Now, with \$10 billion from the U.S. dedicated to the absorption, Israel has no need to disrupt its original plan.
- * The successful absorption of Soviet immigrants over the next five years is Israel's second highest priority. Israel's first priority is figuring out how to continue getting handouts without having to give up a single inch of the "administered" territories.

Those "deep pockets" in the United States:

- * "Guaranteeing loans" for Israel, up to \$2 billion a year for the next five years (we always say it this way so some people don't realize it's \$10 BILLION), is the best way we think the United States can justify sending Israel lots of money and not have too much to say about what Israel does with it. Guarantees are not grants -- at this point, we can say truthfully that not one penny of U.S. government funds will be transferred to Israel through these guarantees. Later, however, when it's clear that Israel hasn't a snowball's chance in hell of paying them back, and that some U.S. banks are in danger of going belly-up, we plan to lobby Congress either to have these "loan guarantees" converted to grants, or to just bail out the banks (something Congress should be quite good at by then).

Many benefits for America:

- * The U.S. will not need to figure out which critical domestic program -- housing, job training, education -- actually deserves all or part of the \$10 billion. One simple loan guarantee to Israel eliminates those tough decisions.
- * Ted Koppel will have something else to talk about.
- * Our staff are so busy lobbying Congress and producing memoranda such as this that they don't have the time to keep track of what members of Congress and the Senate we plan to target for removal in the next election.

Israel's ability to repay:

- * Israel has never defaulted on a loan, and maintains a highly favorable debt portfolio by international standards. This has been a relatively easy feat, in that Israel only pays the interest on its loans, and as mentioned before, Congress manages to convert most of them to grants before any principal is actually due. In fact, AIPCA has been so successful in supporting Israel's financial interests that we are now offering a \$395 course at the Capital Hilton one weekend a month to borrower nations that would like to learn our highly-proven techniques.

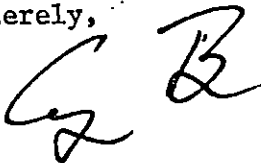
Thank you for your campaign planning memo.

Subject: Campaign Planning

Thank you for including me in the Camp David meeting last Saturday. I felt the discussions were productive and useful, and the key players had a good rapport and should work well together in the campaign.

You invited follow-up comments. This note is not intended to be definitive or inclusive but to underscore a few key points for your consideration.

Campaign Timing

The decision to begin organizing the Finance team now is the right one, as they do need to get started in September. Their task is not daunting (i.e. the money will be there), but it will take time, effort, and organization.

The timing on the campaign organization is another matter. In my view, the requirements in 1991 are modest. Other than fairly routine administrative and legal chores, the most important task will be to identify and gain commitments from those people we expect to chair the campaign in key states and to fill the key roles in the national campaign organization. This should be done quietly with little or no public announcements. Thus, for this Fall, it is hard to envision more than 7 or 8 people operating out of a small suite of offices.

Given the above you could wait until October or even November to announce your campaign team. However, it would be extremely helpful to make your decisions on organization and quietly convey these decisions to the top players by around Labor Day. In this way, they could begin arranging their personal commitments accordingly and could also begin the planning process. If you were to follow this schedule, it may be necessary in the interim to appoint a mid-level administrative person to begin working on office space, communications, security, legal, and the like. This is similar to the approach you took on the transition in naming Chase Untermeyer to undertake low visibility transition planning, well in advance of your selection of heads of the transition team.

Campaign Organization

The "conventional wisdom" is that the campaign will be led by a combination of Mosbacher, Teeter, and Malek. Mosbacher would be a general chairman, spending part time on personal business and part time overseeing and consulting with the finance, campaign, and RNC teams. Teeter and Malek would in effect run the campaign together with Teeter the chief strategist and Malek the operator. Among others, Charlie Black would serve as a senior consultant to the team, Roger Ailes would handle advertising, and

Jim Lake would be a senior advisor on communications. I don't know if this represents your thinking or not, but my feeling is that it would work fine, as would a number of other configurations. A few points to consider:

- Bob Mosbacher can make a contribution in the campaign or he can do so as a continuing member of the Cabinet - he'd be an effective spokesman and organizer of the business community in your support from either post. If you select him for the general chairman role, I believe everyone else involved would enjoy working with him.
- Everyone understands the key role of the White House staff in the campaign and the need to work closely with John Sununu. In effect it needs to be a team effort and would include daily meetings between top campaign people and John and members of his staff to coordinate campaign strategy, tactics, and operations. If you select me to be involved, I personally welcome the opportunity to work with John in this manner.
- There will be considerable built in fragmentation to the campaign given White House involvement, the RNC, and the need to coordinate closely with the Finance Committee, the RNC, and the House and Senate Campaign Committees. Therefore, it is important to avoid further fragmentation in the campaign team by having all elements of the campaign (e.g. advertising, the convention) responsible to the top campaign leadership and not operating independently. Given your involvement and relationship with all the key players, this need not cut off frequent direct contact, but some central responsibility and authority is needed to coordinate and bring together the entire effort in a hard hitting and cohesive manner.
- All of the people at the Camp David meeting were smart and effective, but most were inside the Beltway and Caucasian male. It will be helpful for the campaign organization to recruit a number of top women and minorities and to have a mix of "old-hand inside the beltway" types and new blood from key states.

Near Term Priorities

The need to be more visibly involved in domestic issues over the coming months was clearly articulated at Camp David. As we also discussed, the 1992 election will be far more influenced by the state of the economy than anything else. Unfortunately, the state of the economy is quite uncertain, a double dip back into recession is a distinct possibility, and you are perceived as somewhat detached from the problem.

I am not predicting there will be a double dip - in fact the vast majority of economists do not see this. However, the preponderance of anecdotal evidence from business people all over the country suggest the recovery is not yet on track and a double dip is enough of a probability to be dealt with. Thus, my argument is to prepare for the worst by taking steps now to substantively and perceptually invigorate the recovery. Here are a few suggested steps to start the process:

1. Commit a large part of your personal time in September and October to personally getting into the issue and developing your own firm convictions on the depth of the problem and possible solutions.

2. Start with some lengthy, substantive meetings with your economic team (possibly including Alan Greenspan) to discuss and debate the issue and frame such concerns as the credit crunch, auto industry, housing sluggishness, etc.
3. Supplement the above with another round of give and take sessions with business and financial leaders from around the country. Include some smaller company and bank heads. Engage in a true dialogue and ask not only for a description of the problem but also their suggested solution.
4. Define the problem to your own satisfaction and develop a series of actions and public events to deal with the problem and the perception.
5. Ensure that you have a schedule the next six months that highlights for the American people your understanding of the economic realities, your empathy for those not doing too well, and your hands on leadership to improve economic vitality.

Campaign Tactics

It is premature to suggest strategy or themes, but here are a few selected points related to issues discussed Saturday:

- Your role should be strictly limited until the Convention. You can do far more for the country and for your own re-election from the Presidency than from the campaign trail. Further, an extremely active surrogate program is envisioned to take on opponents as needed.
- This should be a high road campaign all the way. You are the hero of the Gulf War, the one leader who brought the nations of the World together to defeat a bully, and you will be re-elected based on your unparalleled record and character. You are above slapping opponents and don't need to. Whatever needs to be done can be carried out by surrogates, but even this should be held to a minimum. In my opinion, the American people are sick of negative campaigning.
- There should be an incredibly active surrogate program. Obviously, the Vice President, Cabinet members, Senators, Congressmen, Governors, and family members should be in the lead and on the road non-stop, articulating your positions, defining the issues, and countering opponents. Cabinet wives, sub-Cabinet officials, and some state legislators should also be part of the program. An Assistant Secretary of HHS can't make news in Washington or New York but can have considerable impact in Peoria.
- Your great popularity provides a great opportunity to recruit hundreds of thousands of volunteers in the states. This should be a high priority. Part of this should be organizing at the national level and in each key state, active committees representing groups such as farmers, veterans, older Americans, young voters, Blacks, Hispanics, Italian-Americans, doctors, lawyers, etc.

- Above and beyond all else there should be no talks of mandates or landslides. Mandates don't mean anything (e.g. Johnson in '64 and Nixon in '72 both won big). More importantly, over confidence is one of our biggest threats. The 1992 campaign should be approached as if you are neck and neck and in the fight of your life, and this should be the attitude of every campaign worker. At the same time, of course, you and your organization should do everything possible to support other candidates.

SUBJECT: ANALYSIS OF KEY VOTES IN THE 102nd CONGRESS

This memorandum provides our most recent analysis of Congressional support for your Administration's positions based on what we consider to be the key votes cast in the first seven months of the 102nd Congress. The votes selected were those where a clear Presidential position was expressed on a particular vote. House and Senate votes are analyzed separately.

Generally, this analysis shows that House and Senate Republicans supported your position 86% of the time, while Democrats supported your position about 20% of the time. Because of strong Republican support and the votes of Democrats from southern states, you have won nearly every major issue or have garnered enough votes to show veto strength.

THE SENATE

Thirty-five key votes were selected for the Senate analysis. Twenty votes dealt with budget and domestic policy issues while 15 dealt with foreign policy and national security issues.

(1) You enjoy continued strong support from Senate Republicans. In the January to August period, the median Presidential support level among Republicans was 86%. This is slightly higher than the 82% level among Republicans in the 101st Congress.

Senators Dole, Domenici and Garn supported you 97% of the time, followed by Senators McConnell, Symms and Gramm (95%). The lowest Republican scores were by Senators Jeffords (45%) and Hatfield (54%).

(2) The median Presidential support score for Democrats was 23%, identical to Democrats' score in the 101st Congress.

Southern Democrats remain your strongest supporters. Senators Heflin (70%), Shelby (66%), Breaux (63%), and Johnston (54%) had the highest scores. Senators Harkin (03%) and Adams, Sasser, Metzenbaum and Wellstone (09%) had the lowest scores. (Senator Pryor's 0% score is the result of his not voting in the past four months because of illness.)

(3) As a result of your strong support by Senate Republicans and Southern Democrats, your position either prevailed outright or received enough votes to indicate your veto could be sustained on 34 of the 35 votes. Your position prevailed on 23 votes of the 35 votes (you won 21 votes outright; on two votes you won the issue in conference committee after proving veto strength in the Senate). Your position lost on one vote (restoring funding for the Administration's housing reform (HOPE) initiative). On the remaining 11 votes your position did not receive a majority, but sufficient votes were cast to indicate that a Presidential veto could be sustained. The legislation associated with these 11 votes is still pending in Congress.

The House of Representatives

Twenty-one votes were selected for the House analysis. Of these votes, 12 dealt with budget and domestic policy issues, while nine dealt with foreign policy, national security and international trade matters.

(1) House Republican support for your positions remained strong. The median level of support among House Republicans for the January to August time period was 86%, slightly more than your level of support in the 101st Congress (83%). The number of "strong" Republican supporters is at its highest point ever. For example, 76 Republicans (almost half of all Republicans) had Presidential support levels above 90%. This compares to 50 members with 90% or better support during 1989 and only 22 in 1990.

Twenty-five House Republicans voted with you 100% of the time, including: Minority Leader Michel; Reps. Goss, Ireland, Shaw, and Young (FL); Reps. Baker, McCrery, and Livingston (LA); Reps. Archer, Armey, and Johnson (TX); Reps. Sundquist (TN), Hastert (IL), and Lowery (CA).

As in previous analyses, Republicans with the lowest level of Presidential support are clustered in the Northeast. Examples include: Reps. Green and Gilman (NY), 33%; Reps. Morella (MD), 40%; and Horton (NY), 43%.

(2) The median support level among House Democrats was 19%, quite similar to the Democrats' 20% level in the 101st Congress. So far this year 17 Democrats supported you more than 50% of the time. This compares to only 10 Democrats in 1990 and 53 Democrats in 1989.

As in years past, the vast majority of your strong Democrat supporters come from Southern states, including: Reps. Montgomery (MS), 76%; Stenholm (TX), 76%; Huckaby (LA), 75%; Hutto (FL), 66%; Hall (TX), 62%; Tauzin and Hayes (LA), 62%; Parker (MS), 62%.

More than 20 Democrats had Presidential support levels of 0%. Examples include Reps. Waxman, Miller and Boxer, (CA); Kennedy and Studds (MA); Conyers (MI) and Smith (FL). Other Democrat Members of interest include Gephardt (MO) and Bonior (MI) at 9%.

(3) Your position prevailed outright in seven of the 21 key votes selected. Further, in all but one case (Pelosi China MFN Resolution) on the 14 issues where your position did not prevail outright, there were enough votes generated for your position to sustain a veto when it was threatened.

4. WON **Resolution Trust Corporation Funding Bill.** Final Passage of the Administration-backed RTC bill. Passed 69-30.
5. LOST* **Dairy Price Support Bill.** Leahy/Jeffords bill to increase dairy price supports. Amendment passed 60-40. (Subsequently the amendment was deleted from the final bill in conference after the bill was threatened with a veto.)
6. LOST **Funding HUD's HOPE Program.** D'Amato amendment to provide funding for the Administration's Homeownership and Opportunity for People Everywhere program. Amendment defeated 48-52.

7. LOST* **Restrict U.S. Aid to Jordan.** Nickles amendment restricting U.S. military and economic aid to Jordan. Passed 43-57. (Subsequently, the bill containing the amendment was threatened with a veto and a compromise was reached in conference.)
8. WON **Martinez Nomination.** Confirmation vote for Bob Martinez as Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy. Passed 88-12.
9. WON **Moynihan Social Security Tax Cut.** Moynihan amendment to the Budget Resolution to reduce Social Security taxes. Amendment defeated 38-60.
10. LOST** **Cloture Vote on Retail Price Fixing Act.** Cloture invoked 63-35. (Bill not yet considered in House.)
11. LOST** **Campaign Financing.** McConnell amendment striking spending limits and taxpayer financing of campaigns. Amendment defeated 42-56. (Bill not yet considered in House.)
12. LOST** **Campaign Financing.** Final passage of Democrats' campaign financing bill. Passed 56-42. (Bill not yet considered in House.)
13. WON **Fast-Track for Uruguay Round Trade Talks.** Resolution disapproving the President's request for fast track procedures. Defeated 36-59.
14. LOST** **Domestic Content Mandate in "Baby Bells" Bill.** Gramm amendment deleting mandatory domestic content provision from bill allowing "Baby Bells" to manufacture products. Defeated 32-64. (Bill note yet considered in House.)
15. WON **Highway Bill/Government Taking of Private Property.** Symms amendment requiring Attorney General to certify that other agencies' regulations safeguard against the use of taking private property. Amendment passed 55-44. (Bill not yet considered in House.)

16. WON **Highway Bill/Federal Share of Bridge and Road Maintenance.** Lott amendment increasing federal share of the state matching ratios for interstate highway and bridge maintenance. Defeated 44-53. (Bill not yet considered in House.)
17. WON **Crime Bill/Racial Justice and the Death Penalty.** Mitchell (for Graham) amendment struck provisions from the bill banning the death penalty where statistics showed it is used in a racially discriminatory manner. Amendment passed 55-41.
18. LOST** **Administration's Crime Bill.** Thurmond amendment substituting the Administration's crime bill for the Senate Judiciary Committee's bill. Amendment defeated 40-56.
19. LOST** **Crime Bill/Exclusionary Rule.** Thurmond amendment making the exclusionary rule tougher. Amendment defeated 43-54.
20. WON **Crime Bill/Habeas Corpus.** Hatch-Thurmond substitute for committee's provisions on habeas corpus reform. The amendment included Administration-backed reforms. Amendment passed 58-40. (Crime bill not yet considered in House.)
21. WON **Superconducting Super Collider.** Bumpers amendment blocking funds for SSC project. Amendment defeated 37-62. (Funding included in final bill sent to the President.)
22. LOST** **Family Planning Regulations.** Durenberger substitute to the committee bill requiring the Title X program to provide mandatory medical referral for pregnant women. Amendment defeated 35-64. (Bill not yet considered by full House.)
23. WON **Family Planning/Parental Notification.** Coats amendment providing parental notification for minors who request an abortion. Amendment passed 52-47. (Bill not yet considered by full House.)

24. WON **Space Station.** Bumpers amendment reducing space station funding. Amendment defeated 35-64. (Funding included in final bill sent to the President.)

Cloture was not invoked 52-44 (60 votes are needed to invoke cloture.). Subsequently, the amendment was withdrawn from the bill.
31. LOST** **Foreign Aid/UNFPA.** Cloture vote on Simon amendment restoring U.S. contributions to U.N population program in China that had been cut-off because of China's coerced abortion program. Cloture was invoked 63-33.
32. WON **Defense Authorization/SDI Funding.** Gore amendment reducing SDI program. Amendment defeated 39-60.

- 33. WON **Defense Authorization/SDI Funding.** Bingaman amendment reducing SDI program. Amendment defeated 43-56.
- 34. WON **Defense Authorization/SDI Funding.** Bumpers amendment reducing SDI program. Amendment defeated 46-52.
- 35. WON **Defense Authorization Bill/B-2 Bomber.** Leahy amendment terminating B-2 bomber production. Amendment defeated 42-57.

(Note: In some cases votes occurred on parliamentary tabling motions not described in these summaries. The votes selected are consistent with the action taken. For example, on Vote 21 the Senate voted to table the Bumpers amendment eliminating funding for the Superconducting Super Collider. The summary does not reference the tabling action; rather it says the amendment was defeated by a 37-62 vote.)

THE BUSHES TAKE THORNBURGH TO DINNER

KENNEBUNKPORT, MAINE

TUESDAY, AUGUST 13, 1991

President and Mrs. Bush took Attorney General Dick Thornburgh to dinner at Mabel's Lobster Claw Restaurant on Ocean Avenue. The president wore a blue shirt, tan pants and a red, white and blue windbreaker adorned with an American flag and the words "I'm proud to be an American" on the back. Mabel, the owner, greeted the group as they arrived. Bush pointed to Thornburgh and said: "Star guest." Inside, they were joined at the table by White House photographer David Valdez and the nurse from the White House medical unit that accompanied the motorcade. They stayed at the restaurant from about 7:25 p.m. until shortly before 9 p.m. (Your pool, alas, cannot relay the president's menu as we dined across the street.)

A large crowd gathered outside the restaurant and applauded as the Bushes and Thornburgh left. Thornburgh flashed thumbs up to your pool. Asked if he expected a tough race for the Senate, Thornburgh said: "Always tough in Pennsylvania."

As the motorcade left Walker's Point to head for the restaurant, a large sedan stopped at the end of the driveway to let the tail end of the 'cade--the two press vans, the ambulance and the tail car--go by. At the wheel was Chief of Staff John H. Sununu in shirtsleeves. He fell in behind the tail car and disappeared into the night.

THE PRESIDENT FINISHES A QUIET ROUND OF GOLF

KENNEBUNKPORT, MAINE

TUESDAY, AUGUST 13, 1991

The president did not speak to your pool as he finished his round of golf with Cape Arundel Golf Club pro Ken Raynor, son George W. Bush and Bush pal Greg Stapleton. Unofficial elapsed time: 2 hours, one minute.

The press office advises that Bush plans to take Attorney General Dick Thornburgh out on Fidelity at 5:30 this afternoon and plans to go out for dinner tonight.

BEFORE TEEING OFF, the president had some additional comments not reflected in the transcript. There was some chatter about fishing. "It's been good this summer," he said, and expressed his preference for lures that float on the surface. "Isn't that fun when they explode and hit it?" he enthused. He also expressed amazement at Darryl Heickes' catch in the waters just off the Shawmut.

Told that Clarence Thomas had been endorsed today by a group, whose identity is not known to your pool, Bush said: "He should be endorsed by a wide array of groups...He'll make a superb justice."

Asked if he would endorse Thornburgh in Pittsburgh Wednesday, Bush said: "I expect to say good things about him today, tomorrow or any other day...He's been superb. I'll be wishing him well in what lies ahead."

The President also voiced his support for Supreme Court-nominee Clarence Thomas and outgoing Attorney General Dick Thornburgh.

The President wore a green polo shirt with the Cape Arundel Golf Club crest and light blue slacks, and his black and white saddle shoe golf shoes.

Tee-off time was shortly after 1:25 p.m.
