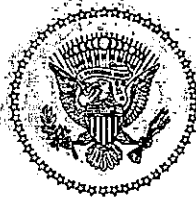

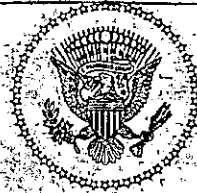

JEWS IRKED BY BUSH'S POSITION ON ISRAEL

Strong sentiments are raging in the American Jewish community in the wake of President Bush's stepped up -- and increasingly public -- campaign to delay \$10 billion in U.S. loan guarantees to Israel....

Perhaps the most extreme view is that of Morris Amitay, treasurer of the pro-Israel Washington Political Action Committee and former executive director of the powerful American Israel Political Affairs Committee.

"What really disturbed our community was that the President talked about 'powerful political forces,' whom he called 'lobbyists,'" Amitay said. "But he was really referring to hundreds of Americans merely exercising their right to influence their government.

"That bothered a lot of people who felt that the President was coming pretty close to the line of inciting anti-Semitism," he said.

BUSH'S DISPUTE WITH ISRAEL UPSETS MANY LEADING JEWS

BOSTON -- President Bush's demand that Congress delay debate on Israel's request for \$10 billion in loan guarantees has deeply troubled many Jews who have been critical of Prime Minister Shamir's government, with most blaming Bush for the confrontation but with some also faulting Shamir.

"It seems to me the Administration has really shot itself in the foot," said Henry Siegman, the executive director of the American Jewish Congress....

"Everyone will be a loser," he said. If Bush gets the 120-day delay on the loan guarantees that he has demanded, it will hurt Israel and give ammunition to Shamir's right-wing supporters, he said. If Bush loses, "it will be a Pyrrhic victory."

DEMOCRATS CRITICIZE BUSH FOR LINKING LOAN TO ISRAEL WITH PEACE

Two leading Democrats say President Bush is wrong to tie the issue of resettling Soviet Jews in Israel to the start of a Middle East peace conference....

Sen. Bradley said Sunday that the U.S. was violating "a fundamental moral principle" by seeking to link the loan issue to the peace talks....

"This is the largest exodus of Jews since the creation of the state of Israel," Bradley said on "Face The Nation."

"I think we should be there and we should stand at this moment with Israel that is absorbing...those who are fleeing oppression," he said.

Sen. Nunn said the U.S. should not allow any money to be used for settlements in the occupied territories.

But Nunn, speaking on "Meet The Press," also criticized Bush's tactics in fighting for a delay on the loan guarantees.

"We really should not connect humanitarian aid with the overall peace process," said Nunn. "Right now (Bush) is apparently is tying it to the peace process."

"If he ties it to the settlements, then he would certainly come much closer to having my support," Nunn said. (AP)

ISRAELI MINISTER CALLS BUSH A LIAR, ANTISEMITE

JERUSALEM -- An Israeli cabinet minister Sunday branded President Bush a liar and an antisemite who is "conducting a political fight on the backs of millions of Jews" in seeking to delay loan guarantees Israel has requested to help it settle Soviet Jews emigrating to Israel.

Calling for a delay in a proposed Middle East peace conference, minister-without-portfolio Zeevi made the accusations against Bush at a weekly cabinet meeting in launching a campaign by the right wing to secure \$10 billion in U.S. loan guarantees.

Israeli Defense Minister Arens, interviewed on "This Week With David Brinkley," repudiated Zeevi's remarks and said Zeevi represents only "a tiny faction in Israeli society."...

Sen. Nunn, also interviewed on "This Week With David Brinkley," suggested that Bush tell the Israelis "not to use this money directly or indirectly to settle" Jews on the occupied Arab territories rather than linking the guarantees to the peace conference.

"I don't think America ought to put up \$10 billion for (Israeli Housing Minister) Sharon's housing policy," Nunn said.

U.S., ISRAEL ON COLLISION COURSE**Bush Move On Loan Guarantees Seen As Ill-Timed**

JERUSALEM -- The Bush Administration's high-profile campaign to delay congressional action on loan guarantees to Israel may have precipitated a conflict with the Israeli government at the wrong time and on the wrong issue, Israeli analysts say.

"The Administration has ended up working against its own script, which was to postpone confrontations and deal with substantive issues after they had been put in a different context through the peace process," said Shai Feldman, a specialist on U.S.-Israeli relations at the Jaffee Center for Strategic Studies at Tel Aviv University....

"If Bush had gone after settlements openly, he would have got a lot of support from the Israeli public, from American Jewish opinion and from Congress," said David Calyman, the representative in Israel of the American Jewish Congress. "But when he links it to the peace process, I think he's lost them. Nobody understands what this has to do with the peace process."...

If Bush now succeeds in delaying the guarantees, "the price will be U.S. credibility in Israel on the eve of the peace conference," said Harry Wall of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. "Bush will reinforce the arguments of the Israeli right that the U.S. is not an honest broker and that Israel can't afford to enter negotiations in which the U.S. might take the side of the Arabs and force concessions."...

Israeli political analysts argue that in order to succeed, an Administration squeeze on Shamir would have to be carefully timed and calculated to appeal to Israeli opinion, offering a clear choice between peace and U.S. support on the one hand and the prime minister's irredentist ideology on the other. The loan guarantee battle, they say, fails by this measure.

PHILIPPINES SENATE REJECTS BASE AGREEMENT

MANILA -- The Philippines Senate refused to extend the lease for Subic Bay naval base Monday in a vote that could end U.S. military presence in the islands and close one of the largest U.S. bases in Asia. Twelve of the 23 senators -- four more votes than necessary -- opposed the agreement that would have extended the lease on the base for 10 years. President Aquino said earlier that she would hold a referendum to extend the lease on the base.... Well-placed anonymous sources said the Americans had agreed to delay their departure pending the referendum.... The government has not spelled out its strategy in detail, but it appeared the Filipinos would not vote directly on the lease agreement. Instead, they would be asked whether they approved the Senate's decision.

In that event, rejection of the Senate vote would return the issue to the Senate for reconsideration, most likely putting a final decision in the hands of the new government and Congress to be elected in May.... "The proposed treaty perpetuates U.S. infringement on Filipino sovereignty, in effect prolonging our colonial master-slave relationship under the guise of special relations," said Sen. Aquino. (Eileen Guerrero, AP)

Philippine Senate Rejects U.S. Bases Pact

MANILA -- ...Opinion surveys show most Filipinos favor the agreement under which the U.S. will withdraw within one year from Clark Air Base and remain for 10 more years at Subic Base....

When asked if the U.S. would now pack and leave, U.S. Embassy spokesman Schrager said, "We'll just wait and see the results of the referendum." (UPI)

ISRAELI MINISTERS HEAT UP DISPUTE WITH WASHINGTON

JERUSALEM -- Israeli leaders turned up the rhetorical heat in the clash with the Bush Administration over loan guarantees, straining relations further on the eve of Secretary Baker's visit.

Several cabinet members Sunday expressed doubts about President Bush's commitment to Israel's security and one even suggested that Bush was antiSemitic. At the weekly cabinet meeting, Prime Minister Shamir said Israel would not back away from its request for the \$10 billion loan package despite President Bush's determination to veto the legislation, state-run Israel Radio reported. "Whoever feels the need to keep declaring that they are a friend (of Israel) invites suspicion," Health Minister Olmert said. "I've had suspicions (about Bush) for a long time."... Defense Minister Arens said Israel would not back away from the peace process no matter what the strains were with the U.S.... Shamir will try to reach a compromise on the loan guarantee issues with Baker, Police Minister Milo said.... Palestinians reacted with glee to Bush's stance, saying it showed America did not always accept Israel's requests. "This is the second American revolution," said Hanan Ashrawi, a leading West Bank personality. "It gives America more credibility with the Palestinians." (Ben Lynfield, UPI)

Rowan: The picture I get is that he changes his views whenever he thinks he has to in order to take another step up....

On Israel and loan guarantees:

Rowan: I think we're learning by now that Bush gets rocks in his craw from time to time. Noriega was one, Saddam Hussein was one, and right now, Israel is the rock in his crow.... You're going to see Bush go beyond what a lot of us would wish him to do....

Peterson: Is that going to cost him politically?

Rowan: Not in the long run....

Talbott: I think he's absolutely right to be doing this.... The Israelis have reacted with the degree of outrage that I found very peculiar. Why is it natural law...that the U.S. has to pay for Ariel Sharon to carry out a policy which is not only contrary to interests of the peace process and contrary to American policy, but I would contend, contrary to the best interests of the Israeli people.

Krauthammer: ...But in fact, no Arab state -- not Syria, not Egypt, not Saudi Arabia -- has ever said that if America grants these loan guarantees, it will withdraw from the peace negotiations.... [The peace conference] is a great achievement on the part of Secretary Baker, and the President is undermining that.

Rowan: I don't think the Arabs think for a moment that Bush can deliver Israel without the Arabs giving up something. But I do think that this pressure goes way beyond the question of a peace conference. I think Bush feels Israel has not been forthcoming enough in terms of the hostage situation, that Shamir has been handicapped to any kind of movement toward peace, and he's going to put the squeeze on as no American president has probably in my lifetime.

On the Soviet Union:

Krauthammer: We ought to give [aid]. Now that all those conditions have been met, we ought to be extremely generous and recognize that our interests lie in helping these democrats....

On the abortion-counseling issue:

Rowan: I'll bet you he vetoes [the Senate bill], and the veto will probably be sustained.... This is another case of Bush having a rock in his craw...and I think he's going to veto it, no matter the political consequences.

Talbott: I think he's being politically very cynical on the abortion issue. This is not an issue of high principle for him. This is Bush concerned about his conservative client....

Krauthammer: Also, because he's changed his opinion on abortion so many times, if he changes it again, he'll become ridiculous....

Germond: The politics is on both sides. President Bush didn't pick this guy because he thinks he's got an open mind on abortion. He picked him because he's against abortion.... I don't think Biden is leaning [against Thomas]. I think Biden is a genuine swing vote, and I think [Thomas] will get at least three of the four swing votes....

On the Gates nomination:

Barnes: ...I think Robert Gates is in actually very strong shape. There's no smoking gun, and he might even be confirmed before Thomas....

On Israel and loan guarantees:

Barnes: ...The biggest issue there is the \$10 billion loan guarantee for Israel. I think Bush made a tremendous mistake in raising this issue, throwing a tantrum at his press conference.... The worst thing that can happen for Israel is to beat Bush on this, because they will have a permanent enemy. I think they need to back off and so does Bush.

Germond: ...As in the civil-rights bill, Bush again has got the iron side politically, because all the polling data shows real antipathy to any kind of foreign aid....

Kondracke: The reason that Bush threw his tantrum was that he had spent the entire week on the telephone, calling up senators trying to get them to do what he wanted them to do, and he couldn't get anybody.... The way this going to be handled is a compromise, whereby the Senate will show that there are something like 70 senators who want this to be done and it will be in January....

Buchanan: They're going to give in easily because Bush did exactly the right thing. He cannot win an inside game with [the Israel lobby] on the Hill. You've got to go public and high and go to the country.... Of course he's going to win it.

PREDICTIONS

Buchanan: There'll be one more Democrat before the field is filled out: Dave McCurdy.

Barnes: Because of Bush's irrational hard line against Israel, American-Israeli relations will sink to their worst level in more than a decade.

Germond: There will be at least one other black candidate running, and not necessarily Jesse Jackson.

Kondracke: There's going to be a massive relief effort for the Soviet Union, conducted by buying the grain from Poland and shipping it to the Soviet Union, helping out both countries.

McLaughlin: The UN resolution which said Zionism is the same as racism will be repealed this year, thanks largely to the efforts of the U.S. State Department.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: JAMES A. BAKER, III *JAB III*
SUBJECT: SATURDAY IN BALTIC STATES

I spent a long day visiting Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. The symbolism of the visits was important and I think it was worthwhile seeing all the Baltic leaders. At the same time, I have got to say that only in Latvia did I find leaders who are approaching difficult issues, like Soviet troop withdrawal, practically.

In all the Baltic states, there is a preoccupation with the need for economic renewal and with getting the Soviet troops out. Estonia, primarily because of its close association for some time with Finland, seems to be more advanced on economic reform. Latvia has impressive leaders, especially Prime Minister Godmanis, and while they have a ways to go on economic reform and the development of skilled people, they are moving in the right direction. Landsbergis and Vagnorius, his Prime Minister, say the right words on privatization and economic reform, but I am not persuaded they fully understand what these terms mean.

All of the Baltic leaders expressed gratitude for the package of assistance items that you approved and I conveyed to them. (Actually one of the big hits was the offer of sending the Peace Corps; indeed, Ruutel said please send three battalions.)

All of the Baltics leaders also expressed the desire to get Soviet troops out quickly. The Estonians want to elevate the issue to the international level as a way of pressuring the Soviets to act. The Latvians are prepared to take on the issue in stages. First, they want to have Soviet troops withdraw from all civilian areas and remain only on military bases. Second, they want to develop a process for complete withdrawal.

The Lithuanians are simply dogmatic, insisting on things that will never happen: the immediate and total withdrawal of Soviet troops, the demilitarization of Byelorussia, the denial of movement of any military goods to Kalininingrad, and the US out there pushing for all of this.

I listened to what each of the Baltic leaders had to say and told them we hoped the Soviet withdrawal would take place as quickly as possible, but that they would have to negotiate this with the Soviets.

I also conveyed what Shaposhnikov said to me on the Baltics:

- o The Soviets understand and recognize that the Baltic states are independent and are under no illusions that Soviet forces will have to withdraw from them.
- o Because there is simply no housing for Soviet officers and their families, they cannot withdraw these forces before January 1, 1994, unless the Baltics are prepared to provide housing. (The 1994 date is clearly tied to the completion of their withdrawal from Germany.)
- o Withdrawals of forces that have been associated with provocative acts -- seizure of the TV tower, buildings, etc. -- could take place before then (indeed soon) provided the numbers are not too large.
- o Citizens of the Baltic states will be discharged from the military now, and those under military detention will be released.

The Lithuanians dismissed all of this. The others, particularly the Latvians, were interested. My worry about the Lithuanians is that they will push Shaposhnikov so hard he may retreat from the position he outlined to me. (Or, alternatively, they may contribute to undermining one of the potentially strong pillars for democratic reform in the Soviet Union.) Perhaps we were hearing some deliberate posturing and the Lithuanian position will be more reasonable when dealing directly with the Soviet military. The one thing I feel strongly about is that we should not get in the middle of this. I know in one guise or another, the Lithuanians and the others may seek to draw us into it. We should be very cautious about that.

One other point: I hit respecting human rights and giving equal treatment to minorities hard in my discussions with all three. Here again, the Latvians seem most sensible. The Estonians seem less so, as they are talking about having all Russians who were in the defense, internal security, or military-industrial sectors leave Estonia -- no matter how long they've been retired from these positions and no matter how long they've lived in Estonia. The Lithuanians seem to be the least tolerant. While explaining that they are not exonerating all those imprisoned by the Soviets for war crimes, I got the distinct feeling that in Lithuanian eyes, some citizens are more equal than others. We must stay on them and make clear that a relationship with us, and any aid from us, will not be forthcoming if they do not respect human rights.

Purpose

To report to Congress consistent with section 3 of the Authorization for Use of Military Force Against Iraq Resolution on the status of efforts to obtain compliance by Iraq with U.N. Security Council Resolutions.

Background

The Authorization for Use of Military Force Against Iraq Resolution requires that you submit to Congress at least once every 60 days a report on the status of efforts to obtain compliance by Iraq with resolutions adopted by the United Nations Security Council. You previously submitted such reports to Congress on March 19, May 17, and July 16, 1991. The next report must be submitted no later than today, September 16, 1991.

The proposed report (Tabs A and B) advises Congress of Iraq's continued efforts to obstruct full implementation of Security Council Resolution 687 requiring elimination of Iraqi weapons of mass destruction; our determination to ensure that inspections of Iraqi weapons and facilities take place as provided in pertinent Security Council resolutions; the progress that has been made toward providing compensation to victims of Iraqi aggression; and our intention to maintain an appropriate level of forces in the region in order to take appropriate steps if necessary.

Boyden Gray concurs in the text of the identical letters to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Consistent with the Authorization for Use of Military Force Against Iraq Resolution (Public Law 102-1), and as part of my continuing effort to keep the Congress fully informed, I am again reporting on the status of efforts to obtain compliance by Iraq with the resolutions adopted by the U.N. Security Council.

Since my last report, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) and the Special Commission created under Resolution 687 have continued to conduct inspections and other activities related to Iraqi weapons of mass destruction and ballistic missiles. With strong support from the United States, these bodies have been working actively under difficult conditions to identify, inspect and arrange for the elimination of these weapons and related items. As a result, Iraq has permitted some access to facilities related to these weapons, and inspectors have viewed the destruction of some ballistic missiles and chemical munitions, and catalogued large volumes of equipment related to Iraq's nuclear and other programs.

Iraq continues, however, to misrepresent the scope of its programs in these areas, to use deception and concealment to prevent inspection teams from locating equipment subject to elimination under Resolution 687, and to deny inspection teams full and unrestricted access to facilities associated with weapons of mass destruction and ballistic missiles. This pattern of behavior, as well as other Iraqi violations of the requirements of Resolution 687, resulted in the adoption on August 15 of Resolution 707, which condemns Iraq for these actions and holds it in material breach of its obligations. In addition, the IAEA Board of Governors voted on July 18 to find Iraq in violation of its Safeguards Agreement and thus of the Non-Proliferation Treaty. Recently, Iraq has refused to permit the U.N. to base helicopters inside Iraq for these purposes, contrary to an explicit Security Council demand contained in Resolution 707. The United States will not tolerate the continuation of this situation, and if necessary will take action to ensure Iraqi compliance with the Council's decisions so as to fully implement Resolution 678's call for the restoration of international peace and security to the Persian Gulf region.

Significant progress has been made since my last report toward implementation of the resolution of the Security Council concerning compensation for the victims of the unlawful invasion and occupation of Kuwait. The first session of the Governing Council of the new U.N. Compensation Commission met from July 22-

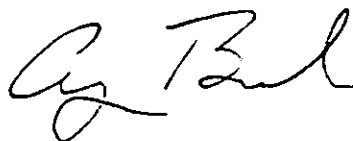
August 2 in Geneva, and adopted criteria for the first category of claims to be considered by the Commission -- namely, claims of individuals for up to \$100,000. The Executive Secretary of the Commission and his two deputies have been appointed, as well as a number of experts on the oil industry, banking and claims processing. The next session of the Governing Council will begin on October 14, and will focus on the adoption of a mechanism for collection and monitoring of Iraqi oil export revenues, as well as criteria for other categories of claims.

On August 15, the U.N. Security Council adopted Resolution 705, which approved the earlier recommendation of the Secretary-General that the ceiling on contributions to the Compensation Fund be set at 30% of Iraqi annual oil export revenues. On the same date, the Security Council adopted Resolution 706, which authorized sales of up to \$1.6 billion of Iraqi oil, the proceeds of which would be paid to a U.N. escrow account and used as follows: (1) 30% would go to the Compensation Fund; (2) the U.N. would retain the amounts necessary for costs incurred by the Special Commission, the Boundary Commission, and other U.N. efforts pursuant to Resolution 687; and (3) the remainder would be used for the food, medicine and other items for essential civilian needs, which would be provided under strict U.N. supervision to ensure their equitable distribution in Iraq. We are currently working with the Secretary-General and other Security Council members to implement this resolution as soon as possible.

As I stated in my previous reports, the United States remains concerned about the situation of the Kurds and other internal population groups that have been the object of repressive measures by the Government of Iraq. We have informed the Government of Iraq that we will continue to monitor carefully the treatment of its citizens, and that we remain prepared to take appropriate steps if the situation requires. To this end, an appropriate level of forces will be maintained in the region for as long as required by the situation in Iraq.

I remain grateful for the support of Congress for these efforts, and I look forward to continued cooperation toward achieving our mutual objectives.

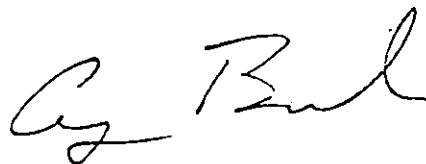

POSSIBLE AGREEMENT ON POLICY WITH RESPECT TO PREGNANCY-RELATED SERVICES IN TITLE X FUNDED CLINICS

File

When a woman comes in for family planning services and is determined in the course of the visit to be pregnant, she should be offered information regarding her pregnancy if she requests it. The provider of services will furnish a list of community resources for [medical care] pre-natal care and social services. In addition, the project will provide the woman with written information to be developed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services about appropriate prenatal care that includes a discussion of proper nutrition and exercise, the need to avoid alcohol, drug and tobacco use, and the importance of receiving medical care.

The provider will also make available, at the woman's request separate lists [a list] of [all known] providers of adoption and abortion services within the service area. Except in those areas where there are no other providers of abortion services, the list may not include providers whose principal activity is the provision of abortions.

The project shall give factual answers to questions the woman has about [her] pregnancy and all [her] legal and medical options. Questions about an individual's medical conditions that relate to her pregnancy should be referred to an appropriate practitioner. [The project is not to provide directive counseling to the woman on her pregnancy.] Should this process of answering questions be found to be directive or "steering" women towards abortion, the Title X project would be subject to the procedures proscribed for misuse of grant funds, including termination of the grant or portion of the grant which funds the project.

If requested, the project will make every effort to assist the pregnant woman in making an appointment with a prenatal care provider.

Nothing in these regulations is intended to [limit the responsibility of a licensed clinician to provide information necessary to the needs of an individual patient] preclude a licensed health care professional fulfilling his or her professional duty to an individual patient. However, the notion of 'professional responsibility' does not allow actions that "steer" women towards abortion.

Nothing in these regulations is intended to circumscribe the services offered by a Title X provider with other segregated public or private funds.

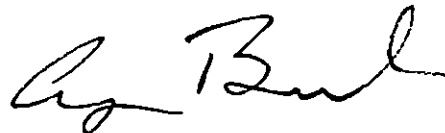
MEMORANDUM FOR THE SECRETARY OF STATE

SUBJECT: Assistance to Jordan Under Chapter 5 of
Part II of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
and Section 23 of the Arms Export Control Act

By virtue of the authority vested in me by section 502(c) of the Dire Emergency Supplemental Appropriations for Consequences of Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm, Food Stamps, Unemployment Compensation Administration, Veterans Compensation and Pensions, and other Urgent Needs Act of 1991 (Public Law 102-27), I hereby determine and certify that furnishing assistance under chapter 5 of part II of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, and under section 23 of the Arms Export Control Act, to Jordan would be beneficial to the peace process in the Middle East.

In addition, by virtue of the authority vested in me by section 586D of the Foreign Operations, Export Financing, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 1991 (Public Law 101-513), I hereby determine and certify that assistance for Jordan under chapter 5 of part II of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended, and under section 23 of the Arms Export Control Act, is in the national interest of the United States.

You are authorized and directed to notify the Congress of this determination and to publish it in the Federal Register.



MEMORANDUM OF JUSTIFICATION FOR PRESIDENTIAL
DETERMINATION REGARDING JORDAN

The most recent Presidential Determination under Section 502(c) of the Dire Emergency Supplemental Appropriations for Consequences of Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm, Food Stamps, Unemployment Compensation Administration, Veterans Compensation and Pensions, and Other Urgent Needs Act of 1991 (Public Law 102-27), and under Section 586D of the Foreign Operations, Export Financing and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 1991 (Public Law 101-513) applies to International Military Education and Training (IMET) and Foreign Military Financing (FMF) assistance allocated for Jordan for Fiscal Year 1991. The Determination follows a similar Presidential decision on July 16, 1991 relating to FY 91 Economic Support Fund assistance for Jordan. Since that time, Jordan has clarified its stance on the Middle East peace process in very helpful ways. The Jordanian government has stated categorically that it will attend the peace conference being arranged by the United States and has initiated discussions with Palestinians to form a joint delegation to the conference. Pursuant to the President's most recent decision, Jordan will be provided up to \$783,000 in IMET funds in the immediate future. Jordan also will become eligible for \$20 million in FMF funds that have been allocated to it for FY 91, but the Administration has not yet decided, pursuant to this Determination, upon a complete program for expending FMF funds for Jordan. The Administration intends to monitor Jordan's policies closely, including its role in the peace process as well as its enforcement of the UN resolutions on Iraq in making specific decisions on providing assistance to Jordan. All other applicable provisions of law will be scrupulously applied if FMF assistance and related arms transfers should be approved. The Administration intends to keep Congress fully informed as developments unfold.

Under the terms of Section 502(c) of Public Law 102-27, funds appropriated or made available under Public Law 101-513 may be obligated and expended for Jordan only if, inter alia, the President determines and certifies to Congress "that furnishing assistance to Jordan would be beneficial to the peace process in the Middle East." Jordan has begun taking important steps to make the goal of a regional peace conference and direct talks between Jordan and Israel a reality. Jordan's continued cooperation will be key to further progress. United States military assistance for Jordan, and the especially important message of support it sends, would contribute to Jordan's stability and security and help establish the atmosphere of trust

necessary for working together on sensitive issues vital to the security of the entire region, including a successful outcome to the Middle East peace process.

Section 586D of Public Law 101-513 separately prohibits use of funds appropriated or otherwise made available under that Act to any country that is not in compliance with the United Nations Security Council sanctions against Iraq. However, the provision makes an exception if the President determines and certifies to the Congress that "such assistance is in the national interest of the United States." Jordan's official position has been to support the UN resolutions and to oppose the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait. Jordan has also evidenced a willingness to consult closely with the United States and the United Nations Sanctions Committee, which has recognized the special difficulties Jordan faces because of its physical proximity to Iraq and historic trade links. Most recently, Jordan has constructed a berm on its border with Iraq and new border posts to facilitate anti-smuggling efforts. At the same time, legitimate questions continue to be raised from time to time concerning Jordan's adherence to the UN trade embargo on Iraq, particularly with respect to Jordan's import of oil in exchange for retirement of Iraqi debt. In this context, it is appropriate to confirm that providing Fiscal Year 1991 IMET and FMF assistance to Jordan would be in the national interest given that, among other things, it would be beneficial to the Middle East peace process.

President Bush hit Israel with another lick today, another hard one. Mr. Bush and Secretary of State James Baker have been pounding the Israelis a lot lately. Seen from at least one perspective, they have been hitting Israel pretty much since the beginning of the Bush presidency. That is the perspective of some Israelis and of some in this country who view Israel as a close friend and valuable ally. Why this is so is unclear. You may want to think about it and make up your own mind as to whether it is even true. President Bush and Secretary Baker say it is not. Their contention, at least publicly, is that they hold no dislike for Israel or its leaders.

Indeed, Mr Bush and Baker say they are friendly — they *like* Israel and its leadership. At the same time, they have become friendly with Israel's sworn enemy, Syria, and its leader, President Asaad. Both President Bush and Secretary Baker have been spending considerable time with the Syrian President. Mr. Bush not long ago posed for photographs, smiling, sitting next to and chatting with Asaad at a special meeting for the Syrian. This raised eyebrows and questions worldwide.

In a way, it was not unlike the time President Bush secretly sent his top National Security Adviser Brent Scowcroft to China to clink champagne glasses with China's old-line, hard-line Communist dictators at the very time they were murderously crushing the Tiananmen Square movement for freedom and democracy. Many people, including many who like and support Mr. Bush, are mystified as to why such things are done.

Bush Re-election Campaign operatives such as John Sununu and Roger Ailes try to convince people that anyone who even raises such questions is unfair, biased and/or left wing.

Mr. Bush himself often seems to believe this. It simply isn't true. There are serious, fundamental questions, fair questions, involved. When a President of the United States gives even the appearance of siding with Communist dictators killing people trying for freedom, that's serious and worth talking about.

When a President of the United States at least gives the appearance of siding with Arabs such as Syria's Asaad at the expense of Israel, that is serious. It may represent a fundamental shift in long-standing American policy supported through the years by Republican as well as Democratic administrations of standing with Israel, the only democracy in the area. On such serious issues, the President deserves to be heard, in full. So do the questions. But be advised — anyone who raises them will be made to pay a price. Now this...

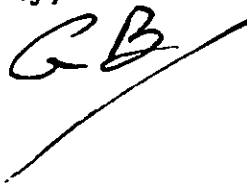

THE ADMINISTRATOR

SUBJECT: Assurance of EPA Loyalty in the Event of a Coup

You may have noticed that a lone outspoken dissenter in the Soviet Cabinet to the usurpation of Gorbachev's power was the Environmental Secretary Nikolai Vorontsov. Now I don't want to claim too much for the significance of this brave act but if people infer that Environment Secretaries are uncommonly loyal, future-oriented and respectful of law, then so be it.

As for me I want to assure you that in the event your Chief of Staff, Vice-President, Interior Secretary, Defense Secretary and CIA Director should ever conspire to place you under house arrest in Kennebunkport, you can count on me to oppose them. Of course, should he be legally a member of the Cabinet and entitled to a seat at the table your Environment Secretary will no doubt be more effective.

Cabinet status nearly came to the Senate floor on the last evening of the summer session but was blocked from a unanimous consent vote by holds placed by two Republican Senators (Mr. Symms and Mr. Wallop). Mr. Wallop has removed his hold leaving only Mr. Symms.

Cabinet status legislation is one of the very few environmental legislative initiatives we have advanced in this Congress and it seems to me we need to win it. The worst outcome would be to lose it and have the defeat attributed to Republicans. I had a conversation with former President Nixon some months ago in New York and he proudly reminded me that it was he who had created EPA. Being the President who elevates the Agency to the Cabinet is a shorthand for much else in your environmental record and, along with Nixon's establishment of the Agency, makes a nice rejoinder to the claim that Republicans are anti-environment.

My reading on the Hill is that Cabinet status will move if you personally let Senator Dole and some of the skeptics know you want it to move. Senators Glenn, Roth and Mitchell are for it and the committee chairmen who had problems with the bill last year are now satisfied. Next week could provide a good opening for this bill and it would give us a fall victory well before the election campaign season.

China Scholar John King Fairbank Dies

John King Fairbank, 84, the Harvard University history professor who had more influence than any other American on the study and public perception of modern China, died Sept. 14 at a hospital in Cambridge, Mass., after a heart attack.

From the day as a Harvard undergraduate when he heard of some intriguing Qing dynasty documents to his completion this year of a major reappraisal of Chinese history, Mr. Fairbank was an academic phenomenon. The tall, lean, bald ascetic, known both for his playfulness and his addiction to work, was a driving force in the post-World War II effort to turn the once arcane study of Chinese texts into a full-fledged academic discipline drawing on modern historical, sociological and field study techniques.

"The man's influence is almost incalculable," said Frederic Wakeman, Haas professor of Asian studies at the University of California at Berkeley.

Mr. Fairbank's 1948 book, "The United States and China," was revised and reprinted many times and became the basic primer for Americans wanting to know more about the most populous country in the world. His students, and the students of his students, eventually populated most of the major China study centers in the country and spread the Fairbank tradition of energy and distrust of unexamined assumptions, while often challenging their patron's strong views on the influence of Confucian traditions on modern Communist China.

Mr. Fairbank was in his office at Harvard's John King Fairbank Center for East Asian Research, named after him in 1977, on Thursday afternoon when he felt dizzy and was taken to Mount Auburn Hospital. It is a measure of his incurable love of scholarly labor that only minutes before he was fatally stricken Saturday afternoon he was telling his research assistant it was time to get back to work.

Mr. Fairbank was born in Huron, S.D., on May 24, 1907. His father was a lawyer and his mother, Lorena King Fairbank, an avid letter writer and conversationalist who died at 105 after spending the last 35 years of her life in Washington.

Mr. Fairbank started college at the University of Wisconsin, but he transferred to Harvard and graduated summa cum laude in 1929. He studied at Oxford University on a Rhodes scholarship and traveled to what is now called Beijing, where he married Wilma Cannon, the daughter of a well-known Harvard Medical School professor, in 1932.

for years but never to the same ones and his capacity for restatement of well-worn themes would excite the envy even of a Richard Nixon."

The Fairbanks for decades served tea and cucumber sandwiches every Thursday afternoon for any students who wished to drop by their little yellow frame house trapped among several Harvard high-rises. Mr. Fairbank hated to waste time; he clipped his nails during seminars and shaved while on the telephone. But he always answered letters and enjoyed throwing a Frisbee on his small lawn.

Roderick MacFarquhar, a former student and fellow Harvard professor, said Mr. Fairbank had just finished one of his most ambitious books, "China: A New History," and had several editing projects on his schedule, despite his retirement from teaching in 1977.

Mr. Fairbank promoted the hope that the Chinese eventually would work through their painful transition into the modern world, but in his 1982 memoir, "Chinabound," he offered a warning: "China and America are now major centers of the coming world struggle, which will be less between nations than within them, between mechanists and humanists. Mechanists believe in both technological gadgetry and in ideology, the potent combination of material might with intellectual righteousness. The mechanists' only problem is that this combination of might and right is precisely what the national enemies always believe in too, but in opposing terms. This is a prescription for unremitting conflict and mutual annihilation."

Survivors include his wife, Wilma, a specialist in Chinese art and archaeology and onetime cultural attaché of the U.S. Embassy in China; two daughters, Laura Fairbank of Arlington, Mass., and Holly Tuck of New York City; and three grandchildren.

He joined the Harvard faculty in 1936. His first undergraduate tutee, the China correspondent and presidential campaign chronicler Theodore H. White, became Mr. Fairbank's most famous student. In 1939, along with Japan scholar Edwin O. Reischauer, Mr. Fairbank began the survey course in East Asian history that introduced two generations of Harvard students to that part of the world.

During World War II, he served in several U.S. government posts in China, including the wartime capital of Chongqing, where he attempted to help dozens of Chinese scholars fighting for their ideas and their lives in rough political currents. He also served with the Office of Strategic Services and, before returning to Harvard in 1946, was director of the U.S. Information Service in China.

He was called to testify before a congressional committee when several China experts in the government and the universities were accused of furthering the communist cause, but no action was taken against him and his academic career did not suffer. Much later, he absorbed blistering attacks from the academic left for his research suggesting that much of the 19th-century Western commercial invasion of coastal cities had been good for China, a view that Chinese scholars in increasing numbers now accept.

He became the director of what was then called Harvard's East Asian Research Center in 1955 and pursued his relentless campaign to spread China studies throughout the country.

Mr. Fairbank wrote and edited more than two dozen books about China and wrote hundreds of articles for newspapers and national periodicals. He loved to tweak his own efforts. A phony "reader's note" he sent his publisher about one of his books said: "One cannot envy an editor who undertakes to make a nonrepetitive sequence out of this mishmash. Mr. Fairbank has obviously been talking to students

Bishop Edmund Browning, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church sent a letter over on Friday expressing his support for the President's position on loan guarantees to Israel.

His office followed up today with an offer to be of assistance in any way with the mainline church community to deflect any criticisms of anti-Semitism which might be leveled as a result of the policy. I have thanked them for their support but was unsure as to advising them on further action. Do you have any suggestions on specific things the Presiding Bishop might do to be helpful? Do we want him to do anything at this time?

As you will recall, the Presiding Bishop met with the President in December and strongly opposed our involvement in the Persian Gulf conflict. For that reason, I am somewhat concerned about how his comments on this loan issue -- vis a vie the Mid East conference -- will play.

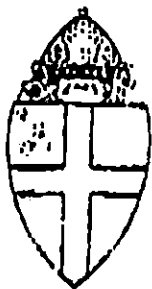
