POOL REPORT # 10

November 9, 1991

Arrival at The Hague and Top of EC Meeting

Baker and Carla Hills beat Bush to The Hague arriving at about 8:40 this morning. But Bush pulled up shortly after with Scowcroft and the usual gang in tow. "Good morning to you," Bush said as he stepped from his limousine to shake hands with Netherlands Prime Minister Ruud Lubbers and EC Commission President Jacques Delors. The three paused for photographs outside Binnenhof, the Parliamentary building complex of the Hague before stepping inside to meet with other EC leaders. One of the Netherlands photographers shouted at Bush and Lubbers to get their attention but he kept repeating the name of former Netherlands Prime Minister Dries Vanagt. The photographers shouts drew laughs from his colleagues as well as from Bush and Lubbers. It was like hollering "Mr. Nixon, Mr. Nixon" to get Bush's attention. Security for the arrival was extremely heavy. Some policemen could be seen on rooftops and hundreds were placed all around the Hague. Some of the European press remarked that the security precautions were unusual for the Hague, where Lubbers and other Netherlands officials normally stroll about without security guards. After Bush disappeared inside the photographers and film crews swarmed around his limousine getting shots of the Secret Service agents who stood nearby, the car's interior, the flags on the hood, and even the license plates. (In case you are interested USIS has provided a nice rundown and description of the Binnenhof, including the Ridderzaal, or "Hall of Knights," where the EC luncheon and Bush's address will take place.) Inside Bush greeted the entire cast of characters from the EC and Netherlands government leadership. He and Baker sat down around an oval table with about two dozen or so leaders and officials in the Treves room of the Binnenhof, a magnificent Louis XIV style chamber built by French refugee Daniel Marot. The entire room was exquisitely painted with portraits by J. H. Brandon and a painting on the domed ceiling by Theodoor Van Der Schuer depicted unity. Bush and the other leaders exchanged smiles and some small talk before getting down to business. Asked by your pool if any breakthrough on GATT was in the works Bush replied "this is a photo-op." Not much else to report except for that the bulk of your travel pool's time was spent this morning searching for Bush's motorcade somewhere around Noordeinde Palace. Happy to report that it was found before the President left the palace for the Hague. Motorcade was uneventful.

DRAFT JOINT US-EC STATEMENT ON ETHNIC ISSUES

The United States and the European Community and its member states support the citizens of the new democracies of Central and Eastern Europe and the USSR in their struggle to rebuild their societies and their economies on a democratic basis after decades of dictatorship and decay. We reaffirm our willingness to assist them as they confront the challenges they must overcome on the path to democracy and free-market economies.

One of the greatest of those challenges is dealing with ethnic diversity and the rights of persons belonging to national minorities. Ethnic diversity has enriched immensely the United States and the member states of the European Community. In Central and Eastern Europe and the USSR, however, communism suppressed the legitimate concerns of those who sought to express and exercise their human rights and fundamental freedoms. The new democracies of the region now face the re-emergence of inter-ethnic tensions, which can lead to ethnic intolerance and aggressive nationalism and other dangers. The problem is currently most acute, and most dangerous, in Yugoslavia. It also exists elsewhere and threatens to undermine progress toward democracy and prosperity in all the countries of the region.

The United States and the European Community and its member states believe that the potential for inter-ethnic tensions and aggressive nationalism to destabilize the emerging democracies of the region can best be addressed through adherence to the principles and commitments enunciated through the CSCE process, including as reaffirmed at the recent Geneva meeting of experts on national minorities. Failure to observe these can, as we have seen in Yugoslavia, lead only to tragedy and human suffering.

We specifically want to underline our firm conviction that political freedom is not the cause of such problems. Rather, the full application of such freedom in a democratic system can provide solutions.

We call on the governments and citizens of the region to join us in openly and publicly confirming their support for CSCE norms, including, specifically:

- The resolution of disputes consistent with democratic values, principles and practices of the CSCE.
- Reliance on dialogue and negotiation rather than the use of force to settle political differences. The use of force in such matters is absolutely unacceptable and will result in the international isolation of those who resort to it.
- Respect for all existing borders, both internal and external, and agreement to change them only through peaceful means and by the agreement of the parties concerned, consistent with CSCE principles and norms.

-- Rebuilding their societies based on democracy and the rule of law, including in particular democratic practices such as free and fair elections. Democracy is based not only on the principle of majority rule, but also on the protection of the fundamental human rights of those in the minority.

-- Safeguarding of human rights, with full respect for the individual, including non-discriminating treatment of members of national minorities.

-- Respect for international law and obligations, as well as the values, principles and commitments enunciated through the CSCE process, especially those contained in the Helsinki Final Act, the Charter of Paris, and the Copenhagen, Geneva and Moscow documents.

We note that respect for the norms outlined above by the new democracies of Central and Eastern Europe and the USSR is essential to the development of close, cooperative and mutually beneficial relations. They are also central to the question of membership in regional and international political and economic institutions. We will apply these criteria equally and fairly to all.

As the CSCE proclaimed categorically and irrevocably in Moscow, respect for fundamental human rights in any CSCE state is a legitimate concern of the CSCE community. Moreover, respect for the principles outlined above is essential to the development of close, cooperative and mutually beneficial relations. Indeed they are among the primary obligations of responsible government.

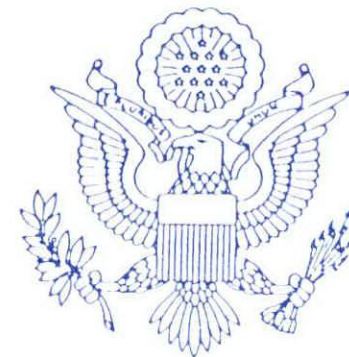

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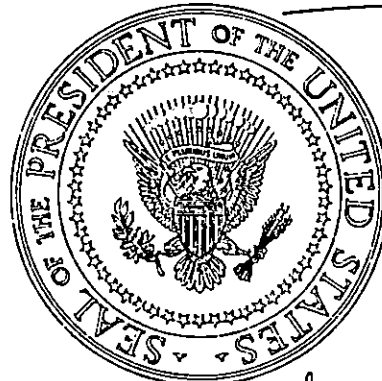

Dutch Schultz's World Of Kill and Be Killed

THE people at Touchstone Pictures can relax. Their screen adaptation of E. L. Doctorow's best-selling novel "Billy Bathgate" is not the disaster that Hollywood insiders had predicted when the shooting schedule was extended, rumors of personality clashes were reported and a new ending was shot.

After all of that negative expectation, the movie is a sort of reverse letdown. It is not a disaster, but neither is it a milestone in motion-picture art.

"Billy Bathgate" is a big, generous movie entertainment of the kind that the old Hollywood studios used to manufacture without financial fuss or emotional stress. They would buy a popular novel, assign the writers, the director, the members of the cast and then shoot.

As supervised by front-office representatives, the movie was expected to synopsise the book more or less, to provide large roles for the studio's stars and not to offend any pressure groups.

The most arresting revelation offered by "Billy Bathgate" is that today a lot of hard work is required to make a film that is so perfectly homogenized, so without dangerously idiosyncratic character, that it seems almost old-fashioned. It might be easier to make a masterpiece.

A great deal of superior talent has gone into this production. Robert Benton is the director, Tom Stoppard the screenwriter and Dustin Hoffman the star, with Bruce Willis appearing in a small but showy supporting role. The movie gives prominence to two attractive newcomers, Loren Dean and Nicole Kidman, and Patrizia von Brandenstein, the production designer, has beautifully recreated the Great Depression look of mid-1930's America. Nestor Almendros was the cinematographer.

Yet the film's sensibility seems to have less to do with any of these people, or with Mr. Doctorow, than with the front-office types who shadowed its production from the original deal through the shooting, the editing, the first screenings and, finally, its release.

This is only a guess, based on the idea that movies that get wildly out of hand tend to be either more lively or far worse than "Billy Bathgate," which is altogether respectable.

The film offers an accurate recollection of the narrative line of Mr. Doctorow's expansive novel, set in 1935, about the adventures of the self-styled Billy Bathgate, a wide-eyed teen-ager from the Bronx who has the skepticism, the intellect, the luck and the nonstop gabbiness of a 20th-century Huck Finn.

It is Billy's great good fortune to witness, close up, the decline and fall of one of the legendary gangsters of his day, Arthur Flegenheimer, alias Dutch Schultz. In Mr. Doctorow's rousing mock-dirge, Dutch, a lethal variation on Mark Twain's Duke (or maybe Dauphin), takes a shine to Billy, whom he praises as "a capable boy." He brings Billy into the gang and educates him in those impulsive, free-swinging gang ways that are fast going out of style as the Mafia's organization expands.

Billy sees all. He is there on the tugboat when Dutch and his boys drop a defiant Bo Weinberg overboard, Bo's feet being appropriately clad in

cement. He is instructed in the arcane mysteries of numbers by Dutch's financial wizard, Otto (Abbadabba) Berman. He is a member of Dutch's entourage when the racketeer moves to upstate New York to stand trial for income-tax evasion.

For Billy, the wonders never cease. He is at hand in the church when Dutch converts to Roman Catholicism, Lucky Luciano acting as Dutch's sponsor. He is the one who is entrusted to keep an eye on Dutch's girlfriend, the very social but nutty Drew Preston, when Dutch sends her to Saratoga Springs to sit out his trial. Billy makes mistakes along the way, none more dangerous than falling in love with Drew.

These are the novel's highlights, dutifully re-created in Mr. Stoppard's screenplay, which also preserves a lot of Mr. Doctorow's funnier lines. Gone, though, is the comic heft of the novel, Billy Bathgate's running first-person commentary that, far more than the specific events, illuminates the author's concerns with the often cockeyed meaning of the American experience.

Mr. Hoffman is fine as Dutch, the sort of man who will always look like a mug no matter how much he pays for his suits. The actor is intense, centered and absolutely straight. He dominates the movie even though it isn't his to dominate, which must have been one of the major problems facing Mr. Benton and Mr. Stoppard.

The novel is less about Dutch than about Billy's view of him. Dutch may be at the center of the story, but the novel is about Billy's perception of Dutch, something not easily re-created in a movie in which the star plays the secondary role and a supporting actor plays what is, in effect, the lead.

Thus the movie is always a little off balance, Dutch being a far more arresting character than Billy, who, as written and as played by Mr. Dean, is something of a cipher. It also doesn't help that Mr. Dean looks to be a bit beyond his teens, which makes his golly-gee-whiz naïveté seem more of an act than it should be.

Miss Kidman is a beauty with, it seems, a sense of humor. Yet Drew Preston is a role that might have introduced a new screen personality on the riveting order of Veronica Lake or Lauren Bacall, someone who immediately registers as an original.

It is that unpredictable spark that is missing from "Billy Bathgate," though Mr. Willis is lively and funny as the doomed Bo Weinberg, and Steven Hill is exceptionally good as Otto Berman.

"Billy Bathgate" guards Mr. Doctorow's novel with care. It is enjoyable but, like the admirable son who cares too much for his poor, widowed mother, it has no real life of its own.

"Billy Bathgate," which has been rated R (Under 17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian), has violence, vulgar language and partial nudity.

NEW YORK — Chuck Norris goes to Canada in this dreary, unconvincing action vehicle from Cannon. His name will assure interest in ancillary markets, but the picture has poor theatrical chances.

For Norris, teamed again with his director brother Aaron, feature is a comedown from their last big-budget film, "Delta Force 2." "The Hitman" is short on action and adopts a film noir visual style that masks its limited production values.

Film should not be confused with a recent tv movie or a Forest Whitaker starrer from Continental Film Group with similar titles.

Prologue has Norris and co-star Michael Parks as cops on a stakeout,

with Parks shooting Norris and leaving him for dead. Three years later Norris has a new identity and is in Seattle undercover as unsuspecting Italian gangster Al Waxman's second-in-command.

Working for agent Ken Pogue, Norris' assignment is to get the two rival mobs, Waxman's and Marcel Sabourin's French heavies in Vancouver, to unite so that both can be nabbed. Fly in the ointment turns out to be a group of Iranian gangsters led by Frank Ferrucci, who, we learn several reels later, are controlled by, you guessed it, Parks.

There is momentary interest as Norris plays both ends against the middle, a ploy popularized by Clint Eastwood. Always clad entirely in black, Norris, with slightly scarred face, is okay as a pretend heavy, but a very poor script by Robert Geoffrion and producer Don Carmody violates many rules of the genre.

Norris kills bad guys in cold blood to impress his gangster partners but, unlike James Bond's, his ruthlessness seems out of line. Pogue criticizes his behavior but the constraints that traditionally limit a hero's actions, compared his evil adversaries, have been removed

here in search of cheap thrills.

Another script boner is an obvious and saccharine "humanizing" subplot in which Norris befriends a black youth in a neighboring apartment and teaches him to defend himself against racist bullies.

This phony segment culminates in a clearcut violation of a lesson that Alfred Hitchcock learned with "Sabotage" in 1936: Don't put children into suspense situations leading to their death if you want to keep the audience's engagement with the film.

The best thing about "Hitman" is some good stuntwork. Picture is the first to credit "dramatic supervisors" (Richard & Leslie Brander), but despite their tutelage Norris walks through his role and is not helped by unfunny one-liners he delivers after killing or beating up somebody.

Waxman is a solid villain while Parks, normally a good guy, seems bemused by his baddie assignment and appears only at the beginning and end of the film.

Sexy Canadian actress Alberta Watson is wasted as romantic interest for Norris as film builds to a presumably torrid scene for the duo but cuts away before anything happens.

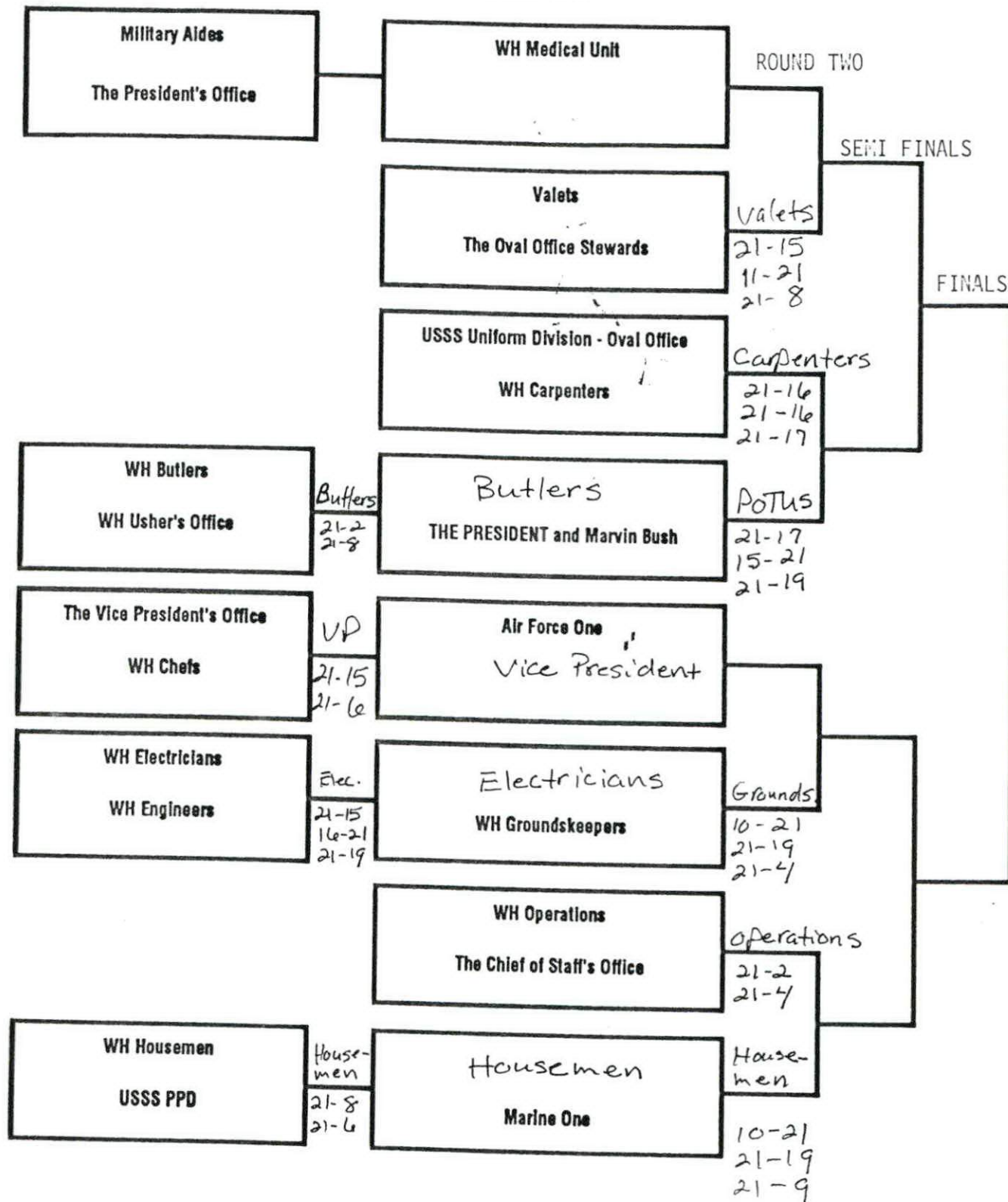

THE WEEK OF NOVEMBER 4 - NOVEMBER 8

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Monday the House defeated H.R. 6, the Deposit Insurance and Regulatory Reform Act of 1992 (the banking bill), by a vote of 89 to 324. During consideration of the bill the House took the following action:

- approved Representative Bruce Vento's (D-MN) amendment, to the interstate banking provisions of H.R. 6, giving a state the right to "opt out," by a vote of 366 to 4.
- defeated Representative Bill Richardson's (D-NM) amendment, opposed by the Administration, which placed unduly harsh restrictions on interstate branching and subjected national banks to state banking laws for the first time, by a vote of 142 to 250.
- defeated Representative Bill Gradison's (R-OH) amendment to strike the objectionable directed scorekeeping provisions, by a vote of 204 to 205.
- defeated Representative Chalmers Wylie's (R-OH) motion to recommit striking Title IV language, the objectionable Dingell/Gonzalez compromise, and incorporating the acceptable insurance provisions offered by Representative James Hayes (D-LA), by a vote 160 to 253.

On Tuesday the House passed a number of bills by voice vote including H.R. 3402, the Health Information and Health Promotion Amendments, to promote health information and promotion programs at the Department of Health and Human Services.

On Wednesday the House defeated H. Res. 268, a privileged resolution offered by Representative Chris Cox (R-CA) designed to

stop the use of funds by the House counsel in preparing legal challenges to state term-limit initiatives, by a vote of 265 to 160. The House then passed H.R. 3350, the Civil Rights Commission Reauthorization Act of 1991, which reauthorizes the Commission for three years, by a vote of 420 to 7; and defeated H.R. 3298, the Farm Credit Banks and Association Safety and Soundness Act of 1991.

Also on Wednesday the House approved the conference report accompanying H.R. 2707, the FY 1992 Labor/HHS Appropriations bill, by a vote of 272 to 156. Forty-three Democrats voted against and fifty-one Republicans voted for the bill which is under a senior advisor's veto threat because of language overturning regulations regarding abortion counseling in Title X family planning clinics. In addition, the bill attempts to meet the budget caps by delaying almost \$4 billion in obligations until very late in the fiscal year, thus further increasing the pressure next year to renegotiate the budget summit agreement.

On Thursday the House passed S. 1745, the Senate's civil rights bill, by a vote of 381 to 38. H.R. 2, the Family and Medical Leave bill, originally scheduled for consideration, was pulled by the Democratic leadership when they determined that a compromise offered by Representative Tim Penny (D-MN) was not attracting enough support to reach their goal of a veto-proof margin. The "Penny Compromise" provides 6 weeks leave for illness, 12 weeks for birth or adoption of a child, and exempts business with up to 100 employees for two years and businesses with 50 employees thereafter.

On Friday the House was in pro forma session.

SENATE

On Tuesday, following two days of debate, the Senate confirmed Robert M. Gates to be Director of Central Intelligence by a vote of 64 to 31. The Senate then passed S. 1671, the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant Withdrawal Act of 1991, legislation which gives congressional approval to the testing of a low-level nuclear waste dump in New Mexico, by voice vote, and S. Res. 214, correcting the civil rights bill to clarify that owners of Wards Cove Packing Company in Seattle are exempt from liability under the bill, by a vote of 73 to 22.

On Wednesday the Senate passed S. 455, the Indoor Air Quality Act of 1991, by a vote of 88 to 7. This \$300 million bill aims to boost the Environmental Protection Agency's efforts to reduce the exposure of Americans to radon gas and other indoor pollutants by

creating an Office of Indoor Air Quality to oversee government research and regulatory programs related to indoor pollution.

On Thursday the Senate agreed to the conference report accompanying H.R. 2707, the FY 1992 Labor/HHS Appropriations bill, by a vote of 72 to 25; and passed S. 838, the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act, which authorizes \$426 million for new and existing programs for abused children, by a vote of 96 to 0.

Senate Majority Leader Mitchell (D-ME) sought unanimous consent for the Senate to consider S. 543, the Comprehensive Deposit Insurance Reform and Taxpayer Protection Act (the banking bill), largely supported by the Administration. Republican Senators objected because of a provision in the bill that rolls back existing bank powers to offer insurance. Senator Mitchell, hoping to embarrass the Administration by pointing out that Senate Republicans are holding up your bill, filed a cloture petition to bring the bill up for consideration on Wednesday. Treasury Department officials and Senators will be negotiating on a compromise bill.

Also on Thursday Senators John Chafee (R-RI) and Bob Dole (R-KS) introduced the Health Equity and Access Improvement Act of 1991, with 20 Republican cosponsors. This five-year, approximately \$150 billion bill is the product of the Republican Task Force on Health Care and emphasizes medical liability reform, better health care access, prevention, and improving the ability of small businesses to purchase health insurance. The bill, however, does not include means to pay for the costs of the reforms.

HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEES

HOUSE

On Wednesday the House Banking Committee reported out H.R. 2094, which would provide additional resources to the Bank Insurance Fund (BIF) and strengthen federal regulatory authority over banks, by a vote of 37 to 25. H.R. 2094 is essentially the same as Title I of H.R. 6, the banking bill which was defeated on the House floor Monday. The Administration is seeking to expand the bill to facilitate interstate banking.

On Thursday the House Rules Committee approved H.Res. 258, which would create a task force of members from the Foreign Affairs Committee to investigate the so-called "October Surprise," regarding the release of American hostages by Iran after the 1980 election. The resolution passed by a party line vote of 8

to 4. Republican amendments to limit the length of the investigation and expand it to the Carter Administration failed.

Conference Committees

Conferees on the FY 1992 Department of Defense Authorization bill continued to meet this week. Objectionable language allowing abortions in overseas military medical facilities was struck from the bill. Negotiations continue over a provision authorizing the Secretary of Defense to divert up to \$1 billion for humanitarian aid to the Soviet Union. If resolved, the conference report could be on the House floor next week.

SENATE

On Tuesday Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney testified before the **Senate Select POW/MIA Affairs Committee** on POW-MIA issues. Cheney said that there has been no recent firm evidence to suggest that any U.S. servicemen are currently being held captive in Vietnam, and denied reports that the Department of Defense has been withholding information on missing servicemen. He promised to make available all unclassified Department of Defense files relating to POWs and MIAs.

On Thursday the **Senate Foreign Relations Committee** held a hearing to discuss U.S.-Soviet arms control proposals, and to discuss the recent Mideast Peace Conference in Madrid, Spain.

Nominations:

On Wednesday the **Senate Banking Committee** rejected Robert L. Clarke for another term as Comptroller of the Currency, by a 9 to 12 party line vote. Panel members disagreed over who was to blame for banking industry losses during Clarke's tenure, with Democrats blaming Clarke and Republicans citing the faltering economy in the Southwest.

On Wednesday the **Senate Banking Committee** approved the nominations of Susan Phillips to be a Governor of the Federal Reserve and Paul Wonnacott and David Bradford to be members of the Council of Economic Advisers by voice vote.

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Monday the House will not be in session in observance of the Veterans Day holiday.

On Tuesday the House will consider a number of bills including: H.R. 3709, to waive the period of Congressional review for certain District of Columbia Acts; H.R. 2270, the Senior Executive Service Improvements Act; H.R. 3508, the Health Professions Education amendments; H.R. 2130, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Authorization Act of 1991; and the Democratic leadership's new unemployment compensation bill.

On Wednesday and for the remainder of the week the House is expected to consider the following legislation: the conference report to accompany H.R. 2100, the FY 1992 DOD Authorization bill; H.R. 2, the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1991; H.R. 2837, the Milk Inventory Management Act of 1991; and H.R. 2929, the California Desert Protection Act of 1991.

The House is also likely to consider H.R. 2094, the new banking reform bill reported Wednesday from the House Banking Committee. Chairman John Dingell (D-MI) continues to try to weaken the ability of banks to expand into the securities industry. House Republicans are negotiating a rule to allow only one amendment in support of interstate banking, thus blocking any Dingell amendments.

On Thursday the House will receive President Menem of Argentina.

SENATE

On Monday the Senate will not be in session in observance of Veterans Day.

On Tuesday the Senate will take up S. 243, the Older Americans Act reauthorization bill. Although the Administration supports reauthorization of the Act, the bill is under a senior advisors veto threat because of a provision which provides ERISA (Employee Retirement Income Security Act) coverage to retirees who lost their retirement before ERISA was enacted.

On Wednesday the Senate will vote on a motion to proceed to S. 543, banking reform legislation.

On Thursday the Senate will likely begin consideration of S. 12, the cable bill, which would lead to renewed regulation of cable television rates in some communities.

Also during the week the Senate may take up the FY 1991 supplemental appropriations bill, and S. 1945, Senator George Mitchell's (D-ME) and Senator Lloyd Bentsen's (D-TX) Emergency Unemployment Compensation Act of 1991. This bill provides 20 weeks of extended benefits, and offers the President three options to pay for the bill: 1) declare the spending an emergency, 2) a modified freeze on foreign aid accounts, not to affect grain sales to the Soviet Union and Israeli loan guarantees, or 3) changes in the tax code that would accelerate estimated tax payments for high income earners. Options 2 and 3 include Senator Dole's proposed reform of the guaranteed student loan program.

HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEES

SENATE

On Tuesday the Senate Judiciary Committee will hold confirmation hearings on the nomination of William Barr to be Attorney General.

On Wednesday the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee will mark up S. 2, the Democratic education bill. Provisions of the bill are unavailable at this point. Floor consideration is expected before the recess.

During the week the Senate Appropriations Committee may mark up the FY 1991 supplemental appropriations bill.

Conference Committees

Conferees will meet on H.R. 2950, the highway bill. Based on an initial meeting this week, and the many differences between the House and Senate bills, it appears this Conference will take a long time.
