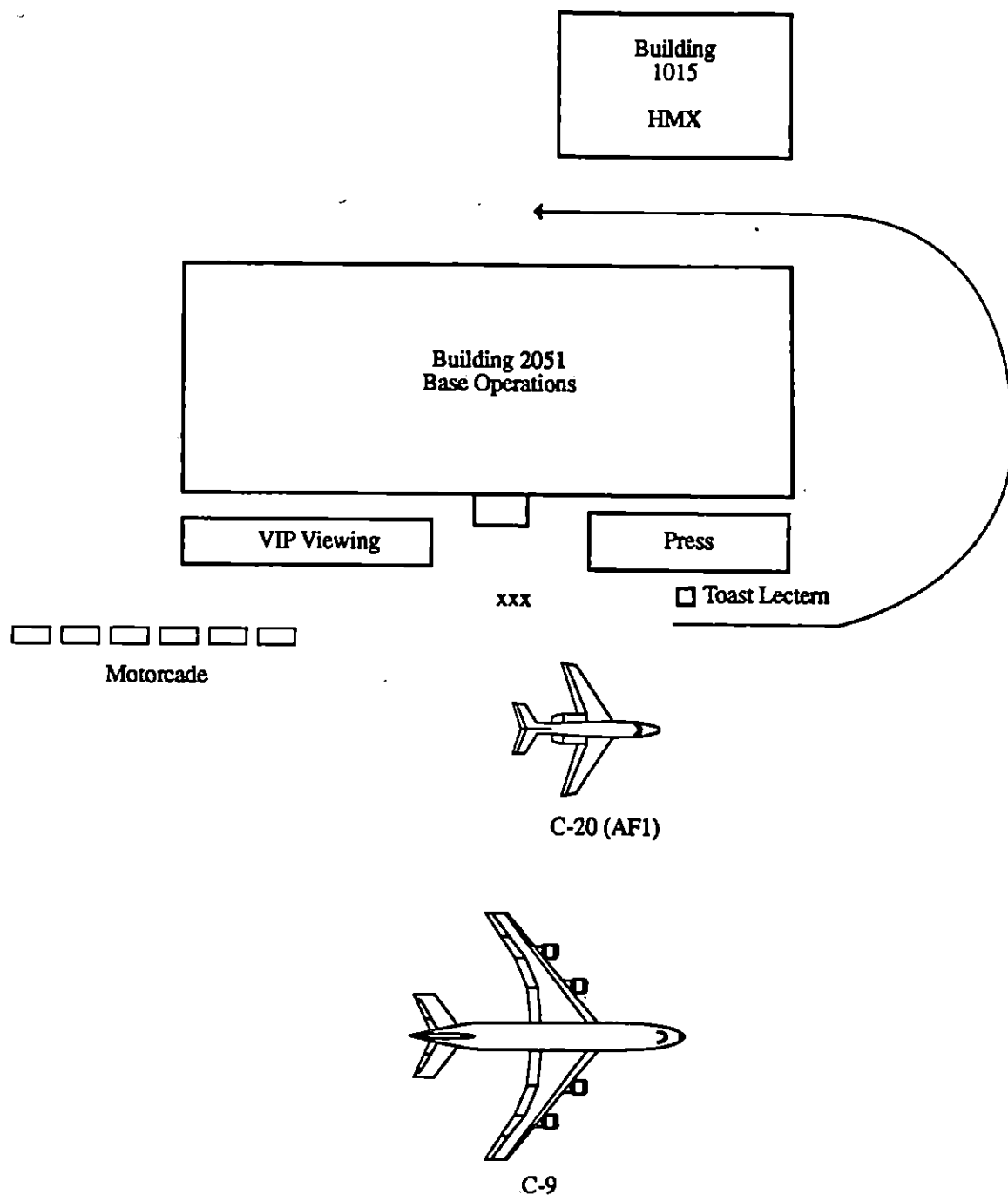

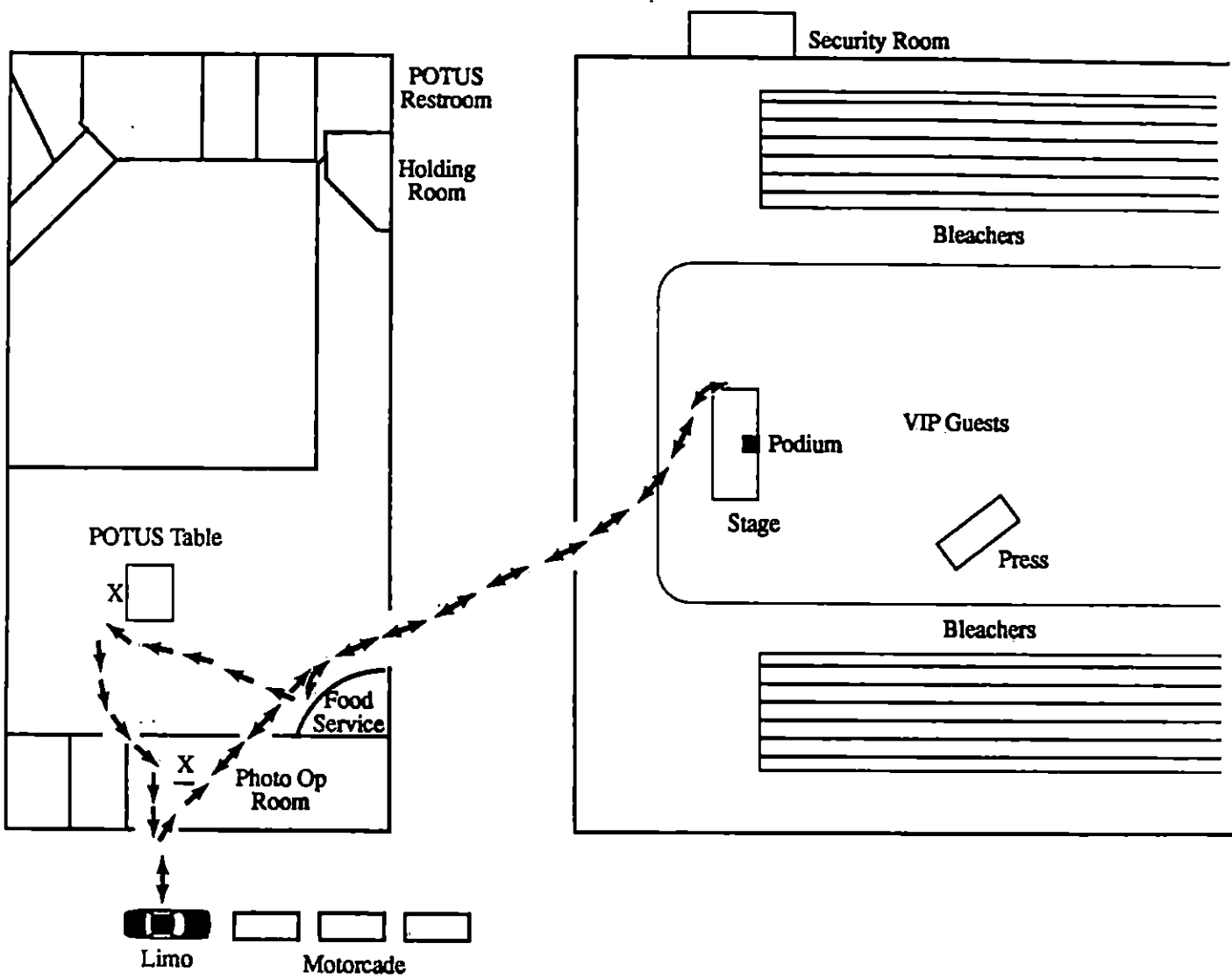

December 27-29, 1991

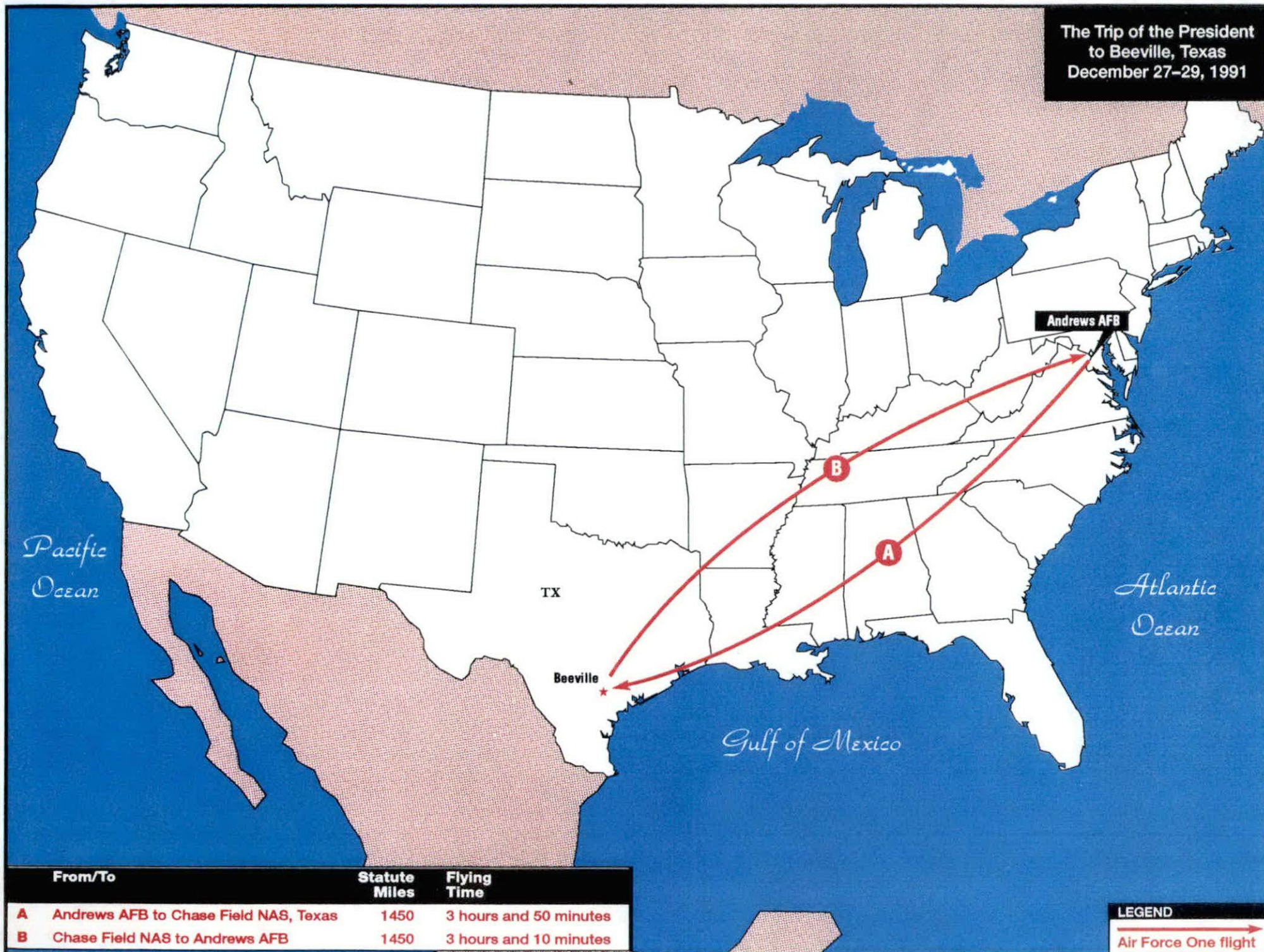

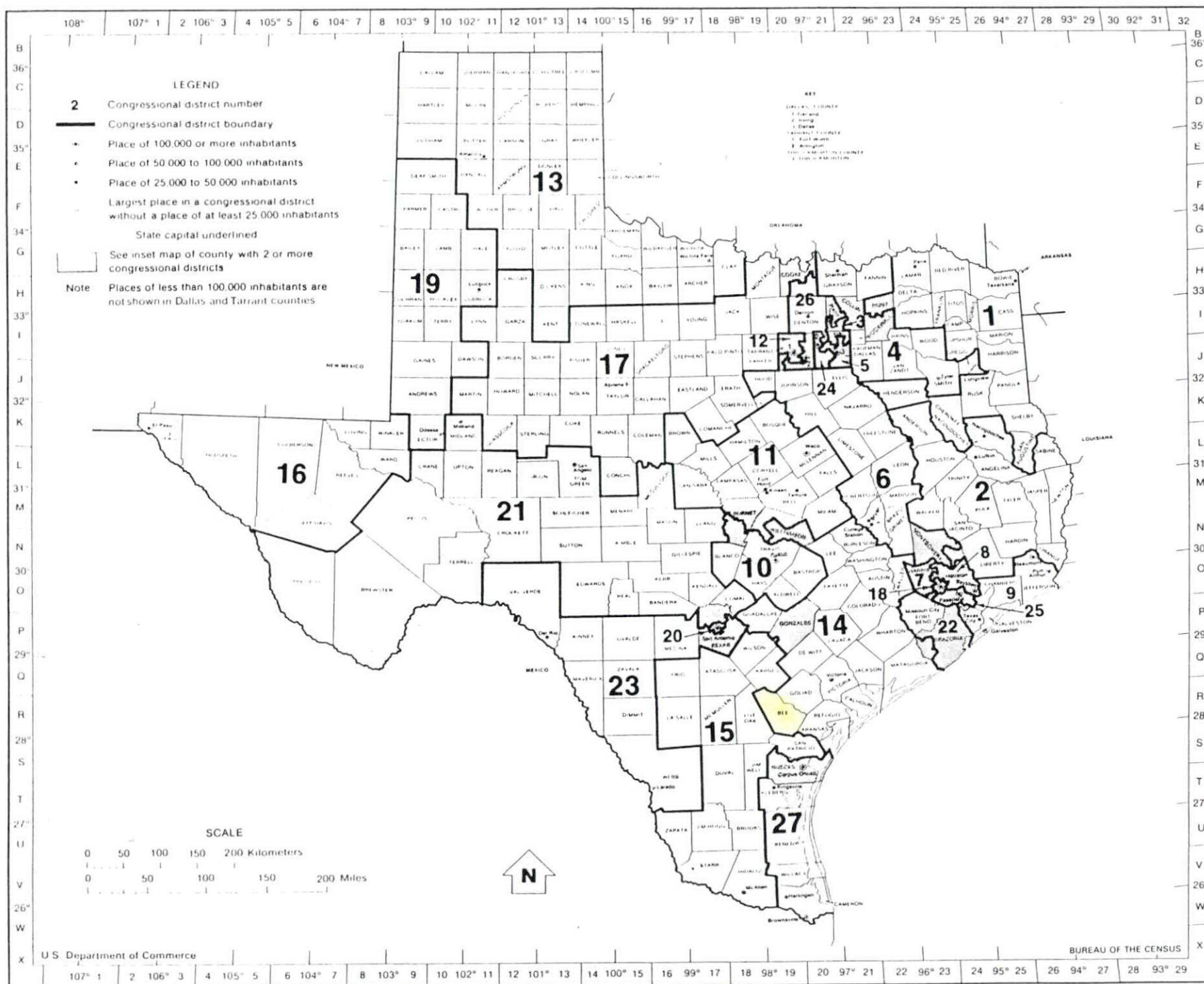

SUBJECT: TEXAS

I. SUMMARY

During your trip to Beeville you will participate in the Beeville Barbecue and private time.

II. RECENT CORRESPONDENCE

Attorney General Dan Morales (D) wrote expressing concern about the habeas corpus provisions contained in H.R. 3371.

City Representative Joe C. Pickett (El Paso) wrote urging you to sign the Transportation Bill.

III. DISCUSSION

A. Economy

The unemployment rate for the state of Texas for November 1991 was 6.6 percent, falling significantly from October's high of 7.9 percent.

B. Education

1. Texas 2000

Communities across the state of Texas such as Odessa, Grayson County, and San Antonio are in the process of becoming America 2000 communities.

Governor Ann Richards has embraced the America 2000 strategy and is supportive of starting a Texas 2000 effort. Although Governor Richards has indicated how she intends to coordinate this statewide effort, she has yet to appoint a steering committee. The America 2000 office is waiting to hear from the Governor's office on this announcement. In the meantime, the America 2000 office is working with Governor Richards on how the state can adopt the six national education goals.

2. School Funding

This summer the Texas legislature passed a record \$59.1 billion, 2-year state budget that included \$2.4 billion to help pay for court-ordered school finance reform.

C. Environment

The Dallas-Fort Worth area continues to violate the ozone air quality standard. With the passage of the Clean Air Act Amendments, the nonattainment boundaries have been expanded to include a four county area. The state of Texas will be required to develop a control strategy to reduce ozone levels. Automobiles contribute over 60 percent of the ozone problem and are expected to be a large portion of the control strategy. Plans to establish high occupancy vehicle lanes and advertise car pooling are currently underway.

D. Drugs

The Drug Enforcement Agency reports that the Corpus Christi area is a major transshipment point for marijuana and cocaine arriving from Mexico. The area is primarily a distribution center and only secondarily a consumer area. The adjacent Gulf of Mexico, rural area, and close proximity to the Mexican border makes it conducive for drug smuggling operations. Heroin smuggling and use occur on a limited basis. The marijuana growing season has just started and a significant increase in the availability of the drug is expected in the next few weeks.

E. Superconducting Super Collider

In 1989, Texas was selected as the location for the Superconducting Super Collider. The site in Ellis County is located 25 miles south of Dallas. The Texas National Research Laboratory Commission is the entity chosen by the state legislature to represent the state in the development, financing and operation of the project. In January 1991, the Department of Energy established the baseline cost for the project to be \$8.25 billion, and the completion date to be September 1999. The state of Texas has committed to contribute nearly \$1 billion in funding and the land for the super collider.

It was just reported last week that a scientific consortium of 16 European nations expects to build a super collider by 1998 at a cost of \$1.44 billion.

F. Chase Field

U.S. Naval Air Station Chase Field is a naval air training base scheduled for closure. The base is a generator of such hazardous waste as spent solvents, metals and oily waste. This facility is not subject to a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act permit for hazardous waste storage, however, the Navy will determine if corrective action is needed.

G. Rain and Flooding in Central Texas

The state of Texas has been hit very hard over the last two weeks with record-breaking rain and flooding. Fifteen deaths have been attributed to the floods which have left hundreds homeless. This afternoon you signed a request for disaster assistance from Governor Ann Richards.

TRIP BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This will be your sixteenth visit to Texas as President. Your last visit to Texas was December 18, 1991, when you signed the Surface Transportation Act in Dallas. In addition, you spoke to a group of transportation officials.

Your most recent political trip to Texas was October 31 - November 1, 1991, when you and Mrs. Bush participated in fundraising dinners for the Bush-Quayle Primary Committee, Inc., in Dallas and Houston.

There are no political events scheduled for this visit.

1990 ELECTION RESULTS (Continued)

The 1990 election year started off with a great deal of promise for Texas Republicans, but **Clayton Williams'** defeat in the Governor's race made for little celebration in the end. Almost the entire Republican statewide ticket lost, making this year's reapportionment process very difficult. The positive news for the GOP was the re-election of U.S. Senator **Phil Gramm**, and the election of State Treasurer **Kay Bailey Hutchison** and Agriculture Commissioner **Rick Perry**.

1991 ELECTION UPDATE

3rd Congressional District:

A special run-off election was held on May 18, 1991, in the 3rd Congressional district to fill the seat vacated by **Steve Bartlett**. Bartlett resigned to run for Mayor of Dallas.

State Representative **Sam Johnson** defeated businessman **Tom Pauken** by a 52.5% to 47.5% margin. Pauken was favored in the run-off because of his high name identification in the district (he had run for office three times prior) and because he outpolled Johnson in the primary election 27% to 20%. Pauken and Johnson were forced into a run-off because neither gathered the 51% necessary to win outright.

Dallas - Mayor:

Former Congressman **Steve Bartlett (R)** was elected Mayor of Dallas in the November 5, 1991, election. Bartlett led the race from the start, and was able to capture enough votes (55%) to avoid a run-off election against his closest competitor, Democrat **Kathryn Cain**. Bartlett was successful in capturing the endorsements of most major business and civic groups, as well as a number of black and hispanic organizations.

Although the Mayor's office in Dallas is officially non-partisan, Bartlett is this nation's most prominent Republican Mayor (Dallas is the eighth largest city in America).

1991 ELECTION UPDATE (Continued)

Houston - Mayor:

Houston voters ushered in a new era in local government on Saturday, December 7, 1991, by electing Democrat **Bob Lanier** as the city's new Mayor. Lanier, a real estate developer, soundly defeated state representative and fellow Democrat **Sylvester Turner** by a 54% to 46% margin. Lanier and Turner won the right to the run-off election after edging out five term Democrat incumbent Mayor **Kathy Whitmire** in the November 5, 1991, election.

Lanier was supported by most business and civic groups, and by a number of prominent Houston Republicans. In fact, Republican National Committeewoman **Penny Butler** was one of Lanier's staunchest supporters. Lanier has pledged to work very closely with the organizers of the 1992 Republican National Convention.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

There are two statewide races in Texas in 1992 -- the Presidential and Railroad Commission elections.

While U.S. Senator **Lloyd Bentsen** has publicly stated that he will not run for the Democrat Presidential nomination, many Texas political experts believe that Bentsen may still consider entering the race as a Vice Presidential running mate -- as he did in 1988.

In the Railroad Commission race, Republicans **Barry Williamson** and **Carol Rylander** will compete for their Party's nomination to challenge Democrat incumbent **Lana Guererra**. The Republican primary will be competitive, although Williamson has assembled a strong campaign and finance committee. U.S. Commerce Secretary **Bob Mosbacher** hosted a fundraising reception for Williamson at his Washington home. **Guererra** was appointed to the Commission by Governor **Ann Richards**.

Texas will have thirty two electoral votes in 1992. The ballot filing deadline for Texas is January 2, 1992; the Presidential primary will be held March 10, 1992.

The **BUSH-QUAYLE** ticket carried Texas by a 56% to 43% margin in the 1988 Presidential election.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Texas will gain three additional Congressional seats in 1992. The Democrat controlled state legislature passed a plan for reapportionment -- which Republican Party Chairman **Fred Meyer** immediately challenged as a bogus gerrymander. Subsequent to the legislative plan, the state (with Governor Richards approval) submitted a revised map, scrapping the initial proposal. Meyer has filed a federal injunction to halt the substitute plan because it was illegally drawn. Meyer is also challenging the original plan, claiming that it discriminates against minorities and Republicans.

The U.S. Justice Department recently pre-cleared plans submitted by the Democrat controlled legislature -- over objections that the proposals were illegally drawn and are in violation of the Voting Rights Act. Many Texas Republicans are very upset with the Justice Department ruling, indicating that it was wrong and overly helpful to the Democrats.

However, on December 17, 1991, the Texas Supreme Court threw out the legislature's senate plan, and is expected to rule similarly on the house plan.

Consequently, a three judge federal panel is currently reviewing the different proposals, as well as the Texas Republican Party challenge. The federal court is expected to render a decision in the next two weeks.

Your participation in the Republican Party's fundraising luncheon in Dallas raised over \$750,000 for reapportionment legal fees and related expenses.

BEEVILLE UPDATE

The Department of Defense announced that it will close Chase Naval Air Station in Beeville, and the potential economic displacement is enormous. Approximately 29% of the city's employment is related to Chase; city and county residents are very apprehensive about the future.

The community has indicated an interest in acquiring the base once the Navy withdraws (expected in the Spring of 1993), as well as assistance in developing the local economy after the closing.

As you know, this is a very close community. People are worried about the future and the impact this decision will have on their lives.

* Rep. Donald E. "Buz" Lukens, R-Ohio, resigned Oct. 24, 1990. Lukens was eligible for 104 of the 108 presidential support votes in 1990.

Bush in Beeville

The President landed at Chase Naval Air Station in Beeville, Texas after flying over flooded areas near Austin and San Antonio. At the Air Station he made brief remarks that were made available by the Press Office. He was accompanied by Senator Alan Simpson (R-WY). A local reporter asked the President about the planned closing of the Air Station, which is a major employer for the area. The President said he would have something to say about that later in the day. The motorcade proceeded to Beeclair in Goliad County. At the entrance to the Lazy F Ranch the President stopped and shook hands with several dozen local residents who had painted signs to welcome him. The Goliad High School marching band played a march tune in his honor. The President crossed the road to shake hands with a man in a wheel chair and wish him happy new year. Senator Simpson told reporters that he would go hunting for quail with the President. "I've done pheasants and ducks, but not the wiley bird," Simpson said. The President and his entourage entered the grounds of the ranch and the press was cut off there.

The President planned to hunt Friday afternoon and attend a Bar-B-Q in his honor Friday night.

The President was dressed in a tweed sports jacket, dress shirt and tie, gray dress slacks and black cowboy boots.

BUSH AT THE BAR-B-Q

The President spoke for 23 minutes to a crowd of about 3500 at the Beeville Convention Center. Text will be made available. Afterwards sponsors of the event gave him an overnight bag for Mrs. Bush and a tooled leather rifle case for the President.

After the speech the President ate barbecue and mingled with a crowd of about 1000 in an enclosed area of the convention center. While a Country & Western band played, the President spent nearly an hour working his way up and down the aisles shaking hands and posing for pictures. The motorcade proceeded towards the Farish Ranch, but the President stopped for an unannounced visit to the Texas Grand Dance Hall near Beeville. The President, accompanied by Senator Alan Simpson and Will Farish, walked up to the bar while amazed patrons stood and watched as media and secret service crowded around. "Al, you gonna have a draft?" the President asked the Senator. Simpson, however, ordered a glass of chablis while the President bought a pitcher of draft beer. The President drank only one mug and spent most of his time signing napkins and hunting caps and making small talk with locals, some of whom included members of the country band "The Edge". The presidential party arrived at 8:10 pm, so the band had not begun playing and the dance hall was largely empty.

"You live around here?" the President asked some of the young women who stood nearby. He asked others who seemed to be affiliated with the band, "Are you customers or are you part of the action?" A couple with a young girl approached and the President asked the child, "Have you had a nice Christmas? Get any one special thing? A doll?" The girl replied that she had received a pair of skates and the president wished her and her family a happy new year.

Doug Mackay, 32, of Houston was on his way to a deer hunt when he and a friend stopped into the bar for a beer. They were astonished when the presidential party came in and Mackay took the opportunity to have the President autograph his camouflage hunting cap. The President noted that the cap was made in South Texas and joked, "I can't see it, it's so well camouflaged." When Mackay took back the hat he admired the signature and said, "That's gonna bring me some luck tomorrow." The President left the bar after about 15 minutes. Simpson told reporters, "George Bush paid cash money" for the drinks. "It was a shocking thing."

The bar's owner, Dorothy Schwartz, said she and her friends had been discussing the Presidents Texas trip and she had said, "Wouldn't it be great if the President came by to see what a Texas dance hall is like."

At 8:25 the motorcade proceeded without incident to the Lazy F Ranch.

POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING AT
BEEVILLE BAR-B-QUE

- I appreciate and understand clearly the impact closing Chase Field could have on this community.
- I am committed to minimizing the potential adverse affects and there is an entire organization - the Office of Economic Adjustment - whose sole function in life is to do just that.
- The Office of Economic Adjustment has an excellent track record of success - and they have been at it for 30 years.
 - New jobs created in the aftermath of base closure far exceed those lost.
 - Closures have resulted in everything from four-year colleges and post-secondary vocational technical schools to industrial and office parks, and municipal airports.
 - Based on a mid-August assessment, as many of you already know, the OEA approved a grant for over \$100,000 for organizational development. Working together with your own officials here, a base reuse plan is being developed and the OEA will fund that plan in the first quarter of 1992.
- But the effort is much broader than just one organization - some 23 Departments and agencies are involved and they provide manpower, time, expertise, and money to help.
- Just a couple of examples:
 - In addition to the \$102,750 already granted by the Office of Economic Adjustment for organizational development in September and the money the OEA will provide in the first quarter of 1992 for the base reuse plan:
 - Beeville can expect about \$1 million from the Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration as well as,
 - Somewhere between \$3 and \$4 million from the Department of Labor's Dislocated Worker Assistance Program to assist those laid off by the closure through job search, counseling, relocation aid, and vocation training.
 - Another organization, the Small Business Administration, has a number of programs designed to help local businesses. And just as they did at Fort Hood, they are prepared, if you ask for them, to conduct seminars here in Beeville.

- There are a number of other agencies who are interested in Chase Field and who may have funds to commit as well. These include the FAA, National Park Service, Department of Education, Bureau of Prisons and the Fish and Wildlife Service.
- The bottom line is that communities can recover effectively from base closures. Ask the folks in Harlingen, Laredo, Mineral Wells and Waco.
- Adjustment can provide long-term opportunities -- not necessarily a crisis.
- But one thing is certain - the more successful communities hit by base closures are those who start their planning early and who pursue implementation aggressively. You have an important role to play in the process and for your future.
- I am fully confident that the fine and very capable people of Beeville and Bee County will succeed.

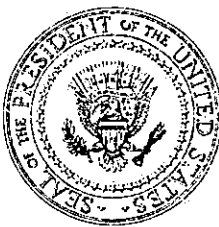

We support an open, comprehensive world trade regime that is universal in its application, predictable, transparent, and mutually advantageous to trading partners.

Multilateral arrangements in support of freer trade are the preferable approach to trade liberalization, but with the increasing complexity of the trading relationships, achieving significant reform becomes ever more difficult in a multilateral context. Bilateral or plurilateral arrangements can quite often achieve major advances that are not possible in a broader setting. Regional trading arrangements may provide vehicles for resolving issues that simply don't fit in the multilateral framework, or to provide an opportunity to pilot ideas that could eventually be adopted on a worldwide basis.

Chronic asymmetrical trading relationships between regions or nations often weaken the world trading system and frustrate progress towards greater liberalization. Therefore, when imbalances persist for extended periods of time, it is imperative that both partners undertake a systematic examination of their respective domestic and international trade policies to identify the root causes of the imbalance, and to act promptly to change policies to achieve more balanced trade.

The U.S.-Japan trade imbalance is certainly chronic. The U.S. trade deficit with countries other than Japan has improved by 70 percent since 1987. The deficit with Japan has remained stubbornly high. Japan now accounts for about 60 percent of our total trade deficit.

The U.S. auto industry has been forced by the U.S. recession to cut back production. Japanese auto producers have not shared in the downside of the U.S. economy. They have used profits from a protected home market -- all the worldwide auto producers have been able to capture less than 3 percent of the Japanese market -- to increase U.S. market share during the last two recessions. At the same time, Japan has negotiated limits on their exports to the European Community, making the U.S. the major target for new capacity.

With regard to the continuing Japanese trade surplus, we need to pursue a coordinated, cooperative effort among the U.S. public and private sectors to adopt a competitiveness agenda, including the following actions:

- Lower cost of capital (e.g.; balanced governmental budgets to reduce the competition for funds).
- Address health care issues in the U.S.
- Improve education of all the work force to enhance skill levels.
- Promote exchange rates that better reflect underlying economic fundamentals.
- Improve linkage of fiscal, monetary, exchange rate, and trade policies, to amplify and reinforce one another.
- Reduce pace of governmental regulation/intervention in industry. Encourage sensible implementation of Clean Air Act and continue to support DOT rulemaking for CAFE standards.
- Eliminate contradictions and inconsistencies in Governmental regulations and assure uniform enforcement (e.g.; customs, local content, and fuel economy regulations).
- Increase Government support (direct or indirect) of R&D spending, and put more emphasis on spending for pre-commercial R&D activities. Change the tax code to accelerate investment and to reward (or at least not penalize) risk capital.
- Insist on measurable progress in trade negotiations with Japan:
 - Force open the Japanese domestic market. Negotiate firmly for increased participation by foreign firms in a manner that cannot be rendered ineffective by group relationship practices.
 - Support strong and uniform rules of origin for conferring benefits under preferential trade agreements, such as the U.S.-Canada FTA and the proposed NAFTA.
 - Avoid unilateral concessions in present trade negotiations with Japan; do not give up more of our advantages in the name of free trade. Be cautious in NAFTA negotiations.
 - Establish a role for the Japanese to play in balancing the presently asymmetrical relationships. The signals Japan receives regarding what is expected must be clear and unambiguous.
 - In order to preserve the political climate conducive to the current global trading system, it will be necessary to reduce the Japanese trade surplus with the U.S. to no more than \$5 billion per year.
 - Japan itself should decide the measures to accomplish this reduction.
 - ✓ A five-year timetable should be set with a 20% reduction each year beginning in 1992. Progress should be monitored quarterly.

Ain't that suite

A lot of people pay full price at tax time, but not President Bush. He has skillfully — and legally — kept his taxes down by paying almost no state levies, according to the latest issue of Money magazine.

Money's exclusive, titled "How President Bush Cuts His Taxes," shows how successful the first family has been over the past 10 years in keeping its tax bill to a minimum. In 1990, the magazine reports, George and Barbara paid less than 1 percent of their adjusted gross income (AGI) in state taxes. In some states, taxes can run as high as 12 percent of AGI.

The Bush strategy centers on the location of their three residences: the White House in Washington, the vacation home in Kennebunkport, Maine, and a rented hotel suite in Houston. Under state law, the Texas suite is considered their primary residence for voting purposes.

Last year the Bushes had an AGI of \$452,732. That's salary plus investments. In the District of Columbia, someone knocking down that kind of loot would face around \$30,000 in D.C. income tax. In Maine, the state tab would run to \$29,000. But since the Bushes' primary residence is in Texas, they paid a total of just \$3,596 in 1990 state taxes.

The Lone Star state levies no personal-income or capital-gains taxes.

The bottom line is that the first family's federal income, Social Security and local property taxes amounted to 29.5 percent of its 1990 AGI. The typical U.S. household, with AGI of \$52,011, paid 37.7 percent in 1990 taxes, according to Money.

Mr. Bush beats the system fair and square, of course. It's not like some IRS bureaucrat just says, "Oh, yeah, you're president, so you get a discount" — although that's part of it, in that Mr. Bush enjoys a special exemption from the District of Columbia's income tax. The District grants 6,100 such exemptions for senators, congressmen, and presidential appointees and their immediate staffs. The only requirement for the exemption is the maintenance of a permanent home outside of Washington.

Mr. Bush does that through his legal voting residence and domicile in low-tax Texas, even though he doesn't own a house there.

While this revelation may add to the cries of "Impeach King George

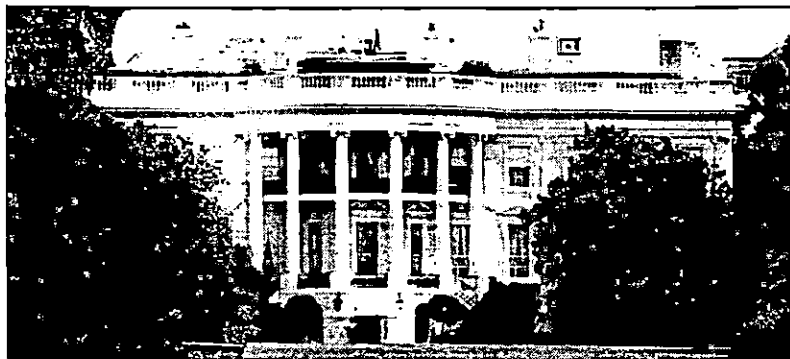

the Fourth," the fact is that he's just taking advantage of options available to any American who has three homes, an income just under half a million and the breaks that accompany a top government job.

He kept a firm grip on his binoculars all through the production number "I Can't Be Bothered Now," which features 10 chorus girls dressed in skimpy pink chiffon.

MACHINE TOOLS/PRESIDENT (Beeville/Tom Raum, AP) -- President Bush urged an extension of voluntary restrictions by Japan and Taiwan on exports to the U.S. of machine tools, citing "national security reasons" for protecting the U.S. industry.

TRADE/SEN. LEVIN (AP) -- A leading Senate Democrat on trade issues predicted Congress will enact legislation punishing Japan for its restrictions on U.S. exports if President Bush fails to do so during his Asian trip next month. "I think we now have majority support to take tough trade stances on Japan and any other countries that have discriminatory trade practices against us," said Sen. Levin. Levin said he was making the prediction to "strengthen the President's hand and maybe strengthen his back" during the trip.

SOVIET NUKES/CHENEY (Reuter) -- The U.S. supports the idea of a central military command for the republics of the former Soviet Union to safeguard their nuclear weapons, Secretary Cheney said. "We think that's important. It gives us the most confidence on how they'll operate in the future," Cheney said, in an interview on CNN when asked about the idea of a centralized military command to control the Soviet Union's nuclear weapons.

HOSTAGES/U.S. (AP) -- The U.S. still hasn't closed the book on the sad chapter of foreign kidnappings in Lebanon, despite Friday's return of remains believed to be those of former CIA operative William Buckley. The Administration, said State Department spokesman Joseph Snyder, is holding out for the remains of two former European hostages, the release of two German relief workers, and information about the whereabouts of several Israeli soldiers. Only when all these demands are met, one U.S. official said privately, will the Administration consider improving relations with Iran.

LOCKERBIE TRIAL/U.S. (Reuter) -- The U.S. turned down an invitation from Libyan leader Gadhafi to send Western judges to Tripoli for the trial of two men allegedly implicated in 1988's bombing of a Pan Am jet over Scotland. "Libya must surrender for trial all those charged with the crime related to Pan Am 103," State Department spokesman Joe Snyder told a regular briefing. "The United States and the United Kingdom have jurisdiction in this case. We expect Libya to comply promptly and in full."

BANKRUPTCIES (New York/AP) -- The number of personal bankruptcy filings soared by 24 percent in the 12 months ending Sept. 30, increasing in every region of the country, government figures show. The East was hit hardest. Personal bankruptcies rose by 50 percent in a region containing Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Rhode Island, and 43 percent in New York, Connecticut and Vermont.

COMPETITION/U.S. PROFITS (Montave, N.J./UPI) -- Financial managers in U.S. corporations believe foreign competition will have little impact on their businesses in 1992, a survey said. An overwhelming 82 percent of corporate controllers say their firms would not be affected by foreign competition, according to the survey by the Controllers Council of the Institute of Management Accountants.
