BUSH ARRIVES IN SEOUL

JANUARY 5, 1992

(SEOUL, KOREA)

A 21-gun salute and the blare of a red-uniformed military band greeted the President and Mrs. Bush when they emerged from Air Force One at the K-16 military airfield for an official greeting by South Korean prime minister Chung Won-Shik and Mrs. Chung. Also in the greeting party were foreign minister Lee Sang Ock and U.S. Ambassador Donald Gregg.

Under slate skies, the motorcade proceeded without incident past scattered onlookers to the National Cemetery. There, the President and Mrs. Bush put on white cotton gloves as a symbol of purity and marched up a path between Korean army and navy honor guards to the Hyun-Choong Tower memorial to the nation's Korean War dead. They were flanked by Kang Myung-Suk, superintendent of the cemetery, and gold-braided Maj. Gen. Ahn Byung Ho of the Seoul Defense Corps, both also wearing white gloves.

The President placed his right hand on a large circular wreath of yellow flowers as a Korean soldier and airman carried it to a large black cast-iron pot of burning incense topped with brass. First the President and then Mrs. Bush scooped three handfuls of a special incense out of a container and tossed them into the burner. This is said to be good luck.

The honor party bowed their heads while a military band played. They retraced their steps to the memorial's entrance, where the President signed a visitors' book and handed back the gloves. "Thank you for accommodating us," Bush said to Kang. The superintendent said he hoped they'd have a good time in Seoul. "We will," said the President, who wore a gray overcoat and blue silk scarf and a blue suit. "We'll have a good time."

The motorcade made its way past the largest crowds of the day on midtown streets--medium-sized, respectful and smiling crowds--to the American embassy and ambassador's residence.

FLYING FROM SINGAPORE TO SEOUL

There is some substance here in airborne comments from Marlin Fitzwater and a senior administration official on relations among the U.S., South Korea and North Korea.

President Bush's trip to Seoul will chiefly emphasize ~~security~~ security and trade, Fitzwater said. On security, Bush will strike the mixed tone of saying positive, encouraging things about the North-South reconciliation process ~~and~~ and of putting verbal pressure on Kim Il Sung's Pyongyang Communist government to implement the Dec. 31 nuclear weapons ban agreement with the South by allowing inspections of its nuclear facilities, said Fitzwater.

In general, with the North warily beginning to open up ~~to~~ to Seoul and ~~the~~ the rest of the world, the U.S. is encouraged ~~by~~ developments and Bush's tone will reflect that. Fitzwater said, "We're past the point where we can say a couple of words and send a signal. We're at the point where they've taken action to change their relationship with the South. We're pulling troops out of the South. So we're a lot further along. He'll (Bush) have a lot to say about North-South relations, and it will all be positive." ~~He'll have a lot to say about North-South relations, and it will all be positive.~~ Fitzwater said of the President, "His tone toward North Korea will be one of improving relations."

~~He'll~~ However, because North Korea has a history of signing agreements and not implementing them--the senior official noted that Pyongyang signed the nuclear nonproliferation treaty in 1985 but has yet to allow International Atomic Energy Agency inspections--Bush also will challenge the North to live up to its latest promises. "We started all these things, now let's see you do it," ~~he~~ Fitzwater described the approach.

Still, Fitzwater recognized the nuclear weapons agreement as "really a major change in the North-South relationship, and leading ultimately to reunification or conciliation in some other format."

South Korea is letting in more U.S. beef but still bans rice imports. But rather than wrestle with them over individual products, ~~Bush~~, recognizing that ~~President~~ President Roh Tae Woo's Liberal Democratic Party has a major farm constituency, will encourage South Korea to overcome its wariness toward the Uruguay Round of GATT and embrace collective action to liberalize international trade, which has benefited its export economy so much, the ~~source~~ source said.

The senior official had copious praise for ~~Roh~~ Roh, with whom Bush will be signing a science and technology agreement. "This guy has shown enormous imagination," the official said, crediting Roh since 1988 with staging a successful Olympic Games, outgunning the North economically, diplomatically opening up to ~~the~~ the Soviets, ~~getting~~ getting the two Koreas into the UN and democratizing internally so that now the nation has "competitive politics, of a sort." All in all, "He's had an unbroken chain of successes since '88," ~~the source said~~, Roh has also co-opted ~~the~~ the student protest movement by moving toward reunification and ~~with the start of~~ an American move-out from the highly visible Yongsan ~~base~~ base.

There are still some political prisoners in South Korean jails, and the U.S. and Seoul have had human rights discussions going on. Bush may bring up the issue, but only "in the general context of democratization," the official said.

Looking toward Japan, the official, asked about the effect of Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa's political weakness on his ability to deliver trade concessions, said simply, "It doesn't help." But he noted that Japan has a collective leadership in the Liberal Democratic Party that does not want to jeopardize the important relationship with the U.S. by alienating Washington on trade issues.

Your pool earlier had a visit from First Lady Barbara Bush. She chatted generally about the trip and the family, while standing in stocking feet and wearing a ^{U.S.-bought} silver nylon zipper jacket with ~~Southwestern~~ Southwestern Indian decoration, and black nylon ~~zip~~ zipper-leg warmup-style pants, together with white shell-design earrings. She said that ~~2-hour~~ 2-hour naps on a couple of the trip days have prevented jet lag, while the President is "in great shape" through daily exercise--runs in Australia and the use of a ^{stationary} bike in a hotel room there, and yesterday doing the Stairmaster and stationary bike at the Shangri-La ~~health club~~. No matter what some of us may have thought of the size and enthusiasm of the Singapore street crowds, Mrs. Bush considered them large and friendly.

She noted that two of her young grandsons, Jeb's son, Jebbie, and Sam LeBlond, have taken up golf.

The motorcade to Changi Airport from the Shangri-La was uneventful, viewed by small clumps of undemonstrative early-Sunday-morning spectators and backed-up lanes of frustrated motorists.

Barbara Bush wished us all a happy and prosperous New Year, by the way.
