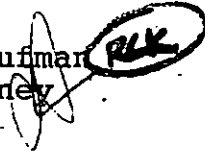

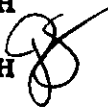

SUBJECT: NEW HAMPSHIRE

I. Summary

During your visit to New Hampshire you will visit Exeter, Dover, Rochester and Portsmouth.

II. Recent Correspondence

Representative Harry Accornero (R-Laconia) wrote opposing the pay raise given to members of the U.S. Senate.

Robert A. Fischer (Chairman, New Hampton Board of Selectmen) wrote requesting a reversal of the proposal to restructure wetlands protection programs.

III. Discussion

A. Economy

1. Employment Rate

New Hampshire, like most of the Northeast, is in very difficult economic circumstances. After several years of having the lowest unemployment rate in the nation, it has crept up this year. The unemployment rate for the state in November 1991 was 7.0 percent.

2. Welfare Claims

Welfare claims for the state increased by 79 percent in 1991. Due to the previous low unemployment rate in the state, the number of welfare claims and recipients had been low. Current economic conditions and multiple layoffs in a variety of industries have caused the dramatic increase.

B. Education

1. New Hampshire 2000

Governor Judd Gregg has endorsed the America 2000 strategy and is working to implement the six national education goals across the state. On December 17, 1991, Secretary Alexander

traveled to the state to announce the kick off of New Hampshire 2000. Several communities across the state are now committing themselves to the plan.

2. Statewide Initiatives

The Governor's Task Force on Education, comprised of business leaders and educators, has been the main focus for developing and promoting a number of major initiatives as part of a comprehensive plan for education reform. The Student Assessment Program will be based on performance outcomes. There are many parallels between the work being done by the Task Force and the national education goals.

C. Great Bay National Wildlife Refuge

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is currently awaiting official transfer of 1,095 acres of the former Pease Air Force Base to the Great Bay National Wildlife Refuge. Due to security concerns, the former Air Force recreation and conservation area has been closed to the general public for the past 30 years. Located in Newington, the area includes six miles of Great Bay, a National Estuarine Research Reserve shoreline, and numerous wetlands and diverse upland habitats.

D. Drugs

Cocaine hydrochloride and crack cocaine are readily available throughout the state and are the focal point of current enforcement efforts. The majority of cocaine distributed in the state appears to be coming from Massachusetts, New York, and Florida. There are a number of independent distributors involved in the distribution of cocaine, however, Dominican traffickers control the major trafficking organizations.

Domestic growing of marijuana appears to be on the increase as a result of the short supply and high demand. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency, in cooperation with the New Hampshire State Police, has organized a comprehensive strategy to identify and eradicate domestic growing operations.

The state has estimated that there are about 140,000 citizens in various stages of chemical dependency. About 85,000 are men and 55,000 are women. Youth between the ages of eleven and seventeen years constitute approximately 20 percent of this group. Alcohol is considered to be the state's most widely abused substance.

TRIP BACKGROUND INFORMATION

You have travelled to New Hampshire twice since being elected President. Your most recent trip was October 23, 1990 when you attended a Congressman Bob Smith for United States Senate fundraiser.

On your current trip, you will visit Portsmouth, Exeter, Dover, and Rochester.

Your first stop will be at the Henly Hangar at the Pease Air National Guard Base where you will participate in a meeting with approximately 100 members of economic development boards from throughout the state. Frustration over the economic condition of the state is keen. This meeting will demonstrate your concern and your willingness to work toward solutions while highlighting Administration accomplishments.

From Pease Air National Guard Base, you will proceed to Exeter Town Hall to participate in a meeting with residents of the Exeter area. Approximately two-thirds of the audience, representing 200 individuals, have been identified as undecided voters in the Republican presidential primary. Approximately 100 attendees are active Bush supporters. Maureen Barrows is the local County Commissioner (Rockingham County) and serves as the

Bush-Quayle Town Chairman for the town of Exeter. Maureen has expressed interest in challenging incumbent Republican Congressman Bill Zeliff in the upcoming Congressional primary. You will be the first sitting President since Gerald Ford to visit the town of Exeter. As Vice President and Presidential candidate, you attended a campaign event at the Exeter Town Hall which was similar to the event planned for this trip. Also as Vice President, you visited Exeter a second time and delivered the keynote address at Phillips-Exeter Academy. On that same visit, you celebrated your birthday at the home of Maureen Barrows. An association of twelve car dealerships in Exeter is conducting a straw poll that will run through the date of the primary. The poll began this week. The first round of results will be announced this Friday.

Your third stop will be in Dover at the Davidson Interior Trim Plant. The plant manufactures interior car parts. Overall, the management and employees believe that your recent overseas trip has been beneficial. The Mayor of Dover, Howard Williams, is an employee at the plant and a strong supporter of yours. Other Presidential candidates have requested a tour of the plant and have been denied. Pat Buchanan requested a tour on Tuesday, January 14, and was regretted.

The Liberty Mutual Insurance Group in Dover will be your next stop. The Executive Vice President of the company, Bob Laszewski, has been actively involved in health care reform. The headquarters of three Presidential candidates are within one block of the Liberty Mutual building.

Your next stop will be in Rochester at Cabletron, a computer manufacturing plant which has grown to an operation earning over \$36 million in net income after beginning 9 years ago in the garage of one of the owners. The owners are extremely supportive of you. They operate under a "Pride in America" motto. They have refused other Presidential candidates who have requested a tour of the plant.

Following a series of media interviews and some down time, your final stop of the day will be at Yoken's Restaurant in Portsmouth to attend a Rotary Club Dinner. On a visit to the State in 1988 you were scheduled to attend a Portsmouth Rotary meeting. You were called back to Washington to preside over a Senate vote on Contra aid and had to cancel your appearance at the meeting. You called into the meeting from Air Force Two en route back to Washington. At the time you committed that you would return.

The **Bush-Quayle '92** campaign headquarters opened in Manchester last month. Governor Judd Gregg is the Chairman of the campaign. Former Governor Hugh Gregg serves as the Campaign Director. **Pat Buchanan** (R) announced his candidacy for the Presidency last month in New Hampshire. He is campaigning on a "Put America First" platform. He is attempting to attract the conservative wing of the party and those who are disenchanted as a result of the economic conditions in the state. Former Congressman Chuck Douglas is Buchanan's State Chairman. Republican activists Chris Tremblay, Paul Nagy and Portsmouth City Councilor Mike Dunbar have also joined the Buchanan leadership team. **David Duke** (R), who lost the Louisiana governor's race last November, has declared his candidacy for President but is not participating in the New Hampshire primary. The five Democrat Presidential candidates have been actively campaigning in the state. **Bill Clinton** has 23 percent of the vote and **Paul Tsongas** has 22 percent.

In a poll released this week 46% of the responses indicated support for you and 30% of the responses indicated support for Buchanan.

New Hampshire is the only state in the nation that allows votes to be cast separately for the Vice President. Chub Peabody, former Democrat Governor of Massachusetts, has entered the race by running in the Democrat Primary. The 1992 New Hampshire general election ballot will include the Office of President, the Office of the Vice President, United States Senate, United States Congressmen, Governor, and all State Legislative seats.

New Hampshire will be represented at the Republican National Convention by a delegation of twenty-three - 6 district delegates and 17 at-large delegates. Independent voters may vote in either the Republican or the Democrat primary.

Since 1952 no candidate has won the Presidency without first winning the New Hampshire primary.

A great deal of speculation exists as to whether Senator Rudman (R) will run for re-election. He remains undecided and is not expected to announce his intentions until the spring. Attorney Robert Robuck (R) has entered the race. Robuck supports a 15% cut in the capital gains tax. Governor Sununu has been mentioned as a possible challenger although he continues to state that he will not run. It has also been speculated that Governor Gregg may run for the Senate seat if he decides not to seek re-election. Ex-State Senate Democrat Leader Robert Preston; businessman John Rauh, who unsuccessfully ran for Gordon Humphrey's seat in 1990, and Chris Tremblay (R) may also run for Rudman's seat.

Congressman Bill Zeliff (R-01) may be challenged by Rockingham County Commissioner Maureen Barrows (R) or ex-House Speaker Doug Scamman's Finance Chairman, Ovide Lamontagne of Manchester.

Congressman Dick Swett (D-02) may be challenged by Peter Thomson, son of ex-Governor Meldrim Thomson; Executive Councilor Peter Spaulding; State Senator Charles Bass; Attorney Stephen Duprey; Gulf War vet and State Representative David Young; ex-Representative William Hatch or ex-Representative Betty Tamposi. Former Congressman Chuck Douglas (R), who Swett defeated in 1990, is expected to decide soon whether he will run. Republicans held this seat for 78 years until Swett won in 1990.

Incumbent Republican Governor Judd Gregg faced a modest challenge from former State Democrat Party Chairman Joe Grandmaison. Gregg was able to highlight Grandmaison's association with the Massachusetts Dukakis organization which served as the base of Grandmaison's fundraising support. Gregg is expected to seek a third term in 1992.

U.S. Senate

Bob Smith (R)	67%
John Durkin (D)	33%

First District Republican Congressman Bob Smith defeated former Democrat U.S. Senator John Durkin to win the U.S. Senate seat. Both candidates modified their positions on abortion. Smith, a strong conservative, eased his anti-abortion positions somewhat while Durkin moved to support abortion rights. Smith decided to run for the Senate after Republican Senator Gordon Humphrey decided to step down and run for a seat in the State Senate. Smith, who had served New Hampshire's First Congressional District since 1984, entered the race and handily won a four-way primary in September. In spite of Smith's record, some party leaders were skeptical about his chances and were reluctant to sign on with his campaign.

Zeliff, a former DuPont Chemical Company executive and local inn-keeper, defeated Joe Keefe, a Manchester attorney for the First District Congressional seat. Zeliff, an early 1987 Bush supporter and a friend of Governor Sununu's, defeated seven other candidates in the Republican primary - including State House Speaker Doug Scamman. Keefe had challenged Bob Smith in 1988 and therefore enjoyed district-wide recognition.

Swett, a political unknown at the time of the election, upset freshman Republican Congressman Chuck Douglas. Douglas had a disagreement with Nancy Sununu after it was reported that there was some distance between the two resulting from Douglas' divorces. The Swett campaign used this issue to its advantage, using quotes from Mrs. Sununu on the issue in a campaign brochure.

State Legislature

Republicans lost seats in both houses of the State Legislature. In the State Senate, Republicans lost three seats but still enjoy a 13-11 margin. During the vote for Senate President, one Republican backed the Democrat choice. As a result, new Senate President Ed DuPont was forced to give the Democrats control of 13 of the 24 Senate Committees.

The State House of Representatives, one of the largest legislative bodies in the english speaking world, is controlled by Republicans by a margin of 272-128. Republicans lost six seats in the State House.

ISSUES

The state economy has presented Judd Gregg with substantial challenges. Governor Gregg delivered his State of the State Address last week in which he outlined economic development initiatives centering on the redevelopment of Pease Air Force Base. Public controversy arose when Gregg blamed Governor Sununu for leaving the state in the red. Facing a budget shortfall last year, Gregg was forced to raise New Hampshire taxes but did not have to implement a broad based state income tax.

The current state of the economy has caused a 10.7 percent loss of jobs since 1989. Of note is the fact that these job losses are not specific to one industry but rather they extend across the board in every sector but health care affecting many white-collar employees who were untouched by the 1981-82 recession. The region's primary industries - defense and computers - have faced severe cutbacks. Personal bankruptcies are at the highest rate in the nation. The number of welfare cases has increased by 160 percent from 1988-1991.

In a recent poll, 81 percent of New Hampshire residents interviewed said that they are worse off today than they were in 1989; 71 percent favored a national health insurance plan that would provide coverage for all citizens.

New Hampshire is a strong anti-tax state that reacted strongly to a break in your "no new taxes" pledge.

Controversy has arisen charging political motivation in government business over three sources of financial assistance that were announced this month in the state. An SBA program was announced that would guarantee loans to businesses if their lending institutions fail. The Chairman of the House Small Business Subcommittee (Democrat Ron Wyden) has asked that the SBA provide information regarding the genesis, intent and timing of the project. The State Department has announced the location of a \$6.2 million 400 job visa and passport processing center at Pease Air Force Base. In addition, \$234 million is Medicaid reimbursement and has provided enough money to the state budget that Governor Gregg has credited it with alleviating the potential \$200 million state budget deficit.

A 5-member Executive Council serves as a "check and balance" system on the Governor. These individuals are elected from 5 districts and vote on monetary expenditures; appointments to state commissions and boards; and judicial appointments. This system has allowed some to argue that New Hampshire has one of the weakest Governor's seats in the nation. The Council is well regarded in the state and is a group that expects to be courted by politicians. Currently, all five members are Republicans - Earl Rinker, Bernie Streeter, Ruth Griffin, Peter Spaulding and Raymond Burton.

Bill Gardner (D) is the Secretary of State. Although he is a Democrat, Gardner is very friendly and is one of Governor Sununu's "favorite Democrats."

Secretary Alexander was in the State recently to participate in the America 2000 program. He also attended a State Party event.

You have to keep updating these models to accurately reflect changing economic relationships," said John Kirkman, director of budget issues for GAO. "Apparently the (Treasury's) models have become outdated by changes in the economy."

DOW JUMPS 61 POINTS TO RECORD**Investors Seen Shifting From Bonds To Stocks**

NEW YORK -- Stock prices resumed their strong rally Tuesday, with the Dow Jones industrial average rising 61 points to a new record high. Investors shifted money out of bonds and into stocks in what traders called a wager that interest rates have touched bottom.

The market's continued climb reflects confidence among many investors that the economy will revive later this year and boost corporate profits, according to various Wall Street analysts.

Even disappointing economic news failed to halt the climb in stock prices. Investors shrugged off Tuesday's reports that retail sales fell 0.4 percent in December and that auto sales dropped sharply in early January. But several traders warned that prices seemed to be getting too high, given the shortage of positive economic signals.

RETAIL SALES FELL BY 0.4 PERCENT LAST MONTH

The Commerce Department confirmed Tuesday what many retailers already have been saying: The 1991 Christmas selling season was not so hot, and the year as a whole was one of the worst in three decades.

The department said retail sales fell 0.4 percent last month after seasonal adjustment to \$151.2 billion, following a similar 0.5 percent drop in November and a 0.1 percent decline in October.

For the entire year, sales totaled \$1.82 trillion, a scant 0.7 percent increase over 1990 and the smallest rise since 1961, when retail sales fell slightly. Sales had increased 3.8 percent in 1990 and 6 percent in 1989, (John Berry, Washington Post, F1)

PARTICIPATION TOPS 24 MILLION AMERICANS FOR FIRST TIME EVER

The number of Americans receiving food stamps continues to grow sharply, federal figures show, and more than half of the children who eat school lunches receive them free or at reduced prices. Rep. Hall called the surging enrollment in the federally funded programs "the monthly body count of the recession."

Hall said Congress may soon have to deal with the escalating costs of feeding growing numbers of hungry Americans. According to the Agriculture Department, enrollment in the food stamp program totaled 24.16 million people in October, up 400,000 from a month earlier and up 3.23 million from a year earlier.

**BUSH CRITICIZES SENATE DEMOCRATS' SCHOOL BILL,
URGES BUSINESS TO BACK HIS**

President Bush criticized the Senate Democrats' initiative on school reform as "standing in the way" of progress Tuesday as he lobbied business leaders on behalf of his own school innovation plan....

Critics of the private school "choice" plan say it would lead to entanglement of church-state issues and divert public dollars to private institutions.

Johnson gently chided Bush for not paying more attention to fighting the disease and, wearing a navy-blue suit and a somber expression, he asked more questions than any other commission member....

Commission members reiterated criticism that the federal government has failed to furnish enough money to help solve the epidemic. "We are frustrated by the silence at the White House level," said commission vice chairman David Rogers.

President Bush is on the verge of igniting what could become one of the biggest ideological battles of the 1990s: a fight over the future of the ailing American health care system.

At the heart of the debate is a fundamental question: Can the market for health care work like the market for autos or tomatoes? Or is health care an exception, like defense and highways, that is unsuited to market mechanisms and must be provided by the government?

Nearly every other developed country has given up on the market as a means of dispensing health care. But the Bush Administration hasn't. The plan it is now crafting behind closed doors is an effort to use market forces to address the nation's two overwhelming health care problems: runaway costs and limited access.

PALESTINIANS PRESENT GOVERNING PLAN TO ISRAELIS Baker To Meet With Two Middle East Delegations Today For A Progress Report

Palestinian negotiators in the Middle East peace talks here gave Israel a proposal Tuesday for Palestinian self-rule in the West Bank and Gaza Strip that calls for withdrawal of Israeli military forces, their replacement by U.N. peace-keepers and election of an interim Palestinian government to rule the territories until their final status is decided.

The plan, which Palestinians called "a model" for future bargaining with Israel, was given to the Israeli delegation as negotiators tried to put recent procedural wrangles behind them and move to substantive discussions. The Israeli reaction was not immediately known, although the plan contains many features that are expected to draw Israeli objections.

Secretary Baker met late Tuesday with heads of the Syrian and Lebanese delegations and is scheduled to meet leaders of the Israeli and joint Jordanian-Palestinian delegations Wednesday.

Magic Johnson meets the President on AIDS and asks him to do more.
(Magic Johnson, at AIDS commission meeting: "And I just want you to understand this: that Magic Johnson cannot do this alone.")

-- NBC News theme --

Brokaw: America's best-known carrier of the AIDS virus took a message directly to President Bush today. Magic Johnson told the President in a personally delivered letter, "No matter how good the team, it won't win the championship without the owner fully in the game," adding, "I don't feel you've been there until now." This on a day when Johnson became a member of the National Commission on AIDS.

NBC's Robert Hager reports on Johnson's efforts in Washington. The Commission heard witnesses like Janice Jerow [ph], a poor woman who's infected:

(Jerow, at AIDS Commission meeting: "I'm just so tired of seeing the same thing over and over and over. Are you really listening? We don't have a voice, Magic. We don't have anybody to stand up for us and speak about things in our lives. We need you. I came here today to tell you that.")

Derek Hodel, who's gay:

(Hodel, at meeting: "Mr. Johnson, you must forgive me because I don't know any basketball stars. I do, however, know hundreds of people with HIV. I challenge you to call President Bush -- not to listen, because we already know what he has to say -- but to challenge him to provide the leadership necessary to stem the AIDS epidemic before it kills you, as, I'm sorry to say, it probably will.")

Johnson said he'd try, but warned it's the whole nation's problem.

(Johnson, at meeting: "We're all in this. It's not just Magic Johnson, it's everybody. And until everybody recognizes that, then we're not going to win this war, we're not going to win this battle.")

Later, Johnson did meet with President Bush.

(President Bush, in Oval Office meeting with Johnson: "We will try to get the maximum research funding level possible.")

But Johnson handed Bush a letter calling for an additional \$2.3 billion for AIDS. And after the meeting, Johnson said this:

(Johnson, outside West Wing lobby: "The people want to hear from him, too, that he's behind this. They want to hear his voice, as well; not just the money, but to hear him speak out that this is happening and that he's concerned and cares.")

(Johnson, at commission meeting: "The only thing I can tell you is I'm gonna give 150 percent, and that's it. Because I don't know what's going to happen tomorrow.")

CBS's Dan Rather: Magic Johnson took his message about AIDS awareness right to the top today, putting the full-court press on President Bush. The White House visit capped a day of heavy campaigning by the former basketball star. Not everyone was pleased.

CBS's Edie Magnus: Magic Johnson joined a new team today: the panel which advises Congress and the President on how to conduct America's war on AIDS.

(Magic Johnson, at commission meeting: "I understand your fight and will help in every way that I can.")

Commissioner Johnson listened as officials from the CDC reported that his is among 206,000 cases of the disease right now in the U.S. Perhaps predictably, the new soldier who's taken a starring role in the fight faced some bitterness from those who have been slogging it out in the trenches.

(Derek Hodel, People with AIDS Support Group, at meeting: "The great power you now wield to persuade, to convince, to inspire is something that I, in spite of dedicating my life to fighting this fight, will never know.")

Hodel challenged Johnson to use that influence on President Bush, who's Administration is viewed by many as having virtually ignored previous recommendations of the commission. Johnson said he would pass along pleas for increased federal funding of AIDS research when he met with Bush privately. The President was prepared for that.

(President Bush, during Oval Office meeting with Johnson: "I would point out the fact that we are spending four-and-a-quarter billion dollars total now. We're spending on research one-point-eight, which is more than we do on cancer, more than we do on heart disease.")

On the thornier question of the President's leadership, Johnson said afterward he advised Bush about that, too.

(Johnson, outside West Wing lobby: "The people want to hear from him, too, that he's behind it. They want to hear his voice, as well; not just the money, but to hear him speak out.")

Expectations are high that the man who's vowed to change the sexual habits of America's youth can also bend the ear of a President. While nothing conclusive happened today, AIDS activists did score a victory. Because when Magic Johnson talked, George Bush listened. (CBS-Lead)

ABC's Bettina Gregory reports on Magic's meetings. One of the witnesses at the commission meeting, Derek Hodel, called Johnson an AIDS hero, and urged him to challenge the President.

(Derek Hodel: "To challenge him to provide the leadership necessary to stem the AIDS epidemic before it kills you -- as, I'm sorry to say, it probably will. Send that message, Magic. We are a thousand points of light, and we are being extinguished one by one." **Johnson:** "You've been fighting this for a long time. Now

how am I, as a black man, going to help the black community, Hispanics?" **Hodel:** "I think that the most powerful message that you can send today to the black community, to the Hispanic community, to all communities, is that this is our problem, and I think that you hold such great power because of your respect, because of your stature, because of your magic -- that you can make this a problem for us." **Johnson:** "I am a part of us, so we're all included, so thank you; and we're gonna fight it together." **Hodel:** "I hope so.")

Gregory continues: An hour later, Johnson was seated right next to the President in the Oval Office. Bush praised his courage.

(President Bush, seated with Johnson: "And I'm not just saying it because I'm sitting next to the big guy, but I'm telling you that's the way they see it. They see it as, here's a man who's got here, and he's standing up and doing something about it and helping others.")

Afterward, Johnson said the President needed to do more and spend more.

(Johnson, outside West Wing lobby: "I think he's going to do his homework and I'm gonna do mine, so I'm going to come at him with figures and numbers that will probably blow his mind.")

And Johnson promised to come back with specific proposals in a month. (ABC-12)

NEW HAMPSHIRE/PRESIDENT

Brokaw: The people of New Hampshire are likely to have plenty of advice for President Bush when he visits tomorrow. That state's primary is just five weeks away, and its economy is on the critical list.

NBC's John Cochran: The President will be returning to the state which more than any other won him the Republican nomination in 1988 after he looked like a loser.

(TV coverage: President-elect Bush, cheering crowds on election night '88)

Minutes after Bush polished off Democrat Michael Dukakis that November, the President-elect ended his victory statement with a very specific thank-you.

(President-elect, 11/8/88: "Once, in days that were a little darker, I made a promise. And now I'll keep it. Thank you, New Hampshire.")

Now the days are dark for New Hampshire, where store closings are common, jobs are scarce and people are looking for someone to blame.

(TV coverage: various "office for rent," "house for rent" signs)

(New Hampshire woman: "It bothers me that, I wouldn't like to help Bush to win again. I'd like to have a change.")

And Republicans who are angry enough can protest by voting for the very conservative Pat Buchanan, who blames Bush not only for the recession but for spending too much time on foreign policy and too much money on foreign aid.

(TV coverage: Pat Buchanan on campaign trail)

But Bush does not want to give Buchanan the status of a serious challenger. So he tries to ignore him.

(John Cochran, in interview: "But I ask if you're ready to specifically attack Pat Buchanan as an isolationist when you go to New Hampshire?" President Bush: "No, I don't need to attack him. What I need to do is advocate our policies on international trade.")

Bush has enormous advantages.

(TV coverage: President and First Lady departing Air Force One)
As President, he can serve plenty of pork: a new passport office with a multi-million dollar payroll at this air base where he will land tomorrow; a big boost in federal Medicaid payments to prevent hospital layoffs; and a more than generous share of transportation funds, a point underscored by Bush during a taping by a New Hampshire TV station.

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Cochran's report continues:

(President Bush, speaking to Vice President: "That transportation bill means \$200 million for New Hampshire.")

But Buchanan claims Bush is vulnerable.

(Buchanan: "George Bush has not even got half of the Republican Party. That is his problem, I didn't have anything to do with creating that. And it's one if he doesn't solve, John, I could beat him in this New Hampshire primary.")

Buchanan wants voters here to regard him as another Ronald Reagan, and he wants voters to regard George Bush as, well, George Bush.

Rather: President Bush may be over his stomach flu or whatever it was that hit him in Japan, but he is still feeling the effects of jet lag from his trip to Asia. The government is buying more than 3,000 GM and Chrysler vehicles powered by alternative fuels. This one runs on natural gas to cut down on pollution.

GM RECALL

Jennings: We begin tonight in Detroit, with the kind of news the troubled automobile industry doesn't need. Even while President Bush and the leaders of the Big Three car companies were in Japan last week talking up the quality of American cars, General Motors was notifying the owners of one and a half million of its cars that the cars may have a problem. The cars may stall, sometimes while they are moving quickly.

ABC's Bob Jamieson reports GM has been quietly contacting owners of 1986 and 1987 Buicks, Oldsmobiles and Pontiacs for six weeks. In its letter, GM does not say the action is a recall. GM often announces recalls publicly, but made no announcement about this. GM had discussed the problem with federal regulators, but they did not order a recall, even though 300 accidents and one death are blamed by customers on defective engine controls. GM Chairman Robert Stempel spent much of the Presidential trip to Japan defending the quality of GM cars. Those problems, he insisted, were left behind in the early '80s.

(Stempel: "The quality issue you can just set aside.")

Consumer groups criticized the way GM handled the problem.

(Clarence Ditlow, Center for Auto Safety: "GM's concern for its image is shown by the fact they tried to keep this recall secret. They didn't put out a press release; they're trying to cover up a serious quality problem once again.")

RETAIL SALES

Rather: Trying to lower expectations, President Bush put out the word today: Don't expect any dramatic, fast changes in economic policy in his State of the Union Address later this month. The President's spokesman did say America's retailers should expect some improvement in sales later this year.

Jennings reports that those retailers who predicted the Christmas season was going to be slow were right on the money. Today the government released its figures on retail sales. In December, they were down .4 percent, and for all of 1991 they were up only .7 of a percent. The last time retail sales were that slow was in 1961, 30 years and five recessions ago.

ABC's Stephen Aug reports on the slow retail sales. The last three months of the year, particularly December, were a disaster for nearly all retailers. The main reason was lack of consumer confidence in the economy.

(Allen Questrom, CEO of Federated Department Stores: "We really do respond to customers' feelings and sentiments, and when they're feeling poor or they're not feeling ebullient about the future, it's going to negatively impact our business. We think that's going to continue for a few months.")

Discounters like Wal-Mart and K-Mart, however, did well.

CBS's Ray Brady reports on the weak retail sales. The number of stores going out of business skyrocketed last year to an estimated 17,000 failures -- a 32 percent jump in one year. (CBS-2, ABC-3)

STOCK MARKET

Jennings: There was another big rally on Wall Street today. Because of falling interest rates, a lot of money is moving into the stock market. The Dow Jones industrials gained more than 60 points today to close at another high, 3246. Trading was heavy.

UNEMPLOYMENT

NBC's George Lewis reports on those unemployed who have all but given up trying to find a job. If those people plus people who can find only part-time work are included, the national unemployment figure rises to more than 10 percent.

CLINTON PROFILE

CBS's Richard Threlkeld does a profile on Gov. Bill Clinton, the second in a series of profiles of the Democratic candidates. Clinton spent much of the last decade making things better in Arkansas's schoolrooms. Clinton's reforms shrunk class sizes, and he also started competency testing of teachers.

(Susan Goodroom, teacher: "There was a lot of upset teachers, people upset, people wanting to quit education, feeling like this was a big stab in the back.")

Arkansas teachers are more supportive now since Clinton got them a 20 percent pay increase.

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Threlkeld continues: Fixing America's education is a foundation of the Clinton campaign -- national education standards, more money for preschoolers in need.

(Clinton: "One in five children is in poverty, one in four children under the age of six. But we haven't fully funded Head Start.")

He wants to retrain workers to qualify for better jobs and be more productive, and start a domestic GI bill.

(Clinton, on stump: "And I will set up a national service trust fund so that any American can borrow the money to go to college if they will pay it back. Any American, as a small percentage of their income, or with two years of service here at home as teachers, as policemen, as nurses, as family service workers.")

Clinton also supports a tax cut for the middle class. He wants to reform the welfare system. And he's in favor of health care reform, but not necessarily for federally-funded national health insurance. Clinton's candidacy has its weaknesses. He has virtually no foreign policy experience. His Southern moderation is not especially popular with Democratic liberals. And back in Arkansas, there are some who have never forgiven him for going back on his pledge to serve out his full term as governor. And there's a suspicion among some that Clinton really regards the presidency as just one more huge merit badge.

(Clinton: "Sure, I'd like to be president. But only because I want to change the country. I have no interest in winning an election just for an election's sake. And the last thing on my mind is becoming another failed president.")

Even his rivals would have to concede that right now, Clinton is the man to beat for the Democratic nomination. (CBS-11)

IRAQ/NUKES

Rather reports Iraq today gave U.N. inspectors a pile of smashed metal, claiming it is all that's left of a sophisticated system to enrich uranium for nuclear weapons. But U.N. officials say they're skeptical that Iraq has destroyed its nuclear capacity. They believe Saddam Hussein may be, even now, going ahead with production of an actual atomic bomb. (CBS-4)

GULF WAR/RESERVES

NBC's Fred Francis reports on the combat readiness of the reserve units in Desert Storm. The quiet scandal of the war is that combat guardsmen, who were supposed to drive tanks and big guns against Iraq, didn't measure up. Fifteen thousand national guardsmen were found lacking, despite the billions of tax dollars lavished on the guard in a decade of defense spending. The three combat brigades which had received passing grades from the active army were to be ready within 60 days of being called to duty. But a sensitive army report obtained by NBC News revealed that they would have needed up to five months to be ready to fight in the Gulf. Once the training began, the guardsmen couldn't even fix their own tanks. As the war approached and the guards' shortcomings became public, the army brass convinced the guards' political supporters that it was time to own up to the failure. A rebuilding is now underway. The overall fix will take up to three years. (NBC-7)

MIDEAST PEACE TALKS

Jennings reports a bus carrying Jewish settlers in the West Bank was ambushed. Seven people were injured, including a six-year-old, who was shot in the stomach. The attack did not stop the peace talks from continuing in Washington -- at a snail's pace, as always.

ABC's John McWethy reports on the talks. The right wing in Israel called for Prime Minister Shamir to end the talks and bring the negotiators home. And in Washington, there was a day-long verbal battle between the Palestinians and the Israelis.

(Elyakim Rubinstein, chief Israeli delegate: "We should also not tolerate neither the terrorism itself nor the doubletalk of some people supposing peace on one side and encouraging terrorism on the other.")

(Hanan Ashrawi, Palestinian spokeswoman: "If we're going to use the same tactics, then we accuse Israelis of doubletalk every day all the time, because every day you have Palestinians killed, every day you have houses demolished, every day Israelis are doing activities that go against the whole peace process.")

Despite the bitter public words, the two sides keep coming back to talk to each other in private. No one has walked out. For people who for years have hated each other, it's about as good a beginning as can be expected. (ABC-7, CBS-5)

RUSSIAN ECONOMY

CBS's Anthony Mason reports on a backlash against Boris Yeltsin's economic reforms, even within Yeltsin's own White House. The Russian Parliamentary speaker, who stood by him during the coup, called the economic plan a disaster yesterday, and demanded the Cabinet's resignation.

(Andrei Fyodorov, vice presidential adviser: "With this liberalization of the process, we brought more tension to the society than before.")

Yeltsin, some say, is getting incompetent advice from a team of little boys in pink ties -- among them, Harvard's Jeffrey Sachs.

(Sachs: "It's no surprise that there's tremendous confusion, anxiety, the criticism, the opposition, demagoguery, populism, and worse. And this is to be expected. This is a very deep crisis.") Even the faithful are having their doubts, and communist supporters are trying to rally the disenchanted. (CBS-6)

Jennings reports Boris Yeltsin asked for patience to give his economic reforms a chance. Yeltsin said the government is not an old pair of socks you throw out. Come to think of it, he said, these days you don't throw out old socks anyway.

ABC's Jim Hickey reports on state-owned Russian factories trying to turn themselves into private companies. Most have the will, but lack the know-how. (ABC-9)

YUGOSLAVIA

Jennings reports a small group of U.N. peacekeeping troops arrived in Yugoslavia today. If the ceasefire truce holds, another 10,000 U.N. troops will be deployed. (ABC-8)

SILICONE IMPLANTS

Jennings reports the leading maker of silicone breast implants in the U.S., Dow Corning, is shutting down its production lines in two factories until safety questions are resolved. (ABC-11, CBS-7)

WELFARE REFORM

NBC's Stan Bernard reports on proposals to deny additional welfare benefits to mothers who have more children while on welfare. New Jersey is the latest such state to offer such proposals. A black New Jersey legislator with a high number of welfare recipients in his constituency steered the legislation through, saying the dependency on welfare must be reversed.

(Wayne Bryant, New Jersey state assemblyman: "Where you work, where I work, no place in America when you decide to enlarge your family they automatically give you a raise. Why do it to poor folks?")

But the New Jersey ACLU says while some of the legislation is good, one bill will be too painful on children.

(Deborah Ellis, ACLU: "We're very concerned about the provision that would cut off benefits if the mother has an additional child. We believe that's unconstitutional because it would force poor women into the choice of feeding their children or having an abortion.")

Some politicians are finding welfare reform to be a powerful tool. Last year, 17 states and D.C. made significant reductions in programs for the poor. Gov. Wilson in California has proposed to cut welfare grants by as much as 25 percent. But social welfare and church organizations are going to fight such cutbacks in the courts. (NBC-2)

CABLETRON

After addressing employees in the company cafeteria, Bush went across the street to Cabletron's corporate headquarters to shake hands with white-collar workers.

Asked how he was feeling, Bush said, "I'm just warming up." He said, "It's been a good day" and said, "I'm getting a little tired being a punching bag" for liberal Democrats.

The President refused to respond to a question about a possible extension of unemployment benefits -- "If a frog had wings, he wouldn't hit his tail on the ground -- too hypothetical."

Asked about Buchanan's challenge to take the no new taxes pledge, Bush said he was only interested in taking a pledge that more Republicans should be in Congress.

Bush was asked if he felt he had to offer an apology to New Hampshire voters for the state of the economy. He responded that he was willing to take a share of the blame, but wanted part of the credit for the successes in the country.

The corporate headquarters was filled with nearly six foot high office partitions that made it next to impossible for photographers to get any decent shots of Bush visiting with employees. Bush walked from cubicle to cubicle saying hello to Cabletron sales representatives, at one point interrupting one sales reps call grabbing the telephone receiver and asking the customer in New Jersey how everything was going. Stopping at another cubicle, he was told by a sales representative that Motorola was on the other end of the line. Quipped Bush, "Motorola? Tell 'em to give my best to Bob Galvin."

Earlier Bush toured the two sections of Cabletron's plant. At the first stop he shook hands with workers -- mostly women -- assembling computer circuit boards. Then he went to an area where computer hardware was being tested, sat down at a terminal, and took a self-guided tour through a simple program about Cabletron and it's worldwide customers. At each juncture of the program a window at the bottom of the screen read, "Mr. President, please touch the cursor bar to continue." He had no apparent problem with the cursor. He wore a Cabletron baseball-style cap while at the computer. Company co-founders, Craig Benson and Bob Levine, wearing identical suits, shirts and ties, conducted the tour. At one point Bush stopped to sign autographs for workers; at another stopped briefly in front of an "emergency eyewash" stand and pretended to reach for the lever.

All travel uneventful.

After the meeting ended, the President remained behind for quite a while pressing the flesh. He had lengthy exchanges with a number of people in the crowd, most of which were inaudible to your pool. William E. Pillsbury, Jr., director of the New Hampshire Office of Business and Industrial Development, said he told the President the State has "a lot of good businesses" that need capital. He said Bush told him he hoped research and development tax credits would help. Bush ignored shouted questions from your pool about whether he intends to sign the Buchanan no-new-taxes pledge. "Give me a Republican Congress and we'll reduce taxes," Bush said.

For those interested, the names and correct spellings of the first three speakers at the hangar meeting are: Doug Pearson, Debra Giles, and Dan Ayer.

On the way to Exeter, the President made one "unscheduled" stop pulling off on the side of Route 101 across from the Meadowview Plaza. There Bush chatted with farmers, Doug and Stella Scamman and their grown up-looking son, Bruce. Bruce held a brown Swiss cow named "Holiday" whose nose the President petted from time to time as he chatted. Though the stop looked impromptu, Mrs. Scamman told reporters they had known for some time that the President would call. Not so coincidentally, her husband is a former speaker of the New Hampshire House. According to one Bush supporter travelling with the press, Scamman supported Senator Robert Dole in the 1988 primaries. Scamman told Bush to hold the line on government spending and the President enthusiastically agreed. "A balanced budget, I'm for it," Bush said, "But you can't do it in a year."

After the Exeter Town Hall meeting, Bush shook hands with every member of the crowd. They filed one by one in front of the President and some spent a fair amount of time talking to him. According to White House Political Director, Ron Kaufman, Bush campaign officials tried to get undecided Republicans to the meeting. Post-meeting interviews seemed to bear him out. Dennis Crisp, a 33 year old, self-employed construction worker from Epping, New Hampshire said he shared some of his worries with the President. "I just let him know I don't think the economy is going to come around in time for me," Crisp said.

Crisp added that he is "actually worse off" than he was four years ago when he voted for Bush. "Four years ago, I had a home that was secure. Now, my home could be taken." Crisp, a registered Republican, said he's not sure how he'll vote this year. "It's open. I want the person who's going to bring the economy around." Crisp said he heard "nothing concrete," today from the President, adding: "That's what I was hoping to hear."

Another meeting participant, florist Chris Wuethrich, said that while he thinks Bush is "a good president," he's not sure he'll vote for him. Wuethrich, of Brentwood, New Hampshire, said he's "concerned" about the economy. "I've never voted Democrat in my life," he said. "I'm listening to Buchanan and I'm listening to Clinton." He said he has not ruled out voting for the President. "I think the State of the Union is going to be key," he said, "if he comes up with something new and dramatic. Right now I think it's the same old rhetoric."

Bush made no stops enroute to the Davidson plant, where he got a warm welcome in the employee cafeteria. The President eschewed a good-looking roast beef, opting instead for "a little chili," skim milk, corn bread, strawberry shortcake, and, at the last minute, two slices of pepperoni pizza. Let's hope this does not bode a jogging trip later this afternoon.

Bush lunched at a long table with the following factory workers: Lucille Ebersole, Janet Sewell, Jim Burney, Kevin Lucey, Jerry Fanstarmakar, Patricia Landry, Joseph Briggs, and Diane Laurent.

After the lunch -- which was piped into the press room, you should have quotes. -- Bush toured parts of the assembly line. He belled up to a table where workers were making armrests for Dodge Caravans and Plymouth Voyagers, chatted for a few minutes and autographed several armrests. He also observed workers injecting foam into the armrests. Several employees of the plant told your pool that all was not necessarily well there either. A number of temporary workers recently have been let go, and some of the permanent employees were placed on two week furlough -- meaning they collected unemployment benefits -- around Christmastime.

George armored for N.H.

Prez stump a steep hill

MANCHESTER, N.H. — On the eve of President Bush's first campaign trip to New Hampshire, his Democratic and Republican rivals softened the ground here yesterday with barrages of Bush-bashing — not that the voters needed any encouragement to join in.

"I was laid off last August, and the month I'm laid off, the President is up at his vacation home in Kennebunkport saying there's no problem," said Raymond Faulkner, 45, during a support-group meeting for the unemployed in Portsmouth.

"Now he says there's a problem. I think he's a day late and a dollar short."

When Bush arrives today, he'll return to the state that gave him his first big victory four years ago. Now its economy is a disaster zone, a field of candidates — including GOP challenger Pat Buchanan — is ridiculing his policies, and many voters are expressing open anger.

White House concession

Although Bush's plan for a half-dozen stops in the state's southern seacoast region was orchestrated to put him in front of mostly sympathetic audiences, White House and campaign officials conceded a high degree of voter frustration across party lines.

"We have six Democrats beating us up every day and one Republican. That's seven people running around the state saying bad things about the administration," said White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater. "So that's a very tough hill to climb."

On the Democratic front here, former Massachusetts Sen. Paul Tsongas and Nebraska Sen. Bob Kerrey hit hard on economic issues as they campaigned here for the Feb. 18 primary.

Recent polls show Tsongas — considered an early favorite here because he is from neighboring Lowell, Mass. — neck-and-neck with Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton. Kerrey has run behind with Iowa Sen. Tom Harkin and former California Gov. Jerry Brown.

Tsongas was well-received as he spoke to the Portsmouth unemployed support group. He spelled out proposals to spur business investment through tax cuts, called Bush's recent trip to Japan "embarrassing," and criticized the idea of a middle-class tax cut, a proposal endorsed by several of the Democratic candidates.

"That's steroid," Tsongas said. "You pump people up artificially and then you pay the price."

Kerrey, touring a computer firm in Manchester, found a group of workers guardedly interested in his campaign but indisputably opposed to Bush.

"Look what's happened to this state. How are you consciously going to vote for him?" asked Paula Senneville, a worker at Itran Corp. who voted for Bush in 1988 but now says she'll vote for someone else.

Babs, maybe?

From the Republican side, Buchanan signed a pledge against raising taxes and challenged Bush to do the same, saying, "Maybe we can get the First Lady, Barbara, to co-sign it and make sure this time it sticks."

One recent poll said Bush was the choice of just 46% of likely Republican voters in New Hampshire; Buchanan got 30%.

Bush challenged to renew no-tax vow

CONCORD, N.H. — Pat Buchanan, aided by mother nature and a large cardboard placard, attempted to set the scene yesterday for President Bush's first campaign visit in four years to economically devastated New Hampshire.

Under a driving rain, Mr. Buchanan stood on the state Capitol steps in the presence of about 20 reporters to challenge the president to "re-sign" the no-new-taxes pledge that he endorsed in the primary campaign in 1988.

"Let him sign it. I have," Mr. Buchanan said, pointing to his name, next to which was a blank line reserved for the signature of Mr. Bush, who will begin his stumping of the Granite State today.

Meantime, Buchanan aides only half-jokingly took credit for the unseasonably warm weather the state has been enjoying since Mr. Buchanan began stumping it virtually non-stop.

The conservative columnist jolted Mr. Bush by entering the Republican presidential primary 14 days before Christmas and has been crisscrossing the state in relatively pleasant weather to rally disaffected GOP voters.

But the temperature, in the 40s and 50s yesterday, is expected to plunge in cold welcome for Mr. Bush.

Mr. Buchanan stopped short of declaring Mother Nature to be a conservative Republican, but his aides delighted in suggesting that a higher power might be trying to tell Mr. Bush something.

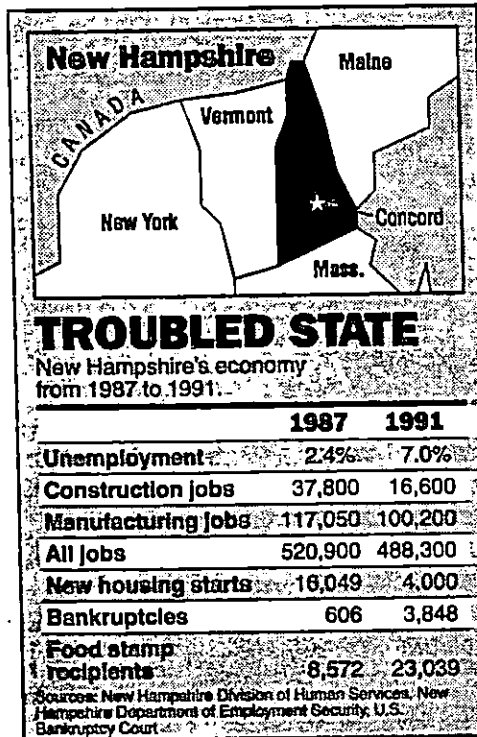
The president, nonetheless, is expected to get a courteous welcome even though many New Hampshireites blame his policies and inaction during the recession for their considerable economic woes.

For one thing, jokes among citizens, including loyal Republicans, have begun to wane since Mr. Bush visited Tokyo and vomited on the prime minister in order, as one Buchanan aide quipped, "to make Japan safe for General Motors."

Nevertheless, Mr. Bush has fallen 10 points in polls here. Mr. Buchanan, though still trailing, has boosted himself to 30 percent of likely Republican voters. As a result, Bush forces take Mr. Buchanan seriously.

After two days of intensive strategy sessions over how to handle the president's visit, Mr. Buchanan and his aides decided not to ambush Mr. Bush but let him have his day and his say in New Hampshire.

Mr. Buchanan rejected suggestions that he confront the president directly and demand

that he co-sign the no-tax pledge.

He also rejected the suggestion that he take the pledge to a White House press aide traveling with Mr. Bush and ask that it be delivered to the president.

Instead, Mr. Buchanan appeared ready to rely on the press to carry his challenge, which puts Mr. Bush in a box.

If the president signs the placard, he enhances Mr. Buchanan's stature as a challenger and at the same time calls attention to the fact that he reneged on his 1988 no-new taxes pledge.

If Mr. Bush doesn't sign the pledge, he risks putting himself in the position of Sen. Bob Dole in the 1988 election when he alone of six Republicans seeking the nomination refused to sign.

Although Mr. Dole arrived a winner from the Iowa caucuses, the Kansas Republican lost here to Mr. Bush in part because the senator appeared to thumb his nose at this state's tax sensitivities.

Asked if he would accept Vice President Dan Quayle's signature instead of the president's, Mr. Buchanan said, "If Mr. Bush would deputize Mr. Quayle to sign, I would accept it."

Uneasy Bush team attacks Buchanan

Deep concern over Pat Buchanan's challenge in the New Hampshire primary sparked an unusual White House attack on him yesterday as the Bush-Quayle re-election team mapped out an expanding anti-Buchanan campaign.

In a preview of President Bush's campaign tour today in New Hampshire, White House officials singled out Mr. Buchanan for criticism. They said the conservative columnist has forced Bush-Quayle strategists to focus on the GOP primary campaign — not just the general

election.

"We take everybody's efforts seriously," said Marlin Fitzwater, White House press secretary.

He said that in New Hampshire the Democratic candidates and Mr. Buchanan have been "beating us up every day ... running around the state saying bad things about the administration, so that's a very tough hill to climb."

Denouncing Mr. Buchanan's popular calls to cut foreign aid and expand trade barriers, Mr. Fitzwater

said: "Mr. Buchanan stands for isolationism and protectionism. He preaches that philosophy. We think that is wrong, and that it is not helpful to the nation or to New Hampshire in terms of economic recovery."

A senior Bush administration official added: "New Hampshire counts now because of Buchanan. It gives us a chance to get things going."

On the eve of Mr. Bush's visit, Mr. Buchanan renewed criticism of the president's flip-flop on his "no new taxes" promise. Campaigning in Concord, N.H., Mr. Buchanan signed his own pledge against higher taxes and called on Mr. Bush to do the same, adding "maybe we can get the first lady, Barbara, to co-sign it and make sure this time it sticks."

Administration officials said the president will not take the pledge.

Vice President Dan Quayle, during a two-day campaign swing through New Hampshire last week, credited Mr. Buchanan with getting the Bush-Quayle effort going sooner than planned.

But this week, in the wake of polls showing Mr. Buchanan gaining on the president, a panic swept through the White House. Campaign officials, still settling into their new 15th Street NW offices, scrambled to drum up an anti-Buchanan effort.

Campaign officials said yesterday Mr. Bush is considering running anti-Buchanan ads in New Hampshire. According to Advertising Age, it would be only the second time in

modern political history an incumbent president seeking re-election ran primary TV ads. Jimmy Carter was the first to do so.

Senior aides also said Mr. Bush plans to take advantage of his perch in the White House to wow voters. Yesterday, for example, Mr. Bush met with former Los Angeles Lakers star Earvin "Magic" Johnson, who attended his first meeting of the Presidential Commission on AIDS.

Mr. Bush also lobbied health officials on his national health policy to be unveiled in the Jan. 28 State of the Union address and made a speech to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce in which he railed against a Democratic education plan he said would undermine his efforts.

In New Hampshire today Mr. Bush is expected to take shots at Mr. Buchanan's protectionist policies by saying that cutting international trade will jeopardize the 35,000 New Hampshire jobs tied to exports.

Mr. Bush also is expected to promise that his growth plan — also to be outlined during the State of the Union speech — will clear the way for economic expansion in the recession-riddled Granite State.

"He'll talk about the objectives of the economic growth plan that he expects to have in the State of the Union message, talk about the need for investment and jobs, discuss the role of exports and trade in creating long-term economic growth," said Mr. Fitzwater.

"The central message is that we are taking action to turn the economy around," he added, pointing to the developing growth package and the Federal Reserve's moves to cut interest rates.

Mr. Bush will fly his jumbo Air

Force One into Pease Air Force Base, which is slated for closure under the bipartisan base-closing plan. After promising to make the base closure easier, he will travel to Exeter for a town meeting and speech and then make stops at three local firms before addressing the Portsmouth Rotary Club.

Bush administration officials said Mr. Bush will meet with New Hampshire Republicans, focusing on those who are undecided.

Some critics have hit Mr. Bush and Mr. Quayle for visiting only successful industries during their campaign tours of New Hampshire, where unemployment has tripled since 1988.

"We would like the president of the United States to meet with the thousands of unemployed workers and dislocated workers in New Hampshire," said state AFL-CIO President Mark Mackenzie.

Democrats, meanwhile, distributed a report card yesterday on the administration that was designed to fire up Democrats in New Hampshire.

"Mr. Bush cannot wipe away three years of presidential neglect with an election-year speech filled with phony promises," said Democratic National Chairman Ron Brown.

Bush supporters in New Hampshire, however, shrugged off charges that the president — who still has not officially announced his candidacy for re-election — is not interested in anything in New Hampshire except beating Mr. Buchanan.

"He's coming up here to listen, to hear New Hampshire people's concerns," said Republican Gov. Judd Gregg, an ardent Bush supporter.

The stomach thing: Bush's chance to really share the pain

Historians will analyze for years to come the causes and effects of the president's recent intestinal flu, or what President Bush has begun to call "the stomach thing." Some have blamed fatigue, others jet lag, and a few have even posited that Bush intentionally fell ill to win sympathy from the Japanese, a kind of Bush-bugged-himself scenario that, if true, failed.

Americans considering protectionism, free trade and sushi watched the president keel over on the dais and shouted, "Lose the sea urchin, George." They were unaware that the Japanese had feted the president with the sort of country-club cuisine that reached its zenith during the administration of

Gerald Ford: to wit, cold salmon, clear soup and the ubiquitous medallions of beef—a dinner as much like a traditional Japanese banquet as cars made in Detroit are like what American consumers want to buy.

In fact, certain reports over the last several days suggest that the president's illness originated with a 3-year-old with a runny nose named Samantha in Bethesda, Md.

Samantha contracted the stomach flu in early December, a case made notable mainly by the fact that she only made it as far as the toy box when disaster struck, the unfortunate triumph of necessity over locale that may have prefigured the Bush incident at the banquet. Samantha then gave the flu to her brother Jonathan, and he to their mother, a Democratic lobbyist for various liberal organizations.

Jonathan gave it to his friend Alexander, whose father, a middle-level official in the Commerce Department, frequently used the Stairmaster at the gym just after the squash partner of one of the Secret Service agents assigned to the Japanese trip. All were later stricken, but not before the agent had stood next to the president with one of those little things in his ear, looking silly.

This is what is called the trickle-up effect, and is not unlike the song about the knee bone being connected to the thigh bone or those endless begat sections of the Bible. The scenario seems plausible since this is the way the stomach flu has traveled through most of America in the last six weeks.

In fact, when they first saw the film of the president pitching over and heard of his symptoms, roughly a million people, Republicans and Democrats alike, struck themselves in the forehead and yelled, "That was the thing that I got from Phil just before the holidays!"

Bush's bout with the flu recalled his handling of the recession. He got it after everyone else did and

When Bush suggested that he had only grossed out the dais and scared the bejesus out of his wife to get attention, Samantha's mother, for example, who had spent an entire week doing laundry after her children got the flu, found herself out of sympathy with him, a feeling that only grew when she was questioned by the FBI and asked for the names of those in Samantha's preschool class and Gymboree group.

It is too late to tell whether the flu outbreak affected the outcome of the trip to Japan, or if it would have been just as big a bust if Bush had cleaned up his medallions and moved on to the passion-fruit dessert and a splash of decaf. The illness did provide some public moments in New Hampshire for Vice President Dan Quayle, currently riding the crest of an amended American standard for high officials that, taken from the Latin, translates roughly as "Not half as bad as we originally thought."

What remains unclear is whether the president will use the stomach thing to boost his re-election chances by presenting it as an indelible link between himself and ordinary Americans, not unlike that magic moment when he discovered he was out of socks—"Barbara, how in blazes do you always manage to let the dryer eat just one of each pair?!"—and hightailed it over to J.C. Penney.

"I shared your pain," he could tell the nation. "Not to mention a few other piggy things I think we'd all prefer to forget."

A moment of disaster could become a defining moment, not only for Bush, but for the future course of American politics, in which we accept our national leaders as human beings.

A president as sick as the rest of us: It resonates.

GLENN BRENNER DIES

WASHINGTON, Reuter - Glenn Brenner, a popular Washington television sports broadcaster and one-time professional baseball pitcher, died Tuesday of a malignant brain tumor. He was 44.

WUSA-TV president and general manager Hank Yaggi said Brenner died at 7:58 a.m. at George Washington University Hospital, where he had undergone surgery Saturday.

Tests Friday had discovered the previously undetected tumor and the operation determined it was inoperable.

In a statement President Bush said he and First Lady Barbara Bush were "greatly saddened by the untimely death of Glenn Brenner, a man whose wit and ability has endeared him to so many

Washingtonians."

"The suddenness of his death, and the warmth of his personality, leave all of us with a painful emptiness," Bush said.

Brenner, sports director of the station since February 1977, had collapsed after completing the Marine Corps Marathon here Nov. 3.

His wife, Suzi, was with him when he died. The Brenners had three children.

Brenner had been a professional baseball pitcher for six years with the New York Mets and Philadelphia Phillies farm systems before a sore arm ended his career in 1972. He then went into broadcasting.
