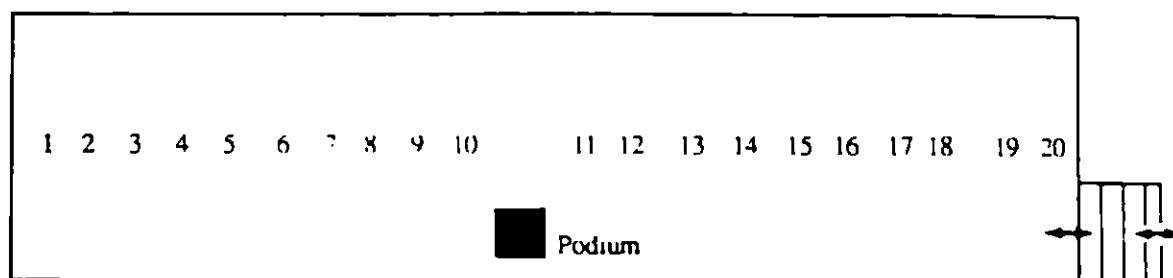

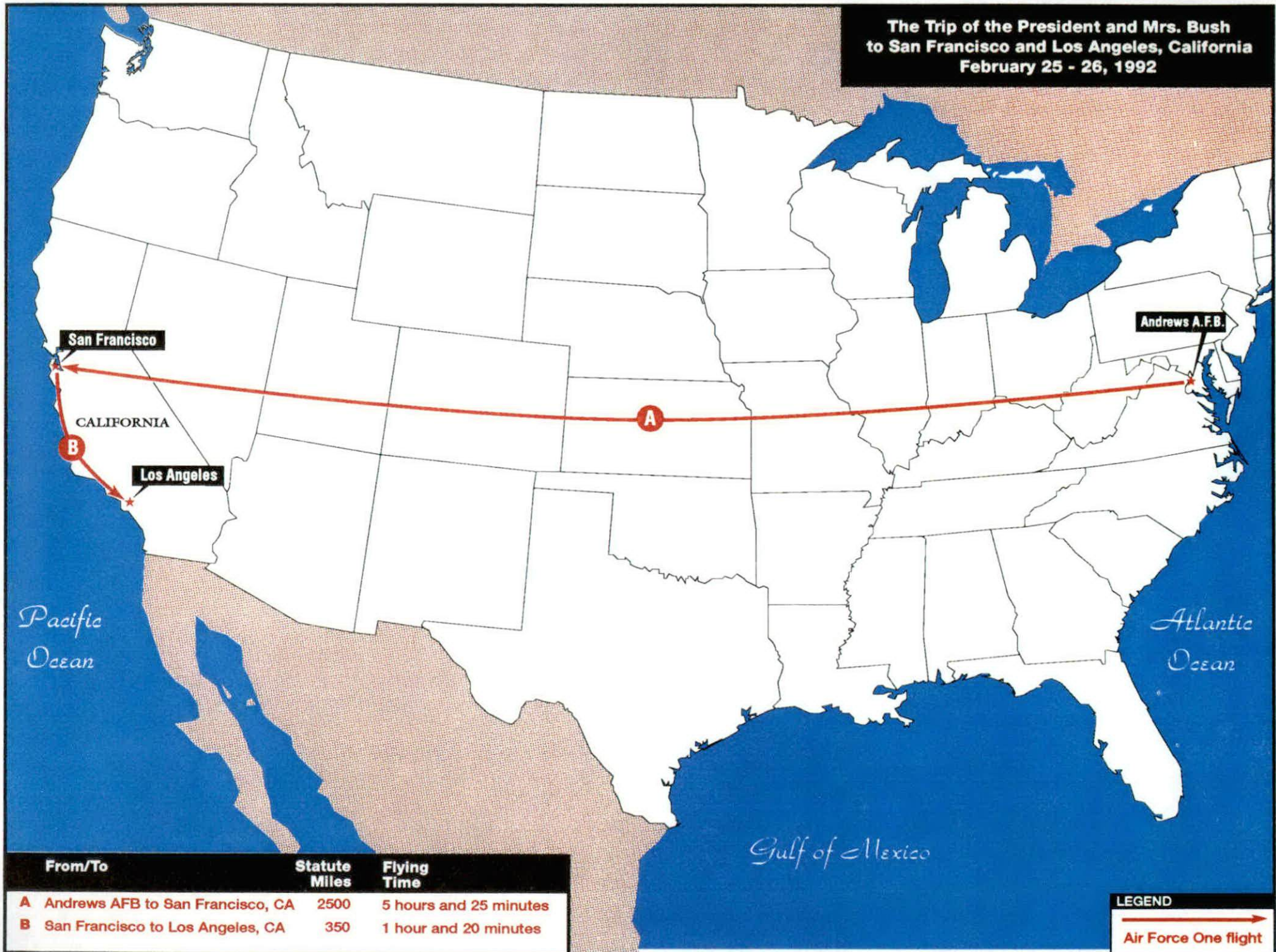

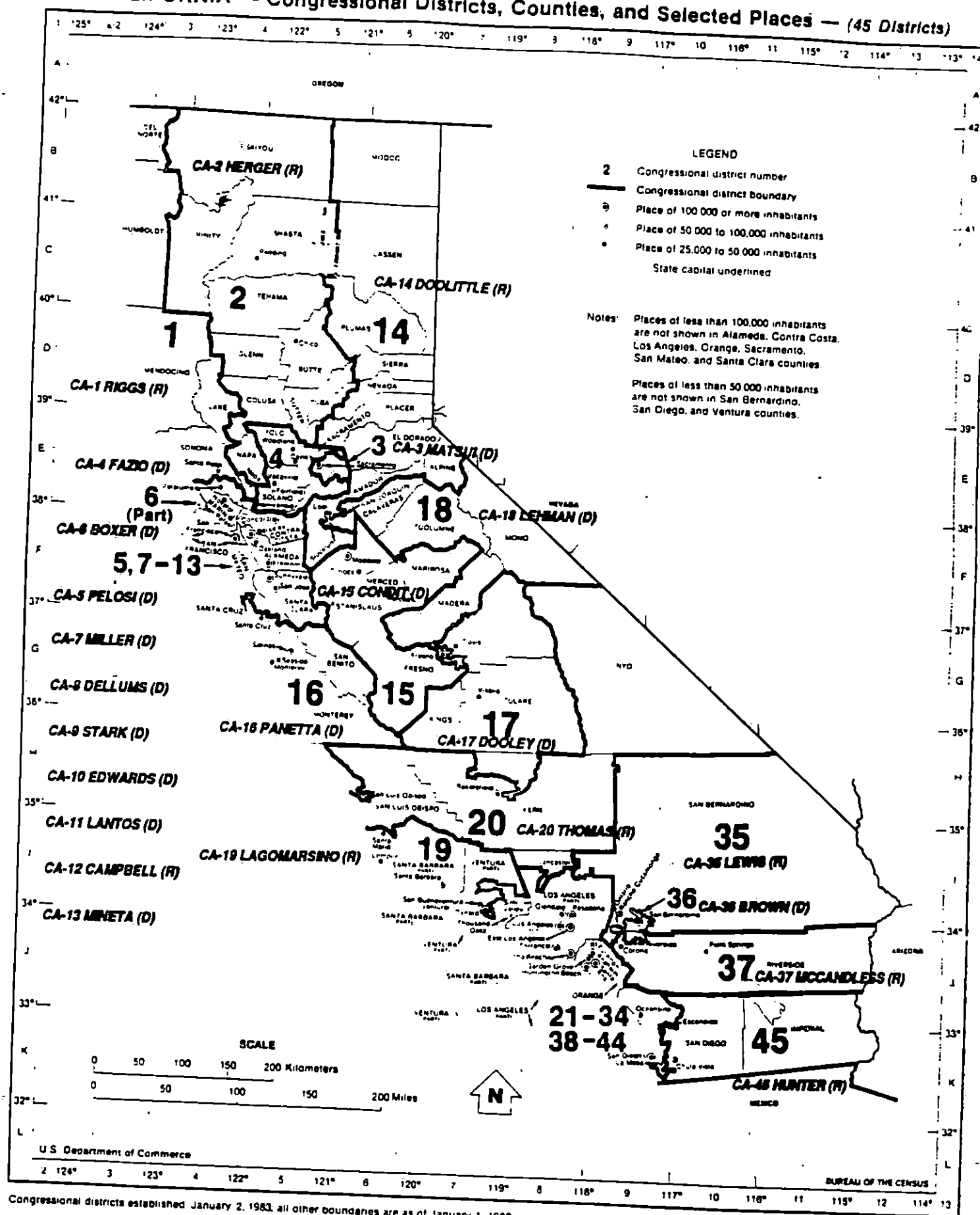

I. PURPOSE

To raise funds in support of the Bush-Quayle '92 primary campaign.

II. BACKGROUND

This fundraising effort combined with efforts in 20 additional states will provide the contributions needed to meet Federal Election Commission matching funds requirements.

The individuals participating in the fundraising lunch have each contributed \$1,000 to the Bush-Quayle '92 Primary campaign. The event is expected to raise approximately \$700,000.

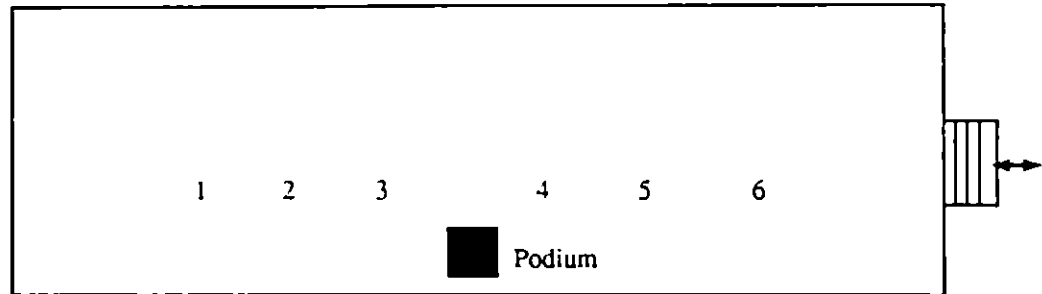

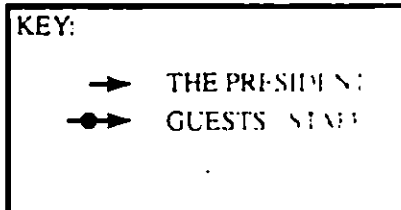

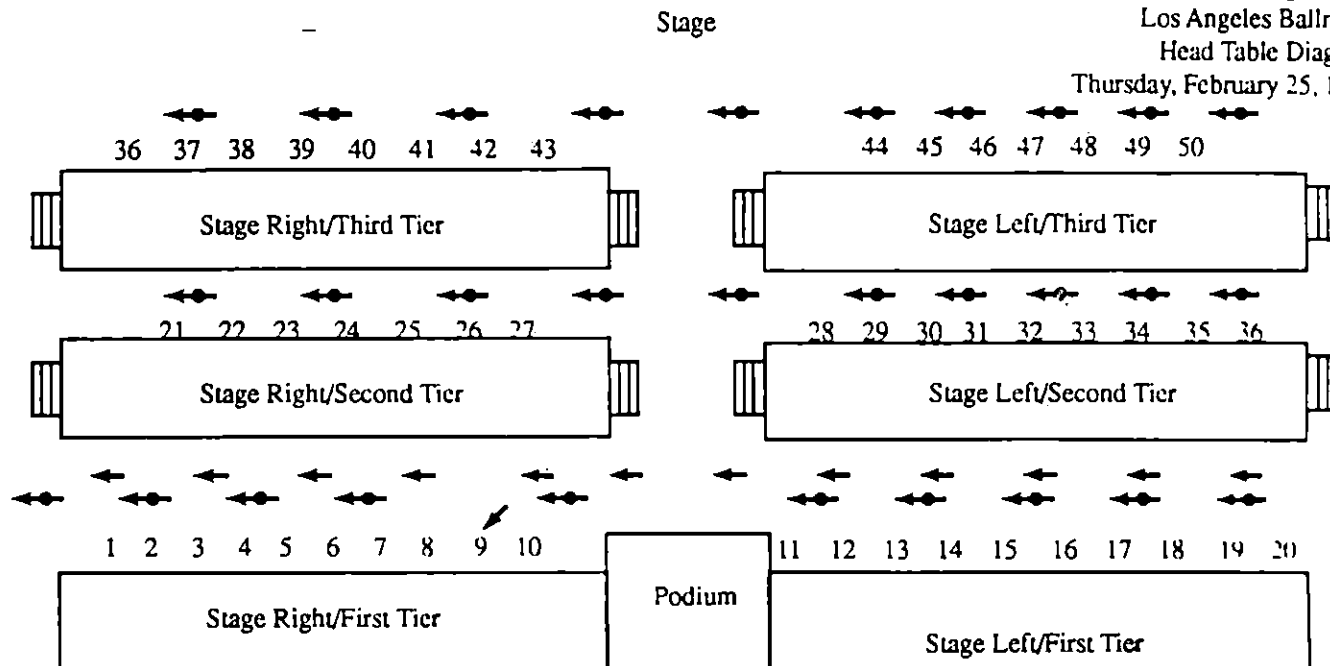

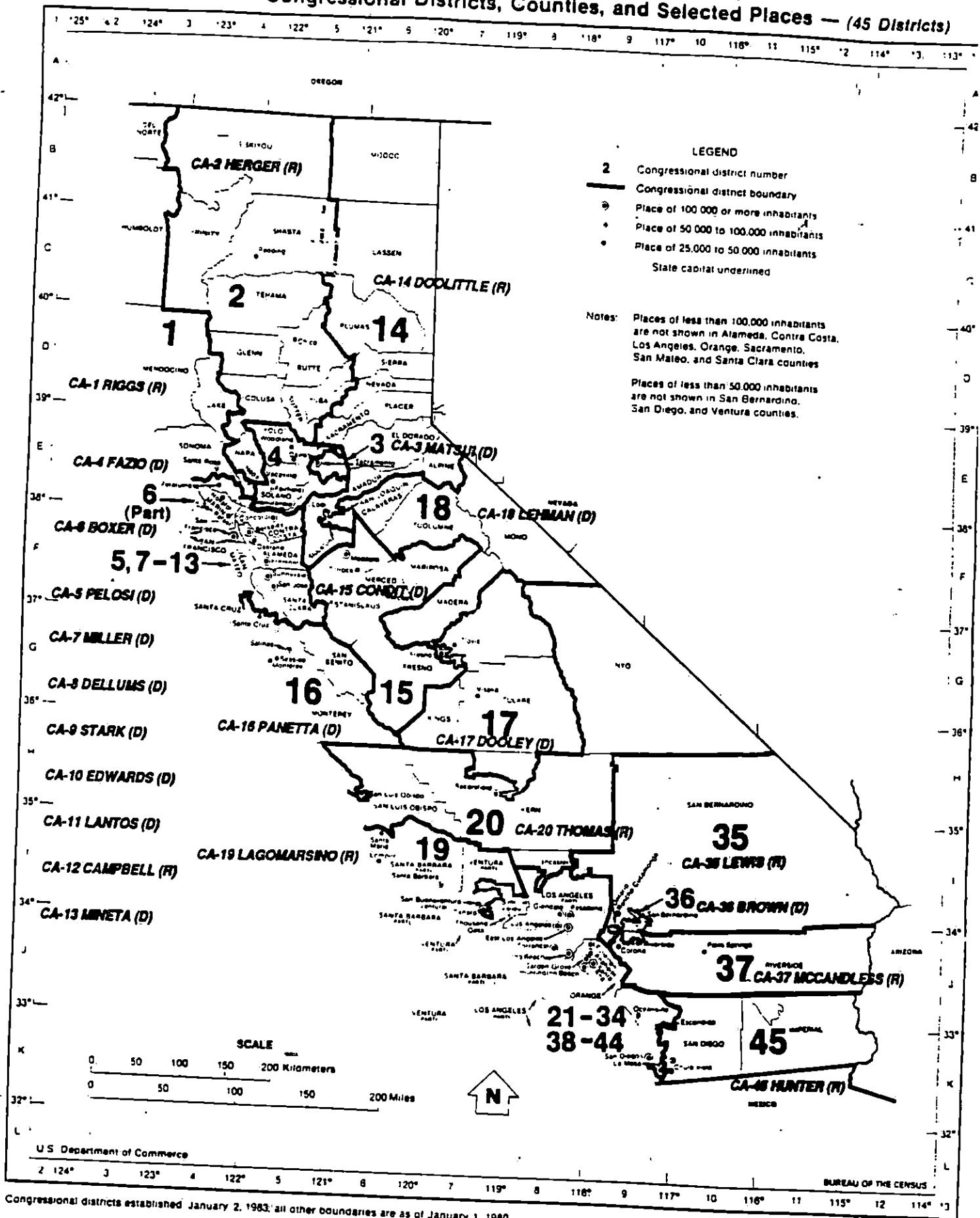

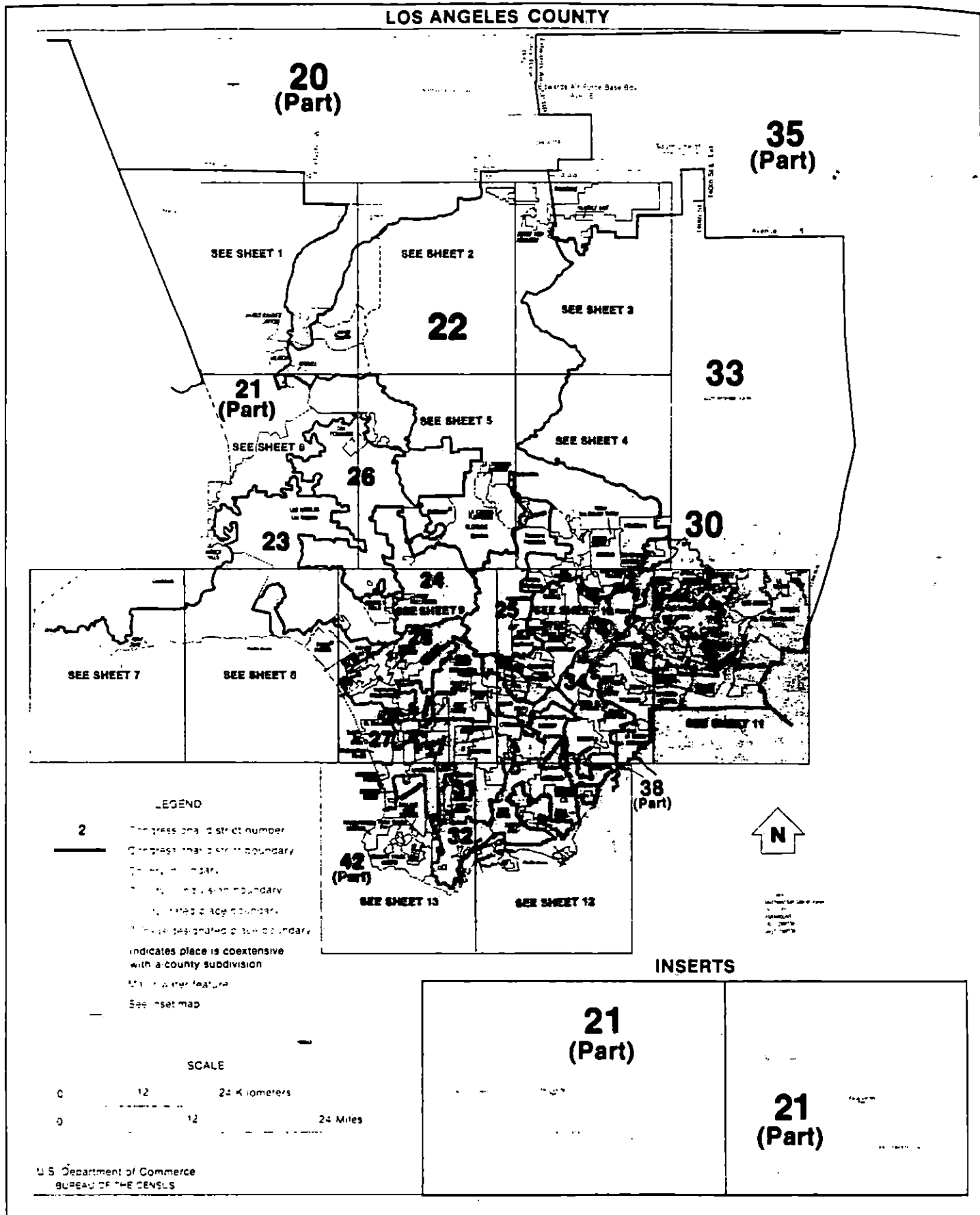
Congressional Districts, Counties, and Selected Places — (45 Districts)

I. Summary

During your visit to California, you will attend a Bush-Quayle 92 fundraising luncheon in San Francisco. In Los Angeles, you will also participate in the U.S./Mexico Environmental Border Plan Agreement Exchange and attend a Bush-Quayle 92 fundraising reception and dinner.

II. Recent Correspondence

Governor Wilson wrote urging you to prevent NASA from transferring all shuttle modification and overhaul work from Palmdale, California to the Kennedy Space Center. Wilson also forwarded his comments on proposed revisions to the Federal Wetlands Delineation Manual and other Administration wetlands conservation policies.

Mayor Sal Sapien, Stanton, wrote requesting your assistance in securing United States borders, especially in Southern California.

Councilman Douglas Drummond, Long Beach, wrote expressing concern that your proposals to stimulate housing sales and home ownership are being thwarted by subordinate levels of your Administration.

Councilman Nate Holden, Los Angeles, wrote urging your commitment to reinvest American money in America and not help export jobs to Japan. Holden also wrote requesting your approval of a new hearing for Jonathan Pollard.

Councilwoman Esther Caldwell, Paramount, wrote to encourage you to support the removal of the earnings test as part of the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act.

Councilman Anthony Santos, San Leandro, wrote urging you to propose aid to American cities in the same amount as proposed for Russia.

Colusa County Supervisor W.D. Mills wrote requesting your intervention with the National Marine Fisheries Service in their quest to protect the winter run chinook salmon in the Sacramento River at the expense of those who use the river water.

Doug Vagim, Chairman of the Fresno County Board of Supervisors, wrote urging you to reconsider your budget proposals regarding the Refugee Cash and Medical Assistance Program.

Bill Cole, Chairman of the Imperial County Board of Supervisors, wrote urging you to reconsider Secretary Madigan's decision not to designate Imperial and Riverside Counties as Agricultural Disaster Areas due to the whitefly infestation.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors forwarded a proclamation ratifying and confirming the existence of a local emergency as a result of severe rainstorms and asking you to declare Los Angeles County a Federal Disaster Area. The Board also forwarded motions calling for an increase in U.S. Border Patrol Agents and a motion which supports the efforts of several members of Congress to release the files regarding the assassination of President Kennedy.

Santa Cruz Supervisor Gary Patton wrote asking for your support for specific efforts to reduce toxic chemical threats through amendments to the Clean Water Act and the Resources Conservation and Recovery Act.

III. Discussion

A. Governor Wilson - State of the State Address

Governor Wilson delivered his State of the State Address on January 8, 1992. In his address, Wilson set forth his agenda for action in the following areas:

- o Budgetary Reform: Proposed an initiative called the "Taxpayer Protection Act" for the November, 1992 ballot. This proposal would enact major reforms in California's welfare system and Legislative budget process.
- o Education: Requested full funding of Proposition 98, a law enacted in 1988 that requires 42 percent of all state government funding be dedicated to education, with a provision that it can be suspended in a financial crisis. Advocated merit pay for individual teachers and the parents' right to choose their children's school.
- o Regulatory Relief: Called for eliminating unnecessary regulations which harm business. Wilson also called for an overhaul of California's troubled workers' compensation system.
- o Criminal Justice: Proposed a series of strong new sentencing proposals for criminals.
- o Public Works: Called for the Legislature to expedite \$500 million worth of state construction projects and for replacement and expansion of the State's infrastructure.
- o Children's Health: Proposed a children's health insurance program to promote access to basic health care services for all uninsured California pre-schoolers.
- o Water Conservation: Supported development of a plan to manage the use of California's water supply for the long term, including protection of fisheries and wildlife habitat.

A controversy arose shortly after Wilson's speech when the press reported they were told by his office that specific people mentioned in the Governor's speech were actually composites. Wilson later held a press conference with the three men to dispel rumors that they did not exist.

B. Fiscal

After increasing taxes by \$7 billion and slashing spending by the same amount in the last legislative session, California is anticipating a \$3-\$6 billion deficit for the fiscal year ending on July 1, 1992.

The general consensus among both Democrats and Republicans is that they will need to balance the budget by cutting spending, not by raising taxes again.

Welfare payments are one of the major causes of the spiraling budget deficit. Welfare reform and revamping the Legislative budget process are Governor Wilson's major priorities this year.

C. Disaster Declaration Request

On February 22, 1992, Governor Wilson requested that a Federal Disaster Declaration be declared for the counties of Kern, Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, and Ventura as a result of severe rainstorms, snowstorms, wind, flooding, and mudslides, which occurred between February 10 and 15, 1992.

High velocity water flows and water borne debris caused extensive damage to flood control works in the Los Angeles and Ventura Counties and the storm caused five confirmed deaths and damage to an estimated several hundred residences and commercial properties.

D. Unemployment

California's unemployment level for January, 1992, stood at 8.1 percent, an increase of 1.1 percent from the same period in 1991. In the time period of February 13-20, 1992, California had a 20,781 increase in initial unemployment insurance claims due to layoffs in the electronics industry, agriculture, and manufacturing.

The unemployment rate for the Los Angeles metropolitan area stood at 8.3 percent in December, 1991, an increase of 2.3 percent over the same period in 1990.

E. Drought

With about 60 percent of California's precipitation season completed, the same dry conditions which have dogged California for 5 straight years are persisting for yet another year. Despite the recent storms, precipitation in the watershed above Central Valley Project reservoirs in northern California are below normal. Recent snow sensor recordings are showing mountain snowpack to be below normal. Because of the lack of precipitation and low reservoir storage and

with a forecasted runoff to the Sacramento River Basin of about 6.5 million acre-feet, the Bureau of Reclamation on February 14 made its reduced available supply announcement to its water service contractors.

Projected 1992 deliveries will be about 2.0 million acre-feet compared to deliveries of 3.6 million acre-feet in 1991 and 3.3 million acre-feet in 1977. In a normal year, the Central Valley Project delivers about 7 million acre-feet of water.

F. Governor Wilson's Trade Mission to Mexico

Governor Wilson recently led a delegation of state officials and California business leaders to meet with President Carlos Salinas de Gortari of Mexico to discuss ways in which to promote free trade with the United States.

Wilson's primary aim in meeting with Salinas was to support increased exports from California to Mexico and to work with Salinas to promote U.S. approval of a North American Free Trade Agreement.

In 1990, California's exports to Mexico were valued at over \$4.7 billion. Only Japan imports more California products than Mexico.

G. California 2000

Governor Wilson's office has been very supportive of the AMERICA 2000 strategy and hopes to kick off the state 2000 effort in late spring. The AMERICA 2000 field staff are currently working with Governor Wilson to organize the details of the statewide strategy.

Secretary Alexander traveled to Fresno on February 18 to announce the city's adoption of AMERICA 2000. It is also anticipated that the City of Los Angeles will join the program within the next two months.

H. Sewage Spill

Due to the heavy rains and a series of sewage spills, California Health authorities recently closed nearly 100 miles of Southern California coastline from Los Angeles County to the U.S.-Mexico border. The sewage spills caused high levels of unsafe bacteria.

The spills occurred when flooding from recent heavy rains caused an electrical short that shut down pumps at the Tillman Water Reclamation Plant. Workers rerouted millions of gallons of raw sewage into alternate water treatment lines which were already full, and were finally forced to release more than 23 million gallons of diluted sewage directly into Ballona Creek, which empties into the ocean at Marina del Rey.

TRIP BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This will be your fourteenth trip to California as President. In the 1990 election cycle, you raised approximately 12 million dollars for Governor Pete Wilson's campaign and the California Republican Party. In 1991, you raised \$700,000 for U.S. Senator John Seymour.

On this trip to California you will participate in a Bush-Quayle '92 lunch fundraiser in San Francisco, a Bush-Quayle '92 dinner fundraiser in Los Angeles, and a signing of a U.S. - Mexico environmental agreement. The San Francisco fundraiser is expected to raise \$700,000 and the Los Angeles fundraiser is expected to raise \$1.2 million.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

1992 will be a very crucial and expensive year politically in California. Many political experts predict that 150 million dollars will be raised and spent by the Republican Party on its many campaigns. The Presidential election, U.S. Senator John Seymour's seat, U.S. Senator Alan Cranston's open seat, and 52 Congressional seats will all be up for election in 1992. With the sheer number of State Assembly, State Senate, Congressional and U.S. Senate seats open this year, it is certain that the California primary and general election will be brutal.

With the recent final announcement of the California Supreme Court's redistricting plan, the following should be competitive races for the Republican Party in 1992: 6 to 8 Congressional seats, 6 State Senate seats, and 12 to 14 Assembly races.

U.S. SENATE "A" RACE:

Senator **Cranston** will be retiring in 1992, thus leaving an open, six year seat. Congressman **Tom Campbell** (CA-12, San Mateo), radio and television commentator **Bruce Herschensohn**, and Mayor **Sonny Bono** are the only announced Republicans to date. Congressman **Bob Dornan** announced that he would not run for this seat and endorsed conservative candidate **Bruce Herschensohn**. **Campbell** has the early lead in fundraising. He has raised approximately \$3.1 million.

Bono has the highest name ID, but is the least admired candidate at this time. As indicated in this poll, **Bono** has drawn support away from **Campbell**, which has created a very close contest between **Campbell** and **Herschensohn**. Their 27-27 standoff suggests a fierce battle between the moderate and conservative wings of the California Republican Party. An example of this conservative-moderate battle was **Herschensohn's** recent support of a flat-tax plan that would spur economic growth, put more money in the pockets of average Americans, and rein-in federal spending. **Campbell** attacked **Herschensohn's** flat tax proposal by saying that "this flat tax would take us from recession to depression."

The announced Democrats running for this seat are Congresswoman **Barbara Boxer** (CA-6, San Francisco) and Lieutenant Governor **Leo McCarthy**. Congressman **Mel Levine** (CA-27, Santa Monica), who has \$5 million on hand, is likely to announce soon his intentions to run for this seat.

U.S. SENATE "A" RACE CONTINUED:

The most notable change since the previous Field Poll 9/91 is **Boxer** gaining a modest advance against **McCarthy**. **Boxer's** support has increased by 4 points, while **McCarthy's** dropped by 3 points.

U.S. SENATE "B" RACE:

Senator **John Seymour**, Governor **Wilson's** appointee to serve the remainder of his term, faces a very tough race in 1992. Because the term expires in 1994, this seat will again be up for election that year. Republican Congressman **Bill Dannemeyer** (CA-39, Orange County) and conservative **Bill Allen** have announced they will challenge **Seymour** in the primary election. **Dannemeyer** has pledged to stay in the race for the duration, and is very serious about his challenge because he feels it is his "moral obligation" to represent the pro-life faction of the party.

Former San Francisco Mayor **Dianne Feinstein** and State Controller **Gray Davis** are the announced Democrats challenging **Seymour**. **Seymour** will more than likely win the primary election, but will have a tough race in the general election largely due to his low name identification, switches to oppose off-shore drilling and support pro-choice positions, and lack of a strong message.

U.S. SENATE "B" RACE CONTINUED:

Seymour campaigned statewide on February 11-12 with his campaign theme of "Jobs, Jobs, Jobs" for California.

This will be the first time a state will have a dual U.S. Senate election since 1978, when it occurred in Alabama and Minnesota.

1991 SPECIAL ELECTIONS RESULTS

California held special elections on May 14, 1991 and September 17, 1991.

On September 17, 1991, Republicans held onto both Assemblymen **Tim Leslie** (R-Carmichael) and **John Lewis**' (R-Orange County) seats, who were elected to the State Senate in the May 14 special election. In Assembly District 5, Republican **B.T. Collins** defeated Libertarian **David McCann** and in Assembly District 67, Republican **Micky Conroy** defeated Democrat **Greg Ramsey**. Collins was endorsed by Governor Wilson and the RNC contributed \$70,000 to his race during the primary election at the request of Governor Wilson.

On May 14, 1991, Republicans won three special elections. In Senate District 35 (Orange County), Republican Assemblyman **John Lewis** defeated Democrat **Francis Hoffman**. This seat was vacated by the appointment of John Seymour to the U.S. Senate. In Senate District 1 (Sacramento), Republican Assemblyman **Tim Leslie** defeated Democrat **Patti Mattingly**. The seat was previously held by **John Doolittle** (R), who was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. In Assembly District 26 (Stockton), Republican **Dean Andal** defeated **Patti Garamandi**. Andal will succeed **Patrick Johnston** (D) who resigned after being elected to the State Senate.

1990 ELECTION RESULTS

GOVERNOR:

Perhaps the most important victory for Republicans nationwide in 1990 was the election of **Pete Wilson** as Governor of California. A massive GOTV effort combined with a successful TV advertising campaign assisted Wilson in defeating Democrat San Francisco Mayor **Dianne Feinstein**.

ATTORNEY GENERAL:

An important statewide victory for Republicans was RNC Committeeman and former Congressman **Dan Lungren** defeating Democrat incumbent Attorney General **Arlo Smith**. Although Lungren failed to win a majority of the votes cast on election day, his dominance of absentee ballots secured him the victory in this close race. Lungren's victory is evidence of how effective the absentee ballot program was during this election cycle in California.

U.S. CONGRESS:

Republicans had a net gain of one seat last election cycle in the U.S. Congress. Republican **Frank Riggs** defeated Democrat incumbent Congressman **Doug Bosco** (CA-1, Santa Rosa), and Republican **Randy Cunningham** defeated Democrat incumbent Congressman **Jim Bates** (CA-44, San Diego). Republican incumbent Congressman **Chip Pashayan** (CA-17, Fresno) was defeated by Democrat farmer **Cal Dooly**. This was the only Republican seat lost. Currently, the California Congressional ratio is 19 Republicans and 26 Democrats.

BALLOT INITIATIVES:

Proposition 140, which limits the terms of state legislators and constitutional officers was accepted by California voters in 1990. California State Legislators filed a major lawsuit this past February to do away with this law. The California Supreme Court upheld Proposition 140 in October 1991.

GENERAL POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE

The **BUSH-QUAYLE** ticket carried California by a 51% to 47% margin in the 1988 Presidential election.

Governor **Pete Wilson** will serve as your 1992 Bush-Quayle Chairman for California. Chevron CEO and Team 100 member **Ken Derr** has agreed to be your 1992 Bush-Quayle Finance Chairmen for Northern California. Sunworld CEO and Team 100 member **Howard Marguleas** has been asked to serve as your 1992 Bush-Quayle Chairman for Southern California.

Katie Boyd, Karl Samuelian, Lod Cook, Howard Leach, George Argyros, David Murdock, Don Bren, Margaret Brock, Yong C. Kim, and Alex Spanos all serve in leadership positions for the 1992 National Bush-Quayle Finance Committee.

GENERAL POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE CONTINUED

A recent California statewide poll (1/13-18) conducted by the Field Institute found that 38% of the voters in California were inclined to vote for you, while 51% would be opposed. This survey represents a sharp reversal in your approval ratings from September 1991, when more than half (54%) expressed support for your re-election and 35% expressed opposition. These results are directly related to California's stumbling economy, high unemployment, and the decrease in defense industry jobs.

At the California Republican Party Convention this weekend February 29, California Republican Party Leaders will try to suspend the rules in order to allow the party to endorse you for the nomination before Buchanan has the chance to address the state voters. This move will require a two-thirds majority of the attendees. A strong Buchanan showing is expected at the convention given the outcome of the New Hampshire primary.

California will have 54 electoral votes in 1992, which will be crucial in the Presidential election. Bringing Asians, Hispanics, and conservatives to our support base will be essential, not only for you, but for all Republican candidates in 1992. Also, implementation of an extensive absentee voter ballot program will be critical in the 1992 election cycle.

Democratic registration has slipped to its lowest level (48.9%) in 59 years. The Democrat party predicts that registration will drop to 47% by the end of next year because a Democrat has not occupied the White House or the Governor's mansion in 12 years and the Democrats do not have one overriding message. Republican registration is 39.27%.

The ballot filing deadline is March 6, 1992 and the primary election is June 2, 1992.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

California will gain seven new Congressional seats in 1992. Because Governor Wilson and the California State Legislature did not agree on a redistricting plan, the California Supreme Court became responsible for a fair plan. The Special Masters, a three judge panel (2 Republicans and 1 Democrat) appointed by the State Supreme Court announced their initial redistricting plan on December 2, 1991.

The plan was open to public comment until December 29, 1991. After hearing public testimony, the Supreme Court adopted the Masters Plan in its entirety except for adding a greater percentage of Asian voters in two Los Angeles Assembly districts.

The Supreme Court announced their final plan on January 28, 1992.

Currently, the election process is underway even though the Justice Department has not precleared the State Senate and Assembly plans. The declaration of candidacy deadline was February 10, 1992 and the ballot filing deadline is March 6, 1992.

Overall, the plan overwhelmingly favors Republicans in the State Assembly, State Senate, and U.S. Congressional districts. The plan as analyzed by Governor Wilson's reapportionment specialists is as follows:

There is a strong possibility of an increase of 7-10 Congressional seats and at the very least a 6 seat pick-up. The plan creates numerous minority districts predominately in the Los Angeles area. This plan creates severe incumbent displacement, which will cause some Congressmen to be forced to run against each other.

However, this displacement is far greater for Democrats than for Republicans.

Governor Wilson praised the Special Masters Plan for its fairness for both Republicans and Democrats.

ISSUES

During the past year, California faced a tremendous budget crisis with a \$14 billion deficit. Governor Wilson's \$55 billion budget package passed through the legislature in July and received a great deal of criticism from conservatives for its \$7 billion tax increase. There is still much anti-Wilson sentiment among California Republicans who are upset with the Governor because of the tax increase.

Recently, The California Commission on State Finance estimated a \$3 billion shortfall in the \$55 billion budget passed by the State Legislature in July. This estimate is based on a sharp drop off in tax collections and higher than anticipated expenditures particularly on health and welfare programs serving the poor. The Commission on State Finance expects tax collections to be off by \$2.3 billion over the remainder of the fiscal year, which ends June 30, and predicts that spending would be approximately \$800 million higher than expected due largely to the increases in welfare caseloads and the cost of providing medical care to the poor.

The fire storm that swept through the Oakland/Berkeley Hills on October 20, 1991 was completely controlled on the evening of October 23, 1991. This fire caused extensive damage to the area, with 25 casualties to date. Approximately 2,691 homes were destroyed and the damage is estimated at 1.5 billion dollars. The President's declaration of California as a major disaster area on October 22, 1991 and Governor Wilson's proclamation of a State of Emergency will allow residents to rebuild their homes to a comparable level without a tax reassessment. At this time, 847 people have applied for State and Federal assistance.

The drought continues to be a critical issue in the State as evidenced by the Oakland fire. Coupled with the problems of the drought is the winter freeze of last year. The unusually cold winter in California destroyed much of California's produce. These two problems in California will affect produce prices nationwide.

Governor Wilson vetoed AB101, a bill that protected homosexuals from job discrimination.

Wilson vetoed the bill because he felt that homosexuals under existing law already received the same protections against discrimination as other Californians. Also, he objected to adding more discrimination cases to the workload of the Department of Fair Employment and Housing and said AB101 would create a tangle of litigation that would hurt small businesses. The veto of AB101 resulted in many protests and acts of violence from gay activists statewide. The conservatives were supportive of the Governor's veto.

On December 9, 1991, Governor Pete Wilson announced his statewide ballot initiative, The Taxpayer Protection Act, to dramatically reform autopilot government spending. Governor Wilson believes that his initiative will help control spending on public assistance programs while still allowing the Governor to assure continued spending on education and other important statewide programs. It will also provide flexibility in dealing with the State's fiscal problems.

Recently, Governor Wilson was under fire by the press for referring to allegorical individuals in his State of the State Address. Specifically, the Governor stated he had personally spoken with three individuals who had been suffering from the recession. He told individual and detailed stories of hardship in order to seem more in touch with the problems of the people of California. When the San Jose Mercury News, a local paper, asked for the names of the individuals stated in the speech, the Governor's Press Office staff told the press that the individuals in the speech were allegorical and were just used to represent thousands in the state. The Governor held a press conference with the three individuals he referred to in his speech to correct the miscommunication from his staff to the press.

Governor Wilson and 24 executives of major California companies met with Mexican President Carlos Salinas on various trade issues earlier this month in Mexico. The main purpose of the trip was for the Governor to use his influence to repeal the 10% tariffs now imposed on all American exports to Mexico. Over 200 companies in California have a long history of trade with Mexico. Last year there were over nine billion dollars in California trade with Mexico, up from seven billion in 1989. Governor Wilson expects the tariff to be dropped and trade to skyrocket.

The Governor sees this as a new opportunity for jobs and an incentive for fewer immigrants to cross the border. Also, during the talks the Mexican government allocated \$400 million for clean up along the U.S.- Mexico border.

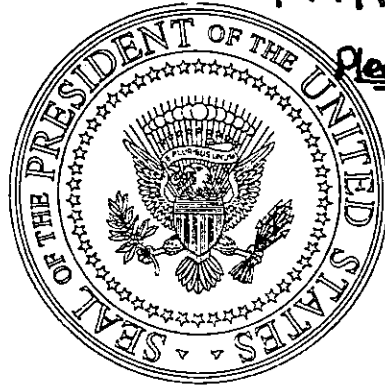

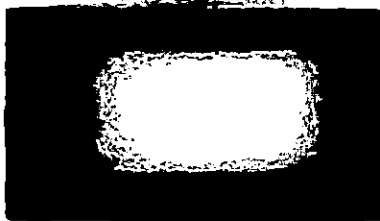
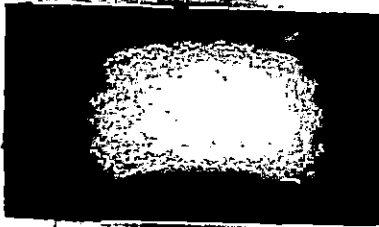

BUSH SUPPORTERS FEAR HE WILL LOSE CALIFORNIA Recession Said To Hurt President Badly

LOS ANGELES -- Key Republican figures in economically depressed California, including Ronald Reagan, say President Bush is in such deep trouble here that he could easily lose this traditionally dependable GOP state in November.... "It's going to be very difficult for Bush to carry California this time," said Stuart Spencer....

Reagan told friends long before the damaging New Hampshire primary that Bush faces reelection difficulties because "he doesn't seem to stand for anything," according to sources close to the former president. The sources also said that Reagan was concerned Bush could lose the state, and with it the general election....

And the President suffers, as sources close to Gov. Pete Wilson put it, "because he is the first Republican candidate for president in a very long time who doesn't really connect to California, either emotionally or by virtue of long residence."...

"Bush faces an extraordinary challenge in California," said former White House speechwriter Ken Khachigian. "He doesn't have any longstanding ties to the state. He doesn't have any advisers with such ties. California is unfamiliar territory to them."

GM's loss, the worst annual loss for an American corporation in history, brought last year's total loss for the Big Three to \$7.7 billion. GM's loss was larger than expected and reflected the impact that a weak economy and cautious consumers were having on the company's sales....

"The choice is Israel's," Baker said, appearing before Congress as Middle East peace talks resumed here and delivering what amounted to a take-it-or-leave-it ultimatum to Prime Minister Shamir's government....

Supporters of Israel in Congress and the U.S. Jewish community acknowledge privately that if the Administration holds its position, there is almost no chance that Israel can continue settlements and still get Congress to authorize the loan guarantees....

Yossi Ben Aharon, Shamir's chief of staff and a leader of the Israeli negotiating team, said that despite Baker's position, the Israeli government refuses to surrender its position that Jews have a right to live in the territories. The Japanese government, she said, believes that the "harmonization" of different nations' policies on industrial competition "should be discussed" in international settings such as the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

A ministry official, speaking to reporters, said, "We don't accept this idea of extraterritoriality. But at the same time, we believe that strengthening anti-monopoly enforcement is all right. We might be able to join hands with the U.S. antitrust authorities to work on antitrust enforcement. That's a much better way to go, I think." (Paul Blustein, Washington Post, D1)

ENVOY SAYS U.S. HAS PLENTY OF SUCCESSES IN JAPAN

TOKYO -- At a time when the U.S. relations with Japan are growing more rancorous and fears are mounting that some sort of a crisis is in the offing, one American in Tokyo is urging that the situation not be seen as worse than it really is.

"When people talk about a rapid deterioration in our relationship, I don't know quite what to make of it," said Amb. Armacost. "I'm concerned about these perceptions. At the office level, I must say that our relationship with Japan is good."

GENERAL MOTORS

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with just how much trouble General Motors has. First, the world's largest car maker confirms that it lost more money last year than any corporation in history -- \$4.5 billion. GM knew it was coming two months ago and said it would have to lay off 74,000 workers and close 21 plants.... One plant knew without a doubt it was in a race to stay open, the one in Ypsilanti, Michigan. Ypsilanti's competitor was the GM plant in Arlington, Texas. Two months ago GM said one of them would close -- Arlington or Ypsilanti.

ABC's Jim Hickey reports that the closing of this plant means that not only will more than 3,000 auto workers lose their jobs; parts suppliers, even retail businesses will be affected. According to some estimates, up to 10,000 more jobs. Ypsilanti can hardly afford that. Many stores downtown are already full. Unemployment runs at 9 percent.

Jennings reports that GM actually had a record year overseas: European sales of almost two million cars and trucks and profits -- yes profits -- of \$1.7 billion. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: There was a time in this country when a job at General Motors was the equivalent of a lifetime contract. America's mightiest company was a corporate fortress. No more. Today it announced losses of almost \$4.5 billion last year. That's a world record. And today company officials disclosed which plants would live and which would die. (NBC-Lead)

CBS's Dan Rather: General Motors announced sweeping cutbacks today, bad news for many workers and their families. The plant closings and elimination of thousands of jobs came as GM posted record annual losses -- the world's worst for a publicly held company ever. (CBS-Lead)

CAMPAIGN

Brokaw: It was once said, as Maine goes so goes the nation. Well, President Bush hopes this political year will revive that old saying. He captured 88 percent of the vote in Maine's Republican straw poll on Sunday, Pat Buchanan managing only four percent. The President was on the campaign trail again tonight, and once again he's got taxes on his mind.

NBC's John Cochran: The President is taking a chance. He is not repeating his read-my-lips pledge, but he is saying he is the one who can prevent higher income taxes. Tonight the President took his campaign into Maryland, bashing the tax plan backed by House Democrats.

Cochran continues: The House will vote this week on a plan for a temporary two-year tax cut -- \$200 for an individual, \$400 for a couple. But income taxes would go up for individuals with a taxable income of \$85,000 and couples making \$145,000.

(**President Bush**: "And what's worse, some of them have a bidding war in mind. To pay for that they'd have to raise taxes on people making more than \$35,000 a year.")

(**Sen. Mitchell**: "The statement is, of course, completely false. The President's words and gestures and actions are those of a man in the grip of panic.")

(**Rep. Rostenkowski**: "I think what the President is having is a problem with Mr. Buchanan and he is shooting from the hip.")

The danger for Bush in talking about taxes is that it reminds everyone he went back on his no-new-taxes pledge. On "Meet the Press," Vice President Quayle said Bush compromised on taxes in 1990 because of the Gulf crisis.

(**Vice President Quayle**: "If we hadn't gotten the budget agreement we would have had further crisis and it would have weakened the President in the tough responsibility he had in facing down Saddam Hussein.")

(**Buchanan**: "And I noticed young Dan said on television yesterday, George Bush didn't break that tax pledge. The Congress made him do it. You know, it's the old Flip Wilson defense: The Devil made me do it.")

But sources say that to show he can get tough the President is considering a constitutional challenge by vetoing only the things he does not like in the Democrats' bill. The Democrats say it would be illegal to veto only part of a bill, and that eventually the Supreme Court would have to decide. (NBC-4)

Jennings: In politics this is an in-between day, in between the Maine caucuses yesterday and tomorrow's primary in South Dakota. On the Republican side, Pat Buchanan did not mount a challenge to President Bush in either state, whereas both contests are likely to serve as a reminder that for the Democrats the race is far from over.

ABC's Judy Muller reports that one reporter in South Dakota has observed this is something of an Andy Warhol campaign, in which every candidate has a chance to win a primary and 15 minutes of fame. (ABC-4, CBS-7)

ISRAELI LOAN GUARANTEES

Jennings: The Secretary of State had a tough message for Israel today. It has been five months now since Israel asked the U.S. to guarantee \$10 billion worth of loans which are supposed to be used for re-settling large numbers of immigrants from the former Soviet Union. Today on Capitol Hill, Secretary Baker explained precisely what Israel will have to do in exchange.

ABC's John McWethy: It started all smiles, but before the morning session was over, Secretary Baker had laid down what was in essence a take-it-or-leave-it proposition. Baker said the Administration is willing to provide up to \$10 billion in loan guarantees to help build housing for Soviet immigrants within Israel. But to get the money, Israel must agree to immediately stop building new settlements in the West Bank and Gaza.

McWethy continues: Clearing land, building new roads and sewers for new settlements must also stop. If Israel chooses, construction begun before Jan. 1 could be completed, but every dollar spent to do so would be deducted from the loan.

(Secretary Baker: "The choice, Mr. Chairman, from our standpoint is Israel's. The choice is Israel's.")

That drew a bitter protest from one of the subcommittee's strongest supporters of Israel.

(Rep. Larry Smith: "Why must you insist on a loan guarantee that is coupled with a freeze of settlements when you in fact are not putting any conditions on anyone else on the Arab side at all?"

Baker: "Nobody else is asking us for \$10 billion in additional assistance over and above the \$3-4 billion that we give every year with no strings attached.")

Baker cut off further questions by Rep. Smith, saying he had nothing to add.

(Smith: "Well, Sir, you did not finish the answer. And it's basically the same way you want to deal with this subject.")

Baker: "I've finished it as far as I was concerned, and I will determine when I've finished my answers, not you.")

The Bush Administration is confident that it has the votes to win easily over the usually strong pro-Israeli lobby in Congress. Officials claim there is little sympathy for Israel's policy on settlements and little support for any new expenditure overseas in this election year.

ABC's Dean Reynolds reports that all over the West Bank you can hear the sounds of construction as expanding Jewish settlements tighten Israel's grip on the land. There is new housing available in Israel itself, but it is either far from the major cities or offers much less for the money than the West Bank homes going up near Jerusalem or Tel Aviv. There is no question that the people who move out here to the settlements in the territories get a terrific deal from the government for doing it. The land is free. The mortgages are more generous than most everywhere else in the country. Interest rates are lower. There are special grants and reduced income taxes. There are growing complaints from jobless Israelis and those upset about cuts in funding for education and health care within Israel proper. Most Israelis have to sacrifice to help pay for the influx of 350,000 immigrants from the old Soviet Union. And the immigrants lose, too. The government refuses to reduce the amount it is spending on settlements to address the newcomers' needs. The \$10 billion in loan guarantees from Washington were supposed to solve those problems. But with Israel now building as many homes in the occupied territories as fast as it can, the government is making clear that if it must choose between the loan guarantees and the settlements, it will choose the settlements. (ABC-2, CBS-2)

NBC's John Dancy reports that for the first time the U.S. showed itself willing to use aid as a club over Israel. As the Middle East peace talks resumed here at the State Department this morning, Secretary Baker dropped a bombshell on Capitol Hill, revealing for the first time what he has been telling the Israelis privately: They must stop building settlements in occupied Arab lands if they want \$10 billion in U.S. loan guarantees over the next five years.... Baker told the committee:

Smith: "I hope someday the American public is going to determine whether you've finished the answers. Disgraceful.")

In Israel, Prime Minister Shamir said the U.S. is now siding with the Arabs. That could be a bad omen for the peace talks. (NBC-3)

GULF WAR

Rather: One year ago tonight, U.S.-led forces were midway through their lightning ground war against Saddam Hussein, and it was turning into a rout. The allies had taken 18,000 Iraqi prisoners, sweeping through the desert with little resistance. But it turns out Operation Desert Storm in some opinions did not go completely according to plan.

CBS's David Martin reports that the war ended with both Gen. Powell and Gen. Shwarzkopf believing incorrectly the main avenue of Iraqi retreat in Kuwait was in American hands. (CBS-3)

ARMS SALES

ABC's Fred Francis says that in a secret report, the Administration has told Congress it wants to sell more weapons to the Gulf Arab states -- deals worth over \$12 billion, deals that mean real jobs. At the heart of the arms package is the F-15 made by McDonnell Douglas. NBC News has learned that last week the Saudi government formally asked to buy 72 F-15s, a deal worth \$5 billion. The real impact is much, much more. The F-15 sale would save as many as 7,000 jobs at the St. Louis factory and affect more than 30,000 at subcontractors in 47 states. The Saudis also want \$1 billion in TOW anti-tank missiles and other hardware. One senior Saudi official said if the royal family can't spend its money in the U.S. it will buy from others. And the Kuwaitis, dazzled by the performance by the Patriot missile in the Gulf War, want six Patriot batteries, along with 450 of the missiles. The Kuwaiti deal is worth \$5 billion. Since the war ended, the U.S. has quietly sold over \$8 billion worth of arms to Mideast states, including Israel.

Francis continues: One defense analyst said that market is worth \$10 billion and tens of thousands of U.S. defense jobs a year until the end of the century. But that's only if Congress approves the sales. Israel's supporters in Congress will try to block these sales, but in an election year any vote that risks or threatens jobs is risky. (NBC-2)

HAITIAN REFUGEES

Jennings: There may be some encouraging news just around the corner for all those Haitians who felt compelled to flee their country. While the Supreme Court said today it will not stop the Bush Administration from sending thousands of Haitian refugees back to Haiti, there may be a political settlement in the works -- a deal worked out by the OAS that would have former President Aristide return to power and the general who led the coup against Aristide last December keep his job as the head of the army. So far there's no sign from the general that he'll accept his part of the deal. (ABC-7, NBC-8, CBS-9)

JUSTICE STEVENS

Brokaw: The U.S. Supreme Court said today that Justice John Paul Stevens has cancer of the prostate and he is undergoing radiation treatment. Stevens, who is 71 years old and is considered a moderate liberal, will remain on the bench. (NBC-7, CBS-6)

ELVIS STAMP

Jennings: Good news for Elvis fans: The Post Office is going ahead with its plan to honor Elvis by putting his face on a stamp next year. But since nobody we know in the Post Office has sighted Elvis lately, they can't decide which picture to use [between a younger or older Elvis]. The public will choose. Look for a ballot in April. It may come in the mail. (ABC-5, NBC-10, CBS-14)

BAKER LINKS Israeli loan guarantees with settlement freeze.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III told lawmakers yesterday that the United States should grant Israel a \$10 billion loan guarantee package only if Israel freezes its construction of new settlements in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Israel has requested the loan guarantees to finance the mass immigration of Jews from the former Soviet Union.

Appearing before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Foreign Operations, Baker said he had laid out two choices for Israel to consider: either it could halt settlement activity entirely in exchange for \$10 billion in U.S. loan guarantees over five years; or Israel could complete the houses it had under construction as of Jan. 1, 1992, and accept far less money on a single-year basis with a dollar deducted for every dollar spent on the settlements.

"The choice is Israel's," Baker said.

Tensions flared at one point in the hearing when Baker argued with panel member Lawrence J. Smith, D-Fla., a leading supporter of Israel in Congress.

Pressed by Smith to explain how he could adopt such a policy while Middle East talks were continuing, Baker said, "Nobody else is asking us for \$10 billion in addition to the [\$3 billion] to \$4 billion that we give every year with no strings attached."

Smith said he found Baker's answer "extremely offensive."

Baker quickly responded: "I will determine when I finish my answers, not you."

Said Smith: "I hope that some day the American public is going to determine whether you finish the answers."

HAITIANS' RETURN backed by Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court yesterday allowed the Bush administration to complete the forced return of thousands of

Haitian boat people to their strife-torn Caribbean homeland.

In an 8-1 vote, justices rejected an emergency request by human rights lawyers to halt the U.S. repatriations on grounds that the Haitians would suffer irreparable harm and possible death if sent back.

The court's action came a day after Haiti's quarreling factions reached an agreement, mediated by the Organization of American States, to restore democracy in the nation and return the ousted president, Jean-Bertrand Aristide, to power.

On Wednesday, the House plans to consider legislation (HR 3844) that would suspend for six months the forced repatriation of Haitian refugees held in U.S. custody. Bill backers say the six-month delay would allow time for the political strife in Haiti to subside.

NIXON OUSTER to be reviewed by Supreme Court.

Walter L. Nixon, a federal court judge who was removed from office by the Senate in 1989, will get his day in court. The Supreme Court yesterday agreed to hear whether the Senate improperly stripped the Mississippi judge of his position.

The Senate removed Nixon three years after he was convicted of perjury for lying to a grand jury about discussions he had with a local district attorney. Nixon was accused of trying to get a marijuana-trafficking case dropped against a man whose father had helped the judge financially.

Nixon continued to collect his salary while serving more than a year in jail. The House impeached Nixon in May 1989, and six months later the Senate removed him as a federal judge.

Nixon claims that his Senate trial was unconstitutional because it was before a committee, not the full Senate. A

Senate Floor: Senators will take up the conference report on legislation (HR 2212) that would put tough conditions on renewal of China's favorable trade status.

Under the bill, the president would have to certify that China's government had made progress in curtailing human rights abuses, unfair trade practices and nuclear weapons proliferation as a condition for renewal of its most-favored-nation (MFN) status come June.

The Chinese government also would have to account for and release all political prisoners arrested in connection with the 1989 Tiananmen Square crackdown on student protesters.

MFN status essentially grants Chinese-made goods the same treatment as those from nearly every other country.

Senators will meet in closed session for an hour and a half this afternoon to discuss intelligence matters related to the legislation.

Members also are scheduled to vote on a motion to limit initial debate on legislation (S 479) that would broaden existing protections from antitrust laws for companies engaging in joint ventures, especially joint ventures in manufacturing.

House Floor: The House will consider legislation (HR 3490) designed to protect consumers from fraud in the pay-per-call industry.

The bill would give the Federal Communications Commission authority to regulate the 900-number industry, whose rapid expansion in the last few years has prompted congressional concerns about unscrupulous operators.

Callers would be allowed to hang up without charge after listening to an introductory message that detailed the call's cost. Individuals could also block calls from their phones to 900-numbers.

measure (HR 2152) that would require the Bush administration to impose sanctions on countries that defy an international ban on drift net fishing.

Japan, Taiwan and South Korea still practice drift net fishing, which traps many forms of sea life other than fish. Japan has announced it will cease the practice by the end of 1992.

Another bill on the House schedule (HR 3519) would limit funding for a national historic site in Pennsylvania designed to mark the age of the steam locomotive.

Congress has already appropriated \$52 million for the Steamtown National Historic Site, which some members have attacked as wasteful.

But a compromise worked out by the project's champion, Joseph M. McDade, R-Pa., and members of the Interior Committee resulted in a deal that would cap spending authority for Steamtown at \$66 million.

Bush's Top Brass: Capitol Hill will be abuzz today with Cabinet secretaries and top administration officials who are scheduled to testify before various committees in support of President Bush's fiscal 1993 budget requests for their departments.

Health and Human Services Secretary Louis W. Sullivan comes before the House Budget Committee to push the president's \$237.5 billion budget request for health-care programs. Fiscal 1992 spending for health care was an estimated \$213 billion.

Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan testifies before the Senate Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee on the president's \$15.7 billion agriculture spending request for fiscal 1993. An administration request for \$1.1 billion for the yet unfunded Rural Development Administration may be discussed.

Labor Secretary Lynn Martin appears before the House Labor Appropriations Subcommittee. One likely topic is President Bush's proposal to overhaul federal job training programs.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III appears before the Senate Foreign Operations Appropriations Subcommittee. Discussion is expected to focus on loan guarantees for Israel and aid to the former Soviet republics.

Energy Secretary James D. Watkins will appear before the House Energy Subcommittee on Energy and Power, where he will likely face questioning about the department's efforts to clean up waste from nuclear weapons production plants such as Rocky Flats, Hanford and Savannah River.

Watkins' appearance comes as the full committee is preparing to mark up

an energy policy bill (HR 776).

Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady and Housing and Urban Development Secretary Jack F. Kemp will testify before the House Banking Subcommittee on Financial Institutions Supervision on the financial needs of the Resolution Trust Corporation, the government entity in charge of the savings and loan bailout. Kemp is a member of the Thrift Depositor Protection Oversight Board.

Peacekeeping Funds: The House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on International Operations will mark up legislation that would authorize \$350 million in supplemental appropriations to contribute to U.N. peacekeeping operations in fiscal 1992.

Most of the funding would be used to help pay for U.N. forces scheduled to begin work soon in Cambodia and Yugoslavia. The two nations have been wracked by civil wars; and the United Nations is sending thousands of soldiers and administrators to help preserve fragile truces. The United Nations pays money collected for peacekeeping directly to the nations that provide the personnel.

The measure (HR 4231) would also authorize an additional \$366 million for fiscal 1993, but more money may be needed as peacekeeping operations are fully implemented and the number of personnel increases.

The bill has the support of the administration and is expected to win subcommittee approval.

Committee Funding: The Accounts Subcommittee of the House Administration Committee begins hearings on 1992 internal funding requests for House committees.

Up for review today are proposals submitted by the House Administration, Science, Intelligence, Education, Agriculture, and Standards of Official Conduct committees. The chairman and ranking Republican on each committee will present their requests, which generally average about 10 percent above 1991 funding.

However, the Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families is seeking a 41 percent increase and the Governmental Affairs, Public Works and Veterans' Affairs panels are all seeking increases of more than 20 percent.

The Intelligence Committee is asking for less than it received last year, and the Rules Committee has requested the same as 1991.

Seven more panels will appear before the Accounts Subcommittee tomorrow. Other committee funding requests will be presented over the next two weeks.

Committee funds are used for operating expenses, largely staff salaries. ■

PERKINS TAPPED to succeed Pickering as U.N. representative.

President Bush said yesterday that he will nominate Thomas R. Pickering, the current U.S. representative to the United Nations, to be ambassador to India and Edward J. Perkins to succeed Pickering as representative to the United Nations.

Pickering, 60, played a key diplomatic role in marshaling support for the U.N. resolutions that isolated Iraq after the invasion of Kuwait.

Perkins, 63, is director general of the Foreign Service and the State Department's personnel director. He served as ambassador to South Africa in 1986-89.

Pickering would succeed William Clark Jr. in the New Delhi post. Pickering has been ambassador to Israel, El Salvador, Nigeria and Jordan.

The nominations had been expected as part of a shuffling of top-level posts at the State Department.

REMAP PLAN for Pennsylvania pits Weldon against Schulze.

After setbacks in several states, Democrats won a round in the redistricting fight yesterday when a Pennsylvania judge approved a plan that jeopardizes at least two Republican House members.

The remap plan, drafted by state Senate Democrats and approved by Commonwealth Court Judge David Craig, must now be approved by the state Supreme Court. The state Supreme Court took over congressional redistricting on Feb. 11, after the legislature failed to meet a court-ordered deadline to approve a map.

If the plan wins final approval, GOP Reps. Curt Weldon, 44, and Dick Schulze, 62, would have to battle each other for the new 7th District in southeastern Pennsylvania. The court decision sparked rumors that Schulze may retire from the House.

The map would weaken freshman Republican Rick Santorum, whose new suburban Pittsburgh 18th District would reach south to take in many of the Democratic voters from the current 20th District of Joseph M. Gaydos, D.

1st District Rep. Thomas M. Foglietta is the only Democratic incumbent potentially endangered by the new plan. His new district has a 52 percent black voting-age population. But even if Foglietta loses a primary against a minority candidate, the district is certain to remain in Democratic hands.

Foglietta's home would now be in the district of Robert A. Borski, D, and he may decide to run in this district. ■

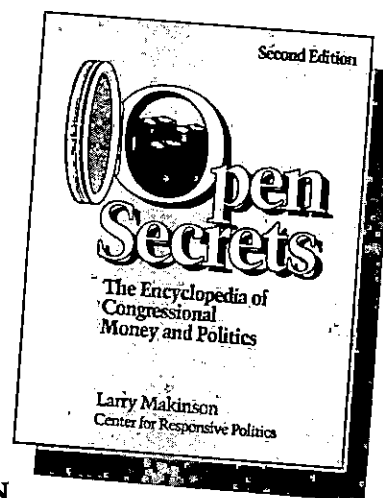

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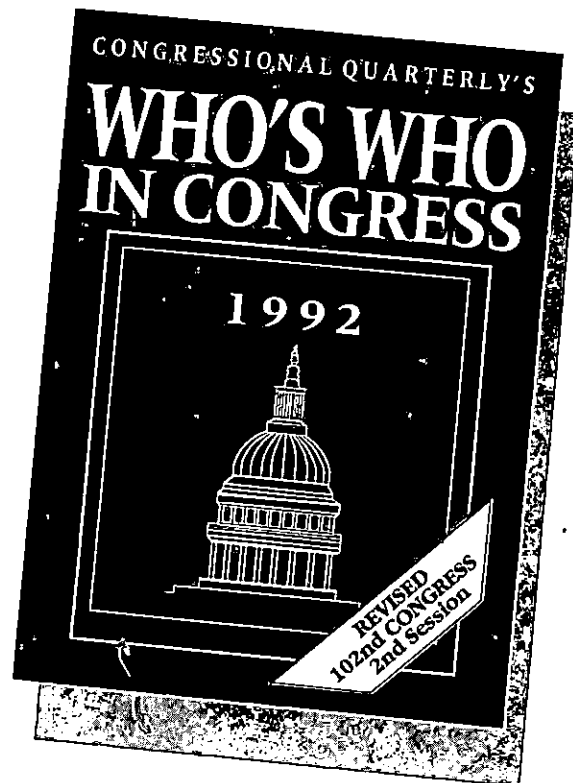

*1 SOUTH DAKOTA: KERREY FAVORED; TSONGAS, CLINTON COULD SPOIL
 "Whoever the voters pick" in today's primary "won't clear up the muddle" (Waldman, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 2/25). Tsongas: "I would suggest we're all going to be here for awhile." Kerrey: "I'm not worried about a 10-point victory, or eight" (HOUS. CHRONICLE, 2/25). N.Y. POST's Orin: "Only one of the Heartland Boys [Harkin/Kerrey] will get out alive." Dem strategist Bob Squier: "[SD] is the Midwestern semifinals -- you have to show that you can at least do well in your own region" (2/25). USA TODAY's Adam Nagourney writes, "it's a good bet that Kerrey will stay in the race after today ... unless his vote totals in [SD] are stunningly poor" (2/25). Kerrey "is favored to revive his slumping campaign ... and sweep [Harkin] from the race." But "a loss for Kerrey or even a close contest with Harkin could doom them both" (Woodlief, BOSTON HERALD, 2/25). Germond/Witcover: "The perception of which [Kerrey/Harkin] has been the stronger farm advocate could make the difference for one or the other ... unless Tsongas or Clinton surprise" (Balto. SUN, 2/25). B. GLOBE's Loth/Lehigh: "Judging from the toughest [ads] to air thus far in the campaign, the [SD] battle has fully engaged the front-runners" in addition to Harkin and Kerrey. "For the first time," Clinton and Kerrey are running ads that attack opponents by name (2/25). Kerrey responded to Harkin criticism of his fast-track authorization vote, noting Harkin "has voted for the 'fast-track' agreement five times," and that his own vote was simply to give Bush authority to negotiate (OMAHA WORLD-HERALD, 2/25). Addressing SD seniors, Harkin "is pulling out all the emotional stops ... But the home state of McGovern, and birthplace of Hubert Humphrey, may be about to pull the plug on New Deal liberalism" (Connelly, SEATTLE POST-INTELL., 2/25). Kerrey, dismounting from a horse: "I'm in my stride politically and I'm in my element in the West" (L.A. TIMES, 2/25).

PRIMARY NOTES: The weather forecast is good ... polls close at 7:00 pm CST ... In addition to the Five and Agran, Wilder and LaRouche are on the ballot ... Kerrey is the only candidate "with plans to have a celebration tonight in Sioux Falls" (Walker, Sioux Falls ARGUS LEADER, 2/25). ABERDEEN AMERICAN NEWS' Mercer notes an estimated 70,000 Dems will vote today; GOP turnout expected "lighter." In each party, registration is down about 5% from '88 (2/25).

CLINTON: He called a Kerrey ad on PPI Fellow/unpaid adviser Rob Schapiro's opinions on farm subsidies (see HOTLINE 2/21, 2/24) "misleading and negative," reaffirming his own support for subsidies. He is airing a response spot called "Wrong," saying: "Say no to negative politics. Say yes to Bill Clinton's fight for the forgotten middle class." ARGUS LEADER's Matt Cecil notes Schapiro's denial of advising Clinton on farm issues appears in the newspaper story used in Kerrey's ad (2/25). "With its appeal to high-road campaigning, Clinton's ad tries to move above the fray while still taking shots at his two closest rivals" (Loth/Lehigh, B. GLOBE, 2/25).

TSONGAS: He "quietly labored for a [SD] 'sleeper surprise'" (Woodlief, BOSTON HERALD, 2/25). In Sioux Falls: "Some of the candidates who are doing well here ... were engaging in this protectionist Japan-bashing rhetoric that they thought would play well out [east] ... If there's any state that's going to be increasingly dependent on foreign markets, it's [SD]" (ARGUS

LEADER, 2/25). Tsongas: "I'm the only candidate who has not been up trashing other Democrats. You see the ad that Bob Kerrey put on attacking me and Bill Clinton? That is not what this is about" (B. GLOBE, 2/25). SD Dem exec. dir. Steve Erpenbach said Tsongas and Clinton "received important exposure" in the 2/23 debate and "are coming on" (Frisby, B. GLOBE, 2/25).

GOP: N.Y. POST's Orin notes the ARGUS LEADER poll giving 53% to Bush and 35% to uncommitted, and writes the "uncommitted slate could do about as well as" Buchanan in NH -- "and cast another vote of no confidence in Bush." Gov. Mickelson (R) "has said his goal is for Bush to win 80 percent of the GOP vote" in today's primary. Bush spokesperson Torie Clark: "Any time any candidate runs against an unknown, the unknown very often does better than the real candidate" (2/25). B. GLOBE's Frisby also warns GOPers "might be on the verge of sending [Bush] a message of discontent." SD GOPers "maintain that Bush has been the biggest victim of aggressive campaigning by [Dems]." SD GOP chair Don Peterson: "No question that all the criticism from [Dems] has had an impact on the [GOP] race" (2/25).

TV: CNN's Richard Roth: "Both Kerrey and Harkin already say they will stay in the race no matter what the result, but the loser here will face major funding problems down primary road and may have no choice but to drop out" (2/24). NBC's Andrea Mitchell: "There's no obvious frontrunner as the Democrats frantically target the fifteen primaries and nine caucuses being held in the next two weeks. ... Television ads are cheap in [SD], Kerrey's are pretty rough. ... Looking beyond [SD], Kerrey and Tsongas have now decided to fight Clinton next week in his home region, Georgia, hoping to slow him down before the bigger southern primaries on Super Tuesday" (2/24). NBC's Margaret Larson over footage of Harkin, then Kerrey: "It may soon be time for one of the nationally known Democratic presidential candidates to reassess. It is crunch time for [Harkin] and [Kerrey] today as voters go to the polls in [SD]. Each one needs a big win to boost morale and to raise enough money to propel him through the next rounds of the presidential campaign" (2/25). CBS' Scott Pelley over footage of Harkin and Kerrey: "On the harsh landscape of [SD] voters may freeze out some of the Democratic hopefuls and start to begin the process of cutting the field down to size. [Harkin and Kerrey] badly need a strong showing here to stay in the race." Harkin: "I have to do well, I don't know that I necessarily have to win it but I do have to do well to show that I have staying power." Pelley: "Both Harkin and Kerrey are campaigning on their farm state credentials. ... Doing well here might prove [Tsongas is] more than a regional candidate, but the New Englander admits he's a straggler in this herd." Tsongas: "All I want to do is be able to say that my views can resonate in [SD]" (2/25). NBC's Bob Kerr: "A showdown for two neighbors ... Only one is expected to walk away able to carry on a campaign. ... It's a question of money. ... Tsongas is one opponent Kerrey and Harkin would like to live to fight again in another state. ... But out here where voters drive great distances to work and shop, Tsongas found himself under attack for proposing higher gasoline taxes. Bill Clinton reminded a debate audience he's been a farm-state governor for years. Clinton may not like today's outcome ... but next week the spotlight shifts to [GA] where he's in better shape and then to other big Southern states the following week" (2/25).

CO: ROCKY MOUNTAIN NEWS' Herrick writes it has been called "a bellwether for the West, a must win for [Kerrey], and a crucial battle for [Clinton]." Pollster and ex-CO Dem chair Floyd Ciruli: "It will be a western benchmark. It's the first real sense of what a western state will do." Other 3/3 primary states "appear to matter more" to the Dems as Tsongas "targeted" MD "to prove he's more" than a regional candidate and Clinton "needs a convincing" GA win. Clinton's CO "aim is to win ... thus making a case he can carry the West." Tsongas may be a "tough challenge" for Clinton while Kerrey "appears to have the most to lose" in CO, and has "admitted ... his performance" here "is critical." A 9News/ROCKY MOUNTAIN NEWS poll taken before NH showed Kerrey in third here, behind Clinton and Tsongas (2/23).

GA: The GOP contest is "stealing [Clinton's] thunder" in GA, and "more importantly, some of his votes." With questions on Clinton's draft behavior and private life, conservative Dems could opt to vote for Buchanan in the open primary -- especially in rural GA. '84 Mondale chair C.O. Smith: "A lot of people down in south Georgia don't want to vote for him. But who else?" Ex-GA Dem chair John Anderson on Buchanan: "I've got some Democratic friends who are going to vote for him" (West, Balto. SUN, 2/25).

MD: A Mason-Dixon Political/Media Research poll, conducted 2/21-23, surveyed 819 likely voters; margin of error +/- 3.5%. Dem subsample: 464 LVs; +/- 4.9%. GOP subsample: 236 LVs; +/- 7% (WMAL-TV, WJLA-TV, 2/24). Robert Hitlin Research surveyed 300 likely voters in each primary 2/21-2/23; +/- 5% (WRC-TV, 2/24).

WRC showed Tsongas leading Clinton among whites 31-25%, trailing him among blacks by only 31-29%. He led Clinton among women 28-21%, and trailed among men 33-32% (WRC release, 2/25).

A Balto. SUN editorial notes Mayor Kurt Schmoke's backing of Clinton "may nail down a number" of Balto. votes, "but the key to the election could well lie in the [DC] suburbs. That's where one-third of the [Dem] votes will be cast." But by emphasizing urban issues, Clinton has "somewhat of an advantage" over Tsongas, "who rarely discusses poverty and homelessness. Nonetheless, there is quiet support for Mr. Tsongas among black leaders who savor what they consider his genuineness and accept his reasoning that to be a pro-business liberal is to be a pro-jobs liberal." Harkin, "as a pro-labor New Deal Democrat," and Kerrey, "who has the backing of Jesse Jackson's old organization, Operation Push, may further scramble the black vote" (2/25). ST. PETE TIMES' Ellen Debenport calls MD and GA "win-or-die" contests for Tsongas and Clinton, respectively (2/25).

MN: Minneapolis STAR-TRIBUNE's Smith writes Kerrey is Harkin's "principal opponent so far," as both have had St. Paul offices for several weeks and have "lined up most of the big name

DFL politicians in the state." Harkin MN manager Dan Cramer: "We kick into high gear now. ... We've got people in every county." Kerrey nat'l field dir. Chris Sautter, conceding "front-runner status" in MN to Harkin, but saying it "carries the responsibility of winning convincingly," is bringing NH "road warriors" to help organize. Tsongas coord. Joyce Banaszak, operating out of her home, is "getting 25 new volunteers a day." Clinton coord. John Wodele, who "concedes" Clinton's "best hope" is third-place, said it's "unlikely" Clinton will visit MN. Brown coord. Craig Neal: "We can't say we've got every precinct covered, but we'll be quite visible." The MN caucus system includes a 3/3 DFL straw poll to provide a "rough estimate" of support while the lengthy process of apportioning delegates won't be settled until June's state convention (2/24).

***3 SOUTH CAROLINA: HARKIN BRINGING JESSE; TOO LATE FOR KERREY?**

The primary is Saturday 3/7, situated in between "Jr. Tuesday" 3/3 and "Super Tuesday" 3/10. Harkin southern dir. Kevin Gray said Jesse Jackson will accompany Harkin on his 3/2 SC visit, but Jackson "won't endorse." Tsongas officials "launched a hurry-up effort in opening" a SC HQ as SC coordinator Julia Cave called the primary "a critical state for moving his campaign to the South." It is still "unclear," however, if Tsongas will campaign in SC. Kerrey aides noted NE LG Maxine Moul will "make a round of appearances" on Kerrey's behalf (Hoover, GREENVILLE NEWS, 2/25). NEWS header: "Kerrey plays catch-up." Kerrey SC coord. Ben Gregg said SC was "not a must-win state" for Kerrey. Kerrey's campaign "has been hampered by a late start, lack of Southern ties, and few resources. Even supporters say they have been disappointed so far." Kerrey backers "are nervous" that despite his 2/4 visit, whatever comes from now on "will be too little, too late." House Maj. Leader Bob McElveen: "He's the second choice of a lot of people" (2/23). Year-end '91 FEC reports show Harkin topped Clinton in SC fund-raising, \$6,250 to \$4,211, but Clinton SC dir. Judie Miller said there was more activity for Clinton since 1/1 (SPARTANBURG HERALD, 2/22).

***4 TEXAS: CLINTON LEADS DEMS, BUSH BEATS ALL**

HOUSTON CHRONICLE/U of Houston surveyed 835 likely voters 2/12-19; margin of error +/- 4%. Dem subsamples: 400 LVs; +/- 5%. GOP: 374 LVs; +/- 5% (2/23). Primary 3/10.

***5 TSONGAS: PICKS UP SCHEDULING PACE; MAY NOT BE ON NY BALLOT SCHEDULE:** He led in the votes but not in the headlines from Maine, and L.A. TIMES' Cathleen Decker concludes that "with his momentum from New Hampshire fading, the former Massachusetts senator dearly needs a victory, and fast." That may mean in the 3/3 JUNIOR TUESDAY primaries (MD, GA, CO). So a day-off planned

for tomorrow has turned into a second trip to GA hoping "to capitalize on a well-received visit last Friday." And a poll showing him ahead in CO (see HOTLINE 2/24) "virtually dictated new appearances" there (2/25). (Note: A new MD poll showing him with a lead there, see #2, could easily dictate time there.) But as Decker says, "while Tsongas is covering all the bases, he has yet to dig in for battle anywhere" (L.A. TIMES 2/25). While Tsongas points out that he won more Maine votes than Clinton, Kerrey and Harkin combined, GA analyst Merle Black says his Maine performance "probably weakens Tsongas further down here, and he wasn't that strong to begin with." He reacted to a CBS/NYTIMES poll (see HOTLINE 2/24) showing him stronger than Clinton against Bush saying that if he continues to appeal to GOPers, "the irony would be that the issue of electability comes back as my strength as opposed to my weakness ... This is a strategy we just devised about 10 minutes ago" (BOSTON GLOBE 2/25). Note: The new strategy might be around for awhile given the MD poll trial heats against Bush, won by Tsongas and lost by Clinton (see #2).

NEW YORK BALLOT: His place on the 4/7 primary ballot may be in jeopardy. A candidate needs 10,000 signatures with at least 100 from each of the 34 CDs to qualify. Since Tsongas has only 13,952, his petitions are considered "most vulnerable to a challenge." The "rule of thumb" is to have "at least twice the number of required signatures in order to withstand a legal challenge" (Dicker, N.Y. POST, 2/22). While NY Dem chair John Marino announced at the end of last week a "peace pact" between Clinton and Tsongas, as the two camps "agreed not to pursue formal legal challenges to each other's nominating petitions" (NY POST 2/22), "fringe" candidate Lenora Fulani (now out of the Dem race, but still running as an independent) Monday filed "specific" objections to the Tsongas petitions (and Jerry Brown's as well) (N.Y. DAILY NEWS 2/25). Fulani's press sec. said it would take "an act of God or the Democratic party" for Tsongas name to stay on the ballot (BOSTON HERALD 2/25). Tsongas NY chair James Armenakis has called the Clinton-Tsongas pact a "ruse to hide Clinton's involvement" in the Fulani challenge (Lombardi, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 2/22). NY Assy Speaker Saul Weprin is going to move a measure to allow the two party state committees the power to decide who is on their ballots, but GOP Chmn Bill Powers was reported as "skeptical changes can be made in midstream" (N.Y. DAILY NEWS 2/25). The Tsongas forces have filed objections to Agran's 21,423 signatures, apparently hoping that Agran would call off his and Fulani's challenge to the Tsongas filing (BOSTON HERALD 2/25). N.Y. TIMES editorial: "Once again [NY] stands embarrassed before the nation because of its petty-minded election law" (2/23). NEWSDAY editorial: "It's like dancing on banana peels. Welcome to New York politics, Mr. Tsongas" (2/24). THE CLOSER LOOK: An AP piece summarizes his law firm's lobby clients (Aetna, US-Canada natural gas pipeline, etc.), his directorship of Boston Edison while they had to shut down a "problematic nuclear power plant," and his co-founding "a company that proposed a floating garbage incinerator in Boston Bay" (Mult., RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH 2/24). Robert Pear of the NY TIMES examines his ten year House/Senate record and finds "the same unorthodox mix of ideas that he espouses as a Presidential candidate": a tireless advocate of energy conservation who "refrained from attacks on the oil companies" ("If Mother Teresa were put at the head of Exxon, the energy crisis would not go away," 1981); he fought to restrict development of federal land in AK but was "more willing than most liberals to accept nuclear

power"; despite his pro-business demeanor he maintained an average 89 out of 100 AFL/CIO rating and an average 23 out of 100 rating from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce (N.Y. TIMES 2/25). He told the BOSTON GLOBE's Peter Gosselin: "I tell the business community I'm good news and bad news. I'm good news because I'll do everything to make you profitable. The bad news: I'm going to hold you to a different standard" (2/25).

*6 CLINTON: STUCK BETWEEN A LITTLE ROCK AND A 3RD PLACE (IN SD)

He returned to Little Rock, "unfazed by a fourth-place finish" in the ME caucuses (Oman, ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE). While he is "taking a break from the presidential campaign trail to hold sway over a legislative special session that he once had sought to avoid, he used it ... to underscore the experience he has over his rivals." Clinton, "clearly" referring to Tsongas: "Frankly, one of the defining things between me and the other candidates is that a lot of what you hear in this election is rhetoric. They say, 'Well, now it's time to tell the American people the truth and make tough decisions.' Well, this Legislature and I, we've been making these tough decisions." Clinton "conceded that his time now could be better spent on the campaign trail but said he long had been looking forward to the special session": "There's nothing I can do about it. What we're doing here's important." While legislators "remained undecided on how long the session would last -- some say one week, others predict longer -- Clinton apparently will not be in Little Rock past" 2/26 when he has 2 DC fund-raisers (2/25). DEM-GAZETTE notes the "throng of national media" reps following Clinton "failed to appear" at the state Capitol (2/25). "A week before key primaries" and two weeks before Super Tuesday, Clinton is "stuck" in AR while the Assembly "debates a controversial plan to bail out the troubled" AR child welfare system. The debate "could not only cost Clinton some key days on the campaign trail, but also could focus national attention on the problems" AR and Clinton have faced "in dealing with one of Clinton's campaign themes, social services for the poor and powerless" (Stewart, L.A. TIMES, 2/25). He will address the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Memphis, TN tonight (release, 2/24).

MAINE DRAIN? Analysts say Clinton's "weak showing in the Maine caucuses was the result of a candidate busy elsewhere, a weak turnout among moderate party regulars, and an overwhelming showing by the state's active progressive wing" (Tessier, DEM-GAZETTE, 2/25). BOSTON GLOBE's Pertman notes ME's results "probably did little more than bruise" Tsongas and Clinton, but the "wounds could worsen if either man stumbles again during the critical contests of the next two weeks" (2/25). CNN: W. POST's Broder on Clinton's showing: "I was surprised. I thought they had put together a very good campaign for Clinton up there and he thought so because he came flying in there Saturday evening. ... Perhaps it has something to do with his message. ... [But] we shouldn't overrate Maine" ("Inside Politics," 2/24).

CLEAR SAILING: Gannett's Richard Benedetto notes the media is trying to make it look like [Clinton] has some tough fights ahead in Southern primaries to prove he has put questions about marital infidelity and draft evasion behind him. But a lack of serious competition" in the South and a "superior bankroll and organization, signal that some big Clinton primary wins, by default, lie ahead." He could have the nomination "all but wrapped up" by the IL and MI primaries 3/17 (2/25). TIME's Kramer asks, "Who Has the Best Plan for Fixing the Economy" --

Tsongas or Clinton? (3/2 issue).

*7 KERREY: FISH OUT OF WATER?

USA TODAY's Adam Nagourney writes, "By most accounts, Kerrey seems utterly unprepared as he plunges into three weeks of the most grueling and geographically diverse state primaries and caucuses in recent Democratic history. ... It is easy to understand just how out of place he felt" in NH. Kerrey: "I am from the Midwest. The primary season would be much different if the first primary would have been in South Dakota." Kerrey's aides "want him to stay in as long as possible, given the uneasiness with Tsongas and Clinton. Several advisers say it's foolish to drop out as long as the possibility exists that Clinton ... could be hit with new accusations." Kerrey advisor Mike McCurry: "We have said all along this guy is steadily improving. But I guess it's more slowly than we would have liked." Nagourney notes, Kerrey's secret service brigade outnumbers reporters covering him by almost 3-to-1 (2/25).

STATE UPDATE: AZ: Kerrey "has won the first political battle" in AZ by signing up the most delegates for the state's 3/7 caucus. His success is a result of AZ Dem official Janet Napolitano who, in just a week and a half, "took a small nucleus of 75 Kerrey delegates and added 400 more" by tapping Phoenix-area unions and "other pockets of Democratic activism." Clinton trails Kerrey with 423 delegates (Steve Meissner, ARIZONA DAILY NEWS, 2/23).

IN OTHER NEWS: VA Gov. Doug Wilder said he doesn't plan to endorse anyone, but he "made it clear he believes" Kerrey would be the strongest in a general election: "I think he'd be more difficult to attack, and that's the question" (Gomlak, Fairfax JOURNAL, 2/24). Kerrey: "If I am President, this country will be different from the one of Paul Tsongas or Bill Clinton. I'd be the better President." Campaigning in Sioux Falls, SD, Kerrey emphasized the importance of making payments to the Internat'l Monetary Fund. But when a reporter asked him to name a few countries the I.M.F. has helped, Kerrey, embarrassed, responded: "Oh God, you've stumped the band" (Alessandra Stanley, N.Y. TIMES, 2/25). W.S. JOURNAL's Jill Abramson profiles Kerrey \$-raiser Robert Burkett. Money has been so "tight" for Kerrey he "has borrowed funds and is making many of the key fund-raising calls" himself (2/25).

*8 HARKIN: UNION TOTAL HITS NINE

Nine of the largest AFL-CIO unions, representing close to 4 million members, have endorsed Harkin: UAW, IAM, CWA, Clothing & Textiles, Steelworkers, Mine Workers, ILGWA, Electrical, Transportation. The union presidents: "We are convinced that with the enthusiastic mobilization of our members and other Harkin supporters across the nation, the massive citizen discontent revealed by the [NH] primary election results can be connected to the Harkin message" (Harkin release, 2/24). Sioux Falls ARGUS LEADER profiles Ruth Harkin. She says Harkin is "aggressive and outspoken because he believes in what he says": "He speaks with a Midwestern bluntness. He's always been a fighter. I think that's one of his best traits. ... He has strong beliefs and fights for them" (2/25). Harkin said GM's layoffs come as "no surprise": "This is one more sad legacy of a presidency whose economic policies are not only out of touch but out of control" (release, 2/24). UAW's Monica Kenney, an auto worker at the closing GM plant in Ypsilanti MI: "The membership

here at Local 1776 is in solidarity and we are going to support Tom Harkin because he's the only candidate running ... that's going to support the workers and I hope that he has good luck today in [SD]" ("Good Morning America," ABC, 2/25).

***9 BROWN: TOUTS HIS NEAR-WIN AS A TSONGAS UPSET**

In the aftermath of the ME caucuses, Brown declared his showing "an upset win and proof that 'grass-roots citizens can take back this country.'" But Tsongas "brushed aside the suggestion" that his showing was a sign of a "fragile candidacy and a stunning setback" (Donald Bertrand, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 2/25). Many analysts agree Brown won't get much more than "ego satisfaction from the near upset," although they say "he might be able to repeat his performance in another small caucus state, by again campaigning in person" (Adam Pertman, BOSTON GLOBE, 2/25). S.F. CHRONICLE's Marie Tessier examines Brown's ME results, and notes his ability to leave his "baggage of political history" at the state border during the caucuses (2/24).

TV: CNN's Catherine Crier interviewed Brown: "From fifth in [NH] to first in [ME], how did you do it?" Brown: "I did it by giving a very strong message. ... Democrats have to reach beyond the now party faithful and bring in those citizens who feel they've been ripped off." On how he will fare in larger states: "I think in the South there is a certain disenchantment.

... We're gonna find every way we can to deliver it. Our 800 number and ..." Crier cuts him off: "Let's talk about the issues." Brown on Super Tuesday: "Bill Clinton has most of the money because he is the insiders' choice. That's what he's worked at for the last eleven years. ... I maintain that corrupt money is the problem. ... This thing is going to boil down between an insider like Clinton and [an outsider]. Then they're gonna have a choice. ... I'd like Jesse Jackson as my vice president" ("Inside Politics," 2/24).

***10 AP DELEGATE COUNT: UNCOMMITTED & BUSH LEAD**

DEM LEADERS: N.Y. TIMES surveyed 307 of the 410 DNC members who are superdelegates to the NY convention. The 410 members will cast 395 votes (2/22). Clinton 83, Harkin 32, Kerrey 16, Tsongas 11, Brown 1, Undecided 156 (2/22).

***11 DUKAKIS: WORDS OF WISDOM**

Dukakis was interviewed by MA's WXTK-FM's Judy Jarvis.

Dukakis on GOP/Bush tactics: "When a President of the United States says ... this is quote ... 'I'll do whatever it takes to win' I think we ought to take him at his word and let's start turning this stuff into a character issue on him and his party and the people around him so that we can get to the real issues." On candidates' personal lives: "For one thing, frankly, I don't know what the sex lives of these candidates have to do with their competence to serve." On Buchanan: "Bill Buckley called him an anti-Semite and if Buckley did, I guess he is. ... In the Republican primary process what he is is a lightening rod for unhappiness with Bush." On Cuomo tease: "At least give him credit for being open and candid about it even if he may not be as crisp and decisive as you'd like him to be." On '92: "Frankly, I think we're going to win the election and I think we're going to win it decisively" (2/24).

***12 BUSH: DEFINING MOMENTS FOR BUCHANAN**

The Bush campaign plans to begin airing TV and radio ads in GA with retired Marine Commandant Gen. P.X. Kelley "attacking" Buchanan's opposition to the Gulf war (Devroy/ Dionne, W. POST, 2/25). Radio text: "Pat Buchanan, to the best of my knowledge, has never visited a military installation. He has never talked to any military people. He has certainly never talked to the senior leadership of the country. I do not think Pat Buchanan has one iota of background or experience that would make him an effective commander-in-chief of our armed forces. Pat Buchanan's lack of background and understanding about the military establishment, his irresponsible assertions and lack of support for the president during Operation Desert Storm do not, in my opinion, make him an attractive candidate for the Republican Party" (Bush-Quayle release, 2/24). "The clearest theme in the Bush campaign now is that Buchanan and his charges can no longer go unanswered" (Ingwerson, C.S. MONITOR, 2/25). The decision to run the spots "reflects the deep anxiety within the Bush camp over the threat posed by Buchanan and was made by the President during a rare Sunday night meeting with his most senior advisers in the private quarters of the White House" (Jehl/Gerstenzang, L.A. TIMES). The spot "marks the most direct White House assault against the insurgency" by Buchanan. One WH official quoted Bush as saying "fine" when asked for the "go-ahead." One campaign official called the spot "comparative" rather than negative: "It's about who had faith in those good men and women in our armed forces, and who didn't" (2/25). W. POST's Devroy/Dionne report the Kelly spot is one of three Bush is airing in GA. The second "directly counters a Buchanan charge" that Bush has "abandoned his proposed middle class income tax cut, and tries to make clear," as WH spokesman Fitzwater said, "Buchanan's charge is a lie." The ad uses a split screen to show Buchanan's charge and "analysis from other media calling the ad misleading." The third, called the "agenda ad," has Bush, from the White House, "outlining a reformist agenda for the country with a tag line that America's future should be put in experienced hands" (2/25).

CALIFORNIA: "Arriving today for his first campaign swing through the state since ... Buchanan took a bite out of his hide in [NH], President Bush faces a [CA GOP] consumed by internal discord. But the problem facing Bush here is not whether he will lose the [6/2] winner-take-all primary to Buchanan, but whether the bitter, ideological disunity in the [CA GOP] -- coupled with a host of economic and political pitfalls -- will undermine his chances in November" (Trounstone, SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS).

Buchanan's CA backers "are trying to figure out how to halt a two-thirds vote" at this weekend's CA GOP convention to give Bush "an unusual pre-primary endorsement" (2/25). Bush arrives in S.F. late this morning to address a luncheon expected to raise \$750,000 and then to a \$1.25 million L.A. fund-raiser tonight. CA pollster Mervin Field: "Bush is probably smart to come out and just do fund-raisers. Given the public's view in the state right now, he would probably lose rather than gain ground if he tried to campaign like he did in [NH]." Notes S.F. CHRONICLE's Roberts, "As elsewhere, the biggest problem for the president in [CA] is economic, with unemployment running higher in the state than in the nation as a whole and the defense and high-tech industries particularly hard-hit" (2/25). Ronald Reagan, who has endorsed Bush, will not be present at either event. WASH. POST's Cannon reports Reagan "told friends" before NH "that Bush faces reelection difficulties because 'he doesn't seem to stand for anything' ... The sources also said Reagan was concerned Bush could lose [CA], and with it the general election." One source close to Gov. Wilson said Bush "suffers" in CA "because he is the first Republican candidate for president in a very long time who doesn't really connect to [CA], either emotionally or by virtue of long residence" (2/25). At the L.A. event, Bush "is expected to emphasize his support for welfare reform -- the cause ... Wilson has staked out as the political wedge of 1992 to divide suburban and rural middle-class whites against low-income and minority voters" (MERCURY NEWS, 2/25). Views differed on Buchanan in CA. Analyst Sherry Bebitch Jeffe: "Buchanan gives [CA] conservatives a champion and a cause to rally around. Buchanan's performance has only helped to exacerbate an existing fight within the [CA GOP]." CA GOP strategist Steve Merksamer: "There's a positive side to Buchanan's message ... But there's another, dark side that has a racist, anti-Semitic, isolationist, protectionist tinge to it. I don't think Pat Buchanan would do well in [CA] because our party and our state are too diversified" (CHRONICLE, 2/25). While GOP Sen. candidates Bruce Herschensohn and Rep. Bill Dannemeyer have endorsed Bush, "many of their arch-conservative supporters ... are ideologically linked to Buchanan, not Bush" (MERCURY NEWS, 2/25).

THE SURROGATES: WH CoS Sam Skinner "strongly suggested" that Buchanan "is an anti-Semite, but he left the final judgment to Jewish groups" (Bedard, W. TIMES). Skinner: "I think the Jewish community thinks he is. From everything I know, they're the best ones to measure his record on that issue. ... It would appear that the voters would like to know the answer to that question and a number of organizations who study that are experts on that issue have reached that conclusion." On negative ads: "We've got to define who Pat Buchanan is. ... If in fact, in his mind he's a serious candidate -- and I said in his mind -- then he ought to be willing to be defined" (2/25). Sen. Gramm (R-TX), on Buchanan's Gulf war opposition: "Let him drop by Fort Benning and explain to the people there why when they were in the desert, he was opposing the president." Rep. Gingrich (R-GA) called a Buchanan ad accusing Bush of abandoning promised tax breaks "dishonest" and a "hit below the belt" (N.Y. TIMES, 2/25).

MORE: Bush opened his MD campaign in a stop in Bethesda "with a blistering attack on his favorite targets: the U.S. Congress, big-spenders and 'the doom-sayers.'" Noting that Bush is supported by "virtually every high-ranking [GOP] official and by most, if not all, of the state's elected GOP officials," Balto. SUN's Smith writes Bush's Bethesda stop "may represent the

closing as well as the opening of his personal campaign" (2/25). Without naming Buchanan, Bush "attacked those who would 'lock the doors and pull down the blinds and hope the world goes away'" (Wines, N.Y. TIMES, 2/25). NBC's John Cochran on video of Bush in MD attacking Dems tax plan: "The president is taking a chance, he is not repeating his 'Read my lips pledge,' but he is saying he is the one who can prevent higher income taxes" (2/24). Addressing the U.S. Chamber of Commerce National Action Rally in DC, Bush noted the one-year anniversary of the ground war in the Gulf: "We mobilized our strength and won that war. ... I think it is fitting a year later to take note of those historic events." Bush attends the GA GOP President's Day dinner 2/29 in Atlanta. Buchanan is not expected to attend (Murray, W. TIMES, 2/25). N.Y. POST's Newfield cites a "research paper" for a NYC law firm which shows "substantial connections" between BCCI and Harken Energy, which employed George W. Bush as a director and consultant. Newfield, who reports there will be a PBS "Frontline" documentary in April "that will zero in on the Bush administration's role" in Justice Dept.'s probes into BCCI, calls for a special prosecutor, specifically Manhattan DA Robert Morgenthau (2/25). N.Y. POST and W. POST both picked up on an L.A. TIMES report that Bush approved aid and close ties with Saddam 9 months before Iraq invaded Kuwait. Rep. Gonzalez (D-TX) said Reagan admin. officials, including then-VP Bush, "intervened with the Export-Import Bank to initiate and continue credit programs with Iraq, even though the bank deemed Iraq not credit-worthy" (Gugliotta, W. POST, 2/25).

BUSH-GM CONNECTION? ABC's Morton Dean to Jim Hickey reporting from MI on the auto workers: "Do they blame GM, do they blame American consumers for not buying American, do they blame the economy or do they think politics might somehow be involved?" Hickey: "Almost all of ... them blame President Bush. They say he intervened, he influenced GM to keep the Arlington plant open for political reasons. Their argument is that President Bush has a residence in Texas, that he needs Texas in the presidential election, that [MI] is a strongly Democratic state. They think this had more to do with politics than it sis with economics." MI UAW's Harlow on closing the MI plant: "We think President Bush got involved and cut some kind of a deal. ... It's his home state and they went along with moving it out there [with the free trade with Mexico." NBC's Bryant Gumbel: "You think [Bush] intervened?" Harlow: "Yes, definitely ... A lot of people do not know what the free trade in Mexico [agreement] is because President Bush won't open it up and let them see it" (2/25).

BUSH CAMPAIGN: NBC's Jim Miklaszewski: "Faced with another primary fight, Bush launched his [MD] campaign last night but set his sights just a few miles down the road, on the U.S. Congress. [WH] sources say Bush could force a constitutional test of a line-item veto, that he could veto parts of the Democrats' plan for a tax cut that he doesn't like." Bush from last night's MD rally: "It's a bad deal for the American people and true to form for the Democrats in Congress, their scheme will raise tax rate on the American people permanently." Miklaszewski: "Democrats say that is far from the truth." Sen. Maj. Leader Bob Mitchell: "I think he's panicked. His campaign is failing, he's presented an economic program which the country has rejected, which the Congress is in the process of rejecting." Miklaszewski: "But Bush is having tax troubles of his own. Pat Buchanan was turning up the heat in the South, reminding voters who broke his 'Read my

Lips' pledge. ... Today Bush takes his campaign to California where he barely beat Dukakis in '88 and this time the economy's in deep trouble. Some top Republicans predict Bush could lose this key electoral state this time around" (2/25).

***13 BUCHANAN: ENDORSED BY THE BAY STATE'S SHAMIE**

Ex-MA GOP chair Ray Shamie, who received "all kinds of fund-raising help" from the WH and Quayle, endorsed Buchanan. He made it on CNN, "thus assuring it would get a lot of bounce" (BOSTON HERALD, 2/25). Columnist Sandy Grady writes, "The Bush crew can't figure how to handle Buchanan's tirades. They appointed Quayle as counter-puncher. That's like matching Alfred E. Neuman against Attila the Hun. ... You can bet the other '96 Republican dreamers" -- Quayle, Gramm, Kemp -- "watch Buchanan's theatrics with irritation. Especially Quayle" (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 2/25).

TV: WASH. POST's Richard Cohen: "If any other candidate were running with these sort of views he'd be a fringe candidate and we'd all be laughing at him." ABC's Sam Donaldson: "I don't think reporters covering Pat Buchanan at all question him beyond saying 'Would you please tell us whether you think you're a bigot?' He says, 'I'm not a bigot.' 'Oh thank you very much Mr. Buchanan.' And they leave" ("Crossfire," CNN, 2/24).

***14 GOP SOUTH: PAT AND BAY MAKE WAVES**

GA (3/3): Buchanan "chewed on barbecue and sought out hard-core conservatives" in the N. GA hills, while Bush surrogates "tried to add some Southern discomfort to" his campaign (Smith, ATLANTA CONSTITUTION). Buchanan, already "outspending" Bush on TV ads, is "blanketing" GA with an ad accusing Bush "of backing out of a \$500 increase in tax credits for children." This prompted a letter from House Min. Whip Newt Gingrich (R-06), "who asked Mr. Buchanan to pull his latest TV ad off the air." But Buchanan replied: "It wasn't Pat Buchanan who traveled around the nation and said about a hundred times, 'Read my lips, no new taxes,' and then went south on us, so to speak." Though he called GA "our No. 1 contest state," he doesn't return to GA until 2/29. If he "fares poorly" in GA, aides admit the result is "likely to be replayed" in SC. At a school, one person asked Buchanan "if the Bible is the inerrant word of God." ("Inerrant" is "favored by Protestant fundamentalists," while Buchanan is a "staunch Roman Catholic"). Buchanan, "dodging the question slightly: "I believe the Bible indeed is the word of God. Yes." In a "sign that both candidates are looking at Georgia as a key battleground, the [WH] announced two more visits" by Quayle and an "overnighter" for Bush as the two "will spend nearly as much time" in GA as they did in NH (2/25). Buchanan pollster Frank Luntz said his survey showed many GA voters are "not aware of the results of the [NH] primary or of Mr. Buchanan's campaign," which just started its media ads (Holmes, N.Y. TIMES). Buchanan called GA the "New Hampshire of the South." Balto SUN's Paul West notes, since GA is an open primary, Buchanan can benefit from disaffected Dems (2/25). Forsyth Co. GOP chair Dan Wolf: "In a number of rural counties, he's going to draw a lot of support. His conservative message is playing well" (W. TIMES, 2/25). Buchanan "appears to be shifting to a populist stance," placing "less emphasis on voter anger over tough economic times, an issue that may be less effective in a state like Georgia where unemployment is not the problem it is" in NH (Holmes, N.Y. TIMES, 2/25). Buchanan on Duke urging his GA supporters to vote Buchanan: "I did not seek his endorsement, nor do I welcome it."

But L.A. TIMES' Ross notes Buchanan "will not renounce" Duke publicly, "saying only that he plans to deal with Duke by 'ignoring' him." He also said he "expected Bush to turn on him like a 'pit bull'" after NH. But he got the "pit puppy" -- Quayle -- instead (2/25). W. POST's Broder: "[Buchanan] will pick up support just by being [in GA] as a vehicle for those folks who don't like the Atlanta Republican hierarchy." CNN's Deborah Potter: "After spending the weekend almost everywhere but where he admitted he needed to be, Patrick Buchanan finally headed to [GA]. ... Buchanan is fighting back with a new [TV ad]. ... But his message may not be getting through" ("Inside Politics," CNN, 2/24).

SC (3/7): The "political version of 'he said, she said' continued" with Buchanan chair/sister Bay Buchanan "spurning" Bush co-chair/SC Gov. Carroll Campbell's apology at the So. Leadership Conference "for calling her brother an 'S.O.B.'": "(Campbell's) invitation, like his apology for name-calling, was never extended to me, or to Pat Buchanan, or to our office." Campbell's remark was made "in a private telephone conversation in the hotel press room within earshot of several reporters" (Hoover, GREENVILLE NEWS). Charleston POST & COURIER's Versola, on the Leadership Conf., writes GOP leaders "may have gotten the adrenalin shot needed to rev up the Bush-Quayle re-election campaign" (2/24). The Duke camp "promised a week-long offensive" before the primary, but aides said "they could not say when it would begin" as Duke is not due back until 3/5. SC chair Wm Carter: "He's working the (March 10) Super Tuesday states; I really think that some of that time ought to be invested here, but I don't make the schedule." Analysts say Duke "may be spreading himself too thin and failing to elevate his profile as a credible candidate." USC's Blease Graham: "Simply to skate around like that accentuates his political weakness." Duke pol. dir. Howie Farrell: "We didn't really launch a campaign until after [NH primary]. We wanted Buchanan to do well to see if people were going to realize that George Bush is unelectable, and they have." Duke scheduler Laura Otililio complains Duke has had a low profile "because the news media has not been reporting Duke's appearances" (Hoover, NEWS, 2/25). Duke "has all but missed the campaign" for the SC primary (Wick, NEWSDAY, 2/25). Bush benefits from the organization of Gov. Campbell. Long-time Campbell aide Warren Tompkins, who heads Bush's SC campaign with ex-SC GOP exec. dir. Tony Denny, said the strategy "will move to isolate and minimize potential Buchanan strength ... winning back the disaffected and independents, and leaving 'the anti-incumbent crowd, the 'we don't like anybody' folks' to the challenger." For Buchanan, SC "means organizing almost from scratch" (Hoover, NEWS, 2/23).

FL (3/10): Buchanan, to 300 supporters -- "many of them Cuban Americans" -- he said Fidel Castro "'would not survive' a Buchanan presidency" (Bartlett/Fiedler, MIAMI HERALD). But he "later told reporters he wouldn't intervene in Haiti to restore democracy, calling the military coup 'an internal affair'" (2/24). Buchanan to Bush supporters in Tallahassee: "Go back and ask the folks who sent you: Why are they afraid of Pat Buchanan? Why did they get me off the ballot in [SD] so I couldn't even run? Why did they keep me off the ballot in [NY] and cancel the primary against Pat Buchanan. ... If George Bush beats me in a clean, fair, straight fight, I will support the nominee of my part all the way to November" (Devroy/Dionne, W. POST, 2/25).

***15 MEDIA ROUND-UP**

According to the analyst Andrew Tyndall, of the Big Three networks ABC had most campaign coverage for the week 2/17-21: ABC had 35 minutes, NBC had 31 mins., and CBS had 26. Campaign '92 accounted for 29% of the Three's total editorial content for the week -- "the first time Campaign '92 has matched four-year-ago levels." For the same week four years ago, it was ABC 43, NBC 42, CBS 40. For the campaign to date (since Labor Day '91): CBS 159, NBC 132, ABC 117 ("Campaign Countdown," 2/23).

*17 ALABAMA: OPINIONS OF SHELBY STILL LARGELY UNFORMED

The CAPSTONE Poll, conducted 1/22-2/4, by the U. of AL, surveyed 464 adults; margin of error +/- 5%. Tested: Sen. Richard Shelby (D) who is up in '92, and Sen. Howell Heflin (D).

Shelby has "made few enemies" during his term, "but he also hasn't made a big impression on many Alabamians" (Hargrove, Birmingham POST-HERALD). Shelby: "That poll looks good for me.

... I've only been in one statewide race. Generally, you are going to see people who don't know me or haven't formed an opinion as to my tenure in the Senate. ... If I had a high negative rating, I'd have some trouble" (2/21). GOP challenger Richard Sellers called Shelby "very vulnerable": "Senator Denton was much more popular than Shelby in the Spring 1986 Capstone Poll, and he was defeated. ... These low numbers are really surprising since Shelby has spent over \$3 million" for franked mail since 1987 (Sellers release, 2/20).

*18 ALASKA: MURKOWSKI'S MISSING SOME IMPORTANT DATA

Sen. Frank Murkowski (R) reported contributions of nearly \$230,000 last year from people whose jobs, employers -- "and in some cases, even hometowns or states -- are not disclosed as called for" by FEC rules (Whitney, Anchorage DAILY NEWS). The lack of information makes it "virtually impossible" to determine the "special interests," if any, the donors represent. A Murkowski spokesperson said the senator "isn't trying" to keep his finances secret, "but that no special effort is planned to obtain" the missing information. FEC spokesperson Fred Eiland said they can't "enforce" the law because a '79 ruling provides if a campaign cmte "can prove it tried to get the information, it may submit reports without it." Center for Responsive Politics dir. Ellen Miller said it's not "uncommon" for information to be missing on about a third of contributors, but that 57% is "unusually high": "It appears this is a deliberate attempt to keep the public from knowing" (2/21). Dem challenger Tony Smith called it the "height of arrogance": "He's either embarrassed to tell Alaskans who is bankrolling his re-election or running one shoddy campaign" (Smith release, 2/21).

*19 ARIZONA: SPANGRUD AIMS FOR FELLOW VET MCCAIN

Ex-Air Force Gen. Truman Spangrud (D) officially entered the race against Sen. John McCain (R) saying "ethics in government will be a major" issue and "criticized" McCain for accepting contributions and trips from Charles Keating. He said that McCain "'betrayed Arizona's trust' but would have voters believe he showed nothing more than bad judgment." Spangrud also plans to stress tax equity, health care and "protecting women's fundamental right to choice." Other Dems: atty Walter Mybeck and law clerk Richard Sherzan (Tyler, ARIZONA REPUBLIC, 2/21).

***20' MARYLAND: CASSILLY GETS THE NOD**

Balto. SUN endorses Harford CO. State's Atty Joseph Cassilly in the GOP primary: "His views on many issues are more conservative than ours." He is an "internationalist, a believer in continuing to maintain an adequate defense in the new world environment and a non-protectionist." On health care, he "does not seem to know exactly what he wants, but he knows exactly what he does not want" -- "problems of federally managed health care." Cassilly is "the best of a good Republican field and is well qualified to give" Sen. Barbara Mikulski (D), "whom we endorse" for the Dem primary, "a stiff, substantive challenge" (2/23).

***21 NEW YORK: MRAZEK WINS CAUCUS STRAW POLL**

Rep. Bob Mrazek (D-03) won the support of central NY Dem leaders as their favorite to challenge Sen. Al D'Amato (R). In an informal straw poll, taken at a regional party caucus, 51.7% of 243 cmtemen voted for Mrazek, 25.9% favored ex-Rep. Geraldine Ferraro (D), 16.8 percent supported NY AG Bob Abrams (D) and 5.6% backed NYC Comptroller Elizabeth Holtzman (D). Rev. Al Sharpton received no votes (Craig, SYRACUSE HERALD AMERICAN, 2/23). Abrams charged the "mini-convention" was set up by Onondaga Co. Dem chair Edward Szczechesniak, a Mrazek supporter, to "give a distorted picture" of Mrazek's support (AP/NEWSDAY, 2/24).

BROTHER, CAN YOU SPARE \$10,000?: D'Amato's, faced with a \$417,706 bill from attys who defended him during his two-year ethics probe, is "asking his supporters to help" by donating to a trust fund he set up under Senate rules. Individuals and corporations can give up to \$10,000 to defray legal bills "relating to or arising by virtue of ... service in or to" the Senate. So far, no money has been raised. Holtzman "has been at the forefront of criticizing" the fund arrangement: "D'Amato might as well post a 'for sale' sign" (Lombardi, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 2/22). Meanwhile, Sharpton won access to the forums sponsored by the State Dem cmte. NY Dem chair John Marino, who barred Sharpton on the grounds he wasn't a "serious candidate," changed his stance after reconsideration by the Dem exec. cmte. N.Y. POST's Fredric Dicker examines D'Amato's "dream" ticket: Ferraro win the Dem line, Abrams stays on the Liberal Party line and Sharpton takes the New Alliance line (2/24). Syracuse POST-STANDARD's Jonathan Salant examines the PAC \$ and funding of the candidates (2/21).

***22 OREGON: THAR'S GOLD IN THAT RACE**

"A proposed open-pit gold mine" in Eastern OR "became an issue" as Rep. Les AuCoin (D-01) and Sen. Bob Packwood (R) faced off on the issue (Ota, Portland OREGONIAN). AuCoin "took a first shot ... by proposing to impose a new tax" on gold-mining chemical cyanide: "These mining practices don't cause environmental impact -- they cause wholesale environmental destruction." Packwood "said the proposal isn't needed because Oregon already has tough mining laws": "An unnecessary environmental scheme by [AuCoin] could destroy our chance to create more than 230 new, family wage jobs." Businessman Harry Lonsdale (D) spokesperson Kathy McShea "said she wanted to consider details of the proposal" (2/21).

***23 SOUTH CAROLINA: HOLLINGS "ATTACKED" AS ARROGANT**

Ex-Rep. Tommy Hartnett (R), "in his uphill battle" against Sen. Fritz Hollings (D), "lambasted" Hollings' for his "arrogance, his vote against the Persian Gulf war, his voting record and his failure to concern himself with South Carolinians except during

re-election years." Hartnett, who expects to get \$338,000 from the GOP, concedes he will be "greatly" outspent by Hollings but "hopes to ride a crest of voter dissatisfaction" into the Senate. Hollings has \$1.7 million "and can easily raise more." Other GOPer: Prof. Chas. Thompson (Dozier, Rockhill HERALD, 2/19). The spring primary will be set when redistricting is finished.

***24 SOUTH DAKOTA: DASCHLE STRONG AGAINST ALL COMERS**

The SD Poll, conducted 2/18-20 for the Sioux Falls ARGUS LEADER by Political Media Research, surveyed 823 likely voters; margin of error +/- 3.5%. Tested: Sen. Tom Daschle (D), declared opponent/ex-teacher Charlene Haar (R), Gov. George Mickelson (R), ex-Gov Bill Janklow (R) and state Rep. Jack Rentschler (R).

SD GOPers "have their work cut out for them if they expect to capture" Daschle's seat. Haar is unknown by 39% of the voters and Rentschler by 52% (Sioux Falls ARGUS LEADER, 2/24).

***25 WASHINGTON: "BROCK IN A HARD PLACE"**

SPOKESMAN-REVIEW & SPOKANE CHRONICLE's Jim Camden writes, "fiscally conservative" eastern WA voters and "socially liberal" women's groups -- are "crucial" to Sen. Brock Adams' (D) campaign, as he is "running very hard, very early" hoping these groups "will take a chance on him." While "conventional wisdom" says Eastern voters are GOPers, women's groups "acknowledge" he's "been there" for them, "taking the lead" on certain issues, but they have been "slow" to endorse. Spokane NOW pres. Leanne Blood, on the '87 "allegations" that Adams "molested" an ex-aide: "People are just a little unsure because of 'that incident.'" But consultant Cathy Allen says "women aren't assuming Adams is guilty. ... They're questioning whether he can win ... and they believe any of the [Dems] will be 'right' on their issues." Adams has spent \$180,000 on "one of the earliest" media blitzes "ever seen" in WA and says his low poll numbers are "a problem for all incumbents." He also blames a "lack of news coverage for [his] work." Manager Laura Altschull says he won't withdraw "even if the poll numbers don't rise" (2/23). Dems: Ex-Rep. Mike Lowry and state Sen. Patty Murray. GOP: State Sen. Leo Thorsness, King Co. exec. Tim Hill, Land Commis. Brian Boyle, Rep. Rod Chandler (R-08).
