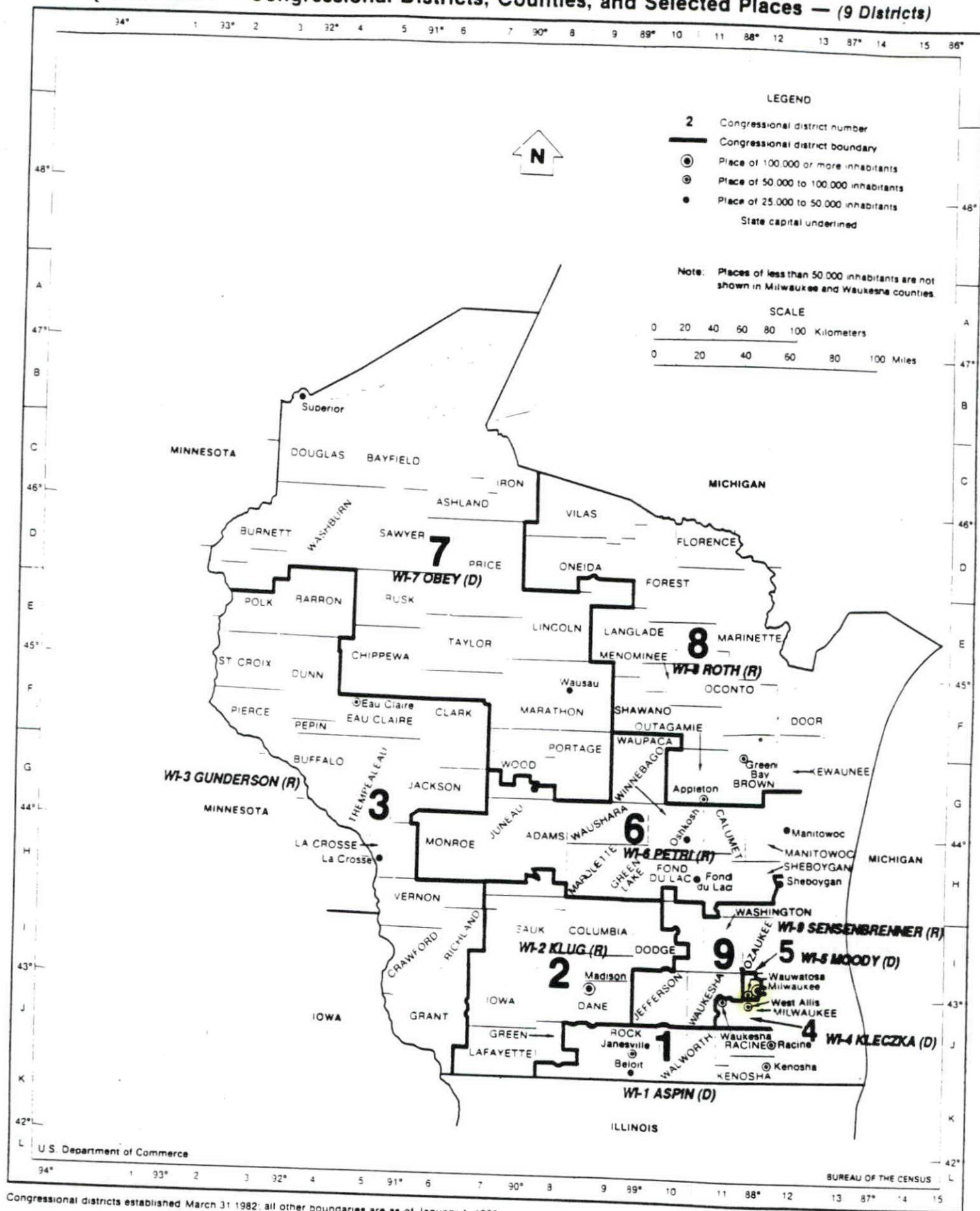

SUBJECT: WISCONSIN

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor Tommy Thompson forwarded a copy of a press release he did to mark the first anniversary of the victory in the Persian Gulf War. He also wrote with his support for your use of the partial veto authority.

Representative Susan B. Vergeront (R-Cedarburg) and Senator Donald K. Stitt (R-Port Washington) wrote on behalf of St. Mary's Elementary School requesting your thoughts on the Wisconsin school choice program and the voucher issue in general.

Representative Ben Brancel (R-Endeavor) wrote with his thoughts before endorsing you for a second term; he challenges you to have a consistent tax policy and a serious eye towards eliminating the federal deficit.

II. Discussion

A. Employment Rate

The unemployment rate for the state of Wisconsin was 5.8 percent for January. This figure is up from the December 1991 rate of 4.6 percent.

B. Wisconsin 2000

Governor Tommy Thompson (R) announced the kick-off of Wisconsin 2000 in November 1991. Since that time, communities across the state are coming on board with the strategy. There are already 70 America 2000 communities established in western Wisconsin. However, there appears to be no interest in establishing an America 2000 community in the Milwaukee area. Mayor John O. Norquist (D) has publicly announced his favor of choice in education and the implementation of a voucher system, but no community plan is in the works.

C. Environment

1. Milwaukee River

With Wisconsin's borders adjoining the waters of the Great Lakes, water issues are always of major concern. In the Milwaukee area, residents have joined with government agencies at all levels to attack the pollution problems on the Milwaukee River with major efforts aimed at reducing pollutants entering Lake Michigan. Special attention has concentrated on options to remediate contaminated sludge. The state and the Environmental Protection Agency have been heavily involved in this effort. EPA has put more than \$450 million toward construction of the "Deep Tunnel" sewer project, which is designed to reduce polluted stormwater runoff into the lake, which is the area's primary source of drinking water.

2. Great Lakes Quality Initiative

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is developing more stringent and consistent standards for use in permitting discharges across the Great Lakes Basin, in conjunction with surrounding states, environmental groups and industry. In December 1991, the eight Great Lakes states endorsed the final draft. Governor Tommy Thompson and other regional Governors, as well as industrial leaders, have since expressed concern to EPA about potential economic impacts of the Initiative. The draft rulemaking arising from the Initiative is scheduled to go out for public comment in late summer 1992.

EPA's 5-year Great Lakes strategy to restore and maintain the physical, biological and chemical integrity of the Lakes, focuses principally on the reductions of toxics loadings and the preservation and restoration of habitats. This strategy emphasizes pollution prevention, reduction of air deposition, clean-up of contaminated sediments, and control of run-off, in addition to traditional regulation of industrial and municipal pollution sources.

D. Drugs

1. Alliance for a Drug Free Wisconsin

In 1989, the Alliance for a Drug Free Wisconsin was created by the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Superintendent for Instruction in an effort to further enhance local community alcohol and drug abuse organization efforts. The state now has 71 members of

the State Alliance that are dealing with the alcohol and drug problems in their communities. The Alliance promotes grass roots efforts which stress community leadership and responsibility.

2. General

Cocaine is the drug of choice in the Milwaukee area. California and Texas are the primary sources for the cocaine. Crack and heroin are emerging on the streets of metropolitan areas. Marijuana is available to a limited extent. Although most of the marijuana is of Colombian or Mexican origin, numerous outdoor and indoor growing operations have been discovered. The state does, however, have an effective eradication program. Drug related murders set a record in 1990 and were even higher in 1991.

E. Prisons

As a result of a suit filed by the ACLU in 1990, Milwaukee is under court order to build a new prison by spring of 1993. The new prison will have 720 beds, compared with 459 beds in the current prison. Because of the overcrowding, those awaiting trial are being electronically monitored by the County Department of Corrections.

The Milwaukee House of Corrections has implemented drug testing for pre-trial defendants in order to examine the impact of drug testing combined with traditional monitoring for pre-trial rehabilitation.

F. Gambling

There are a number of Indian tribes in the state who are actively engaged in gambling activities. More than half of the tribes entered into compacts with the state pursuant to the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act permitting these activities. Many of the tribes that have not thus far entered into compacts are engaging in probably technically illegal gaming activities and are actively negotiating compacts.

A major disagreement between the state and the tribes is whether the Act has replaced the authority granted Wisconsin and several other states in 1953 by Public Law 280 to enforce their criminal laws on some or all of the Indian reservations within their borders. This

question is currently before the Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals.

G. Legislative Inactivity

Governor Tommy Thompson has recently had problems with getting the legislative branch in the state to act on his agenda. Wisconsin legislators are currently sitting on bills concerning education reform, welfare reform, juvenile justice reform, tougher drunk driving laws, abortion and gambling. The Governor has threatened a special session if the legislature fails to act on these issues by the end of the regular session.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

Wisconsin Republicans are bracing for another tough U.S. Senate battle with incumbent **Bob Kasten**. Kasten was elected in 1980 with just over 50% of the vote, and re-elected in 1986 with 51%. The 1986 race, which pitted Kasten against Democrat **Ed Garvey**, was one of the most negative Senate races in recent history. The Democrats consider Kasten one of the most vulnerable Republican U.S. Senators in 1992.

1992 finds Kasten in a somewhat stronger political position -- he is gaining seniority and is a member of Senate leadership (Secretary of the Republican Senate Conference). Democrats accuse Kasten of paying too little attention to the state, and charge that his conservative voting record is out of step with progressive Wisconsin.

Currently there are three Democrats who have declared their intention to challenge Kasten. Congressman **Jim Moody** (CD-5), State Senator **Russ Feingold**, and businessman **Joe Checota**. Moody is considered the early favorite because he ran in the Democrat primary for Senate in 1988, and because his seat on the powerful Ways and Means Committee is an advantage to fundraising. Feingold is the longshot -- with little money and low name recognition. Checota, a former Democrat state party chairman, can personally contribute a substantial amount of money to his campaign. Also, Checota has no record of public service to defend.

While Kasten has a tough challenge ahead, he should win. The race will cost approximately \$5-6 million, and to date, Kasten has over \$2 million cash-on-hand. Moody, the likely Democrat nominee, has a very liberal voting record that will not inspire

rural and suburban voters. Most experts agree that if Kasten works hard and spends a lot of time in Wisconsin, he should win.

Wisconsin's Presidential primary will be held on April 7, 1992. Because the date of the primary is "late" in the process, Wisconsin has received little attention. It is likely that your nomination for re-election will be secured before the primary takes place. Barring any major upsets in the Democrat nominating process, the primary will be largely inconsequential.

While Wisconsin has a tradition of supporting Democrats in Presidential elections, this year could be different. Governor **Tommy Thompson** (R) is considered one of Wisconsin's most popular incumbents in recent history, and U.S. Senator **Bob Kasten's** re-election campaign will increase voter participation in this year's election. Wisconsin has the strongest economy of any of the major midwest industrial states, and the lowest unemployment rate in the Great Lakes region. Governor Thompson has attracted a significant amount of economic development to the state over the past six years, and Wisconsin businesses enjoy a strong export market. In addition, Wisconsin's large agricultural base contributes to a well balanced economic profile. These factors should play well for your re-election strategy in Wisconsin.

Your re-election campaign is under the strong direction of Governor **Tommy Thompson**, who serves as General Chairman. **John MacIver** is the Wisconsin Bush-Quayle Chairman. MacIver was your 1980 and 1988 Wisconsin Chairman. U.S. Senator **Bob Kasten** is the campaign's Honorary Chairman. Lt. Governor **Scott McCallum**, State Treasurer **Cate Zeuske**, and Congressmen **Tim Petri**, **Jim Sensenbrenner**, **Steve Gunderson**, and **Toby Roth** are Honorary Co-Chairmen. **Fred Luber** is your Wisconsin Finance Chairman.

The 1988 BUSH-QUAYLE ticket was defeated in Wisconsin by a 51% to 47% margin.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Wisconsin will not gain or lose any Congressional seats in 1992. **David Opitz** was elected Republican Party Chairman in February, 1991. Opitz hopes to continue to build upon Governor Thompson's successes of 1990 and capture more seats in the State Legislature. Currently the balance is 14R - 19D in the State Senate, 42R - 57D in the State House. The main mission for 1992, is Senator Kasten's re-election and the Presidential election campaign.

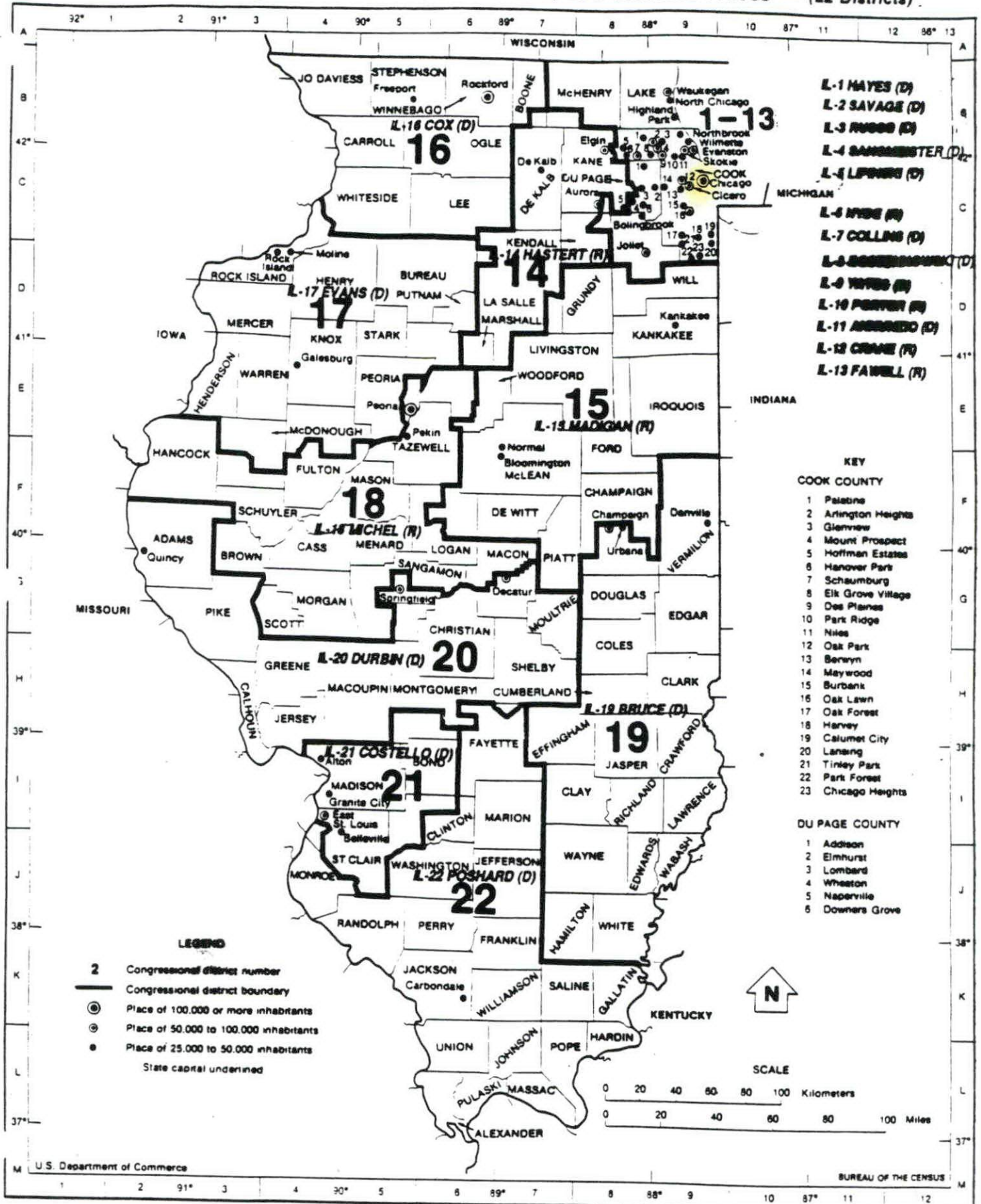

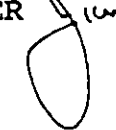

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor Jim Edgar (R) wrote requesting that the use of ethanol blended fuels in ozone nonattainment areas not be precluded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and that the guidelines for oxygenated fuels be expedited.

II. Discussion

A. Economy

The unemployment rate for the state of Illinois was 8.2 percent in January, down from a high of 9.1 percent in December 1991. The most recent figures for Chicago show 8.6 percent unemployment for December 1991.

B. Chicago Airport Site

On February 24, the 11-member Bi-State Committee tasked with searching for the site of a third Chicago airport has made its recommendation to the Federal Aviation Administration. The recommended site is in Lake Calumet, Chicago Mayor Daley's proposed site 14 miles southeast of downtown Chicago. This site poses a controversy focusing on massive residential and industrial relocation, and major waste site cleanup and wetland preservation issues.

The Lake Calumet airport is expected to cost approximately \$10.8 billion and provide 200,000 jobs. Part of the site straddles the Indiana border, and construction will displace 9,000 homes and businesses in both states.

C. Education

1. Illinois 2000

On February 11, Illinois 2000 was kicked-off in Chicago and Springfield. Prior to the kick-off, Governor Jim Edgar released a press announcement indicating his total support of a statewide America 2000 effort. Several organizations

have been instrumental in implementing the Illinois 2000 strategy. For example, the Illinois Chamber of Commerce and the Illinois Manufacturers Association have been working in conjunction with the President of the State Teachers Organization to ensure the success of the Illinois effort.

2. Chicago Schools Report Card

The annual report card on Chicago public schools showed that at least 77 percent of the system's elementary schools fell below state averages on the Goals Assessment Program tests in math and language arts, and about 92 percent of the high schools were below state averages in 11th grade reading and math scores. The poor results came as the Chicago school reform initiative, an effort to improve schools through greater parental and community participation, enters its third year.

D. Environment

1. Chemical Waste Management Incinerator

The Illinois Attorney General's Office announced in mid-February an investigation into allegations brought forth by Chemical Waste Management that some of its employees had tampered with labels on hazardous waste drums in the autumn of 1991. These allegations, in the wake of a February 13, 1991 explosion, has heightened public demands for permanent closure of the Chemical Waste Management hazardous waste incinerator in Chicago.

Following the explosion, the state and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency directed the facility not to operate until repairs were independently verified and major operational changes were made. The state's consent decree with Chemical Waste Management, including \$2 million in fines, allowed the company to resume burning hazardous waste during a rigorous trial period (August through November 1991). EPA gave Chemical Waste Management approval to burn PCB's, which are federally regulated, as part of the demonstration period. Failure of the company to complete the trial burns and other activities on schedule resulted in an additional \$1 million in penalties.

2. Clean Air Act

Ozone and air toxic provisions of the new Clean Air Act are very important in the Chicago area, which has a severe ozone nonattainment problem. In 1990, Illinois adopted an enhanced auto emissions testing program for the Chicago

area, under threat of federal sanctions. A \$13 million Lake Michigan Ozone Study gathered field data this summer, and results are expected by spring 1993. Study results will be used to develop control strategies, for inclusion in revised state air quality plans to be submitted to EPA by November 1994.

E. Drugs

1. Operation Clean Sweep

The Chicago Public Housing Authority began Operation Clean Sweep in September 1988 and has continued the program through a \$5.9 million grant from the HUD Drug Elimination Grant Program for Fiscal Year 1991. On a short-term basis, the program is geared at enhancing security and safety within Public Housing Authority units by police sweeps to remove drug dealers, drugs, and weapons from the developments. Residents are given identification cards, illegal tenants and those involved in illegal activities are removed, and maintenance improvements are made to the facility. The long-term program involves training Public Housing Authority police, creation of resident councils, and improving drug prevention and intervention programs.

2. Weed and Seed

Chicago has been selected to compete for a grant under the Weed and Seed initiative. The Weed and Seed initiative is an innovative, comprehensive and integrated multi-agency approach for controlling and preventing violent crime, drug abuse, and gang activity throughout the country. The aim of this program is to bring together all sectors of society--law enforcement, health and human service agencies, the private sector, and the community--to attack violent crime and to create an environment where crime cannot thrive.

F. Base Closure

Fort Sheridan, a U.S. Army installation of approximately 700 acres in the suburbs of Chicago, has been scheduled for closure. Various nearby communities have indicated that they would like to apply for the recreational facilities and lakeshore land under the Federal Surplus Property Act at a 100 percent discount. The Lake County Forest Preserve District has offered to pay \$10 million for approximately 250 acres and is seeking support from the Department of the Interior. The 250 acres include a golf course, ravines, beach, and bluffs along Lake Michigan. The Army contends that the property has to be sold at fair market value to offset the cost of the closure.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

Democrat incumbent U.S. Senator **Alan Dixon** is up for re-election in 1992. Dixon is a formidable opponent because of his strong financing and high popularity among Illinois' voters. However, Dixon faces serious problems from within his own party. Cook County Recorder of Deeds **Carol Mosley-Braun** and Chicago attorney **Al Hofeld**, both Democrats, are challenging Dixon in the Democrat primary. Braun and Hofeld believe that Dixon is out of touch with his Democrat constituents, and are portraying him as out of touch with Illinois' voters. Hofeld has spent a large amount of his own money attacking Dixon, and the Senator has responded in kind. Although Dixon is expected to win, the race will cost him precious campaign resources and credibility with voters.

As a result, former Reagan-Bush Administration official **Rich Williamson** has announced his candidacy for the seat, in the hope that a divided Democrat party will allow the opening for a successful Republican challenge. You, Governor Edgar, and Chief of Staff **Sam Skinner** have all committed to participate in fundraising events for Williamson. Governor Edgar will tap into his own political organization to help in the Williamson race.

Illinois will again be a key battleground in the 1992 Presidential election. No Republican has ever been elected President without Illinois' electoral votes (22 in 1992). Democrat Cook County controls 45% of the statewide vote, while the remaining percentage falls in the Chicago collar counties, Republican Chicago suburbs and downstate Illinois.

Republican challenger **Pat Buchanan** has vowed to carry his challenge to Illinois -- with a vengeance. Buchanan is expected to spend all of his campaign time between Illinois and Michigan over the next five days. Buchanan's Illinois organization is not particularly strong, but Illinois' high unemployment rate and sagging economy will bolster his message with disaffected voters. Buchanan will attempt to cut into your support in Republican rich DuPage County, as well as the Chicago collar counties -- which are predominately working class and blue collar.

The Presidential primary in Illinois will be held on March 17, 1992. You and **Pat Buchanan** qualified for the Republican primary ballot, but **David Duke** did not. Duke failed to gather the necessary signature petitions required by law.

On Sunday, March 1, 1992, Governor **Jim Edgar**, General Chairman of the Illinois BUSH-QUAYLE campaign, announced that all 102 Illinois Republican County Chairmen; all 80 Cook County Ward and Township Committeemen; all 74 Republican members of the Illinois General Assembly; and the 7 Republican Members of Congress from Illinois have endorsed your campaign for re-election.

Press conferences were held in eight locations throughout Illinois, including Chicago, to announce the unanimous, statewide endorsement of your candidacy. In Chicago, State Minority Senate Leader **Pate Philip**, Lieutenant Governor **Bob Kustra**, and Congressman **Henry Hyde** together released the statement to the press.

The elected officials and leaders of statewide Republican organizations will play an active role in coordinating BUSH-QUAYLE campaign activities throughout the state of Illinois. Governor **Jim Edgar** serves as the General Chairman of the Illinois BUSH-QUAYLE campaign, while Lieutenant Governor **Bob Kustra** and Secretary of State **George Ryan** are the Honorary Co-Chairmen. **Gene Reineke** is the State Executive Director for BUSH-QUAYLE '92.

For the Democrats, Illinois is shaping up to be a make-or-break state for Democrat **Paul Tsongas**. Tsongas' campaign has picked up momentum over the past month in Illinois, but Governor **Bill Clinton** holds a large financial and organizational advantage in this key state. Chicago Mayor **Rich Daley's** political operation is supporting Clinton, making Tsongas' task even more daunting. While Daley is officially neutral at this point, the message is clear that he will strongly support Clinton after the primary.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Illinois will lose two Congressional seats as a result of reapportionment. Republicans have been very successful in the redistricting process, forcing Democrats to merge a Congressional district in Chicago. As a result, Congressman **Frank Annunzio** announced that he will retire next year, avoiding a Democrat primary with Congressman **Dan Rostenkowski**. Downstate, freshman Republican Congressman **Tom Ewing** will likely face off against incumbent Democrat Congressman **George Sangemeister**. Ewing replaced Secretary of Agriculture **Ed Madigan**. Ewing's district was strengthened in the redistricting process, and he is expected to win in November.

STATE PARTY UPDATE

Albert Jourdan serves as the Chairman of the Illinois Republican Party. **Harold B. Smith** is the National Committeeman and **Mary Jo Arndt** is the National Committeewoman from Illinois. On February 28, 1992, the Illinois Republican State Central Committee unanimously endorsed your candidacy in the March 17 primary.

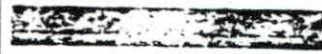

President Bush travels to Wisconsin and Illinois Monday, his pockets filled with more than half the delegates needed to win the GOP nomination. But simple arithmetic is not the motivating factor for the trip.... Bush's greatest challenge is the Democrats.

A Chicago Tribune poll, published Sunday, found an even split in a contest featuring Bush against Gov. Clinton or Paul Tsongas. A Detroit News poll contained more bad news for Bush. It showed Clinton would beat Bush in Michigan if the general election were held now. Clinton led Bush by 47-42 percent, with 11 percent undecided....

Meanwhile, the Detroit Free Press offered Bush a lukewarm endorsement, while Clinton walked away with the backing of nearly every labor group. The Free Press said its support for Bush "has more to do with the lack of a real choice in the Republican primary than any optimism about Mr. Bush's ability to grow in the job."...

GOP campaign officials acknowledge that visits by Bush to primary states have reached diminishing returns, with the President in some cases losing rather than gaining support after a campaign jaunt.

HOME OF REAGAN DEMOCRATS HOLDS TROUBLE FOR BUSH

Voters Voice Ire In Macomb County, Mich.

ROSEVILLE, MICH. -- Here among the white working- and lower-middle-class voters who fueled the Reagan revolution, the evidence of bitter discontent with the substance and style of the Bush Administration is extensive.... Here in Macomb County, widely viewed as a virtual hub of Democratic defectors, the wave of support for the Republican Party in presidential elections appears, for the moment, to have crested....

And, while there is evidence of anger with the GOP, it is by no means unanimous. "I used to be a Democrat," said Richard Powers, a retired gas company worker and union member. "When did I change? Reagan.... Democrats, well they always want to give too much away.... They want me to pay for someone who doesn't want to work, and I don't like that."...

One survey of Michigan voters found that discontent with the Bush Administration is higher than the state average among the roughly 12-14 percent of voters who are "Bush Democrats". Robert Kahle, senior research analyst at the Center for Urban Studies at Wayne State University, also found that half or more of the Bush Democrats plan to vote Democratic in November....

In what may, however, be the clearest danger sign for Bush as he struggles to restore support among Reagan-Bush Democrats, Macomb County's quintessential Democratic defector, state Sen. DiNello, plans to vote for the Democratic nominee for the first time in 16 years.

STERLING HEIGHTS, MICH. -- As the economy collapsed, George Rice had to lay off worker after worker at his tool-and-die factory here, until there was no one to run the machines but himself....

Despite all that, Rice is still not ready to turn to the Democrats this presidential year. He voted for President Bush in 1988 and is disappointed with his performance but said, "I don't think the Democratic Party has someone to fill the shoes that need filling."

Welcome to the battle for the votes of Macomb County -- home of so-called "Reagan Democrats."... Conversations with people across the county indicate that, with the right message, the Democrats can make inroads among voters. They complain that Bush seems to care only about foreign countries, not the U.S. economy. But, at the same time, Democratic candidates haven't made much of an impression.... "People here want three things: schools, roads and law enforcement," said John Hertel, vice chairman of the county board of commissioners. "And they don't want higher taxes," he added.

"I can guarantee you that." He declined to say whether he would form a third party after the 1992 elections or be a part of one....

The latest poll released by the Detroit News shows Buchanan capturing about a quarter of the vote in Tuesday's primary. But supporters are still hoping he can break 40 percent in a state whose mood the Detroit News and Free Press described Sunday as "light years beyond angry -- disgusted, detached and disillusioned is more like it."

U.S. INDUSTRY RECOVERING COMPETITIVENESS

TOKYO -- The industrial base of the U.S. has been revolutionized over the past decade, laying the basis for the nation to reclaim its competitive edge, the chairman of the U.S. Export-Import Bank said Monday.

John Macomber told a meeting of business leaders: "We have a long, long way to go. We only just have our noses above water. But the difference in the base today against 10 years ago is incredible."...

He said the U.S. exported \$540 billion last year, representing only 9 percent of the GNP, less than half the percentage of many European nations. But the U.S. share will grow steadily in the years ahead, he said....

Macomber also said he expected the linking of foreign aid to specific private-sector development projects to be eliminated within the next few years. He said that governments are working out definitions for aid that would separate it from commercial transaction. "This is a way to make sure that aid money stays in aid," he said. (Reuter)

WATER BILL PRECIPITATES CLASH IN CALIFORNIA

Sweeping federal legislation that would redistribute water in California's drought-scarred Central Valley and save endangered salmon at the expense of farmers has emerged as a key political issue in the recession-ridden state. President Bush scored points in agricultural communities this month with a carefully orchestrated announcement of emergency water allocation....

Now, as the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee prepares an omnibus water bill, Republicans see potential advantage in what has become a classic clash between environmentalists and agricultural interests.... "The issue pits the economy against the environment, which in California is normally a winner for the environment," said a Republican strategist close to the Bush campaign. "But with unemployment soaring and people worrying about the future, jobs may have the upper hand this year."...

The White House showed a very good understanding of what was needed in California," said Bob White, chief of staff for Gov. Wilson, who heads the Bush reelection campaign in California.

Ken Khachigian said the action was "good politics and good policy, not a home run but a respectable double. It shows a lot of political sophistication by the White House....

"It was clear that the White House heard the message of the Central Valley farmers and responded," said Steven Goldstein, spokesman for the Interior Department. "The power of incumbency is great, but George Bush cannot make it rain. During the month of February, it looked like God was a Republican."...

The potency of this message is shown by the response to Bush's announcement from Democrats in Congress. Rep. Fazio said the decision was "sound policy" but called Bush's involvement "pure political opportunism.... If he hadn't been in a campaign, you would never have heard his name."

ISRAELIS CHARGE 'SMEAR CAMPAIGN' DENY VIOLATIONS IN SALES OF U.S. ARMS

JERUSALEM -- Israeli political leaders Sunday reacted with alarm as the government's conflict with the Bush Administration spread from political issues to the military relationship between the two countries, and they charged that Israel is the victim of "slander" and a "smear campaign" in Washington.

Senior government spokesmen strongly denied any violations had taken place. Privately, some officials and independent experts conceded that Israel may have sold weapons or taken advantage of "gray areas" in agreements with the U.S. However, Israeli officials and news media described the new controversy in Washington over the weapons sale as part of a stepped-up effort by elements in and outside the Bush Administration to put pressure on the government of Prime Minister Shamir....

Officials also warned that the latest controversy may augur a far-reaching reshaping of U.S.-Israeli relations that could lead to the end of America's role as the chief guarantor and sponsor of Israel's military might. "This deliberate campaign, a slander against Israel, is intended to undermine Israel's position in the American public and Congress," government spokesman Benjamin Netanyahu told reporters....

Officials have said the government would be willing to allow U.S. inspectors to investigate these and other charges in Israel, and the newspaper Haaretz reported Sunday that a U.S. inspection team, headed by a State Department official and including experts from the Pentagon and Commerce department, is expected here this week. Israel Complains Of 'Slander' Campaign By U.S.

JERUSALEM -- Israeli leaders have accused the Bush Administration of engaging in a "deliberate campaign of slander" by leaking reports that Israel was illegally selling U.S. weapons technology to China, South Africa and other nations.

Some suggested the leaks were an attempt to erode the relationship between the two countries that has been hurt by friction connected with U.S. efforts to mediate the Middle East peace process. The reports were particularly embarrassing to Defense Minister Arens, who is on a weeklong trip to the U.S.

"We must get used to a situation in which we are faced with an Administration that is not supportive of Israeli policy," Health Minister Elmert said Sunday after the weekly Cabinet meeting....

Israel Radio quoted high-ranking but unnamed sources in the defense industry who said, "Elements in the Administration and the security industry in the United States have taken out a contract on us. Israel is a producer of weapon systems, some of which are even more advanced than the American ones. They see that Israel is succeeding in selling its products, and this makes them angry. (Jonathan Ferziger, UPI)

ISRAELIS STEP UP SKIRMISH WITH U.S.

JERUSALEM -- Israeli officials stepped up their attacks on the U.S. Monday over allegations that Israel had illegally resold American weapons technology to China, South Africa and other countries. At the same time, military experts here said the arms-sale charges suggest that the longstanding strategic relationship between the U.S. and Israel might be at an important turning point.

If so, the Middle East peace conference could be undermined, some of them warned, arguing that an Israel that doubts Washington's steadfastness would be much less likely to offer the Arabs concessions that might involve security risks.

JOINT CHIEFS VETOED SHIPMENT OF TOP MISSILE TO ISRAEL

The Joint Chiefs of Staff blocked a move during the Persian Gulf crisis to provide Israel with the United States' most advanced air-to-air missile because it feared the missile technology would be diverted to Third World customers, Bush Administration officials say.... An Israeli government official said Sunday that Israel is willing to permit a team of U.S. experts to inspect those Patriot batteries, but so far it has not received a formal request from the Bush Administration. "We have nothing to hide," the official said. "We are willing to cooperate and we want to resolve this as soon as possible."

One Administration official said that during the buildup of the allied forces in the fall of 1990, Israel requested a version of the Sidewinder missile called the AIM-9M. The 9M is considered the most advanced model.... The officials said the bid to provide Israel with the 9M was promoted by the office of Paul Wolfowitz, undersecretary of defense for policy.

U.S. CARRIER MOVES TOWARD IRAQ TARGETS

LONDON -- The U.S. stepped up its pressure on Saddam Hussein this weekend as the carrier USS America moved into position in the Gulf within striking range of targets across Iraq.

Details emerged of a CIA operation to undermine the Iraqi economy by flooding the country with counterfeit money. Pentagon planners preparing for "punitive strikes" against military sites have up-to-date intelligence reports from U.S. inspectors in Iraq.

President Bush's main concerns will be that any military action is strictly in line with U.N. resolutions on the destruction of Iraq's nuclear and missile arsenal. His decision to press ahead will depend also on estimates of civilian casualties. A massacre could reverse the support of regional allies and backfire on his U.S. presidential election campaign....

The CIA has been systematically swamping Iraq with forged dinars, the Iraqi currency, intelligence sources say.... CIA sources said the notes were smuggled in through Jordan, Iran and Turkey by agents and unsuspecting traders.... The CIA has picked up indications from Baghdad that the government is so worried that it is considering printing new notes to replace the denominations affected.

IRAQI ENVOY STANDS FIRM ON ARMS ISSUE

NEW YORK -- Iraqi Deputy Prime Minister Aziz said that while his government intends to cooperate with U.N. in destroying Iraq's existing weapons of mass destruction, Baghdad will not repudiate its right to be a major military power and to build such weapons in the future.

Aziz, speaking in an interview Saturday night, also declined to give assurances that U.N. teams charged with monitoring his country's activities and destroying its war-making capability could continue their work unimpeded. He said U.N. activities would be judged on a "case by case" basis.... Aziz said that Security Council members other than Britain and the U.S. now have a better understanding of Iraq's position and that it "enables both of us to have a better relationship."

Aziz, said he took "at face value" U.S. press reports of a covert \$30 million campaign to destabilize Saddam Hussein. But he laughingly dismissed the effort as involving only "worthless people" meeting to obtain funds from foreign powers. "Next year, we'll be here in the same place," he said of Saddam's regime....

According to a report in Britain's Sunday Telegraph, the CIA is flooding Iraq with fake dinars to undermine that country's economy, Reuter reported.

Iraqi Deputy Prime Minister Aziz arrived in Jordan Sunday, cutting short his U.N. visit. Iraq's delegation had planned to leave Monday, but delegation member Sadoun Alzubaidi said U.S. officials abruptly ordered most of Aziz's 15-member team to leave Saturday.... TALLY OF EX-SOVIETS' A-ARMS STIRS WORRY

Concern has been raised about unconfirmed reports that two or three tactical nuclear weapons are unaccounted for in the former Soviet republic of Kazakhstan, American officials said Sunday. But whether they are missing or are figments created by a bookkeeping error cannot be determined. If the weapons are actually missing, a senior Administration official said Sunday, it is feared that they could turn up in neighboring Iran, where they might be used to make a crude bomb....

The senior Administration official said that in the last several months two intelligence reports indicated that weapons thought to be in Kazakhstan or shipped to Russia for destruction were unaccounted for. A senior American intelligence officer said that as of late Friday there was still no convincing confirmation that the weapons were actually missing or that any weapons had turned up in Iran.

BUSH IS URGED TO SPEAK UP FOR RUSSIA

Worried that economic desperation could transform the former Soviet republics into hostile dictatorship, many Republicans in Congress have joined Democrats and former President Nixon in urging the Bush Administration to take the lead in backing billions of dollars more in aid to the republics....

This is going to require very aggressive leadership on the part of the President," said Rep. Obey. "I think the White House has been so rattled by Buchanan that they're bobbing and weaving on many issues, including this."...

Administration officials say that Secretary Brady has repeatedly called on Congress to vote \$12 billion to replenish the I.M.F. and that President Bush wrote to several members of Congress last year to seek support for such financing.

"Right now the Administration is looking at the whole aid picture toward Russia and the C.I.S. -- an in-depth look," said an Administration official who has followed the aid debate closely. "It's not being spurred by any criticism or suggestion. It's something that's been done off and on since the late of '91."

TOKYO -- North Korea had developed a trigger for a nuclear bomb more than a year ago but made no effort to test it in order to keep its atomic weapons program secret, the Japanese press reported Monday morning, quoting a Russian weekly....

If accurate, the report would advance the date Western and Japanese analysts had predicted that North Korea would be able to use a nuclear weapon. (Edward Neilan, Washington Times, A7)

PANEL SAYS ARMY BUNGLED 'FRIENDLY FIRE' NOTIFICATION

The Army, through a series of "bungles, glitches, errors and wrong assumptions," mishandled notifying the family of a soldier killed by "friendly fire" in the Persian Gulf War, according to a congressional study released Sunday.

The House Armed Services investigations subcommittee found no evidence of a conspiracy or coverup in the death of Army Cpl. Douglas Fielder, killed accidentally by his comrades' guns and posthumously promoted to sergeant. The family initially was told Fielder was killed by enemy fire.

"In this instance, virtually everything that could go wrong did go wrong," the panel said in its report....

In a statement, the Army, which is conducting its own review, said the panel's report "clearly indicates there was no intention on the part of the Army to cover up a friendly fire incident or mislead the family."

CAMPAIGN FUND-RAISING

NBC's Lisa Myers reports that in politics, money follows power. When President Bush decided it was time to build his campaign war chest last year, he raised a whopping \$10 million in only two months, a big chunk of it at this dinner in Houston.
(TV coverage: President Bush attending fund-raiser in Houston.)
An analysis by NBC News and USA Today shows that Bush, like many presidents, is raising a lot of money from fat cats. Last year, 76 percent of Bush's money came in \$1,000 contributions, while Patrick Buchanan got only 26 percent of his money from big givers. On the Democratic side, the favorite of fat cats was Gov. Clinton, who got 41 percent of his war chest in \$1,000 contributions, compared to 31 percent for Paul Tsongas. A close look at the campaign records of all the candidates also reveals that more than half the contributors are not disclosing their occupation or employer, as required by law.

Myers continues:

(Ellen Miller, Center for Responsive Politics: "The key tenet of campaign finance law is disclosure of who pays for campaigns and how much. And without the employer identification information, we really don't know who the individuals are who are supporting a particular campaign.")

Still, we can conclude one thing: With the possible exception of Jerry Brown, everyone is receiving money from special interests.

HOUSE BANK

Sawyer: Throughout the week, public outrage has been growing over the misuse of checking privileges in that special House of Representatives bank, with the news that some members have bounced hundreds of checks. Buried in its billings are thousands of dollars spent for parties, picnics, alcohol, sporting events, trips and employee bonuses. Those bonus charges are criticized in an EPA report and in Congress. The EPA admits to poor accounting, but says that will change.

(Chris Holmes, EPA assistant administrator: "If we have wasted millions of dollars, and if it's due to contractors being greedy, then we go after them and get it.")

Congress believes EPA's Superfund abuses are widespread. CH2M-Hill is the first contractor to be investigated, but there will be more.

ABC -- THIS WEEK WITH DAVID BRINKLEY

Moderator: David Brinkley. Panel: Sam Donaldson, George Will.
Guests: Reps. Gingrich, Foley, Cardin and Grandy.

On the House bank: With Gingrich.

Will: Since this town has been very quick when the Executive Branch people get into trouble to appoint a special prosecutor, do you think one ought to be appointed here and hound people into bankruptcy, as happens in the Executive Branch?

Gingrich: ...We either ought to abolish special prosecutor laws for everybody or we ought to apply them to the Congress....

Donaldson: ...I take it, if I understand you correctly, that you blame the Democratic leadership for allowing this to happen. But you absolve members like yourself -- you say you may have written 20 hot checks -- who didn't know what was going on. And I take it you mean you would absolve Democrats in the same condition?

Gingrich: Sure.... Let me draw a distinction.... I believe a lot of individual members, Democrat and Republican, individually are going to be embarrassed, many of whom were never notified by the bank, had no idea they had a problem and were shocked to discover later on. I think in that case, whether you're a Democrat or a Republican, that you should be absolved.... I believe that the institutional control of the House by the current Democratic leadership makes it impossible to reform the House....

Donaldson: ...Let me ask you about this cocaine scandal [in the House post office]. How much cocaine? Who is responsible? Do you blame Tom Foley for that also?

Gingrich: Well, Tom Foley knew about it for at least 10 months, did not tell anybody outside his own immediate office. The chief of police resigned in disgust because he was blocked from investigating.... I mean, at what point does the speaker take responsibility?

Donaldson: Wait a moment. You are telling me that you're charging that the speaker of the House of Representatives was part of a criminal cover-up of cocaine?

Gingrich: There is no question -- none. It's come out, and there is no question that Tom Foley's office sat on that information for 10 months, did not tell Bob Michel, did not tell anybody on the Republican side....

On the House bank: With Cardin and Grandy.

Will: Do you think...that a special prosecutor is in order?

Grandy: ...If there were to be a full investigation of the House from the post office to the bank to the gym, I would give it to the Ethics Committee and let them begin, because a special prosecutor now is basically a partisan trump card.

Cardin: ...I don't think I can sit still and listen to what Newt Gingrich had to say without at least making some comments. Our investigation was completely on a bipartisan basis, and the report of our committee points out very clearly that in the final analysis, the responsibility for what happened in the bank rests on those members who...wrote checks where they didn't have sufficient funds.

On the House bank: With Foley.

Foley: Today, [Gingrich] transferred the attack to me and said my office had held information for 10 months about problems inside the post office.... That is false and irresponsible.... This is not a partisan scandal any more than the House bank problems are a partisan problem. Richard Bond said last week this is a bipartisan problem. It's been approached on a bipartisan basis by almost everybody except Mr. Gingrich and some others -- Mr. Guy Vander Jagt, who is in charge of trying to win seats for the Republicans in the House -- and they're desperately trying to make a political issue.

Will: ...Explain to the country...why a special prosecutor is appropriate for Ed Meese and not appropriate for the House?

Foley: Because in the special prosecutor, we don't have authority in the Congress to conduct criminal operations. Those are in the Executive Branch. The idea of the special prosecutor was that the attorney general...shouldn't be charged with investigating in criminal ways one of his own party. There is no problem with the attorney general prosecuting any matter of misconduct among employees or other people in the Congress.

POLITICAL DISCUSSION

On foreign policy: Bob Maynard joins the panel.

Brinkley: Is Mr. Bush afraid now to mess with foreign policy?

Will: Mr. Bush is frightened of Pat Buchanan and frightened of polls and frightened of this, that and the other thing. And he's blotting, therefore, the one page in his copy book not yet blotted, and that is his foreign policy record.

Donaldson: ...Mr. Nixon says we should do more, and that's one of the very few points on which I agree with him. But it's curious that, even as he said that, we were discovering that the Russians had gotten through the winter....

Maynard: ...The point is that this President has an opportunity to lead in this area and that is what Mr. Nixon was referring to as the failure of leadership. But Buchanan has already demonstrated the President without conviction, and that is the main problem.

NBC -- MEET THE PRESS

Moderator: Tim Russert. **Panel:** David Broder, John Chancellor.
Guest: Paul Tsongas.

Broder: What's the evidence that your approach would work?

Tsongas: Well, the capital gains tax cut has been tried, and what George Bush has said, basically, he says, "You get a capital gains tax cut no matter what you invest in." So if you invest in real estate, if you invest in art collections, you invest in racehorses, you get a tax credit that has nothing to do with what's going on in terms of competing, No. 1. So all of mine goes into securities, which is where the manufacturing base is. No. 2, if you are a speculator, I charge you a higher rate.

Chancellor: ...Let me take you onto another contentious issue here -- abortion. You told the Chicago Sun-Times editorial board that, if elected, you would have your choices for seats on the Supreme Court...pass a litmus test. They would have to support abortion rights, or you wouldn't nominate them.

Tsongas: ...In normal situations, you would say, "No litmus test for the Supreme Court." But you now have a Bush-Reagan Supreme Court.... I'm strongly pro-choice, and you can certainly -- within that framework, there are thousands of well-qualified people.

Russert: ...Is Bill Clinton electable?

Tsongas: Well, Bob Kerrey said he wasn't. I have serious doubts about that.... I will support Bill Clinton if he's the nominee....

Russert: Will you accept the vice presidency?

Tsongas: No.

POLITICAL DISCUSSION

Broder: ...[The Bush campaign is] so eager to be done with this Buchanan challenge, and I think it may be just about to wind down. Michigan and Illinois may be virtually the last round for Pat Buchanan and then George Bush, who has handled Buchanan about as badly as you could imagine any president handling a challenger, could finally get back onto his message.

Chancellor: ...I think the economy has hurt Bush easily as much as Buchanan has. I find fascinating that the Chicago Tribune in a poll out here just this week found that Ronald Reagan's negatives in the state of Illinois -- a state he carried twice in presidential elections -- his negative rating is now 50 percent. His positive rating is 36 percent. People have turned against Ronald Reagan? Is nothing sacred? Is the bloom off this particular rose? And what does this mean for the fall? I would think that would be terrible news for the Republicans in the fall.

CBS -- FACE THE NATION

Moderator: Bob Schieffer. **Guests:** Jerry Brown, James Gannon, Jon Margolis.

On the campaign: With Brown.

Schieffer: Let me ask you about your value-added tax....

Brown: ...This tax will add not one penny to the economy, because unlike all other proposals, it only replaces taxes. We don't add any new tax except as we take one away. And the value-added tax hits business.

Schieffer: ...What about food? Would your value-added tax, in effect, put a federal tax on food, or is that exempted?

Brown: It would cover all corporations. And just as today, food companies -- whether they're General Mills or Kellogg's or anyone else -- pay a corporate tax of 35 percent. We eliminate that tax and we put a straight 13 percent tax on all businesses, whatever they are.

Schieffer: ... Does it put a tax on medicine?

Brown: It puts a tax on no product. It puts a tax on the billion-dollar companies as well as every other company.

On the campaign: With Gannon and Margolis.

Margolis: We can see now from apparently a new national poll plus the Chicago Tribune poll this morning based just on Illinois, is that Bill Clinton is competitive with George Bush. Now, this may say more about Bush's problems than about Clinton's strengths, but I think that nobody knows what may happen or what may come out, if there's anything else, any other damaging information about Bill Clinton or about President Bush or anyone else that can come out. On the basis of what we know now, we have two vulnerable but also solid, impressive candidates for the fall.

Schieffer: Do you think at this point that George Bush could carry Michigan?

Gannon: At this point, it would be a very close race. Our poll this morning shows Clinton in a test race as the November nominee as slightly ahead of Bush, but close enough so that it would be a tight race. If the economy stays as bad as it is in Michigan, I think it'll be very hard for Bush to carry Michigan again as he did in 1988.

Margolis: ...Our poll showed it pretty even with Bush against either Tsongas or Clinton.

THE McLAUGHLIN GROUP

Moderator: John McLaughlin. **Panel:** Fred Barnes, Eleanor Clift, Jack Germond, Morton Kondracke.

On the House bank:

McLaughlin: How serious is this scandal?

Barnes: It is very serious. This is dynamite, it's explosive.... You finally have a scandal that people understand and you will transfer the disgust against Congress institutionally now to the local member of Congress.... But it depends on mainly what the Republicans do, what the National Republican Congressional Campaign Committee does. If they decide to use this issue, if they make a calculation that, "Look, we're going to lose some members, but we can knock off a lot more Democrats and net 20, 30 seats and go with generic ads across the country, pounding on this thing," then they can win many, many seats.

Clift: This is the killing fields on Capitol Hill, and you will have at least 100 new faces after next year's election.... This is better than term limits. This is accomplishing what the people want, finally.

Kondracke: ...This thing is a bit of a phony story. You act as though this was Teapot Dome and Watergate and the S&L crisis.... It is not the fundamental, deep-seated corruption problem that it's being represented as.

On the campaign:

McLaughlin: Buchanan is telling George Bush in no uncertain terms that if Bush wants Pat out, Bond must go. Will Buchanan get his way?

Kondracke: ...They are not going to throw out Rich Bond, because Rich Bond is the closest thing to Lee Atwater that there is left in this entire Republican Party. He is the only guy who's tough, and the rest of them are simply white bread.

Germond: Pat Buchanan has no notion in his head at all that Rich Bond is going to be thrown out. That is baloney. He understand's the President puts in the national chairman....

Clift: ...[Buchanan] will work out an accommodation if he wants to run for president in the future. You can't do that if you don't back the ticket. So he's going to, in the end, be a good boy and come around.

On Nixon and Russia:

Kondracke: [Nixon] undercut the Buchanan "America First" platform. But nobody is paying any attention to what Nixon does on a carom shot to Buchanan. They care about what he did directly to George Bush. There were people in the White House who suggested that Bush come back with a speech announcing a major initiative to the former Soviet Union. He didn't do it, and they're wandering around in the White House -- they don't know what to do.

Barnes: Nixon -- on that point of aid to Russia -- was absolutely right. They are letting an opportunity pass.

On campaign ads: [Bush's "Buchanan/Mercedes" ad, Buchanan's "Bush Aides/Foreign Agents" ad are shown]

Barnes: I think the Bush ad is better because Pat is trying to attract blue-collar Democratic voters into the Republican primary, and this is going to [inaudible].

Germond: ...Think a minute about who's going to vote in the Republican primary in Michigan. It is not primarily autoworkers. It's a lot of white folks in the suburbs and the small towns in western Michigan, and they are not going to be as exorcised about that car because a lot of them drive one themselves. I think it's a good ad and I think it hurts them.... I think Buchanan peaked in New Hampshire.... I think if he doesn't get 40 percent here -- and he probably won't -- he'll leave the race.

Barnes: ...He can stay until California, but not if he's hammering away at Bush. He'll have to quiet that down some.

PREDICTIONS

Barnes: President Bush wants to fire back at Democrats when the deadline on a tax bill runs out.... He's considering unilaterally imposing indexing capital gains and having a line-item veto. But he'll chicken out and do neither one. The attorney general, Bill Barr, weighed in and said it would be illegal to do it.

Clift: A member of the Bush Cabinet is among the most egregious check-bouncing [inaudible].

McLaughlin: The next prime minister of Israel will be Yitzhak Rabin.

INSIDE WASHINGTON

Moderator: Gordon Peterson. Panel: Charles Krauthammer, Carl Rowan, Juan Williams, Nina Totenberg.

On the House bank:

Williams: ...The real issue here is emotional. It's the idea that somehow, someone is living a lifestyle as if they were a king or a noble in a democracy....

Totenberg: I think this has become something of a metaphor for the distemper of the country. It has no real merit as a really good scandal. There is no public money involved.... It was a lousily run bank, and that's stupid and somebody probably ought to pay for that, but it's not major. But this somehow resonates because the public is so fed up and feeling so cheated....

Krauthammer: It resonates, but it is a Mickey Mouse issue....

Williams: President Bush is going to make good use of this.... He's going to use it when it comes to this tax discussion, to say, "Look, this is the Congress that won't do anything to spur our national economy, but they sure know how to do something to line their own pockets."

On the campaign:

Krauthammer: ...[Buchanan's campaign] is really a candidacy in decline, and I think he's not going to last.

Williams: ...I think the problem with Buchanan is that they don't have any leverage on this guy. Everybody can take their shots, but Buchanan is going to stay in and he's going to have some influence in '96.

On Nixon and Russia:

Krauthammer: ...The Administration is letting an incredible opportunity slide right through its fingers. If we don't help Yeltsin now, we will have a Russia which is going to be aggressive and is going to make our peace dividend disappear. And I think Nixon has done a service in bringing this issue to really strong public attention.

Rowan: ...I understand what's going on: Everything bends to politics in a presidential election year. And they aren't talking about it because they know that much of the American public is saying we can't afford this, we've got to do it for our schools, we've got to have some health plans and so forth. So what you've got are some chicken politicians who don't really want to face up to this Soviet challenge.

Totenberg: ...There really is a consensus on Capitol Hill now to give some serious aid to the Soviet Union. You talk to senators and congressmen and they're scratching their heads as to why the Bush Administration isn't even really pushing hard for the aid that it's asking for.

Williams: ...The point is the leadership has been there when it comes to foreign policy. No one is attacking George Bush as being inept in foreign policy. That attack has come that he hasn't been doing enough at home, and that was his weak point going into the Republican primary.

Rowan: ...I'm for helping the Soviet Union. But I'm not for this weeny-meeny notion in the Pentagon -- this arrogance -- that we're going to fix the world so we remain the only superpower. I don't want them spending billions of dollars to defend Japan and Germany out of some fear that if we let them spend the money to defend themselves, they'll become superpowers and some great threat to us.

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This Week In Congress

The legislative pace on Capitol Hill quickens this week as lawmakers work to complete action on a major economic stimulus measure that includes a variety of tax breaks for the middle-class and business.

Partisan differences in Congress will make it difficult to reach quick agreement on the package, which has passed both the House and Senate and which must be reconciled by negotiators from the two chambers.

Members would like to clear the bill in time to place it on the president's desk by Friday — the March 20 deadline President Bush challenged Congress to meet. But it is likely that the president would veto whatever measure Congress sends to him.

More on what is planned for the week follows.

Tax Bill

Both the House and Senate will attempt to finish work on the tax bill (HR 4210) this week prior to Friday's deadline for action, which was set by President Bush in his Jan. 28 State of the Union address.

The deadline has no legal weight, but in an election year Congress is feeling added pressure to send the president some sort of economic package, even if it is a bill Bush might veto.

As passed by the House, the tax bill would raise taxes on individuals with taxable income of more than \$85,000 and on joint filers making over \$145,000 and give a temporary, two-year tax cut to middle-class taxpayers — providing tax credits worth up to \$400 for joint filers and \$200 for individuals.

The Senate plan includes a health-care package that would provide 100 percent deductibility of health-care costs for the self-employed, caps on annual increases in premiums and minimum health-care standards for small businesses.

Senate Floor Action

Crime Bill. The Senate will vote midweek on a motion to limit debate on

the conference report to the crime bill (HR 3371). Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, said the vote would be scheduled for either Wednesday or Thursday.

Backers of the measure hold out little hope that they can win the 60 votes needed to invoke cloture. (*Details, see box on p.2*)

China MFN Veto. The Senate may also attempt to override President Bush's veto of legislation (HR 2212) that would place conditions on the continuation of normal trade ties with China.

The House last week voted to override the veto by a wide margin, 357-61. But most observers believe the Senate will sustain the veto, keeping President Bush's perfect veto record intact at 26. The Senate passed the measure by just 59-39, far short of the two-thirds that would be needed to override.

The bill would require the president to certify that China has made progress in its human rights, trade and weapons sales practices before most-favored-nation trading status could be renewed later this year.

Public Broadcasting. The Senate may also return to consideration of legislation (S 1504) that would authorize funds for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, which dispenses grants to public television and radio networks.

Work on the bill was halted March 4 when Republicans threatened to amend the bill with the president's crime package.

House Floor Action

Budget 'Walls.' The House may take up legislation (HR 3732) that would tear down the barriers in the 1990 budget law that prohibit the shift of funds among three categories of spending — defense, international affairs and domestic.

Democrats want to remove the "firewalls" to permit money saved by cuts in defense spending to be used for

Last Week

The House voted to override President Bush's veto of a China trade bill and the Senate passed a tax measure supporters say will give a much-needed lift to the economy, but the unfolding House bank check-cashing scandal dominated attention on Capitol Hill last week.

After the strength of the public outcry — fueled by House Republicans — made it obvious that no other action was possible, the House Democratic leadership agreed that the names of all 355 current and former members who floated checks should be publicly disclosed.

While the scandal overshadowed legislative work, House committees approved bills that would map out a national energy strategy and inject an additional \$25 billion into the savings and loan cleanup.

House Floor Action

Check Scandal. In a session that began Thursday morning and ended at 2:50 a.m. Friday, the House approved two resolutions setting the stage for the release of the names of the 355 current and former members who the General Accounting Office said cashed at least one bad check at the House bank.

In doing so, the House essentially rejected the recommendation of the ethics committee that only the 24 worst abusers should be named. House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., tried to stick by the ethics report but abandoned that effort after public pressure grew.

The House voted, 391-36, to approve a resolution (H Res 393) incorporating the ethics report, which will release the names of the 24 members in about 10 days. Members also voted, 426-0, to approve another resolution (H Res 396) that will lead to the release of the rest of the names about 10 days later.

The House then voted, 244-133, to instruct the ethics committee to recon-

new domestic initiatives.

The 1990 budget law does not permit such shifts until fiscal 1994.

Service Pay. The House on Tuesday will consider a bill (HR 3209) that would compensate federal and Postal Service employees who served in the Persian Gulf War for income lost during their service. The bill would authorize payments to make up for the difference between the workers' government salaries and their military pay.

The measure would also allow the 17,000 federal and postal employees called to active duty to make up back contributions to the Thrift Savings Plan,

a federal retirement program.

Democratic Bicentennial. Also on the House schedule is S 2047, which would establish a commission to commemorate the bicentennial of the Democratic Party, which comes later this year.

Committee Action

Water Projects. The Senate Energy Committee on Wednesday will continue its markup of a wide-ranging water projects bill (HR 429) that would set federal policy for delivery of water to Western states and authorize funding for dozens of projects in the Interior Department's Bureau of Reclamation.

Panel members last week informally agreed to include a reauthorization for

the huge Central Utah Project, designed to provide additional water to populated areas of Utah.

Members may also consider proposals to revamp California's largest water project, the Central Valley Project. A compromise amendment may be offered to authorize the sale of water to consumers outside the project.

Foreign Aid. The Senate Foreign Operations Appropriations Subcommittee on Tuesday meets to mark up a fiscal 1992 foreign operations spending bill (HR 2621), the last of the regular spending bills for the current fiscal year.

Currently, fiscal 1992 foreign aid is being funded through a temporary \$14.3 billion continuing resolution (PL 102-

Habeas, Gun Purchase Provisions Threaten Crime Bill

Divisions between Democrats and Republicans are making it more and more unlikely that Congress will clear a comprehensive anti-crime measure this year.

With the Senate scheduled to vote this week on whether to cut off a Republican filibuster that is blocking consideration of the conference report on HR 3371, supporters have all but conceded that they do not have the 60 votes needed to invoke cloture.

The issues are not new: the most controversial provisions in the bill were dropped from a 1990 bill that became law (PL 101-647). And the debate continues to be characterized by obstinacy on both sides.

HR 3371 comes to the Senate floor after a three-month hiatus after Republicans were able to block action on the bill in the closing days of the 1991 session.

Last year, both chambers passed comprehensive bills, with the Senate measure more to the liking of Republicans due to its tougher habeas provisions. But negotiators produced a conference report on HR 3371 that angered most GOP members, who accused the Democrats of an unwillingness to compromise.

The House adopted the conference report last Nov. 27, but by the small margin of 205-203. In the Senate, on the same day, a vote to cut off debate on the measure got only 49 votes, well short of the 60 required.

The bill would expand the federal death penalty to cover 50 crimes, including terrorism and large-scale drug trafficking, require a five-day waiting period for the purchase of a handgun and ease standards on the admissibility in court of evidence seized illegally but in good faith by the police.

The measure would also place limitations on the right of death row inmates to file petitions for habeas corpus to challenge the constitutionality of their sentences. This issue has proved to be the most controversial aspect of the crime debate. Republicans have labeled the habeas provisions — which limit inmates to one petition — weak and "pro-criminal." Instead, most Republicans seek to prohibit habeas petitions if a federal court determines that the inmate received a "full and fair" trial at the state court level.

Battle Rejoined

This year, the battle was reignited after Sen. Phil Gramm and other Republicans announced on March 3 that they would try, at least once a week, to attach the administration's crime proposal (S 2305) — newly introduced by Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C. — to some measure before the Senate.

True to his word, Gramm on the following day announced

his intention to tack the crime package on to the legislation then pending — a public broadcasting reauthorization bill (S 1504).

That prompted Mitchell to put aside the broadcasting bill and bring up the stalled 1991 crime measure, which was much more to the Democrats' liking.

The promised Republican filibuster that followed eventually led to an agreement on March 5 to schedule a cloture vote after the Senate finished its work on the tax bill (HR 4210).

Staffers from both parties say Democrats have enough votes to pass the bill. But they are four or five votes shy of the 60 needed to invoke cloture, according to a Senate Democratic aide.

But even if cloture were invoked and the bill cleared, bill backers would probably not have the necessary two-thirds vote in either chamber to override a promised presidential veto.

This leaves both sides in a standoff. According to a Senate Republican staffer, Gramm and Thurmond plan to offer the president's crime package as an amendment to "virtually every bill that comes before the Senate."

Republicans say that this strategy, coupled with their filibuster tactics, could eventually lead to an informal meeting of the conferees. The hope is that both sides could then work out a new compromise on habeas corpus that would be quickly introduced and passed by the House and Senate. Their hope is that the desire to pass a crime bill before the November election will work in favor of a compromise.

Democrats are less optimistic and say that some Republicans are using the habeas issue to hide behind their real problem with the legislation: the five-day waiting period for handgun purchases.

Senate Judiciary Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., on March 4 called on his Republican colleagues to "stand up and say this is about guns." Biden went on to propose dropping the habeas corpus provisions from the bill hoping that would ferret out those who oppose the bill because of the gun control provision.

According to one Senate Democratic staffer, even if a bill with tougher habeas corpus provisions could be worked out, it would be unlikely to pass the House. There, the Democratic leadership last year had trouble marshaling enough votes from liberals, who did not like the measure's death penalty expansion and new habeas corpus provisions.

Another Senate Democratic staffer, referring to the bill now before the Senate, put it this way: "No comprehensive crime bill will get through this time unless it's this one."

Subcommittee Chairman Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., and ranking Republican Bob Kasten, Wis., reached an agreement last week on a proposal that would provide Israel with some U.S. loan guarantees.

Without giving details, Leahy said that the proposal would be similar to a plan he proposed last month that would provide Israel with up to \$2 billion in guarantees each year for five years — Israel's full request.

Under the plan, the president would have the right to suspend the aid if Israel continues expanding settlements in the Israeli-occupied territories.

Hatch Act. The Senate Governmental Affairs Committee on Tuesday will mark up legislation that would ease restrictions in the 1939 Hatch Act that bar federal workers from engaging in certain types of political activity.

The measure (S 914) would allow federal employees to work on campaigns, hold positions in political parties and run for nonpartisan offices such as a position on a local school board.

Education Research. Legislation (S 1275) that would reauthorize the Office of Educational Research and Improvement for fiscal 1993-99 will be marked up by the Senate Labor Committee on Wednesday.

The office, which helps translate the latest educational research into more practical applications in the classroom, would receive a \$300 million authorization in fiscal 1993.

The measure would also authorize the National Assessment of Educational Progress to conduct trial tests on grade school students in math, reading and science.

Montana Compact. The Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs on Wednesday will mark up legislation (S 1602) that would ratify a compact between the state of Montana and the Assiniboine and Sioux Indian tribes of the Fort Peck Reservation.

Pesticide Ban. Legislation (HR 2083) that would prohibit the export from the U.S. of banned or unapproved pesticides will be marked up by the House Foreign Affairs Committee's Subcommittee on International Economic Policy on Thursday.

Supporters of such a prohibition have long complained that American companies sell banned pesticides to foreign countries that, in turn, use them on foods that are exported to the United States.

Technical Education. The Science Subcommittee of the full House Science, Space and Technology Committee on Wednesday will mark up a bill (HR 2936) that would establish programs at the National Science Foundation for technical

education and training in advanced technology occupations.

The bill would authorize \$35 million each for fiscal 1992 and 1993 for the programs, which are intended to strengthen math and science instruction at two-year colleges.

Executive Branch Ethics. The House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee on Human Resources on Thursday will take up a bill (HR 2828) that would remove the current authorization ceiling of \$5 million for the executive branch's Office of Government Ethics.

The bill would amend the Ethics in Government Act of 1978 to allow Congress to authorize as much money as it deems necessary for the office for each fiscal year through 1994.

The administration had requested that the funding ceiling be lifted.

The Office of Government Ethics sets guidelines and issues advisory opinions on conflict-of-interest matters and monitors each federal agency's ethics program.

Energy Policy. Two House Science subcommittees will mark up draft energy legislation.

The Environment panel will consider the measure on Wednesday; the Energy panel will take it up on Thursday.

The draft was written for the research, development and demonstration portions of the national energy strategy bill (HR 776) approved last week by the Energy and Commerce panel.

The draft includes a five-year authorization for broad program areas focusing on promoting energy efficiency, reducing oil imports, containing environmental accidents and increasing international competitiveness. ■

Incumbents Square Off in Illinois Voting

At least two Democratic incumbents will taste defeat tomorrow in the Illinois congressional primaries, the week's only contests for House and Senate nominations.

That's because Illinois lost two House seats to reapportionment and the remap plan adopted last fall left incumbents Marty Russo and William O. Lipinski squaring off in the newly drawn 3rd District and Terry L. Bruce and Glenn Poshard fighting for survival in the 19th District.

The Illinois races have been some of the most closely watched and anticipated in the country, not just because of the showdown between incumbents but because they may give clues to whether the anti-incumbent mood among voters will translate into election day upsets.

The Russo-Lipinski race has been a classic example of the importance of local politics. Russo, a protégé of fellow Chicagoan Dan Rostenkowski, the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, has a higher Washington profile, but Lipinski has used his local ties to forge ahead in the race.

A Chicago Tribune poll taken a few weeks ago found that Lipinski was beating Russo 47-31 percent, with a third candidate in the single digits and 18 percent undecided.

In the race for the 19th District Democratic nomination, Bruce and Poshard chose different political strategies, although each has claimed to be better at bringing federal spending to the state. Bruce has portrayed himself as an insider on the rise, while Poshard calls himself a "citizen legislator" who does not accept political action committee contributions.

In another competitive contest, incumbent Gus Savage, D, for the third time will face educator Mel Reynolds, who received 43 percent of the primary vote in 1990. Redistricting offered Reynolds hope because it included more affluent suburban areas in the the 2nd District.

Reynolds suffered minor injuries on Thursday when a campaign car he was in was shot at and he was cut by glass.

In other races tomorrow, Rostenkowski is facing a primary challenge for the 5th District from Dick Simpson, a former Chicago alderman who has portrayed the long-time House member as an example of what is wrong with Washington. Democrat Charles A. Hayes is being tested by Chicago Alderman Bobby L. Rush, the number-two man of the Illinois Democratic Party.

The race for the newly created Hispanic majority 4th District is between a current and a former Chicago alderman. Current Alderman Luis V. Gutierrez has the support of the city's strong Democratic organization in his battle with Juan M. Soliz.

Senate Battle. Sen. Alan J. Dixon, D, faces a stiff challenge from Al Hofeld, a wealthy personal injury lawyer, and Carol Moseley Braun, the Cook County recorder of deeds, in a three-way race for the nomination.

Hofeld has been spending millions running a campaign that portrays the two-term Dixon as an unimaginative incumbent who has become captive to corporate campaign contributions.

Dixon has characterized Hofeld as a rich dilettante who wants to buy a Senate seat.

struct the bank records of all House members. H Res 387 instructs the panel to reconstruct the records within 20 days. During the panel's probe, it reconstructed only the records of those it said were the 66 worst abusers.

Some members on the list decided to come clean early. By late Friday, 64 Democrats and 28 Republicans had told news organizations that they had floated checks.

Charles Hatcher, D-Ga., revealed that he had floated about 780 checks at the bank, which was closed last December. Gerry Sikorski, D-Minn., said he had cashed 671 bad checks.

And House Sergeant-at-Arms Jack Russ, who was harshly criticized by the ethics panels for slipshod management of the bank and for personally writing more than \$50,000 in bad checks, announced his resignation.

China Trade. The House easily overrode President Bush's veto of legislation (HR 2212) that would place several conditions on the continuation of normal U.S. trade relations with China.

The 357-61 vote was well over the two-thirds needed to override. Critics of the administration said that its policies had failed and that China was no closer to democratic reform. A Senate vote is set for this week.

The measure would require Bush to certify that China had improved its record on human rights, trade practices and nuclear proliferation before most-favored-nation status was renewed for China later this year.

Budget Changes. The House worked on a bill (HR 3732) opposed by Republicans that would allow Congress to shift planned fiscal 1993 defense funds to domestic needs.

To do so, lawmakers would have to revise the 1990 budget law, which prohibits the shift of funds among the defense, domestic and international aid categories.

Support for the measure was weak, so sponsors began to look for ways to revise it in an effort to attract votes when the House votes on the measure, possibly this week.

House Budget Committee Chairman Leon E. Panetta, D-Calif., said the measure could be rewritten to leave the barriers between the spending categories in place. Instead, the cap for defense spending would be lowered and the cap on domestic spending increased.

Senate Floor Action

Tax Bill. The Senate late Friday passed, 50-47, a massive tax bill (HR 4210) designed to stimulate the economy. But it was likely an exercise in futility — President Bush is sure to veto the measure (or the version of the bill passed by the House on Feb. 27) if it ever reaches his desk.

The \$57 billion Senate measure would increase taxes on the wealthy to finance a \$28 billion tax cut for the middle class. The measure also contains various tax breaks for business and investors, including a cut in the capital gains tax rate.

Some of the tax provisions include a \$300 per-child tax credit for families, a \$5,000 tax credit for first-time home buyers and tax breaks for real estate developers. It would be paid for by raising to 36 percent the tax rate for individuals with taxable income above \$150,000 and by slapping a 10 percent surtax on taxable income of more than \$1 million.

The bill would expand the tax break for individual retirement accounts and allow penalty-free withdrawals for purchasing first homes, new cars and for defraying medical and education expenses. First-time home buyers would qualify for a tax credit of up to \$5,000.

In an amendment added to the bill late Friday, senators agreed to require able-bodied people 18 years old or over to sign up for work as a condition of receiving state welfare benefits.

Earlier in the week, on a procedural vote, the Senate rejected, 37-60, a Republican substitute package that incorporated President Bush's narrower economic proposal, which includes the tax credit for home buyers, a reduction in the capital gains tax rate and penalty-free withdrawals from individual retirement accounts for first homes and educational and medical expenses.

Members tabled, 57-38, an amendment by Carl Levin, D-Mich., that would have stripped the per-child tax credit for middle-income families making less than \$50,000 a year — an amendment that would have gutted the bill.

Radon Contamination. The Senate passed, 82-6, legislation (S 792) that would reauthorize federal programs established in 1988 to reduce radon contamination.

Under the bill, regional radon centers would continue to receive federal aid to provide information on the dangers of radon gas, which has been linked to lung cancer.

Veterans Health. Veterans could receive treatment for post-traumatic stress disorder without having to prove that the disorder is war-related under legislation (S 2344) passed by the Senate.

The Department of Veterans Affairs would be required to develop plans for expanding services for veterans who suffer from the disorder.

House Committee Action

Energy Bill. An omnibus energy bill (HR 776) that would require greater energy efficiency and make it easier to build natural gas pipelines won easy approval from the House Energy Committee.

The measure, approved 42-1, would

also overhaul the wholesale electricity industry and mandate greater use of some non-gasoline fuels.

The panel completed work on the measure in one day after some members decided not to offer controversial amendments on global warming and natural gas pricing.

The committee also approved a compromise amendment on electricity regulation after members agreed on a deal that satisfied those who were concerned that the bill would hurt established utilities and their customers.

Thrift Bailout. The House Banking Committee voted, 30-17, to approve a bill (HR 4241) that would provide an additional \$25 billion to the continuing savings and loan salvage operation.

Funding authority for the Resolution Trust Corporation (RTC), which is managing the cleanup, is set to expire on April 1. The RTC estimates that the new money would keep the bailout operating through April 1993.

Overall, it would increase federal spending on S&L losses to \$130 billion. The Bush administration estimates that another \$30 billion will be needed.

Emergency Aid. A bill (HR 4073) that would authorize \$15 billion for cities and localities to fund public works programs also won the House Banking Committee's approval.

Many state and local governments have complained that the recession has forced them to cut back or curtail some basic services, such as recreation facilities.

Foreign Aid. The House Foreign Affairs Committee approved four draft authorization measures designed to adjust U.S. foreign aid programs to the post-Cold War world.

One bill would authorize \$350 million in fiscal 1992 and \$366 million in fiscal 1993 for additional U.S. contributions to U.N. peacekeeping activities, which have expanded in El Salvador, Cambodia and Yugoslavia.

• Another bill would allow the reallocation of about \$65 million in unused military aid for El Salvador to help the country make the transition from war to peace.

• About \$150 million in fiscal 1992 and \$350 million in fiscal 1993 would be authorized under another bill for humanitarian aid to the former republics of the Soviet Union.

• Finally, \$75 million in fiscal 1993 aid would be shifted to allow the president to help developing nations comply with arms control agreements under a bill approved by the panel.

Credit Crunch. Legislation (HR 4111) that would boost the authorization level for a popular Small Business Administration loan program was approved by the House Small Business Committee.

Funding authority under the guaranteed loan program would be \$5 billion for fiscal 1992, \$6 billion for fiscal 1993 and

\$7 billion for fiscal 1994. Congress appropriated \$3.5 billion for the loan program for fiscal 1992.

Disaster Aid. The House Small Business Committee also approved draft legislation that would restore a revolving fund for federal disaster loans.

The program, administered by the Small Business Administration, was revised by the 1990 budget pact. Currently, the Appropriations committees must annually estimate and fund the program.

Chairman John J. LaFalce, D-N.Y., said it is impossible for Congress to predict how much money will be needed for disasters. The measure would allow the fund to be replenished through repaid disaster loans, the manner in which it was run before 1990.

Senate Committee Action

Job Bias. The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee approved legislation (S 2062) that would lift the caps on damages to successful plaintiffs in job discrimination cases.

The measure would expand on a 1991 civil rights law that strengthened job discrimination laws designed to protect women, the disabled and religious minorities. The current caps on damages range from \$50,000 to \$300,000, depending on the size of the company sued.

Republicans, who fought to retain the caps during the debate on the 1991 civil rights bill, did not contest the measure during the markup but are likely to fight it on the floor.

Wards Cove. A bill (S 1962) that would apply the new sexual discrimination and harassment rules included in the 1991 civil rights bill to an Alaskan salmon canning company was approved by the Senate Labor Committee.

Although a 1989 Supreme Court case — *Wards Cove Packing Co. v. Atonio* — was a driving force behind the civil rights bill, the measure specifically exempted the ongoing litigation between the cannery company and its 2,000 workers.

S 1962 would remove that exemption.

Child Labor. Employers who knowingly violate child labor laws would receive new penalties under legislation approved, 10-7, by the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee.

Democrats say that more than 100,000 children under 18 are injured every year in work-related accidents — an indication that employers have been negligent.

The maximum prison sentence for employers found guilty of willful violations of child labor laws would be increased from six months to 10 years.

Republicans oppose the measure, arguing that businesses will stop hiring young workers out of fear they will wind up being sanctioned for minor paperwork errors. President Bush has threatened to veto the bill.

Job Training. The Senate Labor panel also approved legislation (S 2055) that would reauthorize the 1982 Job Training Partnership Act. Programs under the act would be revised to place more focus on economically disadvantaged individuals.

Bankruptcy Code. The Senate Judiciary Committee began work on legislation (S 1985) that would establish an independent commission to review the U.S. Bankruptcy Code. The Bankruptcy Review Commission would make recommendations to Congress on how to improve the code, particularly in response to the recent increase in bankruptcy filings.

Baltic Ambassadors. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted, 19-0, to approve the nominations of the first U.S. ambassadors in 50 years to the three Baltic states.

The nominations of Ints M. Silins to be ambassador to Latvia, Darryl Johnson to be ambassador to Lithuania and Robert Frasure to be ambassador to Estonia will now go to the Senate floor, where they are expected to win easy approval.

The committee also endorsed Parker Borg to be ambassador to Burma, but said no floor action on the nomination should be scheduled until the Bush administration acts to oppose the military government in Rangoon strongly.

Conference Committee

Coin Redesign. House and Senate conferees reached an agreement on a wide-ranging coin bill (HR 3337) that would call for the redesign of the backs of some of the nation's coins.

The Senate version called for the redesign of all circulating coins, but conferees agreed on a compromise that would lead to the redesign of the back sides of the half dollar and the quarter, one of which would commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Bill of Rights.

Politics

Democratic Superdelegates. The House Democratic Caucus on Friday chose 80 percent of its membership to attend the Democratic presidential convention this summer as superdelegates.

The 218 members picked do not count as part of their state delegation, but they do vote for the presidential ticket and platform.

In addition to the members who attend as delegates of the caucus, eight other members, led by Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., will attend as delegates of the Democratic National Committee. Almost 4,300 delegates will be sent to the convention, which will begin July 13 in New York.

A full two-thirds of those attending, 145 members, have not indicated which presidential candidate they favor.

Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton has the announced endorsement of 51 House Democrats, putting him well ahead of his closest rival, former Sen. Paul Tsongas, who has been endorsed by nine members.

Sens. Tom Harkin, Iowa., and Bob Kerrey, Neb., who have dropped out of the race, had the support of eight and five members, respectively.

Texas, Mississippi Primaries. If there is an anti-incumbent storm this election year, it did not pass over Texas and Mississippi last week. All congressional incumbents in those two states won primaries last Tuesday, some by easier margins than had been expected.

Texas Reps. Sam Johnson, R; Bill Archer, R; and Henry B. Gonzalez, D, are headed to re-election after winning primaries. Archer and Gonzalez have no challengers this fall and Johnson is facing a Libertarian Party candidate.

Democratic state Sen. Frank Tejeda seems assured of election after winning the nomination for the 28th District, one of three new seats added to Texas because of reapportionment.

In Mississippi, the five incumbent House members — all Democrats — easily won their primaries. ■

Going into IL and MI tomorrow, "the two major political parties are on the verge of choosing presidential nominees who, for the moment, appear unelectable" -- Bush and Clinton (Crawford, ORLANDO SENTINEL, 3/15). Brown "may be a wild card threat ... If Brown does well in [MI] and has a respectable showing in [IL], he will slow Clinton's momentum and frustrate Tsongas' attempt to win populous states outside New England." One "concerned Tsongas aide": "Brown could make a lot of trouble in Michigan" (Milligan, N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 3/15). L.A. TIMES' Shogan writes Clinton "seems on the verge of winning a doubleheader victory" (3/16). W. POST's Broder/Edsall: Clinton is "poised to put a double-lock on the [Dem] nomination" (3/15). BOSTON HERALD header: "Midwest primaries could finish Buchanan, Tsongas" (3/15). WASHINGTON MONTHLY's Charles Peters counters, "join me in imploring the pundits to stop declaring that the race will be over if Tsongas doesn't win" MI or IL (W. POST, 3/15).

TSONGAS: In a week of campaigning, Tsongas and staff "might have done better to focus on the here and now -- or even the next campaign event. Time and time again, Tsongas showed up for appearances rife with glitches -- and sparse crowds more ~~familiar~~" in NH than IL or MI (Chen, L.A. TIMES, 3/16). L.A. TIMES' Shogan writes, "For his part, Tsongas had difficulty separating himself from the abstract theorems that undergird his approach to lifting the nation out of its economic difficulties" (3/16). Tsongas "appears to be heading for a political fall ... and there is no one to prop him up" (Hanson, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 3/16). Tsongas "conceded ... he is just aiming for 'competitiveness'" in both 3/17 primaries and that he "would seek to revive his campaign in the East," particularly CT on 3/24 and NY on 4/7 (N.Y. NEWSDAY, 3/15). N.Y. POST's Orin writes, "A double loss tomorrow is sure to raise questions about the future of Tsongas' candidacy and put him under heavy pressure" in CT on 3/24. His managers "insist ... enough money is coming in to keep him going." Orin notes Clinton "is superbly organized" in NY, "while once again Tsongas has barely any operation going" (3/16). Tsongas adviser Jerry Austin "said losses ... would not force his candidate to quit": "You get out of the race when you run out of money. That's not a problem for Paul Tsongas. ON THE AIR: New Tsongas 30-sec. spot, running in IL/MI. Video: A pie on a table; people grabbing pieces. TEXT (v/o): "This is the way Bill Clinton sees the economy. He promises everybody a slice of the pie. LOTS of political promises. But not much pie. What's left for you ... or for our kids? Paul Tsongas doesn't make promises. He's made a commitment. The best way to help people is a growing economy. Not pie-in-the-sky political promises. You've got a choice. Clinton's promises. Tsongas' commitment to jobs and economic growth." L.A. TIMES' Rosenstiel on this and the "hear the latest?" Tsongas ad: "Bitter, mean-spirited." A new Clinton spot asks, "Why are they attacking Bill Clinton? Politics. Pure and ugly." Rosenstiel: "The implication ... that Tsongas initiated the attacks is false. Clinton was the first [Dem] to air a commercial that attacked a fellow Democrat" (3/15). W. POST's Kurtz points out Clinton's AR

accomplishments not mentioned in the "heard the latest" spot, and clarifies Tsongas' positions taken "out of context" in Clinton's "close the book" spot (3/14). B. GLOBE's Loth: The Tsongas spot gives info on Clinton's AR record, "instead of salacious details of extramarital affairs" (3/14). CNN's Brooks Jackson calls Buchanan's ad on the foreign clients of some Bush advisers "true but don't get the wrong idea. Those Bush advisers are not spies or criminals. They do show up in [DoJ] files as lobbyists." On statements in the ad attributing 73,000 lost jobs in MI to their dealings: "Questionable. ... So far as we know, those state jobs did not go to Panama which was [RNC chair Rich] Bond's client." Jackson on Buchanan's answer to the Bush Mercedes ad: "The Mercedes ... is in fact owned by his wife. And they say if he had gotten better service from his Cadillac dealers they wouldn't feel so badly about American made cars" (3/13). NBC's Lisa Myers: "To a large extent these ads are the campaign in Illinois and Michigan. It is negative and it is nasty" (3/13).

But among Dems, they are "most impressed" by Tsongas, who was also endorsed by the TRIBUNE. On Bush: "At least he's not ... Buchanan" (3/15).

CLINTON: SUN-TIMES' Talbott & Briggs review a campaign swing downstate "which his opponents have skipped." His campaign's "production" -- Clinton in a large-scale Q&A at a mall -- "was a dazzling performance" (3/15). TRIBUNE's John Kass writes, the Chicago "machine" which "has assured a Clinton sweep of the city," does not really exist anymore. 47th Ward Cmtman Ed Kelly: "[Clinton] can have all the endorsements he wants but it doesn't mean spit. We've got our own problems" (3/15). ORLANDO SENTINEL's Crawford notes Dukakis' anti-machine campaign got him third-place in '88: "Dukakis failed to see that many Chicagoans are proud of their machine politics" (3/15). Clinton visited 4 black churches and marched in the Southside St. Paddy's parade. At the churches, he "spoke to [the] congregations about national unity," and was joined by Rep. Harold Ford (D-TN). He was also endorsed by the Asian-American Voters Coalition of IL (ARK. DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 3/16). One Chicago Dem backing Tsongas: "Clinton looks like he knows how to win an election, and my guy doesn't" (TRIBUNE, 3/15). SUN-TIMES' Franchine & Talbott report Clinton "got a flat reception, even some boos" at the parade, while Tsongas and Brown received a "friendly reception" (3/16). TRIBUNE's "Inc.": "Some of the boos may have been because the parade started late. But reporters also talked to people who used words like 'adulterer'" (O'Malley/Collin, 3/16).

TSONGAS: W. TIMES header: "Tsongas hopes ethnic vote can upset Clinton in Illinois" (3/16). Many reports mentioned Tsongas' appearance at a Dept. of Aging center, where he was not allowed to speak as a politician (mult., 3/15). N.Y. DAILY NEWS' Auletta writes Tsongas' "balloon is losing air ... likely to fizzle over Lake Michigan" (3/15). N.Y. NEWSDAY's Sloyan writes, even though Chicago's establishment has coalesced behind Clinton, Tsongas' economic plan was well-received and "seems certain of survival" (3/16). CHICAGO TRIBUNE's Steve Daley writes, "St. Paul is acting like a candidate who can't take a pinch" (3/15). Derwinski, WH Domestic Policy Czar Yeutter (a Nebraskan who served as head of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange). Analyst Paul Green: "Bush will have one of the biggest victories of the political season in ~~Illinois and they'll be part of the season" (3/15).~~

CLINTON: NEWS' DeRamus praises him: "Someone in the [WH] who believes in bringing Americans together instead of driving

them apart?" (3/15). A new Clinton ad, airing only in MI so far, hits Brown's flat tax proposal. Clinton media man Frank Greer "denied that the air attack is a nod to Brown's growing strength in [MI], where his message ... appears to be falling on receptive ears": "We do not perceive him as a threat. We just think it's important that people know what his flat tax proposal will do to the middle class" (B. GLOBE, 3/15). DETROIT NEWS' Jim Gannon cites a "striking difference": "The stuff about 'he can't get elected' is not what you hear from voters." A number of his focus groups "rate Clinton the most electable candidate" ("Face the Nation," CBS, 3/15). Many note Clinton's trip to Macomb County, a national bellwether area of Reagan Democrats, and the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church in predominantly black northeast Detroit. "In both places, Clinton delivered essentially the same message: 'Come home to the Democratic Party. We have been divided too long'" (Boyd, KNIGHT-RIDDER, 3/14). "The message to each was the same: do not let racial divisions get in the way of economic advancement" (Balz, W. POST, 3/14). The reaction of both "was overwhelmingly positive" (Fritz, L.A. TIMES, 3/14). Clinton was endorsed by Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, who had backed Harkin, and Rep. Howard Wolpe (FREE PRESS, 3/16). Clinton planned a rally in Lansing this afternoon where he planned to highlight the backing of Joel Ferguson, Jackson's '88 MI director who had backed Kerrey (LANSING STATE JOURNAL, 3/16).

~~LABOR:~~ Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA) endorsed Tsongas, and followed up with calls to MI and IL labor leaders (Primack, BOSTON HERALD). But Kennedy's lobbying "failed to offset deep feelings among many labor leaders against Tsongas" (3/13). Kennedy spokesperson Paul Donovan: "Kennedy can help with a number of important constituencies, most notably organized labor" (B. GLOBE, 3/13). While AR AFL-CIO pre. Bill Becker "has been harshly critical" of Clinton, he said Clinton "would be more appealing to labor than Paul Tsongas." Becker cited Tsongas' opposition to the bill banning striker replacement (ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 3/15). Becker called Clinton a "knight in shining armor" compared to Bush (DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 3/15). Labor "finds itself stuck with a field of Democratic candidates it doesn't like but can't change" (Jacobs, S.F. EXAMINER, 3/16). "Although Clinton's views on trade have been sharply criticized by local labor leaders, it doesn't appear to have yet hurt him too much with most voters" (Brownstein, L.A. TIMES, 3/16).

TSONGAS: BOSTON GLOBE's Pertman writes he "seems to have found his equivalent of ... Kerrey's drumbeat about health care reform. No matter what the question lately, Tsongas' answer invariably is to 'grow jobs'" (3/15). W.S. JOURNAL's Rogers writes Tsongas "is paying a price for being better able to write a plan for the future than to give expression to the pain of the present." It is "frustrating" for Tsongas, whose greatest legislative achievement was the Chrysler bailout, to be regarded with "hostility" by labor (3/16).

BROWN: He was joined at a UAW appearance by "Roger and Me" director Michael Moore, who called him "the only candidate fighting for working people" (CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 3/15). In Dearborn Brown retraced the steps of those shot by police in the Great Depression hunger protest "to show solidarity with the disaffected workers he hopes will rally" to his cause. For the first time in the campaign, Brown was the target of a Clinton TV spot which criticizes his 13% flat tax proposal (Peterson, L.A. TIMES, 3/15). S.F. CHRONICLE's Jerry Roberts sees the Clinton ad as a sign Brown has become a "factor" in MI (3/15). Clinton

media man Frank Greer: "We do not perceive him as a threat. We just think it's important that people know what his flat tax proposal will do to the middle class" (BOSTON GLOBE, 3/15). Brown received his endorsement from a member of Congress -- Rep. John Conyers (D-MI) of Detroit. Conyers announced his backing "after hearing [Brown] deliver a pro-labor stem-winder" at the MI Dem J-J 3/14 (S.F. CHRONICLE, 3/15). Brown released his list of MI endorsements, including: Wayne Co. Board chair Arthur Blackwell, Conyers, AG Frank Kelly, MI Teamsters' Asst. to Pres. James Hoffa, Int'l UAW VP Ernie Lofton, UAW Local 600 pres. Jim McNeil, UAW Local 6000 pres. Joan Doyen, UAW Local 599 pres. Dave Yettaw, UAW Local 1776 (Willow Run) pres. Bob Harlow, UAW Region 1A director Bob King (release, 3/16). KNIGHT-RIDDER's Karaim writes, "Most labor leaders, however, seem to view Brown as more leverage than a real choice" (3/15). DETROIT FREE PRESS' Hugh McDiarmid writes Brown "got the loudest cheers and most sustained applause" at the J-J, "even though -- and this is why it was sad -- almost nobody really present thought he was likely to win Michigan, much less get the nomination. But what the hell" (3/16). USA TODAY's Nagourney writes Brown "appears poised to make a strong showing" in MI (3/16). W. POST's Dionne reviews the J-J: "Brown did just about everything labor's friends would want except to sing a song of praise to Joe Hill" (3/15).

BUSH: Speaking to the Economic Club of Detroit, Bush "came ~~bearing gifts for the auto industry just as he has provided~~ other primary states with government largess" (McNulty/Locin, CHICAGO TRIBUNE). He announced that the EPA was abandoning a Clean Air Act requirement that would have mandated the installation of anti-pollution canisters on new cars to capture ozone depleting gasoline fumes. He also "promised not to sign any new environmental rules or legislation that would burden the automakers" and reiterated his vow to veto legislation that would raise required fuel economy from 27.5 to 40 miles per hour (3/14). The decisions outraged environmentalists and fuel-station operators, who may be forced to remove fuel vapors at the gas pumps (Andrews, LANSING STATE JOURNAL, 3/14). N.Y. TIMES' Keith Schneider notes Bush's announcement came just days after the TX primary, where it angered the oil industry -- also fearful of being left with the burden of cleaning the air (3/14). Sierra Club DC dir. Blakeman Early: "The president is breaking his Clean Air Act promises in order to boost his re-election chances. He's ransoming our health to save 20 bucks." Bush said the EPA decided the canisters were "a real risk to the safety" of motorists (DETROIT FREE PRESS, 3/14). Meanwhile, Bush lashed out at MI Sen. Donald Riegle for suggesting he influenced GM to close a MI plant instead of one in TX: "I made no such intervention. And I take it as a direct attack on my character

... it is a bald-faced lie" (FREE PRESS, 3/14). FREE PRESS' Montemurri writes Bush will have "female voters to thank" if he finishes off Buchanan in IL and TX (3/16). Bush campaigned via teleconference to several MI areas, including a Lansing rally hosted by Gov. John Engler. First Lady Barbara Bush visits Oakland County today (STATE JOURNAL, 3/16).

BUCHANAN: Also stumping in MI, Buchanan fired off a new 30-second spot in response to Bush's ad attacking him for owning a Mercedes. It accuses 3 Bush campaign aides of having been "foreign agents." Citing registrations filed with the DoJ, the ad says strategist Charles Black represented a Japanese official, comm. dir. James Lake represented Japanese auto makers and RNC chair Rich Bond presented the Panamanian gov't (CHICAGO TRIBUNE,

3/14). The Dem debate over the economy "has worked to Buchanan's disadvantage" in MI. He had hoped "disgruntled" Dems would cross over and vote for him, but few "are now expected to stray from their party." And much of the Dem protest vote that might have gone to Buchanan is instead going to Brown. Meanwhile, Buchanan "rejected suggestions he has begun paving the way for a graceful pullout" after MI and IL (O'Rourke, SACRAMENTO BEE, 3/15).

*4 WEEKEND DEBATES: TWO ON TV; ONE IN TIME MAG

In a Sunday night debate hosted and simulcast by Chicago's WLS-TV, and in Detroit, and carried by C-SPAN, Clinton, Tsongas and Brown faced off. The race for the nomination "flared ... into a nasty, personal fracas, with fingers pointed, insults flying and families dragged into it" (Montemurri, DETROIT FREE PRESS, 3/16). The exchange was sparked when Detroit anchorman Bill Bonds asked whether Clinton was electable. Brown: "I think he's got a big electability problem. It was right on the front of the Washington Post. ... He is funneling money to his wife's law firm as state business, that's number one. Number two, his wife's law firm is representing clients before state of Arkansas agencies, his appointees. So it's not only corruption ... it's the kind of conflict of interest that is incompatible in the kind of public servant we expect in the president" (Roberts, S.F. CHRONICLE, 3/16). Clinton: "I feel sorry for Jerry Brown. ... You know, he reinvents himself every year or two." He then criticized Brown's \$100 limit this year and his work against contribution limits as CA Dem chair. Clinton: "I don't think you can take much of what he says seriously." Brown: "You're always trying to attack; you never answer the question." Clinton: "Let me tell you something Jerry. I don't care what you say about me ... but you ought to be ashamed of yourself for jumping on my wife. You're not worth being on the same platform with my wife" (Broder/Walsh, WASH. POST). Clinton "ardently defended his wife's integrity, and he charged that Brown's attack was driven by electoral desperation and poll results" (Daley, CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 3/16). The article cited work the Rose law firm had done for the state and its representation of clients before state authorities. The article noted "no specific instance where Clinton is known to have directed state business" to the firm (3/16). PHILA. DAILY NEWS' Grady writes, "The flareup -- the most incendiary exchange in a dozen debates from South Dakota to Miami -- focused intensely on all three personalities." Clinton's "explosive but controlled anger showed that he would fare well in fall combat over 'character' problems." Tsongas "seemed too cerebral for mud-wrestling." Brown, "Mr. 800 Number, thrives on shock and ambush" (3/16). Clinton "was the allegorical red meat," as he and Brown, after an hour of questioning, "exchanged angry words on electability and character" (Lilleston, ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 3/16). "Face-to-face with furious finger-pointing," both "traded accusations over corruption and integrity along with personal insults." It was the "most bitter clash" of the campaign (Clifford, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 3/16). The debate "degenerated into a bitter verbal brawl" (Berke, N.Y. TIMES, 3/16). "An otherwise placid debate exploded ... into the angriest exchange of the campaign" (Broder/Walsh, WASH. POST, 3/16). Clinton "heatedly denied any wrongdoing, but Brown appeared to draw blood, suggesting the kind of heavy attacks that may be in store for the front-runner" (Hanson, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 3/16). The exchange was "significant both as memorable political theater and as a live demonstration, not only of the kinds of personal

attacks Clinton may expect if he becomes the Democratic nominee, but also of his ability to respond to them" (Roberts, S.F. CHRONICLE, 3/16). ALSO: Tsongas helped Brown "counter a Clinton attack," by telling Brown that Clinton manager David Wilhelm once headed Citizens for Tax Justice. Clinton has been "citing criticism" of Brown's tax proposal by CTJ in his attacks on Brown's flat tax proposal (Clifford, N.Y. NEWSDAY, 3/16). Clinton also "conceded" his FL campaign had given out "inaccurate" information on Tsongas' support for Israel (N.Y. TIMES, 3/16). Tsongas called that an attempt to "have the best of both worlds -- 'It's wrong, but I didn't it.' ... And this is the candidate who talks about personal responsibility, a rather interesting juxtaposition" (Broder/Walsh, WASH. POST, 3/16). NBC's Faith Daniels: "The two came to verbal blows." NBC's Andrea Mitchell: "[Brown] struck again. ... Almost forgotten in the exchange, the third candidate [Tsongas]." Tsongas on Clinton's defense: "As well as you can when you've done something that's indefensible" (3/16). ABC's Morton Dean: "With Democratic friends like these who needs Republican enemies? ... I thought Clinton was this close to throwing the first punch, and not a verbal punch. ... After that exchange Tsongas said he felt like jumping between Clinton and Brown so [he] could get his face on the news." (3/16)." ABC's Hal Bruno: "Part of it is Jerry Brown is trying to play a spoiler role ... so he's playing a role ~~that doesn't make him very popular and the way he goes about~~ doing it is even more irritating" (3/16). CBS' Scott Pelley: "It looked like [Brown and Clinton] almost came to blows." Pelley reported Tsongas and Brown also both declined to become Clinton's running mate last night. CHICAGO SUN-TIMES' Lynn Sweet: "You had two guys who want to be president standing there finger-pointing at each other as if they were at some saloon on the corner trying to defend the honor of somebody's wife. ... Last night is just a little snapshot of a bigger picture that hasn't been played out nationally yet" (3/16).

FRIDAY NIGHT: Tsongas described Clinton's middle-class tax cut plan as "kinder but gentler voodoo economics." Clinton, "giving as good as he got," replied that Tsongas "doesn't want to challenge anybody ... he wants to punish them." Clinton to Brown: "I'm the front-runner because my economic message is better than yours" (Woodlief, BOSTON HERALD, 3/14). Brown on fast-track trade negotiations: "He says yes, he says yes, and I say no, and that's a central issue in Michigan and right here in Illinois" (Walsh/Broder, WASH. POST, 3/14). CHICAGO TRIBUNE found "most of their strongest shots" directed at Bush and Reagan (Fountain/McMahon, 3/14). TRIB's "Inc" gossip column: "The debate turned out to be three Yale law school grads talking about taxes" (O'Malley/Collin, 3/14). WASH. POST's debate story refers to Tsongas and Brown as Clinton's "two remaining rivals" (3/14).

TIME's cover story this week is an "unprecedented" and untelevised hour-long "debate" on economic issues between Clinton and Tsongas. It's not clear whether Brown was invited, but the magazine does say he "has made no pretense of matching the highly detailed economic plans that Clinton and Tsongas debated last week." On Clinton: "At times sounding defensive, Clinton noted similarities between his plan and Tsongas' and argued that the middle-class tax cut was only a minor part of his economic program." On Tsongas: "Constant carping against the middle-class tax reductions makes Tsongas seem indifferent to the plight of the middle class. Yet many voters are likely to see the truth in Tsongas' assertion that 'if you wish to live well, you must

produce well'" (Barrett/Cloud, 3/23 issue). AD WARS: As the debate concluded, Tsongas challenged Clinton to eliminate references to each other in their ads. Clinton refused, saying, "I want to continue sharpening the differences for the American people." Tsongas: "That's pretty clear." Asked whether the two comprised the Dem ticket, both candidates said they would consider the other (3/23 issue).

***5 CLINTON: MORE DIRT FOR THE FRONT-RUNNER**

W. POST piece examines the "uncertain intersection" of Hillary Clinton's law firm's practice with AR official business, and possible appearances of conflict of interest on Clinton's part (see debate story, #4). '90 Clinton gov. foe Sheffield Nelson (R): "If you want something special in this state, you go to the Rose firm" (Weisskopf/Maraniss, 3/15). NEWSWEEK header w/photo of Clinton throwing baseball: "Playing hardball; Bush and his team assemble their scouting report on how to beat Bill Clinton in the fall." Bush's team is "convinced [Clinton] is in the midst of a slow, irreversible bleed" (3/23 issue). U.S. NEWS header: "An uncertain embrace; As he moves in on the [Dem] nomination, Clinton still faces doubts about his character" (3/23 issue). CHICAGO TRIBUNE's Daley asks, "Is Bill Clinton inevitable, or is he doomed?" Ex-DNC pol. dir. Brian Lunde: "There always seems to be a point in this process where the party pulls back and wonders, 'Is this really what we want to do?'" (3/15). S.F. CHRONICLE header: "Many fear that Clinton is a Walking Time Bomb (3/14). But, GOP strategist Ed Rollins says Clinton has done "better than many could have predicted because 'he's obviously planned a campaign without any naivete. ... He's been able to bluff everyone else out. It's a very strategic, calculated campaign in which the guy doesn't flinch" (Dowd, N.Y. TIMES, 3/16). NOW's Patricia Ireland says he "has dealt fairly well with women's issues. ... He has, over the years, stood for many of the issues that we believe in" ("McLaughlin's One on One," 3/13).

MORE STUFF: ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE does the math: Even if Clinton wins IL & MI, "he could not mathematically clinch ... until after the [4/7] primaries" (3/16). N.Y. DAILY NEWS' Lombardi writes "even in the race appears to be over by April, 7, political observers say, Clinton will want to turn New York into the icing on the cake" because the Dem convention is here 7/13-16" (3/16). TRIBUNE's Daley: Clinton has "for the moment abandoned his role as the voice of the new politics. Clinton's new voice sounds a lot like Huey Long (3/15). GOP analyst Kevin Phillips: "Unless any slipper still to come has more tawdry sequins, [Dems] are still probably better off with Clinton than with Tsongas. With his border-state geography, centrism and middle-class populism, Clinton largely fits the abstract blueprint of how [Dems] need to rebuild to win the presidency ... if not in 1992, ... then four years later" (L.A. TIMES, 3/15). BUSINESS WEEK interviews Clinton (3/23 issue). George Will, doubting Clinton's status as "outsider," writes, "all his life, he has avoided the private sector" (NEWSWEEK, 3/23 issue). N.Y. TIMES examines his AR welfare record (DeParle, 3/14). Analyst Stuart Rothenberg: "It would be a great irony if the 'DLC candidate' was lifted to his party's nomination by traditional [Dem] constituencies and was still scrambling in October to attract swing voters" ("Rothenberg Political Report," 3/13 issue). BOSTON GLOBE's Oliphant advises Clinton to return to The Core "the mesage that vaulted him forward in December -- meaning

change, no more business as usual in both parties, responsibilities that go with entitlements, has got to return" (3/15). U.S. NEWS' Barone examines Clinton positions in the light of a new Humphrey-like definition of liberalism (3/23 issue). U.S. NEWS offers a "short list" of possible Clinton VPs: Bradley, Rockefeller, Kerrey, Gephardt, Tsongas. Longshots: Sen. Joe Lieberman (D-CT) and Rep. Stephen Solarz (D-NY) (3/23 issue). RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH editorial, less than flattering in tone: "Co-President Hillary" (3/15). GLOBE columnist Steven Stark writes that "a significant number of reporters and pundits have gone south for Bill Clinton" (3/16).

*6 TSONGAS: WHERE'S THE WARMTH?

When Tsongas, a "modern Greek-American, was asked to name his worst trait, he replied: 'An instinct to cross the border into being moralistic'" (Roberts, U.S. NEWS). As the nomination "showdown" with Clinton nears Tsongas' "penchant for piety could be his undoing." In NH he "came across as a serene and funny man who could laugh at himself. But as the attacks and the losses, have mounted, he has turned sour and snappish." Last week he "even marched through his campaign plane scolding staff and reporters alike to obey the captain and sit down for landing" (3/23 issue). Tsongas, "who had a sense of humor until he began winning primaries, has grown testy and trivial in recent weeks" (Klein, NEW YORK magazine, 3/23).

WINE AND CHEESE: GOP analyst Kevin Phillips: Tsongas "has three items of baggage national Democrats need to drop. The first is identification with the 'wine and cheese' middle-and upper-middle-class liberalism ... The second is the grating moral righteousness associated with New England and Dukakis. "Tsongas' third Achilles' heel is the extent to which, during the late 1980s," he became associated with the corporate world (3/15).

POLITICS AS UNUSUAL: NYT's Russell Baker writes, "The unusualness of Tsongas threatened to let fresh air into this year's proceedings, for he was an insult to every engineer's idea of what a candidate must look like, sound like and be like." Might this be a turning point in Am. Politics? The answer "seems to be no. Clinton's successes this week seem to bear us relentlessly back towards usuality" (3/14).

DUKAKIS FACTOR: BOSTON GLOBE's Leigh and N.Y. TIME's Berke report on Tsongas' inability to shake comparisons to Dukakis. Berke: "Standing between Paul E. Tsongas and the White House is not just Gov. Bill Clinton or President Bush, but the ghost of Michael S. Dukakis" (3/15). Globe's Leigh: "At virtually every stop on the campaign trail, Paul Tsongas tries to inoculate himself against the dread Dukakis Pox" (3/15).

TSONGY BITS: NEWSWEEK's CW arrow on Tsongas is down: "Not many volvos in Flint [MI]. And your message got lost when you hit the low road" (3/23 issue). The W. POST profiles the "Death-Defying Friendship" between Tsongas and his cancer doc. Tak Takvorian (3/15). BOSTON GLOBE's STARRING THE CANDIDATES gives Tsongas three stars (Promising) and notes "it's nice to be the candidate of the A students, but Tsongas needs some B and C students too" (Stark, 3/13). GLOBE reports he took \$10K in S&L PAC money from 1978-83 "a period when he worked on legislation, that helped deregulate the industry, according to campaign finance records filed at the time and released by sources close to the Clinton campaign" (3/15). W. POST questions whether Tsongas' lobbying for the Iroquois Transmission System (a natural gas pipe line from Canada from the Northeastern U.S.) was

"befitting a would-be U.S. president?" (Lee, 3/16). W. POST's Pearlstein profiles Tsongas' "unconventional" experiences as a "director of seven companies in his home state of" MA (3/16).

TV: Tsongas appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press." NBC's Tim Russert: "Is Bill Clinton electable in your mind?" Tsongas: "I will support Bill Clinton if he's the nominee. Let me just say that." Russert: "Would you accept the vice presidency." Tsongas: "No" (3/15). On FOX's "Off The Record," Barone, Goodgame and Beckel predicted Tsongas would be the next to drop out. Beckel said Tsongas or Buchanan (3/15).

***7 BROWN: EARNS ATTENTION, IF NOT RESPECT**

Brown discussed his flat tax on CBS' "Face the Nation," and used the opportunity to attack Clinton: "He started out as a right wing conservative working with the [DLC]. ... Then he turned against Tsongas and played like he was some kind of left wing populist. ... Clinton is the same old politician with the same \$1,000 checks, the same lobbyists, the same hacks and hustlers out of the East Coast" (3/15). Brown in Flint, MI was "introduced -- but not quite endorsed by" Sen. Don Riegle (D-MI) (Witcover, Balto. SUN, 3/16).

COPLEY's Mark Barabak writes Dem insiders are asking, "What does Jerry want?" -- just as they asked the same question about Jackson in '88. Possible answers: "Clean skies and clean politics" in the platform, a chance to address the convention, or "a plane and a commitment of resources .. a la Jackson in 1988" (3/14). TIME and NEWSWEEK both report on the "outsider" campaign. NEWSWEEK notes that the 800 number and 30-minute infomercials "used to be the butt of jokes," but now are "considered revolutionary" (3/23 issue). TIME: "Although [MI] voters have almost nothing in common with this walking Experiment in Living ... [Brown] is showing surprising appeal" (3/23 issue). WASH. POST: "The greatest tribute to Brown's success is that [Clinton and Tsongas] are taking him seriously" (3/14). N.Y. TIMES headline: "Brown's Campaign Is Using Volunteers to Put Chaos in Motion" (3/15).

NY: He was endorsed by the Park River Independent Democrats, an "Upper West Side political club" which includes two "leading" Clinton NY supporters (N.Y. TIMES, 3/15).

TV: CNN's Ken Bode on Brown's record as CA Gov.: "His record as governor of the state with the world's eighth largest economy is a decade in the past and it does raise doubts about his leadership and management abilities" (CNN, 3/13).

***8 HOUSE DEM CAUCUS: CLINTON SUPPORT STRONGEST**

On 3/13 House Dems chose 218 "of their number to serve as uncommitted Superdelegates to" the NY Dem Nat'l convention in July (Winneker, ROLL CALL). Senate Dems will choose 45 out of their 57 to be Superdelegates "early next month." A total of 4,287 delegates will be able to vote for a nominee at the Dem Nat'l convention. As far as whom they support, most Superdelegates "are still not beholden to either candidate [Tsongas or Clinton], although Clinton has locked up the support of substantially more Members than Tsongas." At "last count Clinton had the support of 54," and Tsongas had "10 Members in his camp." House Energy and Commerce Committee Chair. Rep. John Dingell (D-MI) "is pushing in his state for 'uncommitted' votes in tomorrow's primary." Dingell on a brokered convention: "Possible? Yes. Desirable? Yes. Hurtful? No. Prudent? Yes. Wise? Yes." Last week House Dems broke off into 12 regional

caucuses to choose three-fifths [164] of their membership to become superdelegates. Then the Dem Steering and Policy Committee "met to pick another 54 delegates." Eight additional Dems "were accorded delegate status based on their membership" on the DNC (3/16). The BOSTON HERALD/AP reported none of the Superdelegates "expressed a preference for" Brown. And 110 of the 218 "said they were uncommitted" (3/14).

*9 BUSH: OPINERS GIVE HIM UNIMPRESSIVE MARKS

Under subhead, "Struggling voters, hungry for a piece of the pie, may abandon Bush," U.S. NEWS' Dana Hawkins asserts, "Bush's job creation record is the worst of any administration since the end of [WW II]. Weak employment growth and falling incomes ... bode ill for the president's re-election prospects" (3/23 issue). Under header, "Bush changes his tune more than once -- whatever it takes to get re-elected," columnist Edwin Yoder writes, "In the repudiation of his 1990 deal with Congress, he says in effect, it's politics pure and simple" (PHILA. INQUIRER, 3/14). W. POST's David Broder asserts, "It says something about the condition of President Bush's White House and campaign that the most cool-headed man in the operation these last few weeks has been" Quayle (3/15). GOP strategist Roger Stone writes, "The eventual [Dem] nominee will no doubt pick up where Buchanan leaves off, blaming Bush for the deficit, the recession, higher taxes and an obsession to foreign policy at the expense of pressing domestic issues. And this is why President Bush appears to be in trouble. He has allowed himself to be portrayed as a barrier to change and reform" (N.Y. TIMES, 3/15). NEWSWEEK's CW is up: "Bouncing checks help GOP. But using sex against Clinton? Wouldn't be prudent" (3/23 issue). BOSTON GLOBE's Stark: "[Bush] didn't want this race against Buchanan; he didn't plan for it; he didn't execute it well. But he did what he had to do, and he should improve against the Democrats" (3/13).

MEDIA MORSELS: Guam GOPers unanimously pledged their 4 delegates to Bush, bringing his total to 738 (Bush release, 3/14). W. TIMES Paul Bedard writes, "In a decision that has conservatives fuming," Bush is siding with WH moderates "rather than campaign advisers in dealing with congressional Democrats." He is leaning against a line-item veto "that would trigger a constitutional battle with Congress" and has "moved to sidestep" the check kiting scandal "instead of using it as a headliner" against the Dems. Bedard notes, "The incident highlights an ongoing clash between the 'take no prisoners' style the campaign wants to follow and the moderate track of [WH] officials" (3/15). W. POST's Babcock & Devroy note, "Several top officials of President Bush's reelection campaign team, with access to [WH] policy makers and in some cases participation in policy meetings, continue to maintain outside business interests and to serve as paid consultants to domestic foreign clients." They cite Bush campaign chair Bob Teeter, manager Fred Malek, dep. chair James Lake and senior adviser Charles Black (3/15). B. GLOBE's John Mashek notes, aides at the Bush-Quayle camp "acknowledge that negative research on the [Dem] front-runners is in the works." But one aide, noting Clinton and Tsongas' bickering, added, "Democrats seem to be doing a good job for us right now" (3/13).

TV: CNN's Charles Bierbauer on Bush being asked if he intervened in the GM decision to close the MI plant rather than TX: "The President lashed out at Sen. Don Riegle (D-MI) who at the time had suggested looking into any possible administration involvement." Bush: "I made no such intervention and I take it

as a direct attack on my character to have a United States Senator say that. It is a bold faced lie." Bierbauer on Bush's Mercedes ad: "Bush rides in a heavily armored Cadillac but he's trying to get political mileage out of Pat Buchanan's wheels." Buchanan refutes the ad saying he did not call all American cars lemons. Bierbauer: "Then Buchanan struck back with his own TV ad charging top Bush campaign aides are in the pay of foreign government." Bierbauer on the administration's decision not to require auto makers to install vapor trapping canisters on vehicles: "The president brings Detroit something it has been looking for" (CNN, 3/13). ABC's Kathleen Delaski: "Reporters are starting to call Air Force One 'Santa's Sleigh,' because at almost every campaign stop President Bush hands out presents. Yesterday, in Detroit it was goodies for ailing car makers ... before the Florida primary the candidate rode in with millions to restore the state's wetlands. In Oklahoma it was help for the natural gas industry. And before that important first primary, New Hampshire, the Bush administration quickly organized a pilot program for small business. That one really made the Democrats angry. Democrats call this 'presidential pork' and say it's ironic that George Bush is on the campaign trail accusing them of the same thing. Last week he said they are sacrificing national security for political security. The president's advisors say what he's doing is not pork. Even so, some analysts call it unseemly." Analyst Stuart Rothenberg: "It at least looks as if the President is pandering to localities just the way he complains individual congressmen are pandering to their constituencies." Delaski: "Presidents have been pulling out the goodie bag at reelection time for years! George Bush just seemed to do it sooner and more often than most. Now that he perceives the Buchanan threat to behind him, he's expected to leave Santa's sleigh at home" (ABC, 3/14). NBC's Garrick Utley on Bush's MI ad: "[He] attacks Buchanan for driving a Mercedes. Now in the home state of GM, Ford and Chrysler that may earn him some political mileage, but does it add to presidential stature or the sense of a strong confident leader?" (3/14) Morton Kondracke: "They're not going to throw out Rich Bond because Rich Bond is the closest thing to Lee Atwater that there is left in this entire Republican party" (McLaughlin Group, 3/14).

*10 BUCHANAN: HINTS AT THIRD PARTY RUN

"Warning" that -- "unless he wins the '92 nomination or Bush embraces his brand of conservatism -- a new third-party composed of angry and disenchanted" GOPers is likely to be formed: "There is a vacuum in American politics for an 'America First' point of view and for small government conservatism and for traditional family values. If these aren't represented by the establishment of both parties, then something new, I think, is almost certain to emerge" (Fulwood, L.A. TIMES, 3/16). Speaking in MI: "If the Republican Party doesn't get back to the conservative views and conservative values in 1992, and they stay a one-party government with Democrats and Republicans conspiring with one another and collaborating with one another against the national interest of the American people, then in 1996 you will have a brand new third party. I guarantee you that" (Holmes, N.Y. TIMES, 3/16). Conservative author Russell Kirk: "Reluctantly, I would think a third party is the right thing to do if, as Pat says, the Republican Party doesn't return to its values in 1992" (Hallow, WASH. TIMES, 3/16). "Concerned" that his comments would be interpreted as meaning he wouldn't support the '92 GOP nominee,

aides reinforced his previous comments. Buchanan spokesperson Greg Mueller: "The comments were more of a warning" (Holmes, N.Y. TIMES, 3/16).

BOSTON GLOBE's Steven Stark: "Since Buchanan now seems to be running behind the vote that 'uncommitted' might receive as a protest against Bush, perhaps the voters are sending Pat a message too: 'Give up already'" (3/13). NEWSWEEK's CW is down: "Listen, little fella, you're confused. And stop complaining about your Cadillac" (3/23 issue). ECONOMIST opines, "Buchanan's nativism and his isolationism are so far even from what conservatives in the party now stand for that he is, in the words of Newt Gingrich, a leading conservative in Congress, 'close to becoming unacceptable'" (3/14). GOP analyst Kevin Phillips writes, "If he had pulled out all the stops -- for example, cataloguing the dozens of foreign agents and lobbyists with positions in the Bush campaign and GOP apparatus -- he might have gotten 35% to 40% of the vote and, with it, renewed momentum for a new round of April Bush-bashing" (L.A. TIMES, 3/15). DETROIT NEWS header: "The Jesse Jackson of the right?" (3/15).

1996 LINEUP: TIME's Michael Duffy contends Buchanan's target will increasingly shift from Bush to "rival conservatives who he feels hi-jacked the movement years ago. ... [His] lingering presence in the race continues to scramble the already complicated picture for 1996, when a battle royal will take place over the Bush succession." Duffy notes "one unexpected beneficiary of all this may be Dan Quayle," who has "spent more time on the road in bigger media markets, than he would have if Buchanan had not mounted a challenge" (3/23 issue). ORLANDO SENTINEL's Anne Groer examines the 1996 GOP prospects, noting Buchanan's tactics might have turned off some GOP voters whose support he would need in 1996 (3/15). Quayle on Buchanan and the future of the conservative movement: "The real leaders of that movement, in Congress and the Republican Party, have rejected his kind of conservatism. ... They know he would narrow the base of the party, when the rest of us are trying to expand it" (W. POST, 3/15). N.Y. TIMES: "Buchanan + Wilson + 1996 = Trouble" (3/15).

TV: Robert Novak called RNC chair Rich Bond's remarks on Buchanan "ridiculous": "If you want Pat Buchanan to be on the team, you don't attack him and you don't attack his people. That's dumb politics." Sec/Labor Lynn Martin on whether Buchanan is a hater: "I think Pat has done some ads that he will later regret" ("Capital Gang," CNN, 3/15). Rep. Susan Molinari (R-NY) says Buchanan has no future in the GOP because "he's not even running this in a semi-intellectual way. He's calling for the president to resign, he's calling for Rich Bond to resign. This man has really blown himself out of the water." ("Off The Record," FOX, 3/15).

With polls "showing his opponents within striking distance,"
Dixon "winds up his primary campaign today with a boost from the
states [Dem] establishment" (Ritter, SUN-TIMES). Mayor Daley,
Sen. Paul Simon, Ways and Means Chair Rostenkowsky and other IL
Dems "are scheduled to join Dixon at a press conference in
Chicago." Dixon: "Folks who love the party and are leaders in
the party support me" (3/16). Braun, whose "better financed
opponents have been attacking each other in a slew of ads," began
airing her first TV spots of the campaign 3/13, "only five days
before the election". Braun: "We have been blessed to be able to
get the airwaves this weekend." The first spot "attacks her
opponents as millionaires," the second is targeted to "Dixon's
longevity in office," and the third "relies" on Braun's record as
a state legislator. Braun declined to discuss how much will be
spent on "the last-minute media blitz" and "deflected" questions
about "whether it was a last-ditch effort." Braun's campaign has
"picked up steam in the form of contributions" since the 3/8
debate from groups like EMILY's List who had earlier declined to
support her (Thejirika, CHICAGO SUN-TIMES, 3/13). However, the
"quickly dropped" issue of a computer contract "steered to a
political ally" which Braun "coolly sloughed off" in the 3/8
debate "may not be so easily disposed of" according to "an
examination of the [Cook Co.] record." The contract in a project
to computerize Braun's office records went to "politically
connected" consultant James Lowry whose "bid was bested by seven
other companies." While the contract "was ultimately shelved,"
and the office is now taking new bids, Braun says she "took input
from many people" on the selection of Arthur Andersen for whom
James H. Lowry and Assoc. was a minority contractor and received
23% of the contract. Lowry has contributed to Braun's campaigns
throughout her career and last month co-chaired a Braun fundraiser
(Fegelman, CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 3/10). Braun "picked up another much-
needed dose of [media] attention" when Gloria Steinem stumped with
her last week while Hofeld "trumpeted a host of endorsements from
black ministers." Braun "must energize its support among blacks"
and "to that end the campaign plans to have Jesse Jackson ...
record radio commercials" on her behalf. Attending only private
fundraisers, Dixon "chose to spend yet another day out of public
eye" while his staff "denied the incumbent is so confident that he
plans to stay out of the limelight until" Election Day
(James/Parsons, CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 3/11). At a 3/12 press
conference called to draw attention to Dixon's honorary membership

at a golf club which has been "criticized for not admitting blacks and women as full members," Hofeld was asked about his own membership in a professional assn of trial lawyers that has no women or black members. Hofeld: "There are some applications pending." Hofeld's stated net worth has gone from \$15 million to less than \$11 million "as a result of his spending" on "his own campaign" (Parsons, CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 3/13). CHICAGO TRIBUNE's Thomas Hardy writes, "Election Day can't come soon enough" for Dixon who, in addition to two "formidable opponents" in Braun and Hofeld, has "his toughest rival [in] the intangible desire for change by voters." Predictions of moderate voter turnout "bode well for Dixon" who is backed by "most" party organizations (3/15).

===== ON THE HOUSE =====

*13 HOUSE BOINGERS: LATEX WEEKEND

Although the House has not released a single name, AP reports 110 Members have voluntarily outed themselves on their own check bouncing. But leading the weekend coverage was the leaking of a list purportedly containing 21 of the 24 House bank worst "abusers." The list, obtained by AP and other outlets only included Dem names, was republished by many news organizations. Also, it is NEWSWEEK's cover story.

THOSE IN THE LEADERSHIP: On "Brinkley," House Min. Whip Newt Gingrich first acknowledged "around 20" bounced checks, then attacked the "Democratic machine political scandal." Gingrich called for a special prosecutor, his distaste for the law notwithstanding. Asked by Sam Donaldson if he was charging a "criminal cover-up" over the cocaine dealing in the House post office, Gingrich: "There's no question that Tom Foley's office sat on that information for 10 months ... did not tell anybody on the Republican side ... The Democratic leadership only shares information after it appears in print. ... there is an institutional problem of corruption of power involving the Democratic leadership. It caused them to have a speaker and a whip resign in the last Congress. It is still there. It leads to cover-ups. ... if a reform Democrat is serious, they need to vote for Bob Michel to have a reformed speakership." An angry Speaker Tom Foley (D-WA) fired back later on the program: "Suggestions of cover-up and willful attempts to avoid responsibility are obviously and patently untrue, irresponsible, false ... outrageous ... Mr. Gingrich has shown a tendency to throw all caution to the wind, to engage in reckless attacks on individuals as totally without truth, and he frankly owes an apology to me, not so much because of the personal situation but because it's an example for his unbelievable disregard for the truth." Foley was against a special prosecutor (ABC, 3/15). Rep. Fred Grandy (R-IA), a member of the House Ethic Cmte, defended Foley against Gingrich: "In this particular instance ... [Gingrich] is perhaps working from data he himself could not corroborate" (W. POST, 3/16). On "Newsmaker Sunday," NRCC chair Guy Vander Jagt (R-MI): "When Republicans had Watergate, it was a Republican scandal because we were in charge. The Democrats are in charge. ... the Democrats tried to cover it up." ROLL CALL publisher Jim Glassman: "Everybody's missing the story. The story is Congress is reforming itself" (CNN, 3/15).

FROM THE CABINET? Eleanor Clift said a member of Bush's cabinet will be named among the check bouncers, but, "No, not Lynn

Martin" ("McLaughlin Group," 3/14).

SENATE BANK? ROLL CALL notes in the Senate leadership race after the '88 elections, 10 Dem Senators who are up in '92 signed a letter calling for Senate reforms, including a Senate bank, modeled after the House: Breaux (D-LA), Conrad (D-ND), Daschle (D-SD), Graham (D-FL), Fowler (D-GA), Mikulski (D-MD), Reid (D-NV), Sanford (D-NC), Shelby (D-AL) and Wirth (D-CO). The new Senate leader, George Mitchell (D-ME) was against the idea. One GOP Sen., McCain (R-AZ) "explored GOP support for the idea in 1987" but was told by fellow GOP senators "that it was not a good idea." The NRSC is encouraging use of the issue, although NRSC chair Phil Gramm (R-TX) "did not give it a whole-hearted endorsement." Sanford said he "had no interest and no need for an in-house bank, but [saw] no reason not to sign the cover sheet on a list of modernization suggestions." Conrad and Shelby pointed to '88 statements which indicated they were against the idea. The campaign of Wirth's GOP opponent, Terry Considine, charged that Wirth authored the letter "but his staff said he dropped the proposal after 1987" (3/16).

THOSE FACING RE-ELECTION: Rep. Charles Hayes (D-IL) tomorrow will be the first big bouncer to face voters (see #14).

THOSE RUNNING FOR HIGHER OFFICE: NY -- Named with most bad checks while seeking the Senate is Rep. Bob Mrazek (D-NY), who is listed for bouncing 972. N.Y. POST subhead: "Aides say Mrazek will stay in Dem Senate contest" (3/16). Mrazek A.A. Thomas Barry: "There is no way these numbers can be true" (NEWSDAY, 3/15). Mrazek aides, like manager Brian Lunde, had to answer questions with statements like: "There's every reason to believe it will go on" (N.Y. TIMES, 3/16). Mrazek adviser: "He's talking with the other people in the campaign and reaching out to political types for an assessment of the fallout." But Mrazek pollster Harrison Hickman said, "He's absolutely in this race to stay" (Orin, N.Y. POST, 3/16). CA "A" -- Rep. Barbara Boxer (D) at first said she did not have "a problem account," then later admitted to 87 boings: "It's the most embarrassing moment of my life. ... I feel like a fool" (MARIN INDEPENDENT JOURNAL, 3/13). LG Leo McCarthy (D) has jumped on the issue. Rep. Mel Levine (D-CA) said he bounced no checks. On the GOP side, Rep. Tom Campbell (R-CA), although he was accused by Palm Springs Mayor Sonny Bono of withholding information, had actually released a letter from then-House Sgt. at Arms Jack Russ which showed no boings. For the "B" seat, Rep. Bill Dannemeyer (R-CA) disclosed 27 boings but said he was "tripped up" by the bank's "bizarre" record system (S.J. MERCURY NEWS, 3/13). UT -- Rep. Wayne Owens (D-UT) has long been upfront on his 20-30 bad checks. He bragged he is "probably the first" Member to disclose his overdrafts" (ROLL CALL, 3/16). OR -- Rep. Les AuCoin (D-OR) also was upfront early. He faces a tough Dem primary from Harry Lonsdale who already has been running an outsider campaign against AuCoin. ID -- ROLL CALL notes Rep. Richard Stallings (D-ID) "has admitted to some" kiting but is facing a "stronger candidate than many first suspected" in Boise Mayor Dirk Kempthorne (R) (3/16).

MAKE-UP OF THE CLASS OF '92: Analyst Charles Cook: "You are going to see at least 50 incumbents lose, mostly over this" (USA TODAY, 3/16). Cook writes in a "memo" to Rep. John Doe, if a Member who won with less than 60% in '90 has bounced over 50 checks that total \$10,000 or more, he/she should start looking for a new job (ROLL CALL, 3/16).

TV: Rep. Dan Glickman (D-KS): "Most of us thought it was a legitimate normal bank. Boy what a fool I was ... because of

that, I thought that if you had an overdraft ... you would get a notification. Nothing like that ever happened." CNN's Michael Kinsley notes "one of these Republican killers like Newt Gingrich or Vin Weber or Duncan Hunter" wasn't on the show: "Could it be because they all bounced these checks too?" ("Crossfire," CNN, 3/13). Vander Jagt: "38 consecutive years of power by one party over any institution isn't healthy. ... The bank scandal is kind of a sore, is a symptom of an infection that goes through the whole system and people want the system to be changed. They want it put under new management." U.S. NEWS' David Gergen raises the question "what happened to the money?": "In some cases there were very large checks involved and people are asking ... was that money used only for personal purposes, or did it in fact go into campaigns, which would have been illegal. Might have it been used for gambling purposes, might it have been used for some sort of investment ring? ... Remember the point that Deep Throat made to Bob Woodward back during the Watergate scandal, and it was 'follow the money.'" Mark Shields: "The rage is misdirected however. The rage ought to be at a campaign finance system which is truly corrosive. If we're talking about privilege, we're talking about a system which is rigged for incumbents for both parties" ("MacNeil/Lehrer," PBS, 3/13). U.S. NEWS' Michael Barone: "Bush is gonna run heavily against Congress here, I think the Democrats are in a position to take major losses." "Off the Record" panel predicts how many seats will be lost due to the scandal: Barone, 118; Molinari, about 100 with retirements and redistricting; Elliot, 75; Goodgame, 85; Beckel, 115 (3/15). ABC's Peter Jennings: "What does a member of the House of Representatives spend most of his time doing today? Doing damage control" (3/13). NBC's Andrea Mitchell on Jack Russ: "After 25 years of doing members bidding, he fell on his sword last night" (3/13). NBC reported on congressional perks. NBC's Robin Lloyd: "Congress is in for a long haul as it tries to restore public confidence and it's going to take a lot more than just paying the going rate for haircuts" NBC's Henry Champ: "As the worst offenders are being identified, the reception back home could be much worse than for those who today were trying to limit the damage" (3/14). NBC's Garrick Utley interviewed DCCC chairman Rep. Vic Fazio (D-CA). Fazio: "We already anticipated with reapportionment and the economy in the shape it's in that this would not be a great year for incumbents. We anticipate, with a number of retirements, perhaps 75 to 100 members joining the Congress next January" (3/14). How many Congressman will lose their seats because of this scandal? Fred Barnes: between 30 and 65; Eleanor Clift: at least 100 overall, 50 because of this scandal ("This is the killing fields on Capitol Hill ... This is better than term limits"); Jack Germond: turnover "for various reasons" might be 120; Morton Kondracke ("This is a huge embarrassment to these guys ... but it is not the fundamental, deep-seated corruption problem that it's being represented as") ("McLaughlin Group," 3/14). NBC's Henry Champ: "It was a tough weekend, Congressmen were back at home trying to explain their involvement ... but the mood was even meaner and more bipartisan in Washington." Analyst Norman Ornstein: "Foley did not act swiftly enough ... he's gonna have to get more assertive and aggressive" (3/16). Rep. Newt Gingrich (R-GA): "I don't have a fight with Tom Foley as a person but the Speaker is the institutional representative of the Democratic majority. They've had control for 38 years, they hire all the key officers of the House ... The speaker has to take responsibility for a whole series of scandals" (3/16). ABC's Sheliah Kast:

"Some congressmen ... dispute the record." Kast spoke about NY congress members who are on the list of overdrafters while footage showed the sign at Rep. Bob Mrazek's (D-03) NY office with a "bounced check" pasted over it, courtesy of an angry constituent. Kast: "Many have decided apology is the best strategy, but some are not apologizing." Rep. Charles Hayes (D-IL): "If it cost the tax payers money or the government money then it would be an issue" (3/16). Grandy: "I think it will be very hard for these members ... to argue it was just bank errors." S.F. EXAMINER's Chris Matthews: "Maybe this is a good thing ... this will give a challenger an edge" (ABC, 3/16). ABC's Morton Dean on The List: "All of them were Democrats. Two Republicans have been added to the list since then. The excuses are as varied as the states they represent" (3/16). CBS' Jim Stewart on pinning the House Bank scandal on the Dems: "Because so many members of Congress are involved that may be a hard sell." Sen. Maj. Leader George Mitchell (D-ME) on Bush attacking Dems: "People expect more from a president that criticism of others than finger-pointing" (CBS, 3/16). CBS' Randall Pinkston: "Quayle is already calling the [scandal] a national disgrace" (3/16).

*14 IL 01: HAYES IS CHECK-KITING'S CASE STUDY #1

At a news conference incumbent Rep. Charles Hayes tried to turn his check kiting "into an excuse for a political rally" (Mittra, TRIBUNE). And rather than being "contrite," Hayes attempted to "turn the tables, alleging that his best known opponent, Ald. Bobby Rush (2nd), has been no financial saint himself." Hayes alleges that Rush in the 1980s "had fallen behind on alimony and child-support payments to his ex-wife" (3/16). In a Sunday Page One story, CHICAGO TRIBUNE reports Rep. Charles Hayes (D-01), already in a reasonably tight primary race against Rush but still "considered the front-runner," was named "as one of the most prolific check-bouncers" at the House bank with a total of 716 bad checks. His name was among the 21 Dems on a list obtained by the AP. The 21 are said to be part of the 24 who were labeled "abusers" by the House. Hayes said he had voted for full disclosure and "was not apologetic": "I have said before ... this whole thing is a personal matter. I overdrew in small amounts. I covered any overdrafts. I owe no money." Rush: "[I]f this were placed in the context of a congressman who was productive, had sought vigorously to relieve some of the pressures and problems of the people of this [CD], there would be some mitigation to the outrage that voters would feel" (Johnson/Wiltz, 3/15).

*15 IL 02: REYNOLDS ACCUSES SAVAGE OF INCITING SHOOTING

Three-time opponent Mel Reynolds (D) said Rep. Gus Savage's (D-02) "volatile" rhetoric "helped incite a shooting that slightly injured Reynolds. Reynolds: "I can't imagine Gus Savage and his people sitting in a room and planning a bit on Mel Reynolds. But when you talk in volatile terms, ... incite and make wild accusations, you ought to think about the possible consequences of your words." Savage has attacked Reynolds for accepting money from Jewish groups and was censured by a campaign watchdog group for "employing bigotry as a campaign tactic." Reynolds, who said he had received threats to "get out of the race or you'll be sorry," was shot at 3/12 by a tailgating car. Neither he nor his accompanying aides were seriously injured (Herman/O'Connor, CHICAGO SUN-TIMES, 3/14). During a 3/14 news conference billed as a "truth" rally, Savage said "I pity and forgive" Reynolds, though he accused him of being a "front" man for whites and the media.

Savage supporters attending the rally accused Reynolds of staging the shooting (Burgos, CHICAGO SUN-TIMES, 3/15). CHICAGO TRIBUNE header: "Shooting puts Reynolds in the spotlight" (3/14). Under header, "Savage plays the race card again," a CHICAGO TRIBUNE editorial opines, "He is slamming down the race card with a vengeance, baiting black voters to support him on the notion that blacks lose when Jews win. ... Let Gus Savage rave on. But instead of a winning gambit, it ought to become this year an exhibit in the case for his defeat" (3/14).

*16 OTHER IL HOUSE RACES

IL 03: Lipinski manager Tom Maynard1: "Out here he's not thought of as a congressman. ... He's almost like an alderman who went to Washington" (Hayner, SUN-TIMES). 3rd Cong. Dist. Rep. Marty Russo is Lipinski's opponent for the Dem nomination also explains Lipinski through "a Chicago attitude.": "Bill Lipinski is taking money from his congressional employees and from the taxpayers to line his own pockets" (3/16).

IL-05: Ways and Means Chair Dan Rostenkowski is taking Ex-Ald. Dick Simpson's (D-44th) primary challenge "seriously, dusting off campaign skills that had been in storage for years" (Hayner, SUN-TIMES). Simpson "hopes to be the guy who sends a message to Washington that big-name incumbents can be taken down" (3/16).

NBC -- MEET THE PRESS

Moderator: Tim Russert. Panel: David Broder, John Chancellor.
Guest: Paul Tsongas.

Broder: What's the evidence that your approach would work?

Tsongas: Well, the capital gains tax cut has been tried, and what George Bush has said, basically, he says, "You get a capital gains tax cut no matter what you invest in." So if you invest in real estate, if you invest in art collections, you invest in racehorses, you get a tax credit that has nothing to do with what's going on in terms of competing, No. 1. So all of mine goes into securities, which is where the manufacturing base is. No. 2, if you are a speculator, I charge you a higher rate.

Chancellor: ...Let me take you onto another contentious issue here -- abortion. You told the Chicago Sun-Times editorial board that, if elected, you would have your choices for seats on the Supreme Court...pass a litmus test. They would have to support abortion rights, or you wouldn't nominate them.

Tsongas: ...In normal situations, you would say, "No litmus test for the Supreme Court." But you now have a Bush-Reagan Supreme Court.... I'm strongly pro-choice, and you can certainly -- within that framework, there are thousands of well-qualified people.

Russert: ...Is Bill Clinton electable?

Tsongas: Well, Bob Kerrey said he wasn't. I have serious doubts about that.... I will support Bill Clinton if he's the nominee....

Russert: Will you accept the vice presidency?

Tsongas: No.

POLITICAL DISCUSSION

Broder: ...[The Bush campaign is] so eager to be done with this Buchanan challenge, and I think it may be just about to wind down. Michigan and Illinois may be virtually the last round for Pat Buchanan and then George Bush, who has handled Buchanan about as badly as you could imagine any president handling a challenger, could finally get back onto his message. // why?

Chancellor: ...I think the economy has hurt Bush easily as much as Buchanan has. I find fascinating that the Chicago Tribune in a poll out here just this week found that Ronald Reagan's negatives in the state of Illinois -- a state he carried twice in presidential elections -- his negative rating is now 50 percent. His positive rating is 36 percent. People have turned against Ronald Reagan? Is nothing sacred? Is the bloom off this particular rose? And what does this mean for the fall? I would think that would be terrible news for the Republicans in the fall.

Grandy: ...If there were to be a full investigation of the House from the post office to the bank to the gym, I would give it to the Ethics Committee and let them begin, because a special prosecutor now is basically a partisan trump card.

Cardin: ...I don't think I can sit still and listen to what Newt Gingrich had to say without at least making some comments. Our investigation was completely on a bipartisan basis, and the report of our committee points out very clearly that in the final analysis, the responsibility for what happened in the bank rests on those members who...wrote checks where they didn't have sufficient funds.

On the House bank: With Foley.

Foley: Today, [Gingrich] transferred the attack to me and said my office had held information for 10 months about problems inside the post office.... That is false and irresponsible.... This is not a partisan scandal any more than the House bank problems are a partisan problem. Richard Bond said last week this is a bipartisan problem. It's been approached on a bipartisan basis by almost everybody except Mr. Gingrich and some others -- Mr. Guy Vander Jagt, who is in charge of trying to win seats for the Republicans in the House -- and they're desperately trying to make a political issue.

Will: ...Explain to the country...why a special prosecutor is appropriate for Ed Meese and not appropriate for the House?

Foley: Because in the special prosecutor, we don't have authority in the Congress to conduct criminal operations. Those are in the Executive Branch. The idea of the special prosecutor was that the attorney general...shouldn't be charged with investigating in criminal ways one of his own party. There is no problem with the attorney general prosecuting any matter of misconduct among employees or other people in the Congress.

POLITICAL DISCUSSION

On foreign policy: Bob Maynard joins the panel.

Brinkley: Is Mr. Bush afraid now to mess with foreign policy?

Will: Mr. Bush is frightened of Pat Buchanan and frightened of polls and frightened of this, that and the other thing. And he's blotting, therefore, the one page in his copy book not yet blotted, and that is his foreign policy record.

Donaldson: ...Mr. Nixon says we should do more, and that's one of the very few points on which I agree with him. But it's curious that, even as he said that, we were discovering that the Russians had gotten through the winter....

Maynard: ...The point is that this President has an opportunity to lead in this area and that is what Mr. Nixon was referring to as the failure of leadership. But Buchanan has already demonstrated the problem. is the main

On the House bank: With Gingrich.

Will: Since this town has been very quick when the Executive Branch people get into trouble to appoint a special prosecutor, do you think one ought to be appointed here and hound people into bankruptcy, as happens in the Executive Branch?

Gingrich: ...We either ought to abolish special prosecutor laws for everybody or we ought to apply them to the Congress....

Donaldson: ...I take it, if I understand you correctly, that you blame the Democratic leadership for allowing this to happen. But you absolve members like yourself -- you say you may have written 20 hot checks -- who didn't know what was going on. And I take it you mean you would absolve Democrats in the same condition?

Gingrich: Sure.... Let me draw a distinction.... I believe a lot of individual members, Democrat and Republican, individually are going to be embarrassed, many of whom were never notified by the bank, had no idea they had a problem and were shocked to discover later on. I think in that case, whether you're a Democrat or a Republican, that you should be absolved.... I believe that the institutional control of the House by the current Democratic leadership makes it impossible to reform the House....

Donaldson: ...Let me ask you about this cocaine scandal [in the House post office]. How much cocaine? Who is responsible? Do you blame Tom Foley for that also?

Gingrich: Well, Tom Foley knew about it for at least 10 months, did not tell anybody outside his own immediate office. The chief of police resigned in disgust because he was blocked from investigating.... I mean, at what point does the speaker take responsibility?

Donaldson: Wait a moment. You are telling me that you're charging that the speaker of the House of Representatives was part of a criminal cover-up of cocaine?

Gingrich: There is no question -- none. It's come out, and there is no question that Tom Foley's office sat on that information for 10 months, did not tell Bob Michel, did not tell anybody on the Republican side....

On the House bank: With Cardin and Grandy.

Will: Do you think...that a special prosecutor is in order?

BUSH IS URGED TO SPEAK UP FOR RUSSIA

Worried that economic desperation could transform the former Soviet republics into hostile dictatorship, many Republicans in Congress have joined Democrats and former President Nixon in urging the Bush Administration to take the lead in backing billions of dollars more in aid to the republics....

This is going to require very aggressive leadership on the part of the President," said Rep. Obey. "I think the White House has been so rattled by Buchanan that they're bobbing and weaving on many issues, including this."...

Administration officials say that Secretary Brady has repeatedly called on Congress to vote \$12 billion to replenish the I.M.F. and that President Bush wrote to several members of Congress last year to seek support for such financing.

"Right now the Administration is looking at the whole aid picture toward Russia and the C.I.S. -- an in-depth look," said an Administration official who has followed the aid debate closely. "It's not being spurred by any criticism or suggestion. It's something that's been done off and on since the late of '91."

TOKYO -- North Korea had developed a trigger for a nuclear bomb more than a year ago but made no effort to test it in order to keep its atomic weapons program secret, the Japanese press reported Monday morning, quoting a Russian weekly....

If accurate, the report would advance the date Western and Japanese analysts had predicted that North Korea would be able to use a nuclear weapon. (Edward Neilan, Washington Times, A7)

PANEL SAYS ARMY BUNGLED 'FRIENDLY FIRE' NOTIFICATION

The Army, through a series of "bumbles, glitches, errors and wrong assumptions," mishandled notifying the family of a soldier killed by "friendly fire" in the Persian Gulf War, according to a congressional study released Sunday.

The House Armed Services investigations subcommittee found no evidence of a conspiracy or coverup in the death of Army Cpl. Douglas Fielder, killed accidentally by his comrades' guns and posthumously promoted to sergeant. The family initially was told Fielder was killed by enemy fire.

"In this instance, virtually everything that could go wrong did go wrong," the panel said in its report....

In a statement, the Army, which is conducting its own review, said the panel's report "clearly indicates there was no intention on the part of the Army to cover up a friendly fire incident or mislead the family." (AP, Washington Post, A9)

ISRAELIS STEP UP SKIRMISH WITH U.S.

JERUSALEM -- Israeli officials stepped up their attacks on the U.S. Monday over allegations that Israel had illegally resold American weapons technology to China, South Africa and other countries. At the same time, military experts here said the arms-sale charges suggest that the longstanding strategic relationship between the U.S. and Israel might be at an important turning point.

If so, the Middle East peace conference could be undermined, some of them warned, arguing that an Israel that doubts Washington's steadfastness would be much less likely to offer the Arabs concessions that might involve security risks.

JOINT CHIEFS VETOED SHIPMENT OF TOP MISSILE TO ISRAEL

The Joint Chiefs of Staff blocked a move during the Persian Gulf crisis to provide Israel with the United States' most advanced air-to-air missile because it feared the missile technology would be diverted to Third World customers, Bush Administration officials say.... An Israeli government official said Sunday that Israel is willing to permit a team of U.S. experts to inspect those Patriot batteries, but so far it has not received a formal request from the Bush Administration. "We have nothing to hide," the official said. "We are willing to cooperate and we want to resolve this as soon as possible."

One Administration official said that during the buildup of the allied forces in the fall of 1990, Israel requested a version of the Sidewinder missile called the AIM-9M. The 9M is considered the most advanced model.... The officials said the bid to provide Israel with the 9M was promoted by the office of Paul Wolfowitz, undersecretary of defense for policy.

U.S. CARRIER MOVES TOWARD IRAQ TARGETS

LONDON -- The U.S. stepped up its pressure on Saddam Hussein this weekend as the carrier USS America moved into position in the Gulf within striking range of targets across Iraq.

Details emerged of a CIA operation to undermine the Iraqi economy by flooding the country with counterfeit money. Pentagon planners preparing for "punitive strikes" against military sites have up-to-date intelligence reports from U.S. inspectors in Iraq.

President Bush's main concerns will be that any military action is strictly in line with U.N. resolutions on the destruction of Iraq's nuclear and missile arsenal. His decision to press ahead will depend also on estimates of civilian casualties. A massacre could reverse the support of regional allies and backfire on his U.S. presidential election campaign....

The CIA has been systematically swamping Iraq with forged dinars, the Iraqi currency, intelligence sources say.... CIA sources said the notes were smuggled in through Jordan, Iran and Turkey by agents and unsuspecting traders.... The CIA has picked up indications from Baghdad that the government is so worried that it is considering printing new notes to replace the denominations affected.

ISRAELIS CHARGE 'SMEAR CAMPAIGN' DENY VIOLATIONS IN SALES OF U.S. ARMS

JERUSALEM -- Israeli political leaders Sunday reacted with alarm as the government's conflict with the Bush Administration spread from political issues to the military relationship between the two countries, and they charged that Israel is the victim of "slander" and a "smear campaign" in Washington.

Senior government spokesmen strongly denied any violations had taken place. Privately, some officials and independent experts conceded that Israel may have sold weapons or taken advantage of "gray areas" in agreements with the U.S. However, Israeli officials and news media described the new controversy in Washington over the weapons sale as part of a stepped-up effort by elements in and outside the Bush Administration to put pressure on the government of Prime Minister Shamir....

Officials also warned that the latest controversy may augur a far-reaching reshaping of U.S.-Israeli relations that could lead to the end of America's role as the chief guarantor and sponsor of Israel's military might. "This deliberate campaign, a slander against Israel, is intended to undermine Israel's position in the American public and Congress," government spokesman Benjamin Netanyahu told reporters....

Officials have said the government would be willing to allow U.S. inspectors to investigate these and other charges in Israel, and the newspaper Haaretz reported Sunday that a U.S. inspection team, headed by a State Department official and including experts from the Pentagon and Commerce department, is expected here this week. (Jackson Diehl, Washington Post, A12)

Israel Complains Of 'Slander' Campaign By U.S.

JERUSALEM -- Israeli leaders have accused the Bush Administration of engaging in a "deliberate campaign of slander" by leaking reports that Israel was illegally selling U.S. weapons technology to China, South Africa and other nations.

Some suggested the leaks were an attempt to erode the relationship between the two countries that has been hurt by friction connected with U.S. efforts to mediate the Middle East peace process. The reports were particularly embarrassing to Defense Minister Arens, who is on a weeklong trip to the U.S.

"We must get used to a situation in which we are faced with an Administration that is not supportive of Israeli policy," Health Minister Elmert said Sunday after the weekly Cabinet meeting....

Israel Radio quoted high-ranking but unnamed sources in the defense industry who said, "Elements in the Administration and the security industry in the United States have taken out a contract on us. Israel is a producer of weapon systems, some of which are even more advanced than the American ones. They see that Israel is succeeding in selling its products, and this makes them angry." (Jonathan Ferzinger, UPI)

LOAN GUARANTEE PROGRAM FOR ABSORPTION
OF IMMIGRANTS IN ISRAEL

Sec. ____ (A) AUTHORITY TO ISSUE GUARANTEES.--

(1) In General.--Subject to the terms and conditions of this section, during the period beginning April 1, 1992 and ending September 30, 1997, the President is authorized to issue guarantees against losses incurred in connection with loans to Israel made as a result of Israel's extraordinary humanitarian effort to resettle and absorb Jewish immigrants into Israel from the republics of the former Soviet Union and Ethiopia.

(2) Fiscal Year Levels.--Subject to subsection (c) (2), and in addition to any other authority to issue guarantees for such purposes, the President is authorized to issue guarantees in furtherance of the purposes of this section. The total principal amount of guarantees which may be issued under this section during any fiscal year shall be as follows:

(A) Fiscal Year 1992.--Subject to paragraph (3), the principal amount of such guarantees made available in fiscal year 1992 may be up to \$1,000,000,000.

(B) Fiscal Years 1993-1996.--The principal amount of such guarantees made available in each of fiscal years 1993 through 1996 may be up to \$2,000,000,000.

(C) Fiscal Year 1997.--The principal amount of such guarantees made available in fiscal year 1997 may be up to \$1,000,000,000.

(3) Guarantees in Fiscal Year 1992.--

(A) Initial Guarantees.--Guarantees are authorized to be made available in fiscal year 1992 for Israel initially as follows:

(i) The principal amount of guarantees designated in paragraph (2) (A) shall be reduced by \$400,000,000, the estimated expenditures by the Government of Israel, directly or indirectly, to complete the construction of housing units and related infrastructure in the occupied territories where such construction was begun prior to January 1, 1992. The housing units referred to in this clause are the up to 5,500 units estimated by the U.S. Government to have been started by that date. The President shall determine the criteria and standards to identify such units, which shall be specifically identified in accordance with subsection (1)(1).

(ii) Of the principal amount of guarantees remaining after reducing the principal amount in accordance with clause (i), \$300,000,000 should be made available for Israel as soon as possible after enactment and after a loan agreement consistent with this section has been concluded.

(b) ANNUAL CONSULTATIONS.--

(1) Annual Consultations.--It is the sense of the Congress that, as agreed previously between the United States and Israel, the Government of Israel and the United States Government should continue to engage in annual consultations concerning economic and financial measures, including structural and other reforms, that Israel should undertake during the pendency of this guarantee program to enable its economy to absorb and resettle immigrants from the former Soviet Union and Ethiopia into Israel and to accommodate the increased debt burden that will result from loans guaranteed pursuant to this section. Such consultations should be completed--

(A) for fiscal year 1992, as soon as possible, with a view toward their completion within 30 days of the date of enactment of this Act; and

(B) for each of fiscal years 1993 through 1997, as soon as possible in each fiscal year, with a view toward their completion by October 31 of each such fiscal year.

(2) Report.--Not later than 15 days after the completion of the consultations referred to in paragraph (1) of this subsection, the President should submit a report on such consultations to Congress which should include--

(A) the specific economic and financial measures that Israel intends to undertake to enable its economy to absorb and resettle immigrants from the former Soviet Union and Ethiopia and to accommodate the increased debt burden that will result from loans guaranteed pursuant to this section; and

(B) the timetable Israel intends to follow in implementing these measures.

(c) DETERMINATION OF ANNUAL GUARANTEE LEVELS.--

(1) Annual Determination.--Except as provided in subsection (a)(3)(A), the President is authorized to determine the actual amount of guarantees to be issued in each fiscal year of this program, with the amount of guarantees to be made available based among other things on the level of immigration to Israel, Israel's financial needs in absorbing the immigrants, and whether Israel has engaged in construction or other activities inconsistent with this section or with any related understanding or agreement reached between the United States and Israel. The President should submit such determinations to the Congress by December 31 of each fiscal year during the pendency of this program.

(2) Carryover of Authority.--If less than the full amount of guarantees authorized to be made available in a fiscal year is issued to Israel during that fiscal year, the authority to issue the balance of such guarantees shall extend to any subsequent fiscal year ending on or before September 30, 1997.

(d) SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION.--

(1) Authority to Suspend or Terminate.--If, at any time, the President determines that the Government of Israel, or any private entity or individual in any way or to any extent funded, supported, sponsored, subsidized, directly or indirectly by the Government of Israel, on or after the date of enactment of this Act, has engaged in new construction activity, or the placement or purchase of housing units or related infrastructure or other buildings of any type, whether temporary or permanent, in the occupied territories or has acquired, leased or set aside additional land for new settlements or expansion of existing settlements, or has made new or additional improvements of lands already acquired or set aside, and if the President determines that any such activity is inappropriate, the President may, subject to the conditions set forth in this subsection, suspend or terminate the provision of all or part of the additional loan guarantees not yet issued under this section. Construction activity that the President may consider to be inappropriate shall be, inter alia, housing and related infrastructure beyond the 5,500 units referred to in subsections a(3)(A)(i) and 1(1) and general infrastructure construction.

(2) Procedures for Suspension or Termination.--Any such suspension or termination shall be in accordance with the following procedures:

(A) Upon making a determination to suspend or terminate the provision of loan guarantees, the President shall submit to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate his determination to do so, including the basis for such suspension or termination.

(B) Such a suspension or termination shall cease to be effective if Congress enacts, within 30 days of submission, a joint resolution authorizing the assistance notwithstanding the suspension or termination.

(C) Any such joint resolution shall be considered in the Senate in accordance with the provisions of section 601(b) of the International Security Assistance and Arms Export Control Act of 1976.

(D) For the purpose of expediting the consideration and enactment of joint resolutions under this subsection, a motion to proceed to the consideration of any such joint resolution after it has been reported by the appropriate committee shall be treated as highly privileged in the House of Representatives.

(3) Resumption of the Program.--In the event that the President suspends the provision of additional loan guarantees under this subsection and Congress does not enact a joint resolution pursuant to paragraph (2)(B), the provision of additional loan guarantees under the program established by this section may be resumed only if the President determines and so reports to Congress that the reasons for the suspension have been resolved or that the resumption is otherwise in the national interest.

(e) USE OF GUARANTEES.--No part of any loan for which guarantees are issued under this section may be used by the Israeli Government or any private entity or individual in any way or to any extent funded, supported, sponsored or subsidized, directly or indirectly, by the Government of Israel on or after the date of enactment of this Act, for construction activity or the placement or purchase of housing units or related infrastructure or other buildings of any type, whether temporary or permanent, in the occupied territories, or to acquire, lease, or set aside additional land for new settlements or expansion of existing settlements or for new or additional improvements of lands already acquired or set aside in geographic areas which were not subject to the administration of the Government of Israel before June 5, 1967.

(f) GOODS AND SERVICES.--Congress expects that, within the twelve months following each issuance of the guarantees authorized hereunder, the amount of U.S. goods and services purchased for use in or with respect to the country of Israel will be increased over such amounts purchased within the prior 12 months in an amount at least substantially equal to fifty percent of the principal amount of loans actually made and guaranteed during such fiscal year.

(g) REPORTING REQUIREMENT.--Not later than December 1, 1992, and annually thereafter, the Secretary of State shall submit a report to Congress concerning--

(1) the manner in which the loans made pursuant to this section are being used;

(2) the degree of compliance by the Government of Israel with the terms and conditions set forth in this section or any related agreement;

(3) the progress Israel is making with the economic and financial reforms referred to in subsection (b);

(4) the extent of Israel's creditworthiness and ability to repay the loans made under this section; and

(5) the extent to which United States companies are participating in the guarantee program in accordance with subsection (f).

NOTE: SUBSECTIONS (h), (i), (j), AND (k) MUST BE REVIEWED BY OMB, AID, AND TREASURY PRIOR TO PROVIDING COMMENTS. THIS NEW LEGISLATION WOULD BE ACCEPTABLE TO THE ADMINISTRATION ONLY IF THERE ARE NO ADVERSE BUDGETARY IMPLICATIONS (E.G., WITH RESPECT TO THE FEDERAL CREDIT REFORM ACT OF 1990) THAT ARE NOT REIMBURSED BY ISRAEL UP FRONT. FOR INSTANCE, THE 150 ACCOUNT MUST BE HELD HARMLESS. ADDITIONAL LANGUAGE MAY BE NEEDED TO ESTABLISH AN EFFECTIVE MECHANISM TO ENSURE THIS RESULT.

[(h) TIMING OF GUARANTEES.--Each loan guarantee issued under this section shall guarantee 100 percent of the principal and interest payable on such loans. Subject to the conditions set forth in this section, loan guarantees shall be made in such increments as the President may determine.

(i) TERMS AND CONDITIONS.--

(1) Each loan guarantee issued under this section shall guarantee 100 percent of the principal and interest payable on such loans.

(2). The standard terms of any loan or increment guaranteed under this section should be 30 years with semiannual payments of interest only over the first 10 years, and with semiannual payment of principal and interest on a level payment basis over the last 20 years thereof, except that the guaranteed loan or any increments issued in a single transaction may include obligations having different maturities, interest rates, and payment terms if the aggregate scheduled debt service for all obligations issued in a single transaction equals the debt service for a single loan or increment of like amount having the standard terms described in this sentence. The guarantor shall not have the right to accelerate any guaranteed loan or increment or to pay any amounts in respect of the guarantees issued other than in accordance with the original payment terms of the loan. For purposes of determining the maximum principal amount of any loan or

increment to be guaranteed under this section, the principal amount of each such loan or increment shall be --

(A) in the case of any loan issued on a discount basis, the original issue price (excluding any transaction costs) thereof; or

(B) in the case of any loan issued on an interest-bearing basis, the stated principal amount thereof.

(j) **APPLICABILITY OF FOREIGN ASSISTANCE ACT AUTHORITIES.**--Section 223 of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 shall apply to guarantees issued under subsection (a) in the same manner as such section applies to guarantees issued under section 222 except that subsections (a), (e)(1), (g) and (j) of section 223 shall not apply to such guarantees and except that, to the extent section 223 is inconsistent with the Federal Credit Reform Act of 1990, that Act shall apply. Loans shall be guaranteed under this section without regard to sections 221, 222, and 238(c). Notwithstanding section 223(f), the interest rate for loans guaranteed under this section may include a reasonable fee to cover the costs and fees incurred by the borrower in connection with financing under this section in the event the borrower elects not to finance such costs or fees out of loan principal. Guarantees once issued hereunder, shall be unconditional and fully and freely transferable.

(k) **FEEES.**--Notwithstanding any other provision of law, fees charged for the loan guarantee program under this section--

(1) shall be an aggregate origination fee equal to the estimated subsidy cost of the guarantees issued under this section, calculated under the Federal Credit Reform Act of 1990;

(2) may be adjusted so that the amount due annually reflects any reestimate of the subsidy cost of the guarantees issued under this section, except that any such reestimate must be approved in advance in an appropriations Act;

(3) shall include an amount for the administrative expenses of the Agency for International Development in administering the program under this section, which amount shall be paid to such agency and merged and consolidated with funds appropriated for "Operating Expenses of the Agency for International Development"; and

(4) the origination fee shall be payable to the United States Government on a pro rata basis as each guarantee for each loan or increment is issued, and the administrative fee charged shall be at the actual estimated cost for each fiscal year, payable to the United States Government by the Government of Israel within 30 days of issuance of the guarantees in such fiscal year.]

(1) BILATERAL AGREEMENTS.--

No guarantees shall be provided by the President pursuant to this section until the President determines that satisfactory agreements have been reached with the Government of Israel regarding the implementation of this section, which should include provisions requiring--

(1) the identification of the specific housing units referred to in subsection(a)(3)(A)(i) and a requirement that they be marked on the ground;

(2) a suitable mechanism to monitor the ending of construction activity in the occupied territories, including on-site inspection, requested by the United States Government;

(3) monthly reports by the Government of Israel containing full information on licenses or other approvals given for private construction activity in the occupied territories; and

(4) appropriate indemnification against any losses that may be incurred by the United States Government.

THE WEEK OF MARCH 16 - MARCH 20

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Tuesday the House passed a number of bills by voice vote, including H.R. 4449, amending the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Act to give state and local governments flexibility in spending federal housing grants.

On Wednesday the House voted to go to conference on H.R. 4210, the Economic Growth Acceleration Act of 1992 (the Democrats' tax bill). Representative Bill Archer (R-TX) offered a motion to instruct the conferees to reject any increase in taxes. However, the Archer motion was superceded by an amendment offered by Representative Dan Rostenkowski (D-IL) instructing the conferees to support a middle-class tax cut, which passed by a narrow vote of 206 to 200. The House then passed the Archer motion as amended, by voice vote.

The House also passed H.R. 3209, the Federal Employee Reservist Benefit Extension Act of 1992, by a vote of 354 to 57. The bill would compensate federal workers for pay cuts taken when they entered active duty during the Persian Gulf War.

On Friday the House passed the conference report accompanying H.R. 4210, the Democrats' tax bill, by a vote of 211 to 189. Sixteen Republicans and seven Democrats who voted with us (against the bill) when it passed the House last week, were absent and did not vote.

SENATE

On Wednesday the Senate sustained your veto of H.R. 2212, conditional Most Favored Nation status for China, by a vote of 60 to 38. The Senate then passed H.R. 3209, legislation to reauthorize federal railroad safety programs. The bill will boost minimum fines for safety violations and require the Federal

Railroad Administration to increase enforcement of railroad safety regulations.

On Thursday the Senate again failed to invoke cloture on H.R. 3371, the Democrats' crime bill, by a vote of 54 to 43.

On Friday the Senate passed the conference report accompanying H.R. 4210, the Democrats' tax bill, by a vote of 50 to 44.

HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEES

HOUSE

On Wednesday the **House Foreign Affairs Committee** held a hearing on H.R. 4168, legislation to promote a peaceful transition to democracy in Cuba through the application of appropriate pressures on the Cuban government and support for the Cuban people.

On Thursday the **House Banking Committee** heard testimony from Housing and Urban Affairs Secretary Jack Kemp regarding the financial soundness of the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) and the impact of the National Affordable Housing Act administered by HUD.

SENATE

On Tuesday the **Senate Foreign Relations Committee** held a hearing on the plight of Soviet scientists tempted by lucrative offers from nations trying to develop nuclear weapons programs.

Also on Tuesday the **Senate Governmental Affairs Committee** approved S. 914, the Hatch Act Reform Amendments, by a vote of 8 to 4. This legislation would amend the 1939 Hatch Act to allow federal employees to take part in political activities as long as it is not during work hours. Engaging in political activities on the job would still be prohibited. Members rejected several Republican amendments including one that would have required employees of each federal agency to vote on whether changes to the Hatch Act would apply to them.

On Thursday the **Senate Foreign Relations Committee** held a hearing on reports of mass killings of Kurds and Shiites in Iraq by the regime of Saddam Hussein.

THE WEEK OF MARCH 23 - MARCH 27

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

The House will not be in session on Monday.

On Tuesday the House will consider a number of bills under suspension of the rules. Recorded votes will be postponed until Wednesday.

On Wednesday the House will return to consideration of H.R. 3732, the Budget Process Reform Act of 1992 (the "firewalls" bill). The Democratic Leadership continues to float possible compromises to attract enough votes to assure victory. However, given the controversy over the check-kiting situation, the Leadership has not had much time to focus on securing the votes to pass the bill. In addition, given Members' feelings about how the whole check-kiting situation was handled, the Leadership does not have much leverage to exert over Members who may be wavering on the "firewalls" bill.

The House is also expected to take up H.R. 3553, the Higher Education Reauthorization Act; and H.R. 4241, RTC financing bill.

SENATE

The Senate will not be in session on Monday.

While the schedule for the remainder of the week is uncertain, the Senate will likely attempt to override your veto of H.R. 4210, the Democrats' tax bill; and may take up S. 1504, reauthorizing the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEES

HOUSE

On Thursday the House District of Columbia Committee is expected to mark up H.R. 2482, the New Columbia Admission Act, which grants statehood for the District of Columbia. Your senior advisors have recommended a veto of this bill should it reach your desk.

SENATE

On Tuesday the **Senate Armed Services Committee** will hold a confirmation hearing on the nomination of Vice Admiral William Studeman to be a Deputy Director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

Also on Tuesday the **Senate Banking Committee** will mark up legislation to provide additional funds to be used by the RTC to bail out failing thrift institutions, and extends authority for the RTC to spend unused FY 1992 funds which otherwise expire April 1, 1992.
