DAN RATHER: The fate of Manuel Noriega, the former Panamanian dictator, will soon be in the hands of a Miami jury. This story is about the fate of the U.S. servicemen who brought Noriega to this country to stand trial on drug charges. David Martin reports tonight, 'A Eye on America. Was the prize worth the price?'
DAVID MARTIN: For Carlos Melita, life will never be the same. Shot through the abdomen, paralyzed from the waist down, one of 512 servicemen wounded in the invasion of Panama.
Not will life ever be the same for the parents of John Connor, one of 23 Americans killed in Panama. They had no idea he was even there. They were expecting him home for the Christmas holidays.

on the runway with no place to hide. Did you feel naked out there?

BARBER: Ahh, not naked, unprotected.

MARTIN: It was high-risk. So high-risk, you have to ask why the U.S. just didn't use one of its many wonder weapons to destroy Noriega's plane from long range, rather than send the SEALs in to do the job close-up.

BARBER: There was a lot of civilian in the area, and there's a lot of civilian that work at that airfield. And to just go in and blow up this hanger and blow up a bunch of airplanes and maybe kill some innocent people along with it is not something that I want our government to be portrayed as.

MARTIN: In other parts of Panama, hundreds of civilians died in the crossfire between Americans and Noriega's men. So far as is known, no innocent people were killed at Paitia Airfield that night. Those who fell were all combatants.

BARBER: Initially, there's a lot of anger, you know. Not at anybody and directly, but just, you know, "Hey, these guys aren't going to be there anymore." This illman and John Connors, like Rodriguez. Don McFall, a wife was pregnant. And, you know, we're all like, "Why did this have to happen to them?"

MARTIN: The short answer is that it was the price for bringing Noriega to trial on charges of drug trafficking. The impossible question for the families is whether it was worth it.

MRS. CONNORS: You know, our own pain is so deep and we're dealing with that, that with

JOAN CONNORS [mother]: And any frame of mind was just joyous because I had -- I was just so hopeful.

MARTIN: Then came the knock on the door.

MRS. CONNORS: When I opened the door, I saw a Catholic priest and two naval officers. I think what I did is I just backed away and my heart just fell to my toes.

MARTIN: John Connors and Carlos Melita were both members of SEAL Team 4, Navy commanders trained to come at an enemy from almost any direction. What they lack in firepower they make up with stealth and surprise.

In Panama, SEAL Team 4 was assigned the mission of stopping Noriega from escaping by disabling his Learjet parked at Paitia (?) Airfield in downtown Panama City.

Navy SEALs are about as tough as they come, but no one can stand up to a bullet. As they advanced across the airport tarmac toward Noriega's plane, they were hit by a burst of automatic weapons fire. Four were killed, eight wounded, the highest casualty rate of any unit in Panama.

BRENT BARKER [SEAL Team 4]: And we had a firefight and I knew people were hurt, but I didn't know exactly who and I didn't know exactly where. Carlos was telling me to get off his legs. And I wasn't anywhere near his legs. He was in a lot of pain, but not panicky at all, or anything. Just couldn't move. And we just sat there and talked with these guys and kept track of their vital signs and kept pumping fluids in them until the medevac showed up.

MARTIN: Brent Barker was one of those SEALs caught out

Noriega it's almost beyond the circle.

John loved what he was doing, and that was a decision that John made. And if he was willing to sacrifice it, that was a decision he made. But I would love my son to walk through the front door.

In 1985, seeing the need for positive action on behalf of both criminals and victims, she established the Coalition on Victim's Equal Rights (C.O.V.E.R.), the first and now the largest group of its kind in California.

Using her own grief as motivation, Mrs. Tate works to change the lives of the criminals. As an advisor to the California Department of Corrections she has pioneered the Victim Offender Reconciliation Group, a pilot project which enables victims to confront their assailants and to share their pain with the offenders. As she explains, "If we can prevent even one family from suffering the trauma of a murder it will be worth it."

Mrs. Tate has been praised widely by her colleagues for addressing the root causes of crime and for her efforts to reform the lives of criminals. She is credited with bridging the gap between victims' services and criminal corrections programs.

You won the Puerto Rico primary with **99 percent** of the vote. You will recall that you defeated Ronald Reagan in the Puerto Rico primary in 1980.

The Buchanan campaign was virtually non-existent in the state.

In the Democrat race, Bill Clinton won with 96 percent of the vote.

Republican turnout exceeded the Democrat turnout by a margin of 4 to 1. Total Republican votes cast were 254,109. Total Democrat votes cast were 62,930.

The Puerto Rico Republican State convention will be held on April 25.

Republicans outvote Democrats

Grand Old Party alive and well in Puerto Rico

The Republican Party primaries Sunday packed a surprise, delivering four times more votes than the Democratic contest. President George Bush was the winner.

The GOP primaries attracted more than 250,000 voters, a giant leap over the 50,000 votes cast in 1988.

Republican leaders believe the turnout, which fell short of the party's 300,000 goal, will nevertheless send the national party a message.

The intended message is that Puerto Rico would attract Republican voters if it became a state.

Campaign '92

The leaders wanted to get their point across, focusing Bush, who faces a challenge from conservative Pat Buchanan, could be convinced to drop his support for Bush.

"The message is that the Republican Party is strong in Puerto Rico. In the 1988 primary, Puerto Rico gave the impression that there were no Republicans here," said former Gov. Luis A. Ferré, an avid Republican and friend of Bush.

"Puerto Rico has demonstrated that it does not belong to one party or another, that it would be a swing state. There is a balance now," added Ferré, also founder of the New Progressive Party.

Local Republicans believe the massive turnout will help the GOP take them seriously. They basked at an with resentment. How could we say that Puerto Rico was going to be a Republican state (with such a low Republican voter turnout)? said National Committeeman Efraim Mota Aldarondo, also one of the island's 14 Republican delegates.

Preliminary figures showed that 217,007 of the island's 1.8 million registered voters had cast their ballots in Sunday's Republican and Democratic primaries, expected to cost \$17 million.

President Bush, who was the auto winner from the state, obtained 251,872

votes, or 90.3 percent of the Republican ballots cast and secured all 14 of Puerto Rico's delegates to the GOP national convention in Houston, Texas, in August. He was the only platform that appeared on the Republican ballot. Coolidge Buchanan, represented by a circle, came in far second with 878 votes, and former Ku Klux Klanman David Duke, represented by a triangle, came in third with 878. White-in candidates accounted for 0.1 percent with 221 votes.

The results, however, did not come as a surprise to Republican officials who said they worked long and hard in an intensive statewide campaign on a meager \$30,000 budget.

"Explaining to voters why they had to cast their ballots wasn't easy," said Committeeman Mota Aldarondo.

He partially attributed good turnout

work, organization and an effective multi-media campaign for the Republican turnout.

"We recruited 10,000 to 12,000 people and had two or three in each voting unit, whereas the Democrats barely had one," said Mota.

Bayamon Mayor Ramón Luis Rivera said that Democrats were rather disappointed in his municipality. "Some voting officials didn't show up. And some didn't pick up the Democratic ballots. There were no Democratic ballots in some voting stations," said Rivera. Others believe that Sunday's primaries focused on the presidential candidates themselves, while earlier primaries centered on the tug-of-war between the Popular Democratic and New Progress parties.

"For the first time, this was a pure national primary," said Carlos Díaz

Olivo, NPP mayoral candidate for San Juan.

While statehooders make up the bulk of the island's Republican faithful, the Democrats are divided between NPP and PDP members.

"The PDP didn't feel threatened this time around," said Miriam Ramírez de Ferrer, leader of Puerto Ricans in Civic Action, a pro-statehood group.

In 1988, the Democratic primaries turned into a power struggle between former Gov. Carlos Romero Barceló and Senate President Miguel Hernández Aguirre over the chairmanship of the local Democratic party.

Others linked the Republican primary outcome to the two. A referendum in which voters overwhelmingly rejected a PDP-backed proposal to provide constitutional guarantees for Puerto Rico's cultural identity and U.S. citizenship

Most voters cast local party-line ballots

Debudding some voters as they arrived at the 1st Precinct polling station in Caguas was the sight of members of competing factions standing at the gates as Juan Antonio Carrión, middle school, pointing better shelter toward their respective voting areas.

Tiredness and bewilderment might not have been there, but the scene of the 11th precinct's primaries took on a peculiar resemblance to 1944 described in "All in the Family," a novel by black petty and viscous characters greets over a phantasmagoric realm

where nothing is ever what it appears to be.

Such was the exercise in democracy enjoyed by a fraction of eligible Puerto Rican voters Sunday.

With the U.S. presidential nominations all but sewn up, with local political movements locked into unattractive alliances and with local party bosses snuffing out signals, it is little wonder that voters took such a dim view of the elections.

Strolling along Ashford Avenue, one young couple was drawn by the scurry of reporters and the presence of police vehicles outside St. John's High School,

the 1st Precinct polling station where former Gov. Carlos Romero Barceló cast his vote. Unfamiliar to the primaries, the couple asked a nearby photographer if anybody had been murdered inside.

But there were no dead bodies in the polling station. Only complacent election officials who sat idly, as few people entered the jerry-built campaign voting booths that looked more apt for the election of a class president than a president of the United States.

At midday, four buses took the voters, officials at the Democratic Party polling area counted less than 50 votes, the envelope containing the ballot of Felicitas Díaz García, one of the few Democratic

voters, dropped into the waist-high ballot box with a thud. A housewife devoted to raising her eldest 10 children and six of her own, she said she voted for Arkletoe Gov. Bill Clinton because she wanted Puerto Rico to preserve its common wealth status and for once she wanted "to stop Romero's lying."

"He's always saying he doesn't know anything [about the killings at Caguas Mariella] when he really knows every thing," she said with deep-seated conviction.

If Mrs. García had hung around a bit longer, she would have run into Romero

JAPAN AGREES TO BOOST U.S. PAPER IMPORTS

The Japanese government agreed Sunday to press its major industries to buy more foreign-made paper products, opening up a potential \$27 billion market to American companies. To ensure the agreement's success, the Japanese government effectively pledged to use its influence to break up the corporate protectionism that exists between Japan's manufacturers of paper and cardboard and Japan's industrial giants.

U.S. trade officials said the highly competitive U.S. paper industry has been able to win just 1.7 percent of the Japanese market for paper and paper products. "For too long the globally competitive U.S. paper industry has been thwarted in its efforts to make inroads into the Japanese market," U.S. Trade Representative Hills said Sunday after negotiations ended in Washington.

Under the agreement, Japan will focus on major paper users, including companies in the food, cosmetic, pharmaceutical and publishing industries and the 164 companies in an import expansion program sponsored by Japan's Ministry of International Trade and Industry. ANTITRUST WEAPON

The Justice Department says it will use U.S. antitrust laws against Japan and other countries that lock out U.S. exports. The Department went ahead with the controversial change it announced a month ago despite criticism from Japan and some U.S. government officials who warned it might hurt trade relations and stir retaliatory actions.

President Bush has been under pressure to take stronger action in cutting the U.S. trade deficit with Japan. Attorney General Barr denies politics played any role in the change and says the policy is not directed at any one country. Japan called the policy unacceptable. (Donna Rosato, USA Today, B1)

THAI ENDS PURSUIT OF PREMIERSHIP

BANGKOK -- Gen. Suchinda Kraprayoon, the general who toppled a democratically elected government 13 months ago, appeared Sunday to emerge as front-runner for the prime ministership of Thailand.

Kraprayoon, the army's commander, took center stage after the top candidate, Narong Wongwan, bowed out following suggestions by the U.S. government that he was involved in drug trafficking.

BUSH ACCUSED OF HEALTH CARE 'CYNICISM'

President Bush has not sent Congress a detailed health reform bill in the two months since his heavily publicized health care proposal, and Democratic congressional leaders charge that the delay shows Bush was only interested in deflecting public criticism that he was ignoring the health issue.

"It demonstrates a degree of cynicism that's unusual even for this Administration," Sen. Mitchell said in an interview last week. "After 3 1/2 years of study, to make a speech but not to follow it up with legislation makes it clear that this is not an effort to deal with the problem; this is a political effort to deal with the perception that they're not dealing with the problem."

Mitchell's charge was immediately denied by Gail Wilensky, deputy assistant to the President, and Thomas Scully, OMB associate director. Scully said the charge is "ridiculous. The Democrats cannot even agree among themselves what to do."

"I think he (Bush) threw something together; nothing has come since then," said Sen. Rockefeller. Said Rep. Star: "He (Bush) doesn't have an outline for legislation and he has made no effort to commit his musings to paper."

However, Wilensky said, "We are moving ahead with drafting language, fleshing out details and making sure the public understands what is being contemplated."

**PEROT VOLUNTEERS REPORT EXTRAORDINARY
PROGRESS IN PETITION DRIVES**

Ross Perot appears well on his way to getting on the ballot in all 50 states, with supporters around the nation reporting extraordinary early progress in petition drives.

"It used to be a little groundswell, but now it's a tidal wave," said Clancy Eldredge of Grosse Ile, Mich., who suggests it will take only a month to collect the 25,646 signatures needed there.

"I have been swamped," said Perot organizer David Dingess of Huntington, W.Va. "It's a wildfire," said Alaska coordinator Michele Kubek of Anchorage.

Interviews by the AP with Perot supporters and elections officials and volunteers in all 50 states over the past week show that people are signing petitions in droves to put Perot on the fall ballot as an independent presidential candidate....

Getting on the ballot in Texas may prove the most difficult of all 50 states. Backers need 54,000 certified signatures by May 15 -- and they can't include anyone who voted in Texas' Super Tuesday primary.

"This is the first time we've had a third-party candidate with the wherewithal to mount a serious campaign for the presidency," said Ted Thomas of Portland, Ore., who's putting in long hours to get Perot on his state's ballot. (Tom Raul, AP)

49 LAWMAKERS WON'T RETURN TO JOBS

A reeling economy, an angry electorate, redrawn districts and frustration over failed policies add up to a possible record number of Congress members calling it quits this year....

Majority Democrats fleeing Washington outnumber minority Republicans 2-1, reversing a 12-year trend. It's no surprise: Major tax bills are hard to get past a Republican White House, and the massive deficit makes new spending nearly impossible. "It has practically eliminated our opportunity to initiate new programs or improve the ones we have," says Rep. Pease.

Until Saturday night, Clinton had not disclosed that he had received an induction notice ordering him to report for military duty while he was a Rhodes scholar at Oxford.

Tsongas seemed to be encouraging voters to cast ballots for him to encourage him back into the contest in a kind of self-propelled draft movement. "There are two issues," Tsongas said on ABC's "This Week With David Brinkley." "One, how do I do, but more particularly, how does Bill do, how does Bill Clinton do? CLINTON IS TROUBLED ANEW BY DRAFT ISSUE
Questions Focus on 1969 Induction Notice

NEW YORK -- Gov. Clinton struggled once again Sunday to explain his Vietnam War draft record, after disclosing in a statement Saturday that he had received a draft induction notice in the spring of 1969. He told reporters Sunday, "I have never intentionally misled anybody about this."

But he has made statements in the past, including one in an interview with The Washington Post, that in light of the new disclosure appear to be contradictory. Clinton said on Saturday he had received the induction notice in late April 1969, at least three months before he signed up for an ROTC program at the University of Arkansas. In his Saturday statement, Clinton said the draft notice had been sent by surface mail and arrived in England. Clinton's disclosure fills in a gap in his record and makes it clearer why he scrambled to join the ROTC.

NEW YORK -- Jerry Brown scrambled Sunday to turn allegations that money tainted his judicial appointments as California governor into fuel for his crusading campaign against political corruption. CALIFORNIA CONSERVATIVES FURIOUS WITH WHITE HOUSE

The California Republican Assembly, which until last week had been prepared to endorse President Bush for reelection, Sunday registered its anger with the White House by voting overwhelmingly for Patrick Buchanan. Charging that the "Bush-Quayle campaign is in complete turmoil and disarray," delegates voted 134-48 for Buchanan over Bush. The straw vote does not represent an endorsement, however.

Assemblyman Pat Nolan, a CRA member and former minority leader in the state legislature, saw the maneuvering over the presidential preference vote as an example of the vicious infighting going on in the California GOP, which he said has seeped into the Bush campaign and could cost the President victory in November. "Without conservatives, Bush will lose California. Even with conservatives, he may lose," Nolan said.

A CRA report praised Buchanan for his campaign to restore principles and conscience to the GOP and the presidency. But it acknowledged that Bush will win the state GOP primary and the nomination.

The CRA is using the President's name in a flyer being mailed to voters with its slate of endorsed state candidates. Said CRA Vice President John Stoos: "Buchanan is helping us bring conservatives to the polls who otherwise might stay home, but Pat's being on the ballot for our slate mailers would not help us."

CLINTON WINS 96% IN PUERTO RICO VOTE

Gov. Clinton won the Democratic primary in Puerto Rico by an overwhelming margin over Jerry Brown Sunday. On the GOP side, President Bush scored a huge victory -- 99 percent -- with Patrick Buchanan, David Duke and an uncommitted slate splitting the remainder.

Republican Party leaders had said a turnout of 300,000 voters would show the statehood movement's strength. "All of our expectations are close to being met," Republican electoral commissioner Juan Toledo said. "I'm sure that we are going to get 300,000 voters, maybe even more."

"It's very competitive right now," said Jonathan Sender of the state Democratic Party. But Wisconsin voters "don't vote in a mischievous way, just to cause trouble," Sender said.

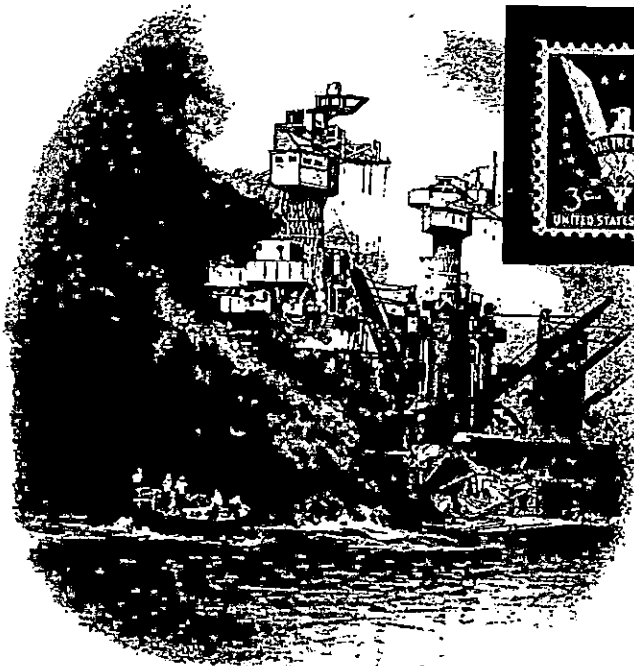

THE WEEK OF MARCH 30 - APRIL 3

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Tuesday the House passed H.J. Res. 456, the continuing resolution for foreign operations programs, by a vote of 275 to 131. The foreign operations appropriations bill was set to expire at midnight on Tuesday. House Republican Leader Bob Michel (R-IL) and Republican Whip Newt Gingrich (R-GA) worked hard to convince GOP Members to support the bill. Our goal was to get at least half of the Republicans and half of the Democrats to support the bill. That goal was met when 87 Republicans joined with 188 Democrats on final passage. Many members expressed surprise that the bill passed by that large a margin.

On Tuesday the House also defeated H.R. 3732, the Budget Process Reform Act of 1992 (the "firewalls bill"), by a vote of 187 to 238. 76 Democrats joined with a unanimous bloc of 162 Republicans to kill the bill. After the House sustained your veto of the tax bill last week by a majority vote and then defeated the Democrats' "firewall" initiative by this large margin, many Members expressed the view that the Democratic leadership had lost control of its Membership.

On Wednesday the House defeated H.R. 4704, reauthorization of the Resolution Trust Corporation, by a vote of 125 to 298. 45 Republicans and 80 Democrats voted for the bill. In addition to protests against the RTC itself, there were political reasons for the defeat. Democrats refused to put up a majority of their votes until Republicans did the same. Many Republicans wanted to register a protest against the Department of Treasury as well as the RTC. Since the defeat of the RTC bill, Republican Whip Newt Gingrich has asked Representatives Bill McCollum (R-FL) and Steve

Gunderson (R-WI) to work together to develop a package of amendments to any RTC funding legislation that would assure passage of the legislation. Chairman of the Banking Committee, Henry Gonzales (D-TX), is blaming the Administration for failing to deliver a sufficient number of Republicans to pass the RTC bill. The House may reconsider RTC funding next week if some of these political problems can be overcome.

The Conference Report to accompany H.R. 3337, the White House Commemorative Coin bill, was also considered. A motion to recommit the bill to conference with instructions to disagree to the Senate coin redesign was offered by Representative Al McCandless (R-CA). The motion passed by a vote of 206 to 199. The Conference then met again and stripped out the Senate's coin redesign provision. The House will likely consider the new Conference Report next week.

On Thursday the House approved the rule for general debate of H.R. 2039, the Legal Services Reauthorization Act, introduced by Representative Barney Frank (D-MA). If the bill passes in its current form, your senior advisors will recommend a veto. The bill is poorly drafted, and would create numerous loopholes that would allow legal services lawyers to engage in redistricting procedures, lobbying, and other activities unrelated to providing legal aid to poor people. Amendments to the bill are expected to be considered next Wednesday. We anticipate enough votes against the bill on final passage to demonstrate veto strength.

The general atmosphere on the House floor is acrimonious. Members are paranoid about the electoral consequences of the check bouncing scandal, redistricting and the general anti-incumbent mood. Many Democratic Members are openly hostile to their leadership for their handling of the House Post Office and the House Bank.

SENATE

On Tuesday the Senate confirmed Dan Goldin to be Administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

On Wednesday, by a vote of 84 to 16, the Senate passed H.J. Res. 456, the continuing resolution for foreign operations programs, which had passed the House the previous day. The Senate adopted one amendment, adding \$107 for Small Business Administration disaster loans, funds that had been requested by the Administration. The same evening, by voice vote, the House passed the amended Senate version of the resolution. In connection with the continuing resolution, the Senate also passed, by a vote of 99 to 1, a Sense of the Senate Resolution in support of Israeli loan guarantees.

On Thursday the Senate passed H.R. 2507, the National Institutes of Health Reauthorization Act, by a vote of 87 to 10. This bill overturns the moratorium on federal funding for fetal tissue transplantation research involving tissue from induced abortions. Members rejected, by a vote of 23-77, an amendment by Senator Orrin Hatch (R-UT) that would have restricted the research to tissue obtained from miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. A senior advisors veto threat was issued on the Senate bill. The last House vote on this legislation was in July of last year, when it passed by a vote of 274 to 144.

HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEES

HOUSE

On Monday William Archer, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Population Affairs at HHS, testified before the **House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health and the Environment** on the Administration's regulations on abortion counseling at federally funded clinics (Title X). As expected, the Democrats and Representative John Porter (R-IL) were critical of the Administration's position during the hearing.

On Tuesday the **House Post Office Subcommittee on Human Resources** held an oversight hearing, led by Chairman Paul Kanjorski (D-PA), examining White House expenses. Five Bush Administration officials declined to testify on the grounds of short notice and the earlier provision of relevant information through proper committees of jurisdiction. While denying political motivation for the hearing, Representative Kanjorski arranged for the television cameras to film the witness table with empty chairs and name placards for the absent Administration witnesses. The Ranking Republican, Representative Dan Burton (R-IN), vigorously defended the White House and repeatedly questioned Representative Kanjorski's assertion that the hearing was not political. I will be meeting with Representative Kanjorski Monday morning.

On Tuesday Transportation Secretary Andrew Card testified before the **House Public Works Subcommittee on Surface Transportation** about the economic impact of continuing regulations on the trucking industry.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, members of the **House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Telecommunications and Finance** met to begin markup of a draft cable television reregulation bill. The Secretary of Commerce and the Attorney General have indicated that they would recommend a veto of this legislation in its current form. The markup was postponed after completion of opening statements when it became clear that the Republican Members of the Subcommittee had developed a bipartisan substitute

that would prevail in the Subcommittee. The Subcommittee is tentatively scheduled to reconvene next Tuesday.

On Thursday the **House District of Columbia Committee** approved H.R. 2482, legislation providing for statehood for the District of Columbia. Arguing that the legislation was blatantly unconstitutional because only a Constitutional Amendment can trigger the process of statehood, all four Committee Republicans opposed the bill while all seven Committee Democrats supported it. A senior advisors' veto threat was issued on this bill. H.R. 2482 is expected to go to the floor sometime after the Easter Recess.

Conferees on the campaign finance reform bill filed their conference report on Friday. The bill does not differ greatly from the original House and Senate Democratic bills, which call for public financing of Congressional elections and the imposition of spending limits. Your senior advisors have recommended a veto. The conference report, which is expected to reach the House floor next Wednesday, is likely to be adopted by a near party-line vote.

SENATE

On Wednesday Central Intelligence Agency Director Robert Gates outlined his reorganization plans and budget reductions before a joint **House and Senate Intelligence Committee** meeting.

On Wednesday the **Senate Foreign Relations Committee** unanimously approved Thomas Pickering to be Ambassador to India and Edward Perkins to be U.S. Representative to the United Nations. The full Senate is expected to vote to confirm the nominations soon.

On Wednesday the **Senate Judiciary Committee** held a hearing on George Terwilliger III to be Deputy Attorney General.

On Thursday the **Senate Budget Committee** marked up the proposed draft budget resolution for FY93. The Committee adopted defense spending levels similar to those you requested. Efforts to cut defense deeper were defeated.

HOUSE AND SENATE FLOORS

HOUSE

On Wednesday the House is expected to complete consideration of the Legal Services Reform Act.

Also on Wednesday the House will vote on H.R. 3750, the Campaign Spending Limit and Election Reform Conference Report.

SENATE

On Tuesday the Senate will take up the first concurrent budget resolution.

The Senate will also take up S. Con. Res. 89, expressing the sense of the Congress concerning the U.N. Conference on Environment and Development (Rio Conference).

HOUSE AND SENATE COMMITTEES

HOUSE

On Wednesday the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee will mark up H.R. 776, the National Energy Strategy legislation, which has already been passed out of the House Energy and Commerce Committee. Floor action on the Energy bill is likely after the Easter recess.

A previously scheduled House Government Operations Committee mark up of a 5-year/\$53 billion revival of the old Revenue Sharing Act was postponed until after the Easter recess. This mark up was postponed due to the defeat of the "firewalls" bill. Had that bill passed, Committee Democrats would have used the money freed up by the removal of the "firewalls" to approve the revival of the revenue sharing bill as their answer to the recession. However, since the "firewalls" bill was defeated, Committee Democrats were forced to reassess their strategy.

SENATE

On Friday the Senate Environment and Public Works Subcommittee on Environmental Protection will hold a hearing on the reauthorization of the Endangered Species Act.

When the House and Senate complete their business on Thursday or Friday of next week, they will begin a two-week recess. Neither is likely to have votes until Tuesday or Wednesday, April 28 or 29.

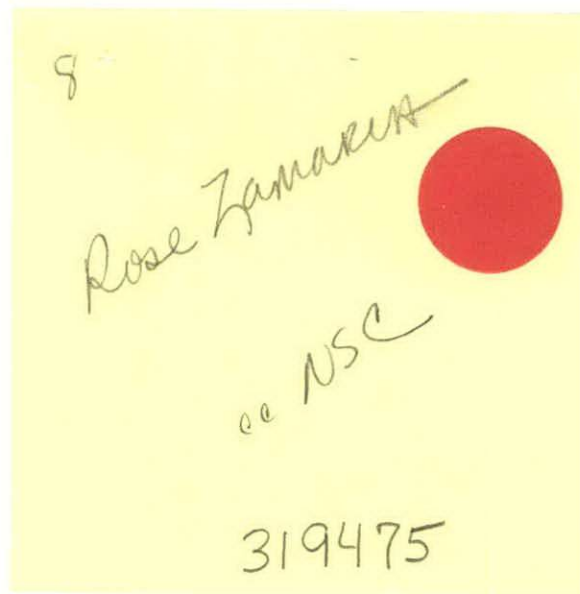

Re: March Employment and Unemployment

The unemployment rate in March was unchanged from February at 7.3 percent. While most analysts had expected the unemployment rate to remain unchanged, some had expected it to continue to rise. While the economy has been improving since the first of the year, unemployment is a lagging indicator and it usually takes some months after the economy starts to pick up before unemployment starts to decline.

From the separate survey of business establishments, (the unemployment rate is calculated from a survey of households), nonfarm payroll employment grew slightly in March, by 19,000. Private analysts had expected more job growth (employment can grow while the unemployment rate stays the same, or even rises, because the labor force is growing). Further, the large job gains in February were revised down.

If the unemployment rate had risen even 0.1 percent, or there had been the slightest decline in employment, there would have been a lot of talk about the economy not really improving, blunting some of the more positive news we have had for the last couple of months. So even though the employment report was slightly weaker than expected, I think it will turn out to be portrayed as "consistent with an economy gradually improving," with the labor market lagging behind as usual.

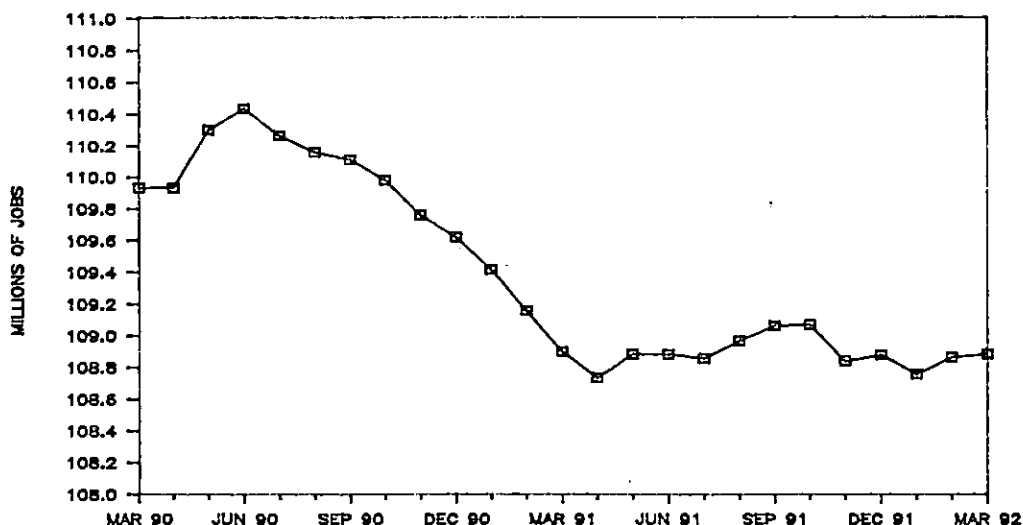
The civilian unemployment rate was 7.3 percent in March, unchanged from February and remaining at its highest level since July 1985. Private analysts had expected the unemployment rate to be unchanged.

The number of nonfarm payroll jobs rose by a modest 19,000 in March, following a downwardly revised increase of 107,000 jobs in February. Last month's release had shown an increase of 164,000 jobs in February. Private analysts had expected nonfarm payroll jobs to increase by 68,000 in March.

Average weekly hours were unchanged in March from February for total private nonfarm business and for manufacturing. Despite the generally flat report for March, for the first quarter as a whole the average level of aggregate production worker hours was up about 1 percent at an annual rate from the fourth quarter.

The graph below shows that nonfarm payroll employment has been relatively flat for the past year after declining significantly from June 1990 through April 1991.

Thank you for your gracious letter of March 13, 1992. I was very touched that you would take time to consider my request and, even more, to write me a personal letter. Needless to say, it will be a cherished keepsake in our family archives for many generations.

My dad was extremely pleased to learn of your letter and of his vindication in your eyes. Neither he, nor our family, knew of the initial request to Congress by the town of Strasburg, ND, for funding of a museum. Once we did learn of it, we were the ones who insisted that it not be a Lawrence Welk Museum but, instead, a Germans from Russia Heritage Museum. We felt that it was inappropriate to have a museum honoring only one man but entirely laudable to honor the heritage of this large immigrant group, of which our family was only a small part. Given the many constraints and priorities of the federal government at the present time, we fully understand, and concur, with the decision to deny funds for the project.

As you correctly stated, public life, whether as a politician or a celebrity, exposes one's family to often unjust and unfair attack. It is especially painful to witness as that special person grows old and is less able to withstand what might have been borne with equanimity at a younger age. Thus, I particularly appreciate your sensitivity to the public nature of this controversy and your kind remarks about my father.

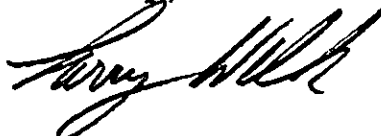

First and foremost I want to apologize profusely for my quotes in Lars-Erik Nelson's Daily News column of a week ago and for any embarrassment they may have caused you, Mrs. Bush or your family. They were not intended to be used in the way Mr. Nelson used them, but to only say they were taken out of context is a weak excuse and one that I will not offer. My remarks were in answer to a question about the Democrats attacking your family in retaliation to personal attacks on Clinton. I commented that this is what Clinton's strategists and other Democrats had told me they intended to do. Secondly, I want to thank you for the kindness you have shown to my wife, Sherrie. Even when you were justifiably irritated with me this last week you took the time to meet and comfort her. She is a tremendous person who is and always has been one of your biggest supporters. Although I was Kemp's Chairman in 1988, she was a Bush supporter and could never understand how I or anyone else for that matter could support anyone but you for the Presidency. She will be a big asset to you in the White House and is very honored to be a part of your team. Know that even if her loyalties are sometimes torn they are never divided. They are always yours. Your side of every argument, even the '90 tax debate, has been more than adequately argued by my wife, much to my chagrin.

As difficult as this letter is to write, I would like to take the opportunity to express a few thoughts I have wanted to say to you for a long time. I had always hoped we would get the opportunity to sit down and talk things out but maybe too much water has gone under the bridge. I know loyalty is one of your most valued qualities. You expect it in your friends and you give it back in spades.

As kind as you were to me in the Reagan White House days, I assume you've never felt I returned the loyalty in 1988 or after. Unfortunately Mr. President, a lot happened in 1987-1988 that I'm sure you never knew about and it is certainly irrelevant today. Some of it was my fault, some of it others.

You had every reason to expect me to support you in 1988 and it certainly was my intention. I endorsed you in early 1985 in a first Monday interview and when leaving the White House in 1985 became one of the first Co-Chairmen of your Political Action Committee.

I was never offered any role in your campaign,^N or was I ever asked for advice or counsel. Lee told me shortly before his death he thought his ascendancy was threatened by me and only by blocking me from any role in 1988 did he feel he could get from under my shadow. A tragic underestimation of his own talent. Considering all that happened, I am pleased that he and I repaired our friendship before his illness and I was able to spend many hours with him in his last days. More importantly, as things so tragically turned out, I am pleased he got his place in political history and will be a role model for generations to come. We all miss him.

After feeling that I was excluded from any meaningful role in your campaign, I let my ego get in the way and went with my very old and dear and sometimes frustrating friend, Jack Kemp. Much of the damage to our relationship was done during this period. Obviously I was never thought of as part of your team after that and even during my early tenure at the Congressional Committee I was never totally trusted. Then of course the ultimate break came during the Budget Summit preceding the 1990 elections.

The famous memorandum to candidates and members that I signed in 1990 that subsequently led to your calling for my dismissal from the Congressional Committee was written at the direction of the Republican House Leadership and approved by them. It was to give candidates and members, who had taken the tax pledge, guidance on how to deal with a complex issue. It was an issue with you the President and party leader on one side and a majority of House and Senate Republicans and most of their leadership on the other side. I signed the memorandum instead of Congressman Guy Vander Jagt who had approved it and normally signed such memos, to cause less embarrassment to him

and to you. In hindsight I wish it could have been more artfully written.

I had argued privately and publicly against this compromise because I believed then as I do now it was bad politics and would ultimately be seriously damaging to you. It also eliminated any opportunity we had in 1990 of picking up House or Senate seats. It was one of the toughest times I have ever gone through in 30 years of politics. I told John Sununu over and over again that the Republican votes in the House were not there for the budget package, but he did not listen and accused me falsely of being the architect of the House revolt. Nothing could have been further from the truth. I only asked him to let the vulnerable incumbents off the hook and give our candidates room to maneuver.

I know my quotes last week came on top of many comments over the years that have been viewed as critical of you or your policies or your White House staff. Unfortunately, comments in print are sometimes harsher than intended. Since 1988 I have been more in an analyst or commentator role than as a principal in the political process and the vast majority of the things I have said have been supportive of you and your policies. However, the critical things are the ones always remembered or highlighted. In this election year I've signed on to do political commentary for CBS News and I am writing a political column for the LA Times. Even though that role is different from being a party or campaign spokesman I will always try to give you the most favorable comments and support I can.

I truly believe you've been a great President and your re-election is critical for the country and the world. I'm sorry I've never had the opportunity to participate in your campaigns. It certainly hasn't made any difference anyway. You've got a first rate

campaign team and now you have the "best Rollins" with you in the White House.

Mr. President, thank you for giving me the opportunity to express my thoughts and please know you have my support, my vote and anything else you might ever want.

I. Recent Correspondence

State Delegate David Craig (Havre de Grace-R) suggested a ten percent tax credit to anyone who purchases a car assembled in the United States.

Baltimore County Councilwoman Berchie Manley (R) urged you to sign Senate Bill 12, the Cable Television Consumer Protection Act.

Baltimore City Council President Mary Pat Clark (D) forwarded a resolution asking that Federal resources be allocated to help relieve Baltimore City of its crime problems.

Baltimore City Councilman Joseph DiBlasi (D) wrote urging your help in solving the crime problems of Baltimore City. Specifically, he proposed allowing the National Guard to facilitate the movement of prisoners.

II. Discussion

A. Governor Schaefer's State of the State Address

Highlighting Maryland's continuing budgetary problems, Governor Schaefer delivered his state of the state address on January 9, 1992. Schaefer called for over \$500 million in budget cuts combined with \$700 million in new taxes and fees. The cuts and tax increases are required to eliminate a projected \$1.2 billion deficit for FY 1993.

His proposals for tax and fee increases include:

- Increasing the state gasoline tax by 5 cents.
- Increasing user and regulatory fees for state services.

- Expanding the sales tax to include such services as auto repairs, cable TV, haircuts, and dry cleaning.
- Increasing the cigarette tax 25 cents per pack.
- Doubling the tax on alcohol to \$3 a gallon for liquor, 80 cents a gallon for wine, and 9 cents a gallon for beer.

Schaefer also proposed making the state income tax more progressive and raising the state corporate income tax rate from 7 percent to 7.5 percent.

B. FY 1993 Budget

Both the House of Delegates and the Senate have passed their own versions of a budget and are now deadlocked in conference committee trying to iron out the differences. On Tuesday, March 31st, Governor Schaefer signed an executive order allowing the legislature to stay in session, after their deadline date of April 7th, to continue working on the budget.

The House bill adopted \$466 million in general reductions and abolished 810 state government positions. It also raised revenues by \$323 million. To reach that level, the House has proposed an increase in personal and corporate income taxes. Also of significant contention, is a \$224 million reduction in state aid to local governments, but which would at the same time, allow the local governments to increase the piggyback tax rate to 60 percent, from the current maximum of 50 percent. The House package also includes a transportation proposal which would increase the gasoline tax by 5 cents, place a surcharge on heavy vehicles, and increase vehicle registration fees.

The Senate version cuts \$321 million and 950 positions. The Senate's tax proposals are oriented towards an increase on the alcoholic beverage tax and expansion of the sales tax to presently exempted goods and services.

C. Unemployment

Maryland's unemployment rate for January 1992 was 7.3 percent, an increase of 1.2 percent over the same period in 1991. Baltimore City's unemployment was 8 percent for January 1992, up 1.5 percent from a year before.

D. Oriole Park at Camden Yards

This new, state-of-the-art ballpark, which holds 48,000 spectators, was built with taxpayer's money at a cost of \$106.5 million. It is estimated that during construction the park generated about \$140 million in gross sales and \$48 million in payroll. State and local tax receipts during construction reached nearly \$5 million.

It is also estimated that the park will generate \$25 million in new sales, plus 293 new full-time jobs (payroll of \$11 million) in the 1992 season. State and local tax receipts during the season should reach \$3.5 million.

E. Surface Transportation Funds

Maryland's 1992 apportionment is estimated at \$288 million, up from \$243 million in 1991. \$1.92 billion is allocated for the state from FY 1992-1997.

F. Commerce/Exports

The latest available figures indicate that Maryland's exports rose 1.3 percent in 1990 to \$3.22 billion, which is 51 percent above their 1987 level. The state's largest trading partner is Canada, which accounts for 24 percent of total exports, while exports to Mexico have tripled from 1987 to 1990.

G. Crime

Governor Schaefer recently hosted the First Violent Crime Summit in Baltimore, which called for a new partnership between the people and the law enforcement community. Attorney General Barr attended and urged that more prisons be built. Governor Schaefer questioned where the money would come from to build those prisons.

H. Education

Since Maryland's kick-off on September 5, 1991, Governor Schaefer has remained very supportive of the Administration's efforts.

The Maryland Equal Opportunity for Education Act, which would have allowed eligible low-income public school students to choose which school they wanted to attend, was defeated in the General Assembly.

Currently, there is an effort underway to restructure the entire curriculum for Baltimore City schools. The endeavor is being driven by the demands of the statewide Maryland School Performance Program (MSPP).

There is real enthusiasm for change in the community and Mayor Schmoke has made a significant public commitment to supporting the transformation.

I. Municipal Waste Incinerators

Roughly 90 percent of the waste generated by Baltimore is disposed of in two incinerators. The Clean Air Act Amendments and the resulting emissions guidelines for municipal waste combustors will require increased controls to be installed, at a substantial cost. Mayor Schmoke recently met with Administrator Reilly to express his concern over the potential costs involved.

J. Calvert Cliffs Nuclear Power Plant

Both of the plant's nuclear units were shut down on March 19, 1992, due to findings by Nuclear Regulatory Commission inspectors which identified a very low probability scenario, under which the plant's safety equipment could not meet requirements. There is no estimate when the plant will be allowed to go back on-line but officials hope to have it resolved by the time Unit 1 finishes its scheduled three month refueling.

K. Fort Meade Land Transfer

On Friday, April 3rd, Secretary Lujan will host a dedication ceremony at Fort Meade, which will formally transfer 8100 acres from the Army to the Fish and Wildlife Service's Patuxent Wildlife Research Center.

L. Wetlands

An extremely contentious issue in Maryland, especially with the state's farmers. They are afraid that Federal restrictions could decrease the value of their farmland and effect their borrowing power when they use it as collateral. Also, farmers and landowners are concerned that there has been no thought of compensation for wetlands that they can no longer use or sell for development, but still must pay high taxes on. Field tests have indicated that as much as 60 percent of nontidal wetlands would be dropped from jurisdiction under the proposed manual.

TRIP INFORMATION

This will be your fifteenth visit to Maryland as President. Your last visit was on February 24, 1992, to the Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School to attend a Bush-Quayle '92 campaign kickoff event. There are no political events scheduled for your current trip to the Orioles baseball game.

1992 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION OUTLOOK

The Presidential primary election was held on March 3. You won the election with 70 percent of the vote. **Pat Buchanan** secured 30 percent of the vote. The entire slate of 42 delegates to the national convention have endorsed your candidacy. Buchanan filed a full slate of delegates. The ballot included three delegates for each of the eight Congressional districts and 66 at-large uncommitted delegates.

Congresswoman Helen Bentley is the Maryland State Chairman of the Bush-Quayle '92 campaign. All Republican members of the State Assembly and all Republican members of the state Congressional delegation have endorsed your candidacy. **Doro LeBlond** serves as an Honorary Chairman of the campaign.

David Duke withdrew his name from the Maryland ballot.

The State Assembly passed a bill last year that moved the Maryland Presidential primary to the first Tuesday in March. This places Maryland fifth on the political calendar, following Iowa, New Hampshire, Maine and South Dakota and falling one week before Super Tuesday.

1992 SENATORIAL AND CONGRESSIONAL ELECTION OUTLOOK

Barbara Mikulski, the junior Democrat Senator, will face her first re-election in 1992. In last month's primary, **Alan Keyes** won the Republican nomination to challenge Mikulski. Keyes is the director of Citizens Against Government Waste. Keyes lost a bid in 1988 to oust Senator Paul Sarbanes. In 1986, Mikulski, a member of Congress, defeated former Reagan aide Linda Chavez. Mikulski is strong among the ethnic voters of the state. She has raised \$1 million for this race. Congresswoman **Helen Bentley** had been mentioned as a potential challenger but did not enter the race.

An unexpected upset occurred in the 6th Congressional District. Six term incumbent **Beverly Byron** was defeated in the primary election. State Delegate **Thomas Hattery** (D) defeated Byron by a margin of 56 percent to 44 percent. Hattery ran an anti-incumbent campaign. The Republican candidate is **Roscoe Bartlett**.

In the newly created 4th Congressional District, **Michele Dyson** won the Republican nomination. Dyson is a computer consultant who has never held elective office. She was a volunteer during the '88 Bush-Quayle campaign. The Democrat candidate is State Senator **Al Wynn**. Although more than 75 percent of registered voters in the district are Democrats, Dyson is expected to have a solid chance at securing this seat.

Larry Hogan (R) won the Republican primary to challenge Congressman **Steny Hoyer** (D-05). Hogan is a real estate broker whose father once served in Congress. Due to the reconfiguration of this district, this is expected to be one of the toughest races that Hoyer has faced. Although Republicans are outnumbered by Democrats by a 2 to 1 margin, Hogan is expected to do well by portraying Hoyer as a "privileged class of professional politicians." The House bank scandal seemed to provide an early opening for Hogan although reports now show that Hoyer had four overdrafts. In addition, many Democrats in southern Maryland are conservative and will cross party lines. Steny Hoyer lost his bid to fill Congressman Bill Gray's position as Majority Whip in the United States House of Representatives. Gray stepped down last Fall to become the President of the United Negro College Fund.

Congressman **Tom McMillen** (D-04) was expected to enter the race for the new Congressional seat but after much speculation announced that he would not run. Although the district is predominately black, McMillen was thought to have a strong chance in the new district because he is well known and well funded. Many of the blacks in the district rejected McMillen's possible

candidacy because they believed it would eliminate their chances of securing a seat for a black representative. Blacks make up more than 60 percent of the district. McMillen will challenge **Wayne Gilchrest** in the First Congressional District. The 1st CD is conservative and Republican thereby giving McMillen a tough race.

Maryland Secretary of State **Winfield Kelly** has formed an exploratory committee to investigate the possibility of his running for governor in 1994.

1991 ELECTION REVIEW

Democrat incumbent Mayor, **Kurt Schmoke**, defeated **Samuel Culotta** (R) in the Baltimore Mayoral election. Democrats outnumber Republicans 10-to-1 in Baltimore. A GOP mayor has not been elected in 28 years.

In the state legislature, Republicans garnered victories in the State Senate and State House. In the State Senate, Republicans picked up two seats though they trail the Democrats by 30 seats, 39-9. Under the leadership of House Minority Leader, **Ellen Sauerbrey**, the GOP gained 9 seats in the House. Democrats still control that chamber, 116-25.

Republicans also won 3 out of 7 county executive seats.

* Thomas W. Ewing, R-Ill., was sworn in July 10, 1991, to succeed Edward Madison, R., who resigned March 8, 1991, after being appointed secretary of Agriculture. Madison was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 75 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 92 percent in 1991. Ewing was eligible for 49 presidential support votes in 1991.

* Sam Johnson, R-Texas, was sworn in May 22, 1991, to succeed Steve Bartlett, R., who resigned March 11, 1991. Bartlett was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 94 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 94 percent in 1991. Johnson was eligible for 76 presidential support votes in 1991.

* George F. Allen, R-Va., was sworn in Nov. 12, 1991, to succeed D. French Slaughter Jr., R., who resigned Nov. 5, 1991. Slaughter was eligible for 94 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 68 percent; his opposition score was 12 percent; and his support score adjusted for absences was 85 percent in 1991. Allen was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

* Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., as Speaker of the House, voted at his discretion. Foley was eligible for eight presidential support votes in 1991.
