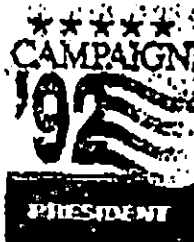

**Solid win predicted
for Bush-Quayle team.**

Missouri Republicans, with their party establishment solidly behind President George Bush, turned out for GOP caucuses Tuesday evening amid indications the Bush-Quayle team will roll to victory throughout the state.

In 137 caucuses in places like courthouses and restaurants, the Republicans elected 3,102 local delegates. At meetings in May and June, they will name the 47 Missouri delegates to the Republican National Convention.



GOP leaders, including Gov. John Ashcroft, said they expected Bush supporters to win all, or nearly all, the local delegate posts. Challenger Patrick Buchanan never tried to mount a campaign in Missouri.

"The Bush victory in Missouri certainly comes as no surprise," Ashcroft said as he attended a caucus with 100 other Cole County Republicans in Jefferson City. "It reflects well on his strong ability to lead the nation, and bodes well for victory in November."

Most counties, like Clay and Platte, held one caucus. In Jackson County, three caucuses were held.

BUSH STILL UNDECIDED ON ATTENDING EARTH SUMMIT

President Bush said Tuesday he was torn about attending the Earth Summit because of the economic price that meeting could extract from the U.S.

Speaking to business executives at the White House, Bush said while he supported international cooperation to protect the environment, he would not sign any agreement that could curb long-term U.S. economic growth....

Meanwhile, Bush received poor marks from environmentalists in a new book released for Earth Day Wednesday. Bush received an overall D grade on his environmental policies in a scorecard that rated performances according to "Voting Green," by Jeremy Rifkin and Carol Rifkin. (Gene Gibbons, Reuter)

On the eve of Earth Day, President Bush dropped new hints he will attend the Earth Summit but withheld final word to avoid losing his major negotiating card.... Some White House officials indicated Bush expects to reach terms that would satisfy angry conservatives and is making plans to attend the politically risky summit. AFGHAN LEADER DECLARES READINESS TO CEDE POWER

KABUL -- Acting President Hatif declared Tuesday that his steadily withering government is ready to turn over power "to a council made up of Muslim rebels. He called for a peaceful transition in a country whose history, he said, "has been written in blood." Hatif made the statements as a U.N. special envoy, Benon Sevan, began a series of meetings with leaders of the mujaheddin guerrillas in an effort to arrange an orderly transfer of power. PARTICIPANTS AGREE TO SHIFT MIDDLE EAST TALKS TO ROME

Israeli and Arab participants in the Middle East peace talks have agreed to shift their negotiations to Rome after they complete the fifth round of talks, scheduled to begin here Monday, the State Department announced Tuesday. The location change is a procedural victory for Israel, which has been arguing for a site closer to the Mideast. (John Goshko, Washington Post, A2)

PENTAGON: IRAQ CEASES 'PAINTING' WITH RADARS

Operators of ground-to-air missile radars in northern Iraq haven't turned their sights on allied aircraft for two weeks, the Pentagon said on Tuesday. In response to a query from reporters, spokesman Pete Williams said April 7 was the last time a coalition aircraft was monitored in such a fashion.... Pentagon sources said some of the missiles have been moved, but that they are still considered to be a problem since then can be set up and targeted quickly. (Susanne Schafer, AP)

BUSH SAYS U.S. EXPECTS TOUGH TRADE TALKS AHEAD

President Bush, preparing for trade talks Wednesday with high-level European leaders, says the U.S. does not intend "to bear the entire burden" of hammering out a compromise in the deadlocked international trade talks.... Bush Tuesday told The Young Presidents Club that the world trade negotiations "are so essential to expanding trade for everybody."...

A senior Administration official said Tuesday that agriculture subsidies totalling \$360 billion last year are the stumbling block in the Uruguay Round, with American and European farmers in dispute.

"The United States is anxious to bring these global trade talks to a fruitful outcome," said one official. "We're negotiating with 108 countries, representing 90 percent of world trade. It is the most complex round of trade talks we have ever entered. And we have encountered a stumbling block, namely agriculture, that has been with us for some time."

The official also insisted that the forthcoming presidential election has "absolutely no effect on the progress of the Uruguay Round."

President Bush said Tuesday that the U.S. was willing to compromise to break a deadlock in talks to reform global trade, but said others must compromise as well.... However, a senior U.S. trade official, asked if she knew of any new EC plan that might break the stalemate, said, "I have to answer that honestly and say, 'No.'"

U.S. URGES ALLIES TO DO MORE TO SPUR GLOBAL GROWTH

Deputy Treasury Secretary John Robson voiced concern Tuesday about weak world economic growth and urged America's allies to do more to pump up their economies. "We worry...that the economies of the major industrial countries are getting soggy," Robson told the National Economists Club. He called on the G-7 to shift their policies away from fighting inflation toward promoting growth.

BUSH URGES ACTION TO HELP U.S. BUSINESSES IN EX-U.S.S.R.

President Bush Tuesday urged the swift negotiation of a series of agreements to help boost U.S. business with the newly emerged republics of the former Soviet Union.

He called for the conclusion "as soon as possible" of tax, trade and investment accords with the former Soviet republics. He also backed the expansion of U.S. export finance and investment insurance for American companies dealing with the republics.

Joe Gibbs, Charlie Casserly, players, coaches, and official family of the 1991-92 Washington Redskins -- welcome to the White House. It's a pleasure to host football's answer to Murderers Row. //

((When I was first told I'd be talking with the Hogs today, I was afraid it was with some of the biggest spenders in Congress.)) //

You can imagine my joy when I learned your true identity. / A flagship franchise of the NFL since 1937. / A team which this year earned the best mark in club history: 17 and 2. / Today we salute the 1992 Super Bowl champions. //

((First, let me say how I admire your talent. I've played a lot of sports, but football is one I wasn't too good at. I once suffered a pulled hamstring -- and that was just in the coin toss. / Actually, I did receive a football letter in college. It said: "Turn in your equipment as soon as possible.")) //

That problem didn't trouble the '92 Redskins. I think of Mark Rypien. Nearly 3,600 passing yards in the regular season. / Two touchdowns and the MVP Award in the Super Bowl. / ((Someone

mentioned to me that Mark was born in Canada. It looks like the U.S.-Canada Free Trade Agreement is paying off already.)) //

Often, Mark threw to No. 81. / When the NFL decided last month to scrap instant replay, I thought I heard a big cheer go up. / Barbara said, "What was that?" / I said, "I'm not sure, but it sounds like Art Monk." / Instant replay cost Art one touchdown in the Super Bowl -- but not 60 others in a glorious career. Art couldn't be with us today -- but his memories are. All Washington is proud of a future Hall of Famer. //

This brings me to the other members of the Super Bowl champions. Perhaps the NFL's best offensive line, the Hogs -- allowing a club-record low 9 sacks. / Next, with Art, members of the "Posse" -- wide receivers Ricky Sanders and Gary Clark. [Acknowledgments]

I can't think of a more important moment than now to convene this Forum on the Americas. Over the last three years, we have seen our world transformed: The Berlin Wall torn down and Germany peacefully unified; the people of eastern Europe and the Soviet Union liberated from communism; and in South Africa an historic vote to reject apartheid. We have seen Arab neighbors negotiating for the first time face-to-face with Israel; and a worldwide coalition, under the banner of the United Nations, stand up, and turn back, Iraqi aggression against Kuwait.

Meanwhile, here in our own hemisphere, we've also made history. The Americas have launched an era of far-reaching and hopeful change. We're well on our way to creating something mankind has never seen: a hemisphere wholly free and democratic, with prosperity flowing from open trade.

From Mexico City to Buenos Aires, that vision is becoming a reality. For the first time in many years, more private capital is flowing into the Americas for new investments than is flowing out. In country after country, the hyperinflation that devastated the region's economies, particularly its poor, has been halted. In nearly every nation, real growth has returned. A growing number of nations are taking advantage of the Brady

Plan, an important initiative of my Administration designed to reduce the debt burden of our neighbors and set the stage for the renewal of growth.

Barriers to trade and investment are coming down. Go to the financial centers of the world and you will get the same message: One of the most exciting regions for investment is Latin America.

Alongside this economic revolution, we have witnessed and played a vital role to shape a political revolution every bit as far-reaching and every bit as powerful. Two years after we initiated Operation Just Cause, Panama has replaced the repression of the Noriega era with freedom and democracy. In El Salvador, after 12 years of civil war, our consistent efforts have brought peace. In Nicaragua, we succeeded in our goal of restoring peace and democracy through free elections. Throughout Central America, civilian presidents hold office, and the principle of consent of the governed is now firmly established. And in South America, Chile and Paraguay have rejoined the community of democracies.

This peaceful revolution throughout the Americas did not happen by accident. It is the work of a new generation of courageous and committed democratic leaders with whom we have worked closely in pursuit of common goals. The new spirit was demonstrated in June of last year, when the OAS General Assembly passed a resolution designed to strengthen the international response to threats to democracy.

Consolidating this revolution will not be easy. Millions of people in our hemisphere are still mired in poverty and political alienation. Recent events in Haiti, Venezuela, and Peru remind us that democracy is still fragile and faces continued dangers. In all our nations, powerful special interests cling to old ideas and privileges, promote protectionism, and resist expanded trade.

For the diehards -- for Castro's totalitarian regime, for those in the hemisphere who would turn the clock back to military dictatorship, for the stubborn holdouts for economic isolation - - I want to make one point clear: Hundreds of millions of Latin Americans share a faith in human freedom and opportunity. And I stand with them. As long as I am President, the United States will devote its energies to the true and lasting liberation of the people of the Western Hemisphere.

Sharing the democratic spirit makes a difference on every issue we care about: Democracy's rebirth led Argentina and Brazil to join hands to halt the spread of nuclear arms. Democracy energized Brazil to slow deforestation of the Amazon rainforest. Democracy gave Argentina the will to stop the Condor ballistic missile program financed by Libya and Iraq. Colombia's democracy is leading the fight against the drug trade. And the restored democracy in Panama has passed tough new laws to combat money laundering.

And make no mistake: Political and economic freedom are inseparable. Just as people have a God-given right to choose who will govern them, they also must be free to make their own

economic choices. And when we lift barriers to economic freedom within and among our countries, we unleash powerful forces of growth and creativity.

Before I leave office -- and please be assured, my timeframe is years, not months from now -- I want manufacturers in Pittsburgh to enjoy virtually the same access to markets in Monterrey as they now have in Minneapolis. With new technologies, creators of services in Denver may be able to tap markets in Santiago as readily as those in Chicago. And I'll work to assure that government protection and excessive regulation don't stand in their way. To do this, we'll have to overcome the stunted vision of the special interests. And I am determined that we can and will do exactly that. \\\

I've made it a top priority to conclude a free trade agreement designed to remove all tariffs on trade between the United States, Canada and Mexico. This agreement will build on our historic free trade agreement with Canada. The success of the agreement with Canada demonstrates how free trade can benefit all concerned.

We can't achieve this breakthrough by equivocating between the status quo protectionists and the movement for freedom and change. Some suggest that we can hide in a cocoon of protection and pretend still to benefit from the fresh air of competition. Well, you and I know that is simply wrong-headed. Our economic future must not depend on those who pay lip service to free trade -- but full service to powerful special interests. We can't have

it both ways. In our own War for Independence those who took this kind of stand were known as the "Summer Soldiers." They wanted the glory of the revolution without showing the gumption to stand for freedom even in tough times. My stand is clear: Open trade is vital to the United States -- every bit as vital as domestic reforms to renew our systems of education, health care, government and administration of justice. \\

A free trade area comprising the United States, Mexico and Canada would be the largest market in the world -- 360 million consumers in a \$6 trillion economy. Mexico is among the fastest growing national markets for U.S. exports today. Over the last three years alone, American merchandise exports to Mexico have increased by two-thirds. Our exports of autos, auto parts, and telecommunications equipment to Mexico have doubled. And while members of this audience may be aware of this, I doubt it is widely known in the United States that two-thirds of all imports into Mexico come from the United States.

It's not just the border states that profit from this growth. During my presidency, 45 of our 50 states have increased their exports to Mexico. Our top 10 exporters to Mexico today include Michigan, Illinois, New York, Louisiana, Pennsylvania, Florida and Ohio -- as well as Texas, California and Arizona.

Trade with Mexico already supports hundreds of thousands of U.S. jobs --and a North American Free Trade Agreement would create thousands more. It would create competitive efficiencies

and economies of scale that will help American companies compete in world markets.

Free trade with Canada and Mexico will make all of us winners in economic endeavor -- but our relationship goes well beyond trade. We share borders that span the continent. We're linked by centuries-old ties of family and culture. I share a warm friendship with Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, whom I consult frequently. I count President Carlos Salinas also as a dear friend -- he and I have been promoting the "spirit of Houston" ever since our summit meeting just after both of us were elected in 1988. Both President Salinas and Prime Minister Mulroney are bold and imaginative leaders -- and I am committed to working with them to forge enduring friendship among our countries, based on open trade, cooperation and mutual respect.

The North American Free Trade Agreement is only a beginning. Our Enterprise for the Americas Initiative already has made noteworthy progress to open markets, expand investment flows, reduce official debt, and strengthen the environment throughout the hemisphere.

The Enterprise for the Americas Initiative reflects a revolution in thinking. Through this initiative, the United States is not seeking to impose our ideas on our neighbors. Rather, our program is designed to empower them to succeed with free market economic reforms they have chosen on their own -- ideas developed in Latin America for Latin Americans.

The courageous Latin American leaders who are reforming their economies and breaking down barriers to trade and investment need our support. They are the true liberators of our era. True success will mean opening up statist systems formerly rigged to protect wealthy elites and closed to working people and the poor. Free market reforms will banish burdensome regulations that now prevent the urban poor from starting new businesses or campesinos from gaining access to credit and title to their land.

Economic reform must also include honest government. Corruption is the enemy of both growth and democracy. New investment will flow only where the rule of law is secure, the courts are fair, and bidding processes are open to all.

To support reformers -- to realize the hopeful new vision in Latin America -- the United States Congress must meet its responsibility. I asked Congress for \$310 million in this fiscal year under the Enterprise for the Americas Initiative. With that authority we could write off more than \$1 billion in the hemisphere's official debts and generate millions of dollars to preserve the environment. But Congress has refused to approve any funds for this purpose.

I've helped persuade our allies in Europe and Japan to contribute nearly two-thirds of a \$1.5 billion fund to help Latin American reformers. This fund, administered by the Inter-American Development Bank, would help people privatize old state enterprises at the grass roots -- with job retraining and small

business loans. But Congress has refused to vote a penny for the U.S. share.

I'll keep on fighting for these vital programs of the Enterprise for the Americas Initiative until Congress demonstrates the vision and fortitude to provide the support they deserve. If we can aid the transformation of Eastern Europe and the old Soviet Union -- and we must do so -- then we can and we must help our closest neighbors on their peaceful road to true liberation and prosperity.

The United States' economic destiny is linked to Latin America's. When Latin America suffered its debt crisis of the 1980s, we suffered through a corresponding drop in trade. With the rise of democracy and economic reform, U.S. exports to Latin America have surged by nearly one-third in just two years -- from \$49 billion in 1989 to \$63 billion in 1991. This is a much faster rate of growth than for our exports to Asia or Europe. It points to the fact that a stable, prosperous Latin America is a natural market for United States goods and services. Strengthening our neighbors' economies will result in more exports and more good jobs for people in the United States.

When any of us speak with our friends outside the Western Hemisphere, we need to assure them as clearly as possible: There is nothing exclusionary in our vision of open trade and economic integration in our hemisphere. Our aim is simply to lower barriers to economic freedom within and among the nations of the Western Hemisphere -- not, I repeat, not -- to create any

barriers between ourselves and the nations of Africa, Europe and Asia. All of our aims are consistent with the global policies of GATT -- and I would just like to commend the superb leadership of Arthur Dunkel, GATT's Director General, who spoke to you earlier today. And I want to assure you I urgently want to open up global markets through success with the Uruguay Round.

If the equivocators and the pleaders for special interests want to debate this, bring them on. \\ I will take the case for increased trade to the people in every corner of the United States. And I'll make this abundantly clear: Free trade means more exports, more investment, more choices, more jobs for Americans. This great country is the Number One exporter in the world -- over \$422 billion last year -- and we intend to pursue trade policies to keep that growth up now and in the future. We'll knock down barriers wherever we find them -- to open markets, for instance, for our computer software, movies, books and pharmaceuticals. We will fight hard against protectionism both at home and abroad.

Five centuries ago, a man of courage and vision set sail from Europe searching for new trade routes and opportunities. He defied the timid counsel of those who said the earth was flat. Christopher Columbus's voyage to the Americas transformed human history.

Today, we still have to combat the flat-earth mentality -- the mindset that urges us to barricade our borders against

competition, to shut off the free exchange of food and machinery and skills and ideas.

But the future doesn't belong to the status quo. It is the legacy of people like yourselves -- people with far-sighted vision and a spirit of enterprise. The future awaiting the Americas is a time of rediscovery. A time for empowering the poor through new investment, trade and growth. A time for cultural renewal. Our efforts -- and the efforts of millions of citizens of the Americas -- can achieve new gains for honest, democratic, limited government. Together we can usher in a new order of peace and prosperity animated by personal freedom.

Sen. Jesse Helms' (R-NC) National Congressional Club is having a typically odd year. Its candidate for Terry Sanford's Senate seat, ex-NC Sec/Commerce Lauch Faircloth, has been a Republican for only a year, and yesterday fessed up to supporting ex-Gov. Jim Hunt (D) over Helms in '84. And a list of 580 NC GOPers supporting Bush, with a reluctant Helms listed as "honorary chair," makes no mention of NCC leaders Thomas Ellis and Carter Wrenn.

*1 PENNSYLVANIA: CLINTON TAKES TO THE STREETS

Clinton, "seeking to frame his Democratic campaign as a fight solely against President Bush, accused [Bush] of using his support for capital punishment as 'a cover' for diminishing the federal role in combating the urban crime problem" (Pertman, BOSTON GLOBE, 4/22). Clinton walked through Philadelphia's Spring Garden neighborhood, "where volunteer groups' anti-drug efforts and street policing helped shut down what was the city's second-worst open-air drug market." Phila. Mayor Ed Rendell (D) accompanied and endorsed him, calling Clinton "the best choice to turn American cities around." Clinton used the neighborhood as an example of the benefits of "community-based policing": "If this block can get rid of crack houses, then every block in America can" (Richter, L.A. TIMES, 4/22). Clinton acknowledged the Dems "had been battered" by the crime issue in the past, "but said that was because it had felt comfortable only discussing economic roots of crime. By being tough, creative and recognizing that personal responsibility is also important, he insisted, 'we can take that issue back'" (GLOBE, 4/22). Asked about the execution of Robert Alton Harris, Clinton "said he supported capital punishment under 'appropriate circumstances' at the state and federal levels" (W. POST, 4/22). Only CNN showed Clinton in Philly (4/21). He was endorsed by the PHILA. DAILY NEWS (4/22). DAILY NEWS' Goldwyn compares the Clinton campaign to Brown's under header "High tech v. low tech" (4/22). Pictured shooting a one-handed set shot on a Philly basketball court, Clinton (in an apparent reference to "White Men Can't Jump"): "I saw the movie. I can't jam it" (4/22). PHILA. INQUIRER's Claude Lewis, after a Clinton appearance at his paper's editorial board: "If he could somehow get beyond those questions concerning his character, I think America would have a rare opportunity to put someone in the [WH] who might make a difference in this country" (4/22).

TV ADS: Clinton began airing two TV ads in PA. The first is a bio ad, "stressing the poverty of Clinton's youth and his struggles against adversity." The second "is intended to dramatize how average Americans have suffered" during the Reagan and Bush Admins. After photos of "struggling Americans," Clinton appears and says: "Some people say I've taken some hits in this campaign. But they're nothing like the hits these people have taken" (L.A. TIMES, 4/22). GLOBE's Pertman calls the ads "telling," in terms of Clinton's gradual shift towards a general election strategy (4/22).

BROWN: He "went back on the attack" against Clinton, criticizing him "for the key role he played" in the DLC, "an organization that has been pushing the party to moderate its views." Speaking in Johnstown, Brown termed the DLC, which Clinton chaired, "as close to Republicanism as you can become and still be able to use the label Democrat" (Cheevers, L.A. TIMES, 4/22). At a Pittsburgh NAACP appearance, Brown "had to ask for silence three times": "If you'll just listen to me for one minute, I'll convince you to vote for me." Clinton also spoke to the group; both "had trouble capturing the audience's attention" (Goldwyn, PHILA. DAILY NEWS, 4/22).

VOX CANDIDATI: PHILA. INQUIRER's Katharine Seelye examines the ongoing travails of Clinton's larynx: "If the periodic silences are benefiting Clinton medically, they also appear to be helping him politically. ... Clinton had been overexposed."

Thomas Jefferson U. Hospital ear-nose-and-throat specialist/opera singer Robert Sataloff: "My impression is that his voice problems are readily correctible, and that with appropriate training his campaign and political career can be salvaged" (4/22).

*2 OTHER UPCOMING STATES

NORTH CAROLINA (5/5): Retiring Gov. Jim Martin (R) traveled the state 4/21 and released a list of 580 NC GOPers who back Bush. Listed as "honorary chairman" was Sen. Jesse Helms (R), "who had said he would remain neutral in the primary" between Bush and Buchanan "on several occasions." Martin "said [Helms] agreed to lend his name to the Bush-Quayle campaign in light of the fact that Bush is 'virtually assured' of renomination." Buchanan pol. dir. Paul Erickson called Helms' support of Bush "pretty tepid": "That's about as little as the senator can do and stop the phone calls from Charlie Black. I get no sense of enthusiasm." Erickson "added that the Buchanan campaign has sought and received advice from Helms supporters." Martin's list included NC GOP chair Jack Hawke and all four of NC's GOP House members. Not listed were Thomas Ellis and Carter Wrenn, "the two top leaders" of Helms' National Congressional Club (Guillory, Raleigh NEWS & OBSERVER, 4/22).

WEST COAST: COPLEY's Mark Barabak reports polling from West Coast states shows "the region is not particularly friendly territory" to either Bush or Clinton. "Voters have shown no great affinity for Bush, a scion of the Eastern Republican establishment" who lost OR and WA -- "and almost lost" CA -- to Dukakis in '88. "Nor is there much affection for Clinton, whose native [AR] is light years away both culturally and demographically. In his only regional test so far, Clinton ... finished fourth" last month in WA's Dem caucuses. "Scattered polling" suggests Perot "could push Clinton into third place ... a pattern that would seriously imperil Democratic prospects if it persisted through the fall campaign." CA pollster Mervin Field: "It's a no-candidate's land. Bush has never been strong and Clinton wasn't even known here five months ago. Since then, people haven't heard many good things about him" (S.D. UNION-TRIBUNE, 4/22). OR primary is 5/19; CA is 6/2.

*3 PEROT: NAMES EX-CHICAGO TRIBUNE EDITOR AS PRESS CONTACT

A second national official has been named to the Perot effort: Ex-CHICAGO TRIBUNE (and ORLANDO SENTINEL-STAR) editor James Squires has been named to handle news media requests -- joining atty Tom Luce in running the national effort. Squires edited the TRIB from 1981-89, and got to know Luce when they were Fellows at Harvard's JFK School (Walker/Walker, DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 4/22). Perot said he quit two private Dallas clubs that exclude minority members -- a step he said last week he was prepared to take (mult., 4/22). Columnist Molly Ivins hits the TX press for not making a Clintonesque issue out of Perot's membership in the all-white clubs, and hits Perot, too: "Why resign? Why not work to get the rules changed instead?" (FT. WORTH STAR-TELEGRAM, 4/21). CBS' Jim Hattori on the Ft. Worth Alliance Airport: "The project has created jobs, but it has also created a valuable market for thousands of acres of nearby land owned by Perot" (4/21). On Perot's claims a GOP "dirty tricks" group is working reporters, WFAA-TV's (Dallas) Doug Fox said, "if those calls are going out, I haven't received them." TX GOP chair Fred Meyer: "The problem Mr. Perot has is people want his positions to be explored and explained as thoroughly as the other

candidates. I don't think he likes that -- I think he wants us to take him on faith" (CNN, 4/21).

REAX TO TEXAS POLL: The Texas Poll that showed Perot 35%, Bush 30%, Clinton 20% (see HOTLINE 4/21, "sent shockwaves" through TX politics (DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 4/22). It was "the most dramatic evidence yet of the vulnerabilities of Bush and Clinton and of the potential magnitude of Perot's impact on the November election" (Shogan, L.A. TIMES, 4/22). Ex-DNC chair John White: "Both political camps have got to be puckered up, but I don't know anyone who thinks it will last. You can't run on beer-joint knowledge. You've got to have substance to your campaign, and so far everything Perot's said, I've already heard in beer joints." Bush strategist Charles Black: "It reminds me of the polls that ran Bush against a generic Democrat, but when you named one the president always won" (ATLANTA CONSTITUTION, 4/22). Bush TX chair Jim Oberweiser: "The public has agreed to go out on a blind date with someone that they really don't know very well" (HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 4/22). GOP analyst Kevin Phillips: "That's a class-A political embarrassment for Bush" (USA TODAY, 4/22). Bush press sec Martin Fitzwater: "He probably hasn't really felt the full weight of that wonderful [scrutiny] barrage from the press, but he will" (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 4/22).

ANALYSTS, GURUS AND ASSORTED GUESSERS: As usual, the morning papers are filled with a variety of views of what he should do, how well he will do, and whether he's good or bad. Paul Tsongas repeated his warning: "The country, the rank and file, is really ready for a change. Ross Perot will fill that vacuum if the Democrats don't try to fill it first, that is until he self-destructs because of his own personality" (Balto. SUN, 4/22). TX GOP consultant John Weaver predicted "he could get pinched by Bush on the right and Clinton on the left" (DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 4/22). Dem pollster Paul Maslin said the 3 months before the conventions are crucial and he needs a major ad campaign in the meantime to avoid being "dwarfed by the process" (W. POST, 4/22). Lars-Erik Nelson asks and answers his own question: "Is the Republic ready for a Perotocracy? ... Perot is perfect. He owes nothing to anyone ... Perot pledges to treat Congress as an equal. But Congress is not an equal to a strong leader who wins a popular mandate" (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 4/22). In a W.S. JOURNAL op-ed, HOTLINE publisher Doug Bailey hypothesizes about a three-way race that ends up in the House because no one gets a 270 Electoral vote majority. He calls the odds: One-in-ten that he wins it all in November; Two-to-one that he determines who wins; One-in-three that it ends up in the House, where "all bets are off." The "Who does he pull from?" question may be less relevant than "Can he be stopped?" One reason for success: "Perot is not the good-government holier-than-thou insider John Anderson seemed; he's a no-nonsense, one-of-us outsider -- with competence and hundred million dollars" (4/22). COX's Ben Smith sees another difference with Anderson who toted a "317-page platform" with him in his 1980 campaign which drew 25% in spring polls but fell to 6.6% in November: "Where Mr. Anderson appealed to the nation's Volvo drivers, Mr. Perot's attraction extends into blue-collar America, which doesn't read 317 page platforms" (ATLANTA CONSTITUTION, 4/22). John Anderson, himself: "Once the conventions were held, then the spotlight of media attention focused almost exclusively on the two party candidates. The most damaging blow of all was my inability to participate in the debates ... There is far more fertile soil today for a new or

independent political effort than ever before in political history ... One of the most alarming signs to date is the ... very low participation in the primaries held to date ... At least [Perot] seems to be injecting a note of real excitement in the campaign" ("CBS This Morning," 4/22).

STATELINES: AR -- State HQ will open in Fayetteville this weekend, with the chair predicting he will have an office in all CDs and that Perot could win (or come close) against favorite-son Clinton (ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE 4/22). SC -- Columbia STATE's Lee Bandy writes, "it's apparent the two parties would suffer equally" with Perot on the SC ballot, as Perot petition signers "seem to be evenly divided" by party and ideology (4/19).

***4 CLINTON: OFFERS ENVIRONMENTAL COVENANT ADDRESS TODAY**

APN's GREENWIRE reports Clinton will mark Earth Day today with a major address on environmental policy that calls for "A New Covenant for Environmental Progress." His program, to be announced at Drexel Univ., is likely to please environmentalists, "who have been wary of his record." The overall message of the address is that environmental protection and economic growth are "not only compatible goals, they must go hand in hand. The speech also contains a sharp attack on Bush's environmental leadership, as well as a defense of Clinton's own record." Clinton's "Covenant" has three main priorities: Increased int'l leadership, improving America's resources, and the promotion of free market enviro policies. In all three areas, he favors specific policies that have long been advocated by leading U.S. enviro groups. For example, he supports raising fuel economy standards for U.S. cars to 45 MPG and calls for limiting CO2 emissions to '90 levels by the year 2000. He also urges Bush to attend the U.N. Earth Summit in Rio (4/22).

TAKING ON THE ENVIRO-PRESIDENT: Clinton says Bush "has been inconsistent on environmental issues and guided by political expediency. He charges that on a number of major issues, including Boston Harbor, the Clean Air Act, climate change, energy policy and wetlands protection, the president's actions haven't lived up to his rhetoric. The speech goes on to portray Bush as stuck in the past for thinking that environmental considerations have to take a back seat to economic growth" (GREENWIRE, 4/22). L.A. TIMES' Brownstein, noting Clinton's call for Bush to go to Rio, reports he will also urge Bush "to accept strict limits on fossil-fuel emissions, believed to be a main cause of global warming trends." While many of the issues in the speech have been discussed before, "it offers considerable new detail on his environmental priorities and proposals. Perhaps as important, the speech's effort to paint Bush as imprisoned by outdated ideas illustrates what may become a broader campaign theme of generational change" (4/22).

DEFENDING HIS OWN POSITION: GREENWIRE reports many analysts have predicted Clinton will have a difficult time using the environment as an issue, mainly because environmentalists say he has a weak record on the issue. Clinton addresses his "perceived weakness in his speech, saying as a governor of a poor state, he sometimes felt that economic development overshadowed all other priorities. He adds he has come to learn that a healthy environment and a healthy economy are interconnected" (4/22).

WHITE RIVER: Asked about the comparison of AR's White River to Boston Harbor, Clinton said "the real culprit was federal inaction": "I spent a lot of money on the White River. I'm going to get the whole record out, and it will be one more

example of how George Bush tries to blame other people for problems he won't take responsibility for" (Brownstein, L.A. TIMES, 4/22). A draft of the speech indicates Clinton avoided the subject of AR's river pollution from animal waste, which some environmentalists say is a result of Clinton's lax policies. "Instead, he mentions state programs on energy conservation, wildlife protection and recycling" (GREENWIRE, 4/22).

NOTE: The GREENWIRE report is based on a late draft of Clinton's address, due to be delivered in Philadelphia this morning. Campaign aides caution that there are likely to be last minute changes.

*5 CLINTON: CAPITOL HILL 1ST STOP ON EXPECTED PA VICTORY TOUR
BOSTON GLOBE's Adam Pertman reports Clinton "plans to meet with congressional Democrats next week to ask them to coalesce around him as their presidential nominee." The session is scheduled for 4/29, the day after PA, which Clinton "is expected to win by a wide margin, so he 'can go in with the strongest hand possible and say, 'Let's finally get this thing done.'" Clinton aides say a convincing PA win plus superdelegate nods "would allow Clinton to begin implementing a general election strategy"; put to rest "questions about whether Clinton can surmount controversies over his character and whether an alternative candidate might yet be chosen at a brokered convention"; and "allow Clinton to raise money and focus his campaign on Bush, unhindered by concerns relating to securing the nomination." Clinton press sec. Dee Dee Myers said Clinton would address a "regular meeting" of Dem House Members and meet each Senator individually. She "said his argument would not be for them to join his camp because no choice remain but because a unified party will stand a far better chance of defeating Bush" (4/22).

RE-CHARACTER-IZATION: GLOBE's Tom Olpivant writes, "In politics, there is a fine line between reintroduction and cosmetic reinvention. To cross it in this fractious age is dangerous, and Clinton (to his credit, given the pressures of campaign life) has thus far stuck to reintroduction" (4/22). W. POST's Lloyd Grove takes an informal poll of P.R. and political consultants on whether Clinton should deliver his own "Checkers" speech. The consensus among Dems seemed to be "No." Scott Miller: "That would be a loooong speech." Bob Squier: "That's the dumbest idea I ever heard" (4/22). N.Y. TIMES' Elizabeth Kolbert profiles the Clinton "two-pronged strategy": Present his background "in a more flattering light"; project him as a "potential President" through policy speeches (4/22).

REPUBLICRAT DEPT.: Balto. SUN's Mark Matthews notes "strikingly similar lyrics" from Sec/State James Baker, speaking before the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations, and Clinton's 4/1 address at the Foreign Policy Assn in NYC. Baker: "We have a once-in-a-century opportunity to shape the course of history and to define a new age of peace. I'm not talking about the 20th century but the 21st century. ... The stakes are truly historic." Clinton: "The stakes are high. The collapse of communism is not an isolated event: it's part of a worldwide march toward democracy whose outcome will shape the next century. ... I seek not to be the last president of the 20th century, but the first president of the 21st century" (4/22).

SIGN OF THE TIMES: Clinton has got his own 1-800 number, but it's not for accepting donations. Callers who dial 1-800-220-1451 today will be able to hear Clinton's environmental speech at Drexel Univ. (ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 4/22).

HOW IT'S STAFFING: The campaign announced David Ifshin, who had been serving as general counsel on a volunteer basis, will become senior political adviser on foreign and other policy areas; Anthony Harrington will serve as general counsel and overall legal adviser; Christine Varney will serve as chief counsel. Both Harrington and Varney are attorneys at Hogan & Hartson of DC (Clinton release, 4/22).

VEEP WATCH: Jesse Jackson "is reveling in his new role as a party insider" while "his chief political advisers have been pushing ... the party's No. 2 spot." No one "has argued for Jackson's inclusion on the ticket more than" longtime aide Frank Watkins: "Can you imagine a white Southerner at the top of the ticket with a black in the second spot? ... That would destroy the [GOP] Southern strategy." Watkins: Jackson "let Clinton off the hook many times. When Clinton called him a double-dealing back-stabber, [Jackson] took the high road. When [Clinton] ... played golf at a segregated club, Jesse didn't blast him all over creation -- which he might have done in the past" (CHICAGO TRIBUNE, 4/21). Under "Slick Willie and the Preacher," PEORIA JOURNAL STAR editorial suggests Clinton "look to" Paul Simon: "You want adjectives? Try incorruptible. Try faithful? Try 37 years of enduring. Try maturity and wisdom and stability to Clinton's youth and recklessness. Try plain -- in an appealing sort of way. ... Try someone who stands for something" (4/21).

***6 BROWN: "A CANDIDATE ADRIFT"**

That's the header over USA TODAY's Nagourney. Recent Brown defeats, especially in NY, "have left both candidate and campaign adrift, slightly discombobulated, and contemplating the unpleasant possibility that Brown's campaign may have peaked." PA crowds are "smaller and less electric ... In many ways, Brown after New York is like Paul Tsongas after Florida, where he too saw his campaign flattened by the Clinton machine." But "despite his promise to tone down the attacks on Clinton, Brown has done nothing of the sort" (4/22). In a release, Brown criticized the CA execution Robert Alton Harris: "Using death as a penalty is something that civilized people reaching for its highest ideals should leave behind" (4/22). Dem consultant Victor Kamber blasts network coverage of the race, particularly ABC's story on alleged drug parties at Brown's CA home (Balto. EVENING SUN, 4/21).

SHOWTIME: N.Y. TIMES' Dowd recounts the bizarre events of the evening Brown spent at the house of Throop, PA city councilor Diane Bruno-Nelson -- an "up-and-coming local politician who craves attention even more" than Brown (4/22).

***7 BUSH: TELLS GROUP HE WON'T SUPPORT GAY RIGHTS PROTECTION**

He told a meeting of 15 evangelical Christian leaders he "opposes special laws to protect the right of homosexuals," including recent "domestic partner" legislation in DC (Devroy, WASH. POST). He also "dismissed" a Dem Study Group analysis critical of his economic record, as WH spokesperson Marlin Fitzwater "brushed off" a Federal Reserve study on the rich in the 1980s. Bush "used" the evangelical meeting, which he requested, to "shore up his support with the group." Bush reportedly did not commit, however, to an effort by House GOPers to repudiate laws such as the DC statute (4/22). W. TIMES' Murray notes Bush "stands by the 1990 hate-crime law that forbids gay-bashing." The evangelicals were concerned about a 2/92 meeting between Bush campaign chair Robert Mosbacher and gay leaders, as well as gays present at two bill signing ceremonies.

Fitzwater said the Mosbacher meeting was a "matter of personal conscience because [Mosbacher's] daughter who is homosexual asked him to do it" (4/22).

HAPPY EARTH DAY: Bush "dropped new hints" he'd attend the 6/13 Earth Summit in Rio, "but withheld final word to avoid losing his major negotiating card" (Murray, WASH. TIMES). Bush: "I'm going to let you know soon, let the country know soon, of our final decision on my attendance in Rio." Earlier this month, the Senate voted 88-10 "in favor of a resolution urging him to attend." WH spokesperson Marlin Fitzwater said Bush's "soon" would probably not be today, which is Earth Day (4/22). USA TODAY reports Bush "is leaning heavily" toward going (4/22). L.A. TIMES' Gerstenzang reports the WH is in a "scalding debate over whether ... Bush should attend." His "political advisers -- who unanimously want him to go -- appear to be winning," officials said. The WH is also concerned about Clinton's address today. One official: "We are mindful that it would be the third week in a row that he has stolen our thunder" (4/22).

MORE: Yale's Ray Fair and American U.'s Allan Lichtman both predict a Bush victory over Clinton based on their academic models, but do not allow for Perot (C.S. MONITOR, 4/22). Columnist James Kilpatrick mocks small "rescissions," de facto line-item vetos, made by Bush in the budget, noting the scrapping of a \$46K study of the feeding of minks (Balto. SUN, 4/22). A "more optimistic" Fitzwater said an economic recovery "is beginning to take hold." The comment was "significant because the [WH] has maintained a cautious posture recently in response to various indexes of recovery" (W.S. JOURNAL, 4/22).

*8 QUAYLE: PA PRO-LIFERS "MORE IN TUNE WITH AMERICAN PEOPLE"

In an interview with USA TODAY, he said pro-life PA Gov. Bob Casey (D) and the PA legislature "are probably more in tune with the American people than the media and some of our critics think. The [PA Abortion Control] statute is a reasonable statute. Look at what it is: 24-hour waiting period, parental consent for someone under 18, informing the spouse ... Is that out of the mainstream? I don't think it is." Quayle on the abortion issue: "It's one that divides Americans better than it unites ... we even have discussions at our family dinner table on the abortion issue." But he said "from a political point of view, the sides are fairly well-drawn. I don't think it will be a determining factor in the election." On the House Bank: "It was more in the way the darned thing was managed. It's a reflection of any time you have an institution that is run by one political party for 40 years, essentially you're going to have mismanagement." On spouses in the Cabinet: "I'd say it would be highly unusual. ... Clinton and I do have that in common: We married very strong, independent, smart women. Neither one of them is a shrinking violet, and I have a great deal of connection with (him). I consider Marilyn to be very much of an asset to me, and I'm sure he considers Hillary to be an asset to him" (4/22).

*9 GOP: MINORITY RULING UNLIKELY TO AFFECT HOUSTON CONVENTION

FEC officials said a ruling by a DC district judge ordering the GOP to "revamp its delegate selection process to be fairer to minorities or lose federal funding" is unlikely to affect the 8/92 convention (Roth/Clayton, HOUSTON CHRONICLE). The Freedom Republicans, a black GOP group from Brooklyn, brought a suit to the FEC "claiming black participation at GOP conventions had been stymied by the party." The FEC asked the judge to clarify his

4/7 ruling that both political parties must comply with the terms of the '64 Civil Rights Act with "all deliberate speed." But the GOP has already received the \$11M earmarked for the convention, and they claim the money "has been spent or allocated." RNC spokesperson Gary Koops says the GOP "has no plans to change the delegate selection process ... The problem, he says, stems from lack of minority participation in the party": "As you increase minority participation, you will have increasing participation in all party activities" (4/21).

DUKE FOR GRAND MARSHAL? HOUSTON POST's Root reports the TX Ku Klux Klan plans to "cruise Houston streets" around convention time in a "reinforced bus -- a rock-proof Klan van ... spewing anti-President Bush themes" (4/21).

***10 BUCHANAN: WANTS CONVENTION "PRIME TIME SLOT"**

Buchanan, on CNN's "Crossfire": "Every journalist in Washington will tell you that Pat Buchanan has influenced Bush's candidacy, his decisions, his rhetoric and his actions." On Rich Bond keeping him out of the convention: "I don't think little Richard ... is going to be making that call ... I intend to go there and endorse George Bush and I intend to say why I believe the Republican party and the Republican ticket if I'm not on it should be elected and the Democratic ticket be defeated. In order to do that well you really need a prime time slot." Kinsley: "You said unless he fires Rich Bond you won't campaign for him in the fall. Are you going to stand by that or are you going to wuss out on that one?" Buchanan: "George Bush is entitled to have the chairman he wants. I'm going to endorse the candidate of my party in August" (4/21).

*14 ILLINOIS: CONSERVATIVES WANT WILLIAMSON REPLACED

"One month into the general election season," atty Rich Williamson (R) "has so angered his party's core membership that several conservatives met with" IL GOP exec. dir. Gene Reineke "to discuss a replacement candidate" (Doubek, Arlington Heights DAILY HERALD). But Williamson commun. dir. David Fields said Williamson "has no plans to quit the race" against Cook Co. Recorder of Deeds Carol Moseley Braun (D). Citing Williamson's flip on abortion, support for gay rights and other "liberal"

civil rights issues, conservatives suggested potential replacements in the event Reineke, Gov. Jim Edgar (R) and Bush "convince Williamson to drop out of the race." Among those mentioned: conservative commentator Thomas Roeser, Lincoln Legal Foundations's Joseph Morris and entrepreneur Gary MacDougal. Roeser and MacDougal confirmed they had been contacted by conservatives. Doubek notes, "While it is highly unlikely Edgar and others would take the extreme and embarrassing step of asking Williamson to move aside after having talked him into the race, many mainstream and conservative Republicans [have said] they fear the party's conservative base will not vote in November." Williamson is "counting on conservatives and anti-abortion advocates to eventually conclude that [he] is their only choice." Ex-school board member Chad Koppie, who was voted out after one term after being arrested for punching out a school admin., announced a petition drive to collect 25,000 signatures needed for a 3rd-party candidacy (4/17).

***15. NORTH CAROLINA: MONEY'S TIGHT FOR SOME GOP CANDIDATES**

In the race to face Sen. Terry Sanford (D), ex-Charlotte Mayor Sue Myrick (R) accused her two major primary opponents of "trying to buy their way" into the Senate. She noted ex-Commerce Sec. Lauch Faircloth (R) loaned his campaign \$300,000 and ex-Rep. Gene Johnston (R) has loaned his campaign nearly \$200,000: "People are completely fed up with politicians buying their way into Congress. We've gotten our message out by going to the people, not by going to the checkbook." Faircloth "struck back" in a 4/20 radio ad: "Don't be misled by Sue Myrick's negative campaigning. Remember, even national [TV] reported that Sue Myrick once ran one of the nastiest campaigns in the country. ... When she's slipping in the polls, she'll do and say anything." Faircloth later defended his contributions: "Before I can ask people to make a contribution to something I believe in, I believe I have to make a contribution myself" (CHARLOTTE OBSERVER, 4/21). In FEC reports through 3/31, "none of the campaigns reported having much cash on hand ... suggesting that they may not be able to afford heavy blitzes of [TV ads] in the final weeks" before the 5/5 primary. Faircloth's willingness "to put a substantial amount of his own wealth" into his campaign "could make a crucial difference in the final weeks of what most observers agree is a wide-open contest." Myrick manager Will Espin said he is "worried" Faircloth will contribute even more money of his own money to buy TV (Krueger, Raleigh NEWS & OBSERVER, 4/17). Myrick has received one-third of her campaign money from Amway Corp. distributors (NEWS & OBSERVER, 4/22).

ADMISSIONS: Krueger profiles Faircloth, noting he "appears to have the best-financed and best-organized campaign" -- with the backing of Sen. Jesse Helms' (R) National Congressional Club. But his efforts to win over conservatives may be stymied by the fact that "it wasn't that long ago" that Faircloth joined the GOP just over a year ago (NEWS & OBSERVER, 4/21). Although he had led some to believe he voted for Helms over then-Gov. Jim Hunt (D) in the '84 Senate race, Faircloth "settled the question" raised by Myrick by saying he did indeed back Hunt (NEWS & OBSERVER, 4/22). Faircloth charged Myrick with "flip-flopping" on gun control saying she first backed it, now doesn't. Myrick admitted she backed the Brady Bill, but said she now backs the NRA's Staggers Amendment: "At that time [1989], the Staggers Amendment was not on the scene. It was not a matter of changing my position. It was a question of supporting what was on the

table at the time" (NEWS & OBSERVER, 4/22). NEWS & OBSERVER's Christensen profiles Johnston (4/22).

Yeakel called the poll numbers "good news" but noted she still trailed Singel: "We're not celebrating yet." Singel: "She has invested a massive personal fortune on [TV] in Philadelphia, and I intend to match her dollar-for-dollar on TV in this last week of the campaign." Specter manager Pat Meehan: "The figures look good, but we feel this is a small sample." Freind spokesperson Kevin Harley: "This election is going to boil down to who can turn out their supporters. We know we can and Specter knows he can't" (Tuma, PITTSBURGH POST-GAZETTE, 4/22). While Specter runs new TV ads attacking Freind, the "nearly broke" Freind campaign has been recruiting voters "via 16 offices and dozens of private homes" where he has a "12,000-person volunteer organization." Freind consultant Bill Wilson: "The emphasis of the whole campaign is to build an organization that could identify Steve's vote and turn it out." Meehan "conceded the 16 offices," adding: "That does not necessarily translate into anything more than desks and telephones" (Gorenstein, PHILA. INQUIRER, 4/22).

ON THE GOP CAMPAIGN TRAIL: Freind switched gears "from deriding [Specter's] philosophy to questioning his integrity and judgment" as he accused Specter "of associating with and accepting campaign contributions from people who have ties to organized crime." Freind issued an "inch-thick packet" to back up his claim. Specter spokesperson Dan McKenna called the charges "a last-minute attack ... illustrative of what his campaign has been about" (Eshleman, PHILA. INQUIRER, 4/22). PHILA. DAILY NEWS' Nicole Welsensee writes Freind "with no money to buy TV time, continues to hammer" Specter "with attacks sensational enough to get free media play" (4/22).

*17 WISCONSIN: CHECOTA CLAIMS OPPONENT PLANTED STORY

Ex-WI Dem chair Joe Checota's (D) camp claims allegations accusing Checota's company of pressuring its employees to contribute to his campaign (see HOTLINE 4/16) are part of a "coordinated effort to embarrass" him politically (MILWAUKEE

SENTINEL, 4/17). Checota, in a release: "We believe the Milwaukee Sentinel has swallowed a phony story hook, line and sinker. To base a negative story about a U.S. Senate candidate on a single telephone call from a person who won't give his name is totally indefensible. We believe it was placed by someone acting on behalf of one of Checota's opponent" (4/16). MILWAUKEE SENTINEL header, following Checota's release: "Story on solicitation of donations doubted" (4/17). MILWAUKEE JOURNAL editorial: "Whatever the real story here, Checota has just handed his opponents a dandy campaign issue. The man who plans to spend \$5 million on this race (half of it his own money) has also given the public yet another reason to be turned off by politics and politicians" (4/16). Others challenging Sen. Bob Kasten (R): Rep. Jim Moody (D-05), state Sen. Russ Feingold (D). Checota's recent speeding ticket was his fifth in 5 years, and his license was suspended in '90 for failure to pay a fine. Checota: "We don't think this is relevant, but if it is, we look forward to reading about Bob Kasten's drunk-driving record, Jim Moody's fixed parking tickets and all of the candidate's driving records." Kasten was arrested for drunk driving in DC in 1985 (SENTINEL, 4/18). WISCONSIN STATE JOURNAL's Still reports, while Feingold trails Moody and Checota in cash, about 4,700 people have donated to him, compared to hundreds of individual donors for Moody and Checota. 75% of Feingold's money comes from WI donors, compared to 9% for Moody and 6% for Checota (4/19).

*18 OHIO 10: OAKAR RESIGNS PLATFORM ROLE

Rep. Mary Rose Oakar (D-10-213), one of the 22 "abusers" of the House bank, resigned as co-chair of the DNC platform cmte, saying it "will enable me to concentrate fully on my race -- a race I will win -- and the needs of my constituents" (Ruess, Cleveland PLAIN DEALER). This is the 2nd influential assignment from which Oakar has resigned this month. She earlier quit a task force probing the House post office due to allegations about employees "linked" to her. DNC chair Ron Brown: "An unanticipated primary campaign precludes her from devoting her fullest attention and energy towards developing a strong party platform" (4/22). Mike Thomas, spokesman for Cuyahoga Co. Comm. Tim Hagan (D), said Oakar's "being held hostage by her own record." While sources "recently had reported" Dem officials were urging Oakar to quit because of the bank and post office flaps, DNC spokesperson Ginny Terzano said Oakar was not told to quit: "It was clearly her decision." Oakar: "The challenges facing the Democratic Party are too great to have them held hostage to the whims of my opponents in their attempts to embarrass me, my party and my city" (4/22). But N.Y. TIMES's Berke reports Dem officials were "fearful" that Oakar's problems could "swell into a major embarrassment" and, therefore, they "dropped her." Two "officials" said Oakar had agreed to step down after conversations with Brown during the past week (Berke, 4/22). Rep. Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) will replace Oakar and serve with CO Gov. Roy Romer as co-chair (S.F. EXAMINER, 4/22).

*19 MISSOURI 03: WHAT'S GOOD FOR THE NEWT ...

The RNC and NRCC jointly released a 60" radio spot produced in-house by the NRCC that targets House Maj. Leader Dick Gephardt (D-MO). The ad, based on a DCCC ad run last week in GA against House Min. Whip Newt Gingrich (R-GA), will air "later this week" on five St. Louis stations. NRCC chair Guy Vander Jagt (R-MI) called the DCCC ad against Gingrich "an unfair smear": "It was Dick Gephardt and his leadership team that mismanaged the bank -- not Newt Gingrich and the Republicans." RNC chair Rich Bond: "The Democrats, as usual, are great talking the talk, but lousy at walking the walk." TEXT: Ann cr: "The following is based on an ad produced by the [DCCC]." Sound effects: Child's voice counting, "1 ... 2 ... 3 ..." Ann cr: "When you're just 2, learning to count isn't easy." Child: "5 ... 6 ..." Ann cr: "But Dick Gephardt is 52 -- and he still doesn't know how to count. Just look at all his bad checks. ... First he told NEWSWEEK he had three bad checks." Child: "3." Ann cr: "Then he said the total was 23 bad checks." Child: "23." Ann cr: "But the House Ethics Committee reports a total of 28." Child: "28." Ann cr: "3 bad checks. 23 bad checks. 28 bad checks. Dick Gephardt just can't count all his bad checks. Or, you know something, maybe Dick did learn how to count and just forgot something else kids learn. To tell the truth. So come on Dick, count the totals, tell the truth and take your medicine like a man. Come on Dick. Grow up" (RNC release, 4/21).

*20 MISSOURI: SCHOEMEHL ON YOU

St. Louis Mayor Vince Schoemehl (D) called LG Mel Carnahan (D) a "redneck from Rolla" during a radio talk show "aimed at a largely black audience." The remark came in a comment about black politicians who "want to play the black voters as fools" and "blame everything that happens in the city" on Schoemehl and "then they are going to try to get them to vote for some redneck from Rolla." The remarks were a "thinly veiled" reference to Carnahan's endorsement by Rep. Bill Clay (D-01), St. Louis' "leading black politician." Carnahan "quickly demanded" an apology: "It's highly inappropriate language ... we don't need a leader who resorts to name-calling any time things don't go his way." Schoemehl said he didn't think "it would cost [him] one vote": "I probably should have called him a thin-skinned high brow from Rolla" (Schlinkmann/O'Neil, ST. LOUIS POST DISPATCH, 4/17). K.C. STAR's Rich Hood writes, "This calls for a foul on Schoemehl. He could justifiably question Carnahan's lack of pizzazz. He could ask whether Carnahan has ever given indication he could be tough enough to make the difficult decisions a governor has to make. ... But there is no legitimate basis to accuse Carnahan of racism" (4/17). Primary: 8/4.

SCHOEMEHL TESTED: A KMOV-TV poll, conducted 4/13 by the Prell Organization, surveyed 306 likely voters; margin of error +/- 5.6%. Tested: St. Louis Mayor Vince Schoemehl (D), AG Wm Webster (R), Sec/State Roy Blunt and Treas. Wendell Bailey (R). The St. Louis station did not test Carnahan.

*21 NORTH CAROLINA: HUNT AD TOUTS PAST GOV RECORD

Ex-Gov. Jim Hunt (D) has begun airing a 60-second ad produced by Greer, Margolis, Mitchell, Grunwald & Assoc. TEXT: Announcer: "With Jim Hunt as governor, we created thousands of good jobs, led in school reform, required able-bodied people to work. Tough laws against crimes were passed and more prison cells were built. And state government ran a budget surplus every year -- never a deficit." Hunt: "I love North Carolina too much to stand by and watch it fall behind. ... Working together we can build a high-skill, high-wage economy, with good jobs for our families, create world-class schools with teachers and parents having more voice and fundamentally change state government to make it more efficient and effective." Announcer: "Jim Hunt. Leadership for real change." CHARLOTTE OBSERVER's Greg Trevor notes, "Hunt's campaign can document all the assertions made in the ad as accurate. But Hunt's opponents say he didn't do enough to avert the state's ongoing problems with low student test scores and prisons." Trevor cites NC's SAT scores that rose while Hunt was governor, but remained near the bottom nationally (4/19).

TAX TIME: AG Lacy Thornburg (D) released his tax returns over the last 4 years and challenged Hunt to do the same. But

Hunt said he won't release them unless the other 6 candidates do -- "which is considered highly unlikely." Thornburg, who "raised questions about Hunt's work as a corporate lawyer and lobbyist" since his governorship: "I simply ask, 'For whom is he working or will he be working?'" Thornburg also quoted statements made by Hunt during his '76 gov. campaign when he urged all candidates to release their returns: "The voters of this state ... have a right to know the full financial interests of the men and women who want to hold public office" (CHARLOTTE OBSERVER, 4/16). Other Dems: Atty Marcus Williams, Wendell Briggs and Jim Hatcher. GOPers: LG Jim Gardner and ex-Gov. Martin aide Ruby Hooper. Primary: 5/5.

*22 WEST VIRGINIA: "READ MY LIPS", MOUNTAINEER EDITION
Gov. Gaston Caperton (D) "is hoping his re-election bid isn't haunted by the 'no new taxes' pledge he broke after taking office" in '89 (Paxton, BECKLEY REGISTER HERALD). Just minutes after being sworn in, Caperton "called a special legislative session that raised taxes nearly \$400 million a year, then followed that with \$65 million in tax increases the next year." Caperton claimed "he had no choice because of the fiscal disaster left by" ex-Gov. Arch Moore (R), "who later went to federal prison for corruption." Caperton: "Nobody likes taxes. But I think the people of the state recognize that our state was bankrupt ... I was willing to do it. The real question is, where would we be if we hadn't done that?" Caperton cites improvements in education as one of his accomplishments, including a 31% teachers' payraise. Despite that, the largest teachers union, the WV Educ. Assn, would not endorse him (4/19). Other Dems: AG Mario Palumbo, state Sen. Charlotte Pritt, pro-marijuana advocate Rodger Belknap and Larry Butcher. GOPers: Agric. Commis. Cleve Benedict and ex-Delegate A.V. Criss. Primary: 5/12.

*23 THIS MORNING: ABC's "GMA" hosted Harvard's Arthur Miller and ABC political dir. Hal Bruno on Supreme Court and PA abortion case. NBC's "Today" hosted ACLU's Kathryn Kolbert, UVA's A.E. Dick Howard, Hillcrest Women's Med. Ctr's administrator Marilyn Rich and Buffalo, NY Dr. Parviz Taefi on abortion. "CBS This Morning" hosted '80 presidential candidate Independent John Anderson and Harvard's Laurence Tribe on death penalty (4/22).

The police on the front line say Day One of the protest was a dud." CBS' Susan Spencer: "While the demonstrators yell the politicians calculate ... We don't regard our case as a test case. I think it will later be a question of measuring the limitations in our law against the Roe standard as modified by the later Webster

case." On Clinton: "I take issue very sharply with his endorsement of the Freedom of Choice Act." On Clinton's electability: "The signs are very clear that we should keep our options open ... and pick the strongest nominee." On abortion at the Dem convention: "I'm going to bring that issue directly to the Democratic platform committee." Operation Rescue's Rev. Joseph Slovenec on the presidential race: "We are definitely concerned about the candidates. We don't have a whole lot to pick from right now it seems, but we are definitely concerned about the abortion issue" (CNN, 4/21).

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Bush says every day is Earth Day; Brown shows up on the scene

WASHINGTON (UPI) _ President Bush, who calls himself the "environmental president" observed "Earth Day" Wednesday, saying he believes "we must make every day Earth Day."

In a written statement, Bush listed nine initiatives his administration has taken over the last three years to clean up the environment.

"Earth Day, April 22, is an opportunity to rededicate ourselves to leaving a better quality of life for future generations," Bush declared. "But I believe we must make every day Earth Day."

"A clean environment requires action from both government and citizens," he said. "I believe that we can have both economic growth and a cleaner, safer environment. Sound policies do not force us to choose between the two."

He issued the statement at a time when he was still trying to decide whether to attend a world environmental summit meeting in Brazil in early June.

Bush's advisers are divided on whether he should go to the meeting where strong curbs on industry are expected to be covered in a treaty. Aides indicated Bush is not in a mood to compromise, and said "part of our leverage is attendance" at the global meeting.

"I'm not going to the Rio conference and be party of a bad deal," Bush told a group of U.S. business leaders at the White House Tuesday. "I'm not going to sign an agreement that does not protect the environment and the economy of this country."

Talks are under way between the United States and conference representatives over setting goals for reducing carbon dioxide gases and providing pollution-control technology to developing nations.

In his statement, Bush listed among his accomplishments the new Clean Air Act; the moratorium on oil and gas drilling off the coasts of California, south Florida, Washington, Oregon and New England; and the decision to add more than \$1 billion in new lands to America's parks, forests, wildlife refuges and recreation lands.

Wednesday afternoon Bush signed a bill designating segments of eight rivers in Arkansas as components of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System.

Meantime, Democratic presidential aspirant, Edmund "Jerry" Brown, former governor of California, showed up at the Council on Environmental Quality across the street from the White House in a battery-operated electric car to deliver a petition urging the nation to develop an independent energy policy.

In remarks to reporters, Brown also took a swipe at his chief rival for the nomination, saying that "the governor of Arkansas has one of the worst environmental records in the country."

Here's where we are on remaining political posts:

Saudi Arabia. John Bookout is very interested. He is working with State Department lawyers to structure his financial holdings so as to avoid potential conflicts of interest. We will know within a week if this can be satisfactorily accomplished.

Croatia. Jim Baker, Sam Skinner, and I agree to recommend to you a candidate named Paula Dobriansky. She is currently Henry Catto's Associate Director for Policy and Programs. Of Ukranian descent, she's had a very strong career in government and is known to and well-regarded by Croatian-Americans. There is another candidate whom we are not recommending but whom you ought to be aware of because of her prominence among Croatian-Americans. Her name is Mara Letica. She's a lawyer from Michigan who has been organizing an "independent Croatia" movement in the U.S. for the last year or so. Larry Eagleburger and I have both had long and cordial talks with her. I believe she'll be helpful in spite of the outcome.

Seychelles. As you know, Dick Carlson is leaving in July to become President of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. Mack Mattingly has been asking about a post. (Bob Dole and Newt Gingrich have also called several times in Mack's behalf.) Jim Baker says okay if you want to do this. Do you want me to bring you a formal recommendation or look for other candidates?

Bermuda Consulate. We are holding this October rotation open for reasons we've discussed. I just want to let you know that Joy Silverman has reiterated her interest in this post. She knows that it's not decided and may or may not be available for her.

SUBJECT: Policy Review of Section 337 Order

You must decide by May 1 what action, if any, to take regarding a section 337 order with respect to certain rotary printing machines.

After a section 337 investigation, the U.S. International Trade Commission (ITC) issued a limited exclusion order prohibiting the importation of certain rotary printers by a Spanish company (Dato Pack Europa S.A.). The ITC found that the printers infringe a U.S. patent owned by Markem Corporation of Keene, New Hampshire.

By law, you may disapprove section 337 orders for policy reasons. The United States Trade Representative recommends that you take no action with respect to the order, thereby allowing it to go into effect. All relevant agencies support the USTR recommendation.

Recommendation

That you approve Ambassador Hills' recommendation that you allow the section 337 order to go into effect.

Issue

You must decide no later than May 1, 1992, what action, if any, you will take regarding a decision by the U.S. International Trade Commission (USITC) to issue a limited exclusion order under authority of section 337. This order instructs the U.S. Customs Service to exclude from entry into the United States certain rotary printing machines that infringe a U.S. patent. I recommend that you take no action to approve or disapprove the order, thus allowing it to become final at the end of the 60-day review period. The interagency Trade Policy Staff Committee supports this recommendation.

Discussion

Section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930 provides a remedy against imports of products that are unfairly traded. In this case, the USITC found that Dato Pack Europa, S.A. of Barcelona, Spain is importing rotary printing apparatus that infringe a patent owned by Markem Corporation of Keene, New Hampshire.

Statutory Authority

Under section 337(j), you may disapprove a USITC determination to issue an order for policy reasons. These reasons may include the foreign policy implications of the order, the effect of the order on national security, the public health and welfare, competitive conditions in the U.S. economy, the production of like or directly competitive items in the United States, and the effect of an order on U.S. consumers.

You may also formally approve the USITC's determination or simply take no action. If you approve the USITC's determination, the order will become final upon notification of the USITC. If you decide to take no action, the USITC's order will become final automatically upon expiration of the 60-day review period. Almost all section 337 orders have

become final through expiration of the 60-day review period without formal action on the President's part.

The Trade Policy Staff Committee agencies believe that there is no reason in this case to deviate from the usual practice of permitting the USITC's orders to become final without action. These particular printing devices are not essential to maintaining the public health or welfare. The imports covered by the order represent a negligible share of the U.S. market for this type of product and Markem contends that it has sufficient capacity to satisfy U.S. demand.

Recommendation

I recommend, with the unanimous support of the TPSC agencies, that you take no action to approve or disapprove the USITC's section 337 limited exclusion order thus letting it become final at the end of the 60-day review period.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

Earth Day, April 22, is an opportunity to rededicate ourselves to leaving a better quality of life for future generations. But I believe we must make every day Earth Day.

A clean environment requires action from both government and citizens. I believe that we can have both economic growth and a cleaner, safer environment. Sound policies do not force us to choose between the two.

In just three years, this Administration has:

- o Proposed, negotiated, and signed into law a new Clean Air Act that will cut sulfur dioxide emissions in half, reduce toxic air emissions by 90 percent, and clean up smog in cities across America;
- o Established a moratorium until at least the next century on oil and gas drilling off the coasts of California, south Florida, Washington, Oregon, and New England;
- o Led the world by proposing to phase out CFCs and other ozone depleting substances by the end of 1995; and taken legislative action to put the U.S. 42 percent ahead of the internationally required phase-out schedule;
- o Proposed to add over \$1 billion in new lands to America's parks, forests, wildlife refuges, and recreation lands;
- o Won international agreements to prevent hazardous waste from being illegally dumped in developing countries, to ban ivory imports, to ban large-scale driftnet fishing, and to protect Antarctica;
- o Increased funding sharply for implementing and enforcing environmental laws (including a 53% increase in EPA's operating budget), for Superfund, for cleaning up Federal facilities, for protecting wetlands habitat, and for parks and recreation;
- o Signed an executive order requiring Federal agencies -- which generate 20% of the nation's solid waste -- to recycle paper, plastic, metals, glass, used oil, lead acid batteries, and tires;
- o Made polluters pay the cost of cleanup. The Justice Department and EPA have collected more fines and penalties

in the first 3 years of this Administration than during the previous 18 year history of the EPA.

But our work is not finished. I have called on Congress to take the following actions this year:

- o Enact balanced national energy legislation, providing for increased energy conservation and environmentally-responsible energy production, transmission, and use;
- o Establish a U.S. Department of the Environment; and
- o Increase budgets for environmental and natural resource programs, as requested in my budget. Last year, Congress cut my budget requests for Superfund and for America the Beautiful, which includes funding for parks, forests, wildlife refuges, outdoor recreation, and our program to plant one billion trees a year across the country.

These measures would build upon our recent progress and provide continuing momentum to achieve what Americans want in the months and years ahead: environmental improvement and economic growth.

THE PRESIDENT: Mr. Prime Minister, this year my country celebrates the Iberian spirit of discovery. Half a millennium ago, Portugal and Spain helped chart a course towards a new world. Five hundred years later, European unity guides the way towards a new world order. Those early pioneers believed their mission was to probe the secrets of the world. Now we must explore the frontiers of common interest and common ground.

The next horizon: a strengthened partnership between the United States and the European Community. Prime Minister Cavaco Silva, EC President Delors and I and our top officials have discussed areas where we may deepen cooperation: Peace efforts in the Middle East, coordination of aid to Central and Eastern Europe, the struggle of the emergent CIS and international assistance -- the agenda of next month's EC conference in Lisbon.

We also talked about Yugoslavia, where, tragically, old hatreds are opening new wounds. The U.S.-EC partnership is working tirelessly to create conditions for a lasting democratic peace.

No topic on our agenda is more crucial than the Uruguay Round of trade negotiations. We are committed to achieving an early agreement -- one that will spur economic growth, not just in America, but in Europe and all around the world. It will create jobs -- not just for our generation, but for generations to come. For Americans, agreement will mean more than free trade abroad; it will mean for Americans good jobs here at home and a better standard of living at home.

We had an extensive exchange of views on the outstanding issues and some new ideas on how to conclude this Uruguay Round were advanced by both sides. We are convinced, absolutely convinced that the EC leaders are committed to an early agreement. And I hope they know that I am committed to such an early conclusion. We agreed to continue this process. We had some serious discussions, and the process will go on.

Forty-one years ago almost to the day, the countries of Europe began their quest for unity. Over the ruins of war they laid a blueprint for peace and began building the foundations for economic and political cooperation. They sought unity not out of convenience, but out of conviction: a vision of economic interdependence that would inflate the costs of war and expand the dividends of peace. The wisdom of their actions has brought us today to a new Europe -- where peace has paid off.

Now, this new Europe has now joined its strength with the United States to support the spread of political and economic freedom in the lands only recently liberated from Soviet communism. Those who helped four decades ago are now able to shoulder -- those

MORE

that we helped four decades ago are now able to shoulder a larger part of these new challenges.

Jean Monnet, the grandfather of European unity, once asked: "If you are in a dark tunnel and see a small light at the end, should you turn your back on that light and go back into darkness, or should you continue walking toward it even though you know it's far away?"

Five hundred years ago, a European mariner followed the light of his imagination to illuminate a new world. For almost 50 years, the West carried freedom's torch to protect the free world. Today, we stand at the shores of a new world order -- where diverse nations are drawn together in common cause to achieve the universal aspirations of mankind: peace and security, freedom and prosperity. A strong and united Europe offers the best hope for this united purpose, and the best alliance for the United States.

I salute our two distinguished guests today, and now would like to ask Prime Minister Cavaco Silva to say a word.

PRIME MINISTER SILVA: Thank you, Mr. President.

It was extremely gratifying for President Delors and myself to have the opportunity to meet with President Bush. It was a meeting among friends that we found very constructive and fruitful. In November '90 in the declaration on the United States and the European Community relations, we defined the guidelines on which our future cooperation should be based. We are glad to conclude today that our cooperation has been both substantial and effective. We very much value our partnership with the United States. We believe that the continued presence and involvement of the United States in Europe is fundamental to maintain peace and stability in our continent.

Human rights, democratic values and free market economy are the foundations of our Euro-Atlantic partnership. In the past, we have come together to defend them. Now we see these ideals gaining ground everywhere. It's of the most fundamental importance that we join our efforts to ensure that these gains will be durable.

Our cooperation and leadership are also crucial to ensure sustained economic goals worldwide. We have reaffirmed our commitment to the multilateral trade system. We are determined to bring the Uruguay Round to a positive conclusion.

We discussed also the situation in the Commonwealth of Independent States and the preparation of the coming Lisbon conference on coordination of aid to the region. We believe it is fundamental that we continue working together to bring stability to the region, thus creating conditions for the consolidation of democracy and the market economy.

We talked about the present situation in Yugoslavia and the prospects for peace there. Coordination between Europe and the United States has been, and will be, of the utmost importance to help reach a negotiated settlement.

We reviewed the situation in the Middle East and the prospects for the region within the framework of the current peace process. The Community is deeply committed to the peace process. The European Community and the United States share the same outlook on this issue, and we are well aware of the fact that there is no viable alternative to the present peace talks.

We also reviewed the situation in the Magreb. The threat posed by the spread of fundamentalism in that region is a matter of concern for us. We believe that promotion of economic

development and free markets and a respect of human rights are the best means to deal with this problem.

We agreed that respect for international law and the rejection of terrorism are also essential, particularly where it concerns Libya.

This was the first meeting between the European Community and the United States since the decisions of last week, which are now in the process of ratification in the 12 EC member states. We are convinced that the establishment of a new European union will create possibilities for further enlargement of the scope of fellow cooperation.

We discussed new ideas where we could work together. We will be exploring these opportunities in the months ahead.

Thank you, Mr. President.

MR. DAVIDSON: Good afternoon. Welcome to the readout on today's meeting between President Bush and the leadership of the European Community. Our briefing today is on the record, but not, as usual, for sound or camera. Our briefer is the Assistant Secretary of State for European and Canadian Affairs, Ambassador Thomas Niles.

Ambassador Niles.

AMBASSADOR NILES: The discussion today between the President and the European leaders, President Delors of the Commission and Prime Minister Cavaco Silva, was divided into two major sections: one, the Uruguay Round and the other the variety of other political issues where the United States and the Community are working together -- principally, Yugoslavia, the relations with the republics of the former Soviet Union, the Middle East; and there was a brief discussion of developments in Angola, given the important Portuguese interest in developments in that country.

On the Uruguay Round some new ideas were advanced by both sides. Both sides agreed on the need to pursue an agreement as rapidly as possible. The President made clear that he saw no reason why, in an election year, the United States could not move ahead quickly to conclude an agreement. The European leaders welcomed that assurance and, on their side, said that they were certainly prepared to work with us and the other contracting parties in the GATT to reach an agreement.

On Yugoslavia, there was agreement that we needed to press ahead in efforts to maintain the deployment of the U.N. forces going into Croatia and, at the same time, to support efforts to reach a cease-fire in Bosnia-Herzegovina. Prime Minister Cavaco Silva advised that the Foreign Minister of Portugal, Foreign Minister Deus Pinheiro; Lord Carrington, who is running the Constitutional Conference on Yugoslavia for the European Community; and the Special Negotiator for Portugal for the European Community, Portuguese Ambassador Cutieler, will be visiting Bosnia and Sarajevo, Zagreb and Belgrade beginning tomorrow. We will be in touch with the three officials and with the Community and see if there are ways in which we can support this effort.

The European leaders told the President, as they had before, that the Community strongly supports the United States' effort to bring peace to the Middle East, an effort in which the Community is participating.

Questions?

Q I'm not surprised at that.

Q -- category, like on agriculture?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: That's what we're talking about. The area of discussion today was -- the discussion on the GATT today was exclusively on agriculture. I think there's a general recognition on both sides that if we are able, the United States and the Community, to reach an agreement on agriculture that the other outstanding issues on the Uruguay Round negotiations, whether you're talking about market access for goods or market access in the area of services, would very likely fall into place fairly quickly. So the concentration was on agriculture.

Q Were you able to accept any of the proposals that they brought? Did you embrace any of these?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: No. Neither did they embrace any of our ideas. But I think there was agreement at the table that some interesting ideas had been put forward that deserved further consideration, and that will be given in the period immediately ahead. There was an agreement that we should continue the negotiating process as quickly as possible.

Q Can we characterize this as a stalemate?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: No, not at all. I think it's --

Q Why?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Why? I think we made clear in the briefing prior to the meeting, which I guess was yesterday, we made clear that we were not expecting a breakthrough at this session, and nor was one achieved. But as we have seen I think fairly steadily since the President and the European leaders met in The Hague last November 8th, we've had steady progress and we believe we can continue to make progress.

The differences are there. There's no reason to minimize them, but we believe we made some more headway and we're going to continue to work on it.

Q Carla Hills gave the impression yesterday that at least in the minds of the U.S., the problem is the failure of the European Community to reach a consensus on the agriculture issue. And yet, the President today had to reassure them that the American election wouldn't cause a problem. So where is the problem? Is it really their failure of a consensus, or is it our failure to compromise?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: The Community as an institution has had difficulty coming forward with a position, but there's a related problem, and that is the fact that while the Community is negotiating in the Uruguay Round, it's also attempting to reform the common agricultural policy in a major way. And one of the problems that President Delors and Prime Minister Cavaco Silva made clear exists on the Community side is this relationship between the international negotiations and the internal reforms.

The President noted at the table that the Europeans and other GATT contracting parties need not fear that the United States lacks a commitment to the conclusion of the Round. But that's not, I don't think, the problem, the problem that we face. There are differences in our approach and theirs on the question of how the agricultural system should be reformed. But we're in the process of trying to overcome those.

Q With the new ideas on the table, how early do you expect an agreement now? Before the G-7 meeting?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: We're ready for an agreement as soon as we can reach one. And if we can reach one next week, we'd be delighted. Next month -- there will be, as you suggest, an important meeting of the G-7 in Munich from the 6th through the 8th of July; and if an agreement is not reached prior to the Munich meeting, obviously, the Uruguay Round would be a subject on the agenda. But we're --

Q This is a possibility --

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Well, if you don't reach an agreement between now and Munich, obviously, you can't say we're not going to discuss the Uruguay Round in Munich. That will be a subject on the agenda -- as has the Uruguay Round at every G-7 summit since 1986.

Q So you're saying now that for sure that will be a subject?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: No, I'm not saying that, because I would hope that maybe before the 6th through the 8th of July we would be able to reach an agreement so that we wouldn't have to have a long discussion of agriculture at the Munich summit.

Q The President repeatedly said an early agreement, an early agreement. It suggested that he had some time frame or some deadline in mind. Can't you help us with that a little bit?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Well, there is no deadline. There is a desire on the part of all of the contracting parties -- that's not just the United States and the European Community -- to wrap up these negotiations as quickly as possible. Negotiations began, after all, in 1986. And we've been at this for a while and I think there's a feeling -- Director General Dunkel has certainly expressed it in recent days -- that the time has come to conclude the negotiations with a success and with an agreement.

The President shares that view, but obviously, there's some important points that need to be resolved before we get there.

Q These new ideas -- the President said in a speech yesterday that he would compromise to some extent, but not carry the whole burden of compromise. Are these compromise ideas and did the other side bring the same, and was it, in general, from Europe, or was it from France or one particular --

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: I think the Prime Minister and the President of the Commission spoke for the Community as a whole, not for one country. So this was a European proposal. There were some European ideas that were put forward to deal with those remaining areas of difference on the agricultural negotiations.

As far as who carries the major weight of the compromises, I think there's a recognition that both sides have to be prepared to be flexible.

Q Were these ideas to actually bring it to a conclusion?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: I think there's a possibility that we can -- I've always felt and I think that's the view of the President and the other senior officials who participated in this process for several years now that there is a basis there to reach an agreement. That is one of the reasons why the President has spent so much time personally in this effort. The meeting at The Hague last November, the meeting here today I think demonstrate his personal commitment to success here. So we think there's a basis for success.

We also think -- and this was something where we found full agreement on the European side -- that the world economy needs a success in the Uruguay Round. Prime Minister Cavaco Silva talked about the implications of a Uruguay Round success with the economies of Central and Eastern Europe and Latin America, and that's a view we share -- that the United States and the European Community would not, certainly, be the only beneficiaries of a success in the GATT. The world economy as a whole would benefit.

Q Since you haven't given us the parameters of these new proposals, can you at least tell us whether they are convergent in any way? Are they in the same areas of disagreement, or are they wholly separate matters?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Same areas of disagreement?

Q Well, that is to say are they on the same subject?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: We're dealing with -- of course, of course. We have certain areas where we and the Community disagree on the nature of what the agricultural agreement should look like. The Community has put forward some ideas in that area; we put forward some ideas. Now we're going to be talking, following up on the discussions today, to see whether there's a way in which we can bridge the gaps. And there are still some gaps between us and there's --

Q Sometimes ideas can be divergent --

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: No, well, let me -- I think I can answer the question; that we did not end up further apart at the end of the day than we were when we went in. There was a feeling at the end that a good faith effort had been made by both sides to bridge the gap and that the ideas put forward were sufficiently promising to justify further discussion, which is what is going to take place now.

Q When the President talked about compromises, already agricultural groups are saying, well, sure, he's going to open up our markets and not get us anything.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Well, obviously, it has to be a balanced deal. I mean, balanced for us and acceptable to them, and not just acceptable to the United States and the Community, but to another hundred participating countries, or 96 participating countries.

Q If you were to get this agreement you're still going to have to work with Congress. Apropos of that, I'd like to ask you to respond to a full-page ad that was in The Washington Post this morning, placed there by a clutch of consumer and environmental groups, criticizing the entire Uruguay Round and charging that, in essence, it's going to force the weakening or dismantling of a number of U.S. environmental laws, bringing higher U.S. standards down to lower standards outside the country. They cite the Marine Mammal

Protection Act and Mexico's activities there. They cite things involved with laws regarding pesticides on imported food. What sort of reassurance are you going to be able to offer on that score?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Well, I think I could point to the fact that, for instance, with our principal partner, the European Community today, their regulations in these areas are in most cases at least as stringent as ours. I mean, it's not a question when we negotiate with the European Community or discuss with the Community GATT issues, we're not talking about weakening standards of consumer protection or environmental protection. Their regulations, I can tell you from experience over there, are at least as stringent in most cases of which I am aware as ours are. So we and the Community go into these negotiations with a common point of view.

Now, it's true that -- wait a second -- it's true that the Community disagreed with the secondary boycott aspects of the Marine Mammal Protection Act -- the dolphin, the problem with the yellowfin tuna. But that was not because the Community disagreed with what we're trying to do. They share our objective of protecting marine mammals. They disagree with the element in the Marine Mammal Protection Act, which imposed a secondary boycott on countries which import yellowfin tuna from countries that don't comply with our act and wish to export yellowfin tuna to the United States. The administration opposed that particular provision of the Marine Mammal Act as well. We went to court. And for a while we had an injunction against it and then we lost finally on appeal. So we and the Community have a very, I think, common and consistent view on the need to ensure that trade liberalization does not conflict with environmental interests or consumer protection.

Q I understand. The point of that is that laws passed by the United States Congress are likely to be overturned by a bunch of people who didn't vote for the congressmen or anybody else.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Well, you can't. I mean, you have to be able to demonstrate how that would happen. And I haven't seen it happen in previous rounds, GATT Rounds. I don't see it happening, frankly, in the current GATT Round. In fact, I think in a way you could argue that a strong multilateral trading system where we have agreement on the rules can be used to support unified standards, worldwide standards, not just United States standards for environmental protection, consumer protection, whatever it is. Bring the developing countries into a system of rules and regulations.

And so I think we would probably have fewer problems in the out-years as a result of a GATT agreement, and particularly as regards consumer protection and environment, than we have today.

Q On Yugoslavia, we were told yesterday that you were going to coordinate your position on Serbia. Was there any discussion and agreement on the steps that could be taken as a pressure on Serbia to stop supporting aggression? For instance, beyond the CSCE measures that can be taken, what about diplomatic relations --

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: No, there was not discussion of specific steps. There was a commitment to work together. There was, I think, a generally-shared view that the behavior of the government of Serbia as it relates to the situation in Bosnia-Herzegovina was unacceptable; inconsistent with Serbia's obligations under the CSCE and under international law; and a commitment on the part of the United States and the Community to stay in very close touch.

Now, we've just had a senior U.S. official visiting the area, Ralph Johnson. He'll be coming back today. The European Community officials, as I said, will be in Yugoslavia tomorrow.

We're going to keep in close touch with the Europeans. You mentioned the CSCE -- the Helsinki meeting reconvenes on the 29th of April. And at that time there will be a proposal on the table which was put forward by the United States with the support of the European Community, to examine Serbia's participation, or Yugoslavia's-Serbia's participation in light of the way in which Serbia is carrying out -- or not carrying out, not fulfilling its CSCE obligations in the case of Bosnia.

So I think, although there will be quite a bit of discussion and perhaps some actions between now and then -- I can't say for sure -- the next perhaps important point in this process would be on the 29th of April when CSCE reconvenes in Helsinki.

Q Mr. Secretary, the administration put money in the budget this year for extra export credits to compete with the Europeans if there's not a deal on the GATT by the end of June. Is the administration going to spend that money?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Well, we have to see what happens at the end of June. You're talking about the Export Enhancement Program sales? I think we'll have to evaluate where we are at the end of June to see what the situation is in the negotiations and also what the market situation is, to what extent U.S. markets are being undercut by subsidized exports by the European Community. It's hard to predict right now what grain markets are going to look like on the 1st of July.

Q Mr. Secretary, a couple of questions on the new ideas. You said they didn't leave you further apart. Did they bring you closer together? Have they reduced the gap?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: I think they provided a basis for further discussion. And as you can imagine, at the table today, with the ideas first put forward, it was not possible to determine whether any or all of the ideas that were advanced will be helpful in bringing us together or not. And that's the purpose of the follow-on discussions which we will conduct with the community.

So it's very hard to say. I think there was a feeling on both sides that these ideas or these suggestions were advanced in a good spirit and that there is a desire, a mutual desire to get on with this and to resolve all the remaining issues as soon as possible.

Q Without going into the specific details of the new ideas, we've been told already by the administration that what you're suggesting and what you have been suggesting to the EC is basically to decouple subsidies of commodities and have them subsidize the farmer without interfering with --

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Decoupled payments.

Q -- decoupled payments.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: Right. Break the link between subsidy and production.

Q Okay. Are these new ideas from the United States under that general rubric?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: I think that one of the things that has happened during the Uruguay Round negotiations and as a consequence of cap reform -- in the cap reform discussions in Europe, is that our original objective -- one of our original objectives, not the only one by any means -- but one of our original objectives which was to convince our European friends of the need to break the link between subsidy and production has been achieved. Not necessarily in full, but that concept is very much in the proposals that are being discussed now in Europe for the reform of the common

agricultural program. And the decoupled payments which Commissioner McSherry has suggested are part of that process.

Now, of course, it also involves set-asides and other devices to reduce the enormous subsidies in Europe which -- grain subsidies and other subsidies that are posing such a burden on Europe and a burden on the international agricultural markets. So we see, if you will, philosophically, some breakthroughs in terms of the way the Europeans look at agriculture and the way they look at the role of agriculture and international trade. Now, the details, that's where we are now, trying to work them out.

MR. DAVIDSON: Last question, please.

Q To follow on the Yugoslav question, is the U.S. prepared to deny the Belgrade government, either as Serbia or Yugoslavia, a seat at CSCE?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: This is an issue that will be discussed on the 29th of April. We've raised the possibility. Ambassador Kornblum, at the last meeting before the Easter break in Helsinki, pointed to the fact that its behavior in Bosnia-Herzegovina puts Serbia at variance with its CSCE obligations. And there was a general agreement among the now 51 countries participating in the CSCE that this was a serious problem that would be taken up at the time the meeting reconvenes on the 29th of April.

Now, obviously, what we hope is that between now and then the government of Serbia will change its policy, will cease and desist from the activities it's undertaking in Bosnia, seeking to destabilize the situation there. If that doesn't happen, obviously, we'll be prepared to draw the consequences when the CSCE resumes. We advanced the proposal.

Q And the consequences are to deny them the seat?

ASSISTANT SECRETARY NILES: It would be our proposal. But obviously we would hope that between now and then there would be sufficient changes in the way in which the government of Serbia is behaving, so that would not be necessary. We're not seeking to exclude Serbia from anything.

Thank you very much.

Here at long last is the fundraising letter and schedule. I am available to discuss at your convenience. I would suggest we get your comments incorporated and then plan the best means of presenting to the President.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

RE: POLITICAL/FUNDRAISING PLAN

Below is an outline of projects that must be funded between now and the election in order to provide the resources necessary for victory in November for the presidential race as well as the rest of the GOP ticket. Understandably, this proposal is extensive. Please note that these proposed events can for the most part be built around campaign travel between now and November.

The official demands of office on your schedule are clearly enormous. However, using 1988 as a baseline we have requested your participation in roughly half the number of events for 1992 and have prepared what we hope is a workable plan to reach the political and fundraising goals set out below.

I. BUSH-QUAYLE '92

As of April 17, 1992 the Campaign has raised \$20.7 million dollars and has a balance of \$6.9 million dollars yet to be raised. Primary opposition necessitated greater expenditures than anticipated to date. It is critical to raise the balance of our primary goal in order to insure adequate resources for media between the DNC Convention and our GOP Convention. Additionally, with the financial needs of the Presidential Trust, Victory '92, GOP Candidates and committees and Bush-Quayle General Election Compliance yet to be raised, it is necessary that we conduct the remainder of Bush-Quayle '92 fundraising quickly so that the way is clear for these other critical efforts to commence.

In order to raise the remaining Bush-Quayle '92 funds, we understand that the following events are confirmed on your schedule:

April 27	Charlotte, NC	Dinner
April 30	Columbus, OH	Dinner
May 11	Philadelphia, PA	Dinner
May 15	Pittsburgh, PA	Luncheon

In addition, there will be a need for one more event where you either host the successful countdown solicitation people at the White House and/or attend a dinner in Washington. These events on your schedule are augmented by a total of 32 events with Mrs. Bush, the Vice President, Cabinet members and other surrogates.

II. THE PRESIDENTIAL TRUST

As you know, this program is responsible for raising the amount set by the FEC that each national party committee can spend on behalf of its nominee. These funds are of the utmost importance to ensure that we have financial parity with the Democrat nominee in the general election. This year the FEC has set the amount at \$10.3 million dollars. In 1988 it was \$8.6 million dollars. In 1988 you participated personally in 14 events as follows: (1) Los Angeles, New York, San Francisco, Chicago, Washington, D.C. (2) Dallas, St. Louis, Omaha, Phoenix, Boston, Cleveland, Miami, Detroit. Additionally, surrogate events were held around the country. As you are aware, because these funds are specifically designated for the Presidential election, the money must be raised from personal (i.e. not corporate) contributions. As you can imagine, the trustee donation at \$15,000 per couple is a significant commitment to your candidacy. In order to raise the \$10.3 million dollars, plus fundraising costs of approximately \$1 million dollars, we propose the following schedule of events with your participation:

From these events, a revenue of \$5,950,000 is anticipated. The remaining \$4,350,000 will be raised through a total of 40 events with Mrs. Bush, the Vice President, Cabinet members, surrogates and a direct mail component. Response to Presidential Trust appeals through the mail have been weak thus far, however, new techniques are being tested in order to attract new donors to this program. With your approval, we will ask former Presidents Reagan, Nixon and Ford to do two Trust events each.

III. VICTORY '92

Victory '92 is the nationwide program to plan, fund and implement volunteer and voter contact programs state by state. These programs include volunteer intensive mail, voter identification phone banks, get-out-the-vote activity and slate cards. Voter registration, absentee ballot programs and collateral materials (yard signs, bumper stickers, door-to door literature, rally materials) will also be part of the effort. Victory '92 programs benefit the entire GOP ticket. However, specific elements such as volunteer phone banks for the Presidential nominee and candidate specific mailings (using volunteers) benefit our Presidential nominee.*

These programs, which constitute the "ground game" for the fall campaign, must be funded in large part with "hard" dollars raised by state parties under FEC guidelines. The proposed events listed below represent states with a large Victory '92 budget and/or priority (i.e. targeted) states for the fall campaign or states where national Victory '92 money can be raised. Victory '88 programs had significant positive impact on the general election results and these programs are an important part of our strategy for success in 1992.

The Victory '92 events will generally be \$5,000 per person and mostly personal money. In 1988 110 Victory '88 events raised \$40 million, and you participated in excess of 42 Victory '88 events. Total Victory '92 funding is anticipated to be \$50 million. Most of the Victory '92 events will occur in August, September and early October, and will be built around your political travel schedule as tag-ons. Please note that it may be possible to do multiple location events at the \$1,000 level using satellite feed for Victory '92 depending on cost, etc. Below are specific Victory '92 events that need to be scheduled in advance as opposed to last minute tag-ons:

California:	Southern CA

IV. CANDIDATE EVENTS

A) Senate:

Incumbents - To date, you have participated in five events for incumbent Senators running for reelection this cycle -- Senators John Seymour (CA), Frank Murkowski (AK), Kit Bond (MO), Bob Packwood (OR), and Bob Kasten (WI). Additionally, we have scheduled an event for Senator Arlen Specter (PA) for June 9th.

We are currently looking into scheduling dates for Senators John McCain (AZ) and Alfonse D'Amato (NY), and believe we should also consider doing an event for Senator Dan Coats (IN) and, perhaps, a second event for Senator Seymour.

Challengers - The following challenger candidates represent our best opportunities for victories in their respective states and should receive strong consideration for events:

Mike DeWine (Ohio)
Rich Williamson (Illinois)
Paul Coverdell (Georgia)
Tommy Hartnett (South Carolina)

After the primaries, we should take a look at California, Connecticut and North Carolina to evaluate the candidate potential for victory.

Open Seats - Additionally, consideration should be given to the open seats in Utah, Idaho, North Dakota, Colorado and New Hampshire.

As with Victory '92 events, we can fold these candidate requests into your political travel between now and mid-October.

- B) **House:** This year presents nearly 100 open/challenger races with viable Republican candidates. At this point there has been no commitment for Presidential participation for Congressional candidate events. There certainly may be requests that will merit consideration and that can be done in conjunction with scheduled political travel in the fall.
- C) **Governors:** At present, there is not a commitment for Presidential events on behalf of the candidates in the 12 Gubernatorial races for 1992 including those from the 6 open Republican seats. However there is likely to be a request for your participation at the Republican

Governors Association dinner in September here in Washington, D.C.

V. BUSH-QUAYLE '92 GENERAL ELECTION COMPLIANCE COMMITTEE

Compliance funds are raised to cover the legal and accounting costs during the general election as well as the mandatory FEC audit post-election. If the compliance committee is not fully funded through it's own fundraising efforts these costs have to be borne by the general election political budget.

Efforts to raise this money after the '88 Campaign concluded (whether through individual solicitation or direct mail) were not successful, as is the case with most "retire the debt" efforts. In 1992 compliance fundraising is an ongoing effort. Vice President Quayle and other surrogates will be participating in events for the Compliance account throughout late Spring and Summer. One Presidential event in the fall, prior to the election, will be required to complete this \$6 million dollar effort.

In summary, Mr. President, we are sensitive to the demands this proposal places on your schedule. However, every effort will be made to incorporate these events into travel that is necessary for Bush-Quayle '92 Campaign appearances.

Attachment A

VICTORY '92 VOTER CONTACT PROGRAM ACTIVITIES

The Victory '92 voter contact program consists of a menu of activities to be carried out by state and local party organizations. Funds expended on these programs are not allocable to the nominee's total campaign budget. Further, there are no limits on the amount of funds which can be spent on these activities.

The activities are:

I. Voter Registration

Programs may be conducted by mail, or phone with paid or volunteer follow-up.

II. Voter List Development

Lists of voters may be purchased, computerized and enhanced. Enhancements are unlimited, but generally include phone numbers, postal carrier routes, party registration, age, sex and census data. Database development through paid phone banks to attach issue or other information is also allowed.

III. Volunteer Material

State and local parties may purchase unlimited quantities of volunteer campaign materials for our nominees. These materials include buttons, bumper stickers, brochures, yard sign and posters.

IV. Presidential Phone Banks

State and local parties may establish and pay all the costs related to the supervision and operation of volunteer phone banks for the nominee. These banks may be used for voter identification, advocacy or get-out-the-vote phone calls.

V. Voter Contact Mail

State and local parties may produce and mail unlimited quantities of mail specifically advocating the message of our nominees without the cost being allocated to their campaigns. The mail must be sent to a non-commercial list, such as the cover list noted above, and volunteers must have a substantial involvement in the production. These mailings may be produced in complete cooperation with the campaign.

VI. Ballot Security

State and local parties may pay the costs associated with ensuring votes are lawfully cast. Poll watchers, educational mailings and lawyer services are examples of costs which may be covered.

VII. Generic Party Mail

State or National parties may produce and mail absentee ballots and get-out-the-vote mail that is non-allocable to any candidate as long as the message is generically Republican. Inclusion of the Republican slate is allowed.

VIII. Slate Mailings

State parties may produce and mail slate mailings without the cost being allocable to any candidate appearing on the slate. A minimum of 3 candidates must appear and the message must be generically Republican. ("Vote for the Republican ticket.")

Some of the above activities do not have to be paid for with exclusively federal account dollars. Costs of certain ones, such as phone banks and slate mailings not for the sole benefit of federal candidates, may be paid for in part with state campaign dollars. (In many states this means corporate dollars.)

Despite this, it is important for maximum flexibility to have state and local federal accounts with balances as large as possible.

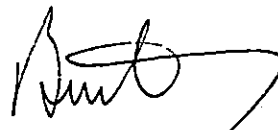
Follow-up on Manfred Werner's case reveals that he had a colon cancer removed by rather extensive surgery. Fifty lymph nodes were removed and examined and one of them apparently was positive. The surgeon has told the Secretary General that everything has been removed, but obviously this remains an unknown. The fact of the matter is that if a lymph node is positive, the cancer is uncommonly really cured by the surgery.

The doctor is sending me all of the details on the pathology and on the surgery and this will help me a great deal. The Secretary General would like my help in trying to determine the proper treatment and of course I am going to do everything I can for him and mobilize all of the appropriate experts, etc.

He obviously feels very close to you and repeatedly asked me to give you his best regards and to thank you again for your concern. He really does sound like an awful nice guy.

As I proceed with the case, I will keep you informed from time to time, if that is your desire. Please remember that this information has been obtained on a confidential doctor-patient basis. If anyone else gets this information from you, they should be reminded of this fact.

PERSPECTIVE ON GEORGE BUSH

Define the Man to See the President



His sees life's struggles as essentially personal, and government's role as supportive, not dominant.

Where is George Bush coming from? Does he have a philosophy? If so, what is it?

There have been three defining events in George Bush's life that continue to shape his public philosophy. First was his experience as a Navy pilot in World War II. On one of his 58 missions, he was shot down and saved by an American sub; his two airplane mates died. Where, he wondered, did the thinking of our statesmen—the ideas of Woodrow Wilson and his opponents—go so wrong that a second world war engulfed humanity only two decades after the first? That question still dominates Bush's thinking.

The second event was the death of his 3-year-old daughter Robin, who contracted leukemia in 1952. Bush is a private man, but of her dying he has said, "We found several friends and neighbors who had gone through like tragedies, and . . . we learned from them and they from us, and we were each strengthened. We began to dare more. We had more children. We started more businesses. And we entered more fully into . . . community life."

The third event was being ambassador to the United Nations, where he came to grasp the commonality of all peoples. Imperfect as the United Nations may be as a political institution—Bush had no delusions that it could solve problems by itself—he saw it as essential to changing the way peoples of different cultures think about each other—as partners rather than strangers.

These three events crystallized Bush's public philosophy. The central tenet of his beliefs concerns human nature: The unavoidable truth, he came to realize, is that all individuals are both sinful and transcendent. Recall how Robert Penn Warren expressed the point in "All the King's Men." On the one hand: "Man is conceived in sin and born in corruption, and he passeth from the stink of the dydie to the stench of the shroud." On the other hand: "The creation of evil is . . . the index of God's glory and His power. That had to be so that the creation of good might be the index of man's glory and power. But by God's help." So with George Bush: Individuals, everywhere (no matter their culture) and always (no matter their century), are subject to wicked feelings, and they are personally responsible to rise above them. Humans

are not angels, but they are obliged not to be beasts. That is the index of their dignity. Government cannot win that spiritual struggle for them. What the state can do is organize a sufficiently reliable environment in which the people can wage their personal struggles. To that end, those in the federal govern-

ment have the responsibility for keeping three primary institutions healthy.

First is the institution of collective security. To defend against domestic bullies, we Americans daily rely on our local institutions of law and order. Internationally, however, there is no law, and America, in Bush's view, must therefore entangle itself in alliances to isolate, deter and punish bully nations. He believes that national security depends on two great postwar alliances, one with our North Atlantic neighbors, the other with our Pacific partners. But he also believes that the resolve of all nations to secure the integrity of inter-

national boundaries must be continually reinforced by persuasion. We must persuade every member of the United Nations of its obligations under Article 39 of the U.N. Charter to unite in collective action against all international aggression. Finding ways to change how nations think about war is the key to peace in the 21st Century.

The second primary institution is democracy. Democracy educates; that is one of its principal virtues. Democracies compel officials to compete for popular support and disclose details of the public business. At the same time, voters are canvassed for their views. This endless, sometimes abrasive, exchange creates what non-democratic systems have never produced: an informed, self-confident citizenry. Democracy generates information, tapping knowledge from diverse sources, extending it to all the people, enabling them to solve their own problems. In the case of developing nations, democracy is particularly important. Imperfect as it may be in countries unused to it, democracy spreads the knowledge necessary to escape poverty, illiteracy and prejudice. The central reality of a non-democratic society, as Bush sees history, is the people's ignorance, which leaves unchecked their natural tendencies to hatred and suspicion.

In 1982, the Soviet physicist Alexander Sakharov remarked on the absence of a public opinion under communism: "We [Russians] don't even know how, or by whom, the decision to invade Afghanistan [in 1979] was made! People in our country do not have even a fraction of the information about events in the world and in their own country which the citizens of the West have."

The third primary institution with which the federal government must be concerned (Bush believes) is economic freedom, including a system of free markets in which, as Walter Lippman once wrote, "for the first time in human history men had come upon a way of producing wealth in which the good fortune of others multiplied their own." A free person profits by providing something and then teaching others how to use it to their profit. Henry Kaiser's cement trucks bore the motto, "Find a need and fill it." If we were less modest, we would recognize that impulse for what it is: neighborliness, community, the habits of human fellowship. Economic freedom exercises us in human empathy, the skill to see things from others' points of view.

By Bush's vision of America, it is government's job to strengthen these primary institutions. Each can break down. Collective security may stumble and collapse in paralysis just when our national interests require action. Democracy may oppress political minorities. Economic freedom may not heed the truly needy. To offset these risks, we must maintain our independent military strength, constitutionally guaranteed civil liberties and traditions of private volunteerism and public social security. They can momentarily prevent disaster, but that is all they can do. The future ultimately depends on keeping our three primary institutions sound.

That is why patient international diplomacy (as in cultivating international partnership in the face of Iraqi aggression) is preferable to impulsive national reaction. That is why it is desirable for the Supreme Court to act with restraint instead of cutting off legislative debate on the great moral and social issues of our time. That is why Congress must begin to address itself more to issues of growth and less to egalitarianism.

Collective security, democracy and economic freedom (in contrast to isolationism, government by judiciary and welfare statism) increase the strength of the people themselves.

TO THE 1992 SUPER BOWL CHAMPIONS, WASHINGTON REDSKINS

The Rose Garden

6:02 P.M. EDT

THE PRESIDENT: Please be seated. And welcome to the Rose Garden. May I first salute, of course, Joe Gibbs and Charlie Casserly, and the players, the coaches, the official family, and the friends of the Redskins. Welcome to the White House at last. We're delighted to have you here.

And you can imagine how much I've looked forward to the event. Today we honor the flagship franchise of the NFL since 1937. A team which, this year, earned the best mark in club history: 17 and 2. We're proud to salute the 1992 Super Bowl Champions.

I think, first of all, of Mark Rypien -- nearly 3,600 passing yards in the regular season; two touchdowns; the MVP Award in the Super Bowl. Someone mentioned to me that Mark was born in Canada. It looks like the U.S.-Canada free trade agreement is paying off already, at least from our standpoint. (Laughter.)

And often Mark threw to the beloved Number 81. And when the NFL decided last month to scrap instant replay, I thought I heard a big cheer go up. Barbara said, "What was that?" I said, "I'm not sure. Sounds like Art Monk." An instant replay cost him one touchdown in the Super Bowl, but not 60 others. And a glorious career, and all Washington is proud of a future Hall-of-Famer.

Now, this brings me to the other members of the Super Bowl Champions. Perhaps the NFL's best offensive line -- the Hogs -- allowing a club record low, nine sacks. Next, with Art, members of the Posse -- wide receivers Ricky Sanders and Gary Clark. We salute, too, running backs like Gerald Riggs and Earnest Byner. Chip Lohmiller -- Cole Porter must have seen the future when he wrote "I get a kick out of you." (Laughter.)

And plus, of course, another future Hall-of-Famer, Joe Gibbs -- now with three Super Bowl victories, second only to Chuck Noll. (Applause.) Let's hear it for the coach. (Applause.)

And yet, it's the "national defense" that would make even the Pentagon proud. That great defense that still has Jim Kelly ducking tacklers in his sleep. Jim, nothing personal, the Skins KO'd opponents all year. Think of linemen like Fred Stokes and Jumpy Geathers, Tim Johnson. Or linebackers Andre Collins and Wilbur Marshall -- 11 tackles against Buffalo. Or the secondary, featuring A.J. Johnson and all-pro speed demon, Darrell Green.

And each showed why Coach Richie Petibon said, "It's a case of the whole being even better than the parts."

Go to Bethesda or Anacostia, travel to Alexandria or Falls Church, and they'll talk about this team molded by Joe and Charlie. They'll talk, too, about things other than the won and lost record, impressive, though, that is. Things like Mark's support for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation; Art Monk's and Earnest Byner's work

on behalf of the Food For Families Program at Thanksgiving; Darrell Green's Youth Foundation; or the Joe Gibbs Youth For Tomorrow Home.

These things explain a lot. They explain why the Skins have become a barometer of whether Monday is good or bad for Washingtonians. And they're also an economic barometer. And I was glad, for example, to learn that whenever the Redskins have won the Super Bowl, the U.S. economy has improved that year. (Laughter.)

Other teams get covered in the sports section; this crowd gets covered in The Wall Street Week. Whether it's Wall Street or Main Street, though, America loves the Redskins.

And so I just want to welcome you all here. We're proud to have you here -- your friends, your wives, dates, and whoever else. And so now let's get on to what's important -- a little chow. But let me tell you that we've got a triathlon event out here. We have the horse shoe pit rigged up, and if I might spell out the ground rules here -- women and men welcome. Just the players and their dates and friends, however, because we've got a time thing. And he who gets -- or she -- who gets the most ringers out of 10 tosses wins a fantastic prize.

On the putting green, he or she who gets the lowest nine-hole score wins yet another fantastic prize. And then we move to the third event -- you can do this in any order you want, but try to do it before dinner -- and the last one is the basketball, 10 shots from the foul line -- another fantastic prize. So you don't have to go and this isn't mandatory, but I want to stand around and laugh. (Laughter.)

Thank you very much. (Applause.)

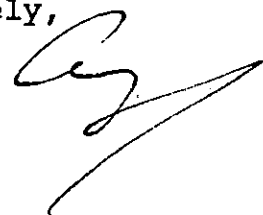

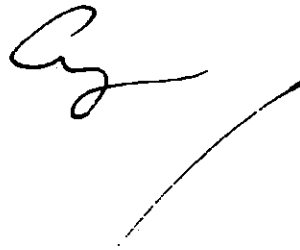

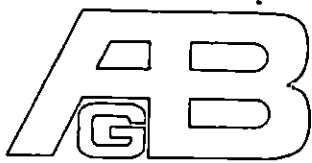
