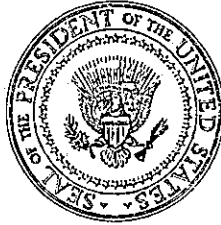

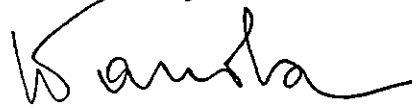

Bush Reasserts His Urban Ideas

'I Am Proposing Them Again ... We Must Try Something New'

LOS ANGELES, May 8—President Bush said today that his "emotional, moving" hours touring this ravaged city have confirmed his belief that urban programs he has sent to Congress provide the correct way of solving the serious problems of U.S. cities.

Bush ended his two-day visit here by calling his proposals to fight poverty and crime "fresh new ideas" although, by his own acknowledgement, they are not new at all.

"I know some will say, 'You've proposed all this before,' " Bush told an inner-city audience of young people, "and I am proposing them again because really, we must try something new."

Bush said his "first order of business" upon returning to Washington tonight would be to build bipartisan support for his "action agenda." The programs—creating tax incentives for investments in blighted urban areas, promoting tenant-ownership of housing projects and targeting law enforcement and social services for poor neighborhoods—have been part of the administration's policy proposals but have received little attention from Bush.

Congress has rejected his plan for tax breaks and has funded the tenant-ownership program well below the administration's requests.

Bush also announced a modest \$19 million grant for a "weed-and-seed" program designed to "weed" out known criminals from troubled neighborhoods and then "seed"

those areas with health, education, job-training and anti-drug centers.

Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton criticized Bush today for waiting until the riots to embrace the ideas of Housing and Urban Development Secretary Jack Kemp and said Bush has joined the cause of urban revival only after "dropping in the polls." [Details on Page A5].

After an emotional—and, for Bush, rare—day of meetings Thursday with black, Hispanic, Korean and other community activists to hear their rage and despair over the riots here, the president returned today to a more traditional mode, giving a series of set remarks to groups that he wanted to highlight.

He visited Scott Miller, a hos-

pitalized firefighter shot during last week's violence; he spoke to area firefighters and law enforcement personnel, and he saluted military troops in brief remarks at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. To each, Bush said his "first responsibility" is to preserve "the domestic order" because improvements cannot occur "in a climate of fear."

Bush seemed ill at ease while talking to Miller. He praised Miller's heroism and said, "I'm sorry Barbara's not here. She's out repairing what's left of our house" in Kennebunkport, Maine. "Damn storm knocked down four or five walls. She says it's coming along."

Notably absent from either law enforcement event was Los Angeles Police Chief Daryl F. Gates, whom Bush once called "an American hero" and who campaigned with

Bush in 1988. White House officials said his presence would be divisive as the president was trying to emphasize the need to heal.

Gates has been criticized for his department's hesitant response April 29 when three days of savage killings, arson and looting broke out, resulting in a National Guard callup and use of Army and Marine troops to help restore order.

At a news conference today, Gates said it had been a mistake for him to attend a fundraiser at the time rioting began, but he blamed a field lieutenant for waiting too long to bring in reinforcements and for retreating from an intersection where people were pulled from cars and beaten by rioters. "Had we to do it over again, we would have used . . . deadly weapons to get into that," the Associated Press quoted Gates as saying.

Los Angeles officials and residents expressed concern today about the possibility of

further violence when federal troops pull back. White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said today that the troops would be moved around this weekend but that the same number would be available and that none would leave the area.

Bush's visit ended the way it began, with a trip to a riot-scarred neighborhood where he spoke at the Challengers Boys and Girls Club, an organization that works with inner-city youngsters.

There, the president described his philosophy of government's role in solving problems involving urban poverty and racial divisiveness, and he said his time here was "packed with emotion, raw and intense."

Bush called the riots, in which more than 50 people died, "a terrible tragedy" for the nation and said he "could hardly imagine" the anger that people must feel in order to terrorize each other that way. He said the trag-

edy was "many years in the making" when "the system perpetuates failure and hatred and poverty and despair."

Bush spoke of the "unpleasant reality" facing the nation. "The cities are in serious trouble, and too many of our citizens are in trouble," he said, adding that government "has an absolute responsibility to solve this problem."

Current government programs, born of what he called "noble intentions," have "taken the nation down an unsuccessful path. . . . In the wake of the L.A. riots, in the wake of a lost generation of inner-city lives, can any one of us argue that we have solved the problems of poverty and racism and crime?"

Bush outlined philosophical underpinning for urban programs that he said would be "a radical break from the policies of the past" because their goal would be to "break a cycle of dependency" on government programs.

In outlining his agenda, Bush essentially

was embracing the proposals of Kemp, who sat beside him during the speech. Kemp said the riots had produced the "critical mass" that might break the logjam over Republicans' proposed solutions.

Kemp told reporters tonight that Congress should be able to agree by July 4 on emergency legislation to aid inner cities.

Fitzwater said Bush plans to meet with congressional leaders next week to assess how to move on his package. He said the president may offer "some new twists" but no new federal programs.

Bush planned to address the nation on radio Saturday morning about his visit and legislation to deal with urban problems, White House Chief of Staff Samuel K. Skinner said en route to Washington.

President takes his hits at reporters' annual fete

George Bush: What a sport. Gravel-voiced comedian Paula Poundstone pounds him at the White House Correspondents' Association annual dinner Saturday night, even brings up the dreaded "grocery store incident" — the much-disputed news story that reported the president's incredulity at the sight of an electronic checkout scanner — and he still passes her a private note on the dais praising her performance as "a 10."

"Paula and I are both funny people. She's funny on purpose." Mr. Bush told the audience of journal-

ists, government types and other notables assembled for the press group's 78th annual dinner at the Washington Hilton.

Ms. Poundstone, in a white pantsuit, cheerfully knocked the president throughout her standup routine. The audience gave her a mostly lukewarm reception; women seemed to laugh harder than men.

The comedian said all she's gathered from media coverage of the political campaign so far is, "I'm a Democrat. I don't want Bush. Clinton may have had sex, and Tammy Wynette is upset about it."

"It felt like I lost weight up there," Ms. Poundstone said afterward. "The president looked shocked at a couple of points."

Mr. Bush told reporters backstage before the dinner that he was a little apprehensive about departing from his usual standup routine to talk instead about the Los Angeles riots. Mr. Bush described the devastation he witnessed in his recent trip to the city.

"The scenes of wanton destruction just won't go away," he said.

He said he was particularly moved by one young Korean Amer-

ican, who told him, 'I'm staying. I want the American dream.'"

The riots, still fresh in everyone's mind, lent a somber undercurrent to the evening. And no media outlet scored the coup of a megastar guest to rival Norman Schwarzkopf's appearance last year or Marla Maples two years ago. Gennifer Flowers or Anita Hill would have lent spice to the occasion.

"Sum total: not a very lively evening," opined conservative humorist P.J. O'Rourke.

Not that there weren't some interesting sightings: filmmaker Oliver Stone (stalking around looking very intense), Heather Foley (sporting a new, short hairstyle), and Dr. Ruth Westheimer (standing on tiptoe on her chair, in stocking feet, straining to get a look at Mr. Bush).

Mr. O'Rourke wanted to clear up the wording of the L.A. riot joke attributed to him in The Washington Post, which he called "the original I-don't-get-it publication." His joke — which the paper messed up, he said — goes like this: "When Oliver North was convicted, I didn't go and loot Brooks Brothers."

Conservative radio host Rush Limbaugh also mined some humor — however subdued — from the L.A. situation. He noted that on Monday's show he had thanked the people of Los Angeles listening to him on "newly acquired radios" for expanding the size of his audience.

Mr. Limbaugh is still finding plenty to keep him busy in the House bank scandal. "The criminal phase of that is just beginning," he said. "The fun is just starting."

He said, tongue in cheek, that being asked to his first White House Correspondents' Association dinner is proof that he's finally arrived.

"They realized they can't throw this party without me anymore and still have credibility," joked Mr. Limbaugh.

D.C. Council President John Wilson, who owns five tuxedos (including a Kuppenheimer "for when it rains"), looked natty in an Armani model. He dominated the dinner conversation at his table with talk of the L.A. riots.

"The Great Society is the greatest thing that's happened to this society," he said, pounding the table for emphasis. "L.A. isn't going to be the only city that's going to have problems before the summer's over. Despair and hopelessness have never been at the magnitude that they are right now. It's going to be an absolutely terrible summer."

Dr. Ruth charmed everyone with her famous tee-hee giggle while relentlessly promoting herself all the way through dinner. She is the host of a new talk show for folks over 40 called "Never Too Late," debuting in September. Topics: step-parenting, divorce, boomerang kids — "not sen-

sationalist issues. I will always talk about sex, of course."

Former Redskin John Riggins spotted the diminutive sex therapist across a crowded reception and murmured "I have a question to ask her..."

Adm. John Poindexter pulled out his famous pipe after dinner (chilled avocado and cucumber soup, filet mignon). He has a computer software business now, which he says is "a lot more profitable than writing books."

First lady Barbara Bush, who got

a much louder round of applause when she was introduced than did her husband, was heard talking at a private reception after dinner about the house in Kennebunkport. After months of redecorating the portions destroyed in a storm, things are finally back to normal, she reported. But there are family pictures and other mementos swept out to sea that no decorator can replace.

"All the good stuff is gone," she said.

Other faces spotted: former U.N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick;

community development activist Robert Woodson; PR whiz Frank Mankiewicz and his wife, novelist and former reporter Patricia O'Brien; Alexander Haig; "Illiberal Education" author and newly engaged Dinesh D'Souza; Watergate relic and radio personality G. The Pall Over The Party

Riot Reminders at the Correspondents' Dinner

What a difference a year makes. At last year's White House Correspondents' Association dinner, George Bush was at the peak of his popularity. His triumph in the Persian Gulf was still warm. Flags waved. Military songs blared. Generals were worshiped like movie stars.

Reelection?

Not a problem at that juncture.

But at the 78th annual dinner Saturday night, there were no spotlights or applause when the military themes were played. When the head table was introduced, it was Barbara Bush who got the biggest ovation.

Perhaps outgoing association President Charles Bierbauer of CNN summed up the mood without even realizing it when he told Bush, "As you know, you are always welcome here. We don't get our invitations out until after November, but you can come back anytime, Mr. Bush."

There was an unsettling vibe in the immense ballroom at the Washington Hilton Saturday night. The kind of vibe you feel when someone at a party has a problem and everyone wants to act as though he doesn't.

George Bush was that someone. And he knew it.

"This is a strange and ugly year in

politics," Bush told the crowd of 2,500 journalists, politicians and power-staff. "A lot of name-calling out there. Candidates calling out terrible epithets like corrupt, liar, hypocrite, fascist, racist, incumbent."

Heh, heh, they laughed, uncomfortably, all-knowingly.

"I hope you'll excuse me if my normally hilarious one-liners are set aside for just a few minutes here, because I am just back in from L.A.," the usually jovial dinner guest added. "It was a very emotional and moving trip. The scenes of the wanton destruction just won't go away. Nor will the hurt of the people I met with. . . .

"I talked to a woman who used to go to our church in Houston. . . . Her son and her brother climbed on a motorcycle and set out to see a friend, a young

Afro-American living in a . . . riot zone. Their motorcycle was upended by a gang of these thugs. The woman's son was beaten, pistol held up to his head, and trigger pulled. It didn't go off. And her brother, a guy who had been deeply offended by the [Rodney] King verdict, and felt very close to the black community itself, was savagely beaten,

and then at close range, shot right through the head.

"Justice, you might say. What did any of this have to do with justice?"

At what is usually one of Washington's more lighthearted events, Bush wasn't the only one preoccupied with the Los Angeles riots.

"The president has the capacity to

lift the people's spirits," said Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-D.C.) at a pre-dinner reception. "Reagan and Bush have told us that the government is not here to take care of you. That is terribly demoralizing. Especially for someone living in the ghetto, out of work. Now, he's [Bush] out there picking up the ashes. The ashes he helped create."

"Race relations need priority attention," said Sen. John Danforth (R-Mo.), who sponsored Clarence Thomas in his tumultuous bid for a Supreme Court appointment last fall. "Finger-pointing doesn't do any good. It's not what the people want."

"Everyone is frustrated," said Secretary of Health and Human Services Louis Sullivan. "I was fortunate to break from [the world of poverty]," he said, "but the fact is there are a number of barriers. . . . We need to channel that anger into constructive situations."

"I understand [the anger]," the sec-

retary said. "It's not productive, but I understand it."

Even the evening's entertainer, comedian Paula Poundstone, jabbed at Bush's seeming disconnection from his own country these days.

"I saw the photo in the New York Times of the grocery store incident," she joked. "You know . . . the photo of him running the milk carton over the scanner thingy. They said that because he didn't know about the scanner thingy that meant he was out of touch."

And yes, she said, "it *did* look like an ape who had just discovered fire."

But, the comedian said, "the point at which I thought you were out of touch was when you said about the Thomas hearings that you were so sorry that the American people had to be exposed to that kind of language."

"Sir, I don't want to burn you out, but that's *why* the American people watched the Thomas hearings."

The dinner has become known for the competition among news organiza-

tions to land the flashiest newsmakers, who have included Fawn Hall, Donna Rice and Marla Maples. But this year the prize catch was a very different kind of celebrity.

Newsweek flew in actor Greg Williams, the country's most recent hero. During the riots in Los Angeles, Williams first chased away five angry youths who were stalking a light-skinned black man, then pulled a Japanese American out of his car as he was being brutally beaten. The large-set black ex-Marine carried the bleeding man away from the intersection, and eventually got him to a hospital.

"I'm still embarrassed by the term 'hero,'" Williams said. "I prefer to think of myself as a recipient of a gift, a gift to serve another human being. I'm so touched by that, and think it is a gift few people receive in a lifetime."

And does this great American have any words of advice for his president?

"I'd just tell him to hang in there," said Williams. "You have to stand up for something or you will fall for anything."

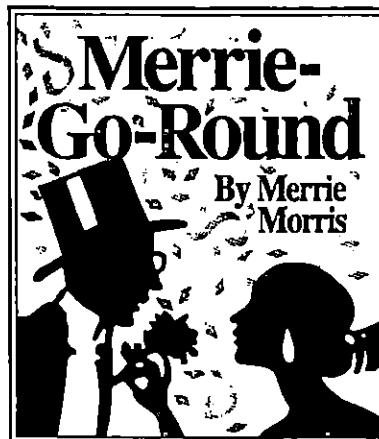

Elusive Donor's Big Gift Placed in Escrow by GOP

The Republican Party, confronted with reports that a major contributor apparently owes more than \$1 million in child support and business debts, has placed his \$400,000 donation in escrow until someone can figure out what to do with it, party officials said.

The contribution was removed from party coffers in response to news reports that contributor Michael Kojima, a Japanese-born American businessman who dined with President and Barbara Bush at the biggest political fund-raiser in American history April 28, was being sought by numerous creditors.

"The [fund-raisers] have referred the issue to legal counsel, and will be getting legal advice about what to do," said Jan Baran, a lawyer handling the case for the GOP. "It all has to be sorted out."

Kojima is an elusive Los Angeles-based entrepreneur with a history of broken marriages and failed businesses. His creditors, including his ex-wife, Soon Kojima, and her two sons, said they had given up searching for the purportedly poverty-stricken Kojima—until he showed up with the president.

Another of Kojima's ex-wives, Chong Kojima, said Friday that the last time she saw her ex-husband was five years ago, when he wrote her a single \$350 child support check, which she said bounced.

in Little Rock greeting party people, Republican Party, that is.

At a reception and dinner at the Excelsior Hotel, Mrs. Bush, dressed in flag-red and her traditional triple strand of pearls, posed for souvenir photographs with each of the guests who had contributed \$500 to the re-election campaign.

Tables in a smaller hotel ballroom for the 240 guests were decorated with casablanca lilies, pink tulips and asparagus fern in tall crystal cylinders, lighted by votives on mirrored circles.

A spray of lilies and tulips also decorated the roped-off, elevated and spotlighted head table, with the U.S. and Arkansas flags at either end. 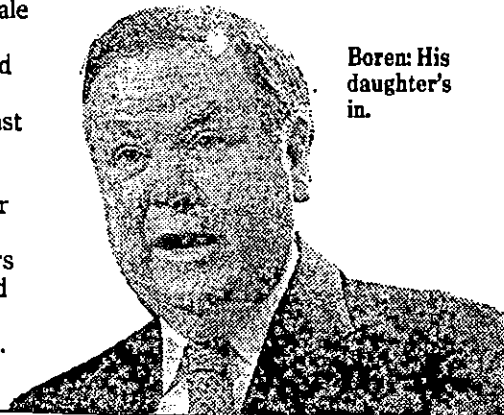
■ Don't tell a soul but secret sources say that Yale's very secret society Skull and Bones, whose alumni

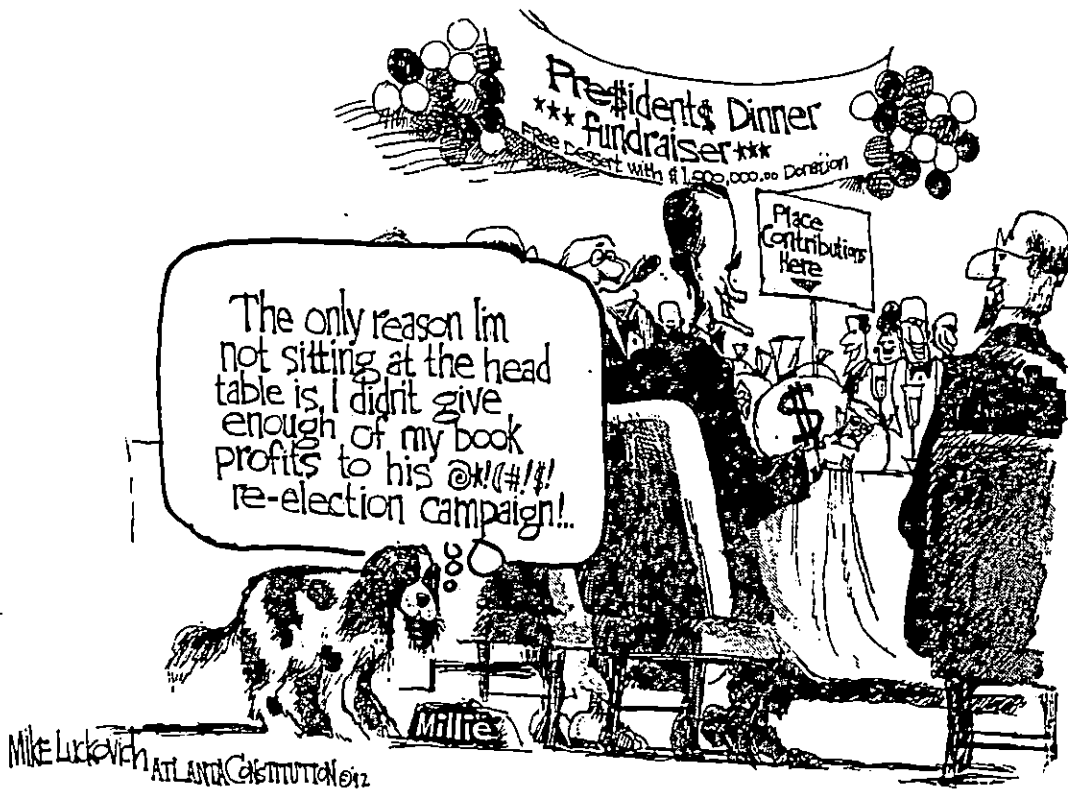

Response to Crisis

President Criticized for Failing to Boldly Employ Leadership Resources of His Office

Historians and presidential scholars, observing George Bush's reaction to the Rodney G. King verdict and the Los Angeles violence, were caustically critical of the president in interviews last week. Across the political spectrum, they faulted Bush for what they described as his failure to marshal the leadership resources of his office to meet the most dramatic domestic crisis of his White House tenure.

"The Bush of the gulf war and Kuwait and the Bush we've seen the last 10 days are so different it's hard to understand," said Harvard's Richard E. Neustadt, author of "Presidential Power," the 30-year-old classic on White House leadership.

Like most of the dozen other presidential biographers, political scientists and historians interviewed in the last two days, Neustadt found fault with Bush's words and actions—and the political calculus and staff work behind them.

Several of the scholars also were critical of Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton (D), Bush's likely opponent in November, for being "rather low-profile and cautious," as Robert J. Donovan, biographer of President Harry S. Truman and author of books on John F. Kennedy and Dwight D. Eisenhower, put it. "But he [Clinton] doesn't have the burden [of leadership]," Donovan said. "It would be natural for him to wait and see how the president reacted."

The president, who had expressed his dismay at the Rodney King incident when the amateur videotape was first televised last year, focused his condemnation last week on the rioting that followed the Simi Valley, Calif., jury's acquittal of police officers involved in the beating. He directed the Justice Department to step up an investigation that could lead to the officers' prosecution for violating King's civil rights, sent federal troops and law enforcement officials to assist in restoring order in Los Angeles and held a series of Cabinet meetings to frame a response to the underlying problems in center cities.

In a series of speeches from May 1 to yesterday, and on a two-day visit to Los Angeles, Bush continued to emphasize his condemnation of mob and gang violence while making it clear that he would put more effort into passing legislation to give tax breaks for center-city businesses and allow public housing tenants to purchase their residences, rather than seek ambitious and expensive new federal programs. He and his spokesmen insisted that past welfare programs had exacerbated, not solved, urban problems and denied Democratic charges that Los Angeles was the product of "neglect" of urban needs by Bush and his predecessor, Ronald Reagan.

But scholars from every corner found Bush's performance wanting. While Neustadt is a Kennedy Democrat, Stephen E. Ambrose, author of sympathetic biographies of Eisenhower and

Richard M. Nixon, said Bush's response was "wishy-washy" compared to the actions of those earlier Republican presidents. "He really does seem to have awful trouble charting a course," Ambrose said.

Princeton's Fred I. Greenstein, whose writings have done a great deal to rehabilitate Eisenhower's originally weak reputation among presidential scholars, said: "What struck me was the continuing inability of George Bush to be a commanding presence in the White House. When the nation is wounded, he is the antithesis of the 'bully pulpit' president."

Further to the right, Terry Eastland, former Reagan administration Justice Department official and now a fellow at the Ethics and Public Policy Center, commended Bush for "not overpromising," but then added his voice to the chorus of criticism.

Eastland, author of a forthcoming study of the Reagan presidency, said Bush's performance has

pointed up a "general deficit" in his presidency: "the inability or unwillingness to make the public argument for what he believes should be done."

"It may be enough to say, 'Saddam, leave Kuwait,'" Eastland said. "But it is not enough to say, 'Congress, pass my bill.' That demeans a collateral branch of government and deprives the public debate of the benefits of a president relentlessly arguing his case."

Jeffrey K. Tulis of the University of Texas, author of "The Rhetorical Presidency," offered a mixed verdict that on balance was more critical than flattering. He praised Bush's May 1 televised address to the nation, saying, "It provided symbolic reassurance to the public . . . by doing what [presidential speechwriter] Peggy Noonan is very good at doing—reading back to Americans their own ambivalence and making them feel good about it. The speech said it was okay to be upset both by the verdict and the violence."

By contrast, Tulis said, Bush's visit to Los Angeles "was not very good. It was not policy- or direction-setting. It did not offer a diagnosis of the problem or an interpretation of the meaning of the events. It failed to communicate specific policies or principles for action."

In a similar vein, historian Michael R. Beschloss, whose most recent book is "Crisis Years: Kennedy and Khrushchev, 1960-1963," remarked that "if you had to design the sort of event that shows George Bush at his worst in presidential leadership, it would be the Los Angeles riots. It hits him in an area that he has not shown much interest in—domestic affairs, urban issues, race relations."

But Beschloss said that is no excuse. "In 1938, Franklin D. Roosevelt had spent very little time or thought and no political capital on foreign policy. But when he saw the rise of Hitler, he figured out how to mobilize the country in response to that threat. That is what a leader does."

Some scholars cited mitigating circumstances. Joseph M. Bessette of California's Claremont McKenna College, another of the Reagan administration academic alumni, said: "The demands for Bush or Clinton to speak out overestimate what can be accomplished by rhetoric. This situation was not caused by rhetoric and it won't be cured by rhetoric."

Colorado College's Thomas E. Cronin, author of "The State of the Presidency," said: "I don't think Bush has given his own party or the country much moral leadership or boldness, but he may be a victim of circumstances. Any party in office for 12 years may run out of steam. Talented people have come and gone. The budget has been depleted and so have the policy ideas."

In assessing both Clinton's and Bush's reactions, many of the scholars pointed to the political dilemmas they face six months before Election Day.

"Clinton has made such an effort in the '80s to moderate himself and not be a polarizing politician that, when a situation arises that seems to pit law and order against the claims of racial and economic injustice, it really tests him," Beschloss said.

But Princeton's Greenstein said he thinks Bush faces a deeper and more crippling dilemma—"a conflict between his basic values and his political support system."

"For most of his life, he was the son of Prescott Bush, a decent, Eastern establishment, public-interest patrician, from whom he inherited a commitment to causes like black colleges and Planned Parenthood. But in 1964, when he ran for the Senate, and again from the time he joined Reagan on the 1980 ticket, he got himself immersed in the kind of conservative coalitions that impose very different demands—and the result is an impossible chemistry," Greenstein said.

"It's not just a lack of vision. He lacks any conceptualization on domestic affairs. He has no abstract ways of linking his values to specific policies, of linking means and ends. So he always seems to be going in varied directions."

TO THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES:

I am returning herewith without my approval S. 3, the "Congressional Campaign Spending Limit and Election Reform Act of 1992." The current campaign finance system is seriously flawed. For 3 years I have called on the Congress to overhaul our campaign finance system in order to reduce the influence of special interests, to restore the influence of individuals and political parties, and to reduce the unfair advantages of incumbency. S. 3 would not accomplish any of these objectives. In addition to perpetuating the corrupting influence of special interests and the imbalance between challengers and incumbents, S. 3 would limit political speech protected by the First Amendment and inevitably lead to a raid on the Treasury to pay for the Act's elaborate scheme of public subsidies.

In 1989, I proposed comprehensive campaign finance reform legislation to reduce the influence of special interests and the powers of incumbency. My proposal would abolish political action committees (PACs) subsidized by corporations, unions, and trade associations. It would protect statutorily the political rights of American workers, implementing the Supreme Court's decision in Communications Workers v. Beck. It would curtail leadership PACs. It would virtually prohibit the practice of bundling. It would require the full disclosure of all soft money expenditures by political parties and by corporations and unions. It would restrict the taxpayer-financed franking privileges enjoyed by incumbents. It would prevent incumbents from amassing campaign war chests from excess campaign funds from previous elections.

These are all significant reforms, and I am encouraged that S. 3 includes a few of them, albeit with some differences. If the Congress is serious about enacting campaign finance reform, it should pass legislation along the lines I proposed in 1989, and I will sign it immediately. However, I cannot accept legislation, like S. 3, that contains spending limits or public subsidies, or fails to eliminate special interest PACs.

Further, as I have previously stated, I am opposed to different rules for the House and Senate on matters of ethics and election reform. In several key respects, S. 3 contains separate rules for House and Senate candidates, with no apparent justification other than political expediency.

S. 3 no longer contains the provision that the Senate passed last year abolishing all PACs. Although that provision was overbroad in banning issue-oriented PACs unconnected to special interests, S. 3 would not eliminate any PACs. Instead, the Act provides only a reduced limit on individual PAC contributions to Senate candidates and no change in the status quo in the House. Moreover, the limit on aggregate

PAC contributions to House candidates to one-third of the spending limit, \$200,000, is not likely to diminish the heavy reliance of Members on PAC contributions. The average amount a Member of Congress raised from PACs in the last election cycle was \$209,000.

The spending limits for both House and Senate candidates will most likely hurt challengers more than incumbents, especially because S. 3 does little to reduce the advantages of incumbency. Inexplicably, there is no parallel House provision to the sensible Senate provision restricting the use of the frank in an election year. In the last election cycle, the amount incumbent House Members spent on franked mail was three times the total amount spent by all House challengers. The system of public benefits, designed to induce candidates to agree to abide by the spending limits, is unlikely in many cases to overcome the inherent favors of incumbency.

S. 3 contains several unconstitutional provisions, although none more serious than the aggregate spending limits. In Buckley v. Valeo, the Supreme Court ruled that to be constitutional, spending limits must be voluntary. There is nothing "voluntary" about the spending limits in this Act. The penalties in S. 3 for candidates who choose not to abide by the spending limits or to accept Treasury funds are punitive -- unlike the Presidential campaign system -- as well as costly to the taxpayer. For example, if a nonparticipating House candidate spends just one dollar over 80 percent of the spending limit, the participating candidate may spend without limit and receive unlimited Federal matching funds. The subsidies provided for in S. 3 could amount to well over 100 million dollars every election cycle, yet the Act is silent on how these generous Government subsidies would be financed. It seems inevitable that they would be paid for by the American taxpayer. I understand why Members of Congress would be reluctant to ask taxpayers directly to subsidize their reelection campaigns, but given the significant costs of S. 3, its failure to address the funding question is irresponsible.

Our Nation needs campaign finance laws that place the interests of individual citizens and political parties above special interests, and that provide a level playing field between challengers and incumbents. What we do not need is a taxpayer-financed incumbent protection plan. For these reasons, I am vetoing S. 3.

THE PRESIDENT: Less than 24 hours ago, I returned from Los Angeles. And today I'd like to use this opportunity to report in on what I saw and what I heard.

By now, each one of us has seen images of hate and horror we won't soon forget. But what I saw during my time in Los Angeles -- even in the hardest-hit parts of South Central L.A. -- should give us all cause for hope.

Everywhere, the people I talked with told me about the acts of individual heroism, about the extraordinary courage of ordinary people. Some braved the gangs of looters to form "bucket brigades" to put out fires when the fire trucks couldn't get through. Some stood against the angry mobs, reached across the barrier of color, to save lives. Many of these aren't the stories you'll see on the first two minutes of the nightly news, but they are the stories that tell us the power of simple human decency.

I went to L.A. to meet with community leaders, to get firsthand information as to how best the federal government could speed the recovery. Part of it is to provide, as we're doing now, federal funds to help shop owners get their businesses open again, funds to help the people who lost jobs when the places they worked were burned out. But beyond this immediate emergency assistance, I set out a broader agenda, a means of bringing hope and opportunity to our inner cities.

First, we've got to preserve order, keep the peace -- because families can't thrive, children can't learn, jobs can't flourish in a climate of fear.

Second, we must spark an economic revival in urban America. And that means establishing enterprise zones in our cities and reform of our welfare system to help people with individual initiative work and save.

And third, we've got to revolutionize American education. That's why we've built our America 2000 strategy around innovations like choice, competition and community action. Children in our inner cities deserve the same opportunities that kids in our suburbs have.

And four, we must promote new hope through home ownership. And that's the aim behind my HOPE initiative -- to give the least-advantaged among us a stake in their neighborhood by turning public housing tenants into homeowners.

At every turn during my time in Los Angeles, I heard people talking about principles that guide these initiatives:

MORE

personal responsibility, opportunity, ownership, independence, dignity.

I can already hear some of the critics out there. And they'll say, well, you've proposed all this before. That's true. They're right. But now it's time to act on these proposals, time to try something new. My first order of business now that I am back in Washington is to build a bipartisan effort in support of immediate action on this agenda.

So far I have spoken about what government can do. Now let me talk about what society must do -- because government alone cannot create the scale and energy needed to transform the lives of people in need. And all over America, people have already found the answers for themselves. And they're taking action to make things better.

You can find them everywhere -- even in South Central L.A. I met a man there named Lou Dantzler, a bear of a man who runs the Challengers Boys and Girls Club. He started it out in the back of an old pickup truck with a group of kids who wanted to get off the streets. And today, across from a burned-out block in South Central L.A., the Boys and Girls Club stands unscarred. No, it wasn't a miracle that the building was left standing. The real miracle is what goes on inside. It's a place kids can go to get the concern and the love they need -- a place where people care.

That's why guaranteeing a hopeful future for the children of our cities is about a lot more than rebuilding burned-out buildings. It's about building a new American community.

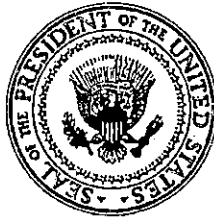
This I know: We have the strength and spirit in our government, in our communities, and in ourselves to transform America into the nation we have dreamed of for generations.

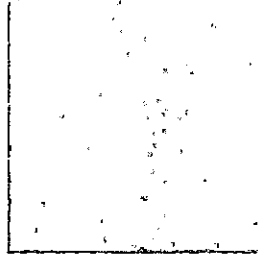

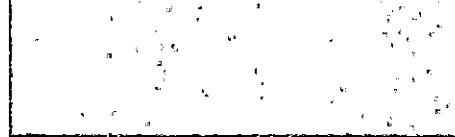

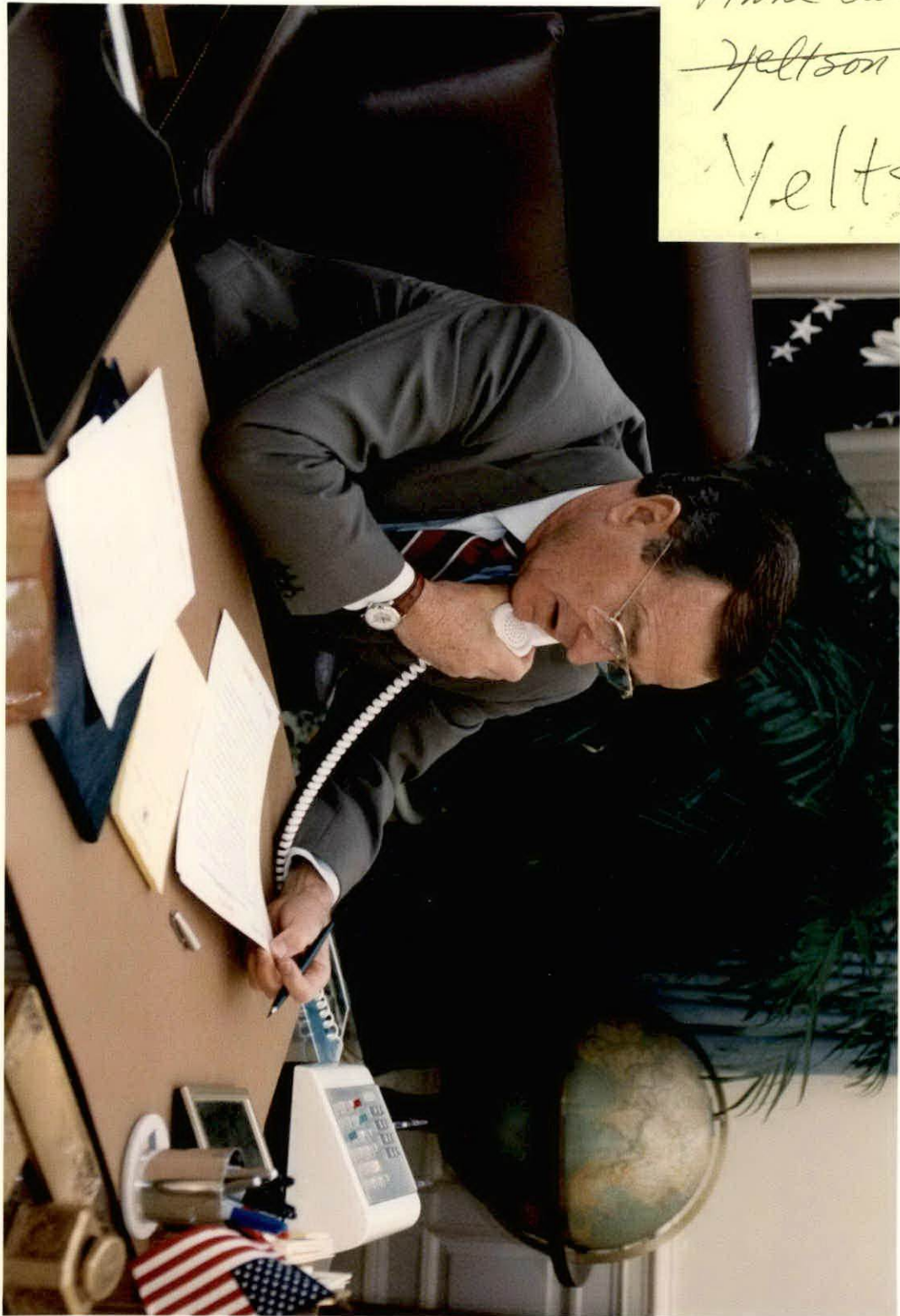
