BUSH PROMISES TO PUSH IDEAS TO REVITALIZE INNER CITIES BUT STILL FACES OBSTACLES

President Bush, seeming haunted by the devastation and anger he saw in Los Angeles last week, promised to take the initiative in supporting ideas that his Administration has floated in the past to revitalize the inner cities. But he still has to decide how to pay for the programs and needs to win over a Congress where there is little bipartisan good will....

Some senior aides to Bush have suggested he will attach spending for small-business loans and immediate disaster relief to an emergency supplemental spending bill, but will require that spending for his housing programs be paid for out of existing budgets. But that approach could revive arguments that Bush isn't as serious about tackling the problems of low-income housing residents.

BUSH TAKES URBAN PUSH ON ROAD

President Bush Monday takes his newly displayed passion for curing urban woes to Philadelphia, the next test of the depth of a commitment some suspect is transitory and political....

Monday's trip, originally for a campaign fund-raising speech, was rearranged so Bush could tour a federal project designed to keep out drug dealers. Los Angeles' new police chief, outgoing Philadelphia police commissioner Willie Williams, will be at his side....

Some who met with Bush in Los Angeles last week doubt his interest will endure: "If the past is any indication, I don't expect to see the vigor sustained," said Clyde Oden, president of the Watts Health Foundation, who's waiting for Bush to prove commitment by decrying the urban decay that exacerbated the riots.

QUAYLE PUTS POLICING 1ST FOR CITIES

Law and order remains the linchpin of the Bush Administration's urban agenda, Vice President Quayle said Sunday.

Condemning the "violence," "murder" and "mayhem" of the Los Angeles riots, Quayle praised the "overstressed" city police and rejected calls for a federal investigation of the violence.

"If there's something that could be done in the future and lessons learned, fine, but right now, I'm going to give credit and praise to the law enforcement officials in this country," Quayle said on "Face the Nation." "Let's recognize that crime hurts the poor the most, and minorities," he said....

Secretary Kemp said on "This Week with David Brinkley": "I believe next week the President is going to ask the leadership of the Congress on a bipartisan basis to move in an emergency way in several areas: educational reform; the Weed-and-Seed Program; enterprise zones that would eliminate the capital gains tax on any man or woman that works, saves, and invests in the inner city."...

LOS ANGELES RIOTS ARE A WARNING, AMERICANS FEAR

Most Americans view the riots in Los Angeles as a "warning" about the state of race relations, and say it is time for a new emphasis on the problems of minorities and the cities, according to the latest New York Times-CBS News poll....

A strong majority of the respondents, 61 percent, said the nation was spending "too little" on improving the conditions of black Americans, up from 35 percent who expressed that view in 1988. And 63 percent said the federal government was not paying enough attention to the needs and problems of minorities, a striking increase from the 34 percent who felt that way four years ago.

President Bush was given poor marks by both blacks and whites for his response to the riots. Moreover, 53 percent of all whites and 76 percent of all blacks said they disapproved of the way Bush was handling race relations in general....

Forty-three percent of the whites and 66 percent of the blacks said they were dissatisfied with Bush's response to the rioting in Los Angeles, compared to 41 percent of all whites and 26 percent of all blacks who said they were satisfied with it.

POLLS UNCOVER MUCH COMMON GROUND ON L.A. VERDICT

Smoke from fires continued to smudge the sun-washed Los Angeles sky, and looters carried off the last of their plunder as the first opinion polls reported initial public reactions to the verdict in the Rodney King beating case and to the violence that followed....

Eighty-six percent of the whites and 100 percent of the blacks interviewed by USA Today said the verdict was "wrong;" 64 percent of all whites and 92 percent of all blacks questioned told Washington Post-ABC News interviewers that the officers in the King case "should have been found guilty of a crime."...

All the surveys showed Americans overwhelmingly wanted federal action taken against the police officers charged in the King case.... Pundits and politicians also predicted that the riots had torn open old wounds and pushed whites and blacks farther apart.

**NEW STRATEGIC ERA SEES TRANSFORMATION
OF U.S. NUCLEAR ARMS ESTABLISHMENT**

After a year of breathtaking developments that completely altered the nation's strategic situation, the unthinkable has become commonplace.

The U.S. is not producing nuclear weapons or manufacturing plutonium or weapons-grade uranium. Information that would have been treasonous to divulge for more than 40 years is routinely made public. And money is being taken out of the bomb-building budget to retrain laid-off workers.

In extensive testimony by Secretary Watkins and Assistant Secretary Richard Claytor, and in a written report delivered to Congress last week, the Energy Department piled up details of the astonishing transformation of the nation's nuclear weapons factories brought about by the end of the Cold War and the breakup of the Soviet Union. BLACKS JOIN FORCES WITH GOP ON REMAP

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida state Rep. Darryl Reaves, a young black politician from the mean streets of Miami's Overtown neighborhood, thinks it's time for a payback from the Democratic Party.

"For 40 years blacks have been the party backbone," Reaves said. "Now we've come to collect, but all we get is 'thanks but no thanks.' It's time to cut the umbilical cord and learn to feed ourselves."

Suiting actions to words, Reaves, like several other black Florida legislators and interest groups, has joined forces with the Republican Party in the battle over congressional redistricting in the nation's fourth largest state. By Thursday, senior U.S. District Judge C. Clyde Atkins's appointed expert is expected to unveil a court-approved plan here....

"We have won the redistricting war," RNC Chairman Rich Bond said in an interview. "It is our assertion that we have made 80 (previously Democratic) seats competitive for the '90s... (and) minority representation is going to be dramatically increased because of the Republican Party."

BENEFITS ARE REFUSED MORE OFTEN TO DISABLED BLACKS

For 30 years, blacks with serious ailments have been much more likely than whites to be rejected for benefits under Social Security disability programs, a congressional investigative agency has found.

From the initial claim through the appeals process, blacks have had a more difficult time obtaining benefits from the two largest federal programs for people with severe disabilities, which together now provide \$43.2 billion in disability checks annually to millions of workers and their families, the study by the GAO concludes. STATES ARE MOVING TO RE-REGULATION ON HEALTH COSTS

After a decade in which health costs rose rapidly and many people lost access to care, state and local health officials around the country are returning to the kind of planning denounced by the Reagan Administration as a tool of heavy-handed government regulation.

State officials are adopting new laws and regulations to slow the construction of hospitals and nursing homes and the purchase of costly medical equipment. At the same time they are convening groups of doctors, consumers, hospital executives, insurers and employers to negotiate the distribution of health-care resources....

The White House plans several events this week to underline President Bush's concern about the nation's health-care problems, including infant mortality and the failure of many youngsters to get fully immunized against childhood diseases. Administration officials say the events are part of Bush's election-year effort to show that he is taking a more active interest in domestic issues, largely left to his subordinates over the last three years.

THE FALL OVER THE PARTY

What a difference a year makes. At last year's White House Correspondents' Association dinner, President Bush was at the peak of his popularity. His triumph in the Persian Gulf was still warm. Flags waved. Military songs blared. Generals were worshiped like movie stars.

Reelection? Not a problem at that juncture.

But at the 78th annual dinner Saturday night, there were no spotlights or applause when the military themes were played. When the head table was introduced, it was Mrs. Bush who got the biggest ovation.

Perhaps outgoing association President Charles Bierbauer of CNN summed up the mood without even realizing it when he told Bush, "As you know, you are always welcome here. We don't get our invitations out after November, but you can come back anytime, Mr. Bush."...

"The President has the capacity to lift the people's spirits," said Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton at a pre-dinner reception. "Reagan and Bush have told us that the government is not here to take care of you. That's terribly demoralizing. Especially for someone living in the ghetto, out of work. Now, he's (Bush) out there picking up the ashes. The ashes he helped create."

PLO URGES U.S. AND RUSSIA TO PRESS ISRAEL

TUNIS, Tunisia -- The PLO, giving its backing to this week's multilateral Middle East peace talks, has urged the U.S. and Russia to break Israel's intransigence.... "Time is passing and the Israeli enemy is proceeding with its settlements, occupation, crimes, and challenges," the PLO council said in a statement after a four-day conference in Tunis. U.S. ACTIONS UPSET INDIA

NEW DELHI, India -- U.S. attempts to halt a rocket deal between India and Russia are hampering New Delhi's move for better relations with the sole remaining superpower after the collapse of its Soviet ally.

"Some countries are arm-twisted," Prime Minister Rao told a parliamentary committee last week, referring to the rocket dispute.

Rao insisted that "India cannot afford to be arm-twisted" but said there was no cause for alarm, describing the incident as part of the give and take of diplomacy after the Cold War.

CIA PURSUES HUMAN TOUCH OVER HARDWARE

After years of building up technical systems, the CIA is beefing up its emphasis on human agents to find out the secret intentions of foreign powers.

Air Force Lt. Gen. Norman Wood, director of the Intelligence Community Staff, said spy satellites and other electronic snoopers are good at knowing foreign capabilities, like numbers of tanks and missiles. But policy-makers now want to know more about the secret plans and motives of foreign governments, terrorists, drug dealers or weapons proliferators. (Bill Gertz, Washington Times, A3)

FILIPINOS VOTE IN CRUCIAL ELECTIONS

MANILA -- Filipinos went to the polls Sunday to choose a new president and thousands of other officials in elections that are seen as a crucial turning point for the future of Philippine democracy.

The turnout in the most widely contested elections in Philippine history and the first free presidential race in 23 years appeared to be heavy, despite an upsurge of violence at the weekend after a campaign period that -- by Philippine standards -- was relatively peaceful. SPACE SHUTTLE

CBS's Connie Chung: An astonishing development is going on right now in outer space. The space shuttle Endeavor has ended a three-day chase to rescue a stranded satellite to repair it and send it back on its way.

CBS's Doug Tunnell reports astronaut Pierre Thewitt [phonetic] is trying to do something no one has ever tried to do before: He is trying to reach out and capture the satellite in space, using his hands. Thewitt has one objective: to attach a special bar to the satellite's face and slowly stop it from spinning. The Endeavor's crew will then maneuver both the astronaut and satellite into the shuttle's cargo bay where it will be repaired and relaunched into the correct orbit. With a new shuttle and a new NASA administrator, the space program hopes to rise above the criticism about spending so much money to go into space when America has so many troubles back here on earth.

(NASA Administrator Goldin: "I think we have to do a better job at expressing to the American people where we believe we ought to go and get the American people to understand and buy in.")

L.A./POLITICS

ABC's Forest Sawyer: While L.A. is still struggling to recover from the disaster of the riots that shook the city, politicians have been quick to jump on a new campaign issue -- Democrats and Republicans squaring off over what really caused the violence.

ABC's Kathleen DeLaski: After criticisms from victims of the slowness of federal help, the government began accepting applications for grants and disaster loans today. While in Washington, politicians continued blaming each other for the riots.

(Mayor Flynn of Boston; This Week With David Brinkley: "It wasn't the decision of 12 jurors. It was 12 years of urban neglect on the part of the national government.")

(Secretary Kemp, This Week With David Brinkley: "That's a little bit harsh and is far from the fact when we're spending \$800 billion this year on social -- welfare, helping people, direct aid to the people.")

Kemp engineered much of the President's so-called emergency agenda announced Friday, including tax breaks for inner-city businesses and financial incentives so that public housing tenants might buy their homes. Interviewed this morning, the Vice President called on Congress to pass the President's plan by Memorial Day.

(Vice President Quayle, Face The Nation: "Put politics aside for a moment, please.")

But he did not put politics aside. Minutes later he strongly implied there would be room for compromise on this conservative agenda.

(Vice President Quayle, outside CBS: "I would hope that the Congress learned with the rest of America that the current structure, the current policy, the current philosophy did not work.")

The President said this is not the time to play the blame game, but it seems politicians, even those who work for him, just can't help themselves. (ABC-3)

L.A./POLL

Chung reports the L.A. riots have dramatically changed the attitudes of white Americans regarding what the government should be doing for black Americans.

CBS's Eric Engberg says for a majority of Americans, the tragedy of L.A. has served as a wake-up call on the dangers of a divided society. The first CBS News/New York Times poll since the riot found that 63% of the public feels government is not paying enough attention to the problems of blacks and other minorities.

(Kathleen Frankovic, Director of Surveys, CBS: "Among white Americans there has been an enormous shift. We've seen a doubling in the number of white Americans that think the government isn't paying enough attention to the needs of blacks.")

The concern goes well beyond what government is doing. Two-thirds of those polled believed race relations in the country are generally bad. But if race is an issue in the fall, the President has problems. Nearly half [46%] of those we polled were dissatisfied with his reaction to the L.A. crisis. And more than half [56%] were dissatisfied by his overall handling of race relations. On the question of who to vote for if the election were held today, both Bill Clinton and Ross Perot continue to peck at the President's lead: President Bush -- 36%, Bill Clinton -- 30%, H. Ross Perot -- 25%. Politics aside, there's wide agreement between blacks and whites that government should focus on jobs, training, and better police training to help minorities. For now, the nations' attention has been captured by the issues of race and poverty. Nearly three-fourths of those we polled think Los Angeles was a clear warning to the country, not just an isolated case. But there is a feeling that the problems are both deep rooted and intractable. A majority of people said the potential for urban riots will be there 25 years from now just as it was 25 years ago.

Chung: President Bush had criticized the 1960 social programs, and then he rescinded blaming them for the riots. How did the people polled feel about that.

Engberg: It almost looks like the White House when it backed off its idea of blaming the Great Society programs had some hint that that idea was playing very well in the polls. Because our polls showed, for example, that 60% of the people said that either none or not much of the problems we saw in L.A. were due to the Great Society programs, whereas 40% said that a lot of the blame should be placed on the Reagan and Bush Administrations for inattention to the problems of the city. L.A./CENSUS

Chung reports the Census Bureau released figures tonight that shed some light on life in riot-torn south-central L.A. They show that the poverty rate was 32.9% -- almost three times the national average. (CBS-5)

URBAN PROBLEMS

NBC's Garrick Utley reports on the big debate over what government can or should do to help alleviate those problems [urban problems]. President Bush has criticized the Great Society program of the 1960s. With us now is Joseph Califano, who was a key adviser on that Great Society program to President Johnson.

Califano: ...Aid for Dependent Children was a New Deal program. President Johnson repeatedly said get rid of the rule that says a husband has to leave his wife and kids in order for them to get any help when he's out of work. He was unsuccessful in doing that. I don't know why President Bush would criticize that because he takes the same position....

Utley: ...Given the economic conditions today compared to the 1960s, even if government wanted to do more, could it do more?

Califano: What government can do is have a public works program which can put people to work right away.... Two, get drug programs into the ghetto. You are never going to clean the inner city up unless you deal with the drug problem. Three, get rid of the guns. (NBC-4)

MILITARY/ASPIN

Chung reports Rep. Aspin is calling for a bigger Army-National Guard force than the Pentagon wants. Aspin said today the total troop strength should be between 375,000 and 380,000 by the end of 1997. That's about 40,000 more than the Pentagon's target. (CBS-8)

DRUGS

Sawyer says new Justice Department figures show police agencies are giving high priority to the war on drugs. In 1990 nearly 19,000 officers were assigned full-time to special drug units. Many of those officers paid a price, not only putting themselves in the line of fire but facing the danger of becoming addicts themselves. (ABC-7)

ABC -- THIS WEEK WITH DAVID BRINKLEY

Moderator: Sam Donaldson. **Panel:** George Will, Cokie Roberts.

Guests: Mayor Emmanuel Cleaver, II, Kansas City, MO; Mayor Flynn, Boston, MA; Secretary Kemp.

Guest: Mayor Emmanuel Cleaver

Donaldson: ...Are we dealing with a racial problem or are we dealing with some other sort of problem when we talk about the plight of the cities?... Is it a money problem?

Cleaver: We certainly need to put more money in than we put in. In the 1970's the poverty level was 11 percent, the poverty rate was 11 percent. Today it's 15 percent. So we are going backwards. We need more money....

Donaldson: How are you going to get the white suburbs to vote more taxes, to pay for money for the inner cities?

Cleaver: First of all, we need a President and Washington leadership who is willing to go to the laboratory to come up with an anecdote for the compassion fatigue that, in part, they created....

Will: Let's continue on the subject of the compassion fatigue, as you call it, in the underclass. What a lot of Americans of goodwill say is it is a fact...that the expansion of domestic spending targeted toward the inner cities...coincided with the expansion of the intractable underclass to which you refer. These people of goodwill say it isn't working, whatever it was. Now, tell me why they're wrong.

Cleaver: They're wrong.... There are minorities all over this country who are now in the middle class because of the federal spending.... I think that the problem is that the black middle class was created during the days of the federal programs, and the reason that the middle class is no longer growing is because the federal funds are not coming in, to bring more people up into the growing middle class.

Roberts: ...Isn't there a growing attitude that [self help] is where the problem really needs to be solved?

Cleaver: There is a need for self-help, and I think minorities need to understand...that we need to deal with some problems internally, but I also believe that self-help is not the cure-all. We need help from Washington....

Donaldson: ...Can you have racial harmony with separate but equal divisions in society and blocks where people live and where people go to school and where people work?

Cleaver: We cannot, and that's where I think the leadership comes in, whether it's the mayor and certainly the President and the members of the Cabinet. I mean, race-baiting is the meanest species of politics, and I think we've had that. We've got to make race an issue today in order that it will not be an issue tomorrow. The leadership on the race question must come from the highest levels of government, and I think that right now there is no emphasis on integration. The racial isolation exists because we have not made it a significant piece of the discussion.

Guest: Mayor Flynn

Flynn: ...The riot started a long time ago. It wasn't the decision of 12 jurors. It was 12 years of urban neglect on the part of the national government. They have allowed poverty, injustice, to go on and on and on. Everybody has sat on the sidelines, allowed it to take place. Nobody has said anything. Nobody has done anything: Democrats, Republicans, the White House, the Congress....

Will: You locate the start of this riot with some precision. It was 12 years ago when the Republicans came to power in Washington. Democrats have been ruling in most cities, however. Can you tell us how things were really good in the late 1970's and precisely why they got really bad when the Republicans got the White House?

Flynn: ...There are a number of positive things that are happening in our cities that unfortunately get ignored.... Unfortunately, it requires a partnership.... One of those partners is no longer there, and that is the federal government. They have walked away from the issue of jobs, the economy, affordable housing, dealing with families in our communities. They are the ones that, in large respect, are responsible for what is happening in cities, not only in Los Angeles....

Guest: Jack Kemp

Donaldson: ...Do you agree that it was the Great Society programs of the '60s that caused the riots?

Kemp: The Great Society did not cause the riots. It was solely predicated on building a net under which people should not be allowed to fall. It didn't spend any time trying to build a ladder upon which people can climb out of poverty, and that's what the President wants to do -- build a ladder of opportunity.

Will: ...Are there any of the great welfare programs, principally Great Society programs, that you think ought to be repealed -- Medicare, Medicaid, Head Start, Job Corps, the '68 Housing Act?

Kemp: No, those are good programs by and large. Everything can be reformed and made better.

Will: What we're trying to put our finger is the moral as well as the material causes of what's gone wrong in our cities. What is your belief? Is there a moral dimension to this, and how did it get there?

Kemp: Certainly, values are at the heart of all solutions to problems. The family is the best teacher of values. The government doesn't create wealth. People who work and save and invest create wealth.... Our welfare system needs to be converted from simply encouraging people towards consumption, towards savings, towards accumulation of property, towards entrepreneurship and ownership of a home, a job, a good education, and educational choice. That is the predicate around which the President announced some rather radical and progressive ideas of reform in the inner-city education, inner-city job climate, inner-city housing conditions.

Roberts: ...You have been beating at the door of the White House with those ideas for three years, and you have gotten back memoranda that we have read, saying, "These are not our issues. This is not where the Republican party should be going," talking about urban issues. First of all, is it a Republican issue, and is it changed?

Kemp: ...This is America's problem. There is a moral obligation....

Roberts: ...The Congress passed enterprise zones in the tax bill that the President just vetoed. He just vetoed enterprise zones, and when he did that he did not call it separately.... Why don't you pass it separately?"

Kemp: He has said. He has asked. With all due respect, it's fair to have this debate, but the President of the United States has been asking for enterprise zones in every state of the union for three years....

Roberts: ...Does the Republican party now think this is their issue, these are their voters, or does the Republican party think that the way to go from here is to emphasize the lawlessness in the riots and law and order as an issue?

Kemp: The one thing I learned in Los Angeles is just about everybody has a grain of truth to their arguments. Lawless and anarchy and pillaging and plundering and looting and killing people and violating property rights is not the solution to anything. And the President was right to dispatch early assistance to L.A. and California to put down the war on life and property. But now I think we need a bipartisan, conservative-based, anti-poverty program designed to empower people, designed to put jobs and educational choice and home ownership --

Donaldson: ...We noticed you sitting by the left side of the President the other day. How does it feel coming from out of the cold, and do you think once the crisis is over they'll relegate you back to the other end of the table?

Kemp: They may, but I'm not worried about that. I think the President took some steps on Friday, and he wants to take bipartisan steps next week. I'm convinced that this is the moment to get Democrats and Republicans and conservatives and liberals to find a third way, and we can do it if we put our minds to it....

DISCUSSION, Julie Johnson of Time Magazine joins panel.

On Los Angeles:

Will: You heard Jack Kemp say, when asked by Cokie, what's the percentage in this [rebuilding the inner cities], the political percentage, and Jack gave the only possible answer, which is there's a moral obligation to do it. That there may be, but I don't believe there's a political obligation.

Roberts: Which is why both parties, both Bill Clinton and George Bush, seem to be all over the lot on it if the truth be told. The President can't make up his mind whether he wants to say we've got to be compassionate, we've have to start a conversation about race, or whether he wants to say we've got to be concerned about law and order....

Donaldson: ...What about it Julie? Is this for real, or is this just all talk on the part of people wanting to get elected?

Johnson: I have to think that it's all talk....

Donaldson: ...Does anyone here believe that we're going to have a massive spending program?...

Will: ...We don't have the money.... We don't have the ideas. I don't think anyone has. Well, Jack has a lot of interesting ideas for ameliorating the worst problems of the inner cities.

Russert: ...You said last week that it would take \$10 to \$15 billion per year for 10 years to deal with this problem [inner cities]. Two questions: Specifically, where would you find that money and, two, what would you do with that money?

Bradley: ...It's going to take probably a little more than that, but I think we need the best of the liberal agenda and the best of the conservative agenda and make an American agenda to deal with the problems of urban America. On the conservative side, I'd take urban enterprise zones, allowing people to buy public housing if they can do that. I think we also need to dramatically increase Job Corps.... I think we need a serious investment in infrastructure in our country generally that will help in our cities.

Bradley: ...I think it's going to be pretty easy [to pay for it], given the change in the world. We're going to end up spending less on defense, and when we spend less on defense we're going to be able to transfer that, I think, to pressing domestic needs. I think urban area is the clear choice for a chunk of that money. But let's make no mistake here.... This is not a problem that's going to be solved just by dollars. This is going to take corporate America making a commitment not only in terms of hiring and promotions, but also in terms of picking up the phone when your black employees are stopped by the cops in your area and calling the police chief and saying what's this all about. It's going to require the media to begin to tell the story of heroic families living amidst all this violence every day.

Broder: The president came back yesterday from Los Angeles, appealing for bipartisan support for some of the proposals he's made that you've mentioned: urban enterprise zones, the HOPE program for home ownership in public housing. Will he get that bipartisan support now?

Bradley: I think that these are programs that could easily be passed in the Congress....

Mitchell: ...You told Tim that you thought the White House suggestion that the Great Society programs were to blame for what happened in Los Angeles was ludicrous. Was it also a racial code word -- a code word to appeal to racial fears? Is it the Willie Horton of the '92 campaign?

Bradley: Could be. If it's a one-week phenomenon then I'll say no, it's not. If we continue to hear the word trotted out, then I'll say yes.

CBS -- FACE THE NATION

Moderator: Bob Schieffer.

Guest: Vice President Quayle.

Schieffer: ...What about understanding and trying to understand some of the things that may have caused the frustrations [in L.A.] that spewed out?... Should we be equally concerned about trying to get to the causes of these things as we are about restoring law and order?

Quayle: ...Beyond law enforcement, there are other matters. New strategies need to be deployed not only in law enforcement but in housing and education and job training and welfare....

Quayle: ...The old thinking, the old ideas, the old strategies, haven't worked as we had anticipated. The goals were laudable, but we've got to do better. We have to reform the Great Society programs.... And you know what we need to also do? We need to have a conversation not just with the Congress but with America, and the conversation should be on the big picture, and the conversation should underscore the importance of law enforcement....

Schieffer: ...Which ones [Great Society programs] didn't work?

Quayle: It is the attitude. It is the philosophy, and the philosophy of the Great Society was this: it was more of dependence rather than independence. The philosophy was of entitlement rather than opportunity. We ought to be preaching and talking about giving a person a hand up rather than a handout....

Schieffer: ...The poverty level during the Johnson administration went from 19 percent to 12 percent. The poverty level among the elderly was reduced by two-thirds. So, you say, "Let's give people a helping hand," but it is hard for me to understand how you do that by just simply saying that those programs didn't work.

Quayle: Let me try to explain it to you. Let's take education. You mentioned poverty. The greatest problem and biggest social gap that we have in American society today is between those that have an education and those that don't have an education.... It's not necessarily rich versus poor; it's the educated versus the uneducated. One of the reforms that the President has talked about in education is choice in education.... Unfortunately, this has been rejected by the education establishment.... We're the ones that are trying to shake it up because our kids cannot afford the current education system they're getting today, and the parents are starting to demand a better education system, a reform of the Great Society idea.

Schieffer: Do you think there ought to be a...federal investigation into why the Los Angeles police were so slow to react?

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Quayle: ...I would favor this instead. I think there's a lot of credit given to the Los Angeles Police Department. I know that there's this possibility that they didn't act as quickly as possible. I think Daryl Gates, in fact, has admitted that he didn't respond as soon as he wanted to.... If there's something that could be done in the future and lessons learned, fine, but right now I'm going to give credit and praise to the law enforcement officials in this country....

Schieffer: ...Will we expect to see you and the President take a more active role in pushing those programs [urban programs]? Because no one would argue that you have pushed strongly for those programs.... He [Secretary Kemp] has been -- the criticism is that you have been very lukewarm about those programs.

Quayle: ...That is simply not true, and Jack Kemp, representing the President, has energetically been on Capitol Hill trying to get a fair hearing and discussion of some of the President's ideas.... The President has supported him. I've supported him.

Schieffer: Let's turn to another subject, and that is Ross Perot. Why do you think that Ross Perot has such broad appeal at this particular point?

Quayle: He's tapping into the frustration in America. America is frustrated. They want change. They don't want the status quo. This debate that we're going to have right now is going to be about change and new ideas -- the President's new ideas and recipe for change.

DISCUSSION; joined by Joel Klein, New York magazine; Michael McQueen, Wall Street Journal.

On Los Angeles and the Administration:

Schieffer: I take it that the message Vice President Quayle was delivering today was that we want to try to work with the Congress.

Klein: Yeah, but seeing it and doing it are two different things. It's going to involve a sustained, real commitment that we haven't seen from this Administration for years....

McQueen: ...The other thing I do want to note, though, is that the Vice President was not just sending messages about working with the Congress. He was also sending a message to the President's political base, and that is conservatives. You will note some strong messages of support for the law enforcement community. I think we need to take (note of that?).

Schieffer: ...We keep hearing these stories about divisions within the White House on whether the emphasis should be on law and order or on understanding the root causes of the problem. Clearly, Vice President Quayle is on the law and order side of that.

Schieffer: The Vice President says that the Administration really is committed now [to the urban agenda]. He says we really ought to -- this gives us an opportunity to rethink these programs. Do you find this Administration is committed to urban programs and urban policies?

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McQueen: There has been no sign at all during the three years that Mr. Bush has been in office that these programs have been a priority.... What I have to say about him is...the Vice President has been responsible for bringing into the White House a lot of the people who are most identified with this program. Even if you don't agree with the philosophy, they have been out there pushing these [urban programs], I guess. But the fact of the matter is the President has not made these issues a priority.

Schieffer: ...Do you really think there is a difference in Mr. Bush private and Mr. Bush public?

McQueen: I do.... I think the President, how to say, bifurcates his thinking on lots of issues. I think, for example, he makes a very sharp distinction between politics and governance.

Klein: ...I think that the practical result of the kind of bifurcation that Michel was talking about is a sense of paralysis. And I think that one of the reasons why the President's polls went down after the Los Angeles riots was that no matter what you want -- if you want stricter law and order, if you want a Marshall plan for the cities -- the sense out in the public is that this guy isn't going to give it to you because he hasn't given you much of anything for the last three years. He's been interested in the foreign policy.

THE McLAUGHLIN GROUP

Moderator: John McLaughlin. **Panel:** Fred Barnes, Eleanor Clift, Chris Matthews, Clarence Page.

On Los Angeles:

McLaughlin: ...How do you rate George Bush's handling of this crisis and of the blame?

Barnes: I think he's handled it very well so far. And certainly the White House was entitled to attack the Great Society programs which they should have said were expanded and financed lavishly by the Nixon Administration.... Here's the test for George Bush: He has a great opportunity when doing the right thing is also what will be politically helpful. If he can come up now with a program for the short term -- and it's basically the Kemp program plus federal support for more police -- and fight for that in Congress in a way he hasn't obviously in his first three and a half years, that is the right thing to do. But he also needs a long-term program that is going to change the whole welfare system in our country....

Clift: ...I don't get the sense that the President is going to do anything but tour the riot areas in his armored limousine. I don't think there's any evidence that he's scared straight to do anything. And if he wants to run against Lyndon Johnson, fine, I think he'll lose. The Great Society has given us Head Start, Medicare, Jobs Corps -- a lot of programs that are enduring. And if the Republicans didn't like something about it -- they've been in charge for the last 12 years, so why didn't they fix it?

Matthews: ...We've had 12 years of evil basically in this country. We've the Bush Administration. We've got Reagan. These guys were bad guys for this country.... George Bush opposed the Civil Rights Act in 1964. He can talk about the programs of the '60s all he wants. He was against them.... He's stupid to go back to the 1960s.... George Bush's urban policies: What has he done?...

Clarence Page: ...He [George Bush] didn't handle it even reasonably well this week. When he blames the problems of the riots on the social programs of the '60s and '70s it was about as big of a blunder as Clinton saying he didn't inhale. American people just don't buy that....

McLaughlin: ...In all fairness, don't you think that you should recognize that Bush did not cast the first stone?...

Clift: ...The President was ought there first...and sending the code language to the suburban voters and keeping his constituency in order....

Barnes: ...The fact is the Reagan-Bush Administrations are responsible for the problem for this reason: They allowed the Great Society programs to continue and grow during those entire years.... What these programs have done is sustain the underclass....

Page: ...That's playing with numbers. The majority of poor people from the '60s are doing better now because of those programs....

Matthews: ...The big opportunity here is for the Democrats. Because it's interesting that the big man this week was not the Attorney General Barr. The big man was the HUD Secretary. The people are desperately looking...to an alternative from this do-nothing, sit back, let it happen policy. And so they look to Kemp...to do something....

Clift: George Bush clung to his coattails for about two days. And now every White House aide you talk to is trashing Jack Kemp....

McLaughlin: ...Don't you think in this crisis he [President Bush] has done a good job?

Matthews: ...The big sleep has been followed by the big weep. First of all, he slept for 12 years. Now he's crying. When's he going to have a policy?...

Barnes: The question is not whether Bush has a policy. He has had this urban policy. The question is whether he's going to fight for it in a sustained way, and he hasn't done that before.

Page: The President was floundering around this week because he finally had to rediscover America and American people know it.... Most people in this country are not divided over what's right or what's left. They want to know what works right now. And the President finally began to discover that at the end of the week when he spoke to an audience in L.A. talking about let's do what works. Unfortunately, he doesn't want to work. He wants to put it back on everybody else, calling for volunteerism, form reform -- ridiculous moves....

Page: ...Bush isn't even buying his own programs. He hasn't supported the programs of his own conservative war on poverty that Jack Kemp's been pushing for the last 4 years....

McLaughlin: ...Is the political impact of L.A., as things stand now, a net plus or a net minus for George Bush?

Barnes: It is neither now. It ought to be a net plus, but he has...to promote, in a sustained way, a new domestic policy that he has but hasn't worked for in the past.

Clift: It's a minus because we see what a fraud his policy is. And he's not going to push any of these programs....

Matthews: ...The fact that he's hanging onto Jack Kemp's coattails -- he might even put him on the ticket. He's desperate. Minus. It shouldn't have been.

Page: ...I see it as a minus because it was back on domestic policy where George Bush is weakest and Clinton is strongest....

INSIDE WASHINGTON

Moderator: Gordon Peterson. **Panel:** Charles Krauthammer; Tom Oliphant; Carl Rowan; Tina Gulland, Post-Newsweek Stations.

On Los Angeles:

Peterson: Why did L.A. go up in flames this week?...

Krauthammer: ...There has been a lot of blame handed out, but the one group that hasn't been mentioned is the group that's obviously the most responsible. And that is the young thugs who raped and pillaged the city.

Rowan: It's about as absurd to blame it all on thugs as it is to try to blame it on the social programs of the cities. Without those social programs we might have 50 cities going up in flames today.

Oliphant: ...The L.A. riot was unique in that the flames were fanned by official Neros: the police, which pulled back; the National Guard that didn't arrive for 36 hours; and the federal government that didn't arrive until the riot was over.

Rowan: ...There are all kinds of people who were out there. There were different kinds of looters. But conservatives and the Bush Administration want to make that word "looter" the great scare word of our time.... Who are the biggest looters of the last year? The people who stole your money from S&Ls....

Rowan: ...I don't understand President Bush. He weeps a little bit, and you think he understands what's going on. Then he hands you a bromide about how we have to go back to family values. Everybody's for family values. But he does not want to face up to the poverty, the racism, the neglect, the hopelessness that are in these cities. And until he does, nothing will be done, and we'll go through this again.

Peterson: ...He seems to be focused on whatever is before him at the time. He seems to lack peripheral vision. Would you agree or not?

Oliphant: ...The question is whether there are forces in Washington that can appeal to the side of this President that really is good.... What I think has to happen is that he has to break through a conceptual Berlin Wall of domestic policy. And it is this wall that prevents resources now being wasted on a \$280 billion defense budget from being used for the beginning of a new domestic effort....

Peterson: To go to the question of L.A., what do you do?...

Krauthammer: We have ideas, and the best ideas are from Jack Kemp. And it's a pity that his ideas have been scorned at his own White House....

Gulland: ...You talk about the failure of the last 12 years. At some point George Bush has to run on his record. And what we're seeing now is a return -- a battle for his conscience surely -- but an apparent return to safe tried and true -- we will argue on law and order and we will because the Republicans have done that for 24 years....

Rowan: There is another hope -- that the American public can understand the truth. Why do we have 25 million people -- most of them white -- living on food stamps? Because in the last 12 years Reagan and Bush have run the economy in a way that we've got 5 million more people living in poverty.

On Clinton's vice presidential pick:

Gulland: ...One of the most intriguing is Colin Powell. If Bill Clinton could persuade Colin Powell to join him on the ticket in the year of the outsider where race and poverty has become a front-burner issue -- he's tough, he's a commander. I think it would be good news.

Oliphant: ...I'll give what I'm told was Clinton's reaction the first time he thought about Colin Powell...: Na.

Rowan: ...I don't think Colin Powell would want any part of it because he's a wise man. He know's that the state of racial polarization in America is such that the race card is going to be played again, and it would hurt the Democratic ticket....

Rowan: ...The race card has been played so viciously for over 12 years that it just won't work.

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you all. And, Peter, thank you very much for that wonderfully warm introduction and for making me feel so welcome. I loved walking out through that crowd because it gave me a chance to see so many people who have been so supportive over the years; and I am very, very grateful to you. Barbara and I count our blessings, even in complicated times. And I am very privileged to serve as President of the United States. And believe me, I'll never forget how I got there. It was good, strong, loyal friends out in the precincts and at dinners like this over the years. And I am very grateful to all of you.

May I thank Reverend Gambet for his invocation. It was a unique invocation. (Laughter and applause.) And I kind of went along with the last part and could learn from the first part, but -- (laughter.) And Malcolm Evans for the National Anthem. I missed the Pledge of Allegiance crowd. I hear they were absolutely fantastic -- and some of them are back there -- but thank you very much for a unique, joint Pledge of Allegiance. (Applause.)

And I want to thank Peter and David here for making this dinner happen. Of course, Senator Specter, I'm just very pleased to have been with him today and what for, I think, both of us was a very moving tour through some of the less privileged, some of the impacted parts of this great city. Larry Coughlin is with us, who is our Bush-Quayle Cochairman; Congressmen Weldon and Ridge and Ritter, all good people. We've got a great Republican delegation from Pennsylvania, I might add, in the United States Congress. (Applause.)

I was delighted to see Barbara Hafer earlier on. And, of course, Governor Mike Castle, an old friend who's done a great job in the a neighboring state with us tonight. And I'd be remiss if I didn't single Elsie Hillman, heading the campaign effort here in the Keystone State. (Applause.) And thank Dexter; and then, of course, our team of Bobby Holt, Wally Ganzi. And then again, I'll single out Dexter, who gets the star seat. He gets to sit next to Elsie, and that means he sold more tickets than anybody else. So that's terrific. (Applause.)

And, of course, Charlie -- Charlie Kopp. He is a fundraising czar. He is our Finance Chairman, a great friend, and a loyal, loyal supporter. And he is very successful -- so successful, that he didn't have to go to our dog, Millie, for a single dime. (Laughter.) You may have seen our income tax returns, and you can tell who earns the money in the family. Millie is not a "fat cat," but nevertheless has done a great job as our dog. (Laughter.)

I am pleased to be here. And I want to share with you just some observations. This is a year where you're hearing a lot of talk about change. And I would be the first to concede that we must

MORE

make significant change in this country. I hear a lot of talk about it coming out of the political arena, but we've been trying to affect constructive change.

I came back from a very moving visit to Los Angeles just on -- we got back Friday evening. And let me just give you a short report of what I saw and what I heard.

Each one of us saw the images of hate and horror. There was no -- that was all around you -- images we won't soon forget. But what I saw during my time in Los Angeles, even in the hardest-hit parts of South Central L.A., should give us some cause for hope.

Everywhere, the people I talked with told about acts of individual heroism, about the extraordinary courage of just plain, ordinary people. And some braved the gang of looters to form these "bucket brigades" to put out fires when the firetrucks couldn't get through. And then some stood up in the face of angry mobs and reached across the barrier of color to save lives of their fellow men and women. And many of these aren't the stories that you'll see on the nightly news. But, believe me, they are the stories that tell us the power of simple human decency.

And what it tells me is that the time has come to set the old, worn-out ideas aside. And the time has come -- in the words of Abraham Lincoln -- "to think anew and to act anew."

And we start with the principles at the heart of this great Republican Party -- principles that tell us something very obvious, and that is that we ought to keep the power close to the people. That we've got to strengthen families. I'll never forget when Tom Bradley, the Mayor of Los Angeles and others, came to see me -- large-city mayors, small-city mayors, Republicans, Democrats, liberals and conservatives joined -- the National Leagues of Cities. And they came and they said the one thing that united them in terms that they all agreed on was that the fundamental problem that the decline of the American family is causing in the cities. The prime cause of much of the unrest in the -- the problems of crime, whatever -- comes from the dissolution of the American family.

And we think we've got to find ways to strengthen that -- instill character and values in our young people. That we must encourage entrepreneurship, ownership, increase investment, and create jobs. Now, these aims have got to form the heart of our agenda for economic opportunity -- an agenda that can literally restore hope -- can't solve the problem overnight -- but restore hope to our inner cities. And they define what we must do:

First -- and let's be very clear on this one -- we have got to preserve order. We've got to keep the peace -- because families can't thrive, children can't live and jobs can't flourish in a climate of fear. And I support the police. I saw the Commissioner here today, had a great -- I see Governor Martinez, the head of our drug effort, here with him. He and I were together with the Senator and others. And I told the Commissioner and told the people out here, we support your efforts. They put themselves in harm's way to save all of us. And we must start by standing strongly for order and keeping the peace.

Now, those thoughts were foremost in my mind from the first hours of the violence in Los Angeles. A civilized society simply cannot tackle any of the really tough problems in the midst of chaos. And it's just that simple. Violence and brutality destroy order. They destroy the rule of law. They must never be rationalized. And it must be condemned. Violence, whenever you find it, we must condemn it as a society. (Applause.)

When I was out in Los Angeles, I called a woman that had been a member of our little church in Houston, Texas -- St. Martin's Parish. And I got a message to call her. And I called her and she told me a tragic story of her brother and her son. They had gotten a call from a neighbor, a minority, and they had -- a member of a minority group -- and they'd climbed on their motorcycle and driven down to see this person. And on the way, their motorcycle was surrounded by a gang. The motorcycle was up-ended. Her son was beaten. Somebody put a gun up to this kid's head, pulled the trigger and it didn't go off. Her brother, not so lucky. He was beaten and they put a gun up to his head and he was killed right on the spot. This didn't have anything to do with Rodney King. This didn't have anything to do with anything other than wanton violence. And we simply cannot be asked to condone that in our society. And so we're going to stand for -- (applause.)

In Los Angeles, I announced an addition to a program that's already at work here in Philadelphia -- an exciting program that we saw today -- an initiative I call "Weed and Seed." The idea is to "weed out" the gang leaders and drug dealers and career criminals; and then "seed" the community with expanded employment, educational and social services. And, second -- and so we're going to push for that. I'm going to push and try to see that we can do more for the American people with this innovative new program.

Secondly, we must spark an economic revival in urban America. The best answer to poverty is a job with dignity in the private sector. And that means establishing what we call enterprise zones in our inner cities. It means reforming our welfare system, putting an end to the pervasive disincentives that encourage welfare and discourage work. So enterprise zones and reform of welfare.

And thirdly, we've got to revolutionize American education. I might add, parenthetically, that I wish Barbara was here to see what you're doing with this show of support for literacy. And Mr. Notebart, I would like -- wherever he may be -- I would like to make this contribution. I'm not trying to sell this. (Laughter.) This is Millie's Book, and we want to donate this here as a contribution from the breadwinner in the Bush family. (Applause.) So, please, we want the record to show we brought a book in. (Applause.)

Now, we have a good education program. It burns me up when I hear some of the old thinkers, the pass-the-mandated-federal-program thinkers criticize. We have a program called America 2000. It's an innovative strategy, and it has things in it like choice. You can choose your colleges; why not choose your schools and thus make them more competitive? (Applause.)

Competition, community action -- all of these things are a part of it. And children in our inner cities deserve the same opportunities that kids in the suburbs have. And that's what a lot of that program is about. And that means we've got to break the power of the establishment, the education establishment. And whether it's public or private or religious, parents -- not the government -- should be free to choose their children's schools. And I am going to fight for that concept. (Applause.)

And then another ingredient of our urban policy -- and one I've been trying to get through for a long time -- is homeownership. And I've never understood how anyone could be content with the present system -- to take pride in the warehousing of the poor. The aim behind our HOPE initiative is to give poor families a stake -- give them a stake in their communities -- to give them something of value they can pass along to their kids, by turning public housing tenants into homeowners. And we are going to fight for that principle.

At every turn during my time in L.A., I heard people talking about the principles that guide these initiatives. And these weren't big shots, these were community leaders. These were people that were out there on the front line trying to help the kids. Personal responsibility, that was one. Opportunity. Ownership. Independence. And then, of course, with great pride, dignity. And you know the sound of those words. We all do. It really adds up to the American dream.

And we all know what the critics will say. And you've heard it. And they'll say: "Well, you've proposed all this before, Mr. President." And the answer, it's true. That's right. But now it is time to act on these proposals, because this time, they know we are right. We are right and we want to get it passed through the Congress. (Applause.) And tomorrow I'll be meeting with the leaders to try to get it done. (Applause.) It's no longer good enough to try the old ones. Let's try these new ideas and see if they can't help some of the kids that we saw today here in Philadelphia.

My first order of business is, then, to build a bipartisan effort in support of immediate action on this agenda. We won't settle for business as usual -- measuring what we achieve by the size of the bureaucracy we build or the number of mandated programs we can send down to these communities who are crying out for flexibility. This time, we've got to put our principles to work, and take the case for change directly to the American people.

What's going on in urban America is just one part, though, of a larger issue -- because the need for reform doesn't end simply with our inner cities.

And it starts with the revolution in American education that I mentioned -- America 2000, we call it. It starts with that. When you get down to what we've got to do really to be competitive in the future, to offer kids an opportunity, it is education. And it includes our aggressive action, also, to break down barriers to free trade -- and opening markets to American goods the world over, has got to be a part. In each case, we've taken aim at the status quo and we've set our sights on change. That's why I'm fighting hard for a GATT agreement. That's why we have proposed and our working with Mexico's able President Carlos Salinas to try to get a North American Free Trade Agreement. It will be more jobs for the United States, more jobs for Mexico, and a Mexico much better able to do what it must do with its environment and do what it must do in controlling its own borders.

America needs legal reform -- to put an end to these outrageous court awards that sap our economy and strain our civility.

We've gotten to a point where doctors won't deliver babies -- where fathers are afraid to coach little league -- all because of the fear of some frivolous lawsuit. And that won't change until people spend less time suing each other and more time helping each other. And we've got to change the laws in Washington. (Applause.) We must -- and we will -- reform the legal system.

Now, we need health care reform -- and to open up access to affordable health care for all Americans. I was talking to Charlie about this a little earlier here. It used to be that going to the hospital didn't conjure up visions of financial suicide. And today, the cost of even minor surgery has gone right out through the roof. And more than 30 million Americans have no health care coverage at all.

We can change that. And we can do it better than some of these nationalized programs that we're hearing about from the opposition. (Applause.) We have a comprehensive health care reform plan that will help us keep the quality health care -- and make no

MORE

mistake about it, people are still pouring into the United States for specialized care because they know we have the best quality health care in the entire world. So we want to keep the quality health care that makes America first in the world -- and at the same time we open up access to all Americans.

Contrary to what the big government folks say, we can do it without putting the government in charge of everybody's health care. (Applause.) If you want to stand in line, you can go to the Department of Motor Vehicles. (Laughter.) You don't need to go for a nationalized health care program. Let's face it: National health care, in my view, literally would be a costly national disaster -- and I am not going to let that happen. We are going to fight for our plan of reform that gives access to insurance to the poor and the middle-income people alike. And that's what we need, and that's what I believe we'll be able to get when we take this case to the American people.

So far, I've spoken about what government can do. So let me conclude by speaking about what society absolutely must do. Because there's something society must cultivate that government cannot provide. Something we can't legislate -- something that we can't make happen by a government order. I'm talking about the moral sense that guides us all. In the simplest of terms -- you want to get it to fundamentals -- I'm talking about knowing right from wrong -- and then doing what's right.

You go back to Los Angeles for a minute. Time and again the people I met with there put their finger on one root cause for the turmoil we see: and that, of course, back to the point -- the dissolution of the family. And they're right. They're absolutely right. And ask yourself: What's the determining fact right now for whether a child has hope -- stays in school, stays away from drugs? It is not government spending. It's not the number of SBA loans or HUD grants. It's whether a child lives in a loving home with a mother and a father.

Barbara Bush was absolutely right when she said: What happens in the White House doesn't matter half as much as what happens in your house. (Applause.) We have tried, both of us, augmented by tons of grandchildren, et cetera, to put the emphasis on American family, put that emphasis first.

That's why I keep coming back to the good Samaritans that we have called and will continue to call Points of Light: Everybody here devoting some time to helping someone else in the community. The people who help the poor, the elderly, kids in trouble -- and never ask a nickel in return. Government alone simply cannot create the scale and the energy needed to transform the lives of people in need. Let the cynics scoff about it: but we know these volunteers are the lifeblood of the American spirit. And I wish you could have been with me today because you heard it: Community Action. People overburdened with financial problems, but finding time to help the guy next door. It was a wonderful thing we saw right here in some of the most impoverished areas of Philadelphia. It was a community spirit.

Government has a role, but it never can supplant the propensity of one American to help another. And so we've got to find ways to help in that concept and help encourage it. I believe there is a great future in store because I believe that all of these principles will be coming into focus now. And I believe we're right about family. I think we're right about freedom and free enterprise. And I think we're right about faith. And most of all, I think we are right about America's future.

You know, we've been through a very tough time. There's been a sluggish economy with recession in many parts of the country. And I have a feeling this thing is beginning to move a little bit. And it's long overdue. And I hope like heck I'm right this time.

But I really do feel that it's beginning to move. And with that there will be a return of this innate feeling of American optimism. And when it happens, let's all vow that we will save time to help the other guy, to do what we can to be Points of Light.

We've got the strength. We've got the spirit in our government. We've got it. You can sense it in even in the ravaged communities of Los Angeles. We've got it in ourselves to transform America into the nation we've dreamed of for generations.

So don't listen to those doomsayers. Don't listen to those top 20 seconds that tell you everything that's wrong with the United States of America. We are the freest and the fairest and the best country on the face of the Earth. And we are going to get the job done. (Applause.)

We have nothing to be apologetic for. We've got big problems. But the message, I think, is if we can try this new approach, I believe we can solve them and offer hope to those little kids we saw with their eyes bulging as we came by their today into these little community centers.

Thank you all very much for you support. Save a little energy for the campaign in the fall. I'm going to need you. But I believe we're going to win this election. Thank you very very much.

SENATE FLOOR: Campaign finance veto easily sustained.

The Senate failed to override the president's veto of a bill (S 3) that would have dramatically changed the way candidates finance their campaigns for Congress.

The vote to override was 57-42, 10 votes shy of the two-thirds needed.

Yesterday's vote was similar to the April 30 vote in the Senate to clear the bill. That vote was 58-42.

To date, Bush has vetoed 28 bills. Congress has been unable to override any of his vetoes.

S 3 would have instituted voluntary spending limits on House and Senate campaigns and provided incentives, such as matching funds and discounted advertising and postal rates, to candidates who abided by the limits.

It also would have placed limits on the amount of contributions that could be accepted from political action committees.

In his veto message, Bush said he objected to provisions that would have allowed public financing of campaigns. He also said the bill failed to ban entirely donations from political action committees.

Arguing for the override, Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, said the president's position on publicly financed campaigns was "inconsistent with his practice."

Mitchell said Bush will soon have received a total of \$200 million in public matching funds for his various presidential campaigns.

HOUSE FLOOR: Shipbuilding, boat user fee bill passed.

The House yesterday passed, 339-78, legislation that would bar from U.S. ports foreign ships built with subsidies and phase out user fees for boat owners.

U.S. shipbuilders contend that foreign subsidies place them at a disadvantage. The measure would prohibit any ship that

benefits from a foreign subsidy from unloading its cargo or passengers at a U.S. port. The requirement would only apply to ships built after the measure's enactment.

The measure (HR 2056) would also phase out a controversial provision of the 1990 budget deal that imposed user fees on boat owners. Starting last year, the Coast Guard has applied an annual fee depending upon the size of the boat.

Boat owners complain about the fee, saying it is an additional tax on boaters who already pay a gasoline tax.

The measure would phase out the fee after fiscal 1994, a year earlier than planned. It would also reduce or eliminate fees on some boat owners. For example, the 1990 law set fees on boats of at least 16 feet. By fiscal 1994, only boats of 37 feet or more would be assessed.

To recoup the revenue that would be lost, the measure would mandate a fee on calls to a new federal service that provides information on tariff fees. Calls to the service would be 46 cents per minute.

A key vote came on a motion to delete everything from the bill but the boat user fee provisions. The motion was rejected 179-237.

AID TO EX-SOVIETS gets green light from Foreign Relations panel.

The struggling independent states that used to make up the menacing superpower President Ronald Reagan once called the "evil empire" would be the beneficiaries of a wide assortment of U.S. aid under legislation approved, 14-4, yesterday by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The bill (S 2532) authorizes an unspecified amount of aid to the Commonwealth of Independent States, with the aim of establishing strong trade ties with the U.S. business community.

The bill urges the president to take into account the records of each of the 12

Today

House Floor: Two of the nation's biggest cities would receive disaster assistance under a fiscal 1992 supplemental spending bill (HR 5069) before the House today.

The \$494.7 measure would provide loans and other financial assistance to riot-damaged sections of Los Angeles and Chicago, which recently had its downtown ravaged by a flood.

The funding would be deemed emergency spending, exempting it from spending limits under budget rules.

The measure would provide \$169.7 million in loan subsidies to the Small Business Administration (SBA), enabling that agency to subsidize \$500 million in loans. Another \$25 million would be provided to cover administrative costs of the SBA program.

In addition, the measure would provide \$300 million for the Federal Emergency Management Agency to make available disaster relief payments, mostly for flood damage in Chicago.

The House also is slated to consider a bill (HR 4111) that would increase federal funds available for small business loans.

To meet the growing demand for loans, the measure would increase the authorized funding level of SBA's guaranteed loan program to \$5 billion for fiscal 1992, \$6 billion for fiscal 1993 and \$7 billion for fiscal 1994.

Senate Floor: Members will resume consideration of the so-called motor voter bill (S 250), which would allow citizens to register to vote at the same time they apply for a driver's license or numerous other public certificates.

Consideration of the measure was halted on Tuesday when the Senate failed to limit debate on the bill, which Republicans want to amend with other legislation (S 640, S 645) that would re-

vamp product liability laws.

During consideration today, members will vote on a motion to table, or kill, the product liability amendment, offered by Bob Kasten, R-Wis.

The Kasten amendment would establish a uniform set of standards under which businesses would be liable for injuries sustained from use of their products.

The aim of the amendment is to lower the amount of awards that could be collected by plaintiffs in product liability lawsuits.

Supporters say high liability awards hurt business' ability to compete and

that most of a jury's award ends up being absorbed in legal costs.

But opponents of the amendment say that it would unduly restrict the power of juries to decide how victims should be compensated.

Marine Sanctuaries: A bill aimed at improving a marine sanctuaries program tops the markup agenda of the House Merchant Marine Committee.

The bill (HR 4310) would reauthorize the program, under which the federal government establishes underwater sanctuaries to protect areas that have ecological, recreational or historical value. Commercial activity, such as oil drilling and

fishing, are limited in the nation's 10 existing sanctuaries.

The bill would significantly boost authorized funding levels for the program — starting at \$15 million for fiscal 1992 and doubling to \$30 million by 1996. Current appropriations are \$5 million.

The bill would place additional restrictions on environmentally damaging activity in marine sanctuaries and would increase fines for violations of the law.

Aid to Ex-Soviets: The Senate Finance Committee will mark up draft legislation to make the new republics of the former Soviet Union eligible for trade benefits under the Generalized System of Preferences program.

Under that program, certain products imported from beneficiary nations are allowed to enter the United States duty-free. Extending the benefits to the former Soviet republics would help their economies by stimulating exports.

There is broad bipartisan support for efforts to help the emerging democracies, and the bill is expected to be easily approved.

Civil Rights: A draft measure to authorize \$9.4 million for the Civil Rights Commission in fiscal 1993 will be marked up by the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Civil and Constitutional Rights.

The commission, which investigates and reports on discrimination, has long been criticized by civil rights groups and many members who say it has not fulfilled its responsibilities.

Last year, Congress passed legislation (HR 3350 — PL 102-167) that extended the agency's authorization through fiscal 1994. But the act set no funding levels for fiscal 1993-94, so as to allow Congress to gauge the commission's progress each year and authorize money accordingly.

The measure is not controversial and is expected to win easy approval.

Farm Credit: Legislation aimed at helping new farmers get started will be marked up by a House Agriculture subcommittee.

The measure (HR 4906) before the Conservation, Credit and Rural Development Subcommittee would set up two new loan programs within the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

One of the programs would assist new farmers with down payments to buy farms; the other would provide operating loans to those new to farming.

The programs would use existing funds within FmHA. The bill contains no specific authorization levels.

The legislation is in response to the dwindling number of young people choosing farming as a way of life, according to sponsor and panel Chairman Glenn English, D-Okla. ■

Mollohan Whips Staggers in W. Va. Primary

In a matchup of incumbents, Rep. Alan B. Mollohan easily defeated fellow Democrat Harley O. Staggers Jr. in Tuesday's West Virginia primary.

The two five-term veterans were forced into the primary battle by redistricting that cost West Virginia one of its four House seats because of population losses in the 1980s.

Mollohan won 61 percent of the 1st District ballots, giving him a margin of more than 20,000 votes over Staggers. Staggers is the seventh House member to lose in a primary this year — the biggest total since 1982. (see chart)

Mollohan, a member of the Appropriations Committee, had to overcome Staggers' persistent reminders that Mollohan wrote 12 bad checks at the now-defunct House bank. Staggers portrayed himself as the outsider, but Mollohan was able to counter by pointing to the benefits he brought to the district via his Appropriations panel post.

Because the Republicans did not field a candidate in the 1st District, Mollohan now has a free ride to re-election in November.

There were no primary matchups in either of the other two House districts.

Nebraska. There was only minimal congressional primary activity in Nebraska on Tuesday. Democrat Peter Hoagland, the only one of the three incumbents who had an intraparty challenge, easily defeated Jess M. Pritchett, 85 percent to 15 percent, in the 2nd District. In the 1st District, Democrats nominated Gerry Finnegan to face GOP incumbent Doug Bereuter in the fall.

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former republics on human rights, economic reforms and non-proliferation of nuclear weapons technology before granting aid.

The bill also includes a separate authorization of \$12 billion for an increase in the U.S. contribution to the International Monetary Fund, the intergovernmental agency that promotes world trade and aids member countries with debt payments.

Members agreed, 14-4, to an amendment that would bar aid to Azerbaijan until it suspends its blockade against Armenia.

Opponents of the bill said it gives too much leeway to the administration in deciding how to distribute the aid to the ex-Soviet republics. Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., said lawmakers are "virtually abdicating our role" in the assistance project.

Jesse Helms, R-N.C., said he will offer an amendment during floor consideration of the bill that would authorize the Overseas Private Investment Corp. to issue \$2 billion in loan guarantees to assist in the resettling of refugees in Israel and Israeli-occupied territories.

INTELLIGENCE FUNDING cut by 5 percent by House panel.

The House Intelligence Committee late on Tuesday approved, by voice vote, an intelligence authorization bill that would cut intelligence spending by 5 percent in fiscal 1993.

Committee Chairman Dave McCurdy, D-Okla., said the proposed budget puts a greater emphasis on intelligence gathering by agents rather than with sophisticated and costly electronic equipment.

But the bill (HR 5095) includes none of the much-discussed reorganization of the intelligence community that McCurdy and Senate Intelligence Committee Chairman David L. Boren, D-Okla., have advocated, such as a streamlining of all satellite and aerial reconnaissance programs.

"My inclination right now is to monitor and evaluate the administration's actions" to rework its spy apparatus, McCurdy said. Some overhaul measures could be added to the bill when it comes before the full House in the coming weeks, he said.

While the precise intelligence budget total is classified, it is estimated to be about \$30 billion. President Bush has requested about a \$1 billion increase for fiscal 1993.

DEFENSE BUDGET approved by panel includes B-2 funding.

The House Armed Services Committee yesterday approved, 47-8, a draft \$273.4 billion fiscal 1993 defense authorization bill that includes the funding that President Bush requested for the B-2 stealth bomber.

While the measure would authorize

\$4 billion for the production of the last four of a planned 20-plane fleet of B-2s, it would set an overall cap of \$44 billion for the program — \$400 million less than the Air Force says is needed.

The panel wants the administration to prove the plane's radar-evading abilities and bring down its cost.

The panel did not go along with Bush's \$5.4 billion request for the Strategic Defense Initiative anti-missile system. Lawmakers agreed to provide \$4.3 billion, rejecting a proposal to develop space-based weapons.

Members also rejected Bush's request for \$535 million for F-18 fighter planes and instead authorized \$575 million to speed development of the Navy's AX attack bomber.

The measure would authorize \$1.9 billion to build six new C-17 cargo planes, not the \$2.7 billion Bush asked for to build eight planes. Government Operations Committee Chairman John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., yesterday called the plane "seriously flawed," saying it had fuel leaks, cracks in wing flaps and troubles with its computer system. (See story below)

FY92 RESCISSIONS bill conference meets, but little resolved.

House and Senate conferees on legislation that would cut fiscal 1992 spending met but did not reach an agreement on cuts in the *Seawolf* submarine program or other major defense projects. Conferees plan to meet again this morning.

The House and Senate versions of the bill (HR 4990) are significantly different with regard to defense spending, which constitute most of the proposed cuts.

The \$5.8 billion House bill would cancel production of one of the two *Seawolf* submarines President Bush wants to cancel. The Senate measure, which would cut \$8.3 billion, would retain funds for the subs.

The Senate measure instead targeted for cuts the anti-missile Strategic Defense Initiative system, B-2 stealth bomber and other defense projects backed by the administration.

Joseph M. McDade, Pa., the ranking Republican on the House Appropriations Defense Subcommittee, said that the conferees had only conducted preliminary discussions but substantive talks were tentatively planned for last night.

WASTE DISPOSAL markup continues at Senate Environment.

A move to institute a nationwide 10-cent deposit on recycled beverage containers was foiled yesterday as members of the Senate Environment Committee resumed work on a bill that would reauthorize the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA).

Last revised in 1984, RCRA regulates the disposal of solid and hazardous

waste. The pending bill (S 976) would increase the nation's rate of recycling, deal with the interstate transport of garbage and expand regulation of municipal landfills and incinerators.

The container deposit amendment, offered by James M. Jeffords, R-Vt., failed on a 6-10 vote after some panel members argued that it would violate states' rights. Some states have proposed deposits for beverage containers only to have the plan defeated in state referendums. Other critics of the amendment said it could hurt current recycling efforts because the aluminum in beverage cans, one of the more lucrative recycled materials, often subsidizes other recycling efforts.

The committee accepted on a voice vote a compromise amendment offered by Max Baucus, D-Mont., and John H. Chafee, R-R.I., that would give governors increased authority to block shipments of garbage into their states but only if a local jurisdiction asked the state government to block the access.

Members earlier defeated a Harry Reid, D-Nev., amendment that would have given governors increased authority to block the interstate transfer of waste even without a request from a local

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municipality. Reid said some Western towns may be approached about handling other states' trash in an effort to bring increased revenue to the town.

The committee is expected to finish work on the bill next week.

TIMBER SALE bill fails to move out of Agriculture subcommittee.

The House Agriculture Committee's Forest, Family Farms and Energy Subcommittee yesterday rejected, 3-6, a bill that would have prohibited most below-cost timber sales from federal forests.

A timber sale is considered below cost when the government spends more to provide the services needed to prepare for the sale than it receives in revenue from selling the timber. Such services by the U.S. Forest Service include building roads to timber sites, determining sale boundaries and administrative costs.

As originally introduced, the bill (HR 3414) would have established a new accounting system for calculating timber sale costs and would have required a sale-by-sale analysis of costs and revenues.

But in responding to Forest Service objections, bill sponsor Jim Olin, D-Va., drafted a substitute version that would have allowed the Forest Service to analyze the profitability of the timber sales on a forest-by-forest basis rather than requiring an analysis on individual sales.

Opponents argued that although the bill was supposed to streamline forest management it would have actually threatened to reduce the amount of timber logged by local communities and would result in a loss of jobs.

ENERGY LABS bill combines federal, industry research efforts.

Legislation (S 2566) that would encourage Energy Department laboratories to collaborate with private industry to develop cutting-edge technology won the voice vote approval yesterday of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

According to Chairman J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., Energy Department laboratories are some of the best in the federal government but have been prohibited from sharing their research.

The measure would direct the Energy secretary to ensure that the labs enter into partnerships with private companies and educational institutions to study such issues as energy efficiency, energy supply and high-performance computing.

Panel members approved, by voice vote, an amendment that would add energy conservation and cancer as areas of research. It would also direct the Energy secretary to encourage the department's scientists and engineers to serve as visiting researchers in the laboratories or facilities of foreign governments.

• The panel also approved, by voice vote, a bill (HR 2556) that would prohibit

development of an 85-mile stretch of three rivers in the Los Padres National Forest, located on the California Coast.

NATIVE HAWAIIAN health-care plan OK'd by Senate panel.

Legislation to expand federal health assistance for native Hawaiians received quick voice vote approval yesterday by the Senate Indian Affairs Committee.

The measure (S 2681) would reauthorize the 1988 Native Hawaiian Health Care Act through fiscal 2001. The health-care program, which received \$11 million last year, promotes disease prevention and primary health care among Hawaii's native population.

The bill would expand and diversify the role of Papa Ola Lokahi, the native Hawaiian health board, which would coordinate health-care services provided to native Hawaiians.

Native Hawaiians, who make up 20 percent of the population of Hawaii, have a high mortality rate compared to the rest of the country.

PACIFIC YEW tree protected for cancer-treating properties.

A House Agriculture subcommittee approved a measure (HR 3836) yesterday that would ensure a sustainable harvest of the Pacific Yew tree. The tree's bark has been found to contain Taxol, a substance that has been highly successful in treating some forms of cancer.

The bill would make sure that the yew trees are harvested from federal forests before other trees are cut and that the yews are cut down in such a way to allow the stump to sprout new growth.

The Forests Subcommittee approved, by voice vote, a substitute version offered by Chairman Harold L. Volkmer, D-Mo., that included a new section calling for an end to federal management of the Pacific Yew if the Health and Human Services, Interior and Agriculture departments agree that the need for Taxol can be sufficiently met without harvesting more yew trees. This provision was added in case a chemical substitute for Taxol is developed.

The Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee will take up the bill today.

BASE TURNOVER bill gets House Energy subcommittee nod.

A bill that would make it easier for the federal government to turn over abandoned military installations and other federal sites to local governments and businesses received speedy voice vote approval from the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Transportation and Hazardous Materials.

The bill seeks to alleviate some of the economic hardship for communities near military bases that are closing.

The legislation would amend the 1980

"superfund" toxic-waste cleanup law to allow the federal government to transfer uncontaminated portions of federal lands.

Currently local use of uncontaminated lands is generally blocked until the whole site is cleaned up, even if only a small portion of a military base is tainted.

The bill would set up a new process under superfund in which federal agencies with jurisdiction over the properties would identify uncontaminated areas that could be speedily put to new use.

State regulators would have to agree with federal officials who have jurisdiction over these lands that an area was "clean." In the case of properties on the national priorities list — the most hazardous sites — the Environmental Protection Agency would have to concur.

Subcommittee Chairman Al Swift, D-Wash., said the bill strikes a balance between the need to speed up the turnover of abandoned federal sites while complying with federal environmental laws.

PENNSYLVANIA AVE. improvement OK'd by House Interior.

In a quick meeting yesterday, the House Interior Committee approved one bill on its agenda and postponed action on another.

The panel approved, by voice vote, HR 4999, which would authorize additional funds for three years to carry out the Pennsylvania Avenue Development Corp.'s development plan. Since it was first authorized in 1975, the corporation has coordinated the redevelopment of the historic boulevard linking the Capitol and the White House.

The measure would authorize \$2.7 million for fiscal 1993 and such sums as necessary for fiscal 1994 and 1995.

• The committee put off until next week action on HR 2660, a bill that would reauthorize funds for a U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council through 2000.

John J. Rhodes III, R-Ariz., requested the postponement so that members would have more time to study the legislation.

URBAN CRISIS issue dominates Hill, White House meetings.

Discussions on the problems facing America's cities, in the wake of the Los Angeles riots, continued yesterday on Capitol Hill.

Ten mayors warned Congress that riots could strike other large cities any day. They urged the Senate Banking Committee to endorse a plan by the U.S. Conference of Mayors to channel \$35 billion into rebuilding cities and creating jobs.

"I urge that there be action today, not because there was a riot in Los Angeles... but there's an ongoing daily riot in every city in America," Atlanta Mayor Maynard Jackson told the panel.

"This is a matter of national secu-

city," said Baltimore Mayor Kurt Schmoke. "I hope that nobody is thinking that it's all over with, that there was one explosion and that it's really not going to happen again," he said.

He urged Congress to declare a state of emergency and channel defense savings to cities, a plan that would be prohibited under the 1990 budget law.

• In a related action, House Republicans met privately yesterday with Housing and Urban Development Secretary Jack F. Kemp, Attorney General William P. Barr, Office of Management and Budget Director Richard G. Darman and White House Chief of Staff Samuel K. Skinner to discuss the aftermath of the Los Angeles riot.

Kemp told reporters afterward that he had discussed with the GOP members his proposals to create enterprise zones, which would give federal tax incentives to businesses that open in the inner city, and to allow public housing tenets to buy their own homes. He said that they didn't discuss how to pay for the initiatives.

And President Bush announced yesterday that he had raised to at least \$1.2 billion the amount of emergency aid available for Los Angeles riot victims and said he hoped it would show "we are serious" about action.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the Federal Home Loan Bank Board would provide \$600 million in low-interest loans for those hurt by the three days of riots.

Bush had earlier approved \$600 million in emergency aid to help citizens and businesses rebuild, using loans and grants from the Small Business Administration and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

TROPICAL WOOD imports should be labeled, panel told.

Environmentalists yesterday urged a House Energy and Commerce subcommittee to require that wood or wood products from tropical rain forests be labeled as such.

Lori Udall of the Environmental Defense Fund told the Commerce, Consumer Protection and Competitiveness panel that "the destruction of the tropical rain forests is an international tragedy."

"Consumers in the United States can play a role in slowing the destruction by limiting their consumption... and making an informed choice in the wood they purchase," she said.

The bill (HR 2854) would require that tropical wood and wood products be labeled with the country of origin and the type of wood.

Proponents say that rain forests, which may be home to half of the world's plant and animal species, are being cut down at an alarming rate. Scientists say the deforestation may upset the world's ecosystem because tropical forests absorb carbon dioxide.

Some believe a buildup of carbon dioxide can lead to global warming.

Some manufacturers oppose the legislation. Susan Perry of the Business and Institutional Furniture Manufacturer's Association called the labeling requirements unachievable, saying that most products are made from many types of wood.

C-17 PROGRAM mismanaged say DOD officials.

Department of Defense officials said yesterday that the Air Force and the McDonnell Douglas Corp. mishandled the multibillion dollar contract for the C-17 military transport plane.

Testifying before the House Government Operations Subcommittee on Legislation and National Security, Derek Vander Schaaf, deputy inspector general at DOD, said the Air Force violated departmental acquisition procedures by making payments to McDonnell Douglas based on the financial needs of the com-

pany rather than demonstrated progress.

Vander Schaaf added that the Air Force altered its contract with McDonnell Douglas to allow the company to deliver its first C-17 prototype, even though the plane was only 80 percent completed.

"We believe prudent management would have dictated that senior DOD officials be appraised of the status of the program before the acceptance decision," Vander Schaaf said, referring to the delivery of the incomplete plane.

Reports of cost overruns, delays and design flaws such as fuel leaks and faulty wing rivets have plagued the C-17 program.

Subcommittee Chairman John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., called for a cancellation of the program in light of domestic needs.

But ranking Republican Frank Horton, N.Y., called on Congress to exercise caution and wait until DOD completes its investigation of the program in the coming months. ■

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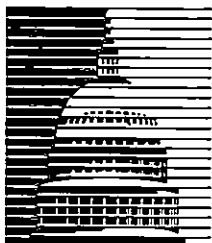

REMARKS BY THE PRESIDENT
AT MATERNAL AND INFANT HEALTH EVENT

The Rose Garden

11:16 A.M. EDT

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you, Lou -- thank you, Secretary Sullivan. And welcome, everyone. Let me just pay a special thanks to Senator Dale Bumpers and to Congressman Tom Bliley, who have been spearheading many of our prenatal and immunization initiatives on Capitol Hill. They are true leaders for this cause and we're delighted to see you all here today.

Also to Jim Mason, our Assistant Secretary for Health; Bill Roper from Atlanta, doing a superb job as our Director at CDC. And a warm welcome to representatives of the Advertising Council and to all the very special mothers and children who are with us today.

Yesterday, on Mother's Day, millions of Americans took time to appreciate the miracle of motherhood. And we thank the mothers who brought us into this world, who taught us our first lessons about life and love and character. And today we're taking some vital steps to help American mothers, their children and their families. We're announcing improved standards and a new action plan for immunization. And we're beginning a public service ad campaign to promote an innovative prenatal care program called Healthy Start, the program Dr. Sullivan referred to.

Every year in America thousands of babies are delivered at dangerously low birth weights, and too many of these babies die or suffer chronic illness as a result. Thousands of our young children suffer crippling effects each year from measles and other communicable childhood diseases, and some even die. But the saddest fact of all is this: most of this death and disease is easily preventable through immunization and through better prenatal care. And to the extent they are preventable they too often reflect bad health choices stemming from ignorance of good health behavior or absence of a defined sense of personal responsibility by the parents.

All of our maternal and child health programs are being improved, integrated, and developed to promote the principles of innovation, of community involvement and personal responsibility. We are using new and creative approaches to bringing high-risk women into care. To attack this problem we are mobilizing the nation's best ideas and resources. The hallmarks of our plan can be summed up in two words: immunization and action.

Last June I stood here in the Rose Garden with the Secretary to call for a stronger immunization effort. We sent out teams to six areas of our country to determine how we could do it better. And we learned lessons that we're not applying nationwide. I was pleased to be a part of the visit to San Diego in February, and happy that representatives of all six communities that we looked at are here with us today.

Today we're announcing a new action plan to get our children vaccinated when it makes the greatest difference -- before the age of two. The plan requires more effective coordination to

MORE

promote vaccination among the various federal agencies that serve children.

We're helping states and localities with their own immunization plans. And our administration's budget for immunization continues to respond to the need for Fiscal '93. We're seeking an increase to \$349 million.

We're also announcing new standards for pediatric immunization -- the work of an expert panel representing many private and public sector organizations. And they're going to help clinics improve their method to provide vaccination to kids who need them the most.

I salute the leaders again of the Advertising Council for all the volunteer time and talent that you have organized for the cause of infant mortality. And I know that public service ad campaigns such as this work. Think of the success of other Ad Council campaigns for kicking the smoking habit, for seatbelt use, for screening for cancer. All such efforts help people show greater responsibility in their own behavior.

Now, I've often thought that the same sort of diligent use of marketing science and communications talents could help motivate Americans to address other problems involving personal responsibility -- for instance, in keeping families together, encouraging responsible sexual behavior and other matters of personal and family well-being. And so I'm confident that the Ad Council's new campaign will have strong and positive results.

The Council's messages will emphasize that the health of pregnant women and their unborn babies is a matter of concern to every member of a civilized society. And when an expectant mother is financially needy or without a husband or a family to support her, it is all the more urgent for good neighbors to show that they care.

The Ad Council's first message, therefore, targets the general public. And it calls on all of us for action. The theme that you'll soon be hearing on television is this: We must not accept high rates of infant deaths because this is America.

The second announcement will impress upon men the importance of their role. Whether a man is an unborn child's father or another family member or friend, there is much he can and should do to help an expectant mother. We cannot understate male responsibility.

The third announcement will tell women that proper care begins long before the baby is born. Consider this: Babies born after a pregnancy with no prenatal care are four times more likely to die than those whose mothers received care beginning in the first trimester.

The full series assures pregnant women in need that they are not alone. Care is available. And good neighbors are being mobilized to help.

The Healthy Start approach represents what we should be doing to solve our social problems -- local solutions, local control, local accountability. The first 15 Healthy Start communities were chosen from a long list of applicants. And I understand that representatives of many of these communities from around the nation are here today. And thank you all for your good work.

We're not weighing down these community initiatives with burdensome federal mandates and command-and-control regulations. We're seeking to empower neighborhood volunteers in local governments to invent effective new ways to help save babies lives and keep babies and their mothers strong and healthy.

Healthy Start successes will come from people who see neighbors in need and ask, what can I do to help? And they follow through on their generous impulses. And they keep noticing and helping more people. I'm talking about people like Minnie Thomas in Oakland, California -- an energetic grandmother, she was helping drug abusers when she learned there was no facility for drug abusers who became pregnant. So she opened her own facility called Solid Foundation. And 47 kids have been born to mothers at Solid Foundation and not one suffered from low birth weight.

Here in Washington, Tawana Fortune-Jones is the woman with the Mom Van, and she knocks on doors in neighborhoods where infant mortality is high. She's enlisted the cooperation of doctors and clinics to establish a Healthy Start Pregnancy Register. And she drives the Mom Van. And each morning at 7:00 a.m. she begins picking up women and taking them to doctors offices. And afterwards she takes them home and then she shuttles another group in the afternoon. She's a friend to women who have no other friends, and she's saved and bettered the lives of hundreds of babies.

And she's here with us today -- Tawana where are you now? Right over here -- Tawana, good neighbors are the heroes of our cities and you're the model of a good neighbor. (Applause.) And thank you for what you do.

Unbelievable as it may seem, the innovations of Healthy Start ran into resistance up in Congress, where they are still too much wedded to the old bureaucratic ways of doing things. I'm optimistic, though. I believe our approach for empowering people with new ideas is the way of the future. And our crusade for preventive health care for infants and expectant mothers will move a step further when we reform this -- overall reform of the health insurance system. I've proposed making every American able to afford a basic health insurance plan of his choice, using credits or vouchers. And through the market system, we would provide needy Americans better health care than they now receive.

These two efforts represent a new way of solving our problems in infant mortality and immunization. Our guiding principle is to reach out -- and reach out to young parents, make sure they know what they need to do and then help them to do it. Reach out to community organizations. Reach out to the private sector. And reach across the artificial lines in our government so that any program that touches young children and their parents will become an opportunity point for better health.

We have new kinds of problems and so we've got to think in new ways. And we need to think about all the opportunities that we have to draw in young families who may be left out today, to help them, to inform them. We need to enlist them and enlist our communities to work together to help them. All the community organizations have a tremendous role to play. It's already worked in our six demonstration immunization cities, and I am confident that it's going to work in Healthy Start and in more immunization communities all around this great country.

Thank you all for your leadership. Again, my respects to the two members of Congress here. Thank the doctors here and thank all of you working in the communities to make life just a little better for the kids and for the families out there. Thank you all for coming. (Applause.)

Transportation is an essential part of America -- its history, its culture, its security, and its progress. Our Nation's transportation system has not only enabled our citizens to enjoy unparalleled personal mobility but also encouraged the growth of industry and commerce, thereby strengthening our American heritage of freedom and prosperity.

The United States has always been a Nation on the move. From the sea lanes that served coastal towns and cities to the wagon trails and railroad lines forged across the frontier -- our transportation network made possible the settlement and development of America.

Amidst the strife of more recent wars, transportation has carried our armed forces to far-flung regions of the world and provided them with the materiel needed to defend our national interests. In each instance, millions of civilians in the transportation industry have assisted in the mobilization of our troops despite tremendous logistical challenges. Thus, transportation has played a key role in America's military preparedness, as well as in its social and economic development.

Even as we note the high levels of mobility and security that we enjoy today, we also recognize the need for continuing investments and improvements in American transportation. Efforts to strengthen our transportation infrastructure will create jobs and economic growth while enhancing the safety and efficiency of our roads, air routes, public transit systems, and waterways. This is the mandate set forth by the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991, which I signed into law last year, and our commitment to its goals and to other objectives of our National Transportation Policy will help move us toward a bright future.

In recognition of the importance of transportation and of the millions of Americans who work to meet our transportation needs, the Congress, by joint resolution approved May 16, 1957 (36 U.S.C. 160), has requested that the third Friday in May of each year be designated as "National Defense Transportation Day" and, by joint resolution approved May 14, 1962 (36 U.S.C. 166), that the week in which that Friday falls be proclaimed "National Transportation Week."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE BUSH, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim Friday, May 15, 1992, as National Defense Transportation Day and the week of May 10 through May 16, 1992, as National Transportation Week. I urge all Americans to observe these occasions with appropriate

A PROCLAMATION

Each year traumatic injury strikes almost one in four Americans, tragically ending the lives of some 150,000 people and afflicting millions more with temporary or permanent disabilities. This devastating loss of human life and potential is all the more regrettable because it is often preventable. In most instances, traumatic injury can be avoided; and when trauma does strike, its impact on individuals can be greatly reduced through proper treatment and rehabilitation.

While each of us is a potential trauma victim, young people are particularly vulnerable. The Department of Health and Human Services reports that traumatic injuries cause more childhood deaths than all diseases combined and account for 80 percent of all deaths among adolescents. Among all age groups, young adults who are between 25 and 44 years old account for the highest number of fatal traumatic injuries -- some 50,000 deaths annually.

The economic costs of traumatic injury, including health care expenses and lost productivity, total in the tens of billions of dollars each year. We cannot, however, even begin to measure the sum of personal pain and suffering that are experienced by victims and their families.

Fortunately, the threat of traumatic injury can be reduced significantly when we use common sense and apply well-established safety precautions. We have, for example, witnessed an encouraging decline in deaths due to motor vehicle collisions -- the leading cause of fatal trauma -- since Americans began to increase their use of safety belts and to lower their intake of alcohol. Our success in reducing fatal motor vehicle collisions is but one indication of how much we have learned about preventing traumatic injuries.

We have also learned that, when serious traumatic injuries do occur, rapid transport, prompt treatment, and early rehabilitation of the victim provide the best means of minimizing physical, emotional, and financial costs. Thus, our Nation is indebted to the thousands of professionals and volunteers who serve on the front lines of trauma care: the emergency medical personnel who stand ready to answer calls for assistance at all hours of the day and night; the rehabilitation specialists who work patiently with trauma victims so that they can recover as quickly and as fully as possible; and the physicians and scientists who are working to improve related therapies and technologies.

Our national commitment to overcoming traumatic injury has borne fruit. Further progress, of course, will require the continuing efforts of men and women in many fields -- including health care, education, government, transportation, law, and engineering. By combining existing knowledge and proven health and safety measures with promising new developments in research, we can more successfully treat and prevent traumatic injury.

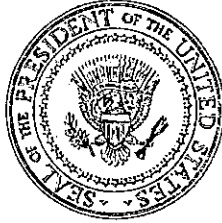

John F. Bookout served as president and chief executive officer of Shell Oil Company from May 1976 through June 1988. He joined Shell Oil in 1950 as a geologist in the Tulsa, Oklahoma area and served in positions of increasing responsibility throughout his career with Shell.

Born in Shreveport, Louisiana, Mr. Bookout graduated from the University of Texas with B.S. and M.A. degrees in geology. He also holds honorary degrees of Doctor of Science from Tulane University and Doctor of Laws from Centenary College. He received the 1981 Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Texas and the 1985 Distinguished Graduate Award from the University of Texas Geology Foundation.

Mr. Bookout is a member of the Supervisory Board of Royal Dutch Petroleum Company and is also on the Board and Executive Committee of Shell Petroleum, Inc.

He is on the Board of Directors of McDermott International Inc., Corporate Partners, The Investment Company of America, and Methodist Hospital of Houston. SUBJECT: Third Quarter 1991 DAWN Data

On Wednesday, May 13, 1992, HHS intends to release third quarter 1991 data from the Drug Abuse Warning Network (DAWN), showing hospital emergency room events that are drug-related.

DAWN shows the consequences of drug use, not the frequency, but it is taken to be a general indicator of hard-core drug use.

✓ The DAWN figures have increased for three straight quarters and are now back to their level between the third and fourth quarters of 1989.

However, this new data to be released is from last July through September. It is old news. We saw increases in cocaine and heroin use in the 1991 Household Survey data released in January.

The increase in DAWN shows that we are fighting a two-front war. Against casual use and use by adolescents we are continuing to make significant progress. Adolescent drug use is at its lowest level since 1975.

Against hard-core use progress is more difficult. The data show that the increases in DAWN occurred among older users. More than half of the increase occurred in central cities, especially among Hispanics and whites. Previously, the major increases had been among blacks.

The Administration anticipated the problem with hard-core use in the first National Drug Control Strategy and has for two years proposed specific targeted programmatic initiatives to target hard-core and at-risk populations with expanded treatment and prevention programs. Congress has cut the Administration's request for these programs.

Nagorno-Karabakh

- We understand your concerns about the escalation of the fighting in both Nagorno-Karabakh and in Nakhichevan [Na KEE CHEE van]. We too, are very disturbed.
- I appreciate the domestic pressure to act that you must be under. But again, we urge you to avoid any military intervention.
- I can assure you that we have urged similar restraint on Armenia.
- I spoke with President Ter Petrosian over the weekend. I expressed our view that he must try to restrain Armenian forces in Nagorno-Karabakh. He said that he was concerned about Turkish intentions, specifically the threat of your possible intervention.
- I told him that our governments had been in touch on this issue. I told him that I was confident that you would show restraint and not intervene in this conflict.
- In our view, all sides bear responsibility for defusing this crisis.
- We believe the best next step is for all sides to stop the fighting and commit to participate in the June peace conference being organized by the CSCE.
- We understand there may have been some progress made during the meetings between Armenia and Azerbaijan in Iran last week.

- I know you spoke with our Ambassador on this subject. I just want to emphasize how important this operation is to ensuring that we don't face another refugee crisis. Your support will be key.

Cyprus (If raised)

- We understand that the UN talks in Nicosia are going very well.
- We really need your help now in getting Denktash to agree to return territory and accept some few Greek Cypriots to their property in the north as provided by the UN resolution.

((If there's one thing Millie hates, it's being called a "fat cat."))

I'm delighted to be here tonight, with the men and women who are going to change America. I know there's been a lot of talk about change this election year. And most of it has been just that -- talk. But the time for talk is over.

America needs men and women of purpose, of experience, people who know how to get things done. We need people who aren't afraid to rattle the business-as-usual crowd. We need people who will stand up to the status quo -- who'll tell them the old ways of doing things just aren't good enough anymore.

What we need, ladies and gentlemen, is a Republican president and a Republican Congress. That's what we're moving toward tonight, with your generous help. And that's how we will build a better America -- an America that preserves peace in the world, that sustains strong families, that provides rewarding jobs for all.

Over the past three years, I've spoken often of the need for reform. I've made specific and far-reaching proposals to change

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our education system, and our health care system. I've made proposals to reform our legal system and our election campaigns.

Right down the line, on issue after issue, the Republican party has proposed fundamental changes to solve the problems that burden our country.

And against heavy odds, we've had our successes. But you know as well as I that we've come up against some obstacles in the past three years. We know who they are, and believe me, so do the American people.

The obstacles to genuine reform in America are the special interests -- small, entrenched constituencies who put their narrow wants before the common good. They block change because change threatens the status quo, and their power is out of all proportion to their size.

Yes, the special interests are well-organized. Yes, they're well-connected. And heaven knows they're well-financed -- after all, they were able to buy their very own political party. But there's another thing about the special interests: On one issue after another, they're wrong.

And they're about to learn a painful lesson this election year: The American people have had enough of the way they do business.

Let me give you a few examples.

It used to be that a doctor's first worry was about the care of the patient -- not the threat of a malpractice suit. Every American knows what I'm talking about: lawsuit madness. Doctors

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not delivering babies -- parents not coaching Little League -- volunteers not helping the elderly -- all from fear of nuisance lawsuits.

That's just plain wrong. That is not the kind of America we want. People should spend more time helping each other and less time suing each other.

We've been trying to do something about that. Shortly after I took office, we joined with Senator Kasten to support his bill to reform product liability laws. That was in 1989. But the liberal Democrats, coached by the special interests, refused to budge. So we introduced it again in '91. And guess what -- Senate Democrats refuse to bring it up for a vote. Over in the House our reform is bottled up in two committees.

Make no mistake: We will ensure that every American's rights are protected. But we will reform our legal system to get rid of these frivolous lawsuits -- and no lobby of trial lawyers will stand in the way.

Here's another example. It used to be that when we sent our kids to school, we knew they were going to get a first-class education. They'd learn how to read and write and multiply and divide, and they'd learn something about the world. And we knew the values we taught them at home would be reinforced in the classroom -- like knowing the difference between right and wrong.

But now we consider ourselves lucky if we can send our kids to schools where they don't find a gun in someone's locker, or

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catch some punk dealing drugs on the playground. And in the classroom, our educational performance is sliding every year.

That's wrong. That's got to change. We must reinvent American education, top-to-bottom -- for our kids, and for our teachers, who too often have to double as social workers, counselors, even surrogate parents. God bless America's teachers for the work they do.

We know how to help them. Our America 2000 reforms are gaining steam, community by community. We're encouraging break-the-mold schools, world-class standards and voluntary testing; we're fighting to give teachers and communities maximum flexibility. We've got to rid our schools of drugs and violence. And whether it's among public schools, private or religious, parents must have the freedom to choose their children's schools.

This is a revolution long-overdue. And the entrenched special interests, the business-as-usual-crowd, the liberal Democrats had all best understand: This revolution is going to happen, with or without the permission of the education lobby and its friends in Congress.

Another example: It used to be that going to the hospital didn't conjure up visions of financial ruin. American health care is still the best in the world, but too many Americans can't qualify for health insurance or can't afford it. The cost of even minor surgery has gone through the roof.

This too has got to change. And we know how to change it. Our health care reform is comprehensive; it preserves what works,

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changes what doesn't. It makes health insurance accessible and affordable -- without throwing out the highest-quality care in the world.

Of course, the other side doesn't like our reform. For them, freedom of choice -- whether in medical care, education or child care -- will always take a back seat to some bureaucratic mandate. They've got other ideas -- very expensive ones, as always. They can call it "national health insurance," "pay-or-play," whatever they'd like. But any way you cut it, it means higher taxes and limits on health care. Nationalized health care would be a national disaster. We are not going to let government dictate the American people's health care.

You see, no matter what the problem, the special interests and their clients who control Congress want a program -- some vast, unaccountable bureaucracy they can manipulate for their own purposes. You'll remember our friends on the Left used to talk about "getting on the right side of history." Well, they were wrong about which side history was on.

It wasn't theirs. It was ours. A movement sweeps the world today: a movement away from bureaucratic mandates and central planning and towards the freely made decisions of individual men and women. And there's a reason freedom is on the march from Managua to Moscow. Think back to the 1980s, to the climax of the Cold War. Liberal Democrats called for gutting the defense budget, then for a nuclear freeze, then for an end to weapons modernization. But the Republican party was there to say: No!

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We stood squarely with the American people ^{FOR A STRONG DEFENSE.} ~~FOR A STRONG DEFENSE.~~
And because we stood firm, imperial communism today is a four-
letter word: D-E-A-D.

The Republican party has always sensed the inevitability of freedom's march. It is woven into everything we are as a party. Recall the first Republican president. Government's highest calling, Lincoln said, was "to lift artificial weights from all shoulders, to clear the paths of laudable pursuit for all."

[[The failures of the past were brought home to us with tragic intensity in recent days. As you know, I visited Los Angeles last week to listen to the citizens there. -- The stories they told -- of simple acts of courage, and of spiritless despair -- renewed my belief that the old ways have failed us; that the solutions of government planners and social engineers breed dependency rather than dignity, hopelessness instead of pride.

We have tried for years to bring to the wrenching problems of the inner-city a new approach -- an approach rooted in personal responsibility, community control, and individual opportunity. But our efforts to encourage investment and jobs through enterprise zones -- to instill the pride of homeownership and a sense of community through the program we call HOPE -- to give greater autonomy to parents and local authorities -- far too many of these have been frustrated by those committed, whether in good faith or ill, to the hidebound ways of yesterday.

Here, perhaps, is the silver lining to the storm clouds that threatened a great city for 48 hours of terror. From these

tragic events we can take renewed courage to cast aside the dogmas of the past, and to do as Lincoln did: "to think anew and act anew."]]

That is our mission today, and we will see it through, as a party and a nation -- the greatest, freest nation on earth.

A strong majority of the respondents, 61 percent, said the nation was spending "too little" on improving the conditions of black Americans, up from 35 percent who expressed that view in 1988. President Bush was given poor marks by both blacks and whites for his response to the riots. Moreover, 53 percent of all whites and 76 percent of all blacks said they disapproved of the way Bush was handling race relations in general....

Forty-three percent of the whites and 66 percent of the blacks said they were dissatisfied with Bush's response to the rioting in Los Angeles, compared to 41 percent of all whites and 26 percent of all blacks who said they were satisfied with it.

Thewitt has one objective: to attach a special bar to the satellite's face and slowly stop it from spinning. The Endeavor's crew will then maneuver both the astronaut and satellite into the shuttle's cargo bay where it will be repaired and relaunched into the correct orbit. With a new shuttle and a new NASA administrator, the space program hopes to rise above the criticism about spending so much money to go into space when America has so many troubles back here on earth.

(NASA Administrator Goldin: "I think we have to do a better job at expressing to the American people where we believe we ought to go and get the American people to understand and buy in.")

L.A./POLITICS

ABC's Forest Sawyer: While L.A. is still struggling to recover from the disaster of the riots that shook the city, politicians have been quick to jump on a new campaign issue -- Democrats and Republicans squaring off over what really caused the violence.

ABC's Kathleen DeLaski: After criticisms from victims of the slowness of federal help, the government began accepting applications for grants and disaster loans today. While in Washington, politicians continued blaming each other for the riots.

(Mayor Flynn of Boston; This Week With David Brinkley: "It wasn't the decision of 12 jurors. It was 12 years of urban neglect on the part of the national government.")

(Secretary Kemp, This Week With David Brinkley: "That's a little bit harsh and is far from the fact when we're spending \$800 billion this year on social -- welfare, helping people, direct aid to the people.")

Kemp engineered much of the President's so-called emergency agenda announced Friday, including tax breaks for inner-city businesses and financial incentives so that public housing tenants might buy their homes. Interviewed this morning, the Vice President called on Congress to pass the President's plan by Memorial Day.

(Vice President Quayle, Face The Nation: "Put politics aside for a moment, please.")

But he did not put politics aside. Minutes later he strongly implied there would be room for compromise on this conservative agenda.

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(Vice President Quayle, outside CBS: "I would hope that the Congress learned with the rest of America that the current structure, the current policy, the current philosophy did not work.")

The President said this is not the time to play the blame game, but it seems politicians, even those who work for him, just can't help themselves. (ABC-3)

L.A./POLL

Chung reports the L.A. riots have dramatically changed the attitudes of white Americans regarding what the government should be doing for black Americans.

CBS's Eric Engberg says for a majority of Americans, the tragedy of L.A. has served as a wake-up call on the dangers of a divided society. The first CBS News/New York Times poll since the riot found that 63% of the public feels government is not paying enough attention to the problems of blacks and other minorities.

(Kathleen Frankovic, Director of Surveys, CBS: "Among white Americans there has been an enormous shift. We've seen a doubling in the number of white Americans that think the government isn't paying enough attention to the needs of blacks.")

The concern goes well beyond what government is doing. Two-thirds of those polled believed race relations in the country are generally bad. But if race is an issue in the fall, the President has problems. Nearly half [46%] of those we polled were dissatisfied with his reaction to the L.A. crisis. And more than half [56%] were dissatisfied by his overall handling of race relations. On the question of who to vote for if the election were held today, both Bill Clinton and Ross Perot continue to peck at the President's lead: President Bush -- 36%, Bill Clinton -- 30%, H. Ross Perot -- 25%. Politics aside, there's wide agreement between blacks and whites that government should focus on jobs, training, and better police training to help minorities. For now, the nations' attention has been captured by the issues of race and poverty. Nearly three-fourths of those we polled think Los Angeles was a clear warning to the country, not just an isolated case. But there is a feeling that the problems are both deep rooted and intractable. A majority of people said the potential for urban riots will be there 25 years from now just as it was 25 years ago.

Chung: President Bush had criticized the 1960 social programs, and then he rescinded blaming them for the riots. How did the people polled feel about that.

Engberg: It almost looks like the White House when it backed off its idea of blaming the Great Society programs had some hint that that idea was playing very well in the polls. Because our polls showed, for example, that 60% of the people said that either none or not much of the problems we saw in L.A. were due to the Great Society programs, whereas 40% said that a lot of the blame should be placed on the Reagan and Bush Administrations for inattention to the problems of the city. (CBS-4)

L.A./CENSUS

Chung reports the Census Bureau released figures tonight that shed some light on life in riot-torn south-central L.A. They show that the poverty rate was 32.9% -- almost three times the national average. (CBS-5)

URBAN PROBLEMS

NBC's Garrick Utley reports on the big debate over what government can or should do to help alleviate those problems [urban problems]. President Bush has criticized the Great Society program of the 1960s. With us now is Joseph Califano, who was a key adviser on that Great Society program to President Johnson.

Califano: ...Aid for Dependent Children was a New Deal program. President Johnson repeatedly said get rid of the rule that says a husband has to leave his wife and kids in order for them to get any help when he's out of work. He was unsuccessful in doing that. I don't know why President Bush would criticize that because he takes the same position....

Utley: ...Given the economic conditions today compared to the 1960s, even if government wanted to do more, could it do more?

Califano: What government can do is have a public works program which can put people to work right away.... Two, get drug programs into the ghetto. You are never going to clean the inner city up unless you deal with the drug problem. Three, get rid of the guns. (NBC-4)

MILITARY/ASPIN

Chung reports Rep. Aspin is calling for a bigger Army-National Guard force than the Pentagon wants. Aspin said today the total troop strength should be between 375,000 and 380,000 by the end of 1997. That's about 40,000 more than the Pentagon's target. (CBS-8)

DRUGS

Sawyer says new Justice Department figures show police agencies are giving high priority to the war on drugs. In 1990 nearly 19,000 officers were assigned full-time to special drug units. Many of those officers paid a price, not only putting themselves in the line of fire but facing the danger of becoming addicts themselves. (ABC-7)

LOGGING IN THE NORTHWEST

NBC's Robin Lloyd reports environmentalists say the scarred mountain slopes of federal land in the Northwest provide vivid testimony to the legacy of clear cutting. (Rep. George Miller (D): "If we continue with the status quo and we don't pass some kind of forestry reform practices in the Congress, we have simply made the conscience decision to screw the next generation out of their inheritance.") (NBC-6)

ABC -- THIS WEEK WITH DAVID BRINKLEY

Moderator: Sam Donaldson. **Panel:** George Will, Cokie Roberts.

Guests: Mayor Emmanuel Cleaver, II, Kansas City, MO; Mayor Flynn, Boston, MA; Secretary Kemp.

Guest: Mayor Emmanuel Cleaver

Donaldson: ...Are we dealing with a racial problem or are we dealing with some other sort of problem when we talk about the plight of the cities?... Is it a money problem?

Cleaver: We certainly need to put more money in than we put in. In the 1970's the poverty level was 11 percent, the poverty rate was 11 percent. Today it's 15 percent. So we are going backwards. We need more money....

Donaldson: How are you going to get the white suburbs to vote more taxes, to pay for money for the inner cities?

Cleaver: First of all, we need a President and Washington leadership who is willing to go to the laboratory to come up with an anecdote for the compassion fatigue that, in part, they created....

Will: Let's continue on the subject of the compassion fatigue, as you call it, in the underclass. What a lot of Americans of goodwill say is it is a fact...that the expansion of domestic spending targeted toward the inner cities...coincided with the expansion of the intractable underclass to which you refer. These people of goodwill say it isn't working, whatever it was. Now, tell me why they're wrong.

Cleaver: They're wrong.... There are minorities all over this country who are now in the middle class because of the federal spending.... I think that the problem is that the black middle class was created during the days of the federal programs, and the reason that the middle class is no longer growing is because the federal funds are not coming in, to bring more people up into the growing middle class.

Roberts: ...Isn't there a growing attitude that [self help] is where the problem really needs to be solved?

Cleaver: There is a need for self-help, and I think minorities need to understand...that we need to deal with some problems internally, but I also believe that self-help is not the cure-all. We need help from Washington....

Donaldson: ...Can you have racial harmony with separate but equal divisions in society and blocks where people live and where people go to school and where people work?

Cleaver: We cannot, and that's where I think the leadership comes in, whether it's the mayor and certainly the President and the members of the Cabinet. I mean, race-baiting is the meanest species of politics, and I think we've had that. We've got to make race an issue today in order that it will not be an issue tomorrow. The leadership on the race question must come from the highest levels of government, and I think that right now there is no emphasis on integration. The racial isolation exists because we have not made it a significant piece of the discussion.

Guest: Mayor Flynn

Flynn: ...The riot started a long time ago. It wasn't the decision of 12 jurors. It was 12 years of urban neglect on the part of the national government. They have allowed poverty, injustice, to go on and on and on. Everybody has sat on the sidelines, allowed it to take place. Nobody has said anything. Nobody has done anything: Democrats, Republicans, the White House, the Congress....

Will: You locate the start of this riot with some precision. It was 12 years ago when the Republicans came to power in Washington. Democrats have been ruling in most cities, however. Can you tell us how things were really good in the late 1970's and precisely why they got really bad when the Republicans got the White House?

Flynn: ...There are a number of positive things that are happening in our cities that unfortunately get ignored.... Unfortunately, it requires a partnership.... One of those partners is no longer there, and that is the federal government. They have walked away from the issue of jobs, the economy, affordable housing, dealing with families in our communities. They are the ones that, in large respect, are responsible for what is happening in cities, not only in Los Angeles....

Guest: Jack Kemp

Donaldson: ...Do you agree that it was the Great Society programs of the '60s that caused the riots?

Kemp: The Great Society did not cause the riots. It was solely predicated on building a net under which people should not be allowed to fall. It didn't spend any time trying to build a ladder upon which people can climb out of poverty, and that's what the President wants to do -- build a ladder of opportunity.

Will: ...Are there any of the great welfare programs, principally Great Society programs, that you think ought to be repealed -- Medicare, Medicaid, Head Start, Job Corps, the '68 Housing Act?

Kemp: No, those are good programs by and large. Everything can be reformed and made better.

Will: What we're trying to put our finger is the moral as well as the material causes of what's gone wrong in our cities. What is your belief? Is there a moral dimension to this, and how did it get there?

Kemp: Certainly, values are at the heart of all solutions to problems. The family is the best teacher of values. The government doesn't create wealth. People who work and save and invest create wealth..... Our welfare system needs to be converted from simply encouraging people towards consumption, towards savings, towards accumulation of property, towards entrepreneurship and ownership of a home, a job, a good education, and educational choice. That is the predicate around which the President announced some rather radical and progressive ideas of reform in the inner-city education, inner-city job climate, inner-city housing conditions.

Roberts: ...You have been beating at the door of the White House with those ideas for three years, and you have gotten back memoranda that we have read, saying, "These are not our issues. This is not where the Republican party should be going," talking about urban issues. First of all, is it a Republican issue, and is it changed?

Kemp: ...This is America's problem. There is a moral obligation....

Roberts: ...The Congress passed enterprise zones in the tax bill that the President just vetoed. He just vetoed enterprise zones, and when he did that he did not call it separately.... Why don't you pass it separately?"

Kemp: He has said. He has asked. With all due respect, it's fair to have this debate, but the President of the United States has been asking for enterprise zones in every state of the union for three years....

Roberts: ...Does the Republican party now think this is their issue, these are their voters, or does the Republican party think that the way to go from here is to emphasize the lawlessness in the riots and law and order as an issue?

Kemp: The one thing I learned in Los Angeles is just about everybody has a grain of truth to their arguments. Lawless and anarchy and pillaging and plundering and looting and killing people and violating property rights is not the solution to anything. And the President was right to dispatch early assistance to L.A. and California to put down the war on life and property. But now I think we need a bipartisan, conservative-based, anti-poverty program designed to empower people, designed to put jobs and educational choice and home ownership --

Donaldson: ...We noticed you sitting by the left side of the President the other day. How does it feel coming from out of the cold, and do you think once the crisis is over they'll relegate you back to the other end of the table?

Kemp: They may, but I'm not worried about that. I think the President took some steps on Friday, and he wants to take bipartisan steps next week. I'm convinced that this is the moment to get Democrats and Republicans and conservatives and liberals and find a third way, and we can do it if we put our minds to it....

DISCUSSION, Julie Johnson of Time Magazine joins panel.

On Los Angeles:

Will: You heard Jack Kemp say, when asked by Cokie, what's the percentage in this [rebuilding the inner cities], the political percentage, and Jack gave the only possible answer, which is there's a moral obligation to do it. That there may be, but I don't believe there's a political obligation.

Roberts: Which is why both parties, both Bill Clinton and George Bush, seem to be all over the lot on it if the truth be told. The President can't make up his mind whether he wants to say we've got to be compassionate, we've have to start a conversation about race, or whether he wants to say we've got to be concerned about law and order....

Donaldson: ...What about it Julie? Is this for real, or is this just all talk on the part of people wanting to get elected?

Johnson: I have to think that it's all talk....

Donaldson: ...Does anyone here believe that we're going to have a massive spending program?...

Will: ...We don't have the money.... We don't have the ideas. I don't think anyone has. Well, Jack has a lot of interesting ideas for ameliorating the worst problems of the inner cities.

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NBC -- MEET THE PRESS

Moderator: Tim Russert. **Panel:** David Broder, Andrea Mitchell.

Guest: Sen. Bradley.

Russert: ...You said last week that it would take \$10 to \$15 billion per year for 10 years to deal with this problem [inner cities]. Two questions: Specifically, where would you find that money and, two, what would you do with that money?

Bradley: ...It's going to take probably a little more than that, but I think we need the best of the liberal agenda and the best of the conservative agenda and make an American agenda to deal with the problems of urban America. On the conservative side, I'd take urban enterprise zones, allowing people to buy public housing if they can do that. I think we also need to dramatically increase Job Corps.... I think we need a serious investment in infrastructure in our country generally that will help in our cities.

Bradley: ...I think it's going to be pretty easy [to pay for it], given the change in the world. We're going to end up spending less on defense, and when we spend less on defense we're going to be able to transfer that, I think, to pressing domestic needs. I think urban area is the clear choice for a chunk of that money. But let's make no mistake here.... This is not a problem that's going to be solved just by dollars. This is going to take corporate America making a commitment not only in terms of hiring and promotions, but also in terms of picking up the phone when your black employees are stopped by the cops in your area and calling the police chief and saying what's this all about. It's going to require the media to begin to tell the story of heroic families living amidst all this violence every day.

Broder: The president came back yesterday from Los Angeles, appealing for bipartisan support for some of the proposals he's made that you've mentioned: urban enterprise zones, the HOPE program for home ownership in public housing. Will he get that bipartisan support now?

Bradley: I think that these are programs that could easily be passed in the Congress....

Mitchell: ...You told Tim that you thought the White House suggestion that the Great Society programs were to blame for what happened in Los Angeles was ludicrous. Was it also a racial code word -- a code word to appeal to racial fears? Is it the Willie Horton of the '92 campaign?

Bradley: Could be. If it's a one-week phenomenon then I'll say no, it's not. If we continue to hear the word trotted out, then I'll say yes.

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CBS -- FACE THE NATION

Moderator: Bob Schieffer.

Guest: Vice President Quayle.

Schieffer: ...What about understanding and trying to understand some of the things that may have caused the frustrations [in L.A.] that spewed out?... Should we be equally concerned about trying to get to the causes of these things as we are about restoring law and order?

Quayle: ...Beyond law enforcement, there are other matters. New strategies need to be deployed not only in law enforcement but in housing and education and job training and welfare....

Quayle: ...The old thinking, the old ideas, the old strategies, haven't worked as we had anticipated. The goals were laudable, but we've got to do better. We have to reform the Great Society programs.... And you know what we need to also do? We need to have a conversation not just with the Congress but with America, and the conversation should be on the big picture, and the conversation should underscore the importance of law enforcement....

Schieffer: ...Which ones [Great Society programs] didn't work?

Quayle: It is the attitude. It is the philosophy, and the philosophy of the Great Society was this: it was more of dependence rather than independence. The philosophy was of entitlement rather than opportunity. We ought to be preaching and talking about giving a person a hand up rather than a handout....

Schieffer: ...The poverty level during the Johnson administration went from 19 percent to 12 percent. The poverty level among the elderly was reduced by two-thirds. So, you say, "Let's give people a helping hand," but it is hard for me to understand how you do that by just simply saying that those programs didn't work.

Quayle: Let me try to explain it to you. Let's take education. You mentioned poverty. The greatest problem and biggest social gap that we have in American society today is between those that have an education and those that don't have an education.... It's not necessarily rich versus poor; it's the educated versus the uneducated. One of the reforms that the President has talked about in education is choice in education.... Unfortunately, this has been rejected by the education establishment.... We're the ones that are trying to shake it up because our kids cannot afford the current education system they're getting today, and the parents are starting to demand a better education system, a reform of the Great Society idea.

Schieffer: Do you think there ought to be a...federal investigation into why the Los Angeles police were so slow to react?

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Quayle: ...I would favor this instead. I think there's a lot of credit given to the Los Angeles Police Department. I know that there's this possibility that they didn't act as quickly as possible. I think Daryl Gates, in fact, has admitted that he didn't respond as soon as he wanted to.... If there's something that could be done in the future and lessons learned, fine, but right now I'm going to give credit and praise to the law enforcement officials in this country....

Schieffer: ...Will we expect to see you and the President take a more active role in pushing those programs [urban programs]? Because no one would argue that you have pushed strongly for those programs.... He [Secretary Kemp] has been -- the criticism is that you have been very lukewarm about those programs.

Quayle: ...That is simply not true, and Jack Kemp, representing the President, has energetically been on Capitol Hill trying to get a fair hearing and discussion of some of the President's ideas.... The President has supported him. I've supported him.

Schieffer: Let's turn to another subject, and that is Ross Perot. Why do you think that Ross Perot has such broad appeal at this particular point?

Quayle: He's tapping into the frustration in America. America is frustrated. They want change. They don't want the status quo. This debate that we're going to have right now is going to be about change and new ideas -- the President's new ideas and recipe for change.

DISCUSSION; joined by Joel Klein, New York magazine; Michael McQueen, Wall Street Journal.

On Los Angeles and the Administration:

Schieffer: I take it that the message Vice President Quayle was delivering today was that we want to try to work with the Congress.

Klein: Yeah, but seeing it and doing it are two different things. It's going to involve a sustained, real commitment that we haven't seen from this Administration for years....

McQueen: ...The other thing I do want to note, though, is that the Vice President was not just sending messages about working with the Congress. He was also sending a message to the President's political base, and that is conservatives. You will note some strong messages of support for the law enforcement community. I think we need to take (note of that?).

Schieffer: ...We keep hearing these stories about divisions within the White House on whether the emphasis should be on law and order or on understanding the root causes of the problem. Clearly, Vice President Quayle is on the law and order side of that.

Schieffer: The Vice President says that the Administration really is committed now [to the urban agenda]. He says we really ought to -- this gives us an opportunity to rethink these programs. Do you find this Administration is committed to urban programs and urban policies?

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McQueen: There has been no sign at all during the three years that Mr. Bush has been in office that these programs have been a priority.... What I have to say about him is...the Vice President has been responsible for bringing into the White House a lot of the people who are most identified with this program. Even if you don't agree with the philosophy, they have been out there pushing these [urban programs], I guess. But the fact of the matter is the President has not made these issues a priority.

Schieffer: ...Do you really think there is a difference in Mr. Bush private and Mr. Bush public?

McQueen: I do.... I think the President, how to say, bifurcates his thinking on lots of issues. I think, for example, he makes a very sharp distinction between politics and governance.

Klein: ...I think that the practical result of the kind of bifurcation that Michel was talking about is a sense of paralysis. And I think that one of the reasons why the President's polls went down after the Los Angeles riots was that no matter what you want -- if you want stricter law and order, if you want a Marshall plan for the cities -- the sense out in the public is that this guy isn't going to give it to you because he hasn't given you much of anything for the last three years. He's been interested in the foreign policy.

THE McLAUGHLIN GROUP

Moderator: John McLaughlin. **Panel:** Fred Barnes, Eleanor Clift, Chris Matthews, Clarence Page.

On Los Angeles:

McLaughlin: ...How do you rate George Bush's handling of this crisis and of the blame?

Barnes: I think he's handled it very well so far. And certainly the White House was entitled to attack the Great Society programs which they should have said were expanded and financed lavishly by the Nixon Administration.... Here's the test for George Bush: He has a great opportunity when doing the right thing is also what will be politically helpful. If he can come up now with a program for the short term -- and it's basically the Kemp program plus federal support for more police -- and fight for that in Congress in a way he hasn't obviously in his first three and a half years, that is the right thing to do. But he also needs a long-term program that is going to change the whole welfare system in our country....

Clift: ...I don't get the sense that the President is going to do anything but tour the riot areas in his armored limousine. I don't think there's any evidence that he's scared straight to do anything. And if he wants to run against Lyndon Johnson, fine, I think he'll lose. The Great Society has given us Head Start, Medicare, Jobs Corps -- a lot of programs that are enduring. And if the Republicans didn't like something about it -- they've been in charge for the last 12 years, so why didn't they fix it?

Matthews: ...We've had 12 years of evil basically in this country. We've the Bush Administration. We've got Reagan. These guys were bad guys for this country.... George Bush opposed the Civil Rights Act in 1964. He can talk about the programs of the '60s all he wants. He was against them.... He's stupid to go back to the 1960s.... George Bush's urban policies: What has he done?...

Clarence Page: ...He [George Bush] didn't handle it even reasonably well this week. When he blames the problems of the riots on the social programs of the '60s and '70s it was about as big of a blunder as Clinton saying he didn't inhale. American people just don't buy that....

McLaughlin: ...In all fairness, don't you think that you should recognize that Bush did not cast the first stone?...

Clift: ...The President was ought there first...and sending the code language to the suburban voters and keeping his constituency in order....

Barnes: ...The fact is the Reagan-Bush Administrations are responsible for the problem for this reason: They allowed the Great Society programs to continue and grow during those entire years.... What these programs have done is sustain the underclass....

Page: ...That's playing with numbers. The majority of poor people from the '60s are doing better now because of those programs....

Matthews: ...The big opportunity here is for the Democrats. Because it's interesting that the big man this week was not the Attorney General Barr. The big man was the HUD Secretary. The people are desperately looking...to an alternative from this do-nothing, sit back, let it happen policy. And so they look to Kemp...to do something....

Clift: George Bush clung to his coattails for about two days. And now every White House aide you talk to is trashing Jack Kemp....

McLaughlin: ...Don't you think in this crisis he [President Bush] has done a good job?

Matthews: ...The big sleep has been followed by the big weep. First of all, he slept for 12 years. Now he's crying. When's he going to have a policy?...

Barnes: The question is not whether Bush has a policy. He has had this urban policy. The question is whether he's going to fight for it in a sustained way, and he hasn't done that before.

Page: The President was floundering around this week because he finally had to rediscover America and American people know it.... Most people in this country are not divided over what's right or what's left. They want to know what works right now. And the President finally began to discover that at the end of the week when he spoke to an audience in L.A. talking about let's do what works. Unfortunately, he doesn't want to work. He wants to put it back on everybody else, calling for volunteerism, form reform -- ridiculous moves....

Page: ...Bush isn't even buying his own programs. He hasn't supported the programs of his own conservative war on poverty that Jack Kemp's been pushing for the last 4 years....

McLaughlin: ...Is the political impact of L.A., as things stand now, a net plus or a net minus for George Bush?

Barnes: It is neither now. It ought to be a net plus, but he has...to promote, in a sustained way, a new domestic policy that he has but hasn't worked for in the past.

Clift: It's a minus because we see what a fraud his policy is. And he's not going to push any of these programs....

Matthews: ...The fact that he's hanging onto Jack Kemp's coattails -- he might even put him on the ticket. He's desperate. Minus. It shouldn't have been.

Page: ...I see it as a minus because it was back on domestic policy where George Bush is weakest and Clinton is strongest....

INSIDE WASHINGTON

Moderator: Gordon Peterson. **Panel:** Charles Krauthammer; Tom Oliphant; Carl Rowan; Tina Gulland, Post-Newsweek Stations.

On Los Angeles:

Peterson: Why did L.A. go up in flames this week?...

Krauthammer: ...There has been a lot of blame handed out, but the one group that hasn't been mentioned is the group that's obviously the most responsible. And that is the young thugs who raped and pillaged the city.

Rowan: It's about as absurd to blame it all on thugs as it is to try to blame it on the social programs of the cities. Without those social programs we might have 50 cities going up in flames today.

Oliphant: ...The L.A. riot was unique in that the flames were fanned by official Neros: the police, which pulled back; the National Guard that didn't arrive for 36 hours; and the federal government that didn't arrive until the riot was over.

Rowan: ...There are all kinds of people who were out there. There were different kinds of looters. But conservatives and the Bush Administration want to make that word "looter" the great scare word of our time.... Who are the biggest looters of the last year? The people who stole your money from S&Ls....

Rowan: ...I don't understand President Bush. He weeps a little bit, and you think he understands what's going on. Then he hands you a bromide about how we have to go back to family values. Everybody's for family values. But he does not want to face up to the poverty, the racism, the neglect, the hopelessness that are in these cities. And until he does, nothing will be done, and we'll go through this again.

Peterson: ...He seems to be focused on whatever is before him at the time. He seems to lack peripheral vision. Would you agree or not?

Oliphant: ...The question is whether there are forces in Washington that can appeal to the side of this President that really is good.... What I think has to happen is that he has to break through a conceptual Berlin Wall of domestic policy. And it is this wall that prevents resources now being wasted on a \$280 billion defense budget from being used for the beginning of a new domestic effort....

Peterson: To go to the question of L.A., what do you do?...

Krauthammer: We have ideas, and the best ideas are from Jack Kemp. And it's a pity that his ideas have been scorned at his own White House....

Gulland: ...You talk about the failure of the last 12 years. At some point George Bush has to run on his record. And what we're seeing now is a return -- a battle for his conscience surely -- but an apparent return to safe tried and true -- we will argue on law and order and we will because the Republicans have done that for 24 years....

Rowan: There is another hope -- that the American public can understand the truth. Why do we have 25 million people -- most of them white -- living on food stamps? Because in the last 12 years Reagan and Bush have run the economy in a way that we've got 5 million more people living in poverty.

On Clinton's vice presidential pick:

Gulland: ...One of the most intriguing is Colin Powell. If Bill Clinton could persuade Colin Powell to join him on the ticket in the year of the outsider where race and poverty has become a front-burner issue -- he's tough, he's a commander. I think it would be good news.

Oliphant: ...I'll give what I'm told was Clinton's reaction the first time he thought about Colin Powell...: Na.

Rowan: ...I don't think Colin Powell would want any part of it because he's a wise man. He know's that the state of racial polarization in America is such that the race card is going to be played again, and it would hurt the Democratic ticket....

Rowan: ...The race card has been played so viciously for over 12 years that it just won't work.

I. PURPOSE

To share concern about the tone and the substance of U.S.-French relations.

II. BACKGROUND

Dumas is here for a day of intensive consultations aimed at managing our many differences. Your objectives are to:

- Stress concern that we are increasingly at loggerheads on key European security issues.
- Make clear that if France is serious about maintaining a U.S. presence in Europe, it must encourage conditions to allow us to stay. It should neither block efforts to keep NATO relevant nor create alternatives to it.
- Stress your desire to keep working to find a Uruguay Round agreement irrespective of the U.S. elections.
- Praise where we cooperate well -- Libya, Iraq, Africa and the CIS (aside from the four-power proposal).

Setting: As you saw, Mitterrand tried to correct his earlier criticism on L.A. in a May 5 interview. Mitterrand is up 7 points in the polls to 38% since the appointment of Prime Minister Beregovoy. But he is still scrambling to build the Socialists' popularity before the 1993 parliamentary elections, which they would lose if held today. He is also seeking to secure his place in history as an architect of European unity. (Dumas cut short his visit to defend the Maastricht treaty in the French Parliament.)

All of this will probably result in more surprises designed to give France the appearance of playing a leading international role, particularly in European construction. Basic U.S.-French differences on Europe are also unlikely to be resolved in the next year. Our strategy thus remains to

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build coalitions with key allies on issues where we and the French differ, while assuring a regular dialogue with Paris.

Mitterrand Meeting: Dumas may raise Mitterrand's January proposal for a spring/summer summit with you. Given your schedule and French behavior, we are not enthusiastic.

European Architecture: While we seek to keep NATO relevant to today's Europe, France blocks our efforts to build bridges to the WEU and the former Warsaw pact or to position NATO for future peacekeeping operations. It favors freezing the Alliance in its old roles and building an independent European security structure. Though France wants a continued U.S. military presence for now, it hopes that the Franco-German corps will serve as the nucleus of a future European army with an arms length relationship to NATO. It continues to tug Germany in that direction. We expect Kohl and Mitterrand will announce new steps on the corps at their May 20-21 summit.

Paris is trying to build up CSCE by giving it a court of arbitration and the clout to provide security guarantees for non-NATO Europe. Paris' long-term goal is a legally-binding CSCE treaty, but for now it is willing to settle for a German-brokered idea of a "code of conduct" among CSCE members. We do not like the idea of a court or a treaty, but we can consider the code of conduct idea.

Nuclear Issues: The French continue to press for a four-power nuclear meeting at the ministerial level. The Russians may now support the idea as a way to reinforce their role as the successor to the USSR. Given the delicate nuclear relations among CIS states, this is a terrible time for a four-power meeting at any level. Jim is handling this with Dumas. As a sign of displeasure, you did not reply to Mitterrand's explanation of his surprise decision to suspend nuclear testing and to call on us to do likewise (which was taken to gain "Green" support at home). The French oppose GPRs and our willingness to discuss defenses with others.

GATT: The French remain the most vehement opponents of volume reductions for export subsidies in the EC. They see relatively efficient French farmers losing export markets under the Dunkel text. The French regularly seek means to blame us for the current impasse, for example saying we want a delay until after our elections. French intrasigence will probably worsen as the 1993 elections approach.

Civil Aviation: On May 4, the French renounced our 1946 civil aviation accord, which gives us a year to renegotiate. The French say the accord exposes Air France to too much competition from strong U.S. carriers. In a more conciliatory gesture, they also accepted our last offer on increased capacity for U.S. carriers this summer (up 31% vice the 15% they had offered and the 41% we sought).

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Yugoslavia: We and the French have differed on tactics of late with the French energetically pushing for dispatch of UN peacekeepers and EC monitors to Bosnia, while resisting our efforts to suspend Serbia from CSCE (arguing that it is counter-productive to isolate Serbia completely).

CIS: Aside from the four-power idea, we generally see eye-to-eye on the CIS. Mitterrand just wrote you highly praising your aid package for Russia. He also wrote you seeking support for establishment of a foundation for non-weapons scientists in the former USSR. While we share Mitterrand's concerns, our priority is funding and setting up the International Science and Technology Centers in Russia and the Ukraine.

Libya, Iraq and the Middle East: Cooperation on Libya and Pan Am 103 remains good. On Iraq, we share the same analysis about Iraqi intransigence, though France (and the UK) has been hesitant to move with our proposed resolution to use Iraqi assets to pay UN expenses. Mitterrand is also concerned, after visiting Incirlik, that our rules of engagement over Iraq give our local commanders too much leeway to initiate combat. On the Middle East peace, the French have been generally supportive. But they are very angry at the compromise we have put forward to allow limited EC participation in the multilateral arms control talks ("humiliating terms" in their words). They see this as a step back from Madrid where they were invited to sit along side us and Russia. But the bottom line is that through our efforts the Israelis did accept finally an EC presence.

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POINTS TO BE MADE FOR MEETING WITH
FRENCH FOREIGN MINISTER ROLAND DUMAS

- I am pleased that you were able to come for talks with Jim, Brent, Dick Cheney and others. I have been troubled that we seem to be increasingly at loggerheads on a range of important European and transatlantic issues.
- I by no means want to denigrate the vitally important areas where we are working together closely.
- Our cooperation on Libya and Iraq is essential. France's cooperation in the G-7 and elsewhere on aid for Russia and the other CIS states is deeply appreciated, as is your support on Middle East Peace.
- But I am worried about the tone and substance of our relations. I hope we can work through our differences and not surprise each other.

U.S. PRESENCE IN EUROPE

- I want to mention the U.S. presence in Europe.
- We hear from our European allies, including France, and from our new friends in the East that it is important for us to maintain a sizable troop presence.
- We agree. But we would not be making such an effort to maintain our troop levels, even in an election year, if the Europeans were not telling us they want it. It is no more important for us to retain our presence in Europe than it is for you Europeans.
- If Europe is serious about maintaining a U.S. presence, you must help create the conditions that allow us to stay.

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- NATO is the is the only way we can justify our continued engagement. This means that NATO must have a military and political role relevant to the post-Soviet era. It must have its role in the creation of a broader European security order. And the Alliance cannot be seen to be undermined by the emergence of a European security identity.
- But our impression is that France has been blocking much of what we try to do to make the Alliance relevant to today's Europe and that you are putting forward alternative security concepts which would make NATO irrelevant and duplicative.
- I fully support the emergence of European unity and a European security identity, but we must not undermine our Alliance in the process.

GATT

- Jacques Delors and I had a good meeting last month on GATT. I told him clearly that I am committed to continue working hard to bridge US-EC differences on agriculture as long as it takes. Our ministers will meet again soon.
- I will not be put off by the approach of our elections. These trade talks are just too important.

IF ASKED: FOUR-POWER NUCLEAR MEETING

- I have serious questions about the wisdom of any such meeting now given Russian-Ukrainian relations, but I think that you and Jim should work this out.

IF ASKED: AN INSTITUTION FOR NON-WEAPONS, EX-SOVIET SCIENTISTS

- I share your concern for the former Soviet science establishment, but our priority now is setting up and funding the International Science and Technology Centers in

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Russia and the Ukraine. I have asked that our officials discuss further what you have in mind.

IF ASKED: CIVIL AVIATION DISPUTE

- I am sorry France felt it had to renounce our 1946 agreement which has worked well and was based on free trade principles. I hope we can work through our problems. I am glad we were able to avoid conflict over summer flights.

IF ASKED: FRANCO-GERMAN CORPS

- Our basic concern is that you are seeking to create a European corps which appears to be an alternative to NATO, rather than a complementary force as foreseen in Rome.

IF ASKED: CSCE TREATY OR COURT OF ARBITRATION

- We support strengthening CSCE, but we are not enthusiastic about creating formal, legalistic structures.
- We worry that negotiating a formal treaty would distract from the real practical task of making CSCE relevant to today's security needs.
- As for a formal CSCE court, we are concerned that attempting to impose legalistic solutions on what are likely to be political problems could undermine CSCE's political consultative process and thus its effectiveness.

IF ASKED: EC PARTICIPATION IN THE MIDDLE EAST MULTILATERAL TALKS

- We appreciate the EC's role in the multilateral talks. We have worked out a formula for EC participation in the arms control group which Israel has accepted. It is not perfect, but you will be at the table.

Your most welcome letter was here upon by return from an arduous stay at the pecan orchard.

I note that Dr. Manger's letterhead features that he too is proud of being a Fellow of the American College of Physicians. Also like Dr. Manger I speak only for myself in spite of my contributing to the position taken by the College. In recent years I chose not to longer belong to "organized medicine".

My thesis is that enough money is currently being spent on health care to look after everyone if the insurance premium dollar or tax dollar was truly spent on medical care. I quickly caution that on their page two clarification is critically needed for to the incidental reader "Managed Health Care" and HMO's are the same. Whereas HMO's do manage health care the term describes an expensive and ineffective and demeaning business to which the medical insurance companies farm out the physician-patient-hospital supervision. There is so much money taken by these entrepreneurs that an investor can buy shares in the their companies and so far they have fared well by doing so. If you need more information on this, Dr. Manger can fill you in or if you prefer I can brief you on this costly atrocity.

Most plans currently proposed are mainly concerned about how to get the money and how to disburse it and pay no heed to two obstacles that must be eliminated or least extensively modified. The first of these is the trait that individuals or organizations that were conceived and engaging in service functions become power centers and in so doing divert money from health care and their existence and expansion is a goal in itself. My vintage lets me recall then Blue Cross consisted of being the bookkeeper for Dallas school teachers who individually put a very few dollars per year into a fund and hence were truly protected from financial wipe-outs by illness. I remember when hospitals

were limited to providing excellent facilities and personnel where doctors, nurses and assorted technicians could care for patients. There is now evidence that institutional chauvinism is rampant; it seems to me that the hospitals are very big business, patients are customers, and fiats directed at doctors are so frequent and nonproductive that we could be regarded as employees.

One of the biggest of this costly harassment without significant yield is caused by the Joint Commission of the Accreditation of Hospitals. It began as a badly needed service organization to upgrade hospital care. Having done that it has expanded its name and now insists that it is the total monitor and guardian of health care in or out of the hospital.

It seems to be that every regulation or law whose intent is to bring reason to the conduct of hospitals and doctors creates a burgeoning speciality in how to circumvent it. Note the activities to specialization by hospitals, and doctors that are now subject to DRG or other financial limits.

The second obstacle to any program is that we must have relief from the incessant fear of malpractice suits wiping us out and this forces us to have added expense in "documenting" the correctness of what we do for a patient. I have avoided giving vignettes that would confiscate your time but here one will succinctly give the picture: In doing my required ^{shift} step in the hospital emergency room adjacent to my patient was one who reported a blow to the head; another had fallen on a swimming pool walkway. Neither of them seemed to be significantly impaired and yet the neurosurgeon who, like I was also on call, ordered a MRI (plus or minus \$1,400.00) and the orthopedist for the other ordered a CAT Scan (plus or minus \$1,000.00). Patients initiate similar demands in my office.

I differ with the current position of the College and of Dr. Manger's group in that I think it destructive of our shared goal to have health insurance tied to employment in any way.

Truly most students upon graduation are in debt but I am not totally sympathetic to their plight for they seem to want the rewards of life before they have necessarily earned them. Your brother and Barbara did not have that attitude while they were scrounging around in West Texas or while he was making Zapata go. In summary I tell you that I am in accord with Dr. Manger's group's goal and differ in only some technicalities. I repeat that if all

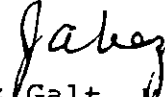
the money now spent on "health care" was actually spent on health care no more money would be needed.

Thank you, Alicia Woodeson, for your kind introduction. I must be honest and say that I am usually uncomfortable about awards, especially if I am receiving, rather than giving one. But Posy and I are delighted to be with you tonight because of our great respect for the Women's National Republican Club and our personal admiration for the other honorees.

If you are judged by the company you keep, this is surely my finest hour. No one has helped to convey the values we share more than Peggy Noonan. And her unique talents will be even more important as Republicans strive to get their message across to the American people. I am pleased to be here with Secretary Dick Cheney, whom I first met when he was Chief of Staff in the White House and whom I have long admired for his integrity and leadership, through the Mid-East crisis and right up to the present time. Finally, I am honored to share this evening with Lynne Cheney, whom I consider the nation's leading spokesperson for academic freedom and cultural values which unite, rather than divide us.

As a lifelong Republican who has worked nearly full time for 6 of the last 8 presidential campaigns, I know how important evenings like this are -- and since you have given me this great honor, I want to spend a few minutes outlining a domestic agenda for America which puts Republicans back where they belong -- the party of vision, the party of values, and the party of opportunity.

I will focus my brief remarks on domestic issues because they are where Republicans are most misunderstood and misrepresented. Also, I believe they hold the key for us to become America's majority party once and for all. Although it has been passed over by many in Washington, the "New Paradigm" of James Pinkerton, Deputy White House Assistant for Policy Planning, provides an excellent framework for our future activities. It consists of five principles: market-orientation; choice; empowerment of the poor; decentralization; and an emphasis on what works. Let me stress that last point -- government programs must be judged on measurable outcomes, not on intent or emotions.

The astonishing thing is that while some in our own party denigrate such principles, many Democrats and even some Democrat governors are beginning to sound suspiciously like Republicans. In their new book, Reinventing Government, David Osborne and Ted Gaebler recommend that public agencies empower communities rather than simply deliver services; encourage competition rather than monopoly; meet the needs of the consumers, not the bureaucracy; concentrate on earning, not spending; decentralize authority; and invest in prevention, rather than continued dependency. Doesn't this sound like a Republican Party Platform? What a tragedy it would be if we abandoned our own principles just as others discover how well they work!

I want to stress especially the last point -- we must be the party of prevention. Instead of trapping people in a seamless web of dependency, we need to offer the right kind of assistance at the right time to help people help themselves. Most of you know that the best way to keep people out of troubled waters is to strengthen families and help them foster personal character and positive values. We have spent hundreds of billions of dollars to alleviate the results of family breakdown, including alcohol and drug abuse, teenage pregnancy, youth gangs and violence, homelessness, and illiteracy. Instead of waiting until such problems overwhelm society, we should put more emphasis on the family, our most powerful social institution, to prevent the problems from happening in the first place.

For many years now, our society has had a love affair with rights and entitlements without a word for the need to develop along with these a real sense of personal responsibility. We must overcome the incessant whining about perpetual victimization which pervades our public discourse. Too often government programs fail to help people enter mainstream society because they do not obligate benefit recipients to behave responsibly, such as by working, finishing school, obeying the law, and caring for one's own family.

Louis Sullivan, Secretary of Health and Human Services, has been a leading spokesman for a "culture of character." He describes character as "personal values and qualities such as self-discipline, integrity, taking responsibility for one's acts, respect for others, perseverance, moderation, and a commitment to serve others and the broader community." Dr. Sullivan quotes his beloved mentor, the late Dr. Benjamin Elijah Mays, former president of Morehouse College, who said, "It is not your environment, it is you -- the quality of your mind, the integrity of your soul, the determination of your will -- that will decide your future and shape your life."

People like Lynne Cheney remind us that we must stand for positive cultural and spiritual values as well as a strong economy. Those who control our culture teach our children. One need not be

a student of popular culture in America today to know how damaging it has been to our young people and their future. Although values and personal responsibility must be mainly nurtured by parents in the home, they can be reinforced at every turn by neighbors, churches, schools, colleagues at work, the media, and, I might add, the Republican Party!

America is blessed with a vast reservoir of ingenuity, altruism, and untapped human potential which can resolve our serious social problems. There are now over a thousand community coalitions across the country fighting drug and alcohol abuse. The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation has earmarked 26 million dollars toward community-wide projects in this regard and the challenge of that money has stimulated the leadership of many communities to organize in the fight against drugs and alcohol besides just those which won Johnson Foundation awards. The Boys & Girls Clubs of America, which serve close to a million-and-3/4 youngsters from disadvantaged backgrounds, have established over 170 satellite clubs in public housing projects across the nation. These and nearly 1200 other clubs are revitalizing devastated neighborhoods and providing positive alternatives to crime, drugs, teenage pregnancy, and despair.

We must design social programs that reward success rather than maintain dependency! The most successful programs will be those that evaluate performance, utilize market forces, create choice for individuals and families, and empower people by encouraging them to make their own decisions. Tenant management and tenant ownership of public housing is a good example of this, and so too is giving parents greater choice over their children's schools and encouraging continued parental involvement in those schools.

Everyone is talking about health care today -- well, I can assure you, a centralized, government-controlled system is not the answer. The only way to cure our ailing health care system and to control rising cost is to promote quality services through consumer choice and competition among providers. No one has developed this concept better than our friends at the Heritage Foundation in their "Consumer Choice Health Plan."

I believe that uncontrolled government growth and lack of accountability at all levels -- Federal, state, and local -- are the primary reason why people are so disillusioned with politicians and have become disconnected from the political process in this country. Government can work, but it must be downsized and virtually recreated along the principles I mentioned earlier. One promising development for new ideas and strategies are the dozens of state-based policy research centers which have been established across the country and which are already giving necessary factual information to state governors, legislators, and opinion leaders.

As we end a troublesome recession, it is easy to forget that more people throughout the world are suddenly experiencing freedom than at any time in this century. The startling collapse of Communist ideals has created an unparalleled opportunity for representative democracy, market-based incentives, and individual liberty. I agree with former President Nixon and others that we must "seize the moment" to promote freedom and democracy abroad and prevent the revival of the various "isms" that have brought disaster to so many peoples of the world. Our pluralistic society and free institutions offer hope to oppressed peoples everywhere.

Paradoxically, many in our own country have declared Western civilization and its continued emphasis in our schools and colleges irrelevant, unnecessary, and oppressive. Thus, although we have won the "cold war," the Republican Party's focus on family, individual opportunity, private initiative, and market incentives is more important now than ever. We are truly one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all. With your vigilance and President Bush's strong leadership, we can revitalize the values of our common heritage and ensure that America remains a beacon of hope in a troubled world.

How to motivate employees

Dear Subscriber:

Good news: It's time to rev up your engine. The green light of growth is flashing again, and with more brilliance than we anticipated when we wrote to you Apr. 20. Then, you'll recall, we restated our belief that the economy would improve markedly in 1992's second half but remain vulnerable to shocks.

We're less concerned about the "shocks" now because signs of improvement are increasing almost daily, and while they shouldn't be regarded as portents of a boom, they do indicate that faster economic growth is already underway.

Housing starts are strong, fueled by the lowest interest rates in years.
Skimpy business inventories will force sharp near-term production gains.
The unemployment situation is definitely improving; hiring's picking up.
Durable goods orders surged 1.6% in March, with gains across the board.
Exports continue to hit new highs, despite slowing economies overseas.

To round out this upbeat picture, the Federal Reserve's huge reductions in short-term interest rates since '89 have yet to make themselves fully felt. As they do, they'll add even more zip to our breakout from a growth recession. There is another reason we feel more confident: history. Note the record:

Most post-recession forecasts have UNDERstated the vigor of recoveries. That happened at the end of 1970, again in '75-'76, and also in the aftermath of the '81-'82 slump. In January 1983, two months after that downturn ended, the consensus call was that the nation's economy would grow just 2.5% in '83.

But, in point of fact, the Gross Domestic Product grew 3.9% that year. Today's consensus is that the year-over-year increase in "real" GDP for 1992, that is, -GDP adjusted for-inflation,-will be a meager-2%,-compared to average growth of 5.5% in the first recovery year after every other slump since 1960.

Our view? History will repeat. 1992's growth rate will be more than 2%, and by late summer, strong enough to lift both consumer spirits and spending to a degree exceeding most forecasts. Next question: What should YOU do now?

Answer: Make sure your company is poised to gain from a faster pick-up. Unless you're in a structurally hard-hit industry or area, the coming months will bring steadily rising demand for goods & services. Some recommendations:

...Review inventory levels and their relationship to sales; stocks that were ample in January could be woefully inadequate by July if demand surges. It might pay to order more from suppliers now, avoid getting on waiting lists.

...If you plan to hire, do it pronto, before best people are snapped up.

...Move from caution to aggressiveness in promotion & sales strategies.

Look closely at your ad budget, too. You might be scrimping too much, failing to maintain a high profile. Finally, if you need a loan, apply soon, because borrowed money will cost more as accelerating growth pushes interest rates up.

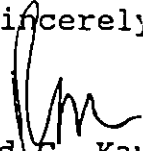

World has to pay for U.S. leadership blunders: French PM

PARIS, May 10, (AFP) - The United States has made the rest of the world pay for the management blunders of former president Ronald Reagan and is to blame for the slowing down of world economic activity, French Prime Minister Pierre Berezgouvoy charged Sunday.

"Because of the slow-down in world economic activity -- due to the excessive weight of U.S. debt and over-important role of the dollar -- America has made the rest of the world pay for the management errors of Reagan, who increased its debts," he told viewers of France's television channel Antenne

Berezgouvoy said the United States had caused a "slow-down in world activity" which was worsened by the Gulf War.

He was also questioned on the recent U.S. riots, but said he did not think France could be compared with the United States.

"I think there is an indifference to social problems in the United States which does not exist in France," he said.
