I. PURPOSE

To recognize the loyalty and dedication this important law enforcement constituency has shown to your Administration.

II. BACKGROUND

The National Troopers Coalition represents approximately 42,000 state police and highway patrol agents from all 50 states. Troopers have been consistently supportive of your Administration, endorsing and testifying on behalf of your Supreme Court nominees, supporting the Administration's crime bill, and working closely with the Department of Justice on a variety of anti-drug and crime initiatives. In addition, Troopers have provided you with logistical support when you are on the road.

Approximately 800 Troopers attended this year's annual conference, which ended yesterday in Baltimore. Due to scheduling conflicts, you were unable to address this group, but the Attorney General did address them two days ago on your behalf.

Most of the Troopers' state chapter heads will participate in full uniform in this photo. After the photo, the Troopers will tour the White House and then will depart for the National Peace Officers' Memorial service, which you will address around 10:00 a.m.

You have met Captain Johnny Hughes, the Troopers' legislative liaison, on several occasions, most recently at the law enforcement roundtable last month. He made you an honorary Maryland state trooper last year.

I. PURPOSE

To strengthen your personal ties to leaders of several police and victims groups. To recognize the hard work and dedication of the volunteers who have organized this year's National Police Week activities.

II. BACKGROUND

You will deliver the keynote address at the 1992 National Peace Officers' Memorial ceremony at Sylvan Theater. This occasion will pay tribute to the families of officers killed in the line of duty in 1991, as well as highlight the critical role law enforcement plays in safeguarding citizens and their property.

You participated in this event in 1989, and the Vice President spoke in 1990. This event is organized annually by the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP), FOP Auxiliary, Concerns of Police Survivors (COPS), and several additional groups.

In addition to the National Police Week organizers, the family of Officer Jeremiah ("Jerry") Hurley will be present. Officer Hurley was killed in October of last year when responding to a call regarding a suspicious package in a Boston neighborhood. Upon approach, the package blew up, severely injuring Hurley and his partner. Hurley was able to warn other officers who had responded of the possibility of a second device before he died. His partner was blinded but survived.

I. PURPOSE

To underscore your support for the law enforcement community, and for the families of officers killed in the line of duty. To use this forum to talk about your crime bill and about the importance of law and order in society.

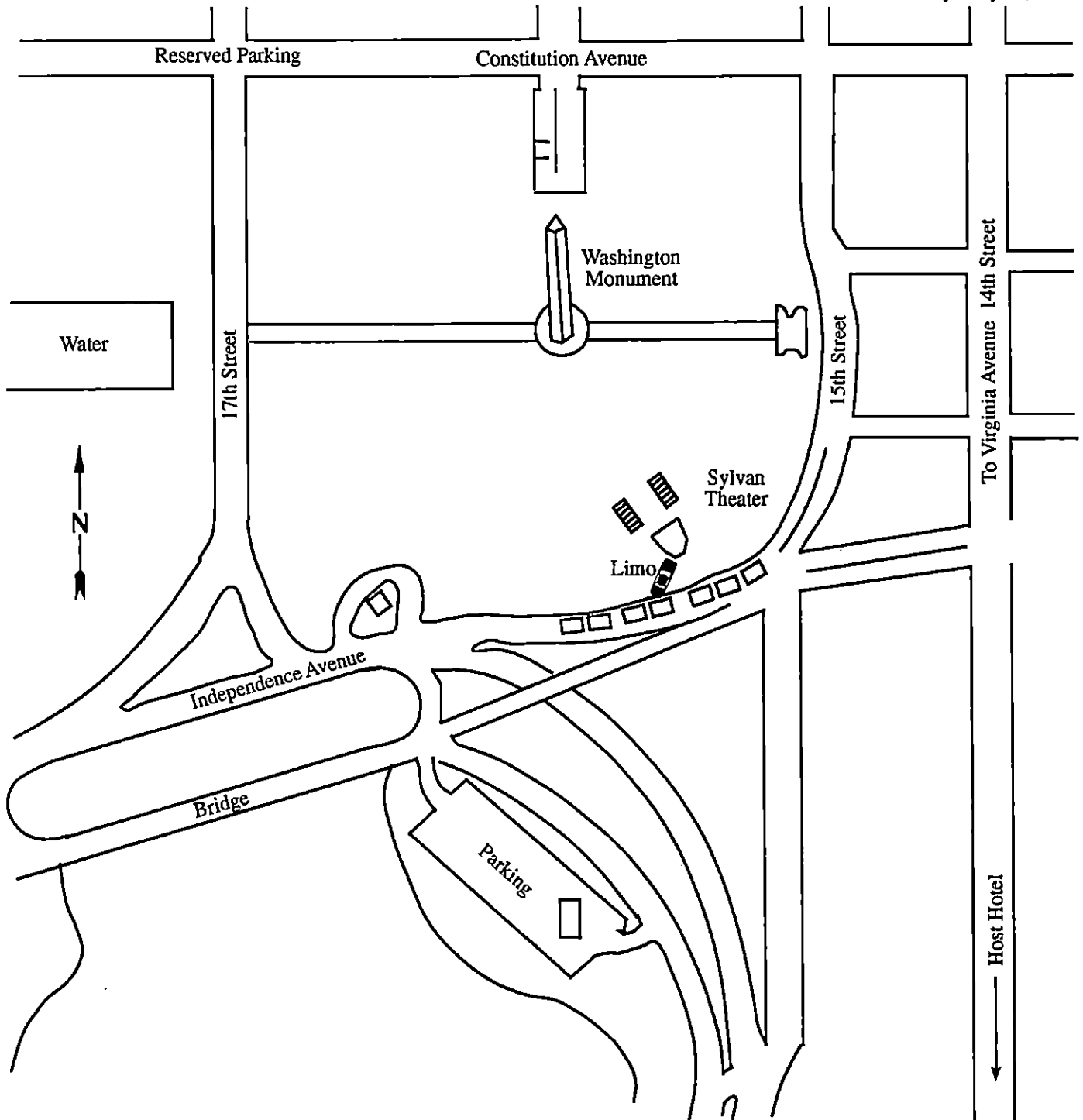

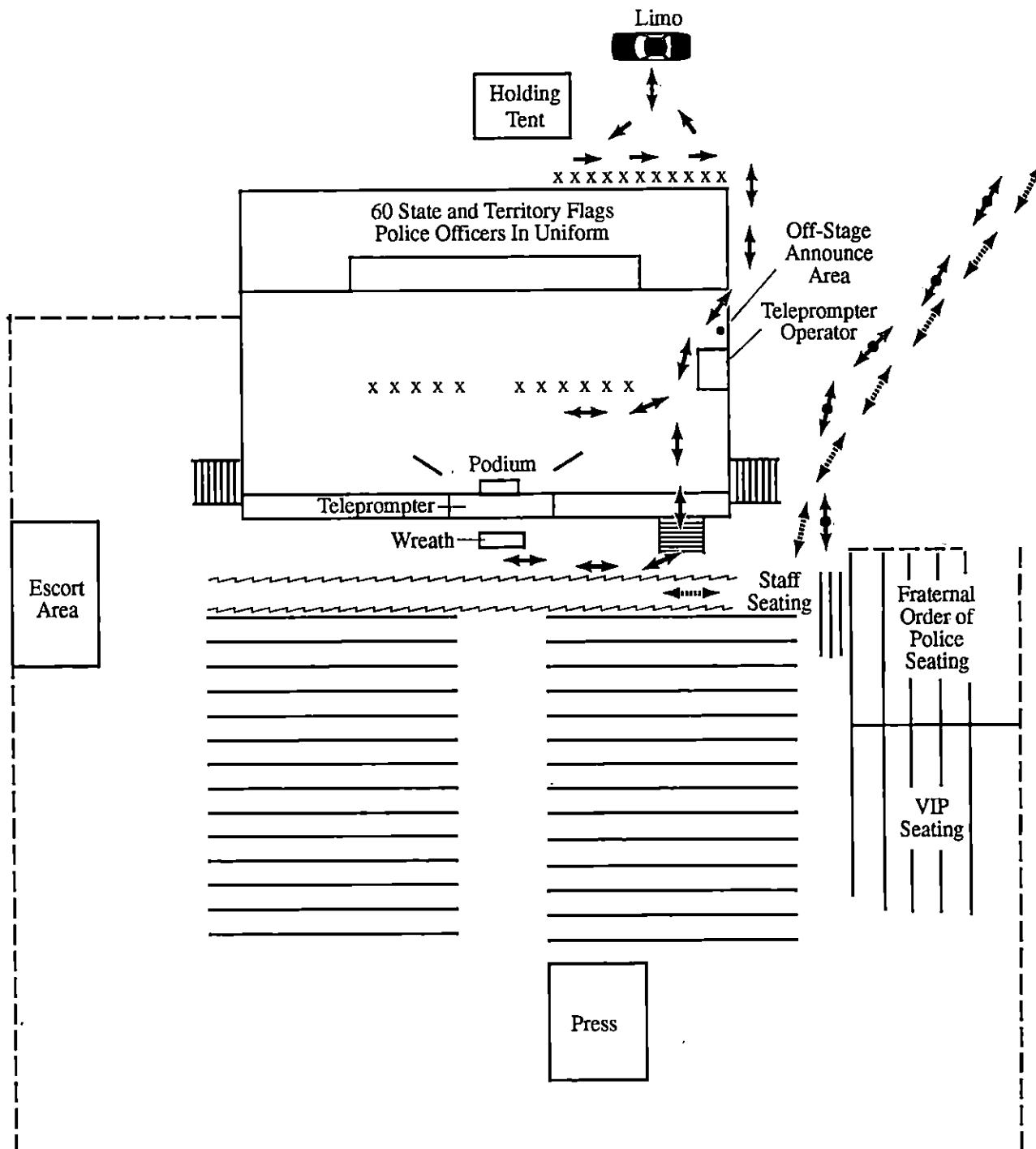

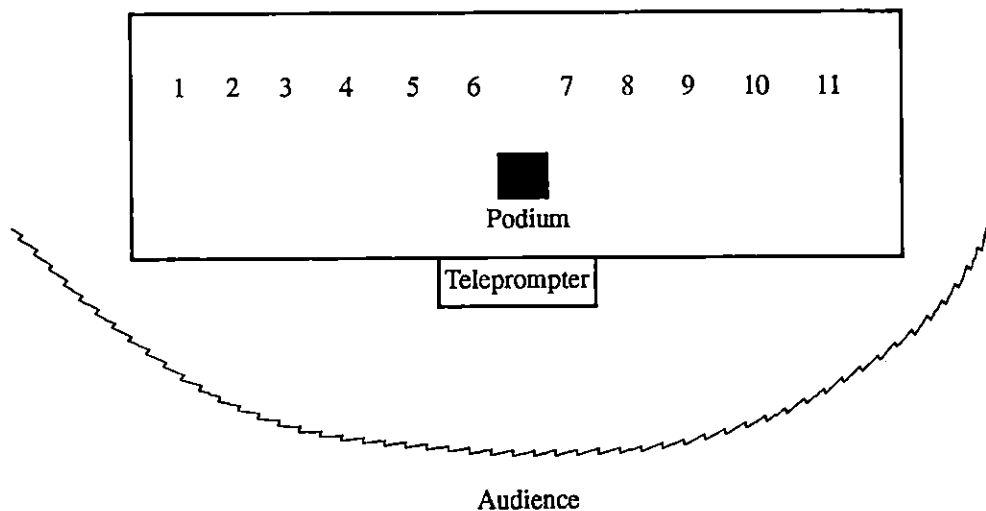

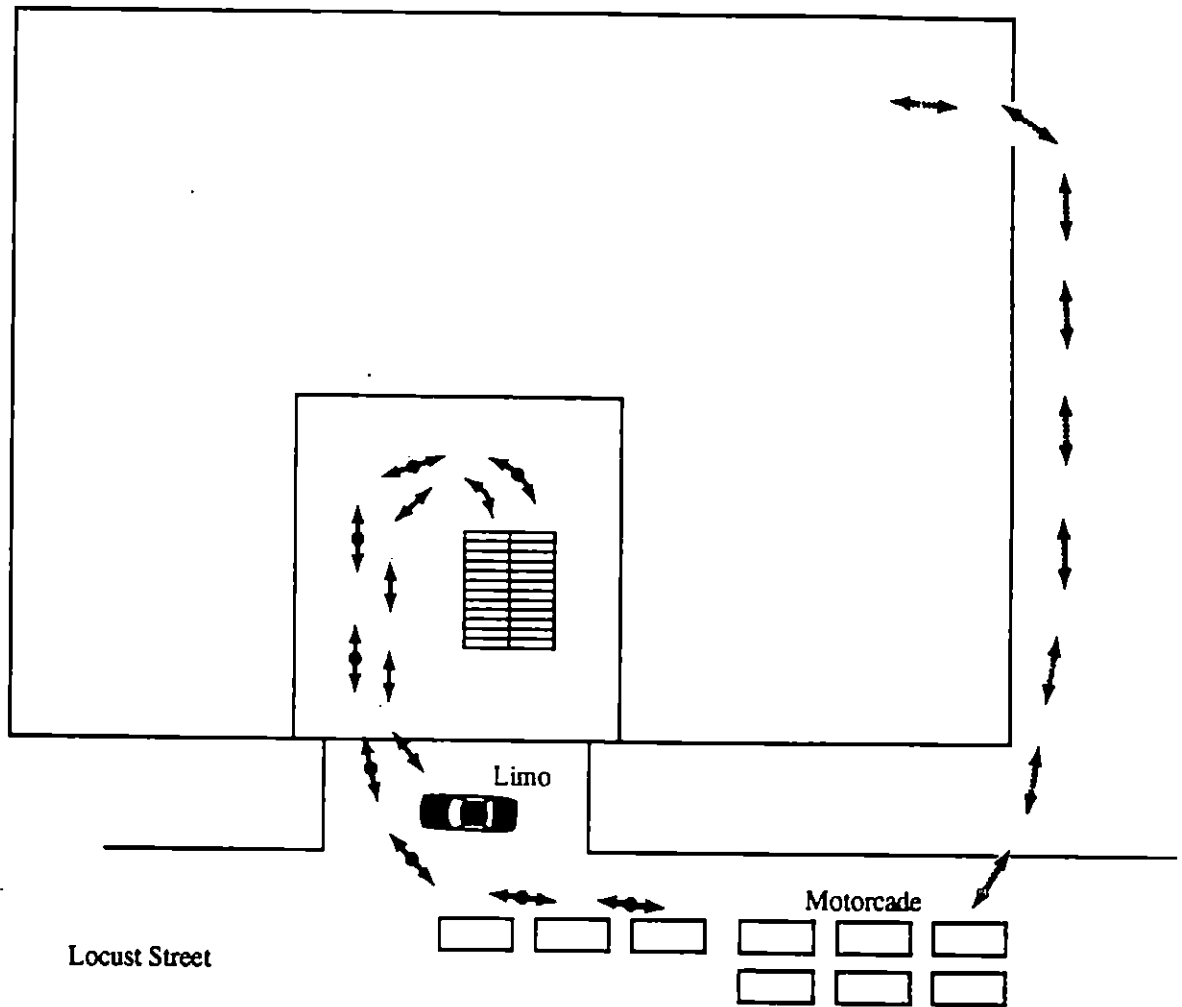

I. PURPOSE

The Attorney General was in Pittsburgh on April 22nd and toured the proposed Weed and Seed target area and met with members of this local Task Force. Pittsburgh is not currently one of the Justice Department's grantees under its Weed and Seed project but the city is organizing itself to become eligible for such a grant.

The Pittsburgh Seed Task Force (social services) has been created to work in conjunction with the Weed Task Force (law enforcement) and Department of Public Safety to address community problems. It is directed by United States Attorney Tom Corbett and Joseph Sabino Mistick, the Executive Secretary to Mayor Masloff.

The Seed Task Force has solicited the participation of as many interested groups as possible. It is their goal to involve as wide a group as possible to greatly magnify resources. The current Task Force consists of a combination of local leaders from the City of Pittsburgh, representatives from Federal Agencies (HUD, SBA), the County of Allegheny, local education entities, foundations and various community organizations including churches, the industrial council, United Way, Urban League and others.

The role of the Seed Task Force is to achieve concentrated and coordinated intervention in the community. They try to encourage joint efforts among participating agencies where appropriate to insure the maximum use of available

resources. They also help identify unmet needs and problems in the community, identify individuals or groups who should be priority clients for services, and propose solutions.

- o Thank you very much. I am glad to be here today and have this opportunity to listen to what you as community leaders have been trying to do here in Pittsburgh.
- o As many of you know, I was in Philadelphia on Monday and met with the Weed and Seed Community leaders and heard firsthand what they are doing to help their community break out of the cycle of violence and take back their neighborhoods.
- o I've come here today because you have begun to address some of these same concerns. I was in Los Angeles last week and saw the sites of some of the worst rioting in history, but in my discussions with local leaders I also saw people who are committed to rebuilding their lives and banding together to find hope and solutions.
- o I've been briefed by Attorney General Barr who was here just a few weeks ago about the progress of your Weed and Seed efforts here in Pittsburgh. From what I heard, you all have been working very hard to bring together resources and efforts to make a difference in this area.
- o Your community effort is similar to what I am encouraging through a new program called "Weed and Seed". It is a plan based on the premise that communities cannot thrive if the citizens who live there fear for their safety.
- o It's like a domino effect -- if a neighborhood isn't protected from crime and drugs, then businesses can't thrive and provide job opportunities, classrooms are threatened and students can't learn or they drop out making it even tougher for them to find jobs.
- o The Weed and Seed program attempts to first "weed" out the criminals who threaten the community and then tries to "seed" in those elements critical to rebuilding a neighborhood: Enterprise Zones to attract investment and industry; community policing to prevent crime from returning; job training programs to create opportunity; and health care and social programs to care and support our citizens in need of help.
- o I know that every community will have to design a plan that meets their unique needs. Our plan is to work with you and today I'm interested in hearing your thoughts on how we can work together.

I. Recent Correspondence

State Representative Frank Salvatore (R-Philadelphia) urged you to authorize \$200 million for the construction of a General Service Administration (GSA) building in Philadelphia.

II. Discussion

A. Governor Casey's State of the Commonwealth Address

In his state of the Commonwealth address, Governor Casey called last year's recession "crippling and unrelenting". He told his fellow Pennsylvanians that, "We're in a fight for our lives."

The main focus of Casey's address was the Commonwealth's economy. The Governor has begun, and pressed for the continuation of, "Operation Jump Start". Essentially a massive public works program, the project is fast-tracking billions of Federal and state dollars into the construction and upgrading of highways, bridges, airports, clean water systems, prisons, mass transit systems and port development investments.

Casey also asked that a \$350 million clean water bond referendum for water and sewer projects be placed on the April primary ballot. That referendum was overwhelmingly approved two weeks ago and those monies will now be channeled throughout the Commonwealth.

B. FY 1993 Budget

In February, Governor Casey outlined a \$14.2 billion budget which included a 1.4 percent increase in overall state spending and established a \$400 million reserve

fund. Although there were no new taxes per se, Casey did include a \$77 million revenue enhancement through increased utility gross receipts.

The main dispute that both the Republican-controlled Senate and the Democrat-controlled House have with the Governor's budget is that he is reneging on last year's budget agreement. In order to pass a record tax increase, Casey pledged to significantly increase spending for basic education in the following years. Casey's proposed FY 1993 budget freezes funding for basic and higher education at last year's level, while increasing funding for the Department of Welfare by almost a quarter of a billion dollars.

House Democrats introduced their own budget package two days ago, which increases spending by 1.3 percent. It does not contain any tax increases.

C. Unemployment Figures

Pennsylvania's rate was 7.2 percent for March of 1992 compared to 7.1 percent for March of 1991.

The City of Pittsburgh's rate was 7.8 percent for February of 1992 compared to 6.5 percent a year before. The rate for area blacks was three times greater than for area whites, 16.2 percent versus 5.5 percent.

D. Drugs/"Weed and Seed"

Federal anti-drug assistance to the Commonwealth has climbed to \$62.5 million in FY 1992 from \$29.8 million in FY 1989.

Cocaine powder, crack cocaine, and heroin are the most prevalent drugs in Pittsburgh. Drug trafficking in cocaine powder and heroin is predominantly run by Jamaican nationals, while the crack trade is loosely organized within the African-American community.

Pittsburgh is one of the sixteen cities awarded a \$1.1 million grant as part of the "Weed and Seed" initiative. State and local law enforcement officials began implementation of this program in March of 1992.

E. Head Start (in the City of Pittsburgh/Allegheny County)

Combined Head Start services in the City of Pittsburgh serve a minimum of 1,216 children and their families. Total Head Start funds for the city programs amount to \$3.6 million.

Head Start services in Allegheny County (which immediately surrounds the City of Pittsburgh) serve a minimum of 1,007 children and their families with \$3.3 million in funding available.

F. Education Issues in the City of Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh School District Superintendent Dr. Richard Wallace will retire in August. Under his leadership, the district has made progressive strides in education. Magnet schools have been established for math and science and an imaginative volunteer program has arranged for area college students to tutor and mentor some of the city's poorest children.

The forementioned magnet schools allow parents some choice in where they can enroll their children rather than requiring them to attend a neighborhood school. They also allow the students to pursue a particular interest or curriculum. Approximately 20 percent of the school district's children, in grades K through 12, are enrolled in the magnet program.

G. America 2000

As you know from your visit to the Lehigh Valley last month, the Pennsylvania 2000 effort is off and running with over 25 communities across the Commonwealth firmly committed to the National Education Goals.

H. Statewide Educational Reform Efforts

For three years, the Pennsylvania Education Department has held public hearings and private work sessions on a bold reform for the Commonwealth's public school system. The result is a landmark revision of the Commonwealth's curriculum guidelines which will require students to attain minimum learning goals rather than merely meeting hour and course requirements before they can graduate from high school. The regulations are designed to produce a better-educated student, give local schools greater autonomy and make public education more accountable.

I. New Midfield Terminal at PIA/Southern Expressway

Construction of the new Midfield Terminal at the Greater Pittsburgh International Airport is scheduled for completion in September of 1992. The new Southern Expressway will provide access to that terminal beginning in October of 1992.

The Southern Expressway is a key element in Governor Casey's economic development program. It will connect existing roads, which have been upgraded, with new portions of highway. Total construction costs of the Expressway will total \$156.3 million. To date, total Federal contributions are in excess of \$20 million.

J. Surface Transportation Funding

Pennsylvania's 1992 apportionment is estimated at \$788.4 million compared to \$491.6 million in 1991. As of April 28th, the Commonwealth had already obligated \$522.8 million of the funding.

Last year's legislation allocates over \$5.4 billion for Pennsylvania from FY 1992 to FY 1997.

K. Waste Technologies Industries Incinerator

Waste Technologies Industries (WTI) is nearly finished with its construction of a large hazardous waste incinerator in East Liverpool, Ohio (which is right on the border of southwestern Pennsylvania). WTI was issued a hazardous waste permit by the EPA in 1983 and in March of this year, it applied for temporary authorization to conduct a trial burn. A decision from EPA is expected by the end of May.

This incinerator has gathered significant regional attention in Pennsylvania, Ohio, and West Virginia as environmentalists have repeatedly attempted to stop it from ever going into service. The latest incident involves the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Administrative Law and Governmental Relations, which is chaired by Congressman Barney Frank (D-MA).

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On May 6th of this year, Congressman Frank conducted a hearing about the site to discuss whether EPA had illegally issued the grant to WTI. EPA admitted they had but that the mistakes made were technical and had been fixed. The mistakes, not identifying the landowner being issued the permit and modifying the permit (by adding the owner's name) without public comment, were enough for Congressman Frank to pledge to pursue the matter further.

L. Exports

The Commonwealth's exports rose 22 percent in 1990 (the latest year figures are available) to \$10.4 billion. That figure is 70 percent above 1987 levels.

Primary exports are computer and industrial machinery, electronic equipment, transportation equipment, chemicals and primary metals.

M. Welfare Reform

House Republicans have unveiled a six-point plan designed to move people off welfare and into the job market, while saving the Commonwealth approximately \$500 million annually and the state and Federal government almost \$1 billion annually. Reforms include establishing a residency requirement, a Learnfare program, paternity establishment, elimination of non-Federally mandated Medicaid benefits, allowing AFDC families who have additional children to work and earn money without penalizing their established benefits, and elimination of the state's transitional needy program except for those receiving unemployment compensation.

N. Workers Compensation Reform

Late last year, the Compensation Rating Bureau asked the Commonwealth to approve a 52 percent increase in premiums for the worker's compensation system. This proposed increase would cost Pennsylvania employers an additional \$1.5 billion over what are already very high fees.

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Governor Casey backs a plan passed by the House which would limit medical costs to 113 percent of the rates Medicare reimburses for specific medical procedures and would allow small businesses to form pools to buy coverage.

The Senate proposal is more acceptable to the medical community and would tie the fees to a Federal workers compensation plan, thereby offering doctors higher payments than the House plan. Also, the Senate plan would offset any social security and pension payments received by the injured worker when figuring compensation.

Elsie Hillman serves as the Pennsylvania State Chairman for the Bush-Quayle '92 campaign. Retiring Philadelphia area Congressman **Larry Coughlin** and Congressman **Bob Walker** serve as Co-Chairmen of the Pennsylvania Bush-Quayle '92 campaign. The Pittsburgh regional chairman is **Martin Hamberger**. All members of the Pennsylvania Republican Congressional delegation have expressed their support for your candidacy. In addition, the state Republican leadership, including Attorney General **Ernie Preate**, State Auditor **Barbara Hafer**, State Senate President **Bob Jubelirer**, State Senate Majority Leader **Joseph Loeper**, State House Republican Leader **Matt Ryan** and former Governors **Raymond Shafer** and **William Scranton** have endorsed your candidacy.

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Former Congressman Gene Atkinson serves as the Chairman of the Buchanan campaign in Pennsylvania. Atkinson was a Democrat who backed Kennedy in the 1980 Democrat presidential primary and joined the Republican party in 1981. Buchanan campaign activity in the state was minimal. Approximately four Buchanan delegates were on the primary ballot but were defeated.

Perot activity in the state has been minimal although an organization is forming. No one of political prominence has signed on with the Perot campaign. Ballot qualifications require 37,216 signatures by August 1.

In the Democratic Presidential race, Pennsylvania Governor **Bob Casey**, stating his preference for a pro-life candidate, did not endorse any of the Democrat candidates. He said " . . . at this point, it would be very difficult for any of the current candidates to beat President Bush." He called for an open convention, stating that Clinton had a minimal chance of defeating you.

Senator **Wofford** endorsed Clinton shortly after his personal friend, Tsongas, suspended his campaign. Clinton used Wofford's race last fall against **Dick Thornburgh** as a blueprint and, while campaigning in Pennsylvania, highlighted the need for health care reform.

The union endorsement of Clinton provided a boost to his campaign by energizing the state's large blue collar union population. However, the state's largest union, the steelworkers, did not endorse Clinton.

Of additional benefit to Clinton was and will be the fact that his consultants directed Wofford's successful Senate campaign and Casey's two gubernatorial victories.

Jimmy Carter lost Pennsylvania (and New York) to Kennedy in 1980.

The U.S. Senate Primary produced dramatic results among the Democrat candidates when newcomer and political unknown, **Lynn Yeakel** defeated former front runner, **Lt. Governor Mark Singel**. Yeakel registered with 6 percent of the vote three weeks prior to the primary. She focused her campaign on Specter's role in the

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Clarence Thomas hearings thereby capitalizing on the anti-Washington theme and the great amount of opposition directed toward Senator Specter from women's groups who believe that his role in the Thomas hearings was too critical of Anita Hill.

Citing his unhappiness with Singel's switch to a pro-choice position, Governor Casey withheld an endorsement of his own Lt. Governor in the primary. Although Yeakel is pro-choice, Casey has endorsed her for the general election. He stated that since **Specter** is also **pro-choice**, the issue is not relevant. Fifty-seven percent of Pennsylvania Republicans believe that Roe v. Wade should not be overturned. Support for Arlen Specter among this group stood at 4 to 1.

Specter's Republican opponent, State Representative **Steven Friend** is the author of the restrictive Pennsylvania abortion law that is currently being heard before the U.S. Supreme Court.

A poll in central Pennsylvania, which is traditionally Republican, shows Specter and Yeakel in a tie. This area has always been a base for Republican candidates. In the poll Specter leads among men 47 percent to 40 percent. Among women Specter trails 42 percent to 40 percent.

The Office of Political Affairs and the Scheduling Office have been working closely with Senator Specter to accommodate his request for a Presidential fundraiser. Specter's initial request was to have the event prior to the April 28 primary. The Senator has accepted June 9 as the event date. The fundraiser will be in the central part of the state - Harrisburg.

Congressional and State Campaigns

Due to redistricting and retirements, the Pennsylvania congressional elections are quite competitive. Two seats have been lost through reapportionment and four Members of Congress have announced their retirement.

Congressmen Lawrence Coughlin (R-13), Richard Schulze (R-5), Gus Yatron (D-6) and Joseph Gaydos (D-20) have all announced their retirement from the U.S. House of Representatives.

In the First Congressional District which includes center city Philadelphia, 12-year incumbent Democrat **Thomas Foglietta** will be challenged by Republican Party activist and former State legislative candidate **Craig Snyder**.

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The Second District race places freshman Democrat Lucien **Blackwell** against Republican businessman Larry **Hollin**. Hollin is the President and owner of the Hollin Group, a management holding company. Blackwell replaced Bill **Gray** in a special election last Fall when Gray resigned to become the President of the United Negro College Fund.

Former Republican Congressman Charlie **Doughtery** will face incumbent Democrat Bob **Borski** in the race for the Congressional seat of the Third District.

The Fourth District's incumbent, Democrat Joe **Kolter**, was defeated in the Democrat primary by Ron **Klink**, who is a former Pittsburgh T.V. newscaster. Klink will be challenged in November by Gordon **Johnston**, who in 1990 received 45% of the vote against Kolter.

Incumbent Democrat Gus **Yatron** is retiring leaving the Sixth District seat open. This seat will be contested by Schuylkill County attorney/businessman John **Jones** (R) and Schuylkill County Sheriff Tim **Holden** (D).

The Mayor of Media, Frank **Daly** (D), resigned to run for the seat held by Congressman Curt **Weldon** (R). Weldon would ordinarily be considered unbeatable, but the FBI's probe of the misuse of federal funds by a quasi-public agency that Weldon founded in 1984 could be a potential liability. Weldon has denied any wrongdoing.

Democrat incumbent from the Eight District, Peter **Kostmayer** will be challenged by Republican State Senator Jim **Greenwood**.

Republican Congressman Bud **Shuster** is unopposed in the Ninth District.

In the Tenth District, Republican 16-term incumbent Joe **McDade** won the Republican primary and the Democrat nomination as a write-in. He was indicted earlier this week on federal charges of accepting bribes from defense contractors. McDade held a press conference before the story was made public and stated that he did nothing more than assist a town in his district that was faced with 85 percent unemployment. Because of his long-term service to the district and the fact that he was out in front of the story, the indictment is not expected to affect his re-election. McDade is Vice-Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and is the ranking Republican on the Defense Subcommittee that oversees the military budget.

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The seat in the Eleventh District which is held by Democrat incumbent Paul **Kanjorski** will be challenged by a former CIA agent and Republican, Mike **Fecina**.

Democrat Congressman John **Murtha** is unopposed in the Twelfth District.

Montgomery County Commissioner, Republican Jon **Fox** and Democrat Marjorie **Mezvinsky** are competing in the general election race to fill the seat of retiring Congressman Lawrence **Coughlin** (R-13).

Pittsburgh Attorney Byron **King** will be the Republican challenger of incumbent Democrat Bill **Coyne** in the race for the Fourteenth District seat.

Fifteenth District incumbent Republican Congressman Don **Ritter** will be challenged by Democrat State Legislator and Desert Storm veteran, Paul **McHale**.

The Sixteenth District seat is held by Republican incumbent Congressman Bob **Walker**. Walker will be challenged by Chester County Democrat Attorney Robert **Peters**.

In District Seventeen Republican incumbent Congressman George **Gekas** will face Dauphin County businessman and farmer Democrat Bill **Sturges**.

The Eighteenth District seat is held by Republican freshman Congressman Rick **Santorum**. He will be challenged by State Senator Frank **Pecora** - a Republican who switched to the Democrat party.

Republican Congressman Bill **Goodling** was among the worst offenders in the Hill check writing scandal. Goodling allegedly bounced 439 checks in the amount of \$188,015. Goodling claims that his records indicate 51 bad checks in the amount of \$26,816. Goodling will be challenged by Democrat businessman Paul **Kilker**.

Democrat incumbent Austin **Murphy** holds the Twentieth District seat and will be challenged by Republican advertising agent Bill **Townsend**.

The Twenty-first District seat is held by Republican incumbent Tom **Ridge**. Democrat John C. **Harkins** will challenge Ridge.

Due to redistricting, Republican incumbent Bill **Clinger, Jr.** will be unopposed in the fall. Clinger formerly represented the Twenty-third District which was lost to redistricting.

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Both Republican statewide elected officials, Attorney General Ernie Preate and State Auditor Barbara Hafer, will face re-election this year. Preate has aspirations for Governor. Democrat State Senators Roy Afflerback and Craig Lewis have entered the race to challenge Hafer. The 1992 Pennsylvania ballot will also include one half of the State Senate seats and the entire 203 member State Representative body.

The death of U.S. Senator John Heinz on April 4, 1991, created an open Senate seat. Harris Wofford, a member of Governor Casey's cabinet was appointed to fill the seat and was challenged by former U.S. Attorney General and former two-term Pennsylvania Governor, Richard Thornburgh, in the general election. Early polls indicated a 40 percent lead for Thornburgh. Wofford positioned himself as a Washington outsider and used national health care as the foundation of his campaign. Thornburgh initially stated that he was opposed to a national health care plan. A Pittsburgh Post Gazette poll indicated that 94 percent of Pennsylvanians said that their decision in this race would be based on the candidate who could best ensure that adequate health care is available. Many believed that Thornburgh's message failed to provide any definition to his campaign and no articulation of his sense of the future for Pennsylvania. Following Wofford's 10 percentage point win, he defined the election as a referendum on the Bush Administration - and Congress. This is the first time in 23 years that Pennsylvania has sent a Democrat to the U.S. Senate. Wofford will face re-election to a full six-year term in 1994.

Congressman Bill Gray resigned last Fall from the U.S. Congress to become the President of the United Negro College Fund, thereby creating a special election to fill his seat. Former Philadelphia City Council member Lucien Blackwell defeated 3 other candidates to win the seat. Democrat ward leaders chose

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Blackwell as the nominee which caused former Democrats Fattah and White to file under the Consumer Party and as an Independent. Ninety percent of the registered voters in the district are Democrats. Seventy-six percent of the residents are black.

Real estate executive and former Philadelphia Deputy Commerce Director Joe Egan (R) lost the Philadelphia Mayoral race to former District Attorney Ed Rendell (D). **Frank Rizzo** had won the Republican primary but died last summer from a heart attack. Egan's first try for elective office was earlier this year when he finished second in a race for an at-large city council seat. Egan emerged as a compromise choice in that the two Republican primary candidates whom Rizzo had defeated both elicited points of controversy among varying factions of the party. Many, including Republicans, criticized Egan's campaign for being issueless, lackluster and disorganized. Mayor Wilson Goode was prevented by law from seeking a third consecutive term.

Local

The Republican party was extremely successful at the local level in the recent elections. Twelve new 3-member county court house boards were won by the GOP, giving Republicans control of a total of 43 of the 67 courthouses.

Incumbent Philadelphia City Council members, **Thatcher Longstreth** and **Joan Specter** (spouse of Senator Specter) were re-elected.

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REAPPORTIONMENT

Pennsylvania lost two Congressional districts through reapportionment. A state court has ruled in favor of a Democrat plan that puts Curt Weldon (R-07) and Dick Schulze (R-05) in the same district. Freshman member Rick Santorum's (R-18) Pittsburgh area district is now comprised of 29 percent Republican voters. His former district was 43 percent Republican. Congressman Tom Ridge (R-21) has received a portion of the Pittsburgh area district. The district of retiring member Joe Gaydos has been eliminated. The court failed to erase the district of retiring Congressman Gus Yatron. The plan seems to have created two majority-black districts.

PARTY STATUS / ACTIVITY

The state party is extremely well organized. They have been extremely successful in their registration drive this year, cutting the Democrat margin of registered voters by 28 percent. They are continuing to build and strengthen local leadership by increasing their involvement in activities such as candidate recruitment and special state party meetings and committees. The party raised \$1.6 million in 1991.

LOCAL NOTE

In hockey, the Pittsburgh Penguins clinched the Patrick Division championship last night with a victory over the favored New York Rangers. Pittsburgh goes on to play the Boston Bruins for the Wales Conference championship beginning Sunday. The Penguins are reigning Stanley Cup champions from a year ago, and were greeted by you in a White House ceremony honoring them last year.

¹ Sen. Harris Wofford, D-Pa., was sworn in May 9, 1991, to succeed John Heinz, R., who died in a plane crash April 4, 1991. Heinz was eligible for 19 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 79 percent, his opposition score was 21 percent and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 79 percent in 1991. Wofford was eligible for 60 of the 81 presidential support votes in 1991.

I. Recent Correspondence

El Paso City Representative Stan Roberts expressed his concern for the shortage of water in the southwest and west and suggested a few solutions.

El Paso Mayor William Tilney noted his city's support for the reenactment of the Clean Water Act but asked that certain revisions pertaining to stormwater regulations be adopted.

El Paso City Representative Jay Armes registered his opposition to the use of Special Purpose Grant monies through HUD for non-housing related projects.

Dawson Mayor Wayne Smith informed you of his city's opposition to the High Speed Rail in Western Navarro County.

Friendswood Mayor Paul Schrader forwarded his city's resolution in continued support of Space Station Freedom.

Victoria County Judge Helen Walker urged you to direct FEMA to provide aid to her county and others which have suffered from extensive flooding over the past four months.

II. Discussion

A. Texas State Government

As you are well aware, the state operates on a two year budget cycle and the legislature meets bi-annually. The legislature did not sit in regular session this year and thus, Governor Richards did not deliver a State of the State address. The legislature did hold a special session in January to finish the redistricting process.

Please note that early projections estimate that the shortfall for the next budget cycle, 1994-6, will be approximately \$5 billion.

B. Unemployment Rates

For March 1992, Texas' rate was 7.6 percent, up .9 percent from a year before. In Houston, the rate was 7.4 percent compared to 5.6 percent from March of 1991. And in Dallas, the rate for March of 1992 was 8.1 percent, an increase of 1.7 percent from a year before.

C. Dallas County Commissioner John Wiley Price

Dallas community and civic leaders had expressed deep concern that a guilty verdict IN the misdemeanor assault trial of African-American Dallas County Commissioner John Wiley Price would result in violence. Commissioner Price had been charged with misdemeanor assault. This past Monday, May 11th, the jury in the case rendered a verdict of not guilty. Please note that Commissioner Price still has a rape charge pending against him, from a separate incident.

D. Drugs

Combined Federal anti-drug assistance to Texas will total approximately \$92 million in FY 1992, up from \$42.8 million in FY 1989.

Marijuana, heroin and cocaine remain the primary drugs of choice in Houston. Crack cocaine is the most prevalent and, as in other urban centers, is found mostly in the city's housing projects. Its distribution is largely controlled by gangs such as the Crips, the Bloods, and the Latin Kings. Former Mayor Kathryn Whitmire established "Houston Crackdown" in 1988, pulling together public and private volunteer efforts in order to develop multiple strategies to the drug problem.

In the Dallas area, crack cocaine is the drug of choice and abuse of the substance is increasing at an alarming rate. Again, the Crips and the Bloods hold substantial interest in the distribution market, having taken it away from Jamaican nationals. Problems in Dallas are

compounded by the fact that there is no identified county or city official tasked with the responsibility of coordinating supply and demand control activities in the Dallas area.

E. "Weed and Seed"

The City of Fort Worth was one of sixteen cities selected for a grant under the "Weed and Seed" initiative. The target area consists of three major sections within the east side of the city, including a large housing development and various schools.

F. Public School Finance

The public school finance situation is so tenuous that Governor Richards recently contemplated calling the legislature into special session this month. Instead, she chose to postpone the session until after the November elections. The exact date is undetermined at this time but it will have to be before January of 1993, when the legislature will convene for its regularly scheduled session.

The funding question began with the *Edgewood vs. Kirby* lawsuit which culminated in the current plan being ruled unconstitutional by both the Texas State Supreme Court and by a Federal judge because it discriminated against property-poor school districts. In response, the legislature approved a plan in 1991 which redirected funds from rich to poor districts. Shortly after the bill became law though, wealthy districts protested, filed suit and the state supreme court ruled in their favor, giving the legislature until June of 1993 to develop an appropriate constitutional solution.

There are at least ten different legislative solutions that have been proposed, none of which have enough votes for passage. The Governor's latest proposal is to split the business base from local tax rolls and tax it at the state level to equalize funding. It only has modest support in the legislature.

G. Houston 2000/Dallas 2000

On March 3, 1992, Secretary Alexander went to Houston to participate in the official announcement of Houston 2000, where he was joined by Assistant Secretary Diane Ravitch and Mayor Bob Lanier. In addition, the First Lady telephoned the mayor during the ceremony.

On April 29, 1992, Deputy Secretary David Kearns travelled to Dallas to participate in the official announcement of Dallas 2000 with Mayor Steve Bartlett and Dallas School Board President Marvin Edwards.

H. Basic Math Education Standards

Last week the state Board of Education announced that it was going to lower the score required on the math portion of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills Test (passage is required for seniors to graduate), since so many students had failed to attain the necessary score. After much public outrage, the Board reconsidered and did not lower the requirements.

I. Houston Independent School District (HISD)

The Houston Independent School District (HISD) has an enrollment of 194,549, making it the fifth largest in the U.S. It takes in the inner city and much of the adjacent area. HISD has 235 schools and 2700 full and part-time employees, which makes it the largest employer in the city.

The HISD Superintendent is Dr. Frank Petruzielo. He and Mayor Lanier have reached an accord on rebuilding infrastructures around schools to attract suburban, middle-class families back into the HISD and have also created a task force to address truancy. Presently, the City of Houston has one of the toughest juvenile curfews in the country, which calls for teens under age 18 to be off the streets from midnight to 6:00 a.m. and from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on weekdays.

J. Head Start

In Houston, there are 3560 children and families enrolled in Head Start with a funding level of nearly \$13 million.

In Dallas, Head Start programs service 1655 children and families. Total Federal funding is approximately \$6.5 million.

K. Houston Health Care

Mayor Lanier had proposed that the Health Departments of the City of Houston and Harris County be consolidated in order to improve the quality and accessibility of services and to create major cost

savings. However, the more hearings, reviews, studies, and meetings that occur, the more difficult the consolidation appears and the participants seem to be moving away from the proposal.

L. Dallas Area Immunization Action Plan

Dallas is one of the six cities that Secretary Sullivan selected to establish an Immunization Action Plan to improve the level of immunizations in preschool children. The city has submitted a budget proposal for approximately \$1.3 million to the Centers for Disease Control. An award is expected in July of this year.

M. Welfare Reform/Food Stamps

Beginning in August of 1993, a pilot program will begin in the Houston area to give food stamp recipients a "credit card" instead of paper coupons. The idea is to cut down on paperwork, fraud, theft and overhead costs.

N. Exports/NAFTA

Texas exports rose 8.6 percent to \$41 billion in 1990 (the latest year figures are available). This figure represents a 63 percent increase above 1987 levels. Also, please note that it ranks Texas second, behind only California, in total value of exports.

The state's two largest trading partners are Mexico and Canada. From 1987 to 1990, trade with Mexico doubled to \$13.3 billion, while trade with Canada increased from \$2.1 billion to \$3.4 billion.

Texas' leading exports are chemicals, computers and industrial machinery, electric and electronic equipment, transportation equipment, and refined petroleum products.

The state's agricultural industry generally supports the North America Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Gains in trade of grains and meat products should be significant. However, that will have to offset anticipated losses in the citrus and winter vegetable industries. These two industries are extremely concerned about NAFTA, specifically the phase-out of U.S. import tariffs with Mexico.

To address their concerns, the Department of Agriculture is seeking to include in NAFTA a special safeguard provision for agriculture which would enable the U.S. to react quickly to sudden increases in imports of sensitive products, such as citrus and winter vegetables, during a transition period.

Please note that Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry (R) has already formed a Select Committee on NAFTA, made up of members of the Texas agricultural industry.

O. Immigration Issues

Due to a 9th Circuit Court of Appeals ruling on the one-year window of opportunity for persons seeking legalization under the Immigration and Nationality Act, the INS is required to accept applications for amnesty from undocumented aliens, pending the continuation of the litigation. The Justice Department estimates that 95 percent of the persons filing under the order from the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals are filing fraudulent applications in an attempt to gain permanent resident status and eventually, citizenship.

In Houston, the immigration problem has escalated with hundreds of immigrants gathering on street corners in residential neighborhoods, looking for jobs. Substantial media and Congressional coverage has prompted the Houston INS to coordinate and participate in town hall meetings, in an attempt to foster a better understanding of the situation and to seek solutions.

P. Prison Overcrowding

As you may well know, the state has been embroiled in a legal battle during the last ten years regarding overcrowding in the state prison system. In the case of *Ruiz vs. Texas*, the Federal courts required limits on state prison populations which have resulted in the premature release of inmates. This in turn has contributed to an increase in violent crime. As a result, the U.S. Attorneys' offices in Texas are being asked to prosecute defendants who otherwise would be prosecuted in state courts.

A settlement has been announced in the lawsuit which will lift the limits from populations of any new prisons that are either to be built or purchased. The hope is that this statement will allow the state criminal justice system to function effectively once again.

Q. Superconducting Super Collider (SSC)

In January of this year, the Department of Energy announced that the expected completion date for the SSC project would be September 1999, with a baseline cost of \$8.25 billion. Texas has committed nearly \$1 billion and the land for the project, while Congress has appropriated over \$1 billion to date in Federal funds for the SSC project. When requested FY 1991 funds were reduced by the Congress, Texas provided the additional monies necessary to keep the project moving forward.

R. Surface Transportation Funding

Texas' FY 1992 apportionment is estimated at a little over \$1 billion compared to \$772 million last year. As of April 28th, \$571 million of that \$1 billion had been obligated.

Under last year's Inter-modal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA), Texas will receive over \$6.88 billion from FY 1992 to FY 1997.

S. Houston Intelligent Transportation Systems (HITS)

Transportation officials have begun designing a system that would integrate traffic management and traveller information systems under various stages of development. HITS includes a freeway surveillance and control system that is comprised of a new traffic management center, a fiber optic communications network, automatic vehicle identification transponders as probes in the highway network, variable message signs, closed circuit television cameras, and other sensing devices.

T. Dallas-Ft. Worth International Airport

The Dallas-Ft. Worth Airport Board is planning significant expansion to accommodate anticipated traffic demands. The two major items in the expansion

plan are development of a new terminal on the west side of the central runway/terminal complex and construction of two new runways. Development of the terminal is considered so important in balancing air traffic between the east and west sides of the airport that the FAA has already approved funding for the apron and taxiways associated with the new terminal. Currently, 90 percent of the airport's traffic originates or terminates on the east side.

The development of the two new runways is the most controversial activity at the airport. Three communities (Irving, Euless, and Grapevine) are challenging the proposed expansion and have initiated a court suit protesting FAA's Record of Decision which approved the Environmental Impact Statement for the construction. Current negotiations are attempting to resolve the issues without a protracted court case.

U. Houston Westside Airport

The FAA and Houston's Department of Aviation are working with EPA, the Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Corps of Engineers to finalize an Environmental Impact Statement for the project which will include the compatibility of waterfowl use and aircraft operation, a wetlands determination and other environmental impacts.

V. Liquid Natural Gas Explosion near Brenham

On April 7, 1992, a major explosion occurred in the vicinity of two underground intrastate pipelines that connect to a salt dome facility used to store liquid natural gas. The site is located near Brenham but the explosion, which killed three and caused damage in excess of \$6.5 million, was felt 65 miles away in Houston.

The Department of Transportation is working closely with the Texas Railroad Commission to determine the cause of the accident. They are also checking on the safety of the other 400+ salt domes that are used throughout the state to determine whether existing regulations need to be modified.

W. Edwards Aquifer

On April 15, 1992 the Texas Water Commission declared the Edwards Aquifer an underground river subject to regulation. Traditionally, groundwater in Texas has been the property of the landowner. This is the first time an aquifer has been subject to the Commission's regulations and it is likely to cause significant public outrage.

The Edwards Aquifer serves as the primary water source for the City of San Antonio, which has been fighting with agricultural interests over the amount of water withdrawal. Nevertheless, both the city and the agricultural industry oppose the Water Commission on their declaration.

Further complicating this issue is the Sierra Club's lawsuit against the Interior Department for failure to enforce the Endangered Species Act. There are several aquatic species that depend on the springs which feed into the Edwards Aquifer. The Sierra Club wants the amount of water withdrawn from those springs regulated to protect the species.

The state and local governments have expressed their sincere hope that this matter can be resolved without federal intervention. In fact, Governor Richards has tried to push through her solution by threatening that "the Feds are going to come in and run our water business."

X. Trans-Texas Water Project

The Water Development Board is looking at the feasibility of building a pipeline to move water from the Toledo Bend Reservoir (on the Louisiana border) to Houston, San Antonio and Corpus Christi. The Texas Water Commission supports the concept and Houston Mayor Bob Lanier has taken the lead on the issue, especially since the proposal would help resolve his city's ongoing battle over the construction of the Wallisville Reservoir for future water supplies.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

There are two statewide races in Texas in 1992 -- the Presidential and Railroad Commission elections.

In the Railroad Commission GOP primary, **Barry Williamson** defeated **Carol Rylander** and will challenge Democrat incumbent **Lana Guererra**. The Republican primary was quite competitive, although Williamson's strong campaign and finance committee proved to be the difference. **BUSH-QUAYLE** General Campaign Chairman **Bob Mosbacher** hosted a fundraising reception for Williamson at his Washington home in 1991. **Guererra** was appointed to the Commission by Governor **Ann Richards**. Williamson is the son-in-law of **BUSH-QUAYLE** National Finance Chairman **Bobby Holt**.

Texas will have thirty two electoral votes in the 1992 Presidential election -- the third largest bloc in the nation behind California and New York. Texas' Presidential primary was held March 10, 1992, in conjunction with Super Tuesday. Both **Pat Buchanan** and **David Duke** qualified for the Republican primary ballot, in addition to the President. The Texas Presidential primary results are as follows:

Neither Duke nor Buchanan had any credible organization in Texas. All 57 members of the Republican Legislative Caucus endorsed the President. In addition, U.S. Senator **Phil Gramm** serves as Honorary Chairman of the Texas **BUSH-QUAYLE** campaign, with State Treasurer **Kay Bailey Hutchison** and Agriculture Commissioner **Rick Perry** as Honorary Co-Chairmen. **Jim Oberwetter** and **Barbara Patton** are the Texas Co-Chairmen; **Kevin Moomaw** is the state Executive Director.

The general election campaign in Texas could be quite challenging -- especially if billionaire **H. Ross Perot** enters the race as an independent candidate. Perot has spent a large amount of money recently through his exploratory committee, and all indications are that he will enter the race. Dallas attorney **Tom Luce** is directing Perot's efforts in Texas, and recently took a leave of absence from his job to work on the campaign full-time. Perot has opened a 50,000 square foot office in Dallas, and currently has over 150 paid employees on staff. On Monday, May 11, 1992, Perot filed over 200,000 signature petitions in an effort to qualify for the general election ballot. Texas law requires that an independent candidate must gather 55,000 registered voter signatures -- individuals who did not vote in either primary. In addition, Perot led a parade of over 3,000 enthusiastic supporters through the streets of Austin, and gave a speech on the grounds of the state capitol.

Some experts believe that Perot is very willing to spend over \$100 million dollars during the course of the campaign. This could be troublesome for the **BUSH-QUAYLE** campaign in Texas because of spending limits. Perot is considered to be a very serious threat, and Chairman **Jim Oberwetter** is preparing the troops for battle.

The **BUSH-QUAYLE** ticket carried Texas by a 56% to 43% margin in the 1988 Presidential election.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Texas will gain three additional Congressional seats in 1992. The Democrat controlled state legislature passed a plan for reapportionment -- which Republican Party Chairman **Fred Meyer** immediately challenged as a bogus gerrymander. Subsequent to the legislative plan, the state (with Governor Richards' approval) submitted a revised map, scrapping the initial proposal.

The U.S. Justice Department recently cleared the Congressional plan submitted by the Democrat controlled legislature -- over objections that the proposals were illegally drawn and are in violation of the Voting Rights Act. The Congressional plan will stand as submitted by the Democrats.

However, on December 17, 1991, the Texas Supreme Court threw out the legislature's senate plan, favoring a plan written by a three judge panel -- that is supported by the Republicans. The state GOP believes the ruling will enable Republicans to pick up at least four state senate seats.

Presidential Support, Presidential Opposition: House

1. Bush Support Score, 1991. Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

2. Bush Opposition Score, 1991. Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative voted "yea" or "nay" in disagreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

3. Bush Support Score, 1991. Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative was present and voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. In this version of the study, absences were not counted; therefore, failures to vote did not lower support or opposition scores. Opposition scores, not listed here, are the inverse of the support score; i.e., the opposition score is equal to 100 percent minus the individual's support score.

¹ Ed Pastor, D-Ariz., was sworn in Oct. 3, 1991, to succeed Morris K. Udall, D, who resigned May 4, 1991. Udall was eligible for 29 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score in 1991 was 0 percent; his opposition score was 100 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 0 percent in 1991. Pastor was eligible for 33 of the 111 presidential support votes in 1991.

² Thomas W. Ewing, R-Ill., was sworn in July 10, 1991, to succeed Edward Madigan, R, who resigned March 8, 1991, after being appointed secretary of Agriculture. Madigan was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 73 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 92 percent in 1991. Ewing was eligible for 49 presidential support votes in 1991.

³ John Oliver, D-Mass., was sworn in June 18, 1991, to succeed Silvio O. Conte, R, who died Feb. 8, 1991. Conte was eligible for 10 presidential votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 60 percent; his opposition score was 40 percent, and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 60 percent in 1991. Oliver was eligible for 59 presidential votes in 1991.

Blackwell was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

⁵ Sam Johnson, R-Texas, was sworn in May 22, 1991, to succeed Steve Bartlett, R, who resigned March 11, 1991. Bartlett was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 94 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 94 percent in 1991. Johnson was eligible for 76 presidential support votes in 1991.

⁶ George F. Allen, R-Va., was sworn in Nov. 12, 1991, to succeed D. French Slaughter Jr., R, who resigned Nov. 5, 1991. Slaughter was eligible for 94 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 68 percent; his opposition score was 12 percent; and his support score adjusted for absences was 85 percent in 1991. Allen was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

⁷ Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., as Speaker of the House, voted at his discretion. Foley was eligible for eight presidential support votes in 1991.

EDUCATION/CLINTON

Jennings reports Bill Clinton issued a powerful challenge today to President Bush on the subject of education. It is one area where both men claim they have demonstrated the ability to lead, a subject Governor Clinton says he intends to keep very much front-and-center in the fall campaign.

ABC's Chris Bury reports in a speech today Clinton ridiculed George Bush's promise four years ago to be the education president.

(Clinton: "America needs an education president who shows up for class every day, not just once every four years.")

Clinton promised in his first 100 days as president to send Congress an ambitious plan to improve schools. It includes national standards and testing for teachers and students, guaranteed access to pre-school through Head Start, federal loans for anyone who wants to attend college, and a national apprenticeship program for those who do not. Clinton would give families a choice among public schools, but unlike Bush:

(Clinton: "I am unalterably opposed to a voucher system to give people public money to take to private schools.")

Clinton's ideas for reforming education are more specific than his plan to pay for them. He says it is a question of priorities.

(Clinton: "Surely a country that found \$500 billion to bail out the S&L industry can find \$5 billion to fund the Head Start program.")

ABC's Bill Blakemore says by the time the Governors involved the President in the Education Summit more than two and a half years ago in Charlottesville, VA, Bill Clinton had clearly become a national leader in education reform.

(President Bush at summit: "Well done, Bill. Well done. You did a wonderful job.")

In the following months Clinton led bipartisan panels figuring out how to monitor America's progress towards the six goals [adopted at the summit] and how to help all pre-schoolers get ready for school.

For its part, the Bush Administration waited a year-and-a-half before presenting its own education strategy --

(President Bush: "We must create a new generation of American schools.")

-- and is under increasing attack by educators.

(David Hamburg, Carnegie Corporation: "The judgement of most of the people close to the education community is that the pace has been very slow, and not much has happened that shows tangible results so far.")

(Clinton: "The President's education plan amounts to a form of trickle-down education.")

Clinton would give the Head Start program twice the money Bush would and reach twice as many kids. But Clinton's main attack today was on the question of leadership. Educators do give him high marks for his record of hands-on involvement.

NBC's Robert Hager reports Secretary Lujan left little doubt where he stands.

(Lujan: "Owls die every day just like people.")

Only a thousand jobs would be saved for now, Lujan said, while thousands more remained threatened in the future.

(Lujan: "There's a 32,000 job loss. Personally, I'll tell you that's not acceptable to me. I hate to see 32,000 people lose their jobs. I hate to see one person lose their job.")

So Lujan called on Congress to permanently shrink the spotted owl's present protected area -- shrink it nearly in half. Environmentalists attacked that.

(Brock Evans, National Audubon Society: "The environmental president is saying drop dead to American wildlife, drop dead to American ancient forests at the same time he's trying to pretend he's the environmental president.") (CBS-7, NBC-Lead)

L.A./PRESIDENT

Jennings: President Bush spent another day trying to demonstrate his concern for America's inner cities. He visited one of the poorest neighborhoods in Washington. And he sent his point man on urban issues up to Capitol Hill, trying to convince the Congress the President really does care.

ABC's Brit Hume: President Bush found himself in the unusual position today of insisting that he doesn't mind at all that Housing Secretary Jack Kemp is seen as the top man in the Administration on urban policy.

(TV coverage of President Bush walking down OEOB steps toward White House.)

He was asked about Kemp in a satellite interview with a Los Angeles TV station.

(President Bush: "I hope he gets a lot of credit because he's been pushing these ideas for this Administration for a long, long time.")

But the idea that Kemp has been pushing them in an Administration that doesn't much care about urban problems is widely held, as Kemp found out for himself on Capitol Hill today. He was before a Senate committee and getting along just fine with the chairman until Kemp asserted that the President is fully committed to more than a one-shot effort for the cities.

(Kemp: "All of the emotions that I saw come out in him in the last two weeks are wrapped up in this issue. It's not going to be --")

(Sen. Riegle: "You know how that's going to get measured? By the follow through. Not by how strongly he feels about it -- by what he does about it.")

[Crosstalk between Kemp and Riegle.]

Riegle says he wants to see the kind of commitment the Administration has shown to such things like aid for the former Soviet Union. Kemp said that kind of commitment is there.

(Kemp: "The President of the United States sent me up here to your committee to tell you it's there. You get me the Democratic party. I'll get you the Republican party.")

**LIBYA 'RENOUNCES ITS TERRORISM
BUT REFUSES TO EXTRADITE SUSPECTS**

NICOSIA, Cyprus -- Libya said Thursday it was renouncing terrorism but refused to comply with the key demand of the U.S. and Britain to hand over two bombing suspects or face more reprisals....

The U.S. and Britain rejected the Libyan move, saying Tripoli must comply fully with all and not just some of the U.N.-backed Western demands.

ABU DHABI PLEDGES TO AID BCCI PROBE

A representative of Abu Dhabi said Thursday its government lost \$6 billion because of the fraudulent practices of BCCI, and it now stands ready to provide information considered critical to U.S. investigators probing the scandal-plagued bank.

Ahmed Al Sayegh, one of the officials advising the Abu Dhabi royal family on BCCI matters, told a Senate hearing that Abu Dhabi was an innocent investor that had pumped billions into the bank to try to save it before it was shut down by regulators around the world last summer....

Another witness, Dexter Lehtinen, former U.S. attorney in Miami, charged that senior Justice Department officials refused his requests for subpoenas against BCCI and last summer blocked him from indicting the bank and some of its principal officers on charges of tax fraud.

Justice Department officials denied Lehtinen's account, contending that he had wanted publicity on the high-profile BCCI case last year in hopes that it would help him win Senate confirmation of his appointment.

PERU BILLS U.S. \$20,000 FOR COSTS OF SHOOTING DOWN ITS PLANE

The government of President Fujimori this week handed the U.S. Embassy in Lima a bill for \$20,000, including charges for medical treatment for the injured U.S. fliers, lodging for U.S. investigators and repair crews, and gasoline used to remove the badly damaged U.S. C-130 plane from a Peruvian air base....

A senior Defense Department official said Thursday he was sure the Peruvian fighter pilots knew they were firing on a U.S. military plane. The C-130 was clearly marked with a U.S. Air Force insignia, which the "Peruvians apparently used as a target" for their cannon and machine-gun fire, the official said....

Bush Administration officials were astounded that Peru could both admit to such a mistake and seek compensation.

**GOP REBELS STEP UP PRESSURE FOR CHANGE
IN PARTY'S ANTI-ABORTION STAND**

Republicans who favor abortion rights are putting up billboards, planning rallies and making television ads in a show of muscle aimed at getting their party to reverse its anti-abortion stand.

Billboards contending most Republicans support legalized abortion start going up Friday in Salt Lake City, where the party is holding a platform hearing May 26 on abortion and other family issues. "Sixty-eight percent of our party can't be wrong. Republicans for Choice," declare the billboards.

Abortion-rights advocates say they will try to force the issue on the convention floor if the platform committee does not come up with a more accommodating document. (Jill Lawrence, AP)

BALANCED-BUDGET CLOUD

An Administration-backed effort to make it more difficult for Congress to raise taxes in the future suddenly has clouded the previously bright prospects of passage this year of a proposed balanced-budget constitutional amendment....

Proponents of the amendment said the measure would fail if Sen. Kasten succeeds in adding a rider that would require a three-fifths vote in the House and the Senate to enact a tax increase larger than the growth rate of the economy....

An Administration official conceded after Bush met with a bipartisan congressional delegation to discuss strategy for passing the amendment that Kasten's proposal potentially was a "poison pill" but that Bush intends to support the rider.

A Pentagon decision to fund displays of U.S. military equipment on behalf of defense contractors at trade shows abroad came under fire this week in the Senate and House.

Sen. Biden said he has asked the GAO to investigate U.S. government money spent at six such trade shows since the end of the Persian Gulf War. And Rep. Berman said he has introduced an amendment to the 1993 defense authorization bill that would bar public expenditures "for expenses incurred by U.S. arms contractors in exhibiting or promoting their products at military trade shows or conventions. RIOTS CAN CUT TWO WAYS FOR BUSH

President Bush is gingerly trying to harvest political advantage from the riots that scorched Los Angeles. "This is an issue that goes beyond politics," says Fred Malek.... Although the domestic void in Bush's record is again in the spotlight and his poll ratings are again falling, aides believe he's benefiting.

BUSH TRIES TO CONNECT BUT HIS MESSAGE IS VINTAGE '50S

President Bush's pilgrimage through the nation's low-rent districts is designed to show he cares. Just as he told recession-walloped New Hampshire before the February primary, "Message: I care," he now seeks to "connect" with voters on urban blight and racial tension.

"Connect" is the word politicians use to urge Bush to relate to real people. Ed Rollins has been advising Bush for months to connect. Oddly, so has Paul Tsongas, who said Bush should "convince the people of South Central Los Angeles and every distressed urban resident anywhere that he cares. It's that simple." He told Bush, "Reach out. Embrace people. Connect."

While decrying the failure of great society programs without saying which ones he doesn't like, Bush wants to spend billions of dollars more on the ones he likes, from housing to job training to preschool education for children from decaying neighborhoods. People who accuse Bush of not having a vision are wrong. He is clear on what he wants -- a return to the image he has of yesterday.

BUSH LEARNING ABOUT RACE,

CRITICS HOPE IT'S NOT TOO LATE

President Bush is getting a crash course in tense race relations in America from inner-city tours and from black supporters who believe he is genuinely concerned and not playing election-year politics. But critics say Bush's show of concern is belated and politically motivated. They ask why it took the worst country's leadership to dire conditions in the cities. It has been a new experience for a man with a lifestyle as close to royalty as America has to offer. "He's getting a better feel of the underlying problems and the racial tension that exist in this country," said one aide. "I think he's more sensitive to the situation."

Former Bush aide Thaddeus Garrett said Bush has long been sensitive to racial problems in America and has some experiences of his own, such as the day when one of his dark-skinned, half-Mexican grandchildren came home from school crying because the white students had made fun of him. "It's not a problem that he's suddenly discovered," Garrett said. "The depth of the problem is something that all of us are learning today. You could say that about a number of black politicians."

HOUSE APPROVES \$494.7 MILLION FOR URBAN RELIEF

The House Thursday approved \$494.7 million in emergency funds for urban disaster relief and loans, the first down payment on a pledge by Congress and President Bush to swiftly respond to the Los Angeles riots and crises in other urban centers....

Yet the House action, a 244 to 162 vote, was far from the overwhelming response many assumed in light of concern expressed by the White House and congressional leaders over the future of Los Angeles and other major cities. Many Republican members complained that the emergency funds were misguided and might be mistaken as a reward for rioters and looters.

"There's a general Republican sense that we shouldn't be throwing money at helping rioters," said Rep. Weber, who voted against the funding. "A lot of Republicans feel we're sending the wrong signal."

KEMP GETS PRAISE, BUSH GETS BLAME

Secretary Kemp won praise for his plan to save American cities but got into a shouting match with Sen. Riegle who lauded the secretary but sharply criticized his boss, President Bush....

Appearing before the Senate Banking Committee Thursday, Kemp explained that his goal is to implement several programs to provide jobs and home-ownership, and to root out gangs in U.S. cities.

Committee members, interrupting Kemp, suggested that the ideas were good and that Kemp should lead the effort, since they said the President has shown a lack of commitment. "I think time is running out on us. Every urban center is a powder keg," said Sen. Riegle. "We have to seize this particular moment. I don't know what is going on in the head of the President."

"Stop asking me to lead," Kemp began shouting. "The President has to lead it. Mitchell and Foley have to lead it. I will guarantee you the President."...

Among others testifying with Kemp were Jesse Jackson and Rep. Waters. In a statement delivered to the press, Jackson gave tentative backing to the idea of enterprise zones but said they were not enough. "While there is great merit to the theory of encouraging investment in depressed urban areas, the Administration's versions do not address the root causes of urban decay and despair," Jackson's statement said. "They would not effectively prevent future crises such as the one in Los Angeles."

Waters supported Kemp's idea of urban enterprise zones but stressed the most important problem is finding jobs. "In Los Angeles between 40-50 percent of all African-American men are unemployed and 40,000 teenagers are both out of school and unemployed," Waters explained.

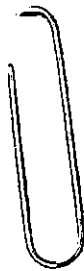

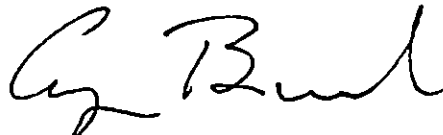

Testimony before President George Bush

WEED and SEED Community Meeting

Mr. President, your presence here in the heart of el barrio of Philadelphia is timely and important. It is important for the nation's leader to see first hand poverty and its devastation as manifested in :

- "bombed out" buldings,
- streets strewn with rubble which unscrupulous contractors have
- dumped on the inner city streets,
- disenfranchised youth standing on street corners engaged in
- most profitable urban enterprise--selling drugs,
- lack of recreation center for these youth,
- lack of up to date schools for these youth,
- lack of treatment facilities for youthful addicts who wish to get off
- the drug being used,
- lack of adequate housing for inner city families.

It is timely since Philadelphia too could have erupted in riots, fires as did L.A. What kept this from happening? Among other reasons, I believe it is the strong relationship developed between community and police, especially in the inner city neighborhoods. As neighbors work with police to rid our community of drugs and their effect, the police work with us to help improve the conditions, the outward appearance of the streets. They are also involved with our youth in positive programming: Adopt A Cop, DARE, Police Explorers, adopting schools.

But all the conditions for full scale riots were here! We can not deny that! We need to address them before they come to fruition. To do this just makes good economical sense! to say nothing of being the right thing to do.

I suggest that it is more economical for US government to look at helping to solve problems before they are forced to spend millions in just clean-up efforts. Weed and Seed provides that opportunity....if its funding is increased to enhance community building programs.

WEED and SEED efforts here in the inner city of Philadelphia need to be enhanced on the SEED side so that community members can empower themselves to rise above poverty. This can be accomplished through:

EMPLOYMENT:

Self help programs which encourage participant to take full part in the education system, in job development, in community development and building of community.

Jobs is most important component. There are several related topics: training for real jobs that exist, not just pretend job training programs that benefit only the provider who goes on to "train" another class of "workers" who can not get job;

job readiness will include Literacy education and whatever skill training is needed to prepare the worker for the jobs available.

jobs today will come from smaller businesses not large corporations, so the small business person needs to be encouraged to open here. We see a part of that coming from new businesses who will come to the American Street Corridor after Federal Enterprise Zone legislation is passed. This Enterprise Zone legislation will have appropriate tax incentives to make it worthwhile for a business person to start here and to hire local residents to work in that business;

jobs that exist here in the North Philadelphia area, not in far suburbs unless reverse commuting becomes cheaper.

Public money to help provide jobs which will rebuild the infrastructure of our city is just as important.

EDUCATION:

Schools in the inner cities need to be improved and to provide more of the needs of our children. Our schools do not match the ones in more affluent areas.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Funding is needed for continuing the work of small nonprofit agencies which support the social fabric of the community. These provide the various social services in support of family life. They offer outlets for

youth to be positively involved and stay away from drugs by being involved in prevention efforts which help them.

Programs such as ones offered at Norris Square Neighborhood Project where youth are being involved in prevention efforts which help them by:

learning about and protecting their environment while improving the quality of life through turning vacant lots into prize winning community gardens, changing graffiti covered walls into colorful, educational murals, and caring for their neighborhood park, recycling glass, etc;

learning to run their cooperatively owned business, Teen Screen Co. for production of silk screened T shirts;

being involved in after school arts and crafts, drama, reading, sports, gardening, nutrition, cooking, camping;

offering full range of summer programs.

Or programs offered at Woodrock where youth are actively involved in positive human relations activities among tri racial youth both in the city and at their country training site;

where youth learn leadership skills by working with younger members of the community in peer counseling relationship.

Both agencies, working with Community Healthy Networks, have benefited from private and public money (Anti-AIDS and SIDS education programs) which supported research, program development and evaluation for Group Process programs. This program promotes an active connection among health, group process, group support, community service project and not using drugs.

Prudential Foundation is to be congratulated for providing almost \$200,000.00 funding to support the project over the five years needed to prove its worth through project design, research, implementation and evaluation.

Federal money does not need to be thrown at another new "experimental" program to prevent drug use and AIDS. Rather it needs to support proven programs such as CHN.

Dr. Irv Siegel of Penn states that Cognitive learning contrasted with other interventions shows greater likelihood of being lasting. It is a better model than the clinical one where youth go to have "problem"

fixed/treated and go out and probably repeat the same behavior. It is also better model than school one which treats all the same. The lesson is learned by youngster to whom you are talking and others are the audience. The Group process model involves all in the group who learn the prevention concepts when they report and converse about the information to others in the group.

The group support is key to its success in the pre-adolescent age group. and it is cost effective! Gerson Greene of Federation of Settlements states that the CHN program costs \$6.95 per youth per day to intervene and prevent troubled youth!

Another factor of CHN's success is the presence,consistently and continuously, of same supportive adults in lives of these youngsters. Adults who will lead the group discussion, group support sessions and share their lives with the pre-adolescent.

HOUSING:

Successful neighborhood housing groups, such as Norris Square Civic Association, United Hands Land Trust, HACE have provided improved housing in the community. The workers in each of these programs come from the community! Pride in their work enhances not only their self esteem, but that of the community. One improvement usually fosters another!. But these organizations need continual support from the public sector WITHOUT long, drawn out battles for funding each year.

Improved housing stock greatly improves the community. A community with better housing, green and garden spaces, feels much better about itself and works on keeping the neighborhood looking good and crime free.

Mr. President, a test of your leadership will be to begin these initiatives through the WEED and SEED program.

As requested, a draft response to a letter from J.P. Reilly, President and Chief Executive Officer of Tenneco Automotive, is attached.

Reilly's letter reports on a survey of Motor and Equipment Manufacturers Association members, the largest parts industry trade group. Thus far, there has been more "business activity" than actual sales.

- Eighty percent of MEMA members reported increased "business activity;"
- Only four percent of the companies reported increased sales orders from Japanese auto manufacturers.

Reilly observes that U.S. auto part manufacturers do not currently have a large number of established business relationships with Japanese firms, but that the current interest of Japanese manufacturers is a positive sign for future trade.

He indicates that U.S. auto part manufacturers are encouraged by these positive signs and committed to pursuing aggressively the opportunities created by your visit in January.

The attached draft response expresses your pleasure on the progress made to date and notes that establishing stable business relationships with Japanese auto manufacturers is an important means for strengthening American competitiveness in a global economy.

Recommendation: That you sign the attached draft letter to J.P. Reilly.

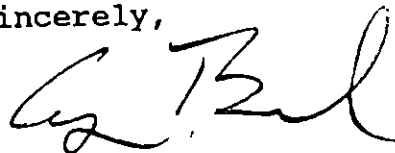
Thank you for your thoughtful letter. It was good to hear about the progress that has been made in expanding sales of U.S. auto parts to Japanese automobile manufacturers.

In my letter of January 13, 1992, I indicated that I would keep you apprised of progress being made by the U.S. auto parts industry in efforts to expand trade with the Japanese car makers. The early signs are encouraging, and it appears that the coalition of government and business is in fact a powerful force in opening markets and assuring free and fair trade on a global basis.

In our March meeting of the Auto Parts Advisory Committee (APAC), a straw poll of the membership suggested that there had been an increase in interest and activity on the part of the Japanese. The Motor and Equipment Manufacturers Association (MEMA), the largest parts industry trade group, was asked by APAC to survey its members to more formally assess any changes in parts procurement trends since our trip to Japan in January. The MEMA survey included a good cross-section of companies in terms of size and focused mostly on first-tier (direct to assembler) suppliers which have been active in developing business with the Japanese.

In general, the survey shows that Japanese manufacturers have accelerated their efforts to identify additional business opportunities with U.S. "traditional" suppliers. In fact, 80% of the responding companies indicate an increased level of business activity with the Japanese car makers. This result is consistent with reports received from the U.S. Automotive Parts Industry Japan Office, which MEMA administers. The Japan Office reports a doubling of both Japanese OEM and U.S.

suppliers' use of its services in the past quarter, in comparison to average 1991 levels. Although this activity is encouraging, we need to stay focused on achieving improved sales results. Continued discussions between the two sides will be necessary on the auto parts issues to insure success.

Results of this increased activity, (i.e., sales) are less definitive to date, with only 4 percent of survey respondents reporting increased Japanese purchase orders. These new purchase orders appear to be concentrated among the larger U.S. suppliers. Some 13 percent report an acceleration of business discussions to the extent that the timetable for receipt of actual purchase orders has been advanced significantly. Another 13 percent have recently been invited to participate in new or additional "design-in" projects. Only 20 percent report either no change in Japanese interest or the loss of existing business with Japanese vehicle producers or their U.S. subsidiaries.

The survey also shows that the current level of business which U.S. suppliers have with Japanese vehicle producers and/or their U.S. subsidiaries is relatively small in comparison to their overall level of automotive sales. About 70 percent of all respondents report that their total sales to Japanese vehicle producers in the United States and Japan amount to \$10 million or less, with nearly 60 percent reporting a level of business of under \$5 million. A few companies, however, reported much more significant levels of business, in excess of \$100 million/year. There also is a clear correlation between participation in "design-in" activities, level of business with Japanese OEMs, size of the U.S. supplier, and the number of years devoted to development of business with Japanese customers.

It is clear that Japanese vehicle producers have stepped up their level of effort since our trip to Japan and their announcement of specific U.S. procurement targets for JFY 1994. The results of this initiative will not become fully visible for several months at a minimum.

As I am sure you are aware, the Department of Commerce has continued their discussions with the Japanese via the MOSS process. Mike Farren's leadership and guidance on these issues has been invaluable to APAC in our efforts to promote the expansion of trade, and results are beginning to show. We expect to continue to implement measured, well thought out plans to increase our penetration of the Japanese market. Mike and his staff will continue to play a key role.

In summary, the foundation that was built during the January business mission has begun to show signs of benefit. Increased efforts on the part of both governments, the Japanese car makers, and the U.S. auto parts industry must now be made to insure that momentum is gained. Again, this early improvement in interest must be converted to actual sales. This is the message I will deliver to the heads of the Japanese car makers when Red Poling, Bob Stempel, Lee Iacocca, and I meet with them later this month.

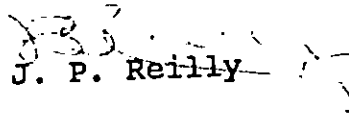
On a separate but related issue, you may find it of interest to know that the competitiveness of the U.S. auto parts industry was substantiated in a recent research finding. A Canadian research group (Fuss, Murphy, & Waverman) examined the North American automotive sector relative to the Japanese industry. They found that our parts industry was 18% more cost effective than our Japanese counterparts. This finding confirms my long held belief that U.S. auto parts suppliers are the most cost and quality competitive of any in the global industry. Further proof that when given a chance to compete fairly and freely in open markets we will earn our deserved share of the market.

As I stated after the January trip, I believe the Japanese now clearly understand the commitment of the allied U.S. government and business community to free, fair, and open global trading. The U.S. auto parts industry will continue to vigorously pursue these new business opportunities and monitor progress along the way.

SUBJECT: Letter to Edward O. Vetter

Ed Vetter, a life trustee of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), has written to you to complain about a lawsuit that the Justice Department is pursuing against MIT.

The suit charges MIT with violating the antitrust laws by conferring with other universities on the amount of financial aid to be awarded to students. Charges against the other universities were settled through a consent decree. Trial in the MIT case is set for June.

This may be more than you want to know about this subject, but in a nutshell: MIT contends that, with a limited pool of financial aid available, consultations among universities prevent "bidding wars" regarding the aid packages they will offer particular students. MIT argues that, as a result, they are able to provide assistance to a greater number of students.

The Department of Justice contends that such consultations restrict competition among universities to attract the best students, and are a form of cartel-like behavior.

The draft response thanks Mr. Vetter for his letter but notes that it would be inappropriate for you to comment on pending litigation brought by the Justice Department.

Recommendation: That you sign the attached draft letter to Edward O. Vetter.

As a life trustee of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, I would like to direct your attention to the enclosed editorial from the NEW YORK TIMES. I agree completely with the thrust of this article.

Briefly, MIT, as many other private universities, have long had a "needs blind" admission system. In order to have available scholarship funds as well as other assistances (such as loans, campus work, etc.) spread around as much as possible, we measure the financial "need" of the students after acceptance in a consistent way. To make this work, we developed with other schools broad standards regarding the level of equitable support. Otherwise, MIT, Harvard, Stanford, etc. might be tempted to bid up the "stars" who have multiple applications working. The result would be less money for truly needy students.

On a personal note, I went to MIT as the son of an immigrant butcher. Were it not for my small scholarship, I probably would have not have made that choice. I am convinced that this education opportunity has played a large part in whatever contribution I have been able to make to my family and country.

The rest of the universities involved, apparently to avoid expensive litigation, have entered into a consent agreement with Justice. MIT is continuing to fight the battle on principle. It's costing us a lot of money but many of my fellow trustees believe it's a worthwhile cause. With all the challenges America should be tackling, the apparent zeal of Justice to go after MIT on this issue would be non-existent on my priority list.

U.S. vs. Needy Students

One would think the Administration of the self-styled Education President would embrace ways to help needy students get through college. Instead, the Bush Administration has gone to court to block the way the Massachusetts Institute of Technology spends \$20 million a year on scholarships. Why? Because the Justice Department thinks M.I.T. is violating antitrust laws.

It's a destructive claim, unworthy of litigation. At least it warrants being contested. But Justice now wants to deny even a fair hearing; it asks for summary judgment. That risks turning the unwarranted into the outrageous.

The Justice Department says M.I.T. and eight other premier universities have been engaged in a conspiracy. They agree to offer students only enough aid to meet their need. Justice thinks that's price-fixing — despicable, automatically illegal and therefore undeserving of a trial.

M.I.T. admits that an agreement existed. The purpose was to prevent a bidding war that would deplete the funds available for needy students. But so what, according to the Justice logic; the letter of the antitrust laws should be upheld.

The argument fails on the merits. The antitrust laws are designed to stop price-fixing by commercial enterprises that exploits consumers. They are not intended to stop nonprofit organizations from cooperating in charitable endeavors. Giving schol-

arship aid to needy students is surely a charitable activity. At the very least, the Government is obliged to prove the cooperative agreements somehow aided a commercial purpose.

At the crux of the dispute is a simple question: What did M.I.T. do with the money it saved by avoiding a bidding war? The Government assumes that it went to improve faculty salaries. If that were so, the suit would be justified.

But the assumption appears to be dead wrong. Dennis Carlton, a University of Chicago economist, in a study commissioned by M.I.T., shows that the universities that agreed to provide aid only to meet financial need used the savings for more financial aid. Needy students, not faculty, benefited. Indeed, Congress uses the same policy to dispense Federal financial aid.

Meanwhile, the very filing of the suit in May 1991 has done grievous damage. Colleges, under threat of suit, have abandoned cooperation. Forced to bid for students, many can no longer afford a "need-blind" admissions policy — the practice of admitting academically qualified applicants regardless of need.

Several M.I.T. trustees grew up on the wrong side of the tracks themselves and owe their scientific education to generous scholarships. They believe in need-blind admissions, which is why they have refused to capitulate to Justice and are fighting this bizarre case. They deserve the support of all who care about scholarship and scholarships.

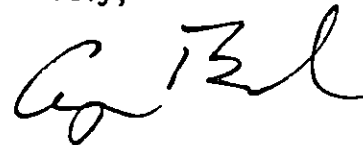

Bonnie Guiton, 1st Black Woman in Cabinet, to Quit

SACRAMENTO—Bonnie Guiton, the first African-American woman to serve in the Cabinet of a California governor, is expected to resign her position with the Wilson Administration and become a dean at the University of Virginia, it was learned Thursday.

Administration sources said Guiton, secretary of the State and Consumer Services Agency, will leave the \$100,000-a-year post next month to accept an appointment as dean of the university's business school. She was unavailable for comment, but her deputy, Kevin Eckery, said a formal announcement is expected today.

Before accepting the state job, Guiton held various jobs in the Bush and Reagan administrations in the 1980s. Early in 1991, Gov. Pete Wilson appointed her to head the state agency, which has jurisdiction over a wide range of regulated businesses and professions.
