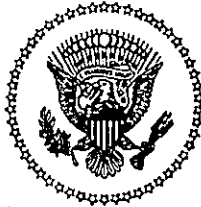

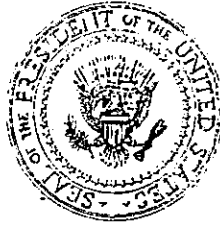

Dear Mr. President:

As a friend and long-time supporter, I urge you to allow federal funds to be used for fetal tissue transplant research. Legislation from Capitol Hill lifting the fetal tissue moratorium will soon be on your desk. As one who has lived with Parkinson's Disease (PD) for eight years, I pray you will open your heart and mind to the reasons why you should sign this legislation.

Since I stepped down as Editor-in-Chief of Reader's Digest in January 1991, I have devoted much time trying to understand the complex world of medical research and in particular neurological disorders such as PD. What I have learned is deeply troubling. At the center of the matter is the four-year moratorium forbidding any kind of federal expenditures for fetal tissue research.

Let me share with you a recent visit I had with Dr. Eugene Redmond, director of Yale University's neural transplant program. Here at the world's most advanced facility for the study of transplantation of fetal tissue into the brains of Parkinson patients, Redmond and a group of doctors have performed 11 transplants in the last four years. His long awaited findings, which have just been released, disclose that neural cells from the fetal tissue are able to graft to the impaired Parkinsonian brain and revive its ability to produce dopamine, the missing neural chemical so desperately needed for motor function. As a result, patients have experienced alleviation of Parkinson symptoms.

This entire undertaking did not cost one cent of federal money. As a research procedure, each transplant involves a team of 23 doctors and nurses and costs more than \$100,000. "If the ban had not been in effect," says Redmond, "by now we would have performed at least 20 transplants and learned far more about this experimental research." If fetal transplantation were being considered like any other new treatment or new drug, the government would require about \$100 million in safety and efficacy.

These days Redmond spends a large part of his time on the road raising money for the transplant program. It is absolutely necessary if he is to continue the research. In addition to his own search for funding, he is concerned about the "chilling" effect the ban has among scientists in the field of fetal research. "A great number of neurological researchers will not touch fetal tissue study with a ten-foot pole for fear of being labeled trouble makers by those who pass judgment on federal grant proposals," says Redmond.

Another factor now emerges. Fetal tissue research is quietly being used to help find cures for the AIDS virus and a number of other maladies such as heart disease, lung cancer, Alzheimer's, diabetes and multiple sclerosis. Researchers at Stamford are working to test fetal tissue implants on immune deficient mice as a basis for an AIDS vaccine. Declares the American Cancer Society: "We have areas of research directly related to cancer that have benefitted from the use of human fetal tests." The American Heart Association says, "The moratorium on fetal tissue transplantation research impedes implant scientific investigations including studies which impact on prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease."

Would you, Mr. President, still restrict federal funds for fetal tissue transplants if in fact they could arrest the AIDS virus?

Many political observers say that you are determined to maintain the fetal tissue moratorium in order to insure the support of anti-abortion activists in this election year. Knowing your love of life and your courage, I cannot believe you really want to perpetuate this flagrant restriction of free scientific inquiry. Mr. President, I beseech you to rescind this ban and lend hope to millions of us who are plagued by incurable diseases.

# My Ruthless Companion

SEEKING PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE WITH PARKINSON'S DISEASE



**I**T WAS ON A visit to Beijing, nearly seven years ago, that I first became acquainted with an alien being in my body—and my life. All too soon I would learn what a ruthless companion he was. Now not a day passes that we do not run into each other.

Neurologists have a name for this mysterious malady that decimates precious cells deep within our brains and makes it difficult for us to walk or talk or control our motions. They call it Parkinson's disease.

Because I wanted a more personal relationship with this amorphous creature who roams my blood stream and attacks my brain cells, I called him Brain-Dead Bob—a name I pulled out of the blue.

It was at a crowded restaurant near Tiananmen Square in late March, 1984, that I got my first warning from Brain-Dead Bob. As I reached for a bowl of shrimp, my left arm began to tingle and shake. It was over in seconds and I thought little more about it. At age 53, I was in excellent health. And I put it entirely out of my mind a few hours later, at 3 a.m., when I got a phone call advising me to return to New York immediately. It was more than likely, I was told, that I would be named editor-in-chief of *Reader's Digest* magazine.

In the busy days that followed, I experienced a slight trembling of my left hand two or three times. Each episode lasted just a few seconds. My wife, Janet, urged me to see a doctor. We did

recall that my elderly mother had a tremor in her left hand.

Our family physician referred us to Dr. Mark Green, a soft-spoken neurologist. He gave me a full examination, from tapping on my kneecap to testing my eyesight. He was especially interested in my mother's tremor, which he concluded was harmless. "You probably have the same thing," he said. "Nevertheless, we can't absolutely rule out Parkinson's disease." A shiver went up my spine. The mere words had a tone of doom.

For the next eight months I had no major problems. With the help of a drug called Inderal, the tremor in my arm disappeared completely. Then one morning I noticed it was difficult to lift my leg as I walked. In subsequent nights I was awakened by an ache deep in my left leg. My remedy was to lift my legs above me and pump as if I were riding a bicycle: 20 minutes of this usually did the trick. But as a creaking bed and a gyrating husband were not ideal for sleeping, I asked Janet if she'd like me to move to our guest room. "No way," she answered. "This bed is designed for you, me and the cats. And the threat of some disease is not going to break up our sleeping together."

My next visit with Green in June, 1985, was not a happy one. In particular, he found that my left hand did not turn and twist as easily in its socket as the right hand. "Ken, I must tell you this is a key indicator of Parkinson's disease," he said matter-of-factly. "I'd like you to see Dr. Lucien Cote at the Columbia Presbyterian Neurological Institute. He's one of the world's top Parkinson's specialists." Mark wasn't exaggerating: The first appointment we could get with Dr. Cote was six weeks away.

Cote, a handsome man with friendly blue eyes, put me through a series of hand and foot coordination tests. We were doing fine until he asked me to

hop on my left foot along a corridor next to his office. I managed to make only one ridiculously tiny hop. When the doctor excused himself for a minute to take a phone call, I looked over to Janet, who had watched the entire exercise. She rolled her eyes, then gave me a wink. We knew the game was up. Score one for the bad guys.

Dr. Core told us I had Parkinson's. "Please do not let this overwhelm you," he said. "A huge amount of research is under way, and you're only in the earliest stages of the disease." Outside his office Janet shook her head. "Honey," she said, "that was a bad hop."

Now we edged into the question of whom to tell. We decided it was not necessary for our daughters, Lara, 14, and Alexandra, 13, to know just yet. Certainly the same would come, but why burden them now? I explained the situation to George Grunc, chairman of the board of Reader's Digest, and assured him that except for occasional aches and muscle stiffness I was in excellent physical condition and could work the long hours the job demanded. He agreed we should keep the matter private.

The variety of medicines developed to combat Parkinson's is awesome (see "Dr. Parkinson's Cruel Disease," p. 54). The trick is to find the mix that minimizes both symptoms and side effects, which can be nasty. Determining the best formula can be excruciatingly slow. It takes six weeks, for example, to go from one to three milligrams a day of a given drug. And just when you think you have things right, Brain-Dead Bob throws another curve ball. Your handwriting becomes painfully tiny no matter how hard you try to keep the letters large. Your voice suddenly goes soft, and you can't speak in a decisive manner.

In early March, 1987, Mark Green informed me that a drug called Deprenyl was undergoing a major test in the U.S. It was reputed to dramatically slow down Parkinson's progressive nature, particularly in its early phase. Though sold in Europe for years, the drug had not yet been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for commercial use in this country. (It's now available here under the name El-depryl.) One place to buy Deprenyl was in London, and the man to see there was Dr. David Marsden, a top Parkinson's expert. With Green's assistance, I finally arranged to see Marsden in July. He asked me a few questions, tested my coordination skills and prescribed a year's supply of the drug.

I collected the medicine at the venerable pharmaceutical house of John Bull & Croyden, which looked like an 18th-century apothecary. Presently, one of the pharmacists handed me a carefully wrapped package—five canisters, each containing 150 tablets. Upon arriving in New York, I stashed the canisters in various pockets and tied my best not to look like some illegal drug runner. For the first time in my life I was scared stiff as I went through customs. My real fear was not that I would be penalized for shipping these drugs into the country, but that my pills would be confiscated. Somehow, I made it through. I headed for the nearest water cooler, swallowed a Deprenyl and whispored, "Score one for the good guys."

For the next two years Deprenyl kept me on a very even keel. In fact, I didn't even need to see Mark Green. But by 1989 Lara and Alexandra were sensing that something was not quite right with me. Both noticed my frequent shuffling at home and they started telling me to pick up my feet. "You're walking around like some old man," declared Alexandra, who privately called me "Carpet Cleaner Ken."

That year we all spent Thanksgiving in Naples, Fla. Late on Saturday afternoon I asked my daughters to take a walk with me. It was misty and few people were on the beach. This seemed the right time and setting.

"Let's stop a minute," I said. "I want to talk to you about a serious matter." When I mentioned the word "Daddy," she sobbed, "that's a terrible disease that kills you."

"No, no, sweetheart. You must be thinking of Alzheimer's, which is far more life threatening than Parkinson's." I told them about the vast network of researchers working to find a cure for Parkinson's. "Also," I said, "with the help of new medicines, I've been able to lead a normal life. And 10 years from now when I'm close to 70, I'm sure there will have been major breakthroughs." I was prepared for the next question. "Is Parkinson's hereditary?" asked Lara. "No, the vast majority of Parkinson's specialists say there's no substantial evidence that it's passed from one generation to the next."

For a few seconds we stood in silence, the mist swirling around us. Then Lara and Alexandra wrapped their arms around me. We clung to each other, tears rolling down our cheeks. Then a giggle from Alexandra. "Daddy, I'm sorry I called you Carpet Cleaner Ken." We laughed until more tears streamed down our cheeks.

The year 1990 brought me to a turning point. While I had managed to keep my ailment on a plateau, mainly due to Deprenyl, new difficulties arose.

By far the most demoralizing development was the "on-off" syndrome, which occurs after you have Parkinson's four to six years. The benefits of your medicine wear off unexpectedly. You are suddenly in an "off" period, which can mean walking problems, shortness of breath, dizziness and mild confusion.

One evening at a charity dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, I headed through a crowded room to get drinks at the bar. On the way back, my feet suddenly felt as if they were trying to walk through six inches of mud. I found myself immobilized in the middle of the crowd, begging my feet to go forward. Finally I plunged ahead, stepping on toes and sloshing our drinks.

By spring of that year I suspected that several of my colleagues had noticed my awkward moments and were beginning to worry that I wasn't well. I decided to let the key members of my staff in on my disease.

I talked to each one of them almost casually, noting from the outset that I could be far worse off with lung cancer or other diseases. I suggested that they pass the word along in whatever fashion they felt best—just no overdramatic announcements. I was overjoyed to have

the secrecy behind me and to discuss my ailment openly with colleagues I had known for years.

As weeks went by, harsh reality began to assert itself. The "off" condition was sneaking up on me at least once a day. There was no way I could fulfill my responsibilities as editor-in-chief up to the standards I had set. I spoke with George Grune and in October he announced that due to Parkinson's I would be retiring early at the end of the year at age 60. I had mixed feelings—gut-wrenching sorrow to leave a job I so loved, yet rising excitement at the prospect of new ventures and more time with Janet and our daughters.

My days in "retirement" are as full as ever, with both writing and editorial consulting. And I've been able to give far more attention to understanding and combating Parkinson's. I remain convinced that the cause and cure of Parkinson's will be found in my lifetime.

Meanwhile, those of us affected must do the best we can, knowing every day has good and bad moments. Consider the weekend Janet and I attended a seminar at my alma mater, Brown University. One evening there was a cocktail reception at which president Vartan Gregorian would speak. As I was getting dressed for it, I had problems fastening the buttons on my shirt. I was determined to do it myself. We were already running late and my button battle consumed another 20 minutes. By the time we finally arrived, Gregorian had finished his talk. Janet was upset. I was frustrated and mad at myself.

After dinner I went down a long stairway to the men's room. Suddenly my feet froze, my left heel tangled with my right ankle and I took a beaut of a fall, landing on all fours. Fortunately, the only thing seriously bruised was my dignity.

So ended one more up-and-down day in my life with Parkinson's. That night, I went to bed uplifted as always by lines from Romans 12:12: "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer." And as sleep crept upon me, I was also comforted by the late writer Malcolm Cowley's words: "If you're over 60 and wake up in the morning and nothing aches, you know you're dead."

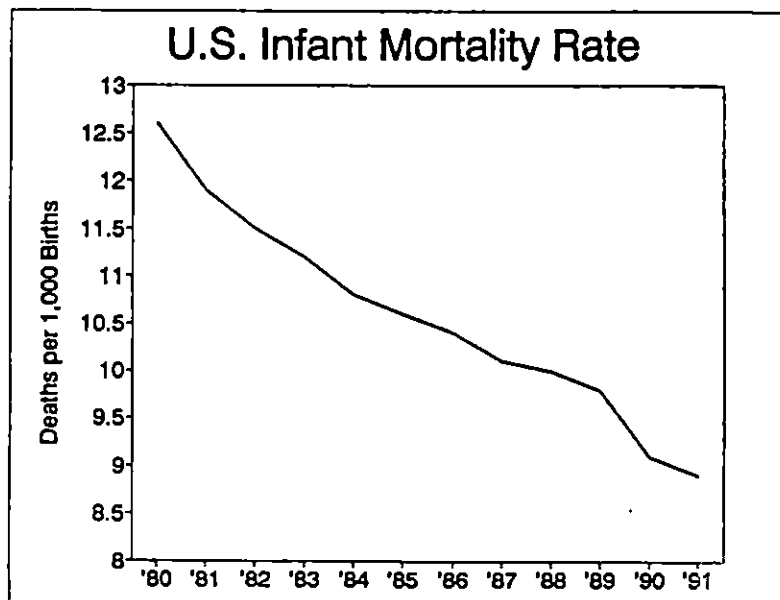

SUBJECT: Infant Mortality in U.S. at a Record Low

Some good news. The most recent infant mortality data shows the U.S. infant mortality rate reached a record low in 1991 of 8.9 deaths per 1,000 live births. This represents a two percent decline from the 1990 rate. The reduction continues a sustained downward trend in infant mortality rates.



Still, over 36,000 infants died in 1991. Researchers have found that the single most important predictor of infant mortality is low birth weight. The two most significant factors leading to low birth weight are smoking during pregnancy and not gaining enough weight during pregnancy.

Women who smoke are twice as likely to have low birth weight babies. Teenage mothers are particularly at risk given that they are more likely to be smokers and less likely to gain the recommended weight during pregnancy.

Before my arrival at the meeting yesterday you raised a question on our budget. Our budget strategy through the convention is divided into three phases:

1. Primaries. Here we spent a fair amount as needed for advertising, candidate travel, and our ground game to help you achieve comfortable margins of victory.
2. Since March 17, we have been in a consolidation phase where we have tightly controlled all expenditures with no advertising or direct mail, a shut down of almost all state offices and payroll, and limited candidate travel. As a result, our total spending from the start to May 1 is about \$11.5 million.
3. The third phase will begin in late June and build up to a full scale effort in the four week period between the Democrat and Republican Conventions. Here we would mount major surrogate activities (a good warm up for the general), an increasing number of candidate trips and in the crucial four week period before our Convention, a major advertising campaign of about \$5 million.

The above plan enables us to match anything Clinton does during this period with his general election funds and should give you a good start going into your Convention.

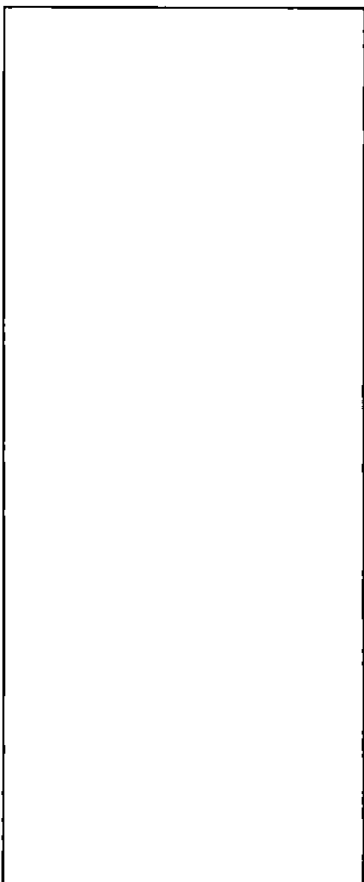

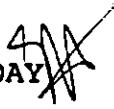

- Thank you Al. Everyone in this room should recognize that our effort is much broader than just responding to Los Angeles. We have a comprehensive effort for reforming the way we treat urban blight. I know several of you have been working hard in advancing our urban agenda, but we need everyone in this room doing everything possible to promote our initiatives.
- We are moving together as a team and I am proud of that. But we really must double our effort to promote what we have done. We have a solid record of accomplishment and we are moving ahead on legislation.

- Our task now is to make sure that the American people know the steps we are taking. That means emphasizing our record at every one of our public appearances. Let me mention just a few things that we should be highlighting:  
  
--We have Enterprise Zones and HOPE for home ownership, two solutions that our Secretary of Housing and Urban Development has so capably pursued.

A PROCLAMATION

Huntington's disease is an insidious, hereditary neurological disorder that causes the gradual deterioration of one's ability to speak, move, and think. The National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke reports that some 25,000 Americans have Huntington's disease, and that each of their children has a 50 percent chance of inheriting the defective gene that is associated with it.

One of the tragic facts about Huntington's disease is that it usually becomes manifest in the middle years, after an individual has established a career and a family. The estimated 125,000 Americans who are at risk of developing the disease may spend years anxiously awaiting the appearance of symptoms, such as tics, lapses in memory, and unsteadiness. If an individual develops Huntington's disease, the resulting dementia, slurred speech, and uncontrollable movements progressively worsen. For those fortunate not to develop the disorder, Huntington's disease can nevertheless take an emotional and financial toll as they care for stricken loved ones.

Today, patients and their families have just cause for hope; a new era of discovery is unfolding in research on Huntington's disease. Members of the biomedical research community are aggressively pursuing studies to identify the exact location of the gene associated with Huntington's disease and to learn how it functions in the body. Once the gene is located and its mechanism of action is exposed, scientists will be able to analyze and possibly to correct the defect, thereby conquering Huntington's disease once and for all. Until scientists achieve these goals, however, affected individuals and families will continue to need our understanding and our support.

In order to enhance public awareness of Huntington's disease and to express concern for those affected by it, the Congress, by Senate Joint Resolution 251, has designated May 1992 as "National Huntington's Disease Awareness Month" and has requested the President to issue a proclamation in observance of this month.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE BUSH, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim May 1992 as National Huntington's Disease Awareness Month. I encourage all Americans to observe this month with appropriate programs and activities.

The Y.E.S. program provides support throughout a 20 county area of rural Texas. Since its inception in 1990, nearly 450 high school youth have undergone training to be providers and companions for senior citizens. During a six hour orientation session, the youth are taught constructive citizenship skills and how to communicate with their elderly friends. To date, 250 youth providers have devoted over 2,500 volunteer hours to assisting over 200 senior citizens in their communities.

The youth providers enhance the independent life style of rural senior citizens by performing such tasks as basic auto maintenance, gardening, running errands, and small household projects like vacuuming and light bulb replacement. In return, the young people acquire insight into the life experience of their elder friends, helping them to set personal goals such as attending college and career choice. Friendships have developed between the youth providers and their senior companions during these weekly visits. The generation gap is also bridged through community projects. Opportunities such as landscaping, painting the local Post Office, and Rock-A-Thon, a fundraiser to benefit the senior citizen center, have created better understanding and camaraderie among all the participants.

The President salutes the young people and senior citizens of Youth Exchanging with Seniors Program for exemplifying his belief that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

At no time in recent history has international commerce been so important to the economic productivity and strength of the United States. As more and more peoples around the world join the ranks of free and democratic nations and reform their economies on the basis of market principles, American business, agriculture, and industry face unprecedented opportunities and challenges. Thus, it is fitting that we pause to recognize the role of international trade in creating jobs for our citizens while spurring America's productivity and competitiveness.

Today the success of U.S. exporters is driving our Nation's economy toward stronger growth. Last year, U.S. merchandise exports soared to a record high of \$422 billion. Our trade deficit dropped to \$66 billion, the lowest level since 1983. Exports not only mean jobs to the men and women who develop, grow, manufacture, and market products for sale abroad but also help to bring prosperity to our communities.

This Administration will continue to work in partnership with U.S. business and industry to promote the quality of American goods and services and to eliminate barriers to free and fair trade. The United States led the way in initiating the current set of negotiations on the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), and we will continue to work to bring the Uruguay Round to a successful conclusion. We also remain committed to the full implementation of our Enterprise for the Americas Initiative, as well as to the completion of a North American Free Trade Agreement, which will create a thriving market of 360 million consumers and an estimated \$6 trillion annual output -- the largest integrated market in the world. THE PRESIDENT: Thank you very much for that welcome, and welcome to the South Lawn of the White House. May I salute the national directors, the home builders and the many, many friends that are here. I also want to single out two members of our Cabinet, Secretary Brady; and then one you know so well because you've dealt with him a lot, Secretary Jack Kemp, who's out there doing an awful lot in the housing field. (Applause.)

Welcome to the people's house. Some of you may know this is like a museum, well over a million people going through every year. And I don't know how many are going through right this minute, but I'm sure they're going to think we're having a yard sale out here when they see all of this stuff. (Laughter.)

But we're here to mark a special birthday. And I heard a little earlier from the leadership about this 50th anniversary of the Home Builders. And I want to salute a special team of them, the leaders, with whom I just met in the Rose Garden. First, of course, Jay Buchert, who has done an outstanding job for this organization -- outstanding. (Applause.) And then Roger Glunt and Tommy Thompson and Jim Irvine and Mark Tipton, Bob Bannister, and, of course, Kent Colton. I want to thank you at the beginning of these brief remarks for your support. Even more, we Bushes are grateful for the friendships we have of those in the Home Builders.

And Millie was a little disappointed. She thought she was going to get a new dog house here. We came and checked it out this morning. (Laughter.)

But I do believe that Barbara and our kids believe in these same values that you all have -- community, country, respect, responsibility, family, jobs, peace. And we know we put America first when we put America's families first. And for 50 years, that's what the Home Builders have been doing. And you're helping people fulfill the American Dream and enlarge the American pie.

And when the homebuilders were founded, the NAHB, almost one-half of the nation lived in substandard housing; and only four in 10 owned their own homes. Today, more than 70 million new homes and apartment units later, two in three households own their own home. That is dramatic progress; but we're not done yet.

For that, I salute you. Once again, you're helping our economy work so that America can get back to work. And, yes, we have had some tough times in this country. But consider this: 264,000 housing starts in the first three months of this year; a two-percent GDP growth in the first quarter, more than a quarter of that resulting from residential construction. The old adage is coming true: As housing goes, so goes the economy. (Applause.)

MORE

Your industry employs more than six million Americans. More and more, they're helping other Americans turn recession into recovery. I speak here as a participant, not a bystander. From my Texas business days I know what it means to meet a payroll and try to balance a budget and help people put food on the table.

Like you, I know that strong housing can help a strong economy. I know how that helps Americans worrying about providing for their families, meeting the challenges of paying their bills, buying that home, and setting aside for retirement. That's why, in my State of the Union message, I announced a program for economic growth. And I called for penalty-free withdrawal from IRAs, for the purchase of a first home; changes in the passive loss-tax rules to spur the real estate and housing development; an extension of mortgage revenue bonds and the low-income housing tax credit. And, yes, I called for a job-generating cut in the tax on capital gains. (Applause.)

And here's the one I feel would really also help this economy and help it fast -- a proposal that we've made and that I'm proud of -- a \$5,000 tax credit for first-time homebuyers. (Applause.) We need this credit to keep the housing market on the mend, helping people like you sell and build homes. And here's why: \$5,000 could pay seven months of mortgage payments on the average American home. According to your own figures, these housing initiatives would mean 415,000 new construction industry jobs and \$20 billion in new economic activity. This is just one more way that your slogan, "Housing equals jobs," can be realized.

I challenged the Congress again today to pass these growth initiatives. Parenthetically speaking, to discipline both the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch, we need to get moving on that balanced budget amendment. I really believe the time for that has come. (Applause.)

Some in Congress haven't gotten the message the message yet. But I believe -- and I think Jack and Nick Brady would agree with me -- the time is right for some of these new ideas -- ideas that we've been proposing but that haven't been tried. I think the American people want to see us take some action and get something new done. So I'm optimistic that we can move forward now in the Congress in a way that we haven't been able to in the past.

This year, the home builders ran an ad in The Washington Post. And the headline was marvelous, if you haven't seen it. The headline read: "Earth to Congress: Enough is enough." (Applause.) I don't believe anybody could have said it any better than that. (Applause.)

Well, you've heard the definition of a contractor: A gambler who never gets to shuffle, cut or deal. (Laughter.) We have to make it easier to deal, sell, hire, invest. So we're going to continue to sound that message that sound banks should make sound loans. And the bankers should also work with the borrowers experiencing temporary difficulties from the remnants of the recession.

For our part, we have been working with the Federal Reserve to keep these interests rates low. And we've been fighting for common-sense regulation, not overregulation, of banks and thrifts. And we are going to keep on that fight. (Applause.) We have made over 30 specific regulatory policy changes -- many, frankly, with the help from your leadership -- to enhance the ability of banks and thrifts to raise new capital, to make new loans and then to work with troubled borrowers.

Nick Brady, Treasury Secretary, and I are going to work to be sure that these measures are carried out. And next, we're

going to push hard for the HOPE initiative, requesting \$1 billion in funding for Fiscal '93, and a key part of our plan for a new America to bring opportunity to our inner cities. (Applause.)

Now, Jack Kemp knows how hope can give poor families a stake in their communities. And his message is beginning to get through up there in the United States Congress. Bottom line: HOPE will turn housing into homes.

And HOPE is only one part, actually, of our six-point plan for a new America, which will use opportunity, not bureaucracy, to combat poverty and inequality. And the plan also includes our Weed and Seed initiative -- it's an anticrime initiative -- enterprise zones, education reform, welfare reform, and also a strong jobs program for city youth. This plan makes a promising start. And we are going to do our level best to get it passed.

And, yes, I will continue to push for what we mentioned a minute ago -- regulatory reform -- because I want government to help, not hurt, the ability of private enterprise to expand and to create jobs. And so I've extended for another 120 days the blanket moratorium on federal regulation. And Jay puts it this way, your President: "Let builders build." And I know he agrees that we need policies that also let buyers buy. And that's what part of this is all about. (Applause.)

I wish everyone understood this concept. On the other hand, you know what it takes -- it takes more than bricks and lumber and mortar to build a home. It takes heart. And it takes skill. And it takes dreams.

And you know that owning a home helps America, makes it better, more caring. And you show this in your Homes Across America program, where NAHB members build and renovate homes for the needy. And so far I am told that this program has housed more than 600 families. And with us today is one of them, Gerald and Angela Williams, and their four children, sitting right over here in the front row -- Murria, Charlease, Gerald and Latoya. (Applause.)

They moved into their new home in Jacksonville on Mother's Day. And the Williams home was built by the builders of the Jacksonville Association of the NAHB and Habitat for Humanity. And I salute them and also salute those who made it possible and also salute the Williams family.

You show how the dream of homeownership keeps the American Dream alive. And that dream seemed illusive half a century ago, but you, right here, all of you, have aided it and nurtured it as a parent does a child. And for that, we are all very, very grateful to you. We salute you on behalf of each American. And on this special anniversary, for those who have done so much, we say thank you from a grateful country. And may God bless you all. And may God bless the United States of America.

Thank you all very, very much.

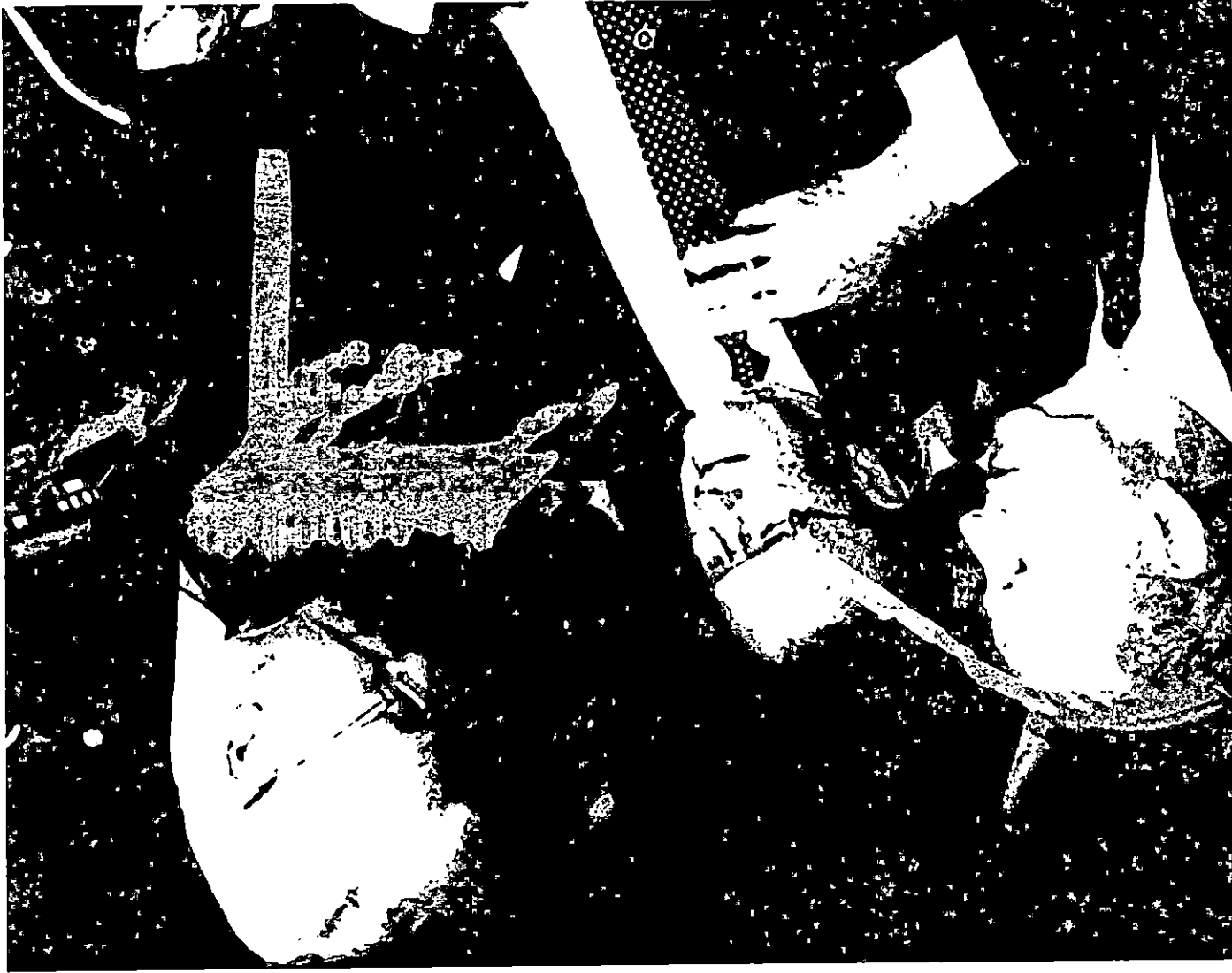

for the Columbus Zoo

Purpose

To reply to Congressman Wylie's request for help in accelerating the delivery of Chinese pandas to be loaned to the Columbus Zoo.

Background

You are familiar with Congressman Wylie's request for intervention with the PRC to speed the delivery of pandas. The international zoological community opposes such loans because they contend the movement puts at greater risk an already endangered species.

China has introduced some health and quarantine procedures, requiring three months preparation in China, in part to address these concerns. Congressman Wylie wants your support to shorten these steps in order to maximize Columbus' investment in the pandas. Part of the rush is due to the late approval of an import license by the Department of Interior.

The letter at Tab A is intended to be responsive, but in cautious terms.

RECOMMENDATION

That you sign the letter to Chalmers Wylie at Tab A.

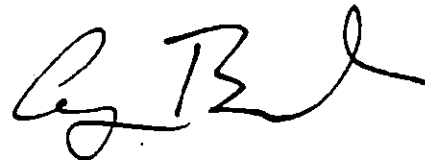

Dear Mr. President:

I understand that you had a very good trip to Columbus, Ohio, yesterday and I was pleased to hear of the warm reception you received from The Ohio Association of Broadcasters Convention in downtown Columbus during your visit to Central Ohio.

I also understand that during your visit to Columbus, you had an opportunity to talk with Tom Stewart of WBNS Radio in Columbus about the status of the pending short-term loan of the Giant Pandas for our Columbus Zoo. Tom mentioned to me last night that you stated you were still very interested in this matter and not only wanted to be kept informed of our progress in obtaining the Pandas, but further, you were most anxious to help in any way possible.

At this time we are very close, Mr. President, to making this particular loan a reality. As you know, and as was communicated to you in my prior letter, we have received the needed Import Permit from the DOI here in Washington and, further, we have received the necessary Export Permit from the Chinese Government as well. We are now facing one last hurdle and that is, to the best of our knowledge, nothing more than an administrative delay in regard to the Quarantine Period of the animals in China prior to shipment to the United States. The Chinese Government has told us that there is a new regulation in China requiring a mandatory three-month quarantine period of the Pandas prior to shipment to any country. They have also said, for us, that they might reduce that time period to two months. The animals, to the best of our knowledge, went into quarantine on April 10, 1992. If the Chinese hold to the three-month period, that will mean we will have to wait until July 10, 1992, to receive the Pandas. If they hold to two months, we would obviously have them in mid-June.

Mr. President, in order for us to participate in the spirit of The Christopher Columbus Quincentennial Celebration in Columbus, Ohio, which is currently already underway, the Columbus Zoo needs to get this important exhibit open to the public as quickly as possible,

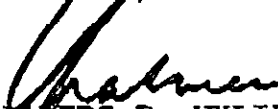

but certainly no later than the upcoming Memorial Day Weekend. To delay the opening until early or even mid-summer, because of a problem that is simply administrative in nature, seems to be a mistake and is one that we are trying to work with the Chinese to avoid. In our discussions with the Chinese, they have asked several times about your personal interest in this matter. We have told them since the beginning of this process, several years ago, about your continued support and interest in this loan. In dealing with the quarantine, they have already indicated that they do have the ability to shorten the time period if they want to (i.e., the reduction from three months to two months). It is the feeling of several people that have been involved in this project from the beginning, that if our negotiating team had some type of written communication from you indicating your continued support of this loan and the need to proceed as quickly as possible on the matter, this last hurdle will be resolved and we would be in a position to move forward very quickly. To that end, we would be most appreciative if you would agree to send me a short note indicating your continued support of and interest in this Panda Loan for the Columbus Zoo. We would then be in a position to transmit this written communication to the various officials we are dealing with in China as a way of not only indicating your continued support, but as a way to help get beyond this one last problem.

The exhibit at the Zoo is complete, the 1992 Celebrating in Columbus, Ohio, has begun and, as you are well aware, all of the City's 1992 activities are fully underway. The one last matter to be addressed is the Panda Issue. The Committee feels that with your help this final issue will be resolved in short order. On behalf of the citizens of Central Ohio, thank you for your continued interest and support in this matter, Mr. President. Please also know that I personally appreciate your personal commitment to this endeavor.

Dear Mr. President:

It certainly was a pleasure to welcome you and the First Lady to Columbus last Monday for the opening of AmeriFlora 92, the official beginning of our Quincentennial Celebration. It was a great day for our community, and should be the first of many throughout the year.

Unfortunately, we are stymied once again in our efforts to effect a timely arrival of the two giant pandas to the Columbus Zoo for our Celebration.

As you probably know from the very favorable press reaction in Ohio, the Department of the Interior approved the import permit on April 10, and issued that permit on April 20 for the pandas to come to Columbus. The Columbus Zoo has been ready to receive them since April 20 when the Chinese officials were faxed a copy of the approved permit.

We are now hearing that China may not send the pandas until mid-June. It could be much later, even though the most advantageous time to reach the many people who will attend the exhibition is from May 1 through early October.

I am concerned that a failure of the Chinese to ship the pandas could have negative political overtones.

A delegation from Columbus is going to Beijing on April 26 to try to break this inexplicable logjam. I believe these negotiations will be immensely assisted if the Chinese have received a letter from you indicating that you would try to make time in your schedule to open the panda exhibit.

As you can suspect, the zoo has spent many hundreds of thousands of dollars in building the panda exhibit. To not have the pandas come now would be a real set back.

Dear Dr. Reid:

The President shared your letter with me and asked I respond to your suggestions on ways to address the social unrest in the Nation.

In regard to your first suggestion for adequate employment opportunities in communities through the creation of businesses, you noted that tax relief can be the incentive used to accomplish this goal. As you may know, the Administration has strongly promoted the establishment of enterprise zones for the purposes of promoting investment in economically distressed neighborhoods, attracting businesses and returning employment opportunities to the residents of those areas. Enterprise zones will attract new seed money for small business start-ups, and create new incentives for entrepreneurial risk-taking. Enactment of enterprise zone legislation will target tax incentives and regulatory relief to some of our Nation's most economically depressed areas.

You also mentioned the need for education and job training programs in these communities. In the budget submitted to Congress for the next fiscal year, the President has given the Department of Education \$6.8 billion in funding for compensatory education for the disadvantaged, serving over 5 million children in a variety of programs. This is the largest discretionary program increase for any department in the Federal Government. The programs benefiting from this increase include Head Start, mathematics and science education and programs promoting drug-free schools.

As for job training, President Bush believes that America needs a dynamic, flexible, and well-trained workforce. While he believes the primary responsibility for job training must remain in the private sector, Federal, State and local governments can play an important supporting role. The Administration intends to build a comprehensive and coordinated job training system by streamlining Federal programs currently dispersed across numerous agencies. This will allow for "one stop shopping centers" designed to serve individuals and employers more effectively. Using 600 business-led Private Industry Councils, local businesses will be able to provide greater input to job training and education programs in communities. These councils will manage Skills Center, the primary point of entry into Federally-funded job training and occupational education programs.

Your third point about creating a network of Daily Points of Light in order to address urban problems is very revelent right now. In September of 1991, the first 575 Daily Points of Light met at Disney World in Orlando, Florida to meet with the President and do precisely the type of networking you suggest. As a result of the positive feedback received from the participants of that effort, a more organized process is being contemplated. Your offer to help in your letter to the President is greatly appreciated. I have passed your letter onto Miah Holmstad and Perry Lucas of my staff so that they may follow-up with you on this matter.

The President greatly appreciates your taking the time to communicate your thoughts and your willingness to serve. You have his best wishes.
