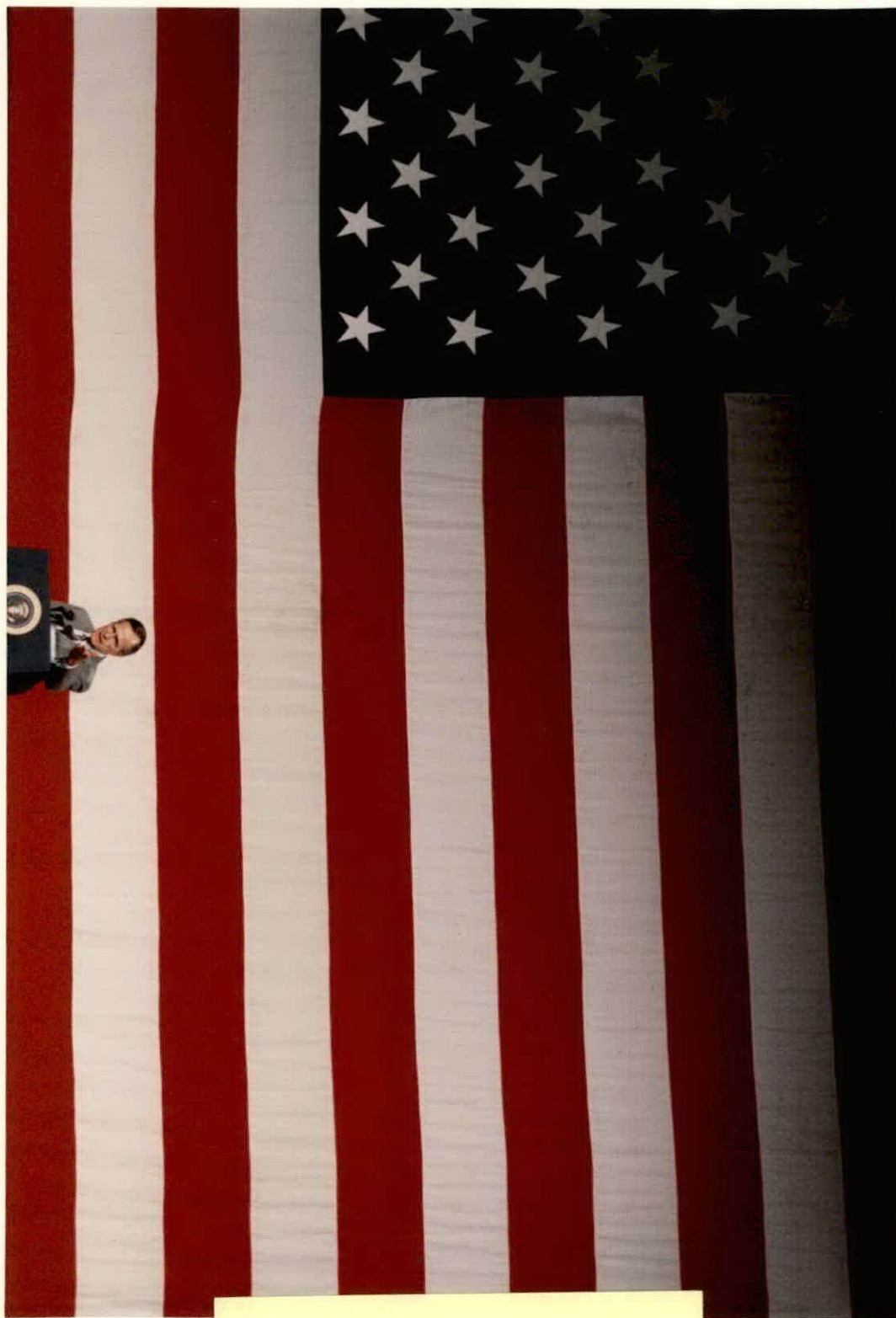

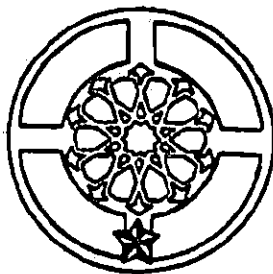

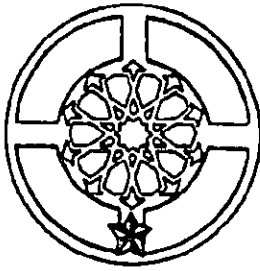

Prior to this, he served as President of The Commonwealth Group, 1987-1989; Managing Partner with Peat Marwick in San Francisco, California, 1969-1987; and as Partner -in-Charge of the Banking Industry Group of Peat Marwick in Los Angeles, California, 1958-1969.

Mr. Gilleran was graduated from Pace University (B.B.A., 1955). He was born May 1, 1933 in Ellenville, New York. Mr. Gilleran served in the United States Army, 1955-1957. He is married, has two children and resides in San Francisco, California.

REMARKS BY THE PRESIDENT
AT BUSH-QUAYLE '92 FUNDRAISING PICNIC

Hangar 26, Westchester County Airport

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you all very much. It is a pleasure to be here, and I'm delighted -- Lou, thank you, sir, for that introduction. Please be seated out there. And be seated up here. (Laughter.) Sorry about that. No, but I'm delighted to be here. I'm sorry that Barbara Bush is not here. She was here just a few -- couple of weeks ago at another event.

But it's a thrill to be back in my hometown -- near it -- one of my many hometowns. I just had a chance to drive up across the line into Greenwich to see my almost 91-year-old mother. So in a way, it is a homecoming. And it really is when you look out here and see so many friends, so many people that worked way back in the political wars and have given me this extraordinary opportunity to be President of the United States in these wonderfully exciting -- challenging, yes -- but wonderfully exciting times for our country.

And I'm pleased -- I want to thank Lou, I want to thank Ginny, his wife; both of them so nervous they can hardly speak about the future grandchild that's appearing any minute now. (Applause.) I want to thank the Young Artists' Philharmonic for bringing us a little class into this hangar. Real good. Thank you all very, very much. (Applause.) And salute several old friends -- John Rowland, who we miss in the Congress and I expect you miss him as governor of this state. (Applause.) But nevertheless -- and Bobby Holt and my old friend, Brian Gaffney and Betsy and Spike Hemingway and Dick Foley and Bob Macauley and Leon Hirsh, Jack Neafsey and fellow Republicans, including our very special Secretary of HUD, Jack Kemp, who is doing a superb job, trying to get this Congress to move. (Applause.)

And a special thanks to my old friends -- they were with us in the convention and four years ago. I am a fan of theirs. They came down from Bangor, Maine to be here, heading right on down to Atlantic City. But let's hear it once more for the Oak Ridge Boys. They say an awful lot about this great country of ours. (Applause.)

Now, not for a long one. Billy Graham tells this marvelous story about the speaker that went on and on and on. Somebody sitting over about where Jack was picked up the gavel, heaved it at him, missed the speaker and hit a lady in the front row. And she said, "Hit me again. I can still hear him." (Laughter.) I want to keep this one brief because it is a lovely and an informal evening. But let me just make a few comments.

In the first place, I do think we've got a lot to be grateful for in this country. I think we have many, many blessings. And I see these kids here and I am very proud that our administration has had some hand in seeing that these kids don't go to sleep every night worried about nuclear war. We have

changed the world, and we've changed it for the better.
(Applause.)

And I just came from a very emotional meeting -- Freedom Day it is out in Cleveland, Ohio; and came from a very emotional meeting with what used to be called "the captive nations people" -- Ukrainians and Hungarians and so many others -- Poles, Eastern Europeans of all kinds, and then those now republics represented by the republics of the Soviet Union -- former Soviet Union. And again we ought to keep that sight as we count our blessings -- the United States -- because we stayed strong, and I salute my predecessor Ronald Reagan for this one -- because we stayed strong and determined, those nations are no longer captive nations, they are free nations, and democracy is on the move all across the world. (Applause.)

So just as we have brought these changes, with a lot of help, I will concede -- but we brought these changes to the world, we've got to change things at home. And that is exactly what we have been trying to do for the last three years. Some successes, not enough. We've got to change the world.

And let me just tell you, as Jack and I went out to Los Angeles and looked at it, what we feel needs to be done in the way of change. And it's not just to take care of that city that went through the horrible times. It's not just that. Because the ideas I'll mention to you real quick are ideas that would resonate for other cities, other communities across this country. And all of them are built on the principles -- personal responsibility, opportunity, ownership, independence, dignity, empowerment, the family. And it all adds up to the American Dream.

And here's what we're talking about: We have a great program that we're trying to get to Congress to help us with now called Weed and Seed. It backs our wonderful law enforcement people. It weeds out the criminals and goes after the drug dealers. And then it seeds the neighborhoods with hope and opportunity. We need to get that through the United States Congress. And I believe we can.

The next one is enterprise zones; something that we've been championing for three years; Jack on the cutting edge, and effectively so, I might add. And what that says is, better than some make-work program, let's change the tax structure so you can draw like a magnet into the inner cities some businesses who are going to take a chance, who are going to take a gamble. And it's going to make it worth their while through the tax changes so they will then offer jobs with dignity in the private sector to those that have been bypassed as far as the American Dream goes. We need enterprise zones now, and I'd like to have your support with the Congress. (Applause.)

Another one is, we must reform the welfare system. And people say, oh, well, wait a minute, is that some kind of code word. It is not. What we're doing is offering waivers to these states so they can try. Wisconsin came in, they've got a program called Learnfare, to take welfare dependency people and have them an opportunity to learn; similarly, Workfare programs. We have got to innovate in this country.

And then there's a much more compassionate side of welfare reform. A kid saved the other day a little over \$1,000 and the welfare people came to get the family, and said, your daughter here has saved a little over \$1,000; you can't do that on welfare, that violates the rules. We're trying to change that so families can save a little money and work their way out or get themselves an education. So we've got to reform the welfare system. And the time has come. And the people that will benefit the most are those who have been on welfare hopelessly without any chance at the American Dream. Help us change it.
(Applause.)

We've got a wonderful job training program: Job Training 2000. We're going to coordinate the services to the people that need it the most. And, again, we're going to push through -- our able Secretary of Labor Lynn Martin and others -- to get this Job Training 2000 enacted.

A fifth one is homeownership. You see, we believe that if a person owns their home -- if a person owns the home, it is far better. They take a pride in it, a dignity comes back, it strengthens the family, and it is a far better approach than these failed housing projects that strip families of their dignity. And so we're pushing hard for homeownership. And, again, we're going to try to get the Congress to help us in every way possible. Give that opportunity to American families. (Applause.)

And the last one -- and it is vitally important and it doesn't have quite the short-term implications -- we must reform our education system. And we are talking about a new program -- David Kearns that's so well-known in this part to many people was very instrumental in it and so is Lamar Alexander, our Secretary -- we're literally talking about revolutionizing American education -- brand-new schools in each state, not necessarily in bricks and mortar, but new concepts. And trying that and saying the old system hasn't worked, let's change it. For example, let's give parents a choice of where they want to send their schools -- religious or private, whatever it is. Give them a choice and watch our educational system improve. (Applause.)

So these are some of the initiatives we're pushing. And then overlying that, we have some other fundamental ones. Every time I see young people I'm saying to myself, we've got to do something to keep from mortgaging their future. And we've proposed capping the growth of these mandatory programs. We are now fighting for a balanced budget amendment. And we need your help to get that one through the Congress. It will discipline our branch of government, and it'll discipline the United States Congress. And the balanced budget amendment will be phased in and it'll save the future generations if we can get it passed. (Applause.)

Two other points you'll be hearing more about as we engage in the fall, and I will be encouraging people to send more Republican congressmen down their to Washington, both in the Senate and the House. One of them is the line-item veto. (Applause.) You give me that line-item veto that these 43 governors have and watch us get that spending under control. (Applause.)

And the last one, we've got to reform our legal system. We've got to sue each other less and help each other more. (Applause.) And we have proposals to do just exactly that. That's the tip of the iceberg.

There's a domestic agenda for you. And we're going to take the case to the American people. And Lou is right: The American economy has begun to move. A recent poll that I saw and analyzed here just a few days ago -- 70 percent of the American people think the economy is getting worse. They are wrong. It is beginning to turn. And when it does, the fortunes of the Republican Party and those people that share the values I've spelled out here are going to rise and they're going to rise precipitously. We are going to win the election in the fall, we are going to get more people in the United States Congress that believe and think as you and I do, and thank you for your help in making that possible.

Thank you all, and may God bless you. (Applause.)

After the speech in the Stouffer Hotel Ball room, President Bush met privately for twenty minutes with Mr. Charles Ballard, president of the National Institute for Responsible Fatherhood and Family Development. Your pool was not allowed to see or hear the meeting, but Sec. Jack Kemp, who sat in on the meeting, said that Murphy Brown's name never came up. He said that Ballard told the president what has to happen in the inner cities to help families. Ballard's suggestions were "exactly" what Bush has already been talking about, according to Kemp. Ballard said that there have to be more black-owned enterprises and that we "need to empower the people instead of the Welfare bureaucracy" according to Kemp.

The motorcade to St. Josaphat's Cathedral was uneventful. Large crowds of people lined State street near the end of the trip, and young children from the John Muir Elementary school held up signs welcoming Bush.

After his speech at the Ukrainian center, Bush made a spontaneous stop at a house adjacent to the center. Joan and Bill Wright were sitting on lawn chairs in their front yard with their two grand children. ^{They} ~~was~~ were not expecting a visit from the President. Bush, in shirt sleeves, walked up to one of the Wright grand children and said, "I saw your granddaddy waving the flag." Michael Busch said that Bush decided ~~that~~ he wanted to visit the Wrights when he saw Mr. Wright waving his flag as the motorcade pulled into the Ukrainian center driveway. Mr. Wright, it turns out, is a retired fireman who voted for Bush in '88 and plans to do so again this year. Wright's sister, Alice Cole stood with the family for photos with Bush and told your pool that the President visited their family because "he's a common man." Mrs. Cole and her brother seemed genuinely surprised to find themselves chatting with Bush. After visiting the Wrights, Bush grabbed the hand of one of their grandchildren (a young girl) and crossed over to the next door neighbor's house. A crowd of people standing behind a police rope shook his hand. One young man said to Bush, "I'm a college graduate and I'm a laborer. Can you help me get a job?" Another man, Dr. Gene A. Nelson, showed Bush his "pen-based", or pen-automated computer which is made by the Biophysics Company. Reporters in the pack asked Bush what he thinks of his standing in the polls. There was some confusion about Bush's response. Once he said, "you live and die by the polls," and another time he said he "was not troubled" by the polls.

Before boarding the C-20 to Westchester, Jack Kemp spoke to reporters about Bill Clinton's speech in downtown Cleveland. No news on the plane. Bush flew to Cleveland on the C-20 Gulf Stream with Judy Smith, Brent Scowcroft and Sam Skinner. Your pool flew on the C-9 with Jack Kemp, Ron Kaufman and Nick Calio. No one came to the back of the plane to talk to your pool. Bush was greeted at the Cleveland Hopkins International Airport by Governor George Voinovich and his wife Janet and a handful of other State officials. Bush also met with local Points of Light greeters. There was no airport greeting crowd. Your pool was informed that there will be 400 people paying \$1000 a head at the luncheon fundraiser and there will be 250 people also paying \$1000 each at the Westchester event.

On the tarmac a senior Administration official offered some background on yesterday's negotiating session on the urban aid package up on the Hill. The official said "It went Ok, but slow. We were there and we were prepared... We were very specific with them because we're prepared to go forward." The official said that the Administration believes an agreement can be reached with lawmakers on the Summer Jobs Program, but, "We don't like Kennedy-Hatch; it's ill conceived." He said the White House wants to see a program targeted more narrowly to localities and individuals who really require the assistance rather than a distribution based on a formula. He said the meeting lasted about an hour. Present were Mitchell, Dole, Michel, Gingrich, Foley, Gephardt and later on briefly attending were Bonior, Dixon, and Seymour. The official said there may be another meeting today chaired by Gephardt, but it may not come off.

Note from the Chief of Staff: The President will use his private time this afternoon to visit his mother in Greenwich, CT. No changes expected in the Press schedule.

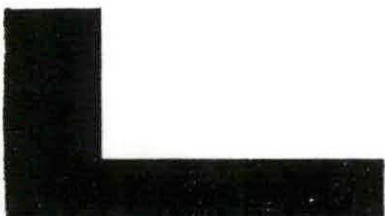

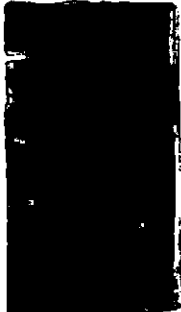

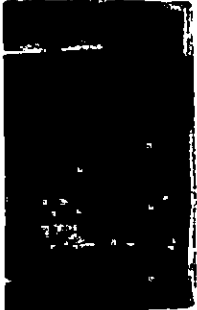

The Bush Administration and Ohio

+ In the health care area, Ohio has benefitted from its negotiations with HCFA -- we were able to expand our **Medicaid program** by \$275 million. Also, the President recently signed legislation to permit the **Dayton Area Health Plan** to continue beyond April 30.

+ **Andy Card** and the **U.S. Department of Transportation** continues to be very helpful. For instance, the recent approval of a **Delta route** from Cleveland to London (the first direct overseas route in Ohio) will be an asset to Northeast Ohio. + **Lamar Alexander** granted Ohio a special two-year waiver of a federal regulation that would have otherwise restricted the State's use of Social Security reimbursements to fund various programs that help disabled Ohioans remain in the workforce. This waiver saved the State \$3 million.

+ **Vice President Quayle** and the **Competitiveness Council** deserve a big pat on the back for standing up and fighting senseless government regulations that threaten jobs. In this regard, we were pleased with the Administration's decision to extend the regulatory moratorium.

FEDERAL PRIORITIES -- STATE OF OHIO

DEFENSE

The Pentagon has requested proposals from interested communities for expanded **Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) Centers** in the next several weeks. This process affords Cleveland and Columbus the opportunity to expand their operations from 1,700 and 2,000 employees respectively to as many as 7,000 employees each. Although a final decision is not expected from the Pentagon on winning sites until 1993, some basic decisions will be made later this year about where to place the additional 18,000 jobs that DFAS will gain. Both the Cleveland and Columbus Centers are highly regarded and would make excellent sites for expansion.

Despite the fact that the Congress has authorized and appropriated \$5.67 million for the purchase of 16,000 acres for the **Muskingum Training Area**, the Pentagon has placed a moratorium on the acquisition of land blocking the release of this funding. Although other states have had their requests to waive this moratorium granted, the Pentagon has refused to waive the moratorium for Muskingum County. Because Ohio currently has no major training area, Ohio guardsmen must travel great distances at considerable expense -- \$1.1 million in 1991 --- to neighboring states for their training. Valuable training time is lost travelling, thereby reducing readiness and making Ohio units more vulnerable to future force cuts. The savings from keeping Guardsmen in-state for training would pay for this acquisition in less than 7 years. Regardless of the programmed force structure reductions for the Ohio Army National Guard, Ohio will continue to need a training area for the considerable National Guard force that will remain. Ohio has appealed the most recent Pentagon decision not to grant the waiver. This application has reached Deputy Secretary of Defense Atwood for final disposition with an unfavorable recommendation by his staff. As a result, we need the White House's help to ensure that this worthwhile project is approved. Procedurally, this is our last chance.

Due to programmed force reductions, the Ohio Army National Guard's medical and aviation capabilities, which are essential for performing state missions, will be eviscerated. While we recognize the need for force reductions as part of overall defense spending reductions, the complete loss of these assets would be devastating to Ohio. Consequently, Ohio seeks the Administration's assistance in retaining the 112th Medical Brigade, which has been identified for elimination despite the highest possible readiness rating, and for filling the second helicopter battalion of the 28th Armored Division in Ohio. Ohio already has helicopters, trained aviators, and airfield facilities paid for and available for deployment of this battalion.

EDUCATION

Ohio proposes to work in partnership with the Bush Administration and Secretary Alexander to **reduce federal over-regulation of the education system**. True systemic change in education cannot occur without substantial deregulation of the education system, which is more highly regulated than most U.S. enterprises. The majority of the Ohio Department of

Education's resources -- 75% -- currently are devoted to compliance activities. Under the direction of Governor Voinovich and Superintendent of Public Education Ted Sanders, the State is working to identify programs that have unnecessary and burdensome paperwork and reporting mandates and eliminate them. Unfortunately, many of these mandates are federal. Local schools in Ohio send well over 300 different forms totalling over 1000 pages to the State each year. Over 50% of this paperwork is required to receive federal funds that constitute only 5% to 6% of a local district's budget. Ohio needs the Administration's assistance in reducing burdensome reporting requirements. We view this proposal as beneficial for states and the Administration, since it is entirely consistent with the President's comprehensive deregulation initiative.

HUMAN SERVICES

States, like Ohio, that want to make comprehensive health care reforms cannot do so without **federal waivers from current Medicaid regulations**. Existing waiver authority is fragmented and narrow in scope (i.e. it simply is not an appropriate vehicle for statewide reform). For example, waivers have different -- sometimes conflicting -- criteria, time frames and administrative requirements, and the application/approval process takes too long. As a result, the Administration must provide states more flexibility through current and expanded waiver authority. In particular, **Ohio currently is seeking quick federal approval of a vent-tech waiver** that would substantially increase Ohio's ability to efficiently and adequately meet the pressing needs of vulnerable children in need of medical services. We are seeking to expand our vent-tech program for people with a tracheostomy or who are ventilator dependent. We are not asking for more federal money, but simply approval to boost the available slots by adjusting services and cost caps. Approval will allow us to expand services to medically fragile children at a cost below institutional care. We would like the White House's help in expediting the approval process.

Ohio and the National Governors' Association have been working with the American Public Welfare Association and state child support directors to develop a proposal to overhaul the **federal child support enforcement audit process**. As a majority of states can attest, the current audit process is cumbersome, inefficient and does not address the true performance of state child support programs. The group proposes the following changes in the audit process:

Audit Criteria - States are currently audited on the basis of bureaucratic administrative procedures and processes. Federal audits should instead focus on outcome-oriented performance measures such as paternity establishment and collections. The current system, under which more than 40 states have failed an audit, is obviously misguided. The Bush administration should ensure that children are receiving the support they deserve by using more reasonable and less bureaucratic audit criteria.

Audit Penalties - The very essence of an audit should be improvement not penalty. Yet states currently are penalized when their programs are found to be out of compliance with federal audit criteria. This loss of federal funds does little to improve state programs and ultimately hurts the children we are trying to help. Our proposal provides some financial relief to states by extending the current corrective action plan and suspending penalties for a certain period of time.

We are finalizing the specifics of the proposal and will forward it to Congress and the Administration later this month. Congressional staff from the House Ways and Means, and Senate Finance Committees have agreed to try to move the proposal through the legislative process this year. The Administration's support is essential to its passage.

support the use of reformulated gasoline in nonattainment regions and areas wishing to opt in, some state air officials charge. "The ink is not even dry on the reg neg and an oil company has crafted a white paper at a time when 12 governors have already opted in" to the reformulated gas program, an agitated state air official says, adding "[the governors] are completely chagrined." This source charges it is a "totally disingenuous action" since Marathon Oil had signed the reg neg. "The governors are quickly learning they're getting criticized," this source says, adding, "many states are furious." This source predicts small business interests will soon get wind of this action and realize that absent a reformulated gasoline program, states will have to turn to "mom and pop operations" to crank down on air pollution, and "there will be a tremendous backlash" against the oil companies.

A Marathon Oil Company source defends the white paper as "factually accurate," and argues "there is nothing in the reg neg agreement that prevents anyone from 'telling it like it is'." This source also emphasizes that the company has not received complaints as to the accuracy of the white paper. But another petroleum industry source calls Marathon's "Fools Rush In" pitch "terrible," arguing that "the tone of the document is not very helpful." This source notes, however, that "every company has its own unique personality" and that Marathon has a right to voice its concerns, adding, "obviously, Marathon has company-specific concerns in Ohio." This source notes that Marathon raised specific concerns during the reg neg process that other companies did not support.

Marathon's white paper argues that "while a number of states have rushed to opt into the federal reformulated gasoline and in some cases to the California [Low-Emitting Vehicle] LEV program, far too little is known at this time to justify such action on any reasonable basis. Some parties have supported a 'get in line first' theory based on the erroneous idea that supplies will run out if you get in line too late. On the contrary, if the market is free to act, supply will meet demand."

Marathon's paper makes several points, including: 1. future costs of and post-2000 standards for reformulated gasoline are unknown, thereby making the cost-effectiveness of the program difficult to gauge; 2. the program is targeted at reducing volatile organic compound (VOC) emissions, despite a recent National Academy of Sciences report which concluded that nitrogen oxide emission controls might be more effective than VOC controls in certain areas; and 3. no "conditional" opt-in is available, that is, once a state opts into the program, it remains in and "opting out is almost impossible (due to both regulatory and political impediments). Consequently, with both the costs and the benefits of reformulated gasoline largely unknown, a hasty opt-in would be extremely imprudent."

WESTERN SENATORS UNITE TO SUPPORT EPA ACID RAIN ALLOWANCE CREDIT SYSTEM

A group of western senators has joined forces to support a hotly disputed EPA proposal for using a telephone queuing system to distribute "bonus" allowances under the Clean Air Act acid rain program. The queuing system is one of the most controversial proposals in EPA's regulations for implementing the market-based acid rain program.

Utilities have already banded together to oppose EPA's proposal, arguing that it would restrict the number of utilities able to receive bonus allowances, consequently diminishing the potential for them to use scrubbers and high-sulfur coal to comply with emissions control standards. The utilities have mounted a major political campaign to see that EPA instead opts for a "pro rata" approach, which allows allowances to be distributed among all utilities that apply (*Inside EPA*, Jan. 17, 12).

An April 10 letter to President Bush, initiated by Sen. Alan Simpson (R-WY) and signed by a total of 18 senators, is intended to communicate to EPA that its proposal has strong support, explains a staffer. Simpson had previously given kudos to EPA's plan, but wants to broaden his effort to show the agency in the face of opposition that "there's a differing view," this source says. The letter argues that EPA's plan "correctly interprets the clear intent of the statute that these allowances be distributed on a first-come first served basis." The law precludes EPA from straying too far from that approach and adopting a pro rata system, though it could allow for a lottery method, the letter states.

The senators explain that the first-come first served approach was the product of a "carefully considered compromise" intended to "resolve intense regional conflicts" in the acid rain program. The letter alludes to attempts by utilities to "undo that compromise" by pressing for a pro rata approach, calling the system a violation of the law. The senators conclude by applauding Reilly for following the intent of the statute and lending support to ensure that first-come first served is adopted.

EPA has promised that the rules will be issued by mid-May. Sources privy to negotiations believe that EPA has gotten sufficient heat over the telephone queuing system and will likely go with a lottery, which

seems to be a compromise position. In addition to being mentioned as an option in the recent letter, the plan was endorsed by utilities over first-come first served. Sen. Christopher Bond (R-MO) at a March 26 Appropriations hearing grilled EPA administrator William Reilly on EPA's selection of first-come first served and a congressional source explains that some senators are deeply concerned about the approach. If EPA decides on first-come first served, the Appropriations Committee has the option of attaching a rider to the Appropriations bill prohibiting funds for implementing the system in the event that a majority are unhappy with EPA's approach.

SENATE PREPARES NEW RCRA BILL, MAY NARROW REAUTHORIZATION SCOPE

The Senate Environment & Public Works Committee at presstime was preparing to introduce a new draft Resource Conservation & Recovery Act bill that is expected to be the vehicle for an April 29 markup. While details of the bill's contents were being closely held, several sources say they expect the committee to drop some large portion of the previous draft bill either in the new draft or in markup in order to speed its passage.

At presstime the new Senate bill was expected to be available April 23 or 24. Several sources say the bill is being assembled by majority staff member Cliff Rothenstein following several meetings of Senate staff in recent days. One Senate source says staff made a variety of recommendations for changes to the last draft, released by the committee March 27 (*Inside EPA*, April 3, p5) but that it was unclear at presstime exactly which changes would be incorporated into the new bill. One source suggests that it is possible the bill will drop an entire title from the previous draft in order to make the bill easier to handle in the one day of markup the committee has scheduled.

Several sources say they would not be surprised to see the committee drop the provisions requiring industry to report uses of toxic materials given the vehement opposition those provisions have raised from industry groups, and the strong opposition some Senators have lodged as well. A Republican staffer says there is "a theoretical difference" among committee members, with some pressing for a "RCRA-lite" bill that does not attempt to address a host of controversial hazardous waste issues that have been offered, while others still hope to pursue a more comprehensive bill. An industry source agrees that the committee is likely to "drop at least one title," but this source does not expect Baucus to accept the RCRA-lite approach. This source says it is still "too early" to make that decision, because there is still time to deal with some of the complex issues before moving to the Senate floor.

Senate and industry sources expect that some of the recycling language will change in the new Senate bill, taking into account industry-wide recycling averages when setting mandatory material recovery rates. An industry source suggests that the draft is unlikely to include regulations for industrial non-hazardous waste, despite efforts by Republican staff to draft language for these wastes.

Congressional sources say the outcome of the Senate bill may also guide the House Energy & Commerce committee deliberations on their version of the bill, which is scheduled to go to full committee markup by mid to late May. The House transportation & hazardous material subcommittee approved a RCRA bill March 26 with many of the most controversial issues left out, pending further negotiations among committee members. House sources say none of those issues have yet been resolved, and only the regulation of used oil has been the topic of in-depth negotiations since the markup. With legislative days dwindling in this session, several House staffers suggest that the committee may narrow its bill to match the scope of the Senate bill, in order to limit the number of issues that will have to be hammered out in conference.

Several House staffers have expressed frustration that the House has made little progress on the outstanding issues, suggesting that this makes it more likely that Congress will try to pass a "RCRA-lite" bill, dealing only with solid waste issues and avoiding controversial topics such as industrial non-hazardous wastes, oil and gas production and toxic use reduction. But other staffers warn that a bill that does not include some of those topics will not have the strong support of either industry or environmentalists, making it no more likely to pass than a comprehensive bill.

PRESIDENT BUSH TO 'SOON' MAKE DECISION ON 'EARTH SUMMIT' ATTENDANCE. Bush said in an April 21 press conference that he will decide whether to attend the United Nations Conference on Environment & Development in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil "soon," perhaps in the next several days as the White House wrestles with the merits of his attendance. Bush emphasized that he wants to go to Rio for UNCED, also referred to as the "Earth Summit," but noted that potential negative impacts on the U.S. economy will be a major deciding factor. UNCED will feature a variety of worldwide environmental accords that have been under negotiation for some time, the most important of which could be the convention on climate change to control emissions of greenhouse gases.

Miami businessman Jeb Bush, President Bush's son, heads the president's Florida re-election campaign. He has served as chairman of the Dade County Republican Party, secretary of Florida's Department of Commerce and chairman of the Beacon Council. He wrote this article for The Herald.

Being part of America's "First Family" is both wondrous and challenging — sometimes more challenging than wondrous, I must admit.

First, the wondrous: My family and I have enjoyed front-row seats for some of history's most significant events, including the end of the Cold War era and the death of imperial communism. Watching as the people of our country have come to know and love my mom, nearly as much as we do, has been a source of great personal pleasure and satisfaction. And the pride I have for my dad and his accomplishments is profound.

However, there is a challenging side to this transitory First Family status. Regularly, I must defend my and my family's rights to privacy, as well as those of my business partners and customers. I must be constantly vigilant to avoid conflicts of interest or the appearance of conflicts of interest to keep from embarrassing myself or, worse, hurting my father politically.

My fervent desire is to be measured like any other individual, whose successes or failures are measured by his own performance and behavior, not those of his parents.

These challenges are made more acute by the glare of political reporting in the press — a press that does not always report accurately and completely the facts.

Recent articles in the national press have contained serious inaccuracies related to my business activities, implying improper behavior on my part. Because of these factual errors, I feel compelled to "set the record straight."

Obviously, the national press has taken an extraordinarily keen interest in our family because of the current presidential campaign. It is my belief that the national news media have been encouraged to investigate the business dealings of the Bush family to level the playing field following the often harsh treatment given Gov. Bill Clinton's personal and business life. In my case, the accusations range from my having abused the Bush name for personal gain and enrichment to benefiting from government programs that leave taxpayers liable for losses.

■ In a Wall Street Journal article filled with inaccuracies, a man I once met for less than a minute alleged (but unconfirmed by any other source) that I have been working to schedule a U.S. state visit by the president of Nigeria at the same time that a Florida-based company called M&W Pump, with which I have a business relationship, has been doing business with the Nigerian government.

Despite knowing the facts, The Wall Street Journal reporter chose not to mention that M&W Pump had been working with the Nigerian government for more than 20 years prior to my involvement. I have not tried to arrange a state visit. If I had, however, it would have had no impact on M&W Pump's ongoing business in Nigeria because the firm was well established there before I became involved.

Furthermore, it is important to understand that my prior experience as an international banker and secretary of Florida's Department of Commerce qualifies me to work with M&W Pump on international trade matters.

At the inception of my association with M&W Pump, we developed a set of guidelines relating to my activities. Those guidelines included:

- (a) A prohibition against my dealing with our own government;
- (b) No dealings by the company with countries hostile to the United States;
- (c) No dealings by me with countries that have politically sensitive relationships with the United States;
- (d) No special use of U.S. embassies abroad (with the exception of security, over which I have no control).

I have honored these guidelines throughout, and I am proud to be associated with M&W Pump, a Florida company that exports high-quality, technologically sound products for worldwide uses, including agricultural irrigation, storm drainage, sewage treatment, environmental cleanup and flood control.

■ In the April 19 edition of The New York Times, a reporter stated that my partner and I "used a \$4.8 million loan that a business associate took out for them from Broward Federal . . . to buy a Miami office building." The Times story and others that followed on this complex transaction assert that the loan went into default, contributing to Broward Federal's collapse, and that the \$4 million loss was assumed by the federal government.

These articles, an attempt to tie me to the S&L debacle, are grossly inaccurate. We did not borrow money from Broward Federal, nor did our partner "take out a loan" for us. Our partner, JE Houston Financial Group, invested in our partnership in the form of a non-recourse convertible equity note secured by a mortgage on the property. That note was pledged by JE Houston Financial to receive its financing, which was provided by Broward Federal.

During all the time we owned the building, we never defaulted on our mortgages. The implication that we benefited from a government bail-out is sheer lunacy. The transaction has received a high level of scrutiny, and there has been absolutely no evidence of any preferential treatment. In fact, while I expressly did not deal with the government on this issue, my involvement as a partner only served to increase the level of scrutiny and slow down the process considerably.

■ The last point I wish to make is related to an April 26 article that appeared in The Miami Herald and other Knight-Ridder newspapers. It was a summary of a story that first appeared four years earlier.

That story reported that I had called then Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret Heckler on behalf of International Medical Centers (IMC) and its owner Mike Recarey to lobby for IMC. IMC was seeking a waiver of a federal rule. According to the article, the waiver was granted and the federal government subsequently ended up losing millions of dollars. In addition, the story noted that I was paid \$75,000 by IMC for arranging a separate real estate transaction.

As I stated in 1988, when the story first ran, I can recall making one phone call on behalf of IMC to an HHS official named Kevin Moley in the spring or summer of 1985. I asked that IMC be given a fair hearing, which IMC was given. No waiver was granted based on my phone call to Mr. Moley, and the accusation that millions of dollars were lost because of that call is unfair and untrue.

As it relates to my real estate work, my company received \$75,000 in 1986 from IMC for extensive work that was documented and reported in a previous Miami Herald article but not mentioned in the April 26 story. In doing business with IMC, we were among many highly reputable South Florida firms, including The Miami Herald and all of South Florida's television stations (which accepted IMC's advertising), a Big Eight accounting firm and more than one of Miami's top law firms.

In short, I vociferously deny any wrongdoing in the IMC matter.

□

During the past 10 years, I have been asked to intercede for many people and many causes. My involvement in politics and civic affairs and my passionate beliefs in some issues have, no doubt, increased the request load. With experience, I've gotten better at deciphering motives and avoiding the appearance of conflict.

I've answered some of the media's allegations and unfair insinuations here. With six months to go before the presidential election, I assume there will be other stories. I understand that some aspects of my life are fair game. However, when the election is over, I am convinced that the lives of the families of the candidates will not have been a factor in choosing the next president. The issues of the day and the candidates themselves will decide that.

I'm troubled by all of this. My recent experiences suggest that political reporters have gone too far in delving into the private lives of the families of public figures. No wonder many people I talk to who are interested in public policy and could make a contribution will never run for office or serve in government with the system as it currently exists.

I'm troubled by the type of journalism I've experienced and wonder if this is the norm in the national political arena. The synthesizing and summarizing of other reporters' work without verifying the underlying story is commonplace. The assumption of guilt, with the accused having to prove his or her innocence, is accepted in political reporting. Perhaps a back-to-basics course in journalism would be a good idea for the national political press corps.

Finally, I'm deeply troubled that the cumulative effect of these stories suggests that there is something wrong with me and my family. While I'm comforted in knowing my relationship with my family, friends and my God is what really matters in life and they will remain unaltered, it angers me that one of the remnants of the 1992 election could be a mistaken perception of my family. For this reason, I ask for the same treatment by the press that any citizen of this nation deserves — fairness, objectivity and accuracy.

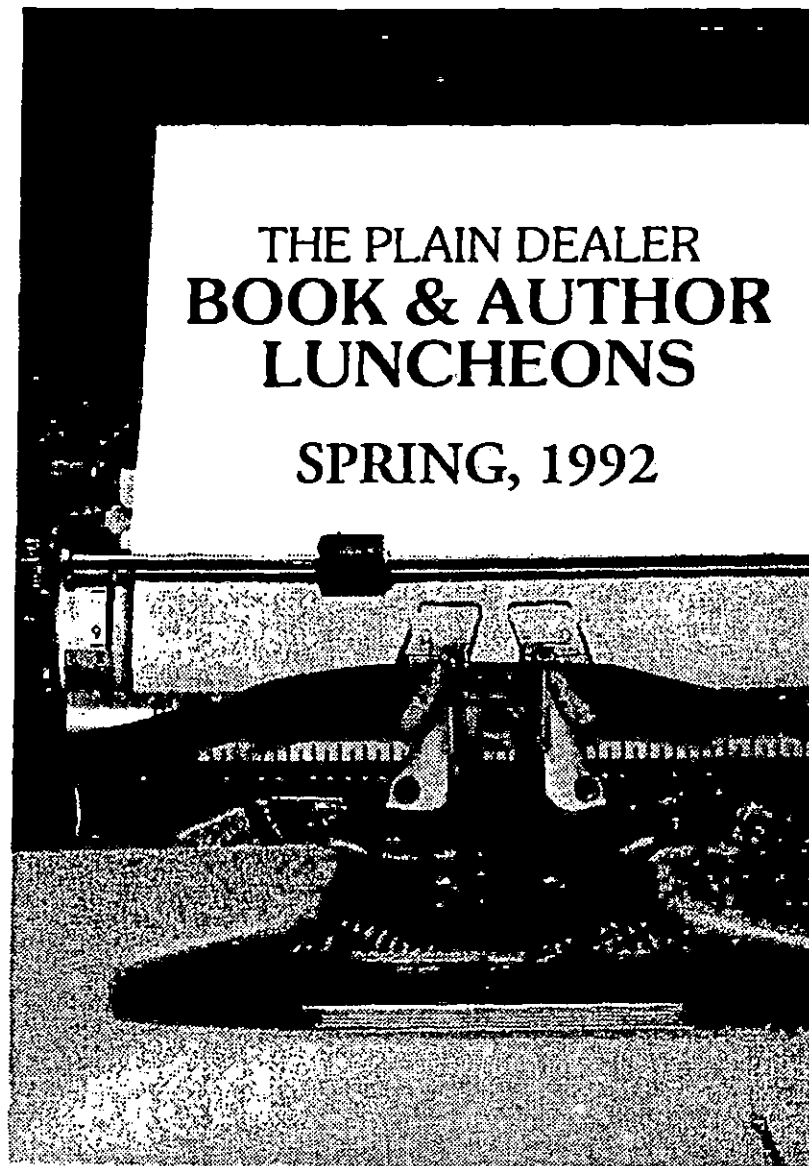

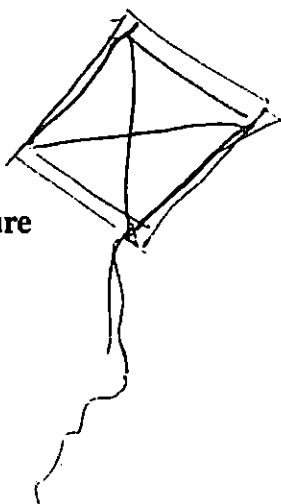
The Panel members have brought a broad range of expertise and experience to their task and have also benefitted from comments received as a result of circulation of an earlier draft of this report.

✓ After these comments were incorporated, this final report, which I am happy to transit to you with the unanimous support of the PCAST members, was forwarded for comment to NSC and OMB.

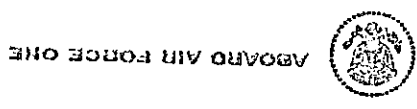
Both have indicated their concurrence with the report as it stands.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: CLAYTON YEUTTER 
SUBJECT: APPROVAL RATINGS

Mr. President, I have felt for about a year now that the explanations given for your declining approval ratings do not tell the whole story. For many weeks, the primary explanation was the state of the economy, and that certainly was plausible in a recessionary environment. More recently, the explanation has been your lack of a domestic agenda or your unwillingness to devote the attention to domestic issues that you do to foreign policy questions.

I've also read the recent comments of focus group participants. I do not question the accuracy of the polls or the sincerity of the focus groups. But I do believe this may be a time when what people say does not fully express what they feel.

As you will remember, there were elections in 18 states last November. Almost all of those races were state and local. Because of the hype over the Thornburgh race, no one paid much attention to what was happening, but at the RNC we could readily discern the anti-incumbent wave that is now sweeping the country. It swept through most of those 18 states, and the Republican Party was the beneficiary. Incumbents were voted out of state and local offices in unusual numbers, and a lot of those incumbents were Democrats. Those votes were not anti-Bush, and they cannot be attributed to the recession, though that may have played a role. Something else had to have been at work.

Coming into 1992, all we heard was that you don't have a domestic agenda--even though your agenda is a lot broader than that of any President in my memory. Or we heard that you don't understand domestic issues. But that's not valid either, though last year's abortive pronouncements of an economic recovery didn't help. You've over and over again demonstrated a high level of knowledge of and involvement in domestic issues--through speeches, press conferences, and numerous other events.

The other major explanation is that we've had an inadequate communications strategy. One can always do that job better, and we have room for improvement. But that cannot explain the

negative mood and the quasi-hostile temperament of the American public, including some of our best supporters.

There is a deeper explanation, and I believe it relates to our winning the cold war and, to a lesser degree, the Iraqi conflict. So long as we had a mortal enemy on the scene, Americans concentrated their attention on the basic objectives of survival and ultimate victory, as they should have. Being patriotic they were willing to sacrifice to provide a secure future for their children and grandchildren. If this meant overlooking domestic concerns, they were prepared to do that.

But now that the Soviet threat has disappeared, and we have returned triumphant from Kuwait, our priorities have changed. We're no longer worried about affairs outside the United States, for those affairs are no longer perceived as life threatening. Hence, Americans express concern over your spending time on what many of them now deem to be unimportant. A specific example is their vehement opposition to foreign aid programs, including those to the former Soviet Union. We know that parochialism is irrational, and even contrary to our self interest, but I also believe it is real.

The domestic issues that had been relegated to the back burner in the past have now moved to the front burner in people's minds. They become exercised over too much regulation, flip flops over tax policy, legislative/executive branch quarrels, and a lot of other things--at all levels of government. They believe that a nation whose leaders can bring down communism and defeat Iraq in 100 days ought to be able to solve these mundane domestic problems. And they blame you more than anyone else because they observed your leadership on the international scene, and they feel that leadership should be transferrable to domestic problems. They do not accept the explanation that Congressional intransigence precludes that from occurring.

The American public does not understand why domestic problems are so intractable, so they're frustrated. This causes them to strike out at most everybody in government, especially at the Federal level. Though they expressed some of their wrath and ire at the state and local level last fall, and will do so again this fall, they are really unhappy with politicians in Washington, D.C. where they see "business as usual," and "government at its worst" as being endemic.

The economic situation exacerbates all this, especially where it results in people losing their jobs.

I also believe that many Americans are intimidated by the rapidity of change in the world today, and particularly by changes in technology that could make their skills obsolete

overnight. That, in my view, is responsible for much of the distress in the 40-60 age bracket.

Is this just a U.S. diagnosis? Not in my judgment. As EC Commissioner Martin Bangemann put it a few days ago, "Much of the western world is disoriented these days." It may be somewhat akin to the letdown that a football team experiences after winning the Super Bowl. Or perhaps post-partum syndrome for the woman who has had a baby. For evidence one need only look at the political unrest in much of western Europe today.

In simple language, I believe the American public is in a funk. Let's hope they get over it by November 3!

Maybe this is too esoteric and, at the same time, too simplistic. Nevertheless, I'll try to draw a few conclusions.

✓ First, we shouldn't get too down in the dumps. This "throw the rascals out" mood is generic, even though it may be felt more by you than by anyone else.

Second, though we ought to try our best to raise your approval rating and reduce your disapproval rating, the latter may stay ✓ relatively high in this kind of year. What we should do is watch the approval/disapproval rating of the other candidates, and see how they compare to yours as the electoral season unfolds.

✓ Third, we ought not panic and do something foolish because the polls are discouraging. As you know, most candidates lose primarily because of their own errors, not because of what their opponents did. Even with Watergate as a backdrop, President Ford would have been re-elected but for any one of several errors.

Fourth, it is important that we govern well. If the focus continues to be on domestic issues, we must try to communicate the breadth and depth of your domestic agenda, even if it doesn't seem to resonate. It usually takes repetition to get resonance. We must also preserve our conservative base, without being extreme about it. Our "change" or "reform" agenda is a good one and we ought to stick with it.

Fifth, we should not focus on domestic issues to the exclusion of foreign policy, for the two are interrelated and the latter is still your strong suit. Putting it another way, if some are irrational during this funky period, that does not suggest we should share or accept their thinking. The "America First" economic nationalism arguments are wrong, and we should in no way embrace them.

Sixth, you and your surrogates should be upbeat in your public presentations. That is essential to restoring public confidence,

and to countering the negative image of the national media and the Democratic presidential candidates.

Seventh, it is imperative that you demonstrate poised, confident leadership. You don't have to solve all the problems of this country in 1992, or even by the end of your second term. But you do have to persuade people--in a straightforward, candid way--that you are on top of those problems, understand them, know how to solve them over time, and are committed to giving them your best shot. The American people are looking for a sense of direction in their lives, and you must provide it for them.

Eighth, you should continue to emphasize that if voters will help you elect Republicans to Congress in November, you'll be able to provide the kind of decisive, effective leadership on domestic issues they wish to see.

Ninth, we need to finesse the cynicism of the national media. As I indicated in our meeting last week, I believe you can best do that through press conferences, your most effective means of communication. You do exceptionally well in personal contact too, so that suggests more use of one-on-one or small group interviews in a Presidential setting and perhaps at least one visionary fireside chat. As Sam Skinner mentioned in the Cabinet meeting yesterday, we also need to get you and your surrogates out into local and regional media markets where our message is conveyed with much more objectivity than here.

Tenth, be presidential, for your opponents cannot be. That is one advantage of the incumbency that cannot be taken from you, even in an anti-incumbent year. People are proud of the President of the United States and still awed by and loyal to him.

Finally, continue to speak to the issue of family values. No one can take your advantage there, and it'll make a lot more difference on November 3 than the polls indicate. Even if people are then still in a funk, they'll stop, think, and compare when they vote for the presidency. The political instincts of the American people are fundamentally sound, and that works to your advantage no matter what the mood.

In summary, I see no reason to depart significantly from our present course. You are doing a fine job as President, and your Administration is performing well under the circumstances of a divided government and an embryonic economic recovery. No one can legitimately ask for much more than that. We should try to boost our performance over the next few months, of course, and a further improvement in the economy sure wouldn't hurt. We need to provide some additional domestic policy pronouncements, and we will. But we're doing all right, and we shouldn't be too self-

critical. Few political observers would rather be in Clinton's shoes, or Perot's, than yours, even in this anti-incumbent, anti-government atmosphere.

The President today named O.H.I.O. (Ohioans Helping Improve Ohio) Inc., of Cleveland, Ohio, as the two hundred and ninth Daily Point of Light. "O.H.I.O. brightens the lives of children who live in low-income neighborhoods.

Founded in 1987, O.H.I.O. is a non-profit agency which offers athletic, artistic, and career-oriented programs to children who live in crime-ridden, drug-plagued neighborhoods. This effort offers the youth an alternative to substance abuse and crime. Volunteers teach classes which help stimulate the children's creativity and develop leadership skills.

Volunteers help with a variety of projects, such as dance and drama classes, swimming and basketball lessons, job training workshops, a study hall, and a 24-hour emergency "Kids Hotline." They also lead field trips to museums to expose the children to cultural and educational resources. Through this program, the volunteers often detect learning disabilities or family problems which may deter a child's educational development.

The President salutes O.H.I.O. as the two hundred and ninth "Daily Point of Light." Daily Point of Light recognition is intended to call every individual, group, and organization in America to claim society's problems as their own by taking direct and consequential action; to identify, enlarge, and multiply successful initiatives, like O.H.I.O.; and to discover, encourage, and develop new leaders in community service, reflecting the President's conviction that, "From now on in America, any definition of a successful life must include serving others."

Dear Mr. President,

When I was contacted by the office of National Service about your visit I became very excited. I was told that we were going to "meet" the President. However, I am certain that you will be whisked off the plane, pose for the obligatory picture and be escorted on to the next eager greeter and that does not really represent a "meeting" to me. I feel I know a great deal about you and your family, as well as your political & social views. Well, I wish to share mine with you

First, I wanted to take this opportunity to express my deepest support of your efforts. Although, I have always been a devoted Republican (ever since the fifth grade when Ford lost the Presidency...I sent Susan Ford my allowance because I thought she'd need the money now that her father was unemployed), I am most enthusiastic about your campaign and your convictions!

I need to thank you formally for your unyielding position on abortion. My commitment to the pro-life position has been tested on a couple of occasions and I have risen from both instances with even stronger feelings.

I also believe that an apology is in order. Many of my counterparts at other Point of Light agencies have not given you your due. So much of their criticisms come from a lack of understanding. However, I am pleased that you will have the opportunity to meet my daughter, Lindsay. I am certain you do not remember, but in late Sept. 1990 Philip (my husband) & I met you and I was very pregnant. I remember that day...not just because we had the honor of meeting you, but because we had just learned that Lindsay was going to be born with a severe birth defect-quite the emotional rollercoaster. It is strange how her birth has changed me (all for the better!). In fact I am re-writing my auto-biography, as it once reflected my work experiences, it will now reflect my life experiences. The "evolution" of a naive, white, doctor's daughter, while working 14 hours per day in the projects, into an educated, cultured, civil rights advocate does not compare to the story of motherhood ('an evolution in itself'). The first sentence of the book says it all..."On October 3, 1990 I gave birth to two people, my daughter Lindsay, and her mother". Lindsay missed the last opportunity she had to visit with you, at Walt Disney World, as she required hospitalization while we were there. So as you can see, Philip & I have been determined in pursuing this introduction.

O.H.I.O, Inc. (Point of Light #209) has been very successful. A great deal of the credit must go to you and the recognition and honors you have bestowed upon us. I would love to learn

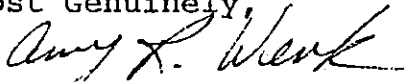
about the appropriate avenues to establish similar programs in public housing estates throughout the Nation. We have REALLY seen some astounding results in the children we have supported in the four years we have been operating. We are NOT government funded as I believe firmly in the "laissez-faire" philosophy. I attribute some of our success to networking and making the neighborhoods work for us instead of against us. Our methods are simple and can be easily modified to meet the different needs of different ethnic/cultural populations. There are not alot of costs involved, it is a very common sense based program.

I am struggling with a personal contemplation. The climate in the projects has been growing more & more volatile for the last 6-8 months. I was astonished that we escaped the King verdict after math as easily as we did. I cannot enter the inner city any longer without having young men jump on the hood of my car as I drive by, some of them waving a gun in the front windshield. Often kids will lie down in the car's path so their companions can rob you when you hesitate. I am not shy about driving on sidewalks or the lawns to escape without having to hurt someone else but I am pondering the feasibility of carrying a handgun in my car. I am great at skeet shooting but I must acknowledge my limitations and I do not think I could shoot another human being. I wouldn't even consider this course if it weren't for my "born again" zest for life --the effects of being a Mom.

I must bring this letter to an end. I know you are used to a higher quality in reading material. Please excuse the rambling dissertation, but feelings are rambling, and not precise...and I have many positive ones for you and your family. My parents are very much like both of you. I wonder if you acquired such similar viewpoints and mannerisms at Yale or if Yale just attracts men like you, Mr. President, and my father. If Mrs. Bush is too much like my mother she is probable examining the grammatical and spelling value of this letter.

Lastly, send our best to Millie. I asked if Millie would be with you this trip, but its impossible to get a straight answer from anyone involved in politics (present company accepted). Penny, Joan, & Sue (Joan and Sue were named after Philip & my mothers) are diligently working on their memoirs..Millie is an inspiration!

I. PURPOSE

To meet with Charles Ballard, Founder and President of the National Institute for Responsible Fatherhood and Family Development, Inc. (NIRFFD), and to congratulate him for his efforts to bring back traditional family values.

II. BACKGROUND

You were previously invited to participate in a meeting with select representatives from the NIRFFD, but because of time constraints on this trip, you will meet with Charles Ballard privately.

NIRFFD was founded in 1976 by Charles Ballard. He was born into poverty and later became a teen father, high school dropout, convicted felon, and drug addict. While serving a prison sentence, Mr. Ballard found religion and since has been committed to helping at-risk youth grow into responsible, spiritually-enriched adults.

The NIRFFD evolved from Mr. Ballard's work as a licensed social worker at a local hospital. While providing counselling to unwed mothers, Mr. Ballard observed that many problems stemmed from the absence of a father in the family unit. He believed that in order to stabilize the family unit and to ensure a viable future for any child, a father must be an active parent.

NIRFFD provides an array of services to teenagers and adults who live in Cleveland's inner city communities. The Institute has served more than 5,500 young fathers, mothers, and grandparents. Over 1,500 young fathers served by the Institute have legally acknowledged the paternity of their children, and many have married the mother of their child.

In addition to uniting families, NIRFFD provides counselling, fathering education, juvenile court advocacy, prison counselling, chemical dependency prevention services, GED training, college scholarships, drug treatment, housing, health care and employment. The small staff (two salaried employees and a corps of volunteers) is comprised mainly of people who have been served by the Institute.

Recently, William Raspberry, columnist for The Washington Post, wrote a splendid article entitled "Teaching Responsible Fatherhood." This article extolled the virtues of this privately-funded grassroots group that has achieved what no other social program has. The article is attached.

Teaching Responsible Fatherhood

Cleveland's Charles Ballard is a man of fact. Ballard's business is an outgrowth of his work at a Cleveland hospital maternity ward. "I keep looking at these mothers and babies, but no fathers. So I started collecting the names of the fathers and visiting them after work, just to talk to them. Before I knew it, I had six different groups of these young fathers in various parts of Cleveland meeting and talking about everything from paternal responsibility to childhood development and reproductive health."

And not long after that, he started the institute, supported now with grants from the United Way, the Cleveland Foundation, the county commission and the federal government.

"We don't have that rigid an institution program," he says of his approach. "What we do is work with the young father, help him to become responsible emotionally and get his life in perspective. We model excellence—what it means to take care of a family, love your wife, read to your child or spend time at the child's school."

Ballard says he's just being logical. I say he's cloning miracles.

The only instant on three things: (1) Legitimate your child; that's a must. (2) Be in school and doing well, or else get your G.E.D. (3) You must have gainful employment—not necessarily a great job, just so you learn responsibility and what it means to show up on time.

The program is constantly evolving. Early on, Ballard saw the importance of involving other family members—grandparents, aunts and uncles—to help the little ones get a sense of belonging and stability. And he discovered, almost by accident, the value of requiring the young fathers to work as volunteers with new entrants into the program.

The situation is more immediate for them, so many times they are better able than the professional staff to connect with their peers," he explained. "First we try to get them squared away, then they learn to work as volunteers with other young fathers, and then they are candidates for full-time employment as counselors."

Ballard says he's just being logical. I say he's cloning miracles.

None of it surprises the 55-year-old Ballard. Even before his training in sociology and social work, he says, he knew these young fathers—no matter how unconnected and aloof they seem—really want to connect with their children. The trouble is, they don't know how, having had little or no contact with their own fathers.

"That's my advantage," says Ballard. "I grew up without a father. [His father entered a mental institution when Ballard was three and died there seven years later without ever returning home.] I had a strong mother, who made us toe the line, but the issue for me was that having experienced my dad so briefly, I missed that."

It was the absence of a father after whom to pattern his life that led Ballard to get a girlfriend pregnant and run away to join the Army before he was 18. While in the military, he was convicted (wrongly, he maintains) of a brutal attack on a woman he didn't know and sentenced to three years in prison.

"It's a miracle I'm sitting here now," he told me. "I did eight months and 13 days and was released after I had a conversion experience. This older gentleman who was serving life brought me to Christ and convinced me I was meant for better things."

Shortly after his release, Ballard went to see the mother of his young son (who by then had three other children), adopted the boy and moved him into his rented room.

"I raised him by myself while working two jobs," he recalls. And the experience of doing so—of finally having a reason to get an education and work at becoming a responsible adult—helps him to understand what his young clients in Cleveland's Hough section yearn for, even when they have trouble articulating it.

"They want to be involved with their children, but they don't find support for that in the system. Most don't know how to ask, and some who do are met with impatience. What role could you play? You've got no job. You're no good to anybody. You can't even help out in the delivery room while your girlfriend is having your baby."

Cleveland's Charles Ballard is a man of fact. Ballard's business is an outgrowth of his work at a Cleveland hospital maternity ward. "I keep looking at these mothers and babies, but no fathers. So I started collecting the names of the fathers and visiting them after work, just to talk to them. Before I knew it, I had six different groups of these young fathers in various parts of Cleveland meeting and talking about everything from paternal responsibility to childhood development and reproductive health."

And not long after that, he started the institute, supported now with grants from the United Way, the Cleveland Foundation, the county commission and the federal government.

"We don't have that rigid an institution program," he says of his approach. "What we do is work with the young father, help him to become responsible emotionally and get his life in perspective. We model excellence—what it means to take care of a family, love your wife, read to your child or spend time at the child's school."

SUBJECT: OHIO

I. Recent Correspondence

State Representative Mike Fox (R-Hamilton) wrote in support of your Executive Order on infrastructure privatization but also noted his concern and gave examples showing that in the past federal agencies have not complied with your directives.

Councilman Michael Polensek, Majority Whip of the Cleveland City Council, wrote urging you not to relax federal wetlands regulations.

Councilman Mike Ferner, Toledo, wrote expressing his views on the underlying factors of unemployment and poverty surrounding the Rodney King verdict and the recent shooting of two black youths by Toledo police officers.

The Ashtabula County Board of Commissioners forwarded a resolution opposing the closing of the Ohio National Guard Armory 3rd Squadron 107th Armored Cavalry Troop K located in Ashtabula, Ohio.

II. Discussion

A. Governor Voinovich's Federal Priorities

Governor Voinovich has outlined three major federal priority areas for the State of Ohio: Defense; Education, and Human Services. Noted here are

summaries of his points of concern regarding these issues:

Defense

1. Defense Finance and Accounting Service Centers

The Pentagon has requested proposals from interested communities for expanded Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) Centers. The Governor feels this process affords Cleveland and Columbus the opportunity to expand their current operations from 1,700 and 2,000 employees respectively to as many as 7,000 employees each. Although a final decision is not expected from the Pentagon on winning sites until 1993, some basic decisions will be made later this year about where to place the additional 18,000 jobs that DFAS will gain. Both the Cleveland and Columbus Centers are highly regarded and the Governor feels they would make excellent sites for expansion.

2. Muskingum Training Area

Although Congress has authorized and appropriated \$5.67 million for the purchase of 16,000 acres for the Muskingum Training Area, the Pentagon has placed a moratorium on the acquisition of land, thus blocking the release of this funding. Because Ohio currently has no major National Guard training area, its guardsmen must go out-of-state for training at considerable expense. Governor Voinovich asserts that the savings from keeping Guardsmen in-state for training would pay for this acquisition in less than 7 years. Ohio has appealed the most recent Pentagon decision not to grant the waiver.

Currently the application for a waiver has reached Deputy Secretary of Defense Atwood for final disposition with an unfavorable recommendation by his staff. As a result, the Governor has requested your assistance in granting the waiver.

3. Ohio Army National Guard Force Reduction

Due to programmed force reductions, the Ohio Army National Guard's medical and aviation capabilities will be greatly reduced. Governor Voinovich has asked the Administration's assistance in retaining

the 112th Medical Brigade, which has been identified for elimination.

Voinovich has contacted Secretary Cheney about this matter.

Education

1. Reduction of Federal Over-regulation of Education

Ohio proposes to work in partnership with the Administration and Secretary Alexander to reduce federal regulation of the education system. The Governor feels that true systemic change in education cannot occur without substantial deregulation of the current system. The Governor states that the majority of the Ohio Department of Education's resources -- 75 percent -- are devoted to compliance activities. Under the direction of Governor Voinovich and Superintendent of Public Education Ted Sanders, the State is working to identify programs that have unnecessary and burdensome paperwork and reporting mandates in order to eliminate them. Many of these mandates are federal.

Voinovich has contacted Secretary Alexander about excessive reporting requirements imposed on local school districts.

Please note that Ted Sanders was the Under Secretary of Education under Secretary Cavazos.

Human Services

1. Federal Waivers for Medicaid

States like Ohio that want to institute comprehensive health care reforms cannot do so without federal waivers from current Medicaid regulations. Governor Voinovich feels that existing waiver authority is fragmented and narrow in scope and thus does not provide an appropriate vehicle for statewide reform. He wants the Administration to provide states with more flexibility through current and expanded waiver authority.

Ohio is currently seeking quick federal approval of a vent-tech waiver that would substantially increase Ohio's ability to efficiently and adequately meet the pressing needs of vulnerable children in need of medical services. The State is seeking to expand its vent-tech program for people with a tracheostomy or who are ventilator dependent. Ohio does not want more federal money, but rather approval to boost the available slots by adjusting services and cost caps. Approval would allow the State to expand services to medically fragile children at a cost below institutional care.

2. Federal Child Support Enforcement Audit Process

Ohio and the National Governors' Association have been working with the American Public Welfare Association and state child support directors to develop a proposal to overhaul the federal child support enforcement audit process. Currently, states feel that the audit process is cumbersome, inefficient and does not address the true performance of state child support programs. The group has proposed changes in the audit criteria and audit penalties. The specifics of the proposal are being finalized and will be forwarded to Congress and the Administration later this month.

B. Rodney King Verdict Reaction

Cleveland experienced no violent rioting or looting in response to the Rodney King verdict. There were peaceful demonstrations and potential riot inciters were arrested.

C. Juvenile Violence

The Cleveland Task Force on Violent Crime reports that, during the past several years, incidents of youth violence in the Greater Cleveland area have escalated to an all-time high. In 1990, thirty eight homicides occurred involving victims in the 8 to 20 year old range. In 1991, the number jumped to forty, the highest number of homicides for this age range in the history of Cuyahoga County.

Gunshot wounds accounted for 85 percent of the youth killed in Cleveland last year. So far this year, 25 percent of the homicide victims within the City of

Cleveland were between the ages of thirteen and nineteen. Ninety percent of these victims died from gunshot wounds. Over half of the 1992 homicide victims are less than 26 years old.

In 1991, the City of Cleveland noted a decrease in the reported number of aggravated assaults. However, juvenile court filings for aggravated assaults committed by juveniles increased. Through interviews with juvenile offenders, it became apparent that a number of factors explained the increase in aggravated assaults among youth. Those factors range from gang initiation assaults to aggravated assaults on rival gangs with weapons, predominantly firearms. Rival gangs fight over drug turf, women and issues dealing with "disrespect." Seventy percent of detained youths at juvenile court were involved with gangs during 1991. Currently, about eighty street gangs have been identified by juvenile court.

The U.S. Attorney's Office in Cleveland is in the process of developing a weed and seed program proposal for the entire Northern District of Ohio, which includes not only Cleveland, but also Akron, Toledo, and Youngstown. It is hoped that the proposal will be completed in time to be considered for funding in 1993.

D. Mayor Michael R. White

Mayor White, who took office in 1991, has focused his administration on five issues: safety, education, revitalization and preservation of neighborhoods, economic development and job creation, and improved citywide race relations.

E. Mound Nuclear Weapons Facility

The Mound Nuclear Weapons Facility located in Miamisburg, Ohio, is being considered for consolidation by the Department of Energy (DOE). Under DOE planned consolidation of nonnuclear facilities associated with the nuclear weapons complex, the preferred option is to move production work from Mound and other DOE sites to Kansas City in order to reduce overhead costs. At present, no decision has been made on this option. The DOE decision, expected later this year, will take into account public comments and findings from an environmental assessment.

If a decision is made to terminate production, DOE hopes to minimize effects on personnel by transferring them to other programs or by early retirement. DOE will also conduct environmental restoration of the site in consultation with state and local officials.

Mayor Richard C. Church of Miamisburg opposes the possible closing and has requested to meet with you on this topic. In early April, Secretary Watkins met with Lt. Governor DeWine to discuss the environmental assessment. Mayor Church and a delegation of local elected officials from Miamisburg met with senior Department of Energy officials on May 20 to discuss this issue. Jim Snyder of White House Intergovernmental Affairs also met with them separately on May 20.

F. Education Summit

Ohio's elected officials expressed support for education reform at an Education Summit held in Columbus on February 19, 1992. Governor Voinovich and State Superintendent of Public Instruction Ted Sanders brought leaders together to discuss critical education issues and to begin building a shared vision for education. Participants were members of the Ohio 2000 Committee of 100 and other key education, business and state political leaders.

Small-group discussions centered on a performance-based education system, the six national education goals, and a public policy agenda from The Business Roundtable. Prior to these discussions, in-depth information was provided to participants on Governor Voinovich's Gap Analysis. The Gap Analysis is a state plan to identify what Ohio is doing right, and what it needs to do if Ohio is to achieve the six national education goals and be an education leader and innovator.

A second summit will be held in October, 1992, to share the Gap Analysis findings. The completion of the report is expected to give a strong impetus to the Ohio 2000 effort.

G. America 2000

Ohio 2000 was officially kicked off by you, Secretary Alexander, and Governor Voinovich, on November 25, 1991.

Although an effort was made to include Cleveland in the AMERICA 2000 program, Mayor Michael White has declined to be part of the program.

City officials stated that they felt the AMERICA 2000 goals were something Cleveland was already involved in. Mayor White's educational aides said that a decision was made "to keep the Cleveland education summit focused on Cleveland's educational policy problems and not to get sidetracked." The education summit refers to the city's effort instituted in 1986 to reform its school system. City officials also were reluctant to join a program which they felt had lofty goals but offered little new money.

H. Unemployment

Ohio's unemployment rate for April, 1992, stood at 6.9 percent, a decrease of .1 percent over the same period in 1991.

The most recent unemployment figures for Cleveland show an unemployment rate of 7 percent in February, 1992, an increase of .5 percent over the same period in 1991.

A survey conducted by the Purchasing Management Association of Cleveland indicates that the recall of production workers and new hires, plus dramatic increases in new orders, are strong indicators that the local economy is improving. The recession is believed to have resulted in a net loss of over 40,000 jobs in the Cleveland area. However, many of these jobs may be recaptured if the recovery continues at a steady pace.

I. Workers' Compensation

Ohio, which historically has had a workers' compensation system favored by organized labor, is considering streamlining the system by making it operate more like an insurance company.

At present, there is a proposed 165 percent increase in workers' compensation assessments for self-insured employers before the Legislature, but this will most likely be scaled back before it will be passed. However, self-insured employers still face at least an 85 percent increase to cover liabilities already incurred.

J. Mental Health Services for Homeless Persons, Inc.
Possible-Fraud Investigation

Mental Health Services for Homeless Persons, Inc., a Cleveland mental health agency also known as "Money and Mailboxes," is under a possible-fraud investigation by the Cuyahoga County Mental Health Board.

The agency receives nearly \$1 million annually in tax dollars to care for helpless and homeless people who are mentally ill. Money and Mailboxes is one of nine experimental programs developed nationwide in 1988 to assist homeless individuals with severe mental health problems. Employees and other experts accused the agency of serving only moderately mentally ill clients who have fewer needs than those with severe mental disabilities.

The agency was set up to find housing for clients, improve their daily living skills, and set them up with disability benefits, psychiatric care, and when possible, employment. Documents show the agency was spending a \$130,000 grant to bring homeless, mentally ill people off the streets, but in the first five months of the grant it had found only two such individuals.

K. Healthy Start Initiative

Cleveland is one of 15 cities nationwide to receive a Healthy Start Grant from the U.S. Public Health Service to promote prenatal care and to combat high infant mortality rates. Cleveland's infant mortality rate was 16.3 per 1000 live births in 1989; the rate for blacks in Cleveland was 19.5 compared to 12.5 for whites. Cleveland's infant mortality rate ranks among the ten highest rates in the nation.

The Healthy Start Initiative provides grants through the U.S. Public Health Service for the development of material and Child health demonstration projects to reduce infant mortality. The City Health Department will administer the grant for a project area consisting of 15 neighborhoods (mostly contiguous) in the city of Cleveland and the adjacent city of Warrenville Heights in Cuyahoga County for a total of 16 areas.

Cleveland was awarded \$1.5 million for FY 1992, \$500,000 of which is being used to develop a comprehensive plan based on community needs and

assessment. The plan is due to be submitted to the Office of Healthy Start by July 1, 1992.

L. Clean Air Act

Ohio is a major producer and user of high-sulfur coal and therefore is a major source of sulfur dioxide and acid rain. The Clean Air Act Amendments impose strict new requirements on the coal and utilities industries. This will cause affected utilities in Ohio to install scrubbers, switch to low-sulfur coal, or purchase allowances from other sources that have cleaned up beyond requirements. Ohio coal miners fear the loss of hundreds of jobs. Phase I of the Act requires 15 Ohio power plants to reduce their cumulative sulfur dioxide emissions by 50 percent by 1995.

The Clean Air Act Amendments also require auto emissions testing programs to be established in several metropolitan areas, including Dayton, Toledo and Cincinnati, but not in Columbus. This program had been previously established in Cleveland. Voinovich, as mayor, opposed the imposition of the program on the city. The Act requires states and urban areas having similar air pollution problems to treat them in a consistent manner relative to auto emissions testing.

M. Interstate Waste Transport

Waste importation is one of the major environmental concerns in Ohio and is an issue of particular interest to Governor Voinovich.

Ohio is both a major generator and importer of garbage and hazardous waste. In 1989, the State imported a net of over 130,000 tons of garbage and hazardous waste. In 1990, the State imported 12 percent of its total solid waste landfill disposal.

Federal Courts have ruled the restrictions on interstate waste movement are unconstitutional infringements on interstate commerce. Congress is examining this issue in the context of reauthorizing the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. EPA's position is to oppose any restrictions. Governor Voinovich is pressing EPA for a more forthcoming position in support of state initiatives to curb imports of waste.

N. Welfare: General Assistance Cuts

Under a new Ohio law that went into effect on October 1, 1991, an Ohio resident can receive General Assistance welfare for only six months in a 12-month period. Consequently, those 106,000 Ohioans on General Assistance as of October 1, 1991, were cut off on April 1, 1992. Benefits were \$148 a month until reduced last summer to \$100 a month. Recipients also receive medical coverage.

Despite large protests against the cuts, Governor Voinovich has stated that the State is bankrupt and has no money to restore benefits. Restoration of the benefits would cost \$118 million. On April 1, Governor Voinovich held a press conference to discuss the benefit cutoff and had to leave the podium when he was overcome by emotion in discussing his concern for those cut from the rolls.

Ohio has reallocated money cut from General Assistance to various state budget areas including adding 130,000 pregnant women and infants to the Healthy Start program, expanding Aid to Families with Dependent Children by 12 percent, and providing more money for inoculations for children, the Headstart pre-school program and the PASSPORT health care program for senior citizens. Additionally, new emergency rules will allow more people to qualify for the Disability Assistance program which provides up to \$115 a month to people with chronic medical conditions who need daily prescription medications.

O. Drought

Farmers and ranchers located east and south of Cleveland have been experiencing a severe drought problem. Two of Ohio's primary water sources, the Hoover Reservoir and Alum Creek, are measuring far below normal water levels in spite of substantial early spring rains. Some farmers have been forced to sell their cattle as a result and have been applying for Emergency Conservation Assistance (ECA) through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). This program is utilized when severe drought conditions exist and the ASCS determines Federal assistance is needed to return the land to productive agricultural use.

1992 POLITICAL UPDATE - PRESIDENTIAL

Ohio will be a key political battleground in 1992, as it was in 1988. Ohio has supported Republican Presidential candidates in the past three elections (1980 - 1988), but Democrats have indicated that they will work hard to break that tradition in 1992. Democrat Governor **Bill Clinton** has made a number of campaign stops in Ohio, most recently on April 16, 1992, to address the 158,000 member United Transportation Union and participate in two fundraisers. One of the fundraisers (\$1,000 per plate) was held at the home of Democrat **Joel Hyatt**, owner of Hyatt Legal Services and son-in-law of U.S. Senator **Howard Metzenbaum**.

Governor Voinovich serves as General Chairman of the Ohio BUSH-QUAYLE campaign effort, with W.R. "Tim" Timken as Finance Chairman. The BUSH-QUAYLE Ohio Steering Committee is composed of the following individuals: **Keith McNamara**, **Paul Mifsud**, **Tally Krumm**, **Bob Bennett**, **Martha Moore**, **Mike Colley**, **Alex Arshinkoff**, **Jim Tilling**, **Bruce Johnson**, **Joe Deters**, **Jim Brennan**, **Senator Grace Drake**, and **Melanie Mitchell**. The BUSH-QUAYLE campaign headquarters is open in Columbus. **Doug Preisse** will serve as Executive Director.

The Ohio Presidential primary, originally scheduled for May 5, 1992, was moved to June 2, 1992. The main reason for the change was the continuing reapportionment battle -- which has since been settled. You and **Pat Buchanan** will appear on the GOP ballot, with **Bill Clinton**, **Jerry Brown**, and **Paul Tsongas** on the Democrat slate. Your Ohio organization is solid, and your margin of victory should be large. Buchanan has little or no representation in the Buckeye state.

Ohio will have 21 electoral votes in the 1992 Presidential contest. The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried Ohio in the 1988 election with a 55% to 44% margin.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK - U.S. SENATE

On Monday, February 3, 1992, Lt. Governor **Mike DeWine** announced his candidacy for the United States Senate -- challenging Democrat incumbent Senator **John Glenn**. DeWine is a popular Ohio figure and expects an uphill battle, but is considered an aggressive campaigner. His strategy will be to portray Glenn as out of touch with mainstream Ohio, and ineffective as a legislator. DeWine hopes to tap into the current anti-incumbent mood, and suggest that Ohio needs a new face in Washington. DeWine is 49 years old, Glenn is 70. DeWine is a conservative, Glenn a liberal. DeWine endorses term limitations, Glenn has served in the U.S. Senate for 18 years. The contrasts between the two candidates could not be sharper.

DeWine must raise over \$3 million to mount an effective challenge to the nationally known and popular John Glenn. Governor Voinovich (who will serve as DeWine's campaign Chairman) and the Ohio Republican Party have pledged their full support to DeWine, and he has requested your participation in an Ohio fundraising event. To date, DeWine has raised nearly \$400,000 and Glenn has raised about \$1 million.

Despite his involvement in the Savings and Loan "Keating Five" scandal, Glenn remains a popular elected figure in Ohio. Glenn's longstanding career in public service has given him tremendous credibility with voters, and most Ohioans are willing to look past his obvious mistakes. DeWine will be careful not to attack Glenn's hero image, but will rather stress the need for change. Most experts agree that Ohio's two Democrat U.S. Senators (Glenn and **Howard Metzenbaum**) are far too liberal for a state with a Republican Governor, Lt. Governor, and Secretary of State.

1992 POLITICAL UPDATE

In addition to the Presidential and U.S. Senate races, the Ohio Republican Party is aiming to take control of the Ohio General Assembly in 1992. Currently, Republicans control the State Senate 21-12, and trail in the Assembly 38-61. While it is a formidable task, the state GOP is confident that it can make major gains --if not capturing the Assembly, because Republicans control the reapportionment process. State Chairman **Bob Bennett** and Governor Voinovich are aggressively recruiting candidates, and are hopeful that their efforts will allow the Governor to further gains he has made in the past year -- with a Republican controlled Assembly.

OHIO GOP UPDATE

The Ohio Republican Party continues to strengthen its position under the leadership of Chairman **Bob Bennett**. The Ohio GOP is arguably one of the best run state party organizations in the nation. Bennett is backed up by National Committeeman **Mike Colley** and National Committeewoman **Martha Moore**, as well as a top notch political staff.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Ohio will lose two Congressional seats in 1992 as a result of reapportionment. Republicans control the Reapportionment Board 3-2 (Governor, Secretary of State, Senate President). Ohio Republican Congressmen **Bob McEwen** and **Clarence Miller** have been forced into a primary situation in the 6th congressional district.

Democrat incumbents **Edward Feighan**, **Donald Pease**, and **Dennis Eckart** will all retire in 1993. Republican Congressman **Chalmers Wylie** recently announced his retirement, as well. Wylie was elected to the House in 1966, and has been thinking about retirement for some time. In addition, Wylie was revealed as a major offender in the Congressional check kiting scandal.

The state legislative redistricting battle has escalated from the state legislature to the U.S. Supreme Court. The Court issued a stay of the Reapportionment Board reapportionment plan, so the legislative primary will be held in conjunction with the Presidential and Congressional primary on June 2nd.

His presidential support score was 79 percent; his opposition score was 21 percent and his support score adjusted for absences was 79 percent in 1991. Wofford was eligible for 60 of the 81 presidential support votes in 1991.

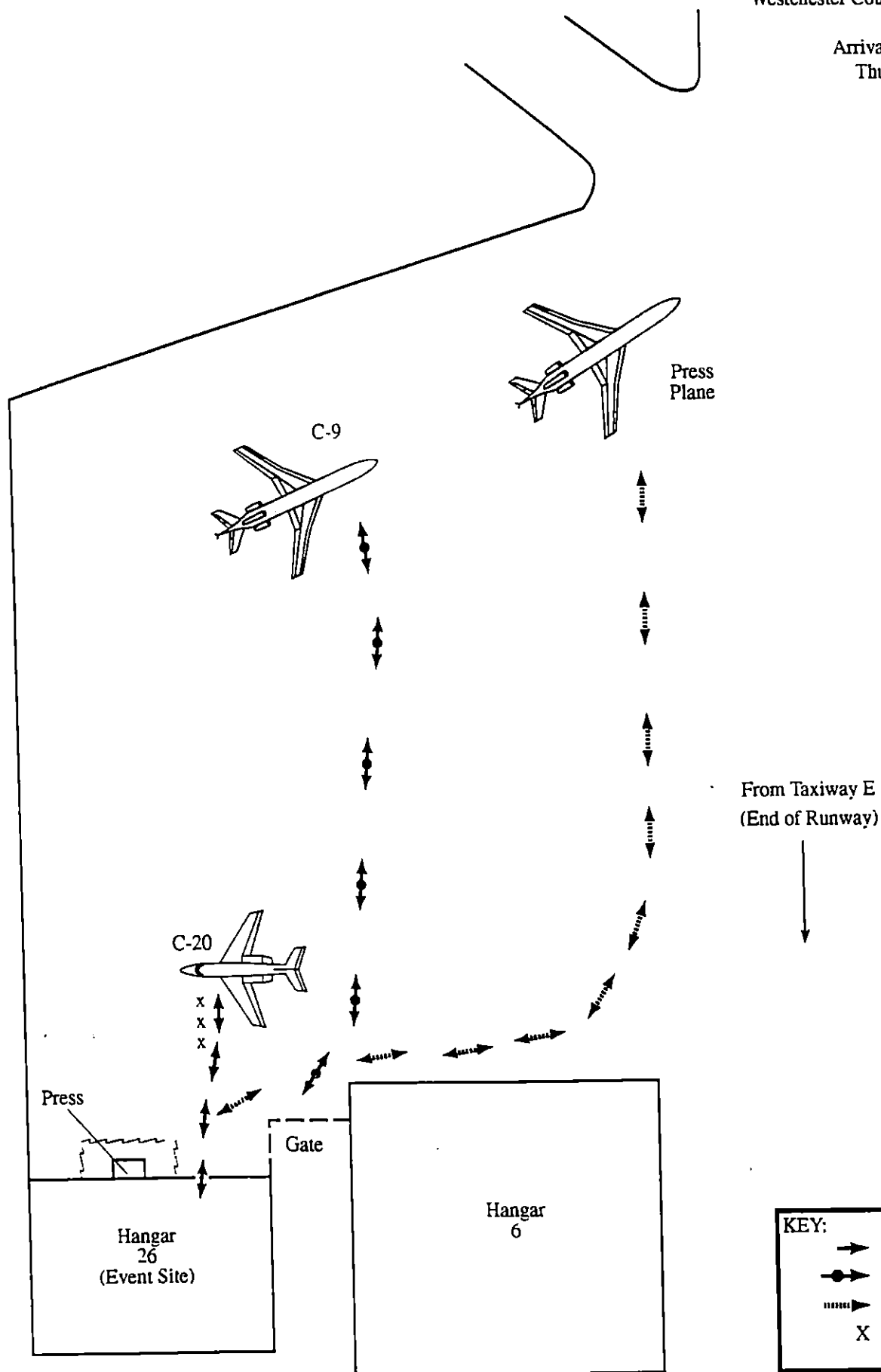

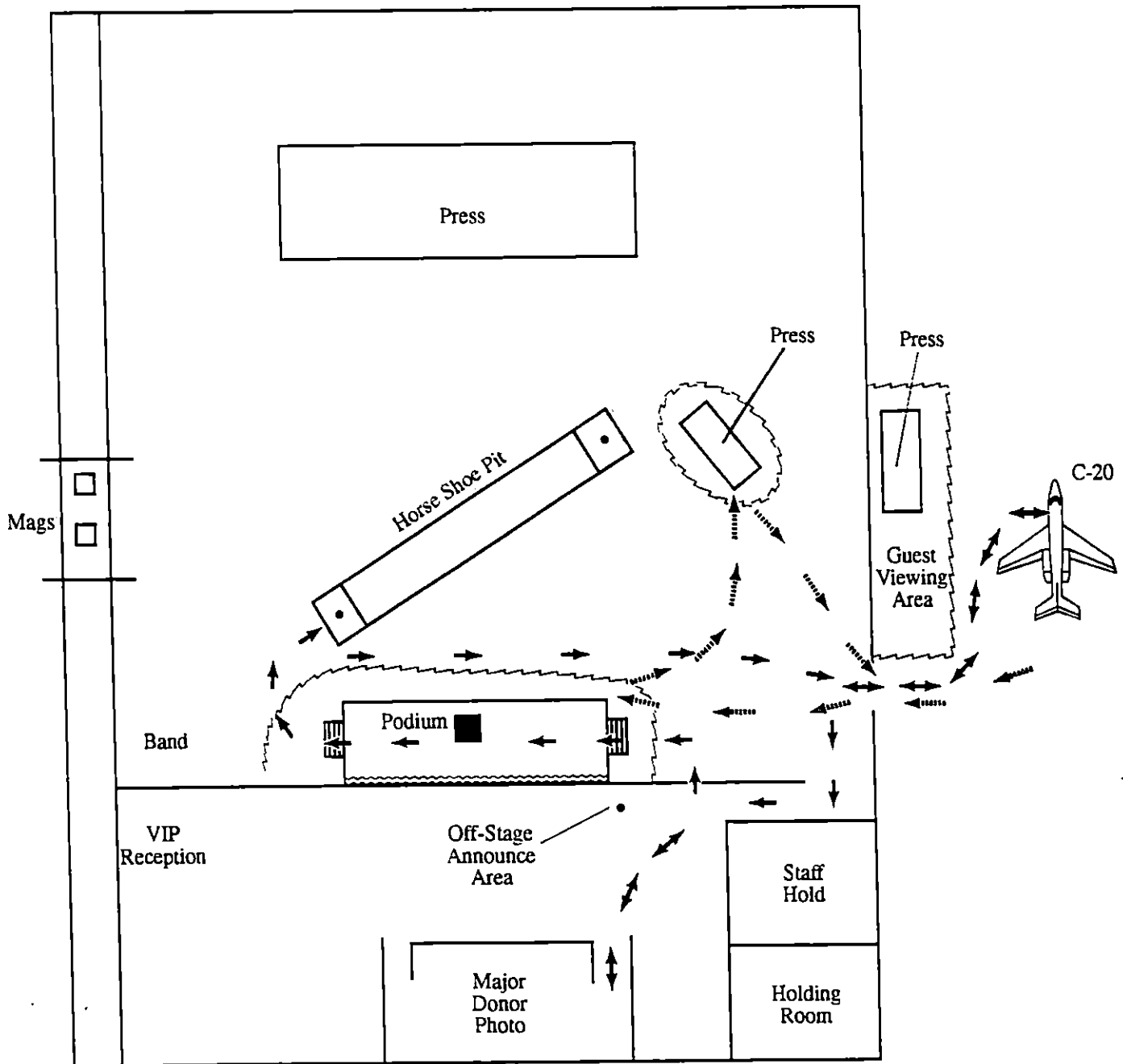

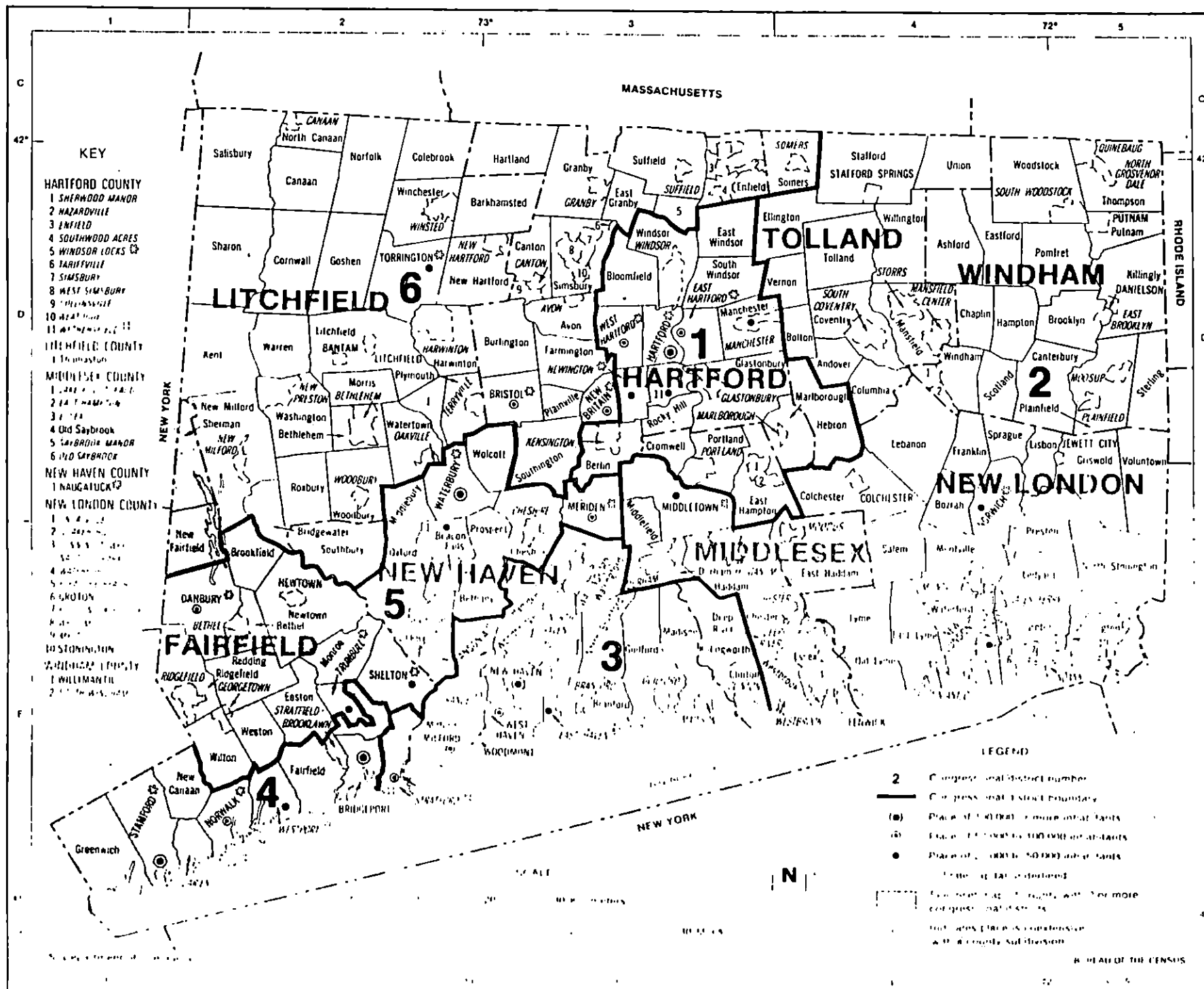

Senator Frank Barrows (D-Hartford) and Representative Lawrence Anastasia (D-Norwalk), co-chairmen of the General Assembly's Public Safety Committee, wrote opposing potential cuts in Connecticut's National Guard forces.

Representative William Dyson (D-New Haven) wrote urging you to continue sanctions against South Africa until all vestiges of Apartheid have been removed.

James M. Rubino (R), Minority Leader of the Board of Representatives of the City of Stamford, forwarded a resolution which gives Stamford police the authority to move street level drug dealers off the streets.

Rita Krevit, Alderwoman for the Sixth Ward for the City of New Haven, wrote opposing any proposed federal cuts in and/or elimination of services to senior citizens

The New Haven Board of Aldermen forwarded a resolution calling on Congress to enact legislation supporting \$10 billion in loan guarantees to Israel.

Paul S. Vayer, Acting Town Manager of the Town of Winchester/City of Winsted, wrote urging you to attend the upcoming Earth Summit in Brazil.

II. Discussion

A. State Budget

The State Senate and House have passed a compromise \$8.08 billion FY 1992-1993 budget. While no one was entirely happy with the budget, most were relieved that a repeat of the protracted budget impasse of last year was avoided. Governor Weicker signed the budget into law on May 6.

The following are key points in the budget:

- o **General Assistance:** Sets the cutoff date for General Assistance aid at 9 months and makes towns pay 15 percent of the cost. Also allocates \$9.6 million to provide employment training for people whose welfare benefits are ending. Governor Weicker originally called for general assistance aid for employable welfare recipients to be terminated after six months. He also asked for municipalities to pay one-third of general assistance costs.

- o **Local Education Aid:** Cuts \$22 million, but keeps aid for larger cities intact. Governor Weicker had called for \$53 million in cuts.
- o **Teacher's Cost-of-Living:** The Legislature restored the cost-of-Living adjustments to the teachers pension fund. Weicker wanted this eliminated.
- o **Veterans' Property Tax Relief:** Weicker wanted to eliminate \$9 million in property tax relief for veterans. The Legislature kept the program intact.
- o **Loan Payments:** Weicker wanted to use \$240 million to pay off loans used to pay for last year's \$1 billion budget deficit. The Legislature cut loan payments to \$140 million.

Critics of the plan claim that the budget cuts for local aid will force cities and towns to raise property taxes.

B. **Income Tax**

After intense debate, Connecticut adopted a 4 percent income tax in September, 1991. Connecticut was one of the last states in the nation without a state income tax.

When the tax was first taken out of people's paychecks in October, 1991, major protests erupted around the state, including a protest rally at the State Capitol attended by an estimated 50,000 people.

The income tax will continue to be the focus in many state legislative races this fall. Anti-income tax forces are still very active in many parts of the state.

Interestingly, lower Fairfield County is not a part of the state where the income tax is unpopular. Three out of four Greenwich legislators voted for the income tax because it meant a big tax cut for their constituents. Under old Connecticut law, there was an income tax on dividends, interest income, and capitol gains on a sliding scale with a maximum 14 percent tax rate for wealthy people. With the institution of the state income tax, all of these were lumped together with employment earnings income which is only taxed at

4 percent. Thus, many people ended up paying a lower overall tax rate.

Governor Weicker was recently named the recipient of this year's John F. Kennedy Profiles in Courage Award for his "brave stand" in supporting the income tax in the face of strong opposition.

C. Special Legislative Session

There is a special session of the General Assembly scheduled for May 26-27 to clear up unfinished business from the regular legislative session which ended on May 6, 1992.

On the agenda are such items as state aid to municipalities, changes in Connecticut's General Assistance welfare program and a possible vote on legalizing video slot machines.

There may also be some tinkering with the newly instituted state income tax. While all Connecticut residents are currently taxed at a flat rate of 4 percent, some legislators would like to tax the wealthy at a higher rate in order to provide income tax cuts for middle income families.

D. Voter Dissatisfaction

Several primaries for local elected offices were held in Connecticut on May 19. Surprisingly, pro-income tax candidates did very well. It is thought that this is due to the fact that the majority of primaries were held on the Democratic side, and tended to draw more liberal voters supportive of pro-tax candidates. Many feel that the story will be different in November, when Republicans and conservative Democrats are added to the voting pool.

Current polling shows that the mood of voter dissatisfaction does not apply to the incumbent Congressional delegation. The only Congressman currently in trouble is Rep. Gary Franks (R-5th District), the first black Republican elected to Congress in over 50 years. He is facing voter perception of inattention to constituent matters and controversy surrounding frequent staff changes.

About 25 percent of the current members of Connecticut's State House and Senate have announced they are not running for re-election or are rumored not to be running again. It is generally perceived that this is an outcome of voter anger with legislators who voted for the income tax as well as legislators' frustration with their inability to make the system work.

E. Unemployment

The most current, not seasonally adjusted unemployment figures for Connecticut show it had an unemployment rate of 7.4 percent in March, 1992, a decrease of .8 percent from February, 1992.

The most current unemployment figures for major Connecticut cities were for March, 1992 were:

All figures show a substantial drop from unemployment levels reported in February, 1992.

F. Seawolf

Your proposed plan to cancel construction of two Seawolf submarines which are produced at General Dynamics' Electric Boat Division in Groton, and subsequent Congressional action to keep them in the budget, continues to be a matter of strong interest in Southeastern Connecticut. Yet, while Seawolf has received a great deal of national attention, it has not necessarily been a driving issue among voters across the state.

Other areas of the state are far more concerned with potential job losses in their areas which may suffer from federal cutbacks. For example, Pratt and Whitney, one of Connecticut's leading defense contractors is very concerned about potential contract cancellations which would affect their operations in East Hartford.

Interestingly, the fight to restore Seawolf was led by Senator Dodd and Representative Gejdenson, who are better known for their opposition to defense spending increases in the 1980's.

G. Sandra Rosado Welfare Case

The media have recently highlighted a welfare case which gives support to your proposal to increase asset limits to \$10,000 for families currently receiving family assistance. Under current Federal regulations, families receiving AFDC aid become ineligible if their assets exceed \$1,000.

Sandra Rosado, a New Haven youth, worked at a part-time job and saved \$4,900 which she intended to use for her college education. Her family has received AFDC assistance for over a decade. When state officials discovered her savings account in 1991, they informed her mother, Cecilia Mercado, that she must spend the money in the account in order to remain eligible for AFDC aid. After receiving the directive from state officials, Rosado spent her savings on clothes, jewelry, shoes and perfume. Shortly after, Federal officials sent Mercado a bill for \$9,342 in benefits she received while her daughter's bank account was active.

Mercado has fought the government in court, but last week the State Supreme Court ruled that Mercado must pay back the money the Federal government says she owes. The New Haven Legal Assistance lawyer representing Mercado has indicated her intent to receive a waiver from the Federal Government on the repayment. It may be difficult, however, for a waiver to be granted retroactively.

After receiving a scholarship and a grant, both based on academic achievement, Rosado was able to enroll at South Central Community College in New Haven in the fall of 1991. She is the first person in her family ever to attend college.

H. Yale Student Murder Trial

On May 18, testimony commenced in the murder trial of a New Haven minor, James Fleming Jr., who is accused of the 1991 murder of Christian Prince, a Yale sophomore from Chevy Chase, Maryland. You are friends with Christian's parents and you knew Christian.

In 1988, while in high school, Christian worked as an intern at the National Bush-Quayle headquarters. After his death, you wrote his parents expressing your condolences and you have seen them socially since then.

The prosecution's case rests on a statement from Randy Fleming, one of the youths accompanying James Fleming, but who is not related to him. According to Randy Fleming's statement, James Fleming, who was accompanied by three youths, robbed Prince at gunpoint, taunted and hit him in the face with his gun, and then shot him in the chest. Randy Fleming later retracted his statement in court, saying that he had made up the story because the police had threatened to charge him with murder as well if he did not cooperate with them.

The murder has led to tighter campus security measures. However, it has also highlighted the underlying racial tensions between poor city residents and the University community.

1992 ELECTION

Presidential Campaign

The Presidential primary election was held on March 24, 1992. You secured 67 percent of the Republican vote; 22 percent supported Buchanan; 9 percent were uncommitted; and, 2 percent supported David Duke. All 35 national convention delegates support your candidacy.

In the Democrat primary, Jerry Brown defeated Bill Clinton by a margin of 37 percent to 36 percent. Paul Tsongas received 20 percent of the vote, and 3 percent were uncommitted.

In the 1988 Presidential primary, you defeated Bob Dole by a margin of 71 percent to 20 percent. Dukakis secured 58 percent of the vote. Jesse Jackson finished in second place with 28 percent of the vote.

In the 1988 Presidential general election, the Bush-Quayle ticket defeated the Dukakis-Bentsen ticket by a margin of 55 percent to 44 percent.

Perot activity in the State has been heavy. The 1987 and 1989 Republican mayoral candidate of Stamford has signed on to head up the Perot effort, and coordinators are in place in all six Congressional districts. 14,620 signatures are required by August 14 in order for Perot to qualify for the ballot. Signatures represent one percent of the 1988 vote.

Speculation is high that Governor Weicker will endorse Perot. Peter Gold, honorary chairman of a Connecticut Party and co-chair of Weicker's gubernatorial election, said a Perot endorsement is being considered. A Connecticut Party was formed as Weicker's independent party. Connecticut law states that the party that won the past election receives top placement on the general election ballot.. Inasmuch as Independent candidate Lowell Weicker won the past election, Ross Perot, as an Independent candidate, may receive top placement on the ballot.

Former Republican Senator **Lowell Weicker** ran as an Independent and narrowly defeated Republican Congressman **John Rowland** by a margin of 40%-38% in the race for Governor. Democrat Congressman **Bruce Morrison** finished third with 22 percent. Republicans were successful in winning one state wide seat. Former Republican Party Vice-Chair **Pauline Kezer** was elected as Secretary of State.

Two House seats were left vacant by the departures of **Bruce Morrison**(D-3) and **John Rowland**(R-5). In the 3rd District, which covers much of New Haven, Democrat activist **Rosa DeLauro** defeated State Senator **Tom Scott** by a margin of 51%-49%. Scott, a well liked conservative politician, was unable to defeat the liberal DeLauro in this traditionally Democrat district.

In the 5th district, Waterbury City Councilman and businessman **Gary Franks** upset former Democrat Congressman **Toby Moffett** by a margin of 50%-48% with 2% going to a third party candidate. Franks is the first black Republican Congressman since the early 1930's. Franks, a conservative, is also the highest elected black in New England.

In the State Legislature, Republicans picked up three seats in the State Senate. The senate margin is 20D-16R. The margin in the State House is 88D-63R.

1992 OVERVIEW

U.S. Senate Race

Democrat U.S. Senator **Chris Dodd** faces re-election this year. In 1986, Dodd spent \$2 million and defeated Roger Eddy with 65 percent of the vote. State Representative **Chris Burnham** of Stamford, a Desert Storm veteran, and former Connecticut House Republican Leader **Robert Jaekle** will seek the Republican nomination to challenge Dodd. Jaekle has served in the State Legislature for 14 years. He ran unsuccessfully for Lt. Governor in 1990. Burnham has a commanding lead over Jaekle in fundraising, \$260,000 to \$70,000, respectively. Jaekle has received public endorsements from former Congressman **John Rowland** and anti-tax activist **Tom Scott**. Each claims to be ahead in the delegate battle. U.S. Representative **Nancy Johnson**, who was expected to enter the race, decided instead to seek re-election to her House seat.

Congressional Races

1st District -- Democrat incumbent **Barbara Kennelly** plans to announce her intention to run for re-election. No announced Republican challenger to date.

2nd District -- Many in the state feel Democrat **Sam Gejdenson** is the most vulnerable candidate among the state's congressional delegation. His support for the pay raise and opposition to the Persian Gulf War, along with 55 bounced checks and the Defense cutbacks to electric Boat make his race one to watch closely. **Glenn Carberry**, a Norwich Republican, who challenged Gejdenson in 1988, State Senator **Edward Munster** and State Representative **Glenn Arthur** are seeking the Republican nomination to challenge Gejdenson.

3rd District -- Former State Senator and Chairman of the Connecticut Taxpayers Committee, **Tom Scott**, will challenge incumbent Democrat **Rosa DeLauro**. Scott was defeated by DeLauro by only 7,000 votes in 1990 having been outspent nearly 4 to 1. Many feel that Scott's recent publicity in leading the anti-income tax efforts in the state give him a strong chance to upset DeLauro.

4th District -- Republican Congressman **Chris Shays** plans to run for re-election. No announced Democratic challenger.

5th District -- First term incumbent **Gary Franks** will face strong opposition from one of five democrats running for the Democratic nomination. The leading two challengers are liberal State Representative **Lynn Taborsak** and conservative Waterbury Judge of Probate **Jim Lawlor**.

6th District -- **Nancy Johnson** will announce her re-election campaign soon. No announced Democrat challenger.

State Legislature

Of the 151 House seats, 50 Republican members have announced that they will not seek re-election.

Of the 36 State Senators, 4 Democratic and 2 Republican members have announced that they will not seek another term.

KEY REPUBLICAN LEADERS

John Rowland: Rowland was first elected to Congress in 1984 at the age of 27. He was considered a strong contender for Governor, until former Senator **Lowell Weicker** switched parties and entered the race as an Independent. Rowland was an early supporter of yours, but played a marginal role in the 1988 campaign as an Honorary Bush Chairman. Rowland has said that he will run again for Governor in 1994. He is currently employed with an insurance company in Hartford.

Brian Gaffney: Gaffney served as Chairman of the Connecticut George Bush for President and Bush/Quayle Campaign in 1988 and currently serves as Bush-Quayle '92 Co-Chairman. He is well respected among party regulars and appreciates the old style of politics.

Betsy Heminway: Heminway served as Co-Chairman of the Connecticut George Bush for President and Bush/Quayle Campaigns in 1988 and currently serves as Bush-Quayle '92 Co-Chairman. She is active in politics in the Greenwich area and was very instrumental in the election of Congressman Chris Shays, who won the seat vacated by the late Stuart McKinney. Mrs. Heminway is also a grassroots campaign volunteer.

Congresswoman Nancy Johnson: Johnson is the senior member of the congressional delegation, and would be a strong candidate for a U.S. Senate seat.

John Mastropietro: Mastropietro was Rowland's campaign manager during which he gained respect among Party regulars.

PARTY STATUS / ACTIVITY

State Party Chairman Dick Foley will face re-election in June. Foley operates from the old school of politics, and has created controversy within the Party due to his harsh style. He is not well respected by the Bush-Quayle leadership in the state.

Tremendous protest occurred last Fall when more than 40,000 people staged the largest protest rally ever held at the State Capitol. The protest was the result of the 4.5 percent state income tax that Governor Weicker had signed into law. Weicker has suffered serious criticism as a result of this action.

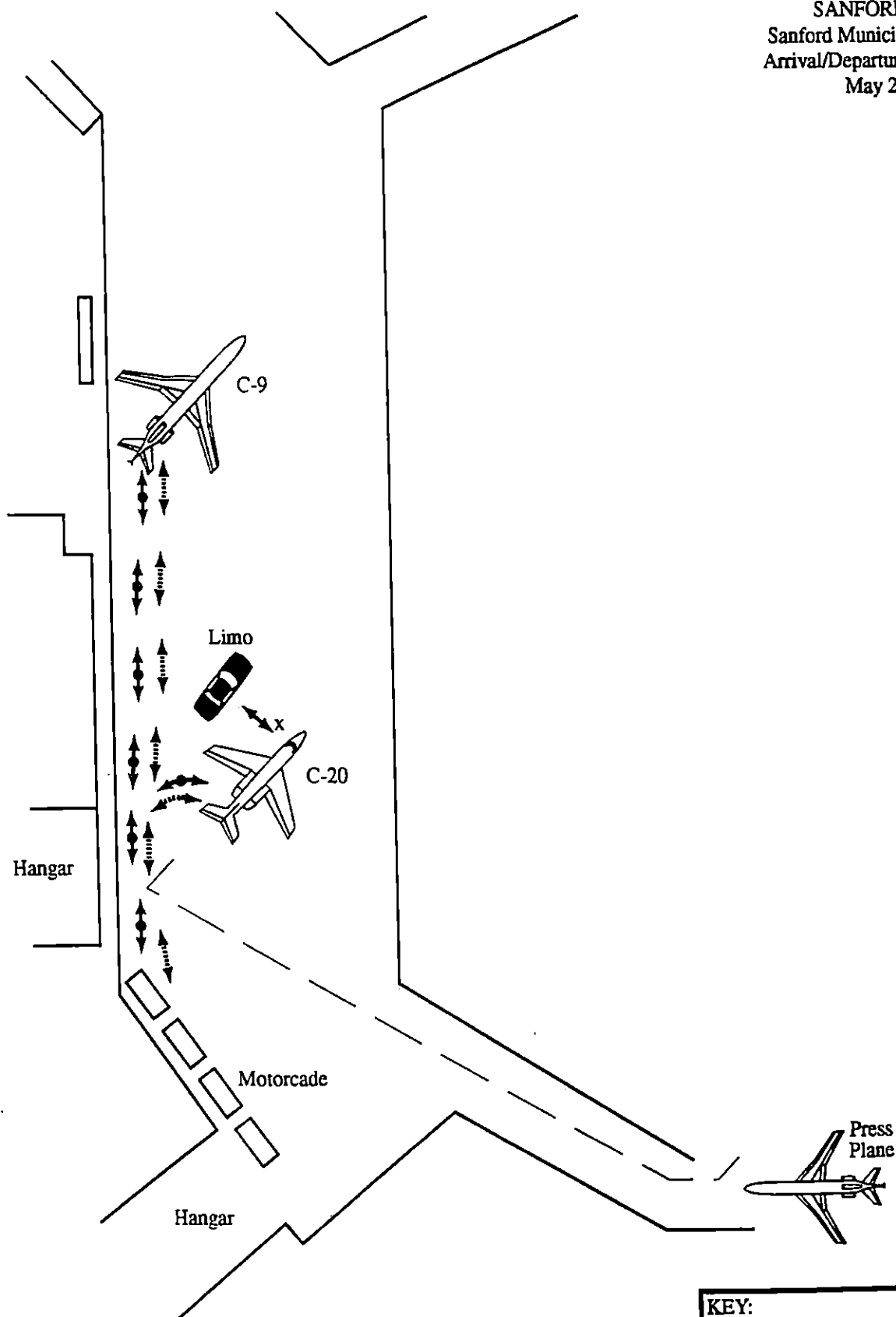

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor McKernan, Chairman of the Board of the bipartisan Jobs for America's Graduates, Inc. (JAG), forwarded a copy of JAG's 1991 Annual Report. The program, active in 350 schools in 19 states, has had a 15 percent increase in serving disadvantaged and at-risk young people and continues to meet several goals of America 2000. Prime Minister John Major has had the JAG program tested in the U.K. for more than a year and has invited Governor McKernan to meet with him to discuss the possibility of replicating the program in the UK.

Additional correspondence from Governor McKernan references a phone conversation he had on May 11 with Bob Teeter and Sam Skinner concerning the underlying problems in Los Angeles, CA. One of the suggestions he proffered was to implement a JAG program within the City of Los Angeles.

State Senator Barbara Gill (R) received a congratulatory retirement letter from you on her retirement from the Maine State Senate after 16 years of public service.

Mr. William Beaulier, Chairman, Ashland Town Council, opposes the proposed Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) regulation requiring employees to wear seat belts while on the job and to conduct driver safety programs for all employees who drive.

II. Discussion

A. Fiscal

On May 6th, a periodic national survey conducted by the Federal Reserve's 12 banks was released. The report includes the most optimistic figures since last summer. Richard Syron, President of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, recently stated New England is headed toward economic recovery, but is a bit slower than the other areas of the country.

The most recent Maine Business Index also indicates the economy is turning around. The latest revenue figures indicate Maine will most likely end the fiscal year (June 30) on target.

B. Workers Compensation

The Blue Ribbon Commission on Workers' Compensation is, and has been, holding public hearings. The Superintendent of the Insurance Bureau has testified before the Commission and stated that adopting a system like that of another state would not necessarily be the best solution to Maine's problem. A business/labor group which studied Maine's system has recommended that Michigan's system ought to be adopted in Maine. The Maine Council of Self-insurers, representing large and small employers, has also gone on record as opposing Michigan's system.

C. Wetlands

The farmers overriding concerns of private property rights and government control with regard to wetlands continues to be a highly emotional issue. The wetlands issue is of particular concern to Maine's new cranberry industry. Maine has had three new cranberry operations established in 1990 and 1991; however, because of the uncertainty of the wetlands issue, approximately 92 new applicants wanting to establish cranberry bogs in Maine have halted the application process.

EPA has developed a work group with the Maine Department of Agriculture and the Army Corps of Engineers to resolve problems. A more generic resolution of this issue is underway through a

Regulatory Guidance Letter being discussed by the Corps, EPA and other agencies.

D. Unemployment

Union representation at the International Paper Company plant in Jay could end in July when a decertification election supervised by the NLRB will take place. The paper industry is the backbone of Maine's economy. In the 1980's, workers went on strike for sixteen months. International Paper hired replacement workers. Just recently, the union voted to allow these individuals to join the union, yet very few have. If the decertification vote passes, it will end nearly a century of union representation at this mill.

On April 14, 1992, Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) funds were allocated to Maine in the amount of \$863,629. The funds for Maine will provide services to workers from Dexter Shoes in Dexter, Fisher Price in Murray, Down East Casuals in Lewiston, and Down East Footwear in East Corinth.

E. America 2000

Maine continues to lead New England states in terms of AMERICA 2000 involvement and initiatives. The Maine Coalition for Excellence in Education, at the request of Governor McKernan, has played a leadership role in the development of Maine 2000. The Coalition is a non-partisan group of business leaders, educators, legislators, and parents. It is financed by private funds and state government resources and is administered by the Maine Development Foundation.

James Orr, President and Chief Executive Officer of UNUM Life Insurance Company, one of the largest employers in the state, is chairman of the Foundation. The Maine Teachers Association has expressed support for President Bush's efforts to make education a national priority and has pledged to work with the Coalition for Excellence in Education to make Maine 2000 a success.

F. Offshore Fish Farm Proposal

The American Norwegian Fish Farm, Inc., has proposed a 48-square-mile floating fish farm roughly 52 miles offshore from Portland, Maine. The proposed fish farm would consist of 90 floating fish pens (90 feet deep by 90 feet in diameter), and would produce a total of 12 million fish annually. Given the absence of an environmental report, EPA has objected to the issuance of an Army Corps of Engineers permit based on offshore and coastal resources.

G. Democratic Convention

The Democratic State Convention was held this past weekend in Bangor. Brown supporters won 9 delegates to the national convention and Clinton won 6, Tsongas won 5, and uncommitted won 3. There are also 8 undeclared super delegates attending the convention.

H. Republican Convention

The Republican State Convention was held on the weekend of April 17th. You won all 22 delegates and 22 alternate delegates.

I. Auto Exhaust Emissions

A law requiring the testing of auto exhaust emissions will go into effect July 1, 1994. Although this legislation received the necessary votes for passage, it was controversial. It requires testing in the seven southern counties only. (There are sixteen counties in Maine.) If a car fails testing, the cost to the owner could rise to approximately \$450.

Maine is an extremely rural state without public transportation in most areas and no rail transportation. Opponents feel people cannot afford these additional costs and will be left without transportation to work and medical services.

J. Discretionary Section 8 Grant Application

The Maine Department of Transportation (DOT) has recently applied to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for a discretionary planning grant of \$693,000 in Federal funds to complete an environmental and preliminary engineering study for the restoration of passenger rail service between Portland, Maine and Boston, Massachusetts. The application is currently under review in Headquarters.

The Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 authorizes \$30 million for the capital costs of the project. However, actual funding must be provided in a future appropriation.

The Maine DOT has chosen Amtrak to operate the service. Amtrak plans to provide \$20 million in equipment for the project.

1992 ELECTION OUTLOOK

Presidential Campaign

Republican Presidential caucuses occurred in Maine over the past three months with the majority of the Republican and all of the Democrat caucuses being held on the last weekend in February. You secured 88 percent of the delegates; 8 percent were uncommitted and 4 percent supported Pat Buchanan. At the Republican State Convention earlier this month, national convention delegates were elected. All delegates support your candidacy. The key platform issues at the state convention were a right-to-life amendment, which did not pass; support of term limits at the state level and a downsizing of the state legislature. The Republican leadership in the state is not in favor of the proposal to reduce the size of the state legislature.

Jerry Brown won the majority of the Democrat delegates in the Maine caucuses by a fraction of a percent over Paul Tsongas. Uncommitted delegates accounted for third place and Clinton finished in fourth place.

Maine has 4 electoral college votes -- one for each of the two congressional seats, and two at-large votes.

The Bush-Quayle ticket won the 1988 Presidential election in Maine by a margin of 56 percent to 44 percent.

Congressional Campaigns

There will be no gubernatorial or U.S. Senate races in Maine this year. The focus will be on the two Congressional races. The Congressional primary will be held on June 9.

In the Second Congressional District, **Olympia Snowe** will face an extremely difficult general election this year after barely emerging victorious in 1990. She has won her previous six elections with more than 70 percent of the vote. Snowe won in 1990 by the smallest margin of any of her Congressional races - 2 percent (less than 5,000 votes.) As a result, she has taken on a higher profile in her district than she has in the past. She has travelled out of state to secure PAC contributions - the first time in a decade that she has raised funds outside of Maine or Washington. Governor McKernan, Snowe's husband, has faced serious decline in his approval ratings following the state budget problems last year. Many believe that McKernan's negative image will cause a decline in Snowe's support. In the hill check writing scandal, Snowe wrote one bad check in the amount of \$150. Snowe's voting record for the 1991 legislative session shows that 47 percent of her votes were cast in opposition to positions that you supported.

While Snowe faces no primary opposition, former State Representative **Patrick McGowan**, who was Snowe's challenger in 1990, is the leading Democrat challenger. He is expected to run hard on the anti-Washington sentiment against the 7-term incumbent. He will also use the closure of Loring Air Force Base as an issue against Snowe. The economy may be used as an issue also - portions of Snowe's district are facing 12-13 percent unemployment. Former U.S. Senator **Margaret Chase Smith** (R) attended McGowan's announcement which created quite a bit of controversy and was used by the McGowan campaign to indicate a lack of support for Snowe. At age 93, however, Smith stated that she attended out of respect to her long time family friendship with the McGowans. Majority Leader **George Mitchell** will campaign actively in support of McGowan.

Green Party member **Jonathan Carter** is also challenging Snowe.

In the First Congressional District, **Tony Payne**, a moderate Republican activist and Portland businessman; Christian Fundamentalist **John Purcell** and **Linda Bean-Jones**, grandchild of outdoor outfitter L.L. Bean, are the Republican challengers to Democrat Congressman **Tom Andrews**. Bean-Jones ran for this seat in 1988 but lost the primary to current GOP State Chairman, **Ted O'Meara**. There are no Democrat challengers to Andrews. While Andrews did not write any bad checks, the Federal Election

Commission has cited him as having the 50th largest campaign debt of all candidates who ran for the House in 1990. Andrews' debt stands at \$47,500. He has been noted by the national media as one of the most liberal members of Congress.

Only 30,000 voters are expected to participate in the First Congressional District primary. With the race split 3 ways, a majority could mean as few as just over 10,000 votes. However, a \$79 million jobs bond is on the ballot which could increase voter turnout. The last time a bond issue appeared on the ballot was in 1986. Turnout increased by 50 percent.

Governor McKernan has requested your participation in a golf fundraiser in August, similar to the one in which you participated two years ago in support of McKernan's gubernatorial campaign. Governor McKernan has suggested that the proceeds from this year's event would be split evenly between Victory '92, the Snowe for Congress campaign and the scholarship fund established last year following the death of the Governor's son, Peter. McKernan states that the Bush-Quayle general election campaign in Maine will depend on the funds raised at this event, particularly the corporate contributions.

In the Governor's race, Republican incumbent John "Jock" McKernan was able to overcome low polling results to defeat former two-term Governor and Congressman Joseph Brennan, who had taken McKernan's Congressional seat when McKernan became Governor in 1986. Brennan developed an early lead when he argued that McKernan had fiscally mismanaged the state.

STATE AND LOCAL ISSUES

Bath Iron Works received a \$749.9 million Navy contract last week to build 3 of 5 authorized Arleigh Burke-class destroyers. In uncertain times for defense related industries, this is expected to secure Bath Iron Works employment until 1997. The Portsmouth-Kittery shipyard received confirmation that it will overhaul a nuclear submarine therefore eliminating the need for anticipated layoffs.

One of the recision projects targeted for elimination was a \$200,000 University of Maine research grant to promote the growth of wild blueberries. The blueberry industry is important in Northern Maine. This grant had been sponsored by Mitchell and Snowe. Both objected to the White House characterization that the project was a waste of taxpayers dollars.

The Bangor Daily News ran a supportive editorial following the State of the Union Address. The economic plan outlined by the President was referred to as " . . . a solid outline of practical short-term goals that could help lift America out of its recession."

The Maine People's Alliance, a liberal consumer group, has charged that the President should pay \$165,000 in state income taxes based on the amount of time he spends in Maine. The \$165,000 represents an amount retroactive to the past decade. The group ran a "Read Our Lips - Pay Your Taxes" television advertisement and full page newspaper ads during the New Hampshire primary season. A Maine tax assessor would not comment, saying individual tax matters are private information. He also stated that tax liability is based on where the individual claims residence.

Maine native, Julie Parisien of Auburn, placed fifth in the Winter Olympics giant slalom competition. She finished .40 seconds away from a medal.

REAPPORTIONMENT OUTLOOK

Maine is not expected to lose either of the state's two Congressional seats through reapportionment. In the state legislature, early evidence shows that population trends may favor Republicans. The Maine constitution requires that the new state legislative lines be drawn by the first legislature seated after the census was taken. Therefore, candidates will not run under the reapportioned districts until 1994.

PARTY STATUS / ACTIVITY

Ted O'Meara, a 1988 Congressional candidate in the First District, was elected last year as State Party Chairman. Ted is a former member of Senator Cohen's staff and works closely with Governor McKernan. He is young and energetic and has been well received in his new role.

The party has been extremely successful in recruiting candidates for the upcoming legislative races. There are 140 candidates for the 151 house seats and 31 candidates for the 35 senate seats.

Last year's budget battles were tremendously contentious with many legislators being physically assaulted by their colleagues from the other party. Many have decided not to seek re-election this year.

The state party is operating with a \$50,000 surplus which is the most positive financial status the party has had in several years.

Controversy has arisen over the seating of a former Pat Robertson chairman as GOP county chair for Cumberland (Portland) County. The chairman represents the far right wing of the party organization in the state and has strongly resisted attempts from within the party to unseat him. In response, he is challenging the legality of the procedures that were undertaken when the national committeeman was elected. He further charged that the State Party violated its by-laws when they refused to seat him as county chairman. The chairman has experienced legal problems of his own. He was arrested and fined last year for shoplifting \$21 worth of batteries.
