MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: ROGER B. PORTER *RBP*
SUBJECT: Letter from Kenneth O. Gilmore

Kenneth Gilmore, editor-in-chief of Reader's Digest until Parkinson's disease forced his retirement, has written urging you to end the moratorium on federal funds for fetal tissue research using tissue from induced abortions.

He included with his letter a short article he published in American Health about his experience with Parkinson's disease. It is a moving and interesting account, and worth reading.

The draft response seeks to emphasize three points:

- (1) You are strongly committed to biomedical research including that using fetal tissue;
- (2) You directed that the Administration examine ways to meet the needs of researchers; and
- (3) On the basis of that review you have signed an executive order establishing a fetal tissue bank using tissue from spontaneous abortions and tissue from terminated ectopic pregnancies.

Recommendation: That you sign the attached draft response to Kenneth O. Gilmore.

Dear Mr. ^{Kenn}Gilmore:

Thank you for your letter and the article you enclosed about your experiences with Parkinson's disease. What a moving and courageous account of what it means to be afflicted by Parkinson's. I learned much from reading it.

Our policy is to support the use of fetal tissue in biomedical research with the use of tissue from spontaneous abortions or from the termination of ectopic pregnancies. I am aware that this approach does not satisfy some researchers.


I asked our people to take a hard look at how we could insure that we meet the fetal tissue needs of researchers. I am pleased to inform you that I have signed an Executive Order directing the establishment of a fetal tissue bank by the Department of Health and Human Services. A copy of the Executive Order is enclosed.

The scientists and physicians involved inform me that this bank will provide researchers with about 2,000 useable fetuses per year, none from induced abortions. These same scientists advise me that this much fetal tissue is about ten times the amount currently used in research.

I am deeply interested in seeing biomedical research move forward. Throughout the debate on this issue, we have not sought to thwart research, but to assure that research is compatible with ethical concerns. The Executive Order establishing a fetal tissue bank can help us meet that goal. I have asked for a report on the establishment of this bank by the end of the year.

Barbara joins me in wishing you the best. Some of the finest minds in our country are doing medical research, and that makes me hopeful we can make progress against diseases like Parkinson's.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

- - - - -

ESTABLISHMENT OF A FETAL TISSUE BANK

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, and in order to provide a source of human tissue to develop treatments and research methods for various diseases, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. Establishment of a Fetal Tissue Bank. The Secretary of Health and Human Services ("Secretary") shall establish a human fetal tissue bank. The fetal tissue in the bank shall be obtained exclusively from ectopic pregnancies and spontaneous abortions.

Sec. 2. Procedures. The Secretary shall establish procedures for making tissue from the bank available for meritorious research projects selected through an appropriate peer review process. The Secretary shall include in the bank a registry of physicians and hospitals interested in using the tissue from the bank to further specific medical objectives.

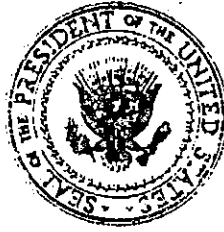
Sec. 3. Policies. The Secretary shall develop human fetal cell lines in a manner consistent with current policy and ensure that the actions directed by sections 2 and 3 of this order are carried out in accordance with all other applicable legal requirements related to fetal tissue.

Sec. 4. Report. The Secretary shall report his progress in carrying out this order to the President on or before December 31, 1992.

Dear Mr. President:

As a friend and long-time supporter, I urge you to allow federal funds to be used for fetal tissue transplant research. Legislation from Capitol Hill lifting the fetal tissue moratorium will soon be on your desk. As one who has lived with Parkinson's Disease (PD) for eight years, I pray you will open your heart and mind to the reasons why you should sign this legislation.

Since I stepped down as Editor-in-Chief of Reader's Digest in January 1991, I have devoted much time trying to understand the complex world of medical research and in particular neurological disorders such as PD. What I have learned is deeply troubling. At the center of the matter is the four-year moratorium forbidding any kind of federal expenditures for fetal tissue research.

Let me share with you a recent visit I had with Dr. Eugene Redmond, director of Yale University's neural transplant program. Here at the world's most advanced facility for the study of transplantation of fetal tissue into the brains of Parkinson patients, Redmond and a group of doctors have performed 11 transplants in the last four years. His long awaited findings, which have just been released, disclose that neural cells from the fetal tissue are able to graft to the impaired Parkinsonian brain and revive its ability to produce dopamine, the missing neural chemical so desperately needed for motor function. As a result, patients have experienced alleviation of Parkinson symptoms.

This entire undertaking did not cost one cent of federal money. As a research procedure, each transplant involves a team of 23 doctors and nurses and costs more than \$100,000. "If the ban had not been in effect," says Redmond, "by now we would have performed at least 20 transplants and learned far more about this experimental research." If fetal transplantation were being considered like any other new treatment or new drug, the government would require about \$100 million in safety and efficacy.

These days Redmond spends a large part of his time on the road raising money for the transplant program. It is absolutely necessary if he is to continue the research. In addition to his own search for funding, he is concerned about the "chilling" effect the ban has among scientists in the field of fetal research. "A great number of neurological researchers will not touch fetal tissue study with a ten-foot pole for fear of being labeled trouble makers by those who pass judgment on federal grant proposals," says Redmond.

Another factor now emerges. Fetal tissue research is quietly being used to help find cures for the AIDS virus and a number of other maladies such as heart disease, lung cancer, Alzheimer's, diabetes and multiple sclerosis. Researchers at Stamford are working to test fetal tissue implants on immune deficient mice as a basis for an AIDS vaccine. Declares the American Cancer Society: "We have areas of research directly related to cancer that have benefitted from the use of human fetal tests." The American Heart Association says, "The moratorium on fetal tissue transplantation research impedes implant scientific investigations including studies which impact on prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease."

Would you, Mr. President, still restrict federal funds for fetal tissue transplants if in fact they could arrest the AIDS virus?

Many political observers say that you are determined to maintain the fetal tissue moratorium in order to insure the support of anti-abortion activists in this election year. Knowing your love of life and your courage, I cannot believe you really want to perpetuate this flagrant restriction of free scientific inquiry. Mr. President, I beseech you to rescind this ban and lend hope to millions of us who are plagued by incurable diseases.

My Ruthless Companion

SEEKING PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE WITH PARKINSON'S DISEASE



IT WAS ON A VISIT TO Beijing, nearly seven years ago, that I first became acquainted with an alien being in my body—and my life. All too soon I would learn what a ruthless companion he was. Now not a day passes that we do not run into each other.

Neurologists have a name for this mysterious malady that decimates precious cells deep within our brains and makes it difficult for us to walk or talk or control our motions. They call it Parkinson's disease.

Because I wanted a more personal relationship with this amorphous creature who roams my blood stream and attacks my brain cells, I called him Brain-Dead Bob—a name I pulled out of the blue

It was at a crowded restaurant near Tiananman Square in late March, 1984, that I got my first warning from Brain-Dead Bob. As I reached for a bowl of shrimp, my left arm began to tingle and shake. It was over in seconds and I thought little more about it. At age 53, I was in excellent health. And I put it entirely out of my mind a few hours later, at 3 a.m., when I got a phone call advising me to return to New York immediately. It was more than likely, I was told, that I would be named editor-in-chief of *Reader's Digest* magazine.

In the busy days that followed, I experienced a slight trembling of my left hand two or three times. Each episode lasted just a few seconds. My wife, Janet, urged me to see a doctor. We did

recall that my elderly mother had a tremor in her left hand.

Our family physician referred us to Dr. Mark Green, a soft-spoken neurologist. He gave me a full examination, from tapping on my kneecap to testing my eyesight. He was especially interested in my mother's tremor, which he concluded was harmless. "You probably have the same thing," he said. "Nevertheless, we can't absolutely rule out Parkinson's disease." A shiver went up my spine. The mere words had a tone of doom.

For the next eight months I had no major problems. With the help of a drug called Inderal, the tremor in my arm disappeared completely. Then one morning I noticed it was difficult to lift my leg as I walked. In subsequent nights I was awakened by an ache deep in my left leg. My remedy was to lift my legs above me and pump as if I were riding a bicycle; 20 minutes of this usually did the trick. But as a creaking bed and a gyrating husband were not ideal for sleeping, I asked Janet if she'd like me to move to our guest room. "No way," she answered. "This bed is designed for you, me and the cats. And the threat of some disease is not going to break up our sleeping together."

My next visit with Green in June, 1985, was not a happy one. In particular, he found that my left hand did not turn and twist as easily in its socket as the right hand. "Ken, I must tell you this is a key indicator of Parkinson's disease," he said matter-of-factly. "I'd like you to see Dr. Lucien Cote at the Columbia Presbyterian Neurological Institute. He's one of the world's top Parkinson's specialists." Mark wasn't exaggerating: The first appointment we could get with Dr. Cote was six weeks away.

Cote, a handsome man with friendly blue eyes, put me through a series of hand and foot coordination tests. We were doing fine until he asked me to

hop on my left foot along a corridor next to his office. I managed to make only one ridiculously tiny hop. When the doctor excused himself for a minute to take a phone call, I looked over to Janet, who had watched the entire exercise. She rolled her eyes, then gave me a wink. We knew the game was up. *Score one for the bad guys.*

Dr. Cote told us I had Parkinson's. "Please do not let this overwhelm you," he said. "A huge amount of research is under way, and you're only in the earliest stages of the disease." Outside his office Janet shook her head. "Honey," she said, "that was a bad hop."

Now we edged into the question of whom to tell. We decided it was not necessary for our daughters, Lara, 14, and Alexandra, 13, to know just yet. Certainly the time would come, but why burden them now?

I explained the situation to George Grune, chairman of the board of *Reader's Digest*, and assured him that except for occasional aches and muscle stiffness I was in excellent physical condition and could work the long hours the job demanded. He agreed we should keep the matter private.

The variety of medicines developed to combat Parkinson's is awesome (see "Dr. Parkinson's Cruel Disease," p. 54). The trick is to find the mix that minimizes both symptoms and side effects, which can be nasty. Determining the best formula can be excruciatingly slow. It takes six weeks, for example, to go from one to three milligrams a day of a given drug. And just when you think you have things right, Brain-Dead Bob throws another curve ball. Your handwriting becomes painfully tiny no matter how hard you try to keep the letters large. Your voice suddenly goes soft, and you can't speak in a decisive manner.

In early March, 1987, Mark Green informed me that a drug called Deprenyl was undergoing a major test in the U.S. It was reputed to dramatically slow down Parkinson's progressive nature, particularly in its early phase. Though sold in Europe for years, the drug had not yet been approved by the

Food and Drug Administration for commercial use in this country. (It's now available here under the name Eldepryl.) One place to buy Deprenyl was London, and the man to see there was Dr. David Marsden, a top Parkinson's expert. With Green's assistance, I finally arranged to see Marsden in July. He asked me a few questions, tested my coordination skills and prescribed a year's supply of the drug.

I collected the medicine at the venerable pharmaceutical house of John Bell & Croyden, which looked like an 18th-century apothecary. Presently, one of the pharmacists handed me a carefully wrapped package—five canisters, each containing 150 tablets.

Upon arriving in New York, I stashed the canisters in various pockets and tried my best not to look like some illegal drug runner. For the first time

in my life I was scared stiff as I went through customs. My real fear was not that I would be penalized for slipping these drugs into the country, but that my pills would be confiscated. Somehow, I made it through. I headed for the nearest water cooler, swallowed a Deprenyl and whispered, "*Score one for the good guys.*"

For the next two years Deprenyl kept me on a very even keel. In fact, I didn't even need to see Mark Green. But by 1989 Lara and Alexandra were sensing that something was not quite right with me. Both noticed my frequent shuffling at home and they started telling me to pick up my feet. "You're walking around like some old man," declared Alexandra, who privately called me "Carpet Cleaner Ken."

That year we all spent Thanksgiving in Naples, Fla. Late on Saturday afternoon I asked my daughters to take a walk with me. It was misty and few people were on the beach. This seemed the right time and setting.

"Let's stop a minute," I said. "I want to talk to you about a serious matter." When I mentioned the word Parkinson's, Alexandra began to cry. "Daddy," she sobbed, "that's a terrible disease that kills you."

She rolled her eyes, then gave me a wink. We knew the game was up.

"No, no, sweetheart. You must be thinking of Alzheimer's, which is far more life threatening than Parkinson's." I told them about the vast network of researchers working to find a cure for Parkinson's. "Also," I said, "with the help of new medicines, I've been able to lead a normal life. And 10 years from now when I'm close to 70, I'm sure there will have been major breakthroughs." I was prepared for the next question. "Is Parkinson's hereditary?" asked Lara. "No, the vast majority of Parkinson's specialists say there's no substantial evidence that it's passed from one generation to the next."

For a few seconds we stood in silence, the mist swirling around us. Then Lara and Alexandra wrapped their arms around me. We clung to each other, tears rolling down our cheeks. Then a giggle from Alexandra. "Daddy, I'm sorry I called you Carpet Cleaner Ken." We laughed until more tears streamed down our cheeks.

The year 1990 brought me to a turning point. While I had managed to keep my ailment on a plateau, mainly due to Deprenyl, new difficulties arose.

By far the most demoralizing development was the "on-off" syndrome, which occurs after you have Parkinson's four to six years. The benefits of your medicine wear off unexpectedly. You are suddenly in an "off" period, which can mean walking problems, shortness of breath, dizziness and mild confusion.

One evening at a charity dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, I headed through a crowded room to get drinks at the bar. On the way back, my feet suddenly felt as if they were trying to walk through six inches of mud. I found myself immobilized in the middle of the crowd, begging my feet to go forward. Finally I plunged ahead, stepping on toes and sloshing our drinks.

By spring of that year I suspected that several of my colleagues had noticed my awkward moments and were beginning to worry that I wasn't well. I decided to let the key members of my staff in on my disease.

I talked to each one of them almost casually, noting from the outset that I could be far worse off with lung cancer or other diseases. I suggested that they pass the word along in whatever fashion they felt best—just no overdramatic announcements. I was overjoyed to have

the secrecy behind me and to discuss my ailment openly with colleagues I had known for years.

As weeks went by, harsh reality began to assert itself. The "off" condition was sneaking up on me at least once a day. There was no way I could fulfill my responsibilities as editor-in-chief up to the standards I had set. I spoke with George Grune and in October he announced that due to Parkinson's I would be retiring early at the end of the year at age 60. I had mixed feelings—gut-wrenching sorrow to leave a job I so loved, yet rising excitement at the prospect of new ventures and more time with Janet and our daughters.

My days in "retirement" are as full as ever, with both writing and editorial consulting. And I've been able to give far more attention to understanding and combating Parkinson's. I remain convinced that the cause and cure of Parkinson's will be found in my lifetime.

Meanwhile, those of us affected must do the best we can, knowing every day has good and bad moments. Consider the weekend Janet and I attended a seminar at my alma mater, Brown University. One evening there was a cocktail reception at which president Vartan Gregorian would speak. As I was getting dressed for it, I had problems fastening the buttons on my shirt. I was determined to do it myself. We were already running late and my button battle consumed another 20 minutes. By the time we finally arrived, Gregorian had finished his talk. Janet was upset. I was frustrated and mad at myself.

After dinner I went down a long stairway to the men's room. Suddenly my feet froze, my left heel tangled with my right ankle and I took a beaut of a fall, landing on all fours. Fortunately, the only thing seriously bruised was my dignity.

So ended one more up-and-down day in my life with Parkinson's. That night, I went to bed uplifted as always by lines from Romans 12:12: "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer." And as sleep crept upon me, I was also comforted by the late writer Malcolm Cowley's words: "If you're over 60 and wake up in the morning and nothing aches, you know you're dead."





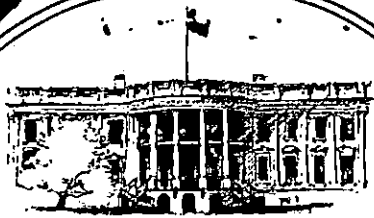

A CLASH OF VALUES

President Bush wasn't about to let Bill Clinton have the wholesome issue of family values all to himself Thursday in Cleveland.

While Clinton was across town unveiling a package of new proposals aimed at preserving the American family, Bush repeated his commitment to the same issue. And Bush only mentioned "Murphy Brown" once.

Bush declined to respond to reporters' questions throughout his brief visit here Thursday, including repeated queries about polls that show him trailing Ross Perot. Instead, the President stuck to his scripted speeches at the fund-raiser and later to a group of about 1,600 people at St. Josephat Ukrainian Catholic Cathedral in Parma, where he was honored by the leaders of numerous ethnic groups.

The President canceled an announced visit to the 3rd District police station, where he was to shake hands with some of Cleveland's finest in front of the national media. Bush's aides said the police-station stop, which was on his official schedule distributed to the news media, was canceled because of scheduling problems.

But Gov. Voinovich said he advised the President to cancel the stop at the police station. Voinovich said the attention generated from such a visit "would detract" from Bush's appearance before the ethnic leaders.

Mayor Michael White, a Democrat, said that if Bush had made a campaign visit to the police station, he would have felt compelled to respond. The mayor, who declined an invitation to meet the President at the airport, said: "What I'm trying to say to you is the man was here for his reelection.... I'm opposed to his reelection, and the use of public facilities would have been used for a political purpose."





A CLASH OF VALUES

President Bush wasn't about to let Bill Clinton have the wholesome issue of family values all to himself Thursday in Cleveland.

While Clinton was across town unveiling a package of new proposals aimed at preserving the American family, Bush repeated his commitment to the same issue. And Bush only mentioned "Murphy Brown" once.

Bush declined to respond to reporters' questions throughout his brief visit here Thursday, including repeated queries about polls that show him trailing Ross Perot. Instead, the President stuck to his scripted speeches at the fund-raiser and later to a group of about 1,600 people at St. Josephat Ukrainian Catholic Cathedral in Parma, where he was honored by the leaders of numerous ethnic groups.

The President canceled an announced visit to the 3rd District police station, where he was to shake hands with some of Cleveland's finest in front of the national media. Bush's aides said the police-station stop, which was on his official schedule distributed to the news media, was canceled because of scheduling problems.

But Gov. Voinovich said he advised the President to cancel the stop at the police station. Voinovich said the attention generated from such a visit "would detract" from Bush's appearance before the ethnic leaders.

Mayor Michael White, a Democrat, said that if Bush had made a campaign visit to the police station, he would have felt compelled to respond. The mayor, who declined an invitation to meet the President at the airport, said: "What I'm trying to say to you is the man was here for his reelection.... I'm opposed to his reelection, and the use of public facilities would have been used for a political purpose."



His thousand-dollar fans from sports include tennis pro Pam Shriver, St. Louis Cardinals owner and beer mogul Augie Busch, Los Angeles Dodgers president Peter O'Malley, and Los Angeles Lakers owner Jerry Buss. From the entertainment world: Hollywood's lobbyist, Jack Valenti, and country singer Leo Greenwood.

Pat Buchanan's booster list has considerably less glitter. Among the few notable names: Ben Stein, Buchanan's buddy from their days in Richard Nixon's White House and now a writer and actor playing the nerdy science teacher on *The Wonder Years*, and Ted Turner. Buchanan's boss from his days on CNN's *Crossfire*.

Playing all the angles: Fante's Drug Stores' Sheldon Fante, who gave \$1,000 to Bush, then \$300 to Clinton two weeks later.



Dear Mr. Puelicher:

I would like to sincerely apologize for my delay in responding to your December 9, 1991 letter to the President. Secondly, I want to thank you for expressing your concerns regarding Section 132 (c) of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation Improvement Act of 1991. As you know, this section requires the federal banking regulators to devise standards prohibiting excessive compensation for the employees, officers, directors, and principal shareholders of banks and savings associations.

Although President Bush enacted the legislation on December 19, let me assure you that the Administration is aware of this and many other shortcomings in the particular law. In fact, the President stated at the signing ceremony that while the legislation had to be enacted to provide needed cash to the Bank Insurance Fund, Congress ought to again consider his comprehensive banking reform proposal to fix, rather than simply fund, the industry's problems.

In addition to seeking overall reform, the Administration has been meeting with the federal banking regulators to discuss problems with the law as passed. While the Congress was unable to enact the Administration's banking reform package last year, we continue to push for comprehensive reform on Capitol Hill. In the meantime, we have taken unilateral regulatory relief measures in an effort to ease the credit crunch and strengthen our banking system. I have enclosed fact sheets regarding some of these pertinent recent actions for your review.

We will keep your views in mind as we work to correct problems like Section 132 (c) and to urge Congress to pass comprehensive bank reform legislation. Thank you again for writing. Please let us know if we can be of further assistance to you.



Dear George:

I was your finance chairman for Wisconsin in 1979 and 1988, and although we did not do politically well in Wisconsin, we raised the amount of money you requested plus. I recite this to refresh your memory.

The Marshall & Ilsley Corporation is one of the more successful regional bank systems in America, and I would suggest you have one of your aides check this or ask Brother John so you may have some comfort in what I suggest.

The amendment Senator Carl Levin attached to Bill S543 as Section 132 and passed by the Congress will do more to destroy the banking system than imaginable. There is no regulator in existence who is capable of fairly judging the pay and incentives of employees of the banking system. This amendment affects the future of existing bankers, and as far as recruiting talent for the future of the industry, it destroys that, too.

You should veto Bill S543, send it back with a message to take out the offensive amendment and replace it with a decent clean bill.

I remember sitting with you in the Ritz Hotel in Boston in 1979 and telling you then I didn't want a job in Washington or any other favors. All I wanted was a statesman in the White House for a change, and that is all I want now. If this bill passes and we continue our present policies on regulation and bad legislation, banking will lose its potential of attracting talented people to the industry and the consumers will lose the potential of good bankers in their communities across the country.

Dear Mr. Speaker: (Dear Mr. President:)

I am pleased to submit for congressional consideration and passage the "New Mexico Public Lands Wilderness Act".

The Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA), (43 U.S.C. 1701, et seq.), directs the Secretary of the Interior to review the wilderness potential of the public lands.

The review of the areas identified in New Mexico began immediately after the enactment of FLPMA and has now been completed. Approximately 908,000 acres of public lands in 50 areas in New Mexico met the minimum wilderness criteria and were designated as wilderness study areas (WSAs). These WSAs were studied and analyzed during the review process and the results documented in six environmental impact statements and one instant study area report.

Based on the studies and reviews of the WSAs, the Secretary of the Interior recommends that all or part of 23 of the WSAs, totaling 487,186 acres of public lands, be designated as part of the National Wilderness Preservation System. From these 23 WSAs, the Secretary proposes to designate 22 wilderness areas by consolidating two WSAs into one wilderness area.

I concur with the Secretary of the Interior's recommendations and am pleased to recommend designation of the 22 areas (totaling 487,186 acres) identified in the enclosed draft legislation as additions to the National Wilderness Preservation System.

The proposed additions represent the diversity of wilderness values in the State of New Mexico. These range from the relatively undisturbed and expansive stretch of the Chihuahuan Desert in the West Potrillo Mountains, to the canyons of the Gila and Chama Rivers, to the rocky peaks of the Organ Mountains, Big Hatchet Mountains, and the Sierra Ladrones. These areas span a wide variety of New Mexico landforms, ecosystems, and other natural systems and features. Their inclusion in the wilderness system will improve the geographic distribution of wilderness areas in New Mexico, and will complement existing areas of congressionally designated wilderness. They will provide new and outstanding opportunities for solitude and unconfined recreation.

The enclosed draft legislation provides that designation as wilderness shall not constitute a reservation of water or water rights for wilderness purposes. This is consistent with the fact that the Congress did not establish a Federal reserved water right for wilderness purposes. The Administration has established the policy that, where it is necessary to obtain water rights for wilderness purposes in a specific wilderness area, water rights would be sought from the State by filing under State water laws. Furthermore, it is the policy of the Administration that the designation of wilderness areas should not interfere with the use of water rights, State water administration, or the use of a State's interstate water allocation.

The draft legislation also provides for access to wilderness areas by Indian people for traditional cultural and religious purposes. Access by the general public may be limited in order to protect the privacy of religious cultural activities taking place in specific wilderness areas. In addition, to the fullest extent practicable, the Department of the Interior will coordinate with the Department of Defense to minimize the impact of any overflights during these religious cultural activities.

I further concur with the Secretary of the Interior that all or part of 39 of the WSAs encompassing 420,400 acres are not suitable for preservation as wilderness and should be released for multi-use management.

Also enclosed are a letter and report from the Secretary of the Interior concerning the WSAs discussed above and a section-by-section analysis of the draft legislation. I urge the Congress to act expeditiously and favorably on the proposed legislation so that the natural resources of these WSAs in New Mexico may be protected and preserved.

New Mexico Public Lands Wilderness Act

Today President Bush transmitted to the Congress the New Mexico Public Lands Wilderness Act. This proposal to add lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management to the National Wilderness Preservation System will substantially diversify the wilderness system. Included in the proposal are a variety of landforms ranging from the expansive stretches of the Chihuahuan Desert in the West Potrillos, to the canyons of the Gila and Chama Rivers, to the rocky peaks of the Organ Mountains, Big Hatchet Mountains, and the Sierra Ladrones.

The Act authorizes:

designation of 487,186 acres in 22 areas to be managed as wilderness by the Bureau of Land Management; and

release of 420,400 acres in all or part of 39 areas found not to be suitable for wilderness designation.

The legislation being proposed by President Bush is the culmination of a 15-year study by the Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management on the wilderness suitability of all the public lands in New Mexico. The lands recommended for wilderness designation contain the highest wilderness qualities of naturalness and opportunities for solitude and primitive recreation. In addition, many of these areas include habitat for threatened and endangered species, unusual geologic features, important cultural values, and ecosystems not widely represented at this time in the wilderness system.

Wilderness designation of these areas means that they will be managed to preserve their natural character. Motorized vehicles and equipment will not normally be allowed. Established uses at the time of designation such as livestock grazing will be allowed to continue, but new development to support commercial activities in wilderness areas will not be allowed.

Enactment of the President's proposal will significantly enhance the diversity and beauty of the Nation's lands set aside for the enjoyment of both present and future generations of Americans as part of the National Wilderness Preservation System.



YUGOSLAVIA/PRESIDENT (Rome/Reuter) -- President Bush said Washington is actively considering new measures to deter Serbian aggression against Bosnia-Herzegovina, according to a letter to Italian President Andreotti. In the letter, released by the Italian government, Bush welcomed an Italian proposal to set up temporary shelters for Bosnian refugees. An Italian government spokesman said Bush had offered to send Secretary Baker to discuss the issue with Italian Foreign Minister Michelis in Lisbon Saturday. Bush said that Washington had already responded with extreme rigor to what he called Serbian aggression. The Italian-language text of his letter added: "We are actively considering additional measures to deter further aggression."

YUGOSLAVIA/MILITARY ATTACHES (Brussels/Reuter) -- The U.S. is about to expel Yugoslav military attaches from Washington and close two Yugoslav consulates in an effort to force Serbia to withdraw from Bosnia-Herzegovina, European diplomats said.

YUGOSLAVIA/U.N. (U.N./AP) -- The General Assembly admitted the three former Yugoslav republics of Slovenia, Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina as individual member states of the U.N.

MILITARY SITE CLOSINGS (Reuter) -- The U.S. will end or cut operations at 61 more military sites in Europe and two in South Korea in a continuing reduction of U.S. military presence overseas, the Pentagon announced. The latest reductions in Europe will result in a cut of over 6,000 American troops and 800 U.S. civilian and 2,500 local jobs.

FAMILY POLICY/CLINTON (New York/Reuter) -- Bill Clinton said the Bush Administration is out of touch and "has no family policy," citing Vice President Quayle's comments about television character Murphy Brown's new baby. Clinton, in an interview on CBS's "This Morning," suggested the Administration talks about family values but does little to support them. "This country has politicians that talk about family values but we're the only advanced nation in the world that has no family policy," Clinton said.

POLL (AP) -- Ross Perot is running neck and neck with President Bush, according to a poll, but few of those surveyed think the Texas billionaire has a good chance of winning the White House. Perot and Bush each won the support of 35 percent of those questioned in the USA Today-CNN-Gallup poll, while Bill Clinton garnered 25 percent. A month ago, the poll put Bush at 41 percent, Clinton at 26 percent and Perot at 25 percent. While today's poll showed Bush and Perot in a dead heat, only one in five of those interviewed thinks Perot has a good chance of winning the presidency and 55 percent said they know little or nothing about him.

PEROT/RON BROWN (Louisville/AP) -- DNC Chairman Brown described Ross Perot as a "little dictator" and predicted the likely candidate will have a short fuse with reporters. Brown made the remarks during a stop Thursday in Louisville, where he spoke to a group of white-collar Democrats. "I think the press is now feeling a little guilty that he has gotten a free ride," Brown said of Perot. "My own judgment is he's a little dictator." ###

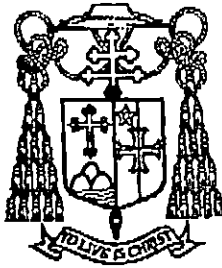

Dear Mr. President:

I have read with profound alarm the report that Haitians attempting to flee their country will be urged, at sea, to return to their homeland. This is being done, as I understand it, because the facilities at Guantanamo Bay are already being overly taxed. While the effort will be made to encourage Haitians attempting to flee to return to their homeland, it is reasonably presumed that a number will continue on their perilous voyage to Florida.

Mr. President, I understand that this is an issue made even more complex by the political conditions within Haiti, the economic blockade imposed by the Organization of American States, and the budgetary implications.

I urgently plead with you on pressing humanitarian grounds, however, to cut through the legal and political Gordian knot and make provision for persons fleeing Haiti to be received aboard U.S. vessels and brought to a processing center either in this country or in some Caribbean country. The sad memory of Jews being refused entry before World War II should teach us that never again should we turn our back on a human being pleading for our help and hospitality.


In the name of all that is decent, we cannot turn our backs on poor Haitians willing to take heroic measures in order to escape a hopeless situation which is made worse by a failure of resolve on the part of the international community.

As our government and other governments strive, and I would hope with greater effect, to help resolve the political crisis within Haiti and to harness international cooperation in the rebuilding of the economy of that land, it is imperative that we do what we are well able to do, and that is extend a welcome to children, men and women who are proving themselves willing to make a heroic effort to achieve a better life in a free society.

There is no doubt in my mind that you share my overall concern for the people of Haiti. I plead with you, Mr. President, to act resolutely and quickly to come to the assistance of those Haitians who are at risk on the sea even as this is being written. I would also urge an expansion of the in-country refugee processing in Port au Prince.

News From the Hill

HOUSE FLOOR: Fiscal 1993 budget narrowly approved.

In its closest tally of the year, the House yesterday voted 209-207 to approve the conference agreement on a \$1.5 trillion fiscal 1993 budget resolution (H Con Res 287).

Only Democrats supported the measure, which includes \$277.4 billion for defense programs and \$21.2 billion for international programs. A GOP aide said that Republicans were haunted by the thought that they would be voting for a balanced budget amendment in a few weeks and could not now vote for a budget that did nothing to move them in that direction.

The close vote forced Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., to cast a rare vote to ensure its victory. "If the resolution had failed, it would just feed into the public perception of this place that we can't get our act together to get anything done," said Budget Committee Chairman Leon E. Panetta, D-Calif.

The Senate took up the resolution last night.

Energy Bill. The House resumed work on a national energy strategy bill (HR 776), agreeing by voice vote to an amendment that would pave the way for a high-level civilian waste dump in Nevada.

The federal government has been seeking to place the dump at Yucca Mountain since the mid-1980s, but the state objects to it and has been slow to issue the permit to allow the project to proceed.

The amendment, approved by voice vote, would allow the federal government to pre-empt state regulations and move forward with plans for the dump.

Late Wednesday, the House agreed to an amendment to HR 776 that would streamline the procedures for approving construction and operation of nuclear power plants.

The amendment, approved 254-160, would institute a one-step licensing plan for utilities seeking to build and operate

nuclear power plants. Currently, utilities first have to apply to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for a construction license and then seek an operating license.

Sponsors said the provision would reduce from 14 years to six years the time it takes to bring a nuclear power plant on line.

SENATE FLOOR: Rescissions and supplemental bills pass.

The Senate cleared, 90-9, the conference report on legislation (HR 4990) that would cut, or rescind, \$8.3 billion in fiscal 1992 spending. The cuts in already-approved funding would come from a variety of programs and include the cancellation of one *Seawolf* submarine.

Earlier in the day, the House passed the compromise bill, 404-11.

Bush administration officials had requested that funding for two submarines be canceled but said yesterday that the president would accept the measure. Defense Secretary Dick Cheney told the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, "I think it's a package we can live with."

The bulk of the cuts, \$7.1 billion, would be in defense projects. In addition to funding cuts in the *Seawolf* program, money for the B-2 stealth bomber would be reduced by \$500 million and for the Strategic Defense Initiative by \$200 million.

Supplemental Funds. Senators also passed, 61-36, a \$1.9 billion fiscal 1992 supplemental appropriations bill (HR 5132) to help Los Angeles and Chicago as well as other major cities.

The legislation would be deemed an emergency spending bill, exempting it from pay-as-you-go budget rules.

Members rejected, 37-62, an amendment by Trent Lott, R-Miss., that sought to remove language in the bill that would provide \$1.45 billion for schools, summer jobs and youth programs in urban areas.

President Bush has termed "not acceptable" the \$1.45 billion urban aid

package added to the bill by Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., and Orrin G. Hatch, R-Utah.

Members rejected, 45-52, an amendment that would have required the cost of the bill to be offset from cuts elsewhere in the federal budget.

• The Senate passed, by voice vote, legislation (S 1731) that would encourage the United States to seek direct economic and commercial ties with Hong Kong after China takes control of the island in 1997.

SEC OVERSIGHT bill gains in Senate Banking; roll-ups blocked.

A bill that would give the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) greater ability to ferret out crooked investment advisers gained Senate Banking Committee approval yesterday.

But a procedural move by Phil Gramm, R-Texas, blocked action on a bill (S 1423) aimed at protecting investors in limited partnerships from being bilked as the partnerships are reorganized, or "rolled up."

The committee approved the investment advisers measure (S 2266) on a 18-2 vote. The bill aims to beef up SEC oversight of the nation's investment advisers, or financial planners. Under the bill, advisers would be charged an annual fee ranging from \$300 to \$7,000, which would be used to pay for a substantial increase in the number of SEC inspectors. Under current law, advisers pay a one-time \$150 fee when they register with the SEC.

At present, there are only 46 SEC examiners to oversee more than 17,500 firms, which means the SEC has the capacity to inspect firms about every 30 years.

The action comes in the wake of huge growth in the financial planning industry. The committee had heard testimony about abusive practices by investment advisers, especially involving the nation's elderly.

The committee adopted an amendment proposed by Gramm that deleted a section that would have required financial planners to take into account a client's financial situation and investment experience and offer advice accordingly.

The SEC supports the bill, said chief

The committee put off consideration of the roll-ups bill after Gramm resorted to a procedural move to halt further action.

ARMED AUTO theft penalties approved by House panel.

Armed "car-jacking" would be made a federal offense under legislation (HR 4542) that won the voice vote approval yesterday of the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime and Criminal Justice.

The measure is designed to discourage the practice of shipping stolen cars across state lines in order to avoid detection. Automobiles stolen with armed force that are located in the state they were stolen would continue to be covered by that state's laws.

The penalty for the new federal crime would be 15 years. In addition, the bill would raise the maximum penalty for importing or exporting stolen cars from five to 10 years.

The measure directs the secretary of Transportation to push a theft prevention plan requiring that major car parts — the frames, engines, transmissions and windows — be stamped with the vehicle's identification number.

Advance-Fee Loans. The panel also approved, by voice vote, legislation (HR 4954) that aims to protect consumers and small businesses from loan brokers who charge fees in advance for loans they never provide.

The bill would prohibit unregulated loan brokers from charging fees in advance. A violation of the law would be a felony with a maximum sentence of five years.

CIVIL RIGHTS office funds approved by House Judiciary panel.

The Civil Rights Commission would be authorized at \$7.4 million in fiscal 1993 under legislation approved yesterday by a House Judiciary panel.

The Civil and Constitutional Rights Subcommittee gave voice vote approval to the draft measure, which would authorize funds for the commission to cover an estimated 4 percent inflationary rise in operational costs and a 4.7 percent cost-of-living increase for employees.

The agency's request of \$1.9 million in emergency supplemental funding for fiscal 1992 was rejected by the Office of Management and Budget, and the bill would authorize no such supplemental funds.

The legislation would allot \$850,000 to cover the cost of relocating the commission's offices, the same amount as requested by the administration.

Republican panel member Howard Coble, N.C., said that the relocation expense appeared large and that he would like to see it cut in half.

Panel Chairman Don Edwards, D-Calif., said staffers would study whether relocation costs could be trimmed.

VETERANS' HOME refinancing costs to be reduced under bill.

A proposal to lower veterans' costs of refinancing a mortgage won voice vote approval yesterday from the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Housing and Memorial Affairs.

The changes to the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Home Loan Guaranty Program were included as an amendment to legislation that would extend eligibility for burial in a national cemetery to certain members of the armed forces reserves. That bill (HR 4368), which would extend eligibility for burial in a national cemetery to reservists who have served for 20 years or more also was endorsed by voice vote.

Offered by subcommittee Chairman Harley O. Staggers Jr., D-W.Va., the amendment would lower the fee on VA-guaranteed home loans from 1.25 percent to 0.5 percent.

Staggers said that because of the current low interest rates, many veterans are looking to refinance their loans to reduce their monthly payments, sometimes by several hundred dollars. The lower mortgage payments would also reduce the government's risk of foreclosure on the properties by making the loans more secure, he said.

By refinancing his mortgage the veteran would not be subjecting the government to any new risk because he would already have qualified for a loan, so it seems inequitable to charge him the same fee he paid the first time, Staggers said in explaining the amendment.

One drawback he said was that the Congressional Budget Office estimated that the lower rate would cost the government \$8 million a year in revenue. But Staggers said that \$5 million of the loss could be offset through a provision in legislation (S 2378) that enhanced the VA's loan asset sale authority and the remainder would be offset through anticipated savings in another bill.

CUBA SANCTIONS bill to be revisited next week.

The House Foreign Affairs Committee yesterday began but did not complete the markup of a draft bill that would toughen economic sanctions against Cuba.

The legislation would impose civil and criminal penalties on U.S. corporate subsidiaries abroad that do business with Cuba. Companies that had existing contracts with Cubans would be allowed to fulfill them.

The bill would also allow the president at his discretion to impose economic sanctions on nations that provide assistance to Cuba. An earlier version (HR 4168) of the measure mandated these sanctions and was opposed by the administration.

The committee approved, 11-10, an amendment offered by Ted Weiss, D-N.Y.,

that would allow the sale of medicine and medical supplies to the Cuban government. The bill would have permitted only donations of medical supplies to organizations not affiliated with the government.

Weiss offered another amendment that would allow the sale or donation of food and agricultural products to the Cuban government. It will be considered at the markup next week.

Opponents of the Weiss amendments — including panel Chairman Dante B. Fascell, D-Fla., and bill sponsor Robert G. Torricelli, D-N.J. — argued that the revisions would water down the bill and promised to work to defeat them when the committee reconvened.

Iléana Ros-Lehtinen, R-Fla., the only Cuban-American in Congress, told her colleagues, "If Mr. Castro was a member of this committee, I'm sure he'd be a cosponsor of the bill with these amendments."

F-22 ESSENTIAL to nation's defense posture, Cheney says.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney defended the administration's request for \$2.2 billion in fiscal 1993 to fund the F-22 Air Force fighter program, saying the combat plane will play a key role in the future defense of the nation.

But some members of the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, where Cheney was testifying, openly doubted whether a new and expensive line of fighter jets is justified.

"Why do we need to build the F-22?" asked Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz. "No one is going to out-fly or out-fight us."

Cheney said the F-22 would probably not be operational until the early part of the next decade, by which time the F-15 fighter, which the F-22 would replace, would be a 30-year-old plane.

Cheney called the F-22 an "absolute prerequisite" to the future defense of U.S. interests around the globe.

The House Armed Services Committee-approved defense authorization bill (HR 5006) would set F-22 program funding at \$2 billion in fiscal 1993.

DEFENSE CONVERSION plans detailed by Senate Democrats.

A Senate Democratic task force focusing on defense conversion programs yesterday detailed a \$1.2 billion plan for fiscal 1993 to help communities that will suffer from scheduled military base closings.

The Pentagon plans to close 34 military bases and reduce operations at nearly 50 other bases, many of which drive the economies of nearby towns.

The 21-member Senate Democratic Task Force on Defense Transition has drafted a plan that would provide funds to retrain defense industry workers, redevelop communities that will be hardest hit and assist businesses with new loans

from the Small Business Administration.

The plan also calls for a redirecting of the roughly \$70 billion annual federal research budget to focus less on defense needs and more on commercial applications of new technologies.

In addition, the plan urges a congressional review of tax incentives that might stimulate growth in communities that will suffer from the closings.

About 150 communities will be hard hit by the closings, said David Pryor, D-Ark., the task force chairman.

Pryor predicted that in the long run about 1,000 defense industry workers will lose their jobs each day through the end of 1997 as a result of the scaling back of the defense establishment.

Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, appointed the task force in March. Task force leaders said it would be unlikely that the proposals would be wrapped into a single bill but rather would be included as provisions of a number of bills this session.

OREGON SENATE race tightens, absentee ballots tallied.

The nip-and-tuck race in Oregon for the Senate Democratic nomination became even closer after all the in-person ballots were counted for candidates Rep. Les AuCoin and businessman Harry Lonsdale.

Yesterday, AuCoin held a razor-thin 39-vote lead over Lonsdale out of more than 340,000 ballots cast. AuCoin's lead narrowed as ballots from the last few precincts were counted.

If the margin of victory is less than one-fifth of 1 percent of all votes cast — about 680 votes — then a recount is automatically ordered and must be completed in 30 days.

Sen. Bob Packwood, who won the GOP primary easily and will face the Democratic nominee, expressed frustration at not knowing whether he will compete against AuCoin or Lonsdale in the fall. "We had been campaigning the past week or so on the assumption AuCoin would be the clear winner," he said. ■

Not As Scheduled

The Senate Judiciary Committee yesterday delayed for a third time the markup of legislation that would allow victims of sex crimes to sue peddlers of hard-core pornography.

The markup of the bill (S 1521), which backers say would deter rape and which opponents say would violate First Amendment rights to free speech, was postponed because the panel lacked a quorum.

The committee had not rescheduled the markup as of last night.

The national computer information service Prodigy has been conducting its own call-in "poll" of customers (one vote per password). Results from last Friday through yesterday (26,000 voters): Perot 63%, Bush 22%, Clinton 9%, Don't know 6%.

*1 OHIO: PEROT TOPS STATEWIDE POLL OF ADULTS

A poll, conducted by the University of Akron for the Akron BEACON-JOURNAL, WJW-TV and WHIO-TV, surveyed 629 adults from 5/6-16; margin of error +/- 4% (BEACON-JOURNAL, 5/22).

"WHITE BACKING PARTY, NOT CLINTON": Under that headline, Cleveland PLAIN DEALER's Marrison reports Cleveland Mayor Mike White (D), "after being wooed" by Clinton, "still would not endorse [Clinton] by name. But White did agree to co-chair a national committee of Democratic mayors 'committed to supporting the nominee of the Democratic Party.' ... White made clear he was not endorsing Clinton, the man he flayed last month for not having an urban agenda and not doing enough for blacks." White: "I have not made a determination, and he did not ask. But I am committed to supporting the nominee." At the Nat'l Conference of Black Mayors meeting in K.C. last month, White "sharply criticized Clinton as a man who 'has done nothing but hug black babies on the front of USA Today and has not addressed an agenda for black folks. And I resent it.'" Clinton and White met together for about 15 minutes yesterday. White "said later that he was pleased with the 'progress Clinton's campaign had made in addressing some of his concerns.'" White's "endorsement stalling tactic is reminiscent of one he employed" with '90 OH Gov. nominee Tony Celebrezze (D). "By the time Celebrezze got the mayor's stamp of approval, it didn't mean much" (5/22).

*2 PEROT: FILES PETITIONS IN KY AMID PARTISAN CROSSFIRE

He "brought plenty of signatures and supporters, but few specifics on issues" to Frankfort, KY, as he filed petitions to get on the Nov. ballot. Perot: "Out in grassroots America, they're not interested in issues. They're interested in principles. I'll have the positions nailed down by the time the two parties do." Only 5,000 signatures are required; supporters turned in over 40,000. Perot backers said the KY visit "was not designed to affect" the 5/26 primary; KY law does not allow write-ins to be counted. In a separate story, Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL's Al Cross suggests KY ex-Govs. Louie Nunn (R) and John Y. Brown (D) might "find themselves both" in Perot's camp. Nunn met Perot yesterday, and Brown met with Perot in TX this week. Brown atty Pat Mulloy on Perot: "They've been friends for 20 years. You draw your own conclusions" (5/22).

FROM WSJ/NBC POLL: W.S. JOURNAL's Jaroslovsky notes this week's poll (see HOTLINE 5/21) also "punctures the notion ... Perot has particularly wide appeal among non-voters that he might be able to tap into." Although Perot finished 2nd among registered voters -- Bush 35%, Perot 30%, Clinton 27% -- he falls to third among non-voters (5/22).

QUESTIONS ABOUT RUDMAN PROBE: Ex-Boston Police Commis. Joseph Jordan, who was reported to have been investigating Sen. Warren Rudman (R-NH), possibly on Perot's behalf, now denies the entire incident. Jordan: "I have not been to [NH] or any other

state making inquires about Rudman. I haven't the foggiest idea of what this is all about." Perot vehemently denied hiring Jordan (see HOTLINE 5/21), and apologized to Rudman for the entire incident. Rudman has denied interest in being Perot's VP. Perot spokesperson James Squires: "It wasn't something we did. We're amateurs, but we're not that bad" (BOSTON HERALD, 5/21).

GOP BARRAGE: WH press sec. Marlin Fitzwater, "reflecting GOP alarm" over Perot's strength, "warns that a vote for him would be supporting 'a pig in the poke and a dangerous and destructive personality.'" House Min. Leader Bob Michel (R-IL), "in what looked like an orchestrated attack," called Perot a "frightening ... demagogue," and warned of "authoritarianism." He called Perot's message "sometimes sinister and sometimes just silly" (L.A. TIMES, 5/22). Michel, on the House floor, spoke of "Perot-stroika: The American Dilemma," and to a GOP breakfast group. He told the GOPers: "Bush ... can be in big trouble with this Perot phenomenon [unless he can] lift this campaign out of the rut it has drifted into ... All I see when I turn on the TV to watch Perot volunteers is suburbanites and older Americans and younger folks and farmers -- exactly the people we thought were in our Republican camp." W. POST's Broder notes the "attack ... was the most strongly worded from a senior official of either party" (5/22). W. POST reprints excerpts from Michel's breakfast remarks (5/22).

DEM BARRAGE: DNC chair Ron Brown, also in KY to address a group of "white collar Democrats," called Perot a "little dictator." Brown said the press "is now feeling a little guilty that he has gotten a free ride" (COURIER-JOURNAL, 5/22).

HALF-COURT PRESS? BOSTON PHOENIX's Mark Jurkowitz examines media coverage of Perot. Noting the recent cover treatment by TIME and NEWSWEEK ("Wild Card"), he writes, "After all, a wild card is a pretty exciting proposition for voters convinced the deck is filled with jokers." Jurkowitz blasts early coverage of Perot, and offers a sampling of pundit opinion on Perot's staying power. He concludes that circumventing the press may be "the cornerstone of the campaign. When you run against Washington, you also run against the press corps, which is increasingly viewed as the handmaiden to the discredited establishment ... Pile that onto the public's already dim view of the press' probing into character issues, and you might have a winning formula in this angry political year" (5/22 issue).

TV: ABC's Brit Hume: "Perot insisted he had first raised the issue of family values on a TV talk show a few weeks ago. In fact, the President had been talking about family values for years and so has Quayle, a man for whom Perot showed minimum regard when asked today what kind of person he would choose as running mate." Perot: "This will not be an empty suit that was picked for political reasons, that plays golf, goes to funerals and has to be programmed before you let him out of the cage." Hume: "With comments like, that nobody's likely to accuse Perot of being programmed. Never mind that part of what he said was at least arguably untrue and the rest of it made for the very kind of soundbite he claims to hate" (5/21).

TINSELTOWN TALK: CBS' Cinnny Kennard reports CA Perot volunteers have an ad in a film-industry publication. Cinnard over video of Warren Beatty and Steve Martin: "Campaign sources say some pretty high-voltage stars have already called Dallas expressing interest and asking information" (5/21).

MORE: Header over MIAMI HERALD financial editor James Russell: "Perot's '71 Wall Street tour was a flop" (5/21).

Columnist Chris Matthews debunks the Perot-as-John Anderson mentality among pundits (W. TIMES, 5/22). W. POST and N.Y. TIMES both examine Perot supporters in CA, where the 5/21 L.A. TIMES poll (see HOTLINE 5/21) had Perot leading with 39% (5/22).

PUBLISHER'S NOTE: W. TIMES' Major Garrett reports, in the event of the election going to the House, "each state delegation casts one vote." That is correct. However, Garrett continues: "That vote goes to the candidate supported by the majority of the delegation." That is not necessarily the case; there are no standing rules to that effect (5/22).

THIS MORNING: Perot was interviewed by ABC's Mike Schneider from his Dallas office. On the question of specifics: "I'm like a carpenter, there's an old saying among carpenters, measure it twice and cut it once. In Washington, they don't even bother to measure -- they just hack away." On the deficit: "I'll make you a bargain. You give me an hour, and I'll discuss it with you." On Marlin Fitzwater calling him a "monster": "Compare the inconsistency of what the president has said about me publicly over the years. Are you sure he didn't say 'cookie monster?' ... Maybe they're going through their Willie Horton phase, I don't know ... Just because an undeclared candidate is doing well in the polls, the president's spokesman declared me a monster." On remarks by Michel: "Now Congressman Michel's a good guy, he's sent me Christmas cards for years. ... Makes me wonder if I'll get one this year" ("GMA," ABC, 5/22).

*3 PEROT: A LOOK AT A DOZEN STRATEGIES EMERGING

ONE: Denounce soundbite politics, and play it to the hilt. EXAMPLE: Reaction to Quayle on Murphy Brown -- "Goofy" (ABC, 5/21).

TWO: Take 60 days off to study the issues, and still be everywhere. EXAMPLE: Yesterday in KY -- and on CNN, ABC, CBS (5/21) -- and this a.m. on "Good Morning America" (ABC, 5/22).

THREE: Provide no press plane and no press releases, but dominate the press anyway. COMMENT: "It will never ever work, all the party pros feel. 'We'll see,' says Perot, 'it will be a different kind of deal'" (Charles Osgood, CBS Radio, 5/22).

FOUR: Count on insiders to reinforce his outsider appeal. IS IT WORKING? House Min. Leader Michel called him a "demagogue" (mult., 5/22), Fitzwater wondered when people would ask "what kind of monster are we buying here?" (Raum, AP/PHILA. INQUIRER, 5/22), and a senior Clinton official labeled him "kind of a fraud" (L.A. TIMES, 5/22). Perot cited the first two on "GMA" this morning (ABC, 5/22).

FIVE: Make knowing nothing a virtue. DOONESBURY: "Perot has stigmatized positions as something that POLITICIANS have! Up until now, he's been able to market his ignorance as political purity." "So standing for something could queer his popularity?" "Right. Of course, Perot's a risk-taker" (mult., 5/22). CA fan: "How many politicians do you know who would say, 'I don't know?'" (Baer, Balto. SUN, 5/22).

SIX: Count on the press being as thin-skinned as they think he is. IS IT WORKING? See Brit Hume's angry tone when commenting on Perot's comments on family values yesterday: "Never mind that part of what he said was at least arguably untrue ..." (ABC, 5/21). Columnist Chris Matthews: "He makes NBC and ABC look like the Crips and Bloods of the political world. Guess who the voters are rooting for?" (W. TIMES, 5/22).

SEVEN: Be aloof enough to be outsider and reach out enough not to be oddball. EXAMPLE: His repeated comments that he will

appoint a bipartisan cabinet. EXAMPLE: His recent meetings with ex-KY Govs. Louis Nunn (R) and John Y. Brown (D) (Cross, Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL, 5/22).

EIGHT: Stay bland enough to unite the disaffected and crisp enough to keep them interested. SEE: Dan Balz study of his CA support (W. POST, 5/22). NOTE: Pollster Dick Bennett has told The HOTLINE that in his focus groups across the country, people uniformly dismiss the concern that he has no answers -- that they are convinced "he'll try" which seems enough.

NINE: Undermine traditional electoral vote strategies of the two parties. IS IT WORKING? GOP strategist Ed Rollins warns, "Ross Perot is the perfect candidate for [CA] ... [and] no matter who wants to get bravado and say we can win without California, I would hate to try it." Dem strategist Brian Lunde, intentionally "setting off the alarm bells" in his party, recommended Clinton introduce legislation, pick a VP and name a cabinet quickly before he gets marginalized (Garrett, W. TIMES, 5/22).

TEN: Bemoan the woes of big money PAC politics, but be ready to outspend anyone in history. NOTE: In a 3-way race, almost all states may be competitive and the spending limits on the two parties may prove a significant disadvantage.

ELEVEN: Use his money as much to prove his independence as to win votes. NOTE: While some bemoan the prospects of his "buying" votes (e.g., see Benjamin Chavis, Washington AFRO-AMERICAN, 5/23; USA TODAY which quotes AZ professor Marilyn Dantico saying, "Deep down the American people don't trust the really wealthy," 5/22), he's gotten the lead mostly via free coverage.

TWELVE: Count on the others "just not getting it." IS IT WORKING? WH Chief of Staff Skinner on L.A. TIMES poll showing Perot with a commanding CA lead over both parties: "Jesus, what do you make of that?" (L.A. TIMES, 5/22).

*4 CLINTON: FAMILY MAKES THE MORNING ROUNDS

Clinton appeared on two morning TV talks -- NBC's "Today" and "CBS This Morning." On "Today," he addressed the Perot phenomenon: "Voters dislike both parties, they believe that they've been let down by both parties. They're so desperate for real change they will go to someone who sounds good and says he's an outsider even before the person has a program." Clinton said his own "task to show people that I have actually been trying to change this party, and both parties, and create both an opportunity and a responsibility for Americans to change this country." On Perot being a "serious threat": "Absolutely." On Perot's claim that voters don't care about policy, only principles: "Making change means making decisions. Leadership means making tough decisions on competing claims. You can't please all the people all the time ... Ross Perot and I were born 35 miles away from each other. Maybe it's something in the water, but I agree with most of what he says" (5/22). On CBS, Clinton was asked about the family values debate: "That's how we learn the difference between right and wrong ... There are things in [TV] that are not supportive of family values. I happen to think crass commercialism and violence are a bigger problem than 'Murphy Brown.'" On grading Bush's domestic policy: "F -- Kemp has some interesting ideas ... [he has] sought to go beyond the labels of Democrat and Republican and find a third way and create opportunity and insist on responsibility." On the most important criterion for VP: "Someone who would make a good president ...

someone who really understands what's happening to this country" ("CBS This Morning," 5/22).

HILLARY: She appeared on "Good Mornign America." On the lastest polls: "What is important, this year, is that my husband continues with his message, both about hope and opportunity." Her reaction to Quayle's comment: "It was a silly thing to say and it's not really on target ... but on the other hand, it may give us a chance to talk about issues that are important to the American people" (ABC, 5/22).

PEROT FACTOR: W. POST's Kurtz writes Clinton "has all but vanished from the media map" and been "eclipsed" by Perot. TIME magazine political reporter Walter Shapiro: "What we have is ... three to four months of dead air. ... Clinton is a static story. Very little is going to happen between now and the moment he names his [VP]. ... He is going through the motions." ABC political dir. Hal Bruno said Clinton's coverage is "perfectly normal": "There has never been anything like the Perot thing before, not in our lifetimes." Bush "remains in the spotlight" because a Large contingent of WH reporters travel with him. Clinton's traveling press corps. has "dwindled to a nucleus" of 15. Center for Media and Public Affairs reports 20 Bush stories on network nightly news in the last 12 days, 13 for Perot and 11 for Clinton (5/22).

VEEP TALK: Tsongas on whether he would be Clinton's VP if asked: "No, I'm just not a good vice presidential kind of candidate. I would find it very difficult. ... I would pick Bill Bradley" ("Crossfire," CNN, 5/21).

STAFF ADDITION: The Clinton campaign announced that Avis LaVelle, press secretary to Chicago Mayor Rich Daley since his election in '89, will assume the management of press operations in the Little Rock HQ (Clinton release, 5/21).

*5 BUSH: TAKES OFFENSE ON IRAQ-GATE ACCUSATIONS

The admin. "delivered the first formal defense of its policy of providing assistance to Iraq before the invasion of Kuwait, maintaining that it was the best option for dealing with a difficult Mideast situation." It was a "clear reflection of the increasing heat the White House and State Department are feeling" on the issue. During a congressional cmte hearing, Dep. Sec/State Lawrence Eagleburger "defended the decision to provide Baghdad" with \$1B in loan guarantees "despite warnings that Iraq had diverted funds to buy arms and nuclear weapons technology." Eagleburger insisted the allegations "amounted to speculation and have never been [proven]." The daylong cmte hearing "was sharply partisan." Cmte Chair Henry Gonzalez (D-TX) launched the sharpest criticism: "Saddam Hussein is President Bush's Frankenstein -- a run-of-the-mill dictator the President fed with billions of U.S. taxpayer dollars and turned into a monster" (Frantz/Waas, L.A. TIMES, 5/22). Eagleburger accused Gonzalez of "distorting the record and threatening the deliberative process of government by selectively disclosing classified documents." Eagleburger and others testified in carefully worded statements that there is no evidence thus far that any American official broke the law in executing the loan guarantee." But even Eagleburger "found it difficult to defend the policy." During a break, Eagleburger put his hand over the microphone and said to Rep. Jim Leach (R-IA): "I'm here to defend the policy. ... When you've got a policy that didn't work, it's not easy to defend" (Sciolino, N.Y. TIMES, 5/22).

TV: NBC's Andrea Mitchell: "Congressional Democrats say

the administration's desire for secrecy is really an attempt to hide an embarrassing policy failure that could become a campaign issue" (5/21). ABC's Peter Jennings: "The Democrats now say that some of the help intended for the Iraqi people may have ended up supporting the Iraqi military with the administration's knowledge" (5/21). NBC's John Chancellor: "Saddam may become an issue in this American presidential election. You can wonder what he thinks about that, but you can be sure of something he's learned in the last 20 years: When it comes to relations with Iraq, American policy can turn on a dime" (5/21).

IRAN-CONTRA CLEAN UP: A federal grand jury yesterday indicted ex-CIA dep. dir. Clair George on "two obstruction counts to replace similar charges dismissed earlier this week" (AP/W. POST, 5/22). Evans & Novak write, ex-Sec/Defense Caspar Weinberger "is not home-free even though the most recent Iran-Contra jury went out of existence last weekend. Another grand jury could indict him at any time. That threat may be used to try to get Weinberger to finger President Reagan," though Weinberger intimates say that is out of the question. "That suggests a sour ending" for Indep. Counsel Lawrence Walsh's "operation, which has produced precious little for its \$30 million-plus cost" (N.Y. POST/W. POST, 5/22).

ABORTION FIGHT: CA Gov. Pete Wilson (R) "has privately assured the Bush re-election campaign that his state's huge delegation will not make abortion an issue on the floor of the [GOP] National Convention this summer." While pro-choice GOPers announced 5/21 "plans to assault the GOP's anti-abortion plank" at hearings 5/26 in Salt Lake City, "their chances for success have been weakened by Wilson's decision to accede to Bush's desire to avoid an embarrassing, televised floor fight." Conservatives had "feared" that CA's GOP delegation, with Wilson as its chair, "would be a pro-choice force" at the convention (Trounstine, SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS, 5/22).

*6 BUCHANAN: TALKS UP CAMPAIGN'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Buchanan to about 150 supporters in San Mateo, CA: "We certainly created and gave shape and voice to a protest movement in the [GOP], of people who believe in principles, who do believe we ought to keep our promises, who believe our party ought to stand for something." With no money left for TV ads, the campaign will air new radio ads beginning next week. The focus will be two issues: illegal immigration and support for jobs over endangered species. "By hammering Bush earlier in the primary season, Buchanan believes he succeeded in getting [Bush] to admit his 1990 decision to allow a tax increase was a mistake and to fire the head of the [NEA.]" Early predictions that [CA] was fertile territory for Buchanan's strategy ... have not turned into reality." Pollster Mark DiCamillo said his hard conservative focus "didn't have the makings of a potential victory" (Witt, SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS, 5/22).

*8 FAMILY FEUD: FROM MURPHY'S HOME TO YOUR HOME

L.A. TIMES' Ron Brownstein writes, "The 1992 presidential campaign is threatening to become a family feud -- or at least a feud over family." Bush, Quayle and Clinton all spoke on the matter yesterday and agreed on the problem. "But they decisively part company on two key questions: what has caused these trends and what, if anything, government can do to reverse them." The debate illustrates that "cultural divisions generate more explosive emotions than any other issue in politics" (5/22).

QUAYLE: "Retreating not one inch from the latest controversy in which he has landed," VP Dan Quayle said "that 'the media elite and Hollywood' may be upset over his criticism of the television show 'Murphy Brown,' 'but the American people support what I'm talking about": "I'm talking about family. I'm talking about integrity. I'm talking about opportunity. I'm talking about personal responsibility." Quayle spokesperson David Beckwith: "We're having a lot of fun with this. Every once in a while, something you try goes off beyond your wildest dreams. This is wonderful. It's a debate that's good for the country and it's good for us" (Gerstenzang, L.A. TIMES, 5/22). N.Y. TIMES' Andrew Rosenthal writes GOP strategists said Quayle's speech "was intended as political shock therapy for a [WH] political team that many Republicans," including some close to Quayle, "believe to be asleep at the wheel." According to them, Quayle wanted to demonstrate that it is possible to seize control of an important issue, rather than to continue to drift while Ross Perot gains in the polls" (5/22). W. POST's Yang writes on how Quayle's '88 debut affects how his themes are received: "While many Americans may agree with the message, they still have doubts about the messenger" (5/22). CBS' Richard Threlkeld: "The 'Murphy Brown' matter has offered Democrats a chance to lambaste the Republicans. What's more, in perusing the 'Ozzie and Harriet' vote, the White House may have just run afoul of modern times." NEW YORK magazine's Joe Klein: "The traditional families in this country are now a minority, and so when Dan Quayle or George Bush or even Barbara Bush emphasizes the need for traditional family values, they may run the risk of seeming out of touch" (5/21).

CLINTON: NEWSDAY's Clifford & Sirica write Clinton cut in on Quayle's "political dance" with "Murphy Brown" (5/22). Delivering what his aides called a "major address on family issues" at the City Club in Cleveland, Clinton, "deriding both Republican inaction and his own party's addiction to big-government programs, proposed 'a third way' to strengthen U.S. families by increasing opportunity while also demanding more personal responsibility." Clinton blasted Quayle's comments as "cynical election-year politics," designed to "to divert attention from the administration's responsibility for facing family problems" (Harwood/McQueen, W.S. JOURNAL, 5/22). Clinton: "'Family values' can't simply be Washington code for Beltway Republicans who really mean 'You're on your own' -- or Beltway Democrats who want to spend more of your tax money on programs that don't embody your values." W. POST's Schwartz reports Clinton's view of the Bush admin. "was all talk and no action." Clinton: "We risk diminishing the bully pulpit to a pulpit of bull" (5/22). USA TODAY's Nagourney writes Clinton sounded "almost like an independent" (5/22). Clinton offered his

prescription for families: "providing training and child care for welfare recipients so they can find work a family-leave law that will guarantee women their jobs back after child-birth; cracking down on 'deadbeat dads'; full-funding of Head Start, and increased sex education in schools" (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 5/22). N.Y. TIMES' Ifill calls the speech a "distillation of weeks of speeches and comments he has made since the [L.A.] riots about the declines of cities and families" (5/22). L.A. TIMES' Brownstein writes, "As he tries to define what he calls a 'third way' in social policy, Clinton is walking a narrow line" between trying to "distinguish himself" from liberal views and conveying a "greater commitment to government action" than Bush (5/22).

BUSH: Also speaking in Cleveland, Bush addressed family issues in the context of his six-point urban plan: "I know there are those who are deprived, who are born into almost helpless situations, but there are all kinds of ways we can help" (L.A. TIMES, 5/22). Bush also cited his "Point of Light" program (NEWSDAY, 5/22). W.S. JOURNAL's Paul Gigot writes WH "reaction to the Murphy Brown flap should gladden Democratic hearts. Handwringing turned the story from a debate over 'values' into another example of Bush diffidence" (5/22). ABC's Brit Hume: "Campaigning in Ohio today, the President didn't exactly ignore the Murphy Brown/Dan Quayle flap, but he didn't say much about it either. ... White House aides meanwhile, were insisting that their own and the President's refusal to join in Quayle's criticism of the popular "Murphy Brown" show was not an effort to undercut the Vice President" (5/21).

PEROT: "Only in America would somebody who's an incumbent keep reacting to that. So, it must have been a very slow day in Washington. I just thought it was goofy" (N.Y. POST, 5/22). This morning on "Good Morning America": "Let's take reality. Candice Bergen is married. Candice Bergen just had a baby. Now, she is on a fictional TV series where an unwed mother had a baby. Now, when you have the problems our country has, to spend time talking about a television series, I guess, shows how far we've really slipped" (ABC, 5/22).

JACKSON: He challenged Quayle to a debate on his CNN show "Both Sides with Jesse Jackson," or "Nightline" (Rainbow release, 5/21). Jackson: "No exam-cheating, pot-smoking, draft-dodging, privileged youth [VP] in a 'Bush the Blamer' administration can speak with moral authority about abandoned moral values and assuming personal responsibility" (Balto. SUN, 5/22).

BROWN (JERRY): "I wish personal responsibility would start in the White House. Why doesn't he (Quayle) prove what he is saying by giving Michael Kojima's money back?" Kojima, who gave \$400,000 to attend a GOP dinner with President Bush, has been targeted as a "deadbeat dad" (L.A. TIMES, 5/22).

BROWN (MURPHY, AKA CANDICE BERGEN): "I don't know what it cost to bring me into the world, but my father paid \$35 to have my brother Charlie McCarthy carved" (N.Y. POST, 5/22).

EDITORIALS: N.Y. POST header: "Dan Quayle was right" (5/22). CHICAGO TRIBUNE: "Quayle's message amounts to more than the insensitive rhetoric of a political mission undertaken two weeks before the [CA] primary and not long after Rodney King found it necessary to utter his poignant question, 'Can we all get along?'" (5/21). L.A. TIMES: "Quayle is right in attacking a poverty of values in the nation. His key error is fixating on the erosion of moral values in the inner city, as if morality has remained constant elsewhere" (5/21). W. TIMES: "In all of this, it needs to be noted that Mr. Quayle does have a point" (5/22).

For comparison purposes, W. POST urges a look at the DoJ's new report on the "personal irresponsibility and lawlessness" of the S&L industry (5/22). Monroe [LA] NEWS-STAR gives Quayle a "thumbs up" (5/21). BOSTON GLOBE: "Dan Quayle should stick to golf" (5/21). USA TODAY: "TV isn't the great Satan in the rise of poor, female-headed households in inner cities. Nor is the loss of moral character Quayle loudly bemoaned. Economics is" (5/22). ROANOKE TIMES & WORLD-NEWS calls Quayle "a somewhat ironic mouthpiece for bootstrap rhetoric" (5/22).

HAVIN' A FIELD DAY: ABC's "PrimeTime Live" covered the response of humorists -- late-night TV comedians and cartoonists -- to Quayle's comments (5/21). Johnny Carson, last night: "Any Brown supporters here? I'm talking Murphy Brown. Let's go to the news and see if Dan Quayle has condemned the lifestyle of Erkel on "Family Matters." Do you get the feeling that Dan Quayle's golf bag does not have a full set of irons. ... Today, he demanded that Murphy put the baby up for adoption and let the Cosby's raise it. Now he has a beef with "Hee Haw." He claims that when Minnie Pearl wears that price-tag on her hat, it promotes prostitution" ("Tonight," NBC, 5/21). Balto. SUN cartoonist KAL depicts a pumped-up Arnold Schwarzenegger as the "Terminator" wearing Bush-Quayle buttons, holding guns called "Killer," "Super Killer," and "Blood Blaster," and asking, "Vere is thees Moofry Brown" (5/22). RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH's Brookins shows Quayle at a press conference with a voice from the wings shouting, "Oh sure!! ... Like you're the arbiter of TV morality! Well, let's see you get out of this as well as you got out of the draft, buster!" Quayle: "Ok, who let Murphy Brown in here?!" (5/22). L.A. TIMES' Conrad shows Candice Bergen, with a screaming baby Quayle on her lap: "I suppose it's too late for an abortion" (5/21). Robin Williams, on the "Tonight Show," called Quayle "one taco short of a combination plate" (NBC, 5/21). David Letterman: "Earlier in the day the White House held a press conference, President Bush made the following announcement: 'Vice President, Dan Quayle had his TV privileges suspended till after the election.'" Letterman's "Top Ten List" was "Things Dan Quayle Does Like About TV," including: "'Letterman' show provides positive role model for Indiana dimwits" ("Late Night," 5/22). For full list, see #25.

*9 ALASKA: DEADBEAT DAD FEEDING FROM THE PIPELINE

Sen. Frank Murkowski's (R) office "weeks before anyone" in there remembers Michael Kojima, sent a letter to the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo "introducing [Kojima] as someone interested in the construction of a Hong Kong airport." Kojima gained notoriety when he paid \$400,00 to sit with President Bush at a GOP dinner, despite various suits filed against him. The letter, dated 9/17/91, "urged embassy officials to be helpful to Kojima. ... He used the letter ... to gain access to U.S. diplomats in Tokyo." The diplomats were to "arrange meetings" with Japanese bankers "to line up money" for the project. It was after this letter was sent that Murkowski received the \$3K contribution from Kojima and his third wife Chiey (see HOTLINE 5/20). Murkowski press aide Chuck Kleeschulte "insisted" nothing "inappropriate or improper occurred." Kleeschulte on the letter: "It is a normal constituent service. ... Anyone can get this kind of [letter]." An embassy spokesperson "confirmed that such letters of introduction from members of Congress are not unusual." Kleeschulte added the Murkowski office "may never be able to precisely describe the sequence of events, such as when a staff member first met Kojima" (Whitney, ANCHORAGE DAILY NEWS, 5/21).

*10 ARKANSAS: BUMPERS "SOLID FAVORITE" FOR RE-ELECTION

An ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE poll, conducted 5/18-19 by Mason-Dixon Political/Media Research, surveyed 826 likely voters; margin of error +/- 3.5%. Subsamples: 469 Dem LVs +/- 4.5%; 189 GOP LVs +/- 7.3% (5/22). Candidates: Sen. Dale Bumpers (D), State Auditor Julia Hughes Jones (D), Baptist minister Mike Huckabee (R), physician David Busby (R).

*11 OHIO: DEWINE USES PRIMARY TO LAUNCH TV ADS AGAINST GLENN

LG Mike DeWine (R) hit the airwaves with a 30-second ad portraying him as "'a fighter for Ohio families' and someone who can make changes in Washington" (Curtin, COLUMBUS DISPATCH). Partial text: "Wouldn't it be great to have a fighter for Ohio families. Not a Washington insider who's been there too long? His agenda: Change welfare. Change the criminal law system. Change Congress. ... It's Mike DeWine for a change." The ad "sets the stage for DeWine's major attack theme" against Sen. John Glenn (D) -- that he has been in D.C. too long and has not supported "substantively" changing Congress. DeWine manager Curt Steiner: "John Glenn is a Washington insider ... he is the embodiment of the problem in Washington. ... DeWine is articulating a program for change." Glenn spokesperson Dale Butland: "Mike DeWine claiming to be an outsider is like Tammy Faye Baker claiming to have the natural look" (5/21). Steiner also said the ad is "not in response" to DeWine's primary foe, George Rhodes: "We would be on the air with or without Rhodes." Rhodes: "[DeWine] should give up all those commercials, give the money to charity and compete with me on a fair basis." Steiner said the \$150K buy will run through the 6/2 primary (Adams, Akron BEACON-JOURNAL, 5/21).

*12 OREGON: WE'LL BE WAITING FOR A LONG, LONG TIME

The Dem primary race between Rep. Les AuCoin (D-01) and businessman Harry Lonsdale (D) felt "as tight ... as a double-overtime Trail Blazers game" as AuCoin held on to a 288-vote lead: 149,547 to 149,259. AuCoin, who started the day up 207 votes, "failed to increase his lead much despite the fact that elections officials in the Portland area -- where AuCoin ran stronger than Lonsdale" -- counted the "bulk" of absentee ballots. As a result, aides to both camps "said they expected an automatic recount," possibly delaying the outcome of the election until 6/8. Both AuCoin and Lonsdale stayed out of the spotlight as their staffs "scrambled to get the latest vote totals from 36 counties to figure out if there were any trends." Lonsdale manager Cynthia Wieland: "We held our own. ... It certainly looks like it will be within recount range." AuCoin spokesperson Rick Gureghian agreed, but said if the current margin held, "we'll be able to withstand a recount." Counties are required to finish counting absentees today. "But that may not end the suspense." Some still have to "scrutinize challenged ballots cast by people who may not have been properly registered." By 6/8, the counties must submit their official returns to the Sec/State. The Sec/State would then order an automatic recount if the margin of victory is less than 1/5 of 1% -- or around 600 votes, given the present numbers. The losing candidate can also request a recount if willing to pay (Jeff Mapes, Portland OREGONIAN, 5/22).

*13 WASHINGTON: ELECTION A LA CARTE, NO RICE

Saying the "choice boiled down to showing in Seattle what can be done for cities, or talking in the Senate about them," Seattle Mayor Norm Rice (D) announced at a fund-raiser he would not seek the seat of retiring Sen. Brock Adams (D): "I didn't run for [Mayor] as a platform for higher office. I ran for mayor as a platform to make a difference for the people of Seattle." But Rice hinted he "might be back" in the Senate picture in '94, when Sen. Slade Gorton (R) is up for re-election: "To all my friends who will be disappointed because I am not seeking this office -- be patient. Be patient." Rice said he was not "scared off by the prospect of an uphill campaign." Seattle Dep. Mayor Bob Watt "acknowledged" Rice was "intrigued" by the opportunity to run for a "rare" open seat: "The part of him that's a value-driven elected official said no. But it was intriguing." Rice said "he wasn't ready to endorse another a candidate" but state Sen. Patty Murray (D) was invited to the fund-raiser by Rice's staff. Ex-Rep. Don Bonker (D) was not there (Boren/Merritt, SEATTLE POST-INTELLIGENCER, 5/21). GOPers: Rep. Rod Chandler (R-08), state Sen. Leo Thorsness, King Co. Exec. Tim Hill

*14 HOUSE RACE BRIEFINGS

The following updates key CDs holding primaries 5/26.

AR 01: Rep. Bill Alexander (D-01) is one of two incumbent Dems who risk being upset in the 5/26 primary. Though he has faced close races in the past, this year could end differently. His challenger, a former aide, Blanche Lambert (D), has used the House bank scandal against him. Alexander was among the 22 worst abusers with 487 overdrafts. She has also criticized his practice of paying himself for daily expenses out of his campaign fund; Alexander's payments often run between \$50 to \$100 a day (HOTLINE sources, 5/22). "Underfinanced, outorganized, Ms. Lambert is betting that [voter] disenchantment will give her an upset victory." But for all AR voters' "discomfort" with Alexander's ways, voters say they are held by "a sense of obligation" for the numerous federal projects he has delivered (Rogers, W.S. JOURNAL, 5/22). Alexander finished in March with only \$15,000 cash on hand after spending \$316,000 in the previous 15 months. Lambert had raised more than \$32,000, with \$20,000 in cash remaining (Curran, ROLL CALL, 5/21). The winner faces Cleburne Co. GOP chair Terry Hayes (R) in the general.

AR 03: Ex-chancery Judge John VanWinkle (D) expects to be in a runoff after the Dem primary, though not certain who his opponent will be. A runoff would be held 6/9 if no one gets more than 50% of the vote. Observers see VanWinkle and businessman Don Nelms (D) as the front-runners. Others vying to replace retiring Rep. John Paul Hammerschmidt (R-03): Dr. Bill Harrison (D), '90 Hammerschmidt challenger Dan Ivy (D). VanWinkle is backed by the Sierra Club's AR chapter and shares the AFL-CIO endorsement with Ivy (ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 5/20). GOP: Investment banker Dryden Pence (R), who is trailing in fund-raising among GOPers, has criticized state Rep. Dick Barclay (R) for accepting PAC money and '88 Senate candidate/state Rep. Tim Hutchinson (R) for having access to a confidential GOP contribution list. Hutchinson's brother, Asa, is the AR GOP co-chair. Pence has raised about \$55,000, donating \$63K of his own money. Hutchinson and Barclay are considered the front-runners. A runoff is possible. Others: David Duke '88 pres. campaign manager Ralph Forbes (I) (ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 5/20).

AR 04: The 4th CD race has been AR's most negative with Sec. State Bill McCuen (D) attacking Rep. Beryl Anthony (D-04) for his 109 House bank overdrafts totalling \$57,000 and for voting in favor of a \$35,000 congressional pay raise. Anthony, in turn, has attacked McCuen for a '90 tax-payer funded trip out west that included a stop over in Las Vegas and for living in free quarters at the AR capitol. McCuen is backed by Labor, the AR Educ. Assn and the NRA, which has funded radio/newspaper ads and direct mail to its membership attacking Anthony for pay raises and junkets. Some suggest such negative campaigning will prompt voters to turn to businessman Pat Pappas (D), who has run a low key campaign. Pappas is not likely to have enough support to win, but could draw enough of the vote to force a runoff (HOTLINE SOURCES, 5/20). ROLL CALL reports the McCuen campaign "admits it is probably peaking at the right time for Tuesday's primary, and may not have as much momentum in a runoff" (Curran, 5/21). GOP: Atty Jay Dickey faces no primary opposition.

ID 01: Rep. Larry LaRocco (D-01) has no primary opposition.

LaRocco has raised \$90,000 since January, \$60,000 of which came from PACs. GOP challengers: '90 gov. candidate/state Sen. Rachel Gilbert (R), businessman David Doremus (R). Gilbert's high name recognition has helped her take the lead. She has attacked Doremus for his part-time residence in CA and for wanting to sell ID water to CA. Doremus has attacked Gilbert for voting in favor of tax increases. Gilbert is backed by Sen. Larry Craig (R) (HOTLINE sources, 5/22).

ID 02: State Sen. pres. Mike Crapo (R) is the GOP front-runner against Ada Co. Commis. Gary Glenn (R), who observers say peaked a month ago and has been declining ever since. Glenn has attacked Crapo for voting against a drunk driving bill, though Crapo voted in favor of a better version the next session. IDAHO FALLS POST REGISTER has endorsed Crapo. The two met in a League of Women Voters debate last night. DEMS: State Auditor J.D. Williams (D) has the "upper hand" in the contest against Ketchum Mayor Jerry Seiffert (D). Williams, also endorsed by the POST REGISTER, enjoys high name recognition (HOTLINE sources, 5/22).

KY 01: The real question is not whether Rep. Carroll Hubbard (D-01) will be defeated, but rather will he get over 50% of vote? Hubbard, hurt by the House bank scandal, but does not face a tough challenge. Opponents: '86 challenger Tom Barlow (D), Charles Banken (D), the '72 and '74 GOP nominee before changing parties. Though Hubbard had only 31 overdrafts, voters are turned off by his by the fact that he didn't admit to it from the start. His votes against low cost banking for senior citizens as a member of the House Banking Cmte have also hurt him. In recent days, Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL has profiled his record and criticized his handling of the S&L crisis. GOP: Book salesman/minister Steve Hammrick (R) faces an uphill challenge in KY's most heavily Dem CD (HOTLINE sources, 5/22).

KY 03: Rep. Romano Mazzoli (D-03) is a "virtual shoo-in" for the Dem nomination against teacher Ron Greene (D). GOPers: Ex-Rolling Fields Mayor/state Rep. Susan Stokes (R), computer software engineer Larry West (R), who is backed by KY Right to Life Assoc., inventor Richard Lewis (R) and perennial candidate Tommy Klien (R). Many GOPers believe the abortion issue could help Stokes who is pro-choice -- abortion is the only issue that separates Stokes from her primary foes, who oppose abortion (HOTLINE sources, 5/22). Louisville COURIER-JOURNAL's Al Cross notes, "Stokes, however, could run into trouble if the abortion issue pulls a large number of Republican conservatives to the polls [5/26] to vote against her." Mazzoli is an "outspoken" abortion foe. Voter turnout is expected to be light (5/20).

KY 05: Rep. Hal Rogers (R-05) is unopposed in the GOP primary. DEMS: Carol Brown Hubbard (D) has played on the House bank scandal, alluding to the overdrafts of retiring Rep. Chris Perkins (D-07) and those of her husband, Rep. Carroll Hubbard (D-01). Though she is trying to distance herself from Rep. Hubbard's troubles, some think the strategy could backfire on her. Hubbard considers atty Bobby Rowe her major challenge. Rowe is the only candidate that has run a full scale campaign with professional consultants and ads, news conferences and good organization. Others: state Sen. John Doug Hayes (D), Atty Ned Pillersdorf (D), insurance agent Steven Maynard (D), ex-5th CD Dem chair N.P. Bingham (D), '90 Perkins challenger/Vietnam vet Jerry Cecil (D) (HOTLINE sources, 5/22).

KY 06: Lexington Mayor/'91 gov. candidate Scotty Baesler is a "shoo-in." The Cmte To End the Permanent Congress has endorsed UPS driver Roy Tudor, Baesler's most active challenger. Others:

student/activist Chris Bush and Harvey Carroll Jr. Lexington councilor Chuck Ellinger (R) is unopposed in GOP primary (HOTLINE sources, 5/22).

*15 REDISTRICTING: LOUISIANA NEARS CONCLUSION

LA (-1): N.O. TIMES-PICAYUNE's Jack Wardlaw reports the "legislative struggle" to redraw LA's CDs "could be over soon, with the House approving a compromise plan ... that creates a second black-majority district." With 61-42 House approval, the plan now moves to the full Senate for final approval. State Rep. Sherman Copelin (D), who handled the bill, "said he expects the Senate to go along" and send it to Gov. Edwin Edwards (D). The Copelin bill passed the Senate in a different form, but sponsor state Sen. Dennis Bagneris pledged to support the compromise. State Rep. John Guidry (D): "We've got the brothers and the Repubs on board. If we can get the Bubbas to go along, then everybody's happy." The plan maintains Rep. Wm Jefferson's (D-02) black-majority New Orleans CD and creates a new one that stretches from Baton Rouge into No. LA. Also maintaining relatively unchanged CDs are Reps. Billy Tauzin (D-03), Jimmy Hayes (D-07) and Bob Livingston (R-01). Reps. Richard Baker (R-06) and Clyde Holloway (R-08) would be placed in the same central LA district, while Reps. Jim McCrery (R-04) and Jerry Huckaby (D-05) would face off in a new Northern CD (5/20).

===== GOVERNORS '92 =====

*16 MISSOURI: ALL ROADS LEAD TO SPAIN

A \$25,000 contribution to St. Louis Mayor Vince Schoemehl's (D) campaign has been traced to Jose Boveda of Spain, who said he did not understand the money was intended for a political candidate. Boveda claims to be the sole owner of Tippins Development Ltd. of London, the firm to which the contribution was originally traced. Boveda made the contribution "as a personal favor" to a business partner, who said "he persuaded Boveda to donate the money because Boveda owed him a favor and they are both in the metals recycling industry business, an industry that Schoemehl is proposing to develop if he is elected." Boveda: "I was told to do it, and I did it. If it was for good ends, I don't mind." Schoemehl described Boveda's partner, John Suarez, as "a friend and supporter and said that their wives also know each other socially." Suarez: "Schoemehl asked me to raise some money for his campaign. I asked, 'Could I get it from Europe?' He said he checked with somebody and said it was alright." Schoemehl: "I receive contributions that other people raise for me all the time. I can't possibly know the interrelations of all the people involved in that. I don't know Boveda; I never met him." Suarez has donated to Schoemehl's campaigns since '85 (O'Neil, ST. LOUIS POST DISPATCH, 5/21).

MONEY TRAIL: The money trail is "significant" because FEC law prohibits foreign corporations or nationals to U.S. candidates. MO law has no such provision but the FEC said federal restrictions cover state and local campaigns. Schoemehl returned the money to Suarez, who said he will send it to Boveda. Schoemehl also asked the FEC for "an advisory opinion" on the contribution. LG Mel Carnahan (D) "called the episode a scandal" and accused Schoemehl of trying to "bury the issue." Carnahan said 5/19 he would file a formal complaint with the FEC but postponed his plan until the campaign completed its own

investigation" (POST DISPATCH, 5/21).

REAX: ST. LOUIS POST DISPATCH editorial calls the episode "beyond believable": "Schoemehl should answer why he would take that much money from a single source and then claim to know nothing about who gave it to him" (5/15). Carnahan manager Marc Farinella: "Anyone who's been in politics as long as Schoemehl already knows a foreign contribution is illegal. ... Schoemehl asking the FEC for an advisory opinion on this is like Bonnie and Clyde asking the police, on their way out of the bank vault, if it's okay to rob banks" (Carnahan release, 5/16).

OTHER DEM NEWS: POST-DISPATCH's Jo Mannies reports Carnahan is running a "low-profile" race while Schoemehl is "spending a bundle" to "saturate" the state with radio and TV ads: "fending off accusations of questionable tactics for targeting some ads and fliers towards blacks," accusing Carnahan of "cutting deals to win backing" from local black officials, and accusing 2 of the GOPers of engaging in "Willie Horton II" for their welfare proposals. Schoemehl has "at least" \$500,000 "socked away" for a final ad blitz in the final days of the race. His current ads are running "about 70 times a week" in K.C., although some of them have been "revised" (5/17).

NO MORE GOP TRUCE: "After a springtime truce" GOPers are "sparring over a wide range of issues" and the "fast-changing developments require a scorecard to keep up." AG Wm Webster manager Tony Feather said Webster will not participate in GOP debates until Sec/State Roy Blunt releases his tax returns. Blunt manager Tom Deuschle said Blunt would make his tax returns available to reporters and said Webster had already missed several GOP forums: "This is another excuse not to face reporters and the press." Webster is the only GOPer with ads on TV. Blunt "won't say" when his ads will start. Treas. Wendell Bailey "says his current plans call for a series of 10-second [TV] spots on airtime being provided by a local businessman at the end of his own commercials" (POST DISPATCH, 5/17).

*17 NORTH CAROLINA: HUNT SUPPORTED BY PRIMARY FOES

"Avoiding a repeat of the defections ... that weakened his party and hobbled" his Senate run in '84, ex-Gov. Jim Hunt (D) "won the backing" of AG Lacy Thornburg (D) and atty Marcus Williams (D). Hunt: "Whatever our differences, we are united today." Getting Thornburg's "endorsement at all had to be a relief for Hunt" since Thornburg "spent the past year criticizing Hunt record" as gov. Since "it became clear" Hunt would win the primary, both LG Jim Gardner (R) and ex-state House speaker Joe Mavretic (I) "have been publicly saying nice things about Thornburg in hopes of winning at least some of Thornburg's supporters" (Christensen, RALEIGH NEWS & OBSERVER, 5/20).

*18 NORTH DAKOTA: DEM CAMPAIGN TAKES TO THE AIRWAVES

While "spit-shining the images of themselves and slightly muddying their opponents," Sen. Majority Leader Wm Heigaard (D), who was endorsed by the ND Dem convention, and AG Nicholas Spaeth (D) have both hit the airwaves. Heigaard "began his ad campaign with biographical pieces" featuring his family. While one of Spaeth's two ads is a "purely family piece," that "warm spot and his other TV ad carry implicit digs at Heigaard" with references "that attempt to define his opponent as a special interest politician. Heigaard's radio ads begin, "Nick Spaeth may be a pretty good government lawyer, but you can't know what's at stake all across [ND] by sitting behind a big desk at the state

Capitol, can you?" Spaeth said Heigaard's "tone is negative and he'll respond if it worsens": "You can't let him get away with murder." Heigaard is "bemused" over Spaeth's reaction: "We have been behind, we are still behind, but we are gaining ground, we are gaining momentum, and I think by [6/9] we're going to have a very close election" (Wood, GRAND FORKS HERALD, 5/17).

DEBATE: Heigaard and Spaeth had a "low key" debate 5/15 in which Heigaard "repeatedly described himself as a mature, experienced leader." Spaeth responded "with a laugh": "So that means I'm immature and inexperienced." Heigaard called health care a "birthright" and said he would make it a priority "from the first day he took office." Spaeth agreed, "but commented": "The question inevitably is how do we fund that?" Heigaard: "'How to fund it.' I've always thought of that as a Republican response to this question" (Wood, GRAND FORKS HERALD, 5/16).

*19 VIRGINIA: ROBB AIDE ORDERED BACKGROUND CHECK ON ACCUSER

Virginia Beach Sheriff Frank Drew said he performed a criminal background check on VB businessman Gary Pope, who alleged on NBC's "Expose" that women used cocaine on a table directly in front of Sen. Chuck Robb (D). He made the check at the request of Robb consultant Billy Hutchens, who was paid by Robb to interrogate women said to have had affairs with Robb. Drew said he didn't know who Pope was at the time, or why Robb wanted the information, but believed "as a U.S. Senator, Robb was entitled to the information." Drew 5/21 "expressed disgust about the incident and said he felt used by the Robb camp." Pope said Robb aides informed NBC of a drunk driving conviction he got in the mid-1980s "in an attempt to discredit him" (Ruberry, RICHMOND TIMES-DISPATCH, 5/22). WASH. POST's Howe reports on another controversy to arise from the ongoing federal probe of Robb's activities: the revelation that Norfolk atty Robert Nusbaum helped Robb staff purchase phone records of VB private detective Billy Franklin (see HOTLINE 5/22). Nusbaum, described by many as "among the best" in the Norfolk area, declined comment (5/22). RICHMOND NEWS LEADER reports Nusbaum met several times with ex-beauty queen/PLAYBOY cover girl Tai Collins to "keep [her] quiet about her alleged affair with Robb" (AP/Fairfax JOURNAL, 5/22).

REAX: TIMES-DISPATCH editorial stops just short of calling for Robb's resignation: "If ... the grand jury should indict the senator or release a report filled with damaging, verifiable information, it is hard to see how Mr. Robb could continue to serve effectively in his position of public trust" (5/21).

WILDER'S BACK: Gov. Doug Wilder (D), the subject of the illegal phone taping at the center of the probe, held a DC press conference this a.m. at the Natl Press Club to present a Robb staff memo outlining strategy to discredit him (see HOTLINE 5/20) to national reporters. Robb state dir. Chris Bridge, who wrote the memo, sent an apology to Wilder 5/21, but Wilder returned it unopened: "I was not interested in its contents" (TIMES-DISPATCH, 5/22). Wilder sent a letter to Sen. Maj. Ldr George Mitchell (D-ME), complaining Robb "abused his position" as DSCC chair. Rep. Jim Moran (D-VA), formerly an enthusiastic Robb backer: "It doesn't look good. A lot of people don't know what his future is, or if he even has one" (W. TIMES, 5/22). W. POST's Harris gives an overview of the ongoing Robb-Wilder strife, highlighting the Bridge memo as "a remarkable window into the mentality of suspicion and revenge that has dominated [VA] political circles in recent years" (5/22).

CONSPIRACY? Ex-federal prosecutor David Baugh told the ROANOKE TIMES & WORLD NEWS that ex-Robb CoS Dave McCloud's allegations (see HOTLINE 5/21) "could be used to build a conspiracy case" against Robb: "It appears that whoever drafted [the McCloud] statement drafted it so it could be alleged as a conspiracy" (5/22).

In the "A" race, the Dems "still are in a tight contest. ... Despite the best efforts" of the candidates, CA voters "so far are not swayed by anything the campaigns are saying" about the L.A. riots. Levine, "who after the riots made 'failure of political leadership' and 'mob rule' dominant sound bites of his campaign, has not improved" his standing he had in the poll before the riots. "Before that, Levine had been coming on fast." McCarthy, "who has been aiming his campaign at moderates and the middle class, seems to have stabilized his race after having lost significant ground" (5/22). Boxer appears to still do well among undecideds when pushed. On the GOP side, Campbell holds a "shaky" lead. But "when a very low turnout is projected," he and Herschensohn "run virtually even" (Skelton, L.A. TIMES, 5/22).

"McCarthy's figure represents his war chest before his current [TV] ad campaign began running." Boxer's "shrinking war chest has forced Boxer to cancel and rearrange some advertising buys in Sacramento and San Diego in the past couple of weeks." Campbell's figures "overstate amount he actually has available to spend" (Wildermuth, S.F. CHRONICLE, 5/22).

***22 MORE "A" SEAT: "FEAR SELLS BETTER ON TV"**

Columnist Joe Scott calls the race the only one that "seems alive": The L.A. riots have "played a larger part ... than any other domestic or foreign policy issue." Ex-TV commentator Bruce Herschensohn (R) and Rep. Tom Campbell (R-12) -- "aware that urban unrest historically works for the GOP" -- initially "led in politicizing the issue," but were passed by Rep. Mel Levine (D-27), who is "in a sprint ... to win by playing a crass law-and-order game that both fascinates and repels" many Dems. Levine's "posturing is undermined by the fact that a small part of the riot zone is within" his CD, and unlike Rep. Barbara Boxer (D-06), Levine was absent from a House vote on emergency riot aid to L.A. Scott calls Levine's shift to the right "very calculated": "His goal is to peel off McCarthy's big lead" among conservative and moderate Dems in order to win (S.D. UNION-TRIBUNE, 5/21).

ON THE GOP SIDE: In his first public speech "devoted entirely to attacking Campbell," Herschensohn called Campbell "a counterfeit conservative trying to hide his liberal colors": "I don't mind someone who has political conviction. But don't disguise it as something else." Campbell spokesperson Greg Stohr: "Herschensohn is an extremist trying to masquerade as someone with mainstream views and he's getting desperate" (Peterson, ORANGE COUNTY REGISTER, 5/21).

***23 MORE "B" SEAT: ABORTION IN PROGRESS SHOWN IN NEW AD**

"In a highly unusual move that one abortion-rights advocate characterized as 'vile and disgusting,'" U.S. Civil Rights Commis. Bill Allen (R) begins airing an ad today depicting "an abortion in progress." The "underfinanced" Allen, "who has been stuck near the bottom of the polls," said the ad is meant to "advance the public understanding" of the abortion issue. The ad begins with a scene of children in a school playground, all of whom disappear. It then shows a fetus in a womb, soon followed by the abortion scene. In a voice-over, Allen attacks pro-choice ex-S.F. Mayor Dianne Feinstein's (D) support for abortion rights

and concludes: "We must work together until all of us are told the truth: That abortion takes a child's life." Feinstein's spokesperson called the ad "shrill hysteria from a right-wing" candidate and predicted "it will have no bearing on the election." Allen political dir. David Warnick would not disclose the extent of the buy, (Murphy, L.A. TIMES, 5/22).

WHERE'S IT PLAYIN?: Adlink, a company that supplies advertising to 31 CA cable systems, refused to accept the spot but "not based on its content." Adlink spokesperson Lynn Bolton said the presidential primary was getting precedence. Cox Cable spokesperson Kimberly Kasitz said attys determined her company was required under federal law to broadcast the ad: "We don't want to run it. ... But we feel we have to. Our hands are tied behind our backs." Warnick said Allen "has neither the time or the money to challenge cable systems unwilling to broadcast the ad ... and will simply take the ad to stations required to air it" (Murphy, L.A. TIMES, 5/22). Also running: Controller Gray Davis (D), Rep. Wm Dannemeyer (R-39) and Sen. John Seymour (R).

LACK OF COVERAGE/INTEREST: N.Y. TIMES' Kolbert reports on the lack of local TV coverage of the Senate race. KTLA-TV news dir. Warren Cereghino: "I'm getting a little annoyed with the Senate candidates and their campaign managers' whining ... their business should be campaigning, not complaining" (5/22).
