I. PURPOSE

To receive the first Atlantic Salmon taken in the 1992 Maine season.

II. BACKGROUND

The tradition of presenting the first caught salmon of the Maine season to the President of the United States began 80 years ago, when a salmon caught by Karl Anderson at the Bangor Salmon Pool was presented to William Howard Taft in 1912.

Due to inadequate fishways and pollution in the large rivers, the salmon runs in Maine were very much reduced by the late 1940's. The Maine Legislature formed the Atlantic Sea-Run Salmon Commission to oversee restoration efforts. This Commission, in cooperation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, embarked upon a program to restore salmon in Maine rivers. After 28 years of effort, the salmon runs were restored to the point that the presidential salmon tradition was revived in 1982 with you, as Vice-President, accepting that first salmon on behalf of President Reagan and in recognition of the restoration effort.

The first salmon of this year's season was caught on May 1st at 4:37 a.m. by Clyde Westfall on Orono, Maine. The fish weighed 9 and one-half pounds and was 30 inches long.

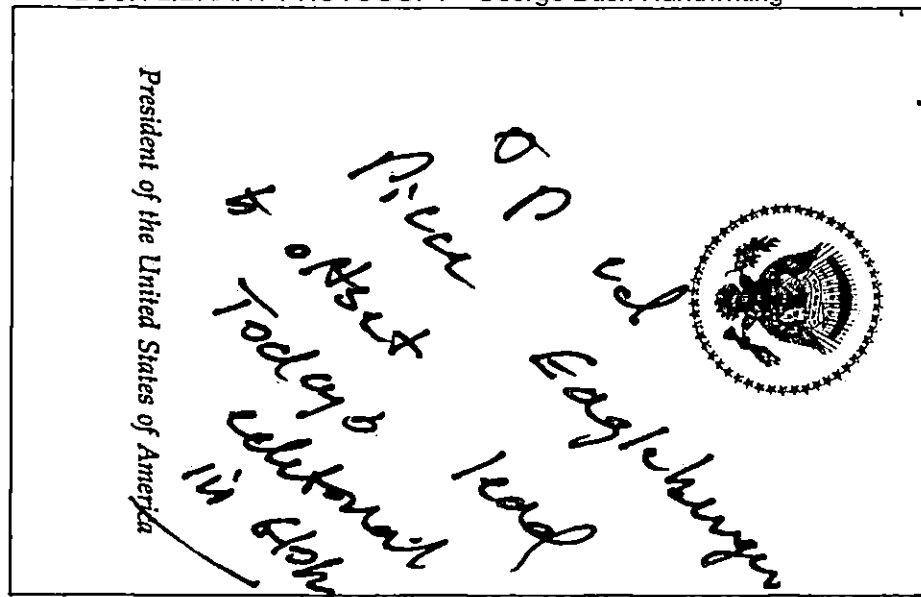

Monday, May 25, 1992

President and Mrs. Bush stopped by Kennebunkport's American Legion Post #159 to participate in the post's annual Memorial Day ceremony. Maine Gov. John McKernan and Rep. Olympia Snowe were with them.

The brief ceremony took place in front of the post where a large stone marker reads "In honor of our comrades..." and then it listed those killed in action.

Mr. Bush spoke and you should have heard his remarks by now played in the filing center.

The simple ceremony included a couple of prayers, a gun salute and the laying of a green wreath with a red, white and blue bow by the women's auxiliary. The flag was then raised to full staff.

Afterwards the Bushes went inside where we are told Mr. Bush had a bowl of chowder.

Now for the president's remarks:

"... simply say on this special day for our nation that we remember those who fell in battle. We honor them. We remember those who are unaccounted for, those that are missing in action. And we will never stop trying to have every single one of them accounted for.

"We are very grateful that the Cold War is over and that these kids here are growing up in a world with less fear of nuclear holocaust. Having said that, it is essential that we not forget those who gave their lives and that to me means that we must keep this country strong enough to repel any threat to our nation's security and as president I will do just that.

"We are reducing defense spending, but we cannot go back to a hollow army. We cannot go back to the days of weakness that invite mischief and invite possible international terror and so this country will remain strong and on this very special Memorial Day again we honor those who serve, who were in uniform and I say to my fellow veterans we have plenty to be proud of, plenty to be grateful for in the United States of America. May I ask God's blessing on those who are missing. They will never be forgotten. . .

Mrs. Bush wore a white coat. The president had on gray pants, navy v-neck sweater, green tie and blue-gray jacket.

FYI: flag was at half staff when we arrived at Walker's Point but was raised when we left for the event..

For many, Memorial Day signals summer's arrival -- families will pull out the picnic baskets and charcoal grills and head for the beach or the park. But, more importantly, Memorial Day is one of our nation's most solemn observances.

On this sacred day, we honor those Americans who died fighting for freedom or are still unaccounted for as a result of that noble cause. We pause to remember, to think about the meaning of the loss of brave men and women who did not return from the battle. And, in cemeteries all across this great land, flags will be raised honoring our POW/MIA's and people will place flags or lay bouquets on quiet graves "where valor proudly sleeps."

On this day, we must tell the stories of those who fought and died in freedom's cause. We must tell their stories because those who've lost loved ones and those still enduring uncertainty need to know that a grateful nation will always remember. SUBJECT: MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVANCES

There will be a short ceremony at the American Legion Post #159 at 11:30 AM to 12 noon on Monday 5/25/92. This ceremony will be at a monument which the President dedicated previously.

Immediately following the ceremony, there will be a "Chowda Lunch" at the Legion Post at 12 noon.

In initial discussions with Ed Flynn of the USSS, he felt that this location would be "very workable" should the President desire to participate/attend.

The backdrop would be Legionnaires and families, flags and a receptive audience.

Another option would be the Cape Porpoise Parade. This parade is a 'downsized' version of the Kennebunkport parade and begins at about 11:00 am. (Tentatively scheduled for Monday morning is the first salmon presentation at 8:30 am followed by golf with Gov. McKernan. This could be changed depending on which event THE PRESIDENT wanted to do.)

Please advice if any of the attached Memorial Day Observances are of interest to the President and we will explore further.

MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVANCES

Memorial Day services and parades all take place this year on Monday, the official holiday, except for Kittery, whose ceremonies will take place Saturday, May 30, and will appear in the May 27 edition.

Kennebunk

The annual Memorial Day parade and festivities will begin with a concert on the town hall steps, featuring bands from the high school, the middle school, Sea Road School, and Park Street School at 1:30 p.m. A parade down Main Street will follow at 2 p.m.

Kennebunkport

The annual Memorial Day parade will kick off at the Masonic Hall at 10 a.m. and proceed through Dock Square to the bridge for a Naval Ceremony and 21-gun salute. The parade will then return to Dock Square for another ceremony and salute. Guest speaker and parade grand marshal will be Wallace Reid. Charles Whiston of South Congregational Church will act as the presiding reverend.

Bands from Consolidated School, Kennebunk Middle School and Kennebunk High School will perform in the parade. All veterans are invited to participate.

Wells/Ogunquit

Memorial Day activities will begin at 8:30 a.m. when soldiers of all wars, the Women's Relief Corps and members of the American Legion will assemble at the parking lot of Wells High School. Both the Wells High School Band and the Wells Junior High School Band will also march.

Sgt. Al Gelestino will serve as Marshal of the Day.

The parade will begin at 9 a.m. and march east on Route 109 to Wells Corner and then turn south on Route

1 to Ocean View Cemetery. The Wells High Band will play "Amazing Grace," Rev. George Fowler will offer a prayer and oration, Marc Fournier of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will read the Gettysburg Address and members of the American Legion Post 143 will decorate the graves of Eldridge and Leroy Hansen.

The parade will then disband and re-form on Bournel Lane in Ogunquit at 11:15 a.m. Marshall of the Day Sgt. Al Gelestino will lead the parade north along Shore Road, and then to the Ogunquit River bridge for a ceremony to remember our servicemen lost at sea.

The parade will then return to the Veterans Park in Ogunquit Center for a prayer and oration by Pastor Stephen Smith, followed by other activities.

York

The Memorial Day Parade in York will follow the traditional route. Participants will gather at 9 a.m. in St. Christopher's parking lot and step off down York Street at 9:30 a.m.

The parade will halt at memorials honoring the dead of the Revolutionary War, Civil War, World War I, World War II, and the war in Vietnam. A color guard will fire salutes.

All veterans are welcome to participate. In addition, according to Robert Ackerman of the Boardman-Ellis VFW Post, local firefighters, police, school bands and others have been invited to participate.

The parade will end at the First Parish Cemetery, where Kenneth Snow, a retired U.S. Navy commander and former director of the Maine Veterans Home, will speak.

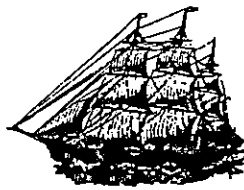

Dear Dale,

As you are aware, ACT-UP is planning to return to Kennebunkport on Memorial Day. Their organizers have been quoted as saying that acts of civil disobedience are planned and that there will be arrests.

Needless to say, Memorial Day is a very special and solemn occasion in Kennebunkport, involving virtually every segment of our community from children's groups to veterans' organizations. Since the announcement by ACT-UP of their planned Memorial Day activities, residents have expressed concern about the safety of their children marching in the parade and about the disruption of the traditional Memorial Day ceremony to honor and remember friends and neighbors who gave their lives for our country. In addition, local merchants have expressed concern about the potential damage to property and loss of business.

Although the Town of Kennebunkport is taking every possible action to insure public safety and to preserve the traditions of its Memorial Day observance, this is still a potentially explosive situation. If there is anything that you, the White House staff, or the Administration could do to help defuse this situation, the Town would be extremely grateful.

Thank you for your consideration.

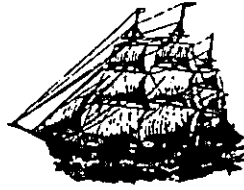

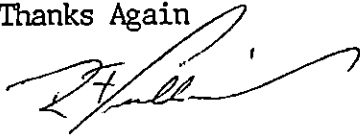

And, we must let their sacrifices give meaning and purpose to our nation's future. Because they fought we have freedoms many all too often take for granted. Because of their sacrifice, our children can sleep soundly -- without the threat of nuclear war hanging over their heads.

May God bless the families of all whom we honor. And, may God bless the United States of America.

RE: Follow-up on Memorial Day Conversation

Mr. President:

It was great to see you over Memorial Day. As we discussed, the following is what I believe we need to do to turn around the public perception of the Administration's handling of domestic issues.

I have some experience in this, since in 1990, I came from 18 points behind in August to win by three. I never really felt I was off the defensive, however, about our economic and budget problems. I fear that if we do not develop a better way to articulate your plan for America's long-term economic recovery, none of the other themes will have their desired impact, and you will be on the defensive in the Fall.

People need to know you care about their current plight, and that you have a plan to fix it -- because you do! And you ought to be proud of it.

You are getting a "bum rap" on "the vision thing" on domestic policy, and I am convinced the problem is not what you have proposed but that the message has not been packaged well. Even though you have made a number of worthy and compelling proposals, there has been no overarching "theme" that describes your plan to bring America back in the 1990s. As a result, the public has been convinced by the media that you have failed to lead on domestic issues, when nothing could be further from the truth.

Between now and this summer, I believe we need to have a concise description about the steps you would take over the next four years to ensure America's economic prominence and well being. Along the way, we can enumerate the proposals you have made which Congress has failed to pass, as well as urging people to send to Congress only those who are willing to help you pass both your past ideas and your new ones (I am not sure that just bashing Congress works unless you can give specifics about what you believe has to be done that Congress is not now doing). Most importantly, we need to have a catchy phrase describing what it is you have been trying to do and what you believe has to be done during your next term to put people back to work and increase America's standard of living (I think it was Pat Caddell who said to Gary Hart that it didn't matter how many great ideas he had if he couldn't summarize them in a catchy phrase on a bumper sticker!).

I have attached the "five criteria" which you discussed both in New Hampshire and in your State of the Union address (without any long lasting media attention, unfortunately). The reason these criteria are so important to our American domestic agenda is because of what has happened in the world:

1. Creation of the New World Order:

As you have so appropriately discussed on many occasions, the world has changed. The break-up of the Soviet Union and the changes in Eastern Europe reflect a victory for freedom, democracy, capitalism, and free market forces. Combined with those changes, over the last six or eight years we have seen a true globalization of the economy, with fierce competition from Europe as well as the Pacific rim. Our competitive position has been eroded due to enhanced skills in the workforces of our developed nation competitors such as Germany and Japan, and an explosion in the number of unskilled jobs now able to be done in developing countries.

2. Reduced American Competitiveness:

Because of this New World Order, we are having trouble competing with Japan and Germany for high skilled jobs and lesser developed countries are now able to do the lower skilled jobs at lower wage rates than we could or should pay (\$1.00 per day vs. \$4.25 per hour!). This has resulted in American corporations downsizing and laying off significant numbers of white collar workers for the first time. This trend is scaring middle class America to death and worrying them greatly about the future. In addition, there are fewer and fewer low skilled jobs but a lot of lower skilled workers and an educational system which is putting out more and more lower skilled workers every year. (Your youth apprenticeship initiative is a major step forward. I hope you will read my comments on the attached sheet).

3. Down economic cycle:

The upheaval in our changing economy has only been exacerbated by the normal down economic cycle we have been going through. The combination of the two events, however, means that people want someone to tell them how it is all going to get better.

In order to address these changes and the resulting challenges we face domestically, you have proposed a number of reforms which have not received the attention they deserve. They all seem to fit quite nicely under the "five criteria" you outlined back in January.

Again, it seems to me that we need to design a strategy for convincing the public that you have a domestic agenda for now and for the next term; that you feel strongly about it; and that the agenda has always been there even if the thematic and/or rhetorical articulation has been missing.

We could begin the process with friendly media types or through op-eds and guest columns that reiterate the "five criteria" under an overarching vision of American Opportunity in the New World Order (Norm Ornstein referred to it as the New American Order in a recent New York Times Magazine article) with specific proposals outlined under each point. I don't have all the specifics, but it would look something like this:

1. Stimulating investment necessary to create jobs.
Investment Tax Credit, expensing for small businesses, capital gains tax rate, R&D tax credit, enterprise zones.
2. Stopping the slide in real estate values and increasing home sales.
IRA's for first time home buyers, passive losses for developers, limited tax credits for home buyers.
3. Making affordable the costs of raising a family, educating children, and obtaining health care.
Increase standard personal exemption, welfare reform, health care vouchers, IRA's for college costs, expanding government student loans, H.O.P.E.
4. Increasing America's capacity to compete in a global economy.
Antitrust and product liability changes, new bilateral and multi-lateral trade agreements, America 2000, youth apprenticeship, Job Training 2000.
5. Controlling wasteful government spending and bringing the deficit under control.
Maintain 1990 budget agreement, line-item veto, balanced budget amendment.

Mr. President, as you can see, there is no justification for all of the criticism you are taking about a lack of a domestic agenda. You should be on the offensive on these issues, not on the defensive. I am convinced that if we put our minds to it, we can have the right simplified domestic theme to describe the agenda you have set forward to restore economic opportunity, jobs, and American competitiveness.

Until we change the current perception on the domestic agenda, I fear the other themes will fail to move the electorate. With the proper economic theme, though, it should be easy to tie those issues into family values, the global economy, and your preeminence in global affairs. That done, the 1992 Presidential race becomes no contest!

Sorry this memo is so long, but you have made so many important proposals for the future well being of this country, I am convinced there has to be some way to better package the message. I stand ready to help.

YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP: KEEPING OUR PROMISE TO AMERICA'S YOUTH

For decades, the American system of education has been hailed as the best in the world. Our college graduates set the world pace for knowledge and skills.

But our education system has not kept pace with the dramatic changes in the workplace and economic markets over the past 30 years. As a result, too many of our youth are forgotten -- nearly half graduate from high school ill-prepared for work. At the same time, other nations have harnessed the power of a well-trained workforce to give their citizens prosperity and opportunity.

Maine's Center for Youth Apprenticeship will build the well-educated, high-skills workforce we need to ensure a new century of prosperity here at home. As business decisions are made on the basis of workforce skills, youth apprenticeship offers us a fresh new approach to training that will revolutionize the way we teach our children.

Our Center will manage a Maine Youth Apprenticeship Program (MYAP) -- offered in 20 percent of Maine high schools in 1993 and statewide by 1997 -- and will also include a research arm that can serve as a resource to other states. The research division will develop curriculum, and ensure that Maine's program incorporates the best aspects of apprenticeship plans worldwide.

Maine's Youth Apprenticeship Program includes aspects of the German and Danish apprenticeship systems that have prepared students well for centuries. We draw liberally from business experience and business needs, to make sure that students are trained for jobs that will actually exist. Jobs specialists from the Jobs for Maine's Graduates program will provide career preparation and training for apprenticeships in the 9th and 10th grades, and build youth guilds, similar to those in the German system, so that apprentices will always have peer support whether in school or at work.

MYAP will offer a three-year apprenticeship beginning with the 11th grade and culminating in a one-year certificate from one of Maine's Technical Colleges. By combining weeks of intensive workplace training with an extended-length school day, we will ensure that students meet the high standards demanded of all Maine high school students -- while training them with a skill.

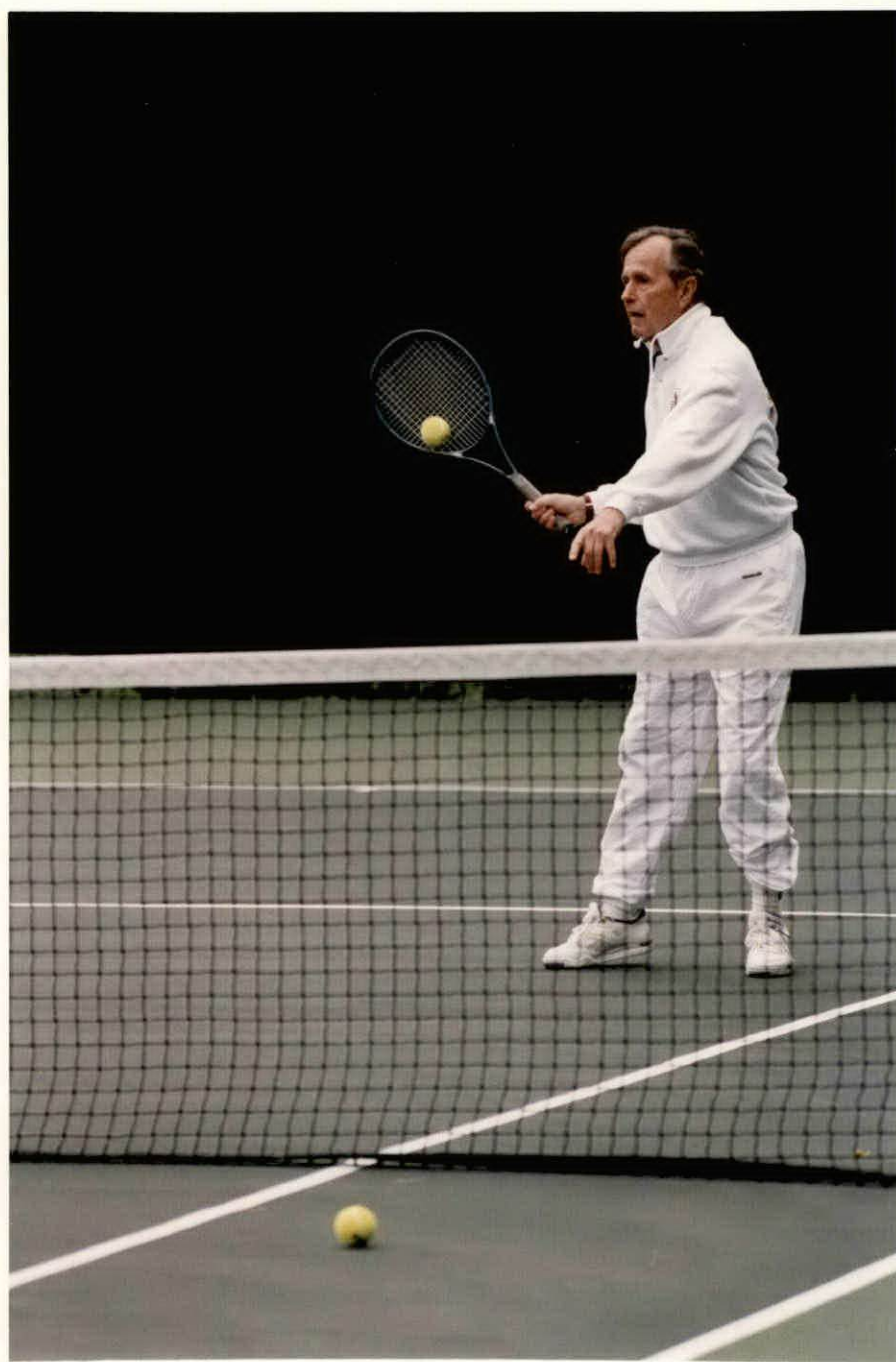

By offering the advantage of one year in college at no cost to the student, we also ensure that MYAP graduates have the opportunity to extend their education as a second-year student at a technical college, or through links with our University system. Our program provides students with the opportunity to learn an occupational skill while continuing with education.

In a world where 85 percent of all jobs will require high skills -- but less than half of our students plan to attend college -- youth apprenticeship offers a new approach that can break new ground in educating the workforce of the next century.

I hope that our unique, Americanized youth apprenticeship design will be considered by other states, and that together we can bring greater opportunity to future generations of Americans.
