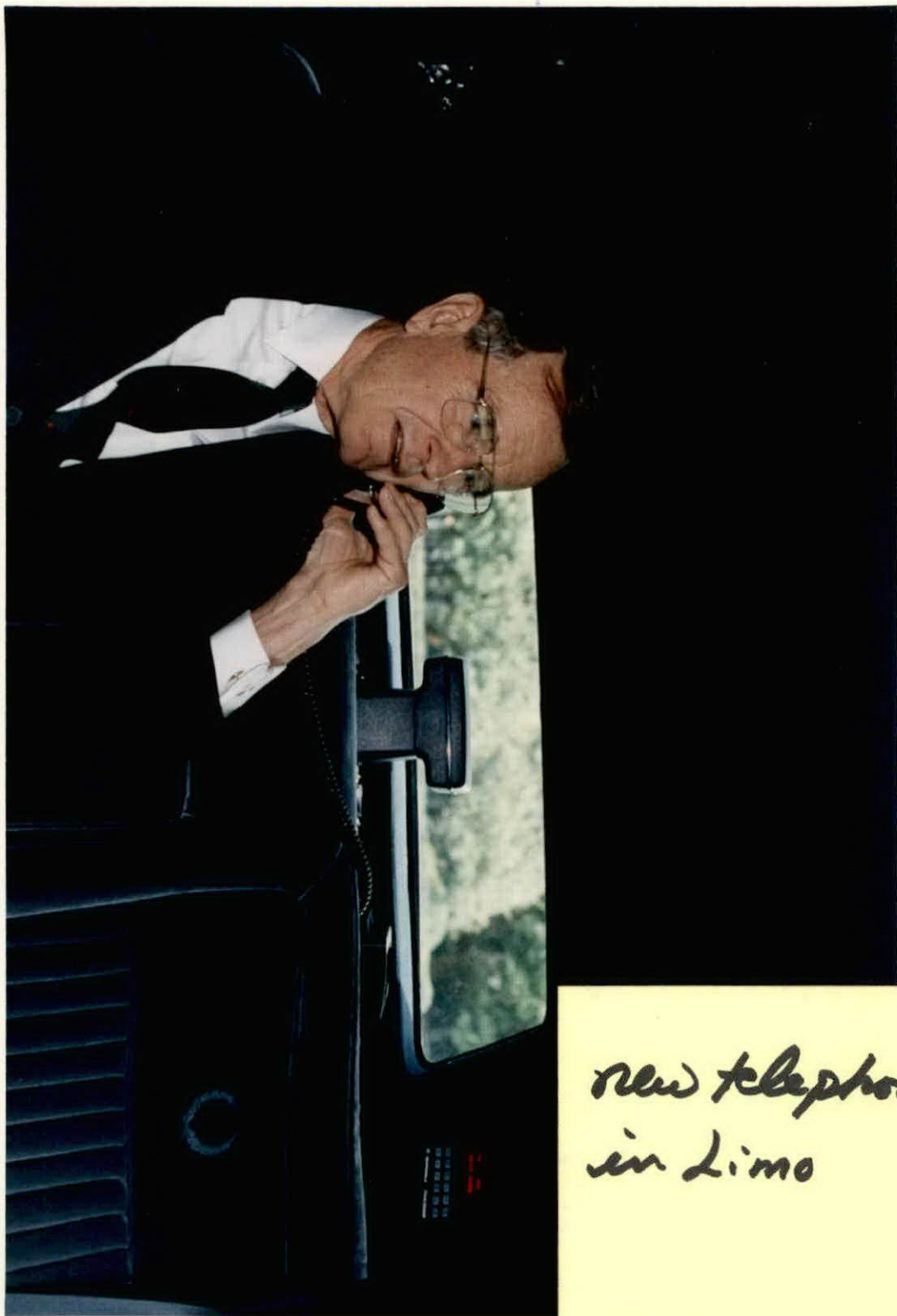

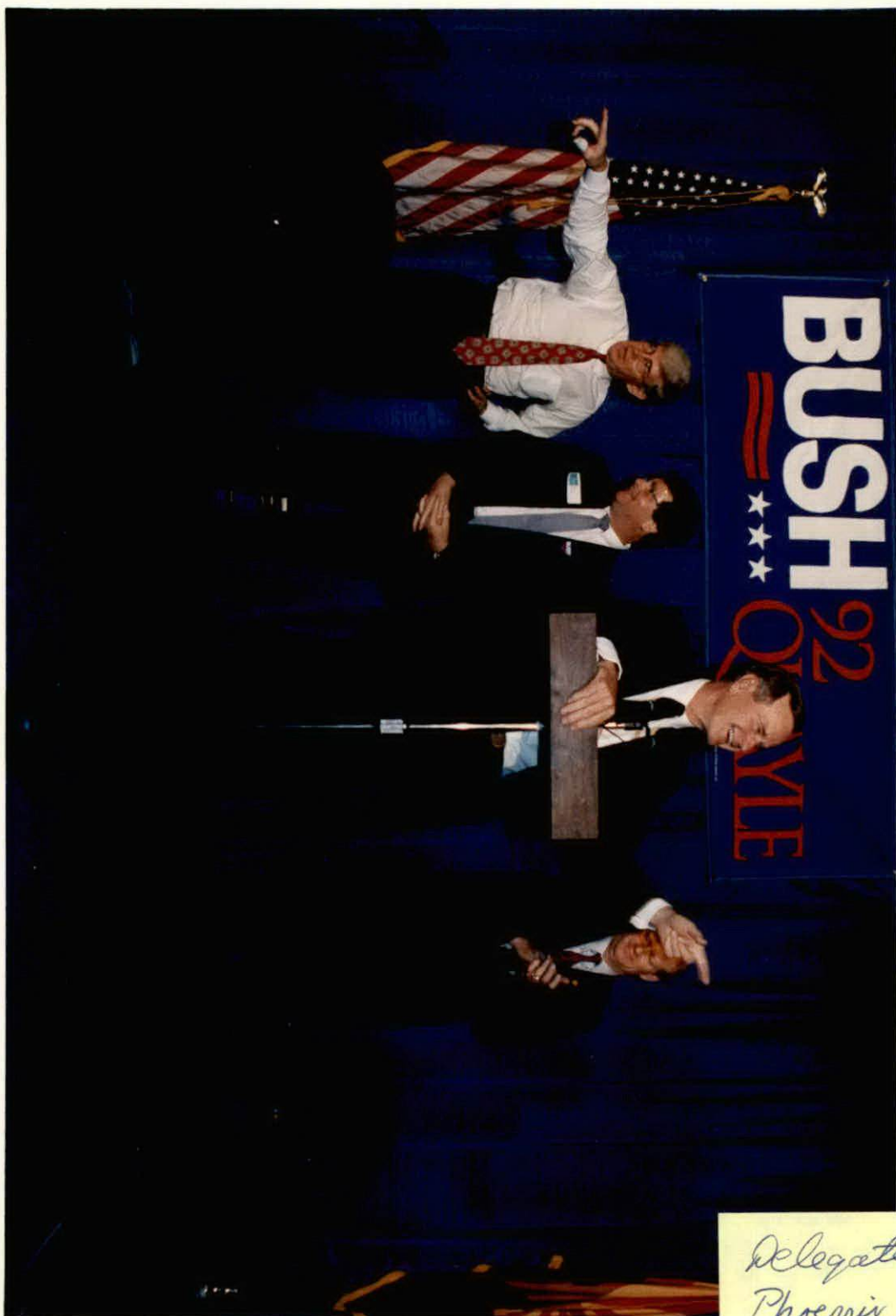

Elsie flew down this week to have another heart-to-heart with me...and this time she means it.

She has been working well with Walker to date and understands the necessity of his activities bringing in the Right to Life, religious right, et al. She will not however, preside over what she sees as the taking over of the party by virtue of their participation in Victory '92 and general election BQ activities.

What she is proposing is:

1. The RNC hire former state chairman, current legislative operative Dick Philling now, to oversee preparation of the general election plan. He ultimately becomes the campaign manager under Co-Chairmen Walker and Coughlin.
- 2. Joe Waldholtz becomes Philling's ED.
3. The State party hires Dave Sanco for Victory '92.
4. She resigns after the convention and this structure runs the campaign.

Elsie understands how bad it would look for her to resign and proposes the logical cover of some sort of Presidential appointment/assignment to work on: Weed and Seed or some Philly urban task force. She rightly points out she has long credibility with the black community and the power structure in Philadelphia and would be welcome to work with them. She could then say there wasn't enough time to do the campaign and the urban job (volunteer activity) and she would be doing more important work for the President on the urban issue than on his campaign.

She insists that neither you nor the President can dissuade her this time. She will not/can not get it up for the general election but does not want to hurt the President by just resigning without cover. I must say, I've been pals with Elsie for years and I'm confident she means it. Furthermore, she's been very consistent, as you know, from the beginning of this cycle in her reluctance to run the Pennsylvania campaign. Today in Congress

House Floor: Members will debate whether to overturn a Bush administration ban on federal funding of transplant research using tissue from aborted fetuses.

The provision is included in a conference agreement on legislation (HR 2507) that would reauthorize the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and has triggered a veto threat from President Bush.

Opponents contend the research would encourage abortions, while bill supporters refute that assertion and counter that important medical research into the use of fetal tissue for the treatment of Alzheimer's disease and other maladies has been hindered by the ban.

A split among anti-abortion forces on the research could clear the way for the first successful override of a Bush veto. The House vote today is considered a key test of whether House supporters of the research have the two-thirds majority needed to override a veto.

The measure would reauthorize NIH through fiscal 1996, including fiscal 1993 funding of \$2.2 billion for the National Cancer Institute and \$1.4 billion for the Heart, Lung and Blood Institute.

California Water: A bill that would make major changes in the distribution of water from California's massive Central Valley Project will be marked up by the House Interior Committee.

The measure (HR 5099) would direct more water supplied by the federally managed project to fish and wildlife preservation and away from farm irrigation.

According to bill supporters, the diversion of water from the project to farms and cities has harmed salmon runs and wetlands vital to certain wildlife. But the bill has stirred up opposition from members from the Central Valley region, who say the measure would severely hurt farmers dependent on irrigation.

And the bill is opposed by the powerful agriculture lobby, which has histori-

cally relied upon inexpensive federal water to prosper.

Under the measure, fish and wildlife preservation would be given equal weight with agricultural needs when water allocation decisions are made. The bill would also place restrictions on new irrigation contracts and make it easier for cities to purchase water from the project.

Miller introduced HR 5099 earlier this month; the bill mirrors a proposal put forward earlier this year by Senate Energy Committee Chairman J. Bennett Johnston, D-La.

Worker Safety: Legislation that would strengthen worker-safety laws under the 1970 Occupational Safety and Health Act will be marked up by the House Education and Labor Committee.

The measure (HR 3160) would impose criminal penalties on a supervisor whose willful violation of health and safety laws results in an employee's injury or death. The supervisor could receive up to five years in prison in the case of an injury and up to 10 years in the event of a death. Currently, only employers can be held criminally liable for such violations.

The bill would also require the creation, at every worksite with 10 or more employees, of a health and safety committee to produce a detailed safety plan for those workers.

Most committee Republicans believe that HR 3160 imposes an undue burden on businesses and are expected to oppose it. But the bill has solid Democratic support and will likely win committee approval.

Local Aid: Draft legislation that would authorize a \$5.4 billion infusion of federal aid to state and local governments in fiscal 1993 will be marked up by the House Government Operations Subcommittee on Human Resources. The

HOUSE FLOOR: Oil reserve set-aside plan rejected by members.

The House yesterday voted, 263-135, not to force oil refiners and importers to contribute to a national oil stockpile.

The oil reserve set-aside provision was dropped from a comprehensive energy strategy bill (HR 776) that the House passed by a 381-37 vote.

"If we want to fill the SPR [Strategic Petroleum Reserve], let's do it in a straightforward manner. Appropriate the money and buy the oil," said Don J. Pease, D-Ohio.

The reserve currently has about 570 million barrels of oil stored in salt domes in Louisiana and Texas. The provision would have required oil firms to collectively contribute 150,000 barrels a day to build the reserve toward a one billion barrel target.

Energy and Commerce Committee Chairman John D. Dingell, D-Mich., said that the provision would have required companies to contribute about 1 percent of the oil they refined or imported.

Opponents of the set-aside plan said it was an unfair burden on oil companies. "The in-kind provision is a tax whose time has not come and never should," said Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., who sponsored the amendment to drop the provision.

The House rejected, 117-293, an amendment that would have required that sites considered to host low-level radioactive waste disposal facilities be of low population density, with limited potential for population growth.

JOBLESS BENEFITS bill polished up by Ways and Means.

The House Ways and Means Committee yesterday approved, by voice vote, new legislation (HR 5260) that is nearly identical to a bill (HR 4727) OK'd by the panel last week to provide extended benefits to the long-term unemployed.

The benefits expire July 4.

Panel members had to revisit the issue after staffers discovered that HR 4727 would not entirely pay for itself. Committee members estimated that the \$6 billion measure would have fallen \$100 million short.

To make up the difference, the panel rewrote the revenue-raising provisions, including one that would ban tax deductions for executive compensation payments in excess of \$1 million. Under the new bill, the effective date of the provision would be Jan. 1, 1992, instead of July 1, 1992.

As approved, HR 5260 would provide 20 to 26 weeks of emergency federal

unemployment benefits to workers whose 26 weeks of state benefits have run out — the same as would have been provided by the earlier bill.

EEOC AUTHORITY would be expanded under House measure.

The House Post Office Subcommittee on Civil Service yesterday approved, 3-0, legislation (HR 3613) that would enable federal workers to lodge discrimination and sexual harassment complaints with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), the same agency that investigates private-sector cases.

Currently, complaints by federal workers are handled by the agency in which the discrimination or harassment allegedly occurred.

Bill backers say conflict-of-interest problems are inherent under the current system because agency officials may be reluctant to agree that discrimination occurred under their watch.

The measure would make the EEOC responsible for investigating all federal employee harassment and discrimination charges. It would also set uniform deadlines for EEOC action on complaints, similar to deadlines in private-sector discrimination and harassment cases.

Members approved, by voice vote, an amendment by Gerry Sikorski, D-Minn., that would allow federal workers to seek the same remedy in discrimination suits as can be collected by private-sector employees. The Sikorski proposal also would require agencies to make all necessary complaint forms readily available to employees.

Full committee markup is expected in early June.

D.C. FEDERAL PAYMENT disputed between two committees.

A question over how much the federal government owes the District of Columbia in a fiscal 1993 federal payment surfaced yesterday as District of Columbia Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly testified before a House District of Columbia Appropriations Subcommittee.

The annual federal payment to the city is supposed to cover the costs and lost tax revenues that result from hosting the federal government. In order to bring some consistency to the way the federal payment is calculated, Congress last year cleared legislation that set the annual federal payment at 24 percent of the city's general operating fund.

But there seems to be some confusion over how much is in the city's general operating fund.

According to Mayor Kelly, the federal payment this year should total \$655 million, \$643 million of which is based on 24 percent of \$2.68 billion of general fund revenue, which is mainly derived from

taxes. The city also takes in revenue from lottery games and charging businesses for such services as sewer and water, and the total federal payment is also based on a percentage of that amount. A report by the General Accounting Office supports the city's calculations.

But the House District of Columbia Committee, which authorizes the funds for the payment, has looked at the general fund revenues differently, coming up with a fiscal 1993 federal payment of only \$624 million, according to D.C. Subcommittee Chairman Julian C. Dixon, D-Calif.

President Bush requested \$630.5 million for the city's fiscal 1993 federal payment, the same amount that the city received in fiscal 1992.

D.C. Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton, who serves on the D.C. Committee, said she expects to be able to clear up the problem with the authorizing committee. Kelly told the spending panel that the city would be hard pressed financially unless "the full amount we agreed upon be respected and received."

NEA GRANT rejections draw criticism from arts professionals.

The acting head of the National Endowment for the Arts was the target of criticism yesterday for denying grants approved by endowment advisory panels.

Lawmakers on the House Interior Appropriations Subcommittee heard from arts officials who complained that Anne-Imelda Radice — who is serving as chairwoman of the embattled agency — had refused to award grants for projects that were judged meritorious by review panels.

"I think she overreacted," said Murry N. DePillars, dean of Virginia Commonwealth University's arts school.

DePillars resigned as a member of an NEA review panel earlier this month to protest the denial of a \$10,000 grant to his school's Anderson Gallery. Citing reasons of artistic merit, Radice turned down the grant application and funding for another project despite earlier approval by a peer review panel and advisory review by the National Council on the Arts.

The dispute is the latest chapter in a long-running political battle over federal support for arts projects that some find offensive because of sexual content or other graphic representation.

Former NEA Director John Frohnmayer was fired by the Bush administration in February after conservatives and religious groups charged the agency with funding pornographic and blasphemous works.

OPIC OFFICIAL Berg defends export subsidy program.

James D. Berg, executive vice president of the Overseas Private Investment Corp., defended the agency yesterday against criticism that the subsidies it of-

fers companies are leading to a decrease in U.S. manufacturing jobs.

In testimony before the House Education and Labor Subcommittee on Employment Opportunities, Berg said that OPIC had helped increase U.S. exports by \$22.9 billion from 1971 to 1991.

But labor union official Douglas Meyer said that OPIC-sponsored projects have cost U.S. jobs. He said a joint venture between General Electric and a Hungarian company to make light bulbs led to the layoff of several hundred GE employees in Ohio.

OPIC helps U.S. companies find foreign investment opportunities and offers loans and insurance to exporters.

Labor groups say that OPIC is supporting companies that are cutting U.S. jobs and moving productions overseas to take advantage of cheaper labor.

Panel member Robert E. Andrews, D-N.J., has introduced legislation (HR 4376) that would terminate OPIC.

But Berg cited Commerce Department figures showing that the share of U.S. civilian employment supported by exports increased from 5.7 percent in 1986 to 7.4 percent in 1990.

• Today, the Foreign Affairs Committee will mark up a bill (HR 4996) that would reauthorize the agency for three years. OPIC finances its operations through fees and insurance premiums and does not require an appropriation.

DANTE FASCELL adds name to House retirement list.

Florida Democrat Dante B. Fascell, a 38-year House veteran and chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee, announced yesterday that he would retire at the end of the 102nd Congress.

"I've done my job, and now it's somebody else's turn," he said at a Capitol Hill news conference.

Fascell said his retirement decision was "purely personal" but acknowledged that a new district was a contributing factor. Due to congressional remapping, Fascell's new district would have included areas that he has not previously represented.

But Fascell frequently expressed frustration with the congressional process of authorizing foreign aid. Since Fascell became chairman, only one foreign aid measure (in 1985) has become law.

Lee H. Hamilton, D-Ind., who co-chaired the congressional committee that in 1987 investigated the Iran-contra scandal, is next in line to chair the Foreign Affairs panel.

Fascell, who also serves on the Narcotics Abuse and Control Committee, is the fifth Florida member of the House to announce his retirement.

Fifty-six House members are retiring or seeking election to another office. In addition, nine House members have lost primaries. (See story, p. 3)

Two More Incumbents Taste Defeat

The House check scandal claimed two more victims Tuesday and left a third in a precarious situation as voters in three states went to the polls for congressional primary elections. The defeats brought the list of incumbent primary losers in the House to nine — the most since 1982.

Nine-term Rep. Carroll Hubbard, D-Ky., and 12-term Rep. Bill Alexander, D-Ark., lost. And seven-term Rep. Beryl Anthony Jr., D-Ark., was forced into a June 9 runoff election. Each of the three wrote more than 100 bad checks at the House bank.

"I could not see this coming," Rep. Hubbard said of his 1st District defeat. Kentucky voters also turned back the electoral bid of Hubbard's wife, Carol, who finished fourth in the Democratic primary in the 5th District.

Here are highlights of the voting in Arkansas, Kentucky and Idaho:

Arkansas

Alexander, who was cited as one of the 22 worst offenders at the bank, with 487 overdrafts, took a drubbing in the 1st District from lobbyist Blanche Lambert, who once worked for him. Lambert won about 61 percent of the vote to Alexander's 39 percent. The GOP candidate is Terry Hayes, a real estate developer.

"It had a great deal of impact in that it is an easily identifiable issue for people," Lambert said of the checks. "They could associate it with the nation's problems, the fiscal irresponsibility."

In the 4th District, Anthony had about 40 percent of the votes in a three-way primary. In Arkansas, if no candidate wins a majority of the votes, the top two vote-getters must compete in a runoff. In the Democratic runoff, he will face Arkansas Secretary of State Bill McCuen, who took 30 percent of the votes to finish second. The winner will face attorney Jay Dickey.

In the open 3rd District, being vacated by retiring GOP Rep. John Paul Hammerschmidt, state Rep. Tim Hutchinson won the Republican nomination. He will face the winner of the June 9 Democratic runoff between attorney John R. Van Winkle and businessman Don Nelms.

Democratic Sen. Dale Bumpers won renomination for a fourth term with a 65 percent-35 percent victory over state Auditor Julia Hughes Jones. In November, he will face Baptist minister Mike Huckabee.

Kentucky

In Kentucky's 1st District, challenger Tom Barlow, a businessman, defeated Rep. Hubbard, 48 percent to 45 percent.

Barlow said that "the checks are just the straw that broke the camel's back." He said that "Congress had reached the end of the line in the '80s with the financial situation having gotten out of control." Hubbard agreed: "Unquestionably, there is an anti-Washington sentiment across the country, and part of the votes my opponent received tonight are people unhappy with Washington in general."

In the 5th District, Hubbard's wife, Carol, who was seeking to become part of the first same-state husband-and-wife tandem in House history, pulled only 17 percent of the vote to finish fourth in the eight-way Democratic primary. Former State Sen. John Doug Hays won the nomination with 30 percent of the vote and will face GOP Rep. Harold Rogers in November.

In the open 6th District, where Rep. Larry J. Hopkins, R, is retiring, Lexington Mayor Scotty Baesler easily won the Democratic nomination. He will be a big November favorite over GOP nominee Charles W. Ellinger.

Idaho

Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings and Boise's GOP mayor, Dirk Kempthorne, won their parties' nominations for the Senate seat being vacated by retiring Sen. Steve Symms, R.

In the battle to replace Stallings in the 2nd District, state Senate President Pro Tempore Michael D. Crapo easily turned back a challenge from Gary Glenn to win the GOP nomination. He will face state Auditor J. D. Williams.

full committee will consider the measure immediately following this markup.

The bill would authorize money for 39,000 local governments to enable them to fund a variety of social programs that were eliminated or curtailed as a result of the recession.

The measure would establish an allocation formula that would take into account major economic indicators such as an area's per capita income and rate of unemployment. Recipients would be allowed to decide how to spend the money.

An earlier version (HR 3601) of the legislation that would have authorized \$53 billion over five years was abandoned by committee Chairman and bill sponsor John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., in an effort to craft legislation more palatable to members with budget concerns.

According to a House Republican staffer, several Republican panel members oppose the bill. But the measure is expected to gain enough support to win approval.

Veterans Health: The House Veterans' Affairs Committee will mark up two measures that would expand eligibility for health services offered by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

One draft bill would authorize the VA to establish a handful of three-year pilot projects to give Medicare-eligible veterans and their dependents with non-life-threatening health problems access to VA hospitals.

Currently these individuals are often denied admission to VA hospitals because the VA does not have the money to provide care for all veterans.

The VA would be reimbursed with existing Medicare funds for receiving these patients. Supporters of the legislation claim that extra funding from Medicare will allow the VA to improve overall services at medical facilities.

• The committee will also consider a measure (HR 5193) that would expand health-care sharing arrangements between the VA and the Department of Defense.

The legislation would give the VA's chief medical director the authority to provide health services on a space-available basis to military retirees and civilian defense employees who are currently eligible for benefits under the Department of Defense's health programs.

Although a number of committee members have expressed concern that HR 5193 might shift VA health resources away from needy veterans, both measures enjoy wide support on the panel and are expected to win approval.

'Baby Bell' Restrictions: The House Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee

tee on Economic and Commercial Law will mark up legislation (HR 5096) that would offer the regional Bell operating companies the chance to enter certain businesses from which they have been barred.

In 1984, AT&T's local phone service monopoly was broken into seven regional phone companies. And federal courts decided that these seven companies, while retaining their monopoly in local phone services, would not be permitted to enter certain businesses where their monopoly power could be used to eliminate competitors.

Under HR 5096, companies could apply in three years for eligibility to provide information services. In five years they would be able to seek approval to manufacture equipment. In seven years, the "Baby Bells" could seek permission to offer long-distance telephone services.

Applications to expand into these areas would have to be approved by the U.S. attorney general and the federal courts. Entry into these fields would be allowed if both the Justice Department and the courts determined that there would be no substantial possibility that a regional Bell company would use its monopoly in local phone service to impede competition in the market it seeks to enter.

While the Bell companies oppose this measure because it would force them to wait to enter these new businesses, the panel is expected to approve the bill.

JFK Files: The House Judiciary Economic and Commercial Law Subcommittee will also mark up a resolution that would lead to the release of nearly all information in U.S. government files about the Nov. 22, 1963, assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The measure (H J Res 454) calls for release of assassination documents and other relevant materials held by numerous agencies, including the National Archives, the CIA and the FBI.

The resolution would create a five-member review board, to be appointed by a federal court, to examine the extensive files on the assassination. All of the material screened by the board would be made public within two years.

CIA director Robert M. Gates told the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee earlier this month that he would support release of the files to clear the agency of suspicion.

And although the Justice Department had originally opposed the release, FBI Director William S. Sessions, whose agency is part of Justice, told the Senate panel that the department would be willing to work with Congress on the legislation.

Public interest in the assassination was renewed after the release of the film "JFK," which attributes the killing to a widespread conspiracy including the CIA and the Mafia.

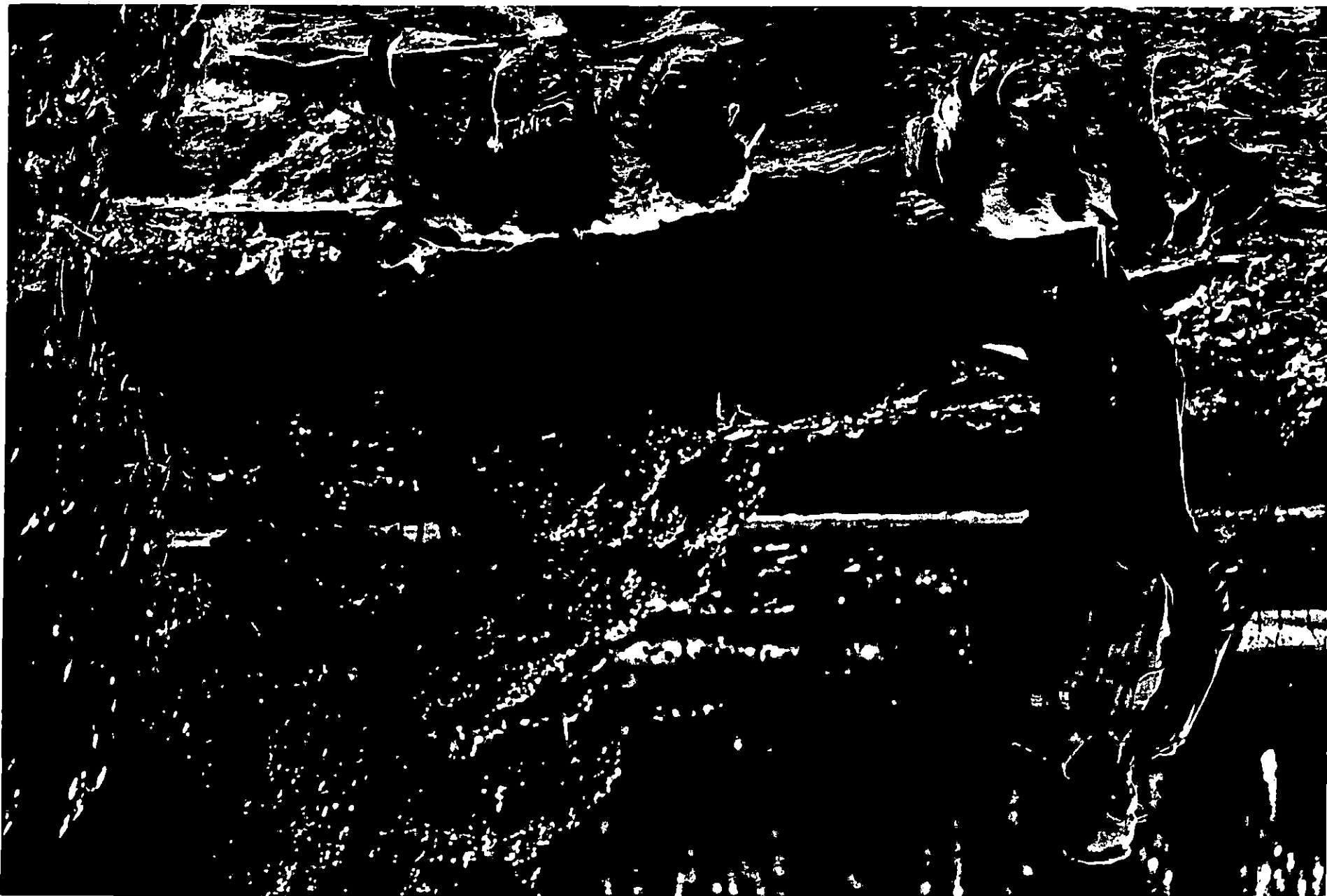

MEMO TO BOB TEETER
FROM PEGGY NOONAN

Bob, two things.

1. I think the President ought to give a speech about race. No American President has had anything interesting to say about race since LBJ, and what he said was interesting not so much because of what he said but how he said it -- he spoke so poetically of how 'we must love one another or die.'

Half the country has conflicted feelings and painful feelings and frustration on this issue. The other night I saw Clarence Thomas and he spoke so movingly of the great uncovered story of our time, the solid, intact, churchgoing black middle and working class families. Last night I saw Peter Jennings and the first thing he wanted to talk about was "all those poor black shopkeepers and owners who got burned out in L.A." These days in America every conversation comes back to race.

No one wants to hear George Bush unveil another 5 point program, but they'd like to hear him speak honestly and even soulfully about his feelings on and thoughts on this issue.

If you think this could fit in somewhere I'll do up a fuller memo with suggestions and ideas for you and the speechwriters.

2. The press is newly excited by my decision not to come down to DC. I'm telling them I'm not coming down for personal reasons and will stay in NY doing policy and political suggestions. (This has the added benefit of being true -- my son rebelled.) There will be a small rumor-storm the next few days. Newsweek had sources saying I'm not coming down because I told the campaign you're not allowed to edit my work -- and I said "It's my way or the highway!" and you or Mosbacher said, "Then it's the highway!" The Washington Times is saying I walked because I've been writing speeches and the President discards them and I'm angry. Everyone is asking me if I'm for Perot, or if I'm in love... Anyway, the best way to discourage all this stuff I think is to simply say, "She's in New York because moving was too much dislocation, if she's not here she can't work with the President on his speeches, but she sends us suggestions from New York and they're helpful and we're happy." Period.

Let me know about idea # 1.

well, the last chance.

And Bob, now is the time to go high risk. Forget prudence and safety and hedging bets. This President has nothing to lose by being daring -- I mean literally, nothing. He better start showing some guts.

Dear Bob,

Here's a returned check. I bet this is the first time a political consultant ever returned you money with the legitimate explanation that they don't deserve it. Having hid from you for two weeks, knowing that if I spoke to you you'd succeed in talking me out of what I know is the right decision, I am now once again answering the phone. I wrote the President a note explaining my thoughts and conclusions, and Bob I have a strong sense that he not only understands my thinking but concurs. Anyway, I'm up here doing my thing and writing my book. I strongly suggest you hire one or two new speechwriters and add them to the extremely talented team of Tell, that fellow from Chaney whose name begins with McC, and Janet Crouse, a new woman on the staff about whom I hear good things.

Bob, I have a stronger sense than ever that the problem for the President isn't words -- how he says things --but policy -- what he wants to do. I do strongly think that L.A. can be an opening for the President if he concludes from it that the answer to his domestic void is Kempian notions regarding opportunity and equality. GB can make himself look classy and future-oriented if, for instance, he gives a speech explaining what an enterprise zone is and why we must go down this path. (Ninety percent of your voters don't know what an enterprise zone is; 90 percent of them would support it if they knew.) By coincidence, I traveled to Alaska with Harrison Hickman as my seatmate. He made the following intriguing points about Bill Clinton:

- (1) His temper. Hickman indicated that Bill Clinton's temper had been a major problem for him. 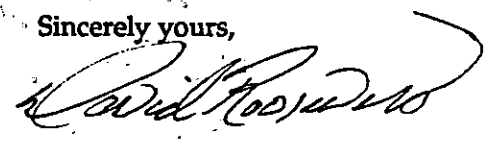
Dear Mr. President:

CROWD CHEERS BUSH'S CALL FOR BETTER SCHOOLS

President Bush took his message of education reform to students, teachers and parents at a Christian school in Marietta on Wednesday, emphasizing his support for giving parents more freedom to bail out of public schools by funneling federal dollars into private schools.

The audience of about 1,000 children and grown-ups, enduring the muggy gymnasium at Mount Paran Christian School, cheered the President's references to traditional family values, a ban on abortion, voluntary school prayer, the blessing about not having to worry about nuclear war any more -- and the effect of choice on education. Bush Cites 'Troubling' Figures On Reading

President Bush Wednesday preempted an Education Department report scheduled to be released Thursday by announcing new "troubling statistics" and saying the nation has "a long way to go" in improving students' reading ability.

Education Secretary Alexander was scheduled to use the report, "Reading In and Out of School," to discuss the urgent need for more involvement by parents in their children's schooling and the lack of emphasis on reading at home and in the classroom.

There has been a longstanding struggle this election year in the White House to extract from Cabinet secretaries newsworthy announcements that Bush could make. Many of his numerous speeches are repetitious policy statements and lack new information and heft that could attract more news coverage.

Wednesday night, Education Department officials appeared not to have known that the White House was releasing part of the reading report. But department spokeswoman Etta Fielek said, "As far as I'm concerned, the President can do whatever he wants."

BUSH TELLS NEW OFFICERS DEFENSE IS A PRIORITY

ANNAPOLIS -- President Bush challenged the nation Wednesday to "avoid the folly" of isolationism and argued against euphoric defense cuts simply because the Cold War is won. "As a nation we have yet to prove we can lead when there is no enemy on the doorstep," Bush told the 1,010 graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy.

Samuel Skinner said Bush will make the foreign policy message a big part of his re-election campaign and expects it to overwhelm doubts on other issues in the final decision of many voters this year. "It's obviously a real strength. You don't run from strength," Skinner said. (Frank Murray, Washington Times, A1)

BUSH STAYING OUT OF PUBLIC ABORTION PLATFORM FIGHT

President Bush is staying out of the Republican Party platform builders' public fight over abortion, but privately the White House has made sure the strong anti-abortion language will remain in the platform, officials said Wednesday.

But Bush's re-election strategists have concluded it is better for the President to say as little as possible about the subject to avoid alienating Republicans who support abortion rights. "The less he personally elevates it, the less emotion and tension there is on the subject," said a campaign official.

Thus, Bush declined to discuss the platform fight when asked Wednesday if the party should make its abortion language more flexible. "We've got a good process working all that out," Bush said, adding that he would leave it to the platform committee.

PRESIDENTIAL RACE A 'THREE-HANDED GAME'

Ross Perot is no longer just a wild card in the presidential campaign. A USA Today analysis shows Perot is showing enough support in the West to pose a potential threat in the electoral college.

USA Today's analysis of 25 state polls found: Bush was first and Perot last in 6 polls before mid-April; Since April 18 -- when the Texas poll showed Perot leading -- Bush has led in eight polls east of the Mississippi. Perot led in 8 Western states; In those later state polls, where nearly half the 538 electoral votes are at stake, Perot's support would earn him 128 votes; Bush would take 115. Leads in earlier polls bring Bush's total to 190.

MAGAZINE SAYS MAJORITY OF BIG BUSINESS CEOS WANT BUSH FOR PRESIDENT

NEW YORK -- Most of Ross Perot's counterparts in the boardrooms of America's biggest businesses would vote for President Bush, Fortune magazine said in a poll released Wednesday.

The poll surveyed 115 chief executives from both the Fortune 500 industrial companies and Fortune 500 service companies. Of the sample, 78% picked Bush, compared to 11% for Perot and 4% for Bill Clinton. The rest were undecided. Forty-four percent said they believed Perot had a serious shot of winning.

REPUBLICAN CHAIRMAN CALLS PEROT 'WALKING CONTRADICTION'

LAS VEGAS -- Richard Bond on Wednesday called Ross Perot a "walking contradiction" who either doesn't know what he stands for or won't tell on such subjects as abortion and gun control.

"Perot says he is for abortion but always shifts the question to adoption," Bond said. "He says he is for gun control, but endorses the NRA. He says he is against government spending, but grew fat on government contracts."

Bond said that although Perot is a "walking contradiction" on the issues, he is doing well in the polls because people believe he would bring a new kind of leadership to the country. Bond also had little good to say about Bill Clinton, whom he called a "failed governor from a small state."

Vice President Quayle, speaking in Colorado before a visit to the Air Force Academy, said Perot could well emerge as Bush's chief rival. "The unexpected has happened," Quayle said. "We will take a Ross Perot candidacy seriously." (AP)

QUAYLE CALLS ON FATHERS TO PUT THEIR KIDS FIRST

AIR FORCE ACADEMY, Colorado -- Vice President Quayle called on fathers Wednesday to put their children first, as he escalated the "traditional values" debate he ignited last week when he criticized single motherhood.

"Just as you fulfill your duties as officers in the armed forces," Quayle admonished male graduates at the Air Force Academy, "never, never forget the obligation that comes first: to be the loyal and loving father that your children deserve."

Sounding like combative former Vice President Spiro Agnew, Quayle also attacked "the cultural elite" in the news media and Hollywood who "will denounce you for raising the subject" of "a poverty of values." But Quayle refused to endorse the repeal of gay rights legislation favored by many Colorado conservatives he's courting. (Brian Weber, Scripps Howard)

HOUSE APPROVES VAST ENERGY BILL

The House passed a massive energy bill Wednesday that would affect virtually everything from the structure of the electric utility industry to the amount of water used by shower heads.

The 381 to 37 vote came after a large majority of members easily defeated an attempt to make oil companies pay the cost of expanding the nation's Strategic Petroleum Reserve. The bill now goes to a conference with the Senate, which passed a similar measure 94 to 4 in February.

Both bills contain parts of President Bush's proposed national energy strategy, but the Administration prefers the Senate version. Secretary Watkins called Thursday's vote "a major victory for President Bush's leadership" in energy policy but said the Administration objects to provisions that would limit state natural gas regulation and offshore oil drilling.

LAWMAKER LINKED TO VIOLATIONS

A supervisor at the House Post Office has told federal prosecutors that he improperly exchanged postage vouchers from Rep. Rostenkowski for cash, in amounts that varied from several hundred dollars to more than \$2,000, according to sources familiar with the grand jury investigation.

The supervisor, James C. Smith, who has been granted immunity from prosecution by U.S. Attorney James Stephens, alleged that the cash transactions totaled between \$18,000 and \$20,000 over the last five years, sources said. House records show Rostenkowski has submitted postage vouchers totaling more than \$24,000 since 1986.

**SDI WOULD COST BILLIONS MORE
THAN ADMINISTRATION ESTIMATES, REPORT SAYS**

Deploying an antimissile defense system will cost \$37 billion over five years, about \$10 billion more than the Bush Administration estimates, a congressional report said Wednesday.

The CBO said costs for SDI from fiscal 1994 to fiscal 1997 would be about \$8 billion a year. President Bush has requested \$5.4 billion for the system in the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

In a statement, the SDI office said it will study the report to determine its technical merits. The Pentagon agency pointed out that the report said delaying deployment could result in increased problems and that savings from alternative plans would eventually have to be spent if a system is built.

Leaders of the arts community spent Wednesday complaining to Congress that artistic freedom and their decision-making authority have been undermined by acting NEA Chairman Anne-Imelda Radice.

Susan Krane, curator of 20th century art at the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, said she and other members of an NEA sculpture panel halted their deliberations because Miss Radice had "severely compromised" the review process.

INDUSTRIAL POLLUTION: A HAZY PICTURE

The nation's factories released 4.8 billion pounds of toxic chemicals, including many cancer-causing substances, into the air, ground and water in 1990, about 11 percent less than the year before, the EPA reported Wednesday.

But the EPA cautioned that some of the reductions may only reflect changes in reporting techniques used by companies. And while overall numbers were reduced, the volume of toxic chemicals poured into rivers, lakes, and streams increased by 4 million pounds, or about 2% in 1990, the agency said.

Nevertheless, EPA officials said the pollution figures covering 313 toxic chemicals used at 23,648 industrial plants seemed to represent a steady movement toward reduced emissions since the reports were first required in 1988.

COMMUTER AIRCRAFT SAFETY MOVE HAILED

The NTSB declared victory Wednesday in one of its most important safety goals -- ground-proximity warning devices on commuter aircraft.

The board voted to remove the aircraft safety system from its "most wanted" list of transportation safety improvements after the FAA published a rule requiring that all commercial passenger aircraft install the systems, which audibly warn a pilot that an aircraft is approaching the ground too rapidly.

ECONOMISTS SEE SUSTAINED RECOVERY

The nation's top business economists are optimistic the recovering economy will not fall back into recession, according to a forecast released Wednesday.

The National Association of Business Economists predicted that gross domestic product in the second quarter would increase 2.6%, up from a previous estimate of 2.1%, made in February.

Evidence of increased consumer confidence turned up in Wednesday's report of a gain in durable-goods orders. The orders rose 1.4% in April, after gains of 2.3% in March, 0.2% in February and 2.3% in January, the Commerce Department reported. The four-month increase is the longest sequence of growth in five years, the government said.

CHILD PORNOGRAPHY LAW HELD UNCONSTITUTIONAL

A federal judge has declared unconstitutional provisions of a child pornography law that required elaborate record-keeping for sexually explicit images of adults.

Judge Stanley Sporkin said he and the plaintiffs condemn child pornography and if the record-keeping had been limited to material involving under-aged models "it would be constitutional." "It becomes impermissible only because the act reaches all individuals engaged in sexually explicit conduct regardless of age." He barred its enforcement against anyone who exercises "due diligence to satisfy themselves that the subjects in these images are over 18 years of age."

Justice Department Spokesman Paul McNulty said the Justice Department is reviewing Sporkin's opinion and will decide later whether to appeal.

BUSH ACTS TO TIGHTEN OAS SEA EMBARGO AGAINST HAITI

Moving to tighten the economic noose around Haiti's military-backed regime, the Bush Administration prepared Wednesday to close U.S. ports to ships trading with Haiti.

U.S. officials expressed hope Wednesday that other OAS nations would also quickly restrict port access. They said this would force shippers to rethink their trade with Haiti.

COAST GUARD RETURNS 524 HAITIANS

The Coast Guard repatriated 524 Haitians -- including 272 picked up at sea Tuesday -- and the White House said President Bush's policy allowing the return of refugees without the usual immigration interviews was working "unusually well."

The White House said Wednesday there are now fewer Haitian boats "consequently putting fewer people at risk." It also reported that a growing number of refugees are applying for visas at the U.S. embassy in Port-au-Prince.

The Coast Guard said 272 Haitians were rescued in international waters Tuesday by the cutter Confidence. Petty Officer Toni Long said the 272 -- all rescued from one 35-foot boat -- were returned to Port-au-Prince Wednesday without first being interviewed by INS agents.

Rep. Shaw said the Bush Administration had taken the only alternative available and was "bending over backwards to try to accommodate them without opening the floodgates for massive migration to the U.S., which for south Florida would be a disaster."

New York Mayor Dinkins called Bush's policy "shockingly inhumane." Wade Henderson of the NAACP said, "The forced return of Haitian refugees with such insensitivity to the political dangers they face is cruel and unconscionable." (UPI)

U.N. OFFICIAL REBUKES U.S. ON HAITIANS

The U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees, Sadako Ogata of Japan, in Geneva sharply criticized the Bush Administration Wednesday for returning Haitian refugees to Haiti without giving them the chance to appeal for protection and asylum.

Ogata said in a letter to Under Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger that she was "deeply disturbed" by President Bush's executive order on the Haitians Sunday. She said the order "denies those Haitians genuinely in need of international protection the opportunity to present their claims, thus exposing them to risk upon their return to Haiti."

BUSH DEFENDS TURNBACK OF HAITIAN BOAT PEOPLE

President Bush on Wednesday defended his decision to turn back Haitians fleeing their homeland, saying "we cannot and will not open our doors to economic refugees from all over the world."

Bush conceded that "to some it appears to be a racist policy," but he said he would deny that. The President told students, parents and educators at the Mount Paran Christian School that he is convinced that people in Haiti are not being physically oppressed by the military-controlled government.

Bill Clinton, meanwhile, said he was "appalled" by the turnback policy. "This policy must not stand," Clinton said in a statement. "It is a blow to the principle of first asylum and to America's moral authority in defending the rights of refugees around the world. This most recent policy shift is another sad example of the Administration's callous response to a terrible human tragedy."

He said that if he were president, he would grant temporary asylum to the refugees until the U.S. restored Haiti's elected government.

Bush Strongly Defends Policy Of Returning Haitians

ATLANTA -- President Bush Wednesday staunchly defended his new policy of forcibly returning fleeing Haitian refugees to their homeland, saying America will not permit entry to those he described as primarily economic, not political, refugees.

Bush likened the situation in Haiti to a bazaar, where hapless refugees were being taken advantage of by those seeking exorbitant fees for rickety boat rides, and described the new U.S. policy as putting a compassionate end to such extortion by dissuading potential travelers from making the trip.

Rep. Rangel said Wednesday an embargo to force an end to military rule in Haiti has failed because several countries, including Venezuela, France, Great Britain and the Dominican Republic, have ignored it.

Rangel called on the President to "act decisively" to tighten the embargo and show that "we really mean business." Rangel also called for negotiations with Haitian military leaders, suggesting that Bush dispatch Colin Powell to Haiti to talk. "We need to convince them that we really mean business this time," Rangel said. "Colin Powell should go and convince them that they are in a weak position. That ought not to be a hard sell."

**'THE STREET WAS A RIVER OF BLOOD'
20 Die in Sarajevo Shelling; EC Votes Yugoslav Sanctions**

BELGRADE -- A volley of mortar fire crashed into a crowded marketplace in besieged Sarajevo Wednesday, killing at least 20 civilians and wounding more than a hundred others in what local officials described as perhaps the bloodiest single attack of Bosnia's two-month-old factional war.

Officials of Bosnia's Muslim-dominated government told journalists that the mortar fire came from the same Serb batteries around Sarajevo that have been raining shells on the city for weeks, but Serb militia commanders called the assertion "Muslim propaganda" and insisted that none of their troops had fired the fatal rounds....

Meeting in Brussels Wednesday, EC officials agreed to ban trade with the new Yugoslav union, freeze export credits and suspend all scientific and technical cooperation with the Belgrade government. The EC officials had also considered an oil embargo, but sources close to the EC discussions said it was likely the conferees would leave such a step to the U.N., which is also readying tough sanctions against Belgrade.

The U.S. is conferring with other members of the U.N. Security Council on a package of economic sanctions against the Belgrade government, and U.S. officials said they were hopeful the Council would be ready to vote on the matter by Friday. In Washington, meanwhile, Richard Boucher described the latest Bosnian bloodshed as "cruelty and suffering," the like of which "Europe has not seen... since 1945." Boucher also said that the U.S. considers "Serbia and its allies in the so-called Yugoslav military overwhelmingly responsible for this appalling tragedy."

**NO CONCESSIONS OFFERED TO EUROPEANS
IN WASHINGTON TRADE TALKS, U.S. SAYS**

Secretary Baker and two other cabinet members met for six hours Wednesday with the top trade official of the EC in an effort to settle a bitter transatlantic dispute over farm subsidies that has deadlocked five years of talks to invigorate the global rules of trade.

After the talks broke up, Carla Hills said the American side had offered no concessions to Frans Andriessen, the EC commissioner for foreign affairs and trade, during the meeting at Blair House. Instead, Hills said the Bush Administration offered "a number of suggestions" on how the EC could expand its reforms so they deal directly with issues in the trade talks. These include limits on subsidies for overseas sales and lowering of European trade barriers. "We are trying to be creative and make suggestions incorporating what they have already done into what we hope they will do," Hills said.

The Europeans, though, have declared the announced reforms are as far as they can go politically. Nonetheless, Hills said Andriessen will take the U.S. proposals back to Europe for evaluation by the EC and its 12 member nations.

U.S. CAUTIONS RUSSIA ON INVESTMENT SNAGS

MOSCOW -- Deputy Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger, in a speech inside the Kremlin Wednesday night, warned Russian authorities and business interests that American investment in the former Soviet Union is still "severely, if not fatally, hampered" by bureaucratic restrictions and uncertainties.

Eagleburger, speaking to the Trade and Economic Council of U.S. and Russian businessmen, said the U.S. is determined to build a "lasting partnership" with the nations of the former Soviet Union as they move toward democracy and capitalism.

But he cautioned the Russians that American investors cannot be forced to do business here -- and are unlikely to invest if the climate does not improve. Eagleburger cited shifting, confusing laws and regulations; huge increases in tax rates for foreigners and foreign companies; uncertainty about who owns what and who controls Russia's vast natural resources, with various levels of government competing for the wealth; and the former Soviet Union's \$190 million debt to American companies.

EX-FOES MAY JOIN TECHNOLOGY PACT

Secretary Baker has proposed that members of the former Soviet bloc be given associate membership in the Cold War-era organization that kept sensitive technology out of the hands of the Soviet Union and its allies, U.S. and diplomatic sources confirmed Wednesday.

The idea is among a package of U.S. proposals that would give a dramatically different focus to the Coordinating Committee on Multilateral Export Controls, known as Cocom. The initiative is to be discussed Monday at a high-level Cocom meeting in Paris.

Baker wrote to U.S. allies last week, proposing that nations of the former East bloc be invited to join a Cocom "cooperation council." Baker's suggestion, officials said, is designed to encourage former communist nations to enact control regulations more quickly.

NATO SEEKS FLEXIBILITY IN PEACE ROLE

BRUSSELS -- NATO members Wednesday endorsed plans for using the alliance's troops as peacekeepers in conflicts throughout Europe, a decision that, if approved, would permit it to send its forces to war-torn Yugoslavia. But Secretary Cheney said the U.S. does not "have at present... any plans for our forces to be involved in Yugoslavia."

Under the proposal, NATO soldiers could be sent on peacekeeping missions mounted by the 51-nation CSCE. Cheney said he expected that NATO foreign ministers would approve the plan in a meeting next week in Oslo.

VIETNAM SAID TO PUSH FOR IMPROVED TIES WITH U.S.

Vietnam pushed for rapid normalization of ties with the U.S. in a high-level meeting but Washington is adhering to its step-by-step approach, the State Department said Wednesday. The exchange came during a meeting Tuesday between Undersecretary of State Arnold Kanter and Vietnamese Vice Foreign Minister Tran Quang Co.

During the meeting, Kanter reviewed the status of U.S. efforts to resolve the fate of 2,266 American servicemen from the Vietnam war who are unaccounted for and stressed the need for achieving "the fullest possible accounting" of these Americans, Richard Boucher said.

Co "reaffirmed Vietnam's commitment to implement the five-point agreement on POW/MIA cooperation that was reached during Assistant Secretary Solomon's March 4-5 visit to Hanoi, as well as the U.N. peace settlement for Cambodia," Boucher added. (Reuter)

U.N. AGENCY BACKS FOOD IRRADIATION

GENEVA -- The World Health Organization intervened in the controversy over food irradiation Wednesday, describing it as a "perfectly sound" way to preserve world food supplies.

The U.N. health body said food safety specialists at a meeting in Geneva last week concluded food irradiated up to a certain level presented no toxic danger or nutritional problems.

ABC's Peter Jennings: We begin tonight with a ruthless civil war. We have been reporting for many weeks now on the civil war in Bosnia-Herzegovina -- part of what used to Yugoslavia. Today, in just one incident the cameras have captured just how outright ruthless it has become. Serbian forces which have been trying to dominate the Muslims and Croats in the republic had agreed to a truce in the capital Sarajevo. Hundreds of already shell-shocked residents came out of their shelters. They made a terrible mistake. Twenty people died. Hundreds were wounded. As ABC's David Ensor reports tonight, some people believe that a monster is waging war against them.

Ensor reports eyewitnesses say 3 mortar shells exploded where people were lined up in the street to get bread. The attack shattered another truce. In an interview, Serbia's foreign minister said the attack was crime against humanity. Serbian officials insist that they cannot control the irregular forces around Sarajevo, and that the massacre was not their fault.

Jennings reports it was a week ago in Washington that the Bosnian foreign minister pleaded for help: My country, he said then, has become a slaughterhouse, and the world's inaction is a disgrace. The words and today's action apparently have hit home. As ABC's John McWethy reports, the U.S. has decided it perhaps should now play a leading role in trying to end the carnage.

McWethy reports the continuing slaughter is now being blamed on just one group and its leaders. In a number of different ways and places the U.S. government today underscored that point. Lawrence Eagleburger was visiting Moscow.

(Eagleburger: "There is simply no question in our minds that at this stage Serbia and the Serbians inside Serbia is principally responsible for what is going on.")

For weeks the U.S. said it was waiting for Europe to act. Now the U.S. is working in the U.N. Security Council on a resolution that would cut off oil shipments, air traffic and all other trade to Serbia. France, China and Russia, all of whom have a veto on the Security Council, want a more gradual approach starting with an air embargo. In Brussels today, the EC finally passed its own set of sanctions -- a trade embargo that does not include cutting off oil. The defense minister of Bosnia today asked for the U.S. to intervene with the Sixth Fleet. U.S. officials continue to say that sending in American troops is not on the list of moves they are considering.

ABC's Jim Laurie reports that in an interview, Serbia's president Slobodan Milosevic denounced sanctions as unjust. He insists Serbia is not to blame for the war in Bosnia.

(Milosevic: "We were not provoking or supporting hostilities. Hostilities are absolutely against interests of Serbs in Bosnia.") The Serbian leader blames the West for encouraging the break-up of Yugoslavia.

(Milosevic: "We are blamed practically just because of one fact that we wanted to preserve our existing country.")

In an attempt to satisfy the West, Serbia says it is withdrawing some army units from Bosnia. But the reality is that 65,000 of those Serbian troops were born in Bosnia. They will stay. It's not clear whether they will take any orders at all from president Milosevic as they fight to seize more Bosnian land continues. So while international sanctions will put more pressure on Milosevic and his government, there is little likelihood that it will stop the war. (ABC-Lead)

NBC's Tom Brokaw: Good evening from Los Angeles where tonight one month after the trouble began there is a continuing uneasy peace, but half around the world the tribal wars of what once Yugoslavia reached new lows today. Serbian forces struck directly at innocent civilians in Bosnia, and while the West was outraged, not much is expected to change.

NBC's Tom Aspell reports the U.S. once again strongly criticized Serbia.

(Richard Boucher: "I reiterate that we consider Serbia and its allies and the so-called Yugoslav military to bear overwhelming responsibility for this appalling tragedy.")

In Belgrade the Serbs were in no mood listen to anybody. Voicelav Sheshill [phonetic], a radical leader popular among the working classes here, said that the U.S. and the EC states were now Serbia's enemies. Serbia is not Iraq he said. If anyone tries to fight it, they will be defeated. Extremists here are confident that the West will never intervene militarily to stop the killing. But in the end, that's exactly what may be necessary because sanctions against Serbia are probably not going to work. Serbia's military has stockpiled food and fuel to last for months. And the country can feed itself for longer. As for Western military intervention, it does not appear imminent.

(Secretary Cheney: "We are not contemplating at present certainly because we've not been asked to -- not contemplating any deployment of U.S. military forces to the region.")

Today the Red Cross announced it was suspending activities in the area. (NBC-Lead)

CBS's Dan Rather: Blood was pouring down the main street of Sarajevo today. At least 20 men, women and children were killed. And more than 100 were wounded as shells rained down on civilians in the capital of Bosnia. The atrocity by Serbian troops sparked new calls for foreign help for the helpless in Bosnia and an end to the wars that have shattered Yugoslavia.

CBS's David Martin reports the slaughter in Sarajevo cries out for action.

(Richard Boucher: "The situation in the city is terrible. Europe has not seen such cruelty and suffering since 1945. Time for excuses and procrastinations is gone.")

But U.S. officials say it will be Friday at the earliest before the U.N. Security Council takes up a resolution to impose economic sanctions against Yugoslavia. And if that doesn't work, there are voices calling for the U.S. to mount a military campaign against Yugoslavia much as it did against Iraq.

(Bob Schneider, Croatian-American Association: "We heard a lot during the Kuwait crisis about how this was not over oil -- that it was over morality and people being oppressed. And we have the same situation now, and we think the U.S. has a moral obligation.") U.S. officials admit they have been sluggish in their reaction to Yugoslavia's nightmare but reject suggestions they would be willing to do more if not just lives but oil were at stake as it was in Kuwait. For the moment, Bush Administration officials say the U.S. military is prepared to airlift relief supplies into Sarajevo but only if the Yugoslav government guarantees safe passage.

TRIP/ANNAPOLIS

Jennings: From the U.S. and Russia [regarding the graduating class at the Derzinsky Naval Academy in St. Petersburg] tonight, two very different assessments of the future. First, Annapolis, where it was graduation day at the U.S. Naval Academy. It was a chance for President Bush to present his view of a very active American military role in the new world order.

ABC's Brit Hume: The President outlined for the graduates a vastly changed world and then sent forth a U.S. defense posture not so vastly changed.

(TV coverage of President Bush speaking.)

It reflected this President's view of his and his country's continuing role in the world, a world now threatened he said by regional conflicts that had long been submerged by the East-West struggle.

(President Bush: "Ancient hatred, ethnic rivalry frozen in time threaten to revive themselves and to reignite.")

He cited the civil slaughter in what was Yugoslavia and friction among the former Soviet states. He called for passage of his proposed aid for those states. But mostly he called for a far-flung military establishment with worldwide responsibilities for keeping the peace.

(President Bush: "America is safest at home when we stand as a force for stability in the world. And this I pledge as Commander-and-Chief: America's forces will continue to be the best trained, the best equipped and the most battle-ready forces anywhere in the entire world.")

The President warned the nation against turning away from the global role he favors but which has earned him criticism from those on both the left and right who think the country's energies must now be committed at home.

(President Bush: "More than once we've come late to conflict and turned back mortal threats to freedom. But as a nation we have yet to prove that we can lead when there is no enemy on the doorstep.")

The electorate may be in no mood for such challenges. But this President, who seems so utterly flexible on domestic policy, has fixed views on foreign policy. And what the public thinks about it seems to matter much less.

PEROT/TALKING WITH ED ROLLINS AND HAMILTON JORDAN

Brokaw: George Bush and Bill Clinton won the Tuesday primaries in Kentucky, Idaho and Arkansas. But these days Ross Perot is stealing the march on both men. He got on the ballot in Texas today, and his supporters continue to collect petition signatures around the country. At the same time, Perot is also collecting something else: some heavyweight political help.

NBC's John Cochran: NBC News has learned that Ross Perot is trying to sign up some former top guns from both parties. Today a spokesman for Perot confirmed that Democrat Hamilton Jordan and Republican Ed Rollins are under consideration for major jobs in the Perot campaign. Jordan plotted the winning strategy for Jimmy Carter 16 years ago and then served not so successfully as White House Chief of Staff in Carter's one-term presidency. Rollins was the campaign manager for Ronald Reagan's landslide re-election in 1984. But in 1988 Rollins criticized George Bush for choosing Dan Quayle as his running mate.

(TV coverage of President Bush with Dan Quayle.)

Rollins and Bush still have a mutual dislike even though Rollins' wife Sherrie is a White House staffer. Bush forced Rollins to quit as co-chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign after Rollins' scorned the President for reneging for his no-new-taxes pledge. Neither Rollins nor Hamilton Jordan has so far agreed to join Perot's campaign. Only two months ago Rollins thought Perot had no chance.

(Rollins: "There's no viable chance of him beating George Bush or beating Bill Clinton. There is a viable chance that he could get 10% of the vote.")

Rollins has since changed his mind, saying Perot can take voters from both Bush and Clinton. Today Bush and Clinton were pushing their interest in schools.

(TV coverage of President Bush at a school.)

Aides for both believe or hope that Perot's popularity will nose dive when he starts taking specific stands on specific issues. But Dan Quayle said today that Ross Perot could be the President's main rival this fall, and said Quayle, "We will take a Ross Perot candidacy seriously." (NBC-6)

Rather: Ross Perot is expected to make his official, independence bid for the presidency sometime next month. Today he qualified to be on the ballots in the home state of Texas and in Florida. So far Perot's been declared eligible to run in eight states total. The Perot factor is having a big impact on the presidential campaign, and it's growing.

CBS's Susan Spencer: To the dismay of the White House, Ross Perot is talking these days to some big-name Republicans and among them is Ed Rollins, who ran Ronald Reagan's 1984 presidential campaign. Rollins tells CBS News that he will hold off any decision on any possible offer until he has at least met Mr. Perot. The idea of a competitive three-man race has thrown both parties into a tizzy. That may be why Vice President Quayle seemed eager to narrow things down a bit.

(Quayle: "It could well be that Ross Perot will be our major opponent this fall. That would be unusual. It would be a bit surprising. But perhaps not surprising in the type of election campaign that we've had thus far.")

With the unpredictable Perot at the race with his billions and his populism, all 50 states suddenly are up for grabs.

(Charles Black: "It puts the two major party nominee's campaigns in the position of having to really stretch their resources to run actively in all the states.")

And a three-way split could give, for example, Clinton a shot at the South or the President a chance in Democratic strongholds -- say in New York.

(TV coverage of President Bush shaking hands with members of armed forces.)

(Michael Barone, U.S. News and World Report: "They'll be having to campaign all over the country and they'll be having to send different messages because the message that works for you in Texas may not work for you in California, and the California message may not work in the Great Lakes. And you've got to try all three of them.")

About that message: neither Mr. Bush nor Clinton has gone very negative against Perot. That could alienate voters needed later. And any notion of running as an outsider seems downright silly as long as Perot is around. Though both candidates are trying.

(Clinton: "I don't blame anybody for being mad at the establishment. The question is what are we going to do to change it?")

Mr. Bush's camp says he'll keep talking change too and for now, let others subtly attack Perot.

(TV coverage of President Bush at a school.)

(Black: "He really hasn't been part of problems or solutions. So he's untested as a political leader, and people know they would be taking a huge risk to put him in charge.")

A senior Bush adviser added today that Ross Perot is like a shooting star. And like a shooting star, he said, he will flame out. It sounded somehow almost as much a hope as a prediction.

(NBC's Lisa Myers reports all the presidential candidates have endorsed welfare reform. But Bill Clinton argues that Gov. Wilson's proposal is too harsh.

Instead, Clinton's welfare plan would require recipients to take community service jobs after 2 years if they haven't found work. For all his rhetoric about welfare reform, President Bush has no comprehensive plan and won't comment on California's.

He does want to let welfare recipients save more before they're thrown off the rolls.

(President Bush in Oval Office, recent presentation on urban agenda: "I believe the limit now is a thousand dollars, and I think were talking now about ten thousand.)

And he has endorsed plans like California's which deny an increase in benefits to women who have more children. Ross Perot opposes that.

(Perot: "If this child is coming into the world, I think from that point of view it's unconscionable not to care for that child.")

ABORTION/CALIFORNIA AND OHIO

Brokaw says in California a judge struck down a state law requiring unmarried girls under 18 to get permission from a parent or a judge before they have an abortion. And a judge in Ohio ruled that a Ohio state law requiring counseling for women seeking abortion was unconstitutional.

Rather reports a new study indicates that anti-drug and safe-sex messages are just not getting through to them [inner-city black teenagers] even if the messenger is a role model such as Jesse Jackson or Magic Johnson. This study says African-American teenagers consider them to be part of mainstream culture, not part of theirs.

SANCTIONS ON IRAQ/U.N.

Rather reports the U.N. Security Council decided today to continue sanctions against Saddam, saying Saddam has refused to comply with important parts of the cease-fire resolution. Nuclear inspectors in Baghdad reported that Saddam is stonewalling questions about where he got the materials for his nuclear weapons program.

VICE PRESIDENT'S MCLEAN HOUSE RENTED TO UNMARRIED COUPLE

Brokaw says Vice President Quayle got a lot of attention recently for criticizing Murphy Brown's morals. Well, it turns out that while the Vice President may not approve of unwed mothers, his McLean, VA, home is being rented to an unmarried couple. A spokesman for the Vice President said the rental was made without his knowledge.

VICE PRESIDENT QUAYLE/MURPHY BROWN

Family Values -- "The Bush Administration's initiatives certainly don't match in breadth or imagination the dimensions of the problem described by Mr. Quayle in his San Francisco speech. Enterprise zones, tenant ownership of public housing, tuition vouchers and welfare revisions won't help much without a massive campaign to provide jobs in the inner cities.... Yet President Bush has already labeled as unacceptable a Senate-passed bill that includes everything he sought for the cities plus \$1.5 billion for jobs. "Wasn't it the Americans who pressed the Europeans for years to assume more responsibility for their own continent? And we must not forget that Paris has given assurances that if the Western Alliance or one of its members is attacked, the entire corps will come under NATO command. So why complain?"

"Italy is siding with Washington on the French-German Eurocorps, out of fear that it may lead to a 'duplication' of U.S. and European interests and military strategies."
(Corriere della Sera, Italy)

YUGOSLAVIA

"The worst aspect of all this, from Bush's point of view, is that the televised scenes of anarchy in Bosnia are reminding Americans of scenes of anarchy in America: the burning and looting of Los Angeles. Instead of presiding over a New World Order, George Bush now looks like a helpless spectator of the spread of anarchy at home and abroad. In the circumstances, I think American-led military intervention against Serbia is now probable. True, no vital American interest is at stake in Bosnia, as there was in Kuwait. But there is a vital White House interest at stake: the re-election of George Bush. He would probably feel safe enough if there were only Bill Clinton to contend with.... But with Ross Perot in the field, the outcome in November is unpredictable... Those are adequate reasons for adopting a forward policy in what was Yugoslavia."

U.S. officials are increasingly concerned...by the fact that repeated, unpunished aggressions by Slobodan Milosevic's regime mock the words spoken by Washington about the New World Order at the time of the Gulf War. "At the order of President Bush, Baker gave the Serbian conquest warriors a harsher dressing down in Lisbon than what has been heard from the White House or the State Department so far.... Baker's reference to the 'humanitarian nightmare' marks at least a verbal turnabout. However, in terms of the issue, there is no change in the cautious U.S. policy, which is accompanied by only moderate public interest. Stepped up sanctions against Belgrade? Maybe. Threatening gestures with the 6th Fleet off Dubrovnik? Preferably not." (Frankfurter Allgemeine, Germany)

"[Referring to Secretary Baker's remarks concerning a possible military intervention], this is a threat that need not be taken seriously in Belgrade. Because if the U.S. were really serious, they would have had to put not only an oral but also a military escalation in process.... Much more effective than announcements that cannot be fulfilled, could be Baker's assessment of Belgrade's policies as 'barbaric.'" (Sueddeutsche Zeitung, Germany)

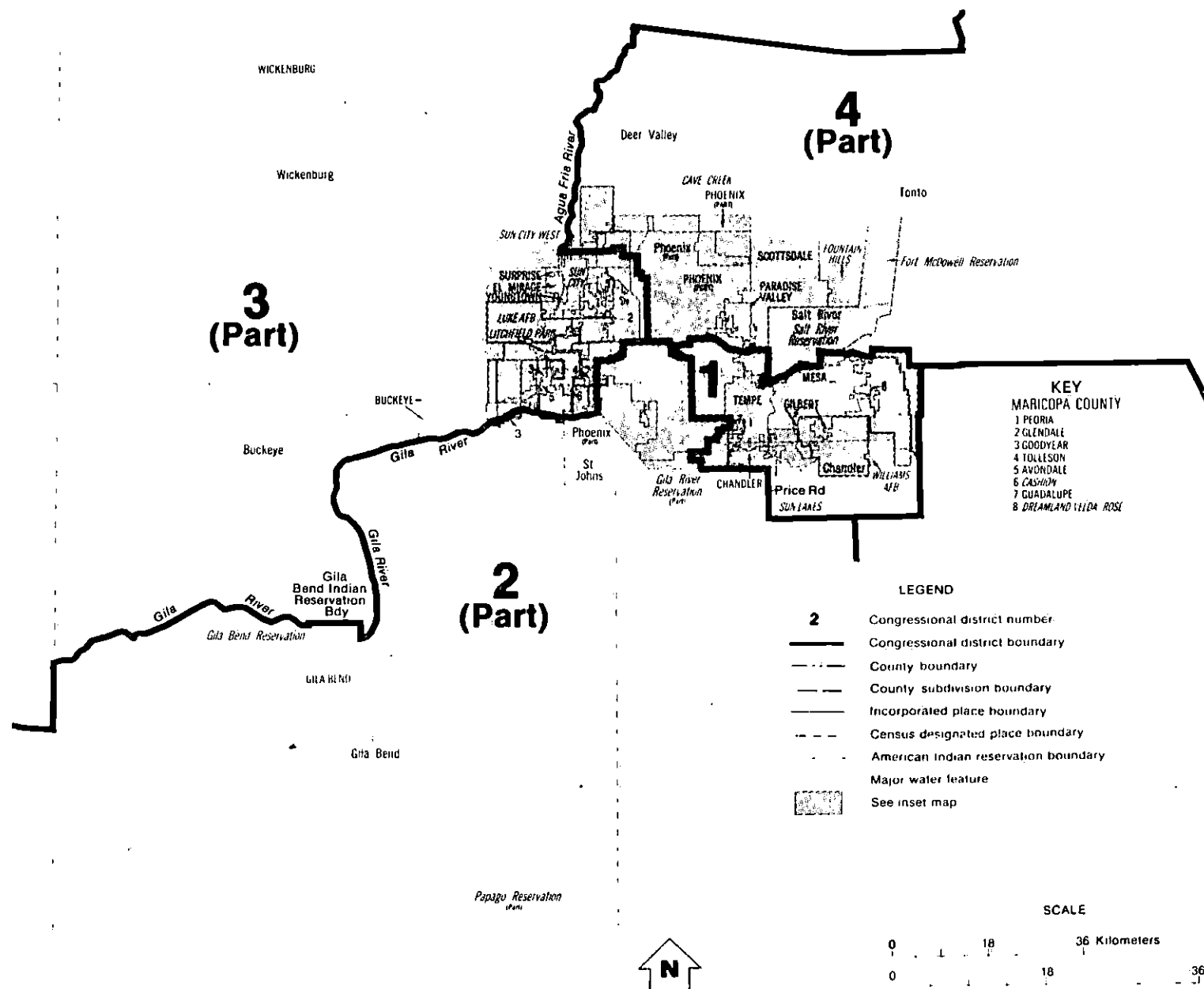
ARIZONA — Congressional Districts, Counties, and Selected Places — (5 Districts)

SUBJECT: ARIZONA

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor Fife Symington has written you on the following topics:

-- Concern about the management of the Federally-owned national forest lands in Arizona.

-- Support for your efforts in response to the civil unrest in Los Angeles.

-- Concern about his state's FY 1992 share allotment under Title XIX of the Social Security Act. Although Arizona was granted only half of its original request, Governor Symington thanked Sam Skinner for personally informing him of the outcome of Arizona's request.

State Senator Gus Arzberger (D-Phoenix) expressed his concern about the Federal government and the Arizona Nature Conservancy acquiring private property in the state, thereby weakening the tax base of rural jurisdictions.

Phoenix Mayor Paul Johnson, Mesa Mayor Peggy Rubach, Tempe Mayor Harry Mitchell and Scottsdale Mayor Herbert Drinkwater all wrote to ask you to direct the EPA to end, or at the least extend, the timetables on numerous water regulations affecting the Phoenix-metropolitan area.

Tucson Mayor George Miller asked you to implement legislation that codifies Arizona's Department of Commerce Defense Restructuring Program.

Santa Cruz County Chair Ronald Morriss requested your support in urging Governor Symington to declare his county an economic disaster area, since it has suffered from excessive rainfall.

II. Discussion

A. Fort McDowell Reservation/Gaming

A very visible issue in Arizona at the present time is the gaming controversy surrounding the Fort McDowell Apache Indian Reservation, which is located east of Phoenix.

On May 7th, the U.S. Attorney for the District of Arizona obtained a search and seizure warrant to confiscate all video gambling machines located at four gaming establishments in the Phoenix area. The raids were conducted on May 12th and all were successful except for the one at Fort McDowell, where over 100 individuals and vehicles blocked the entrance to the gaming center. Federal law enforcement officials who had seized the gaming machines were thus prevented from moving the confiscated material off the reservation.

Arizona Indian leaders united behind the Fort McDowell Apaches and Governor Symington met with the Fort McDowell tribal leaders to arrange a ten day "cooling off" period, during which time the gaming machines would remain in the vans.

At the end of the ten days, May 21st, Governor Symington met with the leaders of all five tribes affected by the four gaming center raids and offered a plan that would allow the gaming machines to stay on the reservation but with set limits on their operations. Please note that this issue remains unresolved.

B. Arizona State Legislature

Legislative stalemate has resulted from a Democratically controlled Senate and a Republican controlled House. In an effort to prompt consideration of the FY 1993 budget, the House has effectively shut down its regular session and persuaded Governor Symington to call a special session of the legislature to deal specifically with the budget, which must be enacted by June 30th. It is possible that the Governor and the House Republicans will use this tactic again, in order to force action on other extremely contentious issues.

C. Unemployment Figures

As of March of this year, Arizona's unemployment rate was 8.4 percent compared to 4.7 percent in March of 1991. The City of Phoenix had an unemployment rate of 7.5 percent in March of 1992, up from 4.1 percent a year before.

D. Navajo Generating Station

As you know from your visit to the Grand Canyon last September, the Navajo Generating Station is a huge coal-fired plant that does not have sulphur dioxide emissions controls. During your trip, EPA issued a plan to reduce sulphur dioxide emissions from the plant by 90 percent, at a cost lower than the original 70 percent emissions reduction proposal. The key part of the plan, installation of high-tech scrubbers, will cost an estimated \$1.2 billion.

When the plan is complete in 1999, the Navajo powerplant will have the lowest sulphur dioxide emissions rating of any coal-fired powerplant in the country. This agreement marks the first time an existing powerplant has reduced its emissions because of visibility impairment under the Clean Air Act amendments of 1977.

E. Glen Canyon Dam Environmental Impact Statement

The Glen Canyon Dam is located immediately upstream from the Grand Canyon and is used to provide electricity for the surrounding area. The Bureau of Reclamation is preparing an environmental impact statement on the operations of the Glen Canyon Dam in an effort to evaluate alternative ways of operating the dam which would balance wildlife, recreational and energy needs. To date, the Bureau has received over 17,000 written comments from interested parties.

The draft environmental impact statement is scheduled for completion in February of 1993, with the final statement due in May of 1994.

F. Surface Transportation

Arizona's apportionment is estimated at \$238 million for FY 1992 compared to \$164 million from FY 1991. As of May 12th, \$80 million had already been obligated.

Under the provisions of ISTEA \$1.6 billion has been allocated for Arizona from FY 1992 through FY 1997.

G. Drugs

PCP and LSD are the most abused drugs in the City of Phoenix, while Mexican-produced marijuana is the most readily available.

The lucrative crack cocaine trade is primarily controlled by the Los Angeles-based "Crips" and "Bloods" gangs. Both are a known force in the major cities of Arizona.

Total Federal anti-drug assistance to Arizona has increased from \$9.7 million in FY 1989 to an estimated \$19.3 million in FY 1992.

H. Arizona 2000

On December 12, 1991, Education Secretary Lamar Alexander participated in the official kick-off announcement of Arizona 2000 with Governor Fife Symington. Since that time, the Governor's office has been extremely helpful in developing a state-wide strategy.

Governor Symington has created an Education Task Force which is in the process of issuing a report on educational reform across the state and is organizing a committee to lead the Arizona 2000 effort.

Currently, there is not an official Phoenix 2000 effort.

I. "AZScam"

Last year, seven members of the legislature were arrested by the Phoenix police and charged in Maricopa County with accepting large financial contributions in return for their vote on a bill which would have

legalized gambling in Arizona. Six members plea bargained and received sentences ranging from probation to six years in prison. The seventh member is currently standing trial.

J. Sweet Potato Whitefly Infestation

During the past several years, the sweet potato whitefly has plagued Arizona agriculture. In 1991, the situation was so bad that many crops had to be left unharvested. So far in the 1992 growing season, state agricultural officials have documented a higher whitefly count than ever.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has accelerated its research activities geared towards finding a solution to eradicate the sweet potato whitefly. A national conference was hosted in February in Houston to bring together top officials from USDA, state and local government, academia, and the private sector.

In the FY 1993 budget, USDA has allocated \$6.1 million in funding for whitefly research, up from \$2.7 million this fiscal year.

K. Water Shortage

Some Arizona farmers are experiencing serious financial hardship in trying to pay for Central Arizona Project (CAP) water for crop irrigation. Through an agreement with the Federal government in 1968, Arizona and several surrounding states were allocated water from the Colorado River. At present though, this water has become extremely costly for agricultural irrigation with regard to Arizona. Because of CAP's expensive water rates, some farmers are pumping groundwater for their needs. Unfortunately, this is not a satisfactory solution either, because electric costs are also very high.

In addition, the Arizona Legislature enacted in 1980 a strict underground water conservation law which gradually reduces the amount of water that can be taken from underground supplies.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried Arizona by 60% to 30% margin in 1988. The filing deadline is June 25, 1992 and the primary for non-Presidential candidates is September 8, 1992. Arizona does not hold a Presidential primary. Delegates will be selected at the State Republican Convention on May 30, 1992.

Arizona's delegate selection process is closed. In April, the delegate selection process will begin in county and district meetings and must be completed by May 10. At these meetings precinct committeemen will elect delegates to the State GOP Convention, May 30, 1992. It will be very difficult for Buchanan to receive more than 6-10 delegates because at least 70% of the precinct committeemen are BUSH-QUAYLE supporters who were elected or appointed before December 31, 1991. The President should have no problem receiving at least 70% of the 37 delegates.

The Democrats held their Presidential caucus on March 7, 1992. Former Senator Paul Tsongas received the largest percent of the popular vote at 34% compared to Governor Bill Clinton's 29% and former Governor Jerry Brown's 27%. However, Clinton received 15 delegates compared to Tsongas' 14 because of the Democrat delegate formula per district.

The elected officials and leaders of statewide Republican organizations will play an active role in coordinating BUSH-QUAYLE campaign activities throughout the state of Arizona. Governor Fife Symington, Senator John McCain, and House Speaker Jane Hull will serve as General Co-Chairmen for the BUSH-QUAYLE campaign in Arizona, while Congressmen Jim Kolbe, Jon Kyl, Jay Rhodes, Bob Stump, Senate Republican Leader Tom Patterson, and Attorney General Grant Woods will serve as Honorary Co-Chairmen.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK CONTINUED

Pat Buchanan has a definite presence in the state and has cultivated an organization statewide. Buchanan's State Director, Jim Crosby has recruited some conservative Republicans as County Chairmen. Buchanan has campaigned in the state urging GOP loyalists to send President Bush a signal of conservative discontent. Secretary Kemp sent letters to GOP party leaders and prospective delegates urging support for President Bush at the May 30 Republican State Convention. Buchanan is not considered a major problem because it will be difficult for him to receive any more than 25% of the vote at the State Convention.

Libertarians held their state convention in Phoenix last week. Approximately 200 Libertarians overwhelmingly endorsed Ross Perot's candidacy for President. Former Congressman Sam Steiger was very supportive of Perot and said that this year Libertarians must take advantage of his candidacy.

The most recent poll among registered Republicans conducted by KAET-TV (Channel 8) on 4/25-26 is as follows:

President Bush	37%
Ross Perot	37%
Bill Clinton	15%

Perot's strong showing in this poll is not surprising given his recent national attention. Although few Arizona voters do not know that much about Perot, many see him as a viable alternative to "two traditional candidates they don't like very much." Many see Perot's support in Arizona declining once the campaign and candidates become more clearly defined.

U.S. SENATE:

U.S. Senator John McCain was expected to face a tough re-election in 1992 because of his involvement in the Savings and Loan crisis. However, poll numbers indicate that McCain has worked hard to rebound from the Keating Five scandal. As of February 1992, McCain has an approval rating of 65% which is an improvement from his 43% approval rating in November of 1991. McCain has no primary opposition at this time. His Democrat opponents include retired Air Force General Truman Spangrud, and businessman and attorney Walter Mybeck, and feminist Claire Sargent.

McCain should have a good chance of holding onto this Republican seat. However, he could have a very competitive race against Claire Sargent who is promoting her background in environmentalism and saying that Arizona is ready for a woman

U.S. SENATE CONTINUED:

Senator. Sargent is a member of EMILY's List, an organization that provides funding for Democrat candidates supportive of women's issues, and has received a substantial amount of funding from this group. McCain, on the other hand has raised a large portion of his campaign money from out of state.

Congressmen Jay Rhodes, Bob Stump, John Kyl, Jim Kolbe, and Ed Pastor are all seeking re-election in 1992.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Arizona gained one Congressional seat in 1992, most likely in the Phoenix area. The legislative redistricting plan passed in the State Legislature and Governor Symington signed the plan.

Since the Arizona State Legislature and Governor Symington did not agree on a redistricting plan, a three federal judge panel became responsible for the new plan. The three federal judge panel, (2R, 1D) appointed by Federal Judge Clifford Wallace from the 9th Circuit, did not use either the Democrat or Republican plans. The panel created an entirely different redistricting plan in which Republicans did very well. The new 6th District open seat has a slight Democrat edge, but Republicans could pick up this seat with a strong candidate. Four of the six seats lean Republican and Democrat Congressman Ed Pastor's seat leans Democrat. The State Legislature redistricting plan is still being debated by the panel.

1991 SPECIAL ELECTION UPDATE

The special election to fill the Second Congressional seat vacated by Democrat Congressman Mo Udall was held on September 24, 1991. Democrat Ed Pastor, a former Maricopa County Supervisor, defeated Republican Pat Conner, a former Yuma County Supervisor by 57% to 43%.

1991 GUBERNATORIAL RUNOFF ELECTION RESULTS

Republican candidate and real estate developer Fife Symington defeated Democrat former Phoenix Mayor Terry Goddard in a runoff election on February 26, 1991.

1990 ELECTION RESULTS

STATE HOUSE AND SENATE:

Republicans held on to the State House by a 33 to 27 margin but lost the State Senate, giving the Democrats a 17 to 13 majority. The loss of the State Senate may be attributed to a large tax package that passed in 1990.

Presidential Support, Presidential Opposition: House

1. **Bush Support Score, 1991.** Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

2. **Bush Opposition Score, 1991.** Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative voted "yea" or "nay" in disagreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

3. **Bush Support Score, 1991.** Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative was present and voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. In this version of the study, absences were not counted; therefore, failures to vote did not lower support or opposition scores. Opposition scores, not listed here, are the inverse of the support score; i.e., the opposition score is equal to 100 percent minus the individual's support score.

¹ Ed Pastor, D-Ariz., was sworn in Oct. 3, 1991, to succeed Morris K. Udall, D., who resigned May 4, 1991. Udall was eligible for 29 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score in 1991 was 0 percent; his opposition score was 100 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 0 percent in 1991. Pastor was eligible for 33 of the 111 presidential support votes in 1991.

² Thomas W. Ewing, R-Ill., was sworn in July 10, 1991, to succeed Edward Madigan, R., who resigned March 8, 1991, after being appointed secretary of Agriculture. Madigan was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 75 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 92 percent in 1991. Ewing was eligible for 49 presidential support votes in 1991.

³ John Oliver, D-Mass., was sworn in June 18, 1991, to succeed Silvio O. Conte, R., who died Feb. 8, 1991. Conte was eligible for 10 presidential votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 60 percent; his opposition score was 40 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 60 percent in 1991. Oliver was eligible for 59 presidential votes in 1991.

⁴ Lucien E. Blackwell, D-Pa., was sworn in Nov. 13, 1991, to succeed William H. Gray III, D., who resigned Sept. 11, 1991. Gray was eligible for 73 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 23 percent; his opposition score was 56 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 29 percent in 1991. Blackwell was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

⁵ Sam Johnson, R-Texas, was sworn in May 22, 1991, to succeed Steve Bartlett, R., who resigned March 11, 1991. Bartlett was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 94 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 94 percent in 1991. Johnson was eligible for 76 presidential support votes in 1991.

⁶ George F. Allen, R-Va., was sworn in Nov. 12, 1991, to succeed D. French Slaughter Jr., R., who resigned Nov. 5, 1991. Slaughter was eligible for 94 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 68 percent; his opposition score was 12 percent; and his support score adjusted for absences was 85 percent in 1991. Allen was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

⁷ Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., as Speaker of the House, voted at his discretion. Foley was eligible for eight presidential support votes in 1991.

* Sen. Harris Wofford, D-Pa., was sworn in May 9, 1991, to succeed John Heinz, R., who died in a plane crash April 4, 1991. Heinz was eligible for 19 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 79 percent, his opposition score was 21 percent, and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 79 percent in 1991. Wofford was eligible for 60 of the 81 presidential support votes in 1991.

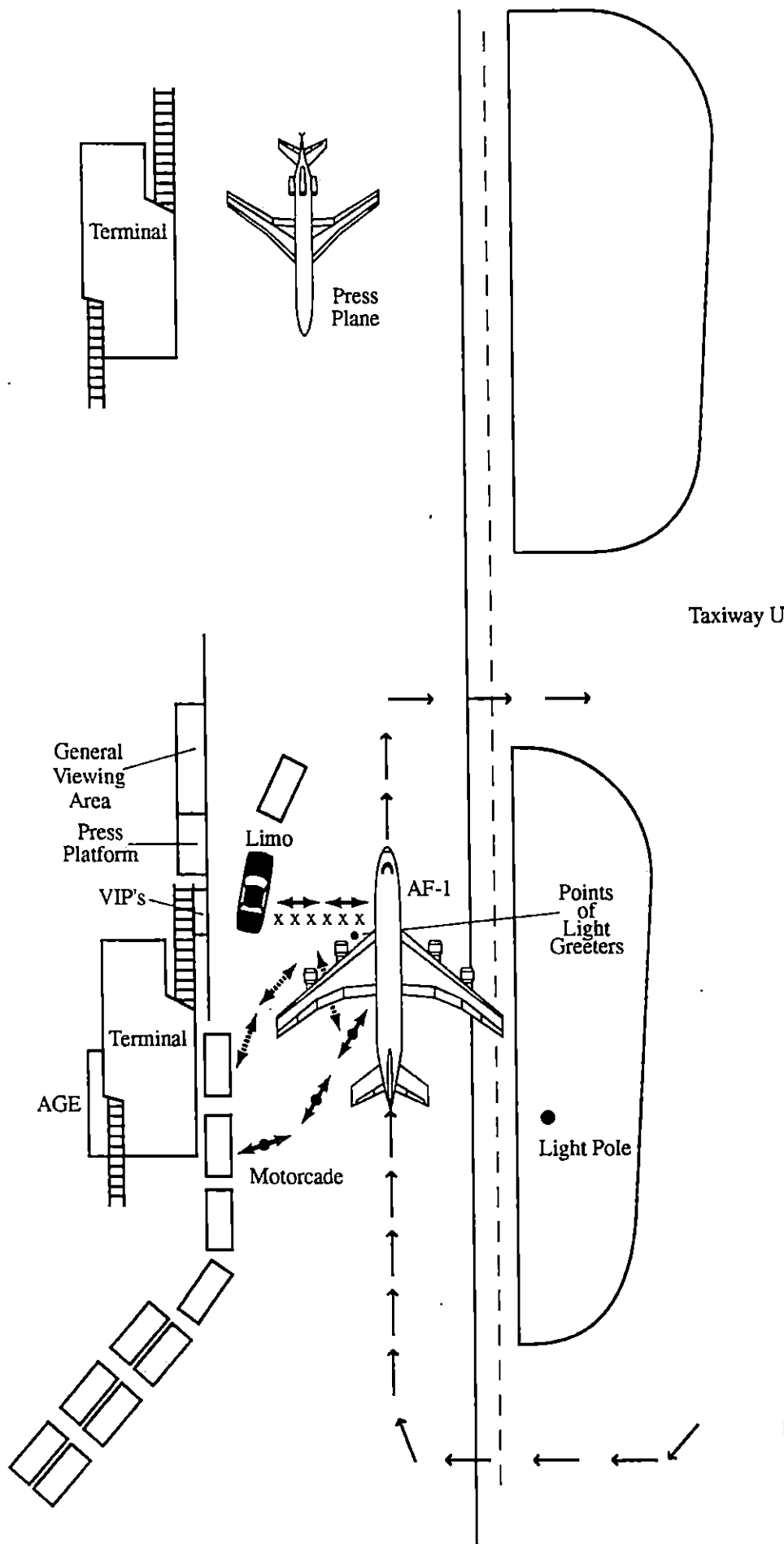

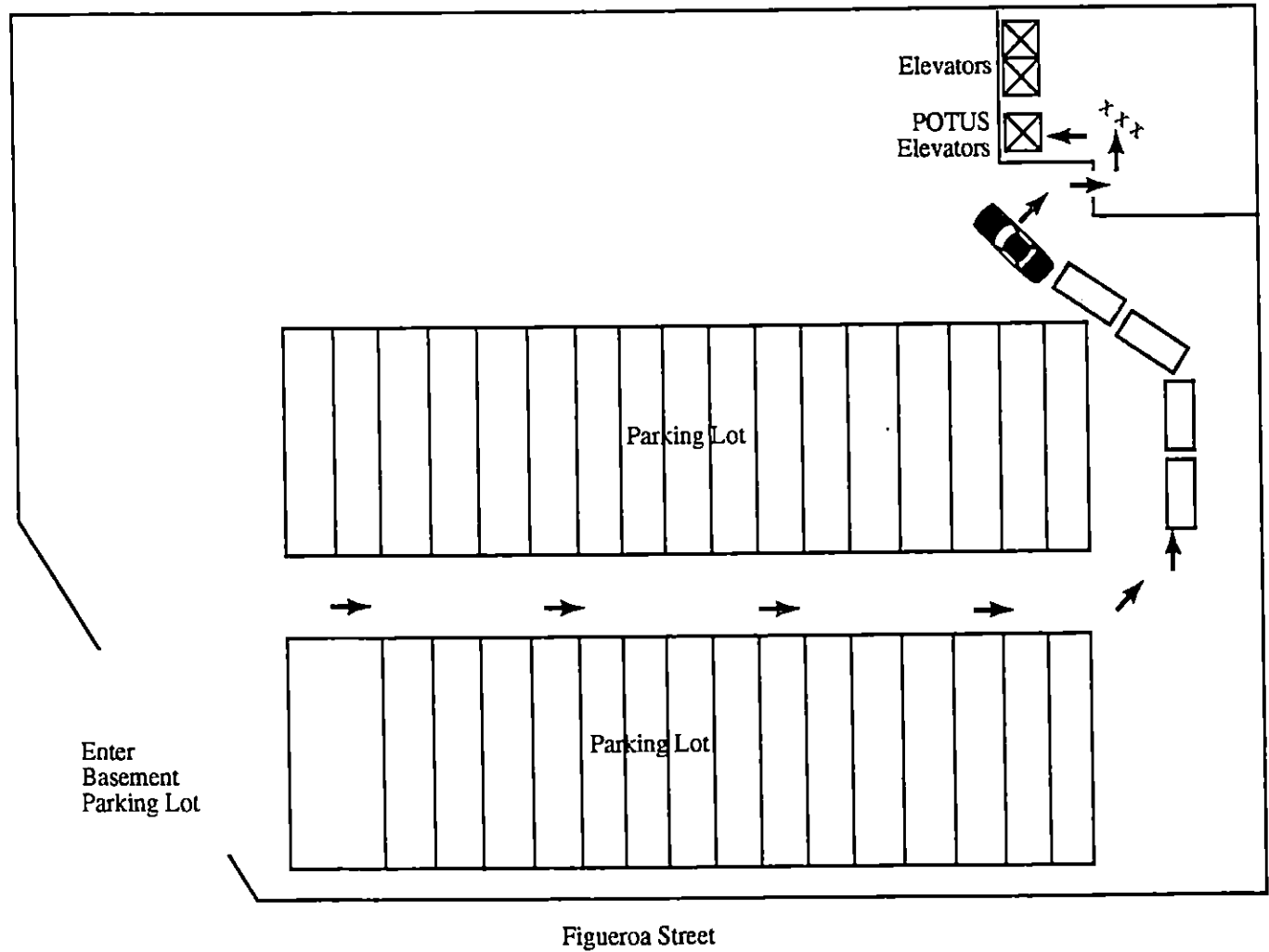

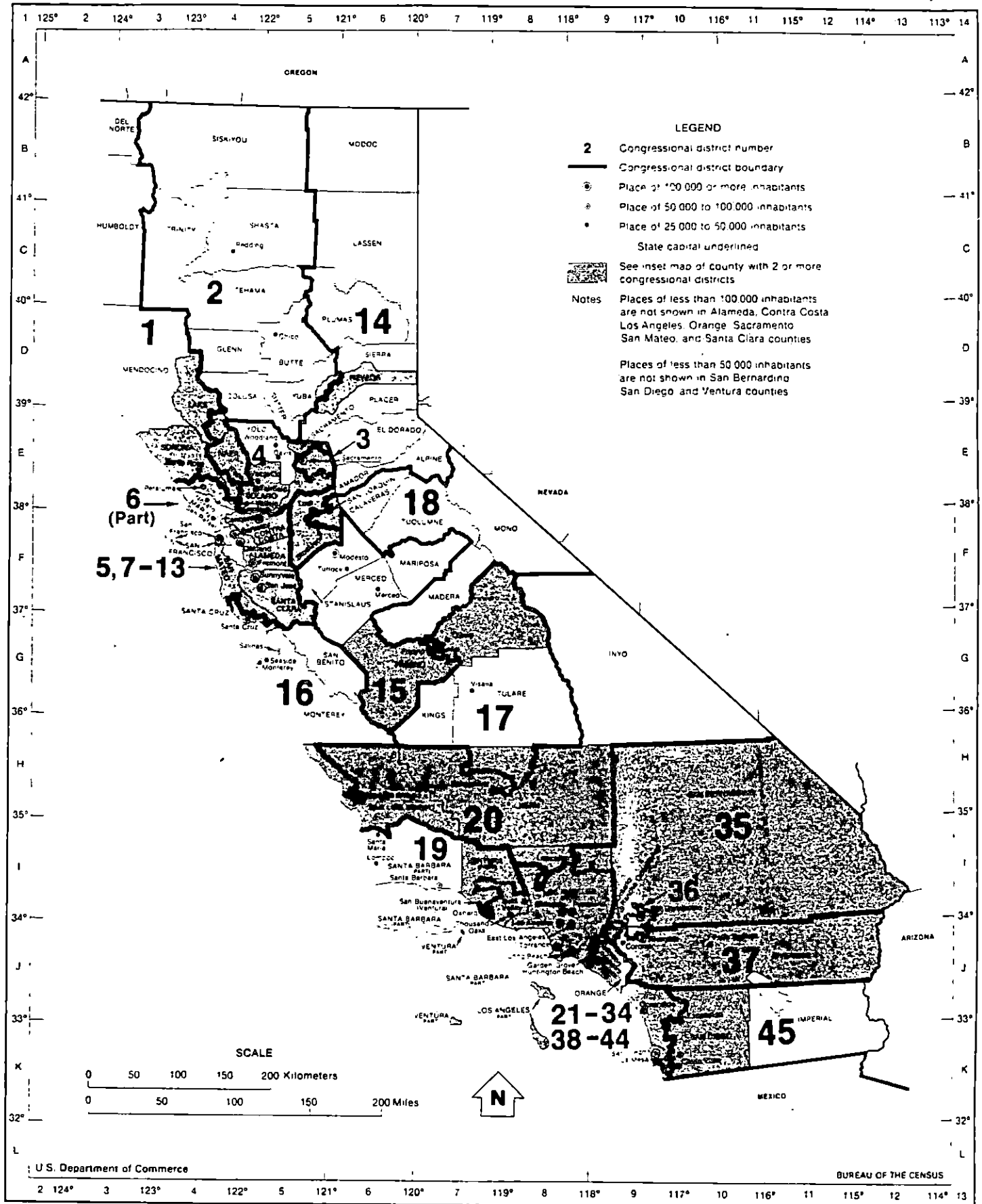

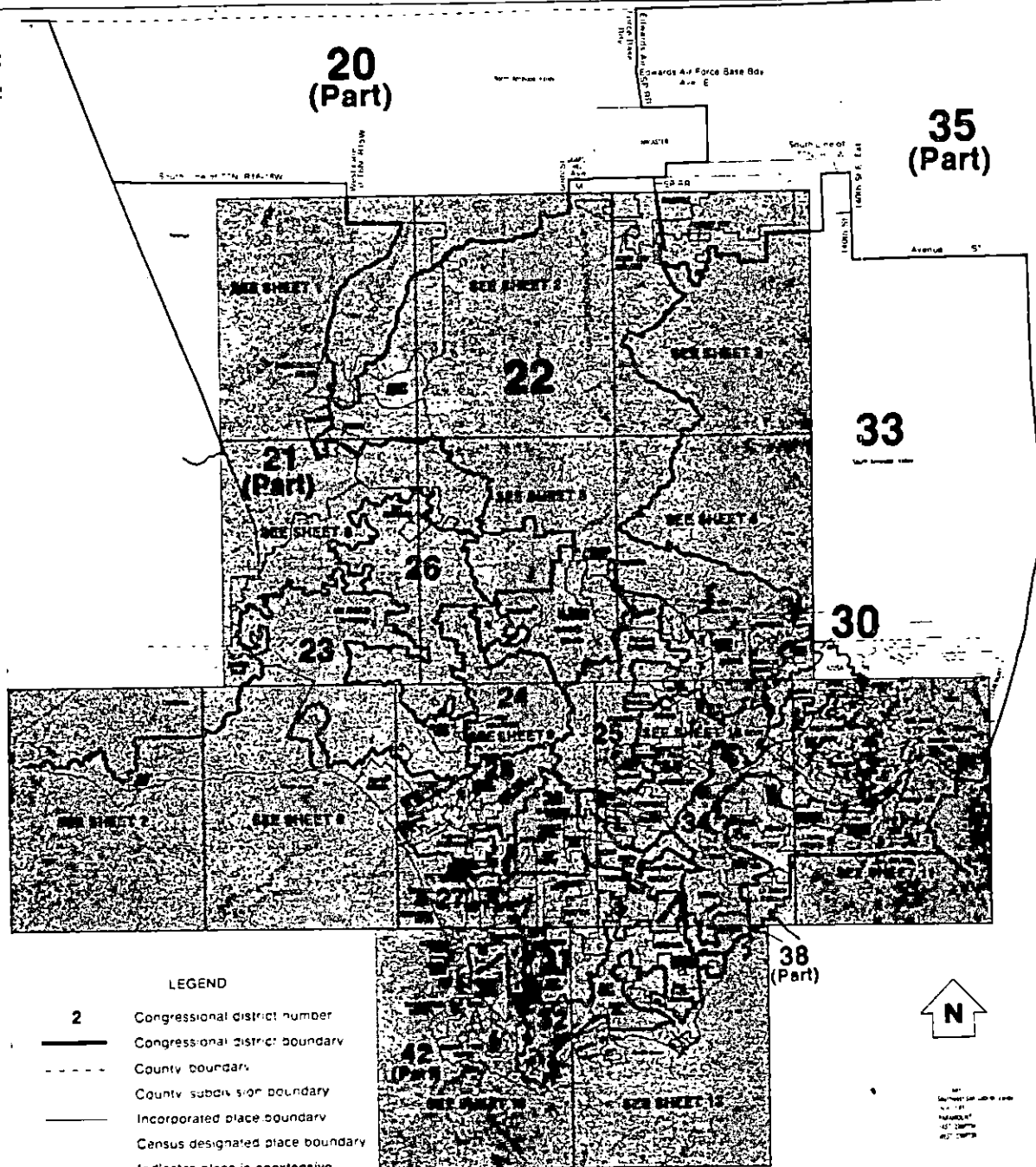

NOTE: This memorandum follows our normal format and does not focus on the Los Angeles riots and recovery efforts. It is our understanding you receive regular reports from the Presidential Task Force on Los Angeles Recovery.

I. Recent Correspondence

Los Angeles-Related Correspondence:

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has requested that you authorize U.S. Navy Construction Battalions to assist Los Angeles County in the cleanup effort following the recent rioting in Los Angeles.

Carlos Jackson, Executive Director of the County of Los Angeles Community Development Commission, wrote urging your support of HR 4073, The Emergency Community Development Act of 1992.

City Councilman Tom Bohigian, Fresno, wrote urging you to instruct the Justice Department to file Federal civil rights charges against the police officers charged with the Rodney King beating.

The California Legislature also forwarded an Assembly Joint Resolution urging the National Institute of Standards and Technology to support a proposal to create a California manufacturing technology center at El Camino College in Los Angeles.

Other California Correspondence:

State Senator Milton Marks (D-San Rafael) wrote urging you to support HR 4551 and S 2553, The Civil Liberties Act Amendments of 1992.

Assemblyman Gil Ferguson (R-Newport Beach) wrote criticizing the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for not following your moratorium on Federal regulations.

The California Legislature forwarded an Assembly Joint Resolution requesting that the U.S.S. Missouri continue to be maintained at the City of Long Beach.

Mayor Dean Lewis, Fortuna, wrote requesting a Federal Disaster Declaration for Humboldt County as a result of earthquake damage.

Mayor Michael Mitoma, Carson, forwarded a resolution urging Congress to develop and support legislation that will provide emergency jobs and stimulate the economy.

Anthony Lopez, City Manager of Corning, wrote requesting funding for street repairs for the City of Corning in order to provide employment opportunities.

II. Discussion

A. Fiscal

After increasing taxes by \$7 billion and slashing spending by the same amount in the last legislative session, California is anticipating a \$10.7 billion deficit for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1992.

The Governor and state legislative leaders are meeting on a weekly basis in order to develop potential solutions to the ever-increasing deficit. The general consensus among both Democrats and Republicans is that they will need to balance the budget by cutting spending, not by raising taxes again.

Welfare payments are one of the major causes of the spiraling budget deficit. Welfare reform and revamping the Legislative budget process are Governor Wilson's major legislative priorities this year.

B. Federal Civil Rights Investigation of the Rodney King Beating

The investigation into possible federal civil rights violations in the Rodney King case is proceeding. A team consisting of experienced prosecutors from the Criminal Section of the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice and the U.S. Attorney's Office in Los Angeles has been in place in Los Angeles since two days after the state court verdict that acquitted four Los Angeles Police Department Officers. The FBI is providing investigative resources. Attorney General Barr has made this civil rights investigation a top priority.

The possible federal criminal civil rights offenses are: conspiring to interfere with a person's constitutional rights, and depriving a person of constitutional rights under the color of law, as by the unlawful use of police authority. Each offense carries penalties of up to 10 years in prison and up to \$250,000 in fines.

A federal grand jury in Los Angeles is receiving evidence in the investigation. The case is receiving top priority in terms of time and resources.

C. Northern California Earthquake

On Saturday, April 25, at 11:06 a.m. Pacific Daylight Time, a major earthquake rocked the sparsely populated northern California coast, causing fires and shaking houses off their foundations. Two subsequent similar-magnitude earthquakes occurred on Sunday, April 26, causing as much destruction as the initial magnitude 6.9 (M6.9) earthquake. The worst damage was sustained in Ferndale, about 250 miles north of San Francisco and nearest the epicenter, and in Petrolia, where the Post Office and other buildings burned to the ground. Losses from the earthquakes in the Ferndale area are estimated to be in the \$60 million range.

On May 4, you approved federal disaster assistance for the northern California communities affected by the earthquake and the aftershocks. Immediately after your declaration, FEMA designated Humboldt County eligible for federal funding to supplement the recovery needs of residents and local jurisdictions.

D. Robert Alton Harris Execution

On July 5, 1978, Robert Alton Harris kidnapped and murdered two teenage boys. Less than one year later, he was tried and convicted of those murders and sentenced to death. Almost fourteen years passed between his first appeal, on November 30, 1979, and his execution, on April 21, 1992.

In continuous legal maneuverings, Robert Alton Harris filed ten petitions for writ of habeas corpus in the California Supreme Court, six habeas corpus petitions in the federal courts [including one when he was strapped in the gas chamber] and five appeals to the United States Supreme Court.

California Assembly Republicans plan to introduce legislation to streamline the State's criminal appeals process. In addition, they also plan to ask the State bar to request tougher ethical limitations on members of the Bar who engage in frivolous appeals and for an ethical investigation of the lawyers who represented Harris.

E. Unemployment

California's seasonally adjusted unemployment level for April, 1992, stood at 8 percent, an increase of .6 percent over the same period in 1991, but a .5 percent drop from March, 1992.

The most current preliminary unemployment figures for Los Angeles show an unemployment rate of 9.0 percent in March, an increase of 2.1 percent over the same period in 1991.

The most current unemployment figures for Fresno show an unemployment rate of 14.6 percent in January, 1992. This is a decrease of 4.1 percent from the same period last year.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that the overall unemployment rate for blacks in California in 1991 stood at 11.8 percent, and the overall unemployment rate for black teens stood at 32.3 percent.

The unemployment rate for Los Angeles blacks in 1991 was 11.1 percent, and the overall unemployment rate for black teens stood at 27.6 percent.

F. Chevron USA Fine

On May 18, 1992, Chevron USA agreed to plead guilty to criminal and civil crimes and will pay \$8 million in fines under the Clean Water Act.

The violations occurred on an oil drilling platform in the Santa Barbara Channel. The Chevron violations constitute the third largest criminal penalty ever assessed under any environmental statute.

G. Federal Weed and Seed Program

On April 6, 1992, Attorney General Barr announced that Los Angeles and San Diego, California were selected for grants involving 16 cities under the Weed and Seed initiative. The grants are approximately \$1.1 million each. The Weed and Seed Program is an innovative, comprehensive, and integrated multi-agency approach for controlling and preventing violent crime, drug abuse, and gang activity in the United States.

You recently announced an additional Weed and Seed grant of \$19 million for Los Angeles.

During the week of May 11, 1992, representatives from the Department of Justice (DOJ) and other Federal agencies involved in the Weed and Seed program met with Mayor Bradley to explain the program and to discuss how the Weed and Seed strategy could be implemented in South Central Los Angeles and the contiguous areas. DOJ is working with other federal agencies to develop a fast track strategy to implement the Weed and Seed program in South Central Los Angeles.

H. Endangered Species

Among many species listed or being considered for proposed listing as threatened or endangered under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) in California are the Bald Eagle, the winter-run chinook salmon, the delta smelt, and the giant garter snake. Efforts to help these species will have a direct impact on water supplies to agricultural and municipal and industrial users.

I. South Coast Clean Air Plan

As a result of high pollution levels, rapid growth and adverse topography of the Los Angeles area, the Los Angeles smog problem is so severe (violations of the ozone standard occur 150 days each year, compared to 20

days in New York or Chicago), that attainment of Clean Air Act standards requires extraordinary pollution reductions -- including much cleaner fuels and vehicles than mandated under the Clean Air Act Amendments, severe restrictions on industrial emissions and reformulation of many commercial and consumer products.

Since attainment in Los Angeles is not feasible without practically emission-free motor vehicles, the State of California is mandating progressive delivery of cleaner vehicles and fuels, with introduction of ultra-clean cars and trucks by the end of the century.

The Clean Air Act Amendments call for attainment of the ozone standard by the year 2020, and the attainment of the carbon monoxide standard by the year 2000.

J. Water Supply

While California as a whole has received almost normal precipitation during the 1991-92 rainy season, the long-term drought has not been broken. However, the rainfall allowed you to announce on March 4, 1992 an increase in water allocations from 0 percent to 15 percent of their normal level to agricultural producers from the Central Valley Project (CVP). Since that time, the allocations have been further increased to 25 percent of the normal level.

K. Central Valley Project

Governor Wilson has requested that the Federal Government turn over the Central Valley Irrigation Project (CVP) to the State of California. Secretary Lujan has publicly stated that he supports this request.

The first meeting between Governor Wilson and Secretary Lujan regarding the transfer of the CVP from Federal to State ownership was held in late April. Initial results from the meeting have been positive. Working groups were set up to solve problems that might arise during the negotiations. Briefings regarding the technical, financial and contractual aspects of the CVP were provided, as well as a briefing on the state water project's operations since 1986. The coordination of the media was discussed, and also the possibility of future public meetings. However, public meetings will be held only after the details of a framework for finishing the negotiations are completed.

Governor Wilson has appointed a public advisory committee to represent all parties interested in the CVP transfer.

L. WETLANDS

Many farmers in California are confused and concerned about the final definition of a wetland. They must currently rely on the 1989 Federal Manual for Identifying and Delineating Wetlands. EPA's recent redefinition of wetlands has been subject to a comment period which closed on January 21, 1992. Over 75,000 comments were received during that time and due to a large volume of comments, it is anticipated that EPA's evaluation will be delayed. This is likely to cause additional concern among farmers.

Many problems with the 1989 Manual have been eliminated by exempting tilled land from consideration as wetlands; however, the overriding concerns of private property rights and government control with regard to wetlands continues to be a highly emotional issue.

Governor Pete Wilson has informed the Administration of his concern that delineation standards must take the State's unique seasonal and erratic precipitation pattern into consideration. Governor Wilson also has urged a policy of no net loss of wetlands for California.

M. North American Free Trade Agreement

In general, California agricultural producers and processors are very supportive of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA). Expected gains in trade of rice, cotton, lumber, nuts, and deciduous fruits will more than offset some of the increase in competition in the citrus and winter vegetable sectors.

Some of California's citrus and winter vegetable industries are concerned about the impact of NAFTA on their operations because they are nervous about the phase-out of U.S. import tariffs with Mexico. They feel that without the current level of protection they will face increased competition.

Even with a phased reduction in tariff rates, it is possible that isolated instances of potentially injurious increases in imports could occur. To address this issue, the U.S. Department of Agriculture is seeking to include in the NAFTA agreement a special

safeguard provision for agriculture to enable the United States to adjust quickly to sudden increases in imports of sensitive products during a transition period. This safeguard would be included in the agreement to help the federal government respond to the unique problems facing U.S. producers of import sensitive crops, such as citrus and winter vegetables.

N. Governor Wilson's Welfare Reform Proposal

Governor Wilson has turned in an estimated one million signatures to qualify his welfare initiative, called the "Taxpayer Protection Act," for the November general election ballot, undercutting efforts by both Assembly and Senate Democrats to adopt alternative welfare reforms of their own.

The Governor's plan projects an estimated savings of \$672 million, about half of which would be in federal matching dollars that would no longer come to California. Features of the plan include grant reductions (welfare grants would initially be cut 10 percent and then another 15 percent for able-bodied recipients who are unable to find work after six months, offset by a small automatic food stamp increase); Cal Learn education incentives; work incentives; maximum family grants; and teenage pregnancy disincentives.

Wilson's initiative effectively moves the debate over welfare reform from the legislature to the electorate.

O. California 2000

Governor Wilson is supportive of AMERICA 2000 and has indicated his desire to bring California on board with the strategy. However, the Governor has not yet announced a statewide effort due to the enormous size of California and the need to devise a proposal best suited for the State.

Secretary Alexander and Under Secretary Kearns have spent significant time working with Los Angeles education and business leaders to help with their education reform efforts. Secretary Alexander is also working through the Los Angeles Education Alliance for Restructuring Now (LEARN) to better understand how the Department of Education can be of greater assistance to the Los Angeles community.

Secretary Alexander attended kick-off ceremonies for FRESNO 2000 in mid-February. During the visit, he toured the Balderas Elementary School and met with the FRESNO 2000 steering committee, which is comprised of area business, political, education, and civic leaders.

P. Outer Continental Shelf

On May 1, 1992, the Department of the Interior's Minerals Management Service (MMS) announced its proposed final Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) leasing program for the 1992-1997 leasing cycle. The program does not include any blocks available for leasing off the California coast and does not address when, if at all, California blocks may be included in future planning cycles.

This represents a change from the draft proposal of February, 1991, which included 87 blocks in the Santa Maria Basin and Santa Barbara Channel. They were identified in your OCS announcement of June, 1990 as being potentially available for leasing after 1996, depending on results of additional studies. Your announcement simultaneously placed more than 99 percent of the California OCS under leasing moratoria until after the year 2000.

Removal of the 87 blocks was recommended by Governor Wilson.

Q. California Division Ballot Initiative

Frustrated by last year's state budget problems, and the funding difficulties encountered by rural California counties, State Assemblyman Stan Statham (R) joined State Senator Barry Keene (D) in sponsoring a proposal to split California into two states. Not wanting to have special interests bankroll an initiative, they decided to ask all county Boards of Supervisors to place two questions on their June ballots: "Should California be divided into two states?" and "If California is divided, would you want your county to be part of Northern California?" Over one-half (31) of California counties will vote on these questions in the June 2 primary.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK

1992 will be a very crucial and expensive year politically in California. Many political experts predict that 150 million dollars will be raised and spent by the Republican Party on its many campaigns. In addition to the Presidential election, U.S. Senator John Seymour's seat, U.S. Senator Alan Cranston's open seat, and 52 Congressional seats will all be up for election in 1992. With the sheer number of State Assembly, State Senate, Congressional and U.S. Senate seats open this year, it is certain that the California primary and general election will be brutal.

The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried California by a 51% to 47% margin in the 1988 Presidential election. The ballot filing deadline was March 6, 1992 and the primary election is June 2, 1992.

California has a total of 201 delegates (3 from each Congressional District and 45 at large). Governor Pete Wilson filed the slate of delegates to the Secretary of State's office on May 4, 1992. Pat Buchanan has also filed his slate of delegates.

The Los Angeles riots have created an enormous amount of political controversy, and most experts expect this to be a major factor in the June 2nd primary. With Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley and other elected officials urging angry Los Angeles residents to vote for a police reform package on the June ballot, many believe the riot might ultimately increase political participation by Blacks. Clinton has attacked the President saying that 12 years of Republican administrations have led to neglect of minorities and cities and it is time again for an activist federal government. Secretary Kemp has criticized Clinton for accusing the Bush Administration of practicing divisive racial politics that helped set the stage for the riots.

Buchanan has campaigned in the Sacramento and Orange County areas. His statewide organization consists of mostly anti-environmentalists and Congressman **Bill Dannemeyer's** political supporters. He is expected to campaign up to the June primary and run TV commercials statewide. Since the Rodney King verdict, **Buchanan** has been criticized as racist and not being sympathetic to the needs of minorities in Los Angeles. Most California political operatives see his presence in California as an attempt to fractionalize the GOP by courting the conservatives who are furious with Governor **Wilson** over his tax increase. However, since **Perot** has become such a force in California with the disaffected voter, **Buchanan's** support seems to have diminished.

Governor **Pete Wilson** will serve as the 1992 Bush-Quayle Chairman for California. Chevron CEO and Team 100 member **Ken Derr** has agreed to be 1992 Bush-Quayle Finance Chairman for Northern California. **John Cronin** has been asked to serve as the 1992 Bush-Quayle Finance Chairman for Southern California.

Katie Boyd, Karl Samuelian, Lod Cook, Howard Leach, George Argyros, David Murdock, Don Bren, Margaret Brock, Yong C. Kim, and Alex Spanos all serve in leadership positions for the 1992 National Bush-Quayle Finance Committee.

This new Los Angeles Times poll indicates that **Perot** is the only Presidential candidate that is viewed favorably by California voters. **Perot's** strong showing underscores widespread dissatisfaction with both the President and **Clinton** in this battleground state. A majority of Californians disapprove of the President's job performance and a plurality say **Clinton** lacks the honesty and integrity to serve as President.

Perot is seen as the best candidate equipped to foment change even though voters do not have a clear picture of his priorities. **Perot** supporters describe themselves as follows: 35% are Democrats, 54% are registered Independents, and 41% are Republicans.

The President's approval rating has slipped to 35% compared to 50% in December. California voters expressed widespread dismay not only with the President, but at the state's condition, with 4 out of 5 saying California is on the wrong track. These results are directly related to California's stumbling economy, high unemployment, decrease in defense industry jobs, and the Los Angeles riot situation.

Perot's organization has held numerous organizational and petition signing meetings statewide. Approximately 500,000 signatures have been secured and the state goal is 1 million. No major Bush-Quayle names are associated with his organization. **Perot** must have 134,000 signatures by August 7 to qualify for the ballot.

California will have 54 electoral votes in 1992, which will be crucial in the Presidential election. Bringing Asians, Hispanics, and conservatives to our support base will be essential, not only for the President, but for all Republican candidates in 1992. Also, implementation of an extensive absentee voter ballot program will be critical in the 1992 election cycle.

Democrat registration has slipped to its lowest level (48.9%) in 59 years due largely because a Democrat has not occupied the White House or the Governor's mansion in 12 years and the Democrats do not have one overriding message. Republican registration is 39.27%.

Clinton held a face to face meeting with voters in Ontario and answered questions on a wide array of topics by satellite link with Sacramento, Hayward, and Fresno. **Clinton** won widespread praise for his handling of the questions and presentation via satellite. The **Clinton** campaign is expected to utilize the next week to introduce **Clinton** to California voters before the primary election.

U.S. SENATE "A" RACE:

Senator **Cranston** will be retiring in 1992, thus leaving an open, six year seat. Congressman **Tom Campbell** (CA-12, San

Mateo), radio and television commentator **Bruce Herchensohn**, and Mayor **Sonny Bono** are the only announced Republicans to date. **Campbell** has the lead in fundraising. He has raised approximately \$3.9 million.

Bono has the highest name ID, but is the least admired candidate at this time. **Campbell** has improved his standing considerably due to his recent statewide media and TV buys which has greatly increased his name ID. The **Campbell-Herchensohn** standoff suggests a fierce battle between the moderate and conservative wings of the California Republican Party. Both **Campbell** and **Herchensohn** have TV ads hammering the differences between both candidates. **Campbell** holds a modest lead at this time, but when low voter turnout is projected both run virtually even.

The announced Democrats running for this seat are Congresswoman **Barbara Boxer** (CA-6, San Francisco), Lieutenant Governor **Leo McCarthy**, and Congressman **Mel Levine** (CA-27, Santa Monica). **Levine** has \$5 million on hand and recently bought \$3.2 million of media statewide. **Levine's** recent barrage of TV commercials has proven to be very successful given his recent increase in the polls and name ID. **Boxer** could benefit greatly from her gender in an election year where women candidates are faring well nationwide. **Levine** made an appeal to the conservative wing of the Democratic Party and has distanced himself from his record as one of the most liberal Congressmen in a radio debate with **Boxer** and **McCarthy**.

U.S. SENATE "B" RACE:

Senator John Seymour, Governor Wilson's appointee to serve the remainder of his term, faces a very tough race in 1992. Because the term expires in 1994, this seat will again be up for election that year. Republican Congressman Bill Dannemeyer (CA-39, Orange County) and conservative Bill Allen have announced they will challenge Seymour in the primary election.

The most recent Los Angeles Times poll (5/16-19) for Republican candidates is as follows:

Seymour will more than likely win the primary election, but will have a tough race in the general election largely due to his low name identification, switches to oppose off-shore drilling and support of pro-choice positions, and lack of a strong message.

Former San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein, State Controller Gray Davis, and Joe Alioto, Jr., son of former Mayor Alioto, are the announced Democrats challenging Seymour.

Feinstein's lead over Davis is due largely to the high percentage of the women's vote which she expects to receive and her high statewide name ID. Feinstein has the best chance at this point of winning in the primary election.

This will be the first time a state will have a dual U.S. Senate election since 1978, when it occurred in Alabama and Minnesota.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

California gained seven new Congressional seats in 1992. Because Governor Wilson and the California State Legislature did not agree on a redistricting plan, the California Supreme Court became responsible for a fair plan. The Special Masters, a three judge panel (2 Republicans and 1 Democrat) appointed by the State Supreme Court announced their initial redistricting plan on December 2, 1991.

The plan was open to public comment until December 29, 1991. After hearing public testimony, the Supreme Court adopted the Masters Plan in its entirety except for adding a greater percentage of Asian voters in two Los Angeles Assembly districts. The Supreme Court announced their final plan on January 28, 1992. Governor Wilson praised the Special Masters Plan for its fairness for both Republicans and Democrats.

Overall, the plan overwhelmingly favors Republicans in the State Assembly, State Senate, and U.S. Congressional districts. The following should be competitive races for the Republican Party in 1992: 6 to 8 Congressional seats, 6 State Senate seats, and 12 to 14 Assembly races.

Of the 7 new Congressional seats, 5 lean Republican because most of these seats are located in Republican growth areas. Republicans are expected to gain control of the State Assembly and have at least 26 of the 52 Congressional seats in 1992.

The plan creates numerous minority districts predominately in the Los Angeles area. This plan creates severe incumbent displacement, which will cause some Congressmen to be forced to run against each other. However, this displacement is far greater for Democrats than for Republicans.

1991 SPECIAL ELECTIONS RESULTS

California held special elections on May 14, 1991 and September 17, 1991.

On September 17, 1991, Republicans held onto both Assemblymen Tim Leslie (R-Carmichael) and John Lewis' (R-Orange County) seats, who were elected to the State Senate in the May 14 special election. In Assembly District 5, Republican B.T. Collins defeated Libertarian David McCann and in Assembly District 67, Republican Micky Conroy defeated Democrat Greg Ramsey. Collins was endorsed by Governor Wilson and the RNC contributed \$70,000 to his race during the primary election at the request of Governor Wilson.

On May 14, 1991, Republicans won three special elections. In Senate District 35 (Orange County), Republican Assemblyman John Lewis defeated Democrat Francis Hoffman. This seat was vacated by the appointment of John Seymour to the U.S. Senate. In Senate District 1 (Sacramento), Republican Assemblyman Tim Leslie defeated Democrat Patti Mattingly. The seat was previously held by John Doolittle (R), who was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. In Assembly District 26 (Stockton), Republican Dean Andal defeated Patti Garamandi. Andal will succeed Patrick Johnston (D) who resigned after being elected to the State Senate.

1990 ELECTION RESULTS

GOVERNOR:

Perhaps the most important victory for Republicans nationwide in 1990 was the election of Pete Wilson as Governor of California. A massive GOTV effort combined with a successful TV advertising campaign assisted Wilson in defeating Democrat San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein.

ATTORNEY GENERAL:

An important statewide victory for Republicans was RNC Committeeman and former Congressman Dan Lungren defeating Democrat incumbent Attorney General Arlo Smith. Although Lungren failed to win a majority of the votes cast on election day, his dominance of absentee ballots secured him the victory in this close race. Lungren's victory is evidence of how effective the absentee ballot program was during this election cycle in California.

U.S. CONGRESS:

Republicans had a net gain of one seat last election cycle in the U.S. Congress. Republican Frank Riggs defeated Democrat incumbent Congressman Doug Bosco (CA-1, Santa Rosa), and Republican Randy Cunningham defeated Democrat incumbent Congressman Jim Bates (CA-44, San Diego). Republican incumbent Congressman Chip Pashayan (CA-17, Fresno) was defeated by Democrat farmer Cal Dooly. This was the only Republican seat lost. Currently, the California Congressional ratio is 19 Republicans and 26 Democrats.

BALLOT INITIATIVES:

Proposition 140, which limits the terms of state legislators and constitutional officers was accepted by California voters in 1990. California State Legislators filed a major lawsuit this past February 1991 to do away with this law. The California Supreme Court upheld Proposition 140 in October 1991.

Presidential Support, Presidential Opposition: House

1. Bush Support Score, 1991. Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

2. Bush Opposition Score, 1991. Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative voted "yea" or "nay" in disagreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

3. Bush Support Score, 1991. Percentage of 111 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a representative was present and voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. In this version of the study, absences were not counted; therefore, failures to vote did not lower support or opposition scores. Opposition scores, not listed here, are the inverse of the support score; i.e., the opposition score is equal to 100 percent minus the individual's support score.

* Ed Pastor, D-Ariz., was sworn in Oct. 3, 1991, to succeed Morris K. Udall, D, who resigned May 4, 1991. Udall was eligible for 29 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score in 1991 was 0 percent; his opposition score was 100 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 0 percent in 1991. Pastor was eligible for 33 of the 111 presidential support votes in 1991.

* Thomas W. Ewing, R-Ill., was sworn in July 10, 1991, to succeed Edward Madigan, R, who resigned March 8, 1991, after being appointed secretary of Agriculture. Madigan was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 75 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 92 percent in 1991. Ewing was eligible for 49 presidential support votes in 1991.

* John Oliver, D-Mass., was sworn in June 18, 1991, to succeed Silvio O. Conte, R, who died Feb. 8, 1991. Conte was eligible for 10 presidential votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 60 percent; his opposition score was 40 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 60 percent in 1991. Oliver was eligible for 59 presidential votes in 1991.

* Lucien E. Blackwell, D-Pa., was sworn in Nov. 13, 1991, to succeed William H. Gray III, D, who resigned Sept. 11, 1991. Gray was eligible for 73 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 23 percent; his opposition score was 56 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 29 percent in 1991. Blackwell was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

* Sam Johnson, R-Texas, was sworn in May 22, 1991, to succeed Steve Bartlett, R, who resigned March 11, 1991. Bartlett was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 94 percent; his opposition score was 6 percent; and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 94 percent in 1991. Johnson was eligible for 76 presidential support votes in 1991.

* George F. Allen, R-Va., was sworn in Nov. 12, 1991, to succeed D. French Slaughter Jr., R, who resigned Nov. 5, 1991. Slaughter was eligible for 94 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 68 percent; his opposition score was 12 percent; and his support score adjusted for absences was 85 percent in 1991. Allen was eligible for 16 presidential support votes in 1991.

* Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., as Speaker of the House, voted at his discretion. Foley was eligible for eight presidential support votes in 1991.

2. **Bush Opposition Score, 1991.** Percentage of 81 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a senator voted "yea" or "nay" in disagreement with the president's position. Failures to vote lowered both support and opposition scores.

3. **Bush Support Score, 1991.** Percentage of 81 recorded votes in 1991 on which President Bush took a position and on which a senator was present and voted "yea" or "nay" in agreement with the president's position. In this version of the study, absences are not counted; therefore, failures to vote did not lower support or opposition scores. Opposition scores, not listed here, are the inverse of the support score; i.e., the opposition score is equal to 100 percent minus the individual's support score.

¹ Sen. Harris Wofford, D-Pa., was sworn in May 9, 1991, to succeed John Heinz, R., who died in a plane crash April 4, 1991. Heinz was eligible for 19 presidential support votes in 1991. His presidential support score was 79 percent, his opposition score was 21 percent, and his support score, adjusted for absences, was 79 percent in 1991. Wofford was eligible for 60 of the 81 presidential support votes in 1991.
