Today you are scheduled to participate in a photo-op with NFIB's President and CEO, S. Jackson "Jack" Faris.

NFIB recently surveyed its membership on the Balanced Budget Amendment issue. Seventy-two percent of its members favored the 3/5ths "super majority" (Barton/Tauzin) legislation. NFIB's membership preferred no legislation if provisions against tax increases were not included.

NFIB, however, as a result of this meeting, has pledged its informal support in working on Members who are wavering. While NFIB is formally neutral on the Stenholm bill, its lobbying staff will be working the issue in support of the Administration's position.

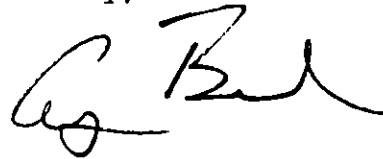

*6 CLINTON: TODAY, NEXT MONDAY, AND ANY OTHER DAY HE CAN He "hopes to upstage" Perot and Bush on live TV, in addition to Arsenio and his 6/9 appearance on NBC's "Today." Clinton "will appear on three call-in programs in seven days, using a format that his advisers have decided is the best way to get through" (Ifill, N.Y. TIMES, 6/10). He will appear on "CBS This Morning" 6/15; the campaign has also bought a half-hour of NBC time 6/12 for "its own phone-in show" (Hill, Balto. SUN, 6/10).

"TODAY" ONE DAY LATER: N.Y. TIMES' Kolbert: "Seven in the morning is not the best time of day for Bill Clinton. His eyes are puffy, his face is red and his smile has the weary air of items at a tag sale. ... While ["Today"] may not have shown Mr. Clinton at his most wide awake, politicians and media analysts say he probably scored points simply by showing up and taking calls" (6/10). BOSTON GLOBE's Black: "Clinton largely avoided the questions he hates concerning public opinion polls, campaign strategy and Ross Perot" (6/10). N.Y. NEWSDAY's Clifford: "He broke little new ground on the issues, but he did broadcast his wish for weekly presidential debates, and he revealed that women are under consideration for his running mate" (6/10). W. POST's Edsall & Marcus: "It sometimes must seem that every question in this ... season has come at [Clinton] like a fast ball or curve ball. But yesterday it was a different game ... slow-pitch softball. ... In this comfortable environment ... Clinton demonstrated consistent restraint, uncharacteristically limiting himself to brief, succinct answers" (6/10).

"CBS" ONE WEEK LATER: ATT informed CBS that over 1 million calls were placed to CBS' 6/2 primary night "town meeting" with Dan Rather. CBS logged 41,000 calls; 17 lucky callers were able

to directly ask questions to Clinton (CBS release, 6/9).

ON LIVE-TV: "Today's" Katie Couric "advised the press to 'take some cues' about what the public wanted" from the kinds of questions callers asked Clinton: "Not polls, not reaction but basic issue-oriented questions" (Ciolli, NEWSDAY, 6/10). Dem strategist Terry Michael called the talk show format "a defensive strategy to get past the negative caricature drawn of the candidate earlier. They fool themselves if they think that simply by acquainting a mass audience with Bill Clinton, they're giving those voters a reason to vote for him. What they're doing is opening the ears of some additional people to any message ... if the message is not attractive, laying this groundwork is useless" (Condon, COPLEY/S.D. UNION-TRIBUNE, 6/10). ABC's Ted Koppel on Clinton's upcoming 30 minute call-in show: "You look at Clinton's half-hour. He will take maybe ten or twelve questions, 15 at the most. Is that really representative? What about all the people who couldn't get through?" (Balto. SUN, 6/10). Clinton spokesperson Jeff Eller: "We're all looking for ways to remove the traditional filter and get our message out." Clinton: "I think it's good. I think people are frustrated by what they see as the artificial nature of politics and its remoteness" (Cannon/Gunther, KNIGHT-RIDDER, 6/10). Clinton media adviser Frank Greer: "It gives people a sense that they have a direct role in the political process. It cuts through cynicism." Georgetown's Michael Robinson: "This format is much better for Clinton than it is for Bush. For Dan Quayle, it's a disaster in the making" (N.Y. TIMES, 6/10). ABC's Sam Donaldson, appearing on the "Tonight Show": "[Clinton] still has so much baggage, particularly in a three-way race, that he is likely to end up third" (NBC, 6/9).

BIG APPLE WATCH: NYC Mayor David Dinkins (D) "stopped short of formally endorsing" Clinton 6/8, but said Clinton "has what it takes to serve the country as president." Dinkins on whether his comments were a formal Clinton endorsement: "No. ... but I will in time. ... I want to do my endorsement with all the flair that I can muster as a mayor of this great city" (N.Y. NEWSDAY, 6/9). After yesterday's "TODAY" appearance, Clinton flew back to Little Rock with DNC chair Ron Brown to discuss the upcoming NY convention (Black, B. GLOBE, 6/10). Clinton said he received favorable response from Cong. Dems on his plan for the Dems' first 100 days in office: "Everybody in America knows that the kind of do-nothing approach we've got now is not working." Brown "was a little more conciliatory": "I expect them to be very supportive of this plan" (Ifill, N.Y. TIMES, 6/10).

FROM THE INSIDE: While Clinton has fashioned himself a Washington outsider in the presidential campaign, the governor "confirmed Tuesday that he flexed his political power to help one of the state's consummate insiders," Rep. Beryl Anthony (D-04) in the runoff against Sec/State Bill McCuen. Clinton said NRA "attacks" on Anthony for supporting the Brady bill were the driving force behind his campaign's decision to help. Clinton, who allowed the Anthony campaign to use a statement from him on radio ads and leased 50 telephones in the Little Rock headquarters to Anthony's camp, did not help enough -- as McCuen won. Clinton maintained his "moves should not be construed as a campaign against McCuen" (Oman, ARKANSAS DEMOCRAT-GAZETTE, 6/10).

CONSULTANT WATCH: Media consultant Michael Shea, who did ads for Tsongas, is negotiating with the Clinton camp "for a role to create commercials for the general election" (B. GLOBE, 6/9).

*7 BUSH: IT'S U.S. AGAINST THE WORLD

The Bush Admin., "defending itself against rising criticism at the Earth Summit, suggested today that Japan, Germany and other countries opposing United States policies were distorting Washington's environmental positions for political and diplomatic gain" (N.Y. TIMES, 6/10). "Only two days before President Bush is to walk into what one senior official derided as a 'circus of Bush-bashing,' the White House struggled to recover from what many acknowledge has been its misreading of the impact" of the Summit, "an overestimation of U.S. influence on environmental issues on its industrialized allies, and a failure to make the case for its policies long before this week's public relations crisis" (Devroy, W. POST, 6/10). Bush "is likely to be greeted with scorn when he arrives ... a blow both to his record on foreign affairs and to his promise to be the 'environmental president'" (Gutfeld/Allen, W.S. JOURNAL, 6/10). The Admin. is using the Rio Declaration, "a document that sets out principles for sustainable development and relations between rich and poor countries," as a "bargaining chip ... linking its support for the current compromise on the declaration to the outcome of other discussions." Summit observers said "reworking" the Declaration "could lead to the collapse of the delicately balanced compromise and possibly jeopardize the success of the Earth Summit" (GLOBE, 6/10). "It once again puts the [U.S.] in solitary opposition to the great majority of nations assembled here" (Robinson/Weisskopf, POST, 6/10). CBS' Susan Spencer on an Admin. explanation on the treaty: "This 'message isn't getting through' explanation has become the M.O. of the Bush campaign" (6/9).

*8 BUSH: MISSOULA, YOU'RE NEXT FOR PRESIDENT BUSH

Balto. SUN's Hill reports Bush has been invited to appear on a, NBC "Today" call-in show, such as the one Clinton did 6/9 and Perot plans to do 6/11. Bush "has refused," but "Today" exec. producer Jeff Zucker said, "they are reconsidering" (6/10). Bush spokesperson Torie Clarke: "Everything is under consideration. If you were to write that 'Larry King Live' is under consideration, you would be right" (N.Y. TIMES, 6/10). CBS' Susan Spencer reports Bush "will do most of his campaigning ... from the [WH] in a traditional way. ... Given his position in the polls right now ... the President would really be missing the boat, if he wasn't at least looking at other options" (6/9). WH press sec. Marlin Fitzwater said, "I'm sure the president will do some [talk shows]." While nothing is scheduled, Fitzwater said, "we'll probably do the same kind of media as the other candidates." Asked if "Arsenio" was under consideration, Fitzwater: "With that exception" (Keen, USA TODAY, 6/10).

ABORTION: HEARST's Charles Lewis reports a "noisy ruckus erupted" in the GOP's "big tent" when both sides of the abortion issue "clashed" over planned TV ads by Republicans for Choice. Eagle Forum's Phyllis Schlafly said while the ads, to air nationwide next week over local cable outlets, "purport to invite viewers to take part in a public opinion poll, the use of '900' telephone numbers makes the operation 'a scam to raise money.'" Schlafly said of GOPers for Choice's Ann Stone: "Like the late P.T. Barnum, Ann Stone must think there's a sucker born every minute." Stone responded by "likening" Schlafly to "Madame LaFarge, who knitted while people went to the guillotine during the French Revolution" (6/10).

ROCKY IRAQI TALK: ABC's Ted Koppel: "In what may well be the supreme irony of his presidency, it is becoming increasingly

clear that George Bush, operating largely behind the scenes throughout the 1980s, initiated and supported much of the financing, intelligence and military help that built Saddam's Iraq into the aggressive power that the United States would ultimately have to destroy ... One [WH] official in particular went out of his way to repeatedly call ABC news executives to undermine and prevent any further reporting on this subject" ("Nightline," ABC, 6/9).

MONEY PITS: The nomination of Donald Alexander to be Amb. to the Netherlands is being held up by Sen. Paul Sarbanes (D-MD) because of a \$100,000 contribution Alexander made to the GOP in 1/92 (mult., 6/10). Common Cause has urged the DoJ to appoint an independent counsel to probe "possible criminal conduct in connection with contributions" made to the 4/28 President's Dinner (Abramson, W.S. JOURNAL, 6/10).

TEAM BUSH: Germond & Witcover write, "The notion that the limitations of either [WH CoS Sam] Skinner or some deputy chief of staff are responsible for the president's political weakness is bizarre almost beyond belief. ... [Bush's problems] are clearly the result of his own failures" (Balto. EVENING SUN, 6/9). In a BOSTON HERALD op-ed, conservative activists Richard Viguerie and Steven Allen call for Bush to fire Skinner, Treas. Sec. Nicholas Brady, OMB Dir. Richard Darman, EPA Admin. Wm Reilly, "and others who represent the establishment that grass-roots Americans have identified as the Enemy" (6/9).

*9 **BUSH AD TEAM: NEW TEAM, BUT GUESS WHO DID LUNCH WITH BUSH** W.S. JOURNAL's Al Hunt: "I guarantee that Roger Ailes will be back by the Houston convention" ("Today," NBC, 6/10). AD AGE's Colford reports the Bush media team is "undergoing a shake-up. Last week, the team lost a founding member when media consultant Don Sipple resigned. The Sipple resignation seemed to surprise the president's campaign team ... Barely a week earlier, the Bush-Quayle campaign named Mr. Sipple as one of the 12 political and commercial admen expected to form the core of the president's re-election effort." Sources said Sipple's resignation was "for professional and personal reasons." With Sipple's resignation, only two members of the team, headed by Martin Puris, of NYC's Amaranti & Puris, "are seasoned, full-time political admen" -- Mike Murphy and Alex Castellanos. Sipple's resignation "coincides with the sudden availability of Dennis Frankenberry, a key member of the 1988 Bush ad team. ... Frankenberry said he's talked with the Bush campaign about enlisting. ... Insiders say there is growing sentiment among Bush supporters to try to coax political media guru Roger Ailes back to the team" (6/8 issue).

SIPPLE: His resignation on 6/2 reflected concern over the growing time burdens of responsibilities to his family, three GOP Senate campaigns -- Packwood (OR), Bond (MO), Cannon (UT) -- and Bush-Quayle (HOTLINE sources, 6/9).

AILES: He was seen emerging from a private luncheon with President Bush 6/9. Chief campaign strategist Bob Teeter was briefing the new Madison Ave. Bush ad team nearby; Ailes is said to have walked through the meeting and offered: "Just had lunch with the boss" (HOTLINE sources, 6/10).

*10 **QUAYLE:** A "CONSERVATIVE CALL TO ARMS" (MINUS MURPHY)

That's the W. TIMES' description of the VP's renewed "family values" rhetoric in his 6/9 speech to the Southern Baptists in Indianapolis that welcomed the "scorn of the media elite": "I

wear their scorn as a badge of honor (standing ovation) ... It is so great a divide that it sometimes seems we have two cultures, the cultural elite and the rest of us ... a cultural elite [which] respects neither tradition nor standards ... sneer[s] at the simple but hard virtues -- modesty, fidelity, integrity ... Talk about right and wrong and they'll try to mock us in newsrooms, sitcom studios and faculty lounges across America. But in the heart of America, in the homes and workplaces and churches, the message is heard ... They believe that moral truths are relative and all 'lifestyles' are equal ... They deny that values have consequences ... an ever-increasing rate of illegitimacy, youthful promiscuity, 1.6 million abortions every year ... They are wrong ... We cannot, as the sophisticated folks are always reminding us, 'turn the clock back' to the America of Norman Rockwell and the smalltown values he celebrated. And yet those values are still there. These values live because they are invaluable. They stand as our essential guide to a good and honest life. The elite's culture is a guilt-free culture. It avoids responsibility and flees consequences. Those who imagine an America without clear moral values yearn for something that could never be. If America ever lost its moral vision, it would cease to be America" (mult., 6/10).

MORE: AP, which pointed out that Quayle "could make some claim to the 'media elite' himself as the scion of a newspaper-publishing family," said in a post-speech press session he ducked the gathering's issue of barring congregations which approve homosexual behavior. Quayle: "The preferred lifestyle is one of marriage. The preferred lifestyle is the traditional family. What one does in the privacy of one's home, what one does privately, that's his business or her own business" (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 6/10). N.Y. NEWSDAY's Kasindorf, saying that Quayle is "demonstrating a feisty independence from [WH] handlers," reports he will bring his message to a Nassau Co. (Long Island) GOP reception tonight and a Nat'l Right to Life meet 6/11 (6/10).

REAX: Family Research Council's Gary Bauer: "This language should have been spoken on Inauguration Day ... but better late than never." Human Rights Campaign Fund's Greg King: "[Bush and Quayle] oppose equality. They are making a fundamentally incorrect political position" (W. TIMES, 6/10). Carl Rowan wonders if the Bush comment that he would do "whatever it takes to get re-elected" includes "dumping" the "baggage" of Quayle from the ticket: "Bush needs people around him who know something about being poor, black, brown and far removed from the country club set." Many "probably even Mrs. Bush, are telling the president that 'pride goeth before a fall'" (N.Y. POST, 6/10). AD AGE, reporting on the new Volvo print ad ("Vice President Quayle: What do you think of these family values?") quotes Volvo ad manager Robt Austin: "'Family values' is what Volvo is all about" (6/8).

POLLS: Rowan cited a recent NBC/WSJ survey that showed 44% rating Quayle negatively, 24% positively (N.Y. POST, 6/10). ABC/W.POST showed his fav/unfav at 26%/54% (while Murphy Brown was at 50%/21%) (see HOTLINE 6/9). W. TIMES and USA TODAY report a Wirthlin Group survey on family values for READERS DIGEST (1013 adults over 25): 74% say there are no circumstances that can justify infidelity in marriage; 78% say prayer is an important part of their daily life; 78% favor the daily pledge of allegiance in school; 3/4 of families with children think the mother should stay home if they don't need job wages; 46% of singles, 44% of marrieds without children and 28% of marrieds

with children think homosexuals should have the right to marry; "Singles and childless families are largely pro-choice; families with children are pro-life" (TIMES, 6/10); 64% of married parents think of themselves as conservative, compared to 45% of singles and 49% of childless couples; "48% of married parents favor abortion rights, in contrast to 72% of singles and 64% of childless couples" (USA TODAY, 6/10).

***11 PEROT: TALKING TO SAATCHI ON MEDIA?**

W.S. JOURNAL reports Perot "has approached" the London offices of Saatchi & Saatchi "about working on his U.S. media campaign." A British press report said Perot "wanted to hire the same team" that handled the Conservatives' upset win this year, "and that if Saatchi got the business, it would set up a special office in Dallas." A London spokesperson said Perot is one of several "senior American politicians" the firm is talking to. Saatchi's NYC office "is also being considered to handle media buying" for Bush. The only other comment from Saatchi was that "its conversations with U.S. politicians have focused more on such matters as the timing of media exposure." Perot chair Tom Luce admitted "inquiries" from Saatchi, but said it was "too early" to talk about the matter, and he "didn't know when" the campaign would sign a media consultant (6/10). Note: Saatchi handled media for Sen. Lowell Weicker, then a GOPer, in his unsuccessful '88 re-elect bid.

OTHER STAFF NOTES: Analyst Bill Shipp reports ex-GA Dem chair/Carter OMB Dir. Bert Lance "is advising Perot operatives on campaign strategy. He urged Hamilton Jordan ... to join the Perot campaign." Sec/State Max Cleland (D), who backed Kerrey, said he will "keep his office open" Saturday, 6/27, so Perot backers can present their petition signatures at an Atlanta rally to be attended by Perot (BILL SHIPP'S GEORGIA, 6/8 issue).

A HOUSE RACE FIRST? TX businessman/'90 cand. John Wayne Caton (D), the Dem nominee to face Rep. Dick Armey (R-26), endorsed Perot "after much soul-searching and prayer." At last weekend's TX Dem convention, Caton was a Clinton delegate; Armey got 70% v. Caton in '90 (HOUSTON CHRONICLE, 6/9).

THOSE INSIDE-OUTSIDERS: W. POST's Broder gives high marks to weekend talk performances by Perot aides Tom Luce and Mort Meyerson, and wonders why Perot needed the Rollins/Jordan combo. Reviewing past "outsider" presidents, he concludes, "Maybe Jordan and Rollins can help Perot understand the built-in limits of the game he's playing" (6/10). B. GLOBE's Oliphant notes the two "have never been establishment figures; they have been movement figures." He notes Rollins' frequent use of the term "party dealignment," concluding "in the face of another agenda-less [GOP] campaign and a [Dem] effort that appears to stand for everything, the stage may be set for the ultimate dealignment" (6/10). USA TODAY header: "Clinton, Bush forced to run as 'insiders'" (6/10).

THE MORNING AFTER: Cleveland mayor Michael White (D), one of 5 mayors who met with Perot recently (see HOTLINE 6/9), "issued a wake-up call for the national media to hold [Perot's] feet to the fire on the tough issues." While admitting he finds Perot "refreshing," White, a late comer to the Clinton camp, said: "I am not willing to say we ought to give the country to him." He went on to make a thinly-veiled comparison to "another country ... where a leader came out of nowhere who said all the right things." Asked if he meant Hitler, White: "I'm not referring to anyone. I'm just leaving the parallel for you to

make your judgment" (Marrison, Cleveland PLAIN DEALER, 6/10).

*12 PEROT: MORE THREE-WAY THINKING; DENIES VIET BUSINESS DEAL
NBC's John Chancellor on the possible dilemma for House Members: "I think they'd have to vote for the presidential candidate who won their [CD]. The framers of the Constitution set up the [CD] as the unit of the federal government closest to the people. The clearest and most direct line between the people and their government. ... Every candidate for a House seat this fall should promise to follow the voters in that [CD] ... The country is already awash in cynicism about politics, if a bad political smell permeates the choosing of the next president ... the whole process will be dragged through the mud. That's why we need some rules" (6/9).

ELECTORAL COLLEGE: Bob Novak's projection: Perot -- 346, incl. CA, TX, GA. Bush -- 183, incl. NY, most of South. Clinton -- 9 AR, DC. Columnist Elaine Kamarck's projection: Bush -- 264, incl. FL, most of South. Perot -- 173, incl. CA, TX. Clinton -- 101 (CNN, 6/9). In FL, a measure to change Elector allocation to a proportionate system (currently only in ME, NE) "didn't get any farther than the [FL] Senate." The issue "isn't included in the call of the [6/1-19] special session" on the new FL budget, but Gov. Lawton Chiles (D) could add it if he chose (AP/ORLANDO SENTINEL, 6/9).

VIETNAM BUSINESS QUESTIONS: Perot on reports he "pursued possible commercial ventures with the Vietnamese" while working for POW releases: "You have my word on it, my oath on it. None of this is true. It did not occur" (DALLAS MORNING NEWS, 6/10).

MORE TV TALK: H&R Block CEO Henry Block: "Being a [CEO] is a lot different than being President ... I would hate to take a chance that a person who has been a businessman could also be good at politics." Perot Wall St. banker Kenneth Langone: "This notion that Ross is an autocrat is 100% wrong." He added: "He wants to make certain if he makes a political promise, he can keep the promise. If he's offering pie in the sky, he'll have the recipe to bake pie in the sky." BOSTON GLOBE's Goodman: "People really don't want to solve their own problems ... they would like to find someone to deposit their worries" ("MacNeil/Lehrer," PBS, 6/9). ABC's Sam Donaldson appeared on the "Tonight Show." Donaldson on Perot: "He's a force, but so is Godzilla ... he's like an empty vessel, you put in anything you want ... Once he starts saying things specific, half the audience is going to start to think he's a bum." Donaldson, when Leno asked why Perot was playing "this silly game" of not declaring his candidacy and claiming he doesn't really want the office: "Perot began running for the presidency at least 18 months ago" (NBC, 6/9). Tim Russert on his suggestion that Perot tell the public that he only wants one term as president: "It will really underscore and cement his relationship with the American people that he is in this business for a different reason than typical politicians" ("Today," NBC, 6/10).

ALSO: W. POST's Kurtz profiles Perot spokesperson James Squires, highlighting the ex-CHICAGO TRIBUNE editor's frustration with what he sees as journalistic cynicism -- especially from "the amateur sleuths, kids who don't know beans and they're going to intimidate me ... There is a belligerent attitude that I am lying from the minute I answer the phone" (6/10). USA TODAY header over dreamy-eyed quotes from political pros: "\$100M question: How to spend a political fortune" (6/10). AP's Michael Holmes reports on a document in the LBJ Library from '63,

where a 32-year old Perot wrote to the then-VP "complain[ing]" about the treatment he got in a meeting with Pentagon officials on a backup computer system for the military (PHILA. INQUIRER, 6/10). N.Y. POST's Norwich reports Donald Trump "stopp[ed] short of confirming" Perot was soliciting his support, and adds: "Like many people around town, Trump thinks the ... campaign will end with a vote in Congress" (6/10). Wm F. Buckley wonders about Perot's position on one of his own cause celebres: Legalizing marijuana (N.Y. DAILY NEWS, 6/10). Front-page N.Y. TIMES header: "Some Gaps Emerge in Perot's Appeal; In Surveys, Blacks, Jews, and Women Say They're Wary." Richard Berke reviews the most recent CBS poll (see HOTLINE 6/2) and CA exit poll data (6/10).

***14 BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT: HOUSE WARMS UP FOR VOTE TOMORROW**

The House defeated a bill Tuesday to require the pres. to submit a balanced budget 220-199. Rep. Barbara Kennelly (D-CT) offered the proposal "as a statutory alternative to changing the Constitution. But opponents charged that it was a transparent attempt to siphon support from the balanced-budget amendment by offering 'political cover' to those who favor deficit reduction but are reluctant to amend the Constitution." Chief amendment sponsors Rep. Charles Stenholm (D-TX) and Sen. Paul Simon (D-IL) met to "agree to identical language" to avoid any chances the Leadership could undermine the bill in conference. Speaker Tom Foley, Sen. Maj. Leader George Mitchell and Sen. Appropriations chair Robert Byrd (D-WV) oppose the measure. Before the House votes on the Stenholm-Simon amendment, they will consider two GOP alternatives, including one calling for a 3/5 vote to raise taxes. The House will also consider an alternative offered by House Maj. Leader Gephardt (D-MO), "which would allow expenditures to exceed revenues if the Congress and president

agree." Gephardt would include Social Security in any budget cutting. House Budget cmte chair Leon Panetta (D-CA) said yesterday's vote indicated the Stenholm backers "are in a strong position going into the final vote." Stenholm: "We still have a solid 290 votes as of this minute, and I do not think that's going to change" (Pianin, W. POST, 6/10).

NETWORK TV: ABC's Brit Hume, over video of Bush with House GOP leaders: "Republicans think it looks good for the president to back, even unsuccessfully, a balanced budget amendment while the Democrats oppose it. But it might also be seen as a sign of the futility of the President's current political strategy. Instead of taking on his two opponents, he stays mostly inside the beltway, trying to do business with the only people in town whose approval ratings are lower than his" (6/9). NBC's Tom Brokaw: "The federal budget deficit -- \$400 billion and counting. One of the most expensive, destructive forces in the lives of all taxpayers ... and no realistic solution was in sight today." NBC's Andrea Mitchell's "reality check": "All the candidates say they would control the deficit monster, but there's a big gap between their promises and budget reality. ... If the balanced budget amendment passes," either Bush, Clinton or Perot, "would actually have to submit a balanced budget. And so far, none of them have come up with a way to do it" (6/9).

DON'T JUST DO SOMETHING, TALK ABOUT IT: W. POST runs excerpts from statements made by President Ford on 6/1 at the National Press Club, in which Ford calls the balanced budget amendment a "gimmick": "This is only another crutch to solve something that ought to be solved ... by some hard-headed votes on Capitol Hill" (6/10). In a N.Y. TIMES op-ed, President Reagan urges passage of the amendment: "Here I go again. ... A balanced budget amendment provides the discipline the members of Congress say they want and need" (6/10). Speaker Tom Foley (D-WA) and OMB Dir. Richard Darman appeared on PBS' "MacNeil/Lehrer." Foley: "It will not help, it will hurt, and it will confuse and damage our constitutional condition." Darman: "I trust it's agreed, we do not have the discipline, we badly need the discipline." Darman on what is out of control: "Not social security. ... We would not touch social security." Foley: "Not one of the suggestions ... made, has anything to do with a constitutional amendment." Foley on the argument for: "It's kind of like putting leeches on the sick patient, because we've tried every other cure" ("MacNeil/Lehrer," PBS, 6/9). On CNN's "Crossfire," John Sununu responded to Rep. Richard Durbin's (D-IL) statement that his colleagues are "excited about the idea of working" with a President Clinton, "having a challenging agenda and a timetable to perform it in." Sununu: "You are passing bills that would unbalance the budget, just as you Democrats are opposed to passing the balanced budget amendment." Durbin: "It's a little hard to hear you say John, that we want to unbalance the budget. I've been waiting for this balanced budget from your White House and the current White House -- haven't seen it yet." Michael Kinsley: "Why doesn't President Bush propose a balanced budget if he's for it?" Sununu: "Because Congress has dug the hole so deep" ("Crossfire," CNN, 6/8).

*16 OHIO: GLENN'S NUMBERS LIFT OFF

An exit poll conducted during OH's 6/2 primary by Voter Research & Surveys of 1600 OH voters, showed 72% OH Dems and more than 40% OH GOPers have a favorable opinion of Sen. John Glenn (D). These numbers are up from a VRS exit poll conducted during the 11/90 OH Gov. election, when Glenn was still involved in a probe of his "Keating Five" involvement. In that 11/90 poll, only 34% thought Glenn should run for re-election, while 47% thought he should retire. Glenn spokesman Dale Butland called the most recent VRS poll "good news." But LG Michael DeWine (R) manager Curt Steiner said, although Glenn is popular, "a lot of people want to retire him ... Glenn is vulnerable in 1992 and he really hasn't been vulnerable in the past." DeWine was not included in the VRS survey. Cleveland PLAIN DEALER's Funk writes Ohioans "feel pretty good about" Glenn. "So good that they may have forgiven his brush with the savings and loan scandal" (6/5).

COLUMBUS DISPATCH's Lee Leonard covers DeWine's Statehouse rally the day after the primary. DeWine "blasted" Glenn and "delivered what may become the headline for his campaign litany next fall": "After 18 years in the Senate, what on Earth has John Glenn done?" DeWine hoped to "hit while people were still attuned to elections and campaigns." DeWine referred to Glenn's involvement in the S&L scandal and his failure to repay a \$2M '84 presidential campaign debt. Butland "served notice that Glenn is not going to lie down and let DeWine tarnish his star": "I hope by using cutesy terms like that ... DeWine is not attempting to disparage Senator Glenn's orbit around the Earth or the 150 bombing missions he flew for his country" (6/8).

FAMILY ISSUES: DeWine "vowed" family issues will be a "focus" of his campaign and said he would "push" unpaid leave for parents who must stay home temporarily with children as well as improved government cooperation to collect child support (Yost, Columbus DISPATCH, 6/5). DeWine's statements "drew fire" from Butland who said Glenn supports "parental legislation leave and so does Congress" but that the legislation "has been held up by the threat of a veto" from Bush (AP/PLAIN DEALER, 6/5).

*17 OREGON: LONSDALE CONSIDERS A NOVEMBER WRITE-IN CANDIDACY

Businessman Harry Lonsdale (D), who trails Rep. Les AuCoin (D-01) by 327 votes in the official tally released 6/8, said he "might pursue a write-in candidacy" if the official recount doesn't reverse his loss. Lonsdale said he is "weighing the write-in race because ... Oregon voters wanted someone who is not a congressional insider" like AuCoin and Sen. Bob Packwood (R). Lonsdale consultant Joe Trippi "believes a write-in candidacy might work in this year's unusual political climate": "The fact that you have to write him in makes it of a revolutionary act." Lonsdale said he "would not seriously pursue" a write-in bid "until after the recount," which begins 6/15 and will be completed 6/18. The pro-life group, OR Citizens Alliance "has talked about fielding" a third-party candidate, and ex-Lonsdale aide Joe Keating said he will "probably" run himself on the liberal Pacific Party ticket if Lonsdale doesn't win the Dem nod. The Pacific Party has about 15,000 of the 37,379 signatures needed to qualify for the ballot. OR law prohibits Lonsdale from appearing on the 11/92 ballot as an independent or a third-party candidate after losing a party primary. (Mapes, OREGONIAN, 6/9).

*18 PENNSYLVANIA: "GEORGE AND ARLEN DOWN ON THE FARM"

"It was payback time" for Pres. Bush at fundraiser for Sen. Arlen Specter (R), whose re-election has been "jeopardized by his prosecutorial questioning of Anita Hill." Bush told a group of 1400 PA GOPers he thought it "essential that Specter be returned to office," adding his visit wasn't a "normal political endorsement, I really mean it." According to Specter spokesman Dan McKenna, the event was expected to raise more than \$750,000 (Marcus, W. POST, 9/10). N.Y. POST's Orin reports Bush's tone at the event "offered a glimpse of [WH] strategy on how to handle [Dem] women candidates ... who are hoping Anita Hill's revenge will get them into the Senate." Bush did not mention Hill, or Specter's opponent, ex-women's group fund-raiser Lynn Yeakel (D). Instead he tried to show "Specter is on the side of American women," citing his "leadership" against pornography, which Bush called "the dry rot that degrades women" (6/10). The "giddy" crowd labeled the event "the Republican Woodstock." Specter called the event "a boost financially and also politically," and called Bush's speech "right on target." PHILA. DAILY NEWS' John Baer called the event, held on a farm south of Harrisburg, the "biggest fund-raiser ever" for Specter (6/10).

PROFILE: PHILA. INQUIRER's Carol Horner profiles Yeakel in a Sunday INQUIRER magazine cover story. Subhead: "How Lynn Yeakel transformed the politics of outrage into the power of politics." Horner credits Yeakel's success to her "style and demeanor ... What Yeakel stands for may be threatening to some, she herself is not. Thus, she's been able to make her views acceptable in established circles." Whether or not Yeakel wins in the fall, she has already changed the "political landscape" and as a result, women will begin "wielding more influence in Washington" (6/7). INQUIRER editorial asks: Was Lynn Yeakel "crafty or sloppy" in her "failure to pay thousands of dollars in city taxes" until just before her Senate run. Yeakel had registered to vote in Phila., so she could be "eligible to run for city council or take an appointive job," but lived with her family in Rosemont. (6/7).

***20 HOUSE RACE BRIEFINGS**

AZ 06: ARIZONA REPUBLIC reports ex-WH aide Doug Wead (R) "scored a political coup" by hiring State Rep. Lela Steffey (R) as campaign chair. Wead has been criticized as a "carpetbagger" for his less-than-two-year AZ residency, and Steffey is expected to give Wead "an aura of credibility among conservatives." Wead faces health-care exec. Mike Meyer (R) in the 9/8 primary for the

newly-created seat (6/5).

CT 05: HARTFORD COURANT reports Rep. Gary Franks (R) "owes tens of thousands of dollars" to banks in CT and MA. State Rep. Lynn Taborsak (D): "If Gary Franks can't manage his own financial affairs, we don't need him in Washington, adding to the sea of red ink." Judge James Lawlor (D): "It is now clear that his management problems and personal distractions have caused him to be ineffective." Franks had no direct statement, but "admitted he had financial problems, and blamed them on a downturn in the real estate market" (6/7).

FL 03: State Sen. Arnett Girardeau (D) announced he will run for the newly created black-majority CD, and will face State Rep. Corrine Brown (D) in the 9/1 primary. Girardeau said his friends had urged him to run: "They thought we black minorities would have a better chance of winning if I, as a senior elected official, ran" (AP/ORLANDO SENTINEL, 6/7).

FL 08: Insurance exec. Chuck Kovalski (R) plans to run for the newly drawn, "heavily" GOP CD. In his announcement, Kovalski "touted" his pro-choice abortion stance and his involvement with the term-limits group "Eight is Enough." Due to redistricting, Rep. Bill McCollum (R-05) will also run in the 8th CD. Also: ex-Orlando City atty. Lew Oliver (R). Primary 9/1 (Griffin, ORLANDO SENTINEL, 6/7).

NY 09: N.Y. POST's Kerrison describes the contest between Rep. Tom Manton (D) and ex-Hill staffer Dennis Shea (R) as "the stuff of David-Goliath politics. Ordinarily, Shea would be cannon fodder against a powerful, entrenched pro like Tom Manton. But this year is different." Shea, presently working as a counse to Sen. Bob Dole (R-KS), is highlighting Manton's 17 bounced checks and his pay raise vote, "but what really riles Shea" is a mailing Manton sent out after the war praising "our decisive victory" after voting against use of force. Shea called the mailing "insincere, at best, bordering on hypocritical." Shea has given Manton "fits" by airing radio spots asking voters to "bounce liberal Tom Manton from Congress the way he bounced those checks." Kerrison: "The race is so dicey in the prevailing climate that some political observers rate it even money" (6/8).

NY 13: Under the current redistricting plan, expected to be passed by the Leg. and signed by Gov. Cuomo (but still subject to DoJ approval), Rep. Ted Weiss (D-17) would lose his CD. Weiss has indicated he would challenge Rep. Stephen Solarz (D-13). N.Y. DAILY NEWS' Lombardi writes the "matchup could rival the dilly of a brawl caused by the '72 redistricting" matching incumbents Bella Abzug (D) and William Ryan (D). That race was "highlighted by rumors that Ryan was dying of cancer, which Ryan adamantly denied." Ryan won the primary, "only to die of throat cancer that September." Abzug then defeated Ryan's widow who ran as the Liberal candidate. Like the '72 race, "health rumors are cropping up about Weiss, 64, who had heart bypass surgery years ago." Weiss responded that he is in good health: "When all else fails, they lay me out on a slab" (6/9).

PA 10: Rep. Joe McDade (R), "facing a five-count federal bribery indictment," enlisted ex-House Speaker Tip O'Neill to serve as a fundraiser for his legal defense fund. O'Neill: "Joe called me the other day and asked me if I would [join the cmte]

... I said 'yes.' I wish him all the luck in the world." McDade has been accused of accepting bribes in exchange for defense contracts, and will "seek to have the charges dismissed at a hearing next week." O'Neill was "unfamiliar" with the details, but said he "can't imagine Joe doing anything of a

deliberate nature" (AP/BOSTON GLOBE, 6/8).

*21 MA HOUSE RACE BRIEFINGS

Although MA doesn't know whether it will have 10 or 11 CD after redistricting, 50 candidates filed as of the 6/2 deadline, including 5 women. Primaries 9/15.

MA 03: Ex-state Sen. Gerard D'Amico (D) announced his candidacy to unseat Rep. Joe Early (D), abandoning his plan to wait until the CDs were finalized. D'Amico: By not announcing "you run the risk of being irrelevant. I'm making a leap of faith that the district, even if it's redrawn, will be largely the central [MA] area I know well" (Hanafin, BOSTON GLOBE, 6/6). Atty Marty Healey announced his Dem bid: "People look at my resume favorably. When you compare my resume with Joe early's, you figure he can't be a viable candidate. If he ran on his accomplishment's he'd never be elected" (Connolly, Worcester TELEGRAM & GAZETTE, 6/4). Healey enjoys the support of former workers of Tsongas' presidential campaign (HOTLINE sources, 6/10). D'Amico and Healey join UMass prof. John Walsh (D) and atty Brian O'Connell (D) in the Dem race. Pro-choice businesswoman Michelle Flaherty joins state Reps. Peter Blute and David Lionett in the GOP race (GLOBE, 6/3).

MA 05: Middlesex Co. asst. DA Martin Meehan (D) is challenging Rep. Chet Atkins (D-05) while ex-Rep. Paul Gronin (R) and atty Michael Conway (R) face off on the GOP side.

MA 06: Rep. Nick Mavroules (D) faces "an intensive investigation spanning four decades" of his political career (BOSTON HERALD, 6/8). New allegations include federal grand jury testimony from MA liquor store owners who said they "had to bribe" then-Peabody mayor Mavroules and hire Mavroules' brother George (Meyers/Armstrong BOSTON HERALD, 6/6). The liquor store owners said they were "forced to pay George Mavroules cash in addition to his regular salary." Mavroules on the payoffs and bribes: "Without any doubt or question, that is a lie" (Kurkjian/McGrory, BOSTON GLOBE, 6/6). Mavroules also failed to disclose members' of his family ownership interest in a Peabody, MA bar. Mavroules daughter owned a one-fifth share of Steve's Lounge as well as an undetermined share of the real estate trust that bought the bar building. Ownership records include an alleged "straw" owner who "said his name was used to hid the Mavroules family interest." Records were "hidden" until '83, when Mavroules' daughter turned 21 and the congressman was no longer required to disclose her assets (Meyers/Levin/Armstrong, BOSTON HERALD, 6/4). State Rep. Barbara Hildt (D) is being criticized by MA Breast Cancer Coalition Northn Shore chapter chair Jan Nelson for "politicizing" a breast cancer education conference. Hildt charges that Mavroules "is trying to steal credit" for the conference. Mavroules called Hildt's criticism "a cheap political shot": "Doesn't Rep. Hildt realize the gravity of breast cancer?" (Connolly, BOSTON HERALD, 6/6). Hildt and Mavroules meet Beverly City Dem chair Eric Elbot in the primary. Elbot said his candidacy will "embody the principles of 'economic truth-telling' that were the hallmarks" of Paul Tsongas' pres. run. Elbot will limit contributions to \$100 (Aucoin, BOSTON GLOBE, 6/2). GOPers: Ex-MA GOP exec. dir. Sandy Tennant and ex-Gov. Weld admin. member Peter Torkildsen.

MA 11: Sec/State Michael Connolly (D) "aborted his wounded," but as yet unannounced, campaign, "citing allegation that he pressured employees for political contributions as one reason for his decision": "Recent false and malicious attacks

leveled against me, when added to the rigors of a campaign, have led me to the conclusion that the cost of the congressional campaign to my family and to my duties as [sec./state] is too high." Connolly spokesperson Susan Pye: "He's not getting out solely because of two day's worth of bad publicity. If anything, the press reports of the last couple of days have detracted from the issues he wants to focus on." Connolly "admitted to soliciting employees for funds but denied any strong arm tactics" (Cafasso, BOSTON HERALD, 6/8). Connolly had denied the reports on 6/5, "but later that day acknowledged that he recently held 'information meetings' with his staff outside his office" at which he asked for campaign donations (Matchan, BOSTON GLOBE, 6/8). Investigations have found Connolly "has amassed scores of questionable campaign expenditures in the past decade" (BOSTON HERALD, 6/8). Dems: State Sen. Paul Harold, Boston City Councilors Thomas Menino and Charles Yancey, Norfolk Co. DA Wm Delahunt, businessman John Shields and economist Eleanor Mulloney. GOPers: Whitman Finance Cmte member Penny Reid and teacher Patrick Walsh.

*22 NY 05: McGRATH OPTS FOR FAMILY OVER ANOTHER TERM

Rep. Raymond McGrath (R) announced he would not seek a seventh term because he wanted to spend more time with his family. "I desperately want to become the type of father my father was to me." McGrath, who two years ago was rumored ready to retire, called the decision "agonizing," and said "the moment of crises" came when he missed his youngest son's first birthday due to "constituent work." Several years ago, McGrath "collapsed" in his office because of a blood clot in his lung, but said he now feels "like a 20-year old," adding he was convinced he would have won re-election because he had not bounced any checks, and the NY redistricting plan would have kept his seat safe (Gruson, N.Y. TIMES, 6/10).

===== CALIFORNIA CABLE =====

*23 51ST STATE: RURAL AREAS SAY "WE WANT OUT"

L.A. TIMES' Warren writes, "The message rumbling out of the rural north on Election Day was loud and unmistakably clear: We have had it with [CA] and we want out." Twenty-seven of 31 one counties voting approved "with gusto" a measure to split the state (see HOTLINE 6/4). Assemblyman Stan Statham (R), who "engineered the secessionist proposal," said the 6/2 results will add "immense momentum" to the effort. Statham plans to introduce legislation 6/16 to carve CA into 2, or possibly 3 states. U/Cal-Berkeley's Bruce Cain calls those reasons "'Ross Perotism' at work -- a sense that anything would but what we have would be a welcome improvement" (6/4). The measure did better in rural areas than urban centers, as the "divisionist fever sprung from forth from [CA's] rural outback, where the sting of the recession has pushed disenchantment with the status quo to new extremes." (L.A. TIMES, 6/3). S.F. supervisor Angela Alioto: "I think it's pretty farfetched. [But] never say never" (MIAMI HERALD, 6/7). In order to truly create a new state CA would need approval from the state legislature as well as Congress.

*24 CA CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION: A MORE FEMININE LOOK

Along with the female tandem of 2 women Dem Senate nominees, Dianne Feinstein and Barbara Boxer, CA women took a "quantum leap" as 16 women won House primaries. All but 2 of the women are Dems, "a factor that may put a dent in the GOP's plans to

seize a majority" of the CA delegation for the first time since '56. Dems currently outnumber GOPers 26-19. DCCC chair Rep. Vic Fazio (D-04): "These are women who have credibility, who have done well and continued their ascent up the political ladder. These are not accidents and have not been coat-tailed in by anyone else." Women face women in 2 CD's: L.A. City Councilor Joan Milke Flores (R) faces atty Jane Harman in the 36th; San Diego Port commis. Lynn Schenk (D) faces businesswoman Judy Jarvis (R) in the 49th. Other Dem women: Patricia Malberg (4th), Lynn Woolsey (6th), Patty Garamendi (11th), Anna Eshoo (14th), Gloria Ochoa (22nd), Lucille Roybal-Allard (33rd), Molly McClanahan (40th), Georgia Smith (44th), Patricia McCabe (45th), Bea Herbert (51st), and Janet Gastil (52nd) (L.A. TIMES, 6/4).

"SEXIEST SIX": S.D. UNION-TRIBUNE's Barabak reports experts in both parties and registration and voting patterns suggests 20 solid and 6 leaning Dem seats and 14 solid and 6 leaning GOP seats. Six seats hold the "balance between continued [Dem] control ... and an even partisan split." Barabak's "Sexiest Six": 1st -- where frosh Rep. Frank Riggs (R) faces ex-Mendocino Co. supv. Dan Hamburg (D). 6th -- Petaluma vice mayor Lynn Woolsey meets "left-leaning" Assemb. Bill Filante (R). 24th -- Rep. Tony Beilenson (D) "faces the fight of his career" with "arch conservative" assemblyman Tom McClintock (R). 36th -- Flores and Harman. 38th CD -- Long Beach councilman Evan Anderson Braude (D), son retiring Rep Glen Anderson (D-32) faces "moderate" ex-Nixon aide Steve Horn (R). 42nd -- Rep. George Brown (D-36) faces Dick Rutan (R) "of Voyager aircraft fame" (6/6).

*25 CA STATE ASSEMBLY: A RETURN TO GOP RULE?

Under L.A. TIMES header, "Wilson May Get His Dream Legislature," CA analyst Sherry Bebitch Jeffe examines Gov. Pete Wilson's (R) "crusade to change the face of the state Legislature." Wilson "gambled big" and won his "desired political map" in state redistricting and tried to recruit strong GOP candidates to run. He endorsed 19 -- 8 incumbents (3 unopposed) and 11 challengers. All the incumbents and 8 of his endorsed challengers won, but some "right-wingers ... who dislike Wilson's agenda" also won "significant victories." While "Wilson did save a couple of his moderate Assembly allies from right-wing challenges" on 6/2 and a couple of "hard-core conservatives" left to run for Congress, the result could be "a more homogeneous and complicated GOP caucus" (6/7). Others chose to "interpret the results differently," including a group of conservative Assembly GOPers who pointed out 12 of their 14 endorsed candidates won. The conservative grass-roots CA Republican Assembly and the CA Pro-Life Council also "claimed victory at Wilson's expense" (L.A. TIMES, 6/4). S.F. EXAMINER's Irving writes the primary "split the [CA GOP] into two warring encampments -- an elated and militant coalition of conservatives in one and dismayed and disorganized moderates in the other" (6/6).

*26 SENATE WATCH: "AS DIFFERENT AS THELMA AND LOUISE"

S.F. CHRONICLE's Roberts writes, "Although the national media are treating them as the female equivalent of Tweedledum and Tweedledee," Rep. Barbara Boxer (D-06) and ex-S.F. Mayor Dianne Feinstein (D) "are actually as different as Thelma and Louise. Like the heroines of the hit movie, Boxer and Feinstein have embarked together on a great adventure -- each bringing a very different style and personal background. Boxer is a liberal molded by the 1960's; Feinstein reflects the more moderate views

of the 1950s. Boxer is impetuous; Feinstein is imperious. Boxer is energetic; Feinstein is elegant." Feinstein speaks "regally" and Boxer "more raucously." Feinstein manager Kam Kuwata: "Dianne and Barbara are going to be campaigning a lot together, but also moving around the state separately" to offset the "perception of the female candidates as a 'unit.'" Kuwata "denied" Boxer and Feinstein's similarities were a drawback in any way: "The message of the [CA] primary was clearly that people are frustrated with the system and lets figure out how to change it. The buzzword is change" (6/5).

AD NAUSEUM: KCOP-TV political commentator Bill Press reviews the campaign tactics used in the Senate primaries and concluded Feinstein and Boxer's media campaigns vs. the campaigns of Rep. Mel Levine (D-27) and Controller Gray Davis (D) "offered a clear choice between candidates who respected voters and candidates who disdained them. ... Boxer and Feinstein weren't the only ones who won [6/2]. We all did" (L.A. TIMES; 6/4). WASH. POST's Howard Kurtz looks at the unsuccessful campaigns of Davis and Levine, both advised by BAD Campaigns, whose "losses have sparked questions about the effectiveness of New-Age campaigns that rely almost exclusively" on TV ads (6/7)

SITE OF THE CHEMICAL WEAPONS PROHIBITION ORGANIZATION (CWPO): We have been told that Lubbers may call you to try to win our support for locating in The Hague the body which would be responsible for ensuring compliance of the Chemical Weapons convention, once agreed. Attached is an advance copy of a letter from Lubbers to you on this subject.

The Dutch are competing with the Austrians and the Swiss, who have offered Vienna and Geneva respectively as the seat of the CWPO. Vienna is the main contender:

- The Hague hosts such international institutions as the International Court of Justice; the Dutch also claim The Hague offers cost advantages.
- Vienna offers economies of scale through the presence of the European office of the United Nations and other UN

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agencies. This would permit missions in Vienna to double-hat representatives to the CWPO and other international agencies, such as the IAEA.

A decision on the site may be made later this month by the negotiators in Geneva. Currently, we are uncommitted. State is divided on which site to support.

URUGUAY ROUND. We should emphasize the need to solve the EC agricultural problems this month (before the G-7 meetings in Munich).

FRANCO-GERMAN CORPS: Although Foreign Minister van den Broek firmly shares our concerns about the Franco-German Corps, Prime Minister Lubbers (who aspires to become President of the EC Commission) wants to avoid upsetting the French and has convened an ad hoc Council with the Foreign and Defense Ministers to review the Dutch position on the Corps. You should express our concerns about the Corps and our thanks for strong Dutch support on this issue.

CSCE: PEACEKEEPING: The Dutch have taken the lead in pressing for a NATO role in peacekeeping under CSCE auspices. We fully support the Dutch approach and have agreed to co-sponsor their proposed text for the Helsinki CSCE Summit Declaration.

CSCE HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR MINORITIES: Foreign Minister van den Broek is personally behind the Dutch proposal to create a CSCE High Commissioner for Minorities to look into complaints by minority groups against their national authorities. We are concerned that the proposal could encourage domestic groups to go around their own elected governments, including our own, to engage CSCE in internal problems; we counter-proposed a "special representative" on human dimension issues at the disposal of the CSCE chairman. The Dutch were not satisfied, but we are working with them to find acceptable middle ground.

UNCED: You called Lubbers seeking his support on the compromise for the climate treaty, which he gave. He may ask you about the biological diversity convention, which the Dutch will sign. Our problems involve intellectual property rights/technology transfer, financing, and biotechnology.

LUBBER'S DEPARTURE IN 1994

- I was sad to read that you have decided to step down in 1994. Is this firm? It will be a great loss for the Netherlands. You have done a great job.

SITE OF THE CHEMICAL WEAPONS PROHIBITION ORGANIZATION (CWPO)

- We will give your offer of The Hague our most serious consideration.

URUGUAY ROUND

- We made a little progress on agriculture when U.S. and EC ministers met here two weeks ago. We need to try to find a solution before the Munich Summit.
- I appreciate all of your hard work to find agreement. The Round will continue be a top priority for me regardless of our approaching elections.

FRANCO-GERMAN CORPS

- I am glad that the United States and the Netherlands are on the same wave length concerning European security. We very much appreciate the Netherlands strong support for the Alliance and for retaining U.S. troops in Europe.
- We support the development of the European Defense Identity, but have serious concerns about the Franco-German Corps.
- As we understand it, the Corps is outside the framework agreed at the Rome and Maastricht Summits last Fall. It gives the impression of a European Army outside of NATO and the WEU and thus sends the wrong signals to those here who would like to reduce our troop presence in Europe.

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- I very much hope we can continue to work closely together, and with the British, to prevent developments which will weaken the Alliance.

UNCED (If Raised)

- Thank you for your support on the Climate treaty language. As for the biological diversity accord, we have a strong record of support for protection of habitats and wildlife both at home and abroad.
- But the biodiversity treaty is seriously flawed. Nevertheless, we pledge full cooperation on conservation measures and will continue our multilateral and bilateral activities in this area.

CSCE: PEACEKEEPING (If Raised)

- We appreciate the Netherlands work to promote a NATO role in peacekeeping under CSCE auspices.
- We have agreed to co-sponsor your proposal for the CSCE Summit Declaration, and will continue to work closely with you in Helsinki.

CSCE: HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR MINORITIES (If Raised)

- We fully agree that CSCE must become more effective in dealing with national minority problems.
- We have some concerns with the particular formulation of your proposal for a High Commissioner for Minorities but want to work with your delegation in Helsinki to come up with a solution we both can support.

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YUGOSLAVIA (If Raised)

- We need to make the UN sanctions against Serbia and Montenegro as tight as possible in order to stop the bloodshed at the earliest possible time.
- We need to support the UN effort to provide humanitarian relief.
- The Netherlands' hard work on Yugoslavia over the past year has been extremely valuable.

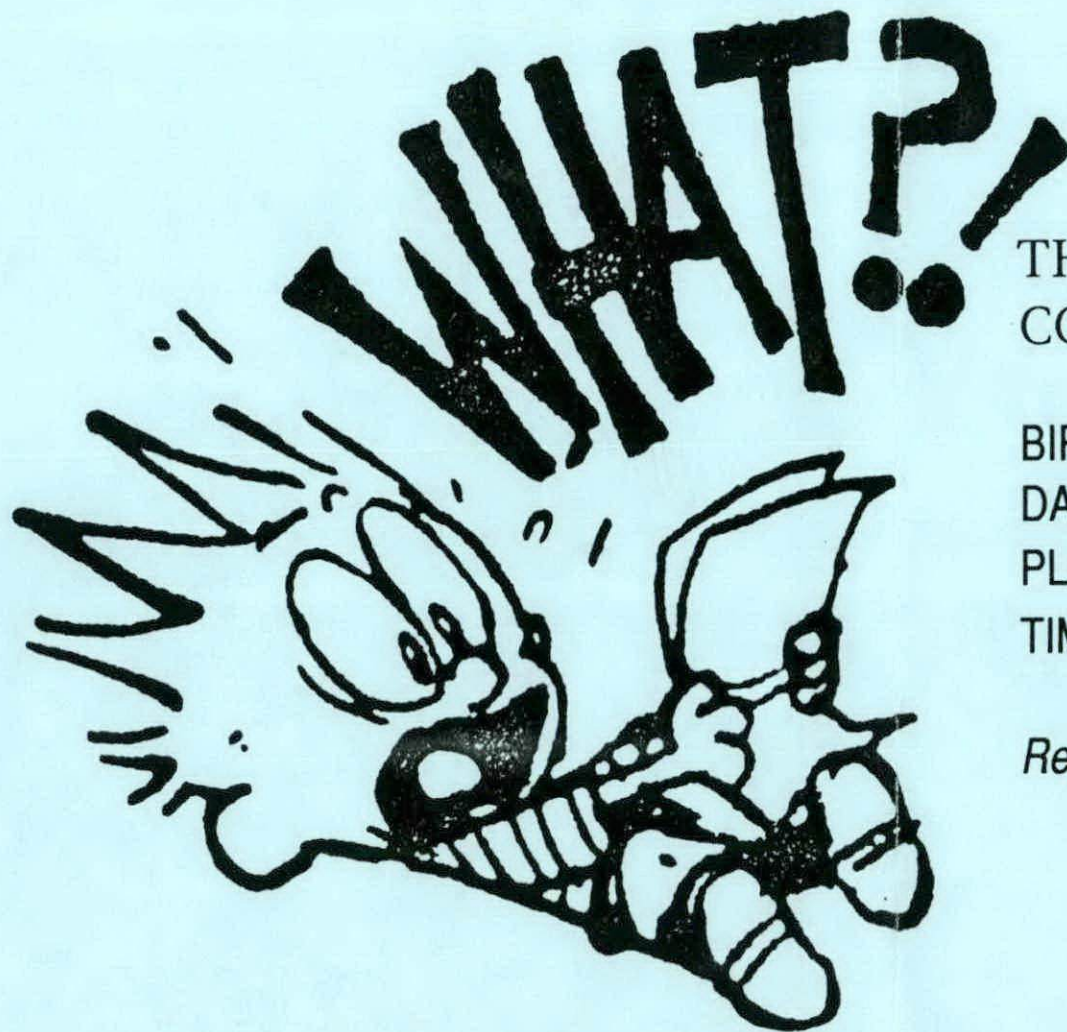

Today in Congress

House Floor: House members begin debate on a constitutional amendment to require that the federal budget be balanced each year.

The measure (H J Res 290) is being pushed hard by President Bush and conservatives, who argue that the federal budget is out of control. The administration projects a fiscal 1992 deficit of \$399.4 billion.

The measure is opposed by many Democrats who claim that political will, not a constitutional amendment, is what is needed to erase the enormous deficits the federal government has been running in recent years.

Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., has mounted an extensive lobbying effort, but the chief sponsor of the measure, Charles W. Stenholm, D-Texas, yesterday asserted that he had the 290 votes needed to approve the legislation, which would then have to be approved by two-thirds of the Senate and ratified by three-fourths of the states.

Foley told reporters yesterday that the final vote on the constitutional amendment will be "the most important vote" of the second session of the 102nd Congress. He said it would be "passed or rejected by a handful of votes."

As introduced by Stenholm, H J Res 290 would include Social Security within the balanced budget rules and require a three-fifths vote of the whole number of both chambers to approve a bill that would increase the deficit.

Members will consider four substitute amendments to the measure, and, under the "king of the hill" procedure, the last one that prevails will supersede all the others.

Republicans Jon Kyl, Ariz., and Joe L. Barton, Texas, will offer the first two amendments. Kyl's proposal would require that federal outlays not exceed 19 percent of the gross national product.

Barton's amendment would require a three-fifths vote of each chamber to approve an increase in the federal budget that was a larger percentage increase than the increase in national income.

Members may get to votes on those two amendments today and hold off until tomorrow consideration of a proposal by Majority Leader Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., that would exclude Social Security from the balanced budget rules and require only a simple majority to approve a bill that would increase the deficit.

Consideration of a revised version of Stenholm's measure that was being finalized yesterday may also be put off until tomorrow.

Amendments to the bill can be approved by a simple majority, but House approval of the final measure requires a two-thirds tally of those voting.

Senate Floor: Members will resume consideration of legislation that would prohibit employers from permanently replacing workers who go on strike.

A 1938 Supreme Court decision allows companies to hire permanent workers to do the jobs of striking employees, unless the workers are protesting unfair or unsafe labor practices. The bill (S 55),

HOUSE FLOOR: Balanced budget bill rejected by House.

The House yesterday defeated a bill (HR 5333) that would have required the president and Congress to write annual budgets in which expenditures do not exceed receipts. The vote was 199-220.

Republicans panned the measure, offered by the Democratic leadership, calling it a ploy to diminish support for a balanced budget constitutional amendment (H J Res 290) that members will begin debate on today.

The bill would have required the president and Congress to eliminate the federal budget deficit, projected to be \$399.4 billion in fiscal 1992, by fiscal 1998.

Minority Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., said the main aim of HR 5333 was "to provide cover to vote against a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution."

But the bill's author, Barbara B. Kennelly, D-Conn., said the measure "was not being used as cover for anyone" and was necessary "to protect the integrity of the Constitution" by ensuring that economic policy was not made part of it.

Jobless Benefits. At press time, the House was considering a bill (HR 5260) that would extend a federal program that provides up to 26 weeks of unemployment benefits to jobless workers who have exhausted their regular allotment of state coverage.

The Bush administration has said it would veto the measure, citing an increase in employer taxes included in the bill to finance the additional benefits. The president also objects to permanent changes that would be made to the unemployment benefits program.

SENATE FLOOR: Mental health agency reorganization approved.

The Senate approved, 86-8, the conference report on legislation (S 1306) that would reauthorize federal substance abuse and mental health programs for fiscal 1993-94.

The legislation would also dismantle the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration, folding its three research agencies into the National Institutes of Health.

Opponents argued that the bill would revise state funding formulas for mental health block grants in a way that would reduce the level of grants received in some states.

Striker Replacement. The Senate began consideration of so-called "striker replacement" legislation (S 55) that would prohibit employers from perma-

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one of organized labor's highest priorities, is designed to block this decision.

Supporters of the measure argue that for the past 10 years employers have chosen to replace workers rather than negotiate.

But opponents contend that the legislation would give employees more reason to strike, knowing that their jobs are safe. President Bush has threatened to veto the measure.

The House passed a similar bill (HR 5) last July.

Spending Measures: Two House Appropriations subcommittees will meet today to work on their fiscal 1993 spending bills.

Lawmakers on the Legislative Subcommittee will face an especially tight budget, as that panel's allocation for programs under its jurisdiction was frozen at the fiscal 1992 level. In addition, actual spending is expected to be reduced by about \$50 million.

Legislators will have a total of about \$2.33 billion with which to fund all legislative branch activities and functions.

The Treasury, Postal Service and General Government Subcommittee also faces budget constraints. The \$11.2 billion in discretionary funding allotted to that panel represents only a \$131 million increase over the fiscal 1992 level.

Subcommittee staffers have hinted that a planned modernization of the Internal Revenue Service's computer system may be cut.

Subsidies for postal rates may also be reduced, a move that is opposed by non-profit organizations, which benefit from the government assistance.

ERISA Changes: Two bills that would clarify legal provisions relating to federal and state regulation of employee health benefits will be marked up by the House Education and Labor Committee.

Both measures would amend the 1974 Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA), which regulates employee benefits and pre-empts state laws in this area. While certain benefits such as pensions are outlined in detail under ERISA, others such as health insurance are only broadly addressed.

One bill (HR 2782) would clarify instances in which Congress never intended for ERISA to pre-empt state authority, thus narrowing the cases where ERISA can be used to supersede state law. For instance, a New York law that required contractors to offer prevailing wages and benefits, which was struck down by a circuit court based on ERISA, would be allowed.

The original text of the other measure (HR 1602) would allow states to set

standards to allow individuals to sue their health insurance companies for damages as a result of unfair or bad faith claims practices.

But committee Democrats plan to offer a substitute that would establish federal standards for individual claimants under ERISA instead of passing the responsibility on to the states. Under the substitute, prevailing plaintiffs for health benefits could collect attorney's fees and expert witness fees. Plaintiffs would also be eligible to receive punitive damages in cases of fraud.

Soviet Aid: Draft legislation that would authorize assistance to the former Soviet republics will be marked up by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

The measure would authorize \$610 million for fiscal 1992 and 1993.

The bill would authorize spending on programs such as providing emergency humanitarian assistance and aiding the republics in making the transition to a democratic and market-oriented system.

In addition, the measure would provide for technical assistance to the U.S. private sector in order to encourage businesses to invest in the former Soviet republics.

The measure does not specify how much money would be earmarked for each part of the assistance package, giving the administration flexibility in determining spending priorities.

According to a Republican staffer, the measure has broad bipartisan support and is expected to win easy committee approval.

Pacific Yew: A bill aimed at guaranteeing a sustainable supply of an anticancer drug derived from the Pacific Yew tree will likely move one step closer to the House floor today, as the House Interior Committee is prepared to approve the measure.

The yew's bark contains the chemical compound taxol, a substance that has been highly successful in treating some forms of cancer.

A slow-growing shrub found in the ancient forests of the Pacific Northwest, the yew has generally been destroyed during logging operations.

The measure (HR 3836) would require that the yews be harvested from federal forests and made available to drug companies before other trees are cut and that the yews be cut down in such a way as to allow the stump to sprout new growth.

The bill has already been approved by the Merchant Marine Committee and is expected to win backing from the Agriculture Committee soon.

Domestic Partners: The House District of Columbia Committee will vote

on a measure that would overturn a D.C. Council-passed measure that would expand eligibility for family health benefits to non-traditional partners of city workers.

The panel will mark up a resolution (H J Res 480) that would express disapproval of the proposal. If the resolution is passed by both chambers of Congress and signed by the president before June 11, the council's proposal would be nullified.

Under the D.C. measure, members of non-traditional family groups would be able to register with the D.C. government as domestic partners, thus qualifying them for family health-benefit coverage. The employees would assume the total cost of the additional coverage for their families.

Resolution sponsor Clyde C. Holloway, R-La., says that the D.C. measure would undermine family values. Other opponents also argue that the measure would be difficult to enforce and may be pre-empted by federal employment insurance codes.

But D.C. legal experts maintain that the proposal is acceptable under the Home Rule Act, which allows Congress to reject a D.C. council proposal if it violates a national interest or is deemed unconstitutional.

After hearing conflicting testimony last week, the Fiscal Affairs and Health Subcommittee sent the resolution to the full committee without recommendation.

Science Markup: The House Science, Space and Technology Committee has a full plate of bills to consider.

At the top of the agenda is a bill (HR 3215) that would authorize \$10 million annually in fiscal 1992 and 1993 for the establishment of an inter-American scientific cooperation program at the National Science Foundation (NSF). The program would provide the U.S. share of funding for joint research, education exchanges and information transfer.

The legislation would also encourage "debt for science" endeavors, in which the NSF would pay part of a Latin American country's debt in exchange for that nation's contribution to joint scientific research and education projects.

Also slated for markup is legislation (HR 3673) that aims to boost federal funding of desalinization programs. The bill which would direct the NSF to spend \$6 million through fiscal 1995 on desalinization technologies, such as advanced filtration membranes.

The committee will also consider:

- A draft measure to expand the authority of the NSF in regulating acceptable use of the NSF computer network (NSFNet).

- HR 3922, which would authorize grants, fellowships and an electronic data archive to promote biomedical research in space.

Republicans oppose the legislation, saying it amounts to unneeded government interference in the business sector. But bill supporters say it would encourage corporate managers to negotiate differences with labor.

Debate on S 55 will continue today.

WHITTEN RELINQUISHES his Appropriations duties to Natcher.

Jamie L. Whitten, D-Miss., under pressure from the House leadership, yesterday agreed to turn control over some of the day-to-day operations of the House Appropriations Committee to William H. Natcher, D-Ky.

Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., and Appropriations panel members had been pressuring Whitten to step down, at least temporarily, for the last two months. But Whitten, who members said suffered a stroke earlier this year, had been unwilling to do so.

Yesterday, Natcher, the second-ranking Democrat on the panel, said, "I have a letter from Jamie in which he's asked me to take over while he's recovering." The scope of the transfer of responsibilities was unclear, although Natcher said it would take effect immediately. "I'll be acting as chairman," he said.

Whitten has been chairman of the full committee since 1978 and head of the panel's Agriculture Subcommittee almost continuously since 1946. Whitten, who has been a House member since 1941, set a record for longevity in the House in January.

Members were concerned that Whitten's declining health had been interfering with the work of the committee, which has just begun the process of crafting fiscal 1993 appropriations bills.

If Whitten had not stepped aside, it was very possible that the Democratic Caucus would have voted to remove him.

If Democrats are not satisfied with the informal arrangement with Natcher, that might still happen. "The most important thing is not what's said, but what's done," said a senior Appropriations Committee member.

• The Agriculture Subcommittee, which Whitten chairs, met behind closed doors to mark up its fiscal 1993 spending bill. Few details were available, but Joe Skeen, N.M., the ranking Republican on the subcommittee, said that most programs were frozen at their fiscal 1992 levels.

The subcommittee's fiscal 1993 allocation for discretionary programs is \$13.87 billion, \$250 million over the current year's level. The panel also approves, but has little control over, about \$40 billion in mandatory spending.

TRADE BILL approved, minus Japanese auto provisions.

The House Ways and Means Trade Subcommittee yesterday approved, by voice vote, legislation (HR 5100) that would require the administration to get tough with countries that have large trade imbalances with the United States.

The measure would reauthorize for five years parts of U.S. trade law popularly known as Super 301 that require the government to identify countries with major trade barriers to U.S. imports and target them for negotiations and possible retaliation.

The administration opposes reauthorizing Super 301 and is strongly opposed to bill language that would force the White House to investigate Japan, Korea and Taiwan for specific trade violations.

Members removed, by voice vote, language that would have capped sales of Japanese cars in the United States at current levels and also placed similar limits on sales of Japanese cars built in U.S. plants.

Opponents of the Japanese auto provisions argued that the provisions could lead to Japanese companies closing auto plants in the United States and putting U.S. jobs at risk.

Committee aides said an amendment to reinstate the Japanese auto restrictions may be offered when the bill is brought before full committee. A date has not yet been set for full committee consideration.

In other action on the bill, panel members approved, by voice vote, an amendment by Byron L. Dorgan, D-N.D., that would require that imported wheat be labeled with a sales destination. Dorgan said use of final destination labels would help prevent the possibility that imported wheat might be re-exported through U.S. government programs that assist domestic grain exporters.

TWO COIN bills get panel's OK; third one awaits action.

A House Banking subcommittee yesterday approved two of three proposed commemorative coin bills, but Republicans, noting that a quorum was not present, brought the markup to a halt before the panel could vote on the third.

On a 16-0 vote, the Consumer Affairs and Coinage Subcommittee approved HR 3654, which would authorize the U.S. Mint to produce a special set of coins memorializing the 1996 Olympic Games to be held in Atlanta.

The subcommittee also approved, 15-1, HR 2448, which would authorize the minting of special commemorative medals to mark the contribution of Benjamin Franklin to the advancement of science and to American firefighters. Franklin founded the nation's first fire department.

Members clashed over a bill (HR

1623) to mint commemorative coins noting the 50th anniversary of World War II and the allied invasion of Normandy.

The subcommittee defeated, 6-10, an amendment by ranking Republican Al McCandless, Calif., that would have delayed the coin issue date by six months so that its release could coincide with the D-Day anniversary in June 1994.

When the amendment was defeated, McCandless noted that a quorum was not present, and Chairman Esteban E. Torres, D-Calif., recessed the markup without taking action on HR 1623.

BANK INSURANCE fund dips to minus \$7 billion, GAO reports.

Comptroller General Charles A. Bowsher, head of the General Accounting Office (GAO), told the Senate Banking Committee yesterday that the bank insurance fund ended 1991 with a deficit of \$7 billion. The insurance fund, which just four years ago had a positive funding level of \$18.3 billion, protects deposits in the nation's banks.

The big drop in the insurance fund is because of the dramatic increase in bank failures in the past four years. Between 1987 and 1991, 882 banks with assets to-

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taling \$151 billion failed, Bowsher said. By comparison, in the 53 years between 1933 and 1986, 1,149 banks with assets totaling about \$52 billion failed.

Bowsher told the committee that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), which administers the bank insurance fund, projects that the fund will be drawn down even further because of the current number of troubled banks. Bowsher said there are currently 1,000 commercial and savings banks, with assets of over \$600 billion, on the FDIC's list of troubled banks.

Bowsher agreed with committee Chairman Donald W. Riegle Jr., D-Mich., that the stagnant commercial real estate market will probably lead to more bank failures. Bowsher said it will take more than 10 years for the commercial real estate market to rebound. He added that California will be the next area of the country hard hit by bank failures because banks there have a heavy financial involvement in real estate.

Congress last year provided a \$30 billion line of credit to the FDIC with the Treasury to help shore up the bank insurance fund.

BUMPERS BLASTS Interior chief for adhering to mining law.

Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., criticized the Interior Department for adhering to what he called "a scam" that allows pristine federal lands to be sold to private developers for as little as two and a half dollars an acre.

Bumpers is seeking to rewrite the Mining Law of 1872, which allows miners to buy the rights to federal lands for a nominal charge and to mine the lands for hard-rock minerals or sell them for profit. The law was enacted during the presidency of Ulysses Grant to encourage settlement of the West.

The issue arose yesterday when Interior Department officials testified before the Senate Interior Appropriations Subcommittee on the agency's \$8.6 billion budget request for fiscal 1993.

Most of the lands at issue are in the West and cover an area about the size of Connecticut.

Bumpers said the government should begin collecting royalties on the minerals taken out of federal lands, much in the same manner that royalties are collected on coal removed from federal lands.

Bumpers said Idaho-based Stillwater Mining Co. recently won patents on 2,000 acres of federal lands in Idaho, an especially large purchase under the 1872 law. "That company paid \$10,180 for what it estimates may be worth \$32 billion of palladium and platinum lying beneath it... That's not much of a return on taxpayers' money," Bumpers said.

Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. said he supported the mining law but

added it would be best for supporters and opponents to "sit down and talk this out." Opponents of the royalty proposal say it would stifle exploration for strategic minerals.

MONTANA WILDERNESS bill backed before House Interior panel.

Almost four years after President Ronald Reagan vetoed a similar measure, House members are beginning to move legislation to set aside 1.2 million acres of federal land in Montana as wilderness, according to a key House Interior subcommittee chairman.

"It is my intention to work with all interested parties in an effort to bring this issue to a conclusion that is appropriate," said National Parks and Public Lands Chairman Bruce F. Vento, D-Minn., during his panel's hearing on a Senate-passed Montana wilderness bill (S 1696).

The Senate bill is an "extraordinarily delicate compromise," said Max Baucus, D-Mont. Both he and fellow Montanan Conrad Burns, R, pressed the committee to make few substantive changes to the bill — or else risk breaking the "delicate balance" forged in the Senate.

Vento, however, told Baucus and Burns, "I do not respond well to ultimatums, especially one that states: 'Take it or leave it.'"

The measure is under heavy fire from both environmentalists and industries — especially timber — that rely heavily on use of federal lands.

Reagan pocket-vetoed a 1.4 million acre bill at the end of the 100th Congress in 1988. That bill bore the imprint of former Sen. John Melcher, D, who was in a tough re-election battle against Burns. Melcher's support of the wilderness issue played a role in his defeat.

• The Forests Subcommittee of the House Agriculture panel, which shares jurisdiction over the bill with the Interior Committee, will hold a hearing on the bill this morning.

'PLAY OR PAY' health care impact on businesses discussed.

The nation's health-care system is shaping up as a key election-year issue, but testimony yesterday before a Senate Finance Committee hearing underlined the differences among lawmakers and business leaders over how to address the problem of spiraling costs and inadequate access to coverage.

Business representatives and lawmakers disagreed over whether Congress should approve legislation that would establish a universal health-care system, called "play or pay," in which employers would either provide coverage or help finance a national system.

John J. Motley III, vice president of the National Federation of Independent Business, said that system would amount

to a huge new tax on business. "Millions of jobs would be put at risk in the form of lower wages, fewer hours or loss of employment," he said.

Legislation (S 1227) introduced by Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, would guarantee all Americans access to health insurance through their employers or through a national system financed by businesses. "Access to affordable and quality care should be a right for all Americans," said Mitchell, a panel member.

But Bob Packwood, Ore., the committee's ranking Republican, said the proposal could encourage some businesses to terminate their health-care coverage because it would be cheaper to pay into a government system.

RATEMAKING PROCESS needs reform, say mailing organizations.

A number of large-scale mailing organizations told the House Post Office Committee yesterday that the U.S. Postal Service's current ratemaking process places too great of a financial burden on low-class mailings.

Direct mailers said the current ratemaking process, which has resulted in significant rate increases during the past six years, has caused some organizations to drop the postal service and switch to other means of communication such as newspapers or magazines, while forcing some smaller-scale customers to go out of business.

The hearing, one in a series of annual oversight hearings on the U.S. Postal Service, focused on a postal service task force report on the postal ratemaking process that recommended a streamlined process.

The mailers told the panel they generally agree with the recommendations, which call for a more orderly ratemaking process, with a more predictable timetable for rate increases.

Mark Silbergeld, president of the Alliance of Nonprofit Mailers, asked lawmakers to back legislation that would reduce the impact of a recent postal increase on non-profit mailers.

HEROIN TRADE is a rising concern, panel hears.

Federal drug officials told the House Narcotics panel yesterday that the international heroin trade is exploding, putting new pressure on enforcement efforts.

Customs Commissioner Carol Hallett told the panel that for the first half of fiscal 1992 the number of U.S. heroin seizures increased 66 percent from fiscal 1991.

And the head of the Drug Enforcement Administration, Robert C. Bonner, said the increase in heroin availability was attributable to the rise in worldwide production.

One particular concern, Bonner said, is the rise in opium production in Colom-

bia. Enforcement officials are faced with the challenge of blocking exports of opium from well-established drug cartels.

Officials said new smuggling methods are also making it more difficult to curtail drug imports. But Democratic panel members laid the blame for the increase influx of drugs on the Bush administration, saying that the president had not made drug control enough of a priority.

PEROT WILL be president if popularly elected, Foley predicts.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., yesterday predicted that if the presidential election is thrown into the House, lawmakers will abide by the will of voters in their home districts, even if that means choosing Texas billionaire Ross Perot, who is currently running high in national polls.

Speaking at the National Press Club, Foley said it "would be difficult for Congress not to respect the will of the American people" if it were called on to choose the president.

A three-man race with Perot, who is expected soon to formally declare his independent candidacy for the presidency, President Bush and Arkansas Democratic Gov. Bill Clinton could end with none of the candidates winning a majority of the 538 Electoral College votes needed to win, thereby throwing the election to the House.

Foley also said that if a president had not been elected by Inauguration Day, Jan. 20, he would assume the presidency temporarily, as called for under the Constitution, until Congress chose the next president.

Joking with the audience, Foley said he would not have a second thought about resigning as House Speaker to be the interim president, whether it was only for a matter of hours or weeks.

"The second best job in government is being president. The best job is to be a former president."

McGRATH RETIREMENT creates Ways and Means vacancy.

Rep. Raymond McGrath, R-N.Y., yesterday announced he will not seek reelection in November, bringing the list of Ways and Means Committee members who will not be returning to 10.

McGrath, 50, is retiring to "spend more time with his family," his press secretary Dan Zielinski told Associated Press.

Other retirements in the New York delegation may be forth coming as members study a new redistricting plan that reduces the state's representation from 34 members to 31.

Although another plan under consideration would put McGrath in the same district as fellow Republican Norm Lent, his aide said that was not a factor in McGrath's decision to retire. ■

✓ URUGUAY ROUND. We should emphasize the need to solve the EC agricultural problems this month (before the G-7 meetings in Munich).

FRANCO-GERMAN CORPS: Although Foreign Minister van den Broek firmly shares our concerns about the Franco-German Corps, Prime Minister Lubbers (who aspires to become President of the EC Commission) wants to avoid upsetting the French and has convened an ad hoc Council with the Foreign and Defense Ministers to review the Dutch position on the Corps. You should express our concerns about the Corps and our thanks for strong Dutch support on this issue.

CSCE: PEACEKEEPING: The Dutch have taken the lead in pressing for a NATO role in peacekeeping under CSCE auspices. We fully support the Dutch approach and have agreed to co-sponsor their proposed text for the Helsinki CSCE Summit Declaration.

CSCE HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR MINORITIES: Foreign Minister van den Broek is personally behind the Dutch proposal to create a CSCE High Commissioner for Minorities to look into complaints by minority groups against their national authorities. We are concerned that the proposal could encourage domestic groups to go around their own elected governments, including our own, to engage CSCE in internal problems; we counter-proposed a "special representative" on human dimension issues at the disposal of the CSCE chairman. The Dutch were not satisfied, but we are working with them to find acceptable middle ground.

UNCED: You called Lubbers seeking his support on the compromise for the climate treaty, which he gave. He may ask you about the biological diversity convention, which the Dutch will sign. Our problems involve intellectual property rights/technology transfer, financing, and biotechnology.

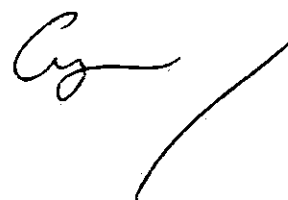

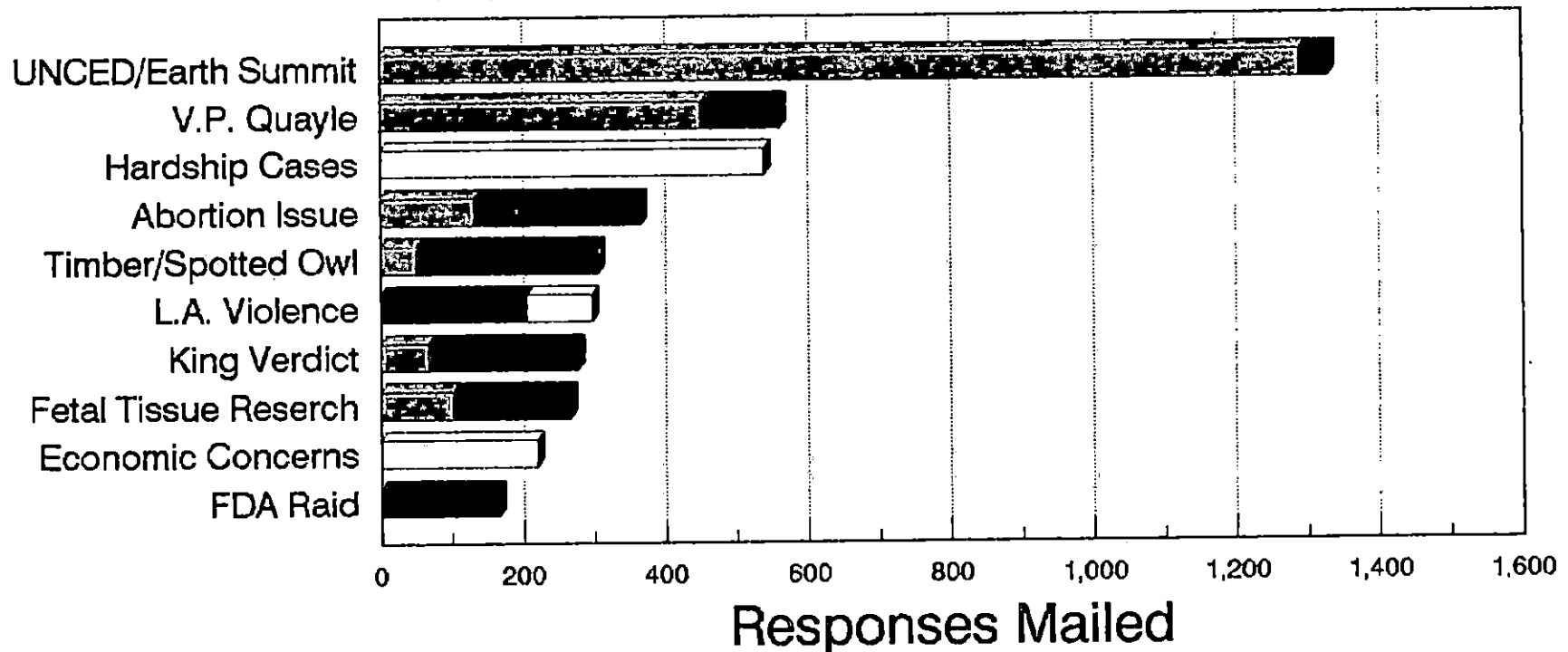

- Thank you for coming down today. I wanted to talk to you about the upcoming vote on the Balanced Budget Constitutional amendment.
- As you know, for years I have asked Congress to pass an amendment requiring a balanced federal budget. Normally I am not a big fan of amending the Constitution. But I am more convinced than ever that these are extraordinary times requiring extraordinary solutions.

- I want to set partisan politics aside long enough to really do something good for our country and more importantly for future generations of Americans. This has truly been a bipartisan effort. We have been working closely with Congressmen Jim Moody, Tom Carper and Charlie Stenholm to get to the 2/3 margin needed and we're close.

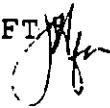

GENERAL MERRILL A. McPEAK

General Merrill A. McPeak is chief of staff of the U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C. As chief, he serves as the senior uniformed Air Force officer responsible for the organization, training and equipage of a combined active duty, Guard, Reserve and civilian force of over 900,000 people serving at approximately 3,000 locations in the United States and overseas. As a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, he and the other service chiefs function as military advisers to the secretary of defense, the National Security Council and the president.

General McPeak was born Jan. 9, 1936, in Santa Rosa, Calif. He earned a bachelor of arts degree in economics from San Diego State College in 1957 and a master's degree in international relations from George Washington University in 1974. The general completed Armed Forces Staff College in 1970, National War College in 1974, and the executive development program at the University of Michigan Graduate School of Business in June 1979.



The general was a distinguished graduate of the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps program and entered the Air Force in November 1957. He completed pilot training at Hondo Air Base, Texas, and Vance Air Force Base, Okla., and received pilot wings in January 1959. General McPeak was designated a distinguished graduate of flying training. He then completed F-100 combat crew training at Luke Air Force Base, Ariz., and Nellis Air Force Base, Nev.

His first operational assignment was flying F-104 Starfighters with the 436th Tactical Fighter Squadron, George Air Force Base, Calif. He subsequently transferred to the 79th Tactical Fighter Squadron, 20th Tactical Fighter Wing, Royal Air Force Station Woodbridge, England, where he flew F-100 Super Sabres. From May 1964 until August 1965 he was a member of the 3rd Air Force Tactical Evaluation Team, exercising and evaluating pilots and operational units in the United Kingdom.

In September 1965 General McPeak returned to Luke Air Force Base as a gunnery instructor and later served as wing weapons officer for the F-104G program. This assignment involved training pilots for West Germany's Luftwaffe.

From December 1966 to December 1968 General McPeak flew the solo and lead solo positions with the U.S. Air Force Air Demonstration Squadron, the Thunderbirds. He performed in nearly 200 official air shows in the United States and abroad.

Reporting to the Republic of Vietnam in December 1968, the general served as an F-100 tactical fighter pilot with the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing, Phu Cat Air Base, then as operations officer and, later, as commander of the "Misty" high-speed forward air controller unit. His unit subsequently was assigned to the 31st Tactical Fighter Wing at Tuy Hoa Air Base, where he served as chief of the wing Standardization and Evaluation Branch. During his tour of duty in Vietnam, he flew 269 combat missions.

After graduating from the Armed Forces Staff College in July 1970, he spent three years as an air operations staff officer in the Directorate of Plans and Policy, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C. He completed the National War College in June 1974 and concurrently earned his master's degree. He then was assigned as assistant deputy commander for operations of the 1st Tactical Fighter Wing, MacDill Air Force Base, Fla.

The general was military fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York City from July 1975 to June 1976. He took command of the 513th Combat Support Group, Royal Air Force Station Mildenhall, England, in July 1976 and in July 1977 became vice commander of the 406th Tactical Fighter Training Wing, Zaragoza Air Base, Spain.

From July 1978 to February 1980 General McPeak was assistant chief of staff for current operations, Allied Air Forces Central Europe, at the Central Region Air Operations Center, Boerfink, West Germany. He then assumed command of the 20th Tactical Fighter Wing, Royal Air Force Station Upper Heyford, England. In June 1981 he was assigned to Headquarters U.S. Air Forces in Europe at Ramstein Air Base, West Germany, as chief of staff. In October 1982 he became deputy chief of staff for plans, Headquarters Tactical Air Command, Langley Air Force Base, Va. From May 1985 to June 1987 he was deputy chief of staff for programs and resources at Air Force headquarters. In June 1987 he assumed command of 12th Air Force and U.S. Southern Command Air Forces, Bergstrom Air Force Base, Texas. He became commander in chief, Pacific Air Forces, Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii, in July 1988. He assumed his present position in October 1990.

General McPeak is a command pilot and parachutist with more than 5,800 flying hours in a variety of aircraft, principally fighters. He is current and qualified in the F-15. The air forces of Thailand, Mexico, Germany, Yugoslavia, France, Israel and the former Soviet Union have awarded him honorary pilot wings. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, New York City, and the International Institute for Strategic Studies, London.

He was promoted to general Aug. 1, 1988, with same date of rank.

General McPeak is married to the former Elynor Moskowitz of San Diego. They have two sons, Mark and Brian.

Admiral J. William Kime Commandant United States Coast Guard



Admiral John William Kime became the 19th Commandant of the United States Coast Guard on May 31, 1990. He was nominated to the position while serving as Commander, Eleventh Coast Guard District, headquartered in Long Beach, Calif.

During that time he also served as the Commander of the Central California Sector of the U.S. Maritime Defense Zone, Pacific; and as Coordinator of the Pacific Region of the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

Admiral Kime graduated from Baltimore City College in 1951 and from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 1957. He received a Master of Science degree in naval architecture and marine engineering and the professional degree of Naval Engineer from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1964.



Admiral Kime served in deck and engineering assignments in the Coast Guard Cutter CASCOS before assuming command of Loran Station Wake Island in 1960. He served at Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington, D.C. in the Merchant Marine Technical and Naval Engineering Divisions. While at Headquarters, he served as the principal U.S. negotiator at the International Maritime Organization (IMO) in London during the drafting of the IMO Codes for Liquefied Gas Ships. Admiral Kime was in charge of the structural design of the Coast Guard's Polar Star class icebreakers. He also served as the first engineering officer in the Coast Guard Cutter BOUTWELL stationed in Boston.

In 1977, Admiral Kime was a distinguished graduate of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces and was again assigned to Headquarters as Assistant Chief of the Merchant Marine Technical Division, and as both technical coordinator and as a member of the U.S. Delegation to the International Conference on Tanker Safety and Pollution Prevention in London. He assumed duty as Commanding Officer, Marine Safety Office, Baltimore in 1978. He was assigned to Headquarters in 1981 as Deputy Chief of the Office of Marine Environment and Systems.

From 1982 through 1984 Admiral Kime was assigned as Chief of the Operations Division of the Seventh Coast Guard District in Miami, where he was in charge of day to day operations in the Coast Guard's drug interdiction effort in the Caribbean. He was promoted to Flag rank in 1984. In 1986 Admiral Kime became Chief of the Office of Marine Safety, Security and Environmental Protection in Washington, D.C., a combination of two offices he had previously headed. His duties in this position included heading the U.S. Delegations to the IMO Maritime Safety Committee and Marine Environmental Protection Committee.

Admiral Kime is a registered Professional Engineer, a member of Tau Beta Pi, Sigma Xi and ASNE. He is a Fellow of the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers (SNAME), and is the 1990 recipient of the SNAME Vice Admiral "Jerry" Land Medal. His decorations include the Coast Guard Distinguished Service Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, five Meritorious Service Medals with "O" device, the Coast Guard Commendation Medal, the Coast Guard Achievement Medal, three Commandant's Letter of Commendation Ribbons with "O" device, two Coast Guard Unit Commendation Ribbons with "O" device and the Coast Guard Meritorious Unit Commendation Ribbon.

GENERAL JOSEPH P. HOAR, USMC UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

General Joseph P. Hoar is the Commander in Chief, United States Central Command, MacDill AFB, Florida.

General Hoar was born on Dec. 30, 1934, in Boston, Massachusetts. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps in 1957, after graduation from Tufts University, in Medford, Mass. After completing The Basic School, Quantico, Va., his first assignment was as a rifle platoon commander in the 5th Marines. He served subsequently in the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines at Camp Pendleton, Calif., and on Okinawa as a battalion staff officer.

His first non-Fleet Marine Force assignment was at Marine Barracks, Yorktown, Virginia. Barracks assignments included platoon commander and guard company commander. After a short tour at Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, N.C., as Assistant G-1, he reported to the 2d Marine Division. He commanded Company M, 3d Battalion, 2d Marines and served as the Battalion Operations Officer while a member of that organization. In 1966, he was ordered to Vietnam and served as a battalion and brigade advisor with the Vietnamese Marines.

On returning to the United States, he reported to Headquarters Marine Corps, Washington. During his three-year tour, he served in the G-3 Division and as Special Assistant to the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

In 1971, he returned overseas where he was Executive Officer of the 1st Battalion, 9th Marines. During the period 1972 to 1976, General Hoar was assigned as an instructor at the Marine Corps Command and Staff College; then returned to Headquarters Marine Corps for duty in the Personnel Management Division.

General Hoar returned to the 1st Marine Division in 1977 and commanded the 3d Battalion, 1st Marines. Relinquishing command of the battalion, he was reassigned briefly to the Division Staff, and during this time, was promoted to colonel. In 1979, General Hoar once again returned to the 1st Marines. He commanded the Regiment until April 1981. He then joined the 31st Marine Amphibious Unit and took command on board the USS Belleau Wood in Fremantle, Australia, in June 1981. During the following year, the MAU participated in three Indian Ocean deployments.

Upon returning to the United States, General Hoar was assigned to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, as the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1. While serving in this capacity, he was selected in February 1984 for promotion to brigadier general, and was subsequently assigned duty as the Assistant Division Commander, 2d Marine Division. The next year he was ordered to Washington as the Director, Facilities and Services Division, Installations and Logistics Department, Headquarters Marine Corps. He served in this capacity until ordered to Parris Island in March 1987 as the Commanding General, Marine Corps Recruit Depot/Commanding General, Eastern Recruiting Region. He was advanced to major general later that year. In the fall of 1988, he reported to the Commander in Chief, United States Central Command and assumed duties as the Chief of Staff. He returned to Headquarters Marine Corps for duty as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans, Policies and Operations in June 1990, was appointed to the grade of lieutenant general on July 1, 1990, and served in that capacity for one year. General Hoar assumed his present position on Aug. 9, 1991.

General Hoar has a master's degree from George Washington University, and has graduated from the Marine Corps Command and Staff College and the National War College.

His personal decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal; the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" and gold star; and the Meritorious Service Medal with gold star.

General Hoar and his wife, Charlie, reside on MacDill Air Force Base. She is a licensed psychologist. They have five grown children.

GENERAL DONALD J. KUTYNA

General Donald J. Kutyna is commander in chief of the North American Aerospace Defense Command and the U.S. Space Command, both headquartered at Peterson Air Force Base, Colo.

General Kutyna was born Dec. 6, 1933, in Chicago, where he graduated from Lane Technical High School in 1951. He attended the University of Iowa for two years and subsequently was appointed to the U.S. Military Academy, graduating with a bachelor of science degree in 1957. The general received a master of science degree in aeronautics and astronautics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1965. He completed the Industrial College of the Armed Forces in 1976.

Upon completing pilot training at Vance Air Force Base, Okla., in September 1958, General Kutyna was assigned to the 33rd Bombardment Squadron at March Air Force Base, Calif., serving as a B-47 combat crew commander until June 1963. After graduating from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in June 1965, he was assigned to the Aerospace Research Pilot School, Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., first as a student and then as a staff director, training test pilots and astronauts for U.S. aircraft and space programs.



From December 1969 to January 1971 he served a combat tour of duty with the 44th Tactical Fighter Squadron at Takhli Royal Thai Air Force Base, Thailand, completing 120 combat missions in the F-105 tactical fighter. Upon his return from Southeast Asia, the general was assigned to Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C., as a development planner in the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Research and Development. In June 1973, after a tour of duty with the Air Force Scientific Advisory Board, he was assigned as executive officer to the under secretary of the Air Force.

In August 1975 General Kutyna entered the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. After graduation in July 1976, he transferred to Electronic Systems Division, Hanscom Air Force Base, Mass., with duty as assistant deputy for international programs. He then served as program manager for foreign military sales of the E-3A Airborne Warning and Control System aircraft and, later, became assistant program director for the overall E-3A program. In June 1980 he was appointed deputy for surveillance and control systems, responsible for the development and acquisition of the sensors and command centers used today by NORAD and the U.S. Space Command in the satisfaction of their worldwide missions.

General Kutyna became deputy commander for space launch and control systems at Space Division, Air Force Systems Command, Los Angeles Air Force Station, Calif., in June 1982. In this position he managed the Department of Defense space shuttle program, including the design and construction of the West Coast space shuttle launch site at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.; the acquisition of space shuttle upper stage boosters; and the operational aspects of launching military payloads on the shuttle. Other responsibilities encompassed the development, acquisition and launch support of all Air Force expendable launch vehicles, including the Titan and Atlas space boosters and the new Titan IV heavy lift launch vehicle, which provides a capability equivalent to

the space shuttle. His programs for control of space missions encompassed the operations and upgrade of the Air Force satellite control network, and development of Air Force Space Command's Consolidated Space Operations Center, Falcon Air Force Station, Colo.

In June 1984 the general became director of space systems and command, control and communications, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Research, Development and Acquisition, at Air Force headquarters. After the loss of the space shuttle Challenger in January 1986, General Kutyna was appointed to serve as a member of the presidential commission investigating that accident and spearheaded the effort to bring expendable launch vehicles back into the nation's space inventory.

General Kutyna returned to Los Angeles Air Force Station as vice commander of Space Division in June 1986, overseeing all space system acquisitions, with particular emphasis on programs associated with the Strategic Defense Initiative.

In November 1987 the general became commander of the Air Force Space Command, the newest major command in the Air Force, with headquarters at Peterson Air Force Base. General Kutyna's forces conducted missile warning, space surveillance and satellite control operations at 46 locations around the world. He assumed his present command in April 1990.

The general is a command pilot with more than 4,500 flying hours in 25 different fighters and bombers. His military awards and decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster, Air Medal with eight oak leaf clusters, and Air Force Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters. He received the National Geographic Society's General Thomas D. White U.S. Air Force Space Trophy in June 1987. The award is given to the individual who has made the most outstanding contribution to the nation's progress in space.

He was promoted to general April 1, 1990, with same date of rank.

His wife, Lucy, is from Iowa City, Iowa. They have two sons, Dale and Douglas.

LIEUTENANT GENERAL CHARLES A. HORNER

Lieutenant General Charles A. Horner is commander of 9th Air Force and U.S. Central Command Air Forces, Shaw Air Force Base, S.C.

General Horner was born Oct. 19, 1936, in Davenport, Iowa, and graduated from Urbandale High School, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1954. He earned a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Iowa in 1958 and a master's degree in business administration from the College of William and Mary in 1972. The general completed Squadron Officer School in 1967, Armed Forces Staff College in 1972, Industrial College of the Armed Forces in 1974 and National War College in 1976.

Upon graduation from the University of Iowa, he was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Air Force and was awarded pilot wings in November 1959. After completing F-100 training in November 1960, General Horner served as an F-100 pilot with the 492nd Tactical Fighter Squadron, Royal Air Force Station Lakenheath, England. From December 1963 to December 1965 he was assigned to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, N.C., as an F-105 pilot with the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing.



The general served a temporary tour of duty with the 388th Tactical Fighter Wing, Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base, Thailand, from June to December 1965. While there he flew 41 combat missions in F-105s over North Vietnam. When he returned to the United States, he was assigned to Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., as an F-105 instructor pilot. In May 1967 the general returned to Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base as an F-105 Wild Weasel pilot with the 388th Tactical Fighter Wing and flew 70 more combat missions over North Vietnam.

From September 1967 to November 1968 he was assigned to the Fighter Weapons School, Nellis Air Force Base, as an F-105 instructor. He then served as an F-105 liaison officer with the Air Force Tactical Fighter Weapons Center. In October 1969 General Horner transferred to Headquarters Tactical Air Command, Langley Air Force Base, Va., where he was an air operations staff officer in the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans until January 1971. After graduating from Armed Forces Staff College in January 1972, he was assigned to Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C., as chief of the Forces Branch.

General Horner graduated from the National War College in June 1976 and returned to Seymour Johnson Air Force Base as deputy commander for operations, 4th Tactical Fighter Wing. From March to August 1979 the general served as vice commander of the 58th Tactical Training Wing, Luke Air Force Base, Ariz. He then became commander of the 405th Tactical Training Wing, also at Luke. The general was commander of the 474th Tactical Fighter Wing, Nellis Air Force Base, from May 1980 to August 1981, when he became commander of the 833rd Air Division, Holloman Air Force Base, N.M.

The general was assigned as commander of the 23rd North American Aerospace Defense Command Region and Tactical Air Command Air Division, Tyndall Air Force Base, Fla., in May 1983. In October 1983 he became commander of the Air Force Air Defense Weapons Center at Tyndall. In May 1985 he was assigned as deputy chief of staff for plans at Tactical Air Command headquarters. He assumed his present command in March 1987.

In August 1990 General Horner deployed to Saudi Arabia as the forward commander for U.S. Central Command as well as the commander, U.S. Central Command Air Forces. There he assumed command of all U.S. and Allied air assets for the duration of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. He returned to Shaw Air Force Base in April 1991.

GENERAL GEORGE LEE BUTLER

General George Lee Butler is commander in chief, Strategic Air Command, and director, Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff, with headquarters at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb. The command is the nation's major nuclear deterrent force with bombers, tankers, reconnaissance aircraft and intercontinental ballistic missiles. The Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff coordinates U.S. nuclear war plans and develops the Single Integrated Operational Plan.

General Butler was born June 17, 1939, at Fort Benning, Ga., and graduated in 1957 from Washington-Lee High School, Arlington, Va. He received a bachelor of science degree from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1961 and a master's degree in international affairs from the University of Paris in 1967. He completed Squadron Officer School in 1964, Air Command and Staff College in 1970, and Armed Forces Staff College in 1974.



The general was commissioned in June 1961 and received undergraduate pilot training at Williams Air Force Base, Ariz., followed by basic instructor school at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas. He then flew as an instructor pilot in T-33s and also served as an academic instructor at Craig Air Force Base, Ala., from March 1963 to December 1964.

General Butler then was selected for study in France as an Olmsted scholar. He received French language training at the State Department's Foreign Services Institute, Washington, D.C., prior to attending the University of Paris. After graduation, he attended F-4 combat crew training school and was assigned in March 1968 to the 12th Tactical Fighter Wing, Cam Ranh Bay Air Base, Republic of Vietnam.

From August 1968 to March 1969 he was aide to the commander of 7th Air Force, Tan Son Nhut Air Base, Republic of Vietnam. Returning to the United States and the Air Force Academy, he served as an instructor in the political science department, and as an executive officer and air officer commanding in the academy's military training department.

In July 1971 General Butler was assigned as special assistant to the director, Office of Emergency Preparedness, Executive Office of the President, Washington, D.C. He again returned to the academy in January 1972, as an assistant professor in the political science department. After completing combat crew training in October 1972, he was assigned as chief pilot of the 53rd Military Airlift Squadron, 63rd Military Airlift Wing, Norton Air Force Base, Calif.

He entered the Armed Forces Staff College in July 1973 and, after graduating in February 1974, was assigned as action officer, Directorate of Plans, Strategic Arms Limitation Talks, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C. Remaining at the Pentagon, he served from October 1974 to September 1975 as executive officer for the special assistant for strategic initiatives, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Plans and Operations.

Other Pentagon assignments in the following years included plans and programs officer, Strategy Development and Analysis, Directorate of Plans; executive director, Air Force Budget Issues Team; executive director, Airborne Warning and Control System task force; and chief, Congressional and Joint Matters Division, Directorate of Concepts.

After B-52 combat crew training in May 1977, General Butler was assigned to the 416th Bombardment Wing, Griffiss Air Force Base, N.Y., first as assistant deputy commander for operations and, later, as the wing's deputy commander for operations. In June 1979 he returned to Air Force headquarters as chief of a policy analysis group serving the Air Force chief of staff.

From March 1981 to June 1983 General Butler was assigned as vice commander of the 320th Bombardment Wing at Mather Air Force Base, Calif., and then as wing commander. He subsequently took command of the 96th Bombardment Wing, Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, in June 1983. In July 1984 the general was assigned to Headquarters Strategic Air Command, Offutt Air Force Base, as inspector general. General Butler returned to Air Force headquarters in August 1986 as deputy director of operations and became director in January 1987. General Hansford T. Johnson is commander in chief of U.S. Transportation Command and Military Airlift Command, Scott Air Force Base, Ill.

General Johnson was born Jan. 3, 1936, in Aiken, S.C. He graduated from high school in 1953 and then attended Clemson College. He was the outstanding graduate in thermodynamics and aerodynamics from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1959, received a master's degree in aeronautics from Stanford University in 1967 and a master's degree in business from the University of Colorado in 1970. The general completed Squadron Officer School in 1965, Army Command and General Staff College in 1972, National War College in 1976 and the advanced management program at Dartmouth College in 1980.

He earned his navigator wings while a cadet at the academy. Upon graduation, he attended flying training at Bartow Air Base, Fla., and then Laredo Air Force Base, Texas, receiving his pilot wings in July 1960. His first operational assignment was to the 317th Troop Carrier Wing, Evreux-Fauville Air Base, France, where he flew C-130 transports throughout Europe, Africa, the Middle East and West Asia. He continued flying with the 317th when it transferred to Lockbourne Air Force Base, Ohio.

After completing graduate school at Stanford University, General Johnson volunteered for duty in the Republic of Vietnam. In 1967 he flew as a forward air controller in support of the Republic of Vietnam army and U.S. Marine Corps forces in the northern province and the demilitarized zone. He directed tactical close air support strike missions against enemy supply, storage, vehicle and troop targets. During the latter half of the year, he operated out of Pleiku Air Base, along the Ho Chi Minh trail, at night. During his tour of duty, he flew 423 combat missions, 71 of which were over North Vietnam or the demilitarized zone.

From May 1968 to July 1971 General Johnson was an instructor and assistant professor of aeronautics at the Air Force Academy. After graduating from Army Command and General Staff College, he served three years in the Plans Directorate, Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C. During his first year he was in charge of developing the tactical airlift force structure, then became leader of the team that developed and evaluated Air Force inputs to military strategy.

The general graduated from National War College in June 1976 and then was assigned to the 93rd Bombardment Wing, Castle Air Force Base, Calif., as assistant deputy commander for operations. He also performed duties as assistant deputy commander for maintenance, deputy commander for operations and vice commander. He was commander of the 22nd Bombardment Wing at March Air Force Base, Calif., from April 1979 until February 1981. General Johnson then was assigned to Headquarters Strategic Air Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., as assistant deputy chief of staff for plans.



In November 1982 the general returned to Air Force headquarters as deputy director of programs and evaluation, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Plans and Resources, and was chairman of the Program Review Committee. He was director of programs and evaluation, and chairman of the Air Staff Board, from July 1984 to October 1985, when he became deputy chief of staff for operations at SAC headquarters. In December 1986 he was assigned as vice commander in chief, Pacific Air Forces, Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii. In August 1987 General Johnson became deputy commander in chief of the U.S. Central Command, MacDill Air Force Base, Fla., during the height of United States operations in the Persian Gulf. He became director of the Joint Staff, Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Pentagon, Washington, D.C., in November 1988. He assumed his present position in September 1989.
