In early March, the Wisconsin State Supreme Court upheld a State educational choice initiative that had been challenged by the state school superintendent, teachers' unions, school administrators, and other school boards. Today, you will be meeting with a group from Milwaukee including Governor Thompson (R), U.S. Senator Robert Kasten (R-WI), local school officials, and parents. They will be discussing the impact of the Milwaukee educational choice program on the lives of the children and how school choice has improved education in Milwaukee.

The initiative, championed by State Legislator Polly Williams (D) in alliance with Governor Tommy Thompson (R) and initially passed in 1990, allows approximately 500-1,000 low-income students to attend private, non-sectarian schools using public funds. Ms. Williams, while invited, will not be in attendance due to the recent illness of her mother.

The Milwaukee initiative provides scholarships of \$2,500 per student, less than half of the per student cost to send a child to a Milwaukee public school. As the law did not address the issue, the court did not rule on the question of public funding of religious schools.

The participants in the meeting will also be joined by observers from other states, all educational choice advocates, who will be coming to hear of Milwaukee's success. They have been invited as your guests.

House Committee Republicans are concerned about a veto of a popular higher education bill and have told us they cannot support such a veto. Further, they are very confused about the Administration sending a veto signal on the Higher Education Act based on the inclusion of a \$500 million program that they believe will save money in the long run, while at the same time unveiling a new \$500 million GI Bill which many of them do not support.

Congressman Bill Goodling (R-PA) requested an opportunity to bring Republicans on the House Education and Labor Committee to meet with you to discuss the veto of the Higher Education Act and let you know their concerns.

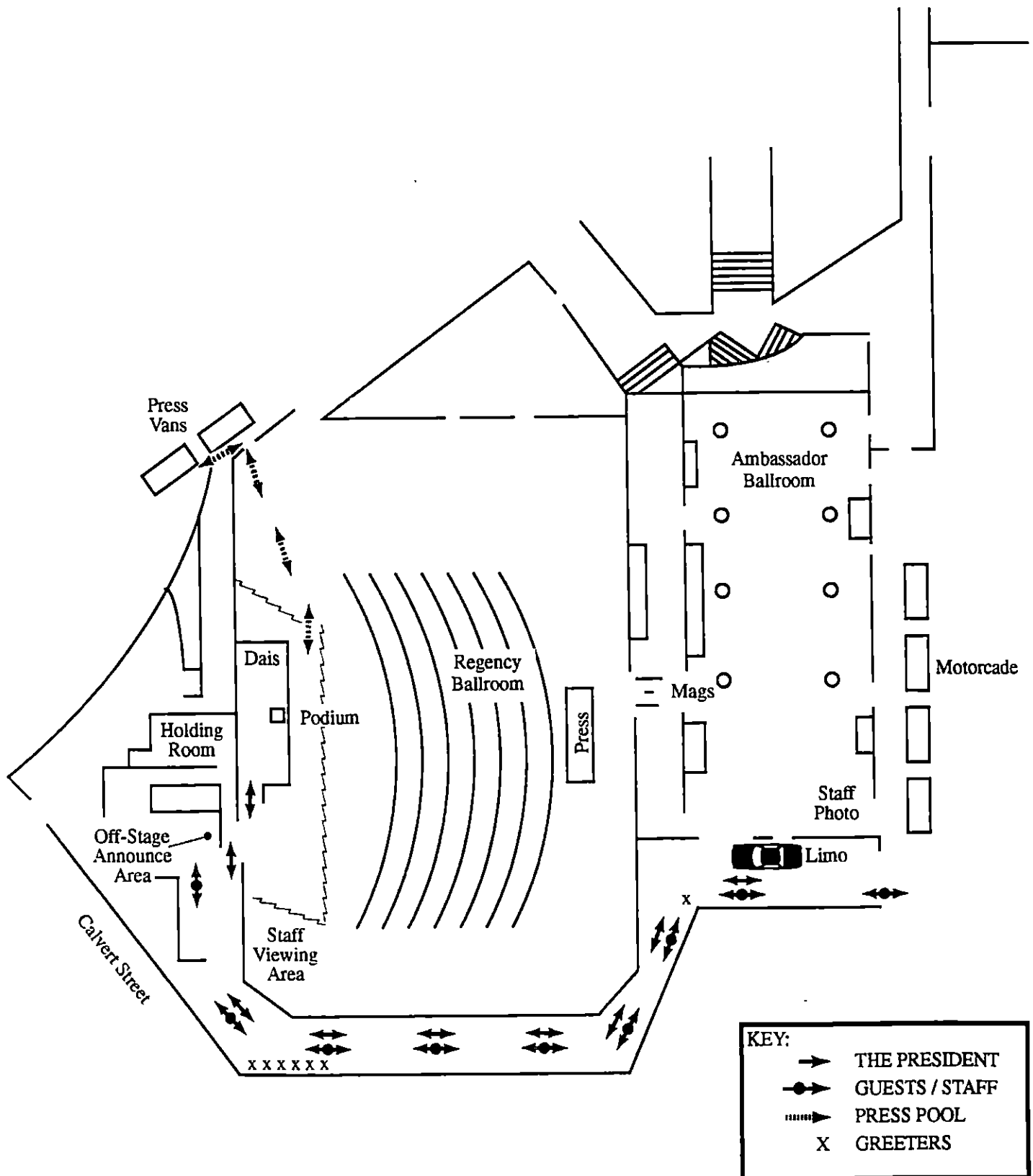

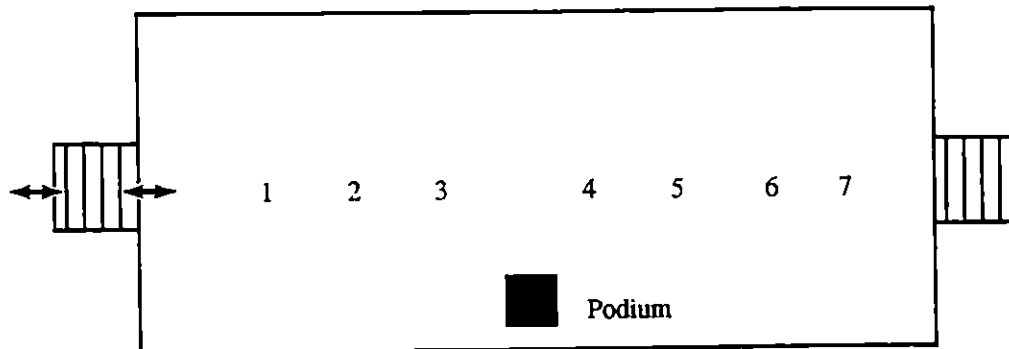

- o I thank each of you for coming here this morning. I've certainly heard of the successful revolution you have started in Milwaukee and today I plan to unveil the next step in my crusade to bring the revolution about nationally.

- o I'm speaking of course about parental choice in education. An issue I've been committed to since before I met with choice advocates here at the White House back in 1989.

- o Today, I am sending to Congress a bill that is the embodiment of my commitment to bring education choice to communities around the country.

- o We're calling it the State and Local G.I. Bill for Children and I believe that it will be one of the most aggressive efforts made to reform education in our country.
- o I've always believed that unless kids have a learning environment that is safe, drug free, and academically challenging, they will never achieve the levels needed to succeed. What you are doing in Milwaukee has proved my point.
- o The concept of educational choice empowers parents. It brings them back to the critical role they should play in their children's lives. Parents get involved at the school site, the classroom and at home.

AND LET ME MAKE THIS CLEAR: ACCEPTING STUDENTS WITH VOUCHERS DOES NOT MEAN A SCHOOL MUST SACRIFICE SCHOOL PRAYER. //

AND LET ME SAY THIS TO THOSE WHO STAND AGAINST EXTENDING SCHOOL CHOICE TO LOW- AND MIDDLE-INCOME FAMILIES: I SIMPLY DO NOT BUY THE IDEA THAT SOMEONE CANNOT MAKE A GOOD DECISION JUST BECAUSE THAT PERSON IS POOR. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT CAN NOT AFFORD ONE MORE ENTITLEMENT, EVEN FOR EDUCATION. AND I HAVE SAID MANY TIMES THAT MONEY ALONE IS NOT THE ANSWER. BUT WHILE THE WORLD HAS BECOME MORE FREE, IT HAS ALSO BECOME LESS CERTAIN. THE SOVIET "BEAR" IS NOW A CREATURE OF THE PAST, BUT THERE ARE STILL PLENTY OF WOLVES OUT THERE -- AND YOU KNOW WHO THEY ARE.

THIS IS NO FANTASY OF AN OLD COLD WARRIOR -- THESE ARE THE REALITIES OF THE NEW WORLD, AND FROM WHERE I SIT I CAN SURVEY THE HORIZON.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: Letter to Prince Sadruddin Aga Khan

Today I spoke with officials at State and Commerce as well as with Under Secretary John Knauss in Glasgow shortly after his arrival for the annual International Whaling Commission (IWC) meeting that begins on Monday, June 29.

1. Knauss reports that the French proposal to establish an International Whale Sanctuary in the waters around Antarctica is unlikely to be voted on at the annual meeting this year. Establishing the sanctuary would require a 75 percent majority vote among the members. State has tested the waters among other nations and has found little support for the French proposal.

2. The IWC adopted a commercial whaling moratorium in 1982 and began enforcing it in 1985. Limited whaling for research purposes and for indigenous peoples (they must eat what they catch) has been allowed to continue. Since the moratorium remains in place, postponing establishing the sanctuary would not have any effect on whales at this time.

3. Knauss and other U.S. officials are consulting closely with other countries. Most likely, a committee will be proposed to consider the French proposal for an Antarctic sanctuary. We will support that effort. A vote on the proposal will likely occur a year from now.

4. Recent scientific findings suggest that the stocks of some whale species are at levels high enough to support a resumption of regulated commercial whaling.

5. The U.S. approach, developed through an interagency committee, which will be discussed informally but not advanced as a formal proposal, includes the following elements:

- Continuing the commercial whaling ban on the high seas, while allowing some flexibility in Exclusive Economic Zones (EEZ).
- Any resumption of whaling in an EEZ would be regulated by the International Whaling Commission.

- The U.S. would continue our ban on whaling within our EEZ, except for limited indigenous catches.

6. Several countries are anxious to resume some commercial whaling. Iceland has served notice that it will leave the International Whaling Commission effective July 1. Knauss hopes they can be persuaded to rejoin the Commission a year from now. The Norwegian Commissioner just met with Knauss and informed him that he is under considerable pressure to follow suit. Denmark also thinking about leaving the IWC.

7. Iceland, Greenland, and Norway have established a North Atlantic Marine Mammal Commission that could potentially become a whaling organization in the North Atlantic, rivaling the IWC. Knauss feels strongly that it is not in our best interest to have a competing whaling organization form.

8. Japan strongly opposes the Antarctic Whale Sanctuary. Seventy-seven members of the Japanese Diet have written you expressing their opposition. For the time being, Japan will remain in the IWC. Japan would prefer to reverse course on the moratorium and resume whaling among stocks of well populated minke whales in the North Atlantic and Southern Hemisphere.

9. Knauss believes he is now having some success in bringing people together. He indicates that U.S. support for an Antarctic sanctuary now would destroy his credibility. He strongly urges that we not go beyond supporting the establishment of a committee to consider the French proposal for an Antarctic Sanctuary.

I concur with Knauss' recommendation. A draft letter reflecting this approach is attached.

Recommendation: That you sign the attached draft letter to Prince Sadruddin Aga Khan.

SUBJECT: SUPERCONDUCTING SUPER COLLIDER

Last week, the House of Representatives canceled funding for the Superconducting Super Collider (SSC) during its consideration of the Energy and Water Development appropriations bill for FY 1993. We are working with Senate supporters of the SSC to make sure that the Senate and, ultimately, Congress continue to provide funding for the project.

One of the major criticisms of the SSC is that it lacks adequate foreign participation. Although several countries have agreed to make contributions, Japan is by far the largest potential contributor. A timely commitment by Japan to contribute to the SSC would counter much of this criticism.

Ambassador Armacost has stressed to me the importance of you personally advising Prime Minister Miyazawa that you would like to have Japan participate in the SSC. (I have attached suggested talking points.) Based on confidential discussions, we believe the Japanese are prepared to contribute up to \$2 billion, provided you bring up the issue at your next meeting. Otherwise, any Japanese decision to participate would be delayed until after the November election, making it impossible to obtain the foreign contributions needed in FY 1994.

I appreciate your efforts on behalf of the SSC. With hard work and a Japanese commitment to participate, I am optimistic that we can obtain enough congressional funding to avoid a serious setback.

State and Local G.I. Bills for Children

Nature of the Problem

Our 110,000 elementary and secondary schools are generally performing poorly.

- Despite having devoted substantial additional resources in the last decade (real spending per pupil is up 33 percent), the results on standardized tests show little improvement.
- Compared with elementary and secondary schools in other industrial democracies American students are not performing well.

The Administration's General Approach

We have argued that we need a revolution, not incremental change, to address the problem. Our approach is built around two central concepts -- accountability and competition. These are reflected in the four principal elements of America 2000:

1. Greater Accountability through national standards for what students should know and be able to do and voluntary American achievement tests. This can dramatically change expectations for students, parents, teachers, employers, etc.
2. Greater Flexibility for teachers and administrators by eliminating much of the federal and state regulation that currently exists.
3. Greater Innovation through a research and development effort (the New American Schools Corporation) and instituting new ideas with 535 "Break-the-Mold" New American Schools.
4. Greater Choice and Competition by giving parents greater choice in selecting the school their child attends.

This proposal can help accomplish two important objectives:

- Generating momentum (through the powerful incentive of Federal money) to get states and localities to adopt school choice; and

- Emphasizing in the public's mind that one of the reasons driving your support for choice is that it can benefit children from low and middle income families.

The Proposal

The proposal calls for a demonstration program of \$500 million to help state and communities give \$1,000 scholarships to middle and low income children which each family may spend at any lawfully operating school of their choice -- public, private, or religious.

How It Works

- States and localities apply for competitive four-year grants to give children from low and middle income families a \$1,000 annual scholarship.
- To qualify the state or locality must:
 - Take significant steps to provide a choice of schools to all families in the area;
 - Permit families to spend the \$1,000 scholarships at a wide variety of public and private schools;
 - Allow all lawfully operating schools in the area including public, private, and religious schools to participate if they choose.
- The Secretary of Education would make these demonstration grants based on:
 - The number and variety of choices made available to families of eligible children;
 - The proportion of participating children who are from low income families; and
 - The applicant's financial support (including private support) for the project.
- Parents control how the \$1,000 is spent, as is the case in the Pell Grant or Guaranteed Student Loan programs. None of the funds are used for administrative overhead.
- Up to \$500 of the scholarship may be used for other academic programs for children before and after school, on Saturdays, or in the summer.

What It Is Not

- It is not like the G.I. Bill of 1944 in that students don't have to do anything or render any service to receive a scholarship.
- It is not like the G.I. Bill of 1944 in that it is not an entitlement -- but rather a demonstration program.
- It is not like Bill Clinton's G.I. Bill that applies to students who attend colleges and universities. This is for elementary and secondary school and doesn't require public service or repayment.
- It is not an attack on public schools. They will be just as eligible to have students and the benefit of these funds as will private schools.

A graduate of Harvard and Harvard Law, Reum is the top securities lawyer at his Chicago firm (Hopkins and Sutter), with twenty years' experience looking at securities regulation from the client's perspective. He supported your candidacy both in 1980 (as Midwest advance representative) and in 1988 (as Finance Committee member of Illinois Victory '88). He had some Washington experience as a lawyer for the House Judiciary Committee in the early 70's. He comes strongly recommended by Jim Edgar, Jim Thompson, Bill Milliken, Bob Michel, and other Illinois Republicans, as well as Jack Danforth, Mitch McConnell, Larry Pressler, and Alan Dixon. His family was active in Illinois Republican politics for many years (his mother headed the racing commission!).

Re: Final estimate of First Quarter GDP and other data

The third (of three) estimates of economic growth for the first quarter is 2.7 percent at an annual rate (revised up from 2.4 percent). While this is a little better than private analysts had expected and good news for the January through March period, it obviously makes it harder for the second quarter to exhibit this rate of growth.

While it is far too early to determine the second quarter growth rate (we only have full data for April, which will be revised, and limited data for May, scant data for June). While the economy will show continued improvement in the second quarter, it is likely to be at a slower rate than the first quarter. We have been getting very much more mixed signals for the last few weeks (autos doing much better, but other retail flat and the trade deficit worsening) than earlier in the year. While this is not nearly as extensive as late last summer/early last fall, I am hearing increasingly from the business community that business is sluggish. Consequently, I believe the language and tone you used on your trip to California were right on target.

In addition, initial claims for state unemployment insurance will show a rise of 16,000 tomorrow morning after having been at the lower level for five straight weeks.

Also, the Purchasing Managers' index-- a private survey provided me in advance of public release and which are the first data available each month for the preceding month--will show that the manufacturing sector continued to grow in June but at a slower pace than in May.

Finally, mid-June auto sales continued at their improved pace of recent weeks. The auto industry which had been hit very hard for some time appears to be in the early stages of a good rebound and the American automakers have even begun to take market share from the Japanese.

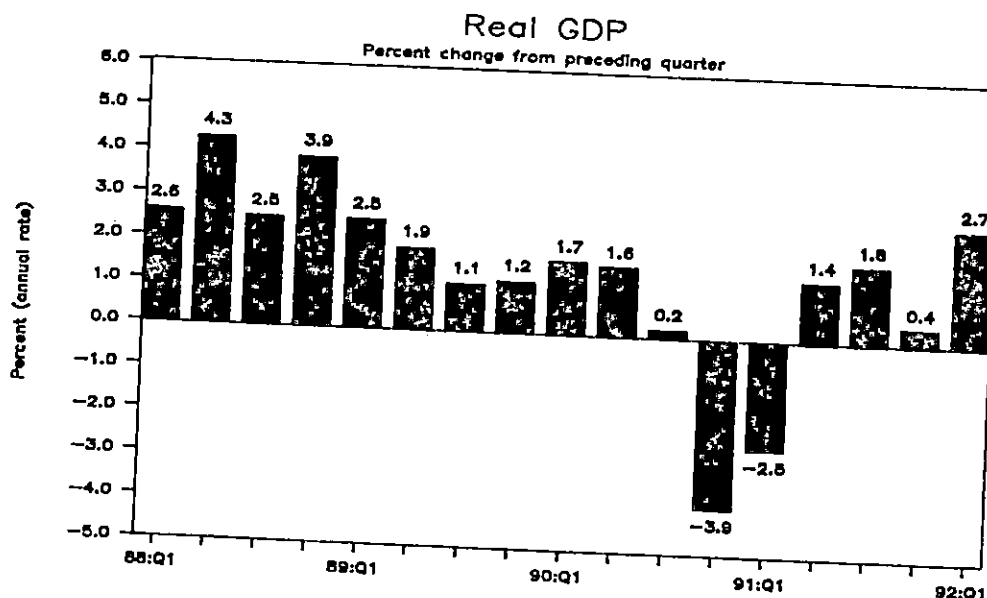
SUBJECT: Final Estimate of First-Quarter GDP, Commerce
Department Release, Tomorrow, 8:30 a.m.

Real GDP rose 2.7 percent at an annual rate in the first quarter of 1992, according to the final estimate by the Department of Commerce. The final estimate is revised upward from the 2.4 percent increase reported last month. Private analysts had expected no revision.

The upward revision reflected higher net exports (primarily from services) and investment in structures, and a slightly slower pace of inventory liquidation than were reported in the preliminary estimate. These more than offset a downward revision to personal consumption expenditures.

Inflation, as measured by the GDP fixed-weight price index, was 3.3 percent at an annual rate in the first quarter, 0.1 percentage point less than reported in the preliminary estimate. The implicit price deflator increased at a 3.1 percent annual rate.

The graph below shows that real GDP has increased for the last four quarters, but at a slow rate. The 2.7 percent increase in the first quarter is the largest rise in real GDP since the fourth quarter of 1988.

# Picture of a president feeling the strain

WASHINGTON — As President Bush tries to dig his way out of the political doldrums, some of his closest friends and advisers acknowledge that he has become emotionally and physically drained at times in the job and that at one point last year he considered not running for reelection.

Even now, though associates say Bush has largely bounced back from any misgivings, some aides continue to express concern about whether

he can generate enough enthusiasm to run an effective reelection campaign.

White House officials say the president is in top physical and mental condition, but one Bush intimate told the Globe that the combined effect of the Gulf War, personal health problems and political attacks left the 68-year-old president in a depression for months, and only recently has he

snapped out of it. Later, the associate suggested that the remark on depression was hyperbole, but he repeated that Bush was "down for months," and he noted that during the Gulf War, he often slept only fitfully.

At one point shortly after the war, this associate said, "there was the deepest thought given to not running." He said Bush "decided to do it with BUSH, Page 18

out great enthusiasm. A large part of it is getting him cranked up. We will do that by the middle of August."

By any measure, Bush's term has been tumultuous, ranging from the collapse of European Communism

and the Gulf War to domestic recession and a bout with heart and thyroid problems.

Most recently, Bush's standing has plummeted in polls, and he has sustained attacks from two men he once considered friends or allies: GOP presidential challenger Patrick Buchanan and likely independent

candidate Ross Perot. Most upsetting to Bush, said his aides, have been attacks on his family by political rivals.

"If you are a human being, you have to get down when your friends go after you, and if you are a father you have to get down when they go after your children," said Dr. Burton

... Bush's personal physician.

Bush showed his sensitivity of the subject Monday, in an interview with ABC's "20/20" program. Responding to stories that Perot has looked into damaging reports about two of his children, Bush retorted, "That is beyond the pale. Leave my kids alone, I say." Perot has denied investigating the Bush children.

Lee described Bush as being overworked and sometimes tired, but he stressed that the president remains in excellent health. He said Bush is handling these problems much better than most people would.

Lee said Bush's bout with a thyroid problem, Graves' disease, was being treated so precisely that his metabolism is no different than a normal person's.

Despite the apparently successful treatment, rumors arose about whether Bush was more seriously ill than his doctors said, which led to speculation about whether Bush might be forced to quit the race. Such talk apparently led Gov. Lowell Weicker of Connecticut to joke recently on a radio show with Vice President Dan Quayle that Bush would not be on the final Republican ticket.

But no senior official or aide in or out of government has seriously suggested publicly that Bush might fade from the race, and his sons said in interviews that their father is ready to stay the course. Bush has repeatedly said the same.

Lee said he constantly hears "amazing rumors" about Bush being seriously ill. But Lee stressed that all such rumors are untrue.

Lee acknowledged, however, that Bush has paid a price for being president.

"What I see is that this is a very tough job," Lee said. "I have seen him when he looks real tired. I have seen him when he has had a few days off and he looks like he did in the beginning. The guy works too damn hard, if you want to know what I think. I would like to see him take it easy."

Bush himself has complained about what he calls "a weird year" in presidential politics. In rare mo-

ments, he publicly philosophizes about his plight with an apparent mixture of disgust and regret.

#### Telling comment

"It hasn't been much fun in the political arena lately," Bush told a group of veterans in Phoenix in late May. "We've been hammered out there a little bit. Somebody said that builds character. I said, I'm a little long on character and looking forward to a change."

Those who know Bush well say the offhand comment is one of the most revealing personal statements made by the president this year.

Lee said the president thrives during a crisis such as the Gulf War but does feel "down" when he has to deal with political matters, personnel changes and attacks on his family.

"It is the little political problems that bother him more than the big decision-making," Lee said. "The kind of thing that bothers him is the nasty political stuff, the nitpicking, the personnel problem. . . . It is tough for him to be nasty. But he gets there."

Lee said he thinks Bush will feel better when he begins attacking his presidential rivals after the August Republican convention. "That will take care of the anxiety and stress," Lee said.

Bush, who used aggressive negative tactics in his 1988 campaign, has expressed impatience to join the campaign fray and has said he will launch a strong attack against Democrat Bill Clinton and Perot after the Republican convention in Houston.

George W. Bush Jr., the president's oldest son, asked about rumors that his father was feeling poorly and might be inclined to drop from the grueling race, denied both vehemently.

"That's just plain crap," the junior Bush said. "Our problem is keeping him from all-out campaigning right now."

#### "He will be raring to go"

The younger Bush, who is working part-time with the Bush-Quayle campaign, acknowledged that his father "has to be affected when he wakes up every morning and gets the hell kicked out of him by somebody." But he said those attacks have not diminished the president's confidence because "he knows he's been a good president."

Another Bush son, Jeb, who is chairing the presidential campaign in Florida, contended that his father's morale problems stem from highly negative media coverage.

"He is getting his brains beat in by you guys and the people who want to be president," Jeb Bush said. "Eighty-five percent of the news stories have been negative. If you gave him a break maybe he could have a break."

Jeb Bush said his father "was

during campaigns. At 68, "he has the vigor of someone much younger, and

when the time comes he will be raring to go."

Only six of the 41 US presidents were older than Bush when they finished their term in office. If Bush is reelected and completes a second term, he would leave office as the second-oldest president after Ronald Reagan.

The president has complained in recent months about not feeling in top-top shape. He told golfing companions last month in Kennebunkport, Maine, that he had "a gut ache." Asked that weekend how he felt, the normally exuberant Bush responded, "about a seven."

In an April visit to Kennebunkport, Bush told several reporters he sometimes awoke in the night with pain so severe that he wondered whether he might need a hip replaced. Yet that same weekend, he took such a fast, extended "power walk" that he left all but a few reporters and Secret Service agents panting behind him on the beach.

#### Forced to slow down

Bush's health has been an issue since he was rushed to the hospital last year with an irregular heartbeat. The problem was traced to Graves' disease, which doctors say can cause patients to become hyperactive. By all reports, the treatment has been effective, but it also has forced Bush to slow down.

A Bush associate said the disease was significant in that "it forced Bush to face his own mortality" and to lessen his regular, active exercise regimen.

All of these factors - the obvious stress of the job, the personal and family attacks, the Graves' disease - add up to a greater level of stress on the president than many realize, say Bush associates.

"You only have to look at any individual who has served as president to see that they changed during their term, and this president is no exception to that," said Bonnie Newman, a longtime New Hampshire friend of Bush who served in Washington as an assistant to the president from 1989 to 1991. Presidents Lyndon Johnson and Jimmy Carter, for instance, appeared to age markedly while in office.

Newman described Bush's present physical stamina as "extraordinary," and noted that he is "not used to being sick. He had to come to grips with a medical condition beyond his control."

Bush's associates stress they believe he has bounced back and will be in fighting trim soon. They say he is not a quitter and is never stronger than when the stakes are highest.

"When he comes out of that convention" in August, "he will be prepared to fight for his job," said Bush's senior political adviser, Charles Black. "He will be full of zest."

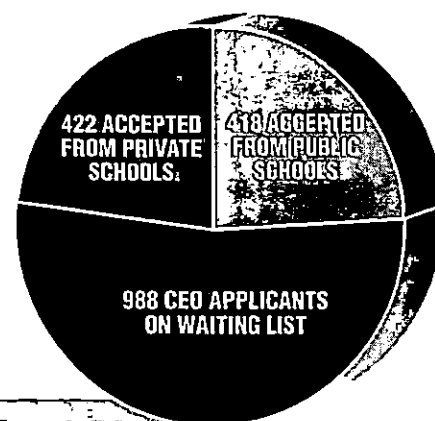

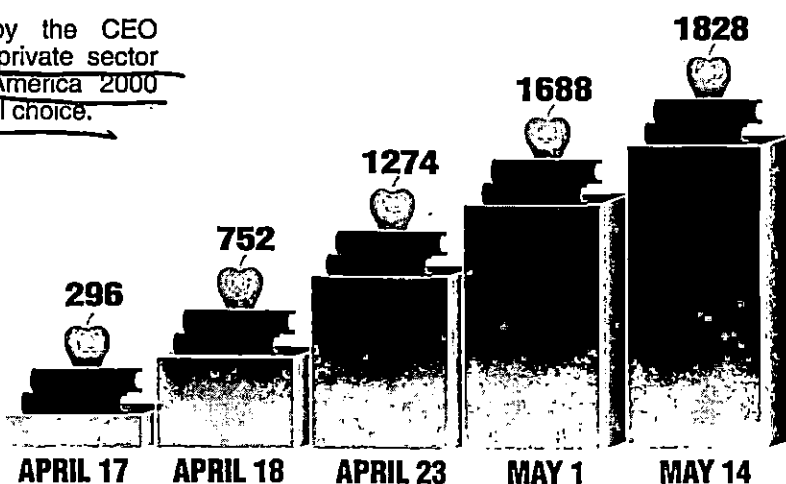
*Initial response to the CEO Foundation, Texas' first private educational voucher program, launched in San Antonio, April 15, 1992, has been dramatic. The following is a "quick look" update at the Foundation's progress and the overwhelming response by the parents of Bexar county.*

- Earlier this year, many San Antonio area CEO's and executives received word from James R. Leininger, M.D., concerning the formation of the CEO Foundation.
- The purpose of the Foundation is to provide educational choice opportunities to low income Bexar County students (grades 1-8) who otherwise could not afford them.
- The program is an initiative of the Texas Public Policy Foundation with lead funding being provided by the KCI Foundation.
- Others participating in funding and supporting the effort include USAA Federal Savings Bank, The San Antonio Express News, and Valero Energy Corporation.
- Other area and state businesses, foundations, and corporations are indicating additional support.
- On April 15th, the CEO Foundation was announced to the media and the public.
- In the first 72 hours following the April 15th announcement of the CEO Foundation 752 applications were received.
- Today, just six weeks since the announcement, more than 1800 applications have been received.
- The Foundation's initial goal was to award 700 Educational Opportunity Vouchers. More than 800 vouchers have been awarded.
- Over 950 students remain on a waiting list, hoping to have an opportunity to exercise educational choice.
- The Educational Opportunity Voucher provided by the CEO Foundation is the first of its' kind in Texas. It is a private sector response to the U.S. Department of Education's America 2000 program, which includes as one of its' goals, educational choice.

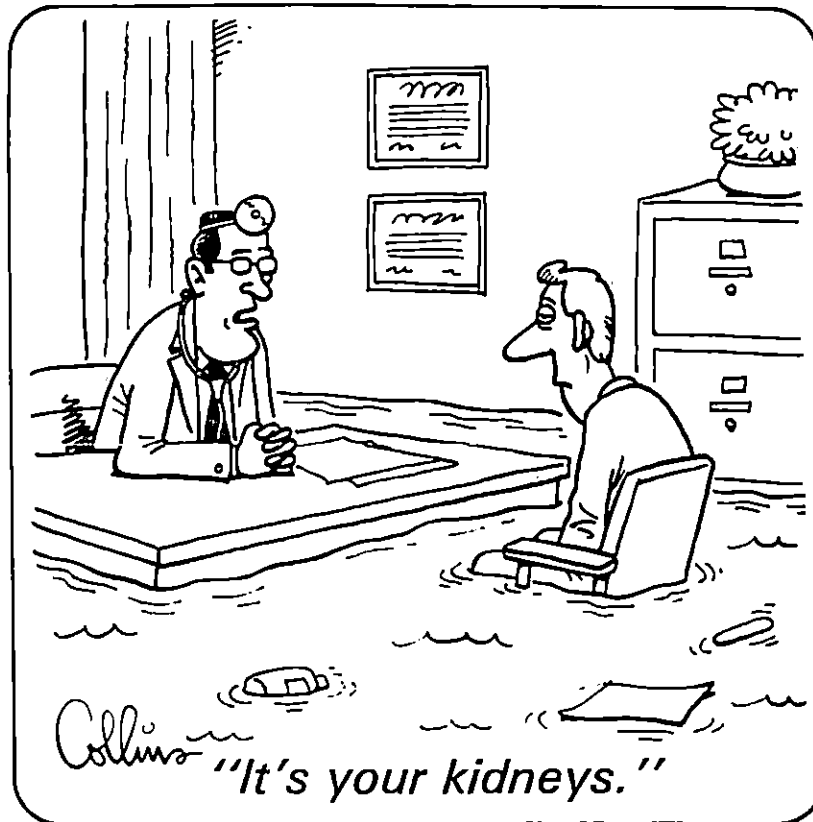

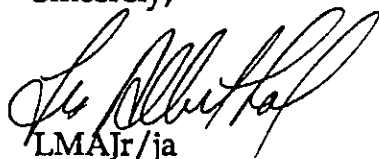

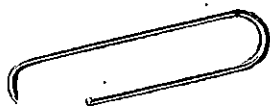

Last week he made a petty, personal attack on President Bush's role in the Persian Gulf war. "I want you to know," he was quoted by the Associated Press, "I will not go to war to prove my manhood."

Perot has every right to question Bush's Middle East record and policies, plus the strategy and tactics of the Persian Gulf war. But to question Bush's "manhood," read courage, is a cheap shot taken way out of bounds.

If Perot thinks Bush needed the Persian Gulf war to prove his manhood, he should ask whether Roger Staubach was really a great quarterback at the Naval Academy, or had to prove his manhood with the Dallas Cowboys.

Perot is an ex-Navy officer old enough to remember much of World War II as a youngster. Surely he can recall that after Pearl Harbor, American armed forces fought many crucial, uphill battles in the Pacific against superior Japanese forces. Surely he knew Bush was one of those deeply involved.

Questioning the courage of any American who fought in that war, or any war, is a brazen gesture, inexcusable and particularly reprehensible for the purpose of seeking political advantage.

George Bush went to war long before last year. As a teen-ager, he volunteered to fly into harm's way, on dangerous combat missions facing Japanese forces

that usually sent up planes that were faster and more maneuverable than his. Early in World War II, the odds of making it back weren't good.

A carrier pilot trained at the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, Bush was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and three air medals. He survived being shot down near the Mariana Islands when a U.S. submarine fortunately came along and rescued him.

Bush served in the manner Hemingway exalted and most Americans appreciated. He fought courageously under tremendous pressure, was awarded medals, but didn't come home and brag about it.

Contrast Bush's military record with that of Perot, who, as an officer during peacetime, complained to the Navy that he should be released from active duty early because the atmosphere created by his fellow Navy personnel was not up to his moral standards.

Perot hasn't been alone in attacking

Bush lately. Some of the media and special-interest groups, especially environmentalists, have been bashing Bush steadily. Of course, the Democrats have been pounding away also, helping drive Bush down in the polls, but to their consternation, the net result has not been to strengthen Bill Clinton, but to benefit Perot.

If anyone had any doubts about Perot's determination to mount a full-fledged campaign, they should have been dispelled this week with his acquisition of Hamilton Jordan and Ed Rollins, key political operatives for Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan, respectively. They bring to the table extremely valuable experience, but they also serve to tarnish somewhat the image Perot has tried to portray as the populist outsider fighting the old political system.

Perot's mercurial campaign appears to be attracting substantial support all across the nation, capitalizing on voter anger against incumbency and gridlock

in Washington. It reflects the anxiety of the American people who want their government to tackle the challenges the two-party system has failed to engage effectively — the unbridled national debt and the need to improve the American competitive position in the global marketplace.

Perot would be well-advised to continue addressing those crucial issues, and not engage in unwarranted personal attacks.

His caustic remark about Bush's "manhood" last week might prove to be nothing more than a blip on a fast-moving presidential radar screen. But it wasn't the first time he's lashed out in that manner, and if a pattern clearly develops, his supporters and leaners will need to question if that's a character flaw that would undermine an effective presidency.

## BCORP LAUDS PRESIDENT'S CUTTING OF DEFENSE REGULATIONS

7 Estimates Some 30,000 New Jobs Could Be Created

Robert Coakley, Executive Director of the Business Council on the Reduction of Paperwork (BCORP), a non-profit organization of corporations and associations, today applauded President Bush' announcement that he will eliminate Department of Defense "recoupment" regulations.

"President Bush understands that federal bureaucracies can get carried away and go far beyond anything Congress intended. With this decisive action to repeal regulations as far as possible under his own authority, the President sends a clear signal that government contract regulations must be sensitive to the post-Cold War era," declared Coakley.

In one fell swoop this action will eliminate a major regulatory barrier to using technology developed under Defense Department contracts for the manufacture of consumer products such as automobiles and refrigerators. Hundreds of millions of dollars in paperwork and administrative costs will be eliminated. "These are the 'hidden taxes' of government contracting that the American taxpayer will no longer have to pay," Coakley noted.

More importantly, this action will enable new markets, new products, and billions of dollars of new export sales in foreign markets. Aerospace Industry officials estimate that every billion dollars of new sales produces 30,000 new jobs.

The President has responded positively and forcefully to recommendations from BCORP, the aerospace industry, and Democratic and Republican members of Congress who agree that the time has come to change "recoupment" practices. "The President is heralding a new era in government contracting, which means the days of 'business as usual' are over," Coakley commented. ("Recoupment" refers to the government's levying of a fee on future sales of products and technology derived from research, development, and other start-up costs underwritten by the government in defense contracting.)

BCORP and its member companies Hughes Aircraft and United Technologies identified recoupment reform as an opportunity to enhance international competitiveness, preserve and create jobs, and assist the "conversion" of a downsized defense industry, in testimony before the President's Export Council last December.

Under the leadership of Boyle Bollinger, Chairman of the Export Council's Subcommittee on Global Competitiveness and Trade, the Council recommended that the President repeal recoupment regulations. "BCORP is pleased to have joined

the Export Council and Industry associations in identifying this major opportunity for the President's Regulatory Reform Initiatives," said Coakley.

"We believe the Paperwork Reduction Act serves as the 'Magna Carta' of the Information Age. We think BCORP's insistence that the Defense Department follow the law has contributed to this success story," Coakley concluded.

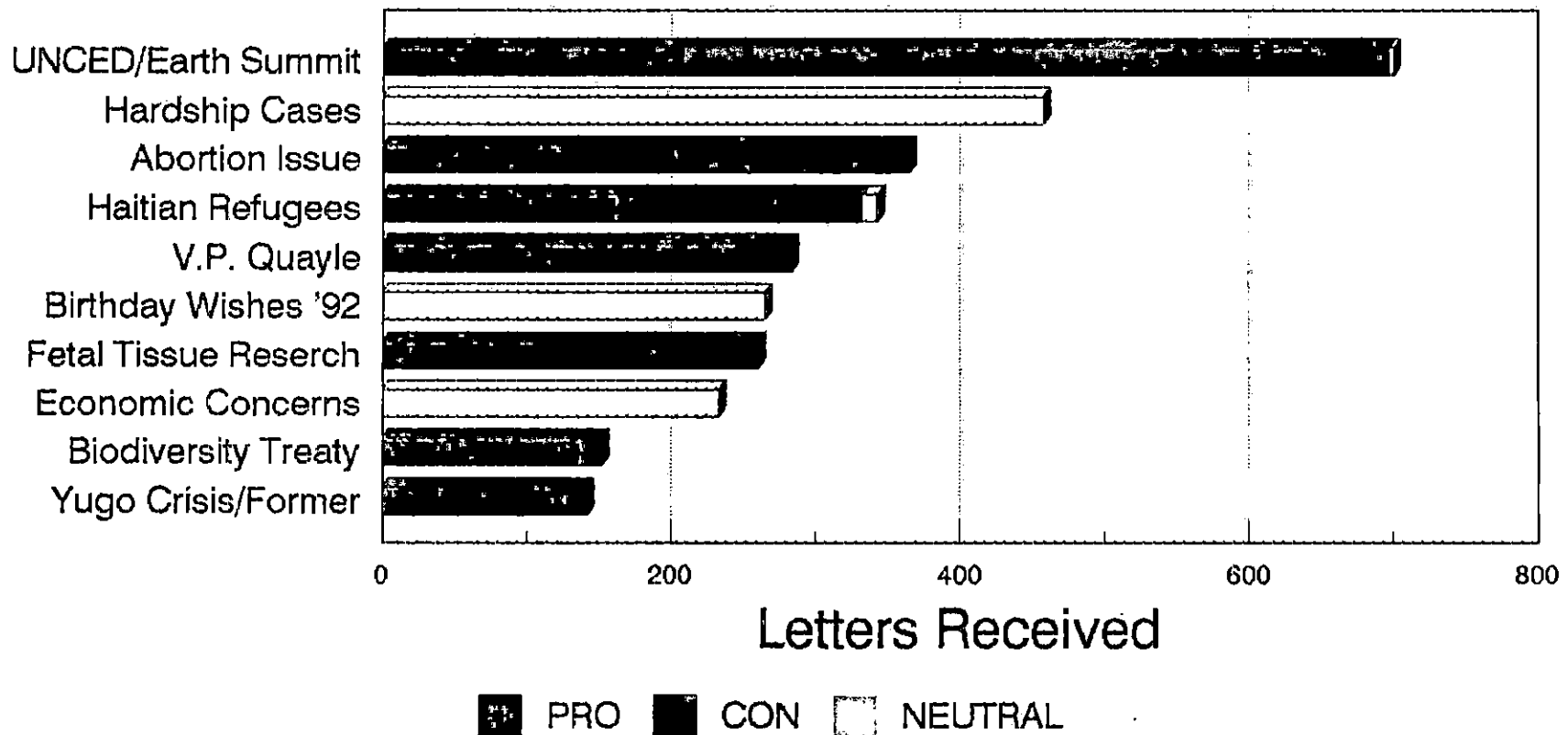

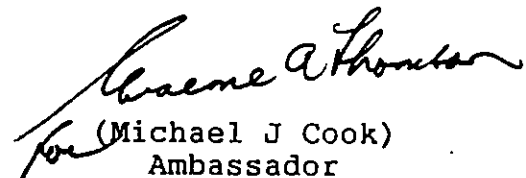

I am writing to you in advance of the G7 Summit to  
convey my concerns for the successful conclusion of

With the main Geneva negotiations virtually marking  
time, I continue to be seriously concerned that the  
opportunity for concluding the Round may be allowed to  
slip away. Now that the cold war has ended there is

trade reform.

In my view, the Munich Summit marks the last  
opportunity to make the breakthrough on the key issues  
which will determine the success or failure of the  
Round in 1992.

I know that the United States shares Australia's sense of urgency to conclude the Round successfully. Despite all the pressures which I know are placed upon you at this time and all the efforts which you and the United States negotiators have made to obtain a breakthrough, it is now the time for all participants, especially the EC and the United States, to make every endeavour to secure agreement.

The Cairns Group will be meeting at ministerial level on 27-28 June in Geneva. We will be doing all that we can to ensure a constructive outcome to the meeting.

I must say I believe that an acceptable compromise on agriculture, and as a consequence in the Round as a whole, should be achievable drawing on the positions being pursued by the United States and the European Community in the negotiations. Inevitably the state of play of the negotiations, including the efforts of you and your G7 colleagues, will guide Cairns Group Ministers in their deliberations and will influence the nature and tone of the communique from the meeting. I would certainly welcome any message from you which Australia could convey to the Group to help to build confidence that the conclusion of the Round is now within our grasp.
