THE McLAUGHLIN GROUP

Moderator: John McLaughlin. **Panel:** Fred Barnes, Clarence Page, Eleanor Clift, Morton Kondracke.

BUSH-PEROT EXCHANGE

McLaughlin: ...Who won this first face-off, Perot or Bush?

Barnes: Any week in which you go from being the guy that's going to clean out the barn in Washington to the can-do gumshoe, as Perot did, he lost the week, and he lost badly....

Clift: ...Neither of these guys look too terrific, but I give the edge to Perot because that letter [thank you letter from Bush to Perot] really undercuts George Bush's emotion and makes it look very feigned.

Page: ...The letter shows that whatever offense Perot allegedly committed, it wasn't so bad that George Bush wasn't thankful for it.... We cannot judge a Perot campaign by conventional standards. I think people who like Ross Perot are going to look at this and say, "Look who's talking: George Bush talking about snooping into somebody's background."...

CLINTON ECONOMIC PLAN

McLaughlin: ...He is fundamentally right. On the other hand, Bush and Perot are stalled. And the play that's being made by Clinton to gain the momentum is brilliant, but I don't think it's working because the plan is too thin....

Clift: ...The biggest loser this week was Richard Darman. If politicians are hypocrites on parade, he's the grand marshall.

McLaughlin: ...Give me the win track of the week: Who came in first, second, and third?

Barnes: Bush first, Clinton second and Perot a distant third.

Clift: Clinton, Perot, Bush.

Page: Clinton came out ahead because at least he had a plan to present. Perot came in second....

Kondracke: ...Bush. Not only did he submerge Perot but he also came out with a big education program which is a good idea. So Bush is first, Clinton is second, and Perot is third.

McLaughlin: ...It's Clinton first, Bush second and Perot third....

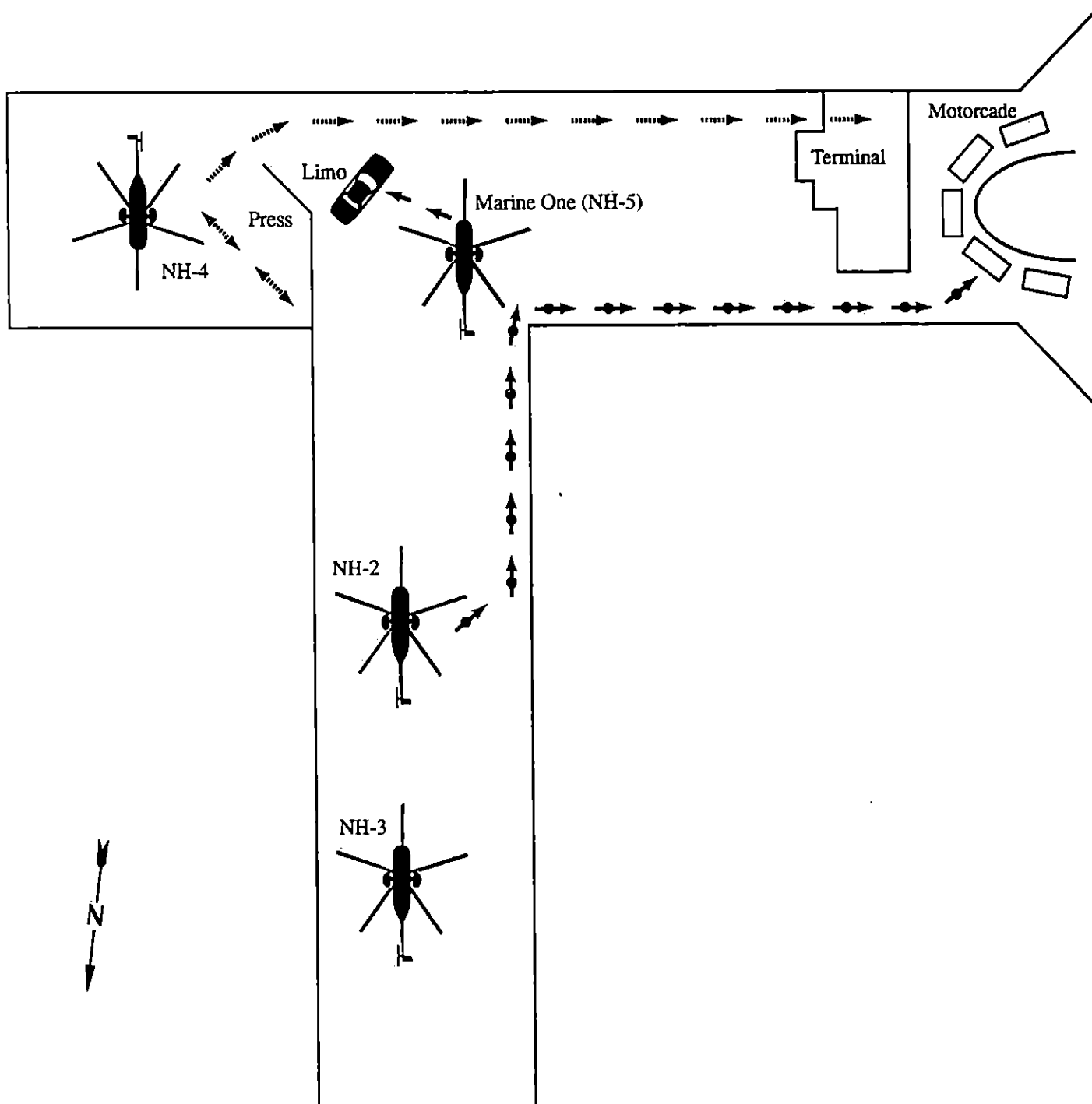

By law the Party's state committee must designate a presidential ticket in September, but the objective is to get the Executive Committee to announce its support on Monday. Party Chairman Mike Long is very popular and supports your nomination. Chairman Bond has worked closely with Long and the other Conservatives to strengthen the relationship between the Conservatives and the Republicans; Bond has been instrumental in initiating this meeting.

Monday's meeting provides an opportunity to express gratitude for the Conservative's support in years past, especially the party's endorsements in 1980, 1984, and 1988. The meeting presents a forum in which you can highlight similarities and acknowledge differences in your respective viewpoints. Recognition of the points of contention will diminish the degree of existing rifts in order to further develop a strong, mutually beneficial relationship between the Republicans and the Conservatives.

I. Correspondence

In response to the Los Angeles riots, Governor Mario Cuomo (D) wrote offering his suggestions for solving our urban problems.

Mayor David Dinkins (D) wrote to you concerning South Africa, and forwarded a copy of a letter he received from Nelson Mandela. You sent a personal reply to Mayor Dinkins thanking him for sharing his views and those of Mr. Mandela.

State Senator George Onorato (D) wrote urging you to review the case of Agent Occhipinti. He forwards a copy of a letter from Mr. Phil Caruso, President, Patrolmen's Benevolent Association.

State Assemblywoman Frances Sullivan (R) wrote to urge you to reconsider your promise to veto legislation that will allow the use of fetal tissue for scientific research.

State Senator Serphin Maltese (R&C), on behalf of the Senate Majority Task Force on the Columbus Quincentennial, forwards to you a signed and numbered Commemorative Collector's Edition copy of "New York at the World's Columbian Exposition."

State Senator John Kuhl, Jr. (R&C) urges you to review the awarding of a United States Air Force training aircraft contract to Slingsby Aviation, Ltd, in Kirbymoorside, England. The work was previously done by the Schweizer Aircraft Corp., Big Flats, New York.

Assemblyman Michael Nozzolio (R) expresses his concern regarding the proposal to admit non-veterans into Veterans Administration hospitals. He urges you to reconsider.

II. Appointment

You appointed State Senator James Lack (R) to be a Member of the National Commission for Employment Policy, expiring September 30, 1994.

III. Discussion

A. Redistricting Plans

On June 24, the Justice Department gave almost total approval to the once-a-decade redistricting plan drawn for the State Legislature, fully certifying the State Senate's new district boundaries and requiring only one Assembly District modification, in upper Manhattan. In the other 148 Assembly districts and in all 61 Senate districts, the redistricting plan conforms with the Federal Voting Rights Act, which is intended to maximize the participation and influence of racial and ethnic minorities.

B. The Case of former Agent Joseph Occhipinti

In protest of the Department of Justice's successful prosecution and subsequent jailing of former Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) Supervisory Special Agent Joseph Occhipinti, Staten Island Borough President Guy Molinari resigned from his positions with the New York State Bush-Quayle campaign, and as "super delegate" to the Republican convention in Houston. He also resigned as vice-chairman of the Federal Legal Services Corporation. Agent Occhipinti was convicted of civil rights violations for conducting illegal searches stemming from investigations of Dominican store owners in upper Manhattan. He is serving a 37-month sentence in the Federal Correctional Institute in El Reno, Oklahoma. Mr. Molinari's announcement has received widespread local and national media coverage.

C. Unemployment Rates

New York's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for May is 7.9 percent, an increase of .7 percent over the same period in 1991. The national unemployment rate (seasonally adjusted) for May is 7.5 percent.

D. Congressional Retirements..

So far, seven members of the New York delegation to the U.S. Congress have announced their retirement. They are: Representatives Mrazek (D), McHugh (D), Nowak (D), Lent (R), McGrath (R), Horton (R), and Martin (R). This development will undercut New York's seniority influence in the House of Representatives. Due to congressional redistricting in the wake of the 1990 census, New York State is losing 3 seats, from 34 to 31. Currently, there are 21 Democrats and 13 Republicans serving.

E. State Legislative Business

The legislature is expected to end its session this weekend. Senate Republicans have overridden Governor Cuomo's 10th straight veto of a death penalty bill, but the Assembly fell five votes short in an override attempt. Republicans are now considering a constitutional amendment on the death penalty which would not require gubernatorial approval to get on the ballot.

F. Crime and Drugs

In May, Mayor David Dinkins (D) endorsed a \$300,000 grant from the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR) to fund five needle exchange programs, including two programs to be operated by city workers. Governor Martinez wrote a letter to Mayor Dinkins stating the Administration's strong opposition to these programs.

Cocaine is the primary drug of abuse in New York. Since early May, the wholesale price of cocaine has increased dramatically, doubling in some instances.

On June 15, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) State and local task force personnel and national Guardsmen seized a major, fully operational cocaine laboratory within New York City. It is estimated that this facility was responsible for producing from 100 to 200 pounds of finished cocaine hydrochloride per day. DEA speculates that the laboratory was established to process cocaine using nine new chemical combinations and to determine the effectiveness of performing final processing in the United States.

G. Solid Waste Incinerator

New Yorkers average five-to-six pounds of solid waste per person, compared to a 4 pound national average. That represents 8 million tons of garbage per year in the City. On March 30, Mayor Dinkins announced plans to triple the amount of waste that is incinerated and triple the amount that is recycled. This announcement foresees the construction of an incinerator in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. There is considerable community opposition to this project. The Environmental Protection Agency has issued a permit for the construction of this incinerator.

H. AIDS Education

Mayor David Dinkins (D) has urged the New York City Board of Education to adopt an expanded AIDS education curriculum for elementary school children that introduces learning about condoms in the fourth grade. The curriculum would require six lessons annually in kindergarten through the sixth grade on AIDS and the HIV virus. This idea has received strong opposition from local parent associations.

1992 ELECTION OUTLOOK

Presidential Election

A recent statewide poll indicated the following results.

The President	34%
Clinton	27%
Perot	20%

In order for Perot to be on the ballot in November, 20,000 signatures are required by August 18. The signatures must represent at least 100 from one-half of the congressional districts (17 required). New York law states that none of the ballot signatures can be those of voters who signed petitions for any of the candidates in the Democrat Presidential Primary or any of the delegates selected to attend the Republican convention. In as much as a Republican primary was not held in New York, registered Republicans who would have signed Bush or Buchanan petition papers are now able to sign the Perot petitions.

Among Democrats in the presidential primary, 25 percent said they would vote for Perot in the general election against you or Clinton.

Perot has offices in New York City, Syracuse, Albany, Buffalo and Binghamton.

The New York Liberal Party is considering an endorsement of Perot. The group supported John Anderson in 1980. As a legally recognized party, the Liberal Party endorsement would guarantee Perot a place on the ballot.

Discussions remain active with Conservative Party Chairman, Mike Long relative to their endorsement of a presidential candidate. On Monday, you will meet with the Executive Committee of the New York Conservative Party. Long has said that although it is

unlikely that they would support Perot, they may run their own candidate. In 1980 the Reagan-Bush ticket secured more than 300,000 New York votes from the Conservative Party. In the 1988 election, the Bush-Quayle ticket secured over 240,000 votes from the Conservative Party.

The Republican Presidential primary in New York had been scheduled for April 7. Pat Buchanan did not submit the required number of petition names of registered Republicans (1,250 per Congressional district) to qualify a delegate slate in any of the 34 Congressional districts. This eliminated the need for the April 7 primary and has committed all 100 state delegates to George Bush. State GOP Chairman Bill Powers is being credited with this "upset" of Buchanan. Powers moved the primary date from June to April and moved the filing date to February 6 to eliminate the possibility of Buchanan using any momentum that he may have gained in later contests. While all of Powers' actions were legal, the developments have caused controversy and the call for New York election law reform.

In the New York Democrat primary, Clinton won with 41 percent of the vote, while Brown garnered 26 percent. Tsongas had suspended his campaign prior to the primary, but still finished with 29 percent of the vote.

The New York Bush-Quayle campaign is being chaired by H. Douglas Barclay. The Bush-Quayle ticket lost New York to Dukakis-Bentsen in 1988 by a 49-51 percent margin. New York has 33 electoral college votes.

Guy Molinari had resigned from the Bush-Quayle re-election campaign to protest what he called the Justice Department's refusal to look at new evidence in the case of Joseph Occhipinti, an I.N.S. officer convicted of civil-rights violations. Molinari investigated the case for several months. Molinari said that he resigned "not because of my lack of affection for George Bush, but for some of his appointees." Molinari is currently reconsidering his status with the Bush-Quayle campaign.

U.S. Senate Election

Republican Senator Alfonse D'Amato will face a tough bid for a third term. D'Amato is viewed as vulnerable as a result of a 20-month investigation into his dealings with HUD contracts. D'Amato was cleared of the allegations of misconduct by the Senate Ethics Committee. However, D'Amato's brother was indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of fraudulently billing a defense contractor. While Senator D'Amato has refused to speculate on the impact the indictment could have on his own re-

election, the indictment is seen as a major political complication.

In another legal controversy involving D'Amato, a federal judge in Puerto Rico has identified evidence which seems to contradict D'Amato's sworn denial last year that he interceded at HUD for a project owned by his chief fund raiser, Eduardo Lopez Ballori. The ruling opens the possibility that D'Amato may have to take the stand. As a result of this contradictory evidence, the scope of the trial has been broadened to include a look into the allegations that D'Amato interceded for political contributors at HUD.

Former Vice Presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro is a candidate for D'Amato's Senate seat. She received the endorsement of the Democrat State Party. Recent polls show that she retains good name identification and high approval ratings. However, one third of those polled say they have an unfavorable view of Ferraro. In a poll conducted in the Western New York County of Erie (Jack Kemp's former district), Ferraro received 54 percent of the support to D'Amato's 31 percent. D'Amato carried Erie County in his 1980 and 1986 senate elections.

New York State Attorney General Robert Abrams (D), a four-term AG, is also a candidate for the Democrat nomination for D'Amato's Senate seat. Abrams has focused his campaign on his support of women's issues. He is expected to receive the endorsement of the Liberal Party of New York; the endorsement automatically would place Abrams on the ballot. The possible 3-way race would help D'Amato by splitting the Democrat vote.

New York City Comptroller Liz Holtzman (D) has also entered the race for the Democrat nomination to the U.S. Senate. In an effort to galvanize female voters, she has made sexual harassment and the Thomas hearings a campaign issue.

Reverend Al Sharpton, a controversial civil rights activist, has also entered the Democrat Senate primary. The Democrat State Party recently drew fire for allowing Sharpton to participate in a candidate forum. Sharpton is facing felony tax-evasion charges and has consistently exacerbated racial tensions in the state. GOP State Chairman Bill Powers has referred to Sharpton as "New York's own David Duke."

Congressmen Bob Mrazek (D-3) withdrew from the Senate race following the disclosure that he wrote 972 bad checks from the House bank, maintaining a negative balance in his account for more than 23 months.

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House Elections

In a year in which the congressional district maps are being redrawn, seven New York representatives have announced that they would not seek re-election; four are Republican. The Republicans are David O'B. Martin, Ray McGrath, Norman Lent, and Frank Horton. The three Democrats are Robert Mrazek, Henry Nowak, and Matt McHugh.

Local Elections

A possible Republican challenger in the Senate race was Rudy Giuliani, former U.S. Attorney, who lost the race for Mayor of New York City in 1989. However, Giuliani has stated that he will not run for the Senate seat and will concentrate on the 1993 New York City Mayoral race. A recent poll taken among Hispanics indicated that 46% of those polled would lean toward Giuliani in a NYC mayoral race - 35% supported Dinkins.

David Cornstein, a self-made millionaire, has expressed an interest in entering the Republican Mayoral primary in New York City. A challenge is expected against Dinkins from within the Democrat party.

Nelson Rockefeller, Jr., has been mentioned as a possible challenger to Congresswoman Nita Lowey. Rockefeller, 27, is a special assistant at OMB. He has met with party leaders but has said that he has no immediate plans to run.

State Comptroller Ed Regan announced that he will not run for Governor in 1994.

The 1992 New York general election ballot will include the offices of President, Vice President, U.S. Senate, U.S. House and the entire New York State Senate and Assembly.

An election reform package was passed by the State Legislature which includes a limit in the amount of money that can be contributed to state candidates. Campaign spending limits or public financing of campaigns is not part of the package. While a great deal of controversy arose from the State Chairman's actions on the primary regarding those signatures required to appear on the primary ballot, those laws did not change. The effectiveness of the legislation has been questioned. The Governor has not signed the bill but is expected to. He had stated that he would veto any redistricting plan unless significant election reform was produced.

1991 ELECTION REVIEW

Republican gains were made in seven county executive races in the 1991 elections. The Albany County seat had been controlled by Democrats for more than seventy years.

A term limitation initiative for City Council members was defeated in White Plains.

REAPPORTIONMENT OUTLOOK

Legislative officials, missing four deadlines in 5 weeks, were unable to draft a Congressional Reapportionment plan. A Federal court panel gave Governor Cuomo one week to agree on a plan. That time line was not met. A "special master" was then appointed by the court to draw the 31 new Congressional districts. Controversy has arisen over the appointment of the Special Master, with Democrats charging that he is too closely tied to the Republican Party. The deadlock resulted from the Democrat-controlled Assembly and the Republican-led Senate.

New York is expected to lose three Congressional seats in the redrawing process. One GOP seat and one Democrat seat are expected to be eliminated. The third seat is likely to be drawn so an incumbent Democrat runs against an incumbent Republican.

STATE PARTY STATUS/ACTIVITY

Bill Powers, a close friend of Senator D'Amato and former State Director of D'Amato's office, was elected as State Party Chairman in 1991. Powers' initial election was viewed as a deliberate move by D'Amato in posturing for his re-election. Powers has been extremely pro-active in turning the party around and has aggressively countered the Democrats' messages in the state with

strong GOP messages. Following what was an embarrassing year last year for NY Republicans with the defeat of the Republican gubernatorial candidate, Powers has restored credibility to the party. The State Party was approximately \$1.3 million in debt at the beginning of 1991. Powers has reduced the debt to less than \$300,000. His skill as a political operative was evident in the success in securing all 100 state delegates as Bush delegates.

Powers is extremely supportive with regard to national issues. He has issued a series of strongly worded press releases supporting you and attacking opponents on a range of issues. He called on the members of the New York Congressional delegation to support you in the balanced budget amendment vote. He blasted Rollins and Jordan for joining the Perot campaign, stating that their appointment proves that Perot is "a die-hard Beltway-Washington insider." He has labeled Perot as a "reckless and unpredictable" personality, "fast to draw his Texas six-shooter and fire blanks." More recently he shifted his sights to Clinton, assailing Clinton's economic plan as a "sly proposal that will kill American jobs."

At the New York Republican State Committee meeting last month, D'Amato was endorsed as the U.S. Senate candidate. Realizing that he did not have the votes to win, Dick Rosenbaum withdrew from the election for National Committeeman. Joe Mondello, current GOP Chairman of Nassau County was elected to the National Committeeman post. Eunice Whittlesey was re-elected as National Committeewoman. Rosenbaum delivered a fervent speech about the importance of having a pro-choice plank in the national platform. Rosenbaum says that he will seriously consider running for governor in 1994.

In a move that has created a great deal of controversy within the Republican party, three high profile New York Republicans have established a group called CHANGE-NY. The group - which includes 1982 gubernatorial candidate Lewis Lehrman; Evan Galbraith, a multimillionaire and former U.S. Ambassador to France; and Herbert London, 1990 gubernatorial primary candidate - has launched an attack on Senate Republican Leader Ralph Marino and the entire GOP-controlled Senate. The attack centers on Senate passage of increased tax packages. The group claims that the tax increases have driven business out of New York. Marino has been described as "furious" over the group's efforts. The strategy is seen as part of a new effort to spark a taxpayer revolt while laying the groundwork for a conservative-oriented campaign for governor in 1994. In a speech to a Conservative Party gathering, Galbraith called for an end to New York City's rent control and rent-stabilization programs which subsidize 1 million apartments.

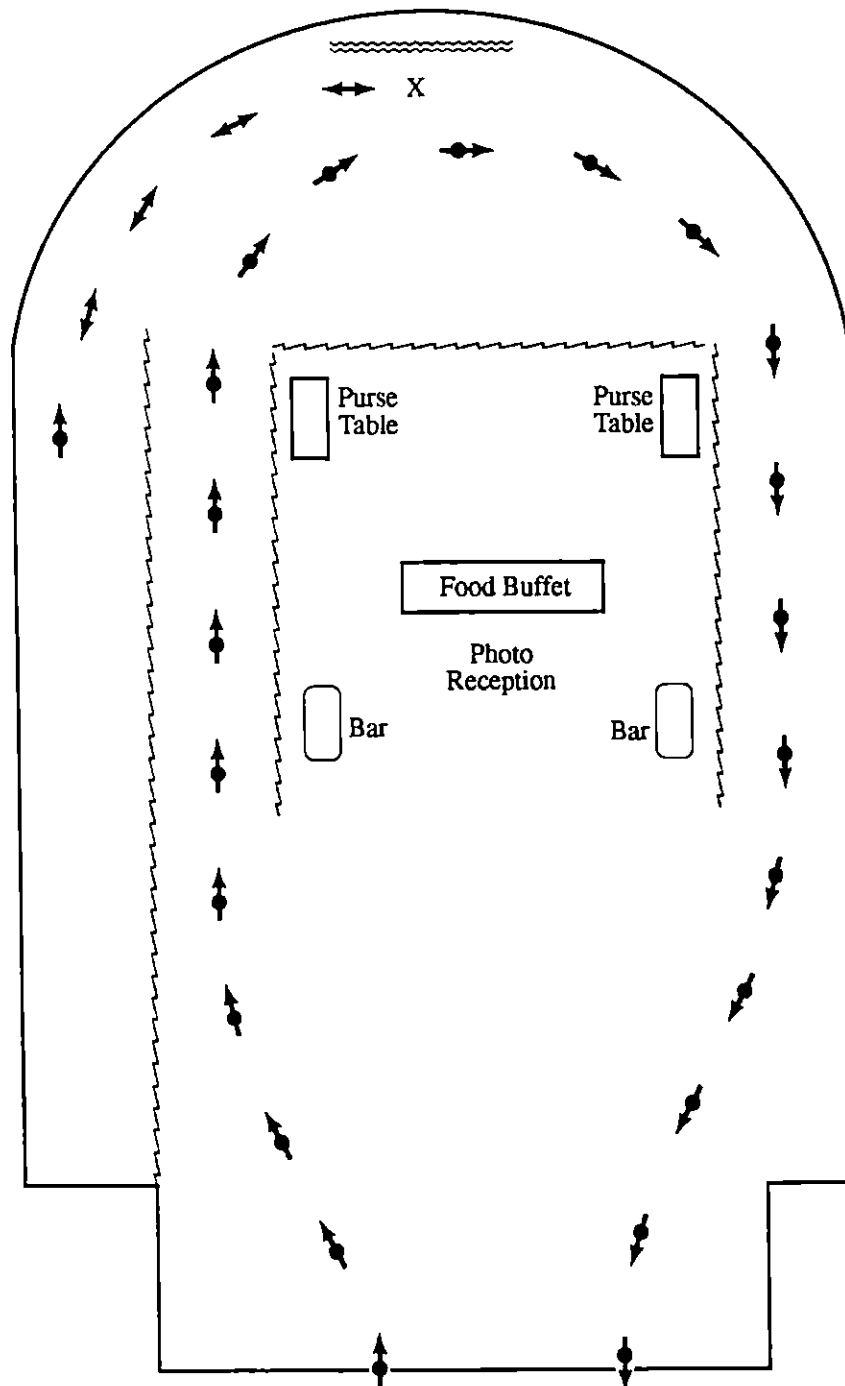

I. Recent Correspondence

Governor Engler forwarded Senate Joint Resolution E, which ratified the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States prohibiting Congress from raising its pay in midterm. Michigan was the 38th state to ratify.

Governor Engler also wrote recommending Mara Letica for the post of U.S. Ambassador to Croatia.

The Michigan House of Representatives forwarded a resolution calling on you and the Attorney General to initiate federal criminal charges on civil rights violations in the Rodney King case. A similar resolution was also received from the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners.

Mayor Coleman Young, Detroit, forwarded a copy of the city's proposal for the Department of Defense to locate a Defense Finance and Accounting Service Center in downtown Detroit.

Mayor Elizabeth Brater, Ann Arbor, wrote urging you to support Community Development Block Grants.

Michael J. McDonald, Addison Township Supervisor, wrote opposing the view that the "Great Society" programs of the 1960's have led to the deterioration of societal values.

The Macomb County Board of Commissioners forwarded a resolution urging you and Congress to address the issue of Social Security benefits for "Notch Babies."

Lois Wells, Councilwoman for the City of Ypsilanti, forwarded petitions supporting efforts to keep GM's Willow Run plant open.

II. Discussion

A. Budget

Because revenue projections have not been met, Michigan's FY 1991-92 budget deficit is currently estimated at \$400 million. Governor Engler and Senate Majority Leader Dick Posthumus (R) have agreed that the Legislature will not recess until a budget agreement is reached. Conference committee reports will be submitted to the Legislature when it returns on June 25, 1992 and it is hoped that a budget will be in place by July 1, 1992.

No new taxes or fees are included in the proposed budget plans. The Engler Administration and the Republican controlled Senate continue to believe that incentives for investment and controlling state spending are needed to spur the economy.

B. Unemployment

Michigan's unemployment rate for May, 1992, stood at 8.6 percent, an increase of 1.2 percent over the same period in 1991.

The most recent unemployment figures for Detroit show its unemployment rate stood at 9.2 percent in April, 1992, a decrease of .3 percent over the same period in 1991.

C. Property Tax Proposals

Governor Engler has proposed a ballot initiative that provides a 30 percent across-the-board cut in school property taxes and a three percent cap on annual tax assessment increases. Engler's plan, known as "Cut and Cap," has received 400,000 petition signatures, thus enabling it to be on the ballot in November. This initiative is projected to provide a \$6.5 billion boost to the state's economy.

A Democratic proposal, formulated by House Speaker Lewis Dodak (D), will be on the ballot as well. This proposal is different from Engler's in that it proposes a significant tax shift to business by eliminating the Capital Acquisition Deduction (CAD). The business community considers this plan to be anti-growth and anti-business.

D. Welfare Reform

Governor Engler has proposed a sweeping reform of Michigan's welfare reform system. The primary goals of the package are to strengthen families by encouraging employment, targeting parental support, increasing social responsibility, and involving communities. Engler's proposal includes 21 recommendations to break the cycle of dependency. Highlights of the recommendations are as follows:

- o Creating an earnings incentive by allowing recipients to keep a fixed proportion of their earnings without any penalty.
- o Exempting the earnings and assets of youth from the earnings statement of the family. It is hoped this will help promote a strong work ethic.
- o Withhold professional licenses and car registrations until child support obligations are met.
- o Make adoption a safer and easier option by implementing recommendations made by Lt. Governor Binsfeld's Adoption Commission.
- o Include all children on health insurance policies of non-custodial parents, regardless of marital status.
- o Require public aid recipients to participate for 20 hours a week in a combination of employment, education, job training or community service.

E. Kroger Strike

The nine week old United Food and Commercial Workers union strike against Kroger food stores continues as the two sides negotiate under a strict media blackout. Kroger, which has kept its 64 stores open using replacement workers and out-of-town managers, has lost an estimated \$88 million in sales. More than 7,500 workers are on strike.

F. Drugs and Crime

Drug trafficking continues to be a serious problem in Detroit and other Michigan cities, spawning violence and other crimes. Crack cocaine use, while perhaps not increasing, remains a serious problem in Detroit.

Recent investigations show that Detroit has become a source city for selling crack cocaine to smaller cities throughout the Midwest. Heroin use appears to be more prevalent. Law enforcement officers consider metropolitan Detroit to be an important heroin distribution site because of its large population of people from the Middle East. In part because of foreign interdiction efforts, an increasing percentage of marijuana available in Michigan is domestically grown. The price of marijuana is at an all time high.

Drug related crimes, especially those involving violence, continue at a very high rate, particularly in the Detroit metropolitan area. Violent crime levels continue to rise from a high base. Federal and state law enforcement officials estimate that from 60-70 percent of the crime in this area is drug related.

G. Detroit/Federal Police Dispute

During recent years, cooperation between the Detroit Police Department and federal agencies and their participation in joint investigations have almost stopped. The Justice Department believes that this policy resulted from orders to the new Police Chief from Mayor Coleman Young. Relations between the mayor and federal agencies have been strained for many years, in part, because of several investigations in which there were allegations of criminal activity on the part of the mayor or his close associates.

In the past year, arrests of a relative of the mayor and 8 Detroit police officers in an FBI sting have apparently resulted in the mayor's order that cooperation cease. The mayor was also embarrassed last year by the disclosure of taped conversations between himself and Kenneth Weiner, the former police official who has been convicted on two occasions over the past year of serious criminal fraud.

The result has been that federal agencies have been hampered in their efforts to conduct investigations of crimes in Detroit.

H. Weed and Seed Controversy

A controversy has erupted over the selection of 16 cities other than Detroit for Weed and Seed pilot sites. Mayor Young has alleged that the local U.S. Attorney, Steve Markman, had deliberately failed to nominate Detroit and therefore excluded the city from selection as one of the pilot cities because of the continuing estrangement between city and federal officials. He claimed that the decision to deny the city these funds was part of a plot to undermine the city.

The selection of Weed and Seed pilot projects was made by Department of Justice officials in Washington, D.C., following several criteria, including the need for a cooperative relationship between the city and federal agencies. In view of the city's refusal to work with federal law enforcement agencies and its resistance to the FBI's effort to locate \$2.6 million in public funds embezzled by the former police chief, the decision not to include Detroit is viewed as responsible and proper by the U.S. Attorney.

I. Plant Closings

General Motors announced that it will shut down operations at the Willow Run Assembly Plant in Ypsilanti by 1993. The plant currently employs 4,000 people. GM will also close its Flint V8 engine plant by 1995, laying off 4,036; its Saginaw Gray Iron Foundry, laying off 600 employees by the Summer of 1994; and two small plants in Detroit in 1992, laying off 435 people. Aggregate GM job loss in the state will total 9,000.

Governor Engler has directed the state Commerce Department to look into new uses for the Willow Run plant.

Department of Labor officials met on March 5 with representatives from GM, the UAW and the State of Michigan to discuss how best to coordinate support services for workers affected by GM shutdowns. Secretary Martin has also formed a high-level task force within the Labor Department. This task force will coordinate activities among states and local communities affected and will assist employees dislocated as a result of corporate cutbacks.

Ypsilanti Township has announced it will charge breach of contract and take GM to court over the company's plans to close Willow Run. At issue are two property tax abatement agreements which GM received in return for a promise to keep 4,100 jobs at Willow Run. GM has received \$13.5 million in tax breaks from the agreements.

J. America 2000

On November 13, 1991, Governor Engler announced Michigan's adoption of the AMERICA 2000 strategy. Governor Engler is highly supportive of the Michigan 2000 educational reform movement and is working closely with the AMERICA 2000 office to ensure its success.

Detroit 2000 was launched on the same day Michigan adopted AMERICA 2000. The Detroit 2000 initiative proposes to: dramatically expand "empowered schools" where principals, teachers and parents make most decisions; promote greater parental choice by increasing the number of schools with distinctive philosophies open to citywide enrollment; require all schools to improve upon their "last best" performance on achievement tests; provide job and scholarship incentives for students with good grades and attendance through the Detroit Compact; and expand preschool classes for at-risk children.

K. School Choice Plan Defeat

On Monday, June 8, 1992, Detroit-area voters voted against school-of-choice plans in all 11 metropolitan Detroit school districts that placed it on the ballot. The plans would have allowed students to choose which school within their district they would like to attend.

School officials had publicly stated that it would cost \$250,000 to \$400,000 to transport the one percent of students who expressed interest in moving to another school. Most observers believe that rejection by the voters was more an economic consideration than opposition to the choice program.

In most cases, parents can still send their children to any school within their district, but they must provide their own transportation.

L. Reapportionment

On Wednesday, April 1, 1992, the Michigan Supreme Court "masters" panel of three judges released its final legislative redistricting plan. The Supreme Court appointed the panel after legislative agreement on reapportionment was not reached in February, 1992.

Overall, the plan will maintain the Senate Republican majority and will give Michigan House Republicans an outside shot of gaining a majority for the first time in two decades.

However, the NAACP challenged the Michigan Supreme Court's legislative reapportionment plan based on a voting rights violation. Their appeal was heard and the Court of Appeals has ordered a three judge panel to rewrite the House of Representatives legislative districts for Wayne and Oakland Counties.

M. Clean Air Act Implementation

The implementation of the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 continues to be of major interest in Michigan, as evidenced by the announcement in March, 1992, of two regulatory decisions that should have a favorable impact on the automobile industry's economic standing.

The first of these, which you announced in your remarks to the Economic Club of Detroit on March 13, 1992, states EPA's decision not to require, for safety reasons, canister equipment on new cars to control hydrocarbon emissions during the refueling process. Instead, controls will be installed at gasoline pumps in areas with significant smog problems, an alternative that is safer, more focused, and has more immediate effect in reducing emissions.

In the second decision, under the umbrella of the 90-day regulatory review process, your Administration announced that EPA will publish guidance and criteria for the accelerated retirement of older vehicles. This initiative allows states, cities, and companies the option of scrapping old, high-polluting automobiles and using the resulting emission reductions to satisfy certain emission-reduction requirements in place of more costly controls than are otherwise required under the Amendments. EPA estimates that in addition to reductions in air pollutants, a 5 percent scrapping of pre-1971 cars would result in a reduction in U.S. oil consumption by 1.6 million barrels per year, and an increase in vehicle sales of more than 2000 per year.

The automotive industry continues to be a key player in consultations surrounding implementation of the new Clean Air Act requirements of tighter pollution standards for car and truck emissions as well as new fuel requirements.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK - PRESIDENTIAL

Michigan started off as a very competitive primary for both Republicans and Democrats, but ended up with big wins for the President and Bill Clinton. Michigan has one of the highest unemployment rates in the Nation, and many experts thought that the Bush-Quayle margin might suffer as a result. As it turned out, Pat Buchanan's protectionist, isolationist message went flat. Buchanan had little formal organization, and was no match for the strong Bush-Quayle effort led by Governor John Engler.

Michigan's Democrats dealt a fatal blow to Paul Tsongas, who finished behind Clinton and Jerry Brown. Brown was strongly supported by organized labor, and effectively tapped into the discontent felt by unemployed workers. Tsongas withdrew from the race shortly after the Michigan primary.

The Michigan Bush-Quayle campaign organization is very strong, and ready for the challenge of the general election. Governor John Engler is the Bush-Quayle '92 General Chairman in the state and Tim Leuliette is serving as Finance Chairman. Max Fisher serves as an Honorary National Finance Chairman, with Heinz Prechter on the National Finance Committee. Michigan Republican Party Chairman Dave Doyle and the entire Congressional delegation are campaign Co-Chairmen.

1992 POLITICAL OUTLOOK CONTINUED

Michigan is expected to be a key battleground state in the general election. The state will have 18 electoral votes in 1992, and they will be hard won. Most experts expect the Fall campaign in Michigan to center on economic issues. The three major automakers have experienced financial difficulties recently, laying off thousands of blue and white collar workers, many of whom reside in Macomb County, which was a top target in 1988. Macomb County is an important county due to the high number of swing voters and conservative Democrats. Some fear these swing voters are disenfranchised and disgruntled due to the perceived gridlock both in Lansing and Washington. As in 1988, Macomb County will be a key target for the Bush/Quayle campaign.

The Perot campaign is very organized in Michigan. There are several headquarters state-wide, and several rallies have already been conducted. A state-wide organizational meeting was held in Detroit on June 9, 1992. Campaign officials from Perot's Dallas headquarters were reported to be in attendance.

Reports indicate that some defections to Perot from the GOP have occurred. Defections have been discovered in some of the northern out-county areas including Benzie, Ogemaw, Crawford and Manistee counties.

The most recent state-wide poll (6/7-8) comes from the Detroit News and shows Ross Perot leading in a three-way race with 33%. The President garnered 31% and Governor Clinton trailed in third with 24%. 12% were undecided.

The BUSH-QUAYLE ticket carried Michigan's 20 electoral votes in 1988 by a 54% to 46% margin.

REAPPORTIONMENT UPDATE

Michigan will lose two Congressional seats as a result of reapportionment. A state court recently approved a compromise plan that is extremely fair and should allow Republicans a competitive chance in this year's election. As a result of redistricting, Republican Congressman Carl Purcell announced his retirement because he would be required to move his home and compete in a more Democratic district. Republican incumbent William Broomfield has also retired. 11th District Republican Congressman Bob Davis, the third worst offender on the

Congressional Bank check kiting list, has retired and former U.S. Representative **Phil Ruppe**, a member of the George Bush for President Steering Committee in 1980 and 1988, has announced his bid to win the GOP nomination in a contested primary. In the state legislature, the favorable redistricting plan will give Republicans an opportunity to take control of the state house. Currently, Republicans hold a 20 to 18 majority in the state senate. Democrats hold a 60 to 50 margin in the state house, but the new plan is expected to make at least 20 seats very competitive.

STATE GOP UPDATE

The Michigan Republican Party, considered one of the best party organizations in the Nation, continues to grow under the leadership of Governor Engler and Party Chairman **David Doyle**. Doyle succeeded **Spence Abraham** as GOP Chairman after serving as Executive Director. Abraham, currently the Executive Director of the National Republican Congressional Committee, left Michigan to serve as Vice President Quayle's Deputy Chief of Staff. Michigan Republicans gathered at their state convention on May 30. Elections were held for National Committeeman and National Committeewoman. National Committeeman **Chuck Yob** won re-election. However, incumbent National Committeewoman **Andi Fischer** was challenged in a three way race between **Betsy DeVos** and **Judy Fisher**. **DeVos** edged out Fischer on a second ballot vote. Insiders attribute Fischer's loss to her apparent lack of commitment to party functions and activities.

Your text also calls on Congress to pass crime legislation to make the judicial system fair, fast, and final. Please note the bracketed page 5 remarks scoring the films, radio, video games, and television which glorify killing law enforcement officials.

((We meet at the end of a hectic month. When President
Yeltsin was in Washington several weeks ago he asked if I still
thought the day of the dictator was over. / I said I did, and he
said, "So who's this 'Steinbrenner' I keep hearing about?")) //

Here is a message I want everyone to hear: All Americans
want families -- strong and united. / All Americans want good
schools, a job-creating economy, and a world at peace. / All
Americans want to keep our neighborhoods safe -- rejecting those
who soft-pedal the need to be hard on crime. / Some say there
are reasons crimes occur. I say there is never an excuse not to
seek justice through America's system of law. //

Nowhere is this need clearer than in our war on drugs -- a
war this new office of the Drug Enforcement Administration can
help fight, and win. / As long as one American is hooked on
drugs -- that is one American too many. So we must stop drug
use. Not some place. Not some time. But across America -- now.

That's why the Federal budget for Fiscal Year 1993 calls for \$12 billion for our National Drug Control Strategy. That's \$12 billion -- nearly double the amount spent when my Administration began in 1989. / Our strategy set ambitious goals. We hoped to cut overall drug use by 10 percent. We surpassed that target. / We wanted to slash occasional cocaine use 10 percent. It went down 29. / Adolescent cocaine use -- our goal was a 30 percent decrease. It's down more than 60.

We have begun well. Yet we have only begun.

Look at Bedford Stuyvesant / the suburbs of any city / the broken canyons of L.A. / There you'll see some of the more than 12 million Americans who currently still use drugs -- and the 1.9 million of them who use cocaine. Worse, more than 1.3 million of our kids use drugs. I grieve for these kids -- but grief is not enough. Just as while Federal funding can help -- it alone is not enough. //

That's why our anti-drug campaign includes community action led by effective treatment -- Federal, state, and local -- to reduce drug use in our neighborhoods and schools. / We also need prevention through wide-spread education. We need business / labor / our families and schools to stop the drugs that lead to death and bondage -- drugs that declare open season on the innocent. //

Next comes perhaps the most crucial part of our crusade: Law enforcement. The DEA New York Field Division seized more than \$234 million in criminal assets in FY 1991. You know that a

country that refused to allow totalitarians of the right and left to enslave the world -- will never allow the evil purveyors of drugs to enslave America. //

Let me tell you a secret: Every time law enforcement officials come to the White House, I think of all the hoods I want to help them put in the Big House. / So by January 1, we will have 50 percent more Federal prosecutors than in 1988. We have also reauthorized the 1984 Victims of Crime Act -- and boosted its annual Crime Victims Fund to \$150 million. These dollars did not come from taxpayers but from criminals' fines and penalties. After all, crime shouldn't pay. Criminals should. //

So we have moved to punish career criminals under the Federal Armed Career Criminal Act. No seasoned criminal should walk free because we didn't take the law -- and our law enforcement officers -- seriously. / My Administration has proposed \$15.8 billion for anti-crime policies for FY 1993 -- that's up 59 percent in four years. / Yet progress made is not mission accomplished. Let's back up our law enforcement officials with laws that are fair, fast, and final. /

You know what I'm talking about. Fair: When good cops act in good faith to nail criminals, those criminals shouldn't go free because of some exclusionary rule. / Fast: We need habeas corpus reforms to stop the frivolous appeals choking our courts. / Crime's victims must not suffer twice: Once, when they are victimized by the criminal. Again, when liberal judges allow criminals to escape scot-free through some new loophole in the

law. / We also need laws that are final -- and you know my belief: For anyone who kills a law enforcement officer -- no penalty is too tough. When drug kingpins inflict the ultimate evil on society -- society demands that the ultimate penalty be inflicted on them.

Some say that legalization of drugs is the answer to drugs. I say: We must never wave the white flag of surrender at the white scourge of cocaine. // So today, I ask Congress to pass crime legislation based on three principles. If criminals commit crimes, they will be caught. If caught, they will be tried. And if convicted, they will be punished. /

We need a crime bill which strengthens -- not weakens -- our ability to uphold the laws -- a crime bill like the Crime Control Act of 1992. / So let's pass this bill -- and salute those who risk their lives to save ours. /

Above all, let's remember: To take back our streets, we need to take criminals off the streets and put them behind bars for a long, long time. // In the past four years, over half a billion dollars in drug forfeiture money alone has been used to build prisons. We need more prisons -- in particular, our states need more prisons. Because for some career criminals, the iron bars of prison are the only bar against crime. //

Let me close with words from the heart about where -- and with whom -- I stand. I stand with those who fight criminals. Your work isn't a nine to five job, with martini lunches and friendly chats around the water cooler. It's filled with danger

and fear. It's not knowing whether you'll end your shift going home in a car -- or to the emergency room in an ambulance. //

[[Let me make one thing clear: I also stand against those who use films -- or records, television, and video games -- to glorify killing law enforcement officers. You know what I'm talking about: It's wrong for any company -- even one like Time-Warner -- to issue a record that approves of killing cops.]] ///

Today, I salute the greatest freedom-fighters any nation could have. Heroes who provide freedom from violence. / Freedom from drugs. / Freedom from fear. In that spirit, I am now honored to officially open the New York Field Division Office of the Drug Enforcement Agency. May God bless you -- and the United States of America.

- o [Acknowledgements]. I am here tonight to salute a great leader \ a force for good \ a titan of politics. \\ Mama D'Amato. I think Al's learned a thing or two from Mama. Things like: "getting it done, making waves, taking 'em on."
- o Al's also learned how frustrating it can be to "get it done" in a town where G.O.P. is a four-letter word. But I'll tell you one thing: when Al "takes 'em on" -- they take cover. \\
- o Voters are frustrated -- they're tired of the status quo and they're calling for change. But they also know there's a flip-side to change -- it's called trust: trust to make the right decisions and block the wrong ones. It's not enough to blaze a new trail: you've got to know where it leads.
- o Republican leadership has helped change the world: Today Eastern Europe is free. Imperial Communism is dead and buried. Just last week we put another nail in the coffin of the Cold War. Boris Yeltsin and I announced the most sweeping nuclear arms cuts in history.

- o While the world has become more free, it has also become less certain. The Soviet "Bear" is now a creature of the past, but there are still plenty of wolves out there -- and you know who they are. This is no fantasy of an old Cold Warrior -- these are the realities of the new world, and from where I sit I can survey the horizon.
- o There are real differences here with the opposition, and Al and I will keep taking it to the people: America is safe as long as America is strong. No one knows this better than Al D'Amato. He shared with me a bit of advice his father once gave him: "Tell it like it is, call 'em like you see 'em, don't be afraid to take unpopular stands when you know you're right." In the late summer of '90 the Senator knew he was right. Iraqi troops had rolled into Kuwait, and Al D'Amato told it like he saw it. We knew then -- we know now -- America will not let aggression stand.
- o Some people say, why can't you bring the same kind of purpose and success to the domestic scene as you did in Desert Shield and Desert Storm? Fair question. The answer is: we can and we will. But I need a Congress that supports our domestic offensive.
- o Despite the odds, we've had some successes on Capitol Hill -
- legislation like our Child Care Act -- which said parents

raise kids, not government; the Clean Air Act -- harnessing free market forces for a cleaner environment; the Americans with Disabilities Act -- making room for the disabled in the American mainstream. And when it comes to blocking bad legislation with the veto: it's Bush 30, Congress 0.

- o We're not done -- not by a long shot. And when the Congress hangs left -- George Bush will hang tough. Let me tell you a little story: One night at sea, a captain saw what looked like the lights of an oncoming ship. He had his signalman blink the other ship: "Change your course 10 degrees south." The reply came back: "Change your course 10 degrees north." Well our man didn't like this, and signaled: "I am a captain, change your course south." The reply: "I am a seaman first class, change your course north." Really furious, the captain signaled: "Change your course south -- I'm on a battle ship!" The reply came back: "Change your course north. I'm in a lighthouse."

- o My friends, we are that lighthouse, and here's how we're lighting the way: Health care reform -- because no one should have to go broke to get better. Legal reform: because Americans should spend more time helping each other, and less time suing each other. Free trade: because no one ever beat the competition by hiding behind a trade barrier.

- o Look at education reform: America 2000 is revolutionizing the way we educate our kids. Last week I sent Congress my GI Bill for Children -- a bill to help low and middle income parents choose what schools can best teach their children. Choice can be the fundamental reform that drives all others. And before I'm done: whether it's public, private, or religious -- parents, not government, will choose their children's schools.
- o Our disagreement with the liberal Democrats comes down to this: they believe that people work for the government. We think it's the other way around. The American people know I proposed an amendment to force a balanced budget. They know I fought for it -- and I'll keep on fighting. That's why in the fall they'll be with us: America wants a Balanced Budget Amendment.
- o It's just this simple: Government is too big and spends too much. The American people know that the President should have what 43 governors have to control spending. They know I've called for it, fought for it. That's why in the fall they'll be with us -- America wants the President to have the Line-Item-Veto.
- o Now I know that not everyone will agree with us. Frankly, I'd have to wonder if some people did. Let someone else be

all things to all people. Let someone else court the press and crib their policy from the polls. We are not elected to please -- we are sent here to serve.

- o Not many of you may know this -- but Al was a track star in high school. Faster than a speeding soundbite. Turns out the real reason he was so fast was that he was running from his mother. 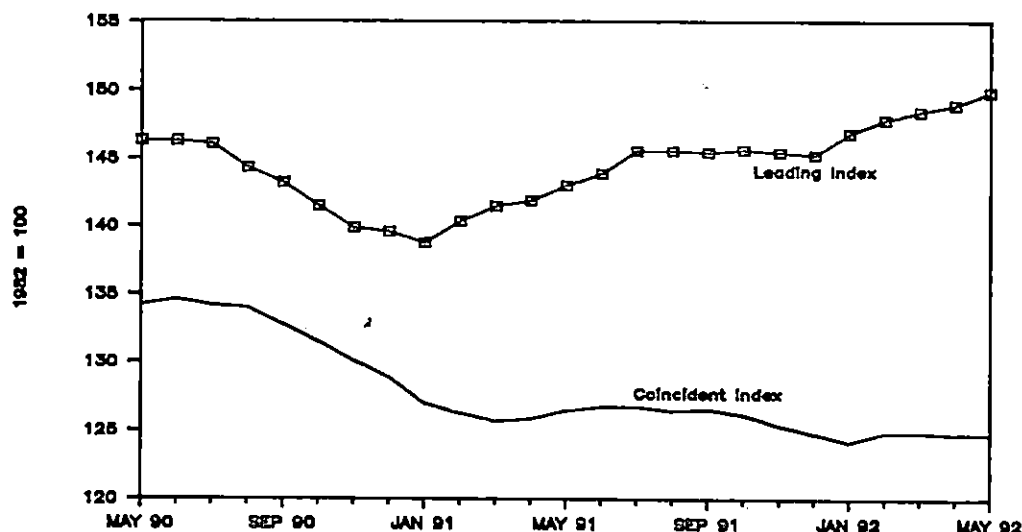
SUBJECT: May Index of Leading Indicators, Commerce
Department Release, Tomorrow Morning, 8:30 a.m.

The index of leading indicators increased 0.6 percent in May, the fifth consecutive monthly increase. The increase matched private analysts' expectations.

Five of the 11 components of the leading index made positive contributions, with an increase in sensitive materials prices making the largest contribution. Six components had negative effects; the largest negative effects resulted from a decline in the real money supply and from declines in three components related to new and unfilled orders.

The index of coincident indicators was unchanged in May, the third consecutive month of little or no change. Industrial production and payroll employment made positive contributions to the index in May, but those increases were offset by a decline in personal income less transfer payments and a negative statistical adjustment.

LARK MCCARTHY: Good morning Dr. Boskin.

MICHAEL BOSKIN (chairman, Presidential Council of Economic Advisors): Good morning.

MCCARTHY: Well, today in the Washington Post Bill Clinton gets some support on the editorial page. The Post is in effect saying that it is nonsense for the President and Ross Perot to suggest that the deficit can be reduced without raising taxes. Is Bill Clinton simply telling the truth and the president is talking nonsense?

BOSKIN: Well, as the Post itself said, and as Clinton has acknowledged he's backed away from even attempting to balance the budget. As the Post editorial said, Governor Clinton's program does little to reduce the deficit. Most of the deficit reduction is already in place. The defense build down that's already been agreed to and other things of that sort. So I think it's quite unfortunate that Governor Clinton has backed away from any--even a goal of balancing the budget.

He's also backed away from his middle class tax relief. Most people thought that was a silly way to try to stimulate the economy back when he proposed it. He also has many other items in his program, about a third of which he seems to have either in common or borrowed from President Bush. A line item veto, permanent R&D tax credit. Some things the Administration's already doing such as administrative savings and medicare, expanded funding for Head Start. So we agree with that sub-part of his program, but basically he's got \$150 billion tax increase to fund \$220 billion of new savings ~~with a bunch of new~~ spending with a bunch of putative savings, which when you look at them kind of evaporate. They're sort of smoke and mirrors. They don't really hold up.

More rapidly it's improving and will continue to improve and will be doing even better if we pass the president's short term program and comprehensive long-term reform and education health care, etcetera, that is much more sensible and much more reasonable, much less intrusive by the government than Governor Clinton's program.

You know, a lot of the things in Governor Clinton program--he's casting it as new. About a third of it, as I said, is borrowed from President Bush or in common with President Bush's proposals. A third of it is sort of warmed over campaign pledges and a third of it is sort of dredging up old ideas from Dukakis and

Carter.

MCCARTHY: Let's talk about the tax idea in particular. Doesn't President Bush have a big credibility problem here, that if he keeps suggesting that no new taxes without even saying, read my lips, people are going to say, how can I believe that. We believed it in '88.

BOSKIN: Well, I think the president's made it clear that the reason he got involved in the budget negotiations in the first place was to control spending. Some achievements were had there but not nearly enough and he's going to focus his attention on getting control of the uncontrolled part of spending--the two-thirds of the budget that never even comes up for annual review, not only by the president, but by Congress itself. He wants to put a cap on the growth of non-Social Security mandatory spending programs at a little bit above inflation and program participation. That plus serious attention to growth promoting policies and getting reasonable economic growth in the economy will bring the budget into balance over four or five years. That's a much more sensible thing to do given the state of the economy and given what's happened in the past than to have a program to raise taxes.

I'll remind you that when Congress started out with a tax increase program and re-distribution program similar to Governor Clinton's earlier this year they wound up going all the way down to people with incomes--to make it permanent they would have had to go all the way down to people with incomes of \$45,000. That's hardly a tax the rich program.

So I think you've got to worry that whatever Governor Clinton may look like, what he's proposing will wind up being a much larger tax increase program applied to a much larger part of the population.

MCCARTHY: All right, let me jump in there, because clearly a lot of Americans are looking for something more. The latest New Yew Times polled this morning saying that 78 percent of Americans disapprove of the way the president is handling the economy. Are we going to see some new proposals from President Bush in the campaign or is he going to stick with what he's already proposed?

BOSKIN: Well, first of all, there will be some new things, but the president has laid out--some things have been passed and many others are very good ideas, would be beneficial to the economy. He's got a sound set of proposals. We're going to do a much better job of explaining why those are a sound set of proposals and getting those out to the American people and drum up support. Some of those have gotten through Congress. Many others have been blocked by the Congress. But I think you'll see not only some additional things but you'll see a much better elaboration of why the president's proposals are the right set of ideas, the right set of proposals to move the economy forward, to raise family incomes, to promote economic growth and expand job creation and b

business expansion.

MCCARTHY: A couple of ideas. One of them obviously is not going to solve the deficit problem but it's seen as sort of a symbolic important gesture. Bill Clinton is talking about cutting 100,000 jobs from the federal government, including cutting the White House staff. That's something President Bush is going to sign onto.

BOSKIN: Well, first of all, while in general I think it's a good idea to reduce government employment, while he does this on the one hand, almost all of his other proposals wind up being much more intrusive with government bureaucracy in private decisions. In health care he's going to set up these boards that are going to ration health care. He's got sort of a modified or warmed over disguised play or pay plan which was such a disaster in Massachusetts. That will wind up meaning that either quality will suffer or people will have to go elsewhere to get their health care, as has happened, for example, in Canada, when the prime minister of Quebec had to come to the United States for a cancer operation because he didn't want to wait around for that health care to be available in Canada.

MCCARTHY: All right. Thank you so much, Dr. Michael Boskin, the chairman of the president's Council of Economic Advisors. The economic debate continues. We appreciate it.

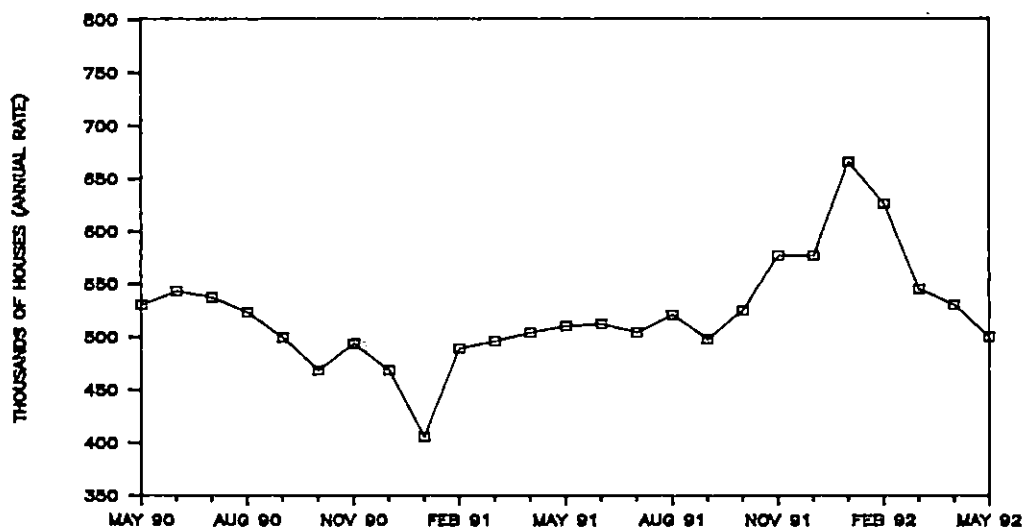

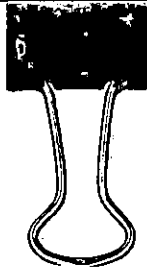
Sales of new single-family houses fell 5.6 percent in May, to 501,000 units at an annual rate, after falling 2.7 percent in April. Private analysts had expected sales to increase 3.8 percent in May.

In May, sales rose in the Northeast and the South, but fell somewhat in the Midwest and dropped a precipitous 34 percent in the West. The average sales price of a new house in May was \$143,200, slightly down from \$143,700 in April.

The graph below shows that sales of new houses have been declining for the last 4 months, after increasing significantly from September 1991 to January 1992. In May, seasonally adjusted sales of new houses were at about the same rate as that of midsummer 1991.

You are required by law to submit to the Congress a bimonthly report on the progress made during the period toward resolving the Cyprus dispute. The attached report covers the period from March through the first fifteen days of May 1992.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

In accordance with Public Law 95-384 (22 U.S.C. 2373(c)), I am submitting to you this bimonthly report on progress toward a negotiated settlement of the Cyprus question. This report covers the last 21 days of March, all of April, and the first 15 days of May, 1992.

In mid-March, U.S. Special Cyprus Coordinator Nelson Ledsky traveled to the Eastern Mediterranean to see if he could clear up what Turkish officials had described as a "misunderstanding" on the part of U.N. negotiators, and thus get the U.N.-sponsored negotiating process restarted. He remained in the area for 10 days, during which time he consulted directly with President Vassiliou of Cyprus and Turkish Cypriot leader Mr. Rauf Denktash, as well as the Prime Ministers of Turkey and Greece. All of his conversation partners signalled their willingness -- indeed, desire -- to see a new round of U.N.-led negotiations begin.

On March 25, on the occasion of Greek National Day, I publicly restated the U.S. commitment to serve as a catalyst for the U.N. Cyprus effort. Two days later, President Vassiliou arrived in New York and met with the U.N. Secretary General. After additional meetings in New York, including consultations with the representatives of the permanent members of the U.N. Security Council, President Vassiliou visited several Greek- and Cypriot-American communities around the United States. I saw him in Washington on March 30 and reassured him of the commitment of the United States Government to do all it could to assist the U.N. to bring the Cyprus negotiations to an early, successful conclusion. On March 31 and April 1, the Cypriot leader had a number of meetings with individual Members of Congress and with congressional groups and committees and made a number of public appearances.

Mr. Denktash arrived in New York on March 30 for separate consultations with the U.N. Secretary General. Ambassador Ledsky also met with Mr. Denktash in New York on April 3.

Also on April 3, the U.N. Secretary General signed a lengthy report to the U.N. Security Council on his good offices mission in Cyprus (a copy attached). The Secretary General reported on the status of the negotiations and included some paragraphs describing the contents of the "set of ideas" on Cyprus as they then stood and on developments relating to the U.N. Force in Cyprus (UNFICYP). In the section on conclusions and recommendations, he decried the lack of progress since the summer of 1991 and asked the U.N. Security Council to actively support another determined effort on Cyprus that he was prepared to undertake, and to work directly with him and his representatives and all concerned to achieve a fair, permanent, and peaceful solution to the problem.

The Security Council responded on April 10 with Security Council Resolution 750 (a copy also attached), which commended the efforts of the Secretary General, reaffirmed the U.N.'s "good office mandate," endorsed the Secretary General's report of April 3, specifically his description of the "set of ideas," and asked the Secretary General to pursue intensive efforts during May and June to complete the "set of ideas" and submit a further report to the Security Council by July 1992. During this period, the Security Council also decided to "remain seized of the Cyprus question on an ongoing and direct basis."

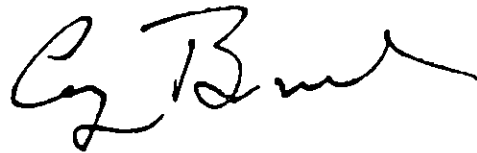
During the 2 weeks that followed April 10, the Greek and Turkish Governments and the leadership of the Turkish Cypriot community in Cyprus accepted the Secretary General's "set of ideas" as the basis for further negotiations. After some internal debate, President Vassiliou sent a letter to the Secretary General outlining general Greek Cypriot agreement as well. On the basis of all these assurances, the U.N. Secretary General wrote to each of the parties again and sent his negotiators back to the area on May 8. Prior to their departure from New York, the U.N. negotiators briefed members of the Security Council on their plans.

In Cyprus, the negotiators met separately with Mr. Denktash and President Vassiliou from May 8 through May 12. The Nicosia meetings were followed by consultations in Ankara and Athens with the Prime Ministers and other officials of the Turkish and Greek Governments. These talks lasted through May 15. The U.N. negotiators briefed ambassadors of the permanent members of the Security Council at meetings hosted by Ambassador Lamb in Nicosia on May 11 and 18.

On the completion of this round of discussions, the negotiators, seemingly satisfied with the results, returned to New York to prepare a report for the Secretary General on the status of the negotiating effort. Based on this report the Secretary General will decide on his next steps.

I remain convinced that the Secretary General's "set of ideas" provide a sound basis for further negotiations and eventual agreement. The United States Government and the U.N. Secretary General have received assurances from all parties that they also accept the "set of ideas" as the basis for further work and that they will make a good faith effort to bring this process to a successful conclusion. I continue to believe that a negotiated solution can be reached.

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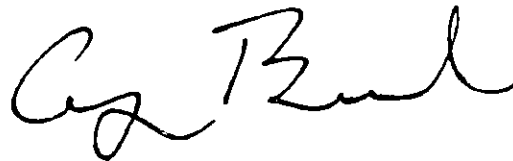

Key Activity, Week of June 22

- o **Rail Strike.** Late Thursday night, the Congress passed legislation ending the rail strike. The vote in the House was 248-140; the vote in the Senate was 87-6. Almost all those voting against the bill were Democrats.

- o **NIH.** On Wednesday, the House voted, 271-156, to sustain your veto of the NIH authorization bill that would have overturned the moratorium on federal funding of research using **fetal tissue** from induced abortions. This was your 30th straight veto without an override.

Unfortunately, the fetal tissue debate may not be over for the year. Representatives Henry Waxman (D-CA), Fred Upton (R-MI), and others have introduced new NIH legislation that would require researchers to resort first to the Administration's fetal tissue bank, but if those supplies prove inadequate, would authorize the use of other sources of fetal tissue. The new legislation would also reduce funding in the overall bill. Committee staff believe there will be action on the new bill this year.

- o **Iraq.** On Tuesday, the House Judiciary Committee held further hearings on whether to request appointment of an independent counsel to investigate Administration actions toward Iraq. Although no significant new evidence arose, the Committee is still expected formally to request an independent counsel soon, perhaps next week.
- o **Retirements.** This week, Energy & Commerce Ranking Republican Norm Lent (R-NY) became the ninth Ranking Member to announce his retirement. The retirement announcement of Robin Tallon (D-SC) brings to at least 75 the number of Members who will not be returning next year.

Expected Key Activity, Week of June 29

- o **GSE/Balanced Budget.** Next week, the Senate will resume consideration of legislation establishing a new oversight office at HUD to regulate the affairs of government-sponsored enterprises (GSE's). After a week of procedural tangles over attempts to amend the GSE bill with Balanced Budget Constitutional Amendment proposals, the Senate has reached an agreement that will allow for some balanced-budget related votes. Intense partisanship in the debate has made passage of -- or even cloture on -- the Amendment itself unlikely. As part of the procedural agreement, the Senate will not take up any Balanced Budget Amendments again this year; but the Senate will vote on your product liability bill on September 8.

On the House side, Budget Committee Chairman Leon Panetta (D-CA) will continue his effort to hammer out a bipartisan proposal for balanced budget enforcement legislation. Little progress is expected.

- o **Freedom Support Act.** Before turning to the GSE bill next week, the Senate will begin debate on your Freedom Support Act, aid to the former Soviet republics. The Senate will return to the aid bill after disposition of the GSE bill, hopefully mid-week, and may be able to complete action on the aid bill prior to adjourning for the July 4 recess.

In the House, committee markups on the Freedom Support Act will proceed next week, but it is still unclear when a bill might reach the floor.

- o **Enterprise Zones and tax provisions.** Next week, the House is expected to take up a Ways & Means Committee bill that includes the Democrats' version of Enterprise Zones legislation. The bill would also extend several expiring tax provisions, provide passive loss relief for the real estate industry, and repeal the luxury tax. While the bill is attractive overall to many Republicans, your senior advisors are expected to recommend veto because the Enterprise Zones provisions are far more limited than the Republican version and because the bill is scored as losing \$7 billion over five years. We remain hopeful of working out a compromise before or during conference.

- o **Higher education.** The conference report on legislation authorizing assistance to low-income students for post-secondary education could reach the House and Senate floors next week. As of late Friday afternoon, key conferees agreed to reopen the bill and appear willing to make changes the Administration has indicated are necessary to make the bill acceptable.
- o **Treasury/Postal Appropriations.** Next week, the House will consider the Treasury/Postal Appropriations bill. The bill includes an amendment by Representative David Skaggs (D-CO) to eliminate funding for the Vice President's Council on Competitiveness, which has prompted a senior advisors veto threat.
- o **Energy and Water Appropriations.** In the wake of House action last week to eliminate funding for the **Superconducting Super Collider (SSC)**, Senate Appropriations Subcommittee Chairman Bennett Johnston (D-LA) has agreed to hold hearings next week on the SSC and to delay markup until late July. We will be using that time to bolster Senate support for the SSC.
- o **Unemployment benefits.** Conference is expected to begin next week on House and Senate bills extending unemployment benefits, both of which carry veto threats. The conference report could be ready for floor action next week.
- o **Calendar.** Both houses will be in session next week. Only the House will be in session the following week, the week of July 6. Both houses will be in recess during the week of July 13 for the Democratic Convention, but then plan to be in session for most of the four weeks between conventions.

Other Significant Congressional Activity

Week of June 22

- o **Foreign Operations.** On Thursday, the House passed the Foreign Operations appropriations bill, 297-124. The bill includes \$1.2 billion in cuts below the Administration's foreign aid request, objectionable abortion-related language, and a 10% cut in funding for international financial institutions. We are hopeful that objectionable provisions can be modified in conference.
- o **Military Construction.** On Tuesday, the House passed the Military Construction appropriations bill, 390-33. The bill includes a Dorgan (D-ND) amendment implementing a one percent across-the-board cut in funding.
- o **Legislative Appropriations.** After a partisan debate in which Republicans objected strenuously to being precluded from offering amendments, the House passed the Legislative Appropriations bill, 279-143.
- o **Pornography.** By a 7-6 vote, the Senate Judiciary Committee favorably reported the Pornography Victims Compensation Act, which would allow a victim of a sex offense to file a civil suit against producers and distributors of any obscene material that encouraged the sex offense.

Week of June 29

- o **Price-fixing.** The conference report has been filed and floor action is possible next week on a bill that would make it easier for retailers to bring price-fixing claims against manufacturers. Attorney General Barr has conveyed a senior advisors veto threat.
- o **Abortion.** Anticipating a Supreme Court decision on Monday that could limit or overturn Roe v. Wade, the House Judiciary and Senate Labor Committees are preparing to take action next week on the Freedom of Choice Act.

- o **START.** The Senate Foreign Relations Committee will conclude hearings on the START Treaty next week and has tentatively scheduled a markup for the end of the week.
- o **China MFN.** This week, the Ways & Means Committee reported, without recommendation, a Solomon (R-NY) resolution that would revoke China's Most Favored Nation treatment. Next week, the Ways & Means Trade Subcommittee will hold hearings on and mark up a Pease (D-NJ)/Pelosi (D-CA) bill that would revoke MFN treatment for goods from Chinese state-owned enterprises if a variety of conditions are not met. Both the resolution and the bill are expected to reach the House floor by early August.
- o **Trade.** During the week of July 6, the House is expected to pass Ways & Means Chairman Rostenkowski's trade bill. Although improved during markup, the bill contains many objectionable provisions, including a renewal of the expired Super 301 statute.

Separately, the Ways & Means Committee this week favorably reported a bill that would change the tariff classification and raise the duty on Japanese minivans by up to \$4,000.

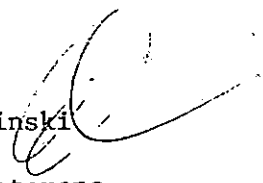

The Persian Gulf War created some 216,000 new veterans: National Guard members and Reservists who previously were ineligible for most veterans' benefits.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has already provided medical care to more than 60,000 of these men and women, who have made some 178,000 outpatient visits to VA clinics.

Vet Centers throughout the country have so far provided counseling and assistance to 23,000 Desert Storm veterans.

These veterans are eligible for and many are already receiving a variety of non-medical VA benefits also, including:

- Education and training through the Montgomery GI Bill
- VA-guaranteed home loans
- Disability compensation and need-based pensions
- Special life insurance programs
- Vocational rehabilitation

We are working closely with the Defense Department on a roster of troops and their locations during the war, to help assess the health effects of environmental conditions in the war zone. We also are pursuing legislation to permit free medical exams so we can create a registry of Persian Gulf veterans, similar to those we have on Agent Orange and radiation. Once authorized to do so, we are prepared to publicize the effort to bring as many Desert Storm veterans as possible in for these special exams.

Complete information and assistance in filing claims is available at 171 VA medical centers and 58 regional offices throughout the country. Toll-free telephone service is available everywhere.

SUBJECT: Machine Tool Agreements

On June 30, we will sign agreements with Japan and Taiwan to extend but phase-out voluntary restraint arrangements (VRAs) on machine tool exports to the United States. The agreement with Japan was concluded in May, but it was not until last week that we concluded negotiations with Taiwan. ||

The old machine tool VRAs expired December 31 last year. In your December 27, 1991 decision regarding a revitalization program for the domestic machine tool industry, you directed USTR to seek extension of the VRAs for two years but with quotas progressively removed over the period.

The new agreements will permit U.S. companies to complete the necessary programs for improving competitiveness, thereby advancing U.S. security interests. The quotas will grow over the two-year period, allowing for a gradual transition to market-determined competition. As you directed, the new agreements will terminate on December 31, 1993.

There has been a great deal of Congressional interest in these negotiations, especially from the Connecticut, Wisconsin, and New York delegations, as well as from Chairman Rostenkowski. We have informed the most interested Members and Senators of the successful conclusion of the machine tool agreements.

I have attached a press release put out last week by the Association For Manufacturing Technology.

After several months of negotiations, representatives from the U.S. and Taiwanese governments have come to an agreement on the machine tool Voluntary Restraint Arrangements (VRAs) which the Bush Administration agreed to extend in December of last year.

The VRAs limit sales of Japanese and Taiwanese equipment to the United States. The original five year agreements with Japan and Taiwan took effect in 1987, and were scheduled to expire at the end of last year. Japanese and U.S. negotiators reached a new agreement on Japan's exports in April of this year, but negotiations with the Taiwanese were stalled while technical changes were worked out.

The new two-year extension will allow machining center, NC lathe and NC milling machine imports from Taiwan to increase over their 1987-91 VRA levels by 29 units in 1992 and by 281 units in 1993.

"We applaud President Bush for his leadership in renewing the VRAs, thus protecting U.S. national security and sustaining the economic health of our industrial base," said Albert W. Moore, president of AMT - The Association For Manufacturing Technology. "We're very pleased that the negotiators from the U.S. and Taiwan have finalized these arrangements. This will allow additional 'breathing space' for our industry and its workers."

In addition to providing "breathing space" for U.S. machine tool builders, the VRAs have allowed substantial capital investments and research and development spending within the industry. This resulted in the introduction of new products and technologies.

Since the original VRAs took effect in 1987, U.S. machine tool exports have risen from \$600 million in 1986 to \$1.1 billion in 1990 and 1991. One AMT survey of U.S.-based, VRA-affected companies showed that annual investment grew by 78% over the period that the VRAs were in effect. From 1987 until 1989, the U.S. machine tool industry averaged productivity gains of 11.3% per year — among the highest productivity growth of any industrial sector. R&D/engineering spending also increased 23% during the three year period of 1987 to 1990. The industry accomplished all of this without increasing prices beyond the rate of inflation.

The extension of the machine tool VRAs was strongly supported by over 196 members of Congress. The congressional campaign for extension was led by Senators Alfonse D. Amato (R-NY) and Bob Kasten (R-WI), and Congresswomen Nancy Johnson (R-CT), Barbara Kennelly (D-CT) and House Ways & Means Committee Chairman, Dan Rostenkowski (D-IL). Congressional delegations from Connecticut, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, and Wisconsin wrote the President in support, as did the Northeast/Midwest congressional coalition.

Mr. Moore also singled out for special recognition for vigorous support for the VRA extension Senators John Glenn (D-OH), Charles Grassley (R-IA), Donald Riegle (D-MI), John Danforth (R-MO), Alan Dixon (D-IL), Jesse Helms (R-NC), James Jeffords (R-VT), and Jay Rockefeller (D-WV); Congressmen Les Aspin (D-WI), Helen Bentley (R-MD), William Broomfield (R-MI), Rod Chandler (R-WA), John Dingell (D-MI), Duncan Hunter (R-CA), Henry Hyde (R-IL), Marcy Kaptur (D-OH), Joe Moakley (D-MA), John Murtha (D-PA), Marty Russo (D-IL), Dick Schulze (R-PA), Guy Vander Jagt (R-MI); Governors Tommy Thompson (R-WI), George Voinovich (R-OH), and Secretary of State George Ryan (R-IL).

MEMORANDUM TO THE PRESIDENT

CONNECTICUT

Between June 5 and June 8, 1992, portions of Connecticut received unusually heavy amounts of rainfall, causing localized flooding in areas from Long Island Sound to the Connecticut/Massachusetts border. Hartford, Litchfield, Middlesex, and New Haven Counties were hardest hit by the storms.

Teams of FEMA, State, and local officials conducted Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) in the four counties on June 7-11, 1992. Governor Weicker requested a major disaster declaration on June 12, 1992, to provide a full range of assistance in the above mentioned counties. Subsequent to the Governor's request, State officials requested that the PDA be continued because additional damage was reported after June 11. The PDA was completed on June 16.

INDIVIDUAL ASSISTANCE

One death and one injury was reported as a result of the storms. The American Red Cross (ARC) opened two shelters, housing a total of 57 people. Some community-run shelters were also opened.

The PDA teams identified 10 homes with major damage and 192 with minor damage. Additionally, 400 families were affected by minimal damage to their residences or loss of personal property.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

The majority of the damage to public facilities is to streets, roads, and bridges. Three communities had some damage to water or sewer systems. Athletic fields, parks, and golf courses were observed with silt settlement, washouts, and scouring.

DISCUSSION

The Governor's request meets all requirements of the law. The State commitment is adequate.

Most families are back in their homes and have returned to their normal routines. The maximum requirement for Temporary Housing assistance is estimated at 112 families for a total program cost of \$78,400.

The most substantial losses were sustained by occupants of two mobile home parks because residents stored personal property under

the trailers or in storage sheds adjacent to the trailers. Approximately 80 applicants might qualify for a grant under the Individual and Family Grant (IFG) program, for a total program cost of \$160,000. The Federal share would be \$120,000.

Approximately 100 people had their employment temporarily suspended due to the disaster, of which half may qualify under the State's regular unemployment insurance program. Therefore, 50 people might need Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA) under the Stafford Act for a total program cost of \$100,000.

Estimates prepared by the Small Business Administration (SBA) for the disaster loan program are 210 home/personal property loans totalling \$2,520,000 and 52 business loans for \$1,560,000. The SBA disaster loan program may be implemented without a Presidential declaration, if SBA damage criteria are met.

Damage to public facilities was observed in 16 communities and four (4) counties. Potentially eligible damage under the Public Assistance program is estimated at \$1,199,936. Based on a 75/25 percent cost share, the Federal portion would be \$899,952.

Public Assistance damage on a State-wide basis equates to \$.37 per capita. Damage was scattered and has not significantly interrupted traffic in any community. There are no known threats to health and

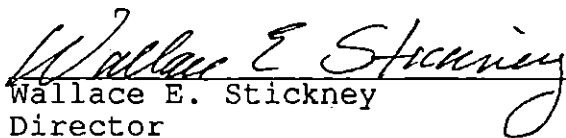
safety. Individual Assistance projections are based on a "worst-case" scenario, and it is doubtful that the estimates would be reached in the event of a declaration. While flood insurance coverage is minimal, 10 percent, it will offset some of the losses. ARC has already assisted many families and will continue to assist those families with unmet needs. As stated, most families have already resumed their normal activities.

CONCLUSIONS

- The situation is not of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the State of Connecticut and its affected local governments, and supplemental Federal assistance is not necessary.
- The situation does not warrant a major disaster declaration.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Governor's request be denied.

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And to calm fears that women would become impregnated and undergo abortions to help friends or relatives, it would forbid women from knowing or designating the recipient of the tissue. Ironically, the veto will allow those few groups continuing fetal tissue research with private money to remain free of these legal constraints. But whatever the laws, there is not likely to be a shortage of tissue. One-and-a-half million American women undergo abortions yearly, a figure that has remained constant for more than a decade. Even if the Supreme Court overturns *Roe v. Wade* and some states outlaw abortion, and even if fetal transplants are wildly successful for every conceivable application, there is not likely to be any shortage of tissue. The problem is a shortage of federal money to carry out needed research.

Fetal tissue appears to be uniquely suited for a range of therapies. Animal studies have shown that often a host will not reject transplanted fetal tissue as readily as adult tissue. And transplanted fetal tissue can often grow better than adult tissue, replacing metabolites and parts of organs destroyed by disease or injury. Fetal transplants in animals have shown at least some success in treating models of spinal cord injury, Alzheimer's disease, blindness, and hearing loss, to name just a few conditions. And in highly limited human studies researchers have tried using fetal tissue to treat at least twenty conditions ranging from diabetes and Parkinson's disease to leukemia, schizophrenia, and several inherited metabolic disorders. But all this remains nothing more than promise until researchers can carry out the needed experiments to learn whether and under what conditions the transplants actually do alleviate human disease and injury. Many scientists believe that the best tissue for transplant ultimately will come not from fetuses but from genetically engineered adult tissue. Unfortunately, the only way to learn how to undertake the genetic engineering is to perform the experiments with fetal tissue.

Those championing the ban emphasize that it prohibits only federal support. Privately financed efforts can continue. But in the reality of American medical research today, experiments opposed by the federal government essentially cease. Not only does the government pay for most research, almost all hospitals and laboratories receive federal money. Thus the ban creates, as one medical school dean told me, "not just a chilling effect, but a hard freeze." Dozens of institutions planning to undertake fetal transplant research abandoned their plans when the ban took effect even if private money was available. "You look at all your millions of dollars of grants for other projects," said the same dean, who did not want to be identified, "and you ask yourself, is it worth the risk? They could yank anything or everything."

As part of its effort to prevent Congress from lifting the ban, the administration proposed setting up a bank of fetal tissue from ectopic pregnancies and miscarriages and financing it at the startlingly high level of \$20 million. Almost every scientist familiar with fetal tissue research quickly spurned the idea. Such tissue

would often be unsterile, genetically defective, or both. There was one critical advocate, however. Dr. Bernadine Healy, head of the National Institutes of Health, declared in a letter circulated in Congress that she believed the president should veto the bill. Of the tissue bank, Healy wrote, "I can state unequivocally as a physician and scientist that this approach is feasible and should be given a chance to prove its efficacy."

Though Bush's veto is likely to prevail, the vote will be close. The Senate passed the measure 85-12, more than enough to fend off the veto. At this writing, House staff members believe that they are nine or ten votes short of the necessary two-thirds. When lobbyists visited Republican Senator Alan Simpson, who voted to lift the ban, he quoted President Bush as saying, "Who are the sons of bitches who backed me in the corner on this one?" Simpson told me he had not talked to the president—that he was only imagining what Bush might say. Whatever Bush said, this can't be a sweet victory for the White House.

Ed Rollins had his reasons. Two years before he joined Ross Perot, the boys at the Bush White House tarred him as a pariah. His sin: as boss of the Republican campaign for House seats in 1990, he advised candidates to distance themselves from President Bush's unpopular tax hike. After the election, Rollins was fired. The Rollins-Bush rift continued to widen as he criticized Bush in TV appearances. Still, in March, GOP Governor Pete Wilson of California suggested Rollins to oversee the Bush campaign this fall in California, Rollins's home state. Robert Teeter, Bush's campaign manager, instantly nixed that idea. Only weeks before, Teeter recalled, Rollins had raised the taboo issue of scandals involving Bush's sons. Even the hiring of Rollins's wife, Sherrie, as White House liaison to interest groups didn't make Rollins any more palatable. When William Kristol, Vice President Dan Quayle's chief of staff, invited Rollins to lunch at the White House mess in May, it raised eyebrows. Several aides later told Kristol he'd committed an act of daring.

Rollins is the exception that proves the rule. And the rule is it's dangerous for anyone in Washington, Republican or Democrat, to side with Perot, which is why so few have. Most of the Beltway crowd isn't like
