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JAPAN'S PRIME MINISTER TO RELAY
ECONOMIC STIMULUS PLAN TO BUSH

TOKYO -- Responding to pressure from the Bush Administration for measures to help lift the world economy out of the doldrums, Prime Minister Miyazawa is heading for Washington and the Munich economic summit armed with a pump-priming plan that is long on promises and short on specifics.

Miyazawa will tell President Bush this week that Japan expects to implement a major stimulus package to boost its flagging economy, and he will repeat that message next week to the leaders attending the summit in Munich, according to Japanese officials.

Miyazawa is planning to say that "the government will do whatever is necessary to maintain the steam of growth," said Masamichi Hanabusa, the Foreign Ministry spokesman, noting that the official government projection calls for 3.5% growth in the fiscal year ending in March 1993. Virtually all analysts believe that without additional government spending on the order of \$50 billion, growth will fall well short of the target, perhaps 2% or less.

In an indication of Bush's interest, officials said Monday that the President telephoned Miyazawa to express his approval of a stimulus proposal announced over the weekend by leaders of the ruling Liberal Democratic Party. The proposal, which includes public works, business tax breaks and loans to small businesses, did not carry a precise price tag, but Yoshiro Mori, chairman of the party's policy committee, said at a news conference that he hoped the government will eventually approve \$48 billion to \$56 billion worth of measures. ADMINISTRATION OPPOSES CHINA TRADE CURBS

The Bush Administration Monday opposed a bill attaching conditions to renewal of China's favorable trade status with the U.S., calling it bad policy and unworkable.

Legislation introduced in the House would partially revoke China's MFN trade status if it does not meet conditions relating to human rights, nuclear transfers, arms sales to Syria and Iran and unfair trade practices. The bill targets only goods produced, marketed or otherwise exported by Chinese state-owned enterprises, rather than all Chinese exports to the U.S.

But Arnold Kanter, undersecretary of state for political affairs, told a House hearing that even this revised version of previously proposed legislation would damage U.S. interests. "Conditioning MFN to the achievement of our foreign policy objectives is simply bad trade policy and strikes at the core of our commitment to free and open trade," he told the House Ways and Means trade subcommittee.

Kanter said the Administration wanted unconditional renewal of MFN to foster normal commercial relations that exposed the Chinese people to American ideas and influence. "The Administration firmly believes that economic reform and liberalization in China creates additional pressure for political reform," he said. He said that placing conditions on MFN would aid opponents of reform and would be seen by Chinese people and leaders as a symbol of hostility toward China. (William Scally, Reuter)

ABORTION DECISION CONFUSES
POLITICAL SCENE

The Supreme Court's ambiguous abortion ruling on Monday threatens to muddle American politics in an already tumultuous election year, disappointing those on both sides of the debate who had expected the decision to crystallize the issue and dominate the presidential campaign.

Many Republicans contend that the decision will energize abortion opponents who will tip the balance for the GOP, confident that Bush would appoint the next justice needed to ensure an anti-abortion majority on the court.

But Bush could lose crucial support if the court ruling alienates GOP women, young voters and political moderates within the party. In one signal that the Bush Administration fears some political fallout, the President made no public appearance or comment after the ruling.

Political analysts of both parties speculated that the GOP might try to avoid a direct debate over whether abortion should be legal, instead concentrating on states' rights issues and narrower legal questions like parental notification.

Abortion rights supporters vowed to hold Bush responsible for any retreat from a constitutional right to abortion. "There is no question that George Bush and Ronald Reagan before him stacked the court to kill a woman's fundamental right to abortion," said Eleanor Smeal, president of the Fund for a Feminist Majority. "We're going to work 24 hours a day to remind voters that Bush is directly responsible for taking away their rights."

ISSUE PASSES TO POLITICIANS

The Supreme Court ruling in the Pennsylvania abortion case spared President Bush the political consequences that a decision overturning Roe v. Wade would have triggered, but abortion-rights advocates vowed Monday to put the issue on the President's desk before the November election.

Bush reacted cautiously Monday, issuing a written statement in which he said he was "pleased" that the court had upheld "most of Pennsylvania's reasonable restrictions on abortion." The statement came after a rush of phone calls and debate back and forth among White House and campaign officials over how much the President should say and whether he should say it for the cameras.

Bush found himself under attack from all sides Monday. "Politically, the loser is George Bush because he's going to be hit from the right and hit from the majority of people who don't agree (with him) on this issue," said Rep. Schumer.

Gary Bauer said the decision tells abortion opponents "it really hasn't mattered that much to have Republican presidents appointing Supreme Court justices. If that's the case, then this flirtation with Ross Perot could grow.... Why not go with Perot out of anger over other issues?"

The first Democratic moves to pressure Bush will come this week, when House and Senate committees are expected to approve the Freedom of Choice Act. Floor action could come next month in the House, while timing of Senate action is not clear.

DECISION CALLED POLITICALLY IDEAL
FOR PRESIDENT

The Supreme Court's decision to uphold a restrictive state abortion law does not appear to give either side a new advantage in the bitter dispute, political analysts said Monday.

Strategists in both camps said they do not believe the ruling will spark a major new political turning point in the abortion fight, as some had predicted, since it does not overturn Roe v. Wade.

"Politically, I don't think President Bush could have hoped for anything better," said Joseph Trippi, a Democratic campaign consultant. "He can look the pro-life movement in the eye and say I did my best. On the other hand he avoids the firestorm that would have occurred if one of his appointees had been responsible for overturning Roe v. Wade."

That view was echoed by others, including James Bopp Jr. of the National Right to Life organization, who condemned the court for barring states from flatly banning abortions but who praised Bush for doing "everything he could do."

"He should not be blamed," Bopp said. "I think he did the best that he could in picking the best justices. You cannot pick justices who will guarantee that they will vote the way you like on every issue."

Torie Clarke sought to play down the significance of the ruling to the presidential election. "Most people vote on several issues, not just abortion," she said.

RULING EASES BUSH'S PERIL FOR NOW
BUT LEAVES HIM WITH A PROBLEM

From the standpoint of President Bush's re-election strategy, Monday's Supreme Court ruling on abortion took the edge off a recurring Republican nightmare. But if his opponents are right about the potency of the abortion issue, it will continue to haunt him.

The Supreme Court came down in the middle Monday, which pleased neither side yet reflected the public mood, top Republican strategists said.

"The Court really found a central ground where most Americans are," said Linda DiVall. "I think it removes from the pro-choice community the fear factor that they were relying on to motivate people for this election."

Harrison Hickman, a Democratic polltaker for NARAL, said of Bush, "He doesn't have to face headlines tomorrow saying 'Roe v. Wade Overturned.'" Still, Hickman and others argued that the Court ruling was one more step down an inexorable road, noting that the Republicans still face a platform fight on the issue, as well as a coming confrontation over the Freedom of Choice Act.

"In the long term, I don't think he did dodge a bullet," said Rep. Schroeder.

GENERAL JOHN R. GALVIN, USA

General John R. Galvin is the Supreme Allied Commander, Europe (SACEUR) and the Commander-in-Chief, United States European Command (CINCEUR). As SACEUR, he is charged with contributing to the deterrence of all forms of aggression in the area of Allied Command Europe (ACE) and taking all measures necessary to preserve or restore the security of that area. As CINCEUR, he commands all United States forces in European Command, which includes the area of ACE and extends into most of Africa and parts of the Middle East.

Born 13 May 1929 in Wakefield, Massachusetts, General Galvin enlisted in the 182nd Infantry Regiment, Massachusetts Army National Guard in 1948. In 1950 he received a National Guard appointment to the United States Military Academy, from which he was graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree and commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry in 1954. He holds a Master of Arts in English from Columbia University and did additional graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania. In 1971, he was a fellow at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy. His military education includes completion of the Infantry Officer Basic Course, the Armor Officer Advanced Course, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and the Army War College.

General Galvin has held a wide variety of command and staff positions during two previous periods of European service. In 1973 he began seven years' continuous service in Europe as the Deputy Secretary of the Joint Staff, Headquarters, U.S. European Command. He then moved to Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe in Belgium where he served as a Military Assistant to the Supreme Allied Commander, Europe. Upon completion of that assignment, he returned to Germany to command the Division Support Command of the 3rd Infantry Division. In 1977 he became the Chief of Staff of that Division. His final appointment during that tour was as Assistant Division Commander of the 8th Infantry Division from 1978 to 1980.

In his second period of European service, General Galvin commanded the VII (U.S.) Corps in Germany from 1983 to 1985. He assumed his present appointment as SACEUR on 26 June 1987.

General Galvin has also had broad experience outside Europe. In the 1950s he served in infantry units in Puerto Rico and as a Ranger instructor in Columbia. He later served two tours in Vietnam with the 1st Cavalry Division, including command of the 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry. His last command prior to assuming his current appointment was as Commander-in-Chief, U.S. Southern Command in Panama.

Although 18 of his past 21 years of service have been spent abroad, General Galvin has also served in the United States as an Instructor and Assistant Professor of English at the United States Military Academy; in the Pentagon as Military Assistant and Aide to the Secretary of the Army; as Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff for Training of the Army's Training and Doctrine Command at Fort Monroe, Virginia; and as Commanding General, 24th Infantry Division at Fort Stewart, Georgia.

General Galvin's published works include: The Minute Men, a study of the first battle of the American revolution; Air Assault; an analysis of the development of air mobility in twentieth century warfare; and Three Men of Boston, a study of the political events that led up to the American revolution.

He is married to the former Virginia Lee Brennan. They have four daughters Mary Jo (Mrs. Richard Schrade), Beth, Kathleen, and Erin.

At the end of June, General Galvin will retire from the Army, completing 44 years of military service. Upon retirement, he will become the John M. Olin Distinguished Professor of National Security Studies at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

I. PURPOSE

To establish a constructive working relationship with York, PA Mayor Bill Althaus (R), the new President of the U.S. Conference of Mayors (USCM).

II. BACKGROUND

You invited Mayor Althaus to meet with you at the White House after the conclusion of the U.S. Conference of Mayors annual meeting in Houston.

Mayor Althaus assumed the presidency of the USCM last Wednesday, June 24th, at the closing session of its annual meeting. He succeeds Boston Mayor Raymond Flynn.

Bill Althaus is the Republican mayor of York, Pennsylvania (population: 42,192). He has held office since January of 1982. During his tenure, Althaus has instituted an aggressive economic development plan which includes, among other things, the successful use of an enterprise zone. He also has participated in night walks through York's drug-infested neighborhoods in an effort to reclaim them from the gangs. This type of "hands-on" involvement in the community has helped bring about a 75 percent decrease in city drug sales and use.

During the U.S. Conference of Mayors annual meeting, Mayor Althaus was supportive of the Administration. At both his opening and closing press conferences, he announced your invitation for an Oval Office meeting. When Althaus was

asked what he was going to discuss with you during the meeting, he replied that he would present the USCM's positions to you in a constructive manner to open a dialogue. He said that while he was disappointed that you could not attend the annual meeting, he understood the time consuming demands of your job and noted that Mayor Flynn's hostility toward you had only exacerbated the division between the White House and the USCM. Althaus also blamed the Congress for not passing your urban initiatives; credited you with creating unlimited possibilities for the nation in a post-cold war era; and declared that he was strongly supporting the Bush-Quayle ticket.

Althaus was a leader of a group of Republicans and Democrats in the resolutions committee who defeated a resolution in opposition to a balanced budget amendment. The vote was 20-16 with 12 Republicans and 8 Democrats in the majority.

Althaus has not always been supportive of the Bush Administration. As late as this January, during USCM's winter meeting here in Washington, he told the press that the Bush Administration and Congress had not done enough for America's cities. However, it should be noted that some of that criticism could be attributed to his need to fulfill his "obligations" to those liberal members who dominate the USCM, in order to assure his ascendancy to the presidency of the Conference. In fact, it should be noted that Mayor Althaus did not participate in the recent USCM sponsored "Save Our Cities" march here in Washington.

Mayor Althaus met with Sam Skinner, Bobbie Kilberg and Jim Snyder a month ago, stressing his desire to work closely with the White House and strongly objecting to Mayor Flynn's activities over the past year.

After this Oval Office meeting, Mayor Althaus is scheduled to testify before the Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control on how enterprise zones can help counteract drug abuse. Secretary Kemp is testifying before Mayor Althaus.

I. SUMMARY

Attached for your consideration and review are draft Q&A's for use at the conclusion of your address tomorrow to the 1992 U.S. Agricultural Communicators Congress (ACC).

II. DISCUSSION

At 1:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 30, 1992, you are scheduled to address the 1992 U.S. Agricultural Communicators Congress at USDA's Jefferson Auditorium.

Following your address, you are scheduled to engage in a brief Q&A session with journalists from the audience.

Please note: These are anticipated questions.

1) Q: Agriculture struggled throughout the recession in the mid-1980s, farm subsidies have been cut in the last two farm bills, USDA is sending out thousands of foreclosure notices and the number of people on farms has dwindled to less than 2 percent of the U.S. population. So why should farmers vote for you?

- o Farmers have bounced back from the recession; emerged stronger generally.
- o Agriculture, above all, understands we've got to cut the \$400 billion deficit.
- o They suffer among the worst from sky-high interest rates; retards purchase of equipment.
- o There will not be additional money for ag support programs in these tight budget times.
- o My policies are designed to provide an independent and prosperous economic future for farmers while protecting the safety net.
- o Based on: Expanding markets in trade and industrial uses of ag products (ethanol), making concerted efforts to open foreign markets and seek a reduction in unfair foreign subsidized competition and getting government out of the farmer's way.
- o We pushed a more market-oriented, flexible farm package.
- o It means free to plant what the free-market seeks, not what government dictates.
- o My program is aimed at building prosperous economic future: more trade, increased jobs.

2) Q: Farmers and ranchers are getting creamed by escalating health insurance premiums. Yet Washington seems not to care.

- o I care. I sent my health benefits package to Congress. There's been no action.
- o It's especially important to self-employed people in agriculture.
- o My health benefits package extends the current 25 percent deductibility on health insurance premiums to 100 percent of the premium costs by 1996.
- o Tremendous benefit to farmers, ranchers and others who are self-employed.

3) Q: The GATT talks have been dragging on for nearly six years. What was announced as a lion has -- so far -- been a mouse. And a lot of farmers think you or your negotiators will sell agriculture down the river, just to get an agreement. How do you respond to that?

- o I'm going to fight -- have been fighting -- to open the doors where they are locked.
- o Agriculture exports are vital -- 25 percent of what we sell is sold abroad.

- o But I'm not going to sign an agreement that is going to undermine our farmers' ability to compete.
- o Economic summit...Munich update?

4) Q: Continuing on the same topic of trade, the North America Free Trade Agreement is being negotiated now. But farmers in southern states -- a base of GOP support in recent elections -- are skeptical. Fruit and vegetable growers especially. They say they'll be hard-hit by cheap imports from Mexico. What about that?

- o Some people doubted the U.S. Canada Free Trade Agreement, too, but exports agriculture have increased more than one-third or over \$1 billion in just 3 years.
- o Yes, there are some concerns. We'd have long-term phase in periods for sensitive crops and import safeguards should the unforeseen happen.
- o The point is: overall, we need to expand trade with other nations -- on an equal footing.
- o And Mexico is a market of more than 90 million consumers. It's already our third largest trading partner in agriculture. But we can do more.

5) Q: Critics say agriculture is draining thousands of acres of wetlands, and yet you've proclaimed that there be "no net loss" of wetlands. How do you explain that?

- o There is no incompatibility with my pledge to have "no net loss" of wetlands and a prosperous farm economy. We can protect the important wetlands of the nation and still have a balanced, sensible approach to that protection that takes property rights into account.
- o I think farmers are America's first environmentalists. They do not want to damage their property, or apply excessive chemicals. It's not in their interest to do so. But they need tools and information to avoid those mistakes.
- o We have a strong wetlands program in agriculture. Swampbuster, for example.
- o And I just announced in California last month the implementation of the Wetlands Reserve Program. If funded by Congress it will restore 1 million acres of wetlands by 1995, without imposing a burden on farmers.
- o But here's where I draw the line: Wetlands should be wet. A farmer's property rights must not be abridged. And if farmers can plant crops on their land without draining more wetlands, they ought to be able to do so.
- o Incidentally, I saw last week that Congress is attempting to cut off funding for two important programs that help farmers help the environment: WRP (Wetlands Reserve Program) and CRP (Conservation Reserve Program). We asked for those programs because we would rather help farmers be good environmentalist than dictate from Washington how they should farm. Congress is wrong on this one.

6) Q: Are you going to extend more credit to the Russians?

- o Russia and the other republics of the former Soviet Union are among American farmers most important customers for grains.
- o We have extended \$4.85 (nearly \$5) billion in credit guarantees since Jan '91 to keep the exports flowing.
- o The Russians are repaying their loans in full on time.
- o I want our farmers to remain the most reliable supplier of ag products for this huge Russian market. I will be seeking every opportunity to accomplish that.

7) Q: What are you going to do about the oilseeds case against the EC?

- o GATT panels have twice said that the EC oilseeds policy is unfair to our farmers and that the EC should change its policy accordingly.
- o The EC has proposed to give us compensation under GATT procedures. We are examining this. Meanwhile, we have a retaliation list out for public comment right now. If there is no adequate response from the EC, we will be forced to retaliate until such time as they resolve the situation.

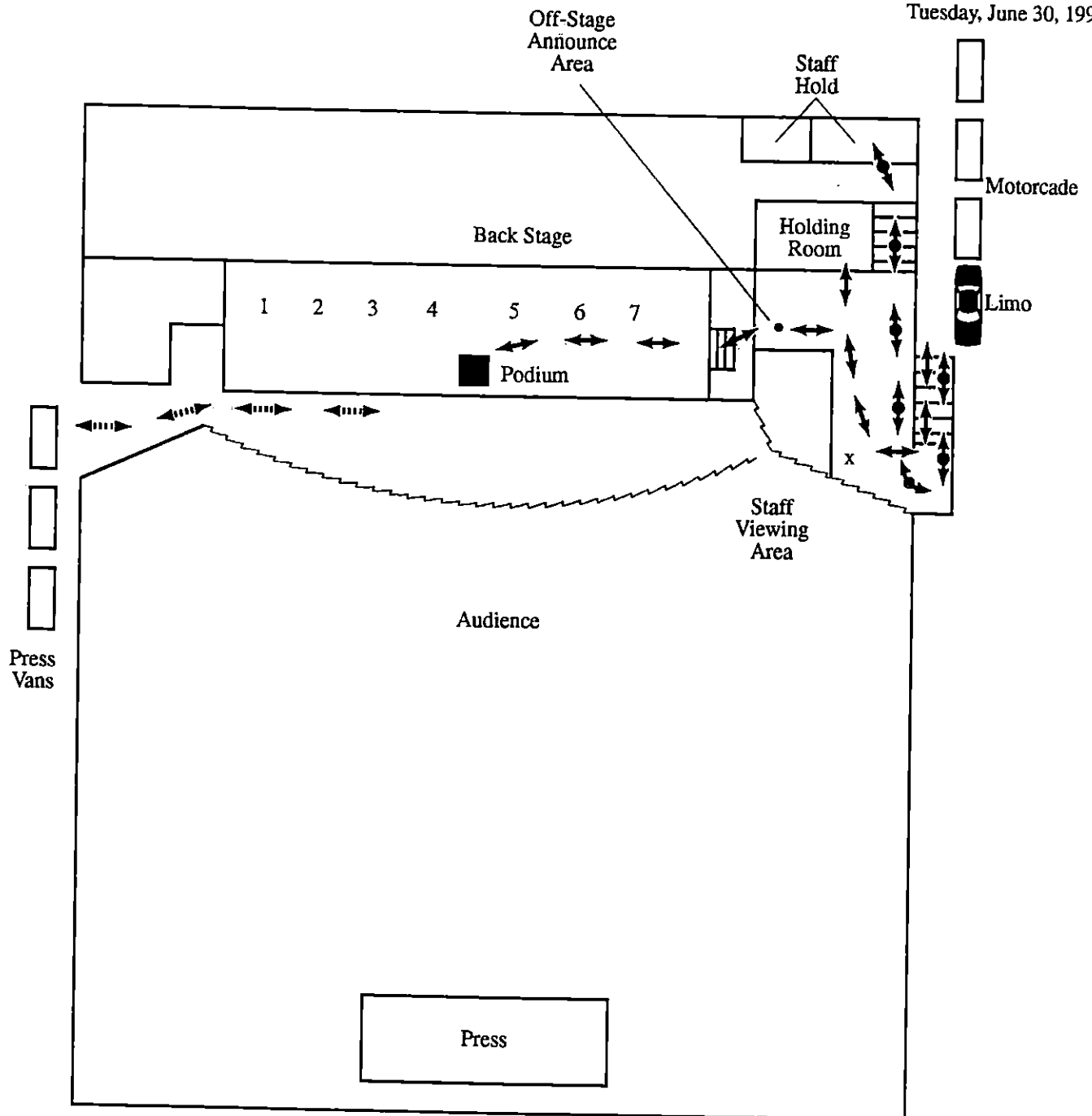

I. PURPOSE

For Ambassador Malcolm Toon to brief you on his meetings last week in Moscow concerning the POW-MIA issue.

II. BACKGROUND

Ambassador Malcolm Toon has requested a brief meeting with you to report on his discussions in Moscow last week on the POW/MIA issue. Toon believes, and told the press on Friday, that Yeltsin probably misspoke when he asserted there might be American POW/MIAs from Vietnam alive in Russia today. Based on his work last week and conversations with senior Russian officials, Toon has not found any evidence to buttress Yeltsin's statement.

Toon and his delegation received good cooperation from the Russians last week. In meetings with his counterpart, General Volkogonov, External Intelligence Chief Primakov and others, it became clear that Yeltsin is pushing his subordinates hard to uncover any information on Americans in Russian prisons and psychiatric institutions. Yeltsin and Volkogonov clearly want to unearth whatever information is available in the Russian archives and make it available to us and to the public.

Since a complete search of the Russian archives could take years, Toon convinced Volkogonov to agree to the following assurances:

- That the Russian government determine by mid-July whether or not it believes there are American POW/MIAs on Russian soil in view of the best available evidence, and make that determination public;
- That the U.S. and Russia follow up jointly any future leads from Russian citizens or others on the presence of Americans in Russia;

- That the Russians focus their research over the next few months on more recent conflicts such as Vietnam where the likelihood of living Americans is greater than on older events such as World War Two.

Until the Russians issue an official judgment on this latest review of the Russian archives, there will continue to be considerable press and public interest in this issue. Toon will brief the White House press corps on his trip and initial conclusions following your meeting with him. He will also consult with interested Senate and House members this week.

The work of our Joint POW/MIA Commission with the Russians, begun in March, will focus on this issue for the next few months. Toon and Volkogonov plan to meet in late August to review developments and task new efforts to cover the range of its work -- from the Second World War to Afghanistan.

- o My policies are designed to provide an independent and prosperous economic future for farmers while protecting the safety net.
- o Based on: Expanding markets in trade and industrial uses of ag products (ethanol), making concerted efforts to open foreign markets and seek a reduction in unfair foreign subsidized competition and getting government out of the farmer's way.
- o We pushed a more market-oriented, flexible farm package.
- o It means free to plant what the free-market seeks, not what government dictates.
- o My program is aimed at building prosperous economic future: more trade, increased jobs.

2) Q: Farmers and ranchers are getting creamed by escalating health insurance premiums. Yet Washington seems not to care.

- o I care. I sent my health benefits package to Congress. There's been no action.
- o It's especially important to self-employed people in agriculture.
- o My health benefits package extends the current 25 percent deductibility on health insurance premiums to 100 percent of the premium costs by 1996.
- o Tremendous benefit to farmers, ranchers and others who are self-employed.

3) Q: The GATT talks have been dragging on for nearly six years. What was announced as a lion has -- so far -- been a mouse. And a lot of farmers think you or your negotiators will sell agriculture down the river, just to get an agreement. How do you respond to that?

- o I'm going to fight -- have been fighting -- to open the doors where they are locked.
- o Agriculture exports are vital -- 25 percent of what we sell is sold abroad.

6) Q: Are you going to extend more credit to the Russians?

- o Russia and the other republics of the former Soviet Union are among American farmers most important customers for grains.
- o We have extended \$4.85 (nearly \$5) billion in credit guarantees since Jan '91 to keep the exports flowing.
- o The Russians are repaying their loans in full on time.
- o I want our farmers to remain the most reliable supplier of ag products for this huge Russian market. I will be seeking every opportunity to accomplish that.

7) Q: What are you going to do about the oilseeds case against the EC?

- o GATT panels have twice said that the EC oilseeds policy is unfair to our farmers and that the EC should change its policy accordingly.
- o The EC has proposed to give us compensation under GATT procedures. We are examining this. Meanwhile, we have a retaliation list out for public comment right now. If there is no adequate response from the EC, we will be forced to retaliate until such time as they resolve the situation.

- o But I'm not going to sign an agreement that is going to undermine our farmers' ability to compete.
- o Economic summit...Munich update?

4) Q: Continuing on the same topic of trade, the North America Free Trade Agreement is being negotiated now. But farmers in southern states -- a base of GOP support in recent elections -- are skeptical. Fruit and vegetable growers especially. They say they'll be hard-hit by cheap imports from Mexico. What about that?

- o Some people doubted the U.S. Canada Free Trade Agreement, too, but exports agriculture have increased more than one-third or over \$1 billion in just 3 years.
- o Yes, there are some concerns. We'd have long-term phase in periods for sensitive crops and import safeguards should the unforeseen happen.
- o The point is: overall, we need to expand trade with other nations -- on an equal footing.
- o And Mexico is a market of more than 90 million consumers. It's already our third largest trading partner in agriculture. But we can do more.

5) Q: Critics say agriculture is draining thousands of acres of wetlands, and yet you've proclaimed that there be "no net loss" of wetlands. How do you explain that?

- o There is no incompatibility with my pledge to have "no net loss" of wetlands and a prosperous farm economy. We can protect the important wetlands of the nation and still have a balanced, sensible approach to that protection that takes property rights into account.
- o I think farmers are America's first environmentalists. They do not want to damage their property, or apply excessive chemicals. It's not in their interest to do so. But they need tools and information to avoid those mistakes.
- o We have a strong wetlands program in agriculture. Swampbuster, for example.
- o And I just announced in California last month the implementation of the Wetlands Reserve Program. If funded by Congress it will restore 1 million acres of wetlands by 1995, without imposing a burden on farmers.
- o But here's where I draw the line: Wetlands should be wet. A farmer's property rights must not be abridged. And if farmers can plant crops on their land without draining more wetlands, they ought to be able to do so.
- o Incidentally, I saw last week that Congress is attempting to cut off funding for two important programs that help farmers help the environment: WRP (Wetlands Reserve Program) and CRP (Conservation Reserve Program). We asked for those programs because we would rather help farmers be good environmentalist than dictate from Washington how they should farm. Congress is wrong on this one.

Q & A on the Supreme Court Lucas Case

Q: What is the implication of yesterday's Lucas v. South Carolina Coastal Council decision for wetlands regulation?

- A:
- My Administration has consistently urged the Supreme Court to protect private property rights.
 - We filed a brief in the Lucas case urging the Court to reverse the South Carolina decision denying Lucas compensation for loss of the use of his land, and I am pleased that the Supreme Court adopted the result we urged.
 - How this case will affect wetlands regulation is unclear, but let me say:
 - The Lucas case reaffirms our belief that a proper balance can be struck between the rights of private property owners and the public interest in protecting the wetlands.
 - We are taking steps to help America's farmers comply with wetlands regulations. Our voluntary easements program in the 1993 budget includes a request for \$800 million to encourage farmers to remove high priority wetlands from production.
 - We will continue to support strongly the rights of private property owners.

Q&A on GATT Trigger

Q. Do you intend to fully implement the GATT Trigger?

A. Two years ago, I worked with Congress to include in law a pair of "GATT triggers" to ensure that the interests of American farmers are adequately safeguarded. The first of those triggers takes effect today, June 30th. Let me tell you what that means:

- First, we will continue to produce what we need to compete -- so we will implement a 0% Acreage Reduction Program for wheat.
- Second, we are prepared to waive minimum acreage set-asides for other commodities.
- Third, we will establish a marketing loan for wheat and feed-grains.
- And fourth, we will increase the levels of programs promoting American agricultural exports by 1 billion dollars.

The message is simple: I will continue to work for an agreement -- but until one is reached, we will defend the interests of American agriculture.

Mitterrand's visit also signaled that France would no longer brook Serbian foot-dragging despite historic ties to Belgrade.

The visit seems to have contributed to positive moves on the ground. The French have sent in humanitarian supplies by plane. French army specialists and equipment to help get the airport operational are enroute if not already in place. They hope to be able to fly in additional French and Canadian troops under the UN flag to operate the airport and provide security.

Today the French Defense Ministry briefed us on French plans and asked to set up close cooperation with us and the British for any

military operations under UN auspices. However, we know that the French have been pushing hard in private to have the WEU assume a large role in the operation and to minimize both our role and that of NATO: they have gone to the UN Secretary General to question possible use of U-2 flights to gather intelligence, they have reportedly urged the SYG to let the WEU take charge of the operation, and they complained when it looked like we might have military air controllers on the ground in Bosnia. The French are pushing WEU to prepare an enhanced contribution for the aid effort and have blocked any formal NATO planning for a role.

We are told that Mitterrand may also raise Iraq and your invitation to Camp David. In response to the Iraqi misbehavior, we have proposed additional pressure on Iraq to comply with UN resolutions and a specific demand that Iraq not use PC-7 aircraft against civilians in the south and that these aircraft be moved north or face the consequences. The French are generally favorable but think our deadline is too short. We can let that slip a bit, but we want to move quickly.

Mitterrand has accepted your invitation to dinner on Sunday in Munich. But our proposed July 26-27 dates for Camp David interfere with his planned visit to the opening of the Barcelona Olympics so he may suggest alternative dates.

BACKGROUND: The Senate will vote today on several procedural motions to Senator Seymour's (R-CA) Balanced Budget Amendment. The first vote will be a Kasten (R-WI) Amendment to require a 3/5 majority of each House to vote for tax increases. The second vote is a Byrd (D-WV) amendment requiring you to submit a budget plan by the first of September that will show a balanced budget by 1998. If this amendment passes, there will be no further votes on the Balanced Budget Amendment. If the Byrd Amendment fails, the next vote will be to invoke cloture, or limit debate, on the Seymour amendment (60 votes necessary).

Senator Paul Simon (D-IL), the lead Democratic proponent of a Balanced Budget Amendment, will be pivotal in voting down the Byrd amendment and in trying to invoke cloture.

-- Paul, I appreciate all you have done to help promote the Balanced Budget Amendment in the Senate. I hope you can continue to work to get it passed today.

-- I realize it is an outside shot, but I believe we must do everything possible to pass the amendment in the Senate and push the House to take another vote.

- This will likely be our last opportunity this year to pass this important legislation. I stand ready to do what I can to get it through the Senate today.

ACTION:

Senator Mark Hatfield (R-OR) is leaning against supporting the Balanced Budget Amendment. He could be very influential with wavering Republicans by voting against the Byrd amendment and for cloture.

SUBJECT: Letter to President Salinas on Alvarez Machain Case

Purpose

To clear the air with the Government of Mexico on the Alvarez Machain case so that our cooperation in the battle against narcotics traffickers can continue and improve.

Background

Attached at Tab A is a letter for your signature to President Salinas which we believe will make it possible to put the Alvarez Machain case into perspective and to maintain and strengthen the close and mutually beneficial cooperation we enjoy with Mexico in the fight against narcotics trafficking.

The letter has been cleared with both State and Justice. It is the central element of a package which includes a new agreement on DEA rules of operation and a letter from Secretary Baker to Mexico Foreign Secretary Solana acknowledging, as we have done with Canada, that crossborder abductions by bounty hunters are an extraditable offense. We will tell the Mexicans that this is as far as we can go and we hope the Government of Mexico will accept the package as a final solution to the concerns they expressed in the wake of the Alvarez Machain decision. Ambassador Negroponte believes that the package will achieve our objective.
